# OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Columbus, Ohio, February 1, 1985

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Friday, February 1, 1985, at The Ohio State University Fawcett Center for Tomorrow, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

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Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

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The Chairman, Mr. Hilliker, called the meeting of the Board of Trustees to order at 12:00 noon. He requested the Secretary to call the roll. The meeting recessed into Executive Session for the purpose of considering legal issues and personnel-related matters.

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#### COMMENTS ON DIVESTMENT

President Jennings made the following statement:

During the Fiscal Affairs Committee meeting this morning we heard a very strong and analytical report from our student body on the issue of investments in South Africa. That group has recommended that we create a committee with at least three student representatives chosen by the Students Against Apartheid. Upon reflection, I think that seems very reasonable and I would like to endorse that recommendation and to move forward in the next few weeks to work with the students to form such a committee for the process of review that we intend to conduct in the next two months--if that seems acceptable.

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AMENDMENTS OF BYLAWS OF UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS BOARD Resolution No. 85-70

Synopsis: Changes in the approved sections of the Bylaws to reflect current unit/operating official title designations; reporting procedure and committee assignments of the University Hospitals Board are proposed.

WHEREAS pursuant to 3335-103-01 of the University Hospitals Board Bylaws, the University Hospitals Board Bylaws may be amended by The Ohio State University Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS the proposed revisions to Bylaws 3335-93-01, 3335-93-03, 3335-97-02, 3335-97-03, 3335-97-04, 3335-97-05, 3335-99-01, 3335-101-06, and 3335-101-07 have been endorsed and ratified by the University Hospitals Board:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That Bylaws as follows of the Administrative Code be amended to read:

#### AMENDED BYLAWS

3335-93-01 University hospitals board.

- (A) The body responsible to the Ohio state university board of trustees for oversight of patient care services, the university hospitals' support of the Ohio state university health sciences academic programs, shall be known as the university hospitals board (herein called board).
  - (6) The president of the Ohio state university will serve as the university's primary administrative contact with the hospitals board and shall interpret proposals and recommend actions of the hospitals board to the university's board of trustees.

3335-93-03 Accountability.

- (A) The appointment of the executive director of university hospitals will be approved by the Ohio state university board of trustees upon recommendation of the president of the university following consultation with the hospitals board.
- 3335-97-02 Executive committee.
- (B) Composition. The executive committee of the board shall consist of: the chairman of the board, who will serve as chairman of the committee; the vice chairman of the board; the immediate past chairman of the board; the president of the university; and the chairmen of all standing committees of the board. The vice president for health services, or other officer designated by the president of the university, and the dean of the college of medicine are to be ex-officio members without vote. Any standing committee chairman may designate a member of that committee who is also a hospitals board member to represent the chairman at any meeting of the executive committee. As non-voting secretary of the board, the hospitals executive director shall attend all meetings of the executive committee and act as its secretary.

3335-97-03 Joint conference committee.

- (A) (1) Accreditation. The committee shall be responsible for advising the hospitals board on all matters relevant to accreditation within the hospitals. The committee shall monitor hospitals operation to identify areas of potential non-compliance with accreditation standards and shall make recommendations to the hospitals board and to the medical staff for appropriate action.
- (B) Composition. The hospitals board shall be represented on the joint conference committee by five (5) members of the hospitals board to be appointed annually by the hospitals board chairman. The immediate past

chairman of the board shall be included among the hospitals board members appointed to the committee, and shall serve as an ex-officio member.

Other members of the joint conference committee will be as follows: the executive director of university hospitals, the dean of the college of medicine, the medical director of the hospitals, the associate executive director of nursing services, the chief of staff or person in equivalent position, and two additional members of the medical staff selected by the organized medical staff. The executive director of university hospitals will serve as secretary of the committee.

- 3335-97-04 Finance committee.
- (B) Composition. The finance committee shall consist of four board members appointed annually by the chairman of the board, one of whom shall be the chairman of this committee; the Ohio state university vice president for health services or designee; the Ohio state university fiscal officer or designee; the Ohio state university vice president for personnel services or designee; the hospitals medical director or designee; and the chief of medical staff or designee. The immediate past chairman of the board shall serve as an ex-officio member.
- 3335-97-05 Hospital facilities committee.
- (B) Composition. The committee shall consist of five board members, appointed annually by the chairman of the board, one of whom shall serve as chairman of the committee; the Ohio state university vice president for health services or designee; the Ohio state university vice president for business and finance or designee; the Ohio state university fiscal officer or designee; the medical director of the hospitals or designee; and the chief of medical staff or designee. The immediate past chairman of the board shall serve as an ex-officio member.
- 3335-99-01 Relationships of hospitals to health sciences, academic, and research programs.

The health sciences colleges of the university carry out a significant portion of their educational and research activity in university hospitals. Although the board has not been delegated specific responsibilities for academic programs, it shall lend its best efforts to assure that the programs of the health sciences colleges are effectively supported in collaboration with the hospitals patient care programs. The vice president for health services shall be charged with maintaining an effective liaison between the health sciences colleges and the hospitals board to assure excellence in both academic and patient care programs. (B/T 5/2/80, B/T 2/1/85)

3335-101-06 Medical staff administrative committee.

(B) Composition. The medical board of the medical staff shall be known as the medical staff administrative committee which shall be composed of the chief of staff, the chief of staff-elect, the chiefs of clinical departments, three at-large members elected by the medical staff, the

medical director, and the executive director of hospitals. The medical director, who is appointed by the dean of the college of medicine and the vice president for health services subject to approval by the board, shall serve as chairperson of the medical staff administrative committee.

- 3335-101-07 Hospital clinical departments.
- (A) Appointment of the chief of each clinical department is subject to approval by the board on the recommendation of the dean of the applicable professional school and the vice president for health services. All such appointments shall be periodically reviewed by the board. Chiefs of clinical departments vacancies may be filled on an interim basis at any time by action of the dean of the appropriate professional college, after consulting with the board. (In general, the chiefs of clinical departments will be chairmen of corresponding academic departments in the medical college.)
- (C) The dean of the college of medicine serves as the chief medical officer of the hospitals and in this capacity is accountable directly to the vice president for health services and to the board. In matters relating to medical care in the hospitals, members of the clinical departments of the hospitals are accountable to their clinical chiefs, who are accountable to the medical director, who is accountable to the dean of the college of medicine. (B/T 5/2/80, B/T 9/5/80, B/T 2/1/85)

Upon motion of Mr. Immke, seconded by Mrs. Bowser, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous voice vote.

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BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS

Resolution No. 85-71

Synopsis: Ratification and confirmation of rule number and reference sequence relating to Bylaws of the Medical Staff of The Ohio State University Hospitals (Rule 3335-43-01 through 3335-43-14).

WHEREAS pursuant to Resolution #83-76 this Board approved at its February 4, 1983 meeting the adoption of Bylaws of the Medical Staff of The Ohio State University Hospitals; and

WHEREAS subsequent to this approval action subject rules have been filed with the Secretary of State pursuant to Section 111.15 of the Ohio Revised Code and have been designated in the Administrative Code as follows: 3335-43-01, 3335-43-02, 3335-43-03, 3335-43-04, 3335-43-05, 3335-43-06, 3335-43-07, 3335-43-08, 3335-43-09, 3335-43-10, 3335-43-11, 3335-43-12, 3335-43-13, 3335-43-14, and Appendices; and

WHEREAS it is desirable now to ratify and confirm the rule number and reference sequence specified herein as rules 3335-43-01 through 3335-43-14 as Bylaws of the Medical Staff of The Ohio State University Hospitals:

#### NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board does hereby ratify and confirm the rule number and reference sequence specified as 3335-43-01 through 3335-43-14 as Bylaws of the Medical Staff of The Ohio State University Hospitals to read:

#### Chapter 3335-43

3335-43-01 Medical staff name.

The board of trustees of the Ohio state university, by official action on September 13, 1963, established "the Ohio state university hospitals." The board of trustees of the Ohio state university, on November 30, 1979, amended rule 3335-1-03 of the Administrative Code to create a university hospitals board and on April 4, 1980, appointed twelve citizen members and three trustee members to serve on the hospitals board. According to Chapters 3335-93-01 to 3335-93-03 of the Administrative Code, the hospitals board designated that the medical staff of the Ohio state university hospitals be delegated the responsibility to prepare and recommend adoption of these bylaws. The dean of the college of medicine serves as the chief medical officer of the hospitals and in this capacity is accountable directly to the vice president for health services and to the board. "The medical staff of the Ohio state university hospitals" shall be the name of the hospitals' medical staff organization.

3335-43-02 Purpose.

The purpose of the medical staff of the Ohio state university hospitals shall be:

- (A) To ensure that all patients admitted to the university hospitals shall receive the best possible care and treatment in a teaching environment, realizing that the care and treatment of the individual patient is the medical responsibility of the member of the attending, courtesy, or honorary medical staff to whose care the patient is admitted or transferred.
- (B) To support educational and research programs; elevate and advance the educational standards of our profession, including, but not limited to, our pre- and post-M.D. students, nurse students, graduate nurse students, students of the allied medical professions, and students of other health professional colleges; provide research programs to enhance and advance the educational and patient-care programs.
- (C) To provide a means whereby medical problems may be reviewed; policies and procedures discussed; and to provide a means for establishing and

maintaining standards of professional, medical and educational performance, organization, and discipline within the medical staff and harmonious cooperation and understanding among the units comprising the university hospitals.

(D) To provide service, education and research programs to benefit the mental, physical, and environmental health of the citizens of the state of Ohio; dedicate itself to be responsive to the needs of its patients and to communicate effectively concerning matters of patient care; and encourage dissemination of medical knowledge to health professionals and the public, and conduct research for the prevention and treatment of disease.

3335-43-03 Patients.

- (A) The care and treatment of individual patients is the medical responsibility of the member of the attending, courtesy or honorary medical staff to whose care the patient is admitted or transferred within the university hospitals.
- (B) There shall be only one category or classification of patients in the university hospitals, and those patients are the private patients of the medical staff under whose care they are admitted. Patients admitted to university hospitals who, at the time of admission, have not requested or selected a member of the medical staff to attend them shall be assigned for their care and treatment, by the chief of the appropriate clinical division or department or their designees, to a member of the medical staff.
- (C) All patients admitted to the university hospitals should cooperate and be an integral part of the teaching program of the college of medicine. Should a patient, or on the behalf of the patient, the patient's next of kin, or guardian, refuse to participate or cooperate in the teaching program of the university hospitals or the college of medicine, the medical staff responsible for the care and treatment of the patient will encourage participation in the university's teaching programs. Students, including pre- and post-M.D., but not limited thereto, are under the direction and control of the members of the medical staff to whom the patient is assigned upon admission to the hospital or transfer within the university hospitals' services.
- 3335-43-04 Membership
- (A) Qualifications.
  - (1) Membership on the medical staff of the Ohio state university hospitals is a privilege extended to doctors of medicine, osteopathic medicine, dental surgery, and to practitioners of podiatry who consistently meet the qualifications, standards, and requirements set forth in the bylaws, rules and regulations of the medical staff, the university hospitals board and the board of trustees of the Ohio state university.

- (2)All members of the medical staff of the Ohio state university hospitals shall be members of the faculty of the Ohio state university college of medicine, or in the case of dentists, of the Ohio state university college of dentistry, and shall be duly licensed to practice in the state of Ohio. Only those physicians, dentists, and practitioners of podiatry who can document their education, training, experience, competence, adherence to the ethics of their profession, dedication to educational and research-goals, and ability to work with others with sufficient adequacy to assure the university hospitals board and the board of trustees of the Ohio state university that any patient treated by them at university hospitals will be given the high quality of medical care provided at university hospitals, shall be qualified for membership on the medical staff of the Ohio state university hospitals.
- (B) Application for membership.

Initial application for medical staff membership shall be made by the applicant to the chief of the clinical department on prescribed forms stating the qualifications and references of the applicant and giving an account of his professional training and experience. Applications may be made only if the qualifications are fulfilled as outlined in paragraph (A) of this rule. A supporting letter from the chief of the clinical department is necessary. It shall include written statements of the applicant to abide by the bylaws, rules and regulations of the medical staff, the university hospitals board, and the board of trustees of the Ohio state university. The application shall also contain a statement acknowledging that membership on the medical staff requires participation in the peer review process of evaluating credentials, medical staff membership and clinical privileges, and that a condition for membership requires mutual covenants between all members of the medical staff to release one another from civil liability in this review process as long as the peer review is not conducted in bad faith, with malice, or without reasonable effort to ascertain the accuracy of information being disclosed or relied upon.

(C) Terms of appointment.

Initial appointment to the medical staff, will be for a period extending to the end of the fiscal year (first of July through thirtieth of June). Reappointment to the medical staff shall be done on an annual basis and for a period of not more than one fiscal year. Initial appointments, except for the honorary and limited categories, will be provisional for six months regardless of the date of his appointment.

(D) Ethics and ethical relationship.

The code of ethics as adopted, or as may be amended, by the American Medical Association, or the American Dental Association shall govern the professional ethical conduct of the respective members of the medical staff.

## (E) Procedure for appointment.

- (1)The written and signed application for membership on the medical staff shall be presented to the chief of the clinical department. The applicant shall include in the application a signed statement indicating that if he should be accepted to membership on the medical staff, he agrees to be governed by the bylaws, rules and regulations of the medical staff, the university hospitals board and the board of trustees of the Ohio state university. Signing the application also constitutes a consent to be interviewed in regard to the application, authorizes university hospitals to consult with members of the medical staffs of other hospitals with which the applicant has been or has attempted to be associated, and with others who may have information bearing on his competence, character and ethical qualifications. The applicant also consents to university hospitals' inspection of all records and documents that may be material to the evaluation of his professional qualifications and competence to carry out the clinical, medical and educational privileges for which he is applying as well as his professional ethical qualifications for medical staff membership and further releases from any liability all representatives of university hospitals for acts performed concerning this process. The applicant has an affirmative duty to disclose any prior or current challenges to his licensure or any loss of membership in any medical, dental, or podiatric professional organization or loss of medical staff membership or privileges at any other hospital. Upon request of the medical staff administrative committee or university hospitals board, the applicant will document his physical and mental status with sufficient adequacy to demonstrate that any patient treated by the applicant will receive care of a generally professionally recognized level of guality and efficiency. The conditions of this paragraph shall be deemed continuing and may be applicable to issues of continued good standing as a member of the medical staff.
- (2) Each chief of a clinical department will be responsible for investigating and verifying the character, gualifications, and professional standing of the applicant and shall submit a report of those findings and recommendations to the medical director of university hospitals who shall forward the application to the medical staff administrative committee for action. The chief of the clinical department shall be responsible to see that each applicant is reviewed and reported upon within three months.
- (3) The medical staff administrative committee shall recommend to the medical director and the chief of the clinical department that the application be accepted, further investigated, or rejected. The medical director will forward the application, with recommendations of the chief of the clinical department, and his own recommendations, to the joint conference committee of the university hospitals board, who will recommend appropriate action to the university hospitals board. The university hospitals board

shall make their recommendation to the board of trustees of the Ohio state university by communicating through the president of the Ohio state university.

- (4) When the board of trustees of the Ohio state university has acted, the secretary of the board shall inform the chief of the clinical department to transmit the decision to the applicant and, if appropriate, to the chief of the clinical division. The secretary of the board shall also notify the dean of the college of medicine, the medical director and the executive director of the university hospitals of the decision.
- (F) Procedure for reappointment.
  - (1) At least sixty days prior to the scheduled final medical staff administrative committee meeting of the fiscal year (first of July through thirtieth of June), the chief of the clinical department shall review the information available on each physician in his department for the purpose of determining recommendations for reappointment to the medical staff and for granting clinical privileges for the ensuing year. Those recommendations shall be transmitted in writing to the medical director at least thirty days prior to the scheduled final medical staff administrative committee meeting of the fiscal year. Where reappointment is recommended the subsequent procedure will be the same as upon appointment. Where a non-reappointment or a change in clinical privileges is recommended, the reason for such recommendation shall be stated. The medical director will forward the recommendations to the medical staff administrative committee.
  - (2) The basis on which the chiefs of the departments are to act concerning the reappointment of a medical staff member and the clinical privileges to be granted upon such reappointment shall be a member's professional competence; clinical judgment; ethical conduct; participation in staff affairs; compliance with the bylaws, rules and regulations of the medical staff, the university hospitals board, and the board of trustees of the Ohio state university; cooperation with university hospitals' personnel and the use of the hospitals' facilities for patients; relations with other physicians, other health professionals or other staff, and his professional attitude toward patients; and the responsibility to the university hospitals and the public.
  - (3) When the medical staff administrative committee is notified of a recommendation of non-reappointment or adverse change in clinical privileges, they shall instruct the dean of the college of medicine to give written notice to the affected member of the decision, the stated reason for the decision, and the member's right to a hearing pursuant to paragraphs (A) and (B) of rule 3335-43-06 of the Administrative Code. This notification and an opportunity to exhaust the administrative appeal process shall occur prior to the imposition of the proposed penalties unless the

emergency provisions outlined in paragraph (D) of rule 3335-43-05 of the Administrative Code apply. The notice by the dean shall be sent certified return receipt mail to the affected member's last known address as determined by university records.

- (4) If the affected member of the medical staff does not make a written request for a hearing to the medical director within fourteen days after receipt of the adverse decision, it shall be deemed a waiver of his right to any review by the medical staff administrative committee to which he might otherwise have been entitled on the matter.
- (5) If a timely, written request for hearing is made, the procedures set forth in rule 3335-43-06 of the Administrative Code shall apply.
- 3335-43-05 Corrective action.

#### (A) Procedures.

- (1)Whenever the activities or professional conduct of a member of the medical staff of university hospitals violates the standards or aims of the medical staff or standards of professional conduct; is considered to be disruptive to the operation of the university hospitals; violates the bylaws, rules and regulations of the medical staff, the university hospitals board, or the board of trustees of the Ohio state university; or the state or federal law; corrective action against such a medical staff member may be initiated by a chief of a clinical division or chief of a clinical department, the medical director, an officer or member of the medical staff, the executive director of university hospitals, the dean of the college of medicine, any member of the board of the Ohio state university hospitals, the vice president for health services, the president of the Ohio state university, and any member of the board of trustees of the Ohio state university. All requests for corrective action shall be in writing, shall be submitted to the dean of the college of medicine, and shall be supported by reference to the specific activities or conduct which constitute grounds for the requested action.
- (2) The dean of the college of medicine shall promptly notify the affected member of the medical staff, in a confidential manner, that a request for corrective action has been made, and inform him of the specific activities or conduct which constitutes grounds for the requested action. The dean shall investigate the matter in whatever manner he deems appropriate. Whenever the dean determines that further action is warranted and that corrective action could result, which action could involve a reduction, suspension or revocation of clinical privileges, the dean shall refer the requests to the chief of the clinical department in which the staff member has clinical privileges, who shall impanel the investigation committee. If the chief of the clinical department is the staff member charged, or has initiated the corrective

action, the dean shall designate a physician member of his administrative staff to fulfill the functions herein specified for said chief. The affected member of the medical staff shall be notified of the referral to the investigation committee, and be informed that these medical staff bylaws will govern all further proceedings. The dean shall designate a physician member of his administrative staff to exercise any or all duties or responsibilities assigned to him under these rules for implementing corrective action and appellate procedure only if:

- (a) He is the medical staff member charged;
- (b) He is responsible for having the charges brought against another medical staff member; or
- (c) There is an obvious conflict of interest.

If the dean decides that no further action is warranted, he will notify the person(s) who filed the request for corrective action and the member accused, in writing, that no further action will be taken.

- (3) The investigation committee will investigate the request for corrective action and shall report within two weeks its findings and recommendations for action to the chief of the clinical department or the dean's designee. The chief of the clinical department or the dean's designee will forward his recommendation and the findings and recommendations of the investigation committee to the dean of the college of medicine. Prior to making such a report to the dean, the medical staff member against whom the corrective action has been requested shall have an opportunity to interview the chief of the clinical department or the dean's designee. At such interview, the medical staff member shall be informed of the specific activities alleged to constitute grounds for corrective action, and of the specific evidence which the investigation committee and the chief of the clinical department or the dean's designee have discovered which is material to the charge. The medical staff member shall be invited to discuss, explain or refute the charge or the evidence thus far adduced. The medical staff member may furnish written or oral information to the chief at this time. However, such interview shall not constitute a hearing, but shall be investigative in nature. The medical staff member shall not be represented by an attorney at this interview.
- (4) Following receipt by the dean of the college of medicine of the report from the investigation committee and the chief of the clinical department, the dean shall decide whether the grounds for the requested corrective action are such as could involve a reduction, suspension or revocation of clinical privileges. If the

dean decides that the grounds are not substantiated, he will notify the investigation committee; chief of the clinical department; person(s) who filed the charge; and the medical staff member affected, in writing, that no further action will be taken. If the dean decides that the grounds for corrective action are substantiated, the dean shall notify the chief of staff to impanel a grievance committee of the medical staff as outlined in paragraph (C) of this rule. The affected member of the medical staff shall be promptly notified by the dean and permitted to make an appearance before the grievance committee of the medical staff. The rules of conduct of the meeting shall be as outlined in paragraph (C) of this rule. The grievance committee will forward its findings and recommendations for action to the dean of the college of medicine, medical director, chief of staff and the accused member of the medical staff.

- (5) Following receipt by the dean of the college of medicine of the report from the grievance committee, the dean shall decide whether the grounds for the requested corrective action are such as could involve a reduction, suspension or revocation of clinical privileges. If the dean decides the grounds are not substantiated, he will notify the grievance committee, the person(s) who filed the charge and the medical staff member affected in writing that no further action will be taken. In the event the dean finds the grounds for the requested corrective action are substantiated he may accept, reject or modify the corrective action recommended by the grievance committee and notify the medical staff member of his decision and of the affected medical staff member's appeal rights pursuant to rule 3335-43-06 of the Administrative Code. This notification and an opportunity to exhaust the administrative appeal process shall occur prior to the imposition of the proposed penalties unless the emergency provisions outlined in paragraph (D) of this rule apply. This notice by the dean shall be sent certified return receipt mail to the affected member's last known address as determined by university records.
- (6) If the affected member of the medical staff does not make a written request for a hearing to the medical director within fourteen days after receipt of the adverse decision, it shall be deemed a waiver of his right to any review by the medical staff administrative committee to which he might otherwise have been entitled on the matter.
- (7) If a timely, written request for hearing is made, the procedures set forth in rule 3335-43-06 of the Administrative Code shall apply.
- (B) Composition of investigation committee.

BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS (contd)

- At the beginning of the fiscal year, the chief of the clinical department shall select four members of the department to serve on the standing investigation committee of the department. Three members shall be designated permanent members and one shall serve as an alternate.
- (2) The investigation committee, when called into session by the chief of the clinical department, shall consist of three members of the medical staff. The alternate shall attend all meetings. When necessary, additional alternates may be selected.
- (C) Composition of grievance committee.
  - (1) At the first meeting of the medical staff, during the fall quarter of each academic year, the chief of the medical staff shall submit, for approval by the staff, the names of thirty members of the staff (who shall not be members of the medical staff administrative committee) whom he has chosen as being appropriate to sit on the grievance committee when they are selected, by lot, to do so.
  - (2) The grievance committee, when called into session by the chief of staff, shall consist of five members of the staff whose names have been chosen by lot from the thirty chosen. No person shall be eligible for selection to serve on two successive grievance committees. The chief of the medical staff shall have authority to rule upon alleged conflicts of interest or disqualifications involving grievance committee members.
  - (3) Each grievance committee shall choose from among its number a chairman who shall preside over it and, with the advice and consent of the committee, speak for it, during the hearing, rule on the matters relevant to its proceedings, and arrange for the conduct of the committee's administration. All grievance committee members shall be required to hear all evidence presented. Any recommendation that involves a reduction, suspension, or revocation of clinical privileges may be by majority decision of the committee. If circumstances make attendance by a member of the grievance committee at a hearing impossible, or require an excessive postponement, the chief of staff shall order the remaining four to act upon a clear majority of the remaining four, or shall immediately select a new grievance committee. If more than one member cannot hear all the evidence, a new committee shall be composed.
  - (4) The affected medical staff member shall have the right to personally appear before the grievance committee, to crossexamine witnesses, and to submit to the grievance committee written evidence and memoranda relevant to the issues. The staff member shall be fully apprised of all allegations and all evidence known to the grievance committee, and shall be entitled to

BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS (contd)

discuss, explain and refute all evidence adduced against him. The affected medical staff member shall not be represented by an attorney before the grievance committee.

- (D) Summary suspension.
  - (1) Notwithstanding the provisions of this rule, a member of the medical staff shall have all or any portion of his clinical privileges suspended by the dean of the college of medicine, the medical director, or the chief of his clinical department whenever such action must be taken immediately in the best interest of patient care. Such summary suspension shall become effective immediately upon imposition and the medical staff member will be subsequently notified in writing of the suspension by the dean of the college of medicine. Such notice shall be by certified return mail to the affected medical staff member's last known address as determined by university records.
  - (2) A medical staff member whose privileges have been summarily suspended shall be entitled to appeal the suspension pursuant to rule 3335-43-06 of the Administrative Code. If the affected member of the medical staff does not make a written request for a hearing to the medical director within fourteen days after receipt of the adverse decision, it shall be deemed a waiver of his right to any review by the medical staff administrative committee to which he might otherwise have been entitled on the matter. If a timely, written request for a hearing is made, the procedures of rule 3335-43-06 of the Administrative Code shall apply.
  - (3) Immediately upon the imposition of a summary suspension, the dean of the college of medicine, the medical director, or the appropriate chief of a clinical department shall have the authority to provide for alternative medical coverage for the patients of the suspended medical staff member who remain in the hospital at the time of suspension. The wishes of the patient shall be considered in the selection of such alternative medical coverage.
- (E) Automatic suspension.
  - (1) Notwithstanding the provisions of this rule, a temporary suspension in the form of withdrawal of a medical staff member's admitting privileges, effective until medical records are completed, may be imposed automatically by the medical director after a warning, in writing, of delinquency for failure to complete medical records as defined by the rules and regulations of the medical staff. The medical director shall notify the executive director of the university hospitals of the action taken.

BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS (contd)

- (2) Action by the state boards of licensure revoking or suspending a medical staff member's license or placing him upon probation will automatically impose the same restrictions to his university hospitals' privileges.
- 3335-43-06 Hearing and appellate review procedure.
- (A) Right to hearing before the medical staff administrative committee and to appellate review.
  - (1) When a member of the medical staff who has exhausted his remedies under paragraph (F) of rule 3335-43-04 of the Administrative Code on reappointments; or under rule 3335-43-05 of the Administrative Code for corrective action; or who has been summarily or automatically suspended under paragraph (D) or (E) of rule 3335-43-05 of the Administrative Code; receives notice of a proposed action by the dean of the college of medicine or the medical director that will adversely affect his reappointment as a member of the medical staff or his exercise of clinical privileges. The staff member shall be entitled to a hearing before the medical staff administrative committee which will submit a written report, including its recommendations, to the chairman of the joint conference committee of the university hospitals board within seven days of the conclusion of hearing evidence.
  - (2) All hearings and appellate reviews shall be in accordance with the procedural safeguards set forth in this rule to assure that the affected medical staff member is accorded all rights to which he is entitled.
- (B) Request for hearing.
  - (1) The request for a hearing before the medical staff administrative committee shall be submitted in writing by the affected medical staff member to the medical director within fourteen days of notification by the dean or medical director of his intended action. The medical director shall forward the request to the medical staff administrative committee along with instructions to convene a hearing.
  - (2) The failure of a medical staff member to request a hearing before the medical staff administrative committee, to which he is entitled by these bylaws within the time and in the manner herein provided, shall be deemed a waiver of his right to any review by the medical staff administrative committee to which he might otherwise have been entitled on the matter. The dean of the college of medicine shall then implement the decision and that action shall become and remain effective against the medical staff member in the same manner as a final decision of the board of trustees of the Ohio state university as provided for in paragraph (F) of this rule. The dean shall promptly inform the

BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS (contd)

affected medical staff member that the proposed decision which had entitled the medical staff member to a hearing has now become final.

- (C) Notice of hearing.
  - (1)Within fourteen days after receipt of a request for hearing by the medical director from a medical staff member entitled to the same, the medical staff administrative committee shall schedule and arrange for such a hearing and shall, through the dean, notify the medical staff member in writing of the time, place, and date so scheduled. The medical staff member shall be given at least ten days prior notice of the scheduled hearing, provided that this notice may be waived in writing by the medical staff member. Notice shall be by certified return receipt mail to the staff member at his last known address as reflected by university records. The hearing or initial hearing, should more than one hearing be required, shall not be less than fourteen days nor more than thirty days from the date of the receipt of the request for hearing by the medical director; provided, however, that a hearing for a medical staff member who is under suspension, which is then in effect, shall be held as soon as arrangements may be reasonably made.
  - (2) The notice of hearing shall state in concise language the acts or omissions with which the medical staff member is charged; a list of representative charts or documents being used; names of potential witnesses to be called; and any other reason or evidence that may be considered by the medical staff administrative committee during the hearing.
- (D) Conduct of hearing.
  - (1)A majority of the members of the medical staff administrative committee shall be present to convene the hearing and a majority which has heard all the evidence must be present to deliberate and to vote. No member may vote by proxy. The hearing shall be a DE NOVO hearing, although evidence of the prior recommendations and decisions of the dean and the various committees may be presented. Neither the dean of the college of medicine nor any member of his staff who has been designated to carry out the duties and responsibilities of the dean under these procedures shall participate in any way in the proceedings or deliberations of the committee except as an observer, a witness, or to explain his prior recommendations and decisions. The committee shall select a chairman from the committee membership for the purpose of conducting the hearing. The person who brings the charge shall not participate in the deliberation or voting of the committee.

### BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS (contd)

- (2) An accurate record of the hearing must be kept. The mechanism for taking the record shall be by the use of a professional stenographer. This record will be available to the affected member of the medical staff upon request at his expense.
- (3) The personal presence of the medical staff member for whom the hearing has been scheduled shall be required. A medical staff member who fails without good cause to appear and proceed at such hearing shall be deemed to have waived his rights to appear and to have a hearing before the medical staff administrative committee in the same manner as provided in paragraph (B) of this rule, and to have accepted the adverse recommendation or decision involved and the same shall therein become and remain in effect as provided in paragraph (B) of this rule. The medical staff administrative committee may, in its own discretion, proceed with the hearing without the medical staff member and impose a sanction which is greater or lesser than that originally imposed.
- (4) Postponements of hearings beyond the time set forth in these bylaws shall be made only with the approval of the medical staff administrative committee. Granting of such postponement shall be only for good cause shown.
- (5) The hearing need not be conducted strictly according to the rules of law related to the examination of witnesses or presentation of evidence. Any relevant matters upon which responsible persons customarily rely in the conduct of serious affairs shall be considered, regardless of the existence of any common law or statutory rule which might make evidence inadmissible over objection in civil or criminal action. The member of the medical staff for whom the hearing is being held shall, prior to, or during the hearing, be entitled to submit memoranda concerning any issues of procedure or of fact and such memoranda shall become a part of the hearing record.
- (6) The affected medical staff member shall have the following rights: to be represented by an attorney at law and to call and examine witnesses; to introduce evidence; to cross-examine any witnesses on any matter relevant to the issue of the hearing; and to challenge any witness and to rebut any evidence. If the medical staff member does not testify in his own behalf, he may be called and examined as if under cross examination.
- (7) The medical staff administrative committee may, without special notice, recess the hearing and reconvene the same for the convenience of the participants or for the purpose of obtaining new or additional evidence or consultation. Upon conclusion of the presentation of oral and written evidence, the hearing shall be closed. The committee may thereupon, at a time convenient to itself, conduct its deliberations outside the presence of the medical staff member for whom the hearing was convened.

BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS (contd)

- (8) Within seven days after the conclusion of the taking of all evidence and of all hearings, the committee shall make a written report of its findings and decisions and shall forward the same together with the hearings record and all other documentation to the joint conference committee of the university hospitals board. The decision may recommend confirmation, modification, or rejection of the prior adverse decision and may impose more severe sanctions than were provided in the decision from which this request for hearing was made. The affected member of the medical staff shall be notified of the decision of the medical staff administrative committee by the medical director. In successive order, the decision and record of the medical staff administrative committee shall be reviewed by the joint conference committee and the university hospitals board, each of which shall have the authority to accept, reject, or modify the previous decision forwarded to them. The joint conference committee shall notify the affected medical staff member of its When the hospitals board has made its decision, notice decision. of that decision shall be sent certified return receipt mail to the affected medical staff member at his last known address as determined by university records.
- (E) Appeal to the president of the university.
  - (1) Within fourteen days after receipt of a notice by an affected medical staff member of the action of the university hospitals board he may, by written notice to the president of the university, request an appellate review by the president of the university. Such appellate review shall only be held on the record on which the adverse decision is based, as appended by the medical staff member's statement provided for below.
  - (2) If such review is not requested within said fourteen-day period, the affected medical staff member shall be deemed to have waived his right to the same, and to have accepted such adverse decision, and the same shall become effective immediately as provided for in paragraph (B) of this rule.
  - (3) The review shall be conducted by the president of the university.
  - (4) The affected medical staff member shall have access to the reports and records, including transcripts, if any, of the medical staff administrative committee and all other material, favorable or unfavorable, that has been considered by that committee; the joint conference committee; and the university hospitals board. He shall then submit a written factual statement in his own behalf in which those factual and procedural matters with which he disagrees, and his reasons for such disagreement, shall be specified. This written statement may cover any matters raised at any step in the procedure to which the appeal is related, and

## BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS (contd)

legal counsel may assist in its preparation. Such written statement shall be submitted to the president of the university at least seven days prior to the scheduled date for review.

- (5) New or additional matters not raised during the grievance committee hearing or in the medical staff administrative committee hearings shall only be introduced at the review by the president of the university at his sole discretion.
- (6) The president of the university may affirm, modify or reject any prior decision, or at his discretion refer the matter back to the hospitals board for further review and recommendation within fourteen days. Such referral may include a request for further investigation. The president's decision shall be mailed certified return receipt mail to the affected medical staff member at his last known address as determined by university records.
- (F) Appeal to the board of trustees of the Ohio state university.
  - (1) If the affected medical staff member wishes to appeal the final decision of the president of the university, he may within fourteen days after notification of the president's decision request the record of the proceedings of the medical staff administrative committee's hearing be forwarded to the board of trustees of the Ohio state university. Failure to appeal within fourteen days shall make the president's decision final. The board, in its discretion, may accept, reject, or modify the decision of the medical staff administrative committee as well as any information considered by the president of the university in order to take specific action relating to the matter under review.
  - (2) The secretary of the board of trustees of the Ohio state university shall notify the medical staff administrative committee, the university hospitals board and the president of the university of the action taken by the board of trustees of the Ohio state university. Subsequent to this notification, the secretary of the board of trustees of the Ohio state university shall notify the affected medical staff member of the final action taken on his appeal.

#### 3335-43-07 Divisions of the medical staff.

The medical staff of the Ohio state university hospitals shall be divided into honorary, attending, courtesy, and limited designations.

- (A) Honorary staff.
  - (1) The honorary staff will be composed of those individuals recognized for outstanding reputation, notable scientific and professional contributions, and high professional stature. They shall enjoy all

BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS (contd)

privileges and responsibilities of attending staff appointments except the right to vote and hold elected office in the medical staff organization.

(2) Honorary staff members are exempt from the requirement for attendance at staff meetings.

#### (B) Attending staff.

(1) Qualifications:

The attending staff shall consist of those faculty members of the colleges of medicine and dentistry to whom clinical teaching responsibilities are assigned in the university hospitals and who satisfy the requirements and qualifications set forth in rule 3335-43-04 of the Administrative Code. The assignment of teaching responsibility is the prerogative of the chief of the clinical department or his designee.

(2) Prerogatives:

An attending staff member may:

- (a) Admit patients consistent with the balanced teaching and patient care responsibilities of the institution. When, in the judgment of the chief of the clinical department, a balanced teaching program is jeopardized, following consultation with the dean and the university hospitals' executive director, and with the concurrence of a majority of the medical staff administrative committee, he may restrict admissions. Imposition of such restrictions shall not entitle the attending staff member to the procedures of paragraph (F) of rule 3335-43-04 of the Administrative Code and rule 3335-43-05 of the Administrative Code.
- (b) Be free to exercise such clinical privileges as are granted in this rule.
- (c) Vote on all matters presented at general and special meetings of the medical staff and of the department and committees of which he is a member unless otherwise provided by resolution of the staff, department, or committee and approved by the medical staff administrative committee.
- (d) Hold office in the staff organization and in the department and committees of which he is a member, unless otherwise provided by resolution of the staff, department, or committee and approved by the medical staff administrative committee.

### BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS (contd)

(3) Responsibilities:

An attending staff member shall:

- (a) Meet the basic responsibilities set forth in rules 3335-43-02 and 3335-43-03 of the Administrative Code.
- (b) Retain responsibility within his area of professional competence for the continuous care and supervision of each patient in the hospitals for whom he is providing care, or arrange a suitable alternative for such care and supervision.
- (c) Actively participate in such quality evaluation and monitoring activities as required by the staff, and discharge such staff functions as may be required from time to time.
- (d) Satisfy the requirements set forth in rule 3335-43-11 of the Administrative Code for attendance at staff and departmental meetings and meetings of those committees of which he is a member.

#### (C) Courtesy staff.

(1) Qualifications:

The courtesy staff shall consist of those faculty members of the colleges of medicine and dentistry who do not qualify for attending staff appointment.

(2) Prerogatives:

The courtesy staff may:

- (a) Admit patients which complement the clinical teaching program. At times when hospital beds or other resources are in short supply, patient admissions of courtesy staff shall be subordinate to those of attending staff.
- (b) Exercise such clinical privileges as are granted in paragraph (E) of this rule.
- (c) Attend meetings as a nonvoting member of the medical staff and the department of which he is a member and any medical staff or hospitals education programs. He may not hold elected office in the medical staff organization.
- (3)

### Responsibilities:

Each member of the courtesy staff shall be required to discharge the basic responsibilities specified in paragraph (B)(3) of this rule

### BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS (contd)

and, further, shall retain responsibility within his area of professional competence for the care and supervision of each patient in the hospital for whom he is providing services, or arrange a suitable alternative for such care and supervision.

- (D) Limited medical staff.
  - (1) Qualifications:

The limited staff shall consist of doctors of medicine, osteopathic medicine, and dental surgery who are appointed in good standing in post doctoral educational programs established and supervised by the clinical department or division chiefs.

(2) Responsibilities:

The limited staff shall:

- (a) Participate fully in the teaching programs of the department in which they are appointed.
- (b) Not admit patients, but participate, under supervision, in the care of all patients to whom they are assigned. They shall follow all rules and regulations of the service to which they are assigned, as well as the general rules of the hospital pertaining to limited staff, including, but not limited to this requirement: consultation shall be obtained with the attending, courtesy, or honorary member of the medical staff responsible for the care of that patient before undertaking a procedure or treatment that carries a significant risk to the patient unless this consultation would cause a delay that would jeopardize the life or health of the patient.
- (c) Serve as full members of various hospital committees to which they are assigned. They are not eligible to vote or hold elected office in the medical staff organization.
- (d) Satisfy the expectations of the program director of the post doctoral education program to which they are appointed.
- (E) Clinical privileges.
  - (1) Restrictions:
    - (a) Every person practicing at university hospitals by virtue of medical staff membership or otherwise shall, in connection with such practice, be entitled to exercise those clinical privileges specifically granted to him by the clinical department of which he is a member. The process of delineating privileges shall be the responsibility of the clinical division chief with the approval of the chief of the

### BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS (contd)

clinical department if there is no clinical division and shall be on file with the medical director. A medical staff member may contest the specific privileges granted to him under rule 3335-43-04 of the Administrative Code.

- (b) The evaluation of every initial application for clinical privileges shall be based upon the applicant's education, training, experience, demonstrated competence, references and other relevant information, including an appraisal by the clinical division chief of the division in which such privileges are sought. The applicant shall have the burden of establishing his qualifications and competence in the clinical privileges and the recommendation for increase or reduction of same shall be the responsibility of each clinical division chief or clinical department chief.
- (2) Special privileges:

Under special circumstances privileges at the university hospitals may be granted to a doctor of medicine, osteopathic medicine, dental surgery, and to a practitioner of podiatry by the clinical department chief or his designee in concurrence with the medical director. The extent of privileges will be governed by the applicant's training and experience and will be in keeping with clinical department guidelines.

- (3) Podiatric privileges:
  - (a) All patients admitted for podiatric care shall receive the same medical appraisal as all other hospitalized patients. A member of the medical staff who is a doctor of medicine or osteopathic medicine shall admit the patient and be responsible for the history and physical and medical care that may be required at the time of admission or that may arise during hospitalization, and shall determine the need of any proposed procedure on the total health status of the patient. The podiatrist will be responsible for the podiatric care of the patient including the podiatric history and physical examination and all appropriate elements of the patient's record. Any proposed procedures by the podiatrist must be approved by, and be under the direct supervision of, an active member of the medical staff who is a doctor of medicine or osteopathic medicine.
  - (b) The podiatrist will be responsible to the chairperson of the department of surgery.
- (4) Associates to the medical staff privileges:

Other health care professionals who are duly licensed in the state of Ohio and who are members of the faculty of the Ohio state university college of medicine may be granted clinical privileges

## BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS (contd)

to provide specified patient care services under the supervision or direction of a physician member of the medical staff. Such professionals must apply for privileges in the same manner as provided in rule 3335-43-04 of the Administrative Code and this rule for medical staff membership and clinical privileges. Each person granted privileges must be assigned to a clinical department appropriate to his professional training and will be responsible to the chief of the clinical department for his activities. The medical staff administrative committee may establish particular qualifications required of members of a specific health care profession, provided that such qualifications are not founded on arbitrary or discriminatory basis and are in conformance with applicable law. No other section of the medical staff bylaws, including the appeals mechanism, applies to these individuals.

- 3335-43-08 Organization of medical staff of the Ohio state university hospitals into clinical departments and divisions.
- (A) Each member of the attending, courtesy, limited, and honorary staff shall be assigned to a clinical department or division upon the recommendation of the chief of the clinical department concerned.
- (B) Names of clinical departments and divisions
  - (1) Anesthesiology
  - (2) Family Medicine
  - (3) Medicine. The following divisions are designated:
    - General Medicine Cardiology Infectious Diseases Dermatology Endocrinology and Metabolism Gastroenterology Hematology and Oncology Neurology Pulmonary Renal Rheumatology-Immunology
  - (4) Obstetrics and Gynecology. The following divisions are designated:

- (C) The chairmen of the departments in the colleges of medicine and dentistry or their designees will be chiefs of the respective departments in the university hospitals. The chiefs of the divisions in the hospitals will be appointed by the chiefs of the departments in the hospitals in which the divisions are included. Clinical divisions may be added or deleted upon the recommendation of the department chief with the concurrence of a majority of the medical staff administrative committee.
- 3335-43-09 Elected officers of the medical staff of the Ohio state university hospitals.
- (A) Chief of staff.

The chief of staff shall:

- Serve on those committees of the Ohio state university hospitals board as appointed by the chairperson of that board.
- (2) Serve as vice chairperson of the medical staff administrative committee.
- (3) Provide for communication between the medical staff and the hospitals board in matters of quality of care, education, and research.
- (4) Serve as liaison between university hospitals administration, medical administration, and the medical staff in all matters of mutual concern within the hospitals.
- (5) Call, preside, and be responsible for the agenda of all general staff meetings.
- (6) Make medical staff committee appointments jointly with the medical director and chief of staff-elect for approval by the deans and hospitals board, with the exception of the medical staff administrative committee.
- (7) Be spokesman for the medical staff in its external professional and public relations.
- (8) Be representative to the council of the academy of medicine of Columbus and Franklin county, or select a representative to serve on the council.

### BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS (contd)

(B) Chief of staff-elect.

The chief of staff-elect shall:

- Serve on those committees of the Ohio state university hospitals board as appointed by the chairman of the board.
- (2) Serve as chairperson of the nominating committee of the medical staff.
- (3) Carry out all the duties of the chief of staff when the chief of staff is unable to do so.
- (4) Keep records of all meetings of the medical staff and oversee the inclusion of changes in the bylaws, rules and regulations of the medical staff.
- (C) Representatives of the medical staff elected at-large.
  - (1) There shall be three medical staff representatives elected atlarge. Each will be a member of the medical staff administrative committee and will serve on those committees of the Ohio state university hospitals board as appointed by the chairperson of the board.
  - (2) Each will have responsibility for a group of medical staff committees, as defined in the rules and regulations.
- (D) Qualifications of officers.
  - (1) Officers must be members of the attending staff at the time of their nomination and election and must remain members in good standing during their term of office. Failure to maintain such status shall immediately create a vacancy in the office involved.
  - (2) The medical director, associate medical directors, assistant medical directors and chiefs of the clinical departments are not eligible to serve as chief of staff or chief of staff-elect unless they are replaced in their hospitals administrative role during the period of their term of office.
- (E) Election of officers.
  - (1) All officers (other than at-large officers) will be elected by a majority of those voting by written ballot of the attending staff after the annual meeting of the medical staff in June.
  - (2) The nominating committee will be composed of five members. The chief of staff and the chief of staff-elect will serve on the committee and the chief of staff-elect will be its chairperson. The

# BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS (contd)

three other members of the committee will be nominated from the floor and elected, by a plurality upon written ballot, following the quarterly meeting of the medical staff in September.

- (3) The committee's nominees will be submitted in writing to all voting members of the attending staff no later than the fifteenth of May.
- (4) Nominations for officers will be accepted from the floor at the June meeting.
- (5) Candidates for the office of chief of staff-elect will be listed and each attending staff member may vote for one. Candidates for the at-large positions will be voted upon as a group. Each voting member of the attending staff may vote for three at-large candidates. The three candidates with the highest number of votes will be elected. A majority of the votes is not necessary.
- (6) An officer may be removed from the elected position by a majority vote upon written ballot of the attending staff following a regularly scheduled quarterly meeting.
- (F) Term of office.
  - (1) The chief of staff and chief of staff-elect will each serve two years in office beginning on the first of July. The chief of staff-elect will be elected in the odd years. The chief of staff may not be elected chief of staff-elect within one year of the end of his term in office.
  - (2) The at-large representatives will each serve two years, beginning on the first of July. They may succeed themselves for three successive terms (six years). They may not continue longer without a period of two years out of office. They may be elected chief of staff-elect at any time.
- (G) Vacancies in office.
  - (1) Vacancies in the office of chief of staff during his term will be automatically succeeded and performed by the chief of staffelect. When the unexpired term is one year or less, the new chief of staff will continue in office until the completion of his expected term in that office. When the unexpired term is more than one year, the new chief of staff will serve until the end of the term of the chief of staff he replaced.
  - (2) Vacancies in the office of chief of staff-elect will be filled by a special election held within sixty days of establishing the vacancy. The nominating committee will make nominations and a special meeting of the attending staff will be called to add nominations and elect the replacement. The new chief of staff-elect will become chief of staff at the end of the term of the incumbent.

BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS (contd)

- (3) Vacancies in the at-large representatives positions will be filled by appointment by the chief of staff.
- 3335-43-10 Administration of the medical staff of the Ohio state university hospitals.

Medical Staff Committees.

- (A) Appointments: Appointments to all medical staff committees except the medical staff administrative committee and the nominating committee will be made jointly by the chief of staff, chief of staff-elect, and the medical director with consultation with the executive director of the hospitals and approved by the dean of the college of medicine and the university hospitals board.
- (B) Medical staff administrative committee:
  - (1) Composition
    - (a) Chief of staff, chief of staff-elect, chiefs of the clinical departments, three medical attending staff representatives elected at large, the medical director, and the executive director of the hospitals. The medical director will be the chairman and the chief of staff will be vice-chairman.
    - (b) Any member of the committee who anticipates absence from a meeting of the committee may appoint a temporary substitute to represent him at the meeting. The temporary substitute will have all the rights of the absent member. The executive director may invite any member of his staff to represent him at a meeting or to attend any meeting with him.
  - (2) Duties.
    - (a) To represent and to act on behalf of the medical staff, subject to such limitations as may be imposed by these bylaws, by the bylaws of the Ohio state university hospitals board, the bylaws or rules of the board of trustees of the Ohio state university.
    - (b) To receive and act upon commission and committee reports. To delegate appropriate staff business to committees while retaining the right of executive responsibility and authority over all medical staff committees.
    - (c) To implement policies of the medical staff.
    - (d) To provide a liaison between the medical staff, medical director, executive director, and the university hospitals board.

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- (e) To recommend action to the medical director and executive director of university hospitals on matters of medicoadministrative nature.
- (f) To fulfill the medical staff's accountability to the university hospitals board and the board of trustees of the Ohio state university for medical care rendered to patients in the university hospitals.
- (g) To ensure the medical staff is kept abreast of the accreditation process and informed of the accreditation status of the university hospitals.
- (h) To review and act on medical staff appointments and reappointments.
- (i) To report to the medical staff all actions affecting the medical staff.
- To inform the medical staff of all changes in committees, and the elimination of such committees as circumstances shall require.
- (k) To appoint committees to meet the needs of the medical staff and comply with the requirements of accrediting agencies.
- (I) To establish and maintain rules and regulations governing the medical staff.
- (m) To perform other functions as are appropriate.
- (3) Meetings. The committee shall meet monthly and keep detailed minutes which shall be distributed to each committee member and to the university hospitals board through the joint conference committee.

3335-43-11 Meetings and dues.

- (A) Meetings. The medical staff of the Ohio state university hospitals shall conduct scheduled meetings quarterly. Notice of the meeting will be sent to all attending staff at least two weeks prior to the meeting. Attendance at at least two of the four regularly scheduled meetings shall be a requirement for continued attending staff privileges. Exceptions requested in writing may be given by the medical staff administrative committee. A special meeting may be called at the option of the medical staff administrative committee.
- (B) Dues. The medical staff, by two-thirds vote of those in attendance at the fall quarterly meeting, may establish dues. Payment of dues is a requirement for attending staff membership.

### BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS (contd)

#### 3335-43-12 Amendments.

These medical staff bylaws may be amended after notice is given at one meeting of the medical staff administrative committee. Such notice shall be laid on the table until the next meeting and shall require two-thirds vote of the members of the medical staff administrative committee present for approval and submission to the medical staff for ratification. Ratification of an amendment shall be by a plurality of those medical staff members voting through written ballot. When an amendment is approved by the medical staff administrative committee and ratified by the medical staff it shall be forwarded in successive order to the following: the joint conference committee; the university hospitals board; the president of the Ohio state university; and the board of trustees of the Ohio state university. Each of the foregoing reviewers shall accept or reject the requested amendment. The amendment shall become effective when accepted by the board of trustees of the Ohio state university in the form ratified by the medical staff.

3335-43-13 Adoption.

- (A) These bylaws shall be adopted by the medical staff administrative committee and forwarded for approval in the same fashion as provided in rule 3335-43-12 of the Administrative Code.
- (B) Upon adoption by the Ohio state university board of trustees of these bylaws, the bylaws shall replace any previous bylaws, rules and regulations of the medical staff of the Ohio state university hospitals.

3335-43-14 Rules of construction.

- (A) "Shall" as used herein is to be construed as mandatory.
- (B) Use of the masculine gender in the text of these bylaws is not intended to connote any sexually discriminative intent. These bylaws should be construed to be sexually neutral.

#### **APPENDICE5**

APPENDIX I. COAT OF ARMS OF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS

The official coat of arms of The Ohio State University Hospitals shall be as follows:

The blazon of the arms of University Hospitals is a shield, 16th century style, on a field of gray surrounded by an "O" in scarlet with the words, "The Ohio State University Hospitals" in black.

The shield is embattled above the chief, with three azure towers. The shield is divided "fesse cotised," through the "fesse point" by three bars, "gemels of or" (gold), separated each by bars, "gemels of argent" (silver). The chief is "gules" (scarlet), impaled by a charge, "The Ohio State University Crest". The "O" is argent, the center is

gules, impaled by a charge with the "or" book of knowledge, and the base of the "O" is impaled by a charge of a "buckeye leaf vert" (green).

The base is quartered per pale.

The dexter base is vertical with a charge, the staff of Aesculapius.

The sinistra base is azure with a charge, the Hospitalier's cross, qules.

The scroll contains the Latin motto: "Hospitale-Academia-Investigatus."

The use of the coat of arms of The Ohio State University Hospitals will be by all who are connected with University Hospitals.

APPENDIX II. COAT OF ARMS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF OF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS.

The official coat of arms of the medical staff of The Ohio State University Hospitals shall be as follows: The shield on vertical narrow stripes, alternating silver and white, is square, parted per green (medicine) chevron. The dexter chief contains the golden oak leaf surmounted by the silver acorn representing the practice of medicine; the sinistra chief contains the multiple atomis circles representing research; the center base contains the multiple atomis circles encircled by the gray "O" from the crest of The Ohio State University and represents the teaching obligation of our staff. The scroll is gold, with the black lettering of the motto, "Eruditio A Scientia Exornata Miliorem Valetudinem Mortalibus Praestat" (knowledge enhanced by science assures better health for mankind).

Encircling the achievement are the words, "The Medical Staff" joined by a green buckeye leaf (symbol of the State of Ohio) to the words, "The Ohio State University Hospitals." Impaled in this "coat of arms" are the heritage of the State of Ohio and The Ohio State University with the obligation of teaching and research to provide and improve medical care. The use of this coat of arms of the medical staff shall be limited to duly appointed members of the medical staff and the staff organization.

#### John H. Dunlap, Jr.

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its deep sorrow upon the death on January 22, 1985, of John H. Dunlap, Jr., a former member of this Board.

John H. Dunlap, Jr., was appointed a trustee of The Ohio State University, effective May 14, 1968, by Governor James A. Rhodes, for a term ending in 1977. He served as chairman of the trustees for 1975-76 and also as chairman of the Board of Control of The Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center at Wooster. He was vice chairman of both boards in 1972-73 and 1974-75 and also served as director of Ohio State's Research Foundation.

A native of Williamsport, Ohio, Mr. Dunlap was a 1928 graduate of The Ohio State University Colleges of the Arts and Sciences. As an undergraduate he was a member of the Scarlet Mask, treasurer of the senior class, treasurer of the former Student Senate, president of Kappa Sigma social fraternity, and member of the Athletic Board.

Members of Mr. Dunlap's family have been farmers in the Scioto Valley for more than seven generations, the original Dunlap having settled north of Chillicothe in 1791. Carrying on with this tradition, Mr. Dunlap farmed all of his life and owned or managed 31 farms totaling over 13,000 acres. In addition, he owned a contracting company which specialized in soil conservation, building lakes, ponds, levees, terraces and ditches. Through this contracting company he built over 100 conservation lakes and ponds.

Mr. Dunlap had an ongoing involvement and a firm friendship with the University for more than 60 years. His contributions to The Ohio State University as a trustee are legendary. Mr. Dunlap was thoughtful, caring, decisive and he always attempted to do those things he judged to be in the best interests of his alma mater. In a truly remarkable sense, Mr. Dunlap was a special person and everyone who came in contact with him recognized his unique humanity and profound character. He touched the lives of many individuals in ways that few others could or would and by deed and actions he demonstrated in a rare and sustained way his commitment to excellence and human progress.

Mr. Dunlap was a nationally recognized agricultural leader and served on many advisory boards and commissions related to agriculture and natural resources, but more importantly he was a friend and staunch supporter of his alma mater.

On behalf of the University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a sincere expression of the Board's realization of the loss which the family and The Ohio State University have sustained.

OSU Cancer Research Institute Endowment Fund

The OSU Cancer Research Institute Endowment Fund was established February 1, 1985, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University with a gift to The Ohio State University Development Fund from Doris H. Preston, B.S.Ed. '30.

All gifts are to be invested in the University's Permanent Endowment Fund, under the rules and regulations adopted by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, with the right to invest and reinvest as occasion dictates.

The annual income is to be used to support cancer research as approved by the Medical Director of the Cancer Research Institute and the Dean of the College of Medicine. If it is determined that funding for cancer research is so ample, then the income from this fund may be used for those purposes as deemed appropriate by the Medical Director of the Cancer Research Institute.

Should the need for this fund cease to exist or so diminish as to provide unused income, then the income may be used for any purpose whatsoever as determined by the Board of Trustees, with preference being given to recommendations from the appropriate administrative official of the University who is then directly responsible for medical education.

All gifts are to be invested in the University's Permanent Endowment Fund, under the rules and regulations adopted by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, with the right to invest and reinvest as occasion dictates.

The annual income is to be used to provide a scholarship to an undergraduate student in good standing and involved in a varsity athletic program who is planning a career in the health professions. Award recipients shall be determined by the Director of the Department of Athletics in cooperation with the University Committee on Student Financial Aids.

Should the need for this fund cease to exist or so diminish as to provide unused income, then the income may be used for any purpose whatsoever as determined by the Board of Trustees, with preference being given to recommendations from the appropriate administrative official of the University who is then directly responsible for student financial aids.

Change of Name and Description of Named Fund

#### The Demkee Wayne-Holmes County Scholarship Fund

The Dr. Donald E. Demkee Wayne-Holmes County Scholarship Fund was established April 2, 1976, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University with a gift to The Ohio State University Development Fund from the Demkee Family, Wooster, Ohio. The name was changed to The Demkee Wayne-Holmes County Scholarship Fund, February 1, 1985.

All gifts are to be invested in the University's Permanent Endowment Fund, under the rules and regulations adopted by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, with the right to invest and reinvest as occasion dictates.

The annual income is to be used to provide one scholarship to an undergraduate student who is a resident of Wayne County or Holmes County and is to be presented to the award recipient at his/her high school graduation. Financial need may or may not be a consideration. Recommendations for students who qualify should be forwarded to the University Scholarship Committee for final selection in conjunction with the Dean of the intended recipient's chosen College.

President Jennings made the following statement:

As you know, the Governor has made his budget recommendations to the General Assembly for the 1985-1987 biennium and I would add that all of us are greatly encouraged by the recommended levels of support for higher education in the Governor's 1985-87 budget. In

particular, the emphasis on reducing the proportion of costs borne by tuition is an important step forward. The level of funding recommended for the instructional subsidy will allow a reduction in the students' share of the cost of their education from 40 percent to 36 percent over the biennium. This represents significant progress toward the more traditional and appropriate 33 percent level historically shared by students and their parents. A strong instructional subsidy is the cornerstone of higher education support.

We also are pleased with the Selective Excellence programs. The long-term impact of Ohio's leadership in taking these initiatives will be especially significant in sustaining and enhancing the quality of higher education in the state and in promoting the economic revitalization of Ohio.

The Governor's budget builds upon the fiscal stability achieved in the current biennium, which was made possible by the proposed increases in higher education's overall share of the state budget. The 15.8 percent of the General Revenue Funds recommended for higher education in 1986-87 reverses the declining trend of past budgets. While the budget share for higher education remains significantly below the 17.1 percent provided in 1978-79, the change from the last biennium is indeed encouraging.

While this budget clearly moves in the right direction, the challenge remains to improve Ohio's national ranking in terms of public support for higher education. We have reversed past trends, but not yet advanced the state's comparative position. Even with the stability achieved in this biennium, state appropriations per student remain 47th nationally. This means Ohio has the third highest average public-college tuition per \$100 of state appropriations. We will continue to emphasize the need for further attention to the level of instructional subsidies with the goal of further reducing the share of higher education costs that students and their parents must pay.

This University must look to the State of Ohio for the basic foundation of taxpayer support upon which our excellence depends. I believe the fundamental commitment is there, along with the vision of what can be accomplished. That has been demonstrated in the budgetary commitments to Selective Excellence and research achievement.

We look forward to working with the General Assembly as the Executive Budget is considered. Our central message, as the state budget process continues in the coming weeks, will emphasize that the time is right to assure an enhanced and secure funding base for higher education.

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NEW DEGREE PROGRAM - PH.D. IN WELDING ENGINEERING Resolution No. 85-82

Synopsis: Recommendation for a Ph.D. program in Welding Engineering is proposed.

WHEREAS the Department of Welding Engineering presently offers the B.S. and M.S. degrees; and

WHEREAS the proposed Ph.D. program in Welding Engineering is consistent with the long-range goals of the College; and

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# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY

Resolution No. 85-83

Synopsis: Amendments to rules 3335-5-01 and 3335-7-21 are being proposed.

WHEREAS the University Senate pursuant to rule 3335-1-09 of the Administrative Code is authorized to recommend through the President to the Board of Trustees the adoption of amendments to the <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> as approved by the University Senate; and

WHEREAS the proposed changes in the <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> were approved by the University Senate on January 26, 1985, as follows:

# AMENDED RULES

3335-5-01 Academic freedom and responsibility.

- (B) The principal elements of academic freedom include the freedom of teachers to:
  - (1) Teach, conduct research, and publish research findings;
  - (2) Discuss in classrooms, in their own manner, any material that is relevant to the subject matter as defined in the course syllabus;
  - (3) Exercise their constitutional rights as citizens without institutional censorship or discipline;
  - (4) Seek changes in academic and institutional policies through lawful and peaceful means.
- (C) Academic freedom carries with it correlative academic responsibilities. The principal elements include the responsibility of teachers to:
  - (1) Meet their defined teaching, research, and service obligations;
  - Pursue excellence, intellectual honesty, and objectivity in teaching, in conducting research, and in publishing research findings;
  - (3) Encourage students and colleagues to engage in free discussion and inquiry;
  - (4) Evaluate student and colleague performance on a scholarly basis;
  - (5) Refrain from persistently introducing matters that have no bearing on the subject matter of the course;
  - (6) Work with appropriate individuals and bodies to provide optimal conditions conducive to the attainment of the free search for truth and its free exposition;

#### AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

(7) Differentiate carefully between official activities as teachers and personal activities as citizens, and to act accordingly. (B/T 9/14/65, B/T 5/2/75, B/T 3/1/85)

3335-7-21 Marks.

The official marks of the university are as follows: "A," "A-," "B+," "B," "B-," "C+," "C+," "C-," "D+," "D," "E," "EM," "I," "K," "P," "PA," "NP," "R," "S," "U," "W." These marks shall have the following meaning:

- (J) "PA"--pass, "NP"--non-pass
  - (1) The grade pass "PA" means the student has satisfied the stated objectives of the course, and the grade non-pass "NP" is the equivalent of the grade "E."
  - (2) These marks may be used at the option of undergraduate or continuing education students only, subject to the following conditions:
    - (A) This grading pattern may be chosen for a maximum of thirty credit hours, provided the student has an accumulated point-hour ratio of 2.0 or higher.
    - (B) Among these thirty credit hours, an undergraduate student may elect this option for courses in fulfillment of the curricular requirements of rule 3335-7-06 of the Administrative Code.
    - (C) An undergraduate student may elect this option for courses that are not required or designated as required electives in the curriculum leading to the degree for which the student is a candidate.
    - (D) Hours graded pass "PA" count toward the minimal number of hour required for a degree. Pass or non-pass marks "PA," "NP" are not computed in the point-hour average of the student.
    - (E) Before five p.m. of the third Friday of a quarter or the second Friday of a term, a student must have declared intention to take a course on this basis by filing the appropriate form with the dean or director of the student's enrollment unit. A student may not change to or from this option after five p.m. of the third Friday of a quarter or the second Friday of a term.
- (K) "R"--registered to audit
  - (1) This mark indicates that the student has registered to audit the course and has met the conditions established for audit enrollment in the course. No credit hours shall be awarded for this mark (see rules 3335-7-29 and 3335-7-33 of the Administrative Code).

#### AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (2) Before five p.m. of the third Friday of a quarter, semester, or session, or the second Friday of a term, a student must have declared intention to take a course for audit or to change from a credit to an audit basis by filing the appropriate form with the dean or director of the student's enrollment unit. A student may not change to or from the audit option after five p.m. of the third Friday of a quarter, semester, or session, or the second Friday of a term.
- (L) "S"--satisfactory, "U"--unsatisfactory
  - (1) The mark "S" may be used to record either satisfactory progress in or completion of work, provided that the course has been approved for this mark by the dean of the college offering the course, and in the case of courses carrying graduate credit, by the dean of the graduate school. It shall be used as an alternative to "U" or "I" in all individual studies courses whatever their number. "S" credit shall be counted as hours only, and shall not be considered in determining a student's point-hour ratio under rule 3335-7-26 of the Administrative Code.
  - (2) The mark "U" shall be used for unsatisfactory work in courses in which a student would be entitled to the mark of "S" if the student's work had been satisfactory. No credit shall be given for work marked "U." This mark shall not be considered in determining a student's point-hour ratio under rule 3335-7-26 of the Administrative Code.

#### NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the foregoing amendments to the <u>Rules of the</u> University Faculty be adopted as recommended by the University Senate.

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# THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS MEDICAL STAFF RULES AND REGULATIONS

Resolution No. 85-84

Synopsis: The Ohio State University Hospitals Medical Staff Rules and Regulations are proposed for adoption.

WHEREAS Bylaw 3335-43-10 (I) of the Medical Staff Bylaws authorizes the Medical Staff Administrative Committee to establish and maintain rules and regulations governing the medical staff of The Ohio State University Hospitals; and

## THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS MEDICAL STAFF RULES AND REGULATIONS (contd)

WHEREAS the University Hospitals Board approved the Medical Staff Rules and Regulations at their December 6, 1984 meeting; and

WHEREAS subject Rules and Regulations as originally approved were amended to include a revised Section 84-12 (by the University Hospitals Board) at their January 31, 1985 meeting:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board adopt The Ohio State University Hospitals Medical Staff Rules and Regulations, including the referenced amendment as follows:

84-01 Ethical pledge.

- (A) Each member of the medical staff shall pledge adherence to standard medical ethics, including:
  - Refraining from fee splitting or other inducements relating to patient referral;
  - (2) Providing for continuity of patient care;
  - (3) Refraining from delegating the responsibility for diagnosis or care of hospitalized patients to a medical or dental practitioner who is not qualified to undertake this responsibility and who is not adequately supervised;
  - (4) Seeking consultation whenever necessary; and
  - (5) Refraining from providing "ghost" surgical or medical services.
- 84-02 Admission procedures.
- (A) Except in an emergency, no patient shall be admitted to the hospital until after a provisional diagnosis has been stated by the patient's attending physician or by a member of the attending staff or a designee, in the interest of assignment to the appropriate service area. The request for admission shall also include the following information:
  - Any facts essential for the protection of the general hospital population against unnecessary exposure to infectious and other communicable diseases.
  - (2) Any information which will warn responsible hospital personnel of any tendency of any patient to try to commit suicide or to injure others because of mental disturbance.
  - (3) Any information concerning physical condition or personality idiosyncrasy which might be objectionable to other patients who might be occupying the same or adjoining rooms.

## THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS MEDICAL STAFF RULES AND REGULATIONS (contd)

84-03 Attending assignment.

All patients entering university hospitals who have not requested the services of a member of the medical staff of university hospitals to be responsible for their care and treatment while a patient therein shall be assigned to a member of the attending staff of the clinical division or service concerned with the treatment of the disease, injury, or condition which necessitated the admission of the patient to university hospitals. This shall also apply to the transfer of patients within the clinical divisions or services of the university hospitals.

84-04 Order writing privileges.

The physician, dentist, or podiatrist member of the staff responsible for the hospitalization, care, and treatment of the patient is responsible for all orders for that patient. Attending, courtesy, and honorary staff may designate members of the limited staff who have valid licenses to practice medicine in the state of Ohio to write orders under their direction. The attending staff member may also designate members of the pre-M.D. student group to write orders, but in all cases the orders shall be signed by a physician, dentist, or podiatrist who is familiar with that patient's care and has the right of practice of medicine, dentistry, or podiatry as licensed by the proper board of the state of Ohio. All written orders must be signed by a licensed practitioner prior to the execution of the order by the hospital nursing staff or other professional groups. All verbal orders must be given to a registered nurse on duty and familiar with the patient. Verbal orders may be given only by members of the medical staff with valid licenses. This policy does not prohibit the patient's private physician or dentist from writing orders, and no such prohibition shall be instituted without the consent of the private physician or dentist. Further, the staff member's declination to participate in this practice shall not in itself be a basis for sanctions relating to staff membership or the holding of clinical privileges, or to the loss of other medical staff prerogatives. Under normal circumstances, all medication orders will expire at the end of seventy-two hours unless the order states otherwise.

84-05 Telephone orders.

Telephone orders must be given to a registered nurse on duty and familiar with the patient by a licensed physician or dentist familiar with that patient. Such an order is to be signed by the nurse to whom it is dictated by telephone as "dictated by Dr. \_\_\_\_\_" (giving name and hour), followed by the nurse's signature. Telephone orders must be authenticated by the signature of a licensed physician within seventy-two hours, on the occasion of first visiting the unit after giving the order.

84-06 Death procedures.

(A) Every member of the medical staff shall be actively interested in securing necropsies whenever possible. No necropsy shall be performed without written consent, permission, or direction as prescribed by the laws of Ohio.

THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS MEDICAL STAFF RULES AND REGULATIONS (contd)

- (B) The death of a patient in the hospital within twenty-four hours of admission must be reported to the proper legal authorities under the laws of Ohio.
- (C) When a necropsy is performed, provisional anatomic diagnosis should be recorded in the medical record within three days and the complete protocol should be made a part of the record within ninety days.

84-07 Disaster plan.

In case of a civil, military, natural emergency or disaster, patients may be discharged from university hospitals, moved to other community hospitals, or moved to other facilities made available for the care and treatment of patients, by the order of the medical director of the university hospitals or the director's designated agent, to preserve life and health, to make room for more critically ill or injured patients sent to the hospitals from a disaster area or for the purpose of saving lives and to provide adequate medical care and treatment.

84-08 Sanctions.

Each member of the medical staff shall abide by policies approved by the medical staff administrative committee and by the Ohio state university hospitals. Failure to abide may result in suspension of some or all hospital privileges.

84-09 Surgical case review (tissue committees).

Surgical case review shall be performed monthly by each department regularly doing surgical procedures. The review shall include indications for surgery and all cases in which there is a major discrepancy between preoperative and postoperative (including pathologic) diagnoses. A screening mechanism based on oredetermined criteria may be established for cases involving no specimens. Written records of the evaluations and any action taken shall be maintained in the department office, available to the medical director or the director's designee.

84-10 Tissue disposition.

All tissue and foreign bodies removed during a surgical procedure shall be sent to the pathology laboratory for examination except for the following categories. These exceptions may be invoked by the attending surgeon only when the quality of care is not compromised by the exception, when another suitable means of verification of the removal is routinely employed, and when there is an authenticated operative or other official report that documents the removal. The categories of specimens that may be exempted from pathological examination are the following:

(A) Specimens that by their nature or condition do not permit fruitful examination, such as cataract, orthopedic appliance, foreign body, or portion of rib removed only to enhance operative exposure;

## THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS MEDICAL STAFF RULES AND REGULATIONS (contd)

- (B) Therapeutic radioactive sources, the removal of which shall be guided by radiation safety monitoring requirements;
- Traumatically injured members that have been amputated and for which examination for either medical or legal reasons is not deemed necessary;
- Foreign bodies (for example, bullets) that for legal reasons are given directly in the chain of custody to law enforcement representatives;
- (E) Specimens known to rarely, if ever, show pathological change, and removal of which is highly visible postoperatively, such as the foreskin from the circumcision of a newborn infant;
- (F) Placentas that are grossly normal and have been removed in the course of operative and non-operative obstetrics; and
- (G) Teeth, provided the number, including fragments, is recorded in the medical record.
- 84-11 Committees.

In addition to the medical staff committees (medical records, operating room, pharmacy and therapeutics, transfusion and blood products), the medical staff shall participate in the following hospital committees and monitoring functions: infection control, quality assurance, safety, and disaster planning.

84-12 Medical records committee.

- (A) The medical records committee has representation from medical staff, nursing, medical records department, and hospital administration. The majority of members shall be members of the medical staff. The committee shall meet at least quarterly and carry out the following duties:
  - (1) Review the quality of medical records for clinical pertinence and timely completion.
  - (2) Assure that each medical record or representative sample of records reflects the diagnosis, results of diagnostic tests, therapy rendered, condition, in-hospital progress of the patient, and condition of the patient at discharge.
  - (3) Review summary information regarding the timely completion of all medical records.
  - (4) Determine or recommend the format of the medical record, the forms used in the medical record, and the use of electronic data processing and storage systems for medical record purposes.
  - (5) Maintain written records of conclusions, recommendations, actions taken, and results of actions taken.

### THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS MEDICAL STAFF RULES AND REGULATIONS (contd)

- (B) Each member of the medical staff shall conform to the policies established by the medical records committee, including the following:
  - (1) Chart contents
    - (a) The attending physician shall be responsible for the preparation of a complete medical record of each patient. This record shall include the following:
      - (i) Identification and related data.
      - (ii) Statement of present complaint.
      - (iii) History of present illness.
      - (iv) Previous personal history.
      - (v) Family history.
      - (vi) Physical examination.
      - (vii) Special reports, as those from:
        - (a) The clinical laboratory, including examination of tissues and autopsy findings, when applicable.
        - (b) The x-ray department.
        - (c) Consultants.
      - (viii) Provisional diagnosis.
      - (ix) Medical and surgical treatments.
      - (x) Progress notes.
      - (xi) Memorandum copy of the death certificate, when applicable.
      - (xii) Condition of patient at discharge, including instructions given at that time.
      - (xiii) Summary and final diagnosis as verified by the attending physician's signature.
      - (xiv) Documentation of informed consent.
  - (2) Deadlines and sanctions

# THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS MEDICAL STAFF RULES AND REGULATIONS (contd)

- (a) The complete history and physical examination shall be recorded on the patient's chart no later than 24 hours after admission of the patient.
- (b) When the history and physical examination, including the results of indicated laboratory studies and x-rays and the attending staff's notes, are not recorded in the chart before the time stated for a procedure, the procedure cannot proceed until the history, physical, and laboratory results are entered into the chart. In cases where such a delay would likely cause harm to the patient, this condition shall be entered into the chart by the attending physician, and the procedure may begin. When there is a disagreement concerning the urgency of the procedure, it will be adjudicated by the medical director or his designee.
- (c) All procedures performed shall be fully described in the record by the responsible physician or the physician's designee within 24 hours of the time of completion of the procedure. An operative report must be dictated within 48 hours of an operation. The transcribed operative report must be signed by the attending surgeon within 21 days of the patient's discharge. Any operative report not dictated within 48 hours shall be deemed delinquent and the attending surgeon responsible will lose operating room privileges. A list will be prepared and distributed daily by the medical record administrator indicating the delinquent operative reports and the responsible attending surgeon. The surgeon will be given three days' notice of an intention to suspend operating room privileges. The pathologist shall make such examination as necessary to arrive at a satisfactory diagnosis. The pathologist's report shall then be included on the patient's record.
- (3) Discharges
  - (a) Patients shall be discharged only on written order of the attending physician, or of the agent of the attending physician acting for and under the specific instructions of the attending physician. At the time of ordering the patient's discharge or at the time of next visit to the hospital, if the attending physician should have authorized a member of the post-M.D. student group to sign the order of discharge, the attending physician shall see that the record is complete. The attending physician is responsible for certifying the principal diagnosis, principal procedure, complications, comorbidities, and other significant O.R. procedures on the face sheet by the time of discharge. If a principal diagnosis cannot be determined in the absence of outstanding test results, the attending physician must record a "provisional" principal diagnosis by the time of

discharge. The medical records committee will advise the medical staff administrative committee of the compliance on the part of the medical staff with this provision.

- (Ь) The discharge summary for each patient must be dictated by the responsible physician or the physician's designee within seven days of discharge for any patient stay of more than 48 hours. A handwritten or dictated discharge summary must be completed within seven days of discharge for any patient stay of 48 hours or less. A dictated summary is required on all patients who die, regardless of length of stay. The medical record must be completed by the attending physician or, when applicable, by his designee within 21 days of discharge of the patient. Attending physicians who have incomplete records (of patients discharged for more than 21 days) assigned to them will have their admitting privileges suspended until all records are A list of delinquent records, by attending completed. physician, will be prepared and distributed by the medical records administrator once each week. The list will include the name of the responsible resident or intern when The attending physician will be given one applicable. week's notice of an intent to suspend. If an attempt is made by the attending physician, or his designee when applicable, to complete the record, and the record is not available, the record is not counted against the attending physician until the next list is prepared.
- (4) Records storage and security

All patient's records, pathological examinations, slides, radiological films, photographic records, cardiographic records, laboratory reports, statistical evaluations, etc., are the property of the university hospitals and shall not be taken from university hospitals except on court order, duly filed with the medical record administrator or the hospital administration. The hospital administration may, under certain conditions, arrange for copies or reproductions of the above concerning patients' records to be made. Such copies may be removed from the hospitals after the medical record administrator or the proper administrative authority has received a written receipt thereof. In the case of readmission of the patient, all previous records or copies thereof shall be available for the use of the attending physician. Under normal circumstances, the original hospital records, pathological examinations, slides, radiological films, etc., will be maintained by the hospital for no less than five years. Microfilms, electronic tape recordings, and such other acceptable storage techniques will be used to maintain patients' records, following the above prescribed five years.

(5) Informed consent documentation

## THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS MEDICAL STAFF RULES AND REGULATIONS (contd)

- (a) Where informed consent is required for a special procedure (such as surgical operation), documentation that such consent has been obtained must be made in the hospital record prior to the initiation of the procedure.
- (b) In the case of limb amputation, a limb disposition form, in duplicate, must be signed prior to the operation.
- (6) Sterilization consent

Prior to the performance of an operative procedure for the expressed purpose of sterilization of a (male or female) patient, the attending physician will be responsible for the completion of the legal forms provided by the hospital and signed by the patient. Patients who are enrolled in the Medicaid program must have their forms signed at least 30 days prior to the procedure. Informed consent must also be obtained from one of the parents or the guardian of an unmarried minor.

(7) Criteria changes

The medical records committee shall define the criteria for record completion with approval of the medical staff.

(8) Signature stamps

Signature stamps may be used by physicians only when there is a statement on file with the medical records department stating that the physician maintains possession of the stamp and will be the only person who will use the stamp in the medical record. The use of the stamp may not be delegated by the physician to any other person for the purpose of affixing a signature to an entry in the medical record.

- 84-13 Operating room committee
- (A) The operating room committee shall have representation from all clinical departments utilizing the operating room, associate medical director, vice chairman of the department of surgery, director of operating room nursing, assistant executive director, director of admitting, and the operating room coordinator. The committee shall meet at least quarterly and carry out the following duties:
  - Insure that surgical privileges have been delineated for each member of the medical staff who uses the operating rooms.
  - (2) Develop written policies and procedures concerning the scope and provision of care in the surgical suite in cooperation with the departments and services concerned.
  - (3) Consider problems in operating room functions brought to its attention by any of its members.

# THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS MEDICAL STAFF RULES AND REGULATIONS (contd)

- (4) Monitor medical staff compliance with operating room policies established for patient safety, infection control, and smooth functioning of the operating rooms.
- (5) Develop and make recommendations to the medical staff administrative committee regarding conduct of medical staff in the operating rooms.
- (6) Maintain written records of actions taken, and results of those actions, and make these available to each committee member, the vice president of health services, the medical director, the executive director, and the associate executive directors.
- (B) Each member of the medical staff shall conform to the policies established by the operating room committee, including the following:

A member of the attending staff and a member of the anesthesiology staff shall be present in person for crucial periods of surgical procedures and anesthestization, shall be familiar with the progress of the procedure, and be immediately available at all times during the procedure.

84-14 Pharmacy and therapeutics committee.

The pharmacy and therapeutics committee has representation from medical staff, nursing, pharmacy department, college of pharmacy, and hospital administration. The majority of members shall be members of the medical staff. The committee shall meet at least quarterly and carry out the following duties:

- (A) Review the appropriateness, safety, and effectiveness of the prophylactic, empiric, and therapeutic use of drugs, including antibiotics, through the analysis of individual or aggregate patterns of drug practice.
- (B) Develop or approve policies and procedures relating to the selection, distribution, use, handling, and administration of drugs and diagnostic testing materials.
- (C) Review all significant untoward drug reactions.
- (D) Maintain the Formulary of Accepted Drugs with review of proposed additions and deletions and review of use of non-formulary drugs within the institution.
- (E) Maintain written reports of conclusions, recommendations, actions taken, and the results of actions taken, and report these at least quarterly to the medical staff administrative committee.
- 84-15 Transfusion committee.

## THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS MEDICAL STAFF RULES AND REGULATIONS (contd)

- (A) The transfusion committee has representation from physicians of the clinical departments frequently using blood products, nursing, transfusion service, and hospital administration. The majority of members shall be members of the medical staff. The committee shall meet at least quarterly and carry out the following duties:
  - (1) Evaluate the appropriateness of all transfusions, including the use of whole blood and blood components.
  - (2) Evaluate all confirmed or suspected transfusion reactions.
  - (3) Develop and recommend to the medical staff administrative committee policies and procedures relating to the distribution, use, handling, and administration of blood and blood components.
  - (4) Review the adequacy of transfusion services to meet the needs of patients.
  - (5) Review ordering practices for blood and blood products.
  - (6) Provide a liaison between the clinical departments, nursing services, hospital administration, and the transfusion service.
  - (7) Use clinically valid criteria for screening and more intensive evaluation of known or suspected problems in blood usage.
  - (8) Keep written records of meetings, conclusions, recommendations, and actions taken, and the results of actions taken, and make these available to each committee member and to the medical staff administrative committee.
- (B) Each member of the medical staff shall conform to the policies established by the transfusion committee, including the following:
  - (1) All pregnant patients admitted for delivery or abortion shall be tested for Rh antigen.
  - (2) No medicine may be added to blood or blood products.
- 84-16 Mechanism for changing rules and regulations.
- (A) These rules and regulations may be amended upon recommendation of the medical staff administrative committee.
- (B) Proposals for amendment to the rules and regulations may be made by any member of the attending staff. Such proposals shall be referred to the medical staff bylaws committee for review. Notice will then be given at any meeting of the medical staff administrative committee and this notice will be tabled until the next meeting. Two-thirds vote of the members present will be required for adoption.

#### THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS MEDICAL STAFF RULES AND REGULATIONS (contd)

- (C) Before approval the medical director or chief of staff shall circulate the proposed change to all medical staff, allowing adequate time for comment.
- (D) Amendments so accepted shall become effective when approved by the vice president for health services and presented to the Ohio state university hospitals' board.
- (E) These rules and regulations shall not conflict with the rules and regulations of the board of trustees of the Ohio state university.

84-17 Adoption of the rules and regulations.

These rules and regulations shall be adopted by the Medical Staff Administrative Committee and forwarded for approval in the same fashion as provided in Section 84-16.

Resolution No. 85-89

Synopsis: Resolutions honoring the service of four of the University's faculty members who have recently died are being proposed.

#### Daniel T. Hughes

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on February 18, 1985, of Daniel T. Hughes, Professor in the Department of Anthropology and in the College of Law.

Daniel T. Hughes was born on February 7, 1930, in New York, New York. He joined the Department of Anthropology at The Ohio State University in 1970 where he also served as the Department Chairperson between 1976-84. In 1984, he was also appointed as a Professor in the College of Law.

Dr. Hughes earned an A.B. in English (1953), the Ph.L. in Philosophy (1955), and the M.A. in Education (1956) at Bellarmine College, New York. After attending the Summer Institute of Linguistics at the University of Washington in 1961, he earned the S.T.B. in Theology (1962) from Woodstock College, Maryland. He directed research courses in Linguistics and Political Science at the University of Hawaii in Fall of 1965 and earned the Ph.D. in Anthropology from Catholic University, Washington, D.C. in 1967.

In addition to teaching, Dr. Hughes was an active participant in a number of university committees--i.e., the University Senate, the University Graduate Council, and the Search Committee for Dean of the Graduate School. Professionally, he was an elected member to the Board of Directors of the Association for Social Anthropology in Oceania, a Research Fellow in Ohio University's Center for International Studies, a member of the Tropical Renewable Resources Program at The Ohio State University, and a Fellow of the American Anthropological Association. These positions reflected his commitment to research in the Philippines and Oceania, specifically Micronesia and Ponape in the Caroline Islands. Most recently, Dr. Hughes conducted a pilot study on the emerging legal systems of the Federated States of Micronesia. The author and editor of several books, he also published numerous articles on the political and legal systems found in Oceania. His background and interest in the Catholic Church was manifested in a series of articles concerning the effects of missionization on the cultures studied.

His distinguished career was recognized by many awards and honors in his lifetime. ## David O. Jones, DVM, MS, MPH

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on January 27, 1985, of David O. Jones, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Veterinary Preventive Medicine.

A native of Cleveland, Ohio, Dr. Jones earned his Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degree from The Ohio State University in 1943 then entered a large animal practice in Camden, Ohio. He became an Instructor at Iowa State University in 1947, returned to OSU in 1949, completed a Master of Science degree in 1954, and was promoted at OSU to Assistant Professor, Associate Professor and full Professor in 1960. During this time he took a one-year leave of absence to earn a Master of Public Health degree from Harvard University in 1956.

Dr. Jones served in all three branches of the United States Armed Forces and, after being discharged from active duty in 1946, he later served as a veterinary officer in the U. S. Air Force Reserve.

Following his academic training, Dr. Jones was instrumental in establishing various University programs including a veterinary out-patient program which provided preventive medicine, immunization and treatment to all livestock maintained for food production for the State of Ohio penal and mental institution inmates. He also established a successful rabies prevention and vaccination program for all faculty and students in the College of Veterinary Medicine.

Dr. Jones had been an intercollegiate wrestler and was captain of the OSU wrestling team. He was a member of Sigma Xi, Phi Zeta, Phi Eta Sigma and Phi Tau Sigma, all honorary fraternities. He served on the Board of the Capital Humane Society and Pilot Dogs, was active in Boy Scouts, his church and community, and was Assistant Health Commissioner and Health Commissioner for the City of Upper Arlington for 28 years.

## Richard L. Meiling

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on December 14, 1984, of Richard L. Meiling, Vice President Emeritus in the Office of Health Sciences and Professor Emeritus in the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology.

Professor Meiling was born in Springfield, Ohio, on December 12, 1908. After graduating from Wittenberg University he went to Munich, Germany, where he studied medicine and earned his degree Doctor of Medicine at the Ludwig-Maximilian-University, Munich. He then became a surgical intern at The Ohio State University in 1938 and after WW II returned as an Assistant Professor in Obstetrics and Gynecology in 1947. He was promoted to Associate Professor in 1951 and to Professor in 1953.

He was appointed Associate Dean of the College of Medicine and Associate Director of University Hospitals in 1951. In 1960, he was selected to be Dean and Director. He was appointed as the first Vice President for Medical Affairs in 1970. On July 1, 1974, he retired and was then appointed Vice President Emeritus and Professor Emeritus.

From Wittenberg University, Professor Meiling received the honorary degree Doctor of Science in 1950. The Ludwig-Maximilian-University conferred upon him the "Venia Legendi" in 1952. In 1971, The Ohio State University established the "Richard Lewis Meiling Endowed Chair in Obstetrics and Gynecology." In 1977, it conferred upon him the honorary degree Doctor of Humane Letters. The University of Athens, Greece, presented him with its "Certificate of Excellence" in 1978. In 1984, The Ohio State University recognized Professor Meiling's many contributions by naming the Medical Administration Building, "Richard Lewis Meiling Hall."

During WW II, Professor Meiling was on active military duty from 1940 to 1946. He served as assistant to the Secretary of Defense for Medical and Health Affairs from 1948 to 1951. He was promoted to Brigadier General in 1949 and to Major General in 1961. He retired from the U. S. Air Force in 1968 and was awarded the U. S. Air Force Distinguished Service Medal.

Professor Meiling held memberships in important national organizations. He was a member of the House of Delegates of the American Medical Association. He served on the AMA's Commission on Research, the Long Range Planning and Development Council, the Council on National Emergency Medical Care, and the Council on National Security. He was a Founding Fellow of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, a Diplomate of the American Board of Obstetrics and Gynecology, a Diplomate of the American Board of Preventive Medicine (Aviation Medicine), and a Governor of the American College of Surgeons. He also served as President of the Ohio Medical Association from 1956 to 1957.

Professor Meiling also served on the boards of many charitable organizations and was a board member of several industrial, financial, business, and insurance corporations, nationally and statewide.

#### Oskar Seidlin

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on December 11, 1984, of Oskar Seidlin, Professor Emeritus in the Department of German.

Professor Seidlin was born in Konigshutte, Oberschlesien, Germany, on February 17, 1911. He received his doctorate from the University of Basel in 1935, and emigrated to the United States in 1938. He worked for a time in New York City as secretary to Thomas Mann and Erika Mann, and began his teaching career as lecturer at Smith College in 1941.

After serving in the U. S. Army, 1942-46, Professor Seidlin came to The Ohio State University, where his work as teacher and scholar soon brought the Department of German an international reputation for excellence. Among the honors bestowed upon him were the Alumni Distinguished Teaching Award, 1960; the Arts and Sciences Good Teaching Award, 1955; the Eichendorff Medal, 1948; Golden Goethe Medal, 1963; the Deutsche Akademie fur Sprache und Dichtung Prize for Germanic Studies Abroad, 1958; and the Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters, University of Michigan, 1969. In 1966, he was designated Regents Professor at The Ohio State University; in 1972 he was designated Regents Professor Emeritus and then he moved to Indiana University.

Among Oskar Seidlin's publications are an edition of the correspondence between Schnitzler and Brahm, 1953, and several volumes of essays: Von Goethe zu Thomas Mann, 1963; Versuche uber Eichendorff, 1965; Klassische und moderne Klassiker, 1972; Vom erwachendem Bewußtsein und vom Sundenfall, 1979. As both writer and teacher, Professor Seidlin was a man of extraordinary poetic sensitivity and intensity (he was himself the author of a volume of poetry, 1938, and of two children's books). At the close of one particularly lively seminar on Schiller, a graduate student once asked him: "Why do you always get so excited? You act as if the Holy Ghost had appeared." Oskar Seidlin answered: "What do you mean 'as if?" When a great poet writes, that is the moment when the Holy Ghost appears." The answer is characteristic of his affirmation of humanism, and his dedication to the word.

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# RENAMING THE ACADEMIC FACULTY OF ACCOUNTING Resolution No. 85-100

Synopsis: Renaming the Academic Faculty of Accounting, the Academic Faculty of Accounting and Management Information Systems is proposed.

WHEREAS the faculty of the College of Administrative Science have unanimously approved renaming the Academic Faculty of Accounting, the Academic Faculty of Accounting and Management Information Systems; and

WHEREAS this proposed name change has been discussed with all units who have expressed an interest in this matter; and

WHEREAS there has been a very significant increase in the amount of information available in the business world, along with rapid technological advances in processing and communicating this information; and

WHEREAS the majority of information systems or management information systems around the country are located in colleges of business and management; and

WHEREAS the ability to manage information systems and to use information intelligently is of increasing importance to good management in the business/industrial and public sectors of our society; and

RENAMING THE ACADEMIC FACULTY OF ACCOUNTING (contd)

WHEREAS there is a definite need for specialists trained with managerial/organizational skills and information analysis skills; and

WHEREAS a management information systems program will be designed to produce this type of specialist:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the University Senate has approved the requested name change from the Academic Faculty of Accounting to the Academic Faculty of Accounting and Management Information Systems, and respectfully request concurrence by the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Mr. Teaford, seconded by Mr. Berry, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous voice vote.

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# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY Resolution No. 85-101

Synopsis: Amendments to rules 3335-3-19, 3335-5-02, 3335-5-07, 3335-5-15, 3335-5-46, 3335-5-51, 3335-7-21, 3335-7-24, 3335-7-26, 3335-7-30, 3335-7-32, 3335-7-33, 3335-7-35, 3335-9-01, 3335-9-12, 3335-9-14, 3335-9-17, and 3335-9-18 are being proposed.

WHEREAS the University Senate pursuant to rule 3335-1-09 of the Administrative Code is authorized to recommend through the President to the Board of Trustees the adoption of amendments to the <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> as approved by the University Senate; and

WHEREAS the proposed changes in the <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> were approved by the University Senate on March 16, 1985, as follows:

# AMENDED RULES

3335-3-19 University registrar.

Subject to the direction of the vice provost for student affairs, the principal duties of the university registrar shall be the supervision of the details of registration, records, and scheduling which shall include: distribution of registration forms; distribution of approved schedules; fee assessments and adjustments; record of fee payments; maintenance of current quarter, semester, or session schedules; maintenance of home or permanent addresses, name and address of person(s) to be notified in case of emergency, local addresses and the respective telephone numbers of all currently enrolled students; the posting of quarters, semesters, and sessions of attendance; the posting of all courses and respective marks; recording of all probations and dismissals; recording of all past names and other demographic data; the distribution of the official student records to include the proper confidentiality safeguards; scheduling of classroom

# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

space, classes, and final examinations; offering placement testing, admission testing, test scoring services, a mechanism for student evaluation of teaching, and coordination of the credit by examination programs; other routine duties associated with the registration, records and scheduling of students; and special projects and duties that may be assigned from time to time by the vice provost for student affairs.

- 3335-5-02 Appointments and continuing employment; conditions upon.
- (A) Upon nomination and recommendation by the president of the university, the board of trustees shall make all appointments to all positions within the university and approve the salaries therefor. Such appointments, for a period not to exceed four academic quarters, or a summer session and two semesters if applicable, shall be evidenced by a notice of appointment signed by the secretary of the board and sent to the appointee for acceptance. The notice of appointment form is a budgetary convenience containing some detail relating to the employment relationship during the term of the appointment, such as salary, title, and the quarters, semesters, or sessions, during which service is to be rendered. The form is used for appointment to many and varied kinds of service, including appointment to positions which may be tenure accruing and others which are not. Neither the issuance of the notice nor its contents is intended to reflect any commitment by the trustees as to the recipient's tenure or as to renewal of appointment.

# 3335-5-07 Term of duty.

All members of the teaching staff on duty during a given quarter, semester, or session, are expected to report for duty and to be available for consultation and organization at least one day preceding the day designated in the calendar as the day for classes to begin. They are also expected to remain on duty through the convocation and examinations which conclude the work of the quarter, semester, or session.

# 3335-5-15 Executive committee.

Each college shall have the power to designate an executive committee to which it may delegate authority to transact the business of the college as provided by the rules or by the established precedents of the college. Unless otherwise provided by the college faculty, this committee shall receive and act upon student petitions relative to courses of study and reinstatement; shall certify to the college faculty at the end of each quarter, semester, or session, lists of students who have fulfilled the requirements for a degree, or for whom special recommendation is made; and shall bring before the college faculty any matter coming within its knowledge that needs the consideration or action of the college. The dean of the college shall act as chairperson of the committee.

- 3335-5-46 Senate committees.
- (T) The rules committee shall have the following functions and responsibilities:

# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (1) The committee, in cooperation with the secretary of the university senate, shall be responsible for the formal supervision of the published "Rules of the University Faculty" and of all statutes and bylaws pertaining to the university senate. It shall keep all published statutes and rules within its purview up to date and shall plan their republication at such intervals as may be desirable. It shall supervise the procedural rules for the university senate and make appropriate recommendations for revision as required.
- (2) Following senate approval, the committee shall receive all proposed new rules and changes in existing rules. It shall review them and recommend to the senate such editorial and other changes as it deems appropriate or necessary to avoid conflict with other rules and university regulations. Its recommendations shall be presented for final action at the next regular meeting of the senate. At this time, debate will be limited to the editorial changes recommended by the committee. If the committee is unable to report at this time, it shall inform the program committee of the reasons so that they may be included in the program committee's report on items pending but not on the agenda.

# 3335-5-51 Athletic council.

- $(A)_{iO}$ . The athletic council shall consist of fourteen members, eight of whom shall be members of the university faculty, two of whom shall be alumni of the university, and four of whom shall be students of the university. These members shall be selected as follows:
  - (1) One faculty member shall be elected by the university senate in the spring of each year at one of its regular meetings and one faculty member shall be appointed by the president each spring. The term of service for each shall be four years commencing the first of July following election or appointment; a member serving a full term may not be reelected or reappointed until one year has elapsed; the terms shall be staggered so that two members retire each year.
  - (2) The alumni members shall be designated by the Ohio state university alumni association for a term of four years, the terms to be staggered so that one member retires every two years, and under such procedures as the association shall adopt.
  - (3) Two undergraduate student members shall be elected by the undergraduate student government, one each year, for a term of two years under such procedures as the undergraduate student government shall adopt. One student member shall be selected by the council of graduate students for a term of one year under such procedures as the council of graduate students shall adopt. One student member shall be selected by the graduate-professional council for a term of two years under such procedures as the graduate-professional council shall adopt.

# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

(B) Subject to the general authority of the president and the board of trustees, the athletic council shall be charged with the development of policy governing intercollegiate and intramural athletics, as the agent of the university senate.

The policies established by the athletic council shall guide the administration of the program of intercollegiate athletics by the director of athletics, but the council shall not serve in an administrative or executive capacity. It will consider and establish policy on such matters as the income and expenditures budget, the schedules for seasonal and post-seasonal play in relation to the effect upon the welfare of the athletes, grants and other financial aid to athletes, eligibility of athletes, student grievance procedures and sportsmanship policies related to athletics, awards to athletes, ticket distribution, and public and campus relations of the athletic program. Its recommendations or decisions on policy shall be made known to the university senate and to the staff of the department of athletics. The university senate may hold these policies in review.

- (C) The selection of the university's faculty representative to the intercollegiate conference of faculty representatives (big ten conference) is the responsibility of the athletic council and the president.
  - The athletic council shall prepare a list of no fewer than two (1)faculty members from which the president shall select the faculty representative. All regular, tenured faculty members are eligible for inclusion on this list. A nominating committee shall be appointed by the chair of athletic council; the committee shall have the responsibility to inform the university community about the position of faculty representative and to invite applications and/or recommendations for nominations. Brief recommendations, in writing, that state the candidate's qualifications for the position may be submitted to the nominating committee by any member of the university community. Applications and nominations shall be due in accordance with a reasonable schedule established by the nominating committee. Final approval of the list of names submitted to the president shall be made by the full membership of the athletic council. The list shall be presented to the president during the winter preceding the start of the next term of office in order to allow for a smooth transition between outgoing and incoming faculty representatives.
  - (2) The term of office for a faculty representative shall be three years with reappointment as faculty representative for no more than one additional three-year term permissible. The term of regular service shall begin the first of July following appointment. If the incumbent faculty representative is eligible to serve another term, then at least nine months prior to the expiration of the current term, the athletic council shall undertake a review of the incumbent's performance. If the council decides that the incumbent faculty representative should serve a second term and

# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

the president concurs, the faculty representative's term shall be renewed. Otherwise the council shall move to prepare a list to submit to the president following the procedures of (1) above.

- (3) A faculty representative who is not a member of the athletic council shall attend meetings of the council. The chairperson of the athletic council or the chairperson's designee from among the faculty members of the athletic council shall serve as an ex officio alternate for the faculty representative with full voting privileges at conference meetings.
- 3335-7-21 Marks.
- (G) "I"--incomplete
  - (3) The student must complete the work so that the instructor of the course may report the final mark at the earliest possible time, but not later than noon of the sixth Saturday of the quarter, semester, or session, following that in which the "I" was received. For legitimate reason the instructor may establish a deadline for the completion of the work which is within the maximum time permitted. Upon petition of the student within this period, the authorized representative of the dean or director of the enrollment unit in which the student was last enrolled after consultation with the instructor of the course, or, if the instructor is unavailable, the chairperson of the department involved, may for good reason allow a student additional time in which to complete the work. Generally, this shall not be longer than the end of the quarter, semester, or session following that in which the "I" was received. Any decision extending the period shall set forth the time in which the student shall complete the work and a copy of the decision shall be forwarded to the office of the university registrar.
- (I) "P"--progress
  - (1) This mark is used to indicate that the student has shown satisfactory progress in a series or sequence of courses where the mark is not recorded until the final quarter, semester, or session of the series or sequence is completed. Until such time as a final mark is recorded, the mark of "P" shall be given and the credit shall be counted as hours only, and shall not be considered in determining a student's point-hour ratio under rule 3335-7-26 of the Administrative Code. When a final mark is submitted by the instructor, all previous "P" marks shall assume and be recorded with the value of this final mark.
  - (2) "P" mark is not to be used for any course approved for the "S," " $\cup$ " grading option.

# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

3335-7-24 Credit hours.

- (B) In determining the hours per week required by the course or work, the council on academic affairs may, in appropriate cases, consider the average weekly hours spent during a quarter, semester, or session on the course or work. It should be remembered that the above are guides only and may be deviated from for good cause.
- 3335-7-26 Point-hour ratio.
- (B) When determining the point-hour ratio of a student:
  - (1) For a quarter, semester, or session, the "applicable number of credit hours" shall be the student's scheduled credit hours in that quarter, semester, or session.
- 3335-7-30 Rescheduled courses.
- (B) If, within the first four weeks of a quarter, semester, or session, a student's previous preparation is demonstrably inadequate for a course in which the student originally enrolled, the department or school concerned is empowered to instruct the college or school in which that student is registered to remove the course from the student's schedule and to replace it with a more suitable one.
- 3335-7-32 Withdrawal from courses or from the university.
- (A) Withdrawal from the university during a quarter, semester, or session, constitutes withdrawal from all courses in which a student is enrolled during that quarter, semester, or session. Upon official notification of the student's withdrawal from the university, the university registrar is authorized to enter the dated notation "withdrew" on the student's official permanent record.
- (C) Until five p.m. of the third Friday of a quarter, semester, or session, or the second Friday of a summer term, a student may withdraw from any or all courses which began in the same quarter, semester, session, or term, and no record for the course(s) will be entered on the student's official permanent record.
- (D) After five p.m. of the third Friday of a quarter, semester, or session and until five p.m. of the seventh Friday of a quarter, semester, or session, if a student withdraws from any or all courses which began in the same quarter, semester, or session, the university registrar is authorized to enter the mark "W" on the student's official permanent record for the courses withdrawn.
- (E) After five p.m. of the seventh Friday of the quarter, semester, or session, or the second Friday of a summer term, a student who because of circumstances beyond his/her control finds it necessary to withdraw from any or all courses, must file the appropriate petition with the authorized representative of the dean or director of the enrollment unit. Reasons not acceptable include (but are not limited to) the student's

# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

performance in the course(s), lack of preparation for the course(s), or dissatisfaction with the subject matter offered in the course(s). If the petition is approved, a copy will be filed with the university registrar who is then authorized to enter the mark "W" on the student's official permanent record and the instructor(s) of the course(s) will be so notified. If the petition is not approved, the student continues to be enrolled in the course(s) and a final mark must be submitted by the instructor(s). Withdrawal from any and all courses shall not be permitted after the last day of regularly scheduled classes except when the student experiences a genuine emergency after the regularly scheduled classes end and prior to sitting for the final examination in a given course or courses.

3335-7-33 Conditions for disenrollment from a course.

- (A) After consultation with the instructor, the chairperson of the instructor's department (or other appropriate administrative official) may disenroll a student from a course if:
  - (1) By the third instructional day of the quarter, semester, session, or term, or the second scheduled class of the course, whichever occurs later, the student fails to attend the scheduled course without giving prior notification to the instructor. In such cases the chairperson (or other appropriate administrative official) shall notify the student's college office. A change ticket removing the course from the student's schedule shall be prepared and copies forwarded to the student and to the office of the university registrar. The student is not relieved of the responsibility for dropping such course in the customary way.
- (C) For disenrollment, exclusive of audit, under sections (A) and (B) of this rule, the university registrar shall enter on the student's official permanent record:
  - No mark, if the disenrollment occurs before five p.m. of the third Friday of a quarter, semester, or session course, or the second Friday of a summer term course; or
  - (2) The mark, "W," if the disenvolument occurs after five p.m. of the third Friday of a quarter, semester, or session course, or the second Friday of a summer term course.
- (D) If a student who has enrolled to audit a course fails to complete the requirements for audit specified by the instructor and also fails to withdraw from the course, the instructor shall so inform the office of the university registrar when marks are reported for the quarter, semester, or session. That office will then disenroll the student from the course, removing the course from the student's permanent record, and will notify the student and the student's college of the action taken. (B/T 7/9/76, B/T 7/22/77, B/T 4/1/83, B/T 2/3/84, B/T 7/6/84, B/T 4/5/85)

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- 3335-7-35 Quarters, semesters, sessions, and terms.
- (B) The university calendar, including the dates of the beginning and ending of each quarter, semester, session, and term and of the several vacations and recesses within the year, shall be published in the appropriate university bulletins.
- 3335-9-01 Classification of students for admission.
- (D) Transient students. This shall include regular enrollees of other institutions who with the recommendation of their college authorities enter this university for a brief residence (usually one quarter, semester, session, or term) without transfer of credits.
- 3335-9-12 Registration conditional upon payment of fees.
- (A) All bills, fees, and deposits required from students for a quarter, semester, or session, must be paid at the office of fees and deposits prior to and as a condition of registration for that quarter, semester, or session.
- (B) On the first day of class each quarter, semester, or session, each student is required to demonstrate the right to enrollment in scheduled classes by presentation of an approved schedule or appropriate change document and paid fee card.

3335-9-14 Time of registration and payment of fees; penalties.

- (A) Payment of fees is required of all students each quarter, semester, or session, by the close of business on the date established by the vice provost for student affairs in cooperation with the appropriate offices, and published by the office of the university registrar. This fee payment deadline will apply to the postmark date for fees paid by mail and to the date of receipt for fees paid in person. Failure to meet this requirement will result in a penalty assessment, unless excused by the university registrar or designee.
- (B) All fees, including penalties, must be paid on or before the fourteenth day after classes begin each quarter, semester, or session. The university reserves the right to refuse registration if fees are not paid by the date on which they are due. Individual exceptions to this provision may be made only upon the approval of the vice president for business and finance or designee.

3335-9-17 Filing registration forms.

All students are required to present their registration forms with course requests each quarter, semester, or session, at the time and place announced by the office of the university registrar. Failure to comply with this rule will result in a penalty assessment.

3335-9-18 Return of fees.

(B) Quarter or session fees will be refunded according to the following schedule:

If there are no qualified applicants, the income will be awarded to deserving Welding Engineering students. Recipients will be named annually, but may be eligible to compete for renewed awards. Selection of each recipient will be done by the Chairperson of the Department of Welding Engineering in cooperation with the University Committee on Student Financial Aids.

### Mansfield Campus Real Estate Education Fund

The Mansfield Campus Real Estate Education Fund was established April 5, 1985, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University with gifts to The Ohio State University Development Fund from the Community Housing Resource Board, Inc., of Mansfield, Ohio.

All gifts are to be invested in the University's Permanent Endowment Fund, under the rules and regulations adopted by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, with the right to invest and reinvest as occasion dictates.

The annual income is to be used to cover recruiting activities and related communications and provide tuition grants to students enrolled in real estate education programs offered by The Ohio State University at Mansfield. It is the preference of the donor that priority consideration be given to students with need who represent minority segments of the population who are preparing for the real estate sales license certification. Grant recipients will be selected and recruiting expenditures will be approved by the Mansfield Campus Dean and Director upon recommendation of a Fund Advisory Committee appointed by the Dean and Director. Committee members will represent the real estate industry and other organizations or agencies interested in fair housing, and may include citizens at large who endorse the Fund purpose.

Should the need for this Fund cease to exist or so diminish as to provide unused income, then the income may be used for any purpose whatsoever as determined by the Board of Trustees, with preference being given to recommendations of the Provost in consultation with the administration of the OSU Mansfield Campus.

Van Buren coming to the University as a result of this settlement, as a gift to The Ohio State University through The Ohio State University Development Fund.

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### STUDENT HEALTH INSURANCE

Synopsis: Improvement and awarding of the Student Health Insurance Program to Blue Cross of Central Ohio and Community Mutual Insurance Corporation is proposed.

WHEREAS coverage under the existing Mutual of Omaha contract for Student Health Insurance is expiring and competitive bids were solicited and received on January 16, 1985, to renew said coverage; and

WHEREAS the bids invited alternative coverages with the University reserving the right to select the coverages which, in its judgment, provided the most benefit commensurate with the premium quoted; and

WHEREAS Blue Cross of Central Ohio and Community Mutual Insurance Corporation submitted the lowest and best proposal of the seven received providing Student Health Insurance for a two year period; and

WHEREAS after consideration of the desires and concerns of the students purchasing the insurance, the Student Health Insurance Subcommittee has recommended--and the full Council on Student Affairs has ratified this recommendation--that the bid contract provide improved benefits as follows:

Increase the daily semi-private hospital room and board rate from \$145 to \$195.

Increase the surgical fee for removal of impacted teeth covered by bone - from \$50 to \$60 soft tissue - from \$30 to \$50

Add a benefit of \$20 for x-rays, only when surgery is performed for removal of impacted teeth.

Add a preventive dental benefit (for students only) which will provide a \$15 benefit for cleaning teeth and an additional \$20 benefit for x-rays if needed. This benefit will be reimbursed once per twelve month period for services provided at the Wilce Health Center or the University Dental Clinic.

Increase the annual medical consultants fee (for students only) from \$35 to \$50.

WHEREAS this program will be available on an optional basis to all registered students for the following proposed Quarterly Premium Rates:

WHEREAS it has been determined that significant additional resources to support the pursuit of excellence could be brought to the University in the form of private gifts from others who share the vision of this University's future that is held by the members of this Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS it has been proposed that a national fund-raising campaign be undertaken for the purpose of securing such additional resources through enhanced levels of private gifts by alumni and other friends, faculty and staff members, parents, corporations and foundations:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That this Board of Trustees supports the pursuit of excellence for the University through attracting additional levels of private gifts; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the members of this Board will devote themselves personally to the successful attainment of this campaign's goals.

Upon motion of Mr. Galbreath, seconded by Mr. Barone, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous roll call vote.

Mr. Hilliker:

President Jennings has a statement that will emphasize the meaning of what this campaign actually involves.

President Jennings made the following statement:

Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

I think it is especially appropriate that this particular Resolution has been passed by the Trustees during a Board meeting away from our central campus in Columbus. The Resolution endorses an activity of enormous significance in the life of the University, and for the longterm future of the institution as a whole. It is therefore also of major significance to our faculty, staff, and students here in Wooster, and to all Ohioans throughout the state as well.

Ohio State has a special role as Ohio's land-grant university, and we take great pride in our reputation as the flagship institution of the state's educational community. I am glad to have this opportunity to remind us all that the expansion and enhancement of the excellence of the University has an importance that reaches far beyond the boundaries of our central campus.

The interests and impact of The Ohio State University are truly national and international in scope and, correspondingly, so is the private fund-raising campaign endorsed in this Resolution.

## ENDORSEMENT THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY CAMPAIGN (contd)

President Jennings: (contd)

We have been studying the feasibility of a major campaign for some time now. The responses to our discussions have confirmed that there is broad-based support for such an effort on behalf of Ohio State. We are confident of our potential for securing major leadership gifts and important commitments of time and expertise from many individuals who will help lead this endeavor. Based on the success of these initial efforts, we will set our final goal by the fall.

With this Resolution of support from the Board--which, I want to mention here, comprises the primary volunteer leadership of the institution--I am today prepared to announce that at the start of the coming Autumn Quarter, we will launch one of the largest campaigns of its type in the history of public higher education. To be more specific, over the next five years, from the fall of 1985 to June of 1990, The Ohio State University will seek, at minimum, \$225 million in new gifts and annual support.

In the context of a fund-raising campaign, we talk about setting dollar goals, and it is important and entirely appropriate to do so. But we should put that in perspective. The dollar figure represents only the means by which we will achieve the real goal of the campaign--the acquisition of significant additional resources that will enable this University to fulfill its potential as one of the premier institutions of higher education in the world.

Through the private dollars we raise in this campaign, we will be able to enhance the excellence of all of our colleges and other major programs that support the academic mission of the University. What we seek to attract is the additional level of private support that will allow us to strengthen our margin of excellence throughout the institution. This includes the traditional areas of the liberal arts and our impressive complement of professional schools.

The campaign will support a significant expansion of our endowment for faculty chairs, student financial aid, and research programs in every conceivable area of academic endeavor. It will include funds to provide state-of-the-art equipment and enhance research efforts in the new Cancer Research Institute. It will incorporate funding for the recently announced multi-purpose, indoor student athletic facility. And it will include, as its largest single component, The Ohio State University Center for the Visual Arts.

As you know, the Center already has won international acclaim for the excellence and creativity of its architectural design, and the unique and innovative aspects of its program. Its reputation will build on this early success once the Center begins to actively involve our students, faculty and staff, and the visitors we expect to attract not only from the community, but from across the nation and around the world.

### ENDORSEMENT THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY CAMPAIGN (contd)

President Jennings: (contd)

We anticipate the advertisement for bids to take place and construction of the facility itself to get underway during Autumn Quarter. Our goal is to have the new Center ready for use by the 1987-88 academic year. Several related campus projects that must precede the construction of the Center already are in progress.

The world-class Center for the Visual Arts we envision for Ohio State is the centerpiece not only of our fund-raising campaign, but also of our comprehensive commitment to the pursuit of excellence for the institution as a whole. No university has ever achieved greatness without an abiding commitment to nurturing those essential components of an intellectual environment that are contributed by the fine arts.

Encompassed in the fund-raising goal for the Center is, of course, the new building itself, which creates a new and dramatic framework for the entrance way to the Oval. At the \$21 million level, we will create essentially the basic structure. The entire architectural scheme will be constructed, but a few interior areas will still be in shell form. How far we go beyond the basic \$21 million level will depend upon our early success in attracting private support for the Center.

An additional \$5 million will allow us to complete those shells with the high technology and sophisticated equipment that is just as essential to today's artists as it is to modern scientists. At the \$26 million level we will, for example, be able to equip an innovative and flexible performance theater with specialized acoustical and lighting systems and the hydraulic engineering to rearrange the seating on demand. These additions will make the performance space truly state-of-the-art.

Another \$5 million will fund an endowment for program activities. The planned Institute for Advanced Activities in the Arts will be the vehicle through which we bring in the distinguished visiting artists, designers, architects, choreographers, and other visual artists who will ensure the on-going energy and continuing new visions for the Center.

People learn from people, and our attention to the building aspect-however impressive that may be--has not overshadowed our fundamental commitment to the purpose of the facility, as a home for the very best faculty, staff, and students. Both as an architectural achievement and a program innovator, the Center represents an impressive focal point for our goals in the forthcoming campaign.

When this Board approved the creation of The Ohio State University Foundation last December, that action signalled the first major step in generating national leadership for this campaign. We are making significant progress in recruiting the twenty-one charter members of

the Foundation Board of Directors. We hope we will be prepared to announced those names and hold the first board meeting later this Spring Quarter.

At the same time, we are assembling an additional core of volunteer leaders to serve as the National Campaign Committee. We expect to announce the composition of that group of more than 100 individuals from across the nation this summer.

Together, the Foundation Board and National Campaign Committee will assist us in determining the final shape of the campaign, setting its goals, and attracting major gifts from alumni and other friends, from our own faculty and staff, the parents of our students, and corporations and foundations with a shared commitment to the mission and goals of the University.

As a necessary predecessor to a major campaign, we also have been working for some time to increase the basic private fund-raising capabilities of this University. And we are succeeding. We already have reported to this Board, for example, that the amount raised in just the first half of the current fiscal year equalled the total for an entire year just four years ago.

We believe that this major campaign is the logical next step. Building on the fundamental and comprehensive strengths that have brought the institution to its current leadership position as one of the cutstanding universities in the nation, we will move ahead to enhance the pursuit of excellence at The Ohio State University for many years to come and, I believe, take our place as one of the pre-eminent scholarly institutions in the world with the help of our private donors.

The results of this campaign truly will make it one of the more important endeavors this University has ever done and I don't think we will see those results for a few years, but when they happen the importance of this campaign will really be appreciated.

Columbus, Ohio, May 3, 1985

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The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Friday, May 3, 1985, at The Ohio State University Fawcett Center for Tomorrow, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

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Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

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The Chairman, Mr. Hilliker, called the meeting of the Board of Trustees to order at 12:35 p.m. He requested the Secretary to call the roll. The meeting recessed into Executive Session for the purpose of considering legal issues and personnel-related matters.

Present: D. James Hilliker, Chairman, John F. Havens, Edmund C. Redman, Leonard J. Immke, Shirley D. Bowser, Hamilton J. Teaford, and John J. Barone.

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Mr. Hilliker reconvened the meeting at 1:35 p.m.

Present: D. James Hilliker, Chairman, John F. Havens, Edmund C. Redman, Leonard J. Immke, Shirley D. Bowser, Hamilton J. Teaford, and John J. Barone.

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Mr. Hilliker called on James Ervin, President of Local 4501 Communications Workers of America, to make a statement to the Board.

Mr. Ervin made the following statement:

Mr. Chairman, President Jennings, Board members, my name is Jim Ervin. I am not an outside agitator. I have been employed by and involved with OSU since 1946, and I think of myself as part of the OSU family. My children went to school here, my wife and brother still work here, and I am a former dietary employee of the Commons.

As President of the local union that represents OSU workers, I have dedicated myself to trying to improve the working conditions of OSU employees and to helping make OSU the best possible university it can be. That is why it hurts me to watch our relationship with the University go from good, to bad, to worse. That is why it hurts me every time I have to go public and let everyone in Columbus know about our problems. I believe it is ripping the University apart--to have the workers and the administration at each others throats.

Now some of you may ask how this happened. How have things gotten so bad that we find it necessary to get arrested? How have we ended up on the edge of a major strike here at OSU? And some of you, especially those who have a business background, may say to yourselves, "It is that damn greedy union--unreasonable union, that's caused all of our problems." But we have been trying--I have been personally trying to get in touch with you for weeks, to get your attention and convince you how deadly serious our problems are.

Over the last year we have seen a new style of management at OSU. A style of management that is ruining seventeen years of peaceful relations. This local union currently has six unfair labor practices against the University being investigated by SERB. We have employees who have been threatened with disciplinary action for participating in demonstrations and at times we have had many,

Mr. Ervin: (contd)

many grievances backed up. We have supervisors that have lost grievances, supervisors who just plainly refuse to accept grievances. There are log jams to audit, there is a massive increase in disciplinary action against workers. Workers are still forced to handle asbestos without proper protection.

Now we don't know where the crisis in management comes from, but it seems that every day you pick up the paper there is a new scandal at the University. Now, in this climate of deteriorating labor relations, we go into collective bargaining. A bargaining that is marked by constant management stalling and delays, among cancelled meetings. Management has even refused to give us budget and wage information that they are mandated by law to give to us. How can we bargain a contract if we don't have some of the tools to work with?

Now in bargaining we are not trying to make big advancements or try new things--we are just trying to hold on to what we have. I don't personally know where Vice President Madison Scott got his figures that we have asked for a 19.5 per cent wage increase, but from where I sit, it is totally untrue. But, how can we reach any kind of agreement when management doesn't even know what our demands are? How are we suppose to respond in light of these kinds of facts? Should we just roll over and play dead simply because management doesn't want to honor contract language that we have had for years?

It seems to me that everyone should ask themselves why management seems willing to have a strike to get rid of language we all have lived with for years. Is it really worth what is happening to us? But what bothers me most--I feel that we have gone back to '67. Now those of you who remember '67, that strike was over just a few words. If I recall correctly those words were, "that this University should take dues from people who want to be a part of a union and transmit those dues to that union of their choice." The University said no--so we wound up on High Street, in the middle of High Street with the students, on strike. Now, here, years later it seems as if we are headed for the same type of fight over just a few words. And those words are in Article 14--Promotion. Maybe this isn't the worse thing that could happen to us, because I'm proud to be arm in arm with these students. And I am proud that together we are trying to knock on every door and get your attention.

Together today, we come to you with two problems. One is a contract and the other is asking you to come out of South Africa, a union-busting country. Mr. President and Board members, I really hate to say what I think I have to say at this time. I believe when you mention that, that's the real meat of the question. I talk about management style deteriorating relations and so on, but maybe this whole South African issue sums up the problem. It seems that OSU

Mr. Ervin: (contd)

not only supports what is going on in South Africa, but seems intent on transferring that same anti-union paternalistic system to Columbus.

Here on campus supervisors are going around telling people that if they strike, they will be fired. We don't really want to strike. We want fair treatment. But we will strike. In South Africa 13,000 union gold miners were just fired. Now, I have had police follow me around campus and threaten to arrest our organizers for talking to workers on campus. We have had union members assigned to the dirtiest, most dangerous jobs--like asbestos removal--without the proper equipment. And the University's proposal on promotions would essentially lock our lower-paid members into those jobs and most of those members are black and women. We feel that you are treating the union the same here as in South Africa--the same reasons, because of the contracting out. That is totally cheap labor and you don't get your job done any better. I believe you want cheap, powerless labor.

Let me end by just saying this--it isn't about \$.25. We aren't fussing about \$.25 or \$.30 or 4.5 per cent or paid holidays. We feel it is a fight for the heart and soul, whether you believe it or not, of this University. Will this University fulfill a mission of honor to defend justice or will it side with the most reactionary backward of ideas as symbolized by South Africa? I just have a couple more words and I will go so far as to say--I am really begging you and urging you to intervene and help our local union get an honorable contract, one that we can honor; and divest from South Africa. Thank you very much.

### Mr. Hilliker:

If I may make a few comments. Mr. Ervin, we appreciate your comments and we, as a Board, and this administration are aware that there are problems that need to be resolved. However, this is not and should not be a negotiating session today, I am sure that you appreciate that.

#### Mr. Ervin:

May I make one other remark, Sir?

## Mr. Hilliker:

Well, let me finish and then--yes, you may. It is our understanding that negotiations are continuing. There are issues to be resolved--we are aware of them, you are aware of them--there are disputes, there are disagreements. A federal mediator is involved and as far as we know he is the best that could be obtained in this. The issues will be resolved and we are confident that they will be resolved in a just, fair way for everybody. There are two sides to every coin and

Mr. Hilliker: (contd)

I think we are looking at one of those type of situations today. But the issues will be resolved, they have been in the past, they will be in the future, and this one is going to be resolved.

Mr. Ervin:

Well, when?

Mr. Hilliker:

That depends--the question as to when--the negotiations are continuing, when the parties can get together. The federal mediator, I believe, is now participating in it.

Person from the audience:

How long?

Mr. Hilliker:

I can't answer that question.

Person from the audience:

I know, you're just on the Board.

Student:

When are you going to divest in South Africa, that is what we want to know?

Mr. Hilliker:

I must remind you all, that this is a regularly scheduled Board meeting and we do have an agenda to follow and we intend to do so. If it becomes apparent that we cannot, we will adjourn the meeting. So basically what I am saying is, the discussions will be up to you as to how far they will continue.

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NEW DEGREE PROGRAM - PH.D. IN NURSING Resolution No. 85-116

Synopsis: Recommendation for a Ph.D. program in the College of Nursing is proposed.

WHEREAS nursing has become a viable area of research at the Ph.D. level. It fills the gap between medical sciences and the behavioral sciences; and

WHEREAS throughout the nation there are currently 28 doctoral programs in nursing, with many more being planned. Case Western Reserve offers the only program in Ohio. The other academic institutions having nursing curricula in Ohio want Ohio State to have a program and strongly support the proposed program; and

WHEREAS the College currently has a strong M.S. program, graduating typically 55 to 60 people per year. During the past five years, approximately 130 of the M.S. students wrote theses; and

#### NEW DEGREE PROGRAM - PH.D. IN NURSING (contd)

WHEREAS a recent rating of 353 four-year, undergraduate degree programs in nursing throughout the country ranks the Ohio State program among the top 25. Ohio State is one of three among the top 25 (the others being Yale and UCLA) which do not offer a doctoral degree. The Ph.D. program should improve further the overall quality of nursing education at Ohio State; and

WHEREAS there are currently a large number of qualified individuals who desire to enroll in a Ph.D. curriculum at The Ohio State University. The College plans to admit six new students each of the first three years of the program and stabilize at nine new students per year thereafter:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the University Senate has approved the establishment of a Ph.D. program in Nursing, and respectfully requests concurrence by the Board of Trustees.

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### INTERIM POLICY ON PATENTS AND COPYRIGHTS Resolution No. 85-117

Synopsis: Creation of University policy, regarding ownership and transfer of, responsibility for and distribution of income from patents and copyrights, is proposed.

WHEREAS a primary mission of The Ohio State University is the support and development of research by its faculty, staff and students that will serve to expand the body of general knowledge; and

WHEREAS The Ohio State University accepts the responsibility to encourage the dissemination of the knowledge acquired by such research for the betterment of the public good; and

WHEREAS The Ohio State University Senate approved the proposed Interim Policy on April 13, 1985:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the proposed Interim Policy on Patents and Copyrights be approved and be implemented as stated therein.

# I. PURPOSE AND SCOPE

# A. Purpose of Policy

A primary mission of The Ohio State University is the support and development of research by its faculty, students, and staff that will serve to expand the body of general knowledge. As a corollary to that mission, the University accepts the responsibility to encourage the dissemination of the knowledge acquired by this research for the betterment of the public good. Occasionally,

INTERIM POLICY ON PATENTS AND COPYRIGHTS (contd)

products of this research will result in inventions or copyrightable materials that may best serve the public good through commercial development and distribution. To promote that development, the following Policy on patents, copyrights, and related material has been adopted to meet these fundamental objectives:

(1) to facilitate the development and utilization of the results of research by the faculty, students, and staff of the University and to assist them and others associated with the University, in that development and utilization;

(2) to obtain appropriate benefits for Researchers and for the University from commercial applications of research results and to apply funds accruing to the University from these applications to the support of research and other scholarly activity at the University; and

(3) to ensure that the rights and interests of all parties concerned are determined with proper consideration of the principles of academic freedom, according to established, uniform, and appropriate procedures, and protected by equitable agreements.

# B. Definitions

The following definitions will be employed in interpreting and implementing this Policy:

(1) "Sponsored Program" means an activity in which the University or one of its units agrees to perform research or development or will receive payment for conducting research or development.

(2) "University Research" means any research or development activity which

(a) is undertaken in connection with a Sponsored Program, or

(b) is directly and immediately related to duties or responsibilities for which a person is compensated by the University or one of its units, or

(c) is conducted with more than insignificant use of facilities or equipment provided by the University or one of its units.

(3) "Researcher" means a person engaging in or directing University Research.

(4) "Product of University Research" refers generally to inventions and other legally protectable material arising out of University Research and includes any discovery, invention, know-how, design, model, work of authorship (including computer software), and any

### INTERIM POLICY ON PATENTS AND COPYRIGHTS (contd)

strain, variety or culture of an organism or any portion, modification, translation, or extension of these items. It includes marks used in connection with these. It does not include works of artistry, academic instruction, or traditional scholarship (including descriptions or discussions of University Research) insofar as these works were not produced in connection with a Sponsored Program or as part of a specific University duty or assignment.

# C. Statement of Policy

The interests of the University are served by the protection of commercially valuable Products of University Research because of the University's commitment to the widest possible distribution of benefits derived from research conducted at the University, and its commitment that these items will be properly and systematically protected and developed for the public good.

In furtherance of these goals, and consistent with state law, the University has the Policy of claiming ownership in all rights in Products of University Research. The University will usually find it desirable to convey all or some portion of these rights to the sponsors of the research, to the Researchers, to commercial firms, or to others. Rights to items developed outside the scope of University Research as defined in section I B(2), above, shall belong to the inventor or creator, subject to claims of third parties; disputes concerning the interpretation of sections I B(2)(b) and (c) shall be appealable to the Faculty Committee on Patents and Copyrights for final determination. Applicable law and the terms of Sponsored Program agreements will govern where they differ from this Policy.

The acquisition, protection, and disposition of rights in Products of University Research are the responsibility of the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies. In making dispositions the Vice President will be guided by the principle that they must be supportive of the basic missions of the University, which are to educate and to generate knowledge. In specific cases, consideration may also be given to other relevant circumstances, including support of graduate or other students, equipment made available to the University, and the educational experiences afforded to University faculty, students, and staff.

Potentially valuable Products of University Research shall be disclosed to the University in a timely manner. The University, at its option, shall develop and protect each item in which the University holds rights in a manner deemed by it to be appropriate at no cost to the inventor or creator. The inventor or creator will share in any royalty or other income as provided under this Policy.

# D. Scope of Policy

This Policy is applicable to all units of the University including its colleges, schools, departments, centers, institutes, and hospitals, and to all of the University's faculty, staff, and students.

# INTERIM POLICY ON PATENTS AND COPYRIGHTS (contd)

For purposes of distribution of royalty income, this Policy applies to all items first conceived or disclosed to the University after its approval date. It is the intent that, where feasible, all appropriate provisions of this Policy, including those governing the distribution of royalty income received after the approval date of the Policy, be applied to items earlier conceived or disclosed to the University; existing arrangements will be individually examined to achieve this goal.

It is not intended that this Policy change the traditional relationship between the University and authors of textbooks and other scholarly and artistic works. Therefore, except in those cases in which the production of such materials is a part of a Sponsored Program or of specifically assigned duties, copyrights in textbooks, monographs, papers, musical compositions, works of art, unpublished manuscripts, and the like will be the sole and exclusive property of the creator. Use of University resources in the creation of these works varies from field to field; arrangements for such use should be approved by the chairperson, dean, or other appropriate academic officer.

Students who are employees of the University are treated under this Policy as employees in connection with matters related to their employment. Students who hold awards such as scholarships or fellowships through the University upon which the funding body has placed restrictions as to items developed during the course of the award shall be treated under this Policy in the same manner as students working on Sponsored Programs. In cases arising under Section I B(2)(c), the University will ordinarily transfer or waive its rights to student inventors or creators except where faculty involvement or the use of University facilities or equipment is substantial (see Section II A(9)(c) and Section IV).

Service marks related to the name of the University and conventional publication activities, including those of The Ohio State University Press and those associated with the intercollegiate athletic program, are not within the scope of this Policy.

Except as to material for use in University Research, questions concerning the use of material protected by copyright and similar items belonging to others by members of the University community are not covered by this Policy.

Non-faculty employees who develop items which qualify as work for hire under the copyright laws or which result from specific direction to produce or develop the item are not eligible to participate in any distribution of income or transfer of University rights in connection with those items.

## II. ADMINISTRATION

The Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies shall have the primary responsibility for the implementation of this Policy on behalf of the University. All or a portion of the administration of activities with respect to this Policy may be delegated by the Vice President to a Patent and Copyright Administrator ("Administrator") and to others.

# INTERIM POLICY ON PATENTS AND COPYRIGHTS (contd)

# A. The Administrator

The Administrator shall, under the general direction of the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies:

(1) with the Committee on Patents and Copyrights, develop standards and procedures for the implementation of this Policy for submission to the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies;

(2) conduct day-to-day operations relating to matters subject to this Policy;

(3) upon request, provide advice and assistance to Researchers with respect to consulting agreements with industrial and other organizations that may involve rights to items within the scope of this Policy and to appropriate University officials who have responsibilities with respect to the approval of consulting arrangements;

(4) maintain a file for each disclosure of an item subject to this Policy which will contain complete records of all actions;

(5) determine whether the University or any other party has rights in an item subject to this Policy, if so, the basis and extent of such rights;

(6) where there are two or more persons associated with the University claiming to be inventors or creators of an item subject to this Policy, encourage and facilitate an early agreement (in a form acceptable to the University) among them concerning which of the claimants shall be considered inventors or creators for the purposes of this Policy and in what fraction each shall share in the benefits of the Policy;

(7) in the absence of an agreement referred to in item (6), above, recommend to the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies for final determination on behalf of the University which of the competing claimants shall be considered inventors or creators for the purpose of this Policy and in what fraction they shall share in the benefits of the Policy (Before making a recommendation, the Administrator will obtain the concurrence of the Faculty Committee on Patents and Copyrights);

(8) determine whether an invention, discovery, writing, or other item to which the University has rights is patentable, copyrightable, or otherwise legally protectable;

(9) for items subject to this Policy, recommend to the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies whether

(a) the University should patent, copyright, or otherwise legally protect, or license the item, or

INTERIM POLICY ON PATENTS AND COPYRIGHTS (contd)

(b) the University should dedicate its rights to the public, adhering to the wishes of the inventor or creator where feasible, or

(c) the University should transfer or waive its rights in favor of permitting the Researcher to protect and develop the item at his or her own expense, and whether conditions should be attached to a transfer or waiver, but any conditions other than the reservation of a non-transferable royalty-free license shall require the concurrence of the Researcher and the Faculty Committee on Patents and Copyrights;

(10) obtain legal protection and arrange for licensing or other commercial development in those cases in which the University elects to pursue its rights, including preparing and prosecuting applications for patent, copyright registration, plant variety protection, and other legal protection, or retaining counsel or other assistance for that purpose, negotiating or assisting in negotiation of licenses and related agreements, and monitoring the collection of royalties or other related income;

(11) prepare or assist in the preparation of all required reports on inventions and discoveries, writings, and other items subject to this Policy;

(12) at the direction of the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies, provide assistance to other University officers and officers of related organizations including The Ohio State University Research Foundation;

(13) consult with the Faculty Committee on Patents and Copyrights at least twice per year, or whenever deemed necessary by the Committee or the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies, on matters concerning this Policy, its implementation, or administration;

(14) prepare an annual report for the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies and for the President, the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost, the Vice President for Business and Finance, and other officers or committees as designated by the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies.

The Administrator shall make a recommendation with regard to responsibility (9), above, within forty-five (45) days of the receipt of all of the required information, and advise the Researchers in writing of the decision of the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies. The Administrator may consult with faculty, staff, students, or others with respect to carrying out his responsibilities.

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# INTERIM POLICY ON PATENTS AND COPYRIGHTS (contd)

# B. The Faculty Committee on Patents and Copyrights

The Faculty Committee on Patents and Copyrights ("Committee") shall be composed primarily of members of the University faculty and shall elect its chair. Five members shall be elected by the Faculty Council in a manner to be determined by that Council. One graduate student shall be appointed by the Council of Graduate Students in a manner to be determined by that Council. Five members shall be appointed by the President in consultation with the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies, the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost, and other appropriate officers of the University. Persons may serve no more than three consecutive years after which time they will be ineligible for service for one year. Committee members having business pending with the Administrator or the Committee in the form of an active patent application, a royalty agreement, or the like or having extramural active patent applications, royalty agreements, or the like shall not participate in the deliberations of the Committee concerning those matters. Official actions of the Committee shall require the concurrence of at least six members of the Committee.

The Committee shall:

(1) review, recommend, and advise the University on matters relating to this Policy;

(2) review and advise the Administrator on the standards and procedures developed by the Administrator for the implementation of this Policy;

(3) convene at least twice per year to review the procedures used in implementing and administering this Policy, and where deemed necessary, develop and recommend changes in standards and procedures to the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies, the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost, the Administrator, and other appropriate officers of the University;

(4) consult with the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies or the Administrator when requested; and

(5) serve as a board to which a Researcher may appeal actions of the Administrator, subject to appropriate review standards and procedures.

## C. Appeal of Actions by the Administrator

A Researcher may appeal actions of the Administrator to the Committee. Grounds for such appeal are alleged failure of the Administrator to fulfill the provisions of this Policy, to follow appropriate implementing guidelines, or to demonstrate reasonable diligence.

The Researcher shall submit the appeal in writing to the Chairperson of the Committee, who shall determine whether the Researcher has made a reasonable effort to resolve the complaint with the Administrator and whether the

### INTERIM POLICY ON PATENTS AND COPYRIGHTS (contd)

substance of the appeal appears to be within the scope of this Policy. Proceedings shall be informal, but all parties shall have adequate notice and an opportunity to be heard.

After considering all relevant information the Committee shall prepare and send to the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies a report of its findings and decision on the issues raised by the Researcher and any corrective action it recommends. The Vice President shall promptly review the report and may adopt or modify it on behalf of the University. The Committee's finding as to whether an item is subject to ownership by the University under section I B(2)(b) or (c) shall be final and conclusive on the part of the University unless appealed by the Researcher.

The decision of the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies shall be communicated to the Researcher and the Administrator within thirty (30) days of his receipt of the Committee's report, and shall be final unless appealed to the President of the University by the Researcher or another interested party within thirty (30) days following the issuance. If so appealed, the decision of the President shall be final.

If the Researcher, the Administrator, or any other person is concerned about protection of academic freedom as a result of the interpretation, implementation, or use of this Policy, the matter may be referred to the Committee for appropriate action.

## III. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE RESEARCHER

Responsibility for timely disclosure of items subject to this Policy, such as copyrightable material and marks, inventions, discoveries and related know-how, rests with the inventor or creator. They shall take all reasonable steps requested by the Administrator including the execution of assignments and the like necessary for evaluation of the item and the perfection of patent or other rights.

Faculty or staff members, including students in their capacity as employees of the University, who believe that they have invented items outside the scope of this Policy shall not file, or permit others to file in their name, patent applications without providing at least thirty (30) days notice and a statement of the circumstances of the invention to the Administrator. At the Administrator's request, additional information as to the nature and circumstances under which the item was developed and a copy of the invention disclosure or proposed patent application, whichever the Administrator may deem appropriate under the circumstances, shall be provided.

Faculty or staff engaging in consulting or in business and those charged with approving such activities on behalf of the University are responsible for ensuring that any related agreements with external entities are not in conflict with this Policy or other commitments involving the University. The Administrator, upon request, will provide assistance in this respect. The University's rights and the individual's obligations to the University which are subject to this Policy are in no way abrogated or limited by the terms of such agreements, except insofar as the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies

# INTERIM POLICY ON PATENTS AND COPYRIGHTS (contd)

may specifically authorize in writing. Faculty and staff members should make their obligations to the University clear to those with whom they make agreements and should provide other parties to the agreement with a current statement of this Policy.

# IV. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE UNIVERSITY

When the University makes the determination to exercise its rights to an item, it will promptly make appropriate efforts to legally protect the item and with the assistance of the inventor or creator it will search out and initiate negotiations with prospective licensees.

If the University chooses neither to exercise its rights through pursuit of legal protection and commercial development or otherwise, nor to transfer the rights to another party, nor to dedicate the rights to the public, they shall be transferred or waived to the inventor or creator, if so requested in writing to the Administrator. Transfers or waivers shall be subject to such conditions in addition to the retention of a non-transferable royalty-free license as may be agreed to by the inventor or creator and the Committee.

If the University chooses to protect an item, but does not arrange for its commercial development or dedication to the public within a reasonable time, the inventor or creator may make a written request to the Administrator for transfer or waiver of rights from the University. The Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies will either grant the request or will advise the inventor or creator of the University's plans for the item; in addition to the retention of a non-transferable royalty-free license, appropriate conditions agreed to by the inventor or creator and the Committee shall be applied to any transfer or waiver.

The University shall treat disclosures of items subject to this Policy as confidential and shall make reasonable efforts to avoid loss of rights due to lack of appropriate documentation or to improper or premature disclosure or to publication without proper copyright notice.

# V. TRANSFER OF UNIVERSITY PROPERTY

The University must preserve any basis that may exist for protecting items subject to this Policy. In some cases, tangible property belonging to the University, including models, devices, designs, computer programs, cell lines, antibodies, recombinant materials, chemical compounds, compositions, formulations, plant varieties, and records concerning inventions or discoveries, constitutes a portion of that basis. Therefore, written approval of the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies, or his delegate, must be obtained before tangible property associated with Products of University Research is removed from University facilities or transferred to any person or entity for commercial purposes. This Policy does not modify any existing requirements concerning the transfer of University property to others for non-commercial purposes.

## INTERIM POLICY ON PATENTS AND COPYRIGHTS (contd)

Where required by a Sponsored Program agreement or where publication may affect the ability to legally protect an item subject to this Policy, timely prior written notice of any proposed publication reporting or describing any Product of University Research should be given to the Administrator so that patent applications may be filed in a timely fashion, appropriate copyright notices provided for, and any relevant obligations under a Sponsored Program agreement satisfied.

## VI. DISTRIBUTION OF INCOME

The University shall establish a royalty account for each Product of University Research for which it anticipates receiving royalties or other income, and all expenses and income relating to that item shall be recorded therein. Where more than one such item is licensed together for a common fee or royalty, a common royalty account may be established for all of the related items.

Income to each royalty account shall be distributed as follows:

(1) Of all amounts received up to the first \$45,000, before deduction for any expenses, fifty percent shall be paid to the inventors or creators, or to their heirs or assigns; the other fifty percent shall not be available for distribution to the inventors or creators.

(2) The direct expenses of the University allocable to investigating, evaluating, protecting and enforcing the rights to the item(s) covered by the account, including provision for payment of future maintenance fees for any patent(s), shall next be charged to the royalty account; expenses shall not include salaries or other overhead associated with the Administrator's office except for a reasonable charge where the Administrator prepares a patent application.

(3) Of that fifty percent of the first \$45,000 not allocated to the inventors or creators, any balance not offset by direct expenses chargeable to the particular royalty account will be used proportionately to offset direct expenses accrued for the evaluation, protection and development of other Products of University Research which have not been otherwise recouped.

(4) Any remaining balance shall be distributed, normally on an annual basis, as follows:

(a) twenty-five percent to the inventors or creators or their heirs or assigns (but not to include any portion of the first \$45,000 of gross income),

(b) twenty-five percent divided equally, unless another division is requested by the appropriate dean or chairperson and is approved by the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies, between the inventor's college and department, for research and other scholarly activities, and

## INTERIM POLICY ON PATENTS AND COPYRIGHTS (contd)

(c) the balance to be used for support of research and other scholarly activities throughout the University as determined by the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies.

Where a royalty account is established for an item in which rights are transferred or waived to the Researcher, no distribution shall be made therefrom to the Researcher, except as may be specifically provided for in connection with such transfer or waiver.

When there is a resonable basis for believing that amounts subject to distribution under the Policy may be required to be refunded or otherwise expended, or that others may have a claim to such distribution, payments may be withheld for a reasonable period required for resolution of the matter. No person shall have a right to receive payment or other benefit under this Policy for periods before the Administrator has been notified in writing by that person of his or her basis for a claim. Upon good faith determination by the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies that a person has not contributed significantly to the invention or creation of the items in question and has no other valid basis for a claim, that person shall not be eligible for payment or other benefit under this Policy. In case of dispute among persons claiming to be due amounts under this Policy, the good faith payment by the University to one or more of the claimants shall fully satisfy any obligations on the part of the University to all claimants for the amounts paid.

## VII. REVIEW OF INTERIM POLICY

This interim Policy shall be reviewed after two years by the Faculty Committee on Patents and Copyrights and a report made to the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies. The report shall form the basis for any revision in the policy which may be appropriate.

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on March 8, 1985, of Edgar Dale, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Educational Policy and Leadership.

#### Edgar Dale (contd)

Born in Minnesota, Dr. Dale received his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of North Dakota and his Ph.D. degree from the University of Chicago. Early in his career he was a teacher and school superintendent in North Dakota. Dr. Dale joined the faculty of The Ohio State University in 1929. As a member of the Bureau of Educational Research, he became a Professor of Education in 1939. During World War II he served as a consultant for the War Department, coordinating the production of instructional training films.

Dr. Dale was a nationally and internationally known expert in communications. His book <u>Audio-Visual Methods in Teaching</u>, published in 1946 and revised in 1954 and 1969, greatly influenced teaching techniques and pointed out the significance of using all available resources and rich experiences in the classroom.

Widely known as an inspiring teacher, Dr. Dale received an Alumni Award for Distinguished Teaching in 1963. During his career he conducted seminars in Japan, Australia, Brazil, and Mexico. For many years Dr. Dale served on the Committee of <u>The National Society for the Study of Education</u>. He was on the Advisory Board of the <u>World Book Encyclopedia</u>, and an active member of Phi Delta Kappa, championing minority membership in the organization.

As editor of <u>The News Letter</u> for 36 years, Dr. Dale's pointed, clearly-written articles encompassed a wide range of knowledge including information on film, radio, television, the press, reading, vocabulary, and literacy. He strove to improve the quality of reading materials by advocating simplicity and clarity in writing. These efforts resulted in his widely-used readability formula for predicting the difficulty of reading materials.

Dr. Dale's scholarly research in reading and vocabulary has greatly influenced the writers of newspapers, textbooks, and other publications. In 1974, he was elected into the Reading Hall of Fame. In 1980, the University conferred on him the honorary degree, Doctor of Humane Letters.

## Hilda E. Dierker

All gifts are to be invested in the University's Permanent Endowment Fund, under the rules and regulations adopted by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, with the right to invest and reinvest as occasion dictates.

The annual income will be used to support the activities undertaken by the Merrell Dow Professor and in support of the advancement of research, teaching and public service in the Division of Pharmaceutical Administration at The Ohio State University College of Pharmacy. The Chairperson of the Division of Pharmaceutical Administration will have sole authority to authorize expenditures from the fund, under the supervision of the Dean of the College of Pharmacy.

The Chairperson of the Division of Pharmaceutical Administration, in agreement with the Dean of the College of Pharmacy, shall have the right to invade the principal from time to time, if necessary, to support the activities undertaken by the Merrell Dow Professor or by the Division of Pharmaceutical Administration.

Should the need for this fund cease to exist or so diminish as to provide unused income, then the income may be used for any purpose whatsoever as determined by the Board of Trustees, with preference being given to recommendations from the appropriate administrative official of the University who is then responsible for the program in Pharmacy.

