ONE THOUSAND AND TWELFTH MEETING

OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Columbus, Ohio, July 14, 1966

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, July 14, 1966, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: Jacob E. Davis, Chairman, Stanley C. Allyn, John W. Bricker, Bertram D. Thomas, John G. Ketterer, Frederick E. Jones, Mervin B. France and James W. Shocknessy.

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Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

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President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Revision of Rules 11.1309, 29.2715 and 41.0501 of the Rules for the University Faculty

The Council on Admissions and Registrations, with Vice President John T. Mount as Chairman, after several months of study has recommended some changes to strengthen and make more effective the administrative policies and procedures in the Office of Admissions. On June 7, 1966, the Faculty Council, upon the recommendation of the Council on Admissions and Registrations and with the concurrence of the Graduate Council and the Committee on Rules, approved the following revisions in Rules 11.1309, 29.2715 and 41.0501, which clarify the role of the Director of Admissions and certain admission policies.

- 1. That Rule 11.1309 be revised to read as follows:
 - 11.1309. Director of Admissions.

The Director of Admissions, subject to the direction of the Executive Dean for Admissions and Registrations, shall:

- a. Direct the administration of admission policies duly established by the appropriate faculty bodies.
 - Exceptions to such policies shall be made only in accordance with recommendations of the Dean of the College, School, or Division involved.
 - A special student not seeking a degree must be approved for admission by the Dean of the College, School, or Division concerned.
- b. Receive, evaluate, and maintain all certificates and transcripts presented by or on behalf of applicants for admission to the University or for credit in any course.
- c. Issue all official notices of admission to applicants and certify the validity of transfer credits to the Registrar and to the Secretary of the College, School, or Division involved.
- d. Transfer students upon request from one College, School, or Division in the University to another, but only in accordance with policies established by the Colleges, Schools, or Divisions involved.
- e. Conduct the official correspondence of the University on all matters connected with the admission of students.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

- A. Revision of Rules 11.1309, 29.2715 and 41.0501 of the Rules for the University Faculty (continued)
 - f. Perform such other duties and assume such additional responsibilities as may be assigned to him from time to time by the Executive Dean for Admissions and Registrations.
 - 2. That Section 2 of Rule 29, 2715 be revised to read as follows:
 - 29. 2715. Council on Admissions and Registrations.
 - Section 2. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to recommend, through appropriate University channels, administrative policies governing admission to the University, student registration, and student scheduling. These recommendations shall be made to the appropriate administrative officer (or officers) or to the Faculty Council, depending upon the nature of the recommendation.
 - 3. That Section 2 of Rule 41.0501 be revised to read as follows:
 - 41.0501. Specific Admission Requirements.
 - Section 2. Graduate student. A candidate must be a graduate of an educational institution approved by the Council on Admissions and Registrations and must have an undergraduate record satisfactory to the Graduate Council.

A candidate for admission as a regular graduate student must specify a field of specialization and must qualify for graduate work in a degree program. A candidate for admission as a special graduate student must comply with all the regular requirements for admission to the Graduate School except that a field of specialization in a degree program is not specified.

- 4. That Section 4 of Rule 41.0501 be revised to read as follows:
 - Section 4. Transient student. To be considered for admission as a transient student, the candidate must present a brief, definite program endorsed by the President or Dean of his University or College. Where this and all other pertinent matters are satisfactory to the Director of Admissions, the candidate may be admitted unless there is objection by the College, School, or Division of which he seeks admission.
- 5. That Section 5 of Rule 41.0501 be deleted.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

A. Revision of Rules 11.1309, 29,2715 and 41.0501 of the Rules for the University Faculty (continued)

It was recommended therefore that the above proposed revisions in the Rules for the University Faculty as approved by the Faculty Council be adopted.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote, and the Secretary was instructed to make such revisions in the Rules for the University Faculty.

B. Naming of New Street Located Between Ohio Stadium and Olentangy River - Cannon Drive

It was recommended that the new street located between Ohio Stadium and the Olentangy River, running generally north and south between Stadium Drive and its ultimate intersection with the Campus Loop Road south of Abraham Lincoln Tower, be named "Cannon Drive" in memory of The Honorable Reuben P. Cannon, who introduced into the Lower House of the Ohio General Assembly on January 12, 1870, the Act under which The Ohio State University was located and organized.

This proposal has the concurrence of the President's Cabinet and is in accordance with the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Dr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Allyn, the Board of Trustees approved by a unanimous voice vote the naming of the new street located between Ohio Stadium and the Olentangy River.

C. Authorization for the Filing of Application for Grant Funds Under Title VI of the Public Health Service Act As Amended

It was recommended that the following resolution be adopted by the Board of Trustees in order that The Ohio State University may comply with the instructions from the Public Health Service for the filing of application for grant funds under Title VI of the Public Health Service Act, as amended:

WHEREAS, the Surgeon General of the Public Health Service is authorized under Title VI of the Public Health Service Act, as amended, to grant funds for the construction and modernization of hospitals and other medical facilities, and

WHEREAS, the governing body of The Ohio State University, hereinafter called the Applicant, is cognizant of the conditions under which such grant funds are made available and approved for payment to an applicant; and

WHEREAS, it is the sense of the governing body of the Applicant that it is desirable to apply for a grant under the aforementioned act for the project described as follows:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that application for the project described above is authorized and directed to be filed with the State of Ohio Department of Health, with the understanding that if upon due consideration by said Department applying the criteria of the State plan, the application receives a priority rating sufficiently high to receive grant funds under the aforementioned act, it will be forwarded to the Surgeon General of the Public Health Service for consideration for his approval and be it further

RESOLVED, that the governing body of the applicant designated Novice G. Fawcett, President of The Ohio State University, and Gordon B. Carson, Vice President for Business and Finance of The Ohio State University as his alternate, as the persons authorized to file application and act as the representatives of the applicant in connection with said application.

Upon motion of Mr. Allyn, seconded by Mr. Bricker, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous voice vote.

D. <u>Degrees and Certificates Conferred</u> -Summer Quarter Commencement Convocation

It was recommended that degrees and certificates be conferred at the Summer Quarter Commencement Convocation on September 2, 1966, to those students who have completed the requirements for their respective degrees and certificates and are recommended by the Faculty Council. The names of those awarded degrees and certificates will be included in the minutes of this meeting. (See Appendix I, page 69.)

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Allyn, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

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II. PERSONNEL CHANGES

A. Appointment of Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost of the University - Dr. John E. Corbally, Jr.

President Fawcett recommended that John E. Corbally, Jr., who currently holds the position of Vice President for Administration, be appointed to the position of Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost of the University, effective August 1, 1966, at a salary of \$30,168.00 per annum. He will continue to hold the rank of Professor in the School of Education at "No Salary."

II. PERSONNEL CHANGES (continued)

A. Appointment of Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost of the University - Dr. John E. Corbally, Jr. (continued)

President Fawcett indicated that the preceding recommendation is made with the unanimous endorsement of the Faculty Advisory Committee to the President and the Board of Trustees and the Council on Academic Affairs. He further stated that the new position of Provost of the University is being assigned to Dr. Corbally to designate his responsibility for general administrative duties on behalf of and as assigned by the President.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the recommendation that Dr. John E. Corbally, Jr. be appointed Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost of the University was approved enthusiastically by unanimous roll call vote.

On March 11, 1965, the Board of Trustees authorized the President to sign a formal application to the Federal Aviation Agency for Federal funds to support the construction of a fire-crash rescue building and an aircraft apron. The FAA under the date of June 9, 1966, offered to the University a grant in the amount of \$144,650.00 for the above stated purpose subject to approval of the Grant Agreement (Project 9-33-044-C602, Contract No. FA-EA-671) by the Board of Trustees and execution by the President of the University on or before June 30, 1966.

After consultation with the Legal Counselor for the University, who examined the said Grant Agreement, the Secretary contacted each member of the Board of Trustees by telephone and secured a unanimous vote of approval by the Board and the President was authorized to execute the Grant Agreement on behalf of the Board of Trustees.

WHEREAS, the Sponsor has submitted to the FAA a Project Application dated August 19, 1965*, for a grant of Federal funds for a project for development of the Airport (herein called the "Airport"), together with plans and specifications for such project, which Project Application, as approved by the FAA is hereby incorporated herein and made a part hereof; and

WHEREAS, the FAA has approved a project for development of the Airport (herein called the "Project") consisting of the following-described airport development:

Land acquisition - Parcels 15, 16, 19, 21; construct fire-crash and rescue building; construct aircraft apron

all as more particularly described in the property map attached as Exhibit "A" to the Project Application and in the plans and specifications as approved for this project by the Chief, Airports Branch, FAA, Eastern Region, Cleveland, Ohio, all of which are hereby incorporated herein by reference and made a part hereof;

NOW THEREFORE, pursuant to and for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the Federal Airport Act, as amended (49 U. S. C. 1101), and in consideration of (a) the Sponsor's adoption and ratification of the representations and assurances contained in said Project Application, and its acceptance of this Offer as hereinafter provided, and (b) the benefits to accrue to the United States and the public from the accomplishment of the Project and the operation and maintenance of the Airport as herein provided, THE FEDERAL AVIATION AGENCY, FOR AND ON BEHALF OF THE UNITED STATES, HEREBY OFFERS AND AGREES to pay, as the United States share of the allowable costs incurred in accomplishing the Project, 50 per centum of all such costs.

This Offer is made on and subject to the following terms and conditions:

- The maximum obligation of the United States payable under this Offer shall be \$144,650.00.
- 2. The Sponsor shall:
 - (a) begin accomplishment of the Project within sixty days after acceptance of this Offer or such longer time as may be prescribed by the FAA, with failure to do so constituting just cause for termination of the obligations of the United States hereunder by the FAA;
 - (b) carry out and complete the Project without undue delay and in accordance with the terms hereof, the Federal Airport Act, and Sections 151. 45-151. 55 of the Regulations of the Federal Aviation Agency (14 CFR 151) in effect as of the date of acceptance of this Offer; which Regulations are hereinafter referred to as the "Regulations";
 - (c) carry out and complete the Project in accordance with the plans and specifications and property map, incorporated herein, as they may be revised or modified with the approval of the FAA.
- 3. The allowable costs of the project shall not include any costs determined by the FAA to be ineligible for consideration as to allowability under Section 151.41 (b) of the Regulations.
- 4. Payment of the United States share of the allowable project costs will be made pursuant to and in accordance with the provisions of Sections 151.57-151.63 of the Regulations. Final determination as to the allowability of the costs of the project will be made at the time of the final grant payment pursuant to Section 151.63 of the Regulations: Provided, that, in the event a semi-final grant payment is made pursuant to Section 151.63 of the Regulations, final determination as to the allowability of those costs to which such semi-final payment relates will be made at the time of such semi-final payment.

The Sponsor shall operate and maintain the Airport as Provided in the Project Application incorporated herein and specifically covenants and agrees, in accordance with its Assurance 4 in Part III of said Project Application, that in its operation and the operation of all facilities thereof, neither it nor any person or organization occupying space or facilities thereon will discriminate against any person or class of persons by reason of race, color, creed or national origin in the use of any of the facilities provided for the public on the airport.
- 6. The FAA reserves the right to amend or withdraw this Offer at any time prior to its acceptance by the Sponsor.
- 7. This Offer shall expire and the United States shall not be obligated to pay any part of the costs of the Project unless this Offer has been accepted by the Sponsor on or before June 30, 1966 or such subsequent date as may be prescribed in writing by the FAA.
- 8. In addition the sponsor shall;
 - (a) Incorporate or cause to be incorporated in each advertisement for bids and each contract for construction work under the project, or any modification thereof, the equal opportunity clause incorporated by reference in Section 151.54 of the Federal Aviation Regulations and as set forth in Section 60-1.3(b)(1) of the regulations of the President's Committee on Equal Employment Opportunity (41 CFR 60-1);
 - (b) Incorporate or cause to be incorporated in such advertisement for bids or proposal for construction work under the project the provisions prescribed by Section 151, 54(d)(1) of the Regulations;
 - (c) Be bound by said equal opportunity clause in any construction work under the project which it performs itself other than through its own permanent work force directly employed or through the permanent work force directly employed by another agency or government;
 - (d) Cooperate actively with the FAA and the President's Committee on Equal Employment Opportunity in obtaining the compliance of contractors and subcontractors with the equal opportunity clause and the rules, regulations and relevant orders of the Committee;
 - (e) Furnish the FAA and the Committee such information as they may require for the supervision of such compliance and will otherwise assist the FAA in the discharge of its primary responsibility for securing compliance;

In the event that the sponsor fails or refuses to comply with its undertakings, the FAA may cancel, terminate or suspend in whole or in part any contractual arrangements it may have with the sponsor, may refrain from extending any further assistance under any of its programs subject to Executive Order 11114 until satisfactory assurance of future compliance has been received from such applicant, or may refer the case to the Department of Justice for appropriate legal proceedings.

- 9. By its acceptance of this Grant Offer the sponsor agrees that insofar as is within its powers and to the extent reasonable, the sponsor will take action to restrict the use of land adjacent to or in the immediate vicinity of the airport to activities and purposes compatible with normal airport operations including landing and take-off of aircraft.
- 10. The sponsor's financial records of the project established, maintained and made available to personnel of the FAA in conformity to Section 151.55 of the Regulations of the Federal Aviation Agency (14 CFR 151), will also be available to representatives of the Comptroller General of the United States.
- 11. The Sponsor covenants and agrees with respect to the clear zones shown on the airport master plan layout approved April 7, 1964, by the Chief, Airports Division, FAA, Eastern Region, and on future revisions of such plan, if any, that the Sponsor will maintain the land in such clear zones as to which the Sponsor holds fee simple title free and clear of all structures, except those required as aids to air navigation, unless otherwise authorized by the FAA.
- 12. It is understood and agreed that the reference to "Section A of FAA Technical Standard Order Number N-18 dated April 26, 1950, as amended," or, "Advisory Circular AC No. 150/5300-1", whichever is applicable, as contained in Part III, Paragraph 7 of the Project Application, be deleted and the following language substituted: "Section 77.23, as applied to Section 77.27, Part 77 of the Federal Aviation Regulations".
- 13. The Federal Government does not now plan or contemplate the construction of any structure, in addition to an air traffic control tower, pursuant to Paragraph 9 of Part III Sponsor's Assurances of the Project Application dated August 19, 1965, and, therefore, it is understood and agreed that the Sponsor is under no obligation to furnish any additional areas or rights without cost to the Federal Government under this Grant Agreement.

It is understood and agreed that the typewritten description of airport development appearing in the second paragraph on Page 1 of the Project Application is hereby deleted and the typewritten description of airport development appearing in the second "WHEREAS" clause on Page 1 of the Grant Offer is substituted in its place and stead.

The Sponsor's acceptance of this Offer and ratification and adoption of the Project Application incorporated herein shall be evidenced by execution of this instrument by the Sponsor, as hereinafter provided, and said Offer and Acceptance shall comprise a Grant Agreement, as provided by the Federal Airport Act, constituting the obligations and rights of the United States and the Sponsor with respect to the accomplishment of the Project and the operation and maintenance of the Airport. Such Grant Agreement shall become effective upon the Sponsor's acceptance of this Offer and shall remain in full force and effect throughout the useful life of the facilities developed under the Project but in any event not to exceed twenty years from the date of said acceptance.

X. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

A. Demolition of Buildings

Upon the recommentation of the President's Cabinet, it was recommended that the Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to proceed with the demolition of all buildings located on the following property:

1105 West Lane Avenue

2442 Olentangy River Road

This demolition will be accomplished in the most economical manner.

Upon motion of Mr. Bricker, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

B. Employment of Engineers - University College, Utilities

It was recommended that the firm of Alden E. Stilson and Associates, Ltd., be employed to provide complete professional engineering services for the utilities for the above project including surve, s, design, preparation of drawings, specifications, estimate of cost, bidding documents and complete field supervision of construction. The fee will also include six months' service of a resident engineer for supervision.

B. Employment of Engineers - University College, Utilities (continued)

The fee will be calculated on the basis of $7 \, 1/2$ per cent of the construction cost plus \$1,300.00 per month or \$60.00 per day for time less than one month for any additional supervision required on the part of the resident engineer.

Funds for this project will be provided from Item 037, H. B. 949.

C. Employment of Engineers - Stadium Dormitory Food Service Facility Remodeling

It was recommended that the firm of Loren J. Staker be employed to provide complete architectural and engineering services for this project including preliminary plans, basic drawings, working drawings, specifications, estimate of cost, necessary bidding documents and complete supervision of construction.

The fee for this service will be 8 per cent of the construction cost and funds will be provided from Student Facilities Fees.

D. Employment of Architects - Wiseman Hall - Replacement of Incinerator

It was recommended that the firm of Saltz & Forward be employed to provide the design and engineering service for the new incinerator stack and footing and lightning protection system, alteration and demolition of existing structure as required to accommodate the new work and the coordination of the work with the mechanical and electrical design and with the architect for the addition to the building presently in progress.

The fee will be calculated on the basis of \$12.00 per hour for principal's services and the actual rate times two for other employee time, or approximately \$2,400.00. Funds will be provided from Budget Account 801085.

E. Employment of Architects - Parking Ramp - Stadium Area

It was recommended that the architectural firm of Vogt-Ivers and Associates be employed to provide complete architectural and engineering services for this project including preliminary plans, basic drawings, working drawings, specifications, estimate of cost and necessary bidding documents. Supervision of construction is not included.

The fee will be calculated on the basis of 4 per cent of the construction cost or approximately \$76,000.00. Funds will be provided from Parking Revenue.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. France, the above recommendations were individually and collectively approved by unanimous roll call vote.

F. Laundry Washer-Extractor Equipment - Internal Loan

To enable the use of modern equipment and methods in the new Laundry Facility, it was necessary to purchase new washer-extractor equipment in the amount of \$105,500.00 which will be self-liquidating. In order to implement the purchase, it was recommended that the sum of \$105,500.00 be transferred from Account 179992 to Account 911685 for this purpose and that repayments be made on the basis of 5 per cent interest payable upon the balance of the loan in accordance with accepted commercial practice. It was estimated that repayment will take five years.

Upon motion of Mr. Bricker, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

G. Special Policeman Commission

At the request of the Vice President for Business and Finance, it was recommended that Robert Donald Clark be designated as Special Policeman pursuant to the provisions of Section 3345.04 of the Revised Code of Ohio; and that in further compliance with the provisions of said section, the Board of Trustees require Mr. Clark, as well as any other employee of this institution designated as Special Policeman, to take the oath of office and give bond to the State of Ohio in an amount no less than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) prior to assuming the duties of Special Policeman.

By unanimous consent the above recommendation was approved.

H. Wright State Campus - Program for Financing Student Activity Center and the Planning and Development of Said Project

President Fawcett reported that Vice President for Business and Finance, Dr. Gordon B. Carson, in consultation with Bond Counsel, Squire, Sanders & Dempsey; the Chairman of the Finance and Investment Committee, Mr. Stanley C. Allyn; and administrative officers from Miami University and Wright State Campus, has developed a program for the financing of greatly needed student activity facilities on the Wright State Campus.

Whereupon Mr. Stanley C. Allyn, Chairman of the Finance and Investment Committee, presented the following resolutions providing for financing of the Wright State Campus Student Activity Center and the planning and development thereof:

 - Resolution Providing for the Issuance of \$950,000 Student Center Notes of 1966 for and on Behalf of the Wright State Campus and Its Successor, Wright State University and Its Board of Trustees

RESOLUTION

Providing for the issuance of \$950,000 Student Center Notes of 1966 for and on behalf of The Wright State Campus and its successor, Wright State University and its Board of Trustees, for the purpose of constructing and equipping a project comprised of a student activity center providing space for student activities and recreation, and also dining facilities and bookstore space at Wright State Campus.

WHEREAS, the Wright State Campus was created by Substitute Senate Bill No. 210, passed by the 106th General Assembly of Ohio, as an interim institution of higher education under the administration of the Boards of Trustees of The Ohio State University and Miami University, with the goal of developing a state university; and

WHEREAS, the Boards of Trustees of said Universities are directed by Revised Code Section 3352.10 to establish policies and goals for the purpose of preparing Wright State Campus to become a state university, and are empowered by Revised Code Section 3352.11 to do all things necessary for the creation, proper maintenance and successful operation of Wright State Campus with the goal of developing a state university; and

WHEREAS, the Wright State Campus Advisory Committee (herein called the Advisory Committee) has been established, pursuant to Revised Code Section 3352.12, for the purpose of consulting and advising with regard to policies for the development of Wright State Campus into a state university; and

WHEREAS, the Advisory Committee did at its January 20, 1966 meeting, by formal resolution find and determine that there is an urgent need at Wright State Campus to develop facilities to serve as a student activity center with dining and other areas to accommodate functions which are important to the successful operations of an institution of higher education and necessary to the development of Wright State Campus into a state university; and

WHEREAS, the Boards of Trustees of The Ohio State University and Miami University did at their meetings held February 10, 1966 and February 12, 1966, respectively, concur in such need and determined to assist in the development of such building; and

- H. Wright State Campus Program for Financing Student Activity

 Center and the Planning and Development of Said Project (continued)
 - Resolution Providing for the Issuance of \$950,000 Student Center Notes of 1966 for and on Behalf of the Wright State Campus and Its Successor, Wright State University and Its Board of Trustees

WHEREAS, the Advisory Committee, upon further consideration, has determined and recommends that the said project should constitute a student activity center providing, among other things, space for student activities and recreation, and also dining facilities and bookstore space (hereinafter called the "Project"), presently estimated to cost approximately \$950,000; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Wright State University, upon commencement of the exercise of its powers, pursuant to Substitute Senate Bill No. 210, will have authority under Revised Code Section 3345.11 to issue bonds or notes to repay moneys borrowed and advances made for the development of the Project; and

WHEREAS, The Ohio State University, by agreement with Miami University, has heretofore undertaken supervision of certain capital improvements at Wright State Campus; and

WHEREAS, extensive analysis by representatives of the Advisory Committee and of The Ohio State University have resulted in the conclusion that the most feasible way of providing for the development of the Project is through the borrowing of necessary funds by The Ohio State University, supported by guarantees, which funds would then be advanced to the Wright State Campus and its successor, Wright State University, and which borrowed and advanced funds are to be repaid from the proceeds of the issuance of bonds or notes by the Board of Trustees of Wright State University following the commencement of their exercise of powers as aforesaid; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the recommendation and request made on behalf of the Advisory Committee, the Board of Trustees of Miami University did, on June 11, 1966, duly adopt a resolution concurring in such method of financing, concurring in the levy of a Student Center Fee to be pledged thereto and planning and development of the Project, and concurring in the exercise of all functions by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University and officers of said University designated by it, in the planning, development and financing of the Project; and

WHEREAS, by resolution adopted July 1, 1966, the Advisory Committee has advised and requested that the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University cause the Project to be financed substantially in the manner provided in this resolution;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University:

Pursuant to the resolutions of the Wright State Campus Advisory Committee and of the Board of Trustees of Miami University referred to above, it is hereby determined and declared that it is necessary to construct and equip the Project, and to issue notes as herein provided in the principal sum of \$950,000 pursuant to Section 3352.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio for the purpose of paying the costs of the Project, and thereby provide for the maintenance and successful operation of Wright State Campus with the goal of developing a state university.

Section 2. Said notes shall be payable from (a) the Student Center Fees assessed upon students at The Wright State Campus and other revenues of the Project financed hereby which are pledged thereto subject to application thereof to pay costs of the Project and subject to any pledge thereof to secure bonds or notes issued by Wright State University and its Board of Trustees, pursuant to Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio, to repay the moneys borrowed for the below mentioned Project evidenced by the notes of this issue and advanced to The Wright State Campus and its successor, Wright State University and its Board of Trustees, and (b) the proceeds of the sale of any such bonds or notes of Wright State University and its Board of Trustees, which proceeds shall be applied promptly to the payment or prepayment of such principal and interest; and neither the State of Ohio nor The Ohio State University, Wright State University, their respective Boards of Trustees, nor Wright State Campus is obligated to pay the same from any other funds or source, nor shall this note be a claim upon or lien against any other property of the State or any of such institutions thereof, and this note is not the general obligation of the State or any such institutions and their full faith and credit are not pledged thereto and the noteholders shall have no right to have any taxes levied, collected or applied for or to the payment of the principal of or interest upon the notes of this issue.

Section 3. Said notes shall be designated "Student Center Notes of 1966", shall be dated as determined by the Fiscal Officer, and shall mature not later than eighteen months from their date, provided that the same may be prepaid at any time without penalty or premium. Said notes shall bear interest payable at maturity or upon prepayment of principal, at the rate or rates, not exceeding 3.75% per annum, as determined by the Fiscal Officer in his certificate awarding such notes. Said notes shall be in the denomination of \$50,000 and any multiples thereof, and may be represented by a single note, all as requested by the Original Purchaser thereof and approved by the Fiscal Officer.

Said notes shall be payable as to both principal and interest at the place or places designated by the Original Purchaser and approved by the Fiscal Officer, and said notes shall be signed by the President or the Fiscal Officer of The Ohio State University, attested by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, and shall be impressed with or bear a facsimile of the official seal of the University. Said notes shall be substantially in the form attached hereto as Exhibit A (page 54), the terms and covenants of which are incorporated herein, with such changes not detrimental to the University as the President or the Fiscal Officer may approve. For purposes of this resolution, Fiscal Officer shall mean the Vice President, Business and Finance, of The Ohio State University.

Section 4. Said notes are issued by The Ohio State University and its Board of Trustees solely for and on behalf of Wright State Campus and its successor, Wright State University and its Board of Trustees, and not for or on behalf of The Ohio State University or its Board of Trustees nor for or on behalf of Miami University and its Board of Trustees, and all obligations hereunder shall be solely those of Wright State University and its Board of Trustees upon the commencement of the exercise of their powers pursuant to Chapter 3352 of the Revised Code of Ohio and Substitute Senate Bill No. 210 enacted by the 106th General Assembly whereupon the control of the aforesaid Project shall be transferred to the Board of Trustees of Wright State University; and prior thereto the sole obligation of The Ohio State University and its Board of Trustees, pursuant and subject to the authority aforesaid, shall be to fix and maintain Student Center Fees at The Wright State Campus in amount sufficient, with other revenues of said Project, to produce net receipts estimated to be adequate to permit the ultimate issuance of bonds by the Board of Trustees of Wright State University, under Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio, in sufficient principal amount for the repayment of the notes of this issue as aforesaid, and to maintain the pledge of said Student Center Fees and other revenues as aforesaid to secure said issue of notes.

Section 5. The notes shall be sold by negotiation, solicitation of proposals or advertisement for bids, by the Fiscal Officer upon such terms and conditions, not inconsistent with this resolution, as he may determine, but at a purchase price of not less than par plus accrued interest, if any. The award of the notes by the Fiscal Officer shall be evidenced by a Certificate of Award signed by him (the purchasers designated therein being herein collectively called the "Original Purchasers"), and the President and Fiscal Officer of the University

are each authorized to do all things necessary or proper for the delivery of said notes in accordance with such award and this resolution; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that such notes shall not be delivered until and unless there is delivered to the Original Purchasers and to the University a guaranty or guarantees of the full obligation of said notes signed by or on behalf of a guarantor or guarantors satisfactory to the Original Purchasers and the Fiscal Officer substantially in the form attached hereto as Exhibit B (page 57), with such changes therein as such Original Purchasers and the Fiscal Officer may approve, his delivery of such notes and their acceptance of them to be conclusive evidence of such approvals.

Section 6. The proceeds of such notes shall be advanced to The Wright State Campus and its successor, Wright State University and its Board of Trustees, by crediting such proceeds to an account clearly indicating the purpose thereof, and such proceeds shall be disbursed by the appropriate officers of the University to pay costs of the Project, including all costs relating to the planning, development and financing thereof. Until needed for such purposes said proceeds may be deposited and invested in such manner as the Fiscal Officer may determine. Any balance remaining in said account at the time of commencement of the exercise of powers by the Board of Trustees of Wright State University shall be transferred to Wright State University for application as aforesaid. The payment in full of said notes, with all interest due, by Wright State University and its Board of Trustees or by the aforesaid guarantors shall serve to discharge the aforesaid advance of funds by The Ohio State University.

The Guarantors further agree that all liability hereunder shall continue notwithstanding the incapacity, lack of authority, death, or disability of any one or more of the Guarantors, and that any failure by the Noteholders to file or enforce a claim against the estate of any of the Guarantors shall not operate to release any other of the Guarantors from liability hereunder.

RESOLUTION

Providing for the planning and development of a project for Wright State Campus composed of a student activity center providing space for student activities and recreation, and also dining facilities and bookstore space, assessing a Student Center Fee at Wright State Campus, and matters incidental thereto.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University has this day adopted a resolution entitled "Resolution providing for the issuance of \$950,000 Student Center Notes of 1966 for and on behalf of The Wright State Campus and its successor, Wright State University and its Board of Trustees, for the purpose of constructing and equipping a project comprised of a student activity center providing space for student activities and recreation, and also dining facilities and bookstore space at Wright State Campus" (herein called the Note Resolution) all of the preambles of which are incorporated herein by reference as if fully set forth, and the term "Project" as used herein shall have the meaning ascribed to it in the Note Resolution; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the June 11, 1966 resolution of the Board of Trustees of Miami University and the Wright State Advisory Committee Resolution of July 1, 1966, referred to in the Note Resolution, this Board desires to make provision for the planning and development of the Project and to take formal action concerning the Student Center Fees;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, as follows:

Section 1. Planning and Development of the Project. The President, Vice President, Business and Finance, and other appropriate officers of the University are each hereby authorized to supervise the planning, construction and completion of the Project in cooperation with the Director of Public Works, the State Architect and consulting architects and engineers, and in consultation with the Advisory Committee, and for such purpose to do all things necessary and appropriate for the selection and employment of consulting architects and engineers, the advertisement for bids on and the awarding, execution and performance of construction contracts, the provision of equipment and furnishings for the Project, and all other things necessary or appropriate to completing and placing the Project in operation; provided that upon the commencement of the exercise of powers by the Board of Trustees of Wright State University, as aforesaid, The Ohio State University and its officers

shall be relieved of such responsibilities and such functions, responsibilities and obligations shall be assumed by the Board of Trustees of Wright State University and its authorized officers.

Section 2. Levy of Student Center Fee. Commencing with the first trimester of the 1966-1967 academic year, and until modified by appropriate authority, there is hereby levied and assessed, and shall be collected by usual procedures, a Student Center Fee in the amount of \$8 per student per trimester, with appropriate adjustments for separate terms of the third trimester and for part-time students, upon each student enrolled at The Wright State Campus, which fee shall be in lieu of the heretofore contemplated allocation of the registration fee for application to the Project. Such Student Center Fee shall be collected as part of the registration fee or general fee, until otherwise determined by appropriate authority, but is hereby specifically allocated therefrom on a pro-rata basis and shall be immediately earmarked for the purposes and applied as herein provided.

Section 3. Application of Student Center Fees. Following collection, all Student Center Fees shall be transferred to the account established for the Project pursuant to the Note Resolution and shall be deposited, invested and applied to the costs of the Project as provided with respect to note proceeds in the Note Resolution, any portion thereof not needed for costs of the Project shall be applied to the payment of the notes authorized by the Note Resolution, and any balance shall be transferred as appropriate to the financing or operations of the Project; all subject, however, to such pledge of said Student Center Fees, then on hand or thereafter collected, as may be made by the Board of Trustees of Wright State University to secure notes or bonds issued by it as referred to in the Note Resolution.

Section 4. <u>Bank Accounts</u>. The Vice President, Business and Finance, of the University is hereby authorized to establish such bank accounts and make, or cause to be made, such deposits thereto and withdrawals therefrom and to give such instructions with respect thereto as he shall from time to time deem advisable in connection with the Note Resolution and this resolution, and this Board does hereby adopt such forms of resolutions as may be required in that connection by any such depository bank.

Upon motion of Mr. Allyn, seconded by Mr. Bricker, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

President Fawcett then presented the following recommendation:

I. Wright State Campus - Food Facility Improvements in Allyn Hall

The Wright State Campus Advisory Committee has sent an urgent request to The Ohio State University to proceed with alterations in Allyn Hall which will provide food service facilities for the Wright State Campus for the Autumn Quarter, 1966.

Funds for this project are to be provided from the financing plan for the Student Activity Center and such monies used will constitute a deduction from funds available for the Center project. No Ohio State University funds are to be used for this purpose.

Because of the urgency expressed in the Advisory Committee action and the necessity to provide these facilities within less than 60 working days, it is clear that an emergency exists and that the only practical method by which the improvements can be accomplished is through the use of force account construction.

It was recommended therefore that the Board of Trustees approve the above request and authorize The Ohio State University, acting for and on behalf of the Wright State Advisory Committee, to proceed on an emergency basis through the State Board of Regents, Department of Finance, Department of Public Works and Controlling Board to secure the necessary approvals to implement a force account project to be known as "Food Facility Improvements in Allyn Hall,"

Upon motion of Mr. Allyn, seconded by Mr. Jones, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote.

XI. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of William Charvat, Professor of English; John L. Carruthers, Professor Emeritus of Ceramic Engineering; and Harold K. Crow, Assistant Professor of Dentistry. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

A. William Charvat

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on June 4, 1965, of William Charvat, Professor of English.

Professor Charvat was born July 15, 1905, in New York City. He held degrees from New York University and the University of Pennsylvania. He joined the faculty of The Ohio State University in 1944.

A. William Charvat (continued)

Professor Charvat served at The Ohio State University as a member of the Faculty Council, trustee of the Research Foundation, and chairman of the Library Council. He was a general editor of The Centenary Edition of the Works of Nathaniel Hawthorne.

Professor Charvat was a research associate at the Huntington Library in 1943 and received a similar grant for the Library of Congress Studies in American Civilization in 1945. He was a Guggenheim Fellow in 1943-44. In 1952 he was a Smith-Mundt lecturer in American literature at the University of Copenhagen. In 1962-63 he set up for Harvard University a chair of American literature at the University of Madrid.

Professor Charvat was a member of the editorial board of <u>American Quarterly</u> and <u>American Literature</u>. He served as chairman of the <u>American Literature Group</u> of the Modern Language Association; and he was a member of the Committee on International Exchange, the Fulbright Committee on Lectureships in American Studies, and the Grants-in-Aid Committee of the American Council of Learned Societies. He was president of the American Studies Association for 1962-63.

Professor Charvat delivered the Rosenbach Lectures at the University of Pennsylvania in 1958, which were published the following year as <u>Literary Publishing in America</u>, 1790-1850. He was co-editor of <u>The Cost on Books of Tickner and Fields</u> (1949). He was co-author of an influential text, Prentice-Hall Handbook for Writers (4th edition, 1965).

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

B. John L. Carruthers

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on July 5, 1966, of John L. Carruthers, Professor Emeritus of Ceramic Engineering.

Professor Carruthers was born in Lafayette, Colorado, on July 25, 1895. He received the degree of Bachelor of Ceramic Engineering from The Ohio State University in 1921, and he was employed by the Denver Terra Cotta Company and Harrop Ceramic Service Company of Columbus from 1921 to 1925. He was appointed Assistant Professor in the Department of Ceramic Engineering in 1925 and was successively Associate Professor, Professor and Chairman of the Department. He was at one time a member of the committee of three who administered the activities of the Engineering College during a vacancy in the Deanship.

B. John L. Carruthers (continued)

Professor Carruthers had a distinguished career of service in the American Ceramic Society, holding various divisional offices, and served as President of the Society in 1940-1941. He was a founder of the National Institute of Ceramic Engineers and served as President of that group in 1939-40. He was Manager of the Edward Orton, Jr. Ceramic Foundation from 1944 to 1964, and Trustee of that organization from 1946 to 1957.

Professor Carruthers was a registered Professional Engineer and a member of the following organizations: Society for the Promotion of Engineering Education, Association of Ceramic Educators, Ohio Ceramic Industries Association, Sigma Xi and Keramos.

Professor Carruthers is remembered by those who studied under him as an exacting but inspiring teacher. He was a competent engineer and the ceramic industry owes much of its engineering advancement during the last forty years to his contributions in the areas of factory design and heat processing equipment.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

C. Harold K. Crow

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on June 28, 1966, of Harold K. Crow, Assistant Professor of Dentistry.

Professor Crow was born in Cumberland, Ohio, on April 28, 1901. He attended the College of Agriculture at The Ohio State University before entering the College of Dentistry from which he was graduated with the degree of D.D.S in 1930.

Professor Crow served as an Instructor in the Dental Clinic of the College of Dentistry from 1930 to 1942 when he was appointed Assistant Professor of Clinical Dentistry, a title which he held at the time of his death. He also conducted an active general practice of dentistry at Worthington, Ohio, during this time.

Dr. Crow was a member of The Columbus Dental Society; Ohio State Dental Association; American Dental Association; Omicron Kappa Upsilon, dental honor society and Psi Omega, dental fraternity. He served as a member of the Board of Education in the Worthington Public Schools and a trustee of the Worthington Presbyterian Church.

Professor Crow had a talent for guiding and inspiring students and gave them a sense of personal interest and friendship.

- (3) Authorized the release of \$25,000.00 to The Ohio State University for the purpose of making a study of and report on economic growth and industrial expansion through university-related research in Central Ohio. The report will cover the following areas:

 - (b) An assessment of the capabilities of the various institutions of higher education in central Ohio to meet these industry needs.
 - (c) Development of the strategy of university-industry relationships concerned with economic growth and industrial expansion.

B. Report on Highlights of Campus Activities

President Fawcett reported to the Board on some of the significant activities of the University during recent weeks. Some references included in the Report, which is filed with the official records of the Secretary, were as follows:

- Summer Quarter enrollment at The Ohio State University continued its upward trend with approximately 15,000 registered for summer 1966. In 10 years Summer Quarter attendance has more than doubled. It was 6,983 in 1956. The sizeable summer enrollment increases reflect definite accomplishment in the University's drive to provide equal educational opportunities for each of the four quarters, which are now each 11 weeks long.
- 2. As President of the Ohio College Association, President Fawcett has appointed a "Blue Ribbon" Committee to investigate possibilities for inter-institutional cooperation among members of the Association, and Vice President John E. Corbally, Jr. has been named as Chairman.
- 3. Governor James A. Rhodes used a specially-designed vibrating shovel to help Ohio State break ground for its new \$3.1 million Systems Engineering Building on Wednesday, June 27. The special ground-breaking shovel used in the program was developed by Ohio State welding department engineers to illustrate their current research on applications of ultrasonic energy to highway construction.
- 4. A significant event took place amid all the usual color of Ohio State's Spring Quarter Commencement on June 14. The 3,300 seniors and graduate students receiving degrees included the recipient of the 150,000th degree granted by this institution in less than 100 years. The degree, a Bachelor of Arts, went to Harry J. Halliday of Powell, Ohio. It was 77 years before Ohio State awarded its 100,000th degree in 1955. The 125,000th degree was given in 1961.
- 5. Ohio State electrical engineers, using an array of four 30-foot saucer antennas, tracked the seven communications satellites launched into a 20,000-mile high equatorial orbit by one Titan 3 rocket on June 16. Their signals were picked up at about 6 p.m., June 17, and were tracked until about midnight.
- 6. A quality control test for asbestos brake linings of automobiles, which duplicates in about 12 minutes the braking power used in thousands of miles of driving, has been developed by a team of Ohio State University mechanical engineers. The work was performed at Ohio State by Professors S. M. Marco, Truman Foster, and Walter L. Starkey.

C. Report on the University's Investment Portfolio

The report on the University's Investment Portfolio dated June 30, 1966, as submitted to the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees and distributed to all members of the Board, was ordered to be filed with the official records of the Board.

Henry L. Wagner has made a lasting contribution to The Ohio State University as a dedicated campaigner for the Development Fund and as an able contributor to the leadership of the Development Fund Board of Directors. His loyalty, hard work, and enlightened counsel have helped the development endeavors of this University grow and mature from modest beginnings to the major role they now play in support of the teaching and research programs.

Mr. Wagner received the Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration from this University in 1926. Over the years, despite the growing responsibilities of his business career, Mr. Wagner has served his community and his alma mater in a variety of ways.

He began working for the Development Fund during its first campaign and he has been actively involved ever since. Creative Innovator of Fiscal Programs and Former University Comptroller

Charley F. Miller served The Ohio State University with exceptional skill and dedication for nearly four decades. During those years, as assistant comptroller and comptroller, he was responsible for major innovations which laid the foundation for the University's present accounting system, its auditing program, and its budgeting procedures.

Under Mr. Miller's leadership, Ohio State was one of the first universities to introduce machine techniques to its accounting operation. He initiated a study of capital costs in higher education and also expressed early interest in measuring educational costs on a per-student basis long before the essential importance of these kinds of information to University budgeting was generally recognized.

As comptroller, he prepared and administered budgets on a sound, conservative basis, refusing to approve new programs unless the source of funds was certain. A man of impeccable integrity, unstinting in his efforts in behalf of Ohio State, Mr. Miller was admired and respected by his University associates and by his colleagues in the several national business organizations in which he served actively and was an influential leader.

Mr. Miller's great ability to assimilate new methods and techniques, while retaining those old procedures which met the test of time, made him ideally suited to the challenge of providing this University with effective budgetary practices during its period of greatest growth and change. To Mr. Miller must go a great share of the credit for creating a fiscal framework which insures that the individual endeavors of faculty, students, and staff are advanced smoothly and efficiently. During his long and productive career, Charley F. Miller has made a significant and lasting contribution to The Ohio State University.


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



THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE ONE THOUSAND AND THIRTEENTH MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Wooster, Ohio, September 8, 1966

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, September 8, 1966, at the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center, Wooster, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Provost - Definition of Responsibilities

As a part of the continuing study of our administrative organization and in consonance with the establishment of the position of Provost of the University, two changes should be made to be effective October 1, 1966. These changes are in accordance with the definition that, with the exception of the position of President, the position of Provost of the University is to be considered the principal central administrative position of the University and that, in the absence of the President, the Provost is to act on behalf of the President. Based upon this definition, the following recommendations were made:

First, it was recommended that the Office of Campus Planning become a Division of the Office of Academic Affairs and of the Provost. The Executive Director for Campus Planning shall remain the head of this Division and shall report to the Provost of the University. The general responsibilities of the Division shall remain the same as those currently assigned to the Office of Campus Planning. This administrative change will recognize the increased need to include facilities planning and utilization as key factors in the process of academic planning. During Dr. Herrick's tenure as Executive Director, and only during his tenure, this position shall remain a Cabinet one.

Second, it was recommended that the Division of Administrative Research and Data Processing which has reported to the Office of the President through the Vice President for Administration now report to the Provost of the University. This recommendation is necessitated by the realignment of the duties formerly assigned to the Vice President for Administration.

Finally, that the Secretary of the Board be authorized to include in the next edition of the <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u> the appropriate changes to reflect the administrative reorganization recommended above.

Upon motion of Mr. Bricker, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the above recommendations for changes in administrative responsibilities as proposed were approved by unanimous voice vote, and the Secretary was instructed to make such revisions in the Rules for the University Faculty when they are reprinted.

B. Appointment of Chief Administrator for Wright State Campus

Pursuant to the provisions of Amended Substitute S. B. No. 210 that was passed in 1965 by the General Assembly of Ohio, the Wright State Campus Advisory Committee has been established and has been working with The Ohio State University and Miami University for the development of Wright State Campus into a state university.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

B. Appointment of Chief Administrator for Wright State Campus (continued)

As a first order of business, the Advisory Committee was authorized by the two parent institutions to seek a qualified person to serve as the chief administrator of the Wright State Campus with responsibility for its total operation.

By agreement with the Advisory Committee, the person selected to fill this role is to be appointed by both The Ohio State University and Miami University as a Vice President with the understanding that his assignment is to be that of serving as chief administrator of Wright State Campus when service begins and extending to July 1, 1967. His salary and such other considerations as are appropriate to the appointment are to be paid from the Wright State Campus budget.

The Wright State Campus Advisory Committee has now recommended a fully qualified person for the above role and has made the proper recommendation to Ohio State and Miami. Additionally, the Advisory Committee has extended to its nominee the courtesy operating designation of President-Elect, Wright State University. The actions of the Advisory Committee are based upon the assumption that the Wright State Campus will become an independent state university on July 1, 1967, at which time, if all conditions are met, the institution will be known as Wright State University.

The Advisory Committee has recommended and the President has indicated his support of the appointment of Dr. Brage Golding, present Head of the School of Chemical Engineering at Purdue University. His salary is to be at the annual rate of \$30,000.00 from October 1, 1966 to July 1, 1967, with the understanding that he will spend at least 1/3 of full time on duty at the Wright State Campus for an interim period and shall be compensated during such interim period at the rate of 1/3 of full-time salary.

Dr. Golding is 46 years of age and has both his Bachelor's degree and his Ph. D. degree from Purdue University. He served as research associate at Purdue from 1948 to 1957, visiting professor of engineering at Purdue from 1957 to 1959 and since 1959 has been head of the School of Chemical Engineering at Purdue. Dr. Golding has had industrial experience, is the author of a book and several papers in his field of specialization and belongs to a number of the key professional societies that are related to his professional interest. He is married and is the father of three children.

Dr. Golding has agreed to accept the position on the basis of the conditions set forth above and as delineated in an August 26, 1966, official communication from Mr. Robert S. Oelman, Chairman of the Advisory Committee.

It was recommended that the proposal to employ Dr. Brage Golding as submitted by the Wright State Campus Advisory Committee be approved and

that the August 26, 1966, official letter from Mr. Oelman be included as a part of the record of this meeting.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. France, the Board of Trustees by unanimous roll call vote approved the above recommendation to appoint Dr. Brage Golding as the chief administrator of Wright State Campus, effective October 1, 1966, with the titles and terms of his employment as set forth in the August 26, 1966, communication from Mr. Robert S. Oelman, Chairman of the Advisory Committee for Wright State Campus.

Gentlemen:

Since its establishment in November, 1965, the Wright State Campus Advisory Committee has consulted with The Ohio State and Miami universities for the development of Wright State Campus into a state university, pursuant to provisions of Am. Sub. S. B. No. 210 of the 1965 General Assembly.

In this connection the Advisory Committee was authorized by the two parent universities to recommend to them a qualified person to serve as chief administrator of Wright State Campus with responsibility for its total operation, both administrative and academic, during the period before the Campus becomes an independent state university on or after July 1, 1967.

With the concurrence of the presidents of the two parent universities, the Advisory Committee has conducted a systematic search for such a person. It was required that each candidate be fully qualified for the presidency of a general university, in order that the appointee might be in a position to continue as permanent President of Wright State University, subject to approval of its board of trustees after their establishment on or after July 1, 1967, pursuant to law. Representatives of the resident faculty, and many other knowledgeable sources, were consulted. The credentials of a considerable number of distinguished candidates were examined. Interviews and confidential references were utilized.

The Advisory Committee now recommends to The Ohio State University and Miami University the appointment of Dr. Brage Golding, present Head of the School of Chemical Engineering, Purdue University, as Vice President, The Ohio State

University, and Vice President, Miami University, with the assignment of serving as chief administrator of Wright State Campus with responsibility for its total operation.

On July 25, 1966, the Advisory Committee reported to the two parent universities its tentative selection of Dr. Golding as its nominee for this position, and the terms of appointment which appeared to be necessary and appropriate for proposal to the prospective appointee. With the concurrence of the presidents of the two parent universities, but subject to approval of the respective boards of trustees, the Advisory Committee then presented a proposal to the nominee.

Terms of this proposal are as follows:

Title: Vice President, The Ohio State University, and Vice President, Miami University, with the additional operating designation of President-elect, Wright State University.

Salary: \$30,000.00 per year payable in equal monthly installments.

Powers and duties: To serve as chief administrator of Wright State Campus with responsibility for its total operation.

Other considerations: A requirement that the appointee live in a residence to be leased or purchased, and maintained, by the Wright State Campus/University, for the convenience of the institution; membership in the State Teachers Retirement System; and use of a state automobile. Necessary and proper entertainment expense incurred by the duties of the office to be reimbursed from non-public sources.

Tenure: The customary manner of appointment to vice presidential positions by each of the respective parent universities, without guaranteed tenure beyond one year.

Date of effect: October 1, 1966, with the understanding that from that date forward until the appointee can spend full time on this assignment, he will spend at least one third of full time on duty at the Wright State Campus and shall be compensated during such interim period at the rate of one third of full-time salary.

After interviews of the nominee by the presidents of the parent universities, a specific proposal containing these terms was presented to the nominee, subject to approval of the boards of trustees of the parent universities, on August 1, 1966. This proposal subsequently was approved by the nominee.

The Wright State Campus Advisory Committee now recommends consideration of this appointment by the boards of trustees of Miami University and The Ohio State

University at their earliest convenience. It is our best judgment that this appointment will be a major step forward in the development of Wright State Campus as an important state university.

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C. Motor Vehicle, Traffic and Parking Regulations, The Ohio State University - Branch Campuses

The construction of facilities on branch campuses makes necessary the revision of The Ohio State University Code of Motor Vehicle Regulations, and the filing of such revisions with the Secretary of State. The proposed revisions have the support of the Dean, University College, and the Directors of the branches at Lima, Mansfield, Marion and Newark.

NOW BE IT RESOLVED that the Motor Vehicle, Traffic and Parking Regulations adopted by the Board of Trustees on June 10, 1965, and filed with Ohio Secretary of State on August 18, 1965, be and hereby are amended as shown in Amendment No. 1, filed with the official records of the Board of Trustees, and that these rules of the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University regulating and controlling the use of motor vehicles on the land and property of The Ohio State University located in the City of Columbus, County of Franklin; County of Allen; City of Mansfield, County of Richland; County of Marion; City of Newark, County of Licking; the foregoing all in the State of Ohio; and

BE IT RESOLVED that the June 10, 1965, action of the Board of Trustees, be and hereby is amended to include the pamphlets, maps and booklets, entitled "Motor Vehicle Regulations, Branch Campuses," and is approved and made a part of the said Motor Vehicle, Traffic and Parking Regulations of The Ohio State University; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University is hereby authorized and directed to file this resolution and the amendments to the Motor Vehicle, Traffic and Parking Regulations of The Ohio State University with the Secretary of State of Ohio and to do and file such other and further papers and documents as may be necessary and proper to comply with Ohio Revised Code, Section 111.15, and to make these regulations binding and in force, according to law.

Employment of Engineers - McCracken Power Plant, Fuel Oil System Remodeling

It was recommended that the firm of Moulenbelt & Seifert, Consulting Engineers, be employed to provide complete professional engineering services for the redesign of the fuel oil distributing and pumping system including the preparation of drawings, specifications, estimate of cost and bidding documents.

The fee for this service will be \$5,500.00 and funds are available in Budget Account 801096.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Jones, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

D. Employment of Engineers - River Dormitory, Completion of Access Road

It was recommended that the firm of Jones-Stuckey, Ltd., Civil Engineers, be employed to provide complete professional engineering services for this project including surveys, design, preparation of drawings, specifications, estimate of cost, bidding documents and complete field supervision.