Selection shall be made by the University Committee on Student Financial Aid upon the recommendation of the Chairperson of the Pharmaceutical Administration Division and approval of the Dean of the College of Pharmacy.

Should the need for this fund cease to exist or so diminish as to provide unused income, then the income may be used for any purpose whatsoever as determined by the Board of Trustees, with preference being given to recommendations from the appropriate administrative official of the University who is then directly responsible for pharmacy education.

## Bradley R. Kastan Fund

The Bradley R. Kastan Fund was established May 3, 1985, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University with a gift to the Office of University Development from Bradley R. Kastan, B.A., Social and Behavioral Sciences, 1981, Columbus, Ohio.

All gifts are to be invested in the University's Permanent Endowment Fund, under the rules and regulations adopted by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, with the right to invest and reinvest as occasion dictates.

The annual income is to be used to fund awards in the Department of History to benefit those studying the history of business. Selection of the recipient shall be made by the University Committee on Student Financial Aid in consultation with Bradley R. 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# LEASE AND DEVELOPMENT OF LAND FOR HANGAR FACILITIES AT THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY AIRPORT

Resolution No. 85-127

Synopsis: Lease of land at the University Airport for the construction and leaseback of hangar facilities is proposed.

WHEREAS there is a need for additional hangar space and related office and shop space at The Ohio State University Airport to house University aircraft and provide hangar facilities to be leased to private aircraft owners; and

WHEREAS in 1984 the University solicited competitive proposals from potential developers for the development of additional hangar facilities, whereby the University would lease land to a developer for the construction and leaseback of a clearspan hangar of approximately 22,500 square feet (with an additional 9,000 square feet of office and shop space) and T-hangar facilities to accommodate approximately 30 aircraft, with title to these facilities to pass to the University at the expiration of a 25-year lease; and

WHEREAS based on the proposals received, the University is negotiating a lease agreement with Diversified Municipal Services, Inc., under which Diversified Municipal Services will develop, construct, and lease back to the University these hangar facilities; and

WHEREAS these facilities will support and benefit the instruction and research programs of the Department of Aviation; and

WHEREAS the appropriate University offices are in agreement as to the desirability of leasing land at the University Airport for this purpose:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to negotiate the terms of the proposed lease of land to, and the subsequent leaseback of hangar facilities from, Diversified Municipal Services, Inc.; to request the Department of Administrative Services, on behalf of the University, to develop and execute the necessary legal instruments for the lease of land; and to execute, on behalf of the University, the subsequent leaseback of these facilities.

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## UNIVERSITY NETWORK/INTEGRATED TELECOMMUNICATIONS SYSTEM

Resolution No. 85-128

Synopsis: Adoption of a plan for a University Network/Integrated Telecommunications System is recommended.

WHEREAS the University's need for improved and expanded voice, data, and video communications to serve the direct needs of faculty, staff, and students and improve research and public service capabilities has been increasing rapidly over the last few years and there now exists a critical need for a University-wide telecommunications system which will integrate voice and data technologies, provide for access for all University departments and offices, improve transmission facilities, provide for future growth, and provide long-term cost and management control; and

WHEREAS over the last four years the Office of Business and Finance, through University Systems' Telephone Services Department, has undertaken a comprehensive study of the University's present and future telecommunications requirements and the technologies available to meet these needs and has issued a report entitled "University Network/Integrated Telecommunications System (UNITS) for The Ohio State University"; and

WHEREAS this report recommends:

- Replacing the existing voice-only communications system with a flexible, state-of-the-art system that will integrate data and voice technologies,
- -Implementing a fiber optic transmission network that will connect all University facilities requiring enhanced voice, data, and video services,
- Purchasing the Ohio Bell Telephone Company building at Neil and Eighth Avenues to house the University's new telecommunications switching equipment and purchasing the copper cable connecting this facility with the University's telephone system,
- Implementing a standardized internal wiring plan for University facilities to ensure access to these telecommunications capabilities, and
- Taking action to ensure that the University has administrative and management control of its telecommunications system; and

WHEREAS the estimated capital cost of this telecommunications system is approximately \$28.9 million over a five-year period, to be financed through long-term debt, and the annual operating costs, including debt service, would be paid through user charges not inconsistent with current and anticipated charges for the present system:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Trustees hereby accepts this report on the "University Network/Integrated Telecommunications System" and adopts, in concept, the recommendations contained in this report; and

## UNIVERSITY NETWORK/INTEGRATED TELECOMMUNICATIONS SYSTEM (contd)

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Trustees authorizes and directs the Vice President for Business and Finance to develop and implement the plans and recommendations contained in this report, subject to University competitive bidding requirements and to review and approval by appropriate University offices and/or this Board as required; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to take such action necessary to purchase, in the name of the State of Ohio for the use of The Ohio State University, the Ohio Bell Telephone Company property located at Neil and Eighth Avenues, at a price not to exceed \$1,500,000.00, and the copper cable and appurtenances connecting this facility with the University's telephone system, at a price not to exceed \$1,600,000.00, upon such terms and conditions as are deemed to be in the best interest of the University, subject to the necessary approvals from the Ohio Board of Regents and the State Controlling Board.

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#### REPORT OF COOPERS & LYBRAND AUDIT OF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY FOR THE PERIOD ENDING JUNE 30, 1983 Resolution No. 85-129

Synopsis: Report of Coopers & Lybrand's audit of The Ohio State University for the period ending June 30, 1983, is recommended for acceptance.

WHEREAS in December 1981, with the approval of the Auditor of State, the University entered into a three-year agreement with Coopers & Lybrand for an annual audit of The Ohio State University; and

WHEREAS the Coopers & Lybrand audit of the University, meeting the audit requirements of the Auditor of State, for the period ending June 30, 1983, has been received and reviewed by the appropriate University officers; and

WHEREAS the accounts, records, files, and reports of the University were found to be in essentially satisfactory condition, but certain recommendations were included in the report; and

WHEREAS the auditor's recommendations have been studied by the appropriate University officers, and procedures and responses have been developed as a result of the recommendations:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Coopers & Lybrand audit of The Ohio State University for the period ending June 30, 1983, be accepted.

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# IMPROVEMENT IN BOILER & MACHINERY, PROPERTY AND MOTOR VEHICLE INSURANCE PROGRAMS

Resolution No. 85-130

Synopsis: An improvement in the boiler and machinery, property and motor vehicle insurance programs is proposed.

WHEREAS the Board of Trustees on prior occasions has approved the purchase of boiler and machinery and property insurance on specified locations and a motor vehicle liability insurance program; and

WHEREAS on July 18, 1984, the University requested proposals from seven national insurance brokers to review, analyze, develop and recommend insurance coverages consistent with current industry trends and risk management practices of major universities; and

WHEREAS on August 30, 1984, Johnson & Higgins of Ohio, Inc., was selected to recommend risk management programs to best protect the University from casualty loss; and

WHEREAS the Johnson & Higgins of Ohio, Inc., report dated January 24, 1985, has been analyzed by appropriate University offices; and

WHEREAS based upon such analysis, it is recommended that an insurance program be implemented, effective May 1, 1985, and at an annual expense of \$532,564, in conjunction with Johnson & Higgins of Ohio, Inc., as broker, upon the following terms:

All University-owned buildings and their contents shall be insured at a total value of \$1,757,311,000 with a deductible of \$500,000. Boiler and Machinery coverage will be provided in the amount of \$35,000,000 for selected property groups with deductibles varying by group from \$500 to \$5,000. Coverage for combined single limit, bodily injury and property damage liability insurance for all powered and driven motor vehicles will be provided in the amount of \$1,000,000 with coverage of \$10,000,000 for excess liability on specified properties and motor vehicles;

## NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the recommended insurance program be implemented and that the coverages, premiums and performance of the carrier/broker (The Continental Insurance Companies-Industrial Risk Insurers/Johnson & Higgins) be reviewed annually with the policy remaining in force until such time as it is deemed appropriate to seek new proposals; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the President and/or Vice President for Personnel Services be authorized to establish and administer the above program which will provide Boiler and Machinery, Property and Motor Vehicle Liability and Excess Liability Insurance programs to protect the University's financial interests.

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REPORT - UNIVERSITY'S INVESTMENT PORTFOLIO

Resolution No. 85-131

RESOLVED, That the report on the University's Investment Portfolio, dated April 19, 1985, as submitted to the Fiscal Affairs Committee of the Board of Trustees, be received and filed with the official records of the Board.

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Mr. Hilliker called on Lisa Aubrey, a member of the Students United Against Apartheid, to make a statement to the Board.

Ms. Aubrey made the following statement:

First of all, I would like to say good afternoon to everybody and thanks for placing us on the agenda at such a late request. I am terribly sorry that we have to come in this form, but it seems as if to get something done at this University you have to try extra, legal tactics.

Most of you know why we are here. We made a presentation on the first of February asking the University to divest monies from corporations doing business in or with the Republic of South Africa. We didn't get that. However, we got a committee and intended to bargain in good faith. And to date, that committee has tried to stall using every possible tactic that they can think of. I do have to agree with Mr. Ervin that it seems that this University will not cooperate and I don't think we are making unreasonable demands.

I'd like to read a statement today that is very short, but it states our position clearly:

"We the Students United Against Apartheid are thoroughly dissatisfied with the lack of progress of the South African Investment Review Committee."

If most of you don't know, the vote was taken on April 16, 1985, and that vote was 8-6 in favor of complete divestment. A copy of that report was given to President Jennings this morning. We had to go outside of committee procedures to see that he got that report-for the life of me, I can't understand why people are trying to keep this secret.

This report, however, as I stated earlier, has not been distributed to you the members of the Board of Trustees; and the only reason we can think of is that the committee is trying to stall and that we are not going to stand for. As a member of that committee, I can tell you first hand that there have been blatant attempts by the committee to delay the submission of the report. The Chairperson even said that she could not submit a report for complete divestment because it is not what President Jennings wants, and I can't believe that. I can't believe that he appointed someone and said, "I don't want complete divestment." And I think it is up to you, President Jennings, and the Board of Trustees, to prove to us that

you are bargaining in good faith. Unfortunately, we have tried peaceful negotiations, as I have said, but see what we have resorted to. We didn't want that, we came here on February 1 saying that we want a committee to study the issue so that we can sit down in an academic environment and discuss that and come to some agreement. However, it has been over three months--over three months--and we haven't gotten any kind of remedies and personally, I don't know what other kind of tactics to pursue at this point.

In essence, what we want to say is that the stalling games are over and it is no longer wait and see. The time to vote was yesterday. It is time that the Board does something. Therefore, we ask you, President Jennings, and the Board of Trustees, to seriously address the issue today. The committee is talking about meeting until the 14th of May to negotiate and while we are sitting down in our air conditioned rooms negotiating, people are suffering and dying in South Africa; and they don't have the right to negotiate.

So today, at this meeting, we don't have anywhere to go. All of us have taken the afternoon off, so we demand that you seriously address the issue. Our position is clear--we want complete divestment. Thank you.

Mr. Hilliker:

Thank you, Lisa. I don't think anybody on this Board is condoning what is going on in South Africa. We had a presentation this morning by the Council on Graduate Students and there was a resolution given us then that--basically the same resolution that passed by a 25-17 vote. I think all 42 of those people would agree that man's inhumanity to man that is going on there is appalling. But, apparently there were at least 17 people that aren't necessarily convinced that these are the only alternatives. What I am saying is this is not an easy issue-it is not an easy issue for the committee. No, we have not gotten a report and to my knowledge a report has not been issued. I am not going to say whether the committee is stalling, I don't know, but we have not gotten a report. But an 8-6 vote tells you that the issue is not easy.

Person in audience:

Let the majority rule.

Mr. Hilliker:

 ${\rm I}$  understand that and this Board is evaluating this issue and we will. We are not going to make decisions under these circumstances, I can promise you that.

## Person in audience:

Take the money out; that is all we are asking. Take all the money out. You get to sit in your nice cushioned chairs and you guys don't know that you're killing people. You are killing people by leaving that money in South Africa. We are not leaving today until you guys make a decision. Now you guys look, there are angry people out there, there are angry people in here, and there are people dying in South Africa. You guys can go home to your nice mansions, but we are not leaving until we get some satisfaction. You have the report, don't you?

President Jennings:

Mr. Chairman, this morning I met with three representatives of the South African Divestment Review Committee, Chair, Dr. Rosita Schiller, Professor Issac Mowoe, and Professor Marshall Swain. They advised me that they had requested a two week extension for the deadline of submitting their report.

Person in audience:

You have had three months.

President Jennings:

All right--and I have agreed to that request. I was informed that a draft copy of the report was delivered to my office while I was in meetings with my staff at a quarter to nine this morning. We will wait to receive the final document before commenting on its contexts and I will be looking forward to receiving that final report.

#### Ms. Aubrey:

President Jennings--I'm not through with my presentation, Mr. Hilliker. I would like to finish please, I would like to finish. You can leave if you want to but it doesn't make the problem go away. We are going to be here.

# Commencement Speaker

# Richard F. Celeste Doctor of Laws

Richard F. Celeste, Ohio's 64th governor, was born in Lakewood, Ohio, and attended Lakewood High School. He graduated magna cum laude from Yale University in 1959 with a bachelor's degree in history. Following graduation, he taught at Yale for one year as a Carnegie Teaching Fellow. In 1961, he was selected as Ohio's Rhodes Scholar and attended Oxford University, where he conducted research on American diplomatic relations. After graduate study at Yale, Celeste worked with the Peace Corps' Division of Volunteer Support for Latin America. From 1963 to 1967, he served as an executive assistant to the U.S. Ambassador to India. Upon returning to Cleveland, he joined the National Housing Corporation, a small firm specializing in the development of housing for senior citizens with moderate incomes.

Celeste was first elected to office in 1970, when voters chose him for the first of two terms in the Ohio House of Representatives. As a state representative, he authored legislation for voter registration reform, improved state employee retirement benefits, adoption reform, and revised pension systems. Celeste was elected fluetrenant governor in 1974 and ran for governor in 1978. After serving in the Carter administration as director of the Peace Corps from 1979 to 1981. Celeste was elected governor of Ohio in 1982. The University proudy recognizes Governor Celeste for his commitment to excelence in the state of Ohio and particularly in higher education.

# **Recipients of Honor**

# Torsten Hägerstrand Doctor of Science

Torsten Hägerstrand is considered by many of his colleagues to be the greatest living geographer in the world. Now professor emeritus at the University of Lund, Sweden, he held a personal research chair at that university from 1971 to 1982 under the sponsorship of the Swedish Council for Social Science Research—an extremely high honor in his country. Hägerstrand received his master's and doctoral degrees at Lund and holds honorary degrees from the University of Glasgow and the University of Bristol. He was a distinguished visiting professor at Ohio State earlier this academic year. His work on innovation diffusion, carried out in the 1950s and 1960s, continues to be cited as a standard against which current research is measured.

Hagerstrand was one of the first researchers to apply mathematical modeling to the social sciences and his work influenced others in several disciplines. Recently, he has pioneered research in "time-geography"-seeking to examine the interaction of space and time in the organization of everyday routines. He has been involved in an international project to record interviews with wellknown scientists in order to analyze how they approach their research. Hägerstrand has made significant contributions of his time and counsel to the Swedish government. He has been awarded the King Carl XVI Gustaf Medal in Sweden, the Outstanding Achievement Award from the Association of American Geographers, and similar honors in Great Britain and Denmark. Ohio State is proud to honor this distinguished individual who has inspired a generation of scholars around the world.

# Ragnhild Marie Hatton Doctor of Humane Letters

One of the world's leading historians of modern Europe, Ragnhild Marie Hatton was a faculty member at the University of London prior to her retirement in 1980. Her published works include a monumental biography of Charles XII of Sweden, which has been described as "the final, authoritative, comprehensive study" of the Swedish ruler. Her examinations of King Louis XIV of France and George I of England have been similarly acclaimed and acknowledged to have changed the perceptions of many historians regarding these monarchs. Hatton is equally admired for the processes leading to the completion of these and other works, earning the praise of one colleague for "her versatility, the breadth of her knowledge, her mastery of documents in a variety of languages... perhaps unparalleled in our time "

Hatton has taught extensively at American and Canadian universities; her first such appointment was as Mershon Visiting Professor at Ohio State in 1964. She is perhaps most fondly regarded on this side of the Atlantic for her encouragement of American students and visiting faculty, many of whom she invited to participate in her seminars. Hatton's recognitions include honorary membership in the American Historical Association and investiture by the government of her native Norway as a kinght in the Order of St. Olav. Ohio State is proud to recognize her contributions to the study of history, as well as her influence on so many of those involved in this discipline.

# Distinguished Service Awards

# Molly B. Caren Distinguished Service Award

Marie Brown (Molly) Caren first learned about Ohio State's College of Agriculture as a child, when horticulture students would visit the Brown fruit farm operated by her parents. After receiving a bachelor's degree in English from Ohio State in 1935, she managed the fruit farm. For 25 years she worked closely with faculty, students, and Cooperative Extension Service agents. In 1979, she acquired a livestock operation in Madison County and enrolled in classes in the College of Agriculture through Program 60. In 1982, she finalized a gift to Ohio State of a 996-acre farm that she owned in Madison County. The farm, which had been in her family since the early 1800s, was renamed Molly Caren Agricultural Center in her honor. It is now the site of the University's annual Farm Science Review, which attracts thousands each year and showcases the latest in agricultural equipment and techniques. Since the review moved to the new site, attendance has grown by 20 percent.

As a result of her generous gift, Mrs. Caren was invited to join The Presidents Council, She also is a member of the Alurni Association. Mrs. Caren has been active with Children's Hospital, Franklin County Children services, the Children's Mental Health Center, the Columbus Gallery of Fine Art, the Junior League of Columbus, and the Crichton Club. She received the Distinguished Service Award from the Columbus School for Girls in 1973. Ohio State is proud to honor such a devoted alumna and benefactor.

#### George G. Greenleaf Distinguished Service Award

During his 25 years as executive vice president of the Ohio Grain and Feed Dealers' Association and four years as executive director of the Ohio Fertilizer and Pesticide Association, George Greenleaf has built close ties between the University and Ohio's agriculture industry. He translated his strong belief in the importance of education into practical workshops for association members—frequenty employing the expertise of Ohio State faculty. Through his guidance, the Ohio Grain and Feed Dealers' Association has long supported the honors program of the College of Agriculture, including sponsorship of its annual recognition banquet.

Greenieal's personal leadership has contributed to successful fund-raising campaigns that have brought nearly \$750,000 to Ohio State. His counsel and advice to the Ohio General Assembly helped lead to the establishment of the Agricultural Technical Institute in Wooster. An Ohio native who earned a bachelor's and a master's degree from Michigan State University, Greenleaf has been the recipient of every major recognition that can be conferred by Ohio State's College of Agriculture. He also has been honored by the national and state Future Farmers of America, the American Society of Association Executives, the National Grain and Feed Association, the Ohio Council of Retail Merchants, and the Ohio Vocational Association. Ohio State is grateful for his dedicated service and pleased to honor him.

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# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY Resolution No. 85-133

Synopsis: Amendments to rules 3335-7-271, 3335-9-06, and 3335-47-10 are being proposed.

WHEREAS the University Senate pursuant to rule 3335-1-09 of the Administrative Code is authorized to recommend through the President to the Board of Trustees the adoption of amendments to the <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> as approved by the University Senate; and

WHEREAS the proposed changes in the Rules of the University Faculty were approved by the University Senate on May 11, 1985, as follows:

## AMENDED RULES

3335-7-271 Freshman forgiveness rule.

- (A) If a course in which an undergraduate student receives a grade of "D+," "D," or "E," taken during the freshman year (the period during which the first forty-four credit hours are accumulated on the student's official permanent record) is repeated before the end of that student's sophomore year (when the student will have accumulated a total of eighty-nine credit hours), the original course credit and grade will be automatically excluded from the calculation of the student's cumulative point-hour ratio and deficiency points, but will remain on the student's official permanent record. This action will be subject to the following conditions:
  - (1) If the grade in the original course was a "D+" or "D," a student may repeat the course for credit only upon the recommendation of the authorized representative of the dean, or director of the student's enrollment unit. Such recommendation must be obtained before noon of the third Saturday of the quarter in which the repeated course is taken.
  - (2) The same course may be repeated only once under this rule.
  - (3) This rule may be applied for a maximum of fifteen credit hours.

# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- 3335-9-06 Admission to advanced standing.
- (C) An undergraduate applicant having fewer than forty-five transferable quarter credit hours at the time of first enrollment shall be subject to the provisions of rules 3335-9-04 (A) and 3335-9-25 (B) of the Administrative Code.

3335-47-10 Regular faculty ranks (requisites, capacities, and tenure accrual).

- (C) Associate professor.
  - (2) A person appointed from outside of this university to associate professor will serve a probationary period.
    - (a) The probationary period will be three years except as noted in paragraph (C) (2) (b) of this rule. During the second year, the person involved will be informed by the chairperson or dean if tenure is to be granted beginning with the fourth year of service. If tenure is not granted, the appointment will not be renewed after the end of the third year.
    - (b) In cases where the appointment of an individual to the associate professor rank is based upon professional experience of a non-academic nature, the probationary period may be as long as five years. The additional time is provided to give the individual an opportunity to demonstrate appropriate academic accomplishments. The length of the probationary period will be part of the official appointment offer and will have approval of the appropriate dean and the vice president for academic affairs and provost. In this case, the decision to award tenure must be made no later than the next to last year of the approved probationary period. The decision will be made according to the unit's normal review procedures. If tenure is not granted, the appointment will not be renewed after the last year of the acreed probationary period.

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the foregoing amendments to the <u>Rules of the</u> <u>University Faculty be adopted as recommended by the University Senate.</u>

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# CHANGE IN ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

Resolution No. 85-134

Synopsis: A change in organizational structure for Hospital and Health Services Administration to Divisional Status within the College of Medicine is proposed.

WHEREAS Divisional status within the College of Medicine would make Hospital and Health Services Administration more competitive in recruiting quality students, attracting and retaining faculty, and obtaining grant monies; and

WHEREAS the proposed change in organizational structure would be consistent with the recommendations of the Hospital and Health Services Administration accrediting commission; and

WHEREAS Hospital and Health Services currently participates in medical student education; and

WHEREAS Hospital and Health Services has been operating on this basis for the past two years:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the University Senate has approved the requested change in organizational structure for Hospital and Health Services Administration, and respectfully requests concurrence by the Board of Trustees.

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# BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF OF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS

Resolution No. 85-135

Synopsis: Amendment of the <u>Bylaws of the Medical Staff of The Ohio State</u> University Hospitals is proposed.

WHEREAS The Ohio State University Hospitals Board pursuant to bylaw 3335-101-04 of the <u>Hospitals Board Bylaws</u> is authorized to recommend to the Board of Trustees the adoption of amendments to the <u>Bylaws of the Medical</u> Staff of The Ohio State University Hospitals; and

WHEREAS the proposed amendment to bylaw 3335-43-10 was approved at the University Hospitals Board meeting on April 25, 1985, as follows:

# AMENDED BYLAW

3335-43-10 Administration of the medical staff of the Ohio state university hospitals.

# BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF OF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS (contd)

- (C) Credentials committee:
  - (1) Composition: The committee shall be composed of six (6) members of the medical staff. Appointments to the committee shall be in accordance with section 3335-43-10 (A) (1). The chairman of the committee shall be appointed by the medical director and the chief of staff.
  - (2) Duties:
    - (a) The committee shall meet quarterly or as often as necessary to consider applications for medical staff appointments.
    - (b) Upon the recommendation of the chairman, the committee will receive, through the office of the medical director, all applications for medical staff appointment.
    - (c) The department chairman will assure that the application includes letters of reference from medical school, internship and residency, other post-graduate experiences, and that reference audits have been completed.
    - (d) The committee will review all applications for medical staff appointments as well as applications for renewal of the medical staff appointment.
    - (e) Renewal applications will be reviewed biennially unless a change in appointment or privileges is recommended by the chairman.
    - (f) Provisional appointments to the medical staff will be reviewed by the credentials committee after six (6) months and with the recommendation of the department chairman. It will be the responsibility of the chairman of the committee to assure that all records are handled and kept with utmost confidentiality.
    - (g) The committee will make its recommendation to the medical staff administrative committee through the office of the medical director. Applications referred to the medical staff administrative committee will have the following information: name, status, department (division), medical school and year of graduation, residency and fellowships, medicalrelated employment since graduation, board certification and recertification, licensure status.
    - (h) The credentials committee or the medical director may request the medical staff administrative committee to consider certain applications in executive session.

(i) Following the recommendation of the medical staff administrative committee the appointment procedure will be completed according to section 3335-43-04 (E) (2), (3), (4).

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the foregoing amendment to the Bylaws of the Medical Staff of The Ohio State University Hospitals be adopted as recommended by the University Hospitals Board.

Upon motion of Mr. Galbreath, seconded by Mr. Teaford, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous voice vote.

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President Jennings made the following statement regarding the Medical Practice Plan:

It has now been more than five years since the Board of Trustees approved Ohio State's first medical practice plan. Last October, a faculty committee was asked to review the existing plan in terms of the current priorities and needs of the College of Medicine. This committee provided us with a series of recommendations in February, which we have accepted in principal.

Since that time, Dr. Tzagournis has been working with the college executive committee and meeting with the faculty in each department of the College of Medicine, as well as with members of the Practice Plan Review Committee, to determine how to implement the committee's recommendations.

As a result of these extensive consultations, I am today recommending modifications to the College of Medicine Practice Plan passed by the Board of Trustees on March 2, 1979. These amendments, which I recommend be effective July 1, 1985, implement several important enhancements to the current plan.

First, the amendments establish a teaching and research fund for the College, to be supported annually by contributions from practice income and release time monies resulting from sponsored research. This fund, initially established between \$500,000 and \$1,000,000, is to be administered by the Dean.

Second, the plan provides for annual confidential disclosure of each faculty member's practice income, associated practice costs, and support to the college and department. These data are to be provided to an independent accounting firm, which will prepare the information for each department chairperson and provide departmental consolidations for the Dean plus a college consolidation for the President or Dean determines that unusual

President Jennings: (contd)

circumstances exist, any regular faculty member shall make a separate confidential disclosure to the Dean or the President, or both.

Third, each department establishes a central practice group with the approval of the Dean. All new faculty members will be required to join this departmental group, while current faculty members may either join or remain with their existing group.

This central group will administer the patient care practice of all its members, including collection of fees and payment of all members' patient care costs and expenses plus contributions for academic enrichment, teaching and research as well as distribute all practice income. Each department's group provides for major input by the chairperson, full participation by the regular faculty, and is subject to a complete and full audit by the Dean, at least annually.

Fourth, the plan provides for an annual review by the faculty Practice Plan Committee, clinical department chairpersons, and the Dean of the costs billed for use of University medical facilities. These amendments also eliminate annual activity reporting, which would duplicate the information provided as a part of the new confidential disclosure process.

These recommended amendments to the medical practice plan represent significant improvements which will benefit the faculty, the college, and the University. I believe we can safely say that with these modifications, Ohio State's practice plan will now provide full accountability with appropriate confidentiality, which is in line with the standard policies at most other major university medical centers across the nation.

I want to compliment the faculty of the College of Medicine for their significant time and effort over the past several months which have resulted in these recommendations. Their openness and willingness to engage in broad discussion of alternative ideas and approaches has resulted in a practice plan of which we can all be proud, and which will enhance the continued pursuit of excellence in the College of Medicine's teaching, research and health care activities.

Synopsis: A change in The Ohio State University College of Medicine Medical Practice Plan as adopted on March 2, 1979, is proposed.

WHEREAS on March 3, 1978, this Board adopted a medical practice plan for professional fee income; and

WHEREAS this plan was revised on March 2, 1979, and was subsequently filed pursuant to Chapter 111.15 of the Ohio Revised Code as Rules 3335-91-01 through 3335-91-11; and

WHEREAS consistent with usual and customary academic and administrative practices it was determined that appropriate review and evaluation of this plan should be made; and

WHEREAS the committee which was appointed by the Provost to review subject plan and make appropriate recommendations relative to any changes or modifications thereto has completed its review:

## NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the aforesaid Ohio State University College of Medicine Medical Practice Plan is hereby amended and adopted in the amended form attached hereto and incorporated herein, to become effective July 1, 1985; it being understood that the newly adopted plan will supersede and render null and of no effect the Medical Practice Plan adopted by this Board on March 2, 1979; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That if any portion of this Medical Practice Plan as adopted pursuant to this resolution is invalidated by a court of law, such determination shall not affect any other part of this Practice Plan.

Upon motion of Mr. Immke, seconded by Mr. Berry, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous roll call vote.

Mr. Havens made the following statement on behalf of the Trustees regarding the Medical Practice Plan:

The amendments to the Medical Practice Plan are definite improvements over the current plan which has been in effect since July 1, 1979. These revisions provide more accountability, greater flexibility and allow for better care to patients visiting The Ohio State University Hospitals and our faculty. After reviewing the amendments, it appears that the plan includes an inherent inefficiency in that medical faculty utilize a variety of billing services. This can be confusing to our patients. In order to address this inefficiency, this Board recommends that President Jennings and his staff institute a central billing service at University Hospitals.

# THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY COLLEGE OF MEDICINE MEDICAL PRACTICE PLAN

# I. Introduction and Scope of Coverage

These policies (hereinafter referred to as "the Practice Plan") shall be incorporated in and be a part of the annual contract of employment between The

# THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY COLLEGE OF MEDICINE MEDICAL PRACTICE PLAN (contd)

Ohio State University and all regular and auxiliary faculty members appointed in a Division or Department of the College of Medicine. This Practice Plan has been adopted by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University to become effective July 1, 1985, and can be amended only by formal action of the Trustees.

II. Definitions

For purposes of this Practice Plan:

- (A) (1) "Regular faculty member" shall mean a person holding a faculty appointment requiring fifty percent or more service to the University and holding the title of Professor or Professor of Clinical Medicine (or other Clinical Department such as Surgery, etc.), Associate Professor or Associate Professor of Clinical Medicine, Assistant Professor or Assistant Professor of Clinical Medicine, or Instructor or Instructor of Clinical Medicine in a Division or Department in the College of Medicine.
  - (2) For purposes of sections II(F), II(K), V, VII, VIII, IX and X, "Regular faculty member" shall include only those faculty who are physicians.
- (B) "Auxiliary faculty member" shall mean a person holding a clinical, adjunct, or other appointment in a Division or Department in the College of Medicine and who is not a regular faculty member in that Division or Department, but shall not include any person employed full-time in the Student Health Center.
- (C) "Strict full-time faculty member" shall mean a person who holds a faculty appointment in the College of Medicine and who has agreed to a salary, without supplement from practice income, as his or her total compensation for teaching, research, and patient care services.
- (D) "Practice income" shall mean all gross income received by a faculty member or a partnership, corporation, association or agent on his or her behalf from such faculty member's patient care services.
- (E) "Release time money," shall mean the amount of time, measured in dollars, that a faculty member is released from normal duties to allow the faculty member to participate in a sponsored research project, or the mechanism by which faculty time is charged to and recovered from a sponsored research project.
- (F) "MRDF" shall mean The Ohio State University Medical Research and Development Foundation, a not-for-profit organization incorporated under the laws of the State of Ohio. The articles of incorporation of MRDF shall provide: that all regular faculty members shall be members of MRDF; that the MRDF Board of Trustees shall have ten members only; that the regular faculty members shall elect 60% of the membership of the MRDF Board of Trustees; that faculty members of the MRDF Board of Trustees shall be elected to three-year terms with one-third of the faculty members being elected each year, with appropriate adjustments

## THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY COLLEGE OF MEDICINE MEDICAL PRACTICE PLAN (contd)

being made during the initial two years; and that the OSU Board of Trustees shall appoint the remaining members (40% of the membership) of the MRDF Board of Trustees.

- (G) "OSU" shall mean The Ohio State University.
- (H) "Clinical Departments" shall mean the following academic Departments in the OSU College of Medicine: Anesthesiology, Family Medicine, Medicine, Neurology, Obstetrics and Gynecology, Ophthalmology, Otolaryngology, Pathology, Pediatrics, Physical Medicine, Preventive Medicine, Psychiatry, Radiology, and Surgery.
- (I) "Academic year" shall mean the period beginning July 1 and ending on June 30 of the following calendar year or such other fiscal year as may be adopted by OSU.
- (J) "Dean" shall mean the Dean of the OSU College of Medicine.
- (K) "Practice Plan Committee" shall mean a committee elected annually by and from the regular faculty members in a Clinical Department, with each Clinical Department being entitled to elect one committee member for each ten (or fraction thereof) regular faculty members in their Department. The Practice Plan Committee will advise the Dean, the Vice President for Health Services, the Provost, the President, and the MRDF Board of Trustees on matters relating to the operation of this Practice Plan, and will perform such other duties as may be determined. The Committee will receive annually a written report from the MRDF Board of Trustees indicating, in the aggregate by department, all of the MRDF revenues and expenditures during the preceding year.
- (L) Division shall mean an organized unit of OSU formally recognized as a division by OSU pursuant to rules 3335-1-05 and 3335-3-34 of the Ohio Administrative Code.
- III. Compensation and Support for Regular Faculty
- (A) Salary

Faculty members in the College of Medicine may receive a salary from the OSU general funds budget. The salary level shall be specified in his or her "Notice of Appointment" and shall be determined annually by OSU. In recommending such salary, the Dean will consider each faculty member's teaching and administrative performance and research productivity. Any regular faculty member desiring to increase his or her salary to a maximum level as determined by the Dean may do so by paying to OSU from his or her practice income from patient care services the amount of the desired increase, plus the increased cost of the employer's contribution to the appropriate retirement system.

## THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY COLLEGE OF MEDICINE MEDICAL PRACTICE PLAN (contd)

(B) Facilities and Support

Regular faculty members will be furnished with office and clinical facilities, equipment, supplies, and staff assistance, subject to the obligations of payment as provided in this Practice Plan. The OSU Hospitals will provide house staff.

(C) Practice Income

Subject to the obligations detailed in this Practice Plan, the regular and auxiliary faculty members may establish their professional fees and bill for, collect, and retain all fees for services rendered by such faculty members.

- IV. Professional Fees--Collection and Guidelines
- (A) A professional fee office will be operated by OSU as a part of this Practice Plan. This professional fee office will issue billing statements and collect practice income for those faculty members or professional corporations, partnerships, and associations of faculty members so requesting.
- (B) Confidential Disclosure

Each regular faculty member of the College shall confidentially disclose to his or her Division or Department Chairperson (Chairperson) on or about the fifteenth of April of each year his or her annual practice income, associated practice costs and expenses, and the amount of annual support provided by the faculty member to his or her Division, Department and/or the College during the previous calendar year. This confidential disclosure will be accomplished by each faculty member or his or her designated agent providing the requested data to a private accounting firm. The private accounting firm will collect all data and disclose to and review with each Chairperson the detailed disclosure information for his or her respective faculty members. All such individual disclosures will be treated confidentially. The private accounting firm will also combine the information of disclosed amounts for the faculty members in each Division or Department and provide an accounting in aggregate amounts to the appropriate Chairperson.

Each Chairperson will provide to the Dean no later than the 15th of May, the total aggregate amounts of practice income, expenses, and institutional contributions relating to his or her respective departmental faculty, along with a confidential disclosure of the Chairperson's own annual practice income, associated practice expenses, and the amount of annual support he or she provided to their Division, Department, and/or the College. The confidential disclosure required for each Chairperson will be accomplished by providing the requested data to the private accounting firm as described in this section. This data shall be available to the Dean.

The Dean will disclose the totals for the College to the President of OSU.

## THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY COLLEGE OF MEDICINE MEDICAL PRACTICE PLAN (contd)

If the President or the Dean determines that unusual circumstances exist, any regular faculty member shall also make a separate, confidential disclosure to the Dean and/or the President of OSU.

- V. Cost Related to Patient Care Services
- (A) Clinical Department Finance Committees

The regular faculty members in each Clinical Department will elect from their membership a Department Finance Committee, consisting of not less than three members.

(B) Determination of Costs

OSU and the OSU Hospital will maintain accurate records of the total costs (direct and indirect) incurred in University medical facilities. It is recognized that a portion of these total costs results, and will continue to result, from the performance of the teaching and research functions of OSU and that this portion of these costs is an appropriate expense of OSU and the OSU Hospital.

The Department Chairpersons and the Department Finance Committees will meet, no fewer than sixty days prior to the beginning of each academic year, with appropriate representatives of OSU and the OSU Hospital to develop a Department practice budget. That budget is to include the (direct and indirect) costs incurred in University facilities used by regular faculty members in that Department to provide patient care services from which regular faculty members will be deriving practice income. Such costs are to be reduced by an amount which, in the judgment of OSU, reflects a proper charge for the Department teaching and research functions performed in the OSU facilities and are to be no more than the costs for which similar facilities could be obtained from a competitive source in which there is no teaching or research function for which payment must be made. No charge is to be made for University medical facilities for which OSU or the OSU Hospital makes a separate charge to the patient.

Appropriate OSU and OSU Hospital costs records will be made available to the Department Chairpersons, the Department Finance Committees, and the Practice Plan Committee. Upon request, the Practice Plan Committee will meet with representatives of OSU Hospital to discuss such cost records, including proposed indirect costs and the amount of the charge for the teaching and research functions.

(C) Practice Costs Review

The costs which are billed to each Division and Department for use of medical facilities shall be annually reviewed by the Practice Plan Committee, Clinical Department Chairpersons, and the Dean. A committee of faculty members and hospital administration members shall review and make recommendations regarding clinic operations, expenses, governance, and other matters which affect outpatient activities.

# THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY COLLEGE OF MEDICINE MEDICAL PRACTICE PLAN (contd)

## VI. Teaching and Research Fund of the College

In order to enhance teaching and research there shall be created within the College a Teaching and Research Fund (TRF) to be administered by the Dean. TRF will be created and perpetuated through annual contributions of practice income and release time money received from each Division and Department of the College. The annual contribution will aggregate between \$500,000 and \$1,000,000 in the first year with these limits adjusted each year at the same percentage as the consumer price index, and will be determined by the Dean in consultation with the College of Medicine Executive Committee and the Practice Plan Committee. The Dean will annually provide to the College of the preceding year's expenditures together with the current status of the TRF.

The initial contribution to the TRF and all subsequent contributions, are to be apportioned among the Divisions and Departments of the College, according to their members' total practice income and release time money received during the previous calendar quarter. Payments will be made to the College on a quarterly basis: the last day of September, December, March, and June of each academic year based upon an estimate of practice income with final reconciliation to be made at the end of June of each academic year. Payments will be made by the Chairperson under agreements adopted by a majority of the members of each Division or Department within the College.

TRF is separate and distinct from the academic enrichment programs provided for in subsection VII of this plan.

- VII. Academic Enrichment Programs
- (A) It is recognized that the Clinical Departments have varying needs for, and varying abilities to support, academic enrichment programs calling for funds in addition to the payment of costs incurred in connection with patient care services. A single plan applicable to all faculty members can result in inequities, both for the faculty and for the College of Medicine. Instead, academic enrichment plans should be developed through Departmental faculties under the guidance of the Practice Plan Committee. Funds to support academic enrichment plans shall be paid to and administered by MRDF.
- (B) The Practice Plan Committee will establish general guidelines for the development of Departmental academic enrichment programs, including recommendations as to possible projects to be considered by the Practice Plan Committee such as the following:
  - (1) Compensation and expenses for visiting consultants and lecturers.
  - (2) Expenses directly related to faculty and staff recruitment.
  - (3) Costs of scholarships, stipends, and tuitions for students.
  - (4) Costs of personal training courses and attendance at professional and educational meetings.

## THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY COLLEGE OF MEDICINE MEDICAL PRACTICE PLAN (contd)

- (5) Costs of research laboratories, including salaries, maintenance and equipment.
- (6) Other expenses incurred in support of Departmental teaching, research, and professional care of patients.
- (C) Each Department Finance Committee, after consultation with the Practice Plan Committee, will recommend to the departmental regular faculty members a Departmental academic enrichment program. Upon an affirmative vote of at least 75% of the regular faculty holding appointments in the Department, the program will become effective and mandatory on all regular faculty members holding appointments in the Department. A Departmental academic enrichment program may be amended from time to time or rescinded by an affirmative vote of at least 75% of the regular faculty members holding appointments in the Department.
- (D) Copies of Departmental enrichment programs will be filed with the Department Chairperson, the Practice Plan Committee, and the Dean, and shall be subject to their approval. The Department Chairperson, the Practice Plan Committee, or the Dean may from time to time recommend changes in any Departmental academic enrichment program, which recommendations will be considered by the Department Finance Committee and by the regular faculty members in the Department. The results of such consideration will be sent to the Department Chairperson, the Practice Plan Committee, and the Department Chairperson, the results of such consideration will be sent to the Department Chairperson, the Practice Plan Committee, and the Dean.
- (E) If a Department does not approve an academic enrichment program or, if at any time a Department rescinds its academic enrichment program the Dean will meet with the regular faculty members in the Department to discuss the reasons why such a program has not been approved or why the program was rescinded. If a Departmental enrichment program is not approved within a reasonable time after such meeting, the Dean (following consultation with the Practice Plan Committee) shall submit the matter, together with a proposed academic enrichment program to the MRDF Board of Trustees for binding arbitration. If a Departmental enrichment program has been adopted by a Department and has been disapproved by the Department Chairperson, the Practice Plan Committee or the Dean, if recommendations for change in a program by the Department Оľ Chairperson, the Practice Plan Committee or the Dean are not accepted by the Department faculty, the disapproving or recommending party shall prepare a proposed Departmental enrichment program. The program adopted by the Department and the program prepared by the disapproving or recommending party shall be submitted to the MRDF Board of Trustees for binding arbitration. Once the matter is brought before the MRDF Board of Trustees for arbitration pursuant to this section, the decision of the MRDF Board of Trustees shall be binding on all parties, and any academic enrichment program thus determined will be mandatory on all regular faculty members in the Department.

# THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY COLLEGE OF MEDICINE MEDICAL PRACTICE PLAN (contd)

- (F) Each Department Chairperson will file an annual report with the Practice Plan Committee and with the Dean, which report will outline the academic enrichment program adopted by the regular faculty members and the academic enrichment achieved by such program during the prior year.
- VIII. Payment of Charges
- (A) Determination of Charges to Each Regular Faculty Member

No fewer than thirty days prior to the beginning of each academic year, each Department Chairperson will meet with each regular faculty member holding an appointment within that Department. The purposes of this meeting will be:

- (1) To list the OSU medical facilities, equipment, supplies and staff assistance that the regular faculty member will be using during the following academic years from which the regular faculty member will be deriving practice income;
- (2) To estimate the percentage of time that the regular faculty member will be using such OSU medical facilities, equipment, supplies and staff assistance for such purpose;
- (3) To agree upon the annual charge to be paid by the regular faculty member for the OSU medical facilities, equipment, supplies and staff assistance used to produce practice income; and
- (4) To determine the annual charge to be paid by the regular faculty member under the Department's academic enrichment program.

At any time during the academic year, either the Department Chairperson, or the regular faculty member may request a review and adjustment of the OSU medical facilities, equipment, supplies and staff assistance actually used by the regular faculty member to derive practice income.

If the Department Chairperson and the regular faculty member cannot agree with the annual charges to be paid by the regular faculty member, the Chairperson shall, after consultation with the Department Finance Committee, recommend to the Practice Plan Committee the annual charges (supported by the list of facilities, equipment, supplies and staff assistance and percentage of use) and shall send a written copy of his or her recommendation to the regular faculty member involved in the dispute. Following consultation with the regular faculty member and the Department Finance Committee, the Practice Plan Committee shall determine the annual charges to be paid by the regular faculty member.

In no event will a determination of the Practice Plan Committee regarding the obligation of any individual faculty member affect the total obligation of the Clinical Department under this Plan.

# (B) Payment for Practice Costs and Academic Enrichment

Except in unusual cases, the charge for practice costs and academic enrichment to each regular faculty member will be stated on an annual basis, one-quarter of which will be paid by the regular faculty member on the last day of September, December, March and June of each academic year, for the prior quarter. Payment for the practice costs will be made to OSU; payment for academic enrichment will be made to MRDF; and both will be reported at least quarterly to MRDF and to the Practice Plan Committee.

- IX. Discovery Relevant to Disputed Clinical Department Practice Plans or Individual Annual Charges
- (A) If the aggregate amount of practice income of a Department or the amount of practice income of any one or any number of individual members of a Department, is found by any three members of the Board of MRDF or a majority of the Practice Plan Committee (PPC) to be relevant to an issue submitted either for arbitration or determination, such information shall be supplied by the Department of the individual faculty member to an independent accountant retained by MRDF. The independent accountant shall report the information to the MRDF and the parties in an arbitration, or to the Practice Plan Committee and the Chairperson of the Department and the faculty member in a Practice Plan Committee determination. The information shall be treated by each as Confidential and not further disclosed.
- (B) If the PPC finds that the amount of practice income of a Department or of any one or any number of individual members of a Department is not relevant to an issue before it for determination, and either the Department Chairperson, or the faculty member disagrees, the question of relevancy shall be appealed to the MRDF Board for final resolution. If any three members of the Board of MRDF find that such information is relevant, the information shall be supplied as provided in subsection IX (A).
- X. Conflict of Interest

If any member of the Practice Plan Committee or of the Board of Trustees of MRDF is a member of a Department, or is a party, which has previously approved or disapproved a plan or charge submitted for discussion or decision before that body, a substitute member shall be selected with full rights to participate in the discussion and any decision (including the right to vote) in place of the members having such conflict of interest. The regulations and procedures of the Practice Plan Committee and of the MRDF shall provide for the selection of substitutes in a manner consistent with the provisions of this Practice Plan.

XI. Policies Affecting Auxiliary Faculty Members

The Chairperson of each Clinical Department, with the advice of the Department Finance Committee, shall determine what financial obligation auxiliary faculty members with appointments in that Department will have. Such determinations

shall be based on the degree to which such auxiliary faculty members enjoy the benefits of University staff and facilities and the extent to which such persons contribute to the academic programs of the Department and the College, and are subject to the approval of the Practice Plan Committee.

# XII. Policies Affecting Strict Full-Time Faculty Members

The Dean or Department Chairperson may negotiate with faculty members for the performance of teaching, research, and patient care services on a salaried basis, without additional compensation from practice income and without additional obligation to pay for cost reimbursement.

A strict full-time faculty member's salary, practice support costs, and academic enrichment contributions will be paid by the University. Practice income generated from the patient care services of strict full-time faculty members may, at the discretion of the Dean, be retained by OSU Hospitals or the College of Medicine.

## XIII. Central Division or Department Practice Group

In an effort to encourage cooperation and the attainment of mutual academic goals within Divisions and Departments of the College, each Division and Department which has not already done so will establish a central practice group.

As a condition of faculty employment, all regular faculty members first appointed on or after July 1, 1985, will be required to join and remain members of the central practice plan group of the Department or Division to which they are appointed. Regular faculty members who are members of a central practice group existing on July 1, 1985, will remain so or become and remain a member of any practice group deemed to be a successor of the existing central practice group. The determination of a successor practice group shall be made by the chairperson, after full consultation with the faculty and with the approval of the Dean. A regular faculty member appointed prior to July 1, 1985, who is not a member of an existing central practice group and who thereafter joins a central practice group may, within two years after joining, withdraw, without membership therein becoming a condition of employment.

All central practice groups, whether established before or after July 1, 1985, including successors thereto, shall be organized by the regular faculty members of each Department or Division under the direction of the Chairperson and be approved by the Dean. The central practice group shall administer the patient care practice of all its members, including collection of fees, payment of all members' patient care costs and expenses, academic enrichment and TRF contributions, as well as distribute all practice income. Each central practice group should provide for major input by the Chairperson, full participation by the regular faculty, and be subject to complete and full audit by the Dean, at least annually.

## In order to maintain individuality and autonomy as between Divisions and Departments, each Division or Department should continue to have the oppor-

tunity to develop its own plan of practice.

## Hazel H. Price

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on May 16, 1985, of Hazel Huston Price, Associate Professor Emeritus in the Department of Home Economics Education.

Dr. Price was born in Dayton, Ohio, on June 11, 1891. She received the Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Cincinnati in 1922. Her graduate work was completed at this University, earning the Master of Arts degree in 1928 and the Doctor of Philosophy degree in 1938.

Dr. Price's teaching and research were in the area of vocational home economics education. She was an elementary school teacher in Hamilton, Ohio, from 1908-1914; taught home economics in high school in Sycamore, Ohio, from 1916-18 and in Bremen, Ohio, from 1918-1919. She was an elementary and junior high school teacher in Bay City, Michigan, from 1919-1920.

She began her career at The Ohio State University as an Instructor supervising student teachers under direction of the State Department of Education in 1921. She was promoted to Assistant Professor in 1925 and attained the rank of Associate Professor in 1945. She completed experimental studies with Home Economics teachers throughout the state and studies for both junior and senior high school course of study for state cooperating teachers. She also represented the State Department of Education as State Adviser to FHA for a period of five years.

Dr. Price authored numerous articles for various publications and was co-author of a textbook, <u>Home Economics Omnibus</u>, published in 1935. She was an outstanding faculty member and her experience in teaching and supervision with advanced graduate work in education brought professional recognition in evaluation of home economics teaching. She retired on July 1, 1953, after forty years of teaching service.

Dr. Price held membership in Pi Lambda Theta, an education honorary, and in Omicron Nu, a home economics honorary.

## Charles A. Reese

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on February 17, 1985, of Charles A. Reese, Assistant Professor Emeritus in the Cooperative Extension Service.

Charles A. Reese was born on July 23, 1891, in Medina County, Ohio and attended Wadsworth High School. He received his B.S. degree from The Ohio State University in 1915 and took graduate work at Iowa State University. He

He was an avid bird watcher and because of his work with bees, he was often promoting honey as a substitute for sugar. Upon his retirement in 1961, he was named Assistant Professor Emeritus.

#### Norman O. Rothermich

Dr. Rothermich was born in 1912 in St. Louis, Missouri. He took his B.S. in Biochemistry from St. Louis University in 1934 and his M.D. in 1936. Dr. Rothermich joined the faculty of The Ohio State University in 1941 as a Clinical Instructor in the Department of Medicine. Upon his return to the University in 1946, after serving as a Major in the United States Army, Dr. Rothermich founded the Division of Rheumatic Diseases. He remained director of that division until 1959. Some of Dr. Rothermich's more notable accomplishments during that period include the founding of The Central Ohio Chapter of the Arthritis Foundation and The Ohio Rheumatism Society, for which he later served as President.

Dr. Rothermich actively involved himself in the teaching and research of rheumatic diseases and authored numerous publications and books related to that subject. He served on the U.S. Food and Drug Administration's Arthritis Advisory and Guidelines Committees. At the time of his death, Dr. Rothermich served as Medical Director to the Columbus Medical Research Foundation and held the title of Clinical Professor Emeritus at The Ohio State University.

Synopsis: Authorization to employ an archtectural/engineering firm is proposed.

WHEREAS The Ohio State University has obtained a grant for planning funds from the Federal Aviation Administration to provide 90% funding (\$43,499.70) for Airport Renovation Work consisting of constructing a parallel taxiway to runway 5-23, and constructing all lighting and guidance signs as required; and

BE IT RESOLVED, That the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to enter into such an agreement with the Ohio Board of Regents for the operation of the Universities Building located at the Transportation Research Center of Ohio for the period July 1, 1985, through June 30, 1987.

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## BUDGET GUIDELINES FOR 1985-86

President Jennings made the following statement:

Let me begin today's review of the budget guidelines I am recommending for the future, by briefly reviewing the University budgets of the past. Overall, the past budgetary environment has been one of fiscal uncertainty due to a poor economic situation in Ohio, as well as nationally.

The usual fiscal cycle at Ohio State is discussion of guidelines at the May Board meeting, with final approval in June of the budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1. Last year, 1984, was the first year in recent memory that fit our normal pattern. Ohio's economy was stable, with all the advantages to Ohio State's situation that this implies. We knew the amount of our state support in keeping with our timetable.

Last year, we were able to set a budget in a spirit of optimism signaled by the achievement of fiscal stability. We took strides to enhance quality and we made substantial progress in improving accessibility by holding student tuition and fee increases to below the Regents' recommendations. We embarked on a new era of great promise, with the hope of accelerating our progress in the new biennium.

#### BUDGET GUIDELINES FOR 1985-86 (contd)

President Jennings: (contd)

Regrettably, Ohio State finds itself unable to follow up on the return to normal budget cycles. We have no budget for the new biennium from the General Assembly, and do not yet know what our state support will be.

However, the Executive Budget introduced to the House earlier this year was encouraging. It provided the first real increase in support of higher education since 1979. We were pleased not only with instructional subsidy recommendations that kept student fee increases to a rate below expected inflation, but also excited about new opportunities for progress in the Selective Excellence programs.

The Ohio House retained the vitally important instructional subsidy levels. But funding for what we believe are equally important research and quality initiatives under Selective Excellence was reduced by more than \$25 million. The cuts placed further limits on our potential for progress. The Executive Budget already had reduced the Regents' Selective Excellence recommendations. Even so, the overall increase was a major achievement. And we are very encouraged by Senator Eugene Watts' announcement that the Senate intends to fund the Instructional Subsidy and Selective Excellence at the original Executive Budget recommendations.

Of course, until a final budget is drafted by the conference committee and approved by the General Assembly, we must operate in an environment of uncertainty. In that context, we must continue to emphasize that a strong budget, passed in a timely fashion, is critical for Ohio's higher education community.

This is a time when Ohio should be clearly demonstrating foresight and leadership by investing in quality and enhancing access to higher education. It is Ohio's best opportunity to make great strides not only for individual Ohioans, but also for the long-term economic future of the state as a whole.

Ohio State has been a leader in working toward the twin goals of quality and accessibility. Through internal reallocations and special efforts on tuition, we have continued to do our share to put Ohio on the right path for the future. I do not intend for Ohio State to lose its forward momentum. Even though our progress and growth predictions must be limited by uncertainty at the state level, I plan to bring to this Board for approval at its July meeting, a 1985-86 budget.

It is vital that we support the efforts of our faculty and staff to sustain and build upon the achievements that Ohio State has made, particularly in the last year. With that in mind, I am today prepared to recommend for your approval 1985-86 budget guidelines for use in planning throughout the institution.

### BUDGET GUIDELINES FOR 1985-86 (contd)

#### President Jennings: (contd)

These recommended guidelines have been developed after consultation with the University Senate Fiscal Committee as well as the Faculty Compensation and Benefits Committee. They are conservative, as they must be in the face of the unknowns regarding state support. And--as always--increases in salaries, equipment and library budgets, and support for the colleges' general operating and enhancement funds must be balanced against the equally important goal of keeping tuition as low as possible.

My recommended increase for Ohio State's student tuition and fees, effective Autumn Quarter 1985, is 4 percent. This is in line with the maximum under the House budget. However, to signal the University's resolve to continue doing our share, and provide further incentives for the General Assembly to consider improvements in accessibility on a statewide basis, I also want to make a further commitment.

If the level of support passed by the House and indicated in the Senate is at least maintained in the final budget, I recommend that Ohio State respond with no further increases in tuition for the second year of the biennium. Furthermore, if the final budget includes the additional \$66 million in instructional subsidy funding that I requested in my testimony before both the House and the Senate, the 4 percent increase for this year will be removed.

I also am recommending, as part of these guidelines for 1985-86, a commitment to hold all University rates and charges to an average increase of 4 percent. This is less than current estimates of inflation for the year.

In this context, I want to note the impressive achievements of University Hospitals' management. Their efforts to keep recommended increases to only 4 percent sets a rate significantly below the current national average increase in health care costs. Also, our residence and dining halls are recommending rate increases of less than 4 percent for the second year in a row.

On salary increases, I am today recommending guidelines of 3 percent for faculty and staff members and providing 3.5 percent in salary funds for merit increases. Additionally, central funds of up to one-half percent of salary budgets are recommended to be provided for promotions and market adjustments.

Support for our faculty and staff requires adequate equipment and supplies. We must continue our efforts to restore these college and office budgets, which were seriously depleted by cutbacks in past years. To make progress on restoration, I recommend 5.5 percent increases for the general expense budgets.

### BUDGET GUIDELINES FOR 1985-86 (contd)

President Jennings: (contd)

Continuing our commitment to help ourselves, last year the deans and vice presidents were asked to define ways to reduce their total budgets by 3 percent, with these funds to be reallocated toward a renewed emphasis on academic excellence, and in support of vital new programs and service initiatives. The deans and vice presidents have done their part to implement efficiencies, improve cost containment, and reduce programs and services no longer needed or central to the University's mission.

We need to meet the challenge of enhancing quality throughout the University by internal reallocations, and maintain the momentum of the past year of fiscal stability. I strongly recommend that we not allow the current fiscal uncertainties to deter us from targeting \$7.5 million for excellence.

I also believe that we can and must do more to pursue excellence through our own efforts. Based on the recommendation of the University Senate Fiscal Committee, I propose that we maintain the pattern that was established so successfully last year, again asking each dean and vice president to target, over the next biennium, 2.5 percent more in selective budget reallocations.

In addition, I recommend that we again make available one-time funds to continue efforts to upgrade equipment, facilities and library holdings. However, this action must await firm knowledge on state funding for the biennium.

It is our hope that the General Assembly will enact a biennium budget in a timely manner, prior to July one. We have developed these recommendations on that expectation, and have projected a level of support at least equal to the House budget. In the interim, it is necessary for the Board to provide provisional expenditure authority. This authority would be based on the guidelines I have presented today, for the period of July first through the next Board meeting on July twelfth. At that time, we hope that a state budget will be in place and we can recommend a final budget for approval.

The 1985-86 University budget we expect to present in July will make every effort to build on the enhanced fiscal stability created during the past biennium. To do otherwise would have long-lasting detrimental effects, and seriously erode our renewed potential for great achievement. The Ohio State University community will do its part in the pursuit of excellence, and we trust that the General Assembly will support our efforts.

### EXPENDITURE AUTHORIZATION 1985-86

Resolution No. 85-144

Synopsis: Authorization to make interim expenditures in Fiscal Year 1985-86 is requested.

WHEREAS levels of State financial support for 1985-86 have not yet been established; and

WHEREAS this University must proceed with its budget planning for 1985-86 even with the current uncertainties in State revenues; and

WHEREAS it is necessary to authorize expenditures for 1985-86 to be effective July 1, 1985, including payment of faculty and staff, prior to the time that this Board adopts the Current Funds Budget for 1985-86:

#### NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the University be authorized to make expenditures consistent with the budget guidelines and the Provisional Current Funds Budget for Fiscal Year 1985-86, as described in the accompanying text and tables, effective July 1, 1985; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That student tuition and fees be increased by an average of 4 percent beginning Autumn Quarter, 1985, and that the Student Fee Schedule effective Autumn Quarter, 1985, be hereby approved; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the President will present as soon as possible to the Board of Trustees the final version of the Current Funds Budget for 1985-86 with adjustments as may be necessary as a result of the final actions of the General Assembly and Governor of the State of Ohio.

Upon motion of Mr. Teaford, seconded by Mr. Barone, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous roll call vote.

#### STATEMENT OF BUDGET GUIDELINES/PRINCIPLES FOR 1985-86

#### I. INTRODUCTION

While in presenting the 1984-85 budget to this Board for approval a year ago, much was made of the positive impact of the return to fiscal stability, it appears that such stability may be short lived. Even with the relatively stable economic situation in Ohio, we must again bring to this Board a provisional budget without knowing the amount of State support which will be provided for fiscal year 1985-86. The House has passed its budget recommendations, but the Senate is continuing its deliberations.

During this period of uncertainty, every effort must be made not to lose the positive momentum that The Ohio State University has achieved in spite of the severe budget cuts imposed since 1981. Therefore, it is important that this University proceed now to implement a provisional budget for 1985-86 which

### STATEMENT OF BUDGET GUIDELINES/PRINCIPLES FOR 1985-86 (contd)

will enable our faculty and staff to continue uninterrupted with their excellent teaching, research and service activities. These recommendations have been developed after consideration of the recommendations of the University Senate Fiscal Advisory and Faculty Compensation and Benefits Committees, deans and vice presidents.

To proceed at this time entails risk and makes use of internal reallocations to provide the necessary resources, while not placing an undue burden on our students with extraordinary tuition increases. The reallocations were initiated a year ago with the 3 percent reduction in base expenditure budgets for all colleges and offices to be effective as of 30 June, 1985. The risk will be the fiscal impact on the second year of the biennium and the adjustments which may be necessary if at least the House levels of State support are not provided by the Senate.

#### II. SOURCES OF FUNDS

The Provisional Current Funds Budget for 1985-86 includes funding sources which total \$826,420,000, as detailed in the schedule of Sources of Income to Support the 1985-86 Provisional Budget. This amount includes, based upon the House passed budget legislation, State support totaling \$266,850,000, which represents 32.2 percent of the total resource budgeted. Other major funding sources include student tuitions providing 15.3 percent, earnings operations generating 32.2 percent, Federal grants and contracts 11.4 percent, and private gifts and grants plus endowment income totaling 5.3 percent.

While student access remains a high priority for The Ohio State University, the continued uncertainties in State support will require student tuition increases for all levels at the rate of 4 percent. The new tuition rates recommended to be effective Autumn Quarter, 1985, are shown in the Student Fee Schedule. While this 4 percent increase returns student tuition increases to less than the projected rate of inflation, it does not yet enable this University to make the desired progress in reducing the student's cost of their education in Ohio. While Ohio State continues to keep student tuition below the Board of Regents projections, further efforts are needed. Therefore, if the State support is maintained at least at the House passed budget levels, Ohio State will keep student tuitions at these new rates throughout the biennium.

Continuing prior year's efforts to manage increases in all fees and charges of the University, the average University-wide increase will be held to 4 percent. It should be noted that University Hospitals continues its leadership role in the containment of health care costs by setting hospital rate increases to an average of only 4 percent. In addition, the Residence and Dining Halls have for the second year in a row kept their average rate increases below inflation levels. This year's average is only 3.8 percent.

The other income components of the 1985-86 Provisional Current Funds Budget are in line with expected growth from 1984-85 expected revenues. The projected revenues for 1984-85 show a decrease of \$7 million, which is less than 1 percent below the original budget approved by this Board on 7 June, 1984. The majority of this difference results from lower than projected

occupancy levels at University Hospitals. The other revenue adjustments represent normal differences in projected income versus the budget expectations of a year ago.

### III. USES OF FUNDS

As detailed in the Schedule of Provisional Budgeted Expenditures for Fiscal Year 1985-86 and the supporting documents, this University's current fund expenditures total \$824,170,000. These planned expenditures will support the following budget planning guidelines.

- \* Increase faculty and administrative/professional staff salaries by 3 percent and provide 3.5 percent in salary funds for merit increases plus 0.5 percent for promotions and market adjustments.
- \* Fund salary increases for the recently negotiated wage settlements.
- \* Increase general expense budgets by 5.5 percent for colleges and offices.
- \* Provide funding to maintain the purchasing power of University-funded student financial aid plus \$7.5 million to address special critical needs including providing adequate instructional staffs, support for continued efforts to enhance excellence and quality, and assist in implementing program changes as well as cost containment efforts.
- \* Provide resources to meet mandatory General Fund cost increases, such as utilities (\$830 thousand) and employee benefits (\$1.4 million).

Every effort will be made to again provide one-time funds for equipment replacement facilities renovations and the acquisition of library materials to continue to improve the quality of these necessary support resources. If resources permit, when the State budget is known, a specific allocation for one-time equipment renovations and libraries funds will be recommended for 1985-86.

These expenditures can be realized within the House approved support, 3 percent internal reallocations initiated during 1984-85 and the 4 percent student tuition increase. While we hope that the Senate actions will provide additional State support, these expenditure plans for 1985-86 are expected to remain as presented with appropriate adjustments to be made in the second year of the biennium, 1986-87. Once the final state budget is known, we will bring an adjusted budget recommendation to this Board for your consideration.

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## INVESTMENT POLICY

Resolution No. 85-147

President Jennings made the following statement:

This campus, like many others across the nation, has been engaged for the last several months in various activities led by our students intended to call attention to the situation in the Republic of South Africa. They have sought to give voice to our shared abhorrence of that nation's policy of apartheid.

As one part of that campus-wide debate, this Board has received the report of an advisory committee on South African investments. I appointed this committee of faculty, staff, and students several months ago, in response to specific student requests that we reconsider the University's investment policy, the issue on which campus-wide debate has focused.

With the committee's report in hand, and after many discussions with my staff, various members of the campus community, and my colleagues in universities around the nation, I am bringing to the Board a set of recommendations that strongly signal our opposition to apartheid, and our support for the human rights of the non-white peoples of South Africa.

I wish to make clear at the outset, on behalf of The Ohio State University community, and of this Board, that we stand united in opposition to the racist policies of the government of South Africa. The Republic of South Africa isolates itself in the international community as the only nation where racism is institutionalized by law, openly defended by its government, and enforced by officially sanctioned police and military action to establish and maintain an underclass of citizens based solely and exclusively on their racial heritage.

Apartheid is a racist system which has caused great suffering and is in conflict with our most deeply held core values of individual freedom and equality of opportunity, which are accepted as basic moral truths by this University and this nation. The Ohio State University unequivocally condemns apartheid as an unmitigated evil, and as a system which is morally, socially and economically bankrupt.

### INVESTMENT POLICY (contd)

President Jennings: (contd)

In making these recommendations, it is important to acknowledge the argument that it is inappropriate for a public university to take political positions. Indeed, in the normal course of things, we conscientiously avoid doing so. This is generally an appropriate role for the University to assume. But this is not an issue that lends itself to normal procedures. I believe it is abundantly clear that the evil of apartheid transcends politics. And I believe The Ohio State University community is in agreement that a rare exception to our normal practices is clearly merited.

This is not to say that there are not many evils in this world, nor much human suffering and much systematic, as well as individual, deprivation of the rights that we in America have come to consider as basic entitlements of all people. But our inability to conquer all the ills of the world, or even all the ills of our own nation, does not absolve us of responsibility to respond to one particular evil that has become a primary societal concern.

Our shared abhorrence of apartheid, however, and agreement that a stand should be taken has not led us to an equally unanimous position on what that appropriate action might be to signify publicly our opposition to apartheid. It is significant, but not surprising, that the advisory committee members found agreement on specific policy recommendations out of reach.

I find the characterization, made by some, of this advisory committee as a representative democracy in which the majority is expected to rule, inconsistent with its structure and charge. But I submit that the committee's debate and report has provided a workable structure through which we have informed the campus community of the various points of view surrounding the question of an appropriate response to apartheid.

While we may not all concur on the efficacy of divestment as a tool for fighting apartheid, we should acknowledge that divestment is the primary symbol of concern to which many of our students have tended to limit their public statements and demonstrations. The same is true across the nation. It is, therefore, appropriate that investment policy figure in our response to these concerns.

We must note that the primary source of the committee members' disagreement was not about divestment itself, but rather what form divestment should take. However, it also is important that the symbolism of divestment not be Ohio State's only response.

The Ohio State University, a part of the honored land-grant tradition, is expected to be a force for the social good, reflecting the philosophy of public higher education under which the land-grant universities were established in this nation. It is incumbent upon us to recognize the appropriateness of serving these ideals where and

### INVESTMENT POLICY (contd)

President Jennings: (contd)

how we can, in a manner consistent with our mission in society. And we must recognize our obligation to lead as well as to reflect society.

It is possible to perceive the linkage of the broad land-grant philosophy with a specific issue, such as apartheid, as assuming an activist role. But I believe action in this case, for the achievement of important ends for society, is not inconsistent with our broader obligations. Nor is it inconsistent to affirm that a public university should not receive benefit from practices that cause substantial societal harm. These precepts offer a structure of consistency within which Ohio State, as an educational institution, can respond to apartheid.

Efficacy is another point to be seriously considered. Not only is Ohio State's position as a stockholder relatively small, it also is several steps removed from any direct or discernible impact. The committee's analysis is sophisticated enough to recognize that this University's divestment is likely to have little or no economic effect on the firms that do business in South Africa.

The sale of a relatively minor amount of investments on a national stock exchange cannot be expected to have the desired impact on corporate management, let alone upon the government of South Africa. The far larger stockholders of multi-national corporations are state and local governments across the nation, individual Americans, and large pension funds, both publicly and privately managed ones.

Universities may not be the most substantial economic forces in the international marketplace. They are, however, the training grounds in which new thinking and new ideas are developed. We also are the home of our brightest young men and women, whose activism and commitment has proved more than once in the past to be the source of wise and necessary social action.

In a university environment, it is appropriate for our students to come to us first for redress of their grievances--not only as they apply directly to the university itself, but in the larger context of society as a whole. Our obligation is to hear our students, and to respond to their concerns in appropriate ways.

We also must acknowledge that we are dealing less with economic realities than moral symbolism. In our obligation as a university to stand as an example, symbolism has an important function. It is a valid principle in the continuation of our American traditions of civil law and democratic governance, and it is appropriate for a university.

## INVESTMENT POLICY (contd)

With the principles of consistency and efficacy in mind, we have a clear obligation to seek out a range of actions appropriate to this University's mission that would protest governmental policies of institutionalized racism and improve the status of non-white South Africans. We have an obligation to go beyond the concept of divestment.

Indeed, divestiture in my view represents a real danger if it is construed as ending the University's obligation. Ohio State several years ago took a leadership position on the question of South Africa by adopting specific principles of corporate responsibility in our investment policy.

Our current investment policy already accepts a special obligation to monitor our involvement with companies doing business in South Africa by requiring adherence to the Sullivan Principles. Formulated in 1977 by the Reverend Leon Sullivan, a civil rights activist in Philadelphia and member of the General Motors Board of Directors, they were adopted in Ohio State's institutional investment policy by the Board of Trustees the following year. They state the following:

--Non-segregation of the races in all eating, comfort, and work facilities.

--Equal and fair employment practices for all employees, including non-discriminatory benefits and the right to join and form trade unions.

--Equal pay for equal or comparable work, including an adequate minimum wage.

--Initiation and development of training programs that will prepare substantial numbers of non-whites for supervisory, administrative, clerical, and technical jobs.

--Increasing the number of non-whites in management and supervisory positions.

--Improving the quality of employees' lives outside the work environment in such areas as housing, transportation, schooling, recreation, and health facilities.

In 1978, we shared with Howard University and Vassar and Amherst Colleges the distinction of being the first four institutions of higher education to take divestment action. We enforced our new Sullivan Principles standard through divestment valued at more than a quarter of a million dollars.

Since then, we have actively monitored corporate performance judged against the Sullivan Principles by the Arthur D. Little Company, and have used the reports of the Investor Responsibility Research

Center, Inc., and other firms to guide our equity investments. In addition, the University regularly requests information on compliance from these companies and reviews numerous business and financial periodicals. This position is far ahead of virtually all of our sister academic institutions across the nation.

A count published May 22, 1985, in the <u>Chronicle of Higher Educa-</u> tion showed only forty institutions as having even partially divested. The overwhelming majority, the <u>Chronicle</u> reports, have taken no steps to end South Africa-related holdings--if they have examined the issue at all.

The Ohio State University can take pride in the fact that it has acted. But we have acted quietly. In the current climate of renewed attention to the situation in South Africa, I believe it behooves Ohio State, as one of the largest universities in the nation and as a land-grant university in particular, to begin to call attention to its leadership role and, further, to continue to set examples of what more might be accomplished.

I am today recommending the following actions designed to have a real impact on the status of non-whites in the Republic of South Africa:

--The establishment of scholarships for non-white South African undergraduate students, modeled after our highly successful Freshman Foundation program. This will both recognize the limitations on educational opportunities for some South Africans in their own nation, and benefit individuals by providing them with an opportunity to achieve a higher education at Ohio State.

For graduate students, Ohio State already participates in the South African Education Program coordinated by the International Institute for Education. Through this program, more than 200 non-white South Africans, selected by a committee in South Africa chaired by Bishop Desmond Tutu, are studying in the United States. Already, one Black South African student has graduated from this University under the S.A.E.P. program.

Ohio State currently is considering two applications under this program for admission to master's degree programs. If both applicants are qualified, both will be provided not only with fellowships, but also a monthly stipend to cover their travel and other expenses. This expanded support, and the additional fellowship, will be continued.

--Special recruitment efforts for visiting professors from the Republic of South Africa, including non-white South Africans and those members of the white minority who are working to end the government's offensive apartheid policies. We will seek to bring to our faculty distinguished individuals whose perspective and academic

### INVESTMENT POLICY (contd)

expertise will benefit the students, faculty, and staff of this University by virtue of their presence and involvement in our campus community.

This has, in fact, already begun--once again, quietly, and it is time to make public the extent of Ohio State's commitment demonstrated in various ways throughout the institution. Last fall, our College of Humanities extended an invitation to Bishop Desmond Tutu to serve as a Distinguished Visiting Professor for the 1985-86 academic year. His appointment as Bishop of Johannesburg had only been recently announced, which made it impossible for him to accept. But he has not ruled out a future acceptance and our offer remains open.

These are academic activities. The financial issue of our investment policy remains. There is an appropriate role available to us in which we can strongly signal our opposition to apartheid in the context of an educational institution. As a result of our stock ownership, Ohio State has a legitimate right and interest--indeed, an obligation--as a stockholder to involve itself in the management decisions of corporations.

As I have stated, our adoption of the Sullivan Principles of corporate responsibility in 1978 was at the time a leadership position in our role as a stockholder. Indeed, even among institutions which have adopted the Sullivan Principles frequently require only that a company have signed them.

Ohio State's monitoring is far more active. We require not only adherence to the Principles, but also evidence of achievement. Not every company that has signed has taken concrete steps to carry out the commitment, and not all are doing as much as they could. Ohio State requires visible evidence of good progress through the various reporting firms that monitor corporate activity in South Africa.

Beyond these Principles, additional calls for action have been outlined by Bishop Tutu. His 1983 statement of Principles asked companies to recognize non-white labor unions, enforce fair labor practices, freely hire non-white employees without regard to the South African laws that restrict the movement of Africans within the country, and invest heavily in education and training for non-whites--as the South African Education Program in which Ohio State participates has undertaken on an international scale.

More recently, the Reverend Sullivan issued a November 1984, amplification of his original Principles that calls for greater emphasis on the status of the non-white peoples of South Africa outside the workplace. These include:

--Use corporate influence to support the unrestricted rights of non-whites' businesses to locate in urban areas.

### INVESTMENT POLICY (contd)

President Jennings: (contd)

--Influence South African companies to follow the standards of equal rights.

--Support freedom of mobility of non-white workers to seek employment wherever opportunities exist and make possible adequate housing for families in proximity of the workplace.

--Support the rescission of all apartheid laws.

Further, the Reverend Sullivan recently has demanded greater speed in creating an impact through corporate activism and last month called on the U.S. Congress to go beyond what private companies have the power to do. The proposed Anti-Apartheid Act of 1985, which incorporates many of his recommendations--a ban on new bank loans or credits to South Africa, a prohibition on new business investments, and an end to imports of gold krugerrands, among other actions--has received wide bi-partisan support in both Houses of Congress, and was passed by a wide margin in the U.S. House of Representatives on June 5.

Some of these new recommendations, provided to us by the Reverend Sullivan just last month, are within the power of corporate stockholders to carry out immediately--such as ending any involvement in sales of equipment or services to the military or police; and making no new investments in the equities of companies conducting business in South Africa.

I recommend that the University's investment policy incorporate fully all of the above--Bishop Tutu's 1983 recommendations, the Reverend Sullivan's new amplification of the Principles in November of 1984, and his call to action of May 1985, including a moratorium on new investments in the equities of companies doing business in South Africa.

The divestiture required by these initial actions is based on social responsibility principles appropriate to a public land-grant university. In a broader sense, as the advisory committee has pointed out, there is reason to undertake divestiture on strict financial grounds that may be as compelling as any other argument.

It is inevitable that the apartheid system must fall. This is only a matter of when and how, not if. The conduct demonstrated in the past by the white supremacist government gives us little hope that such change can be peaceful. Indeed, despite certain efforts by the current administration in South Africa to modify apartheid policies, the situation appears to be deteriorating.

## INVESTMENT POLICY (contd)

#### President Jennings: (contd)

The University recognizes that an important indication of investment soundness is the quality and foresight of management. Continued involvement with a regime that is inherently unstable calls those indicators into doubt.

Therefore, beyond the freeze and strengthened corporate action principles, I further recommend that Ohio State's investment policy be based on the philosophy that, all other things being equal, it is appropriate and prudent not to be invested in companies doing business in South Africa, until apartheid is abolished. To ensure that our divestiture goal is maintained, I recommend a cap on total South Africa-related equities at 5 percent of the endowment, to be achieved by the end of the next fiscal year. In addition, we plan to lower this cap by one percent per year, over the next five years.

The first-year divestment required in implementing this series of recommendations will exceed \$3.3 million. This is estimated on a portfolio base of \$135.3 million. As of our December 31, 1984, full endowment inventory, we showed current holdings in the equities of companies doing business in South Africa valued at \$10.8 million, or 8 percent of the total portfolio.

In addition, since the time of our adoption of the Sullivan Principles in 1978, Ohio State has taken a position that it is possible and appropriate to vote stockholder proxies in a manner that supports corporate adherence to the Principles. But beyond this, we also have the right to initiate stockholder proposals.

I recommend that the University Treasurer be asked to undertake the formulation of stockholder proposals to encourage companies whose equities we hold to improve their records in South Africa. I also would ask that a report on those issues be made to the Board of Trustees on a periodic basis.

These actions, taken as a whole, establish a broad context in which a university takes effective action to oppose apartheid that is appropriate to its role as a corporate stockholder and consistent with its primary educational mission and long-term responsibility to the larger society we serve. All these educational and financial activities, taken together, provide a comprehensive and appropriate position for The Ohio State University.

Significant to Ohio State's divestment program will be generating awareness in the higher education community, in the hope of inspiring further activity across the nation. Many universities are considering divestment, but few have found ways to reconcile their interest in opposing apartheid with fiduciary responsibility and educational missions. Ohio State's position will, we hope, offer an example of reasonable and reasoned university action that serves both our fiduciary obligations, and our larger responsibility to stand

as a model for the public good. The actions outlined are consistent with and, indeed, integral to our primary mission as a university in society.

I recommend, Mr. Chairman, that policy for your consideration.

Upon motion of Mr. Teaford, seconded by Mr. Barone.

Mr. Havens:

The motion is on the floor is there any discussion? Hearing none, I will ask the Secretary to call the roll.

Mr. Redman made the following statement:

Mr. Chairman, before I cast my vote, I want to explain my reason therefor, with your permission:

I am not persuaded that the disinvestment proposed under the resolution before us today, is in the best interests of Ohio State University, or the black citizens residing in South Africa. Many of the black leaders inside and outside of that country, have urged that this action not be taken, since, in their opinion, it will injure the very blacks it is supposed to aid.

I am not impressed with the petition presented here today by the "Students United Against Apartheid," which I have been informed contains approximately 2,700 signatures, out of a student body of 60,000, and thus represents only about 4 percent of the students they allege they represent. Under any responsible analysis of the results of their survey, it would hardly represent a consensus of student body desires.

As Trustees of OSU in my opinion, we should make investment decisions which reflect only the best interests of OSU and not be influenced by political pressures or arbitrary guidelines, based on such considerations. I might add that it is possible that such a policy, if adopted, might be possible of legal attack by the Ohio Attorney General or some interested taxpayer, as has happened in other states.

I do not understand the vote of our representatives in the U.S. House of Representatives by Mr. Kasich and Mr. Wylie, which I consider an unwarranted attempt by the House, to interfere in the conduct of foreign affairs of this country, which affairs, under the U.S. Constitution, is lodged in the hands of the President of the country and the Secretary of State, and in some circumstances, requires the consent of the U.S. Senate. But be that as it may, I do not think it is controlling in the subject at hand.

Mr. Redman: (contd)

At the last Board meeting of the Trustees, an effort was made by these same people who now petition the Board, to disrupt the meeting and threat of physical violence. This indicates to me, the character of those advocates of disinvestment who were there, and are now here. All I can say is, I will not be influenced by those tactics.

I think it is unconscionable for Americans to try to dictate to South Africa, in particular, or any other country, the way they should run their country, internally. I am sure that if the South Africans were trying to dictate to Americans how we should run our country, and threaten punitive action if we did not adopt their concept, we would resent it bitterly and react accordingly. In addition it should be remembered that South Africa has been our best and only friend on the African continent and they are saying to us "with friends like you, who needs enemies."

Many of the corporations whose stock is now held by OSU, and which we would be obliged to sell if the recommended policy is adopted, have been benefactors of OSU in the past and prospective future benefactors, particularly in grants and research projects. For example, International Business Machines, General Motors Corporation, and Wendy's International, to name a few. If we arbitrarily refuse to invest in, or retain our present holdings in these companies, how do you suppose they will react when OSU is negotiating for future cooperation from those companies. Thus the adoption of this resolution will have an adverse effect on the University long after these people are gone and forgotten.

I respect the right of the other members of this Board who may disagree with me, for whatever reason, to vote in what they consider the best interests of this University.

Thus I cast my vote against the resolution proposed.

Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

The Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution with Mr. Havens, Mr. Immke, Mrs. Bowser, Mr. Teaford, Mr. Barone and Ms. Casto casting affirmative votes and Mr. Galbreath, Mr. Redman and Mr. Berry casting negative votes.

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# NEW DEGREE PROGRAM

Resolution No. 86-1

Synopsis: The establishment of a Bachelor of Science degree with an Economics major in the Colleges of the Arts and Sciences is proposed.

WHEREAS the Department of Economics, the College of Social and Behavioral Sciences and the Colleges of the Arts and Sciences have approved extending the Bachelor of Science degree option with a major in Economics to students in the Colleges of the Arts and Sciences; and

WHEREAS currently the Bachelor of Science degree with a major in Economics is offered through the College of Administrative Science, and the Bachelor of Arts degree with an Economics major is offered through the Colleges of the Arts and Sciences; and

WHEREAS this proposal requires no significant shifts in resources or time commitments; and

WHEREAS the Bachelor of Science degree with an Economics major better prepares students for graduate programs in Economics, and is designed for persons who wish to pursue careers in Economics or related fields in which mathematical and statistical training are essential; and

WHEREAS the existing Bachelor of Arts degree will continue to be offered for students who wish to pursue careers with less specialized requirements; and

WHEREAS the Bachelor of Science degree designation better summarizes the educational background of students pursuing the quantitative route; and

WHEREAS there is strong student support:

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# RENAMING OF DEPARTMENT

Resolution No. 86-2

Synopsis: A proposal to change the name of the Department of Home Management and Housing to the Department of Family Resource Management is recommended.

WHEREAS the proposed name change of the Department of Home Management and Housing to the Department of Family Resource Management has the unanimous support of the Department, and the support of the College of Home Economics; and

WHEREAS Deans and departmental chairpersons have been notified of the proposed name change, and no objections have been raised; and

WHEREAS the Department of Home Management and Housing has undergone substantial changes in program thrusts, enrollment patterns and faculty expertise, the current Departmental name is no longer descriptive; and

WHEREAS the proposed name accurately reflects the curricula, research and public service emphases of the Department, and reflects a growing emphasis on integrating consumer/family economics and home management; and

WHEREAS the current name has proved confusing both on and off-campus, and the proposed name will help communicate to the public and potential students the scope of Departmental programs:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the University Senate has approved the name change of the Department of Home Management and Housing to the Department of Family Resource Management, and respectfully requests concurrence by the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Mr. Teaford, seconded by Mr. Barone, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous voice vote.

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# AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY

Resolution No. 86-3

Synopsis: Amendments to the Bylaws of the Board of Trustees (3335-1-05) and Rules of the University Faculty (3335-3-27, 3335-3-31, 3335-3-37, 3335-5-29, 3335-5-30, 3335-5-31, 3335-5-32, 3335-5-33, 3335-5-34, 3335-5-35, 3335-5-36, 3335-5-48, 3335-5-50, 3335-9-04, 3335-9-29, 3335-9-31, 3335-9-321) are proposed.

WHEREAS the University Senate pursuant to rule 3335-1-09 of the Administrative Code is authorized to recommend through the President to the Board of Trustees the adoption of amendments to the <u>Bylaws of the Board of Trustees</u> and <u>Rules</u> of the University Faculty as approved by the University Senate; and

WHEREAS the proposed changes in the <u>Bylaws of the Board of Trustees</u> and <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> were approved by the University Senate on June 8, 1985, as follows:

#### BYLAW

3335-1-05 University organization.

(G) Graduate school; organization. The graduate school shall consist of: those members of the university faculty who are approved to give graduate instruction; a graduate faculty; the council on research and graduate studies; and an administration composed of a curriculum committee, an executive committee, the dean, the secretary and such other administrative officers as are appointed pursuant to paragraph (H) of this rule.

#### RULES

3335-3-27 Organization of the graduate school.

The graduate school shall consist of: those members of the university faculty who are approved to give graduate instruction; a graduate faculty as defined in rule 3335-5-29 of the Administrative Code; a council on research and graduate studies as created by rule 3335-5-32 of the Administrative Code; and an administration composed of a curriculum committee as created by rule 3335-5-36 of the Administrative Code, an executive committee as created by rule 3335-5-36 of the Administrative Code, the dean of the graduate school, an associate or assistant dean or deans, and a secretary.

3335-3-31 Dean of the graduate school.

(A) There shall be a dean of the graduate school who shall be the administrative head of the graduate school. The dean shall be appointed by the board of trustees upon nomination of the president. Before making a nomination, the president shall confer with the council on research and graduate studies.

# AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (B) The dean of the graduate school shall have the same general responsibilities and authorities that pertain to the deans of the several colleges. The dean shall also preside at the meetings of the council on research and graduate studies and of its executive committee, make recommendations to the council concerning all such matters as are of primary importance in the development of the graduate work of the university, and make recommendations to the vice president for academic affairs and provost concerning the budget of the graduate school to provide for the proper maintenance of the school and to assist in the development of graduate work and research programs.
  - (1) The dean of the graduate school shall present candidates for graduate degrees to the president, serve as a member of the council of deans, and in general, be responsible for the progress of the educational policies and well-being of the school. The dean shall report to the appropriate member of the president's staff upon the condition and progress of the graduate school whenever called upon to do so.
  - (2) When planning the annual budget, the dean of a college shall consult with the dean of the graduate school on appointments and promotions of faculty members offering graduate work or acting as advisers to graduate students (see rule 3335-3-29 of the Administrative Code). If at any time the dean of the graduate school believes that the status and contributions of such persons is not adequately reflected in rank or salary, the dean of the graduate school shall make representation of this belief to the dean of the appropriate college.
- (D) The dean is hereby granted all authority necessary to carry out the responsibilities of the dean of the graduate school.
- (E) The dean shall appoint all graduate school committees unless their membership has been designated by these faculty rules, the council on research and graduate studies, or the graduate faculty.
- (G) The usual method of communication between the dean of the graduate school and the president or the board of trustees shall be the same as for the deans of the colleges.

3335-3-37 Research institutes; establishment and administration.

Research institutes shall be established or abolished by the board of trustees upon recommendation of the council on research and graduate studies and university senate. Each research institute shall be administered by a board having such membership and authority as determined by the council on research and graduate studies (see rule 3335-5-35 of the Administrative Code) and approved by the university senate and the board of trustees. (B/T 12/5/58, B/T 9/8/61, B/T 11/9/67, B/T 2/4/72, B/T 7/12/85)

# AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

3335-5-29 Membership.

The regular members of the graduate faculty shall consist of those members of the university faculty who are approved by the executive committee of the council on research and graduate studies. Ex officio members of the graduate faculty are the vice president for research and graduate studies, the vice president for academic affairs and provost, the dean of the graduate school, the deans of the colleges, and the director of libraries.

3335-5-30 Powers and functions.

The graduate faculty shall have the following general powers and functions:

- (A) To elect all voting faculty members of the council on research and graduate studies in the manner prescribed by rule 3335-5-34 of the Administrative Code.
- (B) To initiate and to act upon any question affecting the policies of the graduate school or to request consideration and action by the council on research and graduate studies.
- (C) To approve, modify, or reverse any action of the council on research and graduate studies.
- (E) Perform the functions approved by the council on research and graduate studies.

3335-5-31 Meetings.

(A) Meetings of the graduate faculty shall be called by the dean of the graduate school whenever so requested by ten per cent of the regular members of the graduate faculty or by a majority of the members present at any regular meeting of the council on research and graduate studies.

3335-5-32 Council on research and graduate studies.

There shall be established a council on research and graduate studies with the following powers and subject to the following limitations in rules 3335-5-33 to 3335-5-36 of the Administrative Code.

3335-5-33 Membership.

There shall be a council on research and graduate studies constituted as follows:

- (A) Chief administrative officer. The vice president for research and graduate studies shall serve as the chief administrative officer.
- (B) Chairperson. The dean of the graduate school shall chair the council on research and graduate studies.

# AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (C) Elected faculty members. Forty members of the graduate faculty, four elected by the regular members of the graduate faculty from each of the ten graduate areas: administrative sciences, agricultural sciences, the arts, biological sciences, education, engineering sciences, humanities, physical sciences and mathematics, professional biological sciences, and social and behavioral sciences.
- (D) Alternate faculty members. Each faculty member of the council is expected to attend its meetings regularly but alternate representatives shall be elected for each area in order to assure full attendance at meetings when elected faculty members are justifiably absent. When an elected member is off duty or unable to attend a meeting of the council, the member shall notify the secretary of the graduate school in advance of the meeting, giving the name of the alternate who will attend. The alternate shall then have the general powers and privileges in the council of the member represented.

Service as an alternate does not make the alternate ineligible for election to membership in the council the following year.

- (E) Student members. Twelve graduate students, one from each of the ten graduate areas, and two at large, shall be elected by the council of graduate students. These members shall serve terms of one year and shall be eligible for at most three consecutive terms.
- (F) Alternate student members. Each student member of the council is expected to attend its meetings regularly but an alternate representative shall be appointed for each member in order to assure full attendance at meetings when elected student members are justifiably absent. When a student member is unable to attend a meeting of the council, the member shall notify the secretary of the graduate school in advance of the meeting, giving the name of the alternate who will attend. The alternate shall then have the general powers and privileges in the council of the member represented.

3335-5-34 Election of faculty members.

(B) Elections shall be administered and supervised by a council on research and graduate studies elections committee which shall be composed each year of the ten area members then retiring. This committee shall have power to make final rules on all matters not specifically covered by these rules. Elections shall be held in the spring quarter of each year for terms beginning with the following autumn quarter.

There shall be a council nominating committee in each area. The chairperson shall be the retiring member of the council representing that area. Members shall be the continuing members representing that area and the chairperson of the graduate studies committee for each department in that area. In the absence of a graduate studies committee, the department chairperson or designee shall serve. The committee shall make a minimum of four nominations, including nominations received by petition from any six or more members of the graduate faculty of the area

# AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

concerned. The elections committee shall prepare and mail the election ballot to each member of the graduate faculty. The election ballots shall be counted by that committee. The person or persons receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected to the vacancy or vacancies existing at the time of election. The person receiving the next highest number of votes shall be an alternate member for a term of two years.

3335-5-35 Powers and functions.

The council on research and graduate studies shall be the principal legislative body of the graduate school and, subject to modification or reversal by the graduate faculty, shall have the following powers and functions:

3335-5-36 Committees.

- (A) There shall be five standing committees: executive, curriculum, policy and standards, research, and graduate associate. The research committee will be chaired by the vice president for research and graduate studies, or designee. The other committees will be chaired by the dean of the graduate school, or designee.
- (B) The executive, curriculum, and policy and standards committees shall each consist of ten faculty members of the council on research and graduate studies, one from each graduate area, and three graduate students, all of whom are members of the council. The research committee shall consist of ten faculty members of the council, one from each graduate area, three graduate student members of the council, and six faculty appointed by the vice president for research and graduate studies and approved by the council. The appointees shall serve as voting members of the research committee. The graduate associate committee shall consist of eight graduate faculty members, two of whom are members of the council, and three graduate students.
- (C) Specific responsibilities, in addition to those assigned by the council on research and graduate studies, the vice president for research and graduate studies, or the dean of the graduate school, are as follows:
  - (1) The curriculum committee considers and acts on courses carrying graduate credit and considers and recommends to the council action on graduate degree programs.
  - (3) The policy and standards committee considers and recommends to the council policies and rules related to graduate education.
  - (4) The research committee considers and recommends to the vice president for research and graduate studies and to the council policies and rules related to research.
  - (5) The graduate associate committee considers and recommends to the council policies and rules related to graduate associates. (B/T 3/5/71, B/T 4/2/71, B/T 2/4/72, B/T 6/9/83, B/T 7/12/85)

# AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- 3335-5-48 Council on academic affairs.
- (A) The council on academic affairs shall consist of fourteen members.
  - (6) The vice president for academic affairs and provost, or designee, shall be the chairperson of the council. The vice chairperson of the council shall be elected for a one-year term from the faculty membership of the council. The chairperson (or when absent, the vice chairperson) shall preside at all meetings of the council. The chairperson shall vote only in case of a tie vote among members of the council present and voting, whereas the vice chairperson shall vote without such restriction, even though presiding.
- (C) (2) Receive from the graduate school, pursuant to the exercise of powers conferred upon the council on research and graduate studies by rule 3335-5-35 of the Administrative Code, its proposals for the adoption, alteration or abolition of graduate-credit courses and curricula, and of academic degrees administered by it (see rules 3335-7-02 to 3335-7-03 of the Administrative Code).
- 3335-5-50 Council on student affairs.
- (A) The council on student affairs shall consist of eighteen members as follows:
  - (1) Eight students to be selected as follows:
    - (a) The president of the undergraduate student government, or designee.
    - (b) The president of the association of women students, or designee.
  - (3) Three non-voting members appointed by the vice provost for student affairs: the dean of student life; a student affairs staff member from a regional campus; and a college office student affairs staff member. The non-voting members shall serve one-year terms, but shall be eligible for reappointment.
  - (4) The vice provost for student affairs, or designee, shall be chairperson of the council and shall vote only in case of ties.
- (B) The vice provost for student affairs shall report as requested to the vice president for academic affairs and provost and to the university senate.
- (C) The council's legislative function shall be accomplished by the following:
  - (1) Recommending to university senate any proposed changes in the "code of student conduct."
  - (2) Recommending to university senate proposed legislation which may affect the quality of student life.

# AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (3) Making regulations pursuant to rules of the university faculty, the bylaws, and the statutes, insofar as they pertain to the quality of student life.
- (4) Serving as the principal liaison council between student governments and the faculty and administration. The council shall solicit information from these governments pertaining to any proposed changes in the faculty rules as they relate to the division of student affairs.
- (D) The council's advisory function shall be accomplished by the following (with the exception of those areas advised or addressed by the council on admissions and registration and/or athletic council):
  - Advising the vice provost for student affairs regarding the programs, services, and activities of the division.
  - (2) Establishing study groups, committees and other mechanisms as needed to explore issues affecting the quality of student life and to make recommendations regarding these issues to the vice provost for student affairs.
  - (3) Advising other university departments and administrative units regarding proposed changes in the university's "operating manual" that may affect student rights and responsibilities.
- (E) The council shall have the authority to approve policies that govern the registration, rights, privileges, and obligations of student organizations, including but not limited to fraternities and sororities, student publications, and student government. This responsibility may be delegated by the council to an appropriate committee or administrative agency.
- (F) The council shall establish operating procedures to conduct, in an orderly fashion, the legislative, advisory, and policy approval functions of the council.
- 3335-9-04 Specific admission requirements.
- (B) Graduate student. An applicant must meet the admission criteria established by the council on research and graduate studies. All applicants must specify a field of specialization.
- 3335-9-29 Degrees and certificates.
- (B) Degrees and certificates shall be awarded graduate students by the board of trustees upon recommendation of the council on research and graduate studies and the university senate, transmitted to the board by the president. (See rule 3335-5-35 of the Administrative Code.)

# AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

3335-9-31 Requirements for a graduate degree.

To obtain a graduate degree from this university, a graduate student must have met the minimum requirements established by the council on research and graduate studies and approved by the board of trustees, and have filed an application for the degree in accordance with rules prescribed by the council on research and graduate studies.

3335-9-321 Requirements for certificate of study.

(D) Authority for approval of all certificate programs shall rest with the council on academic affairs. Proposal for graduate certificates must also receive the approval of the council on research and graduate studies. The president of the university and the university senate shall be regularly informed of council actions in this regard. (B/T 2/2/79, B/T 2/3/84, B/T 7/12/85)

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the foregoing amendments to the <u>Bylaws of the Board</u> of <u>Trustees</u> and <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> be adopted as recommended by the University Senate.

#### Mathew F. Dee

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on May 31, 1985, of Mathew F. Dee, Assistant Dean Emeritus in the College of Law - Library.

Mathew F. Dee was born on May 16, 1931, in Parma, Ohio. In 1952, before completing his B.A. degree at Western Reserve University in Cleveland, he was one of the first patients to have open-heart surgery. His physical problems did

not deter him from obtaining his degree in 1954. From 1954 to 1959 he taught French in the Cleveland public schools. It was indicative of his determination to persevere in spite of difficulties that he changed careers and in 1961 received a M.S. in L.S. degree from Case Western University. From 1961 to 1963 he was Law Librarian with the Cleveland law firm of Jones, Day, Cockley and Reavis. In 1963 he came to The Ohio State University Libraries as Assistant Personnel Librarian. In 1965 he served as Assistant Head of Department Libraries, then in 1965-1966 he became Acting Director of Personnel for The Ohio State University Libraries.

Dean Dee came to The Ohio State University Law Library as Assistant Director of Research Services in 1966. In 1972 he was named Assistant Dean and Director of the Law Library. Dean Dee held this position until his retirement in 1984.

Dean Dee was active in the American Association of Law Libraries, serving on the Committee for Indexing Legal Periodicals, and Chapters Committee. He also served as President of the Ohio Regional Association of Law Libraries in 1969 and in 1970. Dean Dee contributed articles to both the <u>Law Library</u> Journal and the Ohio Library Association Bulletin.

As a dedicated law librarian who did more than build a law collection, Dean Dee also was a public service librarian who maintained an open door policy for all users of the Library. He was particularly accessible to all law students for discussion of their concerns. This selfless humanitarian style led to lasting friendships with many of the law students. As a teacher and a librarian, the individual was his greatest concern and his awareness of their feelings and anxieties was characteristic of his approach to law librarianship.

Although Dean Dee died at an early age, he led a full life of successfully pursuing two careers, and contributing to the well-being of the College of Law, the students and his colleagues.

Dr. Johnson, Professor of Conservation, born 1915 in Pine River, Minnesota, received the Bachelor of Education degree in 1939 from the St. Cloud State College, Minnesota; Master of Science degree in 1947 and the Doctor of Philosophy degree in 1951, both from The Ohio State University. Prior to his joining the faculty in the Department of Zoology in 1951, he spent many years

teaching biology and conservation at the high school and college level. He also served as supervisor of conservation education for the Ohio Department of Education.

Professor Johnson contributed to the conservation education effort at The Ohio State University through the Department of Zoology and the Natural Resources Institute. These contributions led to the establishment of the School of Natural Resources. He became one of the original faculty members in the School upon its establishment in 1968. He dedicated much effort to the curriculum development which led to the acceptance by the Board of Regents of a Tagged Degree in Natural Resources.

Professor Johnson taught all of the core courses of the School of Natural Resources at one time or another and served as director of the Barnebey Center for Environmental Studies located in Lancaster, Ohio, and assisted in helping that facility grow and develop. He positively influenced the academic and professional development of thousands of students in the conservation and natural resources area. Through his guidance, advice, and example, he stimulated thousands of students to pursue rigorous academic programs and to develop professional competence far beyond those levels the students thought possible. His unselfish contributions to provide better environmental educational opportunities for our youth caused all of us who knew him to value his efforts and to mourn his passing.

# Harold F. Mathis

Professor Mathis was born in Wichita Falls, Texas, on July 19, 1916. He received the Bachelor of Science degree in Electrical Engineering from the University of Oklahoma in 1939 and the Master of Science degree from Texas A & M University in 1941. He was awarded professional Electrical Engineer degrees from Texas A & M University in 1952 and the University of Oklahoma in 1955. He received a Ph.D. degree in Electrical Engineering from Northwestern University in 1953 and a Ph.D. degree in Education from Case Western Reserve University in 1961.

Prior to joining the faculty of The Ohio State University in 1960, he served as Associate Professor of Electrical Engineering at the University of Oklahoma from 1949-54 and as a research engineer for Goodyear Aircraft Corporation from 1954-60. He also served in the United States Navy in both World War II and the Korean War and retired with the rank of Commander.

During his 24 years on the OSU faculty, he provided distinguished service to his students and to the University prior to his retirement in 1984. He was an extremely versatile individual, holding Ph.D.'s in both Electrical Engineering and Education, and having done graduate work in mathematics as well. This broad background is indicated by the diversity of his publications. He published over 50 articles or papers in such areas as antennas, transmission lines, network theory and electromagnetic radomes and lenses, and mathematics.

His very broad and general background and interests made him a very valuable member of this faculty. He taught courses in a wide variety of technical topics. He made strong contributions in teaching foundation level courses to sophomores who were beginning their study of electrical engineering.

Dr. Mathis' service to his profession and his community was exemplary. He was a member of a large number of professional societies and participated actively in many of them. He was a member of the University Chapter of the American Legion and served on the Board of Trustees and the Board of Deacons of the Mountview Baptist Church. He also served as a technical consultant to a number of industrial firms.

#### John Seidler

John Seidler was born in Los Angeles, California, December 19, 1933. He completed his high school education at Loyola in Los Angeles in June 1951. In 1965 he received a Masters of Theology from Santa Clara University, magna cum laude; his MA and Ph.D. in sociology from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1969 and 1972, respectively. He joined The Ohio State University Department of Sociology in 1971 as an Instructor. He was promoted to Assistant Professor in 1972 and to Associate Professor in 1977.

Dr. Seidler's major substantive areas of interest were social organization, sociology of religion, collective behavior and social movements, research methodology, and sociological theory. He had just completed a major monograph on The Agony and Triumph of Modernization--A Study of the American <u>Catholic Church</u>. He also authored and co-authored many articles published in professional journals.

#### Albert Shapero

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on May 23, 1985, of Albert Shapero, the William H. Davis Chair in the American Free Enterprise System, Academic Faculty of Management and Human Resources.

Mr. Shapero was born May 16, 1921, in Ontario, Canada, but was a U.S. Citizen at birth. He received his bachelors and masters degrees at the University of California at Berkeley.

Professor Shapero was recognized internationally as a leading scholar in the field of entrepreneurship. He wrote almost 100 book chapters, monographs, invited papers, reports, and articles on various subjects relevant to economic and industrial development. His creative research and his work with doctoral students had a significant impact on research and teaching of entrepreneurship in major American universities. His areas of interest included economic and industrial development, management of professional enterprises, information-communication behavior, managerial design, and entrepreneurship. His research was supported by the Economic Development Administration, the Small Business Administration, the Ozarks Regional Committee, the Air Force Office of Scientific Research, the National Science Foundation, and the Denver Research Institute.

Professor Shapero served on the faculty of The Ohio State University College of Administrative Science since 1978. Prior to that appointment he served as Professor of Management at the University of Texas at Austin from 1966 to 1978. He was a visiting professor at the University of South Africa and the University of Stellenbosch in South Africa during the summers of 1976 and 1977. Most recently he served as a visiting professor at Babson College in the fall of 1984. He served as a visiting faculty member at the International Institute for the Management of Technology in Milano, Italy, in 1972 and 1973 and at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology Sloan School in 1968. Early in his career he worked as Director of the Division of Management of Technology at the Stanford Research Institute and as an engineer for Radioplane Corporation and Hughes Aircraft.

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President Jennings made the following statement:

It is clear from the figures for the 1985-86 budget that this is the most promising fiscal outlook for the institution that has been presented to this Board in several years. Our recovery from the difficulties of the past budget cutbacks has been slow and deliberate, and our allocations and projections must of course remain conservative. However, the overall picture is undoubtedly brighter for Ohio State. We owe much of the credit for these new opportunities for progress to the foresight of the General Assembly and the Governor. For the new biennium, it is clear that both political parties have placed a high priority on excellence in higher education for the State of Ohio.

I want to make special note of the state's strong effort to improve accessibility and college-going rates in Ohio by reducing the share of college costs that students must pay through their tuition. I pledged at the last meeting of the Board that our response to adequate Instructional Subsidy funding, would be a further effort to do more to enhance accessibility at Ohio State. The budget presented here, represents our fulfillment of that pledge. We have held the average of all fee increases for our students to under four percent for 1985-86; and, with this budget, there will be no increase in tuition at Ohio State for the second year of the biennium.

Also encouraging is the state's continued emphasis on academic quality through the expanded Selective Excellence initiatives. Last year, the Eminent Scholars competition and the undergraduate Program Excellence Awards represented important first steps. This

year, the state budget incorporates several progressive moves to strengthen Ohio's economic redevelopment potential through funding for higher education.

In particular, the new Research Challenge matching grants provide a great opportunity for Ohio State, in our traditional university role as the heart of the research efforts that are so important to the future. We will be working in close consultation with the Board of Regents, as well as with our faculty, on the allocation decisions that will be forthcoming under the Research Challenge, to ensure the greatest possible return for the University and the state on this long-term investment in research and scholarship.

Ohio State has continued, even during the past severe budgetary constraints, to implement the selective excellence concept within the institution. We have moved forward to help ourselves in the pursuit of excellence through selective internal reallocations of scarce resources. The new one-percent Academic Challenge funds provided by the state this year will allow us to expand our own efforts to identify academic programs which already are outstanding, or which have the potential to very quickly achieve pre-eminence with an infusion of new funding.

Last year, special budget allocations were provided to recognize the excellence of political science, chemistry, and manufacturing engineering. For the coming academic year, three more outstanding programs have been singled out for similar recognition. Special allocations for 1985-86 have been made for dance, physics, and history. We congratulate the faculty members of these areas on their past achievements, and on the ambitious and coherent plans that each of these departments has in place for expanding and strengthening its academic stature.

Finally, I want to note another major new development for the University. On July 3, the Governor signed into law a bill in which the State of Ohio provides the University, for the first time in its history, with full budgetary authority for our Classified Civil Service staff members. We are all well-aware and deeply appreciative of the important contributions by the support staff of the University, who make the academic achievements of our faculty and students possible.

It is our staff members who undertake the day-to-day business of keeping the University running smoothly. We are very pleased that the Current Funds Budget presented today, includes raises for the Classified Civil Service staff affected by this new legislation as an addition to the provisional budget adopted by the Board last month. We will in the future include recommendations for those Civil Service staff members as part of the University's normal budget processes.

# 1985-86 CURRENT FUNDS BUDGET

Synopsis: The budget for 1985-86 is being submitted for adoption.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That student fees be increased by an average of 4 percent beginning Autumn Quarter, 1985, and that the Schedule of Student Fees effective Autumn Quarter, 1985, be hereby approved; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Secretary be instructed to incorporate all supporting documents into the minutes of this meeting, including salary rolls with promotions, and fees and charges for the Fiscal Year 1985-86, and to file these materials with the official records of this University.

Mr. Havens made the following statement:

Before we ask for a motion on the President's report and recommendations, I would like to read a report from the Personnel Committee of the Board.

The Personnel Committee of this Board met last night and the following report is submitted to the Board of Trustees.

As a Board, we have continued the practice of making an ongoing evaluation of the President's performance and we believe that our assessment of his performance should be publicly recorded. Last year it was noted that President Jennings' leadership, service, dedication and achievements on behalf of the University had been exceptional. This year we have again concluded that on the basis of demonstrable results his performance has been noteworthy and deserving of recognition. Given his performance and continued excellence in leadership we have concluded that he merits a salary increase commensurate with his achievements. We recommend a salary increase of \$8,000.00.

The Secretary of the Board is hereby authorized and directed to develop the appropriate documents/agreements to implement this compensation change.

# 1985-86 CURRENT FUNDS BUDGET THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY

# I. INTRODUCTION

In June, 1985, this Board approved budget guidelines and a provisional budget for the 1985-86 fiscal year. These approvals were in anticipation of the funding authorization from the State of Ohio in the budget bill then under consideration.

The Ohio General Assembly proceeded to pass budget legislation for the 1985-87 biennium and the Governor has signed this legislation. The level of State funds provided for the 1985-86 fiscal year will enable this University to support the budget guidelines authorized by this Board on June 7, 1985, including keeping the increases in University fees and charges to an average rate not to exceed 4 percent.

# II. SOURCES OF FUNDS

The sources of current funds in support of the 1985-86 budget total \$827,857,000, as detailed in the Sources of Income to Support 1985-86 Budget. This amount includes State support totaling \$267,653,000, which incorporates the estimated shares to be received by Ohio State from the competitive allocations. Of these sources of funds, Columbus Campus general funds represent 43 percent of the total with earnings operations generating 32 percent, restricted grants and contracts 19 percent, and the regional campuses revenues with OARDC totaling 6 percent.

Included in Ohio State's 1985-86 budget are two important new components of State funding for selective excellence which will greatly assist this University in extending its excellence in teaching and research. The State will provide an additional one percent of the instructional subsidy amount each year of the 1985-87 biennium as an academic challenge. These funds will be directed toward expanding the efforts initiated by Ohio State last year of further enhancing the quality of selected programs recognized nationally as outstanding in their fields. These Academic Challenge monies are expected to total \$2,135,200 during 1985-86.

The State's Research Challenge support has been created to stimulate increased research activity throughout higher education in Ohio. The State has authorized about \$12 million in 1985-86 and \$16 million in 1986-87, which is to be distributed on a formula basis recognizing the amounts of sponsored research dollars each university has been earning. While the Board of Regents have yet

to define the process for allocating these important new research monies, Ohio State can expect to receive around \$5.3 million in 1985-86 based upon proven experience in sponsored research activities.

The budget guidelines approved in June, 1985, included a 4 percent increase in student fees, and the final State budget provided no additional funding which would have enabled this University to further reduce the high percentage of students' contribution to their costs for higher education. While every effort is being made to improve student accessibility through moderate student tuition increases, quality education continues to be the highest priority. Therefore, the average increase in student fees has been recommended at 4 percent effective Autumn Quarter, 1985. However, with the instructional subsidy support provided in the State biennial budget, Ohio State will be able to retain those tuition rates through the 1985-87 biennium.

Every effort has been made to maintain all fees and charges of the University within an overall average of 4 percent, and this result has been achieved with the final average being 3.34 percent. Even more important to achieving the goal of improved accessibility is that the charges to typical students averaged less than 4 percent. The increase in typical student charges ranges from 3.62 to 3.88 percent, as detailed in the supporting budget materials.

III. USES OF FUNDS

As detailed in the summary of Budgeted Expenditures for 1985-86 and the supporting documents, this University's current fund expenditures total \$827,694,000, in support of the budget guidelines authorized by this Board at its meeting on June 7, 1985.

Legislation recently passed by the Ohio General Assembly gives The Ohio State University the authority to determine the wages of University classified civil service employees who are not members of certified bargaining units. In the past, the University was able to set the wages only for faculty and professional staff members; wages for classified civil service staff were determined by the Ohio General Assembly.

The 1985-86 budget includes the recommendation that the base hourly rates of the current classified pay schedule be adjusted to reflect an average annual pay increase for Classified Civil Service employees who are not members of certified bargaining units, including step increases, of 6.5 percent. In the future, recommendations for wage increases for Classified Civil Service employees who are not members of a certified bargaining unit will be regularized and presented to the Board during the University's general budget process each spring, with raises generally effective with the start of each new fiscal year.

The level of funding provided from State funds will support the expenditure of \$8.0 million in one-time funds for equipment enhancements, facilities renovations and acquisition of library materials. However, of this amount only \$5.5 million is available from central resources, with the \$2.5 million balance to be provided from college and departmental resources as matching support. It is important that both years of the 1985-87 biennium be considered in our budget planning since State funding has been authorized for the two-year period. With the amount of State funding provided in Amended House Bill 238, budget plans for the biennium will require continued reallocations from existing college and departmental budgets. The reallocation target for this biennium is 2.5 percent of the 1985-86 base budgets, which will be planned and implemented during the 1985-87 biennium.

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# **Commencement Speaker**

#### Amos H. Lynch, Sr. Doctor of Humane Letters

Amos H. Lynch has been an important influence in the Columbus black community for more than three decades, first as managing editor and advertising and promotions director of *The Ohio Sentinel* and then, since 1962, as general manager of *The Columbus Call* and Post—Columbus' only black-owned and blackoperated newspaper. Lynch has been recognized many times for his journalistic accomplishments with merit awards from the National Newspaper Publishers Association.

In the community, he has been vice chairman of the Columbus Area Chamber of Commerce, treasurer of the Columbus Urban League, president and executive secretary of the Mt. Vernon Avenue District Improvement Association, and coordinator of the Columbus Leadership Conference. Lynch is a trustee of St. Anthony Hospital and is currently involved with the Employment and Education Commission of Franklin County, the United Negro College Fund's Columbus Campaign Advisory Council, and the local United Way Advisory Board. He has been active in a large number of other community service organizations and efforts in the past. He has been recognized for his role in the community with numerous awards and citations, including "Man of the Year" honors from the Spring Street YMCA, East High School, and The Columbus Citizen-Journal.

A graduate of Columbus South High School, Lynch attended Ohio State and served in the Navy during World War II. Ohio State is proud to recognize this important community leader for the continued dedication and inspiration he provides to his fellow citizens.

# **Recipients of Honors**

### F. Miles Flickinger, M.D. Distinguished Service Award

One of the most influential leaders in the establishment of The Ohio State University at Lima is F. Miles Flickinger. He has been associated with Ohio State for half a century as student and loyal alumnus. He earned his bachelor's, master's, and medical degrees from Ohio State and has had a surgical practice in Lima since 1946. He was one of the individuals who provided support-both financially and through his counsel---to expand the University's involvement in Lima from its initial offering of courses in Lima Senior High School. Flickinger was a member of the first organized support group for the campus, known as the "Friends of the Lima Campus," and has been a member of the Lima Campus Citizen Council since 1975. He also was one of the first alumni appointed to represent regional campuses on the Alumni Association's Alumni Advisory Council. Flickinger is a member and past president of the Alumni Association. He has been a loyal supporter of both the Lima campus and the College of Medicine and is a member of The Presidents Club. Flickinger has helped Lima-area students further their educations through the Flickinger Family Foundation.

Beyond the Lima campus, Flickinger has been an active community leader as well. He has been a trustee of Lima Technical College, Trinity Methodist Church, the Ohio Methodist Theological School, and the Lima Chapter of the American Red Cross, a board member and president of the Boy Scouts' Shawnee Council, president of the Lima Kiwanis Club, and vice president of the Lima Area Association of Commerce. Flickinger is a fellow of the American College of Surgicol Society of America. Ohio State is proud to honor this dedicated alumnus.

### John W. Nelson Distinguished Service Award

During his 30 years on the faculty of Ohio State's College of Pharmacy, John W. Nelson not only helped to shape the college's national reputation for excellence but also the building in which the college is housed. Nelson received his bachelor's degree in pharmacy from Purdue and his master's and doctoral degrees in pharmacology from the University of Florida and Purdue University, respectively. He joined the faculty of the Division of Pharmacology in 1947 as associate professor after teaching at the University of Georgia and Oregon State College. He was head of the division from 1948 to 1968, acting chair in 1973-74, and chair in 1976-77. He retired as professor emeritus in 1977. Nelson developed the College of Pharmacy's graduate program in pharmacology, which is recognized as one of the leading programs in pharmacy education in the nation. He was instrumental in the recruitment of outstanding faculty members who were committed to his goals of sound teaching coupled with high-quality research. Beyond his efforts to build the academic program, Nelson was coordinator in charge of planning and construction of Lloyd M. Parks Hall and spent countless hours working with the architects to ensure that the facility would complement the excellent programs it would house. His colleagues affectionately referred to the building as "the house that Jack built."

During his faculty career, Nelson was active in college and University affairs as well as in the American Pharmaceutical Association and the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy. Nelson was a frequent guest lecturer and seminar instructor and wrote more than 50 publications in his areas of interest. The University proudly recognizes his contributions to excellence in pharmacy education.

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# RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

Resolution No. 86-23

Synopsis: Resolutions honoring the service of five of the University's faculty members who have recently died are being proposed.

RESOLVED. That the Board adopt the following Resolutions in Memoriam and that the President be requested to convey a copy to the families of the deceased.

#### Erwin E. Dreese

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on August 8, 1985, of Erwin E. Dreese, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Electrical Engineering.

Born September 10, 1895, in Millbrook, Michigan, Professor Dreese attended the University of Michigan, where he received the B.S.E. Electrical Engineering degree in 1920, the Master of Science degree in Electrical Engineering in 1922 and the professional degree, Electrical Engineer in 1930. He also served in the U.S. Army in 1917 and 1918, reaching the rank of Lieutenant in the Signal Corps.

He remained at the University of Michigan as an Instructor in the Department of Electrical Engineering from 1920-25, before joining the Lincoln Electric Company as Chief Engineer. He left this position in 1930 to become Professor and Chairman of The Ohio State University Department of Electrical Engineering; he held this position until his retirement in 1965.

Professor Dreese assumed leadership of the department when electrical engineering was a field with limited scope. Electronics was a developing field, but of primary concern

were power distribution and the rather narrow application of electronics to broadcast communication. His tenure as Chairman saw tremendous growth in his profession, beginning with a strengthening of its mathematical and physical bases and developing into a field which produced radars, computers, transistors, servomechanisms and the vast array of technological products which have resulted from these and developments. His leadership throughout this other revolutionary period enabled the department to grow into one as a center of excellence both nationally and known internationally. His period as Chairman was an extremely productive one by any measure. In the early 1940's he initiated a strong research activity in the department. This has continued to develop and to maintain international stature continuously since that time. He created an academic environment which attracted outstanding faculty members from the U.S. and foreign countries to teach for him and outstanding students from throughout the world to study under them. Many graduates from this period went on to become widely recognized leaders in education, research, and industry.

In 1953, he received the Distinguished Alumnus Award from the University of Michigan. He was also a fellow of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers. In 1974, The Ohio State University honored Professor Dreese and recognized his contributions to the University by changing the name of the Electronics Building to the Erwin E. Dreese Laboratory of Electrical Engineering.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Professor Dreese its deepest sympathy. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as an expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy.

#### Franklin D. Findley

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on June 5, 1985, of Franklin Doyle Findley, Associate Professor and Extension Agent, Agriculture and Community and Natural Resource Development in Wayne County.

An Ohio native, Mr. Findley joined the faculty in 1962 as a 4-H Agent in Wayne County. In 1966, he became the Agricultural Agent in Holmes County. Three years later he returned to Wayne County as the Agricultural Agent. Both Mr. Findley's Bachelor and Master degrees were earned at OSU.

Mr. Findley's leadership in Extension programs was widely recognized throughout Wayne County, northeast Ohio and the State. He was a quiet, but effective leader and teacher of both adults and youth clientele, and worked very effectively with many other agencies and groups. He was particularly effective with conservation tillage/no-tillage crop demonstrations, alfalfa production, grain production and marketing, pesticide certification training, farm financial management and small farm programs. He also gave leadership to a number of community and natural resource development programs including county-wide planning and waste disposal efforts. He used the expertise of key leaders in the county to assist in planning and organizing Extension programs.

Mr. Findley was an effective communicator. He used news columns and radio shows in addition to preparing original materials for his educational programs. For his outstanding performance in this area, Mr. Findley received six national awards. He was also recognized on numerous occasions by local groups and statewide organizations.

## Eugene O. McLean

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on June 20, 1985, of Eugene O. McLean, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Agronomy.

Professor McLean was born in Nixa, Missouri, on February 14, 1919. He received three academic degrees from the University of Missouri, a Bachelor's degree in soil fertility in 1942; a Masters degree in soil fertility in 1943; and a Ph.D. degree in soil chemistry in 1948. He was an Assistant Professor in the Department of Agronomy at the University of Missouri until 1950. He held the ranks of Assistant and Associate Professor while at the University of Arkansas from 1950 to 1956. He joined the faculty of The Ohio State University 1956 as Associate Professor and was promoted to Professor in 1958. His career of service to the University continued until his retirement in May 1985.

Professor McLean was elected Fellow of the American Society of Argonomy and Fellow of the Soil Science Society of America. He advised over 60 graduate students, more than one-fourth of whom came from developing countries. He

published over 100 articles on soil chemistry and soil fertility. His procedure for determining the quantity of limestone to add to acid soils is used worldwide. He was active on the Graduate School Committees and Departmental Committees related to graduate education. He was Secretary, and later President of the OSA Chapter of Sigma Xi. His loyalty to the University and his dedication to education inspired his colleagues.

## Frank C. Starr

Dr. Starr received his D.D.S. degree from OSU in 1915. He joined the faculty at The Ohio State University College of Dentistry in 1915. He was Chairman of the Crown and Bridge Section during his 42 years of service.

He was a veteran of World War I, retiring at the rank of Colonel. He served as attending Dental Surgeon with the American Red Cross Hospital #2 in France. He received a citation from President Truman for meritorious service in serving as State Chairman, Procurement and Assignment on the War Man Power Committee. He was the last surviving charter member of University Lodge 631 F&AM. He was Past Potentate Aladdin Temple Shrine, 1947, and a charter member of Cabiri, 1947.

Dr. Starr was a Fellow of the American College of Dentistry. He was a Past President of the Columbus Dental Society. He was a member of the Ohio and American Dental Associations and a charter member of the American Academy of Crown and Bridge Prosthodontics. He was a member of Royal Society of Health, London, England and Pierre Fouchard Academie. He was listed in International Blue Book of <u>Who's</u> <u>Who</u> and <u>The American Men of Science</u>. He was a member of Rotary International and the University Faculty Club.

Her career of service to the University extended from 1953 to her retirement as Professor Emeritus in 1974.

Professor Woods was an active member of the American Physical Therapy Association. She was recognized as a member of <u>Who's Who of American Women</u>, as an Honorary Member of Mortar Board at The Ohio State University, and she received many awards for her professional service. Her loyalty to the University and her dedication to the Physical Therapy profession inspired her colleagues.

An annual award of at least \$5,000 shall be made to the award recipient, provided sufficient earnings are available, and award recipients may be selected more than once by the award committee.

Should no Resident Award be made for five consecutive years beginning in 1986, an award may be given to a Distinguished Urologist chosen by the award committee who will serve in residence for one week in the Division of Urology at The Ohio State University to present papers, demonstrate surgery, conduct conferences and rounds with the Urology residents and students or other events as determined by the Director of Urology.

Should the income accumulate for ten consecutive years without being awarded to a Urology resident or Distinguished Urologist, then \$25,000 from the principal and income of the Chester C. Winter Urology Research Award shall be distributed to the Cary Winter Memorial Library Fund and the remainder used in full to support Urology research at The Ohio State University as deemed appropriate by the Director of the Division of Urology.

Should the need for this fund cease to exist or in the event The Ohio State University Division of Urology is dissolved, then the income is to be used by the Department of Surgery or its equivalent at The Ohio State University to support activities related to Urology.

The attached guidelines are to be followed in administering this endowment and distribution of earnings.

This award is to be given to an Ohio State University Resident in Urology who fulfills the following criteria. It will be presented no more than once a year whether funds are available or not and a person may be selected more than once.

The Chester C. Winter Urology Research Award (contd) Rules for winning the award are as follows:

- (1) The candidate must write a paper describing his (her) research in the field of Urology (laboratory, clinical or new instrumentation). An essay without personal involvement in the research will not be eligible.
- (2) The candidate must be a bona fide Resident in Urology (first year or more in the Urology Division) in The Ohio State University Urology Program according to the criteria of the American Board of Urology and the American Medical Association Urology Residency Review Committee. The recipient must be the principal investigator and senior author of the research paper.
- (3) The candidate's research must win a prize of national stature (lst. 2nd, 3rd or lst Honorable Mention) such as given at the Annual Meeting of the American Urological Association or at one of its eight Sections.
- (4) The evidence for winning will be reviewed by a committee of three to determine the legitimacy and merit of the research and the national prize won in order to make the award. This committee will consist of the Director of the Division of Urology at The Ohio State University (Chairperson), the Chairperson of the Department of Surgery at The Ohio State University and Dr. Chester C. Winter. In the event of Dr. Winter's death or unavailability, the third committee member will be the Chief of Pediatric Urology at The Ohio State University.
- (5) The monetary award to the recipient will be at least \$5,000. The money will come from the earnings of the Chester C. Winter Urology Research Award Endowment Fund set up for this purpose at The Ohio State University. If insufficient earnings are available, the money will be paid the recipient when it becomes available at a later date.
- (6) Every effort should be made to have the recipient of the award present his research paper at a meeting of The Ohio State University Medical Society at which time the award will be presented. An appropriate certificate concerning the award suitable for framing will be presented with the monetary award.

(7) If no award is given during a period of five consecutive years beginning in 1986, the money earned by the Fund may be disbursed as follows:

An award of at least \$5,000 may be given to a Distinguished Urologist (chosen by the award committee) who will spend five days (Monday through Friday) in residence at the Division of Urology of The Ohio State University in order to present papers, demonstrate surgery, conduct conferences and rounds with the Urology residents and students or other events in a schedule prepared by the Director of Urology. He will be presented an appropriate plaque. In addition, his travel, lodging and dining expenses will be paid from the Fund. This Distinguished Urologist Award may be given as often as earned income from the Fund is available under conditions contingent upon a Resident Award not being given.

(8) If no award is given to a Urology resident or Distinguished Urologist over a period of ten consecutive years, all the money in the Fund may be disbursed as follows:

First, the Cary Winter Memorial Library Fund in the Division of Urology at The Ohio State University will be given \$25,000. Second, the remainder of the Fund will be used to support research in the Division of Urology at The Ohio State University at the discretion of its Director.

- (9) In the event the Division (or Department) of Urology is dissolved, then the Fund should be administered by the Surgery Department and the money used to support appropriate u ologic endeavors.
- (10) The award committee must notify the Urology Residents annually in July of the availability and rules for winning the award.

Synopsis: Approval for a Preferred Provider Organization utilizing University Hospitals, Children's Hospital and University Physicians as exclusive providers is proposed.

### PREFERRED PROVIDER ORGANIZATION (contd)

WHEREAS in May 1983 a Feasibility Study Committee for a Faculty and Staff Health Care Program recommended that the University establish some form of an alternate health benefit program which might include a University Preferred Provider Organization (PPO) or Health Maintenance Organization (HMO); and

WHEREAS in July 1984 the University contracted with Towers, Perrin, Forster & Crosby (TPF&C) to undertake an in-depth study of HMO's and other Alternate Delivery Systems which would meet the following objectives:

- improve the attractiveness of the health benefits to faculty and staff.
- increase faculty and staff usage of University medical facilities,
- 3. help control the growth of medical benefit costs,
- begin working toward a delivery system which could possibly be marketed to groups outside the University; and

WHEREAS in January 1985 TPF&C submitted its report to the University recommending that the University establish a Preferred Provider option for its faculty and staff utilizing University Hospitals, Children's Hospital, and University Physicians as exclusive providers of services; and

WHEREAS in May 1985 the University established specifications for a preferred provider organization and requested proposals from 21 interested parties/insurance companies to act as a third party administrator for that program; five of whom responded; and

WHEREAS the appropriate University offices together with an independent outside consultant have reviewed and evaluated the proposals and recommended that the University select the John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance Company as the third party administrator for its PPO:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the University establish an alternate health care delivery program in the form of a Preferred Provider Organization utilizing University Hospitals, Children's Hospital and University Physicians as exclusive providers; and

BE IT RESOLVED, That in the event the Board of Trustees is required to take action to accept a gift, bequest, or devise to The Ohio State University by a certain date which makes it impractical for the Board to accept the gift, bequest, or devise before the next meeting of this Board, the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance, in consultation with the Chairman of the Board of Trustees or the Chairman of the Fiscal Affairs Committee of this Board, be authorized to act on behalf of and in the name of this Board to accept and acquire title to such gifts, bequests, and devises that they determine, after appropriate review and evaluation, are in the best interests of the University and that such gifts, bequests, and devises be accepted as gifts to the University through The Ohio State University Development Fund; and

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### SUPPORT LEVEL FOR ENDOWED CHAIRS AND PROFESSORSHIPS

Resolution No. 86-29

Synopsis: Minimum support level for "Endowed Chairs" raised from \$750,000 to \$1,250,000; for "Endowed Professorships" from \$250,000 to \$500,000 is proposed.

WHEREAS the Board of Trustees on January 14, 1965, approved a set of guidelines for the establishment of "Named Chairs" and "Named Professorships," which were subsequently modified March 3, 1972, and renamed "Endowed Chairs" and "Endowed Professorships"; and

WHEREAS the guidelines were revised on May 5, 1978, to require minimum support levels of \$750,000 to establish an "Endowed Chair" and \$250,000 to establish an "Endowed Professorship"; and

WHEREAS these levels of support are no longer adequate to generate the resources needed to attract and/or retain the distinguished faculty leadership that is so vital to the University:

#### NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That support in the amount of \$1,250,000 or more will be recognized by the establishment of a permanent "Chair" which will provide an enduring memorial to the donor and bear the donor's name or an appropriate name of the donor's designation. The fund will be invested in the University's endowment, and the income will be used to provide salary or program support for truly distinguished scholars in the academic field of the donor's interest; and

### James C. Good

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on June 2, 1985, of James C. Good, M.D., Clinical Professor in the College of Medicine, Department of Family Medicine.

#### James C. Good (contd)

Dr. Good was born February 23, 1926, in Dayton, Ohio. He received his A.B. degree in bacteriology from The Ohio State University in 1949, his M.D. degree from The Ohio State University in 1953, and served a rotating internship in 1953-54 at Grant Hospital in Columbus. He was fond of his practice in family medicine and was one of a vanguard of physicians to be involved in nourishing the field to specialty status in 1969. To prove his commitment he qualified himself, by examination, as a charter diplomate of the American Board of Family Practice in 1970, and was recertified in 1976 and 1982.

Dr. Good became a Clinical Instructor in Preventive Medicine in 1969 and was one of the original instructors in the first family medicine clinic established that year. When the Department of Family Medicine was organized in 1974, he became one of the first faculty members of this fledgling department and was promoted to Clinical Assistant Professor in September 1975. He gave unstintingly of his time in teaching medical students behavioral science, interviewing skills, physical examination skills, and family medicine.

Dr. Good was a pioneer in other medical pursuits as well. When promoting breast feeding was thought to lead to anemia, he documented the contrary and published the supporting data from his own practice in 1976. He fought to admit fathers to labor and delivery rooms, to make parenting a family affair, and talked his mothers through labor before the Lamaze method was invented.

Dr. Good was active in the Medical Corps of the National Guard and rose to the rank of Brigadier General, Commander, 112th Medical Brigade; and Chief Surgeon, Ohio Army National Guard. He was the highest ranking officer of the Ohio National Guard. He was also a member of the Army Surgeon General's Reserve Affairs Council.

Dr. Good left a loving family of eight children and eleven grandchildren who are all fine examples of his devotion to and love of family.

His former partner said it best when he said, "because he was here, there were lots of changes made."

## Guy W. Miller

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on July 18, 1985, of Guy W. Miller, Professor Emeritus in the Cooperative Extension Service.

Professor Miller was born September 14, 1892, and reared on a farm near Pataskala in Licking County, Ohio. He graduated from Reynoldsburg High School and in 1919 received a Bachelor of Science degree from the College of Agriculture at The Ohio State University. He earned his Master of Science degree from Cornell University in 1925. During World War I he served as a 1st Lieutenant in the U.S. Army.

In 1919 he began his professional career when he was appointed County Agricultural Extension Agent in Trumbull County, Ohio. He served in this position for seven years, during which time he acquired a significant interest and expertise in the economics of dairy farming. In 1926 he Extension Economist with an the Agricultural became Extension Service for The Ohio State University. He became an Associate Professor in 1934 and a Professor in 1945. He was soon recognized by his peers as well as agricultural leaders throughout Ohio as an authority on the economics of farming, especially dairy farming. His counsel and advice was sought by many and his speaking schedule was always full. He was a firm believer in the importance of farm records in helping farmers make profitable management decisions. He was responsible for starting the farm record keeping program in the mid-20's, which culminated in the farm business analysis program being carried on in the 1980's in the Department of Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology at The Ohio State University.

Professor Miller was also a pioneer in the field of international agriculture. In 1952 he was granted a two-year leave of absence from The Ohio State University to serve as an agricultural economic advisor to the Government of Pakistan under the Technical Cooperation Administration, then called the Point IV Program of the U.S. Government. From 1955 to 1957 he returned to Pakistan in a similar

capacity. He retired from The Ohio State University in 1958, and from 1959 to 1960 served as an agricultural advisor to the Food and Agriculture Commission of Pakistan as a representative of the World Bank. Among his many significant accomplishments in Pakistan, noteworthy is the fact that he was mainly responsible for the creation of three departments of agricultural economics in that country.

Guy Miller was respected by all who knew him throughout his life. He had maintained interest in and supported agricultural economics programs at Ohio State during his retirement. He was also an avid "Buckeye" sports fan his entire life.

#### Claude S. Perry

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on August 13, 1985, of Dr. Claude S. Perry, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Ophthalmology, College of Medicine.

Dr. Perry was born June 3, 1899, in Warren, Ohio. He graduated from Ohio Wesleyan University in 1922 and received his Medical Degree from Western Reserve University in 1926. He completed his residency in Ophthalmology at Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit, and did post-graduate work in Ophthalmology at the University of Vienna, Austria.

Dr. Perry was appointed to the College of Medicine, Department of Ophthalmology, as an Instructor in 1933. He retired at the rank of Professor Emeritus July 1, 1969.

Dr. Perry was the leading ophthalmologist in Ohio for many decades, enjoying the trust of his patients and the respect of his colleagues. He was a member of the Ohio Commission for the Blind; Consulting Ophthalmologist to the State Division of Social Administration; and Chief Ophthalmologist for the Ohio State School for the Blind. Through these appointments he contributed greatly to the medical care and rehabilitation of thousands of blind Ohioians.

He was awarded an Honorary Degree of Doctor of Science by Ohio Wesleyan in 1958, and served as Staff Ophthalmologist at the Ohio State Welfare Department and the Ohio State School for the Blind. He was Medical Advisor for the Board for Crippled Children, a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons, and a member of the American Association of Physicians and Surgeons. Dr. Perry was also a member of the American Medical Society, National and State Society for the Prevention of Blindness, and National Medical Foundation for Eye Care. Dr. Perry was a member of Sigma Xi, Phi Zeta, Alpha Sigma Phi, Alpha Kappa Kappa, Torch Club, Faculty Club, and a Charter Member of the Medical Forum. As a Veteran of the World War II Medical Corps, he served as Colonel and received the Army Commendation Medal, Bronze Star and Purple Heart.

In the field of legislation, Dr. Perry was responsible for the Ohio law providing immediate emergency hospital care for those having Gonorrheal Ophthalmia, regardless of their ability to pay. In 1941 he initiated legislation to prohibit the sale or possession of fireworks by the general public.

Among Dr. Perry's outstanding accomplishments in the field of research was the development of a technique and the actual performance of operations for intra-capsular cataract extractions in small animals. This work was done in cooperation with The Ohio State University College of Veterinary Medicine.

On behalf of the University community and the Department of Ophthalmology, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Dr. Perry its deepest sympathy. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as an expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy.

#### James C. Yocum

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on August 6, 1985, of James C. Yocum, Professor Emeritus in the College of Administrative Science - Support Services.

Professor Yocum was born on May 18, 1906, in Massillon, Ohio. He received the Bachelor of Science in Business Administration degree in 1930 and the Master of Arts degree

in 1932, both from The Ohio State University. He became a graduate assistant at Ohio State in 1931 and in 1932 was a research assistant in the Bureau of Business Research. In 1934 he was appointed Assistant Professor of Business Research. He advanced to Professor in 1951 and became Associate Director of the Bureau in 1959. Professor Yocum retired June 30, 1976.

Professor Yocum served as Assistant Deputy Administrator of the National Recovery Administration in 1933-34. He became a special agent for the United States Department of Commerce in 1936. He was Director of Research for the Committee on Consumer Relations, Inc., New York, in 1940-41, and in 1945-46 served as a consultant to the Ohio Small Business Commission. He also served as Chairman of the Ohio Metropolitan Census Tract Committee of the American Statistical Association.

Professor Yocum was the author of a significant series of articles in the Bureau of Business Research publication, "Bulletin of Business Research," and in other professional journals.

Professor Yocum received the American Marketing Association's National Award for Significant Contribution to the Advancement of Science in Marketing in 1950. In 1951 he was the recipient of the Award for Outstanding Service to Ohio Advertising presented by the Ohio State Chapter of Alpha Delta Sigma, a professional advertising fraternity.

Professor Yocum was elected an honorary life member of the Ohio Trade Association Executives in 1957 and was a life member of Alpha Delta Sigma and Beta Gamma Sigma.

WHEREAS The Ohio State University desires to adopt such a retirement incentive plan in order to provide more flexibility in its long term planning for its academic human resource needs:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That effective November 1, 1985, and continuing for three years thereafter, the University will purchase service credit, in one year increments, for eligible STRS members electing to retire under this plan, and further that the amount of service credit purchased shall not exceed the lesser of five years or one-fifth of the individual's total service credited by STRS as of the date the eligible STRS member elects to participate in this plan; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That to be eligible, all members must be members of STRS and must have attained the age of fifty (50) and be currently eligible to retire or eligible to retire after including the years of service credit to be purchased under the plan; and

#### EARLY RETIREMENT INCENTIVE PROGRAM (contd)

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the maximum number of eligible members under this plan will be limited to five percent (5%) of the total number of individuals at the University who are members of STRS as of October 1, 1985, and further that if the total number of persons applying for this program exceeds the five percent (5%) maximum, then approval for participation will be determined in accordance with Section 3307.35; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That those individuals who are eligible and approved for participation in this plan must retire within ninety (90) days of notification that additional service credit has been purchased; and further that those individuals who retire under this plan will not be eligible for participation in any other supplemental or early retirement program previously established by the University; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the President and/or the Vice President for Personnel Services are hereby authorized to notify the State Teachers Retirement System on the official form approved by that agency of The Ohio State University's election to participate in a retirement incentive plan in accordance with Section R.C. 3307.35 and the terms of this resolution.

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## AMENDMENTS TO THE <u>RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY</u> Resolution No. 86-44

Synopsis: Amendments to rules 3335-5-48 and 3335-9-11 are being proposed.

WHEREAS the University Senate pursuant to rule 3335-1-09 of the Administrative Code is authorized to recommend through the President to the Board of Trustees the adoption of amendments to the <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> as approved by the University Senate; and

WHEREAS the proposed changes in the <u>Rules of the University</u> <u>Faculty</u> were approved by the University Senate on October 5, 1985, as follows:

#### AMENDED RULES

3335-5-48 Council on academic affairs.

- (A) The council on academic affairs shall consist of fourteen members.
  - (4) Four members shall be students: one graduate student appointed for a one-year term by the president of the council of graduate students with the approval of the council of graduate students; one professional student appointed for a one-year term by the president of the graduate-professional

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

council with the approval of the graduateprofessional council; and two undergraduate students for terms of two years appointed by the president of the undergraduate student government with the approval of the undergraduate student assembly. The terms of the undergraduate students shall be such that one term begins each year. Student members shall be eligible for reappointment.

3335-9-11 Regular faculty, regular clinical faculty, and senior administrative and professional employees pursuing additional degrees.

Faculty members: no regular faculty member or regular clinical faculty member will be permitted to pursue a degree offered by the college in which the faculty member holds an appointment. In those instances where faculty members wish to pursue degrees in other colleges of this university, they must demonstrate that the acquisition of these degrees enhances their own competence as teachers and scholars. In making decisions to pursue additional degrees, university faculty must consider first and foremost the requirements of their total university commitment and responsibilities. Requests to pursue additional degrees must be approved by the chairperson of the department in which the faculty member holds appointment, dean of the college in which the faculty member holds appointment, dean of the school or college in which the degree would be granted (the dean of the graduate school in consultation with the executive committee of the council on research and graduate studies or dean of a professional college), and the vice president for academic affairs and provost.

Senior administrative and professional appointees: in those instances where senior administrative and professional appointees wish to pursue degrees at this university, they must demonstrate that the acquisition of these degrees enhances their competence as university employees. In making decisions to pursue additional degrees, senior administrative and professional appointees must consider first and foremost the requirements of their total university commitment and responsibility. Requests to pursue additional degrees must be approved by the immediate supervisor, the appropriate vice president in whose area the senior administrative and professional appointee holds position, dean of the school or college in which the degree would be granted (the dean of the graduate school in consultation with the executive committee of the council on research and graduate studies or dean of a professional college), and the vice president for academic affairs and provost.

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the foregoing amendments to the <u>Rules</u> of the <u>University Faculty</u> be adopted as recommended by the University Senate.

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## NAMING OF BUILDING

Resolution No. 86-45

Synopsis: Naming of building to be constructed on the main campus of The Ohio State University is proposed.

WHEREAS upon the recommendation of the President, with the concurrence of the President's Staff, it has been proposed that The Ohio State University Center for the Visual Arts bear the name "The Wexner Center for the Visual Arts," to honor and recognize the substantial support provided to the project by Leslie H. Wexner, the Founder, President, and Chairman of the Board of The Limited, Incorporated, and Chairperson of The Ohio State University Foundation; and

WHEREAS the building shall be dedicated in the memory of Harry L. Wexner, the deceased father of Leslie H. Wexner:

## Ruth M. Erlandson

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on September 28, 1985, of Ruth M. Erlandson, Professor Emeritus in the University Libraries.

Professor Erlandson was born in Galesburg, Illinois, on July 20, 1907. She received her Bachelor of Arts degree in English from Knox College in 1928, the Bachelor of Science and Master of Science degrees from the University of Illinois in 1937 and 1943, respectively. From 1946 to 1948 she studied Swedish Literature at Columbia University and received the King Gustaf V Fellowship from the American-Scandinavian Foundation for the study of Swedish Literature at the University of Uppsala, Sweden in 1948-49.

Prior to joining the library faculty of The Ohio State University in 1953 as the Head of the Reference Department, she worked in both public and university libraries holding positions of Cataloger, Chief Reference Librarian, and Assistant Librarian.

Professor Erlandson came to The Ohio State University Libraries to rebuild and to administer the reference collection, a position she held until 1964 when she moved into the newly created position of Research Consultant and Lecturer in Subject Bibliography. She remained in this position, which entailed in-depth bibliographic service to graduate students and faculty, until her retirement in July 1976.

Professor Erlandson was a dedicated and natural teacher. She served as a visiting lecturer at the University of

Illinois and Brooklyn College; and was a library advisor and lecturer at the Chulalonkorn University in Bangkok, Thailand; and a library advisor to the Chiengmai University in Chiengmai, Thailand. She was an outstanding reference librarian who never gave up when she had a question to answer. As part of her work as Head of the Reference Department, she taught many junior librarians the fine art of reference.

Professor Erlandson's service to her profession was exemplary. She was a member of the American Library Association International Relations Round Table, was a Director at Large for the Association of College and Research Libraries, Secretary to this Association's Reference Service Division, and served on the prestigious Subscription Books Committee of the American Library Association. In addition, she was also a member of Phi Kappa Phi and Beta Phi Mu.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Professor Erlandson its deepest sympathy. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as an expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy.

## William E. Krauss

The Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on September 1, 1985, of William E. Krauss, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Dairy Science.

Dr. Krauss was born January 11, 1899, in Newark, New Jersey, and served in the U.S. Navy during World War I. He received his B.S. degree in Agriculture and Ph.D. in Animal Nutrition from Cornell University.

Dr. Krauss joined the OARDC (then the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station) in 1926 as an Assistant in Dairy Industry. He was promoted to Associate in 1931, and Department Chief in 1941. In 1946 he was named Chairman of the newly formed Department of Dairy Husbandry at The Ohio State University. He was named Associate Director of the OARDC in 1948 and held that position until his retirement in 1969.

Since retirement, Dr. Krauss has served as unofficial archivist and historian for the OARDC, contributing countless hours to collecting items to preserve the

institution's historical development. He served nearly 10 years as Vice Chairman of a statewide committee to help bring public attention to the important role of agriculture in the state's economy and the need for preserving this heritage in a State Agricultural Museum.

Dr. Krauss had a distinguished scientific career before becoming an administrator. He achieved international recognition for his studies on the nutrition of dairy animals and the nutritional value of milk.

Dr. Krauss's contributions were well-recognized through the years. He received the Borden Award from the American Dairy Science Association in 1938; the Distinguished Nutritionist Award from the Distillers Feed Research Council in 1964; and an honorary Doctor of Science degree from the College of Wooster in 1966. In 1982 he was named an honorary life member of The Ohio State University Presidents Club.

Among the personal attributes admired most by his colleagues was Dr. Krauss's sense of loyalty - loyalty to his profession, to his employer, and to his fellow faculty members. He looked upon his job in terms of what was best for Ohio; what was best for OARDC and the University; what was best for advancing the science and art of agriculture, home economics, and natural resources. He was a true professional in every sense of the word.