The fee will be calculated on the basis of 7 per cent of the contract cost, an estimated \$2,975.00, and funds will be provided from Item 053, H. B. 202 and H. B. 949.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Jones, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE (continued)

E. Employment of Architects, Mental Retardation Facility

It was recommended that the firm of Potter, Tyler, Martin & Roth, Architects, be employed to provide complete architectural and engineering services for this project, including preliminary plans, basic drawings, working drawings, specifications, estimate of cost, necessary bidding documents and complete supervision of construction.

The fee will be calculated on the basis of 6 per cent of the first million, 5 1/2 per cent of the second million and 5 per cent of the balance of the contract cost of the project. Funds are provided for this service from Item 052, H. B. 202, and from an anticipated Federal Grant.

Upon motion of Mr. Bricker, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

F. Easement for Storm Sewer, County of Marion, Ohio

The Marion County Commissioners have requested permission to construct a storm sewer on State of Ohio lands, which lands have been designated for use by The Ohio State University Marion Branch. The sewer will serve the campus as well as a drainage area north of the campus and will be located on the southeast portion of the 180-acre parcel acquired by the State of Ohio in December, 1965. The deed to said property is recorded in Marion County deed records, Volume 415, page 207.

It was recommended that the construction and maintenance of the storm sewer through University lands be approved in a location not inimical to the interests of the University. It was further recommended that the President and/or the Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to request the Director of Public Works of the State of Ohio, pursuant to his statutory duties, to act on behalf of the University in developing the necessary legal instruments to provide for installation of said storm sewer.

Upon motion of Mr. Bricker, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

G. Demolition of Buildings - Water Resources Pilot Sewage Treatment Plant

It was recommended that the Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to proceed with demolition and removal of all facilities at the Water Resources Pilot Sewage Treatment Plant.

This demolition should be accomplished in the most advantageous manner.

Upon motion of Mr. Bricker, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous voice vote.

H. Purchase of Land - Fairfield County

It was recommended that the Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to obtain survey, legal description, appraisal and other basic information as necessary and thereafter proceed with the purchase of approximately 65 acres of land located in the northwest quarter of Section 14, Township 14, Range 20, Fairfield County, Ohio, from Frank D. Phipps at a price not to exceed \$30,000.00.

Funds are available in the University Treasurer General Fund and title shall be held in the University endowment portfolio in the name of the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University pursuant to Section 3335.13 of the Ohio Revised Code.

Upon motion of Mr. Bricker, seconded by Mr. France, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

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X. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of Samuel H. Cobb, Associate Professor Emeritus in the Department of Physical Education - Men's Division; and Mildred Fisher Marple, Assistant Professor Emeritus in the Department of Geology. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

A. Samuel H. Cobb

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on June 25, 1966, of Samuel H. Cobb, Associate Professor Emeritus in the Department of Physical Education - Men's Division.

Professor Cobb was born on January 15, 1891, in Vienna, Austria. He received the B. A. degree from Amherst College and a degree in Physical Education from Springfield College, Springfield, Massachusetts. He was appointed Instructor of Physical Education at The Ohio State University in 1920. He became Assistant Professor in 1921 and Associate Professor in 1944. In addition to teaching Physical Education, Professor Cobb also served as Assistant Track and Cross Country Coach for Intercollegiate Athletics in 1927-28. He served his country in the military service in World War I and World War II. He was also State Commander of the American Legion, State of Ohio, in 1936-37.

Upon his retirement in 1952, Professor Cobb remained active in Chatham, Massachusetts, on the Park Commission and in American Legion-sponsored Little League Baseball.

Professor Cobb is remembered, by those who studied and worked with him, as a dedicated teacher and as one who made many contributions to the improvement of Physical Education.

B. Mildred Fisher Marple

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on August 4, 1966, of Mildred Fisher Marple, Assistant Professor Emeritus in the Department of Geology.

Professor Marple was born in Columbus, Ohio, on November 11, 1898. She received three degrees from The Ohio State University--Bachelor of Arts in 1921, Master of Arts in 1922 and Doctor of Philosophy in 1950. She served as Instructor at Wellesley College during 1923-24 and as Geologist with the Ohio Division of Geological Survey and Curator of the Geological Museum at The Ohio State University from 1950 to 1955. She served as Assistant Professor of Geology and Curator of the Geological Museum from 1955 until her retirement in 1959.

Professor Marple was a member of Sigma Xi and the Paleontological Society; a Fellow of the Geological Society of America and of the Ohio Academy of Science; and served as Editor of the Association of Geology Teachers for several years.

Dr. Marple specialized mainly in micropaleontology and published several papers on Paleozoic Ostracodes and Foraminifera. She wrote several popular information circulars published by the Ohio Division of Geological Survey and was co-author of a popular work on Ohio Fossils.

Professor Marple is remembered with affection by a host of colleagues and former students. She earned a doctorate in geology at a time when this was an unusual accomplishment, and she became a living example to young women geologists who followed in her footsteps. As a curator, she was outstanding for her untiring attention to detail and her constant willingness to oblige those who wished to examine the specimens in her care. As a teacher, she is remembered for her wide knowledge of geology and her sympathetic attitude toward students. The Department of Geology and the Geological Museum are forever in her debt for her devoted attention to her duties and the fine sense of responsibility with which she preserved and recorded the materials in her care.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. A. Transportation Research Center - Authorization to Execute an Agreement Between The Ohio State University and the Ohio Department of Highways

President Fawcett reported completion of the negotiations with the Ohio Department of Highways pertaining to acquisition of land for the establishment of the Transportation Research Center, pursuant to the April 14, 1966 action of the Board of Trustees. This action provides that the Ohio Department of Highways will furnish \$1,000,000 and The Ohio State University from State-appropriated funds will furnish another \$1,000,000.

Upon motion of Mr. James Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. John Ketterer, the Board of Trustees by unanimous vote authorized the President to formalize the negotiations into an agreement between The Ohio State University and the Ohio Department of Highways pursuant to the April 14, 1966 action of the Board of Trustees.

B. Report from the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools Advising of Continued Full Accreditation

President Fawcett reported that from February 27 to March 3, 1966, a Visiting Committee from the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools worked on our campus to complete a periodic inspection of the University's academic program.

On August 5, 1966, the President and the Vice President for Academic Affairs, Dr. John E. Corbally, Jr., appeared in Chicago before the North Central Association Commission on Colleges and Universities to review the Committee's report of findings, to answer questions and to provide such information as was requested. On August 10, 1966, the University was advised that the Executive Board of the Commission on Colleges and Universities, at its meeting on August 5, voted to continue accreditation of The Ohio State University as a Doctor's Degree-Granting Institution.

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C. Report from the Council on Medical Education of the American Medical Association Advising that the Full Accreditation of the College of Medicine Will Be Continued Until 1976

President Fawcett reported that in February, 1966, a Liaison Committee on Medical Education from the Council on Medical Education of the American Medical Association and the Executive Council of the Association of American Medical Colleges visited our campus for the second time in three years to inspect the quality of medical education at The Ohio State University. On August 4, 1966, the University was advised by both medical bodies that the College of Medicine will continue on full accreditation for ten years following February 17, 1966.

C. Report from the Council on Medical Education of the American Medical Association Advising that the Full Accreditation of the College of Medicine Will Be Continued Until 1976 (continued)

President Fawcett commended the faculty and the administration of the College of Medicine for the effective manner in which preparation was made for the above inspection and stated, "I am exceedingly happy to recognize publicly the importance of continuing accreditation for a full ten-year period."

RESOLUTION providing for the issuance of \$14,000,000 Dormitory Revenue Notes, Series 1966, for the purpose of refunding a like principal amount of Dormitory Revenue Notes heretofore issued for the purpose of constructing and equipping certain dormitory and related dining facilities known as Drackett, Jones and Taylor Towers, Archer, Dennis, Houck and Nosker Houses, and Northeast Dining Facility.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University (herein called the "Board") is vested with the government of The Ohio State University (herein called the "University", or where the context admits collectively with the Board called the "University") and has the general supervision of all land, buildings and other property of the University and control of all expenses therefor pursuant to Chapter 3335 of the Revised Code of Ohio; and

WHEREAS, under Section 3345.07 of said Revised Code, the Board has authority to construct, equip, maintain and operate the Project described below and to issue bonds and notes to pay the costs thereof and pledge to the payment of such bonds and notes the net revenues of dormitory and dining facilities now or hereafter under control of the Board as the Board may designate, and to issue such bonds and notes to refund bonds and notes previously issued for such purpose; and

WHEREAS, the Board has previously determined, and does hereby confirm, that it is necessary to provide additional dormitory accommodations and dining facilities for students of the University and, therefor, to construct and equip on the campus of the University the dormitory and dining facilities known as Drackett, Jones and Taylor Towers, Archer, Dennis, Houck and

Nosker Houses, and Northeast Dining Facility (said dormitory buildings and dining facility and all things incidental thereto being herein called the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the Board has heretofore duly issued, and there are presently outstanding, notes in the aggregate principal amount of \$14,000,000 issued for the purpose of paying the costs of the Project, comprised of \$11,000,000 Dormitory Revenue Notes of 1965, dated as of March 15, 1965 and bearing interest at the rate of 2.65% per annum, and \$3,000,000 Dormitory Revenue Notes, Series, 1965, dated as of September 15, 1965 and bearing interest at the rate of 2.55% per annum, all maturing on September 15, 1966 (the said two outstanding note issues being herein collectively called the "Outstanding Notes"); and

WHEREAS, the Board does hereby determine and confirm that it is necessary to issue the below authorized dormitory revenue notes in the principal amount of \$14,000,000 to refund the Outstanding Notes prior to the completion of permanent financing of the Project to be represented by dormitory revenue bonds; and

WHEREAS, the Fiscal Officer of the University has heretofore solicited and received proposals for the purchase of said \$14,000,000 dormitory revenue notes, has advised the Board of the results thereof and has set forth in the Certificate of Award, appended hereto as Appendix III, page 257, that award of said notes as in his best judgment, confirmed herein by the Board is for the best interests of the University:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University:

Section 1. It is hereby determined and declared that it is necessary to construct and equip the Project and to issue and there shall be issued, pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Notes, Series 1966 (herein called the "1966 Notes"), in the aggregate principal amount of \$14,000,000 for the purpose of refunding the presently outstanding \$11,000,000 principal amount of The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Notes of 1965 dated as of March 15, 1965 and \$3,000,000 principal amount of The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Notes, Series 1965, dated as of September 15, 1965.

Section 2. The principal of and interest on the 1966 Notes shall be payable solely from (a) the revenues of the Dormitory Facilities, as defined in the Trust Agreement between the University and The Ohio National Bank of Columbus, dated as of April 15, 1957, as supplemented pursuant to the terms thereof, after providing only for the reasonable and proper expenses of operation and maintenance thereof and all payments required from time to time to be made into the Special Funds created under such Trust Agreement, as supplemented, and (b) the proceeds of the sale of dormitory revenue bonds

or notes of the University to be issued pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, or other authorizing provision of law, to refund the notes authorized hereby; and neither the State of Ohio nor the University or its Board of Trustees shall be obligated to pay the same from any other funds or source, nor shall such notes be a claim upon or lien against any other property of the University or the State of Ohio, and said notes are not general obligations of the State or the University, and the full faith and credit thereof are not pledged thereto and the noteholders shall have no right to have any taxes levied, collected or applied for or to the payment thereof.

The University and its Board of Trustees covenant and agree that they will do all things necessary to effect the issuance and delivery, prior to the maturity of the 1966 Notes, of dormitory revenue bonds or notes for the refunding of the 1966 Notes pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 3345.07, or other provision of law authorizing such revenue bonds or notes, in such principal amount as shall be necessary to pay the principal of and interest on the 1966 Notes and shall apply the proceeds thereof to such purpose, that they will do all things necessary to sell such bonds or notes at the time provided above and will accept such price and such interest rate as shall be necessary in order to effect such sale; and these obligations are established as duties specifically enjoined upon the University, its Trustees and officers, by law and result from their respective offices, trusts or stations within the meaning of Section 2731.01 of the Revised Code of Ohio.

Section 3. The 1966 Notes shall be issued as bearer coupon notes, or in fully registered form without coupons, as requested by the Original Purchasers; shall be dated as of September 15, 1966, shall mature on September 15, 1967, shall bear interest at the rates per annum and payable as prescribed in the Certificate of Award appended hereto as Appendix III, page 257, shall be in denominations of \$5,000 or any multiples thereof as requested by the Original Purchasers and approved by the Fiscal Officer, shall be numbered as determined by the Fiscal Officer, and shall be executed by the Executive Officer and by the Fiscal Officer, provided that one such signature may be a facsimile, shall have the seal of the University impressed thereon, or a facsimile of said seal imprinted thereon, and the coupons, if any, pertaining thereto shall be signed by or bear the facsimile signature of the Fiscal Officer. The definitive notes shall be substantially in the forms attached hereto as Appendix IV, page 261, and Appendix V, page 267, the terms and covenants of which are incorporated herein, with such changes therein, not substantially adverse to the University, as the officers executing same and the Original Purchasers may agree upon, provided that the entire issue may be represented by a single note if so agreed.

In order to facilitate early delivery of the 1966 Notes so as to retire when due the Outstanding Notes, prior to delivery of the definitive notes of the present issue, said notes may be in the discretion of the Fiscal Officer, be delivered as one or more temporary manuscript notes to be surrendered to the University at the principal office of the Paying Agent in exchange for definitive notes of like aggregate principal amount and related interest rates

when the University shall notify the holder thereof that the definitive notes are available. Such exchange shall be made at no expense to the Original Purchasers.

Both the principal of and the interest on all coupon notes shall be payable at the principal office of the Paying Agent. Payment of the interest on coupon notes shall be made only upon presentation and surrender of the coupons representing such interest as the same respectively fall due. The principal of all registered notes shall be payable at the principal office of the Paying Agent and payment of the interest on registered notes without coupons shall be made on each interest payment date to the person appearing on the registration books of the University hereinafter provided for as the registered owner thereof, by check or draft mailed by the Paying Agent to such registered owner at his address as it appears on such registration books.

The University shall cause books to be kept by the Paying Agent as note registrar for the registration and transfer of notes as provided in this Resolution.

Title to any coupon note and to any interest coupon shall pass by delivery in the same manner as a negotiable instrument payable to bearer. Any registered note without coupons may be transferred only upon the books kept for the registration and transfer of such notes, upon surrender thereof together with an assignment duly executed by the registered owner or his attorney in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Paying Agent. Upon the transfer of any such registered note the University shall execute in the name of the transferee and deliver a new registered note or notes, without coupons, of any denomination or denominations authorized by this Resolution, in aggregate principal amount equal to the principal amount of such registered note, of the same maturity, and bearing interest at the same rate.

Except as otherwise provided in this Resolution, the University and the Paying Agent may make a charge for every such transfer of notes sufficient to reimburse them for any tax, fee or other governmental charge required to be paid with respect to such transfer, and in addition may charge a sum sufficient to reimburse them for all costs and expenses incurred in connection with such transfer, and such charge or charges shall be paid before any such new note shall be delivered. Neither the University nor the Paying Agent shall be required to transfer any note or notes during the ten (10) days next preceding an interest payment date on the notes.

As to any registered note without coupons, the person in whose name the same is registered shall be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes and payment of or on account of the principal of any such note and the interest on any such registered note without coupons shall be made only to or upon the order of the registered owner thereof or his legal representative, but such registration may be changed as hereinabove provided. All such payments shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon such note, including the interest thereon to the extent of the

sum or sums so paid. The University, and the Paying Agent may deem and treat the bearer of any coupon notes and the bearer of any coupon appertaining to any coupon note, as the absolute owner of such note or coupon, as the case may be, whether such note or coupon shall be overdue or not, for the purpose of receiving payment thereof and for all other purposes whatsoever, and neither the University nor the Paying Agent shall be affected by any notice to the contrary.

For the purposes of this resolution, "Paying Agent" shall mean a bank or trust company designated by the Original Purchaser of the largest principal amount of the 1966 Notes as the paying agent hereunder and approved by the Fiscal Officer (provided that (i) if two or more Original Purchasers purchase the same largest principal amount, the Paying Agent shall be such of their choices as is designated by the Fiscal Officer, and (ii) if the Paying Agent is outside Ohio, provision shall be made by the Fiscal Officer for a Co-Paying Agent in Ohio if requested by any Original Purchaser); "Executive Officer" shall mean the Chairman of the Board of Trustees or the President of the University; and "Fiscal Officer" shall mean the Vice President, Business and Finance, or the Assistant Treasurer of the University.

Section 4. The award of the 1966 Notes as provided in the Certificate of Award appended hereto as Appendix III, page 257, is hereby in all respects approved, confirmed and ratified (the purchasers designated therein being the Original Purchasers referred to in this Resolution); and the Fiscal Officer is hereby authorized and directed to make delivery thereof promptly in accordance with this Resolution and said Certificate of Award, with appropriate transcript of proceedings, delivery certificates and bond counsel opinion at the expense of the University. The University will provide printed notes at its expense if requested by the Original Purchasers.

Section 5. The proceeds of said notes shall be applied promptly to the payment and discharge of the Outstanding Notes, and the Fiscal Officer is hereby directed to apply to the payment of interest on said outstanding notes such amount from the construction funds for the Project or from available surplus dormitory revenues as shall be needed therefor.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the foregoing resolution was adopted unanimously by roll call vote.

Mr. France presented the following resolution providing for the issuance of \$4,500,000 of The Ohio State University Parking System Revenue Bonds, Series A:

BOND RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$4,500,000 THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY PARKING SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS, SERIES A, FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONSTRUCTING AND EQUIPPING CERTAIN BUILDINGS, STRUCTURES AND FACILITIES TO BE USED FOR OR IN CONNECTION WITH THE PARKING OF MOTOR VEHICLES,

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University (herein called the Board) is vested with the government of The Ohio State University (herein called the University) by Section 3335.02 of the Revised Code of Ohio, with the right, under Section 3335.03 of said Revised Code, and as such Board, of suing and being sued, contracting and being contracted with, and of making and using a common seal and, under Section 3335.10 of said Revised Code, has general supervision of all lands, buildings and other property of the University and control of all expenses therefor; and

WHEREAS, by authority of Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio, the Board is authorized to acquire by purchase, lease, or otherwise, and to construct, equip, maintain, renovate, repair, improve or remodel and operate, and to lease to or from others, buildings, structures, or facilities and sites therefor and related equipment within or in close proximity to the campus of the University to be used for or in connection with athletic purposes, student activity centers, faculty centers, dining halls, book stores, auditoriums, parking or motor vehicles, hospital, medical and health facilities, continuing education facilities, and contract research facilities; and, for the purpose of paying the costs thereof, or any part thereof, or the repayment of any loans obtained for such purposes, to use any funds in its possession not otherwise obligated, revenues derived from athletic events, and from the operation or leasing of such activity centers, faculty centers, dining halls, book stores, auditoriums, parking facilities, hospital, medical and health facilities, continuing education facilities, and contract research facilities including but not limited to such portions of student activity fees charged and paid for such purposes, any other revenues or receipts derived or to be derived from the operation of leasing of such structures, buildings, facilities and equipment; and for the purpose of paying all or part of such costs the Board is further authorized thereby to issue and sell bonds, notes or other written instruments evidencing such indebtedness, provided that such obligations shall not be a claim against or lien upon any property of the State of Ohio or any property of or under the control of said Board excepting such parts of the revenues or receipts derived from the operation or leasing of such structures, buildings, facilities, equipment or sites and any portion of the student fees assessed or to be assessed for the purposes of such acquisition, construction, equipment, renovation, repair, improvement or remodeling or for the use of such structures, buildings, facilities, equipment or sites or any portion of the receipts of athletic events or from other sources not otherwise obligated which the Board may pledge to secure the payment of such obligations; and by authority of said Section 3345.11 the Board is also authorized to issue such bonds, notes or other obligations payable as aforesaid in order to retire or refund outstanding notes or other obligations

matured or unmatured, to repay moneys previously borrowed or advanced under said section or to reimburse funds of the University for amounts used under said Section 3345.11: and

WHEREAS, the University has determined to construct and equip certain buildings, structures and facilities to be used for or in connection with the parking of motor vehicles, including three multi-level parking structures for the parking of approximately 2,250 motor vehicles, all within or in close proximity to its campus (said constructing and equipping and all other things incidental thereto, including site improvements, or, where the context requires, said buildings, structures, facilities and sites themselves, being herein called the Project), to provide for the issuance of Parking System Revenue Bonds, Series A (herein sometimes called the Series A Bonds) to pay the cost of constructing and equipping the Project and to provide for the issuance of additional bonds (herein called Additional Bonds) as from time to time authorized, subject to the conditions contained in this Resolution and the below mentioned Trust Agreement, on a parity with the Series A Bonds (the Series A Bonds and such Additional Bonds from time to time outstanding being herein collectively called the Bonds), to provide for the pledging, application and disposition of the Pledged Receipts herein identified, and to provide for the execution and delivery of a trust agreement (herein called the Trust Agreement) to secure the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the University has not pledged or encumbered the Pledged Receipts except as herein provided; and

WHEREAS, the Project is to be constructed pursuant to plans prepared by qualified architects and engineers and approved by the Department of Public Works of Ohio; and

WHEREAS, the Board has heretofore approved the traffic, parking, feasibility, and revenue surveys, analyses and reports submitted by Wilbur Smith and Associates; and

WHEREAS, the Board has heretofore approved the reports, estimates of cost, surveys, analyses, drawings and sketches submitted with reference to an engineering study, including findings, opinions and recommendations with respect to the size, design and cost feasibility, both as to the construction and operation of the Project; and

WHEREAS, based upon construction cost estimates prepared by the consulting engineers, the Board has estimated the cost of constructing the Project, including, without implied limitation, construction, equipment, site improvements, engineering, legal and administrative expenses, and any costs necessary to placing the Project in operation, together with provisions for contingencies, to be \$4,500,000; and

WHEREAS, the University has determined to borrow the funds to pay the foregoing costs by selling \$4,500,000 Parking System Revenue Bonds, Series A, as hereinafter provided, and to apply moneys now on hand, derived from fees charged for the parking of motor vehicles on the campus, to pay the balance of said costs.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY:

Section 1. Authorization of Series A Bonds, Use of Proceeds. It is hereby determined that the University shall issue and sell bonds for the purpose of obtaining funds to pay the Costs of the Project, as herein defined, and, to the extent of any balance to be deposited in the Debt Service Reserve Fund herein provided. Said bonds shall be designated The Ohio State University Parking System Revenue Bonds, Series A (hereinafter called the Series A Bonds).

Section 2. Terms of Series A Bonds. The Series A Bonds shall be initially issued in coupon or fully registered form as may be requested by the Original Purchaser thereof and shall be exchangeable for fully registered or coupon bonds in the manner and on the terms provided in the Trust Agreement. The Series A Bonds in coupon form shall be dated as of the first day of the month in which the Board shall adopt the resolution approving the award of the Series A Bonds to the Original Purchaser as provided in Section 3 hereof (herein sometimes called the Resolution of Award) or such other date as may be determined by the Board, shall be in the denomination of \$1,000 or \$5,000 each, as determined in the Resolution of Award, and shall be registrable as to principal. Series A Bonds in fully registered form shall be in the denominations of the coupon bonds or any multiple thereof. Series A Bonds in both coupon and fully registered form shall be numbered as determined by the Treasurer of the University. Each Series A Bond in registered form without coupons shall be dated as of the interest payment date on which it is authenticated or the interest payment date next preceding the date of its authentication or as of the same date as the coupon bonds if authenticated prior to the first interest payment date; provided, however, if at the time of authentication of the registered bonds without coupons, interest is in default, such Series A Bond shall be dated as of the date to which interest has been paid. The Series A Bonds shall bear interest payable semi-annually on June first and December first of each year beginning with the first such date occurring at least six months after the date of the coupon bonds, at the rate or rates per annum determined in the Resolution of Award, and shall mature annually on December 1, in the years and in amounts as follows:

Series A Bonds maturing on and after December 1, 1969, shall be subject to redemption in whole or in part on any interest payment date on and after December 1, 1968, at redemption prices equal to the following percentages of the principal amount redeemed plus accrued interest to the date fixed for their redemption, to wit:

104% if redeemed on or before December 1, 1973; 103% if redeemed thereafter, but on or before December 1, 1978; 102% if redeemed thereafter, but on or before December 1, 1983; 101% if redeemed thereafter.

If less than the entire unmatured portion of the Series A Bonds is called for redemption at any time or from time to time, they shall be called in inverse order of maturity of those outstanding; and if less than all of said bonds outstanding of one maturity are to be called, the selection of bonds or portions of registered bonds of such maturity to be called shall be made by lot by the Trustee in such manner as the Trustee may determine.

Principal and interest thereon shall be payable at the principal office of the Trustee hereinafter provided for, or, at the option of the holder, at the principal office of in the Borough of Manhattan, City and State of New York; provided that principal on registered bonds with or without coupons shall be payable only at the principal office of the Trustee and interest on fully registered bonds shall be payable by check or draft as provided in the Trust Agreement.

Series A Bonds shall be executed by the facsimile signature of the Chairman of the Board, shall be signed by the President or the Vice President, Business and Finance, of the University and attested by the Secretary of the Board, provided that such signatures may be facsimiles if authorized by the law in effect at the time of issuance, and shall bear the seal of the University or a facsimile thereof, and the interest coupons thereon shall bear the facsimile signature of the Treasurer of the University.

Section 3. Sale of the Series A Bonds. Subject to the provisions of this resolution, the Vice President, Business and Finance, of the University is hereby authorized and directed to offer the Series A Bonds for sale, by advertisement in The Daily Bond Buyer or other financial journal of national circulation, to the highest bidder based on the lowest net interest cost; all in such manner and on such terms, not inconsistent with this resolution, as determined by him, including specifications in such advertisement, or in the Official Notice of Sale referred to therein, of such of the following as he may choose, together with such other terms as he may deem advisable: a maximum rate of interest less than the maximum rate provided below; a purchase price or range thereof; a maximum number of different interest rates; and a maximum

difference between the highest interest rate and the lowest interest rate. There shall not be more than one interest rate for any single maturity and no single interest rate shall exceed 6% per annum. The University shall provide the printed bonds and the costs of printing shall not be considered in determining the highest bid. Upon opening of bids, the Series A Bonds shall be awarded by resolution of the Board. The successful bidder to whom the Bonds shall be awarded pursuant hereto is herein sometimes called the Original Purchaser.

Section 4. Allocation of Proceeds of the Series A Bonds. The proceeds of all the Series A Bonds shall be allocated and applied by the University as follows in the following order of priority:

- To the Parking System Debt Service Fund, herein established, the portion of such proceeds representing accrued interest to the date of delivery.
- (2) To the Parking System Debt Service Reserve Fund, herein established, the portion of the proceeds representing premium, if any, above par.
- (3) To the University or its obligees, the amounts, if any, necessary to retire notes issued or to repay borrowings made or advances received prior to the delivery of the Series A Bonds to pay the Costs of the Project, including payment of interest thereon, all to the extent permitted by Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio.
- (4) The balance to the Parking System Construction Fund (herein called Construction Fund), hereby established, for the Project, to be held by the University in a separate deposit account, except when invested as hereinafter provided, and used to pay Costs of the Project. The Vice President, Business and Finance, is hereby authorized and directed to establish said deposit account with a bank or trust company which is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

The Vice President, Business and Finance, shall apply said Construction Fund to the payment of Costs of the Project. As used in this Resolution, the term "Costs of the Project" shall include, without intending thereby to limit or restrict any proper definition of such costs under any applicable laws or sound accounting practice, the following: the costs of construction, equipping and furnishing the Project, including site clearance and improvements and all things necessary and incidental thereto, and including all costs and expenses of architectural, engineering, legal and other professional services, administrative and clerical costs and expense, all costs and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance, sale and delivery of the Series A Bonds, and all other necessary and miscellaneous expenses related to the financing and construction of the Project and placing it in operation including interest on the Series A Bonds and on interim construction financing during construction.

G. Bond Resolution for Parking System Revenue Bonds (continued)

If the payment is to be made with respect to an obligation under a construction contract relating to the Project, such payment shall be made only upon certification by a qualified architect or engineer that such payment is due under such contract.

The moneys to the credit of the Construction Fund shall, pending application thereof as above set forth, be subject to a lien and charge in favor of the holders of the Series A Bonds, and the University covenants that it will not cause or permit to be paid from said fund any sums except in compliance with the provisions of this resolution and of the Trust Agreement.

The Construction Fund may be invested by the Vice President, Business and Finance, of the University in Permitted Investments, as defined in Section 10 hereof, with such maturities or redemption provisions and in such amounts, as nearly as practicable, as will provide funds when needed to pay Costs of the Project. Such investments and the proceeds of sale thereof and interest earned thereon shall constitute part of the Construction Fund and shall be maintained separately from other investments or funds of the University. The said investments shall be sold, exchanged or collected from time to time by the Vice President, Business and Finance, of the University.

Any balance in the Construction Fund remaining after paying all Costs of the Project or reserving therein such amounts as shall be necessary to pay the remaining Costs of the Project shall be transferred to the credit of the Parking Facilities Debt Service Reserve Fund.

Section 5. Application of Receipts; Special Funds. There is hereby established a special fund designated "Parking System Revenue Fund" (herein sometimes called the Revenue Fund) which fund shall be maintained in a deposit account or accounts with a bank or trust company which is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, or invested as herein authorized, in the name of the University separate and distinct from all other funds of the University, and which, subject to the withdrawals and uses herein authorized, is pledged to and charged with the payment of the principal, interest, and premium, if any, on all the Bonds.

There shall be maintained in the Parking Facilities Revenue Fund, as an Operating Reserve, such amount as is from time to time determined by the Vice President, Business and Finance, of the University as adequate and necessary for working capital for Operating and Maintenance Expenses of the Pledged Facilities.

From and after the issuance of the Series A Bonds, all Pledged Receipts, as defined in Section 10 hereof, shall be deposited in the Revenue Fund.

The Revenue Fund, including the Operating Reserve, shall be applied to pay when due the Operating and Maintenance Expenses of the Pledged Facilities, provided, however, that nothing contained herein or in the Trust Agreement shall be deemed to prohibit the University of its own volition from paying such expenses, or any portion thereof, from other funds of the University lawfully available for the purpose.

G. Bond Resolution for Parking System Revenue Bonds (continued)

The remainder of the Revenue Fund, after retaining therein the current Operating Reserve and payment of said Operating and Maintenance Expenses then due, shall be applied as follows and in the following order of priority.

First: Into the Parking System Debt Service Fund (herein called the Debt Service Fund), hereby established and to be held by the Trustee as a separate fund and used for the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds, (1) on or before May 15th and November 15th of each year, beginning with the first such date next preceding the first interest payment date of the Series A Bonds, amounts as shall be sufficient, with other moneys on hand therein or provided for such purpose from the Construction Fund, to pay the interest due on the next ensuing interest payment date on all Bonds then outstanding; (2) on or before May 15th and November 15th of each year, beginning May 15, 1969, such equal semi-annual amounts as shall be sufficient, with moneys then on hand therein, to provide for payment of the next ensuing principal maturity on all Bonds then outstanding and, if any of such Bonds shall be term Bonds, to provide an amount annually necessary to retire (by call or otherwise) at or before maturity thereof all term Bonds. No payments need be made to the Debt Service Fund or the Debt Service Reserve Fund so long as the amounts in the Debt Service Fund and Debt Service Reserve Fund aggregate at least the total principal and interest payable on all Bonds then outstanding to the dates of their respective maturities.

Second: Into the Parking System Debt Service Reserve Fund (herein sometimes called the Debt Service Reserve Fund), hereby established, to be held by the Trustee as a separate fund for the payment of the Bonds as herein provided, on or before May 15th and November 15th of each year, beginning May 15, 1969, an amount at least equal to 20% of the amount payable on such deposit date into the Debt Service Fund, to the extent and so long as necessary to create and maintain in said Debt Service Reserve Fund the required reserve, namely, an amount equal to the maximum annual amount required to be deposited to the Debt Service Fund in any subsequent year on account of all Bonds at the time outstanding.

Third: On May 15th and November 15th of each year, to the foregoing funds, such amounts as may be necessary to make up any previous deficiency in any deposits required by the foregoing paragraphs of this section.

Fourth: Into the Parking System Capital Replacement and Improvement Fund (herein called the Replacement and Improvement Fund), hereby established, and to be held by the University in a separate deposit account, except when invested as below provided, in a bank which is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and to be applied as herein provided, on or before May 15 and November 15 of each year, beginning May 15, 1969, the balance of such remainder of the Revenue Fund up to one-fourth of one percent of the cost of all Pledged Facilities to the extent and so long as necessary to create and maintain in said Replacement and Improvement Fund an amount equal to two percent of the cost of all Pledged Facilities (exclusive of the cost of land).

Fifth: So long as there is no deficiency in any of the deposits provided for in Paragraphs First through Third above, any amounts in the Revenue Fund, after reserving therein the then current Operating Reserve, and an amount equal to the next ensuing payment to the Debt Service Fund, Debt Service Reserve Fund and Replacement and Improvement Fund, may be used for any purpose of the University for which such funds may be lawfully used.

The Debt Service Fund is pledged to and shall be used by the Trustee for the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds, and until required for such purposes, shall be invested by the Trustee in such Permitted Investments, as the President or the Vice President, Business and Finance of the University shall direct in writing addressed to the Trustee, which writing shall determine that the maturity, or first date of redemption at the option of the holder, of the respective obligations is not later than the date on which such funds will be required for payment of such principal and interest. The Trustee shall transfer from the Debt Service Fund to the Paying Agents amounts sufficient to enable said Paying Agents to pay when due principal and interest on the Bonds, or the Trustee shall make such credit arrangements with said Paying Agents as to permit such payments.

The Debt Service Reserve Fund is pledged to, and shall be used by the Trustee for, the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds if other available funds are insufficient for that purpose, and, to the extent herein provided, for the purchase or redemption of Bonds. Until required for such purposes, moneys therein shall be invested by the Trustee in such Permitted Investments as the President or the Vice President, Business and Finance, of the University shall direct in writing, which obligations shall mature, or be redeemable at the option of the holder, in not more than ten years from the date of investment. The Trustee shall transfer from the Debt Service Reserve Fund to the Debt Service Fund such amounts as are necessary in addition to amounts available in the Debt Service Fund, including funds transferred from the Replacement and Improvement Fund, to pay when due the principal and interest on the Bonds.

Any amounts in the Debt Service Reserve Fund in excess of the required reserve provided for in Paragraph Second above may be used to purchase Bonds for cancellation or to redeem Bonds then subject to redemption to the extent and in the manner from time to time requested in writing by the President or the Vice President, Business and Finance, of the University. The purchase price of Bonds purchased for cancellation shall not exceed their then prevailing call price, if any, nor exceed their fair market value. In determining such excess over the required reserve, the required reserve shall be determined on the basis of only those Bonds to be outstanding after the redemption or purchase for cancellation of the Bonds to be redeemed or purchased with such excess.

The Replacement and Improvement Fund is irrevocably pledged to, and shall be used by the University to improve, remodel, renovate, re-equip, or make replacements or additions to or extraordinary repairs of Pledged Facilities or to acquire sites for or construct or equip additional Pledged Facilities or for the retirement of Bonds by purchase or redemption or for payment of the principal and interest by transfer to the Debt Service Fund as herein provided.

G. Bond Resolution for Parking System Revenue Bonds (continued)

The University shall transfer from the Replacement and Improvement Fund to the Debt Service Fund such amounts as are from time to time necessary, in addition to the other amounts available in the Debt Service Fund and without use of the Debt Service Reserve Fund, to provide for the payment, when due, of the principal and interest on the Bonds. Until required for such purposes, the Replacement and Improvement Fund may be invested by the President or the Vice President, Business and Finance, of the University in Permitted Investments maturing or redeemable at the option of the holder not more than ten years from the date of investment.

The Vice President, Business and Finance, may invest amounts in the Revenue Fund in Permitted Investments, provided that the amounts and maturities of such investments shall always be such as to keep available in the Revenue Fund sufficient moneys for payment of Operating and Maintenance Expenses and for the deposits provided above at the times needed for such purposes.

Investments, including the interest and other earnings and proceeds of sale thereof, of any amounts in a Special Fund shall be added to that particular Fund and used for the purposes of such Fund; provided, however, that income from investments of the Debt Service Reserve Fund, up to the amount of such Fund in excess of the required reserve therein, may at the option of the University be transferred at any time to the Debt Service Fund in anticipation of interest and principal on the Bonds to become due on future interest and principal payment dates. Such transfers shall be made by the Trustee upon the written directions of the President or Vice President, Business and Finance of the University.

Investments of amounts in the Debt Service Fund and the Debt Service Reserve Fund shall be sold, exchanged or collected from time to time as directed by the President or the Vice President, Business and Finance, of the University, and the Trustee shall be under no liability and have no responsibility in connection with such investment, or the sale, exchange or collection thereof, provided the directions of the officer acting are followed. Investments of moneys in Special Funds shall be valued at their face value amount or market value, whichever is lower.

Section 6. Additional Bonds. (a) The University shall have the right from to time to issue Additional Bonds if necessary to pay the costs of completing the Project or any projects for which Additional Bonds are issued. The Trustee shall authenticate and deliver such Bonds upon (but only upon) receipt of such documents as are required by the Trust Agreement. Nothing herein or in the Trust Agreement shall require any earnings coverage, or certificate with respect thereto, in connection with Additional Bonds issued for completion of a project.

(b) The University shall also have the right from time to time to issue Additional Bonds to provide funds for purposes authorized by Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio in connection with the parking of motor vehicles and the financing thereof. The Trustee shall authenticate and deliver Additional Bonds under this subdivision (b) upon (but only upon) receipt of the

G. Bond Resolution for Parking System Revenue Bonds (continued)

documents required by the Trust Agreement and also a certificate of the President and the Vice President, Business and Finance, of the University (1) showing that the Net Income Available for Debt Service (as defined in Section 10 hereof) is equal to or greater than one and twenty one-hundredths (1.20) times the maximum amount payable into the Debt Service Fund in any succeeding year on account of all the Bonds then outstanding hereunder and on the Bonds then to be authenticated and delivered, less any Bonds, or portion of fully registered bonds, which are to be redeemed or retired with the proceeds of such Additional Bonds, or with the proceeds of Additional Bonds theretofore issued, or issued concurrently with issuance of such new Additional Bonds; (2) showing that there were not included in such Net Income Available for Debt Service any receipts against which there is any prior claim other than the use thereof for the Operating and Maintenance Expenses of the Pledged Facilities; and (3) furnishing such other information in support of the foregoing as may reasonably be requested by the Trustee.

The resolution authorizing such Additional Bonds shall contain such provisions as to Fund deposits and other covenants as shall be consistent with the terms of this Resolution relating to all Bonds, shall not permit redemption of such Additional Bonds earlier than the first redemption date of Bonds then outstanding, and shall provide for deposit of the proceeds of sale thereof in the appropriate Special Funds in a manner satisfactory to the Trustee to assure the use thereof for authorized purposes. Additional Bonds shall have maturities, interest rates, redemption provisions, denominations, and other provisions as provided in the resolution or resolutions authorizing their issuance or sale, provided, however, that such terms and provisions shall not be inconsistent with this Resolution, the Trust Agreement or the then outstanding Bonds. Additional Bonds shall be payable from the Debt Service Fund and other Special Funds established by Section 5 of this Resolution, as provided in this Resolution, and secured by a pledge of the Pledged Receipts on a parity with the Series A Bonds and other Additional Bonds.

Section 7. Terms of All Bonds. All Bonds shall bear such designations as may be necessary to distinguish them from other series of Bonds having different provisions. All Bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States, shall be in coupon form registrable as to principal or in fully registered form as provided in the resolution authorizing them or in the Trust Agreement, shall be negotiable instruments and shall express on their face the purpose for which they are issued and that they are issued pursuant to Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio, this Resolution and the resolution authorizing their issuance.

The Bonds and coupons shall be executed in the manner provided in the resolution authorizing their issuance or in the manner provided by the law in effect at the time of their issuance. In case any officer whose signature or a facsimile of whose signature shall appear on any Bonds or Coupons shall cease to be such officer before the issuance, authentication or delivery of such Bonds or Coupons, such signature or such facsimile shall nevertheless be valid and sufficient for all purposes, the same as if he had remained in office until that time.

G. Bond Resolution for Parking System Revenue Bonds (continued)

Notice of redemption of Bonds, specifying the designation and numbers (and portions of fully registered Bonds) to be called, shall be published by the Trustee on behalf of the University once a week for two consecutive weeks in a financial journal of national circulation, the first such publication to be not more than forty (40) days and not less than thirty (30) days prior to the redemption date. Any Bonds duly called for redemption and for the retirement of which funds are deposited with the Trustee in an amount equal to the principal, premium if any, and interest to redemption date, shall cease to bear interest from said redemption date and shall no longer be deemed to be outstanding. Moneys in any Special Fund which are available for such redemption and which the Trustee shall have been directed to set aside for redemption by Resolution of the Board, a certified copy of which shall have been deposited with the Trustee, shall thereupon be deemed to be deposited with the Trustee for such redemption.

As provided herein, the Bonds shall be equally and ratably payable from, and secured by, a pledge of the Pledged Receipts after provision for the Operating and Maintenance Expenses of the Pledged Facilities, and anything in this Resolution, the Bonds or the Trust Agreement to the contrary not-withstanding, neither this Resolution, the Bonds, nor the Trust Agreement shall be a claim against or a lien upon any property of the State of Ohio or any property of or under the control of the Board except the Pledged Receipts, and neither the State of Ohio nor the Board shall be obligated to pay or provide for payment thereof from any funds except such Pledged Receipts, after provision for such Operating and Maintenance Expenses, provided, however, that nothing herein shall be deemed to prohibit the University, of its own volition, from using to the extent it is lawfully authorized to do so, any of its other resources or revenues for the fulfillment of any of the terms, conditions or obligations of the Trust Agreement, this Resolution or any of the Bonds.

Section 8. Covenants of the University. The University covenants with the holders of the Bonds and with the Trustee under the Trust Agreement that (a) it will fix and adjust the rates, charges and fees comprising the Pledged Receipts, so that the receipts from the Pledged Receipts will be sufficient to pay the Operating and Maintenance Expenses of the Pledged Facilities and provide for the payment of the principal and interest on the Bonds and other payments to Special Funds required by Section 5 of this Resolution; (b) if it shall reduce the number of parking spaces comprising the Pledged Facilities or change the location thereof, it will at the same time provide for the replacement of any Pledged Receipts lost thereby by adding other parking spaces or by increasing or adjusting rates; provided, however, that such addition of parking spaces or increase or adjustment of rates will be required only if and to the extent necessary to maintain Pledged Receipts, after deducting Operating and Maintenance Expenses, at an amount at least sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the Bonds and other payments to Special Funds required by Section 5 of this Resolution; (c) it will cause the Project, and any project work, or acquisition, the costs of which are to be paid from the proceeds of Additional Bonds, to be completed and equipped in an efficient and economical manner with reasonable dispatch, in compliance with all applicable laws, ordinances and regulations, and, if substantial construction is involved,

G. Bond Resolution for Parking System Revenue Bonds (continued)

in a manner consistent with the plans and recommendations of responsible architects and engineers; (d) subject to the right of abandonment under conditions provided in the Trust Agreement designed to prevent adverse effect of such abandonment on the expected earnings coverage of Debt Service, it will, from the Pledged Receipts and as part of the Operating and Maintenance Expenses of the Pledged Facilities, maintain, preserve and keep the Pledged Facilities in good repair, working order and operating condition, and will apply the Pledged Receipts only as provided in Section 5 of this Resolution and in the Trust Agreement; (e) if requested in writing by the Trustee or Original Purchaser, it will furnish to the Trustee and the Original Purchaser of the Bonds within 120 days after the close of each fiscal year an annual report of the accounts (including each Special Fund provided for in Section 5 of this Resolution) and operations of the Pledged Facilities prepared by a qualified accounting firm operating generally throughout the United States. having a national reputation and approved by the Trustee; (f) it will keep proper books of record and accounts separate from all other records and accounts, in which complete and correct entries will be made of all transactions relating to the Pledged Facilities and will at all reasonable times permit the Trustee, the Original Purchaser or any holder or holders of 25% of the outstanding Bonds, or their authorized representatives, to inspect the Pledged Facilities and any books, documents, and vouchers relating thereto; (g) it will furnish heat, light, power, water and other necessary services to the Pledged Facilities at not in excess of reasonable cost; (h) it will insure the Pledged Facilities as required by the Trust Agreement and apply the proceeds of such insurance as provided therein; and (i) it will observe and perform all of its agreements and obligations provided for by the Bonds, the Trust Agreement or this Resolution.

Section 9. Trust Agreement. In order to better secure the payment of the principal and interest on the Bonds, the President of the University and the Chairman of the Board, or either of them, are authorized to execute, acknowledge and deliver, as may be appropriate, a Trust Agreement in substantially the form to be approved by the Board in the Resolution of Award, and the Secretary of the Board and the Treasurer of the University, or either of them, are authorized to seal and attest the same, with such changes therein as are consistent with this Resolution and the Resolution of Award and as may be satisfactory to the officers executing same, the Trustee and the Original Purchaser of the Series A Bonds.

Section 10. <u>Definitions</u>. Where the context permits, the following terms as used in this Resolution or in the Trust Agreement shall have the following meanings:

- (1) "Additional Bonds" shall mean Bonds issued pursuant to Section 6 of this Resolution in addition to and on a parity with the Series A Bonds, and "Bonds" shall mean the Series A Bonds and Additional Bonds.
- (2) "Agreement" or "Trust Agreement" shall refer to the Trust Agreement hereinbefore authorized as from time to time supplemented pursuant to its terms.

 - (3) "Costs of the Project" shall have the meaning set forth in Section 4 hereof.
 - (4) "Pledged Facilities" shall mean all buildings, structures or facilities, including the sites thereof, equipment related thereto and curb parking facilities on the Columbus Campus of the University, now or hereafter constructed, acquired or operated by or under the control of the University and used in connection with the parking of motor vehicles and authorized to be acquired, constructed, leased, equipped, improved, remodeled, repaired or renovated by Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio.
 - (5) "Pledged Receipts" shall mean the gross revenues derived by the University from the operation or ownership of the Pledged Facilities, including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, all motor vehicle parking permit fees and all other fees, charges or receipts assessed, levied or collected by the University for the use of, or right to use, the Pledged Facilities, and charges made upon the Athletic Department and other departments or operations of the University and to organizations, groups or persons for use of, or right to use, the Pledged Facilities in connection with their athletic contests or other activities and functions, provided that such charges made upon the Athletic Department and other departments or operations of the University shall not exceed the remaining amount of fee allocations, revenues and receipts of such department or operation derived from its activities conducted in connection with such use or right to use the Pledged Facilities, and which the University can lawfully pledge to the security of the Bonds under the Ohio Revised Code, after paying all other costs and expenses of such activities. "Pledged Receipts" shall not include fines assessed for violations of parking or traffic regulations of the University, nor receipts of the Athletic Department and other departments or operations of the University derived from their use of Pledged Facilities for which use a charge upon such department or operation has been made as aforesaid and is included in the Pledged Receipts. "Pledged Receipts" shall also include such new or additional fees, charges, revenues or receipts of the University as the University shall hereafter lawfully pledge hereunder to secure all Bonds in connection with the issuance of Additional Bonds.
 - (6) "Operating and Maintenance Expenses" of the Pledged Facilities shall mean all ordinary and usual reasonable expenditures of the University for the operation, repair, and maintenance of the Pledged Facilities and ordinary replacements of old, damaged, worn out, lost or destroyed equipment, furniture and furnishings including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, expenditures, including rentals or rental charges under lease-purchase agreements, for the acquisition of parking meters, rent paid by the University for any parking facilities operated by the University, taxes, if any, insurance, cost of maintenance and repair of meters, cost of maintaining and replacing signs and markers for curb parking, cost of administering the Pledged Facilities and expenses incurred by the University under any agreement whereby the University leases any Pledged Facilities to a parking operator or causes a parking operator to manage them, salaries paid by the University to supervisory personnel employed by the University to the extent allocable to

G. Bond Resolution for Parking System Revenue Bonds (continued)

time devoted to the administration of the Pledged Facilities, and costs of enforcement of parking regulations, taxes, fees, and expenses of the Trustee and paying agents and any expenses required to be paid by this Resolution or the Trust Agreement; but excluding provision or expenditure for depreciation or extraordinary capital replacements or expenditures for administration of the University which do not constitute costs of the type included as costs of operation of Pledged Facilities under the present accounting practice of the University or payments to the Debt Service Fund and Debt Service Reserve Fund.

- (7) "Net Income Available for Debt Service" shall mean (a) the Pledged Receipts, less the Operating and Maintenance Expenses of the Pledged Facilities, during the preceding Fiscal Year as adjusted to reflect the schedule of fees, rates and charges placed in effect since the beginning of said preceding Fiscal Year or to be effective at the beginning of the next semester, quarter or other school period, to reflect the addition of facilities to the Pledged Facilities and any new fees, charges, revenues or receipts lawfully pledged by the Board for inclusion with other Pledged Receipts, to give recognition to anticipated changes in Operating and Maintenance Expenses of the Pledged Facilities, and to eliminate net income from any Pledged Facilities as to which estimated income is included under clauses (b) or (c) of this paragraph (7); plus (b) the estimated annual net income of any Pledged Facilities which are then under construction or for which a full fiscal year's operating experience is not available; plus (c) the estimated annual net income of any Pledged Facilities the cost of which is to be financed in whole or in part by the sale of the Additional Bonds for which the calculation of Net Income Available for Debt Service is then being made; plus (d) the income from investments of the Debt Service Reserve Fund during the preceding Fiscal Year to the extent that the same could have been transferred to the Debt Service Fund at the option of the University pursuant to Section 5 of this Resolution. The "estimated annual net income of any Pledged Facilities," as that term is used in this paragraph (7), means the estimated gross revenues to be derived by the University from the operation or ownership of such Pledged Facilities, less the estimated annual Operating and Maintenance Expenses allocable thereto, in the first full Fiscal Year of operation thereof, and, if such be the case, shall be applied as a negative figure in making the computation under this paragraph.
- (8) "Special Funds" shall mean the Revenue Fund, Debt Service Fund, the Debt Service Reserve Fund and the Replacement and Improvement Fund provided for in this Resolution, and, to the extent applicable, the Construction Fund provided herein and the construction funds created for projects or work to be financed with Additional Bonds.
- (9) "Permitted Investments" shall mean (a) obligations of the United States of America, or securities fully guaranteed as to principal and interest thereby; (b) certificates of deposit of the Trustee, and of banks or trust companies organized under the laws of the United States or Canada or any state or province thereof which have combined capital and surplus of at least \$100,000,000; (c) shares or accounts of savings and loan associations, the accounts of which are

insured by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation; (d) obligations issued by banks for cooperatives, Federal land banks, Federal intermediate credit banks, Federal home loan banks, the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, or any corporation designated in section 846 of Title 31 of the United States Code as a wholly owned Government corporation; and obligations, participations, or other instruments of or issued by, or fully guaranteed as to principal and interest by, the Federal National Mortgage Association; and (e) participation certificates evidencing beneficial interests in obligations, or in the right to receive interest and principal collections therefrom, which obligations have been subjected by one or more Government agencies to a trust or trusts for which any executive department, agency, or instrumentality of the United States (or the head thereof) has been named to act as trustee.