The Julie Price Memorial Scholarship Fund in Law was established November 1, 1985, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University with gifts to The Ohio State University Development Fund from the family and friends of Julie Price, B.A., Humanities, '81; J.D., Law, '84.

All gifts are to be invested in the University's Permanent Endowment Fund, under the rules and regulations adopted by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, with the right to invest and reinvest as occasion dictates.

The annual income is to be used for financial aid for one or more students enrolled in the College of Law who have a demonstrated financial need. First preference will be given to female students who are from Knox and its contiguous counties. Second preference will be given to male students from this same geographical area. Selection of the award recipients will be made by the College of Law Admissions and Financial Aid Committee in consultation with the University Committee on Student Financial Aid.

Should the need for this fund cease to exist or so diminish as to provide unused income, then the income may be used for any purpose whatsoever as determined by the Board of Trustees, with preference being given to recommendations from the appropriate administrative official of the University who is then directly responsible for the College of Law.

### Harry E. Phillian Scholarship Award in Architecture Fund

WHEREAS under the administration of the College of Agriculture, the Moores Farm has been operated continuously and successfully over the last 21 years to demonstrate improved production and management practices in the operation of a small dairy farm, and the Moores Farm currently is operated by a tenant through a lease arrangement; and

WHEREAS the College of Agriculture has determined that the operation of this dairy demonstration farm no longer is required in support of the academic programs of the College and that the farm should be sold with the net proceeds used to establish the Ernest Q. Moores Agricultural Fund, the income of which would be used to support the instructional, research, and public service programs of the College; and

WHEREAS the University has begun efforts to market the Moores Farm and has received an offer from Mr. and Mrs. Randolph Goudy, of Mohican Township of Ashland County, to purchase approximately 6.5 acres of the Farm at a price of \$1,100.00 per acre; and

WHEREAS the appropriate University offices have determined that the sale of the Moores Demonstration Farm is in the best interest of the University:

### NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the President and/or Vice President for Business and Administration be authorized to sell, in the name of the Board of Trustees, all of the University's right, title, and interest in and to the 6.5 acre portion of the Moores Farm to Mr. and Mrs. Randolph Goudy at a price of \$1,100.00 per acre upon such terms as are deemed to be in the best interest of the University and that the net proceeds be used to establish the Ernest Q. Moores Agricultural Fund to support the College of Agriculture.

Mr. Ihrig:

Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I would like to combine two parts in this report if I may. The first is to take another step in closing out the last fiscal year's year-end financial report, which is the Non-Mandatory Transfer resolution. That is under the Tab marked Budget in your books. Following that I'll go into the first quarter report on the status of the current year's budget.

Non-Mandatory Transfer from Current Funds is a situation involved with the University Fund

Mr. Ihrig: (contd)

Accounting System, where we have different fund groups: Current Funds, Plant Funds, Endowment Funds, and Loan Funds (Loan Funds are for student loans). Whenever there are transfers made that are within the University's budget or as a result of remodeling, renovation, or construction decisions made by the Board, there are transfers made into the various fund groups. Most of these go into the Plant Fund group so that we can capitalize the expenditures of both the remodeling facilities and equipment expenditures. Our auditing firm asks that these transfers that occur during the year, as approved individually or within the budget activity, then be brought to this Board annually for your review and approval. That is what we are doing today. There is a total of around \$19.7 million, of which nearly \$18 million are transferred into Plant Funds for various remodeling, construction projects, and equipment purchases.

At this time I would like to submit this Resolution for your review and approval.

Mr. Galbreath:

Thank you, Weldon.

Mr. Teaford:

As a lawyer, I don't really understand anything about accounting, but these are transfers from where?

Mr. Ihrig:

From the Current Funds group, which is the annual operating budget of the University. Endowment Principal Funds would be income generated from Endowment Funds which the Deans of the Colleges decided they wanted to add to the principal for future years income. As for the Loan Funds, the money going into there comes from undesignated scholarship funds and the Student Loan Committee recommends that these funds be made available to provide loans for international students.

Mr. Teaford:

So the Plant Funds come from things like tuition and the State?

Right, all parts of the General Funds income.

Mr. Galbreath:

Any other questions? May I have a motion?

Mr. Ihrig continued his report:

With the closing-out of Fiscal Year 84-85, there is a handout that Mr. Scott passed-out to you. It provides a summary of where we see the current 85-86 budget through September, as we look at the revenues and expenditures for the first three months of the year.

Looking at the total University, at the bottom of the front page on "revenues," it shows basically a small amount of change. These are the standard adjustments we would go through in seeing Summer Quarter tuitions that have actually been received and we have the exact details of the legislation as far as State subsidy and other factors. The change represents less than one-tenth of a percent. Expenditures--on the second page--have basically not changed at all, just a small amount of around \$90,000, out of the total budget.

At this time it is very early in the year, and we basically haven't received all of the Autumn Quarter tuitions. The key analysis of that, and also the subsidies as a result of the Autumn Quarter tuitions, we will learn about in December.

In looking at the status of the Autumn Quarter, we have also provided you with a second handout that is not in your book, that lists the fourteenth day enrollment summary for the Autumn Quarter. That document shows that total University enrollments are at 57,725 students for all campuses. That is 969 students above the enrollments last Autumn Quarter. All of the campuses are generally up. Mansfield is basically the same--down fourteen students; Wooster is up by six; and the others are up by larger percentages. The Columbus Campus is at 53,199, which is 765 students above Autumn Quarter a year ago. If we look at that number over five years, it is less than a one percent increase in the total enrollments, but our target was to be down about 1.6 percent.

If you turn to the second page, Table 2 of that chart, we can discuss some of the changes that we have experienced this year. The first two rows on that Table, which say AU 84 and AU 85 compare the Autumn Quarter this year with last year. The first column there under NFQF, New First Quarter Freshmen, shows that we have 6,862 entering freshmen on the Columbus Campus this year--which is 198 above last year. Our target for new entering freshmen this

Mr. Ihrig: (contd)

year was set last November, and when we discussed it, it was 6,700. So this leaves us 162 above our target and that is 198 above last year's enrollment.

The numbers you have across this Table, as we go across it, compares them with last year's, and I'll interject with the target numbers to give us a perspective of where we think we are. We had planned this Spring, when we looked at the enrollments and the demand for entering freshmen admissions, to add 170 to the target for entering freshmen and reduced the target for transfer students, which are the next two columns, by 170. To keep within the overall enrollment limit of the University, we control the new admission of students. So we increased the freshmen and lowered the transfer targets, because in the previous year the transfer enrollments had not come up to where we thought they would be and we thought we had to trade-off freshmen with transfers. The results of all this--the freshmen came within the revised target and, basically, the transfers did also.

Now there is an increase in transfer enrollments overall, you see the increase by 23 and 286. Over 200 of those increases are due to a new program instituted by the University called the "Bridge Program." That is where we encourage employees of the University to enroll in Continuing Education courses. These are primarily Continuing Education, part-time, courses taken in the evening which are exempt from our enrollment limit. These are to assist employees to get the prerequisites, then to go on and work on their degrees. It is a program initiated by the Office of Continuing Education this year. We had over 200 enrollees in this program. So, these would not count in our enrollment limitations.

Then we are at the continuing students--these are the students that were enrolled in Spring or Summer Quarter and continued on in the Autumn. Data shows that we are down 269 from last year. But that is not the entire story, because our target--we expected to be down over 800 and we are actually 507 above our target. Therefore, we are again having increased retentions. Our targets of last year assumed that retention would level off. Instead, retention of our continuing students is increasing again. That is the good news.

Mr. Ihrig: (contd)

The next set of good news is the former students. These are the students that have been here, have been in good standing, but decided to stop-out for one reason or the other and come back. So they haven't been here Spring or Summer Quarter. That number is increasing by 448 over last year and our targets we set at the same level as last year. So there is an additional 448. That, again, is an increase in retention. When we follow our students, some may stop-out for various reasons and come back and these students are in good standing and can re-enroll whenever they wish. Both the continuing and former students are showing another increase in Ohio State's retention rates which we are very pleased about.

In addition, the graduate enrollments, both in new entering students and continuing students, are up again this year for a total increase of three percent overall from our targets--1.7 percent over last year. We did not anticipate that graduate enrollments would be as high as last year, but they exceeded last year. So, again, we are having strong retention and new admissions in our graduate programs. Our professional programs are basically at the same level as last year and within the plan.

So, all in all, we are going to report over 40,000 FTE when we sort all of this down to report to the Board of Regents this month. Last year we were over by about 533. We expect that they will add one hundred to that overenrollment this year. Again, due to increased graduate enrollments and increased retention. So we are in the process now of reevaluating where we need to be on entering freshmen targets and that decision will need to be made during the month of November, as we get the data refined. Increased retention will have another impact on how many we can admit.

The rest of the pages in this report--the next page talks about college enrollments and they are basically where we would anticipate. The total of the Arts and Sciences--there is a change in the mix of the Arts and Sciences and the different programs--but the grand total is within thirty-three of last year. We are showing a decrease in Engineering, but that is due to enrollment management where they are setting point-hour requirements to enter into the engineering programs. Commensurate with that is University College having an increased number of students who are making their decisions as to where to go based

Mr. Ihrig: (contd)

on their performance. We are showing an increased demand in the Colleges of Education, Home Economics and the Graduate School, as we have discussed.

The next Table takes the students in University College and puts them in with the college program that they have indicated they have an interest in. So it looks more at the curriculum rather than the specific college of enrollment. There, the increase in Education, which was ten percent when we look at all of the students indicating an interest in Education, is up to sixteen percent. So we are showing increased interest in Education as a university degree intent.

The next two Tables then start looking at the loads that the students are taking and the credit hours. We have actually shown a slight decrease on Table 6 in the full-time equivalent students to head count ratio--based on the load that they take--down one hundreth of a percent from .95 to .94; and that reflects the increased efforts in Continuing Education to enroll part-time students, as we discussed a little earlier with things like the "Bridge Program." The professional and graduate students are taking slightly heavier loads by a very small amount, but overall campus-wide it is equal.

The last Table shows you the counties and states and a summary of foreign enrollments at the University. Those from other states and territories and other countries are close to being the same with a pickup of Ohio residents in our total enrollments.

We are carefully analyzing these data and the retention data to see exactly where we are impacting on the programs and the finances of the University. We will have these data ready in detail to go to the Board of Regents, then the subsidy model will be calculated and we will know in December the exact amount of subsidy. We don't see a major shift from our budget as far as subsidy at this time.

This leaves us with the last big unknowns, which are not enrollment-driven as far as our budget, and that is in selective excellence programs. We have the process now for the academic challenge which is one percent of the subsidy. So we will have to know the subsidy before we get the exact amount of the academic challenge. At this time, the Provost has a committee of faculty working on the various programs for excellence that will be recommended, and that effort is going along on schedule. October 31 and November 1, 1985 meeting, Board of Trustees Mr. Ihrig: (contd)

The last big unknown is the selective excellence program in the research challenge and that, if you remember, is where the Regents and the State have provided a matching fund for actual sponsored research within the University. 'The Regents have just issued the guidelines on that challenge grant and we are now reviewing that material and it looks favorable from our opinion. But we will not know probably until March, exactly the amounts for the University when all the numbers and the review of those guidelines are completed.

That completes my report.

Mr. Teaford:

Are those actually this fiscal year's funds, nevertheless?

President Jennings:

Yes. Those are this fiscal year's funds.

Mr. Teaford:

Even though they don't know about it until nearly the end?

Mr. Ihrig:

We estimate them going in.

President Jennings:

They are this year's fiscal funds and probably most of them will be spent this Spring and next year in that context. Let me just make a couple of remarks about Weldon's report.

I think first of all that the enrollment report, as Weldon pointed out, is basically a very solid and good news report--the retention continuing to improve dramatically. But with our enrollment ceiling that undoubtedly means a continuation of the trend that has been taking place at the institution. Namely, an even earlier cut-off date for enrollment for next fall. As you recall, last year we cut-off enrollment on December 22. This year it will undoubtedly be earlier and undoubtedly we will have to look to a smaller freshmen class than we have been looking to in times gone by. So it is a good enrollment report. I am particularly

President Jennings: (contd)

pleased also to see the graduate enrollment, not only leveling out, but beginning to gain slightly. Because nationally, graduate enrollment has been a problem in higher education and particularly becomes serious when we realize that the demographics begin to turn around in the early 1990's very quickly. Which will increase demand for well-trained faculty quite dramatically into the 1990's, but higher education should be producing those people now in order to meet that demand.

I also want to make a remark about the research challenge. I want to emphasize how pleased we are with the draft guidelines for the State of Ohio Research Challenge program that we have received from Chancellor Coulter of the Ohio Board of Regents. As you know, Governor Celeste and the General Assembly authorized this program last year as part of the State's Selective Excellence efforts.

The Regents' draft guidelines currently are being reviewed by the Research Committee of the Council on Research and Graduate Studies, the deans, and my staff. We will be making any necessary comments on the specific details. But, in general, it is clear that our overall, highly positive, impression of the Research Challenge has been reinforced by the direction of the Regent's draft. We believe that a very important step has been taken in direct state support of university-based research that establishes Ohio as a leader in the nation.

The emphasis in the draft guidelines on demonstrated results by the universities in attracting sponsored research is especially praiseworthy. The focus on basic and applied research, and scholarly and creative activity coincides with our own academic mission. We also applaud the State's clear commitment to rewarding and nurturing excellence. The Research Challenge can become an important part of our own internal efforts to enhance excellence in research, as well as expanding success in the other public institutions of higher education.

Of particular note is the commitment the Regents' have shown to encouraging cooperative research efforts with Ohio's private institutions. The manner in which private universities have been included in the program broadens and strengthens the overall state-wide academic research base. We believe that the Regional Research Partnership Program can become a significant impetus to strengthen the working relationships between our

President Jennings: (contd)

public institutions and those private institutions that have demonstrated their capability to bring external research dollars into the State, for the benefit of Ohio as a whole.

We at Ohio State will be working hard to make the Research Challenge achieve its full potential, in acknowledgement of the confidence that the State of Ohio has placed in its University research institutions.

Obviously, we are pleased with this. The private inclusion, I think, is an important piece of this and we will be working very hard to live up to the confidence that the State has placed in us.

Mr. Galbreath:

Ed, would you analyze our particular situation enrollment-wise and compare it to the rest of the colleges and universities in the State? Because we do have a cap. Are they experiencing the same sort of full capacity enrollment?

President Jennings:

Well, most of them are Danny.

Mr. Galbreath:

And the privates, too?

President Jennings:

I can't speak quite as much for the privates. Certainly the privates around Franklin County, yes, but I don't think state-wide. Some of the smaller privates are having some considerable difficulty. Ohio Wesleyan, for example, still is having considerable difficulty, but by and large that experience is there. Now, it is very hard, of course, to compare Ohio State's enrollment pattern with the other institutions, because our actual enrollment is artificially low. We obviously would have a much larger institution had we not had this cap. Because unlike the other institutions that have caps, we have been at our cap for eight or nine years now-longer than that? Fifteen years.

Mr. Galbreath:

Ed, is there any way to know what happens to the freshman that does not get in here because of a cap?

President Jennings:

Again, it would require a survey. Our impression is that that freshman will either go some place else in the State--to another institution in the State; many of them will show up in our regional campuses; or will show up in the Spring or Winter Quarter. In other words, instead of starting their college experience in the fall--

Mr. Galbreath:

You don't think we are losing them from the college ranks totally?

President Jennings:

Our impression is no and certainly the statistics would bear that out, because enrollment state-wide is holding-up. But the demographics where the number of high school graduates are dropping and dropping very rapidly--as you know, between 1979 and 1992 the number of high school graduates is going to drop by thirty percent.

Mr. Galbreath:

Well you know, we have been hearing that for five years, yet it is not happening.

President Jennings:

It is not happening here and it is not happening across the nation. You are getting a larger proportion of high school students going on.

Mr. Galbreath:

So there are fewer bodies, but more of them are going on?

President Jennings:

That's right. You are getting a higher--this is an Ohio phenomenon, a national phenomenon.

Mr. Galbreath:

That's good news.

President Jennings:

It certainly is at the large public universities. Our Big 10 colleagues and public universities all across the country--their enrollments are stable or even growing.

Mr. Galbreath:

Would that reflect the trend toward technology? High school students are more aware of the importance, do you think?

President Jennings:

Well, higher education has never been very successful in determining why enrollment trends on a national basis take place. I will point out, again, one of the pieces of good news is that one variable that has been isolated for enrollments has been the economy. We are a countercyclical industry, if you will, when the economy is bad more people go to college than when the economy is good. That is one of the good news things right now is that the economy now is improving and enrollments are not dropping-off.

Mr. Galbreath:

How many of the other state universities would you say have reached their cap?

Mr. Ihrig:

It's Miami and Bowling Green. We know Miami, this year, again, exceeded their cap and I don't know about Bowling Green.

President Jennings:

Well, but there is also Ohio U that has a cap, but they're way under it. Who else has a cap? I don't think anybody else has a cap.

Mr. Ihrig:

Akron comes to mind, but I'm not sure. They have been under it also. There have only been the three of us that have been up or near our cap.

Mr. Galbreath:

Weldon, I would like to ask one more question. On your chart seven, would you explain these Ohio counties? I understand the 50,000 students from Ohio, other states, United States, students from foreign countries, 120?

Yes. That's a group of students whose parents are abroad for various reasons. They are U.S. citizens,

Mr. Ihrig:

Mr. Ihrig: (contd)

but they don't have a home county in the United States or a home state. They're ambassadors, corporate people, and so on.

Mr. Galbreath:

And the pure foreign student is just 2,690?

Mr. Ihrig:

That's correct.

Mr. Galbreath:

That surprises me.

President Jennings:

You mean the number being low?

Mr. Galbreath:

The number being low. I thought we had a very significant foreign student--

President Jennings:

Well, there is a lot of concentration in the graduate program. But this is about standard for the big public universities--about five percent of their student-body is foreign.

Mr. Galbreath:

I think it is very important for this Board to understand that. Because I don't know--I can't quickly come-up with the figures, but I would have thought that there were more students here from out of Ohio.

President Jennings:

That's, again, a fairly typical pattern--nine percent of your student-body, being out-of-state students. Minnesota, Purdue, and Indiana would have the same pattern.

Mr. Galbreath:

O.K. But I think when we talk about our budgets and our funding and our State support and such, it is clear we are taking care of our own kids. Subsidy monies are really pretty minimal. October 31 and November 1, 1985 meeting, Board of Trustees President Jennings:

Oh yes. And remember that you should have a significant number of out-of-state students and foreign students to assure diversity.

Mr. Galbreath:

Do we recruit foreign students?

President Jennings:

At the graduate level we recruit good students and very often that will be a foreign student.

Mr. Galbreath:

But we don't set up seminars in England or France and try to sell Ohio State?

President Jennings:

No.

Mr. Galbreath:

Do we have enough foreign students to give us diversity?

President Jennings:

Oh yes. I'm not worried about that. But we could, Danny, have--we could double that number easily in terms of the interest in coming to Ohio State.

Mr. Galbreath:

By doing what?

President Jennings:

By simply accepting more of the applications.

Mr. Galbreath:

So there are more foreign applications?

President Jennings:

Oh, many more foreign applications.

Mr. Havens:

And that would knock down our incoming Ohio freshmen?

President Jennings:

Knock down the incoming Ohio freshmen, yes.

Mr. Galbreath:

Unless you could get your cap up.

**President Jennings:** 

But I would not recommend moving our cap up right now. Because it is just not the budget, the critical element is a space limitation. And we would simply not have the space to accommodate.

Mr. Galbreath:

Well, then that answers my question. My only thought was spreading the word of Ohio State. And if you have twice that many foreign students in various parts of the world, you're going to do a lot of things to enhance the image of Ohio State, and ultimately have more financial support.

**President Jennings:** 

We get more good students, but we concentrate in terms--particularly in foreign students--in only the very best. And while we can increase that number without significantly reducing quality, I do like the concept of only just the very best.

Mr. Havens:

I assume that those are mostly graduate students anyway, therefore, they only get in if they meet the standards. Unlike the freshmen, who get in because they live in Ohio.

Mr. Galbreath:

What is our capacity--physical capacity? Are we about there?

President Jennings:

Well, I think Francille would say our physical capacity is way below our enrollment right now.

Mr. Galbreath:

Dorm-wise, as well as instruction?

President Jennings:

Dormitories, for the first time in quite a while, are over-full. But that is a very cyclical activity and they are not over-full by very much. You want to be, but that is one of the reasons we have been able to keep dorm rates down.

Mrs. Bowser:

But if you get more students, you would have more staff and if you visit some of the staff now, there isn't enough room in their little cubby holes for two chairs.

President Jennings:

If you notice on our capital bill, it is filled with renovation, classroom activity, the library book warehouse, the mathematics building, biological sciences; all of that is in recognition of the general undergraduate student-body space limitations that we've got.

Mr. Galbreath:

I'm not necessarily asking--I'm just trying to understand.

President Jennings:

Danny, the other thing though that is coming, and I keep reminding everybody--with this continuing drop and the enrollment staying the same, you are getting obviously more and more students into the upper division.

Mr. Havens:

Is that good?

President Jennings:

You become an upper-division institution. It has some fairly serious budget implications over the long-term, because that is the most expensive education. The junior and senior costs are significantly and substantially higher than the cost of educating at the freshman and sophomore level. There are more specialized courses, smaller classes, more equipment, more writing, more individual instruction at the junior and senior level. That is where your engineering students are concentrated, your chemistry, physics, your expensive curriculum, your art.

Mr. Galbreath:

But the drop is not a freshman number--not a concern other than the budget situation.

President Jennings:

It is a concern to me in the sense that we have to find a way, and I have a group working on that this year, to find some way of getting this--getting through this having to shut-off enrollments so very early. It was December 22 of last year, it may be December 1 this year. We are getting into time periods that are just far too early for the kids.

Mr. Galbreath:

Well, why can't you--rather than cut it off, why can't you be more selective in the pool?

President Jennings:

Well, because this State has had a long tradition of "first come, first serve."

Mr. Galbreath:

You have a phenonmenon like this. Maybe you could begin to change some of your ideas.

President Jennings:

I have asked Francille to put together a group to look at that very issue. That is a serious issue in my mind of this earlier and earlier enrollment shut down.

Mr. Galbreath:

I know this is off the subject, but you know that can do nothing but help the high school student realize that he does not have an inalienable right to get in here. Doesn't it give them a little more incentive?

President Jennings:

Well, that incentive is conditional/unconditional admissions. That is why you are seeing this quality of the freshmen improving so dramatically over these last three or four years. Because the freshmen are appling earlier, and the word is getting out also that if you had trouble in high school, maybe you ought to think about some place else before you come to Ohio State. With attrition rates in the freshmen October 31 and November 1, 1985 meeting, Board of Trustees President Jennings: (contd)

year being cut in half, the improvement in the freshmen class is just remarkable right now. I am not sure that more selectivity would do it, because there is a lot of self-selection going on right now. But there is a long tradition of that. And I think the lawyers would also--you could get three lawyers and you could get three, maybe four or five interpretations of that "first come, first serve." It doesn't <u>say</u> "first come, first serve." There is a good deal of ambiguity in that.

Mr. Barone:

Ed, on tuition, why are we compelling the student who becomes a permanent resident, I mean a bona fide permanent resident, who works here, lives here twelve months, compelling him to pay out-of-state tuition?

President Jennings:

John, generally, many students who come here from a different state end-up with resident tuition. They might have non-resident tuition their first year, but they make their residence Ohio. There is a variety of ways to do that: driver's license, owning property, voting, registering automobiles.

Mr. Barone:

I understand they force them still to pay out-of-state tuition even though they vote here, work here, live here. Is that true or false?

President Jennings:

That is false.

Mr. Barone:

I didn't think so, but I was told this.

President Jennings:

There is one reason, John, that these out-of-state numbers--when we report roughly eight percent, that's probably an understatement of the number of out-of-state students that are actually at Ohio State. There is a signifant number of students that come to us from New York or wherever, who after their freshman year, establish residence here and then show up in Franklin County on the chart. Fifteen thousand out of Franklin County--there are

President Jennings: (contd)

not 15,000 students out of the Franklin County high schools who came to Ohio State.

Mr. Havens:

Didn't we used to have a policy that if you graduated from out-of-state, you'd have to pay tuition--the first year you went to school here regardless of residence?

**President Jennings:** 

Probably.

Mr. Teaford:

There has been lots of litigation on that and suits won.

President Jennings:

There are a long potpourri of ways that you can qualify for in-state tuition and that is pretty well settled now in the courts. The courts have basically defined an out-of-state student for us through the years. Not just in Ohio, but around the country.

Mr. Teaford:

Doesn't the fact that this is now much more of an upper-division university enhance your ability to get good faculty?

President Jennings:

It certainly does. So many of the things--like we had the math articulation program conference here that the Board of Regents began at Ohio State, that was a key part of it. Within the eleventh grade with this math placement testing we are simply getting a much larger percentage of students who are fully qualified for college algebra or things like that. The most amazing statistic to me is that five years ago, two-thirds of the freshmen had some sort of deficiency in their high school curriculum. Today, this freshmen class, if you exclude the visual arts requirement--which I think is appropriate in this context, you have fifteen percent. In other words, from a third with no deficiencies to eighty-five percent with no deficiencies--dramatic changes.

Mr. Havens:

The scholarship student does not have to apply and worry about being cut-off in the middle of December?

President Jennings:

When we talk about our cut-off date, there is a whole variety of categories that could continue on in the spring. The Freshmen Foundation Program for example, which is the minority program that brings in, out of the freshman class, 850 minorities, those seats are reserved. The department will have a number of students that they will give scholarships to on the basis of merit and there will be slots for those. This is the general step. What happens to us every year, every year we keep lowering our projection on retention or increasing our projection on retention. But every year we break the bank on that, because we are getting more and more staying longer. Five hundred more continuing students, 400 more returning students, that is 900 students beyond what our lower estimate of retention would--

Mr. Galbreath:

That is also counter to your comment about the cyclical nature--countercyclical review of the economy, too.

President Jennings:

That's right. If we should be dropping--if anything the economy should be forcing that down right now, but we keep going up. We simply keep going up.

Mr. Galbreath:

Are there any more questions or comments on Mr. Ihrig's report?

Resolution No. 86-55

Synopsis: Providing for the authorization, issuance and sale of the General Receipts Refunding Bonds, Series 1985 A (the "Series 1985 A Bonds"), in an amount not to exceed \$29,500,000, for the purpose of refunding General Receipts Bonds of The Ohio State University, Series 1971, Series 1981 and Series 1983 (the "Prior Obligations"), respectively, and

## AUTHORIZATION, ISSUANCE AND SALE OF GENERAL RECEIPTS REFUNDING BONDS, 1985 SERIES A, OF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY (contd)

paying the costs and expenses associated with the issuance of the Series 1985 A Bonds; authorizing the execution of an Escrow Agreement to secure the payment of Bond Service Charges on the Prior Obligations; authorizing a Trust Indenture to secure the payment of Bond Service Charges on the Series 1985 A Bonds, to provide for the issuance from time to time of additional General Receipts Bonds (the "Additional Bonds") and for related purposes.

WHEREAS pursuant to Sections 3345.11 and 3345.12 of the Ohio Revised Code, as enacted under authority of the Constitution of Ohio, particularly Section 2i of Article VIII thereof, The Ohio State University (the "University"), a state university of the State of Ohio (the "State") created and existing under Chapter 3335 of the Ohio Revised Code, is authorized and empowered, among other things, (a) to issue, as provided herein, Bonds of the University to pay the costs certain capital facilities defined as "auxiliary of facilities" in Section 3345.12 of the Ohio Revised Code (and herein called "University Facilities") and to refund, fund or retire such Bonds and other obligations previously issued for such purpose; (b) to pledge to the payment of such Bonds all or a specified part of the gross amount of the General Receipts of the University, as defined in Section 1 hereof, in priority to all other expenses, claims or payments; (c) to covenant, as herein provided, that the University will make, fix, adjust and collect the fees, rates, rentals, charges and other items comprising General Receipts to produce General Receipts sufficient at all times to meet Bond Service Charges on the Bonds, establish and maintain the required reserves and meet other requirements herein provided; and (d) to provide for a trust indenture (the "Indenture") and make further provisions for securing the payment of the Bond Service Charges;

WHEREAS the Board has heretofore authorized the issuance of \$4,500,000 University General Receipts Bonds, Series 1971, dated June 1, 1971 (the "1971 Bonds") (\$1,980,000 principal amount outstanding);

WHEREAS the Board has heretofore authorized the issuance of \$9,500,000 University General Receipts Bonds, Series 1981, dated February 1, 1981 (the "1981 Bonds") (\$7,600,000 principal amount outstanding);

WHEREAS the Board has heretofore authorized the issuance of \$18,500,000 University General Receipts Bonds, Series 1983, dated October 15, 1983 (the "1983 Bonds") (\$18,500,000 principal amount outstanding);

## AUTHORIZATION, ISSUANCE AND SALE OF GENERAL RECEIPTS REFUNDING BONDS, 1985 SERIES A, OF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY (contd)

WHEREAS the Board has determined that it is in the best interests of the University to authorize the issuance of the General Receipts Refunding Bonds Series 1985 A (the "Series 1985 A Bonds") to refund the 1971 Bonds, the 1981 Bonds and the 1983 Bonds (collectively the "Prior Obligations") and to pay the costs and expenses of issuance of the Series 1985 A Bonds, each in order to discharge the lien of the Trust Agreement, dated June 1, 1971, and supplements thereto securing the Prior Obligations, (the "1971 Trust Agreement") thereby providing new and additional financing powers under the Indenture for the more efficient and effective conduct of the fiscal affairs of the University; and

WHEREAS the University desires to make provision for the issuance of the Series 1985 A Bonds and from time to time of Additional Bonds herein described, and for the payment of the Bond Service Charges thereon and the securing thereof by this Resolution and the Indenture herein authorized, and to provide for each subsequent issue of Additional Bonds to be authorized by a separate Series Resolution based upon this Resolution and such Indenture; and

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University adopt the following:

Section 1. <u>Definitions and Interpretations</u>. The following words and terms as used in this Resolution, in any Series Resolution, in the Indenture and in the Bonds shall have the following meanings unless otherwise therein provided and unless the context or use clearly indicates another or different meaning or intent:

"Act" means Sections 3345.11 and 3345.12 of the Ohio Revised Code, as the same may be amended, modified, revised, supplemented, or superseded from time to time.

"Additional Bonds" means any Bonds of the University issued under any Series Resolution and secured by a Supplemental Indenture, including both Parity Obligations and Subordinated Obligations (as defined in the Indenture).

"Board" means the Board of Trustees of the University.

"Bond" or "Bonds" means any Bond, or all of the Bonds, or an issue or series of Bonds, as the case may be, of the University issued pursuant to the Series 1985 A Bond Resolution and any Series Resolution including bonds, notes, certificates of indebtedness, capital leases or any other

obligation evidencing the borrowing of money consistent with the provisions of the Indenture and in conformity with the laws of the State.

"Bondholder" or "holder" or "holder of Bonds" or any similar term, means any person in whose name a registered Bond is registered.

"Bond Fund" means the Series 1985 A Bond Fund created by Section 7 of this Resolution.

"Bond proceedings" means the Series 1985 A Bond Resolution, the Indenture, any applicable Series Resolution, any applicable Supplemental Indenture, any applicable Certificate of Award and other resolutions and agreements and amendments of and supplements to the foregoing, or any combination thereof, authorizing or providing for the terms and conditions applicable to, or providing for the security or sale of Bonds, and the terms contained in such Bonds.

"Bond Reserve Fund" means the Bond Reserve Fund created by Section 8 of this Resolution and as provided for in any Series Resolution.

"Bond Reserve Requirement" means, as at any relevant date, the Maximum Annual Debt Service Requirement (as defined in the Indenture) on Bonds issued pursuant to the Series 1985 A Bond Resolution, the Indenture or any Series Resolution, which Requirement may be met through the use of an appropriate Bond Reserve Fund Credit Instrument (as defined in the Indenture).

"Bond Resolution" or "Resolutions" means (i) when used with reference to the Series 1985 A Bonds, the Series 1985 A Bond Resolution of the Board (ii) when used with reference to an issue of Additional Bonds, the Series 1985 A Bond Resolution to the extent applicable and any Series Resolution providing for the issuance of such Additional Bonds and (iii) when used with reference to Bonds when Additional Bonds are outstanding, the Series 1985 A Bond Resolution and the Series Resolution(s) providing for the issuance of the then outstanding Additional Bonds; all as the same may from time to time be lawfully amended, modified or supplemented.

"Bond Service Account" means the account, so designated, in the Bond Fund established pursuant to Section 7 hereof.

"Bond Service Charges" and "Bond service charges" means, for any applicable time period, the principal

(including any mandatory sinking fund requirements), interest and redemption premium, if any, required to be paid by the University on the Bonds pursuant to any Bond Resolution. In determining Bond Service Charges for any period or date, mandatory sinking fund requirements for such period or applicable to such date shall be included and principal maturities for which, and to the extent, mandatory sinking fund requirements were imposed in a prior period for a prior date shall be excluded.

"Certificate of Award" means the Certificate of Award authorized pursuant to Section 4 of this Resolution.

"Contract of Purchase" means the Contract of Purchase between the Original Purchasers and the University, dated November \_\_\_\_, 1985.

"Costs of University Facilities" means the costs of or related to University Facilities, and the financing thereof, for the payment of which obligations may be issued under the Act.

"Eligible Investments" means Eligible Investments as defined in the Indenture.

"Escrow Agreement" means the Escrow Deposit Agreement dated as of November 15, 1985 between the University and The Huntington National Bank, as Escrow Trustee, providing for the payment of principal and interest on the Prior Obligations.

"Escrow Trustee" means The Huntington National Bank, Columbus, Ohio, as Escrow Trustee under the Escrow Agreement.

"Expense Fund" means the Expense Fund created pursuant to Section 10 of this Resolution.

"Fiscal Year" means a period of twelve consecutive months constituting the fiscal year of the University commencing on the first day of July of any year and ending on the last day of June of the following calendar year, both inclusive, or such other twelve month period as hereafter may be established from time to time for budgeting and accounting purposes of the University by the Board to be evidenced, for purposes hereof, by a certificate of the Treasurer filed with the Trustee.

"General Receipts" means all monies received by the University including but not limited to all gross fees, deposits, charges, receipts and income from all or any part

of the students of the University, whether designated as tuition, instructional fees, tuition surcharges, general fees, activity fees, health fees or other special purpose fees or otherwise designated; all gross income, revenues and receipts from the operation, ownership, or control of University Facilities; all grants, gifts, donations and pledges and receipts therefrom; and the proceeds of the sale of Obligations issued or incurred pursuant to the Act, including proceeds of Obligations issued or incurred pursuant to the Act issued to refund obligations previously issued, to the extent and as allocated to Bond Service Charges under the proceedings authorizing such Obligations; however, there shall be excluded from General Receipts: (i) monies raised by taxation and state appropriations until and unless the pledge thereof to the payment of Bond Service Charges is authorized by law and is made hereunder by a (ii) Supplemental Indenture approved by the Board: Restricted Monies (as defined in the Indenture); (iii) any special fee charged pursuant to Section 154.21(D) of the Ohio Revised Code and receipts therefrom; (iv) those receipts pertaining to dormitory facilities which are presently pledged under the April 15, 1957 Indenture with BancOhio National Bank (formerly known as The Ohio National Bank of Columbus) Columbus, Ohio, and supplements thereto, but only so long as any dormitory revenue bonds of the University heretofore or hereafter issued are outstanding thereunder, except that the surplus amounts resulting from any such receipts available for any lawful purpose of the University pursuant to the 1957 Indenture that are released from the pledge thereof shall nevertheless be included in General Receipts; and (v) those receipts pertaining to housing facilities which are presently pledged under the 1965 Indenture with Bank One, Columbus, N.A. (formerly The City National Bank & Trust Company) but only so long as such housing facility bonds are outstanding thereunder. Any receipts of the University which it may at any time lawfully pledge to the security of the Bonds may be included, or confirmed to be included, in General Receipts by Supple-mental Indenture approved by the Board, and such receipts may be released, at least in part, as provided in section 4.11 of the Indenture.

"Indenture" means the Trust Indenture between the University and the Trustee, dated as of November 15, 1985, and any Supplemental Indentures, as the same may be duly amended, modified or supplemented.

"Mandatory sinking fund requirements" means amounts required by the Series 1985 A Bond Resolution and any Series Resolution to be deposited to the Bond Fund in any fiscal year for the purpose of retiring principal

maturities of Bonds which by the terms of such Bonds are due and payable, if not called for prior redemption, in any subsequent fiscal year.

"Obligations" means bonds or notes or other evidence of indebtedness of the University for money borrowed, including the Bonds.

"Official Statement" means, as to the Series 1985 A Bonds, the Official Statement including, without limitation, the Preliminary Official Statement, relating to the original issuance of the Series 1985 A Bonds.

"Original Purchasers" means, as to the Series 1985 A Bonds, The Ohio Company, Columbus, Ohio, John Nuveen & Co. Incorporated, Chicago, Illinois, Prudential-Bache Securities Inc., New York, New York, Salomon Brothers Inc, New York, New York, and Shearson Lehman/American Express, Inc, New York, New York, and as to Additional Bonds, the person or persons expressly named in the applicable Series Resolution as the Original Purchaser of the Additional Bonds from the University.

"Outstanding Bonds" or "Bonds outstanding" or "outstanding" as applied to Bonds, means, as of any date, all Bonds which have been authenticated and delivered, or are then being delivered, by the Trustee under the Indenture except:

(a) Bonds surrendered for exchange or transfer or cancelled because of payment or redemption at or prior to such date;

(b) Bonds for the payment, redemption or purchase for cancellation of which sufficient monies have been deposited prior to such date with the Trustee or Paying Agents (whether upon or prior to the maturity or redemption date of any such Bonds), or which are deemed to have been paid and discharged pursuant to the provisions of the Indenture; provided that if such Bonds are to be redeemed prior to the maturity thereof, notice of such redemption shall have been given or arrangements satisfactory to the Trustee shall have been made therefor, or waiver of such notice satisfactory in form to the Trustee, and provided, further, that if such Bonds are to be purchased for cancellation, a firm offer for sale stating the price has been received and accepted; and

(c) Lost, stolen, mutilated or destroyed Bonds in lieu of which others have been authenticated (or payment, when due, of which is made without replacement) under the Indenture.

"Paying Agents" means any banks or trust companies designated as the paying agencies or places of payment for Bonds by or pursuant to the Series 1985 A Bond Resolution or any applicable Series Resolution, and their successors designated pursuant to the Indenture, and shall also mean the Trustee when so designated for such purpose.

"Parity Obligations" means all Bonds and other Obligations except Subordinated Obligations, as defined in the Indenture.

"Prior Obligations Trustee" means The Huntington National Bank, Columbus, Ohio.

"Prior Project" means the construction of the coal fired boiler with air pollution equipment, the extension of steam lines to service the west dormitory complex, the midwest campus, and hospital facilities and the refurbishing of existing steam lines and power plant, all constituting the "Project" for the 1983 Bonds.

"Series Resolution" means a resolution of the Board authorizing the issuance of Additional Bonds in accordance with this Resolution, and particularly Section 6 hereof, and includes any resolution or certificate providing for or evidencing the award and terms of the Bonds as authorized by such Series Resolution.

"Series 1985 A Bond Resolution," or "this Resolution" as used herein, means this Resolution, as the same may be amended from time to time in accordance with the provisions of the Indenture.

"Special Funds" or "special funds and accounts" means the Bond Fund, the Construction Fund, the Expense Fund, the Bond Reserve Fund and the accounts therein, and any other funds or accounts permitted by, established under, or identified in the Indenture, this Resolution or any Series Resolution, except that the Escrow Fund provided for under the Escrow Agreement shall not be deemed a Special Fund.

"State" means the State of Ohio.

"Supplemental Indenture" means any one or more Supplemental Indentures entered into by the parties pursuant to the Indenture.

"Treasurer" means the Treasurer of the University or such other business or financial officer of the University as may be or is designated by the Board, as shown in a written certification maintained by the University or the Secretary of the Board and on file with the Trustee, signed by the President of the University or the Secretary of the Board, together with any alternate identified in such certificate.

"Trustee" means the Trustee at the time serving under the Indenture, originally The Huntington National Bank, Columbus, Ohio, and any successor Trustee as determined or designated under or pursuant to the Indenture.

"University" means The Ohio State University established and existing under Chapter 3335 of the Ohio Revised Code, and every part and component thereof as from time to time existing, and when the context admits, includes its Board of Trustees.

"University Facilities" means buildings, and other improvements, and equipment, real structures, estate and interests in real estate therefor, all or any part of the costs of which are at any time authorized by the Act to be financed by the issuance of Obligations, including but not limited to such facilities to be used for or in connection with student activity or student service facilities, dining halls, and other food service and preparation facilities, dormitories, and other living guarters and accommodations, vehicular parking facilities, bookstores, athletic and recreational facilities, faculty centers, auditoriums, assembly and exhibition halls, hospitals, infirmaries and other medical and health facilities, research, and continuing education facilities, and includes any one, part of, or any combination of the foregoing, and further includes site improvements, utilities, machinery, furnishings and any separate or connected buildings, structures, improvements, sites, utilities or equipment to be used in, or in connection with the operation or maintenance of, or supplementing or otherwise related to the services or facilities to be provided by, any University Facilities.

Any reference herein to the University, the Board, or to any officers thereof or to other public boards, commissions, departments, institutions, agencies, bodies, entities or officers, shall include those which succeed to their functions, duties or responsibilities pursuant to or by operation of law or who are lawfully performing their functions. Any reference to a section or provision of the Ohio Revised Code or to the laws of Ohio shall include such

section or provision and such laws as from time to time amended, modified, revised, supplemented, or superseded, provided that no such amendment, modification, revision, supplementation, or supersession shall alter the obligation to pay the Bond Service Charges in the amount and manner, at the times, and from the sources provided in this Resolution, the applicable Series Resolution, and the Indenture, except as otherwise herein permitted.

Unless the context shall otherwise indicate, words importing the singular number shall include the plural number, and vice versa, and the terms "hereof," "herein," "hereby," "hereto," "hereunder," and similar terms, mean this Resolution.

Section 2. <u>Authorization; Terms; Pledge; and</u> <u>Covenant</u>.

(a) <u>Authorization</u>. The Bonds, to be designated and known as General Receipts Refunding Bonds, Series 1985 A (the "Series 1985 A Bonds"), shall be issued pursuant to and as authorized by the Act, Section 2i of Article VIII of the Ohio Constitution, this Resolution and the Indenture for the purposes of (i) refunding the Prior Obligations, (ii) paying the premium on a surety bond or insurance policy which will provide the Bond Reserve Requirement with respect to the Series 1985 A Bonds, and (iii) paying the costs and expenses incidental to the issuance of the Series 1985 A Bonds.

(b) <u>Form and Numbering</u>. The Series 1985 A Bonds shall be issued only as fully registered Bonds. The Bonds shall be numbered as determined by the Trustee.

(c) <u>Denominations and Dates</u>. The Series 1985 A Bonds shall be in denominations of \$5,000 and integral multiples thereof and shall be dated November 15, 1985.

(d) <u>Maximum Aggregate Principal Amount</u>. The Series 1985 A Bonds shall be issued in a maximum aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$29,500,000.

(e) <u>Execution</u>. The Chairman of the Board and the Treasurer are hereby authorized to make the necessary arrangements with the Original Purchasers to establish the date, location, procedures and conditions for the delivery of the Series 1985 A Bonds to the Original Purchasers and to take all steps as necessary to effect due execution, authentication and delivery of the Series 1985 A Bonds to the Original Purchasers under the terms of this Resolution. The Series 1985 A Bonds shall be signed by the Chairman of the Board and the Treasurer in their official capacities

(provided that both of the signatures may be facsimiles) and shall bear the corporate seal of the University or a facsimile thereof.

# (f) Interest and Maturities.

(i) The Series 1985 A Bonds shall bear interest on their unpaid principal amounts semi-annually on June 1 and December 1 (the "Interest Payment Dates"), beginning June 1, 1986, at the percentage rate or rates per annum set forth in the Certificate of Award (established pursuant to Section 4 herein), which rate or rates shall in no event produce an average interest rate in excess of ten percent (10%) per annum.

(ii) The Series 1985 A Bonds shall mature not later than December 1, 2005, and in such annual amount or amounts as provided for in the Certificate of Award.

(iii) Mandatory redemption of Series 1985 A Bonds of certain maturities prior to maturity, pursuant to the mandatory sinking fund requirements, is as provided in the Certificate of Award.

(iv) Certain maturities of the Series 1985 A Bonds, as provided in the Certificate of Award, are subject to optional redemption at the option of the University, prior to stated maturity in whole or in part, in accordance with the terms, conditions, redemption prices and on the dates set forth in the Certificate of Award. Notice of call for and other terms and provisions governing redemption of the Series 1985 A Bonds shall be given in the manner provided in the Indenture.

(g) <u>Security</u>. There is hereby pledged, in priority to all other expenses, claims and payments, to the security of the Series 1985 A Bonds and other Parity Obligations and for the payment of the Bond Service Charges and for establishment and maintenance of the Bond Reserve Requirement as provided in the Indenture, the gross amount of General Receipts of the University (subject to the provisions for the partial release of a pledge of General Receipts contained in Section 4.11 of the Indenture), and the Special Funds, as provided in the Indenture. In accordance with the Act, all the General Receipts or portion thereof are immediately subject to the lien of the pledge upon receipt thereof by the University, and such pledge creates a perfected security interest without necessity for prior separation, physical delivery, filing or recording or further act.

For the further security of the Series 1985 A Bonds, and any Additional Bonds, the University hereby covenants with the bondholders and the Trustee that so long as any Series 1985 A Bonds or Additional Bonds are outstanding, the University will fix, make, adjust and collect fees, rates, rentals, charges, and other items of General Receipts, as will produce at all times General Receipts sufficient (i) to pay Bond Service Charges when due, (ii) to establish and maintain the Bond Reserve Requirement as provided in the Indenture, (iii) together with other monies lawfully available therefor, to pay all costs and expenses required to be paid under the Bond proceedings, and (iv) together with other monies lawfully available therefor, to pay all other costs and expenses necessary for the proper maintenance and successful and continuous operation of the University.

All Series 1985 A Bonds and other Parity Obligations shall be equally and ratably secured by the pledge of the General Receipts and the Special Funds, to the extent provided in, and except as otherwise provided by the Indenture. Nothing in the Act, this Resolution, the Indenture or other Bond proceedings gives the holders of Series 1985 A Bonds, and they do not have, the right to have the General Assembly of the State levy any excises or taxes for the payment of Bond Service Charges and each Series 1985 A Bond shall bear on its face a statement to that effect and to the effect that the right of such holders to the payment of Bond Service Charges shall be limited to payment thereof from the General Receipts and the Special Funds as provided herein; provided, however, that nothing herein or in the Bond proceedings shall be deemed to prohibit the University or the State, of their own volition, from using to the extent lawfully authorized to do so any other resources for the fulfillment of the terms, conditions or obligations of this Resolution, the Indenture and the Series 1985 A Bonds.

(h) <u>Payment</u>, <u>Places of Payment and Paying</u> <u>Agents</u>. Principal of and redemption premium on the Series 1985 A Bonds when due shall be payable to the registered holders, upon presentation and surrender thereof, at the principal corporate trust office of The Huntington National Bank, Columbus, Ohio. Interest shall be payable by check or draft mailed by the Trustee as provided in the Indenture.

Section 3. <u>General Terms and Provisions of All</u> Bonds.

(a) <u>Designation, Payment and Form</u>. All Bonds of each Series shall bear such designations as may be necessary to distinguish them from Bonds of any other Series. Bond

Service Charges on all Bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America in the manner provided in the applicable Series Resolution. Subject to the provisions of an applicable Series Resolution, Bonds shall be issued only as fully registered Bonds and may be exchanged as provided in the Indenture. All Bonds shall be negotiable instruments, subject to applicable provisions for registration, and shall express on their faces the purpose for which issued and such other statements or legends as may be required by law.

(b) Execution. All Bonds shall be executed in the manner provided in this Resolution or any Series Resolution authorizing their issuance or in the manner provided by the applicable law in effect at the time of their issuance. In case any officer or member whose signature or a facsimile of whose signature shall appear on any Bonds shall cease to be such officer or member before the issuance, authentication or delivery of such Bonds, such signature or such facsimile shall nevertheless be valid and sufficient for all purposes, the same as if the officer or member had remained in office until that time.

(c) <u>Redemption Features</u>. Unless otherwise provided in the applicable Series Resolution, notice of a call for redemption of all Bonds shall be given in the manner provided in the Indenture. If Bonds or portions of Bonds are duly called for redemption and if on such redemption date monies for the redemption of all the Bonds or portions thereof to be redeemed, together with accrued interest to the redemption date and any applicable redemption premium, shall be held by the Trustee or Paying Agents so as to be available therefor and if the notice of redemption shall have been deposited in the mail as provided in the Indenture, then from and after such redemption date

(d) Security. All Bonds shall be secured by a pledge of the General Receipts of the University, or such portion thereof as specifically provided in this Resolution or any applicable Series Resolution but subject to and consistent with the provisions of Section 4.11 of the Indenture and any Supplemental Indenture executed pursuant thereto. Additional Bonds may be issued as Parity Obligations secured by a pledge of a first lien on the General Receipts or as Subordinated Obligations, secured by a pledge of a subordinated lien on the General Receipts, as provided in the Indenture and applicable Series Resolution. Unless otherwise provided in any Series Resolution, Additional Bonds shall be equally and ratably payable from the General Receipts and the Special Funds and accounts

therein. Nothing in any Series Resolution, the Additional Bonds or the Indenture shall constitute a general obligation, debt or bonded indebtedness of the State and, further, nothing therein gives the holders or owners of Bonds and they do not have, the right to have excises or taxes levied by the State for the payment of Bond Service Charges on the Bonds, but such Bonds are payable from the General Receipts and the Special Funds as provided herein, in any Series Resolution and in the Indenture, and each Bond shall contain on the face thereof a statement to that effect; provided that nothing herein or in the applicable Series Resolution shall be deemed to prohibit the State or the University, of their own volition, from using to the extent they are lawfully authorized to do so, any other sources or revenues for the fulfillment of any of the terms, conditions or obligations of the Bond proceedings or any of the Bonds.

All of the above general terms and provisions are subject to more specific terms and provisions contained herein, in the Indenture, any Supplemental Indenture and any Series Resolution.

Section 4. <u>Sale of the Series 1985 A Bonds;</u> <u>Redemption of Prior Obligations; Transfer of Existing</u> <u>Amounts</u>. The Series 1985 A Bonds are sold and awarded to the Original Purchasers in accordance with the Contract of Purchase at the purchase price provided in the Certificate of Award. The form of Contract of Purchase now on file with the Secretary of the Board is hereby approved, together with any changes therein and completions thereof which are not inconsistent with this Resolution and not substantially adverse to the University, and as are permitted by the Act and approved on behalf of the University by the Treasurer. The approval on behalf of the University of those changes and completions by the Treasurer, and the status of those changes as not substantially adverse to the University, shall be conclusively evidenced by the execution of the Contract of Purchase on behalf of the University by the Treasurer. It is determined hereby that the purchase price and the manner of sale and the terms of the Series 1985 A Bonds, as provided in this Resolution, are consistent with all legal requirements and will carry out the public purposes of the Act.

Such award shall be further evidenced by the Certificate of Award, which shall state the aggregate principal amount of the Series 1985 A Bonds to be issued, the purchase price, the allocation of proceeds, the interest rate or rates, the maturity dates and annual principal retirement schedule, the mandatory sinking fund

requirements, the optional redemption provisions, and the amounts to be transferred from the Special Funds (except the Construction Fund for the 1983 Bonds) under the Prior Obligations to the Escrow Fund, all as determined in accordance with the provisions of this Resolution and the Contract of Purchase. The Certificate of Award shall also include the form of the Series 1985 A Bonds (the "Form of Bond"), attached thereto as Exhibit A. The Series 1985 A Bonds shall be executed by the Chairman of the Board and the Treasurer, on behalf of the University, in substantially the form now on file with the Secretary of the Board, but shall reflect any modifications, changes and supplements required to conform the Form of Bond with the provisions of the The Treasurer shall approve, on Certificate of Award. behalf of the Board, any such modifications, changes and supplements. The Certificate of Award is hereby authorized and shall be executed by the Treasurer and shall also contain such other data or provisions as such officer determines are appropriate or necessary, consistent with Resolution, the Indenture and the Contract of se. The Certificate of Award shall be deemed a part this Purchase. of this Resolution in connection with the authorization, issuance and sale of the Series 1985 A Bonds.

The Treasurer is authorized and directed to make the necessary arrangements with the Original Purchasers to establish the date, location, procedures and conditions for the delivery of the Series 1985 A Bonds to the Original Purchasers and to take all steps necessary to effect due execution, authentication and delivery of the Series 1985 A Bonds to the Original Purchasers under the terms of this Resolution.

The Official Statement, substantially in the form of the Preliminary Official Statement now on file with the Secretary of the Board, shall be executed by the Treasurer on behalf of the University in his official capacity with any modifications, changes and supplements necessary or desirable for the purposes thereof which the Treasurer shall approve.

The 1981 Bonds and the 1983 Bonds, hereby authorized to be called for optional redemption at their earliest or some later redemption date pursuant to the 1971 Trust Agreement, may be redeemed from cash and/or Federal Securities (as defined in the Indenture) (the "Securities") on deposit in the Escrow Fund (hereinafter defined) held by the Escrow Trustee and in accordance with the Escrow Agreement and the 1971 Trust Agreement or, at the option of the University, all 1981 and 1983 Bonds may be permitted to be retired on their stated maturity dates (without call for

redemption prior to maturity) from cash or securities in accordance with the Escrow Agreement and the 1971 Trust Agreement. The Treasurer is hereby authorized on behalf of University to execute the Escrow Agreement, in the substantially the form submitted to the Board, and hereby approved, with such changes, modifications and supplements necessary or desirable for the purposes thereof which the Treasurer shall approve. The Escrow Trustee is authorized and directed on behalf of the University to subscribe for such Securities to the extent such Securities are to be those United States Treasury Obligations, State and Local Government Series provided for in 31 C.F.R. Part 344. The University hereby approves and authorizes the use of any monies and investments held in the Special Funds under the 1971 Trust Agreement, except monies in the Construction Fund for the 1983 Bonds, to refund the Prior Obligations. The Securities deposited in the Escrow Fund are to be certified Coopers & Lybrand, or another independent public by accounting firm of national reputation, to be of such maturities and interest payment dates and to bear such interest as will, without further investment or reinvestment of either the principal amount thereof or the interest earnings therefrom, be sufficient to (i) pay the interest on the Prior Obligations; (ii) retire on their stated maturity dates the Prior Obligations; and (iii) redeem by optional redemption on the earliest optional redemption date or some later redemption date the Prior Obligations, together with the premium payable thereon, and thereby discharge and satisfy the covenants, agreements and other obligations of the University under the 1971 Trust Agreement securing the Prior Obligations. There is hereby created the Escrow Fund (the "Escrow Fund") which shall be in the custody of the Escrow Trustee and the Securities and any other monies in the Escrow Fund shall be held in trust for and shall be used solely for the payment of the principal of, premium, if any, on and interest on the Prior Obligations as provided in the Escrow Agreement. To the extent the Escrow Agreement provides for or contemplates the redemption of the Prior Obligations prior to the respective several maturity dates, the acceptance of the Escrow Agreement by the Escrow Trustee shall constitute notice to the Prior Obligations Trustee under the 1971 Trust Agreement of the request for giving of notice for redemption with respect to those Prior Obligations as provided for in Section 3.03 of the 1971 Trust Agreement.

Section 5. <u>Allocation of Proceeds</u>. A portion of the proceeds from the sale of the Series 1985 A Bonds, along with certain monies of the University, as provided in the Certificate of Award, will be transferred to the Escrow Trustee for deposit into the Escrow Fund pursuant to the

Escrow Agreement dated November 15, 1985. A portion of the proceeds from the sale of the Series 1985 A Bonds will be transferred to the Expense Fund to pay issuance costs, to purchase a surety bond or insurance policy which provides for the Bond Reserve Requirement and to pay certain other expenses associated with the issuance of the Series 1985 A Bonds. Pursuant to the Escrow Agreement, any and all amounts remaining in the Bond Pledge Fund, the Bond Service Fund and accounts therein (except the Construction Fund for the 1983 Bonds), as well as in other special accounts of the Prior Obligations are to be transferred to the respective funds and accounts as provided in the Escrow Agreement.

Section 6. <u>Series Resolutions</u>. Each subsequent issue of Bonds shall be authorized by a resolution adopted by the Board (the "Series Resolution"). Each Series Resolution shall provide, in a manner consistent with this Resolution and the Indenture, for the following with respect to each series of Additional Bonds thereby authorized:

(1) the purpose for which issued as permitted by the Act;

(2) the authorized principal amount;

(3) the security and the status of the security interest (whether parity or subordinate);

(4) the date of such Bonds, the interest rate or rates or the maximum interest rate (whether fixed or variable), their maturities, and the interest payment dates;

(5) the series designation and denominations of and manner of numbering;

(6) the redemption provisions, if any, including any premium to be paid upon redemption;

(7) mandatory sinking fund requirements, if any;

(8) the place or places of payment of the Bond Service Charges;

(9) the manner of sale;

(10) the disposition of the proceeds from the issuance;

(11) the funding of the Bond Reserve Requirement consistent with the Indenture;

(12) the authorization of a Supplemental Indenture; and

(13) any other provisions deemed advisable by the Board.

Each Series Resolution shall state that it is adopted pursuant to this Resolution and the Indenture.

Section 7. <u>Bond Fund</u>. There is hereby created by the University and ordered maintained as a separate deposit account (except when invested as hereinafter provided) in the custody of the Trustee in the name of the University designated the "University Bond Fund" (the "Bond Fund"). The Bond Fund is hereby pledged to the payment of Bond Service Charges in the manner hereinafter provided, in priority to any and all other expenses, claims or payments, and on parity with any subsequent pledge of General Receipts to Additional Bonds issued pursuant to a Series Resolution.

There is hereby created by the University and ordered maintained as a separate deposit account within the Bond Fund, in the custody of the Trustee and in the name of the University, the "Bond Service Account." The University shall deposit in this account from General Receipts monies sufficient in time and amount to pay the Bond Service Charges on the Bonds as they become due in the manner provided in the Indenture, any Supplemental Indenture, this Resolution and any Series Resolution.

There is hereby created by the University and ordered maintained as a separate deposit account within the Bond Fund, in the custody of the Trustee and in the name of the University, the "Special Bond Service Account." The Trustee shall transfer from the Bond Fund to the Special Bond Service Account such monies as are necessary for the redemption or purchase of principal amount of any Bonds as provided in the Indenture, any Supplemental Indenture and any Series Resolution.

The Trustee is further authorized, pursuant to any Series Resolution adopted in connection with the issuance of Additional Bonds, to establish and maintain such additional funds or accounts as necessary for the proper maintenance of any Additional Bonds.

Section 8. <u>Bond Reserve Fund</u>. There is hereby created by the University and ordered maintained as a separate deposit account (except as hereinafter provided) in the custody of the Trustee in the name of the University an account to be designated the "Bond Reserve Fund." The

Trustee is authorized, in satisfaction of the Bond Reserve Requirement and in substitution for deposits to the Bond Reserve Fund, to purchase and maintain a surety bond or insurance policy in a face amount equal to the Maximum Annual Debt Service, as defined in the Indenture, but may, at the option of the University, fund the Bond Reserve Fund out of proceeds from the sale of the Series 1985 A Bonds. The surety bond or insurance policy, if purchased, is payable by the Trustee from the Expense Fund created in Section 10 of this Resolution.

Section 9. <u>Construction Fund</u>. There is hereby created by the University and ordered maintained a separate deposit account designated the "University Construction Fund" (the "Construction Fund"). The Construction Fund shall be funded from monies currently on deposit in the Construction Fund created pursuant to the issuance and sale of the 1983 Bonds (the "1983 Construction Fund"). The Prior Obligations Trustee is hereby authorized to transfer to the Trustee all of the monies currently in the 1983 Construction Fund for deposit in the Construction Fund. Monies in the Construction Fund (including monies earned on investment of monies in the Construction Fund) may be used for the payment or reimbursement of all costs and expenses constituting Prior Project costs including those costs incurred by the University for and in connection with the acquisition, construction, furnishing, equipping and improving of the Prior Project or any part thereof, and all costs and expenses of the repair, reconstruction, improvement, alteration and enlargement of the Prior Project or any part thereof pursuant to any Series Resolution.

Each payment or reimbursement by the Trustee from the Construction Fund shall be made only upon receipt by the Trustee of a written order of such payment or reimbursement signed by the Treasurer, which shall specify the name or names of the persons to whom such payment or reimbursement is to be made and the amount thereof, and contain a certification that (i) none of the items for which the payment or reimbursement is proposed to be made has formed the basis for any payment or reimbursement theretofore made from the Construction Fund and, (ii) each item for which payment or reimbursement is made or is proposed to be made is or was permitted to be paid from the Construction Fund in Section. accordance with this A11 monies in the Construction Fund (including monies earned thereon by investment thereof) remaining after receipt by the Trustee of a certification of completion described in the succeeding paragraph and after payment, or provision for payment in full of the costs and expenses provided in the first sentence of this paragraph, then due and payable, except for

such costs and expenses which the Treasurer certifies are not then due and payable, shall, at the direction of the University, be applied by the Trustee to fund additional projects constituting University Facilities (the "Additional Projects") or for such other purposes as provided in the Indenture."

The completion of the acquisition, construction, furnishing and equipping of the Prior Project or an Additional Project shall be evidenced by the filing with the Trustee of a certification in writing signed by the Treasurer, which certification shall state that all costs and expenses incurred in connection with the acquisition, construction, furnishing, equipping and improving of the Prior Project or Additional Projects and payable out of the Construction Fund have been paid and discharged, except for such costs and expenses which the Treasurer certifies are not then due and payable.

Section 10. <u>Expense Fund</u>. There is hereby created by the University and ordered maintained as a separate deposit account in the custody of the Trustee in the name of the University an account designated the "University Expense Fund" (the "Expense Fund"). A portion of the proceeds from the Series 1985 A Bonds shall be deposited by the Trustee at the written direction of the Treasurer in the Expense Fund for the purposes of paying the premium on any surety bond or insurance policy purchased to satisfy the Bond Reserve Requirement and paying certain costs and expenses associated with the issuance of the Series 1985 A Bonds.

Section 11. <u>Conditions for Issuing Additional</u> <u>Bonds</u>. No Additional Bonds shall be issued pursuant to any Series Resolution unless the applicable conditions listed in Sections 2.10, 2.11 and 2.12 of the Indenture have been met.

Section 12. <u>Application of Bond Proceeds</u>. The proceeds from the sale of the Series 1985 A Bonds shall be applied solely to the purposes for which such issue is authorized pursuant to Section 2 hereof. Such proceeds shall be allocated for such purposes as provided in this Resolution, the applicable Series Resolution, and in the Indenture, and shall be held, invested and paid out as therein provided.

Section 13. <u>Further Covenants</u>. In addition to the covenants elsewhere contained herein, the University further covenants as follows:

(a) <u>Payment</u>. The University will, from the sources herein provided, pay or cause to be paid the Bond Service Charges on each and all Bonds on the dates, at the places and in the manner provided herein, in any Series Resolution, in the Indenture, in any Supplemental Indenture and in the Bonds, according to the true intent and meaning thereof.

(b) <u>Maintenance of Pledge</u>. The University will not make any pledge or assignment of or create or suffer any lien or encumbrance upon the Bond Fund, the Bond Reserve Fund, the Construction Fund, the Expense Fund or General Receipts prior to or on a parity with the pledge thereof hereunder, except as authorized or permitted under the Indenture.

(c) <u>Observance of Covenants</u>. The University will at all times faithfully observe and perform all covenants, undertakings, stipulations and provisions contained in this Resolution, the Indenture, any Supplemental Indenture, any Series Resolution and in any and every Bond executed, authenticated and delivered under the Indenture, and in all other proceedings pertaining to the Bonds.

(d) <u>Duties Binding on All with Authority;</u> <u>Enforcement by Mandamus</u>. Each provision of the Bond proceedings is binding upon such officer, board, authority, agency, department, or other person or body as may from time to time have the authority under law to take such actions as may be necessary to perform all or any part of the duty required by such provision; and each duty of the University and the Board, and of their members, officers and employees, undertaken pursuant to the Bond proceedings for the Bonds is established as a duty of the University, the Board and of each such member, officer, and employee having authority to perform such duty, specifically enjoined by law resulting from an office, trust, or station within the meaning of section 2731.01 of the Ohio Revised Code, providing for enforcement by writ of mandamus.

(e) <u>Annual Reports</u>. Within one hundred and eighty days after the end of each Fiscal Year, the University shall submit to the Trustee and each Original Purchaser, and to each bondholder who requests the same, an annual report by the University showing the financial operations of the University during the preceding Fiscal Year, which may be in the form submitted to State officials, and also showing the status of all Special Funds at the end of such Fiscal Year and the receipts thereto and payments therefrom during such Fiscal Year, and such other data as the Trustee may reasonably deem to be relevant under the

Indenture and which was requested in writing. Upon request of the Trustee or the Original Purchasers, the University will make available a copy of any reports concerning the University (including audited financial statements) prepared by the official auditing agency of the State, presently the Auditor of the State, or an independent certified public accountant designated by the Auditor of the State or the University if authorized by law, subject to the availability of such reports.

(f) Inspection and Audit of Records. The Trustee, each Original Purchaser, and the holders of twenty-five percent (25%) or more of the principal amount of all outstanding Bonds shall have the right at all reasonable times to inspect and audit any records, books, documents, Special Funds, and accounts of the University, relating to the Series 1985 A Bonds. Such inspection or audit may be conducted by an independent certified public accounting firm designated by the party entitled to make the inspection.

(g) <u>Further Assurance</u>. The University will at any and all times pass, make, do, execute and deliver such further resolutions, acts, instruments and assurances as may be necessary or desirable to carry out the purposes of this Resolution and the Indenture.

Investment of Fund Monies. Except as (h) otherwise restricted in this Resolution, any monies held as a part of any of the Special Funds or credited to any a part of any of the special runds of credited to any account maintained therein, at the oral or written request of the University, shall be invested or reinvested by the Trustee in Eligible Investments. No such investments shall be made for a term exceeding the date of final maturity of the Bonds. Oral requests shall be promptly confirmed in writing. The type, amount and maturity (which shall be such that the monies invested will be available to make so payments from the appropriate Special Fund or account as the monies are required from that Special Fund or account) of such investments shall be as specified by the University. Any such investments shall be as specified by the University. Any such investment made by the Trustee may be purchased from, sold to or made with the Trustee or any commercial bank affiliate or either, and such investments shall be held by or under the control of the Trustee and shall be deemed at all times a part of the Special Fund or account from which the investment shall be credited, except as otherwise herein provided, and any loss resulting from such investments shall be charged, to the Special Fund or account from which the investment was made. The Trustee shall sell and reduce to cash a sufficient portion of investments under the provisions of this Section whenever the cash balance in any Special Fund or account therein is insufficient to pay

the current requirements from that Special Fund or account. The Trustee shall sell or redeem investments standing to the credit of the Special Funds to produce sufficient monies applicable hereunder to and at the times required for the purposes of paying Bond Service Charges when due as aforesaid, and shall do so without necessity for any order on behalf of the University and without restriction by reason of any such order. Any income on any investment made from monies credited to the Construction Fund shall be credited to the Construction Fund. Any income on any investment made from monies credited to any account in the Bond Reserve Account shall be credited to that account. Investments shall be valued in the manner provided in the Indenture.

Arbitrage Provisions; Transcript. The (i) University hereby covenants that it will restrict the use of the proceeds of the Series 1985 A Bonds in such manner and to such extent, if any, as may be necessary, after taking into account reasonable expectations at the time of the delivery of and payment for the Series 1985 A Bonds, so that the Series 1985 A Bonds will not constitute "arbitrage bonds" under Section 103(c) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, after taking into account reasonable expectations at the time of the delivery of and payment for the Series 1985 To that end, the Chairman of the Board or any A Bonds. other officer, including the Secretary of the Board or Treasurer, having responsibility with respect to the issuance of the Series 1985 A Bonds, is authorized and directed, alone or in conjunction with any of the foregoing or with any other officer, employee, consultant or agent of the University, to give an appropriate certificate on behalf of the University, for inclusion in the transcript of proceedings for the Series 1985 A Bonds, setting forth the reasonable expectations of the University regarding the amount and use of all such proceeds and the facts, estimates and circumstances on which they are based, all as of the date of delivery and payment for such Series 1985 A Bonds.

The Secretary of the Board shall furnish to the Original Purchasers a true transcript of proceedings, certified by the Secretary of the Board, of all proceedings had with reference to the issuance of the Series 1985 A Bonds along with such information from the records of the University as is necessary to determine the regularity and validity of the issuance of said Series 1985 A Bonds.

Section 14. <u>Indenture</u>. In order better to secure the payment of the Bond Service Charges as the same shall become due and payable, the Chairman of the Board, the President of the University and the Secretary of the Board

and the Treasurer, or any one or more of them, are authorized and directed to execute, acknowledge and deliver, in the name and on behalf of the University, an Indenture to the Trustee, in substantially the form submitted to this Board, and hereby approved, with such changes therein not substantially adverse to the University as may be permitted by the Act and approved by the officers executing the same on behalf of the University. The approval of such changes by said officers, and that such changes are not substantially adverse to the University, shall be conclusively evidenced by the execution of the Indenture by such officers.

This Resolution must be considered in conjunction with the Indenture for all purposes, including, without limitation thereto, application to this Resolution of the provisions contained in the Indenture for amendment, modification and supplementation, and provisions for separability.

Section 15. <u>Open Meeting Determination</u>. It is found and determined that all formal actions of the Board concerning and relating to the adoption of this Resolution or adopted in an open meeting of the Board, and that all deliberations of the Board and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

Section 16. <u>Effective Date</u>. This Resolution shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its adoption. Reference shall be made to the Indenture concerning matters not specifically addressed in this Resolution.

Upon motion of Mr. Teaford, seconded by Mr. Barone, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous roll call vote.

NOW THEREFORE

## Eleanor Anawalt

Ms. Anawalt was born on August 26, 1896, in Columbus, Ohio. She graduated from The Ohio State University with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1943 and a Master of Arts degree with a major in music in 1947.

Ms. Anawalt served the University for thirty years. Her major teaching assignments were in the area of piano, theory, and ear training. She retired at the rank of Associate Professor in June 1964.

Ernest William Bowerman was born on March 11, 1905, in Mitchell, South Dakota. He completed his high school education in Phillip, South Dakota, in 1924, by serving one year as a teacher in a one-room county school. He then attended the Northern State Teachers College at Aberdeen, South Dakota, graduating in 1929 with a major in mathematics. After serving one year as a science and mathematics teacher in the high school at Mellette, South Dakota, he was awarded a teaching fellowship at the South Dakota State School of Mines, Rapid City, South Dakota.

There he assisted with laboratory instruction in general chemistry and studied chemical engineering. He earned a B.S. in Chemical Engineering in 1933. That same year he joined the Junior Staff in the Chemistry Department at The Ohio State University where he worked as a graduate teaching assistant and earned the Ph.D. degree in Chemistry in 1937. Following graduation, he joined the Humble Oil and Refining Company as a Research Chemist in the Refining Research and Development Division.

During his 29 years with the Humble Company and Esso Research, he specialized in petroleum process development work for the production of motor fuels and petrochemicals. His work contributed significantly to the world's first commercial scale isobutane-olefin alkylation facility for production of aviation gasoline and also led to the first plant for commercial production of toluene and other aromatics from petroleum. In 1965, Dr. Bowerman retired from his position as Department Head in the Baytown Research and Development Division of Esso Research and Engineering to return to The Ohio State University as Professor and Vice Chairman of the Department of Chemistry.

At Ohio State, Dr. Bowerman managed the business affairs of the Department of Chemistry; served as Chairman of the Safety Committee; as principal liaison with OSU chemistry alumni; industrial companies and scientific societies; as Chairman of the Department's Building Committee; as a member of the University Campus Planning Advisory Committee; and the University Traffic and Parking Commission. He created the Department's Safety Handbook; initiated regular publication of the OSU Chemistry Alumni Newsletter; played a key role in the expansion of the Chemistry Library and renovation of the War Research Building (now Johnston Laboratory); and initiated planning which led to replacement of the McPherson Sawtooth structure. Dr. Bowerman retired as Professor Emeritus in the Department of Chemistry on June 30, 1975.

Dr. Knerr practiced Veterinary Medicine in Shelby, Ohio, for a short time, then was admitted to The Ohio State University College of Medicine where he was awarded a Doctor of Medicine degree with honors in 1964. He was elected to Alpha Omega Alpha Honor Medical Society.

Dr. Knerr interned and completed his residency in General Surgery at Riverside Methodist Hospital from 1964 until 1969. He was a Diplomate of the American Board of Surgery. He was also a member of several other surgical societies and published several significant articles, mostly in the American Journal of Surgery.

In 1972 Dr. Knerr was appointed Clinical Instructor in the Department of Surgery. He played a major and excellent role in the teaching of our surgical students rotating through Riverside Hospital in General Surgery.

Dr. Knerr was highly esteemed by his peers and by the students he taught. This was appropriately demonstrated by his election to Chief of Surgery at Riverside Hospital.

Dr. Knerr died suddenly on October 12, 1985, at Hilton Head Island, South Carolina. He left a legacy of admiration and professional respect among his friends and colleagues.

WHEREAS The Ohio State University (herein called the "University"), a state university of the State of Ohio created and existing under Chapter 3335 of the Ohio Revised Code, by resolution adopted by its Board of Trustees (herein called the "Board") on November 1, 1985 (herein called the "Series 1985 A Bond Resolution") and by a Trust Indenture dated as of November 15, 1985 between the University and The Huntington National Bank, Trustee (herein called the "Indenture"), has provided for the issuance from time to time of General Receipts Bonds of the University, with each such issue to be authorized by a Series Resolution adopted by the Board pursuant thereto; and

WHEREAS the Series 1985 A Bond Resolution was adopted and the Indenture was authorized by the Board pursuant to Sections 3345.11 and 3345.12 of the Ohio Revised Code, as enacted under the Constitution of Ohio, particularly Section 2i of Article VIII thereof (collectively the "Act"), wherein the University is authorized and empowered, among other things, to issue, as provided herein, Bonds of the University to pay the costs of certain capital facilities defined as "auxiliary facilities" in Section 3345.12 of the Ohio Revised Code (and herein called "University Facilities") and to refund, fund or retire such Bonds and other obligations previously issued for such purpose; and

WHEREAS the Series 1985 B Bonds will be issued and sold for the purpose of paying or reimbursing the costs of (i) the acquiring and installing of equipment and facilities comprising a modern, campus-wide integrated telecommunication system which includes a fiber optic transmission network, telecommunications switching equipment, cable, wiring and a building at Neil and Eighth Avenues; (ii) the constructing and equipping of certain vehicular parking facilities and appurtenances including an addition to the Ohio Union Parking Garage and a new multi-level parking facility on West 12th Avenue; (iii) designing, constructing and installing scoreboards and related facilities at Ohio Stadium; (iv) constructing and installing a magnetic resonance imaging facility as a diagnostic and research facility at University Hospials; (v) constructing and installing equipment and facilities comprising a back-pressure turbine co-generation system; and (vi) refunding a lease of an interconnect telephone system (collectively referred to as the "Project"), funding the Bond Reserve Fund and paying the costs and expenses associated with the issuance of the Series 1985 B Bonds; and

WHEREAS there will be outstanding prior to the issuance of the Series 1985 B Bonds herein authorized \$27,680,000 principal amount of General Receipts Refunding Bonds, Series 1985 A, to be issued and delivered pursuant to the Indenture; and

WHEREAS the Board has determined that it is in the best interests of the University to authorize the issuance of not to exceed \$42,520,000 of Variable Rate Demand General Receipts Bonds, Series 1985 B (the "Series 1985 B Bonds") to finance the Project, to fund the Bond Reserve Fund and to pay the costs and expenses of issuance of the Series 1985 B Bonds; and

WHEREAS the University desires to make provision for the issuance of the Series 1985 B Bonds and for the payment of the Bond Service Charges thereon and the securing thereof by this Resolution and a First Supplemental Trust Indenture (the "First Supplemental Indenture") herein authorized:

#### NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY, as follows:

Section 1. <u>Definitions and Interpretations</u>. All words and terms defined in the Indenture and all interpretations therein provided shall have in this Resolution

the same meanings, respectively, and be subject to the same interpretations as therein provided or used, unless the context or use clearly indicates another or different meaning or intent, except that this Resolution, together with the Certificate of Award (the "Certificate of Award") provided for in Section 3 hereof, is sometimes herein called and may be known as the "Series 1985 B Bond Resolution." The Bonds authorized by this Resolution are referred to herein and in the First Supplemental Indenture as the "Series 1985 B Bonds." As used in this Resolution, "Project" shall have the meaning provided for such term in the preambles hereto. Terms not appearing in the Indenture but used herein are defined as follows:

"Annual Rate Period" means, as to the Series 1985 B Bonds, any Annual Rate Period as provided for in Section 2(f)(iv) hereof.

"Annual Rate Index" shall mean the Annual Rate Index established by the Remarketing Agent from time to time which shall be a variable annual interest rate based upon yield evaluations at par of securities comparable to the Series 1985 B Bonds in which the Remarketing Agent is involved or of which it is aware, published or determined and announced on at least a monthly basis.

"Applicable Percentage" means the Applicable Percentage determined by the Remarketing Agent from time to time as that percentage which, when applied to a Variable Rate Index or the Fixed Rate Index, as applicable, will produce that interest Rate on the Series 1985 B Bonds, but not exceeding such interest rate, which would result in the market value of the Series 1985 B Bonds on such date being 100% of the principal amount thereof, provided, however, that the Applicable Percentage as applied to any Variable Rate Index and to the Fixed Rate Index shall not, in any case, be greater than 120% nor less than 80%.

"Authenticating Agent" means, in addition to those Authenticating Agents named in the Indenture, with respect to the Series 1985 B Bonds, the Authenticating Agent designated pursuant to Section 5.16 of the Indenture.

"Bank Bond Rate" means an interest rate not to exceed the Prime Rate plus two percent (2%) per annum or an alternate equivalent formula rate of interest based upon the Letter of Credit Bank's cost of funds, except for any Series 1985 B Bonds held by the Letter of Credit Bank as a result of tenders pursuant to Section 5 of the First Supplemental Indenture, on which the Bank Bond Rate shall be the rate

stated above or some lesser rate provided, however, that the Bank Bond Rate shall in no event exceed thirty (30%) per cent per annum.

"Bond Fund" means the Bond Fund created by the Series 1985 A Bond Resolution and existing under the Indenture.

"Bond Service Account" means the account, so designated, in the Bond Fund established pursuant to the 1985 Series A Bond Resolution and existing under the Indenture.

"Certificate of Award" means the Certificate of Award authorized pursuant to Section 3 of this Resolution.

"Code" means the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, and the applicable income tax regulations thereunder.

"Computation Period" means during any Rate Period, the period of time elected pursuant to Section 2(f)(vi) hereof during which the interest rate will not be subject to adjustment.

"Contract of Purchase" means the Contract of Purchase between the Original Purchasers and the University, dated as of December 30, 1985.

"First Supplemental Indenture" means the First Supplemental Trust Indenture authorized in Section 8 of this Resolution.

"Fixed Rate Index" means the interest index based upon yield evaluations at par (on the basis of a term approximately equal to the time remaining until each of the maturity dates of the Series 1985 B Bonds) of not less than five Fixed Rate Component Issuers selected by the Remarketing Agent after notice to the University, the Letter of Credit Bank and the Trustee or any other interest index approved by the University at the time of its direction pursuant to Section 2(f)(v) hereof to establish Fixed Interest Rates.

"Fixed Interest Rates" means the fixed non-floating annual interest rate for each maturity date on the Series 1985 B Bonds established in accordance with Section 2(f)(v) of this Resolution.

"Fixed Rate Component Issuers" means issuers of securities, including without limitation, universities as issuers of general or limited or special obligation bonds,

the interest on whose securities is exempt from federal income tax and having a rating by either Rating Service in the long-term debt rating category of such Rating Service corresponding to the then existing rating on the Series 1985 B Bonds. The Fixed Rate Component Issuers shall be selected by the Remarketing Agent in accordance with Section 2(f)(v) hereof; provided that the specific issuers included in the Fixed Rate Component Issuers may, after notice to the University and the Trustee, be changed from time to time by the Remarketing Agent at its discretion.

"Fixed Rate Period" means, as to the Series 1985 B Bonds, the Fixed Rate Period as provided for in Section 2(f)(v) hereof.

"Interest Adjustment Date" means (i) for any Weekly Rate Period, the Wednesday of each calendar week or if such day is not a Business Day, then on the Business Day immediately succeeding such day, commencing with the Interest Adjustment Date occurring during the later of the calendar week beginning January 5, 1986 or the calendar week next following the calendar week during which the Series 1985 B Bonds are issued and delivered to the Original Purchasers, or any other date on which an adjustment of the interest rate on the Series 1985 B Bonds is required in order to permit the Remarketing Agent to remarket Series 1985 B Bonds at par, (ii) for any Monthly Rate Period, the Business Day immediately preceding the first Business Day of each calendar month or any other date on which an adjustment of the interest rate on the Series 1985 B Bonds is required in order to permit the Remarketing Agent to remarket Series 1985 B Bonds at par, (iii) for any Monthly Rate Period, the Business Day immediately preceding the first Business Day of each calendar month or any other date on which an adjustment of the interest rate on the Series 1985 B Bonds is required in order to permit the Remarketing Agent to remarket Series 1985 B Bonds at par, (iii) for any Quarterly Rate Period, the Business Day specified by the University in the manner set forth in Section 9 of the First Supplemental Indenture; (iv) for any Semiannual Rate Period, the Business Day specified by the University in the manner set forth in Section 9 of the First Supplemental Indenture; and (v) for any Annual Rate Period, the Business Day specified by the University in the manner set forth in the First Supplemental Indenture.

"Interest Payment Dates" means as to the Series 1985 B Bonds (i) during the effectiveness of a Weekly Rate Period, a Monthly Rate Period or a Quarterly Rate Period, each March 1, June 1, September 1, and December 1 or, if such day is not a Business Day, the next succeeding Business Day commencing March 1, 1986; and (ii) during the effectiveness of a Semiannual Rate Period, an annual Rate Period or a Fixed Rate Period, each June 1 and December 1 or, if such day is not a Business Day, the next succeeding Business Day commencing June 1, 1986.

"Interest Period" means, as to the Series 1985 B Bonds, the period from and including the date of original delivery of the Series 1985 B Bonds to the Original Purchasers thereof to and including the day immediately preceding the first Interest Payment Date and, thereafter, each period commencing from and including the most recent Interest Payment Date to and including the day immediately preceding the next succeeding Interest Payment Date.

"Letter of Credit" means any irrevocable letter of credit, together with extensions thereof and replacements therefor pursuant to Section 6(B) of the First Supplemental Indenture, which may be issued by the Letter of Credit Bank and delivered to the Trustee and being an irrevocable obligation to make payment to the Trustee of up to the amounts therein specified with respect to (a) the principal amount of the Series 1985 B Bonds (i) to enable the Trustee to pay the principal amount of the Series 1985 B Bonds when due, (ii) to enable the Tender Agent to pay the portion of the purchase price of Series 1985 B Bonds delivered to it and not remarketed by the Remarketing Agent, equal to the principal amount of such Bonds, and (iii) to enable the University to purchase Series 1985 B Bonds called for redemption, plus (b) an amount equal to interest to accrue at the Maximum Interest Rate on the Bonds for 215 days (i) to enable the Trustee to pay interest on the Series 1985 B Bonds and (ii) to enable the Tender Agent to pay the portion of the purchase price of Series 1985 B Bonds delivered to it equal to the accrued interest on such Bonds, as the same may be transferred, reissued, extended or replaced in accordance with the First Supplemental Indenture and the Letter of Credit.

"Letter of Credit Bank" means initially, The Industrial Bank of Japan, Limited, New York Branch, as the issuer of and with respect to the Letter of Credit or the Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument (as hereinafter defined), as the case may be, and its successors and assigns in either such capacity.

"Maximum Interest Rate" means fifteen percentum (15%) per annum.

"Monthly Rate Period" means, as to the Series 1985 B Bonds, any Monthly Rate Period as provided for in Section 2(f)(ii) hereof.

"Monthly Rate Index" means the Monthly Rate Index established by the Remarketing Agent from time to time which shall be a variable annual interest rate based upon yield evaluations at par of securities comparable to the Series 1985 B Bonds in which the Remarketing Agent is involved or

of which it is aware, published or determined and announced on at least a monthly basis.

"Offering Memorandum" means, as to the Series 1985 B Bonds, the Offering Memorandum including, without limitation, the Preliminary Offering Memorandum, relating to the original issuance of the Series 1985 B Bonds.

"Original Purchasers" means, as to the Series 1985 B Bonds, John Nuveen & Co. Incorporated, Chicago, Illinois and The Ohio Company, Columbus, Ohio.

"Prime Rate" means the rate of interest announced from time to time by the Letter of Credit Bank as its prime or equivalent rate.

"Quarterly Rate Period" means, as to the Series 1985 B Bonds, any Quarterly Rate Period as provided for in Section 2(f)(iii) hereof.

"Quarterly Rate Index" means the Quarterly Rate Index established by the Remarketing Agent from time to time which shall be a variable interest rate based upon yield evaluations at par of securities comparable to the Series 1985 B Bonds in which the Remarketing Agent is involved or of which it is aware, published or determined and announced on at least a monthly basis.

"Rate Period" means, with respect to the 1985 Series B Bonds, each period elected by the University in accordance with this Resolution and the First Supplemental Indenture, as further provided for in Section 2 hereof.

"Regular Record Date" means, with respect to the Series 1985 B Bonds, during any Weekly Rate Period or Monthly Rate Period, the Business Day immediately preceding each Interest Payment Date, and during any other Rate Period, including the Fixed Rate Period, the fifteenth day of the calendar month next preceding an Interest Payment Date.

"Reimbursement Agreement" means, as to the Series 1985 B Bonds, the Letter of Credit Agreement, if any, or the Reimbursement Agreement dated as of December 1, 1985, relating to the Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument, as the context indicates, between the University and the Letter of Credit Bank, as the same may from time to time be amended, modified or supplemented.

"Remarketing Agent" means initially, John Nuveen & Co. Incorporated, and any Person meeting the qualifications of, and designated from time to time to act

as Remarketing Agent under Section 5 of the First Supplemental Indenture.

"Remarketing Agreement" means the Remarketing Agreement, dated as of December 1, 1985, provided for in Section 8 of this Resolution to be entered into among the University, the Remarketing Agent, and the Trustee, as the same may be amended, modified or supplemented.

"Semiannual Rate Period" means as to the Series 1985 B Bonds, the Semiannual Rate Period as provided for in Section 2(f)(iv) hereof.

"Semiannual Rate Index" means the Semiannual Rate Index established by the Remarketing Agent from time to time which shall be a variable annual interest rate based upon yield evaluations at par of securities comparable to the Series 1985 B Bonds in which the Remarketing Agent is involved or of which it is aware, published or determined and announced on at least a quarterly basis.

"Series 1985 B Bonds" means the Bonds authorized by this Resolution and shall include, except as expressly noted in the First Supplemental Indenture, any Series 1985 B Bonds held by or for the account of the Letter of Credit Bank or its designee.

"Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument" means, as to the Series 1985 B Bonds, the Reimbursement or Line of Credit Agreement dated as of December 1, 1985, between the University and the Letter of Credit Bank (also known as the Standby Bond Purchase and Term Loan Agreement, dated as of December 30, 1985), as the same may from time to time be amended, modified or supplemented.

"Special Funds" means the Bond Fund, the Construction Fund, the Bond Reserve Fund and any accounts therein and any other funds or other accounts permitted by, established under or identified in the First Supplemental Indenture or this Resolution.

"Tender Agent" means, United States Trust Company of New York, New York, New York or any person meeting the qualifications of, and designated from time to time to act as Tender Agent under, Section 5(K) of the First Supplemental Indenture.

"Tender Date" means the first day of any Computation Period during a Rate Period.

"Termination Date" means the date on which the right to draw under the Letter of Credit, if any, terminates, determined as provided in the Letter of Credit, or the date the Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument terminates.

"Variable Rate Index" means the "Weekly Rate Index," the "Monthly Rate Index," the "Quarterly Rate Index," the "Semiannual Rate Index" and the "Annual Rate Index."

"Weekly Rate Index" means the Weekly Rate Index established by the Remarketing Agent from time to time which shall be a variable annual interest rate based upon yield evaluations at par of securities comparable to the Series 1985 B Bonds in which the Remarketing Agent is involved or of which it is aware, published or determined and announced on at least a weekly basis.

"Weekly Rate Period" means, as to the Series 1985 B Bonds, (i) the period from and including the date of original delivery of the Series 1985 B Bonds to the Original Purchasers thereof to and including the first Interest Adjustment Date, and (ii) any other Weekly Rate Period as provided for in Section 2(f)(i) hereof.

Any reference herein to the University, the Board, or to any officers thereof or to other public boards, commissions, departments, institutions, agencies, bodies, entities or officers, shall include those which succeed to their functions, duties or responsibilities pursuant to or by operation of law or who are lawfully performing their functions. Any reference to a section or provision of the Ohio Revised Code or to the laws of Ohio shall include such section or provision and such laws as from time to time amended, modified, revised, supplemented, or superseded, provided that no such amendment, modification, revision, supplementation, or supersession shall alter the obligation to pay the Bond Service Charges in the amount and manner, at the times, and from the sources provided in this Resolution and the First Supplemental Indenture, except as otherwise herein permitted.

Unless the context shall otherwise indicate, words importing the singular number shall include the plural number, and vice versa, and the terms "hereof," "herein," "hereby," "hereto," "hereunder," and similar terms, mean this Resolution.

Section 2. Authorization and Term.

(a) <u>Authorization</u>. The Bonds, to be designated and known as the Variable Rate Demand General Receipts Bonds, Series 1985 B, shall be issued pursuant to and as authorized by the Act, Section 2i of Article VIII of the Ohio Constitution, this Resolution, the Indenture and the First Supplemental Indenture for the purposes of financing the costs of the University Facilities comprising the Project, funding the Bond Reserve Fund and paying the costs and expenses incidental to the issuance of the Series 1985 B Bonds.

(b) <u>Form and Numbering</u>. The Series 1985 B Bonds shall be issued only as fully registered Bonds. The Series 1985 B Bonds shall be numbered as determined by the Trustee.

(c) <u>Denominations and Dates</u>. The Series 1985 B Bonds shall be in denominations of \$100,000 and integral multiples thereof and shall be dated as of the date of their original delivery to the Original Purchasers and otherwise as provided in the First Supplemental Indenture. After conversion to Fixed Interest Rates, the Series 1985 B Bonds shall be in denominations of \$5,000 and any integral multiple thereof.

(d) <u>Maximum Aggregate Principal Amount</u>. The Bonds shall be issued in a maximum aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$42,520,000.

(e) <u>Delivery and Execution</u>. The Chairman of the Board and the Treasurer are hereby authorized to make the necessary arrangements with the Original Purchasers to establish the date, location, procedures and conditions for the delivery of the Series 1985 B Bonds to the Original Purchasers and to take all steps as necessary to effect due execution, authentication and delivery of the Bonds to the Original Purchasers under the terms of this Resolution. The Bonds shall be signed by the Chairman of the Board and the Treasurer in their official capacities (provided that both of the signatures may be facsimiles) and shall bear the corporate seal of the University or a facsimile thereof.

(f) <u>Interest</u>.

(i) <u>Weekly Variable Rate</u>. During any Weekly Rate Period the Series 1985 B Bonds shall bear interest at the rate per annum established as follows, computed on the basis of a 365 or 366 day year, as applicable, for the actual number of days elapsed, and payable on the applicable Interest Payment Date. From the date of issuance and delivery of the Series 1985 B Bonds to the Original Purchasers to and including the first Interest Adjustment

Date, the Series 1985 B Bonds shall bear interest at the interest rate per annum contained in the Certificate of Award delivered on the date of issuance and delivery of the Series 1985 B Bonds to the Original Purchasers. Thereafter the Remarketing Agent shall determine the interest rate on the Series 1985 B Bonds on each Interest Adjustment Date and such rate (A) shall become effective on Thursday of such week, if such Interest Adjustment Date is the Wednesday of a calendar week, and (B) otherwise shall become effective on the next day after such Interest Adjustment Date. The interest rate on the Series 1985 B Bonds determined by the Remarketing Agent shall be the product of the Applicable Percentage times the Weekly Rate Index and shall be the interest rate which, if borne by the Series 1985 B Bonds, would, based upon current transactions in comparable securities in which the Remarketing Agent is involved or of which it is aware and prevailing financial market conditions, be the interest rate necessary to enable the which it Remarketing Agent to sell such Series 1985 B Bonds in the secondary market at a price equal to the principal amount thereof plus accrued interest thereon; provided, however, that (A) the interest rate so determined shall not be greater nor less than the Applicable Percentage times the Weekly Rate Index then in effect; (B) if, for any reason, the Remarketing Agent fails to make or to announce such determination on such Interest Adjustment Date, the rate to take effect on Thursday of such week or on the following day, as applicable, shall be the Applicable Percentage times the Weekly Rate Index already in effect on the Interest Adjustment Date; and (C) if, at any time, the Series 1985 B Bonds are held by or on behalf of the Letter of Credit Bank or its designee pursuant to the First Supplemental Indenture, the interest rate on such Series 1985 B Bonds shall be the Bank Bond Rate; provided, however, that in no event shall the interest rate (other than a Bank Bond Rate) on the Series 1985 B Bonds exceed the Maximum Interest Rate.

The Remarketing Agent shall announce the rate so determined by telephonic notice to the Trustee on the Interest Adjustment Date, and shall confirm such notice in writing sent by wire, telex, telecopier, or similar means of communication, on the same day. The Trustee shall give notice on the Interest Adjustment Date of the rate so determined by telephone, wire, telex, telecopier or other similar means of communication, to the University, the Paying Agents, the Letter of Credit Bank and, in the discretion of the Trustee, the registered holders of the Series 1985 B Bonds at the addresses shown on the Register, or at such other address as any registered holder of Series 1985 B Bonds shall have delivered to the Trustee for the purpose of receiving such notices, but the University and

the Trustee shall not be liable to any bondholder for failure to give such notice or for failure of any bondholder to receive such notice on the day following the Interest Adjustment Date or on any other date. If notice of the rate so determined is not sent to all of the registered holders of the Series 1985 B Bonds, it shall be either (a) sent by the Trustee only to the registered holders requesting such notice or (b) made available to all registered holders who telephone the Remarketing Agent and reguest it. The interest rate on the Series 1985 B Bonds so determined shall be conclusive and binding upon the holders of the Series 1985 B Bonds other than the Letter of Credit Bank.

(ii) <u>Monthly Variable Rate</u>. During any Monthly Rate Period the Series 1985 B Bonds shall bear interest at the rate per annum established as follows, computed on the basis of a 365 or 366 day year, as applicable, for the actual number of days elapsed, and applicable, for the actual number of days elapsed, and payable on the applicable Interest Payment Date. The Remarketing Agent shall determine the interest rate on the Series 1985 B Bonds on each Interest Adjustment Date, and such rate shall become effective on the following day. The interest rate on the Series 1985 B Bonds determined by the Remarketing Agent shall be the product of the Applicable Percentage times the Monthly Rate Index, and shall be the interest rate which, if borne by the Series 1985 B Bonds, would, based upon current transactions in comparable securities in which the Remarketing Agent is involved or of which it is aware and prevailing financial market conditions, be the interest rate necessary to enable the Remarketing Agent to sell those Series 1985 B Bonds in the secondary market at a price equal to the principal amount thereof plus accrued interest thereon; provided, however, that (A) the interest rate so determined shall not be greater nor less than the Applicable Percentage times the Monthly Rate Index then in effect; (B) if, for any reason, the Remarketing Agent fails to make or to announce such determination on such Interest Adjustment Date, the rate to take effect on the following day shall be the Applicable Percentage times the Monthly Rate Index already in effect on such Interest Adjustment Date; and (C) if, at any time, the Series 1985 B Bonds are held by or on behalf of the Letter of Credit Bank or its designee pursuant to the First Supplemental Indenture, the interest rate on such Series 1985 B Bonds shall be the Bank Bond Rate; provided, however, that in no event shall the interest rate (other than a Bank Bond Rate) on the Series 1985 B Bonds exceed the Maximum Interest Rate.

The Remarketing Agent shall announce the rate so determined by telephonic notice to the Trustee on the

The Trustee shall give notice on the Interest Adjustment Date of the rate so determined by telephone, telex, telecopier or other similar means of communication, to the University, the Paying Agents, the Letter of Credit Bank and, in the discretion of the Trustee, the registered holders of the Series 1985 B Bonds at the addresses shown on the Register, or at such other address as any registered holder of Series 1985 B Bonds shall have delivered to the Trustee for the purpose of receiving such notices, but the University and the Trustee shall not be liable to any bondholder for failure to give such notice or for failure of any bondholder to receive such notice on the day following the Interest Adjustment Date or on any other date. If notice of the rate so determined is not sent to all of registered holders of the Series 1985 B Bonds, it shall be either (a) sent by the Trustee only to the registered holders requesting such notice or (b) made available to all registered holders who telephone the Remarketing Agent and request it. The interest rate on the Series 1985 B Bonds so determined shall be conclusive and binding upon the holders of the Series 1985 B Bonds other than the Letter of Credit Bank.

(iii) <u>Quarterly Variable Rate</u>. During any Quarterly Rate Period the Series 1985 B Bonds shall bear interest at the rate per annum established as follows, computed on the basis of a 365 or 366 day year, as applicable, for the actual number of days elapsed, and payable on the applicable Interest Payment Date. The Remarketing Agent shall determine the interest rate on the Series 1985 B Bonds on each Interest Adjustment Date, and such rate shall become effective on the next succeeding Interest Payment Date or, if such day is not a Business Day, the succeeding day. The interest rate on the Series 1985 B Bonds determined by the Remarketing Agent shall be the product of the Applicable Percentage times the Quarterly Rate Index, and shall be the interest rate which, if borne by the Series 1985 B Bonds, would, based upon current transactions in comparable securities in which the Remarketing Agent is involved or of which it is aware and prevailing financial market conditions, be the interest rate necessary to enable the Remarketing Agent to sell those Series 1985 B Bonds in the secondary market at a price equal to the principal amount thereof plus accrued interest thereon; provided, however, that (A) the interest rate so determined shall not be greater than nor less than the Applicable Percentage times the Quarterly Rate Index then in effect; (B) if, for any reason, the Remarketing Agent fails to make or to announce such determination on such Interest Adjustment Date, the rate to take effect on the following

The Remarketing Agent shall announce the rate so determined by telephonic notice to the Trustee on the Interest Adjustment Date, and shall confirm such notice in writing sent by wire, telex, telecopier, or similar means of communication, on the same day. The Trustee shall give notice on the Interest Adjustment Date of the rate so determined by telephone, telex, telecopier or other similar means of communication, to the University, the Paying Agents, the Letter of Credit Bank and, in the discretion of the Trustee, the registered holders of the Series 1985 B Bonds at the addresses shown on the Register, or at such other address as any registered holder of Series 1985 B Bonds shall have delivered to the Trustee for the purpose of receiving such notices, but the University and the Trustee shall not be liable to any bondholder for failure to give such notice or for failure of any bondholder to receive such notice on the day following the Interest Adjustment Date or on any other date. If notice of the rate so determined is not sent to all of registered holders of the Series 1985 B Bonds, it shall be either (a) sent by the Trustee only to the registered holders requesting such notice or (b) made available to all registered holders who telephone the Remarketing Agent and request it. The interest rate on the Series 1985 B Bonds so determined shall be conclusive and binding upon the holders of the Series 1985 B Bonds other than the Letter of Credit Bank.

(iv) <u>Semiannual Rate Periods and Annual Rate</u> <u>Periods</u>. During any Semiannual Rate Period or Annual Rate Period the Series 1985 B Bonds shall bear interest at the rate per annum established as follows, computed on the basis of a 360-day year of twelve 30-day calendar months, and payable on the Interest Payment Date immediately following each Interest Period. The Remarketing Agent shall determine the interest rate on the Series 1985 B Bonds on each Interest Adjustment Date, and such rate shall become effective on the next succeeding Interest Payment Date. The interest rate on the Series 1985 B Bonds determined by the Remarketing Agent shall be the Applicable Percentage of the applicable Semiannual or Annual Rate Index, and shall be the

The Remarketing Agent shall announce the rate so determined by telephonic notice to the Trustee on the Interest Adjustment Date, and shall confirm such notice in writing sent by wire, telex, telecopier, or similar means of communication, on the same day. The Trustee shall give notice on the Interest Adjustment Date of the rate so determined by telephone, telex, telecopier or other similar means of communication, to the University, the Paying Agents, the Letter of Credit Bank and, in the discretion of the Trustee, the registered holders of the Series 1985 B Bonds at the addresses shown on the Register, or at such other address as any registered holder of Series 1985 B Bonds shall have delivered to the Trustee for the purpose of receiving such notices, but the University and the Trustee shall not be liable to any bondholder for failure to give such notice or for failure of any bondholder to receive such notice on the day following the Interest Adjustment Date or on any other date. If notice of the rate so determined is not sent to all of the registered holders of the Series 1985 B Bonds, it shall be either (a) sent by the Trustee only to the registered holders requesting such notice or (b) made available to all registered holders who telephone the Remarketing Agent and request it. The interest rate on the Series 1985 B Bonds so determined shall be conclusive and binding upon the holders of the Series 1985 B Bonds other than the Letter of Credit Bank.

The Series 1985 B Bonds shall be deemed converted to the semiannual interest rate or to the annual interest rate, as applicable, if (a) interest is payable semiannually on June 1 and December 1 (or if any June 1 or December 1 is not a Business Day, on the first Business Day thereafter), (b) the first Computation Period commences on the effective date of such conversion and ends on the day preceding the first Interest Payment Date thereafter, and (c) each succeeding Computation Period commences on a Semiannual Interest Payment Date and ends on the day preceding the next Semiannual Interest Payment Date or the second succeeding Semiannual Interest Payment Date, in the case of an Annual Interest Rate, thereafter. If the University shall elect to convert the Series 1985 B Bonds to the semiannual interest rate or to the annual interest rate, the Trustee, at the direction of the University shall give notice by mail to the holders of the Series 1985 B Bonds not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of conversion. Such notice shall state (A) that the interest rate on the Series 1985 B Bonds is scheduled to be converted to the semiannual interest rate or to the annual interest rate, as the case may be, (B) the effective date of such conversion, (C) that the effective date of such conversion shall be an Interest Payment Date on which interest will be paid at the applicable rate theretofore prevailing, (D) that thereafter interest will be determined on the basis set forth in this Section 2(f)(iv) and payable semiannually as above provided, and (E) that thereafter the Series 1985 B Bonds shall be purchased only on an Interest Payment Date as provided in Section 5 of the First Supplemental Indenture. Such notice shall be given by certified mail to the holders of the Series 1985 B Bonds whose names appear on the Register.

(v) Fixed Interest Rates. Upon conversion to Fixed Interest Rates as in this Section 2(f)(v) provided, the Series 1985 B Bonds of each maturity shall, from and after the date of conversion until maturity bear interest from the date of conversion, payable on the Interest Payment Date immediately following each Interest Period, at the Fixed Interest Rate applicable to that maturity, computed on the basis of a 360-day year of twelve 30-day calendar months. Upon receipt by the Paying Agents, the Trustee, the Letter of Credit Bank and the Remarketing Agent of a direction from the University or its Treasurer specifying the date of conversion (which shall be an Interest Payment Date not less than forty-five (45) days from the date the University gives such direction), the date the Fixed Interest Rates shall be established (which shall not be more than thirty (30) nor less than fifteen (15) days prior to the date of conversion), and, if applicable, approving a

Fixed Interest Index, the Remarketing Agent shall compute and make available to the University, the Trustee, the Letter of Credit Bank and the Paying Agents, the Fixed Interest Index. Such direction shall be accompanied by an opinion of Bond Counsel stating that such conversion to Fixed Interest Rates is authorized or permitted by the Indenture and the Act, and that conversion to the Fixed Interest Rates in accordance with the provisions of the First Supplemental Indenture will not adversely affect the exemption of the interest on the Series 1985 B Bonds from income taxation. Following receipt of the federal University's direction and the establishment of the Fixed Interest Index, the Remarketing Agent shall determine, on the date specified by the University for such determination, the Fixed Interest Rates as those interest rates which, if borne by the Series 1985 B Bonds of each maturity, based upon current transactions in comparable securities in which the Remarketing Agent is involved or of which it is aware and prevailing financial market conditions, be the interest rate necessary to enable the Remarketing Agent to sell the Series 1985 B Bonds then outstanding in the secondary market at a price equal to the principal thereof plus accrued interest thereon. Such determination by the Remarketing Agent shall be conclusive and shall be the Fixed Interest Rates for the Series 1985 B Bonds of each maturity commencing with the Interest Payment Date which is the date of conversion until maturity; provided, however, that in no event shall the interest rate (other than a Bank Bond Rate) on the Series 1985 B Bonds exceed the Maximum Interest Rate. The University shall have the right to deliver to the registered owners replacement Series 1985 B Bonds bearing the Fixed Interest Rates with deletion of such terms as are no longer applicable. Any such replacement Series 1985 B Bonds shall be executed and authenticated as provided generally in the Indenture.

At the direction of the University, the Trustee shall give notice by mail to the holders of the Series 1985 B Bonds not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of conversion to the Fixed Interest Rates. Such notice shall state (A) that the interest rate on the Series 1985 B Bonds is scheduled to be converted to Fixed Interest Rates, (B) the effective date on the Fixed Interest Rates, (C) the date the Fixed Interest Rates are scheduled to be determined, (D) that subsequent to such effective date the holders of Series 1985 B Bonds will no longer have the right to require purchase of Series 1985 B Bonds by the Tender Agent as otherwise required by this Resolution, (E) that all outstanding Series 1985 B Bonds not purchased by the Tender Agent on or prior to the effective date of the Fixed Interest Rates will be purchased by the University on the

effective date of the Fixed Interest Rates at a price of par plus accrued interest, if any, except Series 1985 B Bonds or portions thereof which the holder shall have directed the University not to purchase in accordance with Section 2(h)(iii)(D) hereof, (F) that any Letter of Credit or the Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument, as the case may be, will terminate upon the conversion of the interest rate on the Series 1985 B Bonds to Fixed Interest Rates, (G) that the then current Rating Service ratings on the Series 1985 B Bonds may based on the Letter of Credit or the Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument and may be reduced or withdrawn and (H) the maturity schedule (by bond number), mandatory sinking fund redemption schedule and optional redemption schedule, if any, and a description of the security for the Series 1985 B Bonds, which would become effective after conversion to Fixed Interest Rates. Such notice shall be given by registered or certified mail to the holders of the Series 1985 B Bonds whose names appear on the Register.

Any Series 1985 B Bond purchased by the Tender Agent pursuant to the terms of the First Supplemental Indenture from the date notice of a mandatory purchase is given in the manner provided herein through the effective date of the Fixed Interest Rates shall not be remarketed except to a buyer who agrees at the time of such purchase either (i) to accept the Fixed Interest Rates when the Fixed Interest Rates becomes effective or (ii) to require purchase of the Series 1985 B Bond by the Tender Agent pursuant to Section 5 of the Fixed Interest Rates. Series 1985 B Bonds purchased by the Tender Agent from such notice date through such effective date of the Fixed Interest Rates and not remarketed shall not be purchased, but shall (without the need for direction pursuant to Section 2(h)(iii)(D) hereof) remain outstanding as Series 1985 B Bonds bearing the Fixed Interest Rates.

(vi) <u>Conversion</u>. Upon receipt by the Paying Agents, the Trustee, the Letter of Credit Bank and the Remarketing Agent of (A) a direction from the University or its Treasurer, specifying the date a Weekly Rate Period, Monthly Rate Period, Quarterly Rate Period, Semiannual Rate Period or Annual Rate Period shall be established (which shall be an Interest Payment Date at least forty-five (45) days from the date the University gives such direction), (B) if a Semiannual Rate Period or Annual Rate Period is specified, a replacement for any Letter of Credit or a replacement for the Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument then in effect or an amendment to such Letter of Credit or to the Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument, as the case

may be, to cover the appropriate amount of interest as set forth in the definition of "Letter of Credit" or as then provided by the Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument, and (C) if a Semiannual Rate Period or an Annual Rate Period, the Computation Period for that Semiannual Rate Period or Annual Rate Period, the Remarketing Agent shall begin to compute the applicable Variable Rate Index and interest rate on the schedule provided in (i), (ii), (iii) or (iv) above. Such direction shall be accompanied by an opinion of Bond Counsel stating that such conversion is authorized or permitted by the Indenture and the Act, and that conversion to a Weekly Rate Period, a Monthly Rate Period, a Quarterly Rate Period, a Semiannual Rate Period or an Annual Rate Period in accordance with the provisions of the First Supplemental Indenture will not adversely affect the exemption of the interest on the Series 1985 B Bonds from federal income taxation.

(vii) Interest Rates on Bonds held by Letter of Credit Bank. Notwithstanding anything contrary contained in the First Supplemental Indenture, during any Interest Period (including, without limitation, a Fixed Rate Period) in which any Series 1985 B Bonds are held by or for the account of the Letter of Credit Bank or its designee by reason of the purchase of such Series 1985 B Bonds from a draw on the Letter of Credit or under the Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument (but not otherwise), the interest rate borne by such Series 1985 B Bonds (and only such Series 1985 B Bonds) shall be the Bank Bond Rate.

(viii) <u>Computation of Indices</u>. The Remarketing Agent shall at the request of the University compute and make available to the University the Weekly Rate Index, the Monthly Rate Index, the Quarterly Rate Index, the Semiannual Rate Index, the Annual Rate Index and the Fixed Rate Index at any time prior to conversion to the Fixed Interest Rates.

(g) <u>Maturities</u>. The Series 1985 B Bonds outstanding shall mature on December 1, 2001, unless they have been redeemed prior to such date by mandatory redemption or otherwise. If the Series 1985 B Bonds are converted to the Fixed Interest Rates, they may mature on each of the next succeeding December firsts in the amounts which would otherwise have been subject to mandatory sinking fund redemption on each such December 1, and shall otherwise mature and be subject to mandatory sinking fund redemption as provided herein for periods other than the Fixed Rate Period. Nothing in the preceding sentence shall be deemed to in any case extend the maturity of any Series 1985 B Bond if conversion occurs. The Series 1985 B Bonds (or portions

thereof in amounts of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof) to be assigned to each new maturity pursuant to this subsection shall be determined by lot in any manner which the Trustee may determine.

(h) <u>Redemption</u>. The Series 1985 B Bonds are subject to redemption as provided in the following paragraphs (i), (ii) and (iii).

(i) Optional Redemption. Prior to conversion to the Fixed Interest Rates, the Series 1985 B Bonds are subject to optional redemption at the election of the University upon forty-five (45) days' notice to the Trustee, prior to maturity in whole or in part (in integral multiples of \$100,000) on any Interest Payment Date at a redemption price equal to 100% of the principal amount redeemed plus accrued interest to the date of redemption. Any Series 1985 B Bonds held by the Letter of Credit Bank pursuant to the First Supplemental Indenture shall be called for redemption first.

If the Letter of Credit is in effect with respect to the Series 1985 B Bonds, on or prior to the termination of the Letter of Credit, (i) such redemption shall only be made from monies provided by the University and held by the Trustee for at least 124 days prior to the date notice of such redemption is given, and (ii) the Trustee shall not give notice of optional redemption without the prior written consent of the Letter of Credit Bank, unless the Trustee has such monies on deposit in the Special Bond Service Account and reserved solely for the purpose of such optional redemption in an amount sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the Series 1985 B Bonds to be redeemed.

(ii) Optional Redemption During Fixed Rate Period. Upon conversion to Fixed Interest Rates, the Series 1985 B Bonds are subject to optional redemption at the election of the University upon at least forty-five (45) days' notice to the Trustee, prior to maturity in whole or in part (in integral multiples of \$5,000) on any Interest Payment Date at a redemption price, plus accrued interest to the date of redemption, determined in accordance with the schedule to be specified in the Certificate of Award.

(iii) <u>Mandatory Redemption and Purchase</u> <u>Prior to Conversion to Fixed Rates</u>. (A) <u>Mandatory Sinking</u> <u>Fund Redemption</u>. Prior to conversion to the Fixed Rates, the Series 1985 B Bonds are subject to mandatory redemption by the University at a redemption price equal to 100% of the principal amount redeemed plus accrued interest to the date of redemption on December 1 in the principal amounts and in the years specified in the Certificate of Award.

The amounts set forth in the Certificate of Award as the mandatory redemption requirements in the years 1986 through 2000, and the principal amount remaining to be paid on December 1, 2001, shall constitute principal maturities in those years for the purposes of determining amounts to be deposited to the Bond Service Account and the amount of the Bond Reserve Requirement in respect of the Series 1985 B Bonds pursuant to the Indenture.

(B) <u>Mandatory Purchase Upon Expiration of Letter</u> of Credit or of the Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument. Prior to conversion to the Fixed Interest Rates and provided the Letter of Credit or the Series 1985 B and provided the Letter of Credit or the Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument is in effect with respect to the Series 1985 B Bonds, the Series 1985 B Bonds are subject to mandatory purchase by the University (A) in whole on December 1, 1990 (or such later date as is provided in the Certificate of Award) and on each December 1 thereafter at a purchase price of 100% of the principal amount thereof, unless on or before the immediately preceding August 1 the unless on or before the immediately preceding August 1, the Letter of Credit Bank shall have extended the expiration date of the Letter of Credit, or there shall be effective a date of the Letter of Credit, of there shall be effective a Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument, to a date not earlier than December 1 of the next succeeding year or a replacement Letter of Credit or Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument issued in accordance with Section 6(B) of the First Supplemental Indenture and containing an expiration date of not earlier than December 1 of the next succeeding year shall have been delivered to the Trustee and (B) on the effective date of any Benlacement Letter of Credit or Series effective date of any Replacement Letter of Credit or Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument provided pursuant to Section 6(B) of the First Supplemental Indenture unless the Series 1985 B Bonds, with such Replacement Letter of Credit Series 1985 B Bonds, with such Replacement Letter of Credit or 1985 Series B Credit Support Instrument, will bear ratings from each Rating Service at least as high as the Series 1985 B Bonds are rated immediately prior to the provision of such replacement Letter of Credit or Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument. In the event that the Series 1985 B Bonds are to be converted to Fixed Interest Rates, effective on the Interest Payment Date next preceding the date of expiration of the Letter of Credit, any purchase on such Interest Payment Date shall occur pursuant to paragraph (C) below and not this paragraph (B). Notice of any mandatory purchase pursuant to this subsection (B) shall be given by the Trustee, not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date fixed for mandatory purchase, to the University, the Paying Agents, the Letter of Credit Bank and the registered holders of the Series 1985 B Bonds at the addresses shown on the Register, or at such other address as any registered holder of the Series 1985 B Bonds shall have

delivered to the Trustee for the purpose of receiving such notices; provided that failure to receive notice by mailing, or any defect in that notice, as to any Bond shall not affect the validity of the proceedings for the purchase of any other Bond. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this paragraph (B) there shall be no mandatory purchase under this paragraph (B) of any Series 1985 B Bonds which are deemed to have been paid and are no longer deemed to be outstanding.

The Trustee shall pay the price of Series 1985 B Bonds so purchased: First, from the proceeds of remarketing such Series 1985 B Bonds, Second, from a drawing upon the Letter of Credit, if any, Third, from the Special Bond Letter of Credit, if any, <u>Inira</u>, from the Special Bond Service Account and any other sources available for such purchase, whether from the University or otherwise and <u>Fourth</u>, from amounts obtained by or on behalf of the University under the Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument, if in accordance with the terms of such instrument. As and when the Series 1985 B Bonds so purchased by the University are received by the Trustee, the Trustee shall pay the purchase price for such Series 1985 B Bonds as aforesaid, and the University shall cause such Bonds as aforesaid, and the University shall cause such Series 1985 B Bonds to be resold forthwith at a price as to the principal thereof at least equal to the University's purchase price for the principal of such Series 1985 B Bonds. Prior to such resale (so long as Obligations of the University under the Reimbursement Agreement or Bond Service Charges on such Series 1985 B Bonds held by or for the account of the Letter of Credit Bank are unsatisfied), such Series 1985 B Bonds shall be held by the Trustee for the account of the Letter of Credit Bank or, at the option of the Letter of Credit Bank, shall be delivered to the Letter of Credit Bank or its designee, within three Business Days after such payment and, if the Letter of Credit Bank so directs, shall be registered in the name of the Letter of Credit Bank or its designee and will be delivered to persons (other than the University) purchasing such Series 1985 B Bonds upon receipt by the Letter of Credit Bank of the purchase price therefor. The Trustee shall maintain a record of the numbers of the Series 1985 B Bonds so purchased by the University.

(C) <u>Mandatory Purchase Upon Establishment of</u> <u>Fixed Interest Rates</u>. The Series 1985 B Bonds are subject to mandatory purchase by the University in whole upon conversion to Fixed Interest Rates at a purchase price of 100% of the principal amount thereof on the Interest Payment Date which is the effective date of the Fixed Interest Rates provided that there shall not be so purchased Series 1985 B Bonds with respect to which the Trustee shall have received

direction not to so purchase the same from the holders thereof in accordance with Section 2(h)(iii)(D) hereof and Series 1985 B Bonds which have been remarketed as Series 1985 B Bonds with Fixed Interest Rates. Notice of any mandatory purchase pursuant to this subsection (C) shall be given in the same manner and at the same time as a notice of mandatory purchase in the manner provided in subsection (B) above; provided that failure to receive notice by mailing, or any defect in that notice, as to any Bond shall not affect the validity of the proceedings for the purchase of any other Bond.

The Trustee shall pay the price of Series 1985 B Bonds so purchased by the University: First, from the proceeds of remarketing such Series 1985 B Bonds, Second, from a drawing upon the Letter of Credit, if any, Third, from the Special Bond Service Account or any other sources available for such purchase, whether from the University or otherwise and <u>Fourth</u>, from amounts obtained by or on behalf of the University under the Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument, if such amounts are available in accordance with the terms thereof. As and when the Series 1985 B Bonds so purchased by the University are received by the Trustee, the Trustee shall pay the purchase price for such Series 1985 B Bonds as aforesaid, and the University shall cause such Series 1985 B Bonds to be resold forthwith at a price as to the principal thereof at least equal to the University's purchase price for the principal of such Series 1985 B Bonds. Prior to such resale (so long as any Obligations of the University under any Reimbursement Agreement or Bond Service Charges on such Series 1985 B Bonds held by or for the account of the Letter of Credit Bank are unsatisfied), such Series 1985 B Bonds shall be held by the Trustee for the account of the Letter of Credit Bank or, at the option of the Letter of Credit Bank, shall be delivered to the Letter of Credit Bank or its designee, within three Business Days after such payment and, if the Letter of Credit Bank so directs, shall be registered in the name of the Letter of Credit Bank or its designee and will be delivered to persons (other than the University) purchasing such Series 1985 B Bonds upon receipt by the Letter of Credit Bank of the purchase price therefor. The Trustee shall maintain a record of the numbers of Series 1985 B Bonds so purchased by the University.

It shall be the duty of the Trustee to hold the monies drawn by the Trustee under the Letter of Credit or otherwise provided for the purchase on such Interest Payment Date of any undelivered Series 1985 B Bonds, without liability for interest thereon, for the benefit of the former holders of the Series 1985 B Bonds, who shall

thereafter be restricted exclusively to such monies, for such claim of whatever nature on their part under the Indenture or on, or with respect to, such Series 1985 B Bonds. Any monies so deposited with and held by the Trustee and not so applied to the payment of Series 1985 B Bonds within four years after such Interest Payment Date shall be paid by the Trustee to the University. Thereafter the former holders shall be entitled to look only to the University for payment, and then only to the extent of the amount so repaid to the University and the University shall not be liable for any interest thereon and shall not be regarded as a trustee of such money.

Direction Not to Purchase Series 1985 B (D) Bonds Upon Conversion to Fixed Interest Rates or Upon Expiration of Letter of Credit or of the Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument. Upon and in connection with the conversion to Fixed Interest Rates or expiration of the Letter of Credit, if any, or of the Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument (if such Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument was in effect upon issuance and sale of the Series 1985 B Bonds), a holder may direct the University not to purchase all or any portion (in the principal amount of \$5,000 or any multiple thereof, if the Series 1985 B Bonds are being converted to Fixed Interest Rates, and otherwise in the principal amount of \$100,000 or any multiple thereof) of any Series 1985 B Bond held by him by delivering to the Trustee at its principal corporate trust office on or before the fifth Business Day preceding the date fixed for such purchase an instrument or instruments in writing executed by such holder (A) specifying the numbers and denominations of Series 1985 B Bonds held by him, (B) acknowledging receipt of notice of the matters set forth in clauses (A) through (H) of the second paragraph of Section 2(f)(v) hereof, if applicable, and (C) directing the University not to purchase such Series 1985 B Bonds or portions thereof (in the principal amount of \$5,000 or any multiple thereof, if the Series 1985 B Bonds are being converted to Fixed Interest Rates, and otherwise in the principal amount of \$100,000 or any multiple thereof); provided, however, that a holder who makes such a direction must hold such Series 1985 B Bonds at least through the date of conversion to Fixed Interest Rates or through the date of expiration of the Letter of Credit, if any, or the expiration of the Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument, as the case may be.

Any instrument delivered to the Trustee in accordance with this Section 2(h)(iii)(D) shall be irrevocable with respect to the purchase for which such instrument was delivered and shall be binding upon

Mandatory Purchase Upon Certain Defaults. (E) Prior to the Termination Date and upon the occurrence of an Event of Default as defined in subsections (a) or (b) of Section 6.01 of the Indenture or as defined in Section 6(D) of the First Supplemental Indenture, all Series 1985 B Bonds (other than Series 1985 B Bonds held by or for the account of the University) shall be purchased by the Trustee on the date set forth in the notice given by the Trustee (which date shall be 10 days from the date of such notice) at a purchase price equal to the principal amount thereof plus accrued interest, if any, to the date of such purchase. Any Series 1985 B Bonds not delivered for purchase on the date specified notice shall nonetheless be in such deemed tendered for the sale by the holder thereof and purchased by the Trustee and deemed to be no longer outstanding under the Indenture, provided that sufficient monies are then on deposit with the Trustee for such purchase. Notice of any mandatory purchase pursuant to this subsection (E) shall be given in the same manner as a notice of mandatory purchase in the manner provided in subsection (B) above; provided that failure to receive notice by mailing, or any defect in that notice, as to any Bond shall not affect the validity of the proceedings for the purchase of any other Bond.

The Trustee shall pay the price of Series 1985 B Bonds so purchased by the University: First, from a drawing upon the Letter of Credit, if any, and Second, from the Special Bond Service Account or any other sources available for such purchase, whether from the University or otherwise and Third, from amounts obtained by or on behalf of the University under the Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument, if such amounts are available in accordance with the terms thereof. As and when the Series 1985 B Bonds so purchased by the University are received by the Trustee, the Trustee shall pay the purchase price for such Series 1985 B Bonds as aforesaid. (F) Mandatory Purchase by University of Series 1985 B Bonds Held by Letter of Credit Bank Upon Termination of Letter of Credit. On the Termination Date of the Letter of Credit or the Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument, whichever is in effect with respect to the Series 1985 B Bonds, the University shall purchase, or cause the purchase, from the Letter of Credit Bank of all Series 1985 B Bonds held by or for the account of the Letter of Credit Bank or its designee, at a price equal to 100% of the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest in respect of such Series 1985 B Bonds held by or for the account of the Letter of Credit Bank or its designee.

(G) Reimbursement of Letter of Credit Bank. After a draw on the Letter of Credit pursuant to Section 6(A) of the First Supplemental Indenture or Section 2(h)(iii)(B), (C) or (E) hereof, and payment or provision for payment of all outstanding Series 1985 B Bonds (other than Series 1985 B Bonds held by or for the account of the University or the Letter of Credit Bank or its designee), the Trustee shall, upon direction of the Letter of Credit Bank, <u>First</u>, transfer a pro rata portion (based on the ratio of the amount of the Obligations under the Reimbursement Agreement to the total amount of the obligations equally and proportionately secured thereby) of any amounts on deposit in the Bond Fund and available for payment of Obligations under the Reimbursement Agreement, <u>Second</u>, transfer a pro rata portion (based on the ratio of the amount of the Obligations under the Reimbursement Agreement to the total amount of the Obligations equally and proportionately secured thereby) of any amounts on deposit in the Bond Reserve Fund, and <u>Third</u>, transfer any other funds pledged and available for the payment of Obligations under the Reimbursement Agreement, to the Letter of Credit Bank to reimburse the Letter of Credit Bank, in whole or in part, for any such Obligations.

(i) <u>Appointment of Remarketing Agent</u>. The Board hereby appoints John Nuveen & Co. Incorporated as the initial Remarketing Agent under the First Supplemental Indenture.

(j) <u>Appointment of Tender Agent</u>. The Board hereby appoints United States Trust Company of New York, New York, New York as the initial Tender Agent under the First Supplemental Indenture.

(k) <u>Security</u>. There is hereby confirmed the pledge, in priority to all other expenses, claims and payments, to the security of the Series 1985 B Bonds and for the payment of the Bond Service Charges on the Series 1985 B

Bonds and for establishment and maintenance of the Bond Reserve Requirement (as defined in the Indenture), the gross amount of General Receipts of the University (subject to the provisions for the partial release of a pledge of General Receipts contained in Section 4.11 of the Indenture), and the Special Funds, as provided in the Indenture. In accordance with the Act, all the General Receipts or portions thereof are immediately subject to the lien of the pledge upon receipt thereof by the University, and such pledge creates a perfected security interest without necessity for prior separation, physical delivery, filing or recording or further act. If the Letter of Credit is in effect with respect to the Series 1985 B Bonds, such Bonds shall also be payable from monies derived by the Trustee from drawings under the Letter of Credit.

(1) Payment, Places of Payment and Paying Agents. Principal of and redemption premium on the Series 1985 B Bonds when due shall be payable to the registered holders, upon presentation and surrender thereof, at the principal corporate trust office of the Trustee and the Tender Agent, respectively. Interest shall be payable by check or draft mailed by the Trustee as provided in the Indenture; provided, however, that interest on Series 1985 B Bonds aggregating \$1,000,000 or more in principal amount registered in the name of a single holder shall be paid by wire transfer in immediately available funds to such account, if any, as such holder directs in writing to the Trustee. Interest on Series 1985 B Bonds held by the Letter of Credit Bank or its designee shall be paid (at the Bank Bond Rate) by wire transfer on each Interest Payment Date unless the Letter of Credit Bank notifies the Trustee of a different mutually acceptable method.

(m) <u>Purchase Rights</u>. The holders of Series 1985 B Bonds shall have certain rights to have their Series 1985 B Bonds purchased at certain times and on certain conditions described in Section 5 of the First Supplemental Indenture.

Section 3. <u>Sale of the Series 1985 B Bonds;</u> <u>Certificate of Award; Offering Memorandum</u>. It having been determined that all conditions have been met for the issuance of Additional Bonds under the Indenture, the Series 1985 B Bonds are sold and awarded to the Original Purchasers in accordance with the Contract of Purchase at the purchase price (not less than ninety-nine per cent (99%) of the principal amount plus accrued interest) provided in the Certificate of Award. The form of Contract of Purchase now on file with the Secretary of the Board is hereby approved, together with any changes therein and completions thereof which are not inconsistent with this Resolution and not

substantially adverse to the University, and as are permitted by the Act and approved on behalf of the University by the Treasurer. The approval on behalf of the University of those changes and completions by the Treasurer, and the status of those changes as not substantially adverse to the University, shall be conclusively evidenced by the execution of the Contract of Purchase on behalf of the University by the Treasurer. It is determined hereby that the Purchase Price and the manner of sale and the terms of the Series 1985 B Bonds, as provided in this Resolution, are consistent with all legal requirements and will carry out the public purposes of the Act. Such award shall be further evidenced by the Certificate of Award, which shall state or confirm the aggregate principal amount of the Series 1985 B Bonds to be issued, the purchase price, the allocation of proceeds, the initial interest rate or rates, the maturity dates, the mandatory sinking fund requirements and the contract of Purchase. The Certificate of Award shall also include the form of the Series 1985 B Bonds (the "Form of Bond"), attached thereto as Exhibit A. The Certificate of Award is hereby authorized and shall be executed by the Treasurer and shall also contain such other data or provisions as such officer determines are appropriate or necessary, consistent with this Resolution, the Indenture, the First Supplemental Indenture and the Contract of Purchase. The Certificate of Award shall be deemed a part of this Resolution in connection with the authorization, issuance and sale of the Bonds.

The distribution of the Preliminary Offering Memorandum relating to the Series 1985 B Bonds is hereby approved. The use and distribution of the final Offering Memorandum relating to the original issuance of the Series 1985 B Bonds, substantially in the form of the Preliminary Offering Memorandum now on file with the Board, subject to any changes, modifications or supplements approved by the Treasurer on behalf of the Board, is hereby authorized for the period of initial marketing of the Series 1985 B Bonds. The Board has not confirmed, and assumes no responsibility for, the accuracy, sufficiency or fairness of any statements in the Preliminary Offering Memorandum or the final Offering Memorandum or any supplements thereto, or in any reports, financial information, offering or disclosure documents or other information in any way relating to the Letter of Credit Bank or the Original Purchasers.

The Treasurer is authorized and directed to make the necessary arrangements with the Original Purchasers to establish the date (which shall not be prior to December 30, 1985) location, procedures and conditions for the delivery of the Series 1985 B Bonds to the Original Purchasers and to take all steps necessary to effect due execution, authentication and delivery of the Series 1985 B Bonds to the Original Purchasers under the terms of this Resolution.

Section 4. <u>Allocation of Proceeds</u>. The proceeds from the sale of the Series 1985 B Bonds, including any accrued interest, shall be allocated, deposited and applied as follows:

- (i) To the Bond Fund, accrued interest received on the sale of the Series 1985 B Bonds;
- (ii) To the Bond Reserve Fund an amount equal to the Bond Reserve Requirement in respect to the Series 1985 B Bonds; and
- (iii) To the Construction Fund, the entire remaining amount of those proceeds, to be applied to the purposes of that Fund, including transfers from that Fund authorized by the Act and to pay costs and expenses associated with the issuance of the Series 1985 B Bonds.

Section 5. <u>Construction Fund</u>. There is hereby created by the University and ordered maintained a separate deposit account designated the "1985 University Construction Fund" (the "Construction Fund"). The Construction Fund shall be funded from the proceeds of the sale of the Series 1985 B Bonds. Monies in the Construction Fund (including monies earned on investment of monies in the Construction Fund) may be used for the payment or reimbursement of all costs and expenses constituting Project costs and to pay costs and expenses associated with the issuance of the Series 1985 B Bonds. Payments from the Construction Fund shall be made as provided in Section 9 of the Series 1985 A Bond Resolution.

Section 6. Use of Proceeds. The University covenants that the use of the proceeds of the Series 1985 B Bonds will be restricted in such manner and to such extent, if any, as may be necessary, after taking into account reasonable expectations at the time of delivery of and payment for the Series 1985 B Bonds, so that the Series 1985 B Bonds will not constitute arbitrage bonds under the Code.

The Treasurer of the University, or any other officer having responsibility with respect to the issuance of the Series 1985 B Bonds, alone or in conjunction with any other officer or employee of or consultant to the University, will give an appropriate certificate of the University for inclusion in the transcript of proceedings for the Series 1985 B Bonds setting forth the reasonable expectations of the University regarding the amount and use of all those proceeds and the facts and estimates on which they are based, all as of the date of original delivery of and payment for the Series 1985 B Bonds. The University further convenants that if at any time amounts in the Bond Reserve Fund allocable to and constituting proceeds of the Series 1985 B Bonds under the Code, together with any other acquired obligations chargeable to the minor portion of the Series 1985 B Bonds, would exceed such minor portion, the Treasurer of the University shall cause such amounts in the Bond Reserve Fund, to the extent necessary, to be reinvested so that only such amounts not in excess of that minor portion are invested at a yield materially higher than the yield on the Series 1985 B Bonds as determined pursuant to the Code.

Section 7. <u>Further Covenants</u>. In addition to the covenants in Section 5 and elsewhere contained herein, the University reconfirms its covenants listed in Section 13 of the Series 1985 A Bond Resolution.

Section First Supplemental Indenture, 8. Remarketing Agreement, Reimbursement Agreement, Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument and Other Documents. In order better to secure the payment of the Bond Service Charges as the same shall become due and payable, the Chairman of the Board, the President of the University and the Secretary of the Board and the Treasurer, or any one or more of them, are authorized and directed to execute, acknowledge and deliver, in the name and on behalf of the University and pursuant to the Indenture, the First Supplemental Indenture to the Trustee, the Remarketing Agreement, the Reimbursement Agreement, the Letter of Credit Agreement, if any, and the 1985 B Credit Support Instrument, each in Series substantially the form submitted to this Board or to such officers on behalf of this Board and the University, and hereby approved, with such changes therein not substantially adverse to the University as may be permitted by the Act and approved by the officers executing the same on behalf of the University. The approval of such changes by said officers, and that such changes are not substantially adverse to the University, shall be conclusively evidenced by the execution of each such instrument or document by such officers. Such officers are further authorized to execute and deliver on

behalf of the University such other certificates, documents and instruments as are necessary in connection with the acts authorized by this Resolution.

Section 9. <u>Text of Resolution</u>. The text of this Resolution authorizing the issuance and sale of the Series 1985 B Bonds and related acts by the University may be changed for the purpose of curing any ambiguity, inconsistency or formal defect or omission in this Resolution or in respect of this Resolution as it relates to the Indenture, the First Supplemental Indenture, the Certificate of Award, the Form of Bond, the Offering Memorandum, the Remarketing Agreement, the Letter of Credit Agreement or the Series 1985 B Credit Support Instrument. Such changes shall be subject to the approval of any one of the officers of the University referred to in Section 8 above as being changes not substantially adverse to the University or contrary to the true intent and meaning hereof and shall be acceptable to Bond Counsel.

Section 10. <u>Open Meeting Determination</u>. It is found and determined that all formal actions of the Board concerning and relating to the adoption of this Resolution or adopted in an open meeting of the Board, and that all deliberations of the Board and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements including Section 121.22 of the Revised Code.

Section 11. <u>Effective Date</u>. This Resolution shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its adoption. Reference shall be made to the Indenture and the First Supplemental Indenture concerning matters not specifically addressed in this Resolution.

Upon motion of Mr. Immke, seconded by Mr. Barone, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous roll call vote.

#### **Commencement Speaker**

#### Charles A. Csuri

A pioneer in computer animation and graphics, Charles A. Csuri is a professor of art education and of computer and information science at The Ohio State University. Through his position as director of the University's Computer Graphics Research Group, he has provided a conceptual framework for new directions in art. Csuri has developed an experimental program of graduate study for artists and animators at Ohio State that has attracted worldwide interest.

With support from the National Science Foundation, the Navy, and the Air Force Office of Scientific Research, he has directed basic research in computer graphics for the past 18 years. This work has involved 14 major projects and more than \$3 million in external funding. The research results have been applied to flight simulators, computer-aided design, science education, anatomy, education for the deaf, architecture, and special effects for television and films.

Csuri has published widely, and his research has been described in at least 20 books and a number of journals. He is on the editorial board of the IEEE Journal of Computer Graphics and Applications and the editorial advisory board of Computer Graphics Today. He received a Distinguished Research Award from Ohio State in 1983 and the Golden Eagle Award in 1985 from the Visual Communications Congress in New York.

Csuri has appeared on the Today show and Watter Cronkite's Universe, as well as on Japanese, Belgian, and German television. He founded Cranston/Csuri Productions, which has produced animation for all three major U.S. television networks, commercial clients, and The Living Body, a series of 24 television programs scheduled for worldwide distribution in 1986.

Csuri was awarded a Bronze Star for heroism during the Second World War. The holder of bachelor's and master of fine arts degrees from Ohio State, he was an All-American tackle and most valuable player on the University's national championship football team in 1942.

#### Richard T. Baker

## Doctor of Accounting and Business Administration

Richard T. Baker has brought distinction to The Ohio State University in a career that has earned him national prominence in business, education, and community service. Baker earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from Ohio State in 1939, was senior class president, and a member of the Big Ten championship basketball team.

Prior to retiring in 1977 as managing partner of Ernst & Whinney in Cleveland, he had helped the firm earn a reputation as one of the most progressive in the field of accounting and as perhaps the most committed to the importance of higher education. Under Baker's direction, the firm sponsored a seminar series that brought together educators and professionals to address vital issues in accounting. The firm also provided substantial support for doctoral students, internship opportunities for faculty members, support, for research projects, and initiated a program to provide faculty assistance in accounting to predominantly black colleges.

Baker was a charter member of the Ohio Board of Regents and helped formulate its Master Plan for Higher Education in the state. He played an important role in the creation of Cleveland State University and Cuyahoga Community College. Baker has also served several other universities in an advisory capacity. His service to his alma mater has included membership in The Presidents Club, the Pace Setters, and the Business Administration Advisory Council. The Ernst and Whinney Professorship of Accounting was established at Ohio State in his honor upon his retirement. Baker continues to have an impact in the business community through his membership and key committee roles on the boards of directors of several national corporations, including Gereral Electric Company and Anheuser-Busch, Inc.

On the civic scene, Richard Baker has been an ardent volunteer in the promotion of community development and social service in Cleveland. He did much to advance the cause of Cleveland's United Way effort and served on the board of governors of the United Way of America. He was a director and first vice-chairman of the Greater Cleveland Growth Association and has served on the boards of numerous other arts and civic organizations in northern Ohio.

Baker is acclaimed by all who know him for his creativity, integrity, and insightful approach to leadership in business, education, and community service. Ohio State is proud to honor this most distinguished alumnus.

#### George W. Baughman Doctor of Engineering

Rarely does one man so profoundly influence the industry or profession that he serves as has George W. Baughman. Throughout a career spanning nearly half a century, Baughman applied new technologies to one of this nation's vital transportation links—the railway system. His applications have been adopted around the world.

As an engineer in the 1920's for the Union Switch and Signal Division of the Westinghouse Air Brake Company, Baughman was faced with the challenges of automating the system that railroads used to safely control rail traffic and developing remote control systems for the operation of switches and signals. In response to these chailenges, he developed the concept of "centralized traffic control" that provided enhanced rail safety, increased capacity, more economical operations, and vastly improved train systems management. These benefits played an important role in the ability of the nation's railroads to meet the increased demands placed upon them during World War II. It is a tribute to Baughman's skill and foresight that his techniques and systems, although updated with new technology, remain fundamentally the same today as when he developed them several decades ago. He is the holder of more than 100 patents.

Baughman received a bachelor of electrical engineering degree from Ohio State in 1920, followed in 1924 by the professional degree of electrical engineer. After a brief stint at Bell Telephone Laboratories, he joined Union Switch and Signal. He later became vice president and was assistant to the president when he retired in 1967. He has consulted widely, both here and abroad. Baughman has been honored for his work by being named a fellow of the American Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers, the British Institute of Railway Signal Engineers, and by election to the honoraries Tau Beta Pi, Eta Kappa Nu, and Sigma Xi. He is a recipient of the Elmer A. Sperry Award for distinguished engineering contributions that significantly advanced transportation and received the Benjamin G. Lamme Medal from Ohio State's College of Engineering for his achievements. Baughman has been active in professional associations, as well as civic and community affairs.

Ohio State is proud to honor this creative and influential alumnus for his decades of achievement.

# **Recipients of Honors**

#### David Riesman Doctor of Social and Behavioral Sciences

Colleagues describe sociologist and educator David Riesman as a major force in American sociology and one of the major intellectual leaders in the United States in the past several decades. His writings and teachings have influenced a generation of students across the nation's campuses.

Riesman earned both the A.B. degree and the LL.B. from Harvard University in 1931 and 1934 respectively. He then served as a law clerk for Justice Louis Branders of the United States Supreme Court from 1935 to 1936. After several years of practicing and teaching law, he joined the social sciences faculty at the University of Chicago. In 1958, Riesman became the Henry Ford II Professor of Social Sciences at Harvard—a position he still holds.

Riesman's scholarly contributions have been most profound in two areas: post-war American society and the nation's higher education system. His books, *The Lonely Crowd* and *Faces in the Crowd*, were insightful analyses of post-war America, showing how changing occupations and societal characteristics led to alienation, feelings of powerlessness, and loss of personal identity among Americans in the last half of the 20th century.

His studies of academia have provided insight to the ways in which the growth of the research university has affected the values and behavior of American higher education in general. Riesman has also addressed the characteristics of community colleges, women's colleges, black colleges, and reliajous affiliated schools.

Riesman has been a member of the Carnegie Commission for Study of Higher Education from 1967 to 1973 and the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton University from 1971 to 1972. He also was a fellow at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences at Stanford from 1968 to 1969.

For his scholarship and contributions to American thought, David Riesman has received honorary degrees from a number of institutions. Ohio State is pleased to offer its own recognition to this distinguished scholar.

#### D. Ransom Whitney Distinguished Service Award

D. Ransom Whitney has devoted more than 35 years to the students of Ohio State and the academic discipline of statistics. After earning a bachelor's degree from Oberlin College, a master's from Princeton University, and a Ph.D. from Ohio State, Whitney joined the faculty of Ohio State as an assistant professor of mathematics in 1948. He retired as professor emeritus in 1982. In the intervening years, he had a profound influence on mathematics and statistics education at this University.

in 1948, he founded the Statistics Laboratory to provide a source of statistical experience for students and faculty, as well as to offer consulting experience for statistics graduate students. The laboratory has become a local and statewide resource for the business community, and it has been emulated by many other universities. Whitney was also the primary force behind the planning and construction of a new mathematics building. Finally, he led the move to form a separate academic unit for the teaching of statistics, resulting in the creation of a Department of Statistics in 1970. He then served as its chairperson for nine years. While on the faculty, Whitney published three textbooks and numerous articles, advised hundreds of graduate students, and consulted with many faculty members on their research. He also served one term as president of the Faculty Club.

Whitney is a fellow of the American Statistical Association and the American Association for the Advancement of Science and holds memberships in several other professional organizations. Since retirement, he has continued to consult actively, both with business clients and in the Statistics Laboratory. He also accepted the presidency of the recently formed Ohio State University Retirees' Association.

For his dedication to the University, its people, and his profession, Ohio State is honored to present its Distinguished Service Award to D. Ransom Whitney.

### OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Columbus, Ohio, February 6 and 7, 1986

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, February 6, and Friday, February 7, 1986, at The Ohio State University Fawcett Center for Tomorrow, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

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Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

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The Chairman, Mr. Havens, called the meeting of the Board of Trustees to order on February 6, 1986, at 6:35 p.m. He requested the Secretary to call the roll. The meeting recessed into Executive Session for the purpose of considering legal issues and personnel-related matters.

Present: John F. Havens, Chairman, Leonard J. Immke, Shirley D. Bowser, Hamilton J. Teaford, and Deborah E. Casto.

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Mr. Havens reconvened the meeting on February 7, 1986, at 10:15 a.m.

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Mr. Havens called upon Professor Jan Adams, Director of International Studies.

Dr. Jan Adams: President Jennings, Mr. Chairman, members of the Board, it is a great honor and pleasure for me to introduce to you our outstanding scholar-athlete, Mike Lanese, who has just been awarded a Rhodes Scholarship for study at Oxford University for the next two years. Mike has, certainly in abundance, the qualities for which Rhodes scholars are selected--academic and athletic excellence and outstanding qualities of character and leadership. While earning a double major in English and Political Science, he has maintained a grade point average of 3.76. I know that you have all admired and appreciated his prowess and courage on the football field. These achievements have brought him numerous national awards including the Toyota Leader of the Year Award, which brings our University \$10,000 for our general scholarship fund.

I don't want to detract in any way from the celebration here today of Mike's accomplishments. But I think it is fitting to take this occasion to acknowledge the efforts of a number of our faculty, staff and friends of OSU who have been working very hard in recent years to try to inform our like Mike, talented students not only about the opportunities available to them as Rhodes Scholars, but also as Marshall Scholars, which, as you know, offers similar opportunities. Each year, thirty Marshall Scholars are chosen in the United States for two years of study at a Chosen in the united states for two years of study at a British university. The OSU Rhodes/Marshall Faculty Committee came into being in the late 1970's to provide a mock interview for a Rhodes candidate. Today this committee has twenty faculty members. In recent years, the group has worked very hard to try to identify potential student candidates for both of these awards and then to assist these students in the painstaking process--and believe me it is

painstaking and time-consuming for the students--of making these applications and preparing the students for interviews.