- (10) "Resolution of Award" shall mean the resolution of the Board approving the award of the Series A Bonds to the Original Purchaser as provided for in Section 3 hereof.
 - (11) "Trustee" refers to the Trustee under the Trust Agreement.
- (12) "Original Purchaser" shall mean the original purchaser of the Series A Bonds and additionally, where the term is used in connection with all Bonds, the original purchasers of Additional Bonds.

Section 11. General. The appropriate officers of the University and the Board, and each of them, the architects and engineers employed by the University, and the Trustee and the Paying Agents, are authorized and directed to do all things necessary or proper to carry out the terms and provisions of this Resolution and the Trust Agreement, and to effect the execution, sale, and delivery of said Project Bonds in accordance therewith. The obligations imposed upon the University under this Resolution or the Trust Agreement are established as duties specifically enjoined upon the University, the Board and the officials of the University by law and resulting from their respective offices, trusts or stations within the meaning of Section 2731.01 of the Revised Code of Ohio. In case any one or more of the covenants, stipulations, obligations, agreements or other provisions of or contained in this Resolution, the Trust Agreement or the Bonds or coupons shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provision thereof, but this Resolution, the Trust Agreement, Bonds and coupons shall be construed and enforced as if such provision, to the extent invalid or illegal, were not contained therein, and each such covenant, stipulation, obligation, agreement or other provision shall be deemed to be made and entered into in the manner and to the full extent permitted by law to accomplish most nearly the intention thereof.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Jones, the foregoing resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

H. Appropriations for University Administrative Officials

Mr. France moved that the amounts to be appropriated from the unrestricted interest on endowment funds in the University Treasury to certain principal administrative officers of the University for the purpose of carrying out their administrative responsibilities during the fiscal year 1966-67 be on the same basis as the appropriations for 1965-66: (1) to the President, \$7,500.00; (2) to each of the persons holding the following titles, \$1,000.00 - Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost of the University; Vice President for Business and Finance; Vice President for Research; Vice President for Educational Services; Executive Dean for Student Relations; Executive Dean for Admissions and Registrations; Executive Director for Campus Planning; Executive Director for University Relations; and (3) an additional amount of \$1,000.00 to be allocated at the discretion of the President for such costs as may be incurred by the administrative officers as they, by direction, further the fiscal progress of the University.

The above motion was seconded by Mr. Jones and unanimously approved with Mr. Shocknessy not voting.

I. Report on Highlights of Campus Activities

President Fawcett reported to the Board on some of the significant activities of the University during recent weeks. Some references included in the Report, which is filed with the official records of the Secretary, were as follows:

- The University's growing role in graduate education was reflected in the record number of Ph. D. degrees awarded at Summer Quarter Commencement on September 2, 1966. A total of 167 candidates, more than at any previous Ohio State Commencement, received their Ph. D.'s during the exercises. The largest number previously was 135, conferred in the summer of 1964. In addition, 532 candidates received master's degrees.
- A report on "Teacher Productivity--1965" by a department of the National Education Association showed that Ohio State was the fifth-largest producer of new teachers in the United States in 1965 and was a leading graduate center.
- 3. A committee appointed to review the fate of University Hall met on August 24, 1966. The committee represents faculty, students, alumni and outside interests and is composed of Dean Richard Armitage, Chairman; Professor Marvin Fox, Department of Philosophy; Professor Harold J. Grimm, Department of History; Mr. Howard Hamilton, Past President of the Alumni Association; Mr. W. Byron Ireland, Architect; Mr. Edward E. Slowter, Battelle Memorial Institute; Paul Baumann, undergraduate student of the College of Engineering; and Boyd Brislow, graduate student.

- I. Report on Highlights of Campus Activities (continued)
 - 4. More than 200 of the State of Ohio's top administrators, including members of the Governor's Cabinet, will participate during the next several months in an intensive management training program seminar administered by the Continuing Education Division of the College of Commerce and Administration and financially supported by the Federal Government and the Department of Finance.
 - 5. A report from the University's Telecommunications Center showed that on the campus and in the Columbus Branch during the academic year 1965-1966, closed-circuit televising of 14 different courses reached 28, 317 students.
 - 6. The Ohio Medical Education Network has been named first-prize winner for creativity by the National University Extension Association's division of conferences and seminars. Via two-way radio and telephone, the Ohio Medical Education Network connects the College of Medicine faculty with medical staffs of hospitals in Ohio and West Virginia. More than 50 hospitals participated during the past year. The project began in 1962.

THIS FOURTH SUPPLEMENTAL TRUST AGREEMENT, dated as of the 15th day of April, 1967 (herein called the "Supplement"), by and between The Ohio State University and its Board of Trustees (herein called the "University"), a state university of Ohio, and The Ohio National Bank of Columbus, Columbus, Ohio (herein called the "Trustee"), a corporation duly organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the United States, as Trustee under the Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 hereinafter mentioned.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the University, pursuant to the Original Bond Resolution passed April 8, 1957, entered into a Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 with the Trustee and as of April 15, 1958, October 15, 1959, and April 15, 1961, respectively, entered into First, Second and Third Supplemental Trust Agreements (which original trust agreement, as so supplemented thereby and hereby is herein called the "Trust Agreement") under which \$21,060,000 Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G and H Dormitory Revenue Bonds have been authorized and issued and under which additional bonds (herein called "Additional Bonds") are issuable on a parity with the said Bonds and other Additional Bonds hereafter issued under certain conditions as provided in the Trust Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the University has in all respects complied with the provisions of the Trust Agreement so as to be entitled to execute and to have authenticated and delivered by the Trustee \$14,000,000 Additional Bonds, consisting of \$10,500,000 Series I Bonds and \$3,500,000 Series J Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the University further desires by this Supplement to provide for the issuance under the Trust Agreement of said \$14,000,000 of Additional Bonds (herein called the Series I and J Bonds); and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the University has duly adopted on September 8, 1966, the Series I and J Bond Resolution providing for the Series I and J Bonds and this Supplement, which resolution, collectively with the Original Bond Resolution, the Series C and D Bond Resolution adopted July 8, 1960 and the Series E, F and G Bond Resolution adopted June 15, 1962, is referred to as the Bond Resolution; and

WHEREAS, the Series I and J Bond Resolution is as follows:

Resolution

Providing for the issuance of \$14,000,000 The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Bonds, Series I and J, as Additional Parity Bonds pursuant to Bond Resolution adopted April 8, 1957 and Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957, for the purpose of constructing and equipping Drackett, Jones and Taylor Towers, Archer, Dennis, Houck and Nosker Houses, and Northeast Dining Facility.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University (herein called the Board) is vested with the government of The Ohio State University (herein called the University or, when the context admits, collectively with the Board called the University) by Section 3335.03 of said Revised Code, and as such Board, of suing and being sued, contracting and being contracted with, and of making and using a common seal and, under Section 3335.10 of said Revised Code, has general supervision of all land, buildings and other property of the University and control of all expenses therefor; and

WHEREAS, by authority of Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, the Board is authorized to construct, equip, maintain and operate upon sites within, or in close proximity to, the campus of the University, buildings to be used as dormitories and as other suitable living quarters, or as dining halls, for students and members of the faculty and servants and wives and families of married students of said University (including all separate or connected buildings, sites, equipment, structures and utilities to be used in connection with the maintenance or operation of, or in any way supplementing or related to the services of facilities to be provided by such buildings) and to pay

for the same out of funds in its possession derived from operation of any such buildings under its control or out of funds borrowed therefor and to borrow funds for such purpose upon such terms as said Board may deem proper and issue notes or other written instruments evidencing such indebtedness provided that such indebtedness shall not be a claim against or lien upon any property of the State or any property of or under control of said Board excepting such parts of the receipts of the operation of any such buildings under control of the Board as it may pledge to secure the payment of such indebtedness and by authority of said Section 3345.07 the Board is also authorized to issue such notes or other obligations payable as aforesaid in order to retire or refund outstanding notes or other obligations matured or unmatured, to repay moneys previously borrowed or advanced under said section or to reimburse funds of the University for amounts used under said Section 3345.07; and

WHEREAS, the University determined by resolution adopted April 8, 1957
(herein called the Original Bond Resolution and collectively with this resolution, the
Series C and D Bond Resolution adopted July 8, 1960, the Series E, F and G Bond
Resolution adopted June 15, 1962, called the Bond Resolution) to provide for the
issuance of dormitory Revenue Bonds and pursuant to the Trust Agreement dated as
of April 15, 1957 with The Ohio National Bank of Columbus (herein, with the First,
Second, Third, and Fourth Supplements, called the Trust Agreement), to pledge the net
income of all the dormitory facilities, including married student housing and dining
halls, now or hereafter under control of the University pursuant to Ohio Revised Code
Section 3345.07, and to provide in said Trust Agreement for the issuance of such
Bonds (herein called the Bonds) as from time to time authorized subject to the conditions
contained in said Trust Agreement, and by the Original Bond Resolution and the Trust
Agreement provided for the sale of an initial issue of \$12,000,000 consisting of
\$6,000,000 Series A Bonds and \$6,000,000 Series B Bonds (herein called the Series
A and Series B Bonds) and for the issuance from time to time as authorized by the

Board of additional bonds (herein called Additional Bonds) on a parity with said initial issue of which \$2,330,000 Series C Bonds, \$2,030,000 Series D Bonds, \$5,300,000 Series E Bonds, \$1,200,000 Series F Bonds, \$1,350,000 Series G Bonds, and \$2,850,000 Series H Bonds have been authorized and issued, and the unmatured portions of such Series A through H Bonds are presently outstanding; and

WHEREAS, the University has not pledged or encumbered the revenues from its dormitory facilities on a basis equal or prior to the pledges under the Trust Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the University has determined to sell an issue of \$14,000,000 Additional Bonds consisting of \$10,500,000 Series I Bonds and \$3,500,000 Series J Bonds (herein called the Series I Bonds and the Series J Bonds, respectively) all as provided in the Trust Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Board by the adoption of this resolution has determined and confirmed that it is necessary to provide additional dormitory accommodations and dining facilities located on or in close proximity to the campus of the University and, accordingly, hereby declares and determines that it is immediately necessary to construct and equip additional dormitories and dining facilities to be known as Drackett, Jones and Taylor Towers, Archer, Dennis, Houck and Nosker Houses, and Northeast Dining Facility (said dormitory buildings and dining facility and all things incidental thereto being herein referred to as the Project); and

WHEREAS, said Project is to be constructed pursuant to plans approved by the Department of Public Works of Ohio, and prepared by the University Architect; and

WHEREAS, based upon final construction costs, construction contracts and estimates received from its architect, the University has determined that the costs of the Project will be \$14,000,000, including capitalized interest, miscellaneous expense and contingencies; and

WHEREAS, the University has determined to borrow the funds to pay the foregoing costs, and to advertise for bids, subject to the terms of any loan agreement that might be entered into with the United States with respect to the Series J Bonds (hereinafter called the Loan Agreement), for the purchase of \$14,000,000 Dormitory Revenue Bonds, Series I and J, by investment bankers or others.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University.

Section 1. Purpose of Series I and J Bonds. It is hereby determined to be necessary to construct the Project and to issue \$14,000,000 of Dormitory Revenue Bonds of the University pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio and the Trust Agreement for the purpose of paying the costs of the Project and of all things incidental thereto or incidental to the financing thereof, including repayment of moneys previously borrowed or advanced for the Project or restoring amounts used for the Project from other funds of the University available for such purposes.

Revenue Bonds shall be issued as \$10,500,000 Series I Bonds and \$3,500,000 Series J Bonds under this Resolution, the Original Bond Resolution, and the Trust Agreement, and shall be entitled "The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Bonds", shall be initially issued in coupon or fully registered form as may be requested by the Original Purchaser and shall be exchangeable for fully registered or coupon bonds in the manner and on the terms provided by the Trust Agreement. Series I and J Bonds in coupon form shall be dated as of the first day of the month in which bids for the purchase thereof are opened, and shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 each and registrable as to principal. Series I and J Bonds in fully registered form shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 or any multiple thereof. Such bonds in both coupon and fully registered form shall be numbered as determined by the Fiscal Officer of the University. Each Series I and J Bond in fully registered form without coupons shall be dated as of the interest payment date on which it is authenticated or on the interest date next preceding the

date of its authentication or as of the same date as the coupon bonds if authenticated prior to the first interest payment date, provided, however, if at the time of authentication of a registered bond without coupons, interest is in default, such Bond shall be dated as of the date to which interest has been paid. Notwithstanding the foregoing, in the event that the United States shall purchase any of such bonds pursuant to a Loan Agreement, until such time as the Original Purchaser or Purchasers request definitive bonds a single multiple maturity fully registered bond without coupons will be issued to him in the amount contracted for and thereafter at his request the University will, at its expense and within ninety days from such request, issue to him in exchange therefor definitive bonds, as aforesaid, in aggregate principal amount equal to the unpaid principal of such single bond. The Series I and J Bonds shall bear interest payable semi-annually on April fifteenth and October fifteenth of each year, beginning with the first such date occurring at least six months following the date of the coupon Bonds, until the principal sum is paid at the rate or rates per annum stipulated in the bid of the successful bidders, and approved in writing by the President or Fiscal Officer of the University provided that no such rate shall exceed 6% per annum. The Series I and J Bonds shall mature annually on October fifteenth in the years and amounts per year as follows:

The Series I and J Bonds maturing on and after October 15, 1978 shall be subject to redemption in whole or in part on any interest payment date on and after October 15, 1977, at redemption prices equal to the following percentages of the principal amount redeemed, plus accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption, to wit:

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104% if redeemed on or before October 15, 1982;
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If less than the entire unmatured portion of the Series I Bonds or the Series J Bonds is called for redemption at any time or from time to time, they shall be called in inverse order of maturity of the Bonds of that series; outstanding and if less than all of the Series I Bonds or the Series J Bonds outstanding of one maturity are to be called, the selection of Bonds or portions of fully registered Bonds of such series and of that maturity to be called shall be made by lot conducted by the Trustee under the Trust Agreement. Such call for redemption shall be made by notice specifying the numbers, and portions of registered bonds, of the Series I or Series J Bonds to be called, published by the Trustee on behalf of the University once a week for two consecutive weeks in a financial newspaper of national circulation published in the English language in New York City and in an English language newspaper of general circulation in Columbus, Ohio, the first publication to be not less than thirty (30) days

prior to the date of redemption. Any bonds thus called for redemption and for the retirement of which funds are deposited with said Trustee as provided in the Trust Agreement on or before the redemption date shall cease to bear interest on said redemption rate. A registered bond shall have prepayment provisions consistent with the redemption rights relating to coupon bonds which it replaces.

Subject to the terms of the Loan Agreement, the principal and interest of the Series I and J Bonds shall be payable in any coin or currency which, on the respective dates of payment, is legal tender for the payment of debts due the United States of America, at the principal office of the Trustee under the Trust Agreement (presently, The Ohio National Bank of Columbus, Columbus, Ohio), or, at the option of the holder, at the principal corporate trust office of the United States Trust Company of New York, in the Borough of Manhattan, City and State of New York except that interest on fully registered bonds is payable by check as provided in the Trust Agreement, and principal on fully Registered Bonds may also be payable at such additional place or places, at the option of the holder as shall be designated by the Fiscal Officer of the University.

The Series I and J Bonds shall have such other terms and conditions and shall be issued, executed and delivered as provided by the applicable provisions of the Trust Agreement, and of or pursuant to the Loan Agreement.

Section 3. Sale of Series I and J Bonds. The Series I and J Bonds shall be offered for sale, by solicitation of proposals from investment bankers and others or by advertisement or both, to the highest bidder based on the lowest net interest cost, in such manner and on such terms as determined by the President or the Fiscal Officer of the University, subject, however, to all applicable provisions of the Loan Agreement.

Section 4. Allocation of Proceeds of Series I and Series J Bonds. The proceeds from the sale of Series I and Series J Bonds shall be allocated and applied by the University as follows:

- (1) The portion representing accrued interest to the Debt
 Service Fund provided for in the original Trust Agreement to be
 held by the Trustee, and the portion representing premium above
 par paid to the University for such Bonds, to the Debt Service
 Reserve Fund so provided for.
- (2) From the proceeds of the Series I Bonds, such amount as is verified by the Fiscal Officer of the University to be needed for (or to reimburse the University for amounts expended for) the following purposes:
 - (a) the purchase of movable equipment for the Project,
 - (b) to place the Project in operation, and
 - (c) for any other purpose relating to the Project or the financing thereof for which the proceeds of the Series J Bonds would not be available

to the "Equipment Fund" hereby established to be held by the Trustee and applied to such purposes, and any balance in the Equipment Fund not needed for such purposes shall be transferred to the Construction Fund.

- (3) To the University the amounts necessary to reimburse the University for amounts expended by it on construction of the Project prior to issuance of the Series I and J Bonds.
- (4) The balance to the Construction Fund to be held by the Trustee to pay the costs of construction of the Project and all incidental expenses of the Project and the financing thereof (including in accordance with the Loan Agreement the repayment of any amounts borrowed by the University to pay project costs and interest thereon).

(5) Any balance remaining in the Construction Fund after payment of such costs, shall be applied as follows: (a) twenty-five per centum to retirement at par plus accrued interest in inverse order of maturity of Series J Bonds, if any, then held by the United States and (b) the portion not needed for such retirement of Series J Bonds under (a) shall be transferred to the Debt Service Reserve Fund.

No part of the proceeds of Series J Bonds sold to the United States acting through the Department of Housing and Urban Development shall be used to pay costs (including cost of movable equipment or fees of a financial advisor) which, under the rules, regulations or practices of the Department of Housing and Urban Development, may not be paid from proceeds of bonds purchased by the United States through that Department, and proceeds of Series J Bonds purchased by the United States as aforesaid shall be segregated in the Construction Fund to the extent necessary to effect the foregoing and none of the funds in the Construction Fund shall be applied in any manner contrary to the Loan Agreement.

The Trustee shall apply said Construction Fund and Equipment Fund to the payment of such items as from time to time are requested in writing by the Fiscal Officer of the University. Such written request shall include a certification by such official that the amount to be paid from such Construction Fund or such Equipment Fund constitutes authorized payments from said fund under the foregoing provisions of this Section 4. If the payment is to be made with respect to an obligation under a construction contract relating to the Project, such written request shall further certify that such payment was certified as due under such contract by a qualified architect or engineer.

The Equipment Fund and the Construction Fund shall be invested by the

Trustee in such direct obligations of the United States as shall be directed in writing

by the President or the Fiscal Officer of the University, which writing shall designate maturities and amounts which, as nearly as practicable, would, through maturities, provide funds when needed to pay costs for which the respective funds have been established. Such investments and the proceeds of sale thereof shall constitute part of the fund from which the investment was made. Interest on such investments may be paid to the Dormitory Revenue Fund or applied to the purposes of the fund from which the said investments shall be sold, exchanged or collected from time to time as directed in writing by the President or the Fiscal Officer of the University and the Trustee shall be under no liability in connection with such investment, sale, exchange or collection thereof provided the directions of said officers are followed. No direction shall be made to invest the Construction Fund except as permitted by the Loan Agreement.

Section 5. Additional Bonds. (a) The Board shall have the right from time to time to issue Additional Bonds under the Trust Agreement if necessary to pay the costs of completing the Project or completing any projects for which Additional Bonds are issued. The Trustee shall authenticate and deliver such Bonds upon (but only upon) receipt of the documents required by Section 2.03 of the Trust Agreement. Nothing herein or in the Trust Agreement shall require any earnings coverage, or certificate with respect thereto, in connection with Additional Bonds issued for completion of a project.

(b) The Board shall also have the right from time to time to issue Additional Bonds under the Trust Agreement to provide funds for purposes authorized by Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, including construction and equipment by the University of buildings to be used as dormitories or as other living quarters or the refunding of outstanding bonds or notes issued under said Section 3345.07. The Trustee shall authenticate and deliver under the Trust Agreement Additional Bonds issued under this subdivision (b) if, (but only if), when such Additional Bonds

are issued, the University shall have furnished to the Trustee in addition to the documents required by Section 2.03 of the Trust Agreement, a certificate of the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University, approved by the Board of Trustees, (1) showing that (a) the actual net income from the dormitory facilities of the University (excluding net income from any dormitory facility which is to be abandoned or which is not suitable for continuous use as a dormitory facility for the term of such Additional Bonds) for the preceding fiscal year, as adjusted, if necessary, to reflect the schedule of rates and charges to become effective at the beginning of the next semester, quarter or other school period and to give recognition to any anticipated changes in operating costs; plus (b) the estimated annual net income of the dormitory facilities to be financed through the proceeds of the sale of such Additional Bonds will be equal to or greater than one and threetenths (1.3) times the maximum amount to become due in any succeeding fiscal year for the payment of principal and interest charges on the Bonds then outstanding hereunder and on the Bonds then to be authenticated and delivered; (2) showing that, until the dormitory facility being constructed from the proceeds of the Additional Bonds, is ready for occupancy, funds then available from net income, bond proceeds, gifts, legacies, devises or grants or other sources for payment when due of principal and interest on the Bonds will be at least one and three-tenths (1.3) times the principal and interest requirements for that period; (3) showing that there were not included in net income any receipts against which there is any prior claim other than the use thereof for the operating expenses included in computing the net income; (4) furnishing such other information in support of the foregoing as may reasonably be requested by the Trustee; (5) showing that the computations of estimates provided for above are based on an assumed occupancy of not more than 95% of capacity of the dormitory facilities in question.

The first call date on Additional Bonds shall not be earlier than the first call date on any issue of Bonds outstanding at the time of issue of such Additional Bonds.

Section 6. Terms of the Bonds Generally. As used in this Resolution, the term "Bonds" refers to the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I and J Bonds and all Additional Bonds issued on a parity therewith under the Trust Agreement. The Bonds shall be designated The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Bonds, shall be payable in any coin or currency which, on the respective dates of payment, is legal tender for the payment of debts due the United States of America, shall have all the incidents of negotiable instruments under the laws of Ohio, shall express upon their face the purpose for which they are issued, and shall be issued pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio. Unless otherwise provided by the Board, the Bonds shall be signed by the Chairman of the Board or bear his facsimile signature, shall be signed by the President of the University or bear his facsimile signature, shall be attested by the Secretary of the Board or by the Vice President, Business and Finance of the University, and shall be sealed with the seal of the University or a facsimile thereof, and interest coupons attached to the Bonds shall bear the facsimile signature of the Secretary of the Board or of the Vice President, Business and Finance of the University. In case any officer whose signature or a facsimile of whose signature shall appear on any Bonds or coupons shall cease to be such officer before the delivery of such Bonds, such signature or such facsimile shall nevertheless be valid and sufficient for all purposes, the same as if he had remained in office until such delivery. Except in the case of redemption of Bonds of a particular series from the surplus proceeds of that issue as provided in Section 5 of the Original Bond Resolution, no Bonds of any series may be called unless the same proportion of the outstanding Bonds of each other series, then callable, are called at the same time. The Additional Bonds shall bear such designations

as may be necessary to distinguish them from other Bonds having different provisions and shall have maturities, interest rates, interest payment dates, redemption provisions, denominations, registration provisions, and other provisions as provided in the Resolution providing for issuance of the Additional Bonds, provided, however, that such terms and provisions shall not be inconsistent with this Resolution, the Trust Agreement or the then outstanding Bonds. On the terms provided herein, in the Trust Agreement and in the Bonds, the Bonds shall be equally and ratably payable from and secured by pledge of, the receipts from the operation of all dormitory facilities now or hereafter under control of the Board including the dining facilities constituting a part thereof, after provision for reasonable and proper expenses of operation and maintenance of such facilities; and anything in this Resolution, the Bonds or the Trust Agreement to the contrary notwithstanding, neither this Resolution, the Bonds, nor the Trust Agreement shall be a claim against or a lien upon any property of the State of Ohio or any property of or under the control of the Board except the portion of said receipts pledged as provided herein; provided, however, that nothing herein shall be deemed to prohibit the University, of its own volition, from using, or pledging, to the extent it is lawfully authorized to do so, any of its other resources or revenues for the fulfillment of any of the terms, conditions or obligations of the Trust Agreement, this Resolution, or any of the bonds.

Section 7. Covenants of the University. The University covenants with the holders of the Bonds and with the Trustee under the Trust Agreement that (a) it will adopt and maintain so long as any of the Bonds are outstanding such parietal rules, and charge and collect such rental rates and charges, from time to time, as may be necessary to assure such occupancy and use of, and receipts from, the dormitory facilities as will pay the costs of maintenance and operation and provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds and other payments to Special Funds required by Section 8 of this Resolution; (b) from funds lawfully available, it will cause

the Project and any project to be constructed from the proceeds of Additional Bonds to be completed and equipped in an efficient and economical manner with reasonable dispatch and in a manner consistent with the plans and recommendations of responsible architects and all applicable laws, ordinances and regulations; (c) subject to the right of abandonment under conditions provided in the Trust Agreement designed to prevent adverse effect of such abandonment on the expected earnings coverage of Debt Service, it will, from the dormitory receipts pledged under this resolution and as part of the operating expenses, maintain, preserve and keep the dormitory facilities in good repair, working order and operating condition and continuously operate the same on a revenue producing basis, and will apply the receipts thereform only as provided in Section 8 of this Resolution and in the Trust Agreement; (d) it will furnish to the Trustee and the Original Purchasers of the Bonds within 120 days after the close of each fiscal year an annual report of the accounts (including each Special Fund provided for in Section 8 of this Resolution) and operations of the dormitory facilities prepared by qualified accountants approved by the Trustee; (e) it will keep proper books of record and accounts separate from all other records and accounts, in which complete and correct entries will be made of all transactions relating to the dormitory facilities and will at all reasonable times permit the Trustee, the Original Purchasers or any holder or holders of 25% of the outstanding Bonds, or their authorized representatives, to inspect the dormitory facilities and any books, documents and vouchers relating thereto; (f) it will furnish heat, light, power, water and other necessary services to the dormitory facilities at not in excess of reasonable cost; (g) it will comply with all the terms and conditions of the respective Loan Agreements with the Housing and Home Finance Agency as long as the United States holds any of the Series B, D, F, G and H Bonds: (h) it will insure the dormitory facilities as required by the Trust Agreement and apply the proceeds of such insurance as provided therein; and (i) will observe and perform all its agreements and obligations provided for by the Bonds, the Trust Agreement or the Bond Resolution.

Section 8. Application of Receipts; Special Funds. There was established by the Original Bond Resolution a Special Fund designated "Dormitory Revenue Fund," which fund shall be maintained in a bank account, or invested as herein authorized, in the name of the University separate and distinct from all other funds of the University and subject to the withdrawals and uses herein authorized, is pledged to and charged with the payment of the principal, interest, and premium, if any, on all the Bonds issued under the Trust Agreement.

Under the Original Bond Resolution there shall be maintained in the Dormitory Revenue Fund, as an Operating Reserve, such amount as is from time to time certified by the Fiscal Officer of the University as adequate and necessary for working capital for operation and maintenance of the dormitory facilities; provided, that such Operating Reserve shall not exceed one-fourth of the operating and maintenance expenses of the dormitory facilities for the preceding 12 months.

All receipts from dormitory facilities now or hereafter under the control of the Board, including the dining halls constituting part thereof, shall be deposited in the Dormitory Revenue Fund.

The Dormitory Revenue Fund, including the Operating Reserve, shall be applied to pay when due all reasonable and proper expenses of operation and maintenance (as defined in Section 11) of the dormitory facilities, excluding extraordinary repair and replacement expenses payable from the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund and expenses of or provision for depreciation or capital replacement.

The remainder of the Dormitory Revenue Fund, after retaining therein the then current Operating Reserve and payment of said operation and maintenance expenses then due, shall be applied as provided in the Original Bond Resolution, namely, as follows and in the following order of priority:

First: Into the Debt Service Fund, to be held by the Trustee as a separate fund and used for the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds, the amounts

provided in the Original Bond Resolution and in the Bond Resolutions relating to the Series C, D, E, F, G and H Bonds for payment of principal and interest on the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G and H Bonds and, in addition, (1) on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year an amount equal to the interest due and on the next ensuing interest payment date in that year on the Series I and J Bonds then outstanding; provided, that, the amount so payable on any such date into the Debt Service Fund shall be reduced by the amount then remaining in said Debt Service Fund from the accrued interest and from the funds deposited therein for capitalized interest pursuant to Section 4 of this Resolution; (2) on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year, the equal semi-annual amounts necessary to provide for payment of any principal maturity in that year on the Series I and J Bonds; (3) if Additional Bonds shall be issued under the Trust Agreement, such additional amounts and at such times as specified in the resolution authorizing such Additional Bonds, which amounts shall be not less than necessary to provide in the Debt Service Fund amounts, in addition to the amounts hereinbefore provided for the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I and J Bonds, sufficient to pay in full interest and principal on all Additional Bonds then outstanding, as the same shall become due and payable provided that no payments need be made to the Debt Service Fund so long as the amounts in the Debt Service Fund and Debt Service Reserve Fund aggregate at least the total principal and interest payable on all Bonds then outstanding to the dates of their respective maturities.

Second: Into the Debt Service Reserve Fund, to be held by the Trustee as a separate fund for the payment of principal and interest on, and purchase or redemption of, the Bonds as herein provided, on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year and on such other dates as amounts are payable into the Debt Service Fund with respect to Additional Bonds, such amounts as are necessary to create and maintain in said Debt Service Reserve Fund the required reserve, namely, an amount equal to the maximum principal and interest requirements for any consecutive two-year period on all Bonds at the time outstanding;

Third: Into the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund, to be held by the University as a fund separate and distinct from all other funds of the University, semi-annually on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year, or as soon thereafter as the required reserve has been established in the Debt Service Reserve Fund, an amount equal to one-quarter of one percent of the cost of construction on all dormitory facilities then under the control of the Board and 3 percent of the cost of movable equipment for all such dormitory facilities, which fund may be used by the University to the extent necessary for payment of principal and interest on the Bonds or for extraordinary repairs and replacements to the dormitory facilities or for construction or equipping of additional dormitory facilities;

Fourth: On April 1 and October 1 of each year, to the foregoing funds, such amounts as may be necessary to make up previous deficiency in any deposits required by the foregoing paragraphs of this section;

Fifth: So long as there is no deficiency in any of the deposits provided for in Paragraphs First through Fourth above and so long as the amounts in the Debt Service Reserve Fund are at least equal to the then required reserve, any amounts in the Dormitory Revenue Fund, after reserving therein the then current Operating Reserve, may be used for any purpose of the University for which such funds may lawfully be used.

The Debt Service Fund is irrevocably pledged to and shall be used by the Trustee for the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds and, until required for such purposes, shall be invested by the Trustee in such direct obligations of the United States as the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University shall direct in writing addressed to the Trustee, which writing shall determine that the maturity of the respective obligations is not later than the date on which such funds will be required for payment of such principal and interest. The Trustee shall transfer from the Debt Service Fund to the Paying Agents amounts sufficient to enable said Paying

Agents to pay when due principal and interest on the Bonds, or the Trustee shall make such credit arrangements with said Paying Agents as to permit such payments.

The Debt Service Reserve Fund is irrevocably pledged to, and shall be used by the Trustee for, the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds if other available funds are insufficient for that purpose, and, to the extent herein provided, for purchase or redemption of Bonds. Until required for such purposes it shall be invested by the Trustee in such direct obligations of the United States as the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University shall direct in writing, which obligations shall mature not more than five years from the date of investment. The Trustee shall transfer from the Debt Service Reserve Fund to the Debt Service Fund such amounts as are necessary in addition to amounts available in the Debt Service Fund, including funds transferred from the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund, to enable said Paying Agents to pay when due the principal and interest on the Bonds.

Any amounts in the Debt Service Reserve Fund in excess of the required reserve provided for in Paragraph Second above shall be used to purchase Bonds for retirement or to redeem Bonds then subject to redemption to the extent and in the manner from time to time requested in writing by the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University. In calculating at any time whether additional amounts are required to be paid into the Debt Service Reserve Fund under Paragraph Second above and in calculating the excess over the required reserve, no value shall be given to any investments of the fund other than direct obligations of the United States maturing within five years from the date of such calculation, but, in all other respects, such investments shall be valued at their face amount or market value, whichever is lower.

The Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund is irrevocably pledged to, and shall be used by the University for, extraordinary repairs and replacements to the dormitory facilities or to construct or equip additional dormitory facilities or for the retirement of all then outstanding Bonds by purchase or redemption or for payment

of the principal and interest by transfer to the Debt Service Fund as herein provided. The University shall transfer from the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund to the Debt Service Fund such amounts as are from time to time necessary, in addition to the other amounts available in the Debt Service Fund and without use of the Debt Service Reserve Fund, to provide for the payment, when due, of the principal and interest on the Bonds and shall not use any of this fund for repairs or replacement or additional facilities if there is any deficiency in any of the deposits required to be made under subparagraphs First or Second of this Section. Until required for such purposes, the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund may be invested by the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University in direct obligations of the United States maturing not more than five years from the date of investment.

Investments made pursuant to this Section 8 of any amounts in any Special Fund herein created and the interest thereon and the proceeds thereof shall constitute part of that Special Fund and be added to that particular fund. Such investments shall be sold, exchanged or collected from time to time as directed by the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University, and the Trustee shall be under no liability and have no responsibility in connection with such investment, or the sale, exchange or collection thereof, provided the directions of said officers are followed.

Section 9. Trust Agreement. In order to secure the payment of the principal and interest on the Bonds, the President of the University and the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and each of them, are authorized to execute, acknowledge and deliver as may be appropriate the Fifth Supplemental Trust Agreement in substantially the form attached hereto, and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees is authorized to seal and attest the same, with such changes not unfavorable to the University as the Officers acting shall deem advisable and as shall be approved by the Original Purchasers of the Series J Bonds. The terms and provisions of the Trust Agreement are hereby confirmed and adopted and the terms of said Trust Agreement purporting to be applicable to the Series A and Series B Bonds or to the Project to be constructed

from the proceeds of the Series A and Series B Bonds shall be deemed equally applicable to the Series J Bonds and the Project covered by this Resolution to the extent that the same are not inconsistent with the terms or provisions of this Resolution and the context so permits.

Section 11. Definitions. Where the context permits, the following terms as used in this Resolution or in the Trust Agreement shall have the following meanings: (1) "the Fiscal Officer" shall mean the Vice President, Business and Finance, of the University or any official or employee performing the duties of such officer for the time being. The Comptroller, or any official or employee performing the duties of such officer for the time being, shall also be "a Fiscal Officer" when the context so permits. (2) "Additional Bonds" shall mean Bonds issued pursuant to the Trust Agreement in addition to and on a parity with the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I and J Bonds and "Bonds" shall mean both the Series A. B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I and J Bonds and Additional Bonds; (3) "Agreement" or "Trust Agreement" shall refer to the Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 as from time to time supplemented pursuant to its terms; (4) "Dormitory Facilities" shall mean buildings, groups of buildings or parts of or additions to buildings, including the sites therefor, now or hereafter constructed, acquired by or under the control of the Board and authorized to be constructed, equipped, maintained and operated by Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, including the dormitories, additions to dormitories, dining facilities, and married student housing facilities or projects and all separate or connected buildings, sites, equipment, structures and utilities to be used in connection with the maintenance or operation of, or in any way supplementing or related to the services or facilities to be provided by such buildings located on or in close proximity to the campus; (5) "Net Income" shall mean all receipts of the operation of dormitory facilities after deducting therefrom the reasonable and proper operating and maintenance expenses thereof; (6) "Reasonable and Proper Operating and Maintenance Expenses" shall mean ordinary and usual reasonable expenditures necessary to

the operation, repair and maintenance of the dormitory facilities including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, taxes, fees and expenses of the Trustee and paying agents and any expenses required to be paid by the Bond Resolution or the Trust Agreement, but excluding provisions or expenditure for depreciation or capital replacement or expenditures for administration or regulation of the occupants of the dormitory facilities which expenditures do not constitute costs of the type included as costs of operation of the dormitory facilities under the present accounting practice of the University or expenditures for extraordinary repairs or replacements or payments to the Debt Service Fund, Debt Service Reserve Fund or Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund; (7) "Trustee" refers to the Trustee under the Trust Agreement, presently The Ohio National Bank of Columbus; (8) Any reference to an officer of the University or of the Board in this Resolution shall refer to the person holding such office or, in the event of resignation, absence, incapacity or vacancy in such office, then the person performing the duties of such office; any reference to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio shall, where the context permits, mean said section as it now exists and as it is from time to time amended, supplemented or affected by later legislation.

Section 12. General. The appropriate officers of the University and the Board, the architects and engineers employed by the University, and the Trustee designated in the Trust Agreement are authorized and directed to do all things necessary or proper to carry out the terms and provisions of this Resolution, the Trust Agreement and the Sale referred to in Section 3 above and to effect the execution, sale and delivery of said Series J Bonds in accordance therewith if approved by the President and Fiscal Officer of the University. It may be required as part of the terms of sale of the Series J Bonds that prior to or at the time of delivery the Series J Bonds there shall have been executed and delivered contracts for construction of the principal portions of the Project and provisions shall have been made for obtaining sufficient amounts to pay all costs of the Project as estimated by the Project

architect. The obligations imposed upon the University under this Resolution or the Trust Agreement are established as duties specifically enjoined upon the University, the Board and the officials of the University by law and result from their respective offices, trusts or stations within the meaning of Section 2731.01 of the Revised Code of Ohio.

Whereas, the text of the Series I and J Bonds and the coupons, if any, to be attached thereto and the authentication certificate of the Trustee to be endorsed thereon are to be substantially as follows:

(Form of Coupon Bond)

The form of Coupon Bond shall be identical with the form of Coupon Bond set forth in the Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 except that there shall be substituted in such form in lieu of the corresponding paragraphs and Trustee's Certificate and corresponding coupon form in said Coupon Bond the following paragraphs and coupon form:

This Bond is a Series _____ Bond and is one of a duly authorized issue of \$14,000,000 of Dormitory Revenue Bonds of the University, consisting of \$10,500,000 Series I Bonds and \$3,500,000 Series J Bonds, issued and to be issued from time to time, pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio and the Resolutions of the Board of Trustees of April 8, 1957 and September 8, 1966 (herein collectively called the "Bond Resolution") for the purpose of paying the costs of constructing and equipping certain dormitory facilities and secured by Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 and First, Second, Third and Fourth Supplemental Trust Agreements between the University and the above-named Trustee (herein collectively called the "Agreement").

The University hereby reserves the right to call and redeem the Bonds of this Series prior to maturity as a whole, or in part, in inverse order of maturity, on any interest payment date on or after October 15, 1977, upon terms of par and accrued interest to the redemption date plus redemption premiums as follows: four percent (4%) if redeemed 1977 to 1982, inclusive; three percent (3%) if redeemed 1983 to 1987, inclusive; two percent (2%) if redeemed 1988 to 1992, inclusive; one and one-half percent (1-1/2%) if redeemed 1993 to 1997, inclusive; and one percent (1%) if redeemed after 1997. If less than all the Bonds (or parts of Registered Bonds) of one maturity and of one series are to be called, the Coupon Bonds or portions of fully Registered Bonds

of such series and of that maturity to be called shall be chosen by lot by said Trustee. Except in the case of redemption of a particular series of bonds from surplus proceeds of that issue as provided in the Bond Resolution, no Bonds of any series may be called unless the same proportion of the outstanding Bonds of each other series, then callable, are called at the same time.

* * * * * *

The Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I, and J Bonds, together with such Additional Bonds as may be issued on a parity therewith under said Agreement, are, and are to be, secured only, but equally and ratably without priority one over another by reason of number or of date of Bond, sale, execution or delivery, by the Agreement, creating a prior pledge of the receipts of all dormitory facilities now or hereafter under the control of the Board of Trustees as defined in the Agreement after provision only for reasonable operating and maintenance expenses thereof.

The Bonds are issuable as coupon bonds, registrable as to principal, in the denomination of \$5,000, and as registered bonds without coupons in denominations of \$5,000 and any multiple thereof. Registered Bonds without coupons may be exchanged for coupon Bonds or for other registered Bonds without coupons, and coupon Bonds may be exchanged for registered Bonds without coupons, all on the terms and under the conditions and upon payment of the charges, if any, and with the effect provided in the Agreement.

Section 3. <u>Proceeds of Sale</u>. The proceeds from the sale of the Series I and J Bonds shall be applied as provided in the Bond Resolution.

Section 4. <u>Concerning the Trustee</u>. The Trustee hereby accepts the trusts hereby declared and provided and agrees to perform the same upon the terms and conditions in the Trust Agreement and in this or any other Supplement set forth.

The Trustee shall not be responsible in any manner whatsoever for or in respect of the validity or sufficiency of this Supplement or the due execution thereof by the University, nor for or in respect of the recitals herein contained, all of which recitals are made by the University solely. In general, each and every term and condition contained in the Original Trust Agreement shall apply to this Supplement, with such omissions, variations and modifications thereof as may be appropriate to make the same conform to this Supplement.

OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Columbus, Ohio, October 12, 1966

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Wednesday, October 12, 1966, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: Jacob E. Davis, Chairman, John W. Bricker, Bertram D. Thomas, John G. Ketterer, Frederick E. Jones, Mervin B. France and James W. Shocknessy.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Establishment of the "Alcoa Foundation Professorship in Engineering"

The Alcoa Foundation has selected The Ohio State University as one of sixteen universities in the nation to receive a grant from the Foundation in the amount of \$60,000.00, payable over a three-year period in support of an engineering professorship.

It was recommended, with the concurrence of the Dean of the College of Engineering and pursuant to the policy previously established by the Board of Trustees for "named professorships," that the "Alcoa Foundation Professorship in Engineering" be established at The Ohio State University, effective with the 1966-67 academic year. This grant from the Alcoa Foundation is in addition to scholarships and other educational assistance presently being given to The Ohio State University by the Foundation. Mr. Glen L. Phillips, Manager of Alcoa's Cleveland (Ohio) Works, in announcing the grant, stated that this engineering professorship program is designed to link education more closely with industry by fostering communication between education and engineering practitioners. Mr. Phillips advised also that the grant to Ohio State is indicative of the Alcoa Foundation's high regard for the continuing interest in the educational program of The Ohio State University.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Bricker, the Board of Trustees by unanimous voice vote approved the recommendation that the "Alcoa Foundation Professorship in Engineering" be established and that a letter of gratitude be sent to the Alcoa Foundation.

B. Revision of Personal Services Budget for the University Hospitals

The administrative staff of the University Hospitals in conjunction with appropriate members of the University administrative staff has been conducting for the past two months a comprehensive study of salary ranges for all classified and equivalent personnel in the University Hospitals. This study was necessitated by rapidly changing salary structures for hospital personnel both in Ohio and throughout the nation.

Upon the recommendation of Dean Richard Meiling and with the concurrence of Vice Presidents Carson and Corbally, it was recommended that the personnel budget for the University Hospitals for 1966-67 be increased in the amount of \$1,807,120.00, in accordance with the detailed salary ranges filed with the Secretary of the Board of Trustees. Salary adjustments will be effective on November 1, 1966, and will involve the following numbers of individuals in the categories described below:

The new salary levels will be funded by increases in the patient care service charges of the University Hospitals.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Bricker, the Board of Trustees by unanimous roll call vote approved the above recommendation for revision of the personal services budget for the University Hospitals for 1966-67.

A. Edgar Stephenson Furniss, Jr.

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on August 17, 1966, of Edgar Stephenson Furniss, Jr., Mershon Professor of Political Science.

Professor Furniss was born in Newton, Iowa, in 1918, and received his B.A., M.A. and Ph.D. degees from Yale University.

Prior to joining the faculty of The Ohio State University, Professor Furniss served in the Department of State from 1944 to 1946, and he joined the faculty of the Department of Politics of Princeton University in 1947 where he became a Professor in 1960.

Professor Furniss served as Visiting Professor at Johns Hopkins, Pennsylvania and Columbia Universities and as Lecturer at the United States National, Air, Army and Navy War Colleges.

In 1963, Professor Furniss joined the faculty of The Ohio State University as Mershon Professor of Political Science; and in that same year, was appointed first Director of the Mershon Social Science Program of the Mershon Center for Education in National Security.

Professor Furniss was an active and accomplished scholar and his writings in the fields of international relations, civil-military relations and American foreign policy brought him national and international recognition. Among his several books are American Military Policy; France: Troubled Ally; France: Keystone of Western Defense; and DeGaulle and the French Army.

Of his many contributions, Professor Furniss will best be remembered for his vigor and success in the Mershon Social Science Program. As Director of that program, he brought outstanding authorities on national security matters to Ohio State. He elicited and supported the research of scholars from this and other universities; and by working directly with these scholars, he brought to publication a series of books and pamphlets that have made important contributions to American understanding of national security problems. By supporting younger scholars in this area, Professor Furniss created a body of alumni, who now serve our nation as university professors, as military leaders and as valued members of the several governmental agencies.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

B. Arthur C. Kennedy

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on September 12, 1966, of Arthur C. Kennedy, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Agricultural Engineering.

Professor Kennedy was born March 31, 1889, in Batesville, Noble County, Ohio. He received the Bachelor of Science in Agriculture degree in 1915 and the Master of Science degree in 1927 from The Ohio State University. Professor Kennedy retired from the Department of Agricultural Engineering in 1954 after 17 years as a teacher at the University. He was one of the first vocational agriculture teachers in the state in 1918.

It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

C. Richard Paul Michel

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on September 16, 1966, of Richard P. Michel, Assistant Professor of Dentistry.

Professor Michel was born in Springfield, Ohio, on August 13, 1921. He was educated in the Springfield public schools. Dr. Michel served in the Army Air Corps as a combat flyer during World War II in the Far East. He achieved a brilliant military record, attaining the rank of Major and winning the Silver Star award for bravery in combat in the Okinawa campaign.

Dr. Michel attended Wittenberg University and received a B. A. degree from The Ohio State University in 1948. He then entered the College of Dentistry from which he graduated with a degree of D. D. S. in 1953. Professor Michel served as an instructor in the dental clinic from 1954 until 1958 when he was appointed assistant professor of clinical dentistry, a title which he held at the time of his death. He also conducted an active practice in the specialty of periodontics during this time.

Dr. Michel was a member of the Columbus Dental Society, The Ohio State Dental Association, The American Dental Association, The American Academy of Periodontology and The Academy International of Dentistry and Medicine.

Dr. Michel was a very capable teacher in clinical periodontics, and his instruction and counseling to students was an inspiration which will be sadly missed in the College of Dentistry.

D. degree from The Ohio State University. He joined the faculty at The Ohio State University as an Assistant Professor in 1918 and advanced through the ranks to become a Professor in 1938. He retired in 1947. In addition to teaching Social Studies Education, he was Director of Student Teaching for the College of Education.

He served his country in the military service in the Spanish-American War.

Professor Landsittel is remembered by those who studied and worked with him as an excellent supervisor of student teachers and a wise and understanding adviser to students. He made many contributions to the improvement of the student teaching program at the University. He was a pioneer in establishing the principle of providing the best professional environment for student teachers.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

1. Sale of Lakeholm Farm and Lakeholm Guest House Properties

Mr. France presented the following resolution and moved that it be adopted:

WHEREAS, the University Investment Portfolio lists an item entitled "Non-Productive Real Estate" and that said item contains the record of land and structures thereon given to the University by B. W. Martin and the Continental Can Company, Inc. in the aggregate of 307.86 acres, the income from the property or income from the proceeds from sale of said property to be used for the benefit of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics; and the principal donor and the College of Agriculture and Home Economics now recommend that said property be sold for the purpose of establishing a chair in the College of Agriculture and Home Economics; and

1. Sale of Lakeholm Farm and Lakeholm Guest House Properties (continued)

WHEREAS, the City of Mt. Vernon, through its Chamber of Commerce, has offered to purchase said land and appurtenances for the express use of a general high school, a vocational high school and a college; and

WHEREAS, the Finance and Investment Committee is in possession of an appraisal of said land which values it at \$292,000.00 and recommends sale at said appraisal;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees approve and ratify the action of the Finance and Investment Committee in selling the stated parcel of land for the sum of \$292,000.00 in cash to the Mt. Vernon Area Chamber of Commerce or its legal designee, with the understanding that the land will be used for the purposes previously stated.

Following a second of Mr. France's motion by Mr. Jones, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

2. Report on the University's Investment Portfolio

The report on the University's Investment Portfolio dated September 30, 1966, as submitted to the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees, was received and ordered to be filed with the official records of the Board.

B. Report on Highlights of Campus Activities

President Fawcett reported to the Board on some of the significant activities of the University during recent weeks. Some references included in the Report, which is filed with the official records of the Secretary, were as follows:

- A preliminary enrollment count showed that 41,412 students had paid fees as of October 11. The Registrar's Office reported that the current enrollment figure for the Columbus campus stood at 37,703 as compared with last year's count of 36,620. The report said that some 5,906 graduate students (5,575 in 1965) accounted for a portion of the Columbus increase.
- The first class of Minuteman missile launch control officers enrolled in a unique program of graduate education received Master of Business Administration degrees in a commencement ceremony held September 14, at Ellsworth Air Force Base, South Dakota.
- 3. Ohio State, as a member of the Committee on Institutional Cooperation, will play an important part in the training of a new kind of biologist. The CIC, a voluntary association of Midwestern universities engaging in joint educational projects, has received a Federal grant of \$794,724.00 for support of a program for training graduate specialists in the new field of biometeorology.

B. Report on Highlights of Campus Activities (continued)

 Total holdings of The Ohio State University Libraries increased to 1,845,069 volumes in the year ending June 30--an increase of 99,926 above the 1964-65 figure of 1,748,943.

XI. ESTABLISHMENT OF THE NOVICE G. FAWCETT PROFESSORSHIP IN EDUCATIONAL ADMINISTRATION

Mr. Mervin France presented the following recommendation and moved that it be adopted:

The recommendation which I am about to offer is, I believe, the first official recommendation which I have seen come before this Board without the prior knowledge of President Fawcett. I trust that he will not be too distressed by this breach of the usual procedures.

August 1, 1966, marked the beginning of the eleventh year of Novice G. Fawcett's service as President of The Ohio State University. During his ten years in the presidency, he and the faculty, staff and students of the University have participated in a period of unprecedented growth in higher education in general and in The Ohio State University in particular. His own untiring efforts on behalf of the University and on behalf of education are too well known to require enunciation today, but this Board of Trustees and former members of the Board who have served with Dr. Fawcett do wish to provide an appropriate recognition for the tenth anniversary of his dedicated leadership at Ohio State.

There are several ways this can be done, but the Board wishes to recognize President Fawcett's distinguished service in a manner in keeping with the goals for which he and his colleagues are striving. We believe that what we propose here is most appropriate for The Ohio State University and is commensurate with earlier actions initiated by the President himself.

It is my pleasure on behalf of the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University to move that the 'Novice G. Fawcett Professorship in Educational Administration' be established immediately in the School of Education. In accordance with policy previously adopted by this Board governing the establishment of named professorships, a minimum of \$5,000 a year will be made available from funds contributed by trustees who have served with the President. Under this policy, the sum will be used to supplement the regular salary of a renowned scholar in the President's own field of graduate study.

XI. ESTABLISHMENT OF THE NOVICE G. FAWCETT PROFESSORSHIP IN EDUCATIONAL ADMINISTRATION (continued)

In this way, we desire to make known our esteem for the accomplishments of President Fawcett at this University, to recognize the tenth anniversary of his service to Ohio State and to express our warm personal regard for him.

All members present joined in seconding the motion, and upon roll call vote, it was unanimously and enthusiastically adopted.

All those assembled gave the President a standing ovation as the Chairman of the Board announced the unanimous adoption of the motion.

President Fawcett was deeply moved and was completely surprised by the Board's thoughtful generosity. His expression of gratitude may be summarized by the statement, "I cannot think of anything you could have done to make me happier."



THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE ONE THOUSAND AND FIFTEENTH MEETING

OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Columbus, Ohio, November 10, 1966

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, November 10, 1966, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: Jacob E. Davis, Chairman, John W. Bricker, Bertram D. Thomas, John G. Ketterer, Frederick E. Jones and James W. Shocknessy.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

* *

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Renaming of "John Galvin Hall" - Lima Branch Campus

At the request of the Advisory Committee of the Lima Branch of The Ohio State University, it was proposed that the first building on the new Lima Branch Campus be designated "John Galvin Hall." That recommendation was approved by the Board of Trustees on February 10, 1966. It has now been requested by Mr. Galvin that the building be officially named "John E. Galvin Hall," since he is normally recognized as John E. Galvin.

President Fawcett recommended that the building's name be changed to "John E. Galvin Hall."

Upon motion of Mr. Bricker, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the Board of Trustees by unanimous voice vote approved the renaming of the first building on the Lima Campus as "John E. Galvin Hall."

B. Honorary Degree

The Faculty Council on October 11, 1966, recommended that the honorary degree, Doctor of Science, be conferred upon William L. Everitt.

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the Faculty Council's recommendation and that this degree be awarded at the December, 1966 Commencement or as soon as possible thereafter.

Upon motion of Dr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Bricker, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous voice vote.

C. University Hall - Recommendations Re Its Ultimate Disposition

After consultation with members of the Board of Trustees and the Faculty Advisory Committee to the President and the Board of Trustees, the President appointed on August 1, 1966, a distinguished committee to examine the factors which might have a bearing upon the ultimate disposition which should be made of University Hall and to submit a report of its findings to the President at an early date. The membership of the committee which has representation from the faculty, the student body, the alumni and the professions of architecture and engineering is as follows: Dr. Richard H. Armitage, Dean of the Graduate School, Chairman; Professor Marvin Fox, Department of Philosophy; Professor Harold J. Grimm, Department of History; Mr. Howard Hamilton, Past President of the Alumni Association; Mr. W. Byron Ireland, Architect; Mr. Edward E. Slowter, Vice President, Battelle Memorial Institute; Paul Baumann, undergraduate student of the College of Engineering; and Boyd Breslow, graduate student.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

C. University Hall - Recommendations Re Its Ultimate Disposition (continued)

The committee submitted to the President on October 26, 1966, a report of its deliberations and recommendations. A copy of the report has been forwarded to each member of the Board of Trustees and to the Secretary of the Board for filing with the official records of the University.

The recommendations of the committee were as follows:

- That the departments presently housed in University Hall be given top priority for remaining in this prime location whether the present building be retained or a new structure be erected on the site.
- 2. That the <u>interior</u> of the original University Hall structure be razed together with the entire north wing.
- 3. That a completely new and modern structure be erected within the walls of the original building provided that the total costs per square foot of such construction not exceed the cost of equivalent space in a new building containing offices and classrooms appropriate for the academic use of humanities departments. Cost reports from other institutions indicate that, even including elevators and air conditioning, reconstruction will provide equivalent space at less cost than totally new construction. The committee recommended that money be appropriated at once for a cost estimate.
- 4. If the results of the cost analysis study fail to substantiate the committee's prediction, it was recommended that the site be cleared for erection of an entirely new building.
- 5. Since approximately 150,000 square feet should be available on the site of the present building, the committee suggested that an appropriately designed modern structure be added on the northern portion of the site and connected in an aesthetically pleasing way to University Hall. It was suggested that the design of this new and "centennial year" building and of the University Hall project be determined on the basis of a \$10,000.00 architectural prize competition open to qualified Ohio architects. The prize money might be raised by donations from members of The Ohio State University Association. Funding of the building itself and of the reconstruction of University Hall should be from appropriations for capital improvements by the Legislature of the State of Ohio.

C. University Hall - Recommendations Re Its Ultimate Disposition (continued)

The President recommended that the substantive aspects of the report as submitted by the above-named committee be approved by the Board of Trustees.

It was further recommended that the President be authorized to contact The Associated General Contractors of America - Ohio Chapters through Mr. Park H. Pixley, Executive Secretary of the Ohio Chapter, to conduct a survey to establish a unit cost pattern for the purpose of comparing the estimated cost of reconstructing University Hall with the estimated cost of constructing a new structure and that an amount not to exceed Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) from Account 179992 be released to cover the cost of this study; and, further, that the President be authorized to investigate whether The Ohio State University Association will accept the responsibility for providing a \$10,000.00 prize for architectural competition for the design of new construction if and when the funds are available for such a project.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the Board of Trustees accepted the above-named report of the committee and the recommendations as submitted by the President were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

D. Authorization for the Filing of Applications for Grant Funds Under the Educational Television Facilities Act of 1962, Public Law 87-447

Under the provisions of the Educational Television Facilities Act of 1962, a limited amount of funds are available through the Ohio Educational Television Network Commission to improve the television facilities for noncommercial educational stations.

It was therefore recommended that the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University authorize the President of the University to submit an application to the Office of Education, U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, for a federal matching grant to construct noncommercial educational television broadcast facilities under provisions of the Educational Television Facilities Act of 1962, Public Law 87-447.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Bricker, the Board of Trustees by unanimous voice vote authorized the President of The Ohio State University to submit to federal and other agencies, applications for fiscal assistance in the aid of University educational television activities, programs and facilities.

E. Transportation Research Center - Program of Development

On April 14, 1966, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University on the basis of planning discussions for the development of a Transportation Research Center requested the release of \$1,000,000.00 in H. B. 949 for the acquisition of land for the Center, which request was subsequently approved by the State Controlling Board.

L. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

E. Transportation Research Center - Program of Development (continued)

The Board at its meeting on September 8, 1966, authorized President Fawcett to formalize negotiations into an agreement between The Ohio State University and the Ohio Department of Highways, which was executed on September 9, 1966.

The Engineering Experiment Station of the College of Engineering has prepared and submitted a Program of Development for the Transportation Research Center for the orderly and efficient progress of this undertaking, which document has been distributed to the Board prior to this meeting.

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees hereby

- Authorize the establishment of the Transportation Research Center within the Engineering Experiment Station.
- 2. Endorse the document entitled "Program of Development for the Transportation Research Center," dated November 1, 1966, and approve said document as a general guide for the future development of the Center, with the understanding that such approval does not preclude the need for the usual actions by the Board of Trustees as each part of the plan is implemented in the future.
- 3. Declare that the lands outlined in Map No. 2 of the Program of Development are needed for the proper development and operation of the Transportation Research Center, and establish said lands as the site for the Center.
- 4. Authorize the Vice President for Business and Finance, in accordance with the agreement dated September 9, 1966 between The Ohio State University and the Ohio Department of Highways, to proceed with appraisal, negotiation and acquisition of land as outlined in Map No. 2 of the Program of Development. In the event of failure of negotiations for the acquisition of such lands the Director of Public Works is requested to acquire by condemnation for the State of Ohio and the University the real estate encompassed in Map No. 2 of the Program of Development.
- 5. Instruct the Secretary to file with the records of the Board of Trustees a copy of the "Program of Development for the Transportation Research Center."

Upon motion of Mr. Bricker, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

Dr. McCormick will continue to serve as Professor (part time - 50%) in the Department of Agricultural Education. The salary for the two appointments totals \$18,168.00 per annum.

Robert S. Platt, Jr., Assistant Professor, Department of Botany and Plant Pathology, changed to Assistant Dean - College of Biological Sciences, effective October 1, 1966, at a salary of \$10,668.00 per annum. Dr. Platt will continue to hold the rank of Assistant Professor in the Department of Botany and Plant Pathology at No Salary.

B. Leaves of Absence Without Salary

Marie E. Brittin, Associate Professor, Department of Psychology, effective October 1, 1966 through December 31, 1966, due to critical illness in the family.

George P. Hanna, Jr., Associate Professor, Department of Civil Engineering, effective November 1, 1966 through June 30, 1967, to pursue work on his doctorate at the University of Cincinnati.

C. Emeritus Title

Dallas S. Bolon, Department of Accounting, with the title Assistant Professor Emeritus, effective July 1, 1966.

Upon motion of Dr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Jones, the Promotions, Leaves of Absence Without Salary, Emeritus Title and the personnel budget actions as recorded in the official "Salary Roll" of the University were approved by unanimous roll call vote, and the Secretary was instructed to file these changes in the "Salary Roll," an official document of the University.

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X. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of Faith Lanman Gorrell, Professor Emeritus and former Director of the School of Home Economics; Cedric Hesthal, Associate Professor Emeritus in the Department of Physics; and Roscoe H. Eckelberry, Professor Emeritus in the School of Education. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

A. Faith Lanman Gorrell

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on October 9, 1966, of Faith Lanman Gorrell, Professor Emeritus and former Director of the School of Home Economics.

Mrs. Gorrell was born on November 21, 1881, in New London, Connecticut. She received the Bachelor of Science degree from The Ohio State University in 1903 and two degrees from Teachers' College, Columbia University—the Bachelor of Science in 1907 and Master of Arts in 1924. She completed additional studies at the University of Michigan.

Mrs. Gorrell had a long and distinguished career in the field of home economics. She taught in St. Petersburg, Florida, schools from 1903 through 1906. In 1907, when home economics, or as it was called then, domestic science, was introduced in the schools of Columbus, Ohio, Mrs. Gorrell was made Director of Domestic Science for the public schools of the city. She held this position until 1918 when she became Assistant State Leader and later, State Leader in Home Economics Extension.

Mrs. Gorrell was appointed Chairman of the Department of Home Economics in 1920; and when this Department became the School of Home Economics in 1929, she became its Director. In 1945, she resigned as Director and set up a system of alumni records and placement for the School. From 1926 to 1945, she was also Chief, Department of Home Economics, Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station. She retired on June 30, 1952.

A. Faith Lanman Gorrell (continued)

Under Mrs. Gorrell's direction, home economics at Ohio State made great progress. She instituted courses in child care in 1922 making Ohio State the first college to offer education in this area. The nursery school was started in 1925 for use as a teaching laboratory in child development. Institution management, with a cafeteria first in Campbell Hall and later in Pomerene Hall, became part of the curriculum in 1920. The Grace Graham Walker Home Management House was dedicated in 1932. Household equipment courses were initiated and research and graduate work in textiles and dietetics began.

Mrs. Gorrell was a member of the American Home Economics Association, the Ohio Home Economics Association, the American Dietetic Association, the American Public Health Association, Phi Upsilon Omicron, Omicron Nu and Sigma Delta Epsilon.

In appreciation of Mrs. Gorrell's work in organizing alumni records and assisting the newly formed Home Economics Alumni Association (started in 1946), the alumni founded in 1952 a Faith Lanman Gorrell Scholarship and honored Mrs. Gorrell as an outstanding alumna.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as an expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

B. Cedric Hesthal

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on August 1, 1966, of Cedric Hesthal, Associate Professor Emeritus in the Department of Physics.

Professor Hesthal was born in San Francisco on December 13, 1903. From 1920 to 1929, he attended Stanford University from which he received the A.B. degree in 1924, the A.M. degree in 1927 and the Ph.D. degree in Physics in 1929.

Dr. Hesthal joined the staff of The Ohio State University in 1929 as Instructor in Physics. He became Assistant Professor in 1934 and Associate Professor in 1944. In 1936, he was also named Research Associate of the Perkins Observatory. He spent two years during World War II at the Underwater Sound Laboratory of Harvard University doing research on underwater devices for the United States Navy. During the late 1940's, he was chief investigator in a research project on optical interference filters for the U.S. Air Force.

Dr. Hesthal was a member of the American Physical Society, the Optical Society of America, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the Astronomical Society for the Pacific and the Society of the Sigma Xi. In 1960, the Civitan Club of North Columbus presented Dr. Hesthal a Citizenship Award in recognition of "his service in behalf of youth, particularly in the fields of science and youth education."

B. Cedric Hesthal (continued)

Dr. Hesthal was a masterful teacher and a pioneer in the development of courses in physical science for students other than those specializing in science, starting this effort in the 1930's when few science professors recognized the importance of this activity. His General Studies in Physics and Astronomy, taken by thousands of students over a period of 30 years, was a unique course presenting some of the facts, spirit and methods of science. His students were impressed by his genial sense of humor and his kindly interest in them as growing individuals. He designed and developed much new equipment for lecture demonstrations and laboratory instruction particularly for this course. His course material was published as a text, Study of Physical Phenomena.

Dr. Hesthal was a talented experimental physicist. His principal research efforts were in optics and spectroscopy. He made notable contributions to Perkins Observatory in the design and construction of auxiliary spectroscopic and photographic equipment for the large telescope.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

C. Roscoe H. Eckelberry

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on October 27, 1966, of Roscoe H. Eckelberry, Professor Emeritus in the School of Education.

Professor Eckelberry was born on April 11, 1891, in Zaleski, Ohio. He entered The Ohio State University in 1920 where he earned three degrees-the Bachelor of Science in Education in 1922, the Master of Arts in 1923 and the Doctor of Philosophy in 1927. He began his teaching in the history and philosophy of education areas and became a professor of education in 1939. In 1943, he assumed the editorship of the Journal of Higher Education and the Educational Research Bulletin. He served as chairman of the Committee on Graduate Work in Education 1939-43.

Dr. Eckelberry was a man of varied interests. For seven years, he was director of the Ohio Conservation Laboratory. Since retirement, he was completing a study on the history of the Muskingum Watershed Conservancy District.

Roscoe Eckelberry was a modest, self-effacing man, but he was never cowed by authority nor did he ever shrink from controversy. He was actively concerned with the development of the community college. He had a keen sense of the difference between the trivial and the important, between the significant issues in education and the ephemeral ones. Roscoe Eckelberry was gracious, friendly, witty and a man of good will.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

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XI. REPORTS

A. Report on the Department of Aviation

President Fawcett presented Professor Jack J. Eggspuehler, Chairman of the Department of Aviation, who was invited to report on the programs and activities of the Department of Aviation. The invitation was extended to Professor Eggspuehler in response to questions raised at the last meeting of the Board of Trustees held on October 12, 1966.

Professor Eggspuehler's report is summarized as follows:

Professor Eggspuehler reported that the Department of Aviation's instructional program serves students from a cross-section of the University with departments in almost every academic area represented. He cited specific cases where former students of the Department are now serving in various national defense and civilian activities; e.g., five residents in aviation medicine of the University's College of Medicine have qualified for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration for the astronaut-scientist training program as a result of their flight training experience gained in the Department of Aviation. He emphasized, however, that the teaching of flying is only a small part of the Department of Aviation's total instructional program and noted that the goal of the Department is to provide undergraduate, graduate and professional students with the educational background to solve the many problems facing the total aviation industry of today and tomorrow. He presented examples of how the instructional program includes nationally recognized projects such as the annual agricultural aviation short course and the flight instructors recertification course sponsored by the Federal Aviation Agency.

Additionally, Professor Eggspuehler reported that among the many and varied research activities, the Department of Aviation has developed a competence in low altitude flight which has placed the University in the forefront in this area of aviation research.

In concluding, Professor Eggspuehler stated that the University Airport, identified as Don Scott Field, is now considered as the general aviation airport for the Columbus metropolitan area with some 130 private aircraft being based at the airport. Over 92,000 aircraft operations were registered by Don Scott Field during the past year.

President Fawcett and the Chairman of the Board, Mr. Davis, commended Mr. Eggspuehler on the excellent program of the Department of Aviation, and they expressed their gratitude to Professor Eggspuehler for his personal leadership in the development of the Department and the effective manner in which he presented the report.

B. Report on the University's Investment Portfolio



THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE ONE THOUSAND AND SIXTEENTH MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Columbus, Ohio, December 8, 1966

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, December 8, 1966, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: Jacob E. Davis, Chairman, John W. Bricker, John G. Ketterer, Frederick E. Jones, Mervin B. France and James W. Shocknessy.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Establishment of a Department of Linguistics in the College of Arts and Sciences

The Faculty Council on November 8, 1966, approved the recommendation adopted by the Council on Academic Affairs that a Department of Linguistics be established in the College of Arts and Sciences.

Since 1962, the area of linguistics has been administered as a Division of Linguistics within the College of Arts and Sciences. During the intervening time, the course offerings of the Division have grown in depth and diversity; the faculty and the graduate student body have increased; and programs leading to the M. A. and Ph. D. degrees in linguistics have been established. It is understood that all aspects of the educational program of the Division of Linguistics will be transferred to the new Department of Linguistics, effective with the 1967-68 academic year beginning Summer Quarter 1967.

President Fawcett recommended that the above action of the Faculty Council be approved. \cdot

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous voice vote.

B. Change the Name of the School of Architecture and Landscape Architecture to School of Architecture

The faculty of the College of Engineering has proposed that the name of the School of Architecture and Landscape Architecture be changed to the School of Architecture. Concurrently with the change in name, the proposal included the recommendation that the three teaching disciplines in the School be identified as Divisions. These Divisions are: Architecture, Landscape Architecture and City and Regional Planning. The School now offers two, five-year undergraduate degrees--Bachelor of Architecture and Bachelor of Landscape Architecture--and two graduate degrees--Master of Architecture and Master of City and Regional Planning.

The above proposal was endorsed by the Council on Academic Affairs and was approved by the Faculty Council on November 8, 1966.

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the proposed change in name of the School of Architecture and Landscape Architecture to the School of Architecture, effective with the 1967-68 academic year beginning Summer Quarter 1967.

The name of the School of Architecture and Landscape Architecture was changed to the School of Architecture by unanimous voice vote of the Board of Trustees.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

C. <u>Master of Medical Science Degree Replaced by Master of Science</u> Degree in Certain Departments in the College of Medicine

The Faculty Council on November 8, 1966, upon the recommendation of the Council on Academic Affairs approved the College of Medicine proposal that the present Master of Medical Science degree offered by various departments of the College be replaced by the Master of Science degree, effective with the 1967-68 academic year beginning Summer Quarter 1967. The following departments of the College of Medicine are now awarding the Master of Medical Science degree: Medicine, Obstetrics and Gynecology, Ophthalmology, Otolaryngology, Pediatrics, Physical Medicine, Radiology and Surgery.

This request is based upon the need of the requesting departments to offer for medical personnel a means of preparing for an academic career in institutions of higher education. Each medical resident who successfully completes the Master of Science degree in his major department will fulfill all the requirements set forth by the Graduate School for the degree.

President Fawcett recommended that the action of the Faculty Council be approved by the Board of Trustees.

The Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote,

D. <u>Degrees and Certificates Conferred</u> -Autumn Quarter Commencement Convocation

President Fawcett recommended that degrees and certificates be conferred at the Autumn Quarter Commencement Convocation on December 20, 1966, to those students who have completed the requirements for their respective degrees and certificates and are recommended by the Faculty Council. The names of those awarded degrees and certificates will be included in the minutes of this meeting. (See Appendix VI, page 353.)

By unanimous voice vote of the Board of Trustees, the above recommendation was approved.

E. Temporary Assignment of Oxley Hall to Research Space

The following resolution was presented by President Fawcett:

WHEREAS, there exists an urgent need to provide additional building space to house research functions of the University; and

WHEREAS, the temporary assignment of Oxley Hall to such use will not impair any other program of the University; and

WHEREAS, the amount herein provided to be paid by The Ohio State University Research Foundation for use of Oxley Hall will equal or exceed the revenues that could be derived therefrom under current usage; and

E. Temporary Assignment of Oxley Hall to Research Use (continued)

WHEREAS, the President and the Vice President for Business and Finance of the University have certified to this Board that the net income from dormitory facilities, even without any revenues from Oxley Hall will yet exceed one and three tenths times the debt service requirements on all dormitory revenue bonds of the University;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University that the Vice President for Business and Finance, of the University be and he is hereby authorized to make Oxley Hall temporarily available to use by The Ohio State University Research Foundation, until further action thereon by this Board, on condition that the Foundation shall make semiannual advance payments for the use thereof to the Dormitory Revenue Fund in semiannual amounts of \$37,926.00 on or before March 15 and September 15 of each year with the first such payment to begin and be prorated to the date of occupancy for research purposes.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

Josephine Sitterle Failer Award Fund

The Josephine Sitterle Failer Award Fund was established November 16, 1966, by a gift through the Development Fund from Josephine Sitterle Failer (Mrs. Jay L.) (B.Sc. in Pharmacy '39).

The principal is to be invested in accordance with rules and regulations therefor adopted by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, with right to invest and reinvest as occasion dictates.

The income is to be used for awards to student residents of the Alumnae Scholarship Houses who have been elected to membership in significant University-recognized honorary sororities, fraternities and similar organizations. Initially, these are to include those who become members of Chimes, Mirrors, Mortar Board and Alpha Lambda Delta. This list of organizations is not to be exclusive; other organizations may achieve significance and new organizations may be created and may be included.

In case the need for such awards should cease to exist or so diminish as to create unused income or in case the Alumnae Scholarship Houses should not continue to function, then the income may be used at the discretion of the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University for any purpose in the area of women students' activities at the University.

X. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of Edward V. O'Rourke, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Chemical Engineering; George B. Crane, Assistant Director Emeritus in the Cooperative Extension Service; and John Edwin Brown, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Otolaryngology. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

A. Edward V. O'Rourke

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on November 11, 1966, of Edward V. O'Rourke, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Chemical Engineering.

Mr. O'Rourke was born in Columbus, Ohio, on September 5, 1895. He was graduated from The Ohio State University where he received the degree of Bachelor of Engineering in Mining.

From 1919 to 1925, Professor O'Rourke worked as a mining and petroleum engineer in the copper mines in Chile and Venezuela, South America, and Ruth, Nevada. He joined the staff of the Mining Engineering Department at The Ohio State University in 1925 as an Instructor and was successively Assistant Professor, Associate Professor, Professor and Chairman of the Department of Petroleum and Mining Engineering. In the fall of 1956, he became a Professor in the Department of Chemical Engineering when the Department of Petroleum and Mining Engineering was made a part of the Department of Chemical Engineering.

Professor O'Rourke was a member of the Ohio Oil and Gas Association, American Petroleum Institute and American Institute of Mining Engineers. He served as a national officer in these organizations and as a member of national committees.

Professor O'Rourke was an engineer first and a scientist second. He had little use for scientific data which had no practical economic value. Professor O'Rourke enjoyed a close personal relationship with his students both during their college days and later during their professional lives. His close friendships extend from corporation presidents to field engineers and virtually circle the globe in geographical extent. His most outstanding contribution to his students was instilling in them the economic significance of all of their engineering activities. His course work invariably included the economic impact of the engineering methods taught. Although he stressed economics, his technical knowledge of the industry was broad. His publications, numbering over 50, cover practically all phases of the petroleum-producing industry including drilling, well completion methods, production methods, geology and secondary recovery.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

B. George B. Crane

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on November 20, 1966, of George B. Crane, Assistant Director Emeritus in the Cooperative Extension Service.

Professor Crane was born in Columbus, Ohio, in September 4, 1891. From 1909 to 1913, he attended The Ohio State University from which he was graduated with the Bachelor of Science in Agriculture degree. He did graduate work at the University of Southern California and The Ohio State University where he earned the Master of Science degree in 1931.

Professor Crane joined the staff of The Ohio State University in 1913 as an Extension Editor and was appointed to the position of Secretary and Assistant Director of the Ohio Agricultural Extension Service in 1920. He served in this capacity until his retirement on September 30, 1957.

During his career, Professor Crane received many citations for superior service. In 1949, he was awarded the Epsilon Sigma Phi Certificate of Recognition. The U.S. D.A. Distinguished Service Award was presented to him in 1957, and The Ohio State University honored him with the Distinguished Service Award at the June, 1958 Convocation. He was a member of Gamma Sigma Delta which is the National Honor Society of Agriculture. He served as its president in 1942-43.

Mr. Crane was held in high regard by Extension staff members, leading citizens and legislators for his demonstrated ability in financing, accounting, office management and counseling. His contribution to the people of Ohio in helping to guide and administer an effective Extension educational program for nearly forty years will be remembered for many years to come.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

C. John Edwin Brown

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on November 2, 1966, of John Edwin Brown, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Otolaryngology.

Dr. John Edwin Brown was born May 30, 1864, in Malta, Ohio. Dr. Brown's life, spanning more than a century, was extremely busy and rich. At the age of 15, he was entered as a student at the Ohio Wesleyan University and was graduated with the degree of Bachelor of Science in 1884. Subsequently he studied medicine at the University of Michigan and at the Medical College of Ohio in Cincinnati where he received his M.D. degree in 1887. He then pursued special studies at the New York Postgraduate Medical School and at the University of Vienna where he had postgraduate training in otolaryngology.

C. John Edwin Brown (continued)

In 1892, he became a professor at the Ohio Medical University in Columbus and served as dean of the faculty in 1894-1895. He remained on the faculty until 1906.

From 1907 to 1914, Dr. Brown taught at Starling Ohio Medical College; and when this school was absorbed by the new College of Medicine of The Ohio State University, he was appointed as chairman of the department of otolaryngology and held that position until 1923. He continued on the staff as professor until 1941, at which time he became an emeritus member of the faculty.

During Dr. Brown's long professional career of 56 years, many honors and responsibilities fell to him. He served as president of the American Academy of Ophthalmology and Otolaryngology (1915-1916) and was the fifth president of the Columbus Academy of Medicine. His many academic and civic contributions were recognized in 1964 at the commencement exercises of the Ohio Wesleyan University when he was designated as the "alumnus of the century," and in 1965 by the Centurion Club of the Deafness Research Foundation when he was made an honorary member of that organization.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

B. Report on Highlights of Campus Activities

President Fawcett reported to the Board on some of the significant activities of the University. Some references included in the Report, which is filed with the official records of the Secretary, were as follows:



B. Report on Highlights of Campus Activities (continued)

- 1. During this 1966-67 academic year, The Ohio State University has been allocated over \$2,500,000.00 in Federal funds for Student Financial Aids. Of this amount, over \$544,000.00 will be received in Educational Opportunity Grants and Health Profession Scholarships, over \$458,000.00 for the Work-Study Program and more than \$1,300,000.00 in National Defense Loans, Health Profession Loans and Nursing Loans. For the 1966-67 academic year the University has requested Federal allocations of approximately \$3,000,000.00 for Student Financial Aids. Just five years ago, Federal funds allocated to The Ohio State University for the support of able and needy students totaled only \$250,000.00 or less than one-tenth of the amount allocated for the current academic year. Whereas, only 407 students received financial aid from Federal sources in the 1961-1962 academic year, there will be 3,837 students assisted by Federal financial funds for the 1966-67 academic year.
- Dr. Alfred B. Garrett, Vice President for Research, will serve as general chairman for the University's centennial observance. Plans are under way for an observance of the 100th anniversary of Ohio State's establishment as the "Ohio Agricultural and Mechanical College" by act of the Ohio General Assembly in 1870.
- 3. University residence hall housing will be available to students from Columbus and Franklin County for the first time next Autumn Quarter. This has not been possible in the past because the University has not had adequate residence hall space.
- 4. The University has moved into the nation's top 15 universities in size of Slavic book collections as a result of acquisitions last summer in Yugoslavia and Poland. Dr. Twarog, Professor and Chairman of the Department of Slavic Languages and Literatures, said the new position results from collecting efforts which have expanded the University's holdings from 3,000 volumes five years ago to more than 60,000 today.
- 5. The Center for Textual Studies, which pioneered production of definitive editions of major American authors, has received its first Federal grant. The National Endowment for the Humanities, through the Modern Language Association's Center for Editions of American Authors, awarded \$25,000.00 to Ohio State's center for its publication of Nathaniel Hawthorne's works.
- 6. A dashboard-mounted control stick replaces the conventional steering wheel, accelerator and brake pedal in an automobile developed by Ohio State electrical engineers for use in on-the-road studies of automatic vehicle control.
- William N. Curry of Ohio State was the first American college journalism student to go to Antarctica on an assignment. He covered activities of Ohio State's Institute of Polar Studies for the <u>Lantern</u>, student daily, and for the <u>Cleveland Plain Dealer</u>, cosponsor with the National Science Foundation of his trip.



WILLIAM L. EVERITT

DOCTOR OF SCIENCE

Educational statesman, creative engineer, honored citizen, motivator of men

Dr. William L. Everitt, Dean of the College of Engineering at the University of Illinois, is recognized as one of the world's outstanding educators and as a pioneer and leader of international repute in the fields of electronics and communications. He has also won acclaim as an inspiring teacher, research scholar, author, inventor, and administrative genius. His expert counsel has been valued by local, national, and international agencies. Noteworthy among his numerous publications is his textbook, Communication Engineering, which has become a classic in its field.

Dean Everitt holds three earned degrees—the E.E. from Cornell University in 1922, the M.S. from The University of Michigan in 1926, and the Ph.D. in Electrical Engineering from The Ohio State University in 1933. He also holds honorary doctorates from Bradley University, Monmouth College, Tri-State College, and the University of the Andes.

In 1926, after several years in industry and teaching, Dr. Everitt joined Ohio State's Department of Electrical Engineering and in the years that followed advanced to the rank of Professor. In 1944, he was named Chairman of the Electrical Engineering Department at the University of Illinois, and in 1949 he became Dean and has since led the College of Engineering to its present position of eminence.

Dean Everitt has held nearly every high office available to engineers and educators in his field, including the presidency of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers, American Society for Engineering Education, and Engineers Council for Professional Development. Among the honors which have come to him for his distinguished service to government, industry, and education are the War Department's Exceptionally Meritorious Civilian Award, the Medal of Honor of the Institute of Radio Engineers, the Lamme Medal of the American Society for Engineering Education, and the Mervin J. Kelly Telecommunications Medal of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers.

Basic to his record of unusual achievements is Dr. Everitt's high artistry as a stimulating teacher and motivator of men. The grand measure of this outstanding professional leader and the scope of his many contributions is summed up in the words of a colleague who observed, "It is perhaps not too much to say that he has done more for engineering education than any other single man in the past two decades."

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE

ONE THOUSAND AND SEVENTEENTH MEETING

OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Columbus, Ohio, February 9, 1967

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, February 9, 1967, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: Jacob E. Davis, Chairman, John W. Bricker, John G. Ketterer, Frederick E. Jones, Mervin B. France, James W. Shocknessy and Don M. Hilliker.

The Chairman introduced the new member of the Board of Trustees, Mr. Don M. Hilliker, Bellefontaine, Ohio, who was appointed by Governor James A. Rhodes, to succeed Mr. Alan B. Loop, for the term beginning May 14, 1966 and expiring May 13, 1975. Mr. Hilliker took office January 15, 1967, and his appointment was unanimously confirmed by the Ohio Senate on January 18, 1967.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Modification of Master Plan

It is proposed that the official campus master plan adopted by the Board of Trustees in February, 1962, and subsequently amended on six occasions, be further modified in the following ways and for the reasons indicated:

- Master plan studies by the Office of Campus Planning and the coordinating architects for the University College are substantially completed and the master plan can now show the locations of proposed buildings, streets and other major site improvements on that campus, as well as the necessary street connection between the present main campus and the proposed University College campus.
- 2. As the completion of the two dormitory towers southwest of the Stadium approaches, it is necessary to proceed with the moving of certain athletic facilities and activities to the area south of Buckeye Village, as proposed in the 1962 master plan. Minor modification in this part of the master plan now must be made to indicate the precise location of the new athletic facilities and the resulting modification of the proposed parking area to the south.

The changes in these two areas are shown on the accompanying map dated February 9, 1967, and are consistent with the principles and concepts approved by the Board of Trustees in adopting the master plan in 1962.

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the master plan changes as depicted on the accompanying map, that all previous actions of the Board of Trustees with respect to the master plan and not contrary to the accompanying map be reaffirmed, and that a copy of said map be filed by the Secretary with the "Campus Master Plan Study--Phase II" report submitted December 12, 1961.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Bricker, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous voice vote.

B. Establishment of the Department of Anthropology Within the College of Commerce and Administration

On January 10, 1967, the Faculty Council approved the recommendation by the Council on Academic Affairs that a Department of Anthropology be established within the College of Commerce and Administration, effective Summer Quarter, 1967.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

B. Establishment of the Department of Anthropology Within the College of Commerce and Administration (continued)

This action is the result of a series of steps in the development of this discipline. Initial recognition was given to the field of Anthropology in 1953 when the Department of Sociology added that discipline and changed its name to include Anthropology. The historical relationship of these two disciplines in various institutions has usually been of a "trusteeship" character with the expectation that Anthropology would gain departmental autonomy. The growth of the area at The Ohio State University has now reached the point which seems to make this desirable. When compared with other departments, the enrollment of 4,000 during the current year places Anthropology in the middle of the range of departmental registrations. After full consideration within the Department of Sociology and Anthropology and also by the members of the Anthropology faculty, this proposal was approved by the faculties of the Department of Sociology and Anthropology as well as the College of Commerce and Administration.

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees authorize the establishment of a Department of Anthropology in the College of Commerce and Administration.

The Board of Trustees by unanimous vote approved the proposal that a separate Department of Anthropology be established effective Summer Quarter, 1967.

C. Change the Name of the Department of Engineering Drawing to the Department of Engineering Graphics

The faculty of the College of Engineering has proposed that the name of the Department of Engineering Drawing be changed to the Department of Engineering Graphics.

The term "engineering drawing" no longer accurately describes the nature of the work of this Department. Approximately 30 per cent of the Department's content concerns itself with grapho-numerical and mathematical procedures while another 35 to 40 per cent is devoted to the area of descriptive geometry. The appropriate division of the American Society for Engineering Education changed its name and the name of its journal to "Engineering Graphics" several years ago.

The above proposal was endorsed by the Council on Academic Affairs and was approved by the Faculty Council on December 13, 1966.

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the proposed change in name of the Department of Engineering Drawing to the Department of Engineering Graphics, effective with the 1967-68 academic year beginning Summer Quarter, 1967.

The Board of Trustees by unanimous vote approved the change of the name of the Department of Engineering Drawing to the Department of Engineering Graphics, effective with the 1967-68 academic year beginning Summer Quarter, 1967.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

D. Change the Name of the Department of Classical Languages to the Department of Classics

On December 13, 1966, the Faculty Council approved the recommendation by the Council on Academic Affairs that the name of the Department of Classical Languages be changed to the Department of Classics.

The breadth of the interests and course offerings of the Department of Classical Languages suggest that a change in name would be appropriate. The program of the Department includes studies in various phases of ancient history, philosophy, archaeology and linguistics. The change of name would remove the peculiar designation of the large number and useful courses taught in English as courses in "Classical Languages."

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the proposed change in name of the Department of Classical Languages to the Department of Classics, effective with the 1967-68 academic year beginning Summer Quarter, 1967.

The Board of Trustees by unanimous vote approved the change of the name of the Department of Classical Languages to the Department of Classics, effective with the 1967-68 academic year beginning Summer Quarter, 1967.

E. Revision of Rules 11.1301, 11.1303, 13.0301, 29.2701, 29.2721, 29.2731, 35.05, 53.03, 53.0702, 54.05 and 54.07 of Rules for the University Faculty

On December 13, 1966, the Faculty Council approved a series of changes in Rules for the University Faculty which relate to administrative procedures in the Office of Student Relations. The changes, as recommended by Executive Dean John T. Bonner, Jr., with the concurrence of the appropriate University Councils and Committees, provide for: (1) clarification of procedures to be followed by the Committee on Academic Misconduct, (2) decentralization of jurisdiction of student disciplinary cases to the appropriate colleges, (3) higher academic standards for participation in student extracurricular activities, (4) creation of a Student Judicial Board to coordinate all student tribunals, (5) increase student membership on the Ohio Union Activities Board from eight to nine, and (6) necessary corrective and editorial changes to effect the above.

The Faculty Council at its December meeting also approved an amendment to clarify the operating procedures of the Council on Academic Affairs (Rule 29. 2731) as proposed by Vice President and Provost John E. Corbally, Jr.

E. Revision of Rules 11.1301, 11.1303, 13.0301, 29.2701, 29.2721, 29.2731, 35.05, 53.03, 53.0702, 54.05 and 54.07 of Rules for the University Faculty (continued)

President Fawcett recommended that the above referred to revisions in the Rules for the University Faculty be adopted by the Board of Trustees and that the Secretary be instructed to formally correct and reprint the specific changes as they were adopted by the Faculty Council.

Upon motion of Mr. Bricker, seconded by Mr. France, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote, and the Secretary was instructed to make such revisions in the Rules for the University Faculty.

F. Membership in Universities Research Association, Inc.

The Ohio State University has been elected to membership in Universities Research Association, Inc., an organization of major universities formed:

- (a) To constitute an entity in and by means of which universities and other research organizations may cooperate with one another, with the Government of the United States, and with other organizations, toward the support and use of laboratories, machines, and other research facilities, and toward the development of knowledge in the physical and biological sciences; and
- (b) To acquire, plan, construct, and operate machines, laboratories, and other facilities, under contract with the Government of the United States or otherwise, for research, development and education in the physical and biological sciences, including all aspects of the field of high energy physics, nuclear energy, and their engineering and other applications; and to educate and train technical, research and student personnel in said sciences.

President Fawcett recommended, with the concurrence of the President's Cabinet, that the Board of Trustees adopt the following resolution:

WHEREAS, The Ohio State University desires to participate in the work of Universities Research Association, Inc., as set forth in its Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws; and

WHEREAS, Universities Research Association, Inc. has extended to the University its invitation to become a member;

F. Membership in Universities Research Association, Inc. (continued)

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That The Ohio State University hereby accepts such invitation to become a member of Universities Research Association, Inc., and that the President be and he hereby is authorized to deliver the acceptance of the University to Universities Research Association, Inc. and pay an initial assessment of \$5,000.00.

Upon motion of Mr. Bricker, seconded by Mr. Jones, the Board of Trustees adopted the above resolution by unanimous roll call vote.

G. Authority to Transfer Lakeholm Farm Properties and Execute Deeds

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt the following resolution which has been developed with the advice of the Special Counsel to the Attorney General of Ohio for The Ohio State University:

WHEREAS, at the meeting of October 12, 1966, the Board of Trustees approved the resolution authorizing the sale of "Non-productive Real Estate," listed in the University's Investment Portfolio as the 308.73 acre Lakeholm Farm which includes the guest house and other improvements thereon, but exclusive of the furnishings in the guest house.

WHEREAS, the approved sale price was \$292,000.00 and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees ratified the proposed action, in principal, upon payment of the sum stated and to such grantees as were designated by the Mount Vernon Area Chamber of Commerce for purposes of a county vocational school, a city high school, and a college, and

WHEREAS, the Mount Vernon Area Chamber of Commerce has designated as grantees of respective portions of the entire tract: (1) the Board of Education of Knox County, Joint Vocational School District, (2) the Board of Education, Mount Vernon City School District, and (3) Mount Vernon Nazarene College, a corporation not for profit of the State of Ohio.

THEREFORE, Be It Resolved that the Board of Trustees (acting pursuant to its general trust powers as contained in Section 3345.16, Revised Code) sell the parcel of land known as Lakeholm Farm to the above grantees for the aggregate purchase price of \$292,000.00.

G. Authority to Transfer Lakeholm Farm Properties and Execute Deeds (continued)

FURTHER RESOLVED, That Novice G. Fawcett, as President, and Gordon B. Carson, as Vice President, be and hereby are authorized, empowered and directed to execute and deliver respective deeds and do all other things necessary or desirable to complete such transaction.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees adopted the above resolution by unanimous roll call vote.

H. Establishment of the "Bert W. Martin Chair in Agricultural Sciences"

President Fawcett indicated his great pleasure as he recommended that, in accord with previously announced intentions, the amount of \$292,000.00 received in the sale of the Lakeholm Farm properties, a major portion of which were given to the University by Mr. Bert W. Martin, be used for the purpose of establishing the "Bert W. Martin Chair in Agricultural Sciences." This "Named Chair" will be activated when the income from the principal deposited in the University Endowment Fund is of sufficient amount to fully underwrite the appointment to the faculty of a distinguished scholar who will enhance the teaching and/or research in any area of study directly related to the agricultural sciences and will remain in perpetuity on the campus of The Ohio State University. The Chair will be administered pursuant to the provisions for the establishment of "named chairs" approved on January 14, 1965, by the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees by unanimous voice vote approved the establishment of the "Bert W. Martin Chair in Agricultural Sciences."

PERSONNEL CHANGES

President Fawcett recommended that all personnel changes since the December 8, 1966 meeting of the Board as recorded in the official "Salary Roll" of the University, be approved by the Board. These changes included the following Promotion, Appointments, Leaves of Absence Without Salary and Emeritus Titles:

Clarence R. Cole, now Regents Professor and Chairman of the Department of Veterinary Pathology, be promoted to Dean, College of Veterinary Medicine, and Regents Professor in the Department of Veterinary Pathology, effective July 1, 1967. Dr. Cole will serve 80 per cent time as Dean at an annual rate salary of \$22,572.00 and will serve as Regents Professor at an annual rate salary of \$5,100.00. This appointment is occasioned by the retirement under the rules of the Board of Trustees of Dean Walter R. Krill.

Stuart Sherwood Roberts, Professor, Department of Surgery, effective March 1, 1967, at a salary of \$22,668.00 per annum. Dr. Roberts is appointed to fill "The Robert M. Zollinger Chair of Surgery."

Robert Dean Coddington, Professor, Department of Psychiatry, effective May 1, 1967, at a salary of \$22,968.00 per annum. He will hold an appointment as Professor in the Department of Pediatrics at "No Salary."

C. Memorandum of Agreement Between The Ohio State University and the State of Ohio, Department of Health

As reported to the Board of Trustees in a memorandum dated December 14, 1966, upon the request of the Director of the Ohio Department of Health, an Agreement has been executed whereby The Ohio State University will provide patient-care for patients having a diagnosis of tuberculosis and admitted by the Director of Health to the University Hospital and housed in the Ohio Tuberculosis Hospital, effective January 1, 1967.

The said Agreement was developed with the advice and counsel of the Attorney General of Ohio, is subject to Sections 3701.60 to 3701.65, inclusive, of the Ohio Revised Code and supersedes the agreements between The Ohio State University and the Ohio Department of Health dated November 10, 1947 and December 6, 1951.

Pursuant to the terms of the Agreement, the Ohio Tuberculosis Hospital will be operated as an agency of the College of Medicine using the same procedures through which the College administers the University Hospital.

The Medical Superintendent of the Ohio Tuberculosis Hospital will be appointed by the Director of Health and report to the Director of Health on administrative matters. The administration of the Ohio Tuberculosis Hospital building and services will be handled by the Administrator of University Hospitals and his several staff associates. This will include not only the day-to-day operation, but budgetary and fiscal matters, building

and other activities. Admissions shall be limited by the admission policies of the Director of Health so that the cost of providing care does not exceed the budget of the Department for the operation of the Hospital.

The College of Medicine may use available facilities of the Ohio Tuberculosis Hospital to continue research and educational programs and to institute new and more intensive programs provided such programs do not interfere with providing adequate care and treatment of tuberculosis patients.

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees ratify the above referred to Agreement which has been executed and approved by the Attorney General of the State of Ohio.

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on January 9, 1967, of Erwin F. Frey, Professor Emeritus in the School of Art.

Professor Frey was born in Lima, Ohio, on April 21, 1892. He studied painting and sculpture at the Cincinnati Art Academy from 1908 to 1912 and was awarded a scholarship at that institution. He later received a scholarship at the Art Students League in New York City where he was selected as one of three to compete for the Prix de Rome Prize in sculpture. He studied also at the Beaux Arts School of Design in New York City and was Assistant to Mrs. Louis St. Gaudens at Cornish, New Hampshire. He studied abroad at The Academy Julian, Paris, from 1921 to 1923, where he maintained his own sculpture studio. He was awarded honorable mention at the Salon des Artistes Françaises, Paris, in 1923. He came to Columbus in 1923 to teach at the Columbus Gallery of Fine Arts. He began his teaching career at The Ohio State University in 1925 as its first artist in residence. During the years between 1925 and his retirement in 1962, he carried the responsibility of teaching sculpture to countless undergraduate and graduate students and pursued a most impressive career as a practicing sculptor. His major works include the statue of Dr. William Oxley Thompson, on the campus of this University; two 8-foot stone figures in Fairmont Park, Philadelphia, representing pioneer America, executed in 1943; General George Custer Monument, New Rumley, Ohio, 1933; "Resignation" standing at the Columbus Gallery of Fine Arts; and "Christ after the Resurrection."

Professor Frey actively supported the cause of art in the Columbus community as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Columbus Gallery of Fine Arts. He published many articles on Art, Sculpture and Education; pursued research in the technical areas of sculpture production and taught students to realize and express humanistic and spiritual values in the artistic process and the art form. Many of his former students are now teaching and practicing sculpture in the field today.

To attest its respect and appreciation for distinguished achievement in sculpture and as a teacher, The Ohio State University awarded him the Sullivant Gold Medal in 1950. He was elected to Phi Beta Kappa in 1953.

His consecration to the cause of bringing the artistic experience to the lives of students and to the enrichment of the public environment will be appreciated and remembered through his works in many communities and through the works and teachings of his students which perpetuate his sensitive regard and love for life and its poetic expression in the sculptor's materials.

B. Norman F. Woelfel

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on December 24. 1966, of Norman F. Woelfel, Professor Emeritus in the School of Education, and former Director of the Teaching Aids Laboratory.

Professor Woelfel was born on August 9, 1895, in Buffalo, New York, where he completed elementary and secondary education. Matriculating at Columbia University, Professor Woelfel earned the degrees of Bachelor of Science, Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy. He completed the latter degree in 1933.

Professor Woelfel joined the faculty of The Ohio State University in 1937 as Assistant Professor and Research Associate, serving as a staff member of a nationwide research project in school broadcasting. In 1943, upon completion of the research project, he became the Director of the newly organized Teaching Aids Laboratory and was promoted to the rank of Associate Professor. In 1945, he achieved the rank of Professor. He served the University as Professor and Director of the Teaching Aids Laboratory until his retirement in 1962.

Professor Woelfel was gifted in writing and during his active career authored numerous articles and brochures dealing with educational philosophy, the curriculum, educational broadcasting and materials of instruction. He was organizer, founder and editor of the educational journal, Social Frontiers, described by Lawrence Cremin as "without doubt one of the authentic, progressive voices of the thirties." Charles Beard, John Dewey, Lewis Mumford, Bruce Bliven and Robert Hutchins were some of its distinguished contributors. His books included Molders of the American Mind and Educational Goals for America, and, in collaboration with other Ohio State professors, A Wartime Focus for Ohio's Elementary Schools and Radio and the School. He was responsible for the development of more than 20 color filmstrips, with accompanying text bulletins, which have been widely distributed to educational centers in this country and abroad.

Professor Woelfel was held in high regard by his colleagues, students and leading citizens for his demonstrated ability as a teacher and researcher. His contributions to the students of The Ohio State University and to the people of Ohio for his 25 years of outstanding service will long be remembered.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, March 9, 1967, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: Jacob E. Davis, Chairman, John W. Bricker, Bertram D. Thomas, John G. Ketterer, Mervin B. France, James W. Shocknessy and Don M. Hilliker.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Honorary Degrees

The Faculty Council on February 14, 1967, recommended that the honorary degrees as specified be conferred on the following individuals:

Abe Fortas, Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court - Doctor of Laws

<u>Charles Goode Gomillion</u>, Professor and Administrator at the Tuskegee Institute - Doctor of Laws

Loren Franklin Steiner, Chief of the Agricultural Research Service, United States Department of Agriculture, Honolulu, Hawaii - Doctor of Science

Sherman Emery Lee, Director of the Cleveland Museum of Art and Professor of Art at Western Reserve University - Doctor of Humane Letters

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the Faculty Council recommendation.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous voice vote.

B. Recommendation for the Benjamin G. Lamme Meritorious Achievement Medal - Charles Adelbert Smith

The Committee on Honorary Degrees and Honors of the College of Engineering, with the unanimous endorsement of the faculty of the College of Engineering, has nominated Charles Adelbert Smith, Vice President of Kaiser Aluminum and Chemicals Corporation, for the Benjamin G. Lamme Meritorious Achievement Medal to be awarded at the June Commencement, 1967.

President Fawcett recommended that this nomination be approved by the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Dr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. France, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous voice vote.

C. Revision of Rule 53.0701 of Rules for the University Faculty

The Faculty Council on February 14, 1967, approved the recommendation that the Faculty Rule dealing with membership of the Student Senate be amended to include representation from the College of Biological Sciences, the University College and the School of Allied Medical Services (Rule 53.0701, Section 2, of the Rules for the University Faculty).

C. Revision of Rule 53.0701 of Rules for the University Faculty

President Fawcett recommended that the above amendment as approved by the Faculty Council be adopted, and that the Secretary be instructed to formally correct and reprint the change as approved by the Faculty Council.

The Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote, and the Secretary was instructed to make such revisions in the $\underline{\text{Rules for}}$ the University Faculty.

D. Establishment of Department of Plant Pathology in the College of Agriculture and Home Economics

The Faculty Council on February 14, 1967, in accordance with the procedures set forth in Article V, Section 1, of the Bylaws of the Board of Trustees and Rule 13.01 of the Rules for the University Faculty, approved the proposal that effective July 1, 1967, there be established in the College of Agriculture and Home Economics a Department of Plant Pathology and that the academic discipline of Plant Pathology now administered by the Department of Botany and Plant Pathology in the College of Biological Sciences be transferred to the newly created Department.

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the action of the Faculty Council regarding the establishment of a Department of Plant Pathology in the College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

E. Naming of Buildings

Upon the recommendation of the Cabinet, it was proposed that two campus buildings be renamed. (1) President Fawcett recommended that the building located at 1949 Neil Avenue, formerly housing the Veterinary Laboratory, be renamed "Neil-17th Building." It was suggested that a commemorative name not be used since the building will be demolished in the next few years. (2) President Fawcett further recommended that the present Pharmacy and Microbiology Building, located at 1958 Neil Avenue, be renamed "Edith Cockins Hall" in memory of Miss Edith Cockins, who served the University from 1895 to 1944 in several capacities, principally as its registrar, and who contributed so significantly to the University as a student, alumna and administrative official. Miss Cockins died March 15, 1963.

These proposals were in accordance with the \underline{Bylaws} of the Board of Trustees. They were recommended for approval.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendations by unanimous voice vote.