Just five years ago, John Mount, then Dean of University College, and his alumni advisor, Jack Eby, a Senior Vice President of the Ford Company, funded a luncheon for thirty outstanding freshmen and sophomores to tell them about Rhodes and Marshall Scholarships. I remember that Jack Eby gave a very impressive talk about the importance of these scholarships from the point of view of a business executive. Later, Mr. Eby established an endowment--the John Mount Fund--to make sure that these luncheons and other recruitment efforts could continue. President Jennings has personally hosted these lunches and our speakers have included Governor Celeste, who was, as you know, a Rhodes Scholar from Yale University.

Five years ago, our half-time advisor who provides information and assistance to students interested in applying for the Rhodes, Marshall and other international scholarships, was given a full time appointment. With her help, students could be directed to individual faculty members of the Rhodes/Marshall Committee for personal advice with their plans and preparations. All of this has proved fruitful.

For the past five years, each year an average of ten OSU students have made formal applications for Rhodes and Marshall Scholarships. For the past five years, each year at least one of our students has been invited for interviews by the Rhodes or Marshall Selection Committees. Since 1982, in addition to Mike Lanese's signal honor, two OSU students received Marshall Scholarships for study at Cambridge University. Dean Allemang, our first Marshall Scholar, has now returned to OSU and is pursuing his doctorate here working in the field of artificial intellegience. Our second Marshall Scholar, Gerard Williger, is currently spending his first year at Cambridge studying astronomy.

But Mike, this is your day, and I am sure the Board members are more interested in hearing from you than from me.I just want to say, Mike, that this is a proud moment for all of us and that we are deeply grateful to you for the honor that you have brought our University.

### Harry G. Binau, Jr.

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on November 3, 1985, of Harry G. Binau, Jr., Associate Professor Emeritus in the Department of Photography and Cinema.

Harry G. Binau, Jr., was born on March 30, 1913, in Columbus, Ohio, and attended Columbus Public Schools, graduating from North High School in 1931. He received his B.S. degree from The Ohio State University in 1936. His long association with the Department of Photography and Cinema began when he accepted a Graduate Assistantship in the Department while pursuing graduate work. Mr. Binau spent three years as head of the Photographic Service Department at The Ohio Agriculture Experimental Station in Wooster, Ohio. From 1944 to 1946, he served as a photographer in the Army with the Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Forces in Europe.

Mr. Binau was a strong force in the department for many years. His area of interest in photography was, and remained throughout his career, the scientific and technical aspects of photography. He developed a course for science majors and taught such specialized courses as microphotography, high speed photography and infrared photography. Professor Binau was blessed with a good sense of humor and a sincere enthusiasm for his work with students. Upon his retirement in 1979, he was named Associate Professor Emeritus.

From 1948 to 1951, Dr. Harding served as President of Loma Linda University and as Chairman of the Department of Nervous and Mental Diseases. On returning to Columbus, Ohio, Dr. Harding again became active in the training of residents and students at Upham Hall as well as at Harding Hospital. In 1968, Dr. Harding was appointed Clinical Professor Emeritus in the Department of Psychiatry and a member of the Honorary Staff of The Ohio State University Hospitals.

Dr. Lamey taught geology at Indiana University from 1927 to 1930; at Northwestern University from 1930 to 1933; and at Mundelein College in 1934. He joined the faculty of The Ohio State University in 1935 and served as Instructor (1935-1940); Assistant Professor (1940-1945); Associate Professor (1945-1946); and Professor from 1946 until his retirement in 1962. From 1952 to 1960, he also served the Department of Geology as Chairman. He was employed during the summers by the Michigan Geological Survey, the Morgan Gold Mining Company, and the U.S. Geological Survey.

Dr. Lamey was a member of the Geological Society of America; the Society of Economic Geologists; the American Institute of Mining Engineers; the America Geophysical Union; the American Association for the Advancement of Science; the Ohio Academy of Science; the Michigan Academy of Science; the National Association of Geology Teachers; and the Geochemical Society. He was also honored by election to Tau Beta Pi, Phi Beta Kappa, and Sigma Xi, and was a Fellow in Geology at Northwestern University. He was author of more than 30 publications dealing with igneous and metamorphic petrology, and his colleagues in the Department of Geology recognized his contribution at the time of his retirement by naming the general petrology laboratory in his honor. Dr. Lamey was highly respected as a teacher and administrator.

### Walther P. Michael

Before coming to OSU, he had been an associate with the National Bureau of Economic Research Project on the Structure of World Trade and Payments, 1954-58.

From his roots in Europe and his wide travels, he brought a strong sense of world culture and intellectual interest to the University community. In addition to the teaching and advising of graduate students, Professor Michael for many years was responsible for the large lecture classes in Principles of Economics (macroeconomics) and he also served as advisor to Arts and Sciences Economics majors. He was known for his public service in the community, by way of participation in seminars, discussion groups, radio, and TV, and as a guest lecturer in secondary school classes.

Professor Michael retired and became Associate Professor Emeritus on September 1, 1984.

Dr. Smith held hospital appointments at Mt. Carmel Hospital, Riverside Methodist Hospital and The Ohio State University Hospitals. In 1955, he entered private practice in the Columbus Medical Center, becoming a partner in 1957.

Dr. Smith was very active on the editorial staff of the <u>Bulletin of the County Medical Society</u>, and was named Editor-in-Chief of the <u>Bulletin of the Columbus Academy of Medicine</u> in 1977. In this capacity, he personally contributed many articles to the <u>Bulletin</u> every month. He was highly esteemed by his colleagues and friends in the community for this work.

The Corwin A. Fergus Memorial Fund was established July 10, 1964, by gifts to the Development Fund from John C. Fergus, Robert H. Fergus, and Edith Fergus Gilmore, in memory of Corwin A. Fergus, B.A., 1915, LL.B., 1917. He was a member of The Ohio State University football team in 1912, 1913, and 1914. The description was changed February 7, 1986.

All gifts are to be invested in the University's Permanent Endowment Fund, under the rules and regulations adopted by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, with the right to invest and reinvest as occasion dictates.

The annual income shall be used to provide a one-year graduate scholarship or fellowship renewable in either the Graduate School or one of the professional colleges as provided in the agreement of the gift. Any unused income may be used to support the student athlete educational programs in the Department of Athletics as approved by the Director of Athletics.

Should the need for this fund cease to exist or so diminish as to provide unused income, then the income may be used for any purpose whatsoever as determined by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, with preference being given to recommendations from the appropriate administrative officials of the University then responsible for graduate level and student athlete educational programs.

Iowa-born and educated, Dr. Nelson joined The Ohio State University medical faculty in the early '20's. In the mid-'20's, he and associates in the old Starling-Loving Hospital assembled and installed the area's first electrocardiogram machine.

Decades later, Mt. Carmel Hospital honored him for that and other achievements by dedicating its cardiology laboratory in his name. He also received a distinguished teaching award from University Hospitals.

During his long career as medical educator, researcher and physician, Dr. Nelson also served as president of the Central Ohio Chapter of the American Heart Association and of the Columbus and Franklin County Academy of Medicine. He retired from The Ohio State University faculty in 1968 and from private practice in 1979.

## Merwin E. Potter

Dean Potter was born on March 8, 1903, in Fullerton, Nebraska, and grew up in Serena, Illinois. He received a bachelor's degree from the University of Illinois in 1926 and a master's degree from the University of Kentucky in 1930. While at the University of Kentucky, he was Chairman of the Department of Physical Education.

In 1943, Dean Potter joined the U. S. Air Force. He was Commandant of the Air Force ROTC at Ohio State from 1950-54. He retired from the Air Force in 1956 with the rank of Colonel.

Dean Potter returned to Ohio State in 1956 as Assistant Dean of the then College of Commerce and Administration, serving in that role until his retirement in 1969. Active in University affairs, Dean Potter was President of the Faculty Club from 1965-66.

Dean Potter was admired and respected by the students of the College as a mentor, counselor and advocate. His insistence on academic excellence was a concomitant of his high concern for the intellectual, emotional and physical well-being of the literally thousands of students he served during his tenure.

Dean Potter is remembered by his many friends as an avid sportsman and for his extensive collection of duck decoys. He was a member of the Ohio Decoy Collectors and Carvers Association.

Evelyn A. Rupert

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on January 22, 1986, of Evelyn A. Rupert, Professor Emeritus in the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

Miss Rupert was a native of Pennsylvania and completed her high school education in Vandergrift. She attended The Ohio State University and earned a B.S. in Education in 1935 and a M.A. in 1937. Her areas of concentration were physical education and health education.

From 1936-39, Miss Rupert was an Instructor of Physical Education and Director of Women's Intramural Activities at Western Washington College, Bellingham, Washington. In 1939, she returned to her alma mater as an Assistant Professor of Education in the University School.

Evelyn Rupert became a member of the Women's Division, Department of Physical Education, in 1943; from 1962-71, she was the Assistant Chair of the Division. From 1975-81, she served as Assistant Director of the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation. She retired from the University in 1983.

Holding membership in many professional associations, Miss Rupert served as president of the Women's Physical Education Section - Ohio College Association during 1960-62. She was active in the Division of Girls' and Women's Sports of the American Association of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation; she was a contributor to its <u>Individual Sports</u> <u>Guide</u> in the fields of golf, archery, and softball as well as chairing two of its activity sections.

For five years, 1944-49, she was a member of The Ohio State University Women's Intercollegiate Golf Committee; this group conducted the first intercollegiate golf competition for university women in the United States.

Evelyn Rupert was a self-effacing professional who received genuine pleasure in teaching the golf novice and assisting the young instructor. A warm and caring woman, her advice was sought by students, teaching assistants, and faculty members alike. The thorough, organized and diligent manner in which she completed her variety of responsibilities was exemplary. Her loyalty and commitment to The Ohio State University was reflected in her 44 years of dedicated concern.

## Frederick H. Shillito

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on December 26, 1985, of Frederick H. Shillito, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Preventive Medicine.

Frederick H. Shillito was born in Kalamazoo, Michigan, on June 5, 1905. His father was a general practioner in Kalamazoo and his uncles had founded the Shillito Clinic in Battle Creek. He graduated with distinction from the University of Michigan in 1927 and received his M.D. degree from Harvard in 1931. He served his residency at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital in Boston, and then joined the staff of the Presbyterian Hospital in New York and the School of Public Health at Columbia University, where he served for twenty-five years. Dr. Shillito also had a distinguished career in aerospace and industrial medicine, serving as Medical Director of the Atlantic Division of Pan American Airways and Medical Director of the American Can Corporation. He returned to Michigan in 1958 as Associate Professor of Internal Medicine and Industrial Medicine. In 1961, he joined the faculty of The Ohio State University as Professor of Preventive Medicine and Internal Medicine. Dr. Shillito continued to serve at The Ohio State University until his retirement in 1971.

Dr. Shillito was a Fellow of the American College of Physicians, the American College of Preventive Medicine and the Aerospace Medical Association. He was one of the founders of the Airlines Medical Directors' Association. His major research contributions were in the study of tolerance to altitude in chronic disease states and the after-effects of severe hypoxia. He was one of the early participants in the field of aerospace medicine and had a hand in training many of the physicians associated with the space program in the United States. Despite his heavy administrative duties, Dr. Shillito continued his research and publication at The Ohio State University and was a major contributor to the growing science of aerospace medicine.

#### Wayne Woodrow Hayes Doctor of Humanities

Educator. Philanthropist. Scholar. Motivator. Humanitarian. Woody Hayes has worn many hats, in addition to his coach's cap with its familiar Block O. And since leaving the coaching field, it takes no more than the drop of a hat to convince him to address a group, participate in a charity drive, or promote the importance of hard work in the classroom, as well as on the practice field. Hayes' dedication to these many causes is evidenced by a relentless demand for his services.

His accomplishments during 28 years as head football coach at Ohio State are well known: an overall record of 205 wins, 61 losses, and 10 ties—a winning percentage of .760; a Big Ten record of 152-37-7; 21 seasons in which Ohio State led the nation in attendance per home game; College Coach of the Year in 1957 and 1975; coach to three Heisman Trophy winners and 56 first-team All-Americans; three national championships; 13 Big Ten championships; 13 Big Ten championships; and 11 bowl games.

His tireless drive for excellence, especially among young people, has always been evident not only on the field, but off the field as well. His current community involvements show that he is honorary chair of the Heinzerling Foundation's fund-raising efforts, honorary co-chair of the Celebrity Waiters Lunch to benefit Recreation Unlimited, and chair of the Woody Hayes Sports Spectacular to benefit Children's Hospital. He is a strong supporter of the University's cancer research programs. Last year, gifts made in his honor were used to establish the Woody Hayes Cancer Fund in the College of Medicine.

Hayes earned his bachelor's degree in English and history at Denison University and later earned an M.A. in education administration from Ohio State. He is well known for his analyses of military history, has written three books, and taught at the undergraduate and graduate levels. Hayes lectured at Harvard University in 1982 in a program commemorating the 100th anniversary of the death of Ralph Waldo Emerson. In 1979, he was named head coach and professor emeritus of health, physical education, and recreation. The recognitions received by Woody Hayes during his career also pay tribute to his wide-ranging interests. He was elected to the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame in 1983 and is a member of the Ohio High School Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame. He received the Ohio Governor's Award in 1976 and an honorary degree from Rio Grande College in 1983. Ohio State honored him with a Distinguished Service Award in 1982, and he received the Alumni Citizenship Award from the University's Alumni Association in 1983.

Recently, he was the recipient of the 1986 American College Football Association's prestigious Amos Alonzo Stagg Trophy for his contributions to athletics and community service.

The University that Coach Hayes served for so many years is proud to recognize his dedication to excellence and his devotion to fellow citizens with the honorary degree, Doctor of Humanities.

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# AMENDMENTS TO THE <u>RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY</u> Resolution No. 86-103

Synopsis: Amendments to rule 3335-13-06 are being proposed.

WHEREAS the University Senate pursuant to rule 3335-1-09 of the Administrative Code is authorized to recommend through the President to the Board of Trustees the adoption of amendments to the <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> as approved by the University Senate; and

WHEREAS the proposed changes in the <u>Rules of the University</u> <u>Faculty</u> were approved by the University Senate on March 8, 1986, as follows:

### AMENDED RULE

- 3335-13-06 Rights to and interests in patentable discoveries and inventions, copyrights, and related materials.
- (A) This rule shall apply to all products of university research (where "university research" is as defined in the current university policy on patents and copyrights), defined to be inventions and other legally

# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

protectable material arising out of university research, including any discovery, invention, know-how, design, model, work of authorship, and any strain, variety or culture of an organism, or any portion, modification, translation or extension of these items. Products of research will not include works of artistry, academic instruction, or traditional scholarship insofar as these works were not produced in connection with a sponsored program or as a part of a specific university duty or assignment.

- (B) The board of trustees deems it in the best interest of the university, its faculty, staff, and students, and in the interest of the promotion of research and development to provide for participation by faculty, staff, and students in the proceeds from products of research conceived or developed by them in the absence of any prior agreements relating to sponsored activities and insofar as allowed by any contract or grant agreements in support of the activity leading to the product of research.
- (C) The board of trustees shall establish a policy on patents and copyrights to be administered under the direction of the president of the university through the office of the vice president for research and graduate studies. The provisions of the policy shall be subject to review by the faculty committee on patents and copyrights and recommended to the board of trustees by the university senate.
  - (1) The faculty committee on patents and copyrights shall be composed primarily of members of the university faculty and shall elect its own chair. Five members shall be elected by the faculty council in a manner to be determined by the council. One graduate student shall be appointed by the council of graduate students in a manner to be determined by that council. Five members shall be appointed by the president in consultation with the vice president for research and graduate studies, the vice president for academic affairs and provost, and other appropriate officials of the university. Service on the committee shall be for terms not to exceed three years. An individual may become eligible for committee of at least one year.
  - (2) The specific duties of and the procedures for appeals to the committee shall be as described in the policy on patents and copyrights.
- (D) Subject to the authority of the president of the university, the vice president for research and graduate studies is hereby assigned the responsibility for the

acquisition, protection and disposition of rights in products of university research in accord with the policy on patents and copyrights. (B/T 4/12/63, B/T 5/8/69, B/T 10/4/85, B/T 4/4/86)

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the foregoing amendments to the <u>Rules</u> of the <u>University Faculty</u> be adopted as recommended by the University Senate.

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### AMENDMENTS TO THE <u>BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL</u> <u>STAFF OF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS</u> Resolution No. 86-104

Synopsis: Amendments to the <u>Bylaws of the Medical Staff of</u> <u>The Ohio State University Hospitals</u> are proposed.

WHEREAS The Ohio State University Hospitals Board pursuant to Bylaw 3335-101-04 of the <u>Hospitals Board Bylaws</u> is authorized to recommend to the Board of Trustees the adoption of amendments to the <u>Bylaws of the Medical Staff of</u> <u>The Ohio State University Hospitals</u>; and

WHEREAS the proposed amendments to Bylaws 3335-43-08, 3335-43-11, and 3335-43-12 were approved at the University Hospitals Board meeting on February 27, 1986, as follows:

### AMENDED BYLAWS

- 3335-43-08 Organization of medical staff of the Ohio state university hospitals into clinical departments and divisions.
- (D) Qualifications and responsibilities of the clinical department chairman.

The academic department chairman will ordinarily serve also as the clinical department chairman. Each clinical department chairman shall be qualified by education and experience appropriate to the discharge of the responsibilities of the position. Such qualification shall be judged appropriate by the respective dean of the college of medicine or dentistry. Qualifications for department chairman generally shall include:

recognized clinical competence, sound judgment and well-developed administrative skills.

- (1) Procedure for appointment of clinical department chairman.
  - (a) Appointment of clinical department chairman will be made by the dean of the respective college in consultation with elected representatives of the medical staff and the medical director.
- (2) Term of appointment of clinical department chairman.
  - (a) The term of appointment of clinical department chairman will be concurrent with his academic appointment and be no longer than four years. Prior to the end of his term, a review will be conducted and will serve as the basis for the recommendation for reappointment. Procedure will be as outlined in paragraph (D) (1) of this rule.
- (3) Duties of the department chairman.

Each clinical department chairman shall

- (a) Be accountable for all professional and administrative activities within the clinical department.
- (b) Maintain continuing review of the professional performance of all medical staff members with clinical privileges within the clinical department.
- (c) Conduct a periodic review, at least every four years, of the clinical performance of each clinical division director.
- (d) Make recommendations to the medical staff regarding the criteria for clinical privileges in the department.
- (e) Each calendar year, by April 1, the chairman of each clinical department shall review the clinical performance including the physical and mental health of all members of the active staff of the clinical department. On the basis of this review, the chairman will make recommendations for clinical privileges for each member of his department.

# AMENDMENTS TO THE <u>BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL</u> STAFF OF THE <u>OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS</u> (contd)

- (f) Be responsible for the enforcement within the clinical department of the bylaws, rules and regulations of the Ohio state university hospitals.
- (g) Assure that the quality and the appropriateness of patient care within the department is monitored and evaluated according to departmental and hospital quality assurance criteria.
- (h) Each clinical department will hold monthly meetings. The agenda for the meetings will include, but not be limited to a discussion of clinical activities of the department. the Minutes of departmental meetings, including a record of attendance, will be kept in the the director's medical departmental and office. Greater than fifty per cent unexcused absence from departmental meetings could serve the basis for a recommendation of as non-reappointment to the medical staff.
- 3335-43-11 Meetings and Dues
- (A) Meetings. The medical staff of the Ohio state university hospitals shall conduct scheduled meetings quarterly. Notice of the meeting will be sent to all attending staff at least two weeks prior to the meeting. Attendance at at least two of the four regularly scheduled meetings shall be a requirement for continued staff privileges. Exceptions requested in writing may be given by the medical staff administrative committee. A special meeting may be called at the option of the medical staff administrative committee.
- (B) Dues. The medical staff, by two-thirds vote of those in attendance at the fall quarterly meeting, may establish dues. Payment of dues is a requirement for staff membership.

3335-43-12 Amendments.

There will be a standing bylaws committee which will review the bylaws and rules and regulations as need arises but not less than every two years. This committee will recommend changes to the medical staff administrative committee.

These medical staff bylaws may be amended after notice is given at one meeting of the medical staff administrative committee. Such notice shall be laid on the table until the next meeting and shall require two-thirds vote of the members of the medical staff administrative committee

# AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF OF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS (contd)

present for approval and submission to the medical staff for ratification. Ratification of an amendment shall be by a plurality of those medical staff members voting through written ballot. When an amendment is approved by the medical staff administrative committee and ratified by the medical staff it shall be forwarded in successive order to the following: the joint conference committee; the university hospitals board; the president of the Ohio state university. Each of the foregoing reviewers shall accept or reject the requested amendment. The amendment shall become effective when accepted by the board of trustees of the Ohio state university in the form ratified by the medical staff.

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the foregoing amendments to the <u>Bylaws</u> of the <u>Medical Staff</u> of <u>The Ohio State University Hospitals</u> be adopted as recommended by the University Hospitals Board.

Upon motion of Mr. Immke, seconded by Mr. Barone, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous voice vote.

Synopsis: Resolutions honoring the service of one former member of the Board of Trustees and three of the University's faculty members who have recently died are being proposed.

RESOLVED, That the Board adopt the following Resolutions in Memoriam and that the President be requested to convey a copy to the families of the deceased.

### John W. Bricker

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death of former Board member John W. Bricker on March 22, 1986.

John W. Bricker was born on September 6, 1893, in Pleasant Township, Madison County, Ohio. He received an A.B. degree in 1916, a J.D. degree in 1920, and a L.L.D. degree in 1939--all from The Ohio State University. He was admitted to the practice of law in Ohio 1917.

In his long and illustrious career, John Bricker served the public with intensity and dedication in several different arenas. He was a 1st Lieutenant in the Army in 1917-1918. From 1920 to 1928, he was the City Solicitor for Grandview Heights and was an Assistant Attorney General from 1923-1927 and Ohio Attorney General from 1932 to 1937. From 1929 to 1932, John Bricker was a member of the public Utilities Commission of Ohio. He was elected Governor of the State of Ohio and served three, two-year terms before being nominated as Thomas Dewey's Vice Presidential running mate at the Republican National Convention prior to the 1944 U.S. Presidential Elections. In 1944, John Bricker formed the Columbus law firm of Bricker, Marburger, Evatt and Barton. Today the firm's name is Bricker and Eckler and has grown to include 75 attorneys. John Bricker was elected as a U.S. Senator for the State of Ohio in 1946 and was reelected for a second term in 1952.

Senator Bricker has been awarded honorary degrees from The Ohio State University, Ohio Northern University, Washington and Jefferson University, Kent State University, Wilberforce University, Ohio Wesleyan University, Knox College, Miami University, Boston University and Baldwin-Wallace College. He received a Doctor of Laws degree from Dennison University, a Doctor of Humanities degree from Lincoln Memorial University, a Doctor of Humane Letters from Otterbein College and a Doctor of Public Service from Rio Grande College.

In addition to his distinguished political and legal careers, Senator Bricker has served The Ohio State University long and well. He served as a Trustee from 1948 through 1969. He was originally appointed by Governor Thomas Herbert in 1948, was reappointed by Governor Frank Lausche in 1955 and was finally reappointed by Governor James Rhodes in 1963. He is well remembered as a thoughtful and decisive Trustee who brought great honor both to the Board and to the University. His many years of unyielding service to the University community were recognized in 1983 when the University Administration Building was named for him. John W. Bricker Hall will remain as a permanent symbol of Senator Bricker's commitment to the University.

### Francis B. McCormick

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on February 24, 1986, of Francis B. McCormick, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology.

Dr. McCormick was born April 2, 1916, in New Concord, Ohio. After graduation from New Concord High School in 1934, he enrolled at The Ohio State University in January 1935. He earned his B.S. degree in 1939, the M.S. degree in 1947, and the Ph.D. degree in 1953, from The Ohio State University. After the completion of his baccalaureate degree, he served as County Supervisor for the Farm Security Administration from 1940 to 1943. From 1943 to 1946 he served in the U.S. Army in the Southwest Pacific Theatre.

Dr. McCormick first joined the staff of the Department of Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology in 1947. While on the faculty, he served as an Instructor, Assistant Professor, Associate Professor, Professor, Assistant to the Departmental Chairperson, Associate Chairperson and Acting Chairperson prior to his retirement from the University in 1978. While a member of the faculty at Ohio State, he also served as a member of the faculty of the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center. From 1978 to 1981, he served as head of the Production Adjustment Section of the Ohio Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture in Columbus, Ohio.

and recognized McCormick was well known for his Dr. dedication to undergraduate students in the College of Agriculture. He served as the faculty advisor to hundreds of students; taught the introductory course in agricultural economics; developed and taught two honors courses; and established an internship program that provided for unique opportunities for students to interact with "real world" situations. He also served as the faculty adviser to the adviser and the coordinating for the student club Without a doubt, he was among the most department. influential faculty members assisting students during their stay at The Ohio State University.

In 1972, he established the Francis B. McCormick Scholarship Fund that has assisted many students in completing their undergraduate degree program. This program remains in effect as a tribute to his interest in undergraduate students. In 1982, he established the Francis B. McCormick Professorship in Agricultural Economics. This is an Endowed Professorship to support a professor in the area of food and agriculture, price and income policy.

Dr. McCormick was a member of Gamma Sigma Delta; Delta Theta Sigma; Life Member of The Ohio State University Alumni Association; the American Agricultural Economics Association; the American Society of Farm Managers and Rural Appraisers; the Buckeye Club; the OSU Presidents Club; and the OSU Presidents Council.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That annual support in the amount of \$75,000.00 or more will be recognized by the establishment of a "Designated Chair" for a specific term which will bear the donor's name or an appropriate name of the donor's designation. The donor will ordinarily be expected to guarantee support for a minimum of three years. Annual support provided for a "Designated Chair" will be used to provide compensation and/or program support for truly distinguished scholars in an academic discipline designated by the donor; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That annual support in the amount of \$30,000.00 or more will be recognized by the establishment of a "Designated Professorship" for a specific term which will bear the donor's name or an appropriate name of the donor's designation. The donor will ordinarily be expected to guarantee support for a minimum of three years. Annual support provided for a "Designated Professorship" will be used to provide compensation and/or program support for truly distinguished scholars in an academic discipline designated by the donor; and

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President Jennings made the following statement:

In 1983 the General Assembly of the State of Ohio in its wisdom--enacted into law legislation that would allow institutions whose employees are members of STRS (the State Teachers Retirement System) to purchase up to five years of credit towards their retirement. You may recall that in responding to this legislation, during 1983 we instituted a program whereby we would purchase up to three years credit for eligible STRS members. We kept it at three years primarily because we did not know the demand and wanted to be a bit cautious on the cash flow issue. During the past year-and-a-half, 137 people have taken advantage of this program, and I believe by all standards it has been a substantial benefit to our faculty members, and has also been a benefit that very clearly has a financial aspect to it that the University could afford. A better way to make the point--the total cost of last year's program was approximately \$3.2 million--the total salary freed up was approximately \$5 million.

Based on this experience, last year the Board approved an extension of this program through October 1988, and increased the number of purchasable years to five as allowed under the law.

President Jennings: (contd)

As you might expect, given the fact that there are several retirement systems, most notable among them being the Public Employees Retirement System (PERS), there has been much discussion, debate and concern expressed about the lack of a similar program offering for participants in these systems. At Ohio State, we have 12,272 staff who are members of PERS. Under existing law, we do not have the authority to provide an early retirement incentive program for this group. While a plan similar to the STRS program is now before the General Assembly, there is much concern about its ultimate fate.

The two bills pending on the question of a PERS retirement incentive are Senate Bill 206 and House Bill 706. Each bill is unique and each body of the General Assembly has approved its version and referred it to the other body for consideration. The Legislature has adjourned and will not be in full session for some time. It appears at this time that no action on these PERS bills is possible in the immediate future.

While it is uncertain what the disposition of the PERS bills will be, it is hoped that early positive action will be forthcoming by the General Assembly and that such action will eliminate the differences that currently exist between classes of University employees with respect to retirement incentives. Further, such a program would provide the same level of planning flexibility and utilization for non-faculty staff members as we currently have at the faculty level. I would encourage each of you to give your support to early passage of this legislation.

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#### AMENDMENTS TO THE <u>RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY</u> Resolution No. 86-115

Synopsis: Rescission of current rules 3335-5-46 through 3335-5-63 and the replacement of these rules by adoption of new rules 3335-5-46 through 3335-5-493, 3335-11-021 and 3335-11-022; and amendments to rules 3335-3-03, 3335-3-18, 3335-3-21, 3335-3-25, 3335-3-38, 3335-5-021, 3335-5-023, 3335-5-04, 3335-5-05, 3335-5-14, 3335-7-02, 3335-11-02, and 3335-11-05 of the <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> are proposed.

#### AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

WHEREAS the University Senate pursuant to rule 3335-1-09 of the Administrative Code is authorized to recommend through the President to the Board of Trustees the adoption of amendments to the <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> as approved by the University Senate; and

WHEREAS the University Senate desires that non-substantive changes be made to the <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> by way of reorganizing various rules and sections; and

WHEREAS the proposed changes in the <u>Rules of the University</u> <u>Faculty</u> were approved by the University Senate on February 1, 1986, March 8, 1986, and April 5, 1986, as follows:

## RESCINDED RULES

Rules 3335-5-46 through 3335-5-63.

#### NEW RULES

3335-5-46 Senate committee operating procedures.

The university senate shall have committees designated as organizing, standing, or special.

- (A) Membership.
  - (1) Unless otherwise designated by rule, the president shall appoint all committees of the university faculty and the senate (see paragraph (D) of rule 3335-3-03 of the Administrative Code).
  - (2) When a rule provides for the option of selecting a designee to a committee, the designee shall be appointed by the person being replaced.
  - (3) Committee vacancy.
    - (a) The chairperson will report vacancies to the appropriate nominating source through the office of the university senate. For the purpose of this rule, a vacancy exists when an elected member is unable to meet the participation requirements defined by the committee.
    - (b) Unless otherwise specified, when an unexpired term becomes vacant, the vacancy shall be filled in the same manner that the position was originally filled. A member selected to fill such a vacancy shall serve for the duration of the unexpired term.
  - (4) The membership of each committee shall be made known through the report of the secretary of the university senate.

## AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (5) Terms of office.
  - (a) Unless otherwise specified by the rules, election of members to senate committees shall take place at a special meeting in spring quarter of senate members serving the following year.
  - (b) Unless otherwise specified by the rules, terms of office of senate committee members shall begin and end on the first day of autumn quarter.
- (B) Duties and responsibilities.
  - Senate committees shall report at least annually to the senate at a time and in a manner specified by the program committee of the senate.
  - (2) Senate committees shall define reasonable participation requirements for the conduct of ongoing business.
- (C) Organization.

Committee chairpersons. Except where otherwise specified by the rules, each committee shall elect a chairperson pro tem in the spring from its continuing membership and a chairperson at its first meeting in the autumn quarter.

- 3335-5-47 Organizing committees of the senate.
- (A) The senate shall have four organizing committees (see rules 3335-5-471 through 3335-5-474 of the Administrative Code):
  - Steering committee;
  - (2) Program committee;
  - (3) Rules committee;
  - (4) Elections committee.
- (B) Membership.
  - (1) Election to the organizing committees shall be by the senate upon written nomination submitted at least seven days prior to voting. The president shall nominate members of the administration; the faculty council, the council of graduate students, the inter-professional council, and the undergraduate student assembly shall nominate members of their own constituency.

#### AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (2) Only members of the senate may serve on organizing committees.
- (3) Terms of office.
  - (a) Faculty members shall serve two-year terms and shall not be eligible for immediate reelection.
  - (b) Student members shall serve one-year terms and shall be eligible for reelection.
  - (c) Elected administration members shall serve two-year terms and shall not be eligible for immediate reelection.
- (C) Organizing committees are also governed by the provisions of rule 3335-5-46 of the Administrative Code.
- 3335-5-471 Steering committee.
- (A) Membership.

The steering committee shall consist of fourteen members.

- Six regular faculty, all of whom are members of the senate, shall be nominated by faculty council and elected by the senate.
  - (a) The term of office is two years, and three members shall be elected each year.
  - (b) The names of at least three and no more than six nominees will be submitted at least seven days prior to voting when new representatives are to be elected.
- (2) Four students.
  - (a) The president of the council of graduate students.
  - (b) The president of the inter-professional council.
  - (c) The president of the undergraduate student government.
  - (d) One elected by the senate from the undergraduate student membership of the senate. Nomination will be made by the undergraduate student government. The term of office is one year.
- (3) Four administrators.

## AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (a) The vice president for academic affairs and provost.
- (b) The vice president for finance.
- (c) The secretary of the university senate (nonvoting).
- (d) A dean, who is a member of the senate, shall be nominated by the president and elected by the senate.
  - (i) The term of office is two years.
  - (ii) The names of not more than two nominees will be submitted at least seven days prior to voting when a new representative is to be elected.
- (B) Duties and responsibilities.
  - (1) Be the senate's committee on committees: the steering committee shall have the power to call, by vote of nine of its members, a special meeting of the senate, and shall have such power and duties as the senate may delegate to it during periods when the senate is not in session. It may create subcommittees and may delegate to them any of its powers, functions, and duties.
  - (2) It shall review proposed rule changes concerning senate committee structure, duties, and responsibilities and may review other proposed rule changes prior to presentation to the senate.
  - (3) Serve as a channel of communication between the senate and the president and the board of trustees. Members shall be an advisory group available to both the president and the board of trustees for advice and counsel on any matter relating to the operation and development of the university. After consulting with the president, the members of the steering committee may request and obtain a meeting with the board of trustees.
  - (4) Nominate candidates for election by the senate to membership on those committees for which other means of nomination are not specified in the rules.
  - (5) Meet at least once every year with the chairperson of each standing committee.
- (C) Organization.
  - (1) Election of members to the steering committee shall take place at a special meeting in spring

## AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

quarter of senate members selected to serve the following year. Voting shall be by written ballot. For the period of time beginning with this election and ending with the start of the autumn quarter, the steering committee shall consist of the newly elected and continuing members. During this period, the outgoing members shall serve as alternates.

- (2) The committee shall annually elect a chairperson from its regular faculty membership.
- (3) As an organizing committee of the senate, this committee is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-47 of the Administrative Code.
- 3335-5-472 Program Committee.
- (A) Membership.

The program committee shall consist of nine members.

- Four regular faculty, all of whom are members of the senate, shall be nominated by faculty council and elected by the senate.
  - (a) The term of office is two years and two members shall be elected each year.
  - (b) The names of at least two and not more than four nominees will be submitted at least seven days prior to voting.
- (2) Three students, all of whom are members of the senate, shall be elected by the senate for one-year terms.
  - (a) One graduate student nominated by the council of graduate students.
  - (b) One professional student nominated by the inter-professional council.
  - (c) One undergraduate student nominated by the undergraduate student assembly.
- (3) Two administrators.
  - (a) The secretary of the university senate.
  - (b) A dean, who is a member of the senate, shall be nominated by the president and elected by the senate.

## AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (i) The term of office is two years.
- (ii) The names of not more than two nominees will be submitted at least seven days prior to voting.
- (B) Duties and responsibilities.
  - Receive proposals for senate action and set the senate's agenda. The agenda shall be mailed to members of the senate at least seven calendar days prior to the senate meeting.
  - (2) Serve as continuing liaison between the senate and the three constituent bodies as well as the university at large.
  - (3) Schedule for senate consideration items referred by committees of the senate, by the faculty council, by the administration, by the student governments, and by individual senate members. To keep the agenda manageable, however, the program committee may assign priority to such items and schedule those it deems less urgent for a subsequent senate meeting. Proposals not originating within the senate, its committees, or the constituent bodies may also be placed on the agenda. The program committee is empowered to refer all items to an appropriate committee or body for further study before presentation to the senate.
  - (4) Send to senate members, along with the call for each meeting, a brief report outlining proposals brought before the program committee but not yet appearing on the senate's agenda.
  - (5) Schedule reports of senate committees.
  - (6) Identify matters of potential concern to the senate and work with the principal standing committees and with other bodies in the coordination and planning of the senate's continuing agenda.
- (C) Organization.
  - The committee shall elect a chairperson pro tem in the spring from its continuing membership and a chairperson at its first meeting in the autumn quarter.
  - (2) As an organizing committee of the senate, this committee is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-47 of the Administrative Code.

#### AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

3335-5-473 Rules committee.

(A) Membership.

The rules committee shall consist of ten members.

- (1) Six regular faculty, all of whom are members of the senate, shall be nominated by faculty council and elected by the senate.
  - (a) The term of office is two years and three members shall be elected each year.
  - (b) The names of at least three and not more than six nominees will be submitted at least seven days prior to voting.
- (2) Three students, all of whom are members of the senate, shall be elected by the senate for oneyear terms.
  - (a) One graduate student nominated by the council of graduate students.
  - (b) One professional student nominated by the inter-professional council.
  - (c) One undergraduate student nominated by the undergraduate student assembly.
- (3) One administrator. The secretary of the university senate.
- (B) Duties and responsibilities.
  - (1) Be responsible, in cooperation with the secretary of the university senate, for the formal supervision of the published "Rules of the University Faculty" and of all statutes and bylaws pertaining to the senate. The rules committee shall keep all published statutes and rules within its purview up to date and shall plan their republication at such intervals as may be desirable. It shall supervise the procedural rules for the senate and make appropriate recommendations for revision as required.
  - (2) Following senate approval, the committee shall receive all proposed new rules and changes in existing rules. It shall review them and recommend to the senate such editorial and other changes as it deems appropriate or necessary to avoid conflict with other rules and university regulations. Its recommendations shall be

## AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

presented for final action at the next regular meeting of the senate. At this time, debate will be limited to the editorial changes recommended by the committee. If the committee is unable to report at this time, it shall inform the program committee of the reasons so that they may be included in the program committee's report on items not yet appearing on the senate's agenda.

- (3) Initiate rules or changes in existing rules and recommend them to the program committee for scheduling for senate action.
- (4) Review the structure and operation of the senate, and receive suggestions and initiate recommendations for change, as need and advantage may appear. The committee shall have continuing responsibility for assessing the structure, operation, and effectiveness of the senate, without, however, in any way restricting the senate's authority to alter its operation by other means.
- (C) Organization.
  - (1) The committee shall elect a chairperson pro tem in the spring from its continuing membership and a chairperson at its first meeting in the autumn quarter.
  - (2) As an organizing committee of the senate, this committee is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-47 of the Administrative Code.
- 3335-5-474 Elections Committee.
- (A) Membership.

The elections committee shall consist of nine members.

- Four regular faculty, all of whom are members of the senate, shall be nominated by the faculty council and elected by the senate.
  - (a) The term of office is two years and two members shall be elected each year.
  - (b) The names of at least two and not more than four nominees will be submitted at least seven days prior to voting.
- (2) Four students, all of whom are members of the senate, shall be elected by the senate for one-year terms.

#### AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (a) One graduate student nominated by the council of graduate students.
- (b) One professional student nominated by the inter-professional council.
- (c) Two undergraduate students nominated by the undergraduate student assembly.
- (3) One administrator, who is a member of the senate, shall be nominated by the president and elected by the senate.
  - (a) The term of office is two years.
  - (b) The names of not more than two nominees will be submitted at least seven days prior to voting.
- (B) Duties and responsibilities.
  - (1) Review and recommend to the senate changes in the election bylaws.
  - (2) Oversee the implementation of the election bylaws and certify election results to the senate.
  - (3) Hear appeals concerning election of senate members and make recommendations to the senate on the resolution of such appeals.
- (C) Organization.
  - The committee shall elect a chairperson pro tem in the spring from its continuing membership and a chairperson at its first meeting in the autumn guarter.
  - (2) As an organizing committee of the senate, this committee is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-47 of the Administrative Code.
- 3335-5-48 Standing and special committees of the senate.
- (A) The senate may establish such standing and special committees as it deems necessary or desirable.
  - The standing committees of the senate are those committees defined in rules 3335-5-481 through 3335-5-4816 of the Administrative Code.
  - (2) A special committee is one established to carry out a specified task, at the completion of which it automatically ceases to exist.

# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (B) Membership.
  - All standing and special committees of the senate shall include at least one regular faculty member of the senate.
  - (2) Unless otherwise specified by the rules, or by the senate, committees shall be elected by the senate upon written nomination submitted to the membership by the steering committee or by individual members at least seven days prior to voting on those nominations.
  - (3) Terms of office. Unless otherwise specified by the rules, student members shall serve one-year terms and be eligible for reelection; faculty and elected administrative members shall serve threeyear terms and, except for members serving less than a full term, be ineligible for immediate reelection.
- (C) Standing and special committees are also governed by the provisions of rule 3335-5-46 of the Administrative Code.
- 3335-5-481 Council on academic affairs.
- (A) Membership.

The council on academic affairs shall consist of fourteen members.

- (1) Nine regular faculty.
  - (a) Five regular faculty, at least two of whom are members of the senate, shall be nominated by the faculty council and elected by the senate. The term of office is three years with one member elected the first year and every third year thereafter, and two members elected in each of the other years.
  - (b) Four regular faculty shall be appointed by the president for three-year terms; two the first year and every third year thereafter, and one in each of the other years.
  - (c) A faculty member who has completed a threeyear term shall not be eligible for appointment or election for one year after such service.
- (2) Four students.

#### AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (a) One graduate student appointed by the president of the council of graduate students with the approval of the council of graduate students.
- (b) One professional student appointed by the president of the inter-professional council with the approval of the inter-professional council.
- (c) Two undergraduate students for terms of two years appointed by the president of the undergraduate student government with the approval of the undergraduate student assembly. The terms of the undergraduate students shall be such that one term begins each year.
- (3) One administrator. The vice president for academic affairs and provost, or designee.
- (B) Duties and responsibilities.
  - (1)Make recommendations to the senate concerning the educational and academic policies of the university (see rule 3335-5-41 of the Administrative Code). This responsibility shall include, but shall not necessarily be limited to, the power to make recommendations concerning the establishment, alteration and abolition of all curricula and courses offered by the university or any division thereof; of all degrees and certificates conferred under authority of the university or any division thereof; and of all colleges, departments, schools and bureaus. It may conduct such investigations appoint such committees as are reasonably anđ necessary to carry out its responsibilities under these rules. Committees appointed by this council may be discharged by it at any time.
  - (2) Initiate recommendations to the senate and review all proposed changes in the educational and academic policies of the university. In reviewing proposed changes, the council shall:
    - (a) Receive from the various colleges and schools, pursuant to the exercise of their powers under rule 3335-5-14 of the Administrative Code, proposals for the establishment, alteration or abolition of courses and curricula, of departments, schools, divisions and bureaus within a college, and of academic degrees.(See rules 3335-7-02 and 3335-7-03 of the Administrative Code);

## AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

(b) Receive from the graduate school, pursuant to the exercise of powers conferred upon the council on research and graduate studies by rule 3335-5-35 of the Administrative Code, its proposals for the adoption, alteration or abolition of graduate-credit courses and curricula, and of academic degrees administered by it. (See rules 3335-7-02 and 3335-7-03 of the Administrative Code.)

Upon proposals respecting courses and curricula, the council shall act with finality subject to the rights of the graduate school or of any college to bring the council's decision before the senate for review. With respect to other submissions to it, the council shall make its recommendations to the senate after notice thereof, in at least abbreviated form, has been given in the official bulletin. Failure of the council on academic affairs to act or to submit its recommendations will not deprive the senate of power to review these other submissions.

- (3) Foster, as needed for interdisciplinary programs involving two or more academic areas, the faculty coordinating council. These units establishment of units the reporting to shall perform coordinative functions similar to those of the faculty of the arts and sciences (see rule 3335-5-27 of the Administrative Code) and shall serve the interdisciplinary interest of academic programs both within and among the several colleges of the university.
- (4) Appoint "ad hoc" arbitration committees to help solve problems created by any major reorganization of the academic structure of the university. The role of such committees shall be:
  - (a) To encourage discussion between and within groups of faculty members of departments or schools when it is apparent that relocation in a different organizational environment is a source of concern to some of these groups;
  - (b) To hear viewpoints and where necessary to take the lead in the arbitration of problems of individuals or groups who feel their professional development may be adversely affected by the revised organization.

If agreement cannot be reached by consultation or arbitration, an arbitration committee may make a recommendation to the senate through the council

# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

on academic affairs on what should be done to solve the problem at issue from the standpoint of what is best for the university.

- (5) Review the academic organization of the university at five-year intervals to make certain it is kept as closely attuned as possible to changing needs. Any suggestions for modifications and improvements shall be reported to the senate.
- (6) Formulate and announce a procedure to be followed in the establishment, alteration or abolition of courses or curricula.
- (7) Review the administration's proposals following the determination of a state of financial exigency as provided under rule 3335-5-021 of the Administrative Code.
- (C) Organization.
  - (1) The vice president for academic affairs and provost, or designee, shall be the chairperson of the council. The vice chairperson of the council shall be elected for a one-year term from the regular faculty membership of the council. The chairperson (or in that person's absence, the vice chairperson) shall preside at all meetings of the council. The chairperson shall vote only in case of a tie vote among members of the council present and voting, whereas the vice chairperson shall vote without such restriction, even though presiding.
  - (2) Reports by the council on academic affairs to the president, other than those made through the senate, shall be made through the vice president for academic affairs and provost.
  - (3) As a standing committee of the senate, this council is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-48 of the Administrative Code.

3335-5-482 The library council.

(A) Membership.

The library council shall consist of sixteen members.

(1) Nine regular faculty, one of whom is a sr member, shall be appointed by faculty co Three shall retire each year, and those who shall be ineligible for reappointment dr year thereafter.

- (2) Four students.
  - (a) One graduate student appointed by the president of the council of graduate students with the approval of the council of graduate students.
  - (b) One professional student appointed by the president of the inter-professional council with the approval of the inter-professional council.
  - (c) Two undergraduate students appointed by the president of the undergraduate student government with the approval of the undergraduate student assembly.
- (3) Three administrators.
  - (a) The vice president for academic affairs and provost, or designee.
  - (b) The dean of the graduate school.
  - (c) The director of libraries.
- (B) Duties and responsibilities.
  - (1) Formulate, in cooperation with the director of libraries, the policies governing the operation of the university libraries as an educational and research facility.
  - (2) Assist the director of libraries in the interpretation of library services to the university community.
  - (3) Assist in the presentation of major library needs to the university administration.
  - (4) Advise the vice president for academic affairs and provost on the appointment of a director of libraries.
  - Organization.

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- (1) The chairperson shall be elected from among the faculty members of the library council.
- (2) Reports by this council to the president, other than those made through the senate, shall be made through the vice president for academic affairs and provost.

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

(3) As a standing committee of the senate, this council is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-48 of the Administrative Code.

3335-5-483 Bookstore committee.

(A) Membership.

The bookstore committee shall consist of ten members.

- Three regular faculty, one of whom is a member of the university libraries. One faculty member shall retire each year, and the term of service is three years.
- (2) Four students.
  - (a) One graduate student.
  - (b) One professional student.
  - (c) Two undergraduate students.
- (3) Two administration members, appointed by the president for two-year terms.
- (4) One non-university member, appointed by the president for a two-year term.
- (B) Duties and responsibilities.
  - (1) Work with the bookstore management in the formulation and implementation of bookstore policy.
  - (2) Develop reporting procedures that will demonstrate publicly on a continuing basis that the bookstore is a non-profit organization.
- (C) Organization.

As a standing committee of the senate, this committee is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-48 of the Administrative Code.

3335-5-484 Council on student affairs.

(A) Membership.

The council on student affairs shall consist of eighteen members.

 Six regular faculty, at least two of whom are members of the senate. Two regular faculty members shall be elected each year.

# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (2) Eight students.
  - (a) Two graduate students appointed by the president of the council of graduate students with the approval of the council of graduate students.
  - (b) One professional student appointed by the president of the inter-professional council with the approval of the inter-professional council.
  - (c) Two undergraduate students appointed by the president of the undergraduate student government with the approval of the undergraduate student assembly.
  - (d) One student, who is a member of the freshman senate, appointed by the president of the freshman senate with the approval of the freshman senate.
  - (e) The president of the undergraduate student government, or designee.
  - (f) The president of the association of women students, or designee.
- (3) Four administrators. Each administrator shall be appointed for a one-year term and shall be eligible for reappointment.
  - (a) The dean of student life, non-voting.
  - (b) A student affairs staff member from a regional campus, appointed by the vice provost for student affairs, non-voting.
  - (c) A college office student affairs staff member, appointed by the vice provost for student affairs, non-voting.
  - (d) The vice provost for student affairs, or designee, voting only in case of ties.
- (B) Duties and responsibilities.
  - (1) Legislative.
    - (a) Recommend to the senate any proposed changes in the "Code of Student Conduct."
    - (b) Recommend to the senate proposed legislation which may affect the quality of student life.

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (c) Make regulations pursuant to the rules of the university faculty, the bylaws, and the statutes, insofar as they pertain to the quality of student life.
- (d) Serve as the principal liaison council between student governments and the faculty and administration. The council shall solicit information from these governments pertaining to any proposed changes in the faculty rules as they relate to the division of student affairs.
- (2) Advisory.
  - (a) Advise the vice provost for student affairs regarding the programs, services, and activities of the division.
  - (b) Establish study groups, committees, and other mechanisms as needed to explore issues affecting the quality of student life and make recommendations regarding these issues to the vice provost for student affairs.
  - (c) Advise other university departments and administrative units regarding proposed changes in the university's "Operating Manual" that may affect student rights and responsibilities.
  - (d) Recommend to the president, subject to the approval of the board of trustees, a list of attorneys, unaffiliated with the university, who shall be authorized to act as hearing officers to preside over disciplinary proceedings under rule 3335-11-02 of the Administrative Code.
- (3) Approve policies that govern the registration, rights, privileges, and obligations of student organizations, including but not limited to fraternities and sororities, student publications, and student government. This responsibility may be delegated by the council to an appropriate committee or administrative agency.
- (C) Organization.
  - (1) The vice provost for student affairs, or designee, shall be the chairperson of the council and shall report as requested to the vice president for academic affairs and provost.

## AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (2) The council shall establish operating procedures to conduct, in an orderly fashion, the legislative, advisory, and policy approval functions of the council.
- (3) As a standing committee of the senate, this council is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-48 of the Administrative Code.

3335-5-485 Athletic council.

- (A) The athletic council shall consist of fourteen members.
  - (1) Eight regular faculty.
    - (a) Four regular faculty members elected by the senate. The term of service is four years with one member elected each spring, and service commences the first of July following election.
    - (b) Four regular faculty members appointed by the president. The term of service is four years with one member appointed each spring, and service commences the first of July following appointment.
    - (c) The terms shall be staggered so that two faculty members retire each year.
    - (d) A faculty member serving a full term may not be reelected or reappointed until one year has elapsed.
  - (2) Four students.
    - (a) One graduate student selected by the council of graduate students using procedures adopted by that council, for a term of one year.
    - (b) One professional student selected by the inter-professional council using procedures adopted by that council, for a term of one year.
    - (c) Two undergraduate students elected by the undergraduate student government using procedures adopted by that body. The term of office is two years and one student is elected each year.
  - (3) Two alumni designated by the Ohio state university alumni association using procedures adopted by that body. The term of office is four years and

## AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

the terms are staggered so that one member retires every two years.

- (B) Duties and responsibilities.
  - Develop, subject to the general authority of the president and the board of trustees, policies governing intercollegiate and intramural athletics, as the agent of the senate. The senate may hold these policies in review.
    - (a) These policies shall guide the administration of the program of intercollegiate athletics by the director of athletics, but the athletic council shall not serve in an administrative or executive capacity.
    - (b) It will consider and establish policy on such matters as the income and expenditures budget, the schedules for seasonal and post-seasonal play in relation to the effect upon the welfare of the athletes, grants and other financial aid to athletes, eligibility of athletes, student grievance procedures and sportsmanship policies related to athletics, awards to athletes, ticket distribution, and public and campus relations of the athletic program.
    - (c) Its recommendations and decisions on policy shall be made known to the senate and to the staff of the department of athletics.
    - (d) The athletic council shall appoint one of its members to the recreation-intramural sports advisory council. The athletic council shall keep informed of activities, needs, and plans for recreation and intramural sports programs through the director of university recreation and intramural sports.
  - (2) Participate with the president in the process of selecting the university's faculty representative to the intercollegiate conference of faculty representatives (big ten conference).
    - (a) The athletic council shall prepare a list of no fewer than two regular faculty members from which the president shall select the faculty representative. All regular tenured faculty members are eligible for inclusion on this list.
    - (b) The chairperson of the athletic council shall appoint a nominating committee which shall

# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

have the responsibility to inform the university community about the position of faculty representative and to invite applications and/or recommendations for nominations. Brief recommendations in writing that state the candidate's qualifications for the position may be submitted to the nominating committee by any member of the university community. Applications and nominations shall be due in accordance with a reasonable schedule established by the nominating committee.

- (c) Final approval of the list of names submitted to the president shall be made by the full membership of the athletic council. The list shall be presented to the president during the winter preceding the start of the next term of office in order to allow for a smooth transition between outgoing and incoming faculty representatives.
- (d) The term of office for a faculty representative is three years, beginning the first of July following appointment. Reappointment for no more than one additional three-year term is permissible. If the incumbent faculty representative is eligible to and desires to serve another term, then at least nine months prior to the expiration of the current term, the athletic council shall undertake a review of the incumbent's performance. If the council decides that the incumbent should serve a second term and the president concurs, the faculty representative's term shall be renewed. Otherwise, the council shall move to prepare a list to submit to the president following the procedures of paragraphs (B) (2) (a) to (c) of this rule.
- (e) A faculty representative who is not already a member of the athletic council shall attend meetings of the council. The chairperson of the athletic council, or the chairperson's designee from among the faculty members of the athletic council, shall serve as an ex officio alternate for the faculty representative with full voting privileges at conference meetings.
- (C) Organization.
  - Reports by the council to the president, other than those made through the senate, shall be made through the vice provost for student affairs.

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (2) As a standing committee of the senate, this council is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-48 of the Administrative Code.
- 3335-5-486 Council on admission and registration.
- (A) Membership.

The council on admission and registration shall consist of nineteen members.

- (1) Nine regular faculty.
  - (a) Three regular faculty appointed by the president for three-year terms. Appointed members are eligible for reappointment.
  - (b) Six regular faculty, at least three of whom are senate members, elected by the senate.
- (2) Five students.
  - (a) Two graduate students.
  - (b) One professional student.
  - (c) Two undergraduate students.
- (3) Five administration members.
  - (a) Vice president for academic affairs and provost, or designee.
  - (b) Vice provost for student affairs, or designee.
  - (c) Vice president for business and administration, or designee.
  - (d) University registrar.
  - (e) Director of admissions.
- (B) Duties and responsibilities.

Recommend to the appropriate university offices or to the senate, depending on the nature of the recommendation, administrative policies governing admission to the university, and student registration. Such recommendations as impinge on academic policies or standards shall be developed in collaboration with the council on academic affairs.

## AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (C) Organization.
  - (1) The vice president for academic affairs and provost, or designee, shall serve as council chairperson, and the vice provost for student affairs, or designee, shall serve as council secretary.
  - (2) Reports by this council to the president, other than those made through the senate, shall be made through the vice provost for student affairs.
  - (3) As a standing committee of the senate, this council is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-48 of the Administrative Code.
- 3335-5-487 Committee on academic misconduct.
- (A) Membership.

The committee on academic misconduct shall consist of twenty-seven members.

- (1) Fifteen regular faculty, elected by the senate at its special meeting in June. Five faculty members shall be elected each year, and the term of service is three years. No faculty member shall serve more than two consecutive terms.
- (2) Ten students.
  - (a) Five graduate students appointed in the summer quarter by the president of the council of graduate students with the approval of the council of graduate students, for a term of one year beginning with the autumn quarter.
  - (b) Five undergraduate students, appointed in the spring quarter by the president of the undergraduate student government with the approval of the undergraduate student assembly, for a term of one year beginning with the summer quarter.
- (3) Two administrators.
  - (a) The dean of student life, or designee, nonvoting.
  - (b) A coordinator, appointed by the vice president for academic affairs and provost, who shall not participate in the decisions of the committee.

#### AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (B) Duties and responsibilities.
  - (1) Investigate or establish procedures for the investigation of all reported cases of student academic misconduct, with the exception of cases in a professional college having a published honor code, and decide upon suitable disciplinary action. (The term "academic misconduct" includes all forms of student academic misconduct wherever committed; illustrated by, but not limited to, cases of plagiarism and dishonest practices in connection with examinations.) Instructors shall report all instances of alleged academic misconduct to the committee.
  - (2) Investigate all cases of lax or irregular methods of conducting examinations that might tend to promote academic misconduct on the part of students, with the exception of cases in a professional college having a published honor code. The committee shall report its findings in these cases to the vice president for academic affairs and provost.
  - (3) Serve as a consultant on questions of academic misconduct for any professional college having a published honor code. (Note: this committee shall not have jurisdiction over cases involving student academic misconduct in professional colleges having published honor codes. These colleges shall follow their own codes in investigating reported cases of academic misconduct and in determining suitable disciplinary action. When the action taken involves suspension, dismissal, or entry on the student's permanent record, a recommendation to that effect shall be made to the vice president for academic affairs and provost for review and action.)
- (C) Organization.
  - (1) The committee on academic misconduct is authorized to:
    - (a) Establish panels of its members which will conduct hearings and make decisions with the same authority as the committee itself;
    - (b) Establish rules and procedures to conduct hearings, including the definition of a quorum.
  - (2) As a standing committee of the senate, this committee is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-48 of the Administrative Code.

# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

3335-5-488 Committee on honorary degrees.

(A) Membership.

The committee on honorary degrees shall consist of five members of the regular faculty.

- Members shall be elected by the senate with a secret ballot. Nominations shall be made from the floor and a nominee to be elected must receive a majority of the votes of those voting. The term of office is five years with one member retiring each year. A retiring member shall not be eligible for immediate reelection.
- (2) The annual election shall occur at the first regular meeting of the university senate in the autumn.
- (B) Duties and responsibilities.
  - (1) Establish definite standards of scholarly attainment or of the distinctive applications of such attainment in the service of society by which to judge the qualifications for this honor.
  - (2) Receive suggestions concerning persons who might be considered for an honorary degree.
  - (3) Canvass thoroughly the achievements and qualifications of all persons so suggested.
  - (4) Report to the university senate for its consideration and action such persons as have received the unanimous endorsement of the committee.
  - (5) Keep all deliberations and votes confidential except where publication is necessary for official purposes.
  - (6) Deliver the full dossier of each candidate and the nomination report of the committee on honorary degrees to the secretary of the university senate who shall distribute the nomination report to all members of the university senate.
    - (a) This report shall include a statement that conveys the committee's rationale for the nomination, pertinent details concerning the qualifications of the candidate, and the name of the sponsoring department or academic unit.
    - (b) A ballot shall be attached to the nomination report and shall be returned to the secretary

### AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

of the university senate within a time prescribed on the ballot, but in no case less than two weeks from the date that the committee report is distributed.

- (c) The secretary of the university senate shall transmit to the president the nominations, together with the appropriate section of the reports from the committee on honorary degrees, for those candidates who are endorsed by a majority of the ballots cast by the members of the university senate.
- (C) Organization.
  - The vice president for academic affairs and provost, or designee, shall serve as liaison between this committee and the president.
  - (2) As a standing committee of the senate, this committee is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-48 of the Administrative Code.

3335-5-489 Committee on academic freedom and responsibility.

(A) Membership.

The committee on academic freedom and responsibility shall consist of eight members during autumn, winter, and spring quarters and ten members from June to the beginning of autumn quarter.

- (1) Six regular faculty (eight during the summer period), all of whom are members of the senate, shall be nominated by the faculty council and elected by the senate. Two members shall be elected each year at the special June meeting of the senate; the term of service begins in the summer quarter following election and extends through the summer quarter following the third year of service.
- (2) Two graduate teaching, research, or administrative associates elected by the senate at its first autumn guarter meeting from a list of four nominees prepared by the council of graduate students. The term of service is twelve months.
- (3) Vacancies shall be filled through election by the senate with nominations from the floor.
- (B) Duties and responsibilities.

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (1) Study all conditions which may affect the academic freedom or responsibility of the faculty of the university, including the review of proposed changes in the "Faculty Handbook," rules 3335-47-01 through 3335-47-11 (rules of the university faculty concerning faculty appointments, promotion and tenure), and such changes in the "Operating Manual" as may impinge upon academic freedom or tenure. If the committee finds that any such proposed change adversely affects academic freedom or tenure, it shall report that finding promptly to the senate for its review.
- (2) Hear and investigate complaints by individual faculty members concerning alleged infringements upon academic freedom or responsibility in the university; report findings and recommendations to the parties involved with the hope of mediating a dispute and report to the senate if further action by the senate is appropriate.
- (3) Hear and investigate complaints by individual faculty members concerning alleged improper evaluation under the procedures of rule 3335-5-05 of the Administrative Code.
- (C) Organization.
  - (1) A quorum consists of five members.
  - (2) As a standing committee of the senate, this committee is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-48 of the Administrative Code.
- 3335-5-4810 Faculty hearing committee.
- (A) Membership.

The faculty hearing committee shall consist of nine tenured members of the regular faculty.

- (1) Three members shall be elected annually by the senate from a slate of six candidates.
- (2) Each elected person shall serve a three-year term as a regular member, followed by a one-year term as an alternate member.
- (B) Duties and responsibilities.
  - Conduct hearings on allegations of incompetence or grave misconduct, or on appeals from findings of failure to meet university responsibilities,

following procedures of paragraph (E) of rule 3335-5-04 of the Administrative Code.

- (2) Conduct hearings on complaints of alleged improper evaluation based upon reasons or considerations that infringe a constitutional right of the complainant following procedures of paragraph (C) (3) of rule 3335-5-05 of the Administrative Code.
- (3) Conduct hearings on allegations of improper evaluation based upon inadequate consideration of the pertinent facts by the individual(s) making the decision following procedures of paragraph (C) (4) of rule 3335-5-05 of the Administrative Code.
- (4) Conduct hearings on an appeal of a tenured faculty member because of termination of appointment during financial exigency following procedures of paragraph (B) of rule 3335-5-023 of the Administrative Code.
- (C) Organization.
  - (1) The chairperson shall select three members of the committee to sit on each hearing panel. If disqualifications or case loading should require their service, alternates may be assigned to hearing panels.
  - (2) A member shall be replaced on a hearing panel if there is a relationship to one of the parties or a prior involvement with the issues which may introduce prejudice.
  - (3) A hearing panel shall select a person, who need not be a member of the faculty hearing committee, to serve as presiding officer. The presiding officer shall direct the proceedings, rule on matters involving the introduction of evidence, and advise the panel members on such issues of law and procedures as they may deem necessary. The presiding officer, if not a member of the committee, shall not participate in substantive deliberations with the panel nor vote on decisions by the panel.
  - (4) As a standing committee of the senate, this committee is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-48 of the Administrative Code.
- 3335-5-4811 Fiscal committee.
- (A) Membership.

# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

The fiscal committee shall consist of fifteen members. A voting member who has completed a full term shall not be eligible for appointment or election for one year after such service.

- (1) Seven regular faculty members.
  - (a) Five regular faculty, at least two of whom are members of the senate, shall be nominated by the faculty council and elected by the senate. The term of office shall be three years with one member elected the first year and every third year thereafter, and two members elected in each of the other years.
  - (b) Two regular faculty shall be appointed by the president for three-year terms, one member to be appointed in the first year and every three years thereafter, and one member to be appointed in the second year and every three years thereafter.
- (2) Four students.
  - (a) One graduate student appointed by the president of the council of graduate students with the approval of the council of graduate students. The term of office is two years.
  - (b) One professional student appointed by the president of the inter-professional council with the approval of the inter-professional council. The term of office is two years.
  - (c) Two undergraduate students, at least one of whom is a member of the senate, appointed by the president of the undergraduate student government with the approval of the undergraduate student assembly. The term of office is two years, and one member shall be appointed each year.
- (3) Two staff members appointed by the president for two-year terms.
- (4) Two administrators appointed by the president. These members are non-voting.
- (B) Duties and responsibilities.

The committee shall have full access to all fiscal documentation necessary to perform the following functions:

- Review, on a continuing basis, the fiscal resources of the university;
- (2) Advise the president on the alternatives and strategies for the long-term and short-term allocation of university resources consistent with maintaining the missions of the university;
- (3) Analyze resources and budgets from an overall university-wide perspective, rather than making a detailed analysis of the budgets and expenditures of individual units within the university;
- (4) Advise the president, in the event of an imminent financial crisis, whether a determination of financial exigency is warranted.
- (C) Organization.
  - (1) The chairperson shall be elected from among the voting members of the committee.
  - (2) As a standing committee of the senate, this committee is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-48 of the Administrative Code.
- 3335-5-4812 Faculty compensation and benefits committee.
- (A) Membership.

The faculty compensation and benefits committee shall consist of fifteen members.

- Twelve regular faculty, at least two of whom are members of the senate. Faculty members shall be elected by the senate. The term of office shall be three years with four members elected each year.
- (2) Two administrators.
  - (a) The vice president for academic affairs and provost, or designee.
  - (b) The vice president for personnel services, or designee.
- (3) A non-voting emeritus faculty member appointed annually by the president in consultation with the Ohio state university retirees association.
- (4) Additional non-voting members and consultants from the university, serving at the discretion of the voting members of the committee.

# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

(B) Duties and responsibilities.

Study the adequacy and other attributes of the university's policies and provisions for:

- (1) Salaries, outside professional services and supplemental compensation;
- (2) Retirement benefits, hospitalization and medical insurance and other health benefits, life insurance, other insurance, travel reimbursement, educational benefits, recreational benefits, and other perquisites, benefits, and conditions of faculty employment.
- (C) Organization.
  - (1) The committee shall designate two standing subcommittees to concentrate, respectively, on:
    - (a) Faculty salaries and related matters;
    - (b) Faculty benefits.
  - (2) As a standing committee of the senate, this committee is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-48 of the Administrative Code.
- 3335-5-4813 Legislative affairs committee.
- (A) Membership.

The legislative affairs committee shall consist of seven members.

- (1) Three regular faculty. The term of office is three years with one member elected each year.
- (2) Three students.
  - (a) One graduate student.
  - (b) One professional student.
  - (c) One undergraduate student.
- (3) One administrator, appointed annually by the president.
- (B) Duties and responsibilities.
  - Inform itself on legislative affairs, current or contemplated, that affect higher education in

general and the Ohio state university in particular, and make this information available to the senate.

- (2) Inform itself, through the senate and otherwise, on student and faculty concerns with respect to such legislative affairs, and present those concerns to appropriate university officials.
- (3) Serve as an advisory committee on legislative affairs to the president and staff assistants responsible for legislative relations.
- (C) Organization.

As a standing committee of the senate, this committee is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-48 of the Administrative Code.

- 3335-5-4814 University calendar committee.
- (A) Membership.

The university calendar committee shall consist of fourteen members.

- (1) Six regular faculty who are not eligible for immediate reelection.
- (2) Four students.
  - (a) One graduate student.
  - (b) One professional student.
  - (c) Two undergraduate students, at least one of whom is a member of the senate.
- (3) Four administrators.
  - (a) The vice president for academic affairs and provost, or designee.
  - (b) A representative of the council of deans.
  - (c) The university registrar, or designee.
  - (d) The vice president for personnel services, or designee.
- (B) Duties and responsibilities.
  - (1) Serve in an advisory capacity to the council of deans on calendar-related matters.

## AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (2) Formulate guidelines for the preparation of university calendars to be presented for approval to the senate.
- (3) Propose the university calendar, following the adopted guidelines, to the council of deans.
- (4) Study the comparative advantages and disadvantages of the quarter system and alternative systems.
- (5) Study the development of improved quarter-end validation procedures.
- (6) Reports, including results of studies conducted by the university calendar committee, shall be forwarded to the council on academic affairs and the university senate for consideration and appropriate action.
- (C) Organization.

As a standing committee of the senate, this committee is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-48 of the Administrative Code.

- 3335-5-4815 Committee on traffic, parking, and public safety.
- (A) Membership.

The committee on traffic, parking, and public safety shall consist of seventeen members.

- (1) Six regular faculty.
- (2) Four students.
  - (a) One graduate student.
  - (b) One professional student.
  - (c) Two undergraduate students.
- (3) Two staff members (eligible for only "B" parking permits) elected for three-year terms.
- (4) Three administrators appointed by the president. The term of office is three years and one member shall be appointed each year.
- (5) Two members, non-voting.
  - (a) The director of public safety, or designee.
  - (b) The director of the division of traffic and parking.

#### AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (B) Duties and responsibilities.
  - Be responsible for making recommendations and hearing grievances, criticism, and other testimony pertaining to public safety.
  - (2) Recommend through appropriate administrative channels, and to the senate, ways and means for improving traffic and parking conditions and the administration and enforcement of traffic and parking regulations.
  - (3) Hold at least one publicized annual open hearing to receive information from interested parties with concerns about traffic, parking, and public safety.
  - (4) Hold such special hearings as the committee deems necessary when concerns about public safety, traffic, and parking arise in the university community. Reports of such special hearings shall be promptly forwarded through appropriate channels and to the senate.
- (C) Organization.
  - The committee shall elect a chairperson from among its faculty members. A chairperson shall serve a one-year term, and no more than one additional one-year term if reelected.
  - (2) As a standing committee of the senate, this committee is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-48 of the Administrative Code.

3335-5-4816 Committee on women and minorities.

(A) Membership.

The committee on women and minorities shall consist of eleven members.

- (1) Six regular faculty.
- (2) Three students.
  - (a) One graduate student.
  - (b) One professional student.
  - (c) One undergraduate student.
- (3) Two administration members, non-voting.

# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (a) The vice provost for minority affairs, or designee.
- (b) The director of affirmative action, or designee.
- (B) Duties and responsibilities.
  - (1) Study and evaluate programs for improving educational and employment opportunities for minorities and women at the university.
  - (2) Evaluate the results of the recommendations made by the commission on women and minorities.
  - (3) Report from time to time, but at least annually, to the senate on the progress of affirmative action at the university.
  - (4) Make recommendations to the senate or to the president, as deemed appropriate, for further action.
- (C) Organization.

As a standing committee of the senate, this committee is also governed by the provisions of rules 3335-5-46 and 3335-5-48 of the Administrative Code.

3335-5-49 Other committees of the university.

- (A) Other committees of the university may be designated by the board of trustees or, subject to the approval of the board of trustees, the president or university senate. These committees shall have no direct affiliation with the senate.
- (B) Unless otherwise specified by rule, the president shall appoint the members of these committees.
- 3335-5-491 Mershon committee on education in national security.
- (A) The Mershon committee on education in national security shall consist of ten members to be appointed by the president to serve terms as follows: the director of the Mershon center for education in national security shall serve as chairperson; the chairpersons of the ROTC departments; and six regular faculty members who shall be appointed for three-year terms, with two of the six being appointed each year. Members appointed for three-year terms shall be eligible for reappointment.

### AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (B) The committee shall function principally in an advisory capacity to the director (see rule 3335-3-38 of the Administrative Code) with respect to the development of a program of education and research in national security which will support and be in harmony with the general educational and research aims of the university. The committee shall be charged with the responsibility of ensuring that the program makes a significant and continuing contribution to the university-wide program for education and research in national security.
- (C) This committee shall be responsible for making recommendations to the president regarding the appointment of the director of the Mershon center for education in national security, as a vacancy arises. Established university procedures for appointing academic personnel shall be followed.
- (D) Reports by this committee to the president shall be transmitted by the director through the vice president for academic affairs and provost.
- 3335-5-492 Standing committee on agricultural affairs.
- (A) The standing committee on agricultural affairs shall be appointed by the board of trustees.
- (B) The committee shall include:
  - The director of the Ohio department of agriculture who shall be vice chairperson, ex officio with voting rights;
  - (2) Such other members as the chairperson of the board of trustees may designate.
- 3335-5-493 Faculty committee on patents and copyrights.
- (A) A faculty committee on patents and copyrights has been designated in the policy on patents and copyrights approved by the board of trustees.
- (B) The membership and duties of the faculty committee on patents and copyrights are described in paragraph (C) of rule 3335-13-06 of the Administrative Code.
- 3335-11-021 Hearing officers and panels.
- (A) The council on student affairs shall recommend to the president, subject to the approval of the board of trustees, a list of attorneys, unaffiliated with the university, who shall be authorized to act as hearing officers to preside over disciplinary proceedings under

rule 3335-11-02 of the Administrative Code. One such attorney shall be designated by the president as chief hearing officer, whose duties shall include:

- Assisting the council on student affairs in preparing and enacting procedural rules to guarantee due process, including, but not limited to, the procedural recommendations contained in the report and recommendations of the university committee on rights and responsibilities (the Ohio state university, September 15, 1968);
- (2) Selecting hearing officers as needed from the approved list;
- (3) Reviewing every case in which sanctions have been recommended, to determine whether such sanctions should be imposed or reduced, or whether the case should be dismissed or remanded for further hearing;
- (4) Forwarding completed cases to the vice provost for student affairs for administrative implementation in accordance with their final determination by the chief hearing officer;
- (5) Hearing on appeal student disciplinary cases, not including university actions relating to academic failure or violations of a code of professional ethics or of an honor code of these colleges or academic units having such codes, where an appeal is taken by any student from any such action by the student's college, university committee, or other properly authorized university adjudicatory body, only in those cases where the penalty assessed was suspension, dismissal, or expulsion.
- (B) That an array of hearing panelists, large enough to allow at least three panels, shall be selected by lot consisting of:
  - (1) Faculty members,
  - (2) Undergraduate students,
  - (3) Graduate and professional students, and
  - (4) Administrative staff members.