F. <u>Degrees and Certificates Conferred</u> -Winter Quarter Commencement Convocation

President Fawcett recommended that degrees and certificates be conferred at the Winter Quarter Commencement Convocation on March 16, 1967, to those students who have completed the requirements for their respective degrees and certificates and are recommended by the Faculty Council. The names of those awarded degrees and certificates will be included in the minutes of this meeting. (See Appendix VIII, page 481.)

The Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

G. Prices for Faculty-Staff and Student Athletic Books, 1967-68

As a result of financial studies by the Department of Athletics which have indicated a possible deficit in the 1967-68 fiscal year, the Athletic Council has held a lengthy series of meetings devoted to possible solutions to the impending financial problem. A complete discussion of possible alternatives has been held and the Athletic Council has proposed, with the concurrence of Executive Dean John T. Bonner, Jr., a two dollar increase in the prices of faculty-staff and student athletic activity cards.

After a careful review of the athletic financial situation by the President's Cabinet, President Fawcett recommended that beginning with the 1967-68 season athletic activity cards for faculty-staff members be raised from \$14 to \$16 and athletic activity cards for students be raised from \$12 to \$14.

The amount paid by faculty-staff and students for athletic activity cards has not been increased since 1956, and athletic ticket prices to the general public have been raised in 1956, 1961 and 1963.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote.

H. Report of Auditor of State to The Ohio State University

The Annual Report of Examination of The Ohio State University by the Auditor of State for the fiscal year 1965-66 has been received. The report states that "The audit and examination disclosed the financial records and accounts to be neatly, currently and accurately maintained."

President Fawcett recommended that the receipt of the above-referred-to Annual Report of the Auditor of State be noted in the minutes of this meeting and that said Report be filed with the official documents of the Board of Trustees.

The Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

I. Change in Title of Degree from Bachelor of Laws (LL. B.) to Juris Doctor (J. D. or Doctor of Jurisprudence)

The faculty of the College of Law, with the endorsement of the University Faculty Council, has proposed that effective Spring Quarter, 1967, the degree Juris Doctor (J. D. or Doctor of Jurisprudence) be awarded to those students who have completed the study of law at The Ohio State University; and in accordance with the University policy those students who have attained a superior level of academic achievement shall receive the additional academic distinction as indicated by the terms "summa cum laude" or "cum laude."

It was proposed further (a) that this change in degree for all graduates of the College of Law be retroactive, upon request, for those who had earned the baccalaureate degree before they entered the College of Law at The Ohio State University, (b) that all past graduates of The Ohio State University who earned the degree Juris Doctor in recognition of their excellence in academic performance shall be issued upon request a new diploma carrying the appropriate designation of high scholarship--summa cum laude or cum laude, and (c) that the fee to cover the cost of printing and distributing the diploma issued retroactively shall be \$10.00.

President Fawcett recommended that the above proposals from the faculty of the College of Law, which neither creates a new degree nor a new degree program, be adopted by the Board of Trustees, and that the Secretary be instructed to issue a new diploma to those persons who are qualified under the above specifications.

Mr. Shocknessy moved that the above recommendation be approved and Mr. Hilliker seconded the motion.

Mr. Bricker moved that the section identified as item (a) in the second paragraph of the above recommendation be amended to read as follows:

that this change in degree for all graduates of the College of Law be retroactive, upon request, for those who had earned a baccalaureate degree before they were awarded the Bachelor of Laws degree by The Ohio State University.

Mr. Shocknessy stated that he agreed with Mr. Bricker and seconded the motion to amend the proposal.

The Chairman, Mr. Davis, invited President Fawcett to express his position regarding the motion to amend and the President responded by indicating that the Board of Trustees, in its wisdom, might properly modify the proposal; however, it was his desire to let the recommendation stand as presented. Mr. Davis suggested that in recognition of the significance of the proposed amendment the motion be withdrawn and referred to the President for further study and consultation with the faculty. The suggestion was declined. The Chairman called for a roll call vote and the motion to amend the recommendation was adopted with six members voting affirmatively and Mr. Davis voting negatively.

The motion to approve the recommendation as amended was adopted with six affirmative votes and one negative vote by Mr. Davis.

J. Policy on University Appraisals for University Hospitals

Historically, the University has been on the State system of cash accounting for capital improvements. The coming of Medicare, however, provides for reimbursement to cooperating agencies on the basis of depreciation of buildings and equipment used in connection with services rendered.

It is, therefore, necessary to provide Medicare auditors with certified depreciation figures to be used under the rules set forth administratively by the Federal Government, to implement Public Law 89-97.

Accordingly, the College of Medicine secured three proposals for appraisals: from Industrial Appraisal Company, the Lloyd-Thomas Co. and the American Appraisal Company. The American Appraisal Company's proposal in the amount of \$20,000.00 for the first appraisal and an annual charge for updating for accounting purposes of \$1,300.00 is judged to be the best of the three.

Proposals for services rendered all carry a cancellation provision at the end of any contract year should the parties involved not be satisfied with the relationship.

President Fawcett recommended that the American Appraisal Company be engaged to provide the necessary appraisal services for University Hospitals to qualify our accounting procedures under Public Law 89-97 (Medicare Act) at an initial cost not to exceed \$20,000.00 and an annual fee for updating the appraisal of \$1,300.00. Funds are available in Budget Account 960200.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

Louis Kasza, Assistant Professor, Department of Veterinary Pathology, effective May 1, 1967 through June 30, 1967, to study in England.

C. College of Dentistry - Internal Loan

In order to provide the necessary funds to have schematics prepared for an application for Federal funds for this project, President Fawcett recommended that \$14,100.00 be transferred from Account 179992 to Account 801110 with the understanding that repayment will be made from State appropriations and the Federal Grant.

VIII. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of George J. Hamwi, M. D., Professor in the Department of Medicine and Director of the Division of Endocrinology and Metabolism; Lida Hays, Assistant Professor Emeritus in the Department of Physical Education; Lloyd B. Fidler, Assistant Professor Emeritus in the Department of Agricultural Education; and Wilbur F. Stewart, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Agricultural Education. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

A. George J. Hamwi, M.D.

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on February 14, 1967, of George J. Hamwi, M.D., Professor in the Department of Medicine and Director of the Division of Endocrinology and Metabolism.

George John Hamwi was born July 23, 1914, in New York City where he received his early education. After two years at Columbia University, he attended the American University of Beirut and there received his Bachelor of Science degree in 1936. He received his medical degree at the same institution four years later. Following internships at the Metropolitan Hospital in New York City and the Presbyterian Hospital of Philadelphia, he spent four years in active duty in the United States Navy, a part of this time attached to the Marine Corps. He returned from the war to The Ohio State University where he took residencies in pathology and internal medicine and followed this with a year as Fellow in endocrinology and metabolism at Cornell University. In 1949 he returned to Ohio State as Assistant Professor of Medicine in the newly established Division of Endocrinology and Metabolism and was primarily responsible for the growth and development of this Division to its present size and professional stature. In 1960 he was instrumental in obtaining the award of a Clinical Research Center by the National Institutes of Health to the College of Medicine and was Director of this Center until June, 1965.

Dr. Hamwi's professional affiliations were many. He was a member of the Central Society for Clinical Research, the New York Academy of Sciences and the American Federation for Clinical Research. His memberships in clinical specialty societies were many and included The American College of Physicians, The American Thyroid Association, The American Cancer Society, The American Geriatrics Society, The American Society of Clinical Nutrition and others. He was past president of the Ohio State Medical Association and chairman of the Council on Foods and Nutrition of the American Medical Association.

Dr. Hamwi took very seriously the traditional and ideal, but usually impossible, roles of the academic physician—those of teacher, clinician and investigator—and he pursued each of these three roles with a zeal and effectiveness which is seldom approached by modern academicians. He was keenly aware of the fact that university physicians generally do not take a sufficiently active interest and responsibility in the administrative and political activities of organized medicine. He devoted literally hundreds of hours of energetic effort in his activities in behalf of the local and state medical societies and in the American Medical Association. He was one of the founders of the local Society of Internal Medicine and took an active interest and participation in organizing the state and national societies of internal medicine.

Professor Hamwi exhibited many evidences of his talents as a teacher, both in bedside demonstration and in didactic exposition. His chairmanship of the Committee on Professional Education of the American Diabetes Association was only one of many evidences of this interest.

A. George J. Hamwi, M. D. (continued)

Dr. Hamwi had many basic as well as clinical research interests. However, the strongest were those in connection with diabetes mellitus specifically, and in carbohydrate and lipid metabolism in general. His contributions in this sphere are well known to those in the field.

Dr. Hamwi's main non-professional interest and hobby was his devotion to his family and to his friends. However, even outside this circle, his humor, warmth and generosity will always be remembered.

On behalf of the members of the Faculty of the College of Medicine and his colleagues throughout the University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

B. Lida Hays

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on February 7, 1967, of Lida Hays, Assistant Professor Emeritus in the Department of Physical Education.

Professor Hays was born in Columbus, Ohio, on October 14, 1901. She was graduated from The Ohio State University where she received her Bachelor's degree in 1923. In 1928 she earned her Master's degree from Teacher's College of Columbia University.

Professor Hays taught at The Ohio State University from 1935 to 1937 and from 1945 to 1966. She was promoted to Assistant Professor in 1955. During her teaching career she also held positions in the high schools of Middletown, Ohio, and Uniontown, Pennsylvania, as well as at Hood College and Wittenberg University.

Professor Hays was a member of the Midwest and National Associations for Physical Education of College Women, The Women's Physical Education Section of the Ohio College Association and the American Association for Health, Physical Education, and Recreation.

Professor Hays in her very warm and helpful way made her greatest contributions to the Department by her willingness to assume many of the less popular assignments in teaching and in the supervision of recreation. Her outstanding contribution to her students was in beginning courses where she was unusually successful in helping them attain success and satisfaction. She also was effective in building up interest in student activities and aiding them in bringing their projects to successful conclusions.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

C. Lloyd B. Fidler

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on February 17, 1967, of Lloyd B. Fidler, Assistant Professor Emeritus in the Department of Agricultural Education.

Professor Fidler was born on a farm in Knox County, Ohio, on June 30, 1893. He received his Bachelor's degree in 1925 and his Master's degree in 1934 from The Ohio State University. He taught vocational agriculture in Waldo, Ohio, High School for five years before becoming associated with The Ohio State University as a cooperating instructor at Canal Winchester. In this capacity, he directed the work of student teachers in vocational agriculture. As a teacher, he was very successful in organizing and conducting year-round programs for young and adult farmers.

Mr. Fidler was associated with the State Department of Education as a Supervisor for Special Programs including war-production training and agricultural-veterans training. In his most recent years as an associate with the Department of Agricultural Education and State Department of Education, he gave special emphasis to adult education programs.

Mr. Fidler was a member of Gamma Sigma Delta, Phi Delta Kappa, National Education Association, The American Vocational Association and its affiliates. He had the distinction of serving as President of the Ohio Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association. Throughout the years, he was very active in community organizations.

Mr. Fidler was an excellent and dedicated teacher. He was thorough, stimulating and thought provoking. He worked tirelessly in helping meet individual needs and in improving the community of which he was a part. His contribution to agricultural education has been significant.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

D. Wilbur F. Stewart

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on February 18, 1967, of Wilbur F. Stewart, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Agricultural Education.

Professor Stewart was born June 28, 1885, on a farm in northern Illinois. He received his Bachelor's degree at the University of Wisconsin and his Doctor of Philosophy degree from Columbia University. He started his teaching career in elementary education and later was a teacher of agriculture and school superintendent at Tracy, Minnesota. He came to Ohio in 1917 as a teacher-educator and state supervisor of agricultural education. He had the responsibility to develop the original program to prepare teachers of vocational agriculture. He served as Professor and Chairman of the Department of Agricultural Education until 1948.

D. Wilbur F. Stewart (continued)

Dr. Stewart was an outstanding teacher who gave emphasis to such basic aspects in agricultural education as the development of individual farming programs and problem-solving methods of teaching as applied to agriculture. Many of these sound procedures have been reported in his book, Methods of Teaching in Agriculture. He emphasized the development of abilities in parliamentary procedure and prepared a handbook that has been distributed widely throughout the world.

Dr. Stewart was called upon to serve in a number of institutions as a visiting professor and to speak to many teacher groups. He served as Vice President of the American Vocational Association and was editor of the "Agricultural Education Magazine."

Dr. Stewart was held in high regard by the members of his profession. He has made a lasting impression upon the development of a program which has stressed the integration of theory and practice. His contribution to agricultural education and vocational education for more than forty years has been significant.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE ONE THOUSAND AND NINETEENTH MEETING

OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Columbus, Ohio, April 13, 1967

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, April 13, 1967, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENATIONS

A. Proposal to Establish a Graduate Degree Program in Medical Microbiology

The Faculty Council on March 14, 1967, upon the recommendation of the Council on Academic Affairs, approved for transmittal to the Board of Trustees and the Board of Regents the recommendation that a graduate degree program at the Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy levels be approved in Medical Microbiology. This proposal, which was approved by the Graduate Council on December 10, 1966, recommended the establishment of such a graduate program of studies in order that the faculty of medical microbiologists, with their special orientation, will be able to participate in a graduate curriculum for the preparation of future teachers and researchers in this particular field.

While the program of Medical Microbiology will offer courses which are important to the instruction of the graduate student in this field, other departments, particularly the Department of Microbiology, offer courses which are basic or supplemental to this disciplinary area. Major emphasis in course material in the Department will be the study of microbial organisms and those aspects which are associated with the establishment of, resistance to or treatment of infection to which man is host. In addition, study will be offered which logically deals with the host response to microbial invasions, whether they be normal, abnormal or theoretical.

As part of the development of a graduate program, a carefully conceived and appropriately conducted research program within the Department will provide both motivation and advancement in scholarly achievement to the graduate students pursuing studies therein. Each member of the Department at the present time has a research program under way.

President Fawcett recommended that the above proposal to establish Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy degree programs in Medical Microbiology be approved by the Board of Trustees, and pursuant to Section 3333.04 Revised Code of Ohio that the proposal for the new degree program be forwarded to the Ohio Board of Regents; and further, subject to the approval of the Board of Regents, that this action become effective Summer Quarter, 1967.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

B. Proposal to Establish New Degree Program-Doctor of Philosophy in Biostatistics

The Faculty Council on March 14, 1967, upon the recommendation of the Council on Academic Affairs, approved for transmittal to the Board of Trustees and the Board of Regents the recommendation that the Graduate School be authorized to grant the degree--Doctor of Philosophy in Biostatistics.

This proposal, which was approved by the Graduate Council on June 4, 1966, recommended the establishment of a program which is designed to produce scholars concerned with the study of the mathematical and statistical models of life process which constitute the area of biostatistics. The degree will be administered by the Graduate Committee on Biostatistics appointed by the Dean of the Graduate School.

The application of statistics to biological problems, and in particular to biomedical research, has gained momentum during the past few decades and has led to the widespread recognition of biostatistics as a new discipline. The study of biology provides an impetus for the development of statistical methods for dealing with special biological phenomenon and the study of statistics and mathematics provides a framework that helps to shed light on some biological problems. The biostatistician is not the only biologist who studies statistics nor is he the only statistician who studies biology, but he is the only man who is primarily concerned with both areas.

A biostatistics program will reinforce interdisciplinary programs among biologists and mathematicians. The Ohio State University offers a unique opportunity for the development of such a program as it has Colleges of Agriculture and Home Economics, Biological Sciences and Arts and Sciences on one campus. The College of Biological Sciences would have a particular interest in the program of biostatistics and would provide a logical place for such a department if and when that development seems necessary.

President Fawcett recommended that the above proposal to grant the Doctor of Philosophy in Biostatistics degree be approved by the Board of Trustees, and pursuant to Section 3333.04 Revised Code of Ohio that the proposal for the new degree be forwarded to the Ohio Board of Regents; and further, subject to the approval of the Board of Regents, that this action become effective July 1, 1967.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

C. Revision of Rules 31.03, 31.05, 33.11, 33.13, 35.07 and 37.09 of Rules for the University Faculty

On March 14, 1967, the Faculty Council approved a series of revisions in Rules for the University Faculty which relate to the changes necessary to the establishment of the new course-numbering system which is to go into effect for the 1967-68 academic year. These changes are reflected in Rules 31.03, 31.05, 33.11 and 33.13.

The Faculty Council at its March meeting also approved changes in Rules 37.09 and 35.07 which reflect changes applying to the repeating of a course which has already been successfully passed or courses for which EM examination credit has been given.

President Fawcett recommended that the above referred to revisions in the Rules for the University Faculty be adopted by the Board of Trustees, and that the Secretary be instructed to formally correct and reprint the specific revisions as they were adopted by the Faculty Council and attached to these minutes as Appendix VIII, page 565.

Upon motion of Dr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Bricker, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote, and the Secretary was instructed to make such revisions in the Rules for the University Faculty.

D. Water Supply System

The growth of the University has oversubscribed the present water supply system. Accordingly, Professor Kenneth W. Cosens of the Department of Civil Engineering was engaged to examine the problem and report thereon. His report, "Campus Water Study for The Ohio State University," calls for the improvement of the system in phases.

The study provides for improved fire protection through the increase in water pressure and for an increase in the quantity of water available to the several campus areas. It also provides for adequate water supply for the University College. Finally, the report calls for the elimination of multiple meter stations and the provision of master metering.

Inasmuch as the expansion of the University mandates the implementation of certain phases of the study immediately, with others to follow as soon as practicable, President Fawcett recommended that this study be received and filed with the official documents of the Board of Trustees; and that the President and the Vice President for Business and Finance be hereby authorized to proceed with the implementation of the study, phase by phase, in accordance with the release of funds by the Board of Trustees, following proper presentation of each phase as a project.

Upon motion of Mr. Bricker, seconded by Mr. Jones, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous voice vote.

* *

II. PERSONNEL CHANGES

President Fawcett made the following statement concerning Dr. John Herrick's retirement as Executive Director of Campus Planning:

The first personnel recommendation is one which I make with mixed feelings for it marks the completion of the administrative duties of Dr. John Herrick--a man whom I have known for many years and who was my first appointee to a Cabinet post upon my assumption of the duties of President of this University. Dr. John Herrick has had a distinguished career in education--a career which he will continue as special assistant in the Office of Academic Affairs and as a professor of education. The importance and significance of his work as Executive Director of Campus Planning cannot, in my view, be overstated. The Master Plan for Ohio State--a landmark document--was created and administered under his direct supervision and is an instrument which will serve this University for decades to come.

As John leaves his administrative tasks, I am sure you will join with me in extending thanks for the job he has done and in wishing him well for the productive work which is his ahead.

President Fawcett followed with the recommendation that all personnel changes since the March 9, 1967 meeting of the Board, as recorded in the official "Salary Roll" of the University, be approved by the Board. A. Walter Harold Hamilton, M.D.

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on February 22, 1967, of Walter Harold Hamilton, M.D., Clinical Assistant Professor in the Department of Surgery.

Dr. Walter Hamilton was born in Columbus, Ohio, on March 24, 1898. He was educated at North High School and The Ohio State University where he received his M.D. degree in 1922. His internship followed in Harper's Hospital, Detroit, Michigan, with a residency in rectal and colon surgery at the Mayo Clinic, in Rochester, Minnesota.

Following his return to Columbus, he joined with his father, Dr. Edwin A. Hamilton in the practice of proctology. He was married to Gladys Bray and of this union, one daughter and four sons were born. All four of his sons received their higher education at The Ohio State University, where they earned M. D. degrees as follows: Edwin B., 1952; Charles H., 1954; Walter W., 1959 and James F., 1965. All four are in practice or graduate training in Columbus Hospitals.

In addition to being on the active staff of all the Columbus Hospitals and local medical societies, Dr. Hamilton was also a member of the Ohio State Medical Association, American College of Surgeons and American Proctologic Society. He was certified by the American Board of Colon and Rectal Surgery.

"Dr. Walter" has been admired and respected by students, interns and residents in the wards and clinics of University Hospital over the last 35 years. His quiet dignity, but firm bearing and yet compassionate bedside manner, made him loved by patients, students and colleagues. He will be remembered for his efforts in establishing the Division of Proctology at The Ohio State University, as well as his literary contributions in his chosen field.

On behalf of the members of the Faculty of the College of Medicine and his colleagues throughout the University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

B. Edward S. "Beanie" Drake

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on March 23, 1967, of Edward S. Drake, Manager Emeritus of the Ohio Union and founder and adviser of many student organizations. Edward S. Drake was known as "Beanie" to thousands of alumni and students, not only through his 33 years of service as manager of the Ohio Union, but also as adviser for more than 50 years to campus organizations.

B. Edward S. "Beanie" Drake (continued)

"Beanie" was born April 22, 1876, in Circleville, Ohio. He received the major part of his primary and secondary education in the Columbus Public Schools. He later studied at the University of Chicago, Armour Institute and The Ohio State University. Before coming to The Ohio State University as Manager of the Ohio Union, Mr. Drake's early business experience was with the Auditor's office of the Hocking Valley Railway, the Sunday Creek Coal Company and the Franklin County Auditor's office. He managed the Ohio Union from 1913 until his retirement in 1946, when he received the title of Manager Emeritus. During his 33 years of University service, he also carried many other campus responsibilities. He had an active part in the feeding of student soldiers of the two world wars. He also was in charge of food arrangements for the student dormitories on the campus and the Alumnae Scholarship House for girls during that time.

Besides his official duties, Mr. Drake won campus acclaim as an adviser to students and as a counselor for many of their organizations. At one period in his life, he was adviser to ten different organizations at the same time. His demand as a student adviser reflects in a most significant way the honor and prestige which were afforded him by the students at Ohio State. He was adviser to the three class honorary groups--Sphinx, Bucket and Dipper and Romophos--which he founded. He was a life long and charter member of Ohio Staters, Inc. Other groups in which he participated and advised included Ohio Union Activities, Strollers Dramatic Society, Independent Men's Association, Phi Sigma Kappa, Alpha Phi Omega, Newman Club and Scarlet Mask. He attended weekly meetings of Ohio Staters, Inc., until two months before his death. Mr. Drake was also interested in civic and church affairs. He was a member of the Catholic Church and was instrumental in promoting the establishment of the Hocking State Forest.

Mr. Drake traveled extensively in the South, particularly in the Smokies, and vacations usually found him traveling in that direction--often with one or more students as his traveling companions. His travel in the Smokies also prompted his favorite hobby--collecting books and information about the Appalachian section of the United States. Several years ago, he donated his personal book collection of over 500 volumes to The Ohio State University libraries. His area of academic interest was languages and literature.

Mr. Drake was also active in his professional organization, The Association of College Unions. He helped found the organization in 1914, serving as its secretary from 1919 to 1932 and as president in 1933. He also served as editor of the Association's Bulletin for a number of years.

Edward S. "Beanie" Drake was a pleasant little man, always busy as any undergraduate in all the varied aspects of university life. His stewardship of the Ohio Union carried him into intimate contact with students and their problems. He was always cheerfully helpful in times of stress and a willing guide to the fuller life in happier times. He never married; The Ohio State University and its students were his whole life.

As "Beanie" passes from the scene at Ohio State, his impression will linger on for years to come, not only in the form of fond memories but also in the many traditions and customs which he helped to found and propagate. He gave to the students at Ohio State a source of humanism, warmth and guidance which is so important even today if we are to carry on and fulfill the true purposes of The Ohio State University.

On behalf of the entire University family, the Board of Trustees expresses to his many friends on and off campus, its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in their loss. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in the passing of Edward S. Drake.

C. Frank Greene Davis

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on March 29, 1967, of Frank Greene Davis, Instructor Emeritus in the Department of Engineering Drawing.

Mr. Davis was born in Baltimore, Maryland, on August 31, 1897, and was graduated from the United States Military Academy, West Point, Class of 1919. His father, Colonel William D. Davis, fell in the line of duty in World War I, and Fort Davis in the Panama Canal Zone was named in his honor. Following in the footsteps of his father, he had an active army career, serving in both the first and second World Wars, and retiring in 1954 with the rank of Colonel.

In addition to numerous campaign ribbons, Colonel Davis had been awarded the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star and Army Commendation Medal (all U. S.), the Croix de Guerre w/palm (France), the Croix de Guerre (Belgium) and the Philippine Legion of Honor.

Colonel Davis came to The Ohio State University upon his retirement from the service, his last tour of duty being on the staff of his Alma Mater, the United States Military Academy.

Colonel Davis served as an Instructor in the Department of Engineering Drawing from October, 1954, until his retirement with the rank of Instructor Emeritus in September, 1965.

D. Forrest Guy Ketner

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on April 9, 1967, of Forrest Guy Ketner, who for 14 years gave dedicated service as a member and twice as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University.

Forrest Guy Ketner was born on January 23, 1888, in Thurston, Ohio, where he received his early education in the public schools of Fairfield County. He was awarded a Bachelor of Arts degree from Otterbein College in 1910 and was granted an honorary Doctor of Laws degree by the same institution in 1958.

Mr. Ketner's association with The Ohio State University extends over a period of more than half a century from the date of his first appointment in 1918 as a Lecturer in the Division of Farmer's Institutes of the Cooperative Extension Service. He was appointed by the Board of Trustees on July 1, 1918, as the first County Agricultural Extension Agent in Delaware County, where he served until May 31, 1920. Following this service, he accepted the appointment as the first Director of Cooperative Marketing with the Ohio Farm Bureau Federation. In this position, he began a long and effective professional career which has led to his being recognized as a national leader in the field of livestock management and marketing. Mr. Ketner served as Secretary-Treasurer and General Manager of the Producers Livestock Association and its several wholly owned subsidiary corporations from the time of its organization July 19, 1934 until his retirement in 1959.

Mr. Ketner's community and business affiliations were many. He was a member of the Bexley Methodist Church, Columbus Rotary Club, Columbus Country Club, Columbus Athletic Club, Aladdin Shrine of the Masonic Lodge and Scottish Rite. He served actively in Big Brothers, Columbus Area Chamber of Commerce, Ohio and American Farm Bureaus, and Ohio State Grange and was a member of the national honorary society of agriculture, Gamma Sigma Delta.

Prior to Mr. Ketner's appointment as Trustee of The Ohio State University in 1949, he served as Chairman of the Alumni Advisory Committee for the College of Agriculture and Home Economics and as a member of the Alumni Advisory Board of The Ohio State University. Throughout his service as Trustee of the University, he contributed a depth of experience and fundamental sensitivity which made him a constructive participant in the policy development of the University. It was during his term of office as Chairman of the Board in 1956 that Dr. Novice G. Fawcett was selected as President of the University. He was a Past President of the Governing Boards of State Universities and Allied Institutions, in which organization he effectively served higher education of the state and nation for 12 years.

Upon the expiration of his second term as a Trustee of The Ohio State University in 1963, he was presented the University's Distinguished Service Award. In 1964 a scholarship fund was established in his name for students in the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, and he became a member of the Presidents Club of The Ohio State University.

RESOLUTION providing for the issuance of \$125,000 Student Center Notes of 1967 for and on behalf of the Wright State Campus and its successor, Wright State University, and its Board of Trustees, for the purpose of paying part of the cost of constructing and equipping a project comprised of a student activity center providing space for student activities and recreation, and also dining facilities and bookstore space at Wright State Campus.

WHEREAS, the Wright State Campus was created by Substitute Senate Bill No. 210, passed by the 106th General Assembly of Ohio, as an interim institution of higher education under the administration of the Boards of Trustees of The Ohio State University and Miami University, with the goal of developing a state university; and

WHEREAS, the Boards of Trustees of said Universities are directed by Revised Code Section 3352.10 to establish policies and goals for the purpose of preparing Wright State Campus to become a state university, and are empowered by Revised Code Section 3352.11 to do all things necessary for the creation, proper maintenance and successful operation of Wright State Campus with the goal of developing a state university; and

WHEREAS, the Wright State Campus Advisory Committee (herein called the Advisory Committee) has been established, pursuant to Revised Code Section 3352.12, for the purpose of consulting and advising with regard to policies for the development of Wright State Campus into a state university; and

WHEREAS, the Advisory Committee did at its January 20, 1966 meeting, by formal resolution find and determine that there is an urgent need at Wright State Campus to develop facilities to serve as a student activity center with dining and other areas to accommodate functions which are important to the successful operations of an institution of higher education and necessary to the development of Wright State Campus into a state university; and

WHEREAS, the Boards of Trustees of The Ohio State University and Miami University did at their meetings held February 10, 1966 and February 12, 1966, respectively, concur in such need and determined to assist in the development of such building; and

WHEREAS, the Advisory Committee did at its July 1, 1966 meeting by resolution advise and recommend that the project should constitute a student activity center providing, among other things, space for student activities and recreation, and also dining and bookstore space (hereinafter called the "Project"), estimated to cost approximately \$950,000; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Wright State University, upon commencement of the exercise of its powers, pursuant to Substitute Senate Bill No. 210, will have authority under Revised Code Section 3345.11 to issue bonds or notes to repay moneys borrowed and advances made for the development of the Project; and

WHEREAS, The Ohio State University, by agreement with Miami University, has heretofore undertaken supervision of certain capital improvements at Wright State Campus; and

WHEREAS, extensive analysis by representatives of the Advisory Committee and of The Ohio State University have resulted in the conclusion that the most feasible way of providing for the development of the Project is through the borrowing of necessary funds by The Ohio State University, supported by guarantees, which funds would then be advanced to the Wright State Campus and its successor, Wright State University, and which borrowed and advanced funds are to be repaid from the proceeds of the issuance of bonds or notes by the Board of Trustees of Wright State University following the commencement of their exercise of powers as aforesaid; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the recommendation and request made on behalf of the Advisory Committee, the Board of Trustees of Miami University did, on June 11, 1966, duly adopt a resolution concurring in such method of financing, concurring in the levy of a Student Center Fee to be pledged thereto and planning and development of the Project, and concurring in the exercise of all functions by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University and officers of said University designated by it, in the planning, development and financing of the Project; and

WHEREAS, by resolution adopted July 1, 1966, the Advisory Committee has advised and requested the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University cause the Project to be financed substantially in the manner provided in the resolution hereinafter referred to and adopted by said Board on July 14, 1966; and

WHEREAS, by resolutions adopted July 14, 1966, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, pursuant to the resolutions of the Advisory Committee and of the Board of Trustees of Miami University referred to above, provided for the issuance of \$950,000 Student Center Notes of 1966 for and on behalf of The Wright State Campus and its successor, Wright State University, and its Board of Trustees, (hereinafter called "Note Resolution") for the purpose of paying the costs of the Project pursuant to Section 3352.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio and for the planning and development of the Project, assessing a Student Center Fee at Wright State Campus, and matters incidental thereto; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to said Note Resolution said Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University issued and delivered a note entitled "Student Center Note of 1966" dated August 25, 1966 in the aggregate principal sum of \$950,000 to The Winters National Bank and Trust Company of Dayton, Dayton, Ohio, together with a guaranty as required by said resolution; and

WHEREAS, the present estimate of cost of constructing and equipping the Project exceeds the original estimate of cost by \$125,000; and

Pursuant to the resolutions of the Wright State Campus Advisory Committee and of the Board of Trustees of Miami University referred to above, it is hereby determined and declared that it is necessary to issue notes as herein provided in the principal sum of \$125,000 pursuant to Section 3352.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio for the purpose of paying the part of the costs of the Project, and thereby provide for the maintenance and successful operation of Wright State Campus with the goal of developing a state university.

Section 2. Said notes together with the Student Center Notes of 1966 dated August 25, 1966 heretofore authorized and issued in the aggregate sum of \$950,000 shall be payable from (a) the Student Center Fees assessed upon students at The Wright State Campus and other revenues of the Project financed hereby which are pledged thereto subject to application thereof to pay costs of the Project and subject to any pledge thereof to secure bonds or notes issued by Wright State University and its Board of Trustees, pursuant to Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio, to repay the moneys borrowed for the below mentioned Project evidenced by the notes of this issue and the issue of the said Student Center Notes of 1966 and advanced to The Wright State Campus and its successor, Wright State University and its Board of Trustees, and (b) the proceeds of the sale of any such bonds or notes of Wright State University and its Board of Trustees, which proceeds shall be applied promptly to the payment or prepayment of such principal and interest; and neither the State of Ohio nor The Ohio State University, Wright State University, their respective Boards of Trustees, nor Wright State Campus is obligated to pay the same from any other funds or source, nor shall this note be a claim upon or lien against any other property of the State or any of such institutions thereof, and this note is not the general obligation of the State or any such institutions and their full faith and credit are not

pledged thereto and the noteholders shall have no right to have any taxes levied, collected or applied for or to the payment of the principal of or interest upon the notes of this issue.

Section 3. Said notes shall be designated "Student Center Notes of 1967", shall be dated as determined by the Fiscal Officer, and shall mature not later than February 25, 1968, provided that the same may be prepaid at any time without penalty or premium. Said notes shall bear interest payable at maturity or upon prepayment of principal, at the rate or rates, not exceeding 3-3/4% per annum, as determined by the Fiscal Officer in his certificate awarding such notes. Said notes shall be in the denomination of \$25,000 and any multiples thereof, and may be represented by a single note, all as requested by the Original Purchaser thereof and approved by the Fiscal Officer. Said notes shall be payable as to both principal and interest at the place or places designated by the Original Purchaser and approved by the Fiscal Officer, and said notes shall be signed by the President or the Fiscal Officer of The Ohio State University, and shall be impressed with or bear a facsimile of the official seal of the University. Said notes shall be substantially in the form attached hereto as Exhibit A, page 558, the terms and covenants of which are incorporated herein, with such changes not detrimental to the University as the President or the Fiscal Officer may approve. For purposes of this resolution, Fiscal Officer shall mean the Vice President, Business and Finance, of The Ohio State University.

Section 4. Said notes herein authorized are issued by The Ohio State University and its Board of Trustees solely for and on behalf of Wright State Campus and its successor, Wright State University and its Board of Trustees, and not for or on behalf of The Ohio State University or its Board of Trustees nor for or on behalf of Miami University and its Board of Trustees, and all obligations hereunder shall be solely those of Wright State University and its Board of Trustees upon the commencement of the exercise of their powers pursuant to Chapter 3352 of the Revised Code of Ohio and Substitute Senate Bill No. 210 enacted by the 106th General Assembly, as amended or affected by further legislation, whereupon the control of the aforesaid Project shall be transferred to the Board of Trustees of Wright State University; and prior thereto the sole obligation of The Ohio State University and its Board of Trustees, pursuant and subject to the authority aforesaid, shall be to fix and maintain Student Center Fees at The Wright State Campus in amount sufficient, with other revenues of said Project, to produce net receipts estimated to be adequate to permit the ultimate issuance of bonds by the Board of Trustees of Wright State University, under Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio, in sufficient principal amount for the repayment of the notes of this

issue and the Student Center Notes of 1966 as aforesaid, and to maintain the pledge of said Student Center Fees and other revenues as aforesaid to secure said issues of notes.

Section 5. The notes shall be sold by negotiation, solicitation of proposals or advertisement for bids, by the Fiscal Officer upon such terms and conditions, not inconsistent with this resolution, as he may determine, but at a purchase price of not less than par plus accrued interest, if any. The award of the notes by the Fiscal Officer shall be evidenced by a Certificate of Award signed by him (the purchasers designated therein being herein collectively called the "Original Purchasers"), and the President and Fiscal Officer of the University are each authorized to do all things necessary or proper for the delivery of said notes in accordance with such award and this resolution; PRO-VIDED, HOWEVER, that such notes shall not be delivered until and unless there is delivered to the Original Purchasers and to the University a guaranty or guarantees of the full obligation of said notes signed by or on behalf of a guarantor or guarantors satisfactory to the Original Purchasers and the Fiscal Officer substantially in the form attached hereto as Exhibit B, page 561, with such changes therein as such Original Purchasers and the Fiscal Officer may approve, his delivery of such notes and their acceptance of them to be conclusive evidence of such approvals.

Section 6. The proceeds of such notes shall be advanced to The Wright State Campus and its successor, Wright State University and its Board of Trustees, by crediting such proceeds to an account clearly indicating the purpose thereof, and such proceeds shall be disbursed by the appropriate officers of the University to pay costs of the Project, including all costs relating to the planning, development and financing thereof. Until needed for such purposes said proceeds may be deposited and invested in such manner as the Fiscal Officer may determine. Any balance remaining in said account at the time of commencement of the exercise of powers by the Board of Trustees of Wright State University shall be transferred to Wright State University for application as aforesaid. The payment in full of said notes, with all interest due, by Wright State University and its Board of Trustees or by the aforesaid guarantors shall serve to discharge the aforesaid advance of funds by The Ohio State University.

WHEREAS, provided that this guaranty be given, The Ohio State University and its Board of Trustees (herein sometimes collectively called the University) will issue and deliver to

one or more Student Center Notes (herein called the Notes), aggregating not more than One Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$125,000) in principal amount, maturing February 25, 1968, bearing interest payable at maturity or upon prepayment at the rate of three and three quarters per centum (3-3/4%) per annum, and issued for and on behalf of The Wright State Campus and its successor, Wright State University and its Board of Trustees, for the purpose of paying part of the cost of constructing and equipping a project at Wright State Campus comprised of a student activity center providing space for student activities and recreation, and also dining facilities and bookstore space at Wright State Campus, the obligation of which notes is to be satisfied by Wright State University and its. Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS, provided that this Guaranty be given, the Bank will accept and pay for said Notes;

NOW, THEREFORE, in order to induce the University to issue and deliver the Notes to the Bank, and in order to induce the Bank to accept delivery and make payment for the Notes, the Guarantors do hereby jointly and severally unconditionally guarantee to the Noteholders, and each of them, irrespective of the genuineness, validity, regularity, or enforceability thereof, or of the obligation evidenced thereby, and irrespective of any other circumstance, and all sums stated therein to be payable on the Notes shall be promptly paid in full at maturity, and, in case of any extension of time of payment or renewal in whole or in part, all sums shall be promptly paid when due according to such extension or extensions, renewal or renewals, at maturity; and in case Wright State University and its Board of Trustees shall fail to pay or cause to be paid all or any part of the principal of and interest on the Notes when due, the Guarantors jointly and severally agree to pay to the noteholders the amount due and unpaid in like manner as if such amounts constituted the direct and primary obligation of the Guarantors.

C. Report on the University's Investment Portfolio

The report on the University's Investment Portfolio dated March 31, 1967, as submitted to the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees, was received and ordered to be filed with the official records of the Board.

D. Report on Proposed Academic Reorganization

President Fawcett stated that in view of the significance and wide interest in the proposed academic reorganization of the University, Dr. John E. Corbally, Jr. has been invited to review the proposal. Dr. Corbally's report is summarized as follows, and a copy of his report filed with the official records of the Board of Trustees;

The proposal from the Council on Academic Affairs urges:

- The creation of the Colleges of the Arts and Sciences composed of four new colleges--arts, humanities, mathematics and physical sciences, and social sciences and the present College of Biological Sciences and University College. The faculty of these units would have complete jurisdiction over basic education requirements and over all programs for baccalaureate degrees that have no further designation other than Bachelor of Science or Bachelor of Arts;
- The creation of a College of Administrative Science to replace the College of Commerce and Administration which will lose several departments to the new Colleges of Arts and Sciences; and
- The creation of a College of Optometry, now a school, as a fifth graduate professional college.

The new basic education unit, the Colleges of the Arts and Sciences, would have a coordinating council composed of the deans of its six member colleges. One of these deans would serve a four-year term as Chairman of the Coordinating Council of Deans and as Chairman of the Faculty of the Arts and Sciences.

Thereupon the Board adjourned to meet Thursday, May 11, 1967, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, at 10:30 a.m.



Adopted by Board of Trustees April 13, 1967 (See page 528)



On March 14, 1967, the Faculty Council approved the following revision of Rule 31.05 and changes as underscored in Rules 31.03, 33.11, 33.13, 35.07 and 37.09 of Rules for the University Faculty.

31,03. Course Numbering.

Courses numbered below 200 are primarily designed for freshmen and sophomores and do not carry credit for graduate students. Courses numbered from 300 through 499 are not open to freshmen and do not carry credit for graduate students. Courses numbered from 500 through 799 are designed for upperclassmen and graduate students and are not open to freshmen or sophomores, except with the consent of the Dean of the Graduate School. Courses numbered 800 and above are designed for graduate students and are open to undergraduates only with the consent of the Dean of the Graduate School.

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31.05. Prerequisites for University Courses of Instruction.

Section 1. Courses numbered 000-099 are considered to be noncredit courses for orientation, remedial, or other noncollege-level experiences. There are no prerequisites for courses at this level.

Section 2. Courses numbered 100-199 are basic courses providing undergraduate credit and do not count on a major or field of specialization in any department. Courses at this level have either no prerequisites or specified course(s) numbered 100-199.

Section 3. Courses numbered 200-299 are basic courses providing undergraduate credit and may be counted on a major or field of specialization. Prerequisites for courses at this level include: (1) forty-five quarter hours in collegiate courses, exclusive of ROTC or Physical Education; or (2) specified course(s) numbered 100-199; or (3) satisfactory placement on entrance examinations when applicable.

Section 4. Courses numbered 300-499 provide undergraduate and/or professional credit and include: (a) intermediate courses providing undergraduate credit which may be counted on a major or field of specialization; (b) basic courses in the professional divisions of the Colleges of Education and Engineering; (c) basic courses in the Colleges of Dentistry, Pharmacy, and Veterinary Medicine. Prerequisites for courses at this level include: (1) ninety quarter hours in collegiate courses, exclusive of ROTC and Physical Education or (2) specified course(s) numbered 100-399.

Section 5. Courses numbered 500-599 provide undergraduate or professional and graduate credit, and include: (a) intermediate courses providing undergraduate credit which may be counted on a major or field of specialization and provide graduate credit only in other departments; (b) intermediate courses in the professional divisions of the Colleges of Education and Engineering; (c) intermediate courses in the Colleges of Dentistry, Pharmacy, and Veterinary Medicine; (d) basic courses in the Colleges of Law and Medicine. Prerequisites for courses at this level include: (1) fifteen quarter hours in courses in the same discipline numbered 200 or higher, or (2) ten quarter hours in courses numbered 200 or higher in the same discipline, plus ten quarter hours in courses numbered 200 or higher in specified allied disciplines, or (3) baccalaureate degree.

31.05. Prerequisites for University Courses of Instruction. (continued)

Section 6. Courses numbered 600-799 provide undergraduate or professional and graduate credit. These courses are designed to meet the needs of Section 5, a, b, c, d, and also include: (a) advanced courses providing undergraduate credit which may be counted on a major or field of specialization and may also provide graduate credit in all departments; (b) advanced courses in professional divisions and professional colleges. Prerequisites for courses at the 600 level include: (1) fifteen quarter hours in courses in the same discipline numbered 300 or higher, or (2) ten quarter hours in courses numbered 300 or higher in the same discipline, plus ten quarter hours in courses numbered 300 or higher in specified allied disciplines. Prerequisites for courses at the 700 level include: (1) fifteen quarter hours in courses in the same discipline numbered 400 or higher and (2) additional specified course(s) numbered 600 or higher.

Section 7. Courses numbered 800-999 provide graduate credit only and are open only to students in the Graduate School. Prerequisites for courses at this level include: (1) thirty quarter hours in courses in the same discipline, or (2) twenty quarter hours in the same discipline, plus twenty-five quarter hours in specified allied disciplines.

Section 8. In accordance with the procedure outlined in Rule 31.0201, departments and schools will submit for approval a statement for each proposed new or altered course in the 500 through 900 groups which shows the prerequisites that are to be regarded as belonging to the same subject and those that are regarded as allied subjects.

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33.11. Cancellation of Elective Courses.

As promptly as possible after the filing of election cards, the Registrar shall report to the Dean of the College having charge of the Department concerned all elementary elective courses (those numbered below $\underline{300}$) in which fewer than twelve students are enrolled and all elective advanced undergraduate courses (those numbered $\underline{300}$ and above) in which fewer than eight students are enrolled. The Dean shall cancel every such course unless the Department can show adequate reason why it should be given. When such a course is cancelled, the Dean shall notify the Registrar, who shall insert in the Official Bulletin a notice of its cancellation.

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33.13. Regulations for the Control of Course Offerings.

Section 1. The regulations applicable to classes in the $\underline{000, 100, \text{ and } 200}$ groups are:

- a. A course offered only once during the three quarters of the regular academic year which has failed to secure an average enrollment of fifteen for the last two times it was given shall be withdrawn from the catalogue or limited to alternate years.
- b. A course offered during two quarters of the regular academic year which has failed during the preceding year to secure a total enrollment of forty shall be offered during one quarter only.

- 33.13. Regulations for the Control of Course Offerings. (continued)
- c. A course offered during three quarters of the regular academic year which has failed during the preceding year to secure a total enrollment of seventyfive shall be withdrawn for one quarter, and, if the total enrollment is less than forty, it shall be withdrawn for two quarters.
- d. If an elective course during a current quarter fails to secure an enrollment of twelve, it shall be withdrawn for that quarter despite the fact that its record of enrollment during the preceding year permits its listing under a, b, or c of this Section 1. (See Rule 33.11.)

Section 2. The regulations applicable to classes in the 300, 400, 500, 600,and 700groups are:

- a. A course offered only once during the three quarters of the regular academic year which has failed to secure an average enrollment of ten for the last two times that it was given shall be withdrawn from the catalogue or limited to alternate years.
- b. A course offered during two quarters of the regular academic year which has failed during the preceding year to secure a total enrollment of twenty-five shall be offered during one quarter only.
- c. A course offered during three quarters of the regular academic year which has failed during the preceding year to secure a total enrollment of fortyfive shall be withdrawn for one quarter, and if the total enrollment is less than twenty-five it shall be withdrawn for two quarters.
- d. If an elective course during a current quarter fails to secure an enrollment of eight, it shall be withdrawn for that quarter despite the fact that its record of enrollment permits its listing under a, b, or c of this Section 2. (See Rule 33.11.)

Section 3. A course withdrawn or suspended under these rules may be restored by following the procedure for introduction of new courses.

Section 4. These regulations do not apply to minor or major research problem courses, to honors courses, or to courses in which special types of instruction or equipment, or limited laboratory facilities, require that, without reference to expense, classes be smaller than those provided for by these regulations. All exceptions of these types must be authorized by the Council on <u>Academic Affairs</u> each year.

Section 5. Courses for which there is inherently a limited demand but which are essential to the University's program, may be exempted from these regulations, in whole or in part, by the Council on <u>Academic Affairs</u>. Each such course shall be considered annually upon its individual merits.

35.07. Marks.

EM -- Examination

Section 1. This mark indicates credit given to students registered in the University on the basis of examinations taken prior to or after admission to the University. The level of achievement which must be demonstrated by the student on these examinations in order to receive EM credit shall be determined by the Department or School in which the course for credit is being given is taught. This credit, up to a maximum of 45 quarter credit hours, or of 70 quarter credit hours in the case of students registered in the School of Nursing who have completed diploma nursing programs and are licensed registered nurses, shall be assigned only upon the authorization of the Chairman of such Department or the Director of such School and with the approval of the Executive Committee of the College in which the student is registered. Additional examination quarter credit hours may be assigned in the same manner but only with the prior approval of the Faculty Council.

Section 2. Examination credit shall not be given to a student for a course in which he has received a mark at this University. No credit points are allowed for courses in which a mark of EM is given.

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37.09. Repetition of Courses.


Section 1. A student who has received a mark of E in a required course at this University may repeat the course for credit only as provided in Rule 37.07. A student who has received a mark of E in any other course at the University may repeat the course for credit at his option.


Section 2. An undergraduate or professional student, as defined in Rule 41.03, who has received a mark of D in a course at this University may repeat the course for credit only upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee and with the approval of the Dean of his College. A graduate student, as defined in Rule 41.03, may, when approval is given by his adviser, repeat for credit any course in which he has received a mark of D.

Section 3. An undergraduate or professional student, as defined in Rule 41.03, who has received a mark of A, B, or C in a course taken at this University or elsewhere may repeat the course only as an auditor, upon receipt of permission by the Chairman of the Department or Director of the School and the Dean of his College. A graduate student, as defined in Rule 41.03, may, after a period of five years, and when approval is given by the Graduate Committee of his Department and the Dean of the Graduate School, repeat for credit a course in which he has received a mark of A, B, or C.

Section 4. A student who has audited a course may subsequently repeat the course for credit with the permission of the Executive Committee of his College.

Section 5. The credit hours for a repeated course shall in no case be counted more than once in meeting graduation requirements.

Columbus, Ohio, May 11, 1967

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, May 11, 1967, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: Jacob E. Davis, Chairman, John W. Bricker, Bertram D. Thomas, John G. Ketterer, Frederick E. Jones, Mervin B. France, James W. Shocknessy and Don M. Hilliker.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Parking Inventory and Analysis Study

The Franklin County Regional Planning Commission has engaged the firm of Barton-Aschman Associates, Inc., of Chicago to make a detailed Parking Inventory and Analysis of the Central Traffic District as a part of the Comprehensive Regional Plan of Columbus and Franklin County, popularly known as the "Blue Plan." The Barton-Aschman parking study and related studies by the Regional Planning Commission staff and other consultants will include a detailed inventory of parking facilities, updating of origin and destination information, a study of duration of parking based on postcard questionnaires distributed to all parked cars in the study area, a detailed facility usage study and preparation of parking demand forecasts.

These studies as originally designed included the University district and the campus of The Ohio State University, but the campus would have been treated as a single district. The results, therefore, would have been of limited value to the University in the study of its parking and traffic problem.

An agreement has been reached between The Ohio State University and the Franklin County Regional Planning Commission whereby the Barton-Aschman study will be expanded to provide for analysis of the campus data by parking zones and to provide 100 printed copies of a separate report for The Ohio State University area. This report will include future parking demands by campus area, trip purpose and category of parker; and it will include recommendations with respect to policy decisions required by the University to meet the parking demands of the future. The agreement provides that the additional costs for this expanded analysis in the campus area and for the preparation of the special report for the University will be paid by the University in the amount of \$8,200.00.

It was recommended that the President be authorized to sign the above referred to agreement since the findings from this expanded study will be directly usable in the currently planned restudy of the campus master plan and will also be useful in meeting traffic and parking problems prior to the completion of the master plan revision, and it is to the clear advantage of the University to participate in the Barton-Aschman studies as indicated. Funds are available for this purpose in Account 122248.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees by unanimous roll call vote authorized the President to sign the agreement described in the foregoing paragraphs.

B. Distinguished Service Awards

Serving as a Committee on Distinguished Service Awards, the President's Cabinet has nominated for consideration by the Board of Trustees the following-named persons to receive the Distinguished Service Award at the September 1, 1967 Commencement. These awards are given in recognition of distinguished service to The Ohio State University and the awards are in accordance with action taken by the Board of Trustees in 1952.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the above nominations for the Distinguished Service Award were approved by unanimous voice vote.