Any person selected to serve as hearing panelist may be exempted from such service if that person declines.

(C) The chief hearing officer shall, by lot, select from the array hearing panels, each composed of two faculty members, two undergraduate students, one graduate or

## AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

professional student, and one administrative staff member. The hearing panels shall have original jurisdiction to hear cases of alleged student violation of rule 3335-11-02 of the Administrative Code brought before it by authorized university officials, make findings of fact, determine a verdict, and, in the event of a guilty verdict, to recommend sanctions.

(D) The university and the defendant shall have the right to challenge for cause. The hearing officer shall hear challenges for cause.

3335-11-022 Pending criminal law suit.

Whenever a criminal court exercises jurisdiction over acts which allegedly constitute a disruption by university rules, the university shall not exercise jurisdiction, except that in extraordinary cases, where there is a clear and present danger of repeated or continued violation of the disruption rule, the university may bring the student before a hearing officer and panel to find whether he poses such a danger. If the panel finds that he does, it shall recommend that the continued enrollment of the student be dependent on his being placed on strict disciplinary probation, under such terms and conditions as the hearing officer may specify (except that the student may not be deprived of university scholarship, loan, grant-in-aid, or employment). The term of probation shall last until such time as the hearing officer shall, or on his own initiative or upon petition by the student, find that the danger no longer exists. If the student is alleged to have violated probation, he will be subject to an immediate hearing before a hearing officer, and if found guilty of violating probation, be temporarily suspended or dismissed from the university pending a full hearing.

#### AMENDED RULES

3335-3-03 The president.

(D) The president shall be a voting member of all college faculties, and of the graduate school faculty, and of the faculty of the arts and sciences. He shall be a voting member and presiding officer of the university faculty (see rules 3335-5-19 to 3335-5-25 of the Administrative Code) and of the university senate. He shall appoint all committees of the university faculty and of the university senate, unless membership has been designated by rule (see paragraph (A) (1) of rule 3335-5-46 of the Administrative Code).

3335-3-18 Director of libraries.

(B) The director of libraries shall have the responsibility and authority for administering the university

libraries under the jurisdiction of that office and the university archives. In the discharge of library duties the director shall be guided by the policies established by the library council (see rule 3335-5-482 of the Administrative Code). The director shall report to the president through the vice president for academic affairs and provost.

3335-3-21 Director of athletics.

- (A) The director of athletics shall be a member of the faculty. The director of athletics shall be responsible to the vice provost for student affairs and shall be appointed under the procedures outlined in rule 3335-3-35 of the Administrative Code. The athletic council (see rule 3335-5-485 of the Administrative Code) shall also be consulted.
- 3335-3-25 Organization of the university.
- (B) Procedures for recommending the establishment, alteration and abolition of educational units shall be promulgated by the university faculty or the university senate and approved by the board of trustees (see rule 3335-5-481 of the Administrative Code). Procedures recommending the establishment, alteration and abolition of administrative units shall be promulgated by the president and approved by the board of trustees.
- 3335-3-38 Director, Mershon center for education in national security.
- (A) The director, Mershon center for education in national security, shall have the responsibility and authority for formulating and administering the program of the center financed by the civilian-military portion of the Mershon fund and other funds that are made available. The director shall provide active leadership in developing and maintaining a program of education and research in national security which will support and be in harmony with the general educational and research aims of the university. In carrying out these duties, the director shall consult with the Mershon committee on education in national security (see rule 3335-5-491 of the Administrative Code).
- 3335-5-021 Financial exigency.
- (B) Mechanism of determination.
  - In the event of an imminent financial crisis, as announced and defined by the president to the university senate, the president will solicit the recommendations of the fiscal committee, as

provided for under rule 3335-5-4811 of the Administrative Code, to ascertain whether a determination of financial exigency is warranted.

- (2) The fiscal committee, acting in accordance with rule 3335-5-4811 of the Administrative Code, shall have the responsibility to:
- 3335-5-023 Appeal procedures for tenured faculty because of termination of appointments during financial exigency.
- (B) The faculty hearing committee.
  - (2) In response to each notice of intention to appeal, the faculty hearing committee shall select a hearing panel of tenured faculty members according to the provisions of rule 3335-5-4810 of the Administrative Code. The hearing panel shall begin its review of the case not earlier than thirty days and no later than sixty days from receipt of the notice of intention to appeal, except by mutual consent of the complainant and the chairperson of the faculty hearing committee.
- 3335-5-04 Hearing procedures for complaints against regular, regular clinical, and auxiliary faculty members.
- (A) Definitions and construction.
  - (3) Department chairpersons, deans, or the vice president for academic affairs and provost shall not act in their administrative capacities in the consideration of any complaint naming them as respondent. In complaints naming a department chairperson or a dean as respondent, the vice president for academic affairs and provost shall appoint an equivalent rank administrator from another department or college to act in the stead of the chairperson or dean for the purposes of this rule. In complaints naming the vice president for academic affairs and provost as respondent, the chairperson of the faculty hearing committee shall act in that administrator's stead.
  - (4) The faculty hearing committee is established by rule 3335-5-4810 of the Administrative Code.
- 3335-5-05 Procedures concerning faculty complaints about promotion, tenure and renewal decisions.
- (B) The committee on academic freedom and responsibility.
  - (4) If the committee determines that reasonable and adequate grounds may exist for asserting improper

evaluation, it shall forward the complaint to the faculty hearing committee, established pursuant to rule 3335-5-489 of the Administrative Code.

- (C) The faculty hearing committee.
  - (1) Upon receipt of a complaint alleging improper evaluation, the faculty hearing committee shall select a hearing panel according to the method provided in rule 3335-5-4810 of the Administrative Code, to conduct proceedings in order to determine whether there is validity in the complaint.
- 3335-5-14 Powers.
- (B) To adopt, alter or abolish courses and curricula subject to the approval of the council on academic affairs and the president and the board of trustees (see rules 3335-5-481 and 3335-7-02 of the Administrative Code);
- (C) To create and abolish schools, bureaus, and departments of instruction within the college subject to approval of the council on academic affairs, the university senate, the president and the board of trustees (see rules 3335-3-25 to 3335-3-28 and 3335-5-481 of the Administrative Code);
- 3335-7-02 Courses and curricula; establishment, alteration or abolition.
- (A) All proposals for the establishment, alteration and abolition of courses and curricula must be submitted to the council on academic affairs. Such proposals shall follow the procedure outlined in rule 3335-5-481 of the Administrative Code and shall be subject to review by the president and the board of trustees.

3335-11-02 Disruption.

(B) Any student found guilty of the conduct proscribed in paragraphs (A) (1) through (A) (7) of this rule shall be subject to maximum sanction of dismissal or any lesser disciplinary sanction pursuant to rule 3335-11-021 of the Administrative Code.

3335-11-05 Promulgation of regulations.

President Jennings made the following statement:

It is with great optimism that I bring before you today budget guidelines for the 1986-87 fiscal

year that, I believe, permit us to continue to enhance excellence at this University and, at the same time, continue to challenge us to effectively manage our resources.

In keeping with the planned budget cycle, I offer these guidelines for discussion today. Final approval of the operating budget is scheduled at the June Board meeting, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1986.

We are on a course toward establishing our position as one of the nation's premier educational institutions, and this year we have gained momentum toward reaching that goal. The 1985-86 fiscal year has seen a number of initiatives implemented by the State of Ohio and by the University that are significantly -- and favorably -- affecting Ohio State. Let me mention some of these efforts as exemplary of the climate of excellence that we are developing throughout our campuses today.

We are very fortunate that the State of Ohio has taken national leadership in the ambitious Selective Excellence Programs. In addition to contributing basic support through the instructional subsidy, the State has invested in Ohio's economic redevelopment and its future by committing public funds to the Research Challenge, Program Excellence, Academic Challenge, and Productivity Improvement Challenge grants. Through these programs, Ohio State will realize more than \$18 million during the 1985-87 biennium.

Academic excellence in Ohio is further enhanced by the Eminent Scholars Awards Program of the Ohio Board of Regents. This program improves our ability to attract additional internationally recognized scholars to our faculty. Three such scholars already have been brought to Ohio State under this program, with two additional searches in progress.

These State efforts enable this University to extend initiatives already begun in the last biennium with our own University resources. Beginning with three departments designated as Centers of Excellence in 1984-85, we now have a total of fourteen Columbus campus programs sharing

special funds from University resources, and the \$4.2 million Academic Challenge Grant through 1986-87. In addition, the four regional campuses and the Agricultural Technical Institute have received State entitlements to enhance selected programs on their campuses.

We also are, as you well know, in the midst of an enormous campaign to increase the level of support for the University from private and corporate gifts. This week, we kicked off that portion of the campaign involving our faculty, staff, and students. The progress already made toward our ambitious \$350 million goal is very encouraging.

Correspondingly, our faculty continue to build upon their abilities to further increase the amounts of sponsored research dollars from governmental, as well as private sectors. Enhancing their efforts is the \$12.9 million Research Challenge grant from the State and our own resources that we hope will stimulate additional external research funds.

However, there is still more that we can do. Continuing efforts are being made within the University to assure the effective use of all resources to support teaching, research, and related service activities. The guidelines I am recommending today are consistent with these efforts. They have been developed after consultation with the Fiscal Committee and the Faculty Compensation and Benefits Committee of University Senate.

In the current biennium, the process of selective internal reallocations is being continued. Each dean and vice president is again being asked to redirect 2.5 percent of their resources by reducing and eliminating expenditures on low priority, inefficient, or duplicative activities. This has provided \$8.1 million in redirected resources which will be used to support our emphasis on excellence, as well as new and emerging needs throughout the University. Reallocations, and continuing cost containment efforts, enable Ohio State to maintain its forward momentum while allowing us to maintain accessibility by avoiding tuition increases.

As I pledged last year, if the State maintained the funding level being considered in the budget proposals, Ohio State would not increase student tuition in the second year of the biennium. The State has done its part. Therefore, we will meet our commitment to accessibility by recommending no student tuition increases for 1986-87.

In light of tuition increases nationally that are averaging more than seven percent, Ohio State's zero increase will significantly enhance accessibility. Even more important, holding the line on tuition will directly assist students who face uncertainties in federal student financial aid.

In addition, I am recommending that the average increase in all University rates and charges not exceed four percent. It is my intent that even with this guideline, the actual average increase will be significantly less than four percent, as a result of the success of cost containment efforts within our earnings units.

One indication of this is the three percent rate increase request submitted by our Residence and Dining Halls. This is significantly below the national average increase in residence hall fees of five percent. Accompanying this rate increase is my recommendation that Ohio State again provide funds to maintain the purchasing power of University-funded student financial aid.

A major factor in building excellence is maintaining and improving our competitive position on salaries with other major universities. On salary and wage increases, I am today recommending guidelines of three percent for faculty and staff and providing an additional three percent in salary budgets for merit increases. Additionally, central funds of up to one-half percent of salary budgets are recommended for promotions, and equity and excellence adjustments. Staff members who are part of an exclusive bargaining unit shall receive salary increases as specified in the appropriate labor agreement.

In support of the faculty and staff and of our comprehensive programs, I am further recommending an increase of 5.5 percent for equipment and

supplies. This continues our emphasis on keeping these necessary support budgets at reasonable levels.

As I told the University Senate last fall, no University has ever become great, or maintained its greatness, without continued attention to the needs of its central academic core in the libraries. Our libraries must keep pace with the demands of the faculty, and the needs of our students, by continually updating their collection and improving the scope of their resources. This same philosophy holds for the equipment we use to instruct our students and to perform research; and for the facilities in which these activities are conducted.

To this end, I am recommending one-time funds of \$5.8 million beyond normal budgets for the acquisition of new library holdings, equipment, and needed renovations. These university funds -plus the instructional equipment and computing funding of \$9.5 million which was included in the recently approved capital appropriations bill -will help us continue to modernize the equipment and computers used in instruction and research. This is a vital investment in the future that will insure that our faculty and students have the most modern equipment and facilities available to support their academic efforts.

Our over-riding goal -- that we maintain an ever higher standard of excellence in instruction -becomes even more imperative with the continuing improvement in the quality of our undergraduate students. This process has begun as a result of our move to conditional admissions, and will intensify under selective admissions. Our students are better prepared for us, and our challenge is to be fully prepared for them and the new demands they will present. I am, therefore, recommending that from monies reallocated from the various offices that serve the academic mission, a total of \$1.8 million be committed to support excellence in undergraduate instruction.

In sum, as part of our self-help commitment through internal reallocations -- along with the new Selective Excellence funding -- these recommendations for the 1986-87 budget include a

total of \$38.5 million for enhancements to excellence. This level of excellence funding will provide us with a unique opportunity to initiate new directions which will influence the future of Ohio State into the next century.

Further, the academic excellence funding from the State, along with our internal reallocations, provide a basis for strength as we approach potential donors nationwide to participate in our private fund-raising campaign.

As I said last fall, "We are fortunate at Ohio State that our institutional funds are available to be spent flexibly, as priorities change and new needs arise...Our financial flexibility allows us to manage our own destiny. Throughout the University, it is goals and priorities -- not artificial and arbitrary categories -- that must guide our spending decisions."

While I have faith that the decisions made throughout this University will result in these resources being effectively used to further improve the quality of instruction, research, and related service, we must continue to challenge ourselves to also make maximum use of the fiscal flexibility available to us.

Increased efforts are being put in place throughout this University to strengthen our management of resources at all levels, and to insure that the most effective use is made of all available resources. During the next several months, we will be setting into motion initiatives that will further enhance cost containment activities throughout the University. Excellence in the management of the University resources must be enhanced. Along with our efforts to achieve excellence in instruction, research, and related service.

The 1986-87 University budget we will present for your approval in June will be in accordance with these guidelines. It will reflect our commitment to emphasizing the twin goals of excellence and accessibility -- while maintaining the comprehensive diversity of a great University that we are continuing to work together, to make even better for the future.

The floor is open for discussion and any questions. Thank you, Ed. I would certainly like to take this opportunity to commend you and your staff at the University for coming in with such a responsible--in my mind--budget, which clearly keeps our promise of maintaining current tuition levels. Isn't this the first time in a while that you have been able to do that?

President Jennings:

First time in a while--although you will recall in December 1981, we actually reduced tuition by twenty-five dollars per quarter. So, this is the first time, since that time, that we have come in with a zero tuition increase--reflecting state support and our reallocations.

Mr. Galbreath:

I think that it might be good for all of us, when we see our various congressmen and legislators, to take the opportunity to remind them that we kept our promise. Thank you. Are there any further questions?

President Jennings:

And I might add, that that makes the tuition increases roughly half the rate increase that was assumed in the biennium budget that was passed in the General Assembly. So, it is a result of both the General Assembly and our internal reallocations, but we can do better with our math.

Mr. Galbreath:

Is that a promise?

President Jennings:

That's a promise.

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### **Commencement Speaker**

#### Leslie H. Wexner Doctor of Humanities

Leslie H. Wexner is the founder, president, and chairman of the board of The Limited, Incorporated, —the nation's largest women's specialty apparel retailer with more then 2,400 stores and sales of more than 52.4 billion in 1985. Wexner earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from Ohio State in 1959 and studied law at the University for two years. He began The Limited in 1963 with one store, located in Columbus' Kingsdale Shopping Center.

An active and loyal alumnus of Ohio State, Wexner serves as chair of the board of directors of The Ohio State University Foundation, a group of prominent alumni and friends of the University that oversee major private fund-raising activities. Wexner provided significant early impetus to the University's current \$350 million private fund-raising campaign last autumn when he announced his gift of \$10 million to his alma mater-the largest gift ever received from a living individual. The gift is in support of the widely acclaimed Ohio State University Center for the Visual Arts. The \$26 million facility will be known as "The Wexner Center for the Visual Arts," dedicated to the memory of Wexner's late father, Harry L. Wexner. Leslie Wexner is also a member of The Presidents Club and the College of Business Advisory Council.

A long-time patron of the arts, Wexner is a trustee of the Whitney Museum of American Art, the Columbus Symphony Orchestra, and the Columbus Museum of Art. He is a director of Banc One Corporation and a director and member of the executive committee of Sotheby's Holdings Inc. A champion of his hometown of Columbus, he has been extremely active in promoting the growth and economic vitality of this community. He is a trustee of the Capital South Community Urban Redevelopment Corporation. He also is active in local and national Jewish organizations, serving on the executive committee of the Columbus Jewish Federation; as vice-chairman and trustee of Agudas Achim Synagogue; and as national vice-chairman of the United Jewish Appeal and co-chairman of its international committee

The Ohio State University is proud to count him among its distinguished alumni and to honor him today for his achievements, as well as for his vision of the future.

#### **Recipients of Honors**

#### Berenice Abbott Doctor of Humane Letters

Berenice Abbott is recognized internationally as one of the leading American photographers of the twentieth century. Born in Springfield, Ohio, she graduated from high school in Cleveland and attended Ohio State for a brief period in 1917-18. She left Ohio State for New York and then on to Paris and Berlin to study photography. After serving as an assistant to photographer Man Ray, she opened her first photo studio in Paris in 1926. During her years in Paris, she photographed many of the most notable artistic and political figures of the era. She also began her efforts to preserve the work of the French photographer Eugene Atget.

Returning to New York in 1929, Abbott began to document the city's people, architecture, and other aspects of its life. Supported in part by the Federal Arts Project of the Works Progress Administration in 1935-38, this work led to a book, *Changing New York*, that has been hailed as the premier photographic record of New York in the 1930s. (Thirteen prints from this series are held in the permanent art collection at Ohio State.) Later in her career, Abbott's intrest in scientific phenomena led her to photographically illustrate a wide variety of scientific principles such as magnetism, motion, and gravity. This body of work added to her already substantial acclaim.

While continuing her work as a photographer, Abbott has been an active teacher and has written books and articles ranging from artistic criticism to explanation of photographic techniques. She has received many honors, including the distinction of being the first photographer to be inducted as a member of the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters.

Abbott has been hailed by historians as well as admirers for her efforts to document the great changes that have occurred in society during her lifetime. That documentation has resulted in a priceless and timeless legacy for future generations. The Ohio State University is proud to recognize the distinguished career of this extremely talented artist.

#### Charles W. Fries Doctor of Arts

During his career of more than 30 years in television and film, Charles W. Fries of Cincinnati has acquired a reputation as a man of great skill and sensitivity. After receiving a bachelor's degree in business from Ohio State in 1950, he joined the financial operations area of a production company. He quickly moved into production, eventually holding top positions at Screen Gems, Columbia Pictures, and Metromedia Producers Corporation. In 1974, he founded his independent company, Fries Entertainment, inc., which has multiple interests in the production and distribution of films for television and the theatre.

Fries has produced more than 75 films for television, many dealing with issues of national importance. A sampling of such productions includes *Intimate Strangers* (1977), about spousal abuse; A Cry for Love (1980), dealing with pill addiction; and Bitter Harvest (1981), dramatizing the chemical poisoning of farmlands. He also has brought about film biographies of Louis Armstrong, Francis Gary Powers, the Wright Brothers, Humphrey Bogart, and Medgar Evers. Miniseries developed under his supervision have included The Martian Chronicles, The Word, and The Trial of Lee Harvey Oswaid.

Fries is also active in the promotion of quality and responsibility in entertainment. He is past chairman and presently a member of the Steering Committee of the Caucus of Producers, Writers and Directors, a group that attempts to make film and television more responsive to social issues. Fries has also been a member of the board of governors and executive committee of the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences.

Fries has devoted time and energy to charitable and service organizations including the City of Hope Hospital, the Fund for Higher Education, the NAACP, the Neighbors of Watts, the National Conference of Christians and Jews, and the InterAgency Council on Child Abuse and Neglect.

Currently, Fries serves on the advisory committee of the Department of Photography and Cinema at Ohio State. The University is proud to honor this creative and influential alumnus.

## **Recipients of Honors**

#### Donald E. Osterbrock Doctor of Science

Cincinnati native Donald E. Osterbrock is regarded as one of the world's great astronomer's. His research and observations on several important areas of astronomy and astrophysics have had a lasting and far-reaching influence on the field. Osterbrock has come to be regarded as a leading expert on gaseous nebulae and active galactic nuclei. Several of his books and articles have become standard references, used widely in graduate courses and by researchers around the world. He has also written books and articles on the history of astronomy, including two biographies of important early astronomers.

Österbrock received his undergraduate and Ph.D. degrees at the University of Chicago. He has been an astronomer and faculty member at Princeton University, the California Institute of Technology, the University of Wisconsin, and since 1973 at the University of California at Santa Cruz, where he also served as director of the Lick Observatory until 1981. He has been a visiting faculty member at the University of Minnesota and at Ohio State, and twice has received Guggenheim Fellowships to the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton.

Osterbrock's honors include his election to the National Academy of Sciences, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and the Royal Astronomical Society. He has also held leadership positions in professional organizations, including service as president of the International Astronomical Union Commission 34 on Interstellar Matter and Planetary Nebulae, chairman of the National Academy of Sciences Section of Astronomy, and chairman of the University Research Association Astronomy Committee.

Beyond his professional interests, he is a member of the Nature Conservancy, the National Wildlife Federation, and the Santa Cruz Bird Club.

Osterbrock has had a strong interest in Ohio State for many years, and has visited on several occasions to lecture and to work with faculty and graduate students. The University is very pleased to honor this distinguished teacher and scholar.

#### Richard P. Anderson Distinguished Service Award

Richard P. Anderson of Maumee is managing partner of The Andersons, an agribusiness partnership with gross sales exceeding S1 billion annually. For more than 35 years, the firm has generously supported Ohio State's College of Agricultural methan and Development Center [OARDC], the Ohio Cooperative Extension Service, and the Agricultural Technical Institute. This support has included substantial monetary contributions as well as scholarships, internships, and access to company records for student research.

In 1965, the Andersons established the Andersons Agricultural Research Fund with a major gift to the University. Since that time, income from the gift has provided the resources for a grain-quality research project of national proportions. In 1975, The Andersons enabled the University to become a Community Partner in the firm and to share in its profits. In recognition of this generosity, Anderson is a member of The Presidents Club and The Presidents Council—Ohio State's major donor recognition organizations. He is a member of the National Campaign Committee for the current Ohio State University Campaign.

Anderson has also expended vast amounts of time and energy on behalf of the University. He has served two terms as chairperson of the OARDC Support Council, which encourages increased budgetary support from state and federal governments. Anderson has led a delegation of council members to the Statehouse in Columbus and to Washington, D.C. for the past six years. He has also made the expertise of many other people in his company available to serve on college advisory committees.

Anderson is an active business and civic leader. His board memberships include the Toledo Edison Company, St. Luke's Hospital, Lucas County Children Services, the Toledo Museum of Art, and the Ohio Chamber of Commerce. Anderson received a bachelor of science degree in agriculture, magna cum laude, from Michigan State University in 1953. Three of his sons have graduated from Ohio State.

Columbus, Ohio, June 11, 1986

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Friday, June 11, 1986, at The Ohio State University Fawcett Center for Tomorrow, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

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Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

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The Chairman, Mr. Galbreath, called the meeting of the Board of Trustees to order on June 10, 1986, at 6:30 p.m. He requested the Secretary to call the roll. The meeting recessed into Executive Session for the purpose of considering legal issues and personnel-related matters.

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Mr. Galbreath reconvened the meeting on June 11, 1986, at 10:05 a.m.

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## INTRODUCTION OF NEW BOARD MEMBER

Mr. Galbreath introduced the new member of the Board of Trustees:

It is my pleasure to introduce John W. Kessler to you. Mr. Kessler is our newest Trustee, having been appointed by Governor Celeste on May 14 for a term which expires in 1995.

Jack Kessler lives and works in Columbus. He is a 1958 graduate of The Ohio State University in the College of Business. He is the owner of the John W. Kessler Company and Chairman of Marsh & McLennan Real Estate Advisors.

In addition to being active in real estate development, consulting, financing and investing, Jack is on the Board of Directors of the Avalon Corporation, Banc One, The Limited and Rax Restaurants. He is involved with numerous civic organizations, including The Ohio State University Foundation, the Columbus Foundation, the Columbus Museum of Art and the Capitol South Community Urban Redevelopment Corporation.

We are pleased to have you with us, Jack, and we all look forward to working with you.

Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I would like to give you an update on the selective admissions policy

change--and for that I'd like to call on Professor Tom Willke to review the recommendation that is before you.

Professor Tom Willke:

Thank you, President Jennings. Mr. Chairman, Board Members and guests, this is a proposal for selective admission of new first-quarter freshmen to the Columbus campus for Autumn Quarter 1986. This will involve Ohio residents exclusively.

For many years, the University has had some difficulty in meeting the state-mandated enrollment ceilings for the Columbus campus for Autumn Quarter. Our principal point of control has been the admission of new first-quarter freshmen and we exercise that control with a first come, first served policy for Ohio residents. That policy served neither the applicants nor the University very well, for it selected students on the basis of a post-mark rather than on a basis of more rational criteria. Moreover, it was self-defeating. The earlier we closed for applications, the earlier the students applied the next year and the earlier still we had to close. Each year the dates move forward and for Autumn Quarter 1986, we had to close for applications on November 15, 1985. Clearly an unacceptable situation. If the policy were continued, the closing date for the entering class of 1987 would probably be in October of this year. Even with these extremely early closing dates, the control of the numbers was not good. If only for this reason alone, a new policy is necessary.

In his state of the University message last October, President Jennings charged the University to examine its admissions policy and find a better way to manage. The Council on Admission and Registration--the University-level committee composed of faculty, students and administrators-worked with the President examining alternative policies and their consequences. At the February meeting of the University Senate, the President made a major address to that body presenting the rationale for a change in policy and the general principles which a new policy should encompass.

At the March meeting of the Senate, the Council presented a proposal for a new selective admission policy. That document dated March 7, is in the Board book you received for this meeting. The document was mailed to all faculty/staff and

student governance bodies for comments. The purpose of this document was to give the general principles for an outline of a selective admission policy for new first-quarter freshmen. In the light of experience, most of the details will be worked out and we recognize that some of the details in the document may need a change with practice.

In brief, the proposal was that for new firstquarter freshmen admission to the Columbus campus for Autumn Quarter, the University should set a traditional fixed closing date in late winter and select from among all applicants those most likely to benefit from Autumn Quarter admission and most likely to advance the mission of the University. Those not so admitted would still have the option of enrolling at the Columbus campus for another quarter or at a Regional campus any quarter or as a part-time evening commuter student, if that were appropriate.

The principal criteria for admission would be the applicant's high school program, high school rank, and special qualifications. Several years ago, the University gave a clear message with its conditional admission policy--that high school students should take college-preparatory courses if they intend to attend this University, or any other for that matter. In accordance with that same reasoning, those who pursue a college-preparatory program would be favored in the selection process besides what a student did in high school. How well the student did would also be important. Class rank would be the primary measure of that. Furthermore, the University is committed to promoting racial, cultural, and geographic diversity and to recognizing the special talents or circumstances of individuals. In accordance with its missions of affirmative action and of generally promoting diversity, these special qualifications of some students will also be principal criteria.

At the heart of the selection process will be a Faculty Committee which will make the actual decisions on individual students. That committee will report to the Council on Admission and Registration for policy matters and that body, in consultation with the Council on Academic Affairs, will report on important issues to the University Senate. Under current conditions, there will probably be about 15,000 or 16,000 new firstquarter freshmen applicants for Columbus campus Autumn Quarter. Of these, about eight percent or more will be admitted because the acceptance to

Professor Willke: (contd)

enrollment ratio is a little less than fifty percent. Thus, it is important to understand that most of the applicants can be admitted rather routinely on the basis of their high school records with no close scrutiny or difficult judgments involved.

Therefore, the Faculty Committee will only need to individually examine the applications of the much smaller set of students who are not admitted routinely. With this still large, but manageable load, that committee can exercise individual judgments which will be necessary to ensure that our goals of affirmative action, promotion of diversity, and recognition of special talent or circumstances are fulfilled.

Finally, it should be noted, again, that those who are not admitted to the Columbus campus for Autumn Quarter will be offered alternative ways to enroll at Ohio State. Thus, while some students may not have their first choice of time and place of enrollment, no student will be completely denied the opportunity to enroll at Ohio State. The response of the University community to this proposal was overwhelmingly positive. At its May meeting, the University Senate unanimously passed the general resolution supporting the adoption of selective admission policy, following the prin-ciples advanced in the March 7 document. That's the first part of the resolution which was given to you for this meeting. The second two parts of the resolution concern the appointment and composition of the Faculty Committee. There was some dissent on that, but, even so, they passed with a healthy majority. Therefore, in accordance with the bylaws of this Board, and the approval of the University, this resolution is presented to the Board.

President Jennings:

Thank you, Tom. Are there any questions? The dissent that Tom talked about was the exclusion of students on that, which we ordinarily do not do on our University governance structure. But since this is a curriculum matter--which is approved by the faculty--it is a faculty committee.

Mr. Immke:

Thank you, Tom.

# SELECTIVE ADMISSION OF NEW FIRST-QUARTER FRESHMEN

Resolution No. 86-135

WHEREAS the current procedures for limiting admission of new first-quarter freshmen to the Columbus campus for Autumn Quarters provide inadequate control in meeting the state-mandated enrollment ceiling, serve our applicants badly, and impede progress toward our institutional goals; and

WHEREAS the Council on Admission and Registration's document of March 7, 1986, provides a set of principles for limiting admission of new first-quarter freshmen to the Columbus campus for Autumn Quarters and the basis for implementing an acceptable procedure to achieve that end; and

WHEREAS the University community's response to that March 7, 1986, document has been strongly supportive; and

WHEREAS on May 3, 1986, the University Senate approved the practice of selective admission of new first-quarter freshmen to the Columbus campus for Autumn Quarters, beginning with Autumn Quarter 1987, based on the academic and special qualifications of the applicants and according to the principles established in the March 7, 1986, document of the Council on Admission and Registration:

### NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That an interim Faculty Committee on Admissions be appointed for the purpose of implementing the principles of this policy. This committee shall be appointed by the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost in consultation with the Steering Committee of the University Senate. The committee shall consist of eight members as follows:

- (A) Six members of the regular faculty, including two faculty members currently serving on the Council on Admission and Registration, and one faculty member currently serving on the Council on Academic Affairs.
- (B) The Director of Admissions, or designee, non-voting.
- (C) The Vice Provost for Minority Affairs, or designee, non-voting.

This committee shall report to the Council on Admission and Registration. Proposed recommendations for changes in policy for selective admission will be forwarded as well to the Council on Academic Affairs; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the composition and responsibilities of this committee will be reviewed within one year and a recommendation made to the University Senate for appropriate further action.

Upon motion of Mr. Teaford, seconded by Ms. Casto, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous voice vote.

# INTRODUCTION

In his presentation to the University Senate, President Jennings outlined the shortcomings of this University's first-come, first-served policy for managing the admission of New First Quarter Freshmen (NFQF) to the Columbus campus for Autumn Quarter. In particular, he noted that the policy provides inadequate control in meeting the state-mandated enrollment ceiling, serves our applicants badly, impedes progress toward our institutional goals, and harms the University's public image.

In the past few years this self-defeating policy has led to ever-earlier closing dates to the point that this year we had to close admission for Autumn Quarter 1986 on November 15, 1985. Thus, in practice the University had open admission for a few short weeks. After mid-November, The Ohio State University became as selective as any university, in the country, admitting only a select few honors candidates, Freshman Foundation applicants, and students with special talents. Even with these extreme measures, next fall we will exceed our enrollment target for freshmen by almost 1,000 students. Without a change in policy we can expect a closing date in October 1986 for Autumn Quarter 1987 because applicants will rush even more to beat the deadline.

As the President pointed out, many of those admitted under the first-come, first-served policy in recent years have not been well served by the "false promise of open admission." Fully one-quarter of these freshmen have left before the Even beginning of the sophomore year. though our conditional admission policy is helping, the fact is that "open admission tends to signal unfortunate, and unfounded, perceptions that it also means lower academic standards." He further noted that, "It is neither possible nor desirable for Ohio State to be all things to all people." Many other institutions of high quality have excess capacity that our Columbus campus does not, and some students will be better served by these colleges and universities, community colleges, regional campuses, and technical schools.

While some applicants are poorly served by admission to the University, others who could benefit from attendance have been denied admission, often through no fault of their own. Many of the latter group are those whom Ohio State has a special obligation to serve, for example, the first

generation college students who lack the advantage of family experience with college application forms and deadlines.

Our progress toward affirmative action and our recruitment of top scholars have been seriously hindered by the early closing dates because many are discouraged from applying for admission by the news that it is too late.

A change to a more rational selective admission policy is clearly necessary, and legal and historical precedents from both this University and others indicate that a change is possible. In this report the Council on Admission and Registration proposes a procedure for selective admission similar to that used at colleges and universities throughout the country. Three other state universities, Miami, Bowling Green and Ohio University, currently use a similar procedure as did OSU as late as the 1960's.

## PROCEDURE FOR SELECTIVE ADMISSION

Immediately following is an outline of the suggested procedure for the admission of Ohio residents to the Columbus campus for Autumn Quarter. A flow chart is attached. Further discussion of the key issues, e.g., criteria to be used for judging admissibility, follow.

A fixed closing date for applications would be announced at the beginning of the admission cycle. All applications received before that date would receive equal consideration.

As applications are received they would be reviewed, and those applicants clearly meeting the established criteria would be admitted on a rolling basis; that is, notices of admission would be sent on a continuous basis as applications are received and approved. The criteria for admission on a rolling basis would need to be set high enough to ensure control of the number admitted while preserving consistency of judgement. Or put another way, the expected enrollment yield from the rolling admission must be safely below the enrollment target so that the enrollment target would not be exceeded or so that an arbitrary tightening of the criteria for later applicants would not be required to meet the target.

Rolling admission would be managed in two ways. First, many of the applicants would be admitted routinely by the Admissions Office because their qualifications would be apparent and easily judged. For example, an applicant with high class rank and no admission conditions needs no special scrutiny for admission. With an estimated 16,000 applications it is a practical necessity that most be admitted routinely. That is possible because probably less than 20% of the total 1987 applicant pool will ultimately be denied admission for Autumn Quarter, Columbus campus.

Rolling admission would also be done by a faculty committee. Every application not accepted as above would be referred to a faculty committee for a closer inspection. The committee would determine whether the applicant had qualifications equivalent to those of students admitted as described above or had other qualifications to advance the University's special missions. If so, that student would be admitted on a rolling basis.

Applicants not admitted through the Admissions Office review or the faculty committee inspection would be notified that their admission decisions were deferred until after the closing date. At that time, all applications in this deferred pool would be reviewed by the faculty committee. The number of applicants admitted from the deferred pool would depend upon the spaces available to meet the enrollment target.

Those applicants not admitted would be sent letters denying them admission to the Columbus campus, Autumn Quarter, but offering the alternatives of enrolling on the Columbus campus for another quarter, on a regional campus any quarter, or, if appropriate, as a part-time evening commuter on the Columbus campus Autumn Quarter.

## ADMISSION CRITERIA

The primary academic criteria for admission should be the applicant's high school class rank and high school program. High school class rank, or an equivalent calculated from grade-point average, is readily available, is relatively free of legal complications, and has proved to be a good predictor of academic success in college.

The high school program, as reflected by the number and kind of admission conditions assessed, would be the other significant academic factor in determining admission preference. This University's conditional admission policy has been an enormous success in leading high school students to stronger college preparatory studies, and the new admission policy should capitalize on the strengths of that policy. High grades alone, regardless of the courses taken, should not be sufficient for admission.

Analyses of Columbus campus Autumn Quarter 1984 NFQF showed higher retention rates, fewer failed courses, and higher cumulative point-hour ratios for students who met the unconditional admission requirements. Mathematics and English were the most important courses in this regard, with foreign language and the natural sciences less so; deficiencies in the visual and performing arts do not seem to affect retention probabilities. Deficiencies in the social sciences are very rare. Thus, there should be a very

serious trade off between high school rank and admission conditions in mathematics and English. If a student has more than one deficiency in mathematics and English combined, normally acceptable high school rank would not be sufficient for rolling admission. Such cases would be referred to the faculty committee, but applicants would not be considered admissible unless there were special circumstances or qualifications. Admission conditions in the natural and social sciences or foreign language would have lesser effect while those in the visual and performing arts would have none. Students admitted with conditions would, as now, still need to remove these conditions.

Reaching beyond the academic criteria, the admission procedure, especially through the faculty committee, must be especially sensitive to applicants who promote cultural, racial, economic, and geographic diversity as well as those who possess special talents. These special recognitions will be an integral part of the admission procedure and will advance the University's commitment to these special goals.

Test scores would be used only in a positive way, that is, if they indicate that the high school record may underestimate a student's potential to succeed in college or if they suggest special talents not apparent otherwise.

## FACULTY COMMITTEE ON FRESHMAN ADMISSION

The Faculty Committee on Freshman Admission would be central to the new process. Its first charge would be to establish criteria that would allow the majority of the admissible applicants to be cleared routinely by the Admissions Office. In the first year especially, the committee would have to make many individual decisions. It would admit all applicants whose qualifications appear to be equivalent, although not identical, to those needed for routine admission. By judging applications on an individual basis, the committee would ensure that the merits of each applicant are considered even though they do not fit the standard mold. For example, an applicant might have a lower class rank but come from a high school with demonstrably high mold. standards and successful graduates. Or, through test scores or other means (e.g., audition, portfolio) the applicant many show talents or potential not reflected in the high school record.

As part of its selection process, the committee must take positive action to maintain and enhance the University's policies regarding affirmative action and the accommodation of other university goals. As a result, the committee must be permitted a flexibility that allows for unique merit and qualifications in whatever form they appear. Ideally the policy would lead to a healthy diversity in the incoming freshman class.

The committee should function in a manner similar to that of the Faculty Committee on Conditional/Unconditional Admission. With some experience the committee should make and refine explicit policies for the Admissions Office to follow, thereby allowing an increasingly greater proportion of the admissible applicants to be admitted routinely. The experience of the Conditional/Unconditional Admission Committee indicates that this will happen rather quickly and efficiently.

The committee will always be needed to make decisions on the marginal applicants. It will monitor the new process, provide appropriate flexibility, and rule on appeals. The committee should also make recommendations as necessary for changes to the freshman admission policies and procedures to the Council on Admission and Registration.

The committee should consist of six faculty with staggered three-year terms and one graduate teaching associate. It should be assisted--ex officio--by resource persons from the Admissions Office and the Office of Minority Affairs. To assure the broadest student-faculty representation of opinion, policy matters will be addressed by the appropriate University committees.

## CLOSING DATE

The traditional closing date for admission at most institutions is between February 1 and March 1. The Council recommends a February 15 date for 1987. A February 1 date would jeopardize the processing of the graduate student applications which are due on that date. A March 1 date would further delay notification of the final decision to the large pool of deferred applicants, and it is important to give them final word as soon as possible so that those denied admission to the Columbus campus have time to pursue alternate choices.

Exceptions to the closing date for the special categories will still be needed, but in much smaller numbers than before. Prior to the closing date, exceptions will not be needed because affirmative action and the other special goals will be an integral part of the admission criteria.

### OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

Under current conditions it is estimated that about 20% of the total applicant pool would be denied admission to the Columbus campus for Autumn Quarter. When a sufficient high school preparatory program has been followed, a high school rank cut-off at approximately the upper 40% to 50% from the top would be required. Students with a lower high school

rank would be admitted on the basis of an unusually strong high school program or special qualifications which fulfill a specific University mission, for example, affirmative action.

A preliminary assessment of the effects of this new policy indicates that it would greatly assist recruitment of honors minority students, increase costs in the Admissions and Office, and incur considerable faculty involvement the first and a lesser, still significant, amount but year It would increase the proportion of more thereafter. qualified students and therefore, ultimately, the proportion of upper-division students. This, in turn, would have an effect, both welcome and manageable, on various University Increased retention will ultimately decrease the units. allowable number of NFQF for Columbus for Autumn.

With some care in the execution of the new policy, regional campuses need not suffer a loss of image. For each of the past few years fewer than sixty Columbus campus applicants who were denied admission under our first-come, first-served policy actually enrolled at regional campuses. Under the proposed policy the type of students may change, but the number will probably remain insignificant because the total number denied admission to the Columbus campus, Autumn Quarter, should be the same as before.

## CONCLUSION


adoption of the The Council recommends the freshman admission policy and procedure presented above. It incorporates competitive criteria to admit the majority of the applicants efficiently by setting quantitative standards based upon the latest available profile of Columbus campus Autumn Quarter NFQF. The faculty committee review of other will not only ensure flexibility in the applicants application of the academic criteria, but also the fulfillment of the University's affirmative action and other specific admission goals.

Replacing the present self-defeating, self-contradictory freshman admission policy with the proposed policy would have a number of salutary consequences:

- It would preserve the open admission tradition of the University by admitting all eligible applicants while restricting only the choice of time and place of enrollment.
- It would ensure finer and steadier control over the number of students admitted.
- It would end the tightening spiral of earlier and earlier closing dates and the negative consequences which accompany it.

- It would advance the goals of the University and its pursuit of excellence by admitting a greater concentration of more qualified students and thus would allow limited resources to be used to the best advantage.
- It would enhance the reputation of the University as an institution in the pursuit of excellence.
- It would facilitate the recruitment of students having special qualifications which advance the goals of the University.
- It is a straightforward policy congruent with public expectations for a quality institution of higher education.
- It would replace the current mixture of both non-judgmental and highly selective policies with an internally consistent policy.



PROPOSED FRESHMAN ADMISSIONS POLICY

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AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY Resolution No. 86-136

Synopsis: Amendments to rules 3335-3-291 and 3335-3-35 and the recission of the Pattern of Departmental Administation of the <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> are being proposed.

WHEREAS the University Senate pursuant to rule 3335-1-09 of the Administrative Code is authorized to recommend through the President to the Board of Trustees the adoption of amendments to the <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> as approved by the University Senate; and

WHEREAS the existing statement describing "Pattern of Departmental Administration," as found following Rule 3335-3-39 in the <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u>, contains information of value but is not a part of the rules; and

WHEREAS the Committee on Academic Freedom and Responsibility recommends that a clarification of the intent of those statements, "adopted in principle by Faculty Council in 1941," be incorporated in Rule 3335-3-35; and

WHEREAS Rule 3335-3-291, Dean and Director of a Regional Campus, also makes reference to this issue; and

WHEREAS after such incorporation, the statement on "Pattern of Departmental Administration" is no longer necessary and should be deleted; and

WHEREAS the University Senate approved the following proposed amendments to Faculty Rules 3335-3-291, and 3335-3-35 and the recission of "Pattern of Departmental Administration," on May 3, 1986, as follows:

## AMENDED RULES

3335-3-291 Dean and director of a regional campus.

- (B) (2) To develop in consultation with the faculty a pattern of administration for the regional campus following the principles set forth in paragraph (B) (2) of rule 3335-3-35 of the Administrative Code.
- 3335-3-35 Chairpersons of departments, directors of schools.
- (B) (2) To develop in consultation with the faculty a pattern of administration. This pattern of administration shall be made available to all present and prospective members of the faculty of the department or school, and a copy shall be deposited in the office of the dean of the college and in the office of the vice president for academic affairs and provost.

# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

For purposes of defining minimum content, the following shall be included in the pattern of administration:

- (a) A statement requiring the chair to provide a schedule of all regular faculty meetings (see rule 3335-5-18 of the Administrative Code) to all faculty members before the start of each guarter, semester, or session.
- (b) A statement requiring the chair to maintain minutes of all faculty meetings and to maintain records of all other actions covered by the pattern of administration.
- (c) A statement that the chair will consult with the faculty as a whole on all policy matters, and that such consideration will, whenever practicable, be undertaken at a meeting of the faculty as a whole.
- (d) A statement recognizing in principle the presumption favoring majority faculty rule on all matters covered by the pattern of administration.
- (e) A statement affirming that the faculty shall be consulted in the initiation and in the review and selection of new faculty members for appointment.
- (3) To prepare, after consultation with the faculty and in accordance with the pattern of departmental administration, a statement setting forth the criteria and procedures according to which recommendations are made concerning appointments and/or dismissals, salary adjustments, promotions in rank, and matters affecting the tenure of the faculty. This statement shall be made available to all present and prospective members of the department or school, and a copy shall be deposited in the office of the dean of the college and in the office of the vice president for academic affairs and provost. At the beginning of each four-year term of the chairperson of a department or the director of a school, the members of the college, and the office of the vice president for academic affairs or school, the office of the dean of the college, and the office of the vice president for academic affairs and provost shall receive either a revision or reaffirmation of the original statement.
- (4) Unchanged.
- (5) To plan with the members of the faculty and the dean of the college a progressive program.

# AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (6) Unchanged.
- To evaluate faculty members periodically in accordance with criteria approved by the board of trustees and subject to instructions from the vice (7) president for academic affairs and provost, and also according to such supplemental criteria as may be set up by the department or school.
- To recommend to the dean of the college, after consultation with the faculty in accordance with (8) paragraph (B) (3), appointments, promotions, dismissals, and matters affecting the tenure of members of the department or school faculty.
- (9) Unchanged.
- (10) Unchanged.
- (11)To see that adequate supervision and training are given to those members of the faculty and staff who may profit by such assistance.

Recission of Pattern of Departmental Administration.

to rule 3335-9-08, (Medical Synopsis: An amendment examination and enrollment denial for medical reasons) and the creation of a new rule 3335-9-081 (Withdrawal for medical reasons) of the <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> are being proposed.

WHEREAS the University Senate pursuant to rule 3335-1-09 of the Administrative Code is authorized to recommend the adoption of amendments to the Rules of the University Faculty through the President to the Board of Trustees; and

# ADDITIONAL AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

WHEREAS the University currently requires students, upon admission, to submit a medical examination report form to the University Student Health Service; and

WHEREAS from time to time some students may present a substantial danger or risk of causing harm to the student, others, or the property of the University or members of the University community as a result of their state of physical or mental health; and

WHEREAS the University Senate has approved an amendment to rule 3335-9-08 and the creation of rule 3335-9-081 of the Faculty Rules as follows:

# AMENDED RULE

- 3335-9-08 Medical examination and enrollment denial for medical reasons.
- (A) After admission, but prior to enrollment, each student seeking to enroll shall complete and submit to the university health service medical information in a form prescribed by the health service. Failure to comply with this requirement may result in denial of enrollment.
- (B) Students with certain physical, psychological or emotional health conditions may be subject to a hold from enrollment. Such a hold may be imposed when there is clear and convincing evidence that:
  - The student's current state of physical health poses a substantial danger to the health and well-being of other members of the university community; or
  - (2) The student is suffering from a mental disorder and as a result of that disorder engages, or threatens to engage in behavior which:
    - (a) Poses a substantial danger or risk of causing harm to the student or to others or
    - (b) Poses a substantial danger or risk to university property, or to the property of another member of the university community.
- (C) When the health of a student is alleged to be as defined in paragraph (B) above, the director of the university health service, or designee, shall consult with the student about the student's health status. If

# ADDITIONAL AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

the director decides it is necessary, the student may be required to submit to examination(s) deemed sufficient to evaluate such condition. The university health service will then review the case, including any medical evidence or opinion available, and determine appropriate university action. If the student fails to submit to an examination, or fails to furnish relevant health condition information, or if the review by the director discloses the existence of an immediate danger to the university community as set out in paragraph (B) above, the student may be subject to a hold from enrollment; or conditions appropriate to protect the university community may be placed upon enrollment. In arriving at appropriate action, the director will take into account reasonable action on the part of the university to accommodate the student's condition.

- (D) If a student has been placed on a hold from enrollment, or otherwise experienced modification of enrollment status by reason of health conditions enumerated in paragraph (B) above, the student may petition for revision of that status through the office of the vice provost for student affairs.
  - (1) Such request must be accompanied by supporting documentation that the conditions for revision of enrollment status have been fulfilled, and/or that the health condition has changed sufficiently to make revision appropriate. Upon receipt of such request, the vice provost for student affairs will evaluate the evidence, or convene the case consultation committee (composed of representatives of counseling and consultation service, university health service, the student's academic unit, and other academic/administrative units as appropriate) for that purpose, and decide to:
    - (a) Approve enrollment without condition;
    - (b) Approve enrollment with specified conditions such as medical treatment; or
    - (c) Deny enrollment.
  - (2) The student must, in addition, meet all normal and appropriate standards for enrollment set by the academic unit in which the student seeks to enroll.

### NEW RULE

- 3335-9-081 Withdrawal for medical reasons.
- (A) Students with certain physical, psychological, or

emotional health conditions may be subject to the sanctions provided in rules 3335-29-02 through 3335-29-08 of the Administrative Code. Appropriate sanctions may be imposed when there is clear and convincing evidence that:

- The student's current state of physical health poses a substantial danger to the health or well-being of other members of the university community; or
- (2) The student is suffering from a mental disorder and as a result of that disorder engages or threatens to engage in behavior which:
  - (a) Poses a substantial danger or risk of causing harm to the student or to others;
  - (b) Poses a substantial danger or risk to university property, or to the property of another member of the university community; or
  - (c) Results in conduct which substantially impedes or disrupts the authorized activities of other members of the university community as defined in rule 3335-11-02 of the Administrative Code.
- When the health of a student is alleged to be as defined in paragraph (A) above, the vice provost for (B) student affairs, or designee, shall consult with the student about the student's health status. If the vice provost for student affairs decides it is necessary, the student may be required to submit to examination(s) deemed sufficient by the university health service to evaluate such condition. The office of the vice provost for student affairs will then review the case, including any medical evidence or opinion available, and determine appropriate university action. If the student fails to submit to an examination, or fails to furnish relevant health condition information, or if the review by the vice provost for student affairs discloses the existence of an immediate danger to the university community as set out in paragraph (A) above, the student may be subject to any sanction provided in the rules 3335-29-02 through 3335-29-08 of the Administrative Code; immediate involuntary withdrawal from the university with an order to leave the campus; or conditions appropriate to protect the university community may be placed upon continued enrollment. In arriving at appropriate action, the vice provost for student affairs will take into account reasonable action on the part of the university to accommodate the student's condition. Involuntary withdrawal will be used as a last resort.

# ADDITIONAL AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (C) If a student has been withdrawn, or otherwise experienced modification of enrollment status by reason of health conditions enumerated in paragraph (A) above, the student may petition for revision of that status through the office of the vice provost for student affairs.
  - (1) Such request must be accompanied by supporting documentation that the conditions for revision of enrollment status have been fulfilled, and/or that the health condition has changed sufficiently to make such revision appropriate. Upon receipt of such request, the vice provost will evaluate the evidence, or convene the case consultation committee (composed of representatives of counseling and consultation service, university health service, the student's academic unit, and other academic/administrative units as appropriate) for that purpose, and decide to:
    - (a) Revise the status, without condition;
    - (b) Revise the status, with specified conditions of continuation, such as medical treatment or disciplinary action; or
    - (c) Not revise the status.
  - (2) The student must in addition meet all normal and appropriate standards for admission or enrollment set by the academic unit in which the student seeks to enroll.

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the foregoing amendment to rule 3335-9-08 and the creation of rule 3335-9-081 of the <u>Rules</u> of the <u>University Faculty</u> be adopted as recommended by the University Senate.

He was also named "Veterinarian of the Year" in 1976 by the American Animal Hospital Association, and was the Humboldt U.S. Awardee in Munich, West Germany, for 1984-85.

Dr. Taft had a long and distinguished career at The Ohio State University where he served as a teacher for 43 years before becoming Professor Emeritus. He was a distinguished teacher who received the College of Biological Sciences Distinguished Teaching Award in 1971, and the University Distinguished Teaching Award in 1974. He inspired many undergraduate students over the years and supervised over 25 masters and 12 doctoral students. As director of the general botany courses from 1959 to 1965, and in establishing training programs in the College of Education and School of Natural Resources, he particularly influenced the education of numerous students

Professor Taft's interests in research related to algae and in particular to the role of these aquatic plants in human affairs. He did research on Lake Erie and also frequently taught at the University's Stone Laboratory there. He was first Co-Director and then Director of The Ohio State University multidisciplinary training program in water pollution control. His knowledge of water pollution problems led to a book on algae in human affairs and many papers. He served as consultant to numerous public and private organizations concerned with water quality, and for many years, even after his retirement from the University, he was a regular consultant for the Columbus Department of Water. He also served his profession as editor and reviewer for scientific journals.

The long and distinguished service of Clarence E. Taft to The Ohio State University, the profession of botany, and the people of Ohio was recognized with a University Distinguished Service Award at the Summer 1981 commencement. His distinguished career and leadership in education will long be remembered by those whom they influenced.

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President Jennings:

Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I would like to call on Mr. Ihrig to present the details of the budget to you for your approval.

Mr. Ihrig:

Thank you, Mr. President. Today, we are presenting for your consideration a balanced budget for Fiscal Year 1986-87, which is summarized on page 1 of the red covered book titled <u>Current Funds Budget</u>. This budget includes revenues of \$885,140,000 to support planned commitments of \$885,040,000. As shown on page 4, this represents an increase of 5.9 percent in total revenues over 1985-86. The recommended budget for 1986-87 incorporates the budget planning guidelines approved by this Board at your May meeting.

In addition to grouping Ohio State's budgets by campus, pages 7 and 8 show the sources and uses of funds by the basic fund categories we use to account for current revenues and expenditures: General Funds, Earnings Operations and Restricted Funds. The restricted funds budgeted at \$207.7 million or 23 percent of the total, are monies received for specific purposes specified by an external entity such as in the case of Federal or private sponsored research. These funds are accounted for so that they are only spent for the purposes agreed upon with the external organization or person providing the funds.

Earnings operations, budgeted at \$282.6 million or 32 percent of the total, are all those units who charge separately for their services, which include everything from University Hospitals and student dormitories to copying services and sales of publication. These operations earn the revenues they spend as well as pay University overhead and facilities costs. They also receive interest income on their positive balances, and pay interest on any negative balances.

Mr. Ihrig: (contd)

The General Funds, budgeted at \$394.8 million or 45 percent of total, are the unrestricted, nonearnings resources used to fund the basic instructional, administrative, and physical plant activities at Ohio State. As shown on page 9 under the column titled "Unrestricted General," the major two sources of these funds are the State instructional subsidies and student tuition.

It is important to note that while the University's accounting system is based upon these three fund groups, management actions to support the needs of instruction, research and support services are based upon making the best use of all available resources. The deans, vice presidents and department chairs have the flexibility and the responsibility to make maximum use of all available resources to support their priority needs.

The table on page 9 also summarizes the distribution of the Univeristy's total current resources for 1986-87, and shows State appropriations as \$295.07 million, which represent 33.34 percent of total revenues, an increase from the 32.8 percent last year; while student tuitions represent 14.05 percent of current revenues versus 14.7 percent last year. If we were to compare State instructional subsidies for the Columbus campus in <u>constant dollars</u> to 1979-80, the year prior to the time of high inflation and cuts in State Appropriations, instructional subsidies in 1979-80 totaled \$198.6 million versus the \$218.9 million budgeted for 1986-87. In other words, 1985-86 and 1986-87 are the only two years that Ohio State's instructional subsidy in constant dollars has exceeded the 1979-80 level.

The General Fund budget at Ohio State is directly impacted by student enrollment expectations, not only the numbers on each campus, but also the mix of students by class rank and program. Enrollments affect not only tuition revenue, but also the amount of State instructional subsidies. Since Ohio State Columbus has a legislated enrollment limit of 40,000 Full Time Equivalent (FTE) students, the mix between class rank and program will have the greatest impact on State instructional subsidy earnings.

Pages 14 and 15 show Ohio State's historical enrollments along with our expectations for this coming Autumn Quarter. The projected headcount enrollment of 53,198 on the Columbus Campus is expected to result in a non-exempt FTE enrollment of 41,340, versus the 40,890 this past Autumn

Mr. Ihrig: (contd)

Quarter. This increase in non-exempt FTE results from a greater percentage of students at the lower division undergraduate level as a result of the unexpectedly high numbers of new freshman applications which caused admissions to be closed early this past November for the Autumn Quarter, 1986. The new selective admissions procedures will provide a much better opportunity for students interested in attending Ohio State than the previous "cut off date lottery."

As in prior years, we are concerned about the total impact on Ohio State's students of all student related charges. The chart on page 20 shows that the increase in the package of University controlled charges to undergraduate and graduate students, including tuition, residence hall room and board, books, supplies, parking, football and basketball tickets are less than 2.0 percent.

Page 21 contains a listing of undergraduate fees since 1970-71. The fifth column of numbers shows undergraduate student tuition in constant dollars, and we can compare the annual cost in 1979-80 of \$1,476 versus this year's \$1,704. Our expectation was that last year's undergraduate tuition increase of 3.84 percent would be less than inflation rates, but inflation suprised us by coming down to 3.5 percent. Therefore, with no tuition increase for 1986-87, this year will result in a real decline in student tuitions for the first time since 1979-80. This improved trend in student tuition reflects the new levels of State support for instructional subsidies along with the University's internal reallocation and cost containment activities.

Comparing Ohio State undergraduate fees with the Big Ten is difficult due to the variety of tuition arrangements, and not all of the Universities have yet decided on their new tuition rates. However, preliminary data indicate that we will drop two places to below Indiana and Purdue, leaving only Wisconsin and Iowa with lower tuitions than Ohio State. Comparing the average annual increases since 1983, Ohio State ranks last in the Big 10 with an average increase of only 3.15 percent.

While the level of State support this biennium has been encouraging, Ohio State has continued to use internal reallocations to support new and expanded program initiatives. In the previous biennium, colleges and offices had their base budgets reduced by 3 percent, and these funds were reallocated to meet the highest priority needs throughout the University as recommended by Deans and Vice

Mr. Ihrig: (contd)

Presidents. Budget plans for 1986-87 include reallocations of another 2.5 percent for the current biennium, which funds are again being used to support priority needs. Similarly, this budget provides \$5.8 million in one-time cash allocations for equipment, facility renovations and library holdings.

Details of the earnings budgets are provided on pages 27-32, and the table on page 27 shows that the University-wide average change in earnings rates for 1986-87 is only 2.4 percent.

Details on restricted and regional campus budgets are provided on pages 33-36.

We are presenting this balanced 1986-87 current funds budget totaling \$885,140,000 for your consideration and recommend its approval.

I would be happy to respond to any questions regarding this budget. Thank you.

Mr. Redman:

I have a question. On page 27, Mr. Ihrig, on telephone services it shows an increase of 14 percent. Is that due to an increase in rates by the telephone company?

Mr. Ihrig:

Yes. That's primarily because of the telephone company direct pass-through on their rates. Now we are in the process, as you know, of converting over to our own telephone services activity. But this still is reflecting those pass-through rates at this time.

Mr. Redman:

So this does not reflect the new work that you are doing.

Mr. Ihrig:

Not 100 percent yet -- it's a partial --

Mr. Redman:

What effect will that have upon its completion?

Mr. Ihrig:

The overall plan was to bring these charges down

Mr. Ihrig: (contd)

after we get conversion, so the rate of increase will be more at the rate of inflation.

Mr. Redman:

What effect will the overall increase be on telephone costs?

Mr. Ihrig:

As far as the rate of increase, it will be a lower rate of increase.

Mr. Teaford:

As I understand it, for internal accounting purposes, you are going to follow the Bell rates in terms of how you charge within the University.

Mr. Ihrig:

That's in its initial start-up period until we get over the hump, then we will level-off the rates.

President Jennings:

We continue to be impressed about the substantial institutional rate of return that we will generate from this almost \$30 million investment in becoming our own telephone system. There is no question that that is going to be a very substantial rate of return. It will take two or three more years to fully begin to realize that.

Mr. Teaford:

And to quote--telephone system definitely understates what it really is, since it will provide the University with state of the art technology.

President Jennings:

Well, that's important to note, too, that we would probably have to do this anyway for scientific reasons around the campus. The fact that we can earn a rate of return on this is a bonus. It is our mechanism of financing something we would have had to have done anyway.

Mr. Barone:

I agree with the financial figures and they are excellent. But I have a strong objection and I don't understand--I'm referring to page 24--why you call this the Columbus campus. To me that is

Mr. Barone: (contd)

implying that The Ohio State University is simply a City of Columbus entity. I don't think we are giving Ohio State credit as the flagship University in the entire State of Ohio. You have the Columbus campus--

Mr. Ihrig:

That differentiates it from our branch campuses.

Mr. Barone:

Well, I realize that, but why Columbus campus? Can't you say Ohio State local campus? This is Ohio State campus.

Mr. Ihrig:

No. This table has on it all the campuses of the University. The first campus we looked at is the Columbus campus. If you move down, there is a total for the Columbus campus and then we list the regional campuses and then OARDC at Wooster. Because Columbus is such a large percentage of the budget on all the tables where we summarized everything for the entire University--which this table does--we always list Columbus first then we list the regional campuses and then the agricultural activities at Wooster.

Mr. Barone:

I would have the same objection if you would call it the Mansfield campus or the Newark campus. It is Ohio State campus and we could identify the locality accordingly. I don't think it is a Columbus campus.

President Jennings:

John, I fully agree that we are the University of the entire State of Ohio. The reason for this nomenclature, as you recall, is that when we receive state appropriations we receive a separate appropriation for the Columbus campus, a separate appropriation for each of the regional campuses, and a separate appropriation for OARDC from the General Assembly. We have to continue to maintain these separate designations in conjunction with the General Assembly's appropriations. I think, however, you are making an extraordinarly important point. This is the flagship University of the State of Ohio, it belongs to the entire State of Ohio and we are very proud of that. And as you also know, we keep emphasizing that point.

President Jennings: (contd)

Throughout everything we are doing, not only in our activities with the General Assembly, but within our fund-raising activities, we are making the point that this institution is not a Columbus institution--it is a State of Ohio institution. It probably doesn't include Toledo--that is part of Michigan.

Mr. Barone:

That is one of my big objections.

President Jennings:

We won the war though, right, and got Toledo.

Mr. Barone:

We want to include Toledo into the Ohio State family.

Mr. Teaford:

I think, Mr. Ihrig, too, you mentioned the comparison with the other universities in the Big 10, but, indeed, there are only two state universities in Ohio with lower tuitions than Ohio State. And I think that is particularly important to note because, I think, you probably get more for your money here even if all the tuitions were the same. So I think that is quite significant.

President Jennings:

Also, in the Big 10 you get more for your money here. And in terms of quality and what you get, we should be the highest tuition institution in the Big 10.

Mr. Galbreath:

I reviewed that and I was really surprised. Even though we talked about it--you are saying that we are third lowest in tuition in the Big 10?

Mr. Ihrig:

Yes, third from the bottom.

Mr. Galbreath:

Third lowest?

Mr. Ihrig:

Yes, only Wisconsin and Iowa are below us.

Mr. Galbreath:

And within the State, we are--

Mr. Ihrig:

Third lowest, with only Youngstown and Central State being lower.

President Jennings:

I might add--this is from a ranking in the Big 10, of being the third highest. We have been working this down by basically doing roughly half, in terms of tuition, of what the General Assembly has been suggesting in their appropriations.

Mr. Teaford:

Until this year--we didn't do that for the biennium--

President Jennings:

For the biennium we did--the General Assembly's appropriation included an assumption of a 4 percent increase per year. We did 4 percent last year and nothing this year, so we did do half for the biennium. That is by design, by intention. I think it is very important to note also that fundamentally, the way this has mostly been done is through internal reallocation in the institution. Obviously, there is never enough money in the institution and our folks fuss sometimes, but the outcome is appropriate.

Mr. Teaford:

In discussion, the Fiscal Affairs Committee was hard-pressed to come up with another university that did not raise tuition this year, public, private or anything else. Any further questions?

#### NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the University Current Funds Budget for Fiscal Year 1986-87, as described in the accompanying text and tables, be approved, with authorization for the President to make expenditures within the projected income levels; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That student tuition and fees remain at the same rates as were approved beginning Autumn Quarter, 1985, and that the Student Fee Schedule effective Autumn Quarter, 1986, be hereby approved; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Secretary be instructed to incorporate all supporting documents into the minutes of this meeting, including faculty tenure approvals, salary rolls with promotions, fees and charges for the Fiscal Year 1986-87, and to file these materials with the official records of this University.

Mr. Galbreath made the following statement:

The Personnel Committee of this Board met on June 10, 1986, and the following report is submitted to the Board of Trustees.

During the past year, the Board of Trustees has continued the practice of making an ongoing evaluation of the President's performance and it is our belief that conclusions rendered relative to his performance should be publicly recorded. September 1, 1986, will mark the beginning of his sixth year as President of The Ohio State University. During his tenure, President Jennings has brought new vitality and enthusiasm to the institution and has also demonstrated unusual talents and skills in working with the diverse constituencies of the University--leaders of government, both state and federal; members of this Board; alumni of the University; faculty, staff and students.

Several examples will serve to illustrate the essence of the President's efforts and leadership initiatives during the preceding year. Much has already been written and said about the formulation of plans and the development of implementation strategies regarding the first major fund raising drive in the University's history. The credit for the extraordinary success of this drive must be attributed to the leadership vision, creative insight and wisdom of Ed Jennings. His ability to

marshall the support among the many constituent groups and build a university team to coordinate this effort has been simply magnificent. His leadership role in enhancing the academic quality and excellence within the University has had a synergistic effect. The vibrant mood of the campus is heartening, morale is high, the budget is balanced, new academic facilities are coming on line and almost daily some announcement is made about the addition of another distinguished person to the ranks of our faculty/staff and new programmatic changes are in the headlines with much regularity. This evidence strongly attests to Ed Jennings's leadership ability, competency, and commitment to the best traditions of The Ohio State University.

In sum, this Board has again concluded that President Jennings's leadership, service, and dedication on behalf of the University has been outstanding merit. Given his performance and continued excellence in leadership we have determined that he merits a salary increase commensurate with his achievements. And we therefore have voted that President Jennings receive a \$10,500 per year increase in his salary.

The Secretary of the Board is hereby authorized and directed to develop the appropriate document/ agreements to implement this compensation change for the President.

May I now have a motion to approve the President's budget report and recommendation as well as the Board Personnel Committee's proposal relative to President Jennings's salary for the coming year.

### STATEMENT OF BUDGET GUIDELINES/PRINCIPLES FOR 1986-87

## I. INTRODUCTION

The uncertainties which resulted in presenting to this Board a provisional budget one year ago, have turned into optimism as a result of the funding initiatives implemented by the State of Ohio for the 1985-87 biennium. First, real progress on accessibility was made by reducing the statewide average student share of tuition costs from 40 to 36 percent over the biennium. The State has demonstrated a positive effort by this significant move to return the student share toward the traditional 30 percent levels.

### STATEMENT OF BUDGET GUIDELINES/PRINCIPLES FOR 1986-87 (contd)

This level of funding, along with Ohio State's continued internal reallocation efforts, enabled President Jennings to fulfill his commitment of last year not to increase student tuition in 1986-87 if State support were adequate. The state responded to enhance accessibility; therefore, the tuition levels of 1985-86 will remain in effect for the biennium, through June 1987.

Second, the State provided significant support for the package of excellence enhancement initiatives for this biennium. In addition to extending funding for the Eminent Scholars Program, the State added funding for four other important excellence initiatives - Research Challenge, Academic Challenge, Program Excellence and Productivity Improvement Challenge grants. Both the Academic Challenge and Research Challenge funds enable this University to extend initiatives begun in the previous biennium with University resources. Three departments were designated as Centers of Excellence in 1984-85 and received special funding from existing resources to further enhance their programs. Thirteen Columbus campus programs are now benefitting from Ohio State's \$4.2 million Academic Challenge grant. In addition, the four regional campuses and the Agricultural Technical Institute have received entitlements totalling \$500,000 to enhance selected outstanding programs on their campuses.

The \$12.6 million Research Challenge grant will be awarded in several areas to further stimulate sponsored research activities throughout the University. These include support for investigators' funds and competitive seed grants aimed at encouraging and assisting faculty in expanding current and creating new research initiatives, centrally shared research facilities, matching equipment funds and major research starts. In addition, enhanced agricultural research and service support has been provided by the State for the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center and the Ohio Cooperative Extension Service to initiate the University's Ohio 21 program.

The Program Excellence Awards encourage a statewide competition among the best undergraduate programs for one-time enrichment funds. Ohio State has three programs in the finals of the competition for this biennium. In addition, the Productivity Improvement Challenge provides incentives to two-year institutions to develop innovative approaches for increasing participation in postsecondary education, job training and retraining. For the regional campuses and Agricultural Technical Institute, Ohio State received a total of \$378,966 in Productivity Improvement funds for this biennium.

These new areas of State resources along with the University's emphasis on internal reallocations continue to

provide funding for new and enhanced activities in support of excellence and to address emerging needs throughout the University.

#### II. SOURCES OF FUNDS

The Current Funds Budget proposed for 1986-87 includes funding sources which total \$885,140,000 as detailed in the Sources of Income Schedule. This amount includes State support totalling \$295,070,000 which represents 33.3 percent of the total resources budgeted. Other major funding sources include student tuition, providing 14.0 percent; earnings operations, generating 30.7 percent; Federal grants and contracts, 10.8 percent; and private gifts and grants plus endowment income, totalling 5.9 percent.

With this level of State support, a significant enhancement in student access is being achieved at The Ohio State University by holding tuition at 1985-86 levels. The current tuition rates, recommended to be continued, are shown in the Student Fee Schedule. While this zero increase maintains tuition increases to less than the projected rate of inflation for two straight years, it does not yet enable this University to make the desired progress in reducing the students' cost of their education in Ohio. While Ohio State continues to keep tuition below the Board of Regents projections, further efforts will be needed in future biennia if Ohio students' access to public higher education is to become competitive nationally.

Continuing prior efforts to control increases in all fees and charges of the University, the average University-wide increase will be limited to less than 3.0 percent. The Residence and Dining Halls have again done their part to assist student accessibility by keeping their average rate increases to only 3.0 percent. University Hospitals continue to emphasize containment of health care costs by setting hospital rate increases to an average of 5.0 percent.

The other income components of the 1986-87 Current Funds Budget are in line with expected growth from 1985-86 revenues. The projected revenues for 1985-86 show an increase of \$7.97 million, which is less than 1.0 percent above the original budget approved by this Board on July 7, 1985. The majority of this difference results from increases in Federally sponsored reseach, private gifts, grants and temporary investment income. The other revenue adjustments represent normal differences in projected income versus the budget expectations of a year ago.

### III. USES OF FUNDS

As detailed in the Schedule of Budgeted Uses for Fiscal Year 1986-87 and the supporting documents, this University's

recommended Current Funds expenditures total \$885,040,000. These planned expenditures will support the following budget planning guidelines.

- Increase faculty, administrative/professional and classified staff salaries by 3.0 percent and provide 3.0 percent in salary funds for merit increases plus 0.5 percent for promotions and market adjustments.
- \* Fund salary increases for negotiated wage settlements.
- \* Increase general expense budgets by 5.0 percent for colleges and offices.
- \* Generate internal reallocations by reducing base budgets 2.5 percent effective 1 July 1986.
- \* Provide funding to maintain the purchasing power of University-funded student financial aid, plus \$4.3 million to address critical needs that include providing adequate instructional staffs, supporting continued efforts to enhance excellence and quality, and assisting implementation of program changes, as well as cost containment efforts.
- \* Provide resources to meet mandatory General Fund cost increases, such as utilities and employee benefits.

One-time funds totalling \$5.8 million will be provided for equipment replacement, facilities renovation and the acquisition of library materials to continue to improve the quality of these fundamental support resources. This will be in addition to the expected \$10.0 million for replacement of instructional equipment and computers provided in the 1986-88 State Capital Improvements Bill, to be effective July 1, 1986.

This balanced budget for 1986-87 is being presented for Board of Trustees approval. As proposed, the budget supports significant enhancements in excellence at Ohio State. However, such momentum can only be sustained with continued careful attention to cost containment activities within the University matched by the State's willingness to extend its support of excellence and student accessibility.