II. PERSONNEL CHANGES

A. Retirement of Dean of Women and Dean of Men and the Promotion of Two Persons to Major Administrative Responsibilities

President Fawcett made the following statement concerning the retirement of Dean of Women Christine Y. Conaway and Dean of Men Mylin H. Ross and the promotion of Associate Dean Ruth H. Weimer and Associate Dean Milton W. Overholt:

After a combined total of 50 years of service to students at our University, Dean of Women Christine Y. Conaway and Dean of Men Mylin H. Ross have announced their plans for retirement. Their dedicated service to two generations of students in a period of rapid university growth has enabled our institution to demonstrate its concern for each individual student as a person. Based upon a recommendation from Executive Dean Bonner, I am asking that Christine Y. Conaway be designated Dean of Women Emeritus and Mylin H. Ross be awarded the title of Dean of Men Emeritus, effective September 1, 1967.

Careful study of the various functions of the Area of Student Relations has indicated that some reorganization of responsibilities is necessary and desirable. I am, therefore, recommending the promotion of Ruth H. Weimer from Associate Dean of Women to Associate Dean for Student Relations, effective September 1, 1967. Her new responsibilities will include the coordination of all student organizations and activities and programming for the residence halls.

I would also like to recommend the promotion of Milton W. Overholt from Associate Dean of Men to Associate Dean for Student Relations, effective September 1, 1967. His responsibilities will include the coordination of all student housing, men and women, on and off campus. Eight of the other Big 10 institutions have previously instituted a unified housing program of this type.

At the March 9, 1967 meeting, the Board of Trustees approved the appointment of Dr. Luvern L. Cunningham to succeed Dr. Donald P. Cottrell as Dean of the College of Education, effective September 1, 1967. Dean Cottrell's retirement from the position of Dean is pursuant to the policy established by the Board of Trustees which requires that 'principal administrative officers of the University be relieved of their assignments as such administrative officers of the University on June 30 next following the attainment of age 65.'

To assure continuity in the Office of the Dean of the College of Education, it is recommended that an exception be made to the above-referred to policy which extends Dean Cottrell's retirement from the Deanship from June 30, 1967 to August 31, 1967.

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X. RESOLUTION IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the death of Albert L. Henne, Professor in the Department of Chemistry. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, a copy of the following Resolution expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the family of the deceased.

A. Albert L. Henne

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on March 11, 1967, of Albert L. Henne, Professor in the Department of Chemistry.

Albert L. Henne was born in Brussels, Belgium, on March 24, 1901. He received the Ph.D. (cum laude) from the University of Brussels in 1925 and was a fellow of the Belgian-American Education Foundation at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1925-26. He became a naturalized United States citizen in 1933.

In 1927-28 Dr. Henne was employed by the Thomas and Hochwalt Laboratories in Dayton, Ohio. In 1928 he became associated with Thomas Midgley, Jr., the inventor of Ethyl Gasoline (containing lead tetraethyl as anti-knock agent). Although a mechanical engineer, Midgley saw chemical problems and called upon chemists to help attack them. Dr. Henne worked with Midgley on natural

and synthetic rubber and on a suitable gas for home refrigeration. Work on the latter problem resulted in the Freons. During World War II Freon was used as the basis for a spray or aerosol insecticide which since then has become a commonplace household item. Professor Henne held the position of Special Lecturer at the University and Director of Research of the Midgley Foundation (at Ohio State) during 1931-1938 after which he was appointed Associate Professor of Chemistry in the University in 1939.

During the period 1939-1943 Dr. Henne was associated with Professor Cecil E. Boord in setting up and organizing the work and laboratories of the American Petroleum Institute Project at Ohio State. This need for pure hydrocarbon syntheses for engine fuel evaluation arose from the discovery that certain highly branched hydrocarbons had a higher anti-knock rating than the best leaded gasoline. The information obtainable from the synthetic program was required for the design of aviation gasoline for the piston-type engines then used for airplanes. This military requirement of World War II was the main cause for the government building permit allowing construction of the laboratory now known on the campus as the "War Research Building." He was Vice Chairman of the Fuel Section, National Defense Research Committee, during World War II.

Dr. Henne was made Professor of Chemistry at The Ohio State University in 1942. His main scientific interest during his academic career was in the organic chemistry of fluorine-containing hydrocarbons, in which he became a recognized international authority.

The fluorocarbons, because of their unique properties, became important substances for the Manhattan District activity leading to the atomic bomb. In "Atomic Energy for Military Purposes," H. D. Smyth writes (10.29, p. 182, diffusion separation): "As in the plutonium problem, so here also, there were many questions of corrosion, etc., to be investigated. New coolants and lubricants were developed by A. L. Henne and associates, . . ."

For many years, Albert Henne was a consulting chemist for the E. I. du Pont de Nemours and Co. and its associated companies, Frigidaire and the Ethyl Gasoline Corporation. He was a Guggenheim Fellow at Cambridge University, England, in 1952. He served as Visiting Professor at the University of Colorado (1948), California Institute of Technology (1950), American University of Beirut (1954-55) and University of Prague (1947). He served for several periods at the University of Brussels where he helped establish the chemistry courses for the degree, then new at Brussels, in chemical engineering. The Belgian Government decorated Dr. Henne as Chevalier de Premier Ordre du Roi Leopold II.

Dr. Henne was an excellent teacher. He liked to teach organic chemistry where he emphasized industrial aspects. His wide experience in many universities, both in this country and in Europe, made his counsel valued.

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XI. REPORTS

A. Report on Conveyance of Land to The Ohio State University for the Newark Campus

The President presented the following report:

On March 2, 1967, the Park National Bank of Newark, The Newark Trust Company and The First National Bank of Newark as Trustees of the Licking County Foundation for Public Giving, Newark, Ohio, conveyed 101.38 acres, more or less, by warranty deed to the State of Ohio. Title to the land, located in the City of Newark, Licking County, Ohio, was examined and approved by the Attorney General of Ohio. The land will provide the site for The Ohio State University - Newark Campus.

It is reported for information and the record that the 101.38 acres were acquired from four owners at a cost of \$335,000.00. The funds were provided by donations resulting from the Newark-Ohio State University Development Campaign.

B. Report on the University's Investment Portfolio

The report on the University's Investment Portfolio dated April 30, 1967, as submitted to the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees, was received and ordered to be filed with the official records of the Board.

C. Report on Highlights of Campus Activities

President Fawcett reported to the Board on some of the significant activities of the University during recent weeks and activities to take place in the near future. Some references included in the Report, which is filed with the official records of the Secretary, were as follows:

 The College of Engineering will dedicate six new classroom and laboratory buildings and additions in ceremonies Friday, May 12, 1967. The special program will be held as part of the College's 14th annual Alumni of the College of Engineering Day. About 1,000 alumni have been invited to attend.

C. Report on Highlights of Campus Activities

- Harold Howe II, who has been the U. S. Commissioner of Education since December, 1965, will address the Spring Quarter Commencement on June 13.
- Dr. Richard M. Mall, Professor of Speech, will be the new Director of Alumni Affairs, succeeding John B. Fullen, who will retire July 1 after 39 years of service.
- 4. The College of Medicine recently broadcast its fourth pilot television program of the year via the Ohio Medical Education Network. The television venture, directed to physicians as an adjunct to continuing medical education on the postgraduate level, was carried by WOSUTV, WGSF-TV in Newark and CATV (cable) Service in several hospitals. Hospitals participating in the experimental television series are in Springfield, Chillicothe, Mansfield, Ironton, Newark, Coshocton, London, Marysville, Marion and Columbus.
- 5. Ohio State is now home for the NAEB Journal, official publication of the National Association of Educational Broadcasters. Scheduled to be renamed the Educational Broadcasting Review, the Journal currently circulates 6,000 copies on a bi-monthly basis throughout the U. S. and in Canada and Mexico.
- 6. Fourteen new Assistant Professors in the arts and humanities have been awarded Development Fund Faculty Fellowships for 1967, according to Dr. Alfred B. Garrett, Vice President for Research. Each recipient will receive a \$1,500 award.
- 7. An Ohio State metallurgist has been tapped for membership in the National Academy of Engineering, a group of the nation's leading engineers called upon to advise the Federal Government in matters of science and technology. Dr. Mars G. Fontana, Chairman of the Department of Metallurgical Engineering and an authority on corrosion research, was one of 93 scientists elected to the Academy.
- 8. Dr. Kenneth L. Bader, Assistant Dean of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, has been selected by the American Council on Education as an academic intern for the 1967-68 academic year. Dr. Bader will serve his internship at the University of California in Irvine.
- Aerial demonstrations and ground exhibits of general aviation airplanes will be featured at the third annual Aviation Day Program of Ohio State University's Department of Aviation Saturday, May 13, at the University Airport.

D. A Six-Year Report of the College of Medicine, The Ohio State University

The Secretary distributed the report entitled, "A Six-Year Report of the College of Medicine, The Ohio State University, 1961 through 1966," to each member of the Board as requested by Dean Richard L. Meiling. A copy of the said report will be filed with the official records of the Board of Trustees.

XII. RECOGNITION OF JACOB E. DAVIS, RETIRING CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Mr. John Bricker, in recognition of the expiration of Mr. Jacob E. Davis' term as a member of the Board of Trustees and his retirement as Chairman of the Board, expressed words of deep appreciation and high commendation for Mr. Davis' devoted and generous service as trustee and alumnus of the University. Mr. Bricker made special reference to the following projects to which Mr. Davis gave his personal leadership and generous fiscal support: (a) the establishment of a scholarship fund for the School of Social Work and the creation of a cooperative graduate program in social work in the Cincinnati community with the University of Cincinnati cooperating with The Ohio State University, (b) the establishment of a special fund for the College of Law and (c) the establishment of the Novice G. Fawcett Professorship in Educational Administration.

The President, speaking on behalf of the administration, faculty and students, expressed words of gratitude to Mr. Davis for his effective and loyal service dedicated to the best interest of the University. In recognition of Mr. Davis' distinguished service, President Fawcett presented the citation which appears on the following page.

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, June 8, 1967, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: John W. Bricker, Vice Chairman, John G. Ketterer, Frederick E. Jones, Mervin B. France, James W. Shocknessy, Don M. Hilliker and William C. Safford.

The Vice Chairman, Mr. Bricker, introduced the new member of the Board of Trustees, Mr. William C. Safford, Cincinnati, Ohio, who was appointed by Governor James A. Rhodes, to succeed Mr. Jacob E. Davis, for the term beginning May 14, 1967 and expiring May 13, 1976. Mr. Safford's appointment was confirmed by the Ohio Senate on May 11, 1967.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

Mr. John W. Bricker, Vice Chairman of the Board of Trustees, presided in the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Stanley C. Allyn.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Budgets for the 1967-1968 Fiscal Year

President Fawcett presented the following statement pertaining to the recommended budgets for the 1967-1968 fiscal year:

Today, I am presenting a unified University budget document that is based upon total estimated revenue for the 1967-1968 fiscal year. This estimate is subject to passage by the General Assembly of Ohio of the Appropriation Act (House Bill 537) and anticipates a Supplemental Appropriation Act to produce the revenue for a continuation budget in the amount of \$136,917,720.

This budget proposal is based on the concept that the University must continue to improve the quality of its programs despite the fact that resources for the full implementation of University needs are not in sight.

Expenditure estimates in the amount of \$136,917,720 for 1967-1968 are approximately \$15,000,000 above estimated expenditure of \$121,947,357 for 1966-1967. The increase from all funds - both general and restricted - can be traced for the most part to increases in the following categories:

1.	Personal services, including retirement	\$5,700,000
2.	Operating and equipment budgets	2,000,000
3.	Cooperative Extension	700,000
4.	Federal and State grants and gifts	4,000,000
5.	University Hospitals	1,700,000
6.	Operation of dormitories	500,000
7.	Auxiliary enterprises and services	500,00 0

Over \$2,000,000 of the increase for personal services is required to cover the cost the University will incur in compliance with the requirements of H. B. 93. The remainder of the increase is to provide merit and market salary increases and adjustments to meet competition and will increase the faculty salary average by about five per cent. Additional funds are provided to employ personnel necessary to meet increased enrollments and to staff new buildings coming "on line" in the next year.

The increases in the operating and equipment budgets reflect inflationary costs and additional funds required because of new buildings and increased enrollment.

A. Budgets for the 1967-1968 Fiscal Year (continued)

Increased funds for the Ohio Cooperative Extension Service and for the University Hospitals are required to provide salary increases for professional staff members, to meet mandated salary increases for civil service and equivalent personnel under the requirements of H. B. 93 and to cover price increases caused by inflation.

I am pleased to report the growth of University activity that evolves from Federal, State and private grants, gifts and contracts in support of teaching and research programs. These programs constitute one measure of the growing effectiveness of our faculty. It should be recognized, however, that the growing activity of this institution in the fields of research and teaching requires certain internal financial commitments in support of the quality that earns the recognition of outside funding agencies.

Other increases evolve from earnings and income from literally hundreds of auxiliary enterprises and departmental activities in which income is directly offset by expenses charged against these earnings.

As will be pointed out in the recommendations, expenditures exceed estimated receipts in the amount of \$6,137,144 and which amount hopefully will be funded by a Supplemental Appropriation Act by the General Assembly of Ohio. In the event that the Supplemental Appropriation Act would not produce \$6,137,144, then the hard decision will need to be made as to what advance in fees will be required and/or what reductions in program costs can be effected.

It should be pointed out, however, that any reduction beyond the contemplated expenditure of \$136,917,720 would weaken substantially the quality of certain University programs.

While, if I had the choice, I would not bring a unified budget to the Board at this time because of the uncertainty of resources, such action is absolutely necessary in order to provide timely assurances to personnel that their positions will not be in jeopardy and to reduce as much as possible the loss of people whose services are being sought by other institutions, by government agencies and by business and industry.

With this background of information, President Fawcett presented for consideration by the Board of Trustees a continuation budget proposal involving all of the current budgets for the operation of The Ohio State University for the fiscal year 1967-1968:

General Budget

In recommending this continuation budget it should be noted that the funds necessary for the support of new and improved programs in the amount of \$9,040,813.00 have not been included in the recommended budget and that support for a limited number of program improvements for which commitments have been made in the amount of only about one-half million dollars is provided in the recommended budget.

It is recommended that the following unified budget be approved subject to expenditure limitations as set forth below:

The foregoing recommended budget is presented for adoption subject to passage of House Bill 537.

It is further recommended that the detailed supporting statements for the foregoing summary budget figures which have been reviewed by the Board of Trustees be approved, and that the Secretary be instructed to file this unified budget statement for the fiscal year 1967-1968 with the official records of the University.

Mr. Jones moved that the foregoing recommendations for adoption of a budget in the amount of \$130,780,576.00 for the fiscal year 1967-1968 be approved; and

Further, that it be the sense of this motion that the estimated deficit in the amount of \$6,137,144.00 must be funded through additional legislative actions in the form of a supplemental appropriation at the approximate level recommended by the Ohio Board of Regents or by such adjustments in student fees and programs as may be required to achieve the "continuation budget" in the amount of \$136,917,720.00.

 $\operatorname{Mr.}\nolimits$ France seconded the above motion, and it was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

Budget for The Ohio State University Research Foundation for the 1967-1968 Fiscal Year

It is recommended that The Ohio State University Research Foundation annual budget for the fiscal year 1967-1968, beginning July 1, 1967, be approved in an amount not to exceed \$894, 338.00. This budget was approved by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Research Foundation at its annual meeting on April 21, 1967.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, The Ohio State University Research Foundation budget for 1967-1968 was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

Budget for The Ohio State University Development Fund for the 1967-1968 Fiscal Year

It is recommended that The Ohio State University Development Fund annual budget for the fiscal year 1967-1968, beginning July 1, 1967, be approved in an amount not to exceed \$222,754.00. This budget was approved by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Development Fund at its annual meeting on February 24, 1967.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. France, The Ohio State University Development Fund budget for 1967-1968 was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

President Fawcett continued with the presentation of the following recommendations for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

B. Dormitory Room and Board and Apartment Rental Rates

President Fawcett presented the following resolution and recommended that it be adopted:

WHEREAS, by Section 8 of the Bond Resolution adopted April 8, 1957, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, the University and its Board of Trustees covenanted to adopt and maintain, so long as any of the bonds authorized by the Bond Resolution were outstanding, such parietal rules, and charge and collect such rental rates and charges, from time to time, as may be necessary to assure such occupancy and use of, and receipts from the dormitory facilities as will pay the cost of maintenance and operation and provide for the payment of principal of and interest on the bonds and other payment to special funds required by Section 9 of the Bond Resolution; and

WHEREAS, the rates set forth below are hereby determined to be in compliance with the aforesaid covenants; and

WHEREAS, this resolution has been reviewed by Bond Counsel and approved by them as complying as to form with the aforesaid Bond Resolution;

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

C. Policy Governing Residency Status of Students

On November 11, 1965, the Board of Trustees adopted a revised policy governing the residency status of students enrolled at The Ohio State University to comply with the Board of Regents Rule No. 2 which defines the residency status of students enrolled on the Branch Campuses of state-assisted institutions. The problems in administering the rule during the past year make it apparent that some clarification and revision of the interpretative definition of domicile is needed.

Therefore, for the purpose of clarification and consistency, President Fawcett recommended that the revised statement of policy governing residency status for students at The Ohio State University, as developed in consultation with the Office of the Ohio Board of Regents and endorsed by the President's Cabinet, be approved and included with the minutes of this meeting as Appendix IX, page 637.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

D. Revision of Rule 35.97 of Rules for the University Faculty

On May 9, 1967, the Faculty Council supported the proposal of the Council on Academic Affairs that Rule 35.07 of Rules for the University Faculty be amended to provide for the use of the grading mark of "S--Satisfactory" for those students who have completed satisfactorily the professional education course in student teaching.

President Fawcett recommended that the above action of the Faculty Council be approved.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote, and the Secretary was instructed to make said revision in the Rules for the University Faculty.

E. Proposal to Establish a Master of Arts Degree Program in Chinese Language and Literature

The Faculty Council on May 9, 1967, upon the recommendation of the Council on Academic Affairs, supported the proposal of the College of Arts and Sciences for the establishment of a Master of Arts degree in Chinese Language and Literature. This proposal to establish a graduate degree program at the master's level is in recognition of the University's expanding program in East Asian Languages and Literatures. Since Autumn Quarter 1962, Ohio State students have had the option of choosing Chinese Language and Literature as a major course of study leading toward the Bachelor of Arts degree.

For the past five years, the University has made significant strides in strengthening the faculty and library holdings in the East Asian Languages and Literatures program. The library holdings currently include 18,000 volumes of Chinese and Japanese, and there are presently six faculty members in this area of study. Students interested in East Asian art, history, geography, government and other social sciences desire to increase their proficiency in the East Asian languages in order that they might proceed with research in original Chinese sources. The proposed expansion to the Master of Arts level will make it possible for the Division of East Asian Languages and Literatures to serve these needs.

President Fawcett recommended that the above proposal to establish the Master of Arts in Chinese Language and Literature degree program be approved by the Board of Trustees, and pursuant to Section 3333.04 of Revised Code of Ohio that the proposal for the new degree program be forwarded to the Ohio Board of Regents; and further, subject to the approval of the Board of Regents, that this action become effective Summer Quarter, 1967.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

F. Naming of Building

Upon the proposal of Dean Harold A. Bolz, College of Engineering, on behalf of the Department of Electrical Engineering, and with the concurrence of the President's Cabinet, President Fawcett recommended that the Antenna Laboratory Building, 1320 Kinnear Road, be renamed the ElectroScience Laboratory. It is felt that the term "ElectroScience" more properly describes the work being carried on by the staff housed in this facility.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

G. Degrees and Certificates Conferred -- Spring Quarter Commencement

President Fawcett recommended that degrees and certificates be conferred at the Spring Quarter Commencement Convocation on June 13, 1967, to those students who have completed the requirements for their respective degrees and certificates and are recommended by the Faculty Council. The names of those awarded degrees and certificates will be included in the minutes of this meeting. (See Appendix X, page 641.)

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

H. Creation of Wright State University

WHEREAS, legislation has now been approved by the 107th General Assembly to create Wright State University as an autonomous institution on July 1, 1967 or as soon thereafter as feasible; and

WHEREAS, a number of steps are necessary to insure that the changeover of this institution from a branch status to an independent university is accomplished effectively;

It was therefore recommended that the President of The Ohio State University be authorized to proceed to take such steps as are necessary to facilitate this changeover and that he report to the Board concerning any such steps which may require ratification by the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the Board of Trustees adopted the above resolution by unanimous voice vote.

I. Establishment of the "Samuel and Esther Melton Chair of Jewish History and Studies"

At the July 8, 1965 meeting of the Board of Trustees the "Samuel and Esther Melton Professorship in Jewish History and Studies" was established through funds provided by Mr. Samuel M. Melton.

President Fawcett indicated his deep gratitude and pleasure as he recommended that the "Melton Professorship" be expanded to a "Chair," to be known as the "Samuel and Esther Melton Chair of Jewish History and Studies." This new "Chair" is established pursuant to the action of the Board of Trustees approved on January 14, 1965, and the generous commitment of Mr. Samuel M. The \$250,000.00 described in Item (b) above will be in the form of common stock of the Harsco Corporation which stock is to be held by the University until further notice from Mr. Melton and the interest and dividends from the capital appropriation of the foregoing investment shall be applied to the newly established endowment;
- d. Mr. Melton has in the form of a letter dated May 8, 1967 guaranteed to make further contributions as may be necessary (and include an appropriate provision in his will) so that during a period of not less than eight (8) years from this date the full sum of \$500,000.00 will be attained.

Until the endowment fund identified above attains the \$500,000.00 level no more than \$5,000.00 a year may be withdrawn, which \$5,000.00 shall be used to assist in the support of the Samuel and Esther Melton Professor of Jewish History and Studies.

This expanded program in Jewish History and Studies will be an integral part of a new series of offerings in International Studies now under development at The Ohio State University.

WHEREAS, by authority of Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio, the Board is authorized to acquire by purchase, lease, or otherwise, and to construct, equip, maintain, renovate, repair, improve or remodel and operate, and to lease to or from others, buildings, structures, or facilities and sites therefor and related equipment within or in close proximity to the campus of the University to be used for or in connection with athletic purposes, student activity centers, faculty centers, dining halls, book stores, auditoriums, parking of motor vehicles and contract research facilities; and, for the purpose of paying the costs thereof, or any part thereof, or the repayment of any loans obtained for such purposes, to use any funds in its possession not otherwise obligated, revenues derived from athletic events, and from the operation or leasing of such activity centers, faculty centers,

dining halls, book stores, auditoriums, parking facilities and contract research facilities including but not limited to such portions of student activity fees charged and paid for such purposes, any other revenues or receipts derived or to be derived from the operation or leasing of such structures, buildings, facilities and equipment; and for the purpose of paying all or part of such costs the Board is further authorized thereby to issue and sell bonds, notes or other written instruments evidencing such indebtedness, provided that such obligations shall not be a claim against or lien upon any property of the State of Ohio or any property of or under the control of said Board excepting such parts of the revenues or receipts derived from the operation or leasing of such structures, buildings, facilities, equipment or sites and any portion of the student fees assessed or to be assessed for the purposes of such acquisition. construction, equipment, renovation, repair, improvement or remodeling or for the use of such structures, buildings, facilities, equipment or sites which the Board may pledge to secure the payment of such obligations; and by authority of said Section 3345.11 the Board is also authorized to issue such bonds, notes or other obligations payable as aforesaid in order to retire or refund outstanding notes or other obligations matured or unmatured, to repay moneys previously borrowed or advanced under said section or to reimburse funds of the University for amounts used under said Section 3345.11; and

WHEREAS, the Board has and does hereby determine and confirm that it is necessary to provide additional facilities for the parking of motor vehicles, and, accordingly, hereby declares and determines that it is necessary to construct and equip certain buildings, structures and facilities to be used for or in connection with the parking of motor vehicles all within or in close proximity to its campus, including three multi-level parking structures for the parking of approximately 2,250 motor vehicles, (herein collectively called the "Project") the total cost of such Project being presently estimated to be \$4,500,000; and

WHEREAS, the University has determined to borrow funds to pay part of the foregoing costs, and to issue its Parking System Revenue Bonds, Series A, in the principal amount of \$4,500,000 pursuant to Section 3345.11 of the Ohio Revised Code and pursuant to a resolution of the Board duly adopted September 8, 1966 authorizing said Bonds (which resolution, as the same may be amended, supplemented or superseded, is herein called the "Bond Resolution"), the balance of such costs to be paid from funds of the University available for such purposes; and

WHEREAS, the University has and does hereby determine and confirm that it is necessary to issue notes to provide interim construction financing to pay part of the costs of the Project prior to the issuance and delivery of the Series A Bonds, and for such purpose to issue notes in the principal amount of \$700,000; and

Section 1. It is hereby declared necessary to construct and equip the Project, and to issue notes in the principal sum of \$700,000 pursuant to Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio for the purpose of paying part of the costs of the Project.

Section 2. The principal of and interest on said notes, and such additional notes as may be issued to pay part of the costs of the Project, shall be payable solely from (a) the "Pledged Receipts" after provision for "Operating and Maintenance Expenses", if any, of the "Pledged Facilities" and all payments required to be made from time to time from said "Pledged Receipts" into the "Special Funds" created under the Bond Resolution; and (b) the proceeds of the sale of parking system revenue bonds or notes of the University to be issued pursuant to Section 3345, 11 of the Revised Code of Ohio or other authorizing provisions of law; provided that neither the State of Ohio nor the University or its Board of Trustees shall be obligated to pay the principal of or interest upon such notes from any other funds or source, nor shall such notes be a claim upon or lien against any other property of the University or the State of Ohio, and said notes are not general obligations of the State or the University, and the full faith and credit thereof are not pledged thereto and the noteholders shall have no right to have any taxes levied, collected or applied for or to the payment thereof.

STATEMENT OF POLICY GOVERNING RESIDENCY STATUS AT THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY

Adopted by Board of Trustees June 8, 1967 (See page 608)

STATEMENT OF POLICY GOVERNING RESIDENCY STATUS AT THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY

1. General Policy as to Non-Resident Fees

Every student who is not a resident of the State of Ohio, as defined below, is required to pay non-resident tuition fees in addition to other University fees.

- a. The status of a student as a resident or non-resident of the State of Ohio for fee purposes will be determined as of his original enrollment. In general, that status will remain the same throughout his continued attendance at the University, although such status may be reviewed upon petition. In cases where there has been a break in the student's attendance at the University, the beginning of the last enrollment may be considered by the Registrar as the student's "original enrollment" for the purpose of residence determination.
- b. A person shall be eligible to register as a resident for fee purposes only if he, in the case of an adult student, or the parents or guardian, in the case of a minor student, has established <u>bona fide</u> residence (domicile) in the State of Ohio for twelve consecutive months preceding the first day of classes of the quarter for which registration is made.
- c. Further information or clarification may be obtained by contacting the Office of the Registrar, Room 203, Administration Building, 190 North Oval Drive, Columbus, Ohio 43210.

2. Registration

The burden of registering under the proper residence is placed upon the student. If there is any question as to residence, the matter should be brought to the attention of the Registrar and passed upon prior to original enrollment.

3. Definitions

This policy is interpreted as follows:

- a. An adult student is a person 21 years of age or older.
- b. A person is considered to be a minor until he has reached his twenty-first birthday. Married minors, however, and veterans are entitled to establish and maintain their own residency pursuant to Paragraph 1b.
- c. The residency of a married woman is determined by the rules which would apply to her husband if he would seek enrollment; except that a woman who would have been classified as an Ohio resident for fee purposes immediately prior to her marriage to a non-resident may continue to be classified an Ohio resident providing she continues to live in Ohio.

Statement of Policy Governing Residency Status at The Ohio State University

- d. A woman who is legally separated from her husband may establish her own residency pursuant to Paragraph 1b.
- e. Federal Government service personnel who entered the service from Ohio and their dependents shall be considered residents for fee purposes if they provide proof of continued Ohio domicile such as evidence that (1) they have not acquired a domicile in another state and (2) they have maintained a continuous voting record in Ohio.
- f. Personnel in the military service who enter the service from another state and their dependent children shall be classified as Ohio residents during the period of their active duty assignment and domicile in Ohio. If a person in the service changes his or her residence legally and officially to Ohio, he and his dependents shall be classified as residents.
- g. Aliens admitted to this country on immigrant visas or acquired immigrant visas may establish Ohio residence in the same manner as any other non-resident. All aliens on student visas will be classified as foreign students, and as such, non-residents.
- h. A student registering as a resident for fee purposes, from an established domicile in the state, shall continue to be classified as a resident for as long as he is continuously enrolled as a student at The Ohio State University.
- i. An emancipated minor who is completely self-supporting may be considered a resident for fee purposes. He must present satisfactory proof that his parents, if living, neither contribute to his welfare nor claim him as a dependent for Federal Income Tax purposes. The fact that a minor files his own federal or city income tax return is not sufficient evidence alone to substantiate emancipation.
- j. Teachers in Ohio schools and colleges who enroll at The Ohio State University are classified as resident students when they have signed a contract for the second year.
- k. The residency of any student may be re-evaluated at each term of re-enrollment, provided he has met all requirements for Ohio residency as stated in these rules. Changes of classification from non-resident to resident will not be made retroactive prior to the quarter or term in which application for resident classification is made.
- The residence of any person, other than the parent or legal guardian, who may furnish funds for payment of University fees, shall in no way affect the residence of the student.
- m. Proof of ownership of property in Ohio, payment of local and state taxes, Ohio automobile registration or driver's license or the fact that a person is a legal voter in Ohio, do not, in

themselves, constitute valid evidence of resident status for fee purposes. Residency for fee payment purposes is dependent upon the domicile of the student concerned.

- n. An out-of-state student enrolled for a full program is considered to be in the State for the purpose of attending school, and is presumed not to be here as a permanent resident. Continued presence in Ohio during vacation periods does not of itself overcome the presumption.
- o. Any non-resident student who reaches the age of 21 years, or is married while a student at any university or college in the State of Ohio does not by virtue of such act attain residence for fee payment purpose.

The Recipients of Honors

CHARLES GOODE GOMILLION

DOCTOR OF LAWS

Architect of the transition from past to present, master of the art of human relations, and eminent social scientist

Charles Goode Gomillion was born on a farm in Edgefield County, South Carolina, attended rural schools in his neighborhood, and later taught in those schools before going on to Paine College in Augusta, Georgia, from which he received the A.B. degree in 1928. That same year he joined the faculty of Tuskegee Institute as an instructor in history. In 1959, he received the Doctor of Philosophy degree from The Ohio State University, and an honorary Doctor of Laws degree was conferred upon him by Howard University in 1965.

He has remained at Tuskegee Institute his entire professional career and, as an inspiring teacher and effective administrator, has helped make Tuskegee an institution of distinction. By precept and example, he has been training a group of young teachers and leaders of such competence, insight, and skill that their work commands respect throughout the world.

It is in the field of civil rights, however, that Dr. Gomillion has made his most significant contributions and won national recognition. He relies heavily upon law and due process, condemns violence and fanfare, and maintains that the ballot is the most powerful instrument for the achievement of a democratic society. Through his quiet but effective leadership, the right to vote and the full privilege of citizenship for Negroes were achieved in his community sooner than in any other region of the Deep South. As a member of the Macon County Board of Education, he has been more responsible than any other individual for the workable integration of the public schools, despite what appeared to be insurmountable obstacles. He has been able to persuade people to put aside their illusions, fears, and prejudices and to seek large and mutually beneficial objectives. His calm appeal to reason has educated a generation of both races in the duties of responsible citizenship.

It has frequently been necessary for Dr. Gomillion to resort to court action. Because of the rightness of his position and the expert preparation of his cases, he has never lost a legal battle. One of his major victories came in 1960, when the United States Supreme Court rendered a unanimous decision in his favor in the historic case of Gomillion versus Lightfoot.

LOREN FRANKLIN STEINER

DOCTOR OF SCIENCE

Entomologist and scientist, whose imaginative research has added new dimensions to biological thought and created new techniques for the successful control of insect pests

Loren Franklin Steiner is an internationally recognized entomologist whose basic biological studies have led to new techniques in the control of insects. As a member of the Entomology Research Branch of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, he has devoted his professional life to the control or eradication of harmful insect species.

Among his accomplishments are the publication of numerous scientific and technical articles in professional journals, the development of the male annihilation technique for the control of fruit flies, and the application of his protein hydrolysate bait to the eradication of the Mediterranean fruit fly from Florida. Eradication of the Mediterranean fruit fly has saved millions of dollars annually for the citrus industry of Florida. More importantly, it has also made it unnecessary to use conventional methods of chemical control that could add to the contamination of the ecosystem.

Essential to the control of insects by use of attractants in combination with minimum amounts of toxic chemicals is a fundamental understanding of insect behavior. By demonstrating the importance of such basic knowledge to insect control, Mr. Steiner has made a major contribution to mankind.

On five separate occasions, Mr. Steiner has been recognized by the U.S. Department of Agriculture for his distinguished service as a biologist, economic entomologist, and research director. In 1960, he received the First Annual Honor Award of the Florida Entomological Society. In recognition of his outstanding work in economic entomology, the Entomological Society of America in 1966 selected Mr. Steiner as the recipient of the First Annual J. E. Bussart Memorial Award. To be chosen by the professional entomologists of America as the first recipient of such an award is to be recognized as the outstanding economic entomologist in the country.

A native of Bluffton, Ohio, Mr. Steiner attended The Ohio State University and received the B.Sc. degree in 1926 and the M.Sc. degree in 1927. Upon graduation, he joined the Agricultural Experiment Station at Purdue University. In 1930, he joined the U.S. Department of Agriculture and has been serving as an entomologist in that organization in various capacities up to the present.

Recognized widely for the practical results of his research, Mr. Steiner is also honored today by The Ohio State University for his basic contributions to knowledge and to the science of entomology.

ALAN B. LOOP

THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

Prominent attorney, loyal alumnus, able and respected trustee of The Ohio State University

Alan B. Loop is a man of dedication—to his home and family, his profession, his alma mater, and to education generally. The Ohio State University, from which he was graduated, has benefited immeasurably from his leadership and his loyalty.

In his seven-year term as a trustee, Mr. Loop brought to bear upon the complex problems facing the University the precision of a keen legal mind and the sensitive understanding of one who is committed to the promise of higher education. As chairman of the Board of Trustees, he guided University policy with courage and wisdom during a year which began in stress and ended in accord and progress.

In 1932, Mr. Loop received the Bachelor of Arts degree, after an undergraduate career which identified in unmistakable terms the leadership qualities which have marked his adult life. He served as president of his fraternity, and in 1928, he was captain of the first Ohio State golf team to win the Western Conference championship. Mr. Loop continued his education at Ohio State and received the Bachelor of Laws degree in 1933. He has also studied corporation law and corporate finance at the University of Michigan and the University of Wisconsin.

In addition to his contributions as a member of Ohio State's governing board, Mr. Loop has served fifteen years on other educational bodies. A senior member of the Toledo law firm of Shumaker, Loop and Kendrick, he was elected a fellow of the American Bar Foundation in 1965.

CHARLES A. SMITH

BENJAMIN G. LAMME AWARD

Prominent industrial leader and creative engineer

Charles A. Smith is acknowledged as the key man in the development of aluminous raw materials and in the creation of a major industry based on those resources. Among his more significant contributions have been improvements in high alumina and insulating refractories and the engineering of modern production methods.

Most of Mr. Smith's professional career was spent at Mexico, Missouri, primarily in association with the Mexico Refractories Company which he joined in 1930 as chief engineer. He advanced through a series of administrative positions, ultimately becoming executive vice president and director, and guided the company from a small operation to one of the most important producers of refractory materials in the United States. In 1959, he joined Kaiser Aluminum and Chemical Corporation as vice president and until his retirement in 1966 devoted his time to that company and its recently organized refractories subsidiary.

Mr. Smith received the Bachelor of Ceramic Engineering degree from The Ohio State University in 1923 and did postgraduate work in metallurgy at Lehigh University. During his undergraduate years, his leadership abilities were whetted on extra-curricular activities in the College of Engineering where he was a member of Engineers' Council, Tau Beta Pi, Pi Mu Epsilon, and Phi Lambda Upsilon. Continuing the pattern of leadership, Charles A. Smith rose steadily from his first position as an engineer just out of school to become vice president of one of America's industrial giants.

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



ONE THOUSAND AND TWENTY-SECOND MEETING

OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Columbus, Ohio, July 13, 1967

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, July 13, 1967, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: John W. Bricker, Vice Chairman, John G. Ketterer, Frederick E. Jones, Mervin B. France, James W. Shocknessy, Don M. Hilliker, and William C. Safford.

Mr. John W. Bricker, Vice Chairman of the Board of Trustees, presided in the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Stanley C. Allyn.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Transfer of Property Located on South Bass Island, County of Ottawa,
State of Ohio, from the U. S. Department of Health, Education, and
Welfare to the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University

To enable The Ohio State University to accept a tract of land located in close proximity to the biological science laboratory facilities at Put-in-Bay, President Fawcett recommended that the following resolution be adopted:

WHEREAS, certain real property owned by the United States, located in the County of Ottawa, State of Ohio, has been declared surplus and is subject to assignment for disposal for educational purposes by the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, under the provisions of Section 203(k)(l) of the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949 (63 stat. 377), as amended, and rules and regulations promulgated pursuant thereto, more particularly described as follows:

All of the tract or Lot of Land, situated in the Island of Put-in-Bay or South Bass Island in the County of Ottawa and State of Ohio described as follows, viz: That portion of the South West point of Put-in-Bay Island or South Bass Island lying west or southwest of a straight line across the said point of the said island in a direction approximately north 300 west or south 300 east and located by two stakes. First the stake near northwest extremity of the boundary line is at a distance of thirty five (35) feet in a northeasterly direction from the center of an iron wood tree with bushy and broken top and trunk about one foot in diameter; said stake is also fifty feet and nine inches (50'9") from center of maple stump eighteen inches (18"0) in diameter and thirty six and ninety five hundredths (36.95) feet distant from blazed post of wire fence stake is branded U. S. Second, the stake near southeast end of the boundary line is located near a straight line between two small peach trees and is at a distance of eight and forty five hundredths (8.45) feet from the most easterly of the two trees and at a distance of seven and twenty five hundredths (7, 25) feet from the northwesterly of the two trees: the stake is also at a distance of forty one and twenty five hundredths (41, 25) feet from a stump in a southwesterly part of lots twenty four and twenty five (24 and 25) range south of County Road and is bounded by the waters of Lake Erie, save on the northeasterly side which is bounded by the line described. The said tract as described contains two ± acres of land.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

A. Transfer of Property Located on South Bass Island, County of Ottawa, State of Ohio, from the U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare to the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University (continued)

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, needs and can utilize said property for education purposes in accordance with the requirements of said Act and the rules and regulations promulgated thereunder:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, shall make application to the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare for and secure the transfer to it of the above mentioned property for said use upon and subject to such exceptions, reservations, terms, covenants, agreements, conditions, and restrictions as the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare, or his authorized representative, may require in connection with the disposal of said property under said Act and the rules and regulations issued pursuant thereto; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University has legal authority, is willing and is in a position to assume immediate care and maintenance of the property, and that Novice G. Fawcett, President, or Gordon B. Carson, Vice President for Business and Finance, be and they are hereby authorized, for and on behalf of the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University to do and perform all and any acts and things which may be necessary to carry out the foregoing resolution, including the preparing, making, and filing of plans, applications, reports, and other documents, the execution, acceptance, delivery, and recordation of agreements, deeds, and other instruments pertaining to the transfer of said property, and the payment of any and all sums necessary on account of the purchase price thereof or on account of fees or costs incurred in connection with the transfer of said property for surveys, title searches, appraisals, recordation of instruments, or escrow costs.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

B. Designation of "Arnold Agricultural Credit Library"

Upon the proposal of Dean Roy M. Kottman, College of Agriculture and Home Economics, and with the concurrence of the President's Cabinet, President Fawcett recommended that the library of the Agricultural Finance Center in the Department of Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology, located in Room 244 Agricultural Administration Building, 2120 Fyffe Road, be formally designated the "Arnold Agricultural Credit Library." This proposal is consistent with the purposes of the Carl R. Arnold Agricultural Development Fund, which was established ". . . to develop the agricultural credit library with the intent that it be formally designated the Arnold Agricultural Credit Library." Additionally, Dr. Arnold's library and files of invaluable original agricultural credit materials have been donated to the library by his widow.

Section (a) of the Rule as amended will read as follows:

49.03. Requirements for an Undergraduate Degree.

To obtain an undergraduate degree from this University an undergraduate student must:

a. Have completed a minimum of three quarters in fulltime residence on the Columbus Campus of this University. . . . "

President Fawcett recommended that the above action of the Faculty Council be approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote, and the Secretary was instructed to make said revision in the Rules for the University Faculty.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University is hereby authorized and directed to file this resolution and the "Motor Vehicle, Traffic, Parking and Watercraft Regulations of The Ohio State University" with the Secretary of the State of Ohio and to do and file such other and further papers and documents as may be necessary and proper to comply with Ohio Revised Code, Section 111.15 and to make these regulations binding and in force according to law.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Columbus Children's Psychiatric Hospital, through the Department of Mental Hygiene and Correction, and the Dean of the College of Medicine, through the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, agree to the following:

- The clinical facilities, including the inpatient and outpatient services of the Columbus Children's Psychiatric Hospital are made available for the educational program of students in the College of Medicine of The Ohio State University.
- 2. The Superintendent of the Columbus Children's Psychiatric Hospital will coordinate the programs of diagnostic procedures, including the taking of medical histories and the physical examination of both inpatients and outpatients, with the Dean of the College of Medicine so as to secure the uniformity and precision which are necessary for the proper instruction of students in the College of Medicine.
- The treatment and care of all patients will be determined by the (physician) member of the Columbus Children's Psychiatric Hospital's medical staff in charge of the patient.
- 4. Only those staff members of the Columbus Children's Psychiatric Hospital holding faculty appointments in the College of Medicine of The Ohio State University may be assigned teaching responsibilities involving students of the College of Medicine.
- The Dean of the College of Medicine shall be responsible for discipline of students willfully violating the rules and regulations of the Columbus Children's Psychiatric Hospital.

B. Recommendation Concerning Change Orders on Construction, Remodeling, and Repair Projects

This project covers the revision of the sprinkling systems on the Campus, making use of well water where available and submetering to lower cost of city water used for outside sprinkling.

A. Health Sciences Information Center - Employment of Architects

President Fawcett recommended that the architectural firm of C. Curtiss Inscho and Associates be employed to provide schematic studies and drawings in accordance with Federal Regulations for grant applications, with provisions for complete architectural service if the project proceeds beyond the schematic stage.

The fee for this service will be computed at 6 per cent of the contract cost and is estimated to be \$9,000.00. Funds will be provided from a grant from the Office of Education, Title I, for Wright State Campus.

C. Acquisition of Property for Educational, Research, Housing, and Service Facilities

WHEREAS, The Ohio State University has acquired certain parcels of real property located between Eighth Avenue and Tenth Avenue, bounded on the east by Neil Avenue and on the west by State of Ohio lands; and

WHEREAS, the University in planning to meet a portion of the needs of its students and its programs from the standpoint of educational, research, housing, and service facilities, will be required to acquire most, if not all of the land lying between Eighth and Tenth Avenues east of present State of Ohio land and west of Neil Avenue; and

Acquisition of Property for Educational, Research, Housing, and Service Facilities (continued)

WHEREAS, the Trustees of The Ohio State University deems that the acquisition of this land is mandatory in meeting the needs of the University and serving the people of the State of Ohio; and therefore, find it necessary to proceed with the acquisition of real property therefor;

NOW BE IT RESOLVED, that the Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized and directed to proceed with purchase of the following described real estate with funds to be reappropriated from H. B. 202 and, when these funds are exhausted, to utilize additional funds as they are made available for this acquisition and, in the event negotiations to purchase said property at a fair and just compensation should fail, then, pursuant to his statutory authority, the Director of Public Works shall be requested to exercise the right of "eminent domain" and acquire by condemnation for the State of Ohio and said University the following described tract of real estate located in Columbus, Franklin County, Ohio:

Being Lots numbered 23 to 31, inclusive, William N. Kings, Neil Avenue Subdivision, and commonly known as 303 through 341 West Ninth Avenue and 1548 Michigan Avenue and Lots numbered 26 to 28, inclusive, Elizabeth J. McMillens Homestead Addition and commonly known as 348 and 352 West Eighth Avenue.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

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X. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of Charles Henry Shaw, Professor in the Department of Physics; Albert Benedict Wolfe, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Economics; Laura Zirbes, Professor Emeritus in the School of Education; and James Burton Tharp, Professor Emeritus in the School of Education. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

A. Charles Henry Shaw

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on June 5, 1967, of Charles Henry Shaw, Professor in the Department of Physics.

Professor Shaw was born in Los Angeles, California, on January 26, 1908. He received his bachelor's degree from the University of California at Los Angeles in 1930 and his doctor of philosophy degree from Johns Hopkins University in 1933. He was an Instructor at Johns Hopkins, 1933-34, and a National Research Council Fellow at Cornell, 1934-36.

A. Charles Henry Shaw (continued)

He returned to Johns Hopkins as an American Philosophical Society Fellow, 1936-38; was an Assistant Professor of Physics, 1938-46; and served as Senior Physicist at the Applied Physics Laboratory, 1943-46.

In 1946 Dr. Shaw joined the Department of Physics of The Ohio State University as Associate Professor and in 1954 was promoted to Professor. During this time he carried on an active program of research in X-ray spectroscopy and X-ray diffraction which received support from the Office of Naval Research, the Atomic Energy Commission, the National Science Foundation, and the Research Corporation.

Dr. Shaw was also much interested in the problems of instruction and was respected by his many students. He was a member of Phi Beta Kappa, Sigma Xi, Gamma Alpha, American Physical Society, American Association of Physics Teachers, New York Academy of Sciences, and Ohio Academy of Sciences.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

B. Albert Benedict Wolfe

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on June 3, 1967, of Albert Benedict Wolfe, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Economics.

Professor Wolfe was born in Arlington, Illinois, on August 23, 1876. He earned three degrees from Harvard University, A.B. 1902, A.M. 1903, and Ph. D. 1905. He was a member of the faculties at Oberlin College from 1905 to 1914 and the University of Texas from 1914 to 1923. During World War I he served in federal war agencies for approximately two years. Dr. Wolfe joined the Department of Economics at The Ohio State University as a Professor in 1923, was Chairman of the Department from 1928 to 1940, and retired in 1946.

Dr. Wolfe earned recognition as a distinguished economist and social scientist and as a challenging, stimulating teacher. His major interests through life were centered on population problems. He published widely, his more notable publications included: Conservatism, Radicalism and Scientific Methods; Population Problems in the United States and Canada; Business Management as a Profession; The Social Sciences and Their Interrelations; and Economics, Sociology and the Modern World.

Dr. Wolfe was a member of the Editorial Board of the American Economic Association and served as Vice President of the Association in 1936 and President in 1943. In 1956 The Ohio State University conferred on him an honorary Doctor of Laws degree. He was also a member of the American Association of University Professors and the Population Association of America.

C. Laura Zirbes

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on June 9, 1967, of Laura Zirbes, Professor Emeritus in the School of Education.

Professor Zirbes was born in Buffalo, New York, on April 26, 1884. She earned three degrees from Columbia University: B.S., 1925; A.M., 1926; and Ph.D., 1928. She was granted the honorary degree of L.H.D. by Culver-Stockton College in 1962.

Following sixteen years as an elementary school teacher in the schools of Cleveland, Ohio, Professor Zirbes became a Research Associate in Reading at The Lincoln School and a Lecturer in Education at Teachers College, Columbia University, between 1920 and 1928 when she joined the faculty of The Ohio State University as an Associate Professor of Education. She became a Professor in 1931. For nine years she directed the summer program and for four years directed the elementary grades at the University School of the College of Education at The Ohio State University. She gave major leadership to the development of the College of Education program for the professional preparation of elementary school teachers. She was granted the Professor Emeritus title upon her retirement in 1954.

A widely noted professional writer and lecturer in Education, Professor Zirbes made her greatest contribution through the inspiration she gave to teachers and educational leaders to embrace progressive ideas and to relate education to the deeper meanings of American life and the basic changes developing in American society.

Dr. Zirbes was an adviser to 30 recipients of the Ph. D. degree from The Ohio State University and to more than 200 recipients of the M. A. degree. She received an achievement award as "Woman of the Year" from the National Women's Press Club in 1948. D. James Burton Tharp

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on June 20, 1967, of James Burton Tharp, Professor Emeritus in the School of Education.

Professor Tharp was born in Frankton, Indiana, on June 8, 1892. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Indiana University in 1921 and his Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy degrees were earned at the University of Illinois in 1924 and 1928, respectively. He also completed special language studies at the University of Grenoble, in France, in 1919 and 1929. For eight years, he taught in Indiana public schools and for seven years he was a Graduate Assistant and Associate in the field of Romance Languages at the University of Illinois. He joined the faculty of The Ohio State University as an Assistant Professor of the Teaching of Foreign Languages in 1929, progressed through the academic ranks to Professor in 1942, and became Professor Emeritus in 1958. For short intervals, he also served on the faculties of Middlebury College, Vanderbilt University, and Mexico City College; and as a member of a cultural mission to Haiti for the U. S. Department of State.

Professor Tharp was widely known as a leader in the improvement of the teaching of foreign languages in the public schools of the nation. He was active in leadership capacities in the work of many national professional organizations, such as the Modern Language Association and the American Association of Teachers of French. His indefatigable labors in advisement and sponsoring of his students will long be remembered by them and by his colleagues in the University faculty. He was decorated as Officier d'Academie by the Government of France in 1939, and as Commandeur de l'Ordre Nat'l. Honneur et Merite by the Government of Haiti in 1943.

From 1946 until 1965, Professor Tharp developed and directed the program of Winter Quarter in Mexico at Mexico City College (now the University of the Americas), in which many students of The Ohio State University participated.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University (herein called the "Board") is vested with the government of The Ohio State University (herein called the "University", or where the context admits collectively with the Board called the "University") and has the general supervision of all land, buildings and other property of the University and control of all expenses therefor pursuant to Chapter 3335 of the Revised Code of Ohio; and

WHEREAS, under Section 3345.07 of said Revised Code, the Board has authority to construct, equip, maintain and operate the Project described below and to issue bonds and notes to pay the costs thereof and pledge to the payment of such bonds and notes the net revenues of dormitory and dining facilities now or hereafter under the control of the Board as the Board may designate, and to issue such bonds and notes to refund bonds and notes previously issued for such purpose; and

WHEREAS, the Board has previously determined, and does hereby confirm, that it is necessary to provide additional dormitory accommodations and dining facilities for students of the University and, therefor to construct and equip on the campus of the University the dormitory and dining facilities known as Drackett, Jones and Taylor Towers, Archer, Houck and Nosker Houses, and Raney Commons Dining Facility, provided, however, that it subsequently determined not to construct and equip Dennis House (said dormitory buildings and dining facility and all things incidental thereto, exclusive of Dennis House, being herein called the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the Board has heretofore duly issued, and there are presently outstanding, notes in the aggregate principal amount of \$14,000,000 Dormitory Revenue Notes of 1966, dated as of September 15, 1966, issued for the purpose of paying the costs of the Project and

bearing interest at the rates of 4-1/4%, 6% and 6-1/2% per annum, all maturing on September 15, 1967 (the said outstanding note issue being herein called the "Outstanding Notes"); and

WHEREAS, the Board has heretofore authorized the issuance of a principal amount of \$10,500,000 Dormitory Revenue Bonds, Series I to refund, in part, the outstanding Notes, and has funds otherwise lawfully available to refund a principal amount of \$500,000 of said Outstanding Notes; and

WHEREAS, the Board does hereby determine and confirm that it is necessary to issue the below authorized dormitory revenue notes in the principal amount of \$3,000,000 to refund the balance of the Outstanding Notes prior to the completion of permanent financing of that part of the Project known as Jones Tower, to be represented by an issue of \$3,000,000 dormitory revenue bonds; and

WHEREAS, the Fiscal Officer of the University is hereby authorized and directed to solicit proposals for the purchase of said \$3,000,000 Dormitory Revenue Notes at par and at an interest rate not to exceed 6% per annum and award said notes as in his best judgment is for the best interest of the University;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University:

Section 1. It is hereby determined and declared that it is necessary to construct and equip that part of the Project known as Jones Tower and to issue and there shall be issued, pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Notes, Series 1967 (herein called the "1967 Notes"), in the aggregate principal amount of \$3,000,000 for the purpose of refunding part of the presently outstanding \$14,000,000 principal amount of The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Notes of 1966 dated as of September 15, 1966.

Section 2. The principal of and interest on the 1967 Notes shall be payable solely from (a) the revenues of the Dormitory Facilities, as defined in the Trust Agreement between the University and The Ohio National Bank of Columbus, dated as of April 15, 1957, as supplemented pursuant to the terms thereof, after providing only for the reasonable and proper expenses of operation and maintenance thereof and all payments required from time to time to be made into the Special Funds created under such Trust Agreement, as supplemented, and (b) the proceeds of the sale of dormitory revenue bonds or notes of the University to be issued pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code

of Ohio, or other authorizing provision of law, to refund the notes authorized hereby; and neither the State of Ohio nor the University or its Board of Trustees shall be obligated to pay the same from any other funds or source, nor shall such notes be a claim upon or lien against any other property of the University or the State of Ohio, and said notes are not general obligations of the State or the University, and the full faith and credit thereof are not pledged thereto and the noteholders shall have no right to have any taxes levied, collected or applied for or to the payment thereof.

The University and its Board of Trustees covenant and agree that they will do all things necessary to effect the issuance and delivery, prior to the maturity of the 1967 Notes, of dormitory revenue bonds or notes for the refunding of the 1967 Notes pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 3345.07, or other provision of law authorizing such revenue bonds or notes, in such principal amount as shall be necessary to pay the principal of and interest on the 1967 Notes and shall apply the proceeds thereof to such purpose, that they will do all things necessary to sell such bonds or notes at the time provided above and will accept such price and such interest rate as shall be necessary in order to effect such sale; and these obligations are established as duties specifically enjoined upon the University, its Trustees and officers, by law and result from their respective offices, trusts or stations within the meaning of Section 2731.01 of the Revised Code of Ohio.

Section 3. The 1967 Notes shall be dated as of September 15, 1967, shall mature on September 15, 1968, shall bear interest at a rate not to exceed 6% per annum, but at the rate determined by the Fiscal Officer in his Certificate of Award described below and payable semiannually or at maturity as requested by the Original Purchaser, shall be designated "The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Notes, Series 1967", shall be in denomination of \$5,000 or any multiples thereof as requested by the Original Purchaser and approved by the Fiscal Officer, or may be represented by a single note for the entire issue as may be requested by the Original Purchaser. Said notes shall be payable at the office of the Original Purchaser, or at such other place as he may designate, and shall be signed by the Executive Officer or by the Fiscal Officer, shall have the seal of the University impressed thereon, or a facsimile of said seal imprinted thereon. The definitive notes shall be substantially in the form attached hereto as Supplement D (page 93), the terms and covenants of which are incorporated herein, with such changes therein, not substantially adverse to the University, as the officers executing same and the Original Purchaser may agree upon.

The proceeds of said notes shall be applied promptly to the payment and discharge of the Outstanding Notes, and the Fiscal Officer is hereby directed to apply to the payment of interest on said outstanding notes such amount from the construction funds for the Project or from available surplus dormitory revenues as shall be needed therefor.

D. Report on the University's Investment Portfolio

The report on the University's Investment Portfolio dated June 30, 1967, as submitted to the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees, was received and ordered to be filed with the official records of the Board.

E. Report on International Program Development of the University

Upon the invitation of President Fawcett, the Associate Dean of Faculties for International Programs, Dr. Leon I. Twarog, was presented to the Board by Vice President and Provost John E. Corbally, Jr., for the purpose of providing a report on the current status of and future plans for the University's International Programs.

In summary, Dr. Twarog presented the "academic blueprint" which has been prepared during the past year for strengthening and developing graduate programs in international education on The Ohio State University campus for the next decade. He indicated that the "blueprint" for such programs when completed will come to the Board of Trustees for consideration and hopefully approval.

Dr. Twarog presented statistics which documented the relative slowness of the State of Ohio in developing significant programs in international education. The program of Slavic Languages and Literatures at this University is the only such program of international significance in the State of Ohio. At most of the universities of the Big Ten there are four or more graduate programs for international education.

Dr. Twarog indicated that the two most important aspects for the development of such language and area programs are an outstanding faculty and excellent library and research collections. He reported that "It costs at least \$1,000,000 per program for library acquisitions and the processing of materials for a collection of 100,000 volumes which is considered to be minimal for an excellent program. A very conservative estimate of what it would take to bring our library collections to this figure for five areas (Slavic, East Asian, Latin American, Near and Middle East, and Southeast Asia) is \$5,300,000. The addition of 75 graduate faculty area specialists within the next five years will be essential. For 1968-69 approximately \$300,000 will be required for additional program support and for support of faculty research, publication, and academic travel."

Thereupon the Board adjourned to meet Thursday, September 14, 1967, at the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center, Wooster, Ohio, at 9:00 a.m.

FOURTH SUPPLEMENTAL TRUST AGREEMENT

THIS FOURTH SUPPLEMENTAL TRUST AGREEMENT, dated as of the 1st day of August, 1967 (herein called the "Supplement"), by and between The Ohio State University and its Board of Trustees (herein called the "University"), a state university of Ohio, and The Ohio National Bank of Columbus, Columbus, Ohio (herein called the "Trustee"), a corporation duly organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the United States, as Trustee under the Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 hereinafter mentioned.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the University, pursuant to the Original Bond Resolution passed April 8, 1957, entered into a Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 with the Trustee and as of April 15, 1958, October 15, 1959, and April 15, 1961, respectively, entered into First, Second and Third Supplemental Trust Agreements (which original trust agreement, as so supplemented thereby and hereby is herein called the "Trust Agreement") under which \$21,060,000 Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G and H Dormitory Revenue Bonds have been authorized and issued and under which additional bonds (herein called "Additional Bonds") are issuable on a parity with the said Bonds and other Additional Bonds hereafter issued under certain conditions as provided in the Trust Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the University has in all respects complied with the provisions of the Trust Agreement so as to be entitled to execute and to have authenticated and delivered by the Trustee \$10,500,000 Additional Series I Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the University further desires by this Supplement to provide for the issuance under the Trust Agreement of said \$10,500,000 of Additional Bonds (herein called the Series I Bonds); and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the University has duly adopted on July 13, 1967, the Series I Bond Resolution providing for the Series I Bonds and this Supplement, which resolution, collectively with the Original Bond Resolution, the Series C and D Bond Resolution adopted July 8, 1960 and the Series E, F, G, and H Bond Resolution adopted June 15, 1962, is referred to as the Bond Resolution; and

WHEREAS, the Series I Bond Resolution is as follows:

RESOLUTION

Providing for the issuance of \$10,500,000 The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Bonds, Series I as Additional Parity Bonds pursuant to Bond Resolution adopted April 8, 1957 and Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957, for the purpose of constructing and equipping Drackett, Jones and Taylor Towers, Archer, Houck and Nosker Houses, and Raney Commons Dining Facility.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University (herein called the Board) is vested with the government of The Ohio State University (herein called the University or, when the context admits, collectively with the Board called the University) by Section 3335.03 of said Revised Code, and as such Board, of suing and being sued, contracting and being contracted with, and of making and using a common seal and, under Section 3335.10 of said Revised Code, has general supervision of all land, buildings and other property of the University and control of all expenses therefor; and

WHEREAS, by authority of Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, the Board is authorized to construct, equip, maintain and operate upon sites within, or in close proximity to, the campus of the University, buildings to be used as dormitories and as other suitable living quarters, or as dining halls, for students and members of the faculty and servants and wives and families of married students of said University (including all separate or connected buildings, sites, equipment, structures and utilities to be used in connection with the maintenance or operation of,

or in any way supplementing or related to the services of facilities to be provided by such buildings) and to pay for the same out of funds in its possession derived from operation of any such buildings under its control or out of funds borrowed therefor, and to borrow funds for such purpose upon such terms as said Board may deem proper and issue notes or other written instruments evidencing such indebtedness, provided that such indebtedness shall not be a claim against or lien upon any property of the State or any property of or under control of said Board excepting such parts of the receipts of the operation of any such buildings under the control of the Board as it may pledge to secure the payment of such indebtedness, and by authority of said Section 3345.07 of the Board is also authorized to issue such notes or other obligations payable as aforesaid in order to retire or refund outstanding notes or other obligations matured or unmatured, to repay moneys previously borrowed or advanced under said section or to reimburse funds of the University for amounts used under said Section 3345.07; and

WHEREAS, the University determined by resolution adopted April 8, 1957 (herein called the Original Bond Resolution and collectively with this resolution, the Series C and D Bond Resolution adopted July 8, 1960, the Series E, F, G and H Bond Resolution adopted June 15, 1962, called the Bond Resolution) to provide for the issuance of Dormitory Revenue Bonds and pursuant to the Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 with The Ohio National Bank of Columbus (herein with the First, Second, Third, and Fourth Supplements, called the Trust Agreement), to pledge the net income of all the dormitory facilities, including married student housing and dining halls, now or hereafter under control of the University pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 3345.07, and to provide in said Trust Agreement for the issuance of such Bonds (herein called the Bonds) as from time to time authorized subject to the conditions contained in said Trust Agreement, and by the Original Bond Resolution and the Trust Agreement provided for the sale of an initial issue

of \$12,000,000 consisting of \$6,000,000 Series A Bonds and \$6,000,000 Series B Bonds (herein called the Series A and Series B Bonds) and for the issuance from time to time as authorized by the Board of additional bonds (herein called Additional Bonds) on a parity with said initial issue of which \$2,330,000 Series C Bonds, \$2,030,000 Series D Bonds, \$5,300,000 Series E Bonds, \$1,200,000 Series F Bonds, \$1,350,000 Series G Bonds, and \$2,850,000 Series H Bonds have been authorized and issued, and the unmatured portions of such Series A through H Bonds are presently outstanding; and

WHEREAS, the University has not pledged or encumbered the revenues from its dormitory facilities on a basis equal or prior to the pledges under the Trust Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the University has determined to sell an issue of \$10,500,000

Additional Bonds designated Dormitory Revenue Bonds, Series I (herein called the Series I Bonds), all as provided in the Trust Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Board by the adoption of this resolution has determined and confirmed that it is necessary to provide additional dormitory accommodations and dining facilities located on or in close proximity to the campus of the University and, accordingly, hereby declares and determines that it is immediately necessary to construct and equip additional dormitories and dining facilities to be known as Drackett, Jones and Taylor Towers, Archer, Houck and Nosker Houses, and Raney Commons Dining Facility (said dormitory buildings and dining facility and all things incidental thereto being herein referred to as the Project); and

WHEREAS, said Project is to be constructed pursuant to plans approved by the Department of Public Works of Ohio, and prepared by the University Architect; and

WHEREAS, based upon final construction costs, construction contracts and estimates received from its architect, the University has determined that the

costs of the Project will be \$13,500,000, including capitalized interest, miscellaneous expense and contingencies; and

WHEREAS, the University has determined to borrow the funds to pay part of the foregoing costs, and to advertise for bids for the purchase of \$10,500,000 Dormitory Revenue Bonds, Series I, by investment bankers or others, it having been determined that the balance of such costs, shall be provided by the issuance of \$3,000,000 principal amount of Dormitory Revenue Bonds, Series J, (herein called the Series J Bonds) as Additional Bonds on a parity with all other Bonds to provide the balance of the cost of Jones Tower, subject to the terms of a loan agreement between the University and the United States of America, Department of Housing and Urban Development, with respect to Jones Tower and the Series J Bonds (herein called the Loan Agreement), and to any extent necessary, from other funds of the University available for the payment of such costs.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University.

Section 1. Purpose of Series I Bonds. It is hereby determined to be necessary to construct the Project and to issue \$10,500,000 of Dormitory Revenue Bonds of the University pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio and the Trust Agreement for the purpose of paying part of the costs of the Project and of all things incidental thereto or incidental to the financing thereof, including repayment of moneys previously borrowed or advanced for the Project or restoring amounts used for the Project from other funds of the University available for such purposes, consistent with Section 4 hereof.

Section 2. <u>Terms of Series I Bonds</u>. Said \$10,500,000 of Dormitory

Revenue Bonds shall be issued as Series I Bonds under this Resolution, the Original

Bond Resolution, and the Trust Agreement, and shall be entitled "The Ohio State

University Dormitory Revenue Bonds, Series I," shall be initially issued in coupon

or fully registered form as may be requested by the Original Purchaser and shall be exchangeable for fully registered or coupon bonds in the manner and on the terms provided by the Trust Agreement. Series I Bonds in coupon form shall be dated August 1, 1967, and shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 each and registrable as to principal. Series I Bonds in fully registered form shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 or any multiple thereof. Such bonds in both coupon and fully registered form shall be numbered as determined by the Fiscal Officer of the University. Each Series I Bond in fully registered form without coupons shall be dated as of the interest payment date on which it is authenticated or on the interest date next preceding the date of its authentication or as of the same date as the coupon bonds if authenticated prior to the first interest payment date; provided, however, if at the time of authentication of a registered bond without coupons, interest is in default, such Bond shall be dated as of the date to which interest has been paid. The Series I Bonds shall bear interest payable semi-annually on April fifteenth and October fifteenth of each year, beginning April 15, 1968, until the principal sum is paid at the rate or rates per annum stipulated in the bid of the successful bidders, and approved in writing by the President or Fiscal Officer of the University provided that no such rate shall exceed 6% per annum. The Series I Bonds shall mature annually on October fifteenth in the years and amounts per year as follows:

The Series I Bonds maturing on and after October 15, 1978 shall be subject to redemption in whole or in part on any interest payment date on and after October 15,

1977, at redemption prices equal to the following percentages of the principal amount redeemed, plus accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption, to wit:

104% if redeemed on or before October 15, 1982; 103% if redeemed thereafter but on or before October 15, 1987; 102% if redeemed thereafter but on or before October 15, 1992; 101-1/2% if redeemed thereafter but on or before October 15, 1997; 101% if redeemed thereafter.

If less than the entire unmatured portion of the Series I Bonds is called for redemption at any time or from time to time, they shall be called in inverse order of maturity of the Bonds of that series outstanding; and if less than all of the Series I Bonds outstanding of one maturity are to be called, the selection of Bonds or portions of fully registered Bonds of such series and of that maturity to be called shall be made by lot conducted by the Trustee under the Trust Agreement. Such call for redemption shall be made by notice specifying the numbers, and portions of registered bonds, of the Series I Bonds to be called, published by the Trustee on behalf of the University once a week for two consecutive weeks in a financial newspaper of national circulation published in the English language in New York City and in an English language newspaper of general circulation in Columbus, Ohio, the first publication to be not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of redemption. Any bonds thus called for redemption and for the retirement of which funds are deposited with said Trustee as provided in the Trust Agreement on or before the redemption date shall cease to bear interest on said redemption rate. A registered bond shall have prepayment provisions consistent with the redemption rights relating to coupon bonds which it replaces.

The principal and interest of the Series I Bonds shall be payable in any coin or currency which, on the respective dates of payment, is legal tender for the payment of debts due the United States of America, at the principal office of the Trustee under the Trust Agreement (presently, The Ohio National Bank of Columbus, Columbus, Ohio), or, at the option of the holder, at the principal corporate trust

office of the United States Trust Company of New York, in the Borough of Manhattan, City and State of New York except that interest on fully registered bonds is payable by check as provided in the Trust Agreement, and principal on fully Registered Bonds may also be payable at such additional place or places, at the option of the holder as shall be designated by the Fiscal Officer of the University.

The Series I Bonds shall have such other terms and conditions and shall be issued, executed and delivered as provided by the applicable provisions of the Trust Agreement.

Section 3. Sale of Series I Bonds. The Series I Bonds shall be offered for sale, by solicitation of proposals from investment bankers and others or by advertisement or both, to the highest bidder based on the lowest net interest cost, in such manner and on such terms, including specification of a lower maximum interest rate than that specified in Section 2 hereof, as determined by the President or the Fiscal Officer of the University, subject, however, to all applicable provisions of this Resolution.

Section 4. Allocation of Proceeds of Series I Bonds. The proceeds from the sale of Series I Bonds shall be allocated and applied by the University as follows:

- (1) The portion representing accrued interest to the Debt Service Fund provided for in the original Trust Agreement to be held by the Trustee, and the portion representing premium above par paid to the University for such Bonds, to the Debt Service Reserve Fund so provided for.
- (2) The sum of \$610,000 to a separate fund to comprise the Series J Construction Fund under the bond resolution authorizing the Series J Bonds and to be held and invested and used for paying costs of Jones Tower and any balance to be transferred or applied, all as provided in the Series J Bond Resolution (as the same may

be amended, supplemented or superseded), subject to the terms of the Loan Agreement.

- (3) To the University the amounts necessary to reimburse the University for amounts expended by it on construction of the Project prior to issuance of the Series I Bonds.
- (4) The balance to the Series I Construction Fund to be held by the Trustee to pay the costs of constructing and equipping the Project and all incidental expenses of the Project and the financing thereof, including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the repayment of any amounts borrowed by the University to pay Project costs and interest thereon, the costs of all moveable equipment for the Project, including Jones Tower, the costs of placing the Project in operation and any other purpose relating to the Project or the financing thereof for which the proceeds of the Series J Bonds would not be available, and including reimbursement to the University of amounts previously advanced from any other funds of the University for payment of costs of the Project and not required in the Series I Construction Fund for payment of other costs of the Project. Any amount needed for the costs of construction of Jones Tower in addition to that otherwise provided in the Series J Construction Fund may be paid directly from the Series I Construction Fund or transferred therefrom to the Series J Construction Fund.

The Trustee shall apply the Series I Construction Fund to the payment of such items as from time to time are requested in writing by the Fiscal Officer of the University. Such written request shall include a certification by such official that the amount to be paid from the Series I Construction Fund constitutes authorized payments from said fund under the foregoing provisions of this Section 4. If the

payment is to be made directly from the Series I Construction Fund to satisfy an obligation under a construction contract relating to the Project, such written request shall further certify that such payment was certified as due under such contract by a qualified architect or engineer.

The Series I Construction Fund shall be invested by the Trustee in such obligations of the United States, obligations of agencies or instrumentalities of the United States, or certificates of deposit of banks and or trust companies having a combined capital and surplus of not less than five million dollars, as shall be directed in writing by the President or the Fiscal Officer of the University, which writing shall designate maturities and amounts which, as nearly as practicable, would, through maturities, provide funds when needed to pay costs for which the respective funds have been established. Interest on such investments and the proceeds of sale thereof shall constitute part of such Fund. Said investments shall be sold, exchanged or collected from time to time as directed in writing by the President or the Fiscal Officer of the University and the Trustee shall be under no liability in connection with such investment, sale, exchange or collection thereof provided the directions of said officers are followed.

Section 5. Additional Bonds. (a) The Board shall have the right from time to time to issue Additional Bonds under the Trust Agreement if necessary to pay the costs of completing the Project or completing any projects for which Additional Bonds are issued. The Trustee shall authenticate and deliver such Bonds upon (but only upon) receipt of the documents required by Section 2.03 of the Trust Agreement. Nothing herein or in the Trust Agreement shall require any earnings coverage, or certificate with respect thereto, in connection with Additional Bonds issued for completion of a project.

(b) The Board shall also have the right from time to time to issue Additional Bonds under the Trust Agreement to provide funds for purposes authorized

by Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, including construction and equipment by the University of buildings to be used as dormitories or as other living quarters or the refunding of outstanding bonds or notes issued under said Section 3345.07. The Trustee shall authenticate and deliver under the Trust Agreement Additional Bonds issued under this subdivision (b) if, (but only if), when such Additional Bonds are issued, the University shall have furnished to the Trustee in addition to the documents required by Section 2.03 of the Trust Agreement, a certificate of the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University, approved by the Board of Trustees, (1) showing that (a) the actual net income from the dormitory facilities of the University (excluding net income from any dormitory facility which is to be abandoned or which is not suitable for continuous use as a dormitory facility for the term of such Additional Bonds) for the preceding fiscal year, as adjusted, if necessary, to reflect the schedule of rates and charges to become effective at the beginning of the next semester, quarter or other school period and to give recognition to any anticipated changes in operating costs; plus (b) the estimated annual net income of the dormitory facilities to be financed through the proceeds of the sale of such Additional Bonds will be equal to or greater than one and three-tenths (1.3) times the maximum amount to become due in any succeeding fiscal year for the payment of principal and interest charges on the Bonds then outstanding hereunder and on the Bonds then to be authenticated and delivered; (2) showing that, until the dormitory facility being constructed from the proceeds of the Additional Bonds, is ready for occupancy, funds then available from net income, bond proceeds, gifts, legacies, devises or grants or other sources for payment when due of principal and interest on the Bonds will be at least one and three-tenths (1.3) times the principal and interest requirements for that period; (3) showing that there were not included in net income any receipts against which there is any prior claim other than the use thereof for the operating expenses included in computing the net income; (4) furnishing such other information in support of the

foregoing as may reasonably be requested by the Trustee; (5) showing that the computations of estimates provided for above are based on an assumed occupancy of not more than 95% of capacity of the dormitory facilities in question.

The first call date on Additional Bonds shall not be earlier than the first call date on any issue of Bonds outstanding at the time of issue of such Additional Bonds.

Section 6. Terms of the Bonds Generally. As used in this Resolution. the term "Bonds" refers to the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, and I Bonds and all additional Bonds issued on a parity therewith under the Trust Agreement. The Bonds shall be designated The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Bonds, shall be payable in any coin or currency which, on the respective dates of payment, is legal tender for the payment of debts due the United States of America, shall have all the incidents of negotiable instruments under the laws of Ohio, shall express upon their face the purpose for which they are issued, and shall be issued pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio. Unless otherwise provided by the Board, the Bonds shall be signed by the Chairman of the Board or bear his facsimile signature, shall be signed by the President of the University or bear his facsimile signature, shall be attested by the Secretary of the Board or by the Vice President, Business and Finance of the University, and shall be sealed with the seal of the University or a facsimile thereof, and interest coupons attached to the Bonds shall bear the facsimile signature of the Secretary of the Board or of the Vice President, Business and Finance of the University. In case any officer whose signature or a facsimile of whose signature shall appear on any Bonds or coupons shall cease to be such officer before the delivery of such Bonds, such signature or such facsimile shall nevertheless be valid and sufficient for all purposes, the same as if he had remained in office until such delivery. Except in the case of redemption of Bonds of a particular series from the surplus proceeds of that issue as provided in

Section 5 of the Original Bond Resolution, no Bonds of any series may be called unless the same proportion of the outstanding Bonds of each other series, then callable, are called at the same time. The Additional Bonds shall bear such designations as may be necessary to distinguish them from other Bonds having different provisions and shall have maturities, interest rates, interest payment dates, redemption provisions, denominations, registration provisions, and other provisions as provided in the Resolution providing for issuance of the Additional Bonds, provided, however, that such terms and provisions shall not be inconsistent with this Resolution, the Trust Agreement or the then outstanding Bonds. On the terms provided herein, in the Trust Agreement and in the Bonds, the Bonds shall be equally and ratably payable from and secured by pledge of, the receipts from the operation of all dormitory facilities now or hereafter under control of the Board including the dining facilities constituting a part thereof, after provision for reasonable and proper expenses of operation and maintenance of such facilities; and anything in this Resolution, the Bonds or the Trust Agreement to the contrary notwithstanding, neither this Resolution, the Bonds, nor the Trust Agreement shall be a claim against or a lien upon any property of the State of Ohio or any property of or under the control of the Board except the portion of said receipts pledged as provided herein; provided, however, that nothing herein shall be deemed to prohibit the University, of its own volition, from using, or pledging, to the extent it is lawfully authorized to do so, any of its other resources or revenues for the fulfillment of any of the terms, conditions or obligations of the Trust Agreement, this Resolution, or any of the bonds.

Section 7. Covenants of the University. The University covenants with the holders of the Bonds and with the Trustee under the Trust Agreement that (a) it will adopt and maintain so long as any of the Bonds are outstanding such parietal rules, and charge and collect such rental rates and charges, from time to time, as may be necessary to assure such occupancy and use of, and receipts from, the dormitory

facilities as will pay the costs of maintenance and operation and provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds and other payments to Special Funds required by Section 8 of this Resolution; (b) from funds lawfully available, it will cause the Project and any project to be constructed from the proceeds of Additional Bonds to be completed and equipped in an efficient and economical manner with reasonable dispatch and in a manner consistent with the plans and recommendations of responsible architects and all applicable laws, ordinances and regulations; (c) subject to the right of abandonment under conditions provided in the Trust Agreement designed to prevent adverse effect of such abandonment on the expected earnings coverage of Debt Service, it will, from the dormitory receipts pledged under this resolution and as part of the operating expenses, maintain, preserve and keep the dormitory facilities in good repair, working order and operating condition and continuously operate the same on a revenue producing basis, and will apply the receipts therefrom only as provided in Section 8 of this Resolution and in the Trust Agreement; (d) it will furnish to the Trustee and the Original Purchasers of the Bonds within 120 days after the close of each fiscal year an annual report of the accounts (including each Special Fund provided for in Section 8 of this Resolution) and operations of the dormitory facilities prepared by qualified accountants approved by the Trustee; (e) it will keep proper books of record and accounts separate from all other records and accounts, in which complete and correct entries will be made of all transactions relating to the dormitory facilities and will at all reasonable times permit the Trustee, the Original Purchasers or any holder or holders of 25% of the outstanding Bonds, or their authorized representatives, to inspect the dormitory facilities and any books, documents and vouchers relating thereto; (f) it will furnish heat, light, power, water and other necessary services to the dormitory facilities at not in excess of reasonable cost; (g) it will comply with all the terms and conditions of the respective Loan Agreements with the Department

of Housing and Urban Development as long as the United States holds any of the Series B, D, F, G, and H Bonds; (h) it will insure the dormitory facilities as required by the Trust Agreement and apply the proceeds of such insurance as provided therein; and (i) will observe and perform all its agreements and obligations provided for by the Bonds, the Trust Agreement or the Bond Resolution.

Section 8. <u>Application of Receipts; Special Funds</u>. There was established by the Original Bond Resolution a Special Fund designated "Dormitory Revenue Fund," which fund shall be maintained in a bank account, or invested as herein authorized, in the name of the University separate and distinct from all other funds of the University and subject to the withdrawals and uses herein authorized, is pledged to and charged with the payment of the principal, interest, and premium, if any, on all the Bonds issued under the Trust Agreement.

Under the Original Bond Resolution there shall be maintained in the Dormitory Revenue Fund, as in Operating Reserve, such amount as is from time to time certified by the Fiscal Officer of the University as adequate and necessary for working capital for operation and maintenance of the dormitory facilities; provided, that such Operating Reserve shall not exceed one-fourth of the operating and maintenance expenses of the dormitory facilities for the preceding 12 months.

All receipts from dormitory facilities, as defined in Section 10 hereof, now or hereafter under the control of the Board shall be deposited in the Dormitory Revenue Fund.

The Dormitory Revenue Fund, including the Operating Reserve, shall be applied to pay when due all reasonable and proper expenses of operation and maintenance (as defined in Section 10) of the dormitory facilities, excluding extraordinary repair and replacement expenses payable from the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund and expenses of or provision for depreciation or capital replacement.

The remainder of the Dormitory Revenue Fund, after retaining therein the then current Operating Reserve and payment of said operation and maintenance expenses then due, shall be applied as provided in the Original Bond Resolution, namely, as follows and in the following order of priority:

First: Into the Debt Service Fund, to be held by the Trustee as a separate fund and used for the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds, the amounts provided in the Original Bond Resolution and in the Bond Resolutions relating to the Series C, D, E, F, G and H Bonds for payment of principal and interest on the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G and H Bonds and, in addition, (1) on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year an amount equal to the interest due and on the next ensuing interest payment date in that year on the Series I Bonds then outstanding; provided, that, the amount so payable on any such date into the Debt Service Fund shall be reduced by the amount otherwise available in said Debt Service Fund for such payment; (2) on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year, the equal semi-annual amounts necessary to provide for payment of any principal maturity in that year on the Series I Bonds; (3) if Additional Bonds shall be issued under the Trust Agreement, such additional amounts and at such times as specified in the resolution authorizing such Additional Bonds, which amounts shall be not less than necessary to provide in the Debt Service Fund amounts, in addition to the amounts hereinbefore provided for the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, and I Bonds, sufficient to pay in full interest and principal on all Additional Bonds then outstanding as the same shall become due and payable; provided that no payments need be made to the Debt Service Fund so long as the amounts in the Debt Service Fund and Debt Service Reserve Fund aggregate at least the total principal and interest payable on all Bonds then outstanding to the dates of their respective maturities.

Second: Into the Debt Service Reserve Fund, to be held by the Trustee as a separate fund for the payment of principal and interest on, and purchase or

redemption of, the Bonds as herein provided, on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year and on such other dates as amounts are payable into the Debt Service Fund with respect to Additional Bonds, such amounts as are necessary to create and maintain in said Debt Service Reserve Fund the required reserve, namely, an amount equal to the maximum principal and interest requirements for any consecutive two-year period on all Bonds at the time outstanding;

Third: Into the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund, to be held by the University as a fund separate and distinct from all other funds of the University, semi-annually on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year, or as soon thereafter as the required reserve has been established in the Debt Service Reserve Fund, an amount equal to one-quarter of one percent of the cost of construction on all dormitory facilities then under the control of the Board and 3 percent of the cost of movable equipment for all such dormitory facilities, which fund may be used by the University to the extent necessary for payment of principal and interest on the Bonds or for extraordinary repairs and replacements to the dormitory facilities or for construction or equipping of additional dormitory facilities;

Fourth: On April 1 and October 1 of each year, to the foregoing funds, such amounts as may be necessary to make up previous deficiency in any deposits required by the foregoing paragraphs of this section;

Fifth: So long as there is no deficiency in any of the deposits provided for in Paragraphs First through Fourth above and so long as the amounts in the Debt Service Reserve Fund are at least equal to the then required reserve, any amounts in the Dormitory Revenue Fund, after reserving therein the then current Operating Reserve, may be used for any purpose of the University for which such funds may lawfully be used.

The Debt Service Fund is irrevocably pledged to and shall be used by the Trustee for the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds and, until required

for such purposes, shall be invested by the Trustee in such direct obligations of the United States as the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University shall direct in writing addressed to the Trustee, which writing shall determine that the maturity of the respective obligations is not later than the date on which such funds will be required for payment of such principal and interest. The Trustee shall transfer from the Debt Service Fund to the Paying Agents amounts sufficient to enable said Paying Agents to pay when due principal and interest on the Bonds, or the Trustee shall make such credit arrangements with said Paying Agents as to permit such payments.

The Debt Service Reserve Fund is irrevocably pledged to, and shall be used by the Trustee for, the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds if other available funds are insufficient for that purpose, and, to the extent herein provided, for purchase or redemption of Bonds. Until required for such purposes it shall be invested by the Trustee in such direct obligations of the United States as the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University shall direct in writing, which obligations shall mature not more than five years from the date of investment. The Trustee shall transfer from the Debt Service Reserve Fund to the Debt Service Fund such amounts as are necessary in addition to amounts available in the Debt Service Fund, including funds transferred from the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund, to enable said Paying Agents to pay when due the principal and interest on the Bonds.

Any amounts in the Debt Service Reserve Fund in excess of the required reserve provided for in Paragraph Second above shall be used to purchase Bonds for retirement or to redeem Bonds then subject to redemption to the extent and in the manner from time to time requested in writing by the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University. In calculating at any time whether additional amounts are required to be paid into the Debt Service Reserve Fund under Paragraph Second above and in calculating the excess over the required reserve, no value shall be given to any

investments of the fund other than direct obligations of the United States maturing within five years from the date of such calculation, but in all other respects, such investments shall be valued at their face amount or market value, whichever is lower.

The Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund is irrevocably pledged to, and shall be used by the University for, extraordinary repairs and replacements to the dormitory facilities or to construct or equip additional dormitory facilities or for the retirement of all then outstanding Bonds by purchase or redemption or for payment of the principal and interest by transfer to the Debt Service Fund as herein provided. The University shall transfer from the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund to the Debt Service Fund such amounts as are from time to time necessary, in addition to the other amounts available in the Debt Service Fund and without use of the Debt Service Reserve Fund, to provide for the payment, when due, of the principal and interest on the Bonds and shall not use any of the fund for repairs or replacement or additional facilities if there is any deficiency in any of the deposits required to be made under subparagraphs First or Second of this Section. Until required for such purposes, the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund may be invested by the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University in direct obligations of the United States maturing not more than five years from the date of investment.

Investments made pursuant to this Section 8 of any amounts in any Special Fund herein created and the interest thereon and the proceeds thereof shall constitute part of that Special Fund and be added to that particular fund. Such investments shall be sold, exchanged or collected from time to time as directed by the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University, and the Trustee shall be under no liability and have no responsibility in connection with such investment, or the sale, exchange, or collection thereof, provided the directions of said officers are followed.

Section 9. <u>Trust Agreement</u>. In order to secure the payment of the principal and interest on the Bonds, the President of the University and the Chairman

of the Board of Trustees, and each of them, are authorized to execute, acknowledge and deliver as may be appropriate the Fourth Supplemental Trust Agreement in substantially the form attached hereto, and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees is authorized to seal and attest the same, with such changes not unfavorable to the University as the Officers acting shall deem advisable and as shall be approved by the Original Purchasers of the Series I Bonds. The terms and provisions of the Trust Agreement are hereby confirmed and adopted and the terms of said Trust Agreement purporting to be applicable to the Series A and Series B Bonds or to the Project to be constructed from the proceeds of the Series A and Series B Bonds shall be deemed equally applicable to the Series I Bonds and the Project covered by this Resolution to the extent that the same are not inconsistent with the terms or provisions of this Resolution and the context so permits.

Section 10. Definitions. Where the context permits, the following terms as used in this Resolution or in the Trust Agreement shall have the following meanings:

(1) "the Fiscal Officer" shall mean the Vice President, Business and Finance, of the University or any official or employee performing the duties of such officer for the time being. The Comptroller or the Assistant Vice President-Assistant Treasurer, or any official or employee performing the duties of such officer for the time being, shall also be "a Fiscal Officer" when the context so permits. (2) "Additional Bonds" shall mean Bonds issued pursuant to the Trust Agreement in addition to and on a parity with the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, and I Bonds and "Bonds" shall mean both the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, and I Bonds and Additional Bonds; (3) "Agreement" or "Trust Agreement" shall refer to the Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 as from time to time supplemented pursuant to its terms; (4) "Dormitory Facilities" shall mean buildings, groups of buildings or parts of or additions to buildings, including the sites therefor, now or hereafter constructed, acquired by or under the control of the Board and authorized to be constructed, equipped, maintained and operated by

Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, including the dormitories, additions to dormitories, dining facilities, and married student housing facilities or projects and all separate or connected buildings, sites, equipment, structures and utilities to be used in connection with the maintenance or operation of, or in any way supplementing or related to the services or facilities to be provided by such buildings located on or in close proximity to the campus; (5) "Net Income" shall mean all receipts of the operation of dormitory facilities after deducting therefrom the reasonable and proper operating and maintenance expenses thereof: (6) "Reasonable and Proper Operating and Maintenance Expenses" shall mean ordinary and usual reasonable expenditures necessary to the operation, repair and maintenance of the dormitory facilities including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, taxes, fees and expenses of the Trustee and paying agents and any expenses required to be paid by the Bond Resolution or the Trust Agreement, but excluding provision or expenditure for depreciation or capital replacement or expenditures for administration or regulation of the occupants of the dormitory facilities which expenditures do not constitute costs of the type included as costs of operation of the dormitory facilities under the present accounting practice of the University or expenditures for extraordinary repairs or replacements or payments to the Debt Service Fund, Debt Service Reserve Fund or Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund; (7) "Trustee" refers to the Trustee under the Trust Agreement, presently The Ohio National Bank of Columbus; (8) Any reference to an officer of the University or of the Board in this Resolution shall refer to the person holding such office or, in the event of resignation, absence, incapacity or vacancy in such office, then the person performing the duties of such office; any reference to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio shall, where the context permits, mean said section as it now exists and as it is from time to time amended, supplemented or affected by later legislation.

Section 11. General. The appropriate officers of the University and the Board, the architects and engineers employed by the University, and the Trustee designated in the Trust Agreement are authorized and directed to do all things necessary or proper to carry out the terms and provisions of this Resolution, the Trust Agreement and the sale referred to in Section 3 above and to effect the execution, sale and delivery of said Series I Bonds in accordance therewith if approved by the President and Fiscal Officer of the University. The obligations imposed upon the University under this Resolution or the Trust Agreement are established as duties specifically enjoined upon the University, the Board and the officials of the University by law and result from their respective offices, trusts or stations within the meaning of Section 2731.01 of the Revised Code of Ohio.

Whereas, the text of the Series I Bonds and the coupons, if any, to be attached thereto and the authentication certificate of the Trustee to be endorsed thereon are to be substantially as follows:

(Form of Coupon Bond)

The form of Coupon Bond shall be identical with the form of Coupon Bond set forth in the Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 except that there shall be substituted in such form in lieu of the corresponding paragraphs and Trustee's Certificate and corresponding coupon form in said Coupon Bond the following paragraphs and coupon form:

* * * * * * *

This Bond is a Series I Bond and is one of a duly authorized issue of \$10,500,000 of Dormitory Revenue Bonds Series I of the University, issued and to be issued from time to time, pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio and the Resolutions of the Board of Trustees of April 8, 1957 and July 13, 1967 (herein collectively called the "Bond Resolution") for the purpose of paying the costs of constructing and equipping certain dormitory facilities and secured by Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 and First, Second, Third and Fourth Supplemental Trust Agreements between the University and the above-named Trustee (herein collectively called the "Agreement").

The University hereby reserves the right to call and redeem the Bonds of this Series prior to maturity as a whole, or in part. in inverse order of maturity, on any interest payment date on or after October 15, 1977, upon terms of par and accrued interest to the redemption date plus redemption premiums as follows: four percent (4%) if redeemed 1977 to 1982, inclusive; three percent (3%) if redeemed 1983 to 1987, inclusive; two percent (2%) if redeemed 1988 to 1992, inclusive; one and one-half percent (1-1/2%) if redeemed 1993 to 1997, inclusive; and one percent (1%) if redeemed after 1997. If less than all the Bonds (or parts of Registered Bonds) of one maturity and of one series are to be called, the Coupon Bonds or portions of fully Registered Bonds of such series and of that maturity to be called shall be chosen by lot by said Trustee. Except in the case of redemption of a particular series of bonds from surplus proceeds of that issue as provided in the Bond Resolution, no Bonds of any series may be called unless the same proportion of the outstanding Bonds of each other series, then callable, are called at the same time.

* * * * * *

The Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, and I Bonds, together with such Additional Bonds as may be issued on a parity therewith under said Agreement, are, and are to be, secured only, but equally and ratably without priority one over another by reason of number or of date of Bond, sale, execution or delivery, by the Agreement, creating a prior pledge of the receipts of all dormitory facilities now or hereafter under the control of the Board of Trustees as defined in the Agreement after provision only for reasonable operating and maintenance expenses thereof.

The Bonds are issuable as coupon bonds, registrable as to principal, in the denomination of \$5,000, and as registered bonds without coupons in denominations of \$5,000 and any multiple thereof. Registered Bonds without coupons may be exchanged for coupon Bonds or for other registered Bonds without coupons, and coupon Bonds may be exchanged for registered Bonds without coupons, all on the terms and under the conditions and upon payment of the charges, if any, and with the effect provided in the Agreement.

In general, each and every term and condition contained in the Original Trust Agreement shall apply to this Supplement, with such omissions, variations and modifications thereof as may be appropriate to make the same conform to this Supplement.



That there was not included in such net incomes net income from any dormitory facility which is to be abandoned or which is not suitable for continuous use as a dormitory facility for the term of the Series I Bonds, nor any receipts against which there is any prior claim other than the use thereof for the operating expenses of the dormitory facilities.
- Note 1 The term dormitory facilities as herein used shall mean dormitory facilities as that term is defined in the Trust Agreement with The Ohio National Bank of Columbus, dated as of April 15, 1957, as supplemented by First through Fourth Supplemental Trust Agreements. The actual net income for the year ended June 30, 1967, is adjusted to reflect the schedule of rates and charges approved by the Board of Trustees on June 8, 1967 and to become effective at the beginning of the Autumn Quarter of the academic year 1967-68; and to give recognition to anticipated changes

in operating costs of the dormitory facilities, resulting from the review and recomputation of the basis of allocating costs of heat, light, power and water to all auxiliary facilities, including dormitory facilities, by direction of the Board of Trustees, pursuant to which the revised reasonable changes therefor to the dormitory facilities will be reduced by an estimated \$200,000.

- Note 2 Estimated net income is computed in accordance with the Trust Agreement on the basis of 95% occupancy and estimated expenses are consistent with those experienced in similar existing facilities. It is hereby certified that the facility, Drackett Tower, under Item 2 was placed in operation in March, 1965, Houck House was placed in operation in January, 1966, Archer and Nosker Houses and Taylor Tower were placed in operation in September, 1966, and that Raney Commons Dining Facility was placed in operation in January, 1967. Until Jones Tower is ready for occupancy the net income from the Dormitory Facilities and the principal and interest requirements will be as shown in paragraphs 2 and 3 above.
- Note 3 Series I Bonds are computed at 4-3/4%. Series A through H are computed on basis of actual interest rates for those bonds.

THIS FIFTH SUPPLEMENTAL TRUST AGREEMENT, dated as of the		
day of, 1967 (herein called the "Supplement"), by and		
between The Ohio State University and its Board of Trustees (herein called the "Uni-		
versity"), a state university of Ohio, and The Ohio National Bank of Columbus,		
Columbus, Ohio (herein called the "Trustee"), a corporation duly organized and		
existing under and by virtue of the laws of the United States, as Trustee under the		
Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 hereinafter mentioned.		

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the University, pursuant to the Original Bond Resolution passed April 8, 1957, entered into a Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 with the Trustee and as of April 15, 1958, October 15, 1959, April 15, 1961, April 15, 1963, and August 1, 1967, respectively entered into First, Second, Third and Fourth Supplemental Trust Agreements (which original Trust Agreement, as so supplemented thereby and hereby is herein called the "Trust Agreement") under which \$37,560,000 Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H and I Dormitory Revenue Bonds have been authorized and have been or are to be issued and under which additional bonds (herein called "Additional Bonds") are issuable on a parity with the said Bonds and other Additional Bonds hereafter issued under certain conditions as provided in the Trust Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the University has in all respects complied with the provisions of the Trust Agreement so as to be entitled to execute and to have authenticated and delivered by the Trustee \$3,000,000 Additional Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the University further desires by this Supplement to provide for the issuance under the Trust Agreement of said \$3,000,000 of Additional Bonds (herein called the Series J Bonds); and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the University has duly adopted on July 13, 1967 the Series J Bond Resolution providing for the Series J Bonds and this Supplement, which resolution, collectively with the Original Bond Resolution, the Series C and D Bond Resolutions adopted July 8, 1960, the Series E, F, G, and H Bond Resolution adopted June 15, 1962, and the Series I Bond Resolution adopted July 13, 1967 is referred to as the Bond Resolution; and

WHEREAS, the Series J Bond Resolution is as follows:

RESOLUTION

Providing for the issuance of \$3,000,000 The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Bonds, Series J, as Additional Parity Bonds pursuant to Bond Resolution adopted April 8, 1957 and Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957, for the purpose of constructing and equipping Jones Tower.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University (herein called the Board) is vested with the government of The Ohio State University (herein called the University or, when the context admits, collectively with the Board called the University) by Section 3335.03 of said Revised Code, and as such Board, of suing and being sued, contracting and being contracted with, and of making and using a common seal and, under Section 3335.10 of said Revised Code, has general supervision of all land, buildings and other property of the University and control of all expenses therefor; and

WHEREAS, by authority of Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, the Board is authorized to construct, equip, maintain and operate upon sites within, or in close proximity to, the campus of the University, buildings to be used as dormitories and as other suitable living quarters, or as dining halls, for students and members of the faculty and servants and wives and families of married students of said University (including all separate or connected buildings, sites, equipment, structures and utilities to be used in connection with the maintenance or operation of, or in any way supplementing or related to the services of facilities to be provided by

such buildings) and to pay for the same out of funds in its possession derived from operation of any such buildings under its control or out of funds borrowed therefor and to borrow funds for such purpose upon such terms as said Board may deem proper and issue notes or other written instruments evidencing such indebtedness provided that such indebtedness shall not be a claim against or lien upon any property of the State or any property of or under the control of said Board excepting such parts of the receipts of the operation of any such buildings under control of the Board as it may pledge to secure the payment of such indebtedness and by authority of said Section 3345.07 the Board is also authorized to issue such notes or other obligations payable as aforesaid in order to retire or refund outstanding notes or other obligations matured or unmatured, to repay moneys previously borrowed or advanced under said section or to reimburse funds of the University for amounts used under said Section 3345.07; and

WHEREAS, the University determined by resolution adopted April 8, 1957 (herein called the Original Bond Resolution and collectively with this resolution, the Series C and D Bond Resolution adopted July 8, 1960, the Series E, F, G and H Bond Resolution adopted June 15, 1962 and the Series I Bond Resolution adopted July 13, 1967, called the Bond Resolution) to provide for the issuance of Dormitory Revenue Bonds and pursuant to the Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 with The Ohio National Bank of Columbus (herein, with the First, Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Supplements, called the Trust Agreement), to pledge the net income of all the dormitory facilities, including married student housing and dining halls, now or hereafter under control of the University pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 3345.07, and to provide in said Trust Agreement for the issuance of such Bonds (herein called the Bonds) as from time to time authorized subject to the conditions contained in said Trust Agreement, and by the Original Bond Resolution and the Trust Agreement provided for the sale of an initial issue

of \$12,000,000 consisting of \$6,000,000 Series A Bonds and \$6,000,000 Series B Bonds (herein called the Series A and Series B Bonds) and for the issuance from time to time as authorized by the Board of additional bonds (herein called Additional Bonds) on a parity with said initial issue of which \$2,330,000 Series C Bonds, \$2,030,000 Series D Bonds, \$5,300,000 Series E Bonds, \$1,200,000 Series F Bonds, \$1,350,000 Series G Bonds, \$2,850,000 Series H Bonds and \$10,500,000 Series I Bonds have been authorized and issued and the unmatured portions of such Series A through I Bonds are presently outstanding; and

WHEREAS, the University has not pledged or encumbered the revenues from its dormitory facilities on a basis equal or prior to the pledges under the Trust Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the University has determined to sell an issue of \$3,000,000

Additional Bonds as Series J Bonds (herein called the Series J Bonds) all as provided in the Trust Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Board by the adoption of this resolution has determined and confirmed that it is necessary to provide additional dormitory accommodations and dining facilities located on or in close proximity to the campus of the University and, accordingly, hereby declares and determines that it is immediately necessary to construct and equip additional dormitory facilities to be known as Jones Tower (said dormitory building and all things incidental thereto being herein referred to as the Project); and

WHEREAS, said Project is to be constructed pursuant to plans approved by the Department of Public Works of Ohio, and prepared by the University

Architect; and

WHEREAS, based upon final construction costs, construction contracts and estimates received from its architect, the University has determined that the costs of the Project will be \$3,610,000, including capitalized interest, miscellaneous expenses and contingencies; and

WHEREAS, the University has heretofore by the Series I Bond Resolution adopted July 13, 1967, allocated \$610,000 of the proceeds of the sale of the Series I Bonds to the Series J Construction fund hereinafter provided for to be held and used for paying costs of the Project; and

WHEREAS, the University has determined to borrow the balance of the funds to pay the foregoing costs, and to advertise for bids, subject to the terms of any loan agreement that might be entered into with the United States with respect to the Series J Bonds (hereinafter called the Loan Agreement), for the purchase of \$3,000,000 Dormitory Revenue Bonds, Series J, by investment bankers or others.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University:

Section 1. Purpose of Series J Bonds. It is hereby determined to be necessary to construct the Project and to issue \$3,000,000 of Dormitory Revenue Bonds of the University pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio and the Trust Agreement for the purpose of paying part of the cost of the Project and of all things incidental thereto or incidental to the financing thereof, including repayment of moneys previously borrowed or advanced for the Project or restoring amounts used for the Project from other funds of the University available for such purposes, excepting, however, the sum of \$610,000 allocated from the proceeds of the Series I Bonds to the Series J Construction Fund under this Resolution.

Section 2. Terms of Series J Bonds. Said \$3,000,000 of Dormitory
Revenue Bonds Series J shall be issued under this Resolution, the Original Bond
Resolution, and the Trust Agreement, and shall be entitled "The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Bonds". The Series J Bonds shall be initially issued in coupon or fully registered form as may be requested by the Original Purchaser and shall be exchangeable for fully registered or coupon bonds in the manner and on

the terms provided by the Trust Agreement. Series J Bonds in coupon form shall be dated as of the first day of the month in which bids for the purchase thereof are opened, and shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 each and registrable as to principal. Series J Bonds in fully registered form shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 or any multiple thereof. Such Bonds in both coupon and fully registered form shall be numbered as determined by the Fiscal Officer of the University. Each Series J Bond in fully registered form without coupons shall be dated as of the interest payment date on which it is authenticated or on the interest date next preceding the date of its authentication or as of the same date as the coupon bonds if authenticated prior to the first interest payment date; provided, however, if at the time of authentication of a registered bond without coupons, interest is in default, such Bond shall be dated as of the date to which interest has been paid. Notwithstanding the foregoing, in the event that the United States shall purchase any of such bonds pursuant to a Loan Agreement, until such time as the Original Purchaser or Purchasers request definitive bonds, a single multiple maturity, fully registered bond without coupons will be issued to him in the amount contracted for and thereafter at his request the University will, at its expense and within ninety days from such request, issue to him in exchange therefor definitive bonds, as aforesaid, in aggregate principal amount equal to the unpaid principal of such single bond. The Series J Bonds shall bear interest payable semi-annually on April fifteenth and October fifteenth of each year, beginning with the first such date occurring at least six months following the date of the coupon Bonds, until the principal sum is paid at the rate or rates per annum stipulated in the bid of the successful bidders, and approved in writing by the President or Fiscal Officer of the University, provided that no such rate shall exceed 6% per annum. The Series J Bonds shall mature annually on October fifteenth in the years and amounts per year as follows:

The Series J Bonds maturing on and after October 15, 1979 shall be subject to redemption in whole or in part on any interest payment date on and after October 15, 1978, at redemption prices equal to the following percentages of the principal amount redeemed, plus accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption, to wit:

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104% if redeemed on or before October 15, 1983;
103% if redeemed thereafter but on or before October 15, 1988;
102% if redeemed thereafter but on or before October 15, 1993;
101-1/2% if redeemed thereafter but on or before October 15, 1998;
101% if redeemed thereafter.
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If less than the entire unmatured portion of the Series J Bonds is called for redemption at any time or from time to time, they shall be called in inverse order of maturity of the Bonds of that series outstanding; and if less than all of said bonds outstanding of one maturity are to be called, the selection of bonds or portions of fully registered bonds of such maturity to be called shall be made by lot conducted by the Trustee under the Trust Agreement. Such call for redemption shall be made by notice specifying the numbers, and portions of registered bonds, of the Series J Bonds to be called, published by the Trustee on behalf of the University once a week for two consecutive weeks in a financial newspaper of national circulation, published in the English language in New York City and in an English language newspaper of general circulation in Columbus, Ohio, the first publication to be not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of redemption. Any bonds thus called for redemption and for the retirement of which funds are deposited with said Trustee as provided in the Trust Agreement on or before the redemption date shall cease to bear interest on

said redemption date. A registered bond shall have prepayment provisions consistent with the redemption rights relating to coupon bonds which it replaces.

Subject to the terms of the Loan Agreement, the principal and interest of the Series J Bonds shall be payable in any coin or currency which, on the respective dates of payment, is legal tender for the payment of debts due the United States of America, at the principal office of the Trustee under the Trust Agreement (presently, The Ohio National Bank of Columbus, Columbus, Ohio), or, at the option of the holder, at the principal corporate trust office of the United States Trust Company of New York, in the Borough of Manhattan, City and State of New York except that interest on fully registered bonds is payable by check as provided in the Trust Agreement, and principal on fully Registered Bonds may also be payable at such additional place or places, at the option of the holder as shall be designated by the Fiscal Officer of the University.

The Series J Bonds shall have such other terms and conditions and shall be issued, executed and delivered as provided by the applicable provisions of the Trust Agreement, and of or pursuant to the Loan Agreement.

Section 3. Sale of Series J Bonds. The \$3,000,000 Series J Bonds shall be offered for sale, by solicitation or proposals from investment bankers and others or by advertisement or both, to the highest bidder based on the lowest net interest cost, in such manner and on such terms as determined by the President or the Fiscal Officer of the University, subject, however, to all applicable provisions of the Loan Agreement.

Section 4. Allocation of Proceeds of Series J Bonds. Upon the issuance and delivery of the Series J Bonds, the Fiscal Officer of the University shall forthwith establish a bank account in the name of the University designated "Series J Construction Fund", (hereinafter called the "Construction Fund"). The proceeds from the sale of said Bonds shall be forthwith deposited and applied by the University as follows:

- (1) The portion representing accrued interest to the Debt Service Fund provided for in the Original Trust Agreement to be held by the Trustee, and the portion representing premium above par paid to the University for such Bonds to the Debt Service Reserve Funds.
- (2) To the University, the amounts necessary to reimburse the University for amounts expended by it on costs of construction of the Project prior to issuance of the Series J Bonds.
- (3) The balance to the Construction Fund to be held by the Trustee to pay costs of construction of the Project and to pay all incidental expenses of the Project and the financing thereof, including repayment (with interest) of money borrowed or advanced for such purposes and restoring to the University of other funds of the University issued for such purposes in accordance with the Loan Agreement, except however, there shall be no repayment of the \$610,000 of the proceeds of the Series I Bonds allocated to the Construction Fund under the Series I Bond Resolution.
- (4) Any balance remaining in the Construction Fund after payment or reimbursement of all Project costs and other amounts provided for in (3) above shall be promptly used to the extent possible for the retirement at par plus accrued interest in inverse order of maturity of Series J Bonds, if any, then held by the United States, and any portion not needed for such retirement shall be transferred to the Debt Service Reserve Fund; provided, however, the University shall have the right to withdraw any such moneys representing additional funds deposited into the Construction Fund by the University, other than from the proceeds of the sale of the Series J Bonds sold to the United States of America, to finance the total project cost, which are found to be unnecessary for such purpose.

No part of the proceeds of Series J Bonds sold to the United States acting through the Department of Housing and Urban Development shall be used to pay costs (including cost of movable equipment or fees of a financial advisor) which, under the Loan Agreement or under the rules, regulations or practices of the Department of Housing and Urban Development, may not be paid from proceeds of bonds purchased by the United States through that agency, and proceeds of Bonds purchased by the United States as aforesaid shall be segregated in the Construction Fund to the extent necessary to effect the foregoing and none of the funds in the Construction Fund shall be applied in any manner contrary to the Loan Agreement.

The Trustee shall apply said Construction Fund to the payment of such items as from time to time are requested in writing by the Fiscal Officer of the University. Such written request shall include a certificate by such official that the amount to be paid from such Construction Fund constitutes authorized payments from said fund under the foregoing provisions of this Section 4. If the payment is to be made with respect to an obligation under a construction contract relating to the Project, such written request shall further certify that such payment was certified as due under such contract by a qualified architect or engineer.

The Construction Fund shall be invested by the Trustee in such direct obligations of the United States as shall be directed in writing by the President or the Fiscal Officer of the University, which writing shall designate maturities and amounts which, as nearly as practicable, would, through maturities, provide funds when needed to pay costs for which the respective funds have been established.

Such investments and the proceeds of sale thereof shall constitute part of the fund from which the investment was made. Interest on such investments may be paid to the Dormitory Revenue Fund or applied to the purposes of the fund from which the said investments shall be sold, exchanged or collected from time to time as directed in writing by the President or the Fiscal Officer of the University and the Trustee shall be under no liability in connection with such investment, sale, exchange or collection thereof provided the directions of said officers are followed. No direction shall be made to invest the Construction Fund except as permitted by the Loan Agreement.

Section 5. Additional Bonds. (a) The Board shall have the right from time to time to issue Additional Bonds under the Trust Agreement if necessary to pay the costs of completing the Project or completing any projects for which Additional Bonds are issued. The Trustee shall authenticate and deliver such Bonds upon (but only upon) receipt of the documents required by Section 2.03 of the Trust Agreement.

Nothing herein or in the Trust Agreement shall require any earnings coverage, or certificate with respect thereto, in connection with Additional Bonds issued for completion of a project.

(b) The Board shall also have the right from time to time to issue Additional Bonds under the Trust Agreement to provide funds for purposes authorized by Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, including construction and equipment by the University of buildings to be used as dormitories or as other living quarters or the refunding of outstanding bonds or notes issued under said Section 3345.07. The Trustee shall authenticate and deliver under the Trust Agreement Additional Bonds issued under this subdivision (b) if, (but only if), when such Additional Bonds are issued, the University shall have furnished to the Trustee in addition to the documents required by Section 2.03 of the Trust Agreement, a certificate of the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University, approved by the Board of Trustees, (1) showing that (a) the actual net income from the dormitory facilities of the University (excluding net income from any dormitory facility which is to be abandoned or which is not suitable for continuous use as a dormitory facility for the term of such Additional Bonds) for the preceding fiscal year, as adjusted, if necessary, to reflect the schedule of rates and charges to become effective at the beginning of the next semester, quarter or other school period and to give recognition to any anticipated changes in operating costs; plus (b) the estimated annual net income of the dormitory facilities to be financed through the proceeds of the sale of such Additional Bonds will be equal to or greater than one and three tenths (1.3) times the maximum amount to become due in any succeeding fiscal year for the payment of principal and interest charges on the Bonds then outstanding hereunder and on the Bonds then to be authenticated and delivered; (2) showing that, until the dormitory facility being constructed from the proceeds of the Additional Bonds, is ready for occupancy, funds then available from net income, bond proceeds, gifts, legacies,

devises or grants or other sources for payment when due of principal and interest on the Bonds will be at least one and three-tenths (1.3) times the principal and interest requirements for that period; (3) showing that there were not included in net income any receipts against which there is any prior claim other than the use thereof for the operating expenses included in computing the net income; (4) furnishing such other information in support of the foregoing as may reasonably be requested by the Trustee; (5) showing that the computations of estimates provided for above are based on an assumed occupancy of not more than 95% of capacity of the dormitory facilities in question.

The first call date on Additional Bonds shall not be earlier than the first call date on any issue of Bonds outstanding at the time of issue of such Additional Bonds.

Section 6. Terms of the Bonds Generally. As used in this Resolution, the term "Bonds" refers to the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I and J Bonds and all Additional Bonds issued on a parity therewith under the Trust Agreement. The Bonds shall be designated The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Bonds, shall be payable in any coin or currency which, on the respective dates of payment, is legal tender for the payment of debts due the United States of America, shall have all the incidents of negotiable instruments under the laws of Ohio, shall express upon their face the purpose for which they are issued, and shall be issued pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio. Unless otherwise provided by the Board, the Bonds shall be signed by the Chairman of the Board or bear his facsimile signature, shall be attested by the President of the University or bear his facsimile signature, shall be attested by the Secretary of the Board or by the Vice President, Business and Finance of the University, and shall be sealed with the seal of the University or a facsimile thereof, and interest coupons attached to the Bonds shall bear the facsimile signature of the Secretary of the Board or of the Vice President,

Business and Finance of the University. In case any officer whose signature or a facsimile of whose signature shall appear on any Bonds or coupons shall cease to be such officer before the delivery of such Bonds, such signature or such facsimile shall nevertheless be valid and sufficient for all purposes, the same as if he had remained in office until such delivery. Except in the case of redemption of Bonds of a particular series from the surplus proceeds of that issue as provided in Section 5 of the Original Bond Resolution, no Bonds of any series may be called unless the same proportion of the outstanding Bonds of each other series, then callable, are called at the same time. The additional Bonds shall bear such designations as may be necessary to distinguish them from other Bonds having different provisions and shall have maturities, interest rates, interest payment dates, redemption provisions, denominations, registration provisions, and other provisions as provided in the Resolution providing for issuance of the Additional Bonds, provided, however, that such terms and provisions shall not be inconsistent with this Resolution, the Trust Agreement and in the Bonds, the Bonds shall be equally and ratably payable from and secured by pledge of, the receipts from the operation of all dormitory facilities now or hereafter under control of the Board including the dining facilities constituting a part thereof, after provision for reasonable and proper expenses of operation and maintenance of such facilities; and anything in this Resolution, the Bonds or the Trust Agreement to the contrary notwithstanding, neither this Resolution, the Bonds, nor the Trust Agreement shall be a claim against or a lien upon any property of the State of Ohio or any property of or under the control of the Board except the portion of said receipts pledged as provided herein; provided, however, that nothing herein shall be deemed to prohibit the University, of its own volition, from using, or pledging, to the extent it is lawfully authorized to do so, any of its other resources or revenues for the fulfillment of any of the terms, conditions or obligations of the Trust Agreement, this Resolution, or any of the bonds.

Section 7. Covenants of the University. The University covenants with the holders of the Bonds and with the Trustee under the Trust Agreement that (a) it will adopt and maintain so long as any of the Bonds are outstanding such parietal rules, and charge and collect such rental rates and charges, from time to time, as may be necessary to assure such occupancy and use of, and receipts from, the dormitory facilities as will pay the costs of maintenance and operation and provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds and other payments to Special Funds required by Section 8 of this Resolution; (b) from funds lawfully available, it will cause the Project and any project to be constructed from the proceeds of Additional Bonds to be completed and equipped in an efficient and economical manner with reasonable dispatch and in a manner consistent with the plans and recommendations of responsible architects and all applicable laws, ordinances and regulations; (c) subject to the right of abandonment under conditions provided in the Trust Agreement designed to prevent adverse effect of such abandonment on the expected earnings coverage of Debt Service, it will, from the dormitory receipts pledged under this resolution and as part of the operating expenses, maintain, preserve and keep the dormitory facilities in good repair, working order and operating condition and continuously operate the same on a revenue producing basis, and will apply the receipts therefrom only as provided in Section 8 of this Resolution and in the Trust Agreement; (d) it will furnish to the Trustee and the Original Purchasers of the Bonds within 120 days after the close of each fiscal year an annual report of the accounts (including each Special Fund provided for in Section 8 of this Resolution) and operations of the dormitory facilities prepared by qualified accountants approved by the Trustee; (c) it will keep proper books of record and accounts separate from all other records and accounts, in which complete and correct entries will be made of all transactions relating to the dormitory facilities and will at all reasonable times permit the Trustee, the Original Purchasers or any holder or holders of 25%

of the outstanding Bonds, or their authorized representatives, to inspect the dormitory facilities and any books, documents and vouchers relating thereto;

(f) it will furnish heat, light, power, water and other necessary services to the dormitory facilities at not in excess of reasonable cost; (g) it will comply with all the terms and conditions of the respective Loan Agreements with the Department of Housing and Urban Development as long as the United States holds any of the Series B, D, F, G, H and J Bonds; (h) it will insure the dormitory facilities as required by the Trust Agreement and apply the proceeds of such insurance as provided therein; and (i) will observe and perform all its agreements and obligations provided for by the Bonds, the Trust Agreement or the Bond Resolution.

Section 8. Application of Receipts; Special Funds. There was established by the Original Bond Resolution a Special Fund designated "Dormitory Revenue Fund", which fund shall be maintained in a bank account, or invested as herein authorized, in the name of the University separate and distinct from all other funds of the University and subject to the withdrawals and uses herein authorized, is pledged to and charged with the payment of the principal, interest, and premium, if any, on all the Bonds issued under the Trust Agreement.

Under the Original Bond Resolution there shall be maintained in the Dormitory Revenue Fund, as an Operating Reserve, such amount as is from time to time certified by the Fiscal Officer of the University as adequate and necessary for working capital for operation and maintenance of the dormitory facilities; provided, that such Operating Reserve shall not exceed one-fourth of the operating and maintenance expenses of the dormitory facilities for the preceding 12 months.

All receipts from dormitory facilities now or hereafter under the control of the Board, including the dining halls constituting part thereof, shall be deposited in the Dormitory Revenue Fund.

The Dormitory Revenue Fund, including the Operating Reserve, shall be applied to pay when due all reasonable and proper expenses of operation and

maintenance (as defined in Section 10) of the dormitory facilities, excluding extraordinary repair and replacement expenses payable from the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund and expenses of or provision for depreciation or capital replacement.

The remainder of the Dormitory Revenue Fund, after retaining therein the then current Operating Reserve and payment of said operation and maintenance expenses then due, shall be applied as provided in the Original Bond Resolution, namely, as follows and in the following order of priority;

First: Into the Debt Service Fund, to be held by the Trustee as a separate fund and used for the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds, the amounts provided in the Original Bond Resolution and in the Bond Resolutions relating to the Series C, D, E, F, G, H and I Bonds for payment of principal and interest on the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H and I Bonds and, in addition, (1) on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year an amount equal to the interest due and on the next ensuing interest payment date in that year on the Series J Bonds then outstanding; provided, that, the amount so payable on any such date into the Debt Service Fund shall be reduced by the amount then remaining in said Debt Service Fund from the accrued interest and from the funds deposited therein for capitalized interest pursuant to Section 4 of this Resolution; (2) on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year, the equal semi-annual amounts necessary to provide for payment of any principal maturity in that year on the Series J Bonds; (3) if Additional Bonds shall be issued under the Trust Agreement, such additional amounts and at such times as specified in the resolution authorizing such Additional Bonds, which amounts shall be not less than necessary to provide in the Debt Service Fund amounts, in addition to the amounts hereinbefore provided for the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I and J Bonds, sufficient to pay in full interest and principal on all Additional Bonds then outstanding, as the same shall become due and payable provided that no payments

need be made to the Debt Service Fund so long as the amounts in the Debt Service

Fund and Debt Service Reserve Fund aggregate at least the total principal and interest

payable on all Bonds then outstanding to the dates of their respective maturities.

Second: Into the Debt Service Reserve Fund, to be held by the Trustee as a separate fund for the payment of principal and interest on, and purchase or redemption of, the Bonds as herein provided, on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year and on such other dates as amounts are payable into the Debt Service Fund with respect to Additional Bonds, such amounts as are necessary to create and maintain in said Debt Service Reserve Fund the required reserve, namely, an amount equal to the maximum principal and interest requirements for any consecutive two-year period on all Bonds at the time outstanding;

Third: Into the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund, to be held by the University as a fund separate and distinct from all other funds of the University, semi-annually on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year, or as soon thereafter as the required reserve has been established in the Debt Service Reserve Fund, an amount equal to one-quarter of one percent of the cost of construction on all dormitory facilities then under the control of the Board and 3 percent of the cost of movable equipment for all such dormitory facilities, which fund may be used by the University to the extent necessary for payment of principal and interest on the Bonds or for extraordinary repairs and replacements to the dormitory facilities or for construction or equipping of additional dormitory facilities;

Fourth: On April 1 and October 1 of each year, to the foregoing funds, such amounts as may be necessary to make up previous deficiency in any deposits required by the foregoing paragraphs of this section;

Fifth: So long as there is no deficiency in any of the deposits provided for in Paragraphs First through Fourth above and so long as the amounts in the Debt Service Reserve Fund are at least equal to the then required reserve, any

amounts in the Dormitory Revenue Fund, after reserving therein the then current Operating Reserve, may be used for any purpose of the University for which such funds may lawfully be used.

The Debt Service Fund is irrevocably pledged to and shall be used by the Trustee for the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds and, until required for such purposes, shall be invested by the Trustee in such direct obligations of the United States as the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University shall direct in writing addressed to the Trustee, which writing shall determine that the maturity of the respective obligations is not later than the date on which such funds will be required for payment of such principal and interest. The Trustee shall transfer from the Debt Service Fund to the Paying Agents amounts sufficient to enable said Paying Agents to pay when due principal and interest on the Bonds, or the Trustee shall make such credit arrangements with said Paying Agents as to permit such payments.

The Debt Service Reserve Fund is irrevocably pledged to, and shall be used by the Trustee for, the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds if other available funds are insufficient for that purpose, and, to the extent herein provided, for purchase or redemption of Bonds. Until required for such purposes it shall be invested by the Trustee in such direct obligations of the United States as the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University shall direct in writing, which obligations shall mature not more than five years from the date of investment. The Trustee shall transfer from the Debt Service Reserve Fund to the Debt Service Fund such amounts as are necessary in addition to amounts available in the Debt Service Fund, including funds transferred from the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund, to enable said Paying Agents to pay when due the principal and interest on the Bonds.

Any amounts in the Debt Service Reserve Fund in excess of the required reserve provided for in Paragraph Second above shall be used to purchase Bonds for retirement or to redeem Bonds then subject to redemption to the extent and in the manner from time to time requested in writing by the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University. In calculating at any time whether additional amounts are required to be paid into the Debt Service Reserve Fund under Paragraph Second above and in calculating the excess over the required reserve, no value shall be given to any investments of the fund other than direct obligations of the United States maturing within five years from the date of such calculation, but, in all other respects, such investments shall be valued at their face amount or market value, whichever is lower.

The Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund is irrevocably pledged to, and shall be used by the University for, extraordinary repairs and replacements to the dormitory facilities or to construct or equip additional dormitory facilities or for the retirement of all then outstanding Bonds by purchase or redemption or for payment of the principal and interest by transfer to the Debt Service Fund as herein provided. The University shall transfer from the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund to the Debt Service Fund such amounts as are from time to time necessary, in addition to the other amounts available in the Debt Service Fund and without use of the Debt Service Reserve Fund, to provide for the payment, when due, of the principal and interest on the Bonds and shall not use any of this fund for repairs or replacement or additional facilities if there is any deficiency in any of the deposits required to be made under subparagraphs First or Second of this Section. Until required for such purposes, the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund may be invested by the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University in direct obligations of the United States maturing not more than five years from the date of investment.

Investments made pursuant to this Section 8 of any amounts in any Special Fund herein created and the interest thereon and the proceeds thereof shall constitute part of that Special Fund and be added to that particular fund. Such investments shall be sold, exchanged or collected from time to time as directed by the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University, and the Trustee shall be under no liability and have no responsibility in connection with such investment, or the sale, exchange or collection thereof, provided the directions of said officers are followed.

Section 9. Trust Agreement. In order to secure the payment of the principal and interest on the Bonds, the President of the University and the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and each of them, are authorized to execute, acknowledge and deliver as may be appropriate the Fifth Supplemental Trust Agreement in substantially the form attached hereto, and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees is authorized to seal and attest the same, with such changes not unfavorable to the University as the Officers acting shall deem advisable and as shall be approved by the Original Purchasers of the Series J Bonds. The terms and provisions of the Trust Agreement are hereby confirmed and adopted and the terms of said Trust Agreement purporting to be applicable to the Series A and Series B Bonds or to the Project to be constructed from the proceeds of the Series A and Series B Bonds shall be deemed equally applicable to the Series J Bonds and the Project covered by this Resolution to the extent that the same are not inconsistent with the terms or provisions of this Resolution and the context so permits.

Section 10. <u>Definitions</u>. Where the context permits, the following terms as used in this Resolution or in the Trust Agreement shall have the following meanings:

(1) "the Fiscal Officer" shall mean the Vice President, Business and Finance, of the University or any official or employee performing the duties of such officer for the time being. The Comptroller, or the Assistant Vice President-Assistant Treasurer, or any official or employee performing the duties of such officers for the time being

shall also be "a Fiscal Officer" when the context so permits. (2) "Additional Bonds" shall mean Bonds issued pursuant to the Trust Agreement in addition to and on a parity with the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I and J Bonds and "Bonds" shall shall mean both the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I and J Bonds and Additional Bonds; (3) "Agreement" or "Trust Agreement" shall refer to the Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 as from time to time supplemented pursuant to its terms; (4) "Dormitory Facilities" shall mean buildings, groups of buildings or parts of or additions to buildings, including the sites therefor, now or hereafter constructed. acquired by or under the control of the Board and authorized to be constructed. equipped, maintained and operated by Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, including the dormitories, additions to dormitories, dining facilities, and married student housing facilities or projects and all separate or connected buildings, sites, equipment, structures and utilities to be used in connection with the maintenance or operation of, or in any way supplementing or related to the services or facilities to be provided by such buildings located on or in close proximity to the campus; (5) "Net Income" shall mean all receipts of the operation of dormitory facilities after deducting therefrom the reasonable and proper operating and maintenance expenses thereof; (6) "Reasonable and Proper Operating and Maintenance Expenses" shall mean ordinary and usual reasonable expenditures necessary to the operation, repair and maintenance of the dormitory facilities including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, taxes, fees and expenses of the Trustee and paying agents and any expenses required to be paid by the Bond Resolution or the Trust Agreement, but excluding provision or expenditure for depreciation or capital replacement or expenditures for administration or regulation of the occupants of the dormitory facilities which expenditures do not constitute costs of the type included as costs of operation of the dormitory facilities under the present accounting practice of the University or expenditures for extraordinary repairs or

replacements or payments to the Debt Service Fund, Debt Service Reserve Fund or Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund; (7) "Trustee" refers to the Trustee under the Trust Agreement, presently The Ohio National Bank of Columbus; (8) any reference to an officer of the University or of the Board in this Resolution shall refer to the person holding such office or, in the event of resignation, absence, incapacity or vacancy in such office, then the person performing the duties of such office; any reference to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio shall, where the context permits, mean said section as it now exists and as it is from time to time amended, supplemented or affected by later legislation.

Section 11. General. The appropriate officers of the University and the Board, the architects and engineers employed by the University, and the Trustee designated in the Trust Agreement are authorized and directed to do all things necessary or proper to carry out the terms and provisions of this Resolution, the Trust Agreement and the sale referred to in Section 3 above and to effect the execution, sale and delivery of said Series J Bonds in accordance therewith if approved by the President and Fiscal Officer of the University. It may be required as part of the terms of sale of the Series J Bonds that prior to or at the time of delivery of the Series J Bonds there shall have been executed and delivered contracts for construction of the principal portions of the Project and provisions shall have been made for obtaining sufficient amounts to pay all costs of the Project as estimated by the Project architect. The obligations imposed upon the University under this Resolution or the Trust Agreement are established as duties specifically enjoined upon the University, the Board and the officials of the University by law and result from their respective offices, trusts or stations within the meaning of Section 2731.01 of the Revised Code of Ohio.

WHEREAS, the text of the Series J Bonds and the coupons, if any, to be attached thereto and the authentication certificate of the Trustee to be endorsed thereon are to be substantially as follows:

(Form of Coupon Bond)

The form of Coupon Bond shall be identical with the form of Coupon Bond set forth in the Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 except that there shall be substituted in such form in lieu of the corresponding paragraphs and Trustee's Certificate and corresponding coupon form in said Coupon Bond the following paragraphs and coupon form:

* * * * * * *

This Bond is a Series J Bond and is one of a duly authorized issue of \$3,000,000 Dormitory Revenue Bonds of the University, issued and to be issued from time to time, pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio and the Resolutions of the Board of Trustees of April 8, 1957 and July 13, 1967 (herein collectively called the "Bond Resolution") for the purpose of paying the costs of constructing and equipping certain dormitory facilities and secured by Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 and First, Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Supplemental Trust Agreements between the University and the above-named Trustee (herein collectively called the "Agreement").

The University hereby reserves the right to call and redeem the Bonds of this series prior to maturity as a whole, or in part, in inverse order of maturity, on any interest payment date on or after October 15, 1978, upon terms of par and accrued interest to the redemption date plus redemption premiums as follows: four percent (4%) if redeemed 1978 to 1983, inclusive; three percent (3%) if redeemed 1984 to 1988, inclusive; two percent (2%) if redeemed 1989 to 1993, inclusive; one and one-half percent (1-1/2%) if redeemed 1994 to 1998, inclusive; and one percent (1%) if redeemed after 1998. If less than all the Bonds (or parts of Registered Bonds) of one maturity and of one series are to be called, the Coupon Bonds or portions of fully Registered Bonds of such series and of that maturity to be called shall be chosen by lot by said Trustee. Except in the case of redemption of a particular series of bonds from surplus proceeds of that issue as provided in the Bond Resolution, no Bonds of any series may be called unless the same proportion of the outstanding Bonds of each other series, then callable, are called at the same time.

* * * * *

The Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I, and J Bonds, together with such Additional Bonds as may be issued on a parity therewith under said Agreement, are, and are to be, secured only, but equally and ratably without priority one over another by reason of number or of date of Bond, sale, execution or delivery, by the Agreement, creating a prior pledge of the

receipts of all dormitory facilities now or hereafter under the control of the Board of Trustees as defined in the Agreement after provision only for reasonable operating and maintenance expenses thereof.

* * * * * *

The Bonds are issuable as coupon bonds, registrable as to principal, in the denomination of \$5,000, and as registered bonds without coupons in denominations of \$5,000 and any multiple thereof. Registered Bonds without coupons may be exchanged for coupon Bonds or for other registered Bonds without coupons, and coupon Bonds may be exchanged for registered Bonds without coupons, all on the terms and under the conditions and upon payment of the charges, if any, and with the effect provided in the Agreement.

The form of Registered Bonds without coupons of single maturity shall be identical with the form of Registered Bond set forth in the Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 except that there shall be substituted in such form in lieu of the corresponding paragraphs and Trustee's Certificate in said Registered Bond the following paragraphs:

* * * * * * *

This Bond is a Series J Bond and is one of a duly authorized issue of \$3,000,000 of Dormitory Revenue Bonds of the University, issued and to be issued from time to time, pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio and the resolutions of the Board of Trustees of April 8, 1957 and July 13, 1967 (herein collectively called the "Bond Resolution") for the purpose of paying the costs of constructing and equipping certain dormitory facilities and secured by Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 and First, Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Supplemental Trust Agreements between the University and the above-named Trustee (herein collectively called the "Agreement").

The University hereby reserves the right to call and redeem the Bonds of this series prior to maturity as a whole, or in part, in inverse order of maturity, on any interest payment date on or after October 15, 1978, upon terms of par and accrued interest to the redemption date plus redemption premiums as follows: four percent (4%) if redeemed 1978 to 1983, inclusive; three percent (3%) if redeemed 1984 to 1988, inclusive; two percent (2%) if redeemed 1989 to 1993, inclusive; one and one-half percent (1-1/2%) if redeemed 1994 to 1998, inclusive; and one percent (1%) premium if redeemed after 1998. If less than all the Bonds (or parts of registered Bonds) of one maturity and of one series are to be called, the coupon bonds or portions of fully registered bonds of such series and of that maturity to be called shall be chosen by lot by said Trustee. Except in the case of redemption of a particular series of bonds from surplus proceeds of that issue as provided in the Bond Resolution, no Bonds of any series may be called unless the same proportion of the outstanding Bonds of each other series, then callable, are called at the same time.

* * * * * *

The Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I, and J Bonds, together with such Additional Bonds as may be issued on a parity therewith under said Agreement, are, and are to be, secured only, but equally and ratably without priority one over another by reason of number or of date of Bond, sale, execution or delivery, by the Agreement, creating a prior pledge of the receipts of all dormitory facilities now or hereafter under the control of the Board of Trustees as defined in the Agreement after provision only for reasonable operating and maintenance expenses thereof.

The Bonds are issuable as coupon bonds, registrable as to principal, in the denomination of \$5,000, and as registered bonds without coupons in denominations of \$5,000 and any multiple thereof. Registered Bonds without coupons may be exchanged for coupon Bonds or for other registered Bonds without coupons, and coupon Bonds may be exchanged for registered Bonds without coupons, all on the terms and under the conditions and upon payment of the charges, if any, and with the effect provided in the Agreement.



- Note 2 Estimated net income is computed in accordance with the Trust Agreement on the basis of 95% occupancy and estimated expenses are consistent with those experienced in similar existing facilities. It is hereby certified that the facility, Drackett Tower, under Item 2 was placed in operation in March, 1965, Houck House was placed in operation in January, 1966, Archer and Nosker Houses and Taylor Tower were placed in operation in September, 1966, and that Raney Commons Dining Facility was placed in operation in January, 1967. It is certified that Jones Tower will be in operation and revenue producing by January, 1969.
- Note 3 Series J Bonds are computed at 3%. Series A through H are computed on basis of actual interest rates for those bonds and the Series I Bonds are computed at 4-3/4%.

KENYON S. CAMPBELL

THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

Outstanding development officer and dedicated servant of The Ohio State University

Kenyon S. Campbell has been associated with The Ohio State University for more than five decades. As a student, alumni leader, and Development Fund executive, he has worked in behalf of Ohio State with rare devotion and skill and has left upon the University the imprint of truly distinguished service.

During his undergraduate days, Mr. Campbell was a leader in extracurricular activities and was elected to membership in the junior and senior men's honorary societies. He received the B.A. degree in 1920 and the LL.B. in 1922.

Mr. Campbell was appointed field director of The Ohio State University Development Fund in 1947 and became associate executive director in 1956, the position he held until he retired in 1966. Before joining the Ohio State staff, he had practiced law in Columbus for 25 years and had been one of the University's most active alumni. He was a member of the "Committee of 100" which originally set up the framework for the Development Fund.

Much of the success of the University's Development Fund is attributable to Mr. Campbell's work. He was the originator of the highly successful Presidents Club which has grown to a membership of more than 250 since its inception in 1963. His unusual ability as a collegiate fund-raiser is reflected in the leadership roles, including national president, which he has filled in the American Alumni Council and in the awards which that organization has bestowed upon The Ohio State University Development Fund.

THOMAS E. DAVIS

THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

Pioneer research administrator and dedicated University citizen

Thomas E. Davis, a 1939 graduate of the College of Commerce and Administration, served the University for 28 years. Mr. Davis played increasingly important roles in The Ohio State University Research Foundation, from his initial appointment as an assistant project supervisor to his retirement in 1967 from the position of associate executive director.

As a key administrator in the Research Foundation, Mr. Davis insisted that the activities directed by the Foundation be in harmony with the mission of the University. His major effort was to insure that research activities were an integral part of the University educational program, and he vigorously resisted all pressures which might have caused separation between the Foundation and the University. Largely through his vigilance, sponsored research at Ohio State has been administered as a part of the University rather than as a separate activity.

Mr. Davis was also active in the development of federal and industrial policies and procedures in support of sponsored research activities in universities. His counsel was widely sought by colleagues from other universities as well as by representatives of government and of industry.

A skillful administrator who displayed great loyalty to his colleagues and earned their loyalty in return, Thomas E. Davis rendered distinguished service to his alma mater, to the State of Ohio, and to the research efforts of the Nation.

JEAN WAID REILLY

THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

Devoted friend of the University and leader of alumnae endeavors

Jean Waid Reilly is one of those rare persons who sensed, as an undergraduate, the full promise of her alma mater and who has given, as an adult, creative leadership toward the advancement of the University. She has made lasting contributions to The Ohio State University.

Mrs. Reilly earned the Bachelor's Degree in 1940 and the Master's Degree in personnel psychology in 1942. As an undergraduate, she was a member of the Student Affairs Council and the Student Senate, and she served as president of the Women's Self-Government Association. These activities and other campus affiliations won membership for her in Chimes, the junior women's honorary society, of which she was president, and in Mortar Board, the honorary society for senior women.

Graduation did not diminish her continuing interest in University affairs. She has served as president of the Alumnae Council and of the Franklin County Alumnae Club. In 1949, she was elected Second Vice President of The Ohio State University Association.

Mrs. Reilly's special interest has been directed toward the development of ways by which Ohio State alumnae might maintain meaningful relationships with the University, and in this work her success has been truly noteworthy. In 1964, she directed a survey of 5,000 central Ohio women which led to the formation of the increasingly active University program of continuing education for women. Currently she is chairman of the Alumnae Council Committee on Continuing Education for Women.







ONE THOUSAND AND TWENTY-THIRD MEETING

OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Wooster, Ohio, September 14, 1967

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, September 14, 1967, at the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center, Wooster, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: John W. Bricker, Vice Chairman, John G. Ketterer, Frederick E. Jones, Mervin B. France, James W. Shocknessy, Don M. Hilliker, and William C. Safford.

Mr. John W. Bricker, Vice Chairman of the Board of Trustees, presided in the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Stanley C. Allyn.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Supplemental Action on the Budgets for the 1967-68 Fiscal Year

At the June 8, 1967, meeting of this Board of Trustees, budgets in the amount of \$130,780,576 were approved, subject to the passage of House Bill 537. In this action the Board recognized that revenue in the amount of \$136,917,720 would be required to guarantee a continuation of our present programs. The Board recognized further that \$6,137,144 would need to be funded through additional legislative actions in the form of a supplemental appropriation or by such adjustments in student fees and programs as might be required.

Since that original action was taken, the General Assembly passed House Bill 537 and Amended Senate Bill 350 known as the Supplemental Appropriation Act. To bring the budget for the 1967-68 fiscal year into balance at a continuation level requires additional revenue beyond the amount provided in House Bill 537 in the amount of \$6,137,144. Our studies lead us to conclude that the funds required to bring us into balance can be provided best as follows:

Fee increases for four quarters should produce in the 1968-69 academic year \$1,510,000 and the carry forward from 1967-68 should be about \$588,846 to meet an anticipated deficit for 1968-69 of \$2,096,400.

President Fawcett made the following recommendations:

- That, effective Winter Quarter, 1968, the instructional and general fee for The Ohio State University be increased \$15.00 per quarter,
- That, effective Winter Quarter, 1968, the tuition fee (out-of-state student surcharge) be increased \$14.00 per quarter.
- 3. That, in addition to the above-proposed fee increase, effective Winter Quarter, 1968, the instructional and general fee for students enrolled in the Doctor of Medicine program in the College of Medicine be increased in the amount of \$60.00 annually to reflect the rising costs of special laboratory equipment and supplies.

These recommended fee increases are interpreted in the attached New Schedule of Student Fees, effective Winter Quarter, 1968. (See Appendix II, page 267.)

Mr. France moved that the foregoing recommendations be approved and that a "Continuation Budget" in the amount of \$136,917,720 for fiscal year 1967-68 be adopted, subject to the approval of the Ohio Board of Regents.

Mr. Safford seconded the above motion, and it was passed unanimously by roll call vote.

Mr. Shocknessy commented to the effect that a member of The Ohio State University faculty contributed significantly to the development of support for the Supplemental Appropriation Act passed by the General Assembly; and President Fawcett responded with the statement, "Yes, Dr. John C. Ullery, Professor and Chairman of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology, served as Chairman of the State-Supported Education Review Committee."

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

B. Insurance Program for Faculty and Staff

The Retirement and Insurance Committee of the Board of Trustees has consulted with the members of the University administration in a further effort to improve the benefits in the employee group insurance coverages with no additional out-of-pocket cost to either the University or the faculty, administrative staff, or classified and hourly employees. As the result of these deliberations and counsel with the insurance consultants to the Board, Carlin-Black Company, and with the full agreement of the insurance carrier, President Fawcett recommended that the following resolutions be adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED THEREFORE, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, that the following improvements in the University's insurance program under the John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance Company Contract No. 1035-G and No. 58175-GTC as amended, for faculty and staff be enacted, effective September 1, 1967, except that Section 1(c) be made retroactive to July 1, 1967:

1. Unclassified Employees

a) Group Life Insurance Program - the amounts of life insurance for active unclassified employees be increased from 2 times salary to 2-1/2 times salary. All other elements of the schedule to remain unchanged so that the new life schedule would be as follows:

2-1/2 times regular annual salary with a minimum of \$7,500.00, reduced 3% at age 55 and by an additional 3% each year thereafter subject to a maximum reduction of \$13,500.00.

Life insurance and accidental death and dismemberment insurance to be continued during retirement years to age 70 on a basis of an amount equal to 2 times salary for both present and future retirees, subject to appropriate deductions as in the current life insurance schedule.

- b) Accidental Death and Dismemberment Insurance the amount of accidental death and dismemberment insurance to be equal to the amount of life insurance by increasing the accidental death and dismemberment schedule for active unclassified employees from 2 to 2-1/2 times salary. All other elements of the accidental death and dismemberment schedule to remain unchanged so that the new schedule would be identical to the new life schedule.
- c) Major Medical Insurance the maximum coverage for hospital private room and board charges shall be changed from \$25.00 per day to the hospital's average semi-private room and board rate plus \$3.00.

B. Insurance Program for Faculty and Staff (continued)

- (1) The period of disability shall be increased from 2 years to 3 years requiring a period of 3 years to elapse rather than 2 years currently after the deductible is first satisfied before a new deductible charge would be applicable.
- d) Under the major medical coverage, an automatic \$1,000.00 annual reinstatement revision to be adopted which would gradually restore the \$15,000.00 maximum major benefit but not over \$15,000.00.
- e) Extend major medical coverage, after satisfaction of the normal deduction provision, to dependent, newborn children, immediately from birth, including coverage for nursery services and circumcision.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University that the following amendments to the above-referred to contracts of the University's insurance plan be enacted for the purpose of clarification:

- B. Insurance Program for Faculty and Staff (continued)
 - 1. That the "actively at work" provision contained in Amendment No. 23 to said Policy shall not be applicable to retired employees.
 - 2. That the first sentence in Part V of Amendment No. 25, which cancels the Schedules of Insurance contained in Amendments Nos. 16 and 17, is modified to the extent that such cancellation of Schedules shall not be applicable to those employees who retired prior to July 1, 1965. Accordingly, the Schedule of Insurance described as Schedule II in Amendment No. 17, as further modified by Amendment No. 23, shall remain in effect as a basis for the amounts of insurance available to those employees on the Unclassified Payroll who retired prior to July 1, 1965.
 - The following is added to Part IV INSURANCE AFTER RETIREMENT contained in Amendment No. 25 to said Policy:

The amount of Life Insurance applicable to an eligible unclassified employee at the time of his retirement shall be the same amount for which he was insured under the Policy immediately preceding the date of such retirement, with successive annual reductions for retirees prior to July 1, 1965 as specified in Schedule II contained in Amendment No. 17 to said Policy; and for retirees on and after July 1, 1965 as specified in Schedule I contained in Amendment No. 25 to said Policy.

- 4. The monthly premium rates per \$1,000 of Life Insurance currently applicable under said Policy for those employees described as "Unclassified" shall be further reduced 10%, effective October 1, 1966.
- 5. That effective as of April 1, 1967, the provision entitled "Waiver of Premium in the Event of Permanent and Total Disability" contained in Amendment No. 25 to said Policy is hereby amended to provide that wherever in subdivision (d) the phrase which reads
 - (d) the employee furnishes the Company at its Home Office, after nine months following the date the employee ceased active work but within twelve months following the date of termination of his employment, . . .

appears, such phrase is changed to read

(d) the employee furnishes the Company at its Home Office, after nine months following the date the employee ceased active work, or as of the date, if earlier, on which he filed a claim for disability with the State Teachers or Public Employees Retirement Systems, but within twelve months following the date of termination of his employment, . . .

6. That effective as of October 1, 1966 said Policy is hereby amended to provide that the provision entitled "Conversion Privilege" contained in page 2 to said Policy is cancelled and annulled and the following provision substituted therefor:

CONVERSION PRIVILEGE.

- a) Any employee, upon written application made to the Company within thirty-one days after the earlier of the following dates:
 - the date of termination of his employment, as hereinbefore defined, for any reason whatsoever;
 - (2) the date of termination of his membership in the class or classes of employees insured hereunder, or
 - (3) within thirty-one days after the date of cessation of his rights under the provision entitled "Waiver of Premium Benefit in the Event of Permanent and Total Disability"; or
 - (4) within the period following cessation of insurance as stated in the provision entitled "Extension of Death Benefits in Event of Total Disability" during which period death would have resulted in a valid claim under this Policy.

shall be entitled to have issued to him by the Company, without evidence of insurability, an individual policy of life insurance subject to the following conditions and provisions:

- such individual policy shall be in any one of the forms then customarily issued by the Company, except term insurance;
- (2) the premium for such individual policy shall be the premium applicable to the class of risk to which the employee belongs and to the form and amount of the policy at the employee's attained age (nearest birthday) at the date of issue of such individual policy;

- (3) the amount of such individual policy shall be equal to (or at the option of the employee, less than) the amount of the employee's Life Insurance hereunder which was discontinued on whichever of the dates specified in the preceding paragraphs (1), (2), (3), and (4) is applicable;
- (4) the first premium payment on such individual policy of life insurance so issued shall be made to the Company within the applicable period specified supra during which application for such individual policy may be made.

b) Any employee, upon

- (1) termination of the Life Insurance of the class of employees of which he is a member, or
- (2) termination of the Life Insurance under this Policy,
- (3) termination of this policy by either the Employer or the Company,

shall be entitled to the rights and benefits set forth in subdivision A of this provision, in accordance with its terms and conditions, provided his Life Insurance has been continuously in force for at least five years immediately preceding such termination; except that the amount of such individual policy shall not exceed the lesser of

- (1) the amount of such employee's Life Insurance under this Policy at the date of such termination, less any amount of life insurance for which he may be or may become eligible under any Group Policy issued by the Company or by any other insurer within thirty-one days after such termination, and
- (2) \$2,000.
- c) Insurance under any individual policy issued in accordance with this provision shall become effective at the end of the applicable period during which application for such individual policy may be made.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

B. Insurance Program for Faculty and Staff (continued)

7. Said Policy is amended by the addition of the following provision:

EXTENSION OF DEATH BENEFIT DURING CONVERSION PERIOD.

In the event of the death of the employee during any aforedescribed thirty-one-day period, the Company shall pay to the beneficiary as a death benefit the maximum amount of Life Insurance for which an individual policy could have been issued under this provision whether or not the employee shall have made written application for conversion.

- 8. The provision entitled "Waiver of Premium Benefit in the Event of Permanent and Total Disability" contained in subdivision (1), Part III, Amendment No. 25 to said Policy is amended by the addition of the following subdivision.
 - (g) no death benefit is payable within thirty-one days following the date of termination of employment, or the date of termination of the Life Insurance under this Policy, or the date of termination of this Policy as provided in the provision entitled "Conversion Privilege".

Except as stated in the above amendments, nothing contained herein shall be held to alter or affect any of the provisions of said Policy including any prior amendments.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University that the following changes in the above-referred-to University's group insurance contracts be enacted and be made effective October 1, 1966, (the last anniversary date of the contract):

- That separate group insurance contracts be issued by the carrier to insure classified and hourly employees. The new contracts will provide classified and hourly employees with the same benefits as under the existing group insurance contracts, (No. 1035-G and No. 58175-GTC) as amended.
- 2. The in-force group insurance contracts covering various classifications of University employees be amended to exclude classified and hourly employees from coverage thereunder.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the above resolutions were adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

E. Agreement for Preliminary Studies - Campus Loop Road

The proposal to enter into an agreement with the engineering firm of E. S. Preston & Associates, Ltd., Columbus, Ohio, for the purpose of making preliminary engineering studies to assist in protecting the interests of the University in the later implementation of its master plan, particularly related to that portion of the proposed Campus Loop Road paralleling the Olentangy Freeway, of adjoining segments of the Loop Road, and of connections to other related campus and non-campus streets, was reviewed with the Board of Trustees on July 13, 1967, and the President was authorized to proceed with the negotiation of such an agreement with the total cost not to exceed \$10,000.00.

An agreement between The Ohio State University and E. S. Preston & Associates has now been executed with the understanding that the University will reimburse the E. S. Preston & Associates for "Actual payroll cost... plus actual other direct costs plus overhead at 80 per cent of actual payroll cost plus a fixed fee of \$1,500.00; the combined total of which shall not exceed \$10,000.00."

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees formally ratify this agreement and authorize payment upon satisfactory completion of the work.

All bids received are in excess of the estimates of cost and have been recommended for award subject to the approval of the State Controlling Board and the Director of Public Works whose opinion is that no better bids would be received if the project was readvertised.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above award of contracts and expenditure of funds were approved, and the action of the Vice President for Business and Finance was ratified by unanimous roll call vote.

VII. CONTROLLING BOARD REQUESTS

Each numbered request accomplishes the following purpose:

- Approves the transfer and release of \$39,475.00 from Item 016 Medical Complex to Item 052 Mental Retardation Center, H. B. 202, to provide funds for Stage II preliminary plans.
- Authorizes the release of \$885,050.00 from Item 018, H. B. 202, to provide funds for contracts for the project "Lima Campus Phase II."
- Approves the amendment of previous request to provide funds for contracts for the project "Printing Facilities."

VIII. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

A. Laboratory Animal Facility - Employment of Architects

On December 8, 1966, the Board of Trustees authorized the employment of Urban, Calabretta & Lewis to prepare schematic studies and drawings for this project to accompany an application for a Federal Grant.

President Fawcett recommended that their employment be extended to provide complete architectural and engineering services for the project, including preliminary plans, basic drawings, working drawings, specifications, estimate of cost, necessary bidding documents, and complete supervision of construction.

The fee for this work will be calculated at 6 per cent of the first \$1,000,000.00 and 5 1/2 per cent of all over the first \$1,000,000.00. This is an estimated fee of \$76,665.00 less the prior payment for schematics. Funds will be provided from B/A 801021.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

VIII. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE (continued)

B. Purchase of Buildings and Property, 199-203 West Tenth Avenue

Upon recommendation of the Finance and Investment Committee, the Vice President for Business and Finance has negotiated for the purchase of the following property from Leo Yassenoff at a price of \$42,500.00:

Property known as 199-203 West Tenth Avenue being Lots 38 and 39, Elizabeth J. McMillen's University Addition, City of Columbus, County of Franklin, State of Ohio.

Funds are available in the Investment Portfolio for this purchase, and President Fawcett recommended that the action of the Vice President for Business and Finance be ratified and the purchase completed.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

C. <u>McCracken Power Plant - Additional Boiler and Remodeling</u> of Existing Boilers - Employment of Engineers

President Fawcett recommended that with the concurrence of the Director of Public Works the engineering firm of Moulenbelt and Seifert be employed to provide engineering services involved in the design and supervision of a new gas-fired package boiler and conversion of two existing powdered coal boilers to gas fuel with oil standby.

The fee for this service will be calculated at the rate of 6 3/4 per cent for the new boiler and 8 per cent for the remodeling work. Funds will be provided from Budget Account 801143.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. France, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

IX. RESOLUTION IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the death of David Rollin Dodd, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Agronomy. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, a copy of the following Resolution expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the family of the deceased.

A. David Rollin Dodd

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on July 23, 1967, of David Rollin Dodd, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Agronomy.

Dr. Dodd was a native of Berkeley County, West Virginia. He was a graduate of Shepherd College and received his Bachelor of Science degree from West Virginia University and his Doctor of Philosophy degree from Cornell University.

IX. RESOLUTION IN MEMORIAM (continued)

A. David Rollin Dodd (continued)

From 1914 to 1919, he served as County Agricultural Extension Agent, first of Clay County and later of Mason County, West Virginia. In 1919, he joined the faculty of West Virginia University, and except for two years at Cornell University, served there until 1930 when he joined the faculty at The Ohio State University. He was also associated with the U. S. Department of Agriculture and was widely known as an authority on grasses and pastures. In 1952, he was named Deputy Economics Administrator for the Marshall Plan with headquarters in Paris, France. In this capacity, he assisted nineteen European countries on programs designed to increase their agricultural productivity. After returning to the United States and retiring from The Ohio State University in 1954, he devoted his principal attention to the development of Potomac Riverside Farm at Little Georgetown, West Virginia.

In 1958, he was named Director of Agricultural and Forestry Resources and Professor of Agriculture at Berry College, Mt. Berry, Georgia. After retiring from Berry College in 1960, he served as Technical Director of Darby Dan Farms, Columbus, Ohio. He returned to his permanent residence at Little Georgetown, West Virginia, late last year and at the time of his death was active as an agricultural consultant and President of Potomac Riverside Farms, lnc., the old Dodd homestead at Little Georgetown, West Virginia.

Dr. Dodd was a Fellow of the American Society for the Advancement of Science and the American Society of Agronomy. He was a thirty-second degree Scottish Rite Mason and a member of Berkeley Lodge 37, A.F.A.M.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

3. Appropriations for University Administrative Officials

Mr. France moved that the amounts to be appropriated from the unrestricted interest on endowment funds in the University Treasury to certain principal administrative officers of the University for the purpose of carrying out their administrative responsibilities during the fiscal year 1967-68 be on the same basis as the appropriations for 1966-67: (1) to the President, \$7,500.00; (2) to each of the persons holding the following titles, \$1,000.00 - Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost of the University; Vice President for Business and Finance; Vice President for Research; Vice President for Educational Services; Executive Dean for Student Relations; Executive Dean for Admissions and Registrations; Executive Director for University Relations; Executive Assistant to the President; and (3) an additional amount of \$1,000.00 to be allocated at the discretion of the President for such costs as may be incurred by the administrative officers as they, by direction, further the fiscal progress of the University.

The above motion was seconded by Mr. Jones and approved by unanimous roll call vote.

B. Distribution of Annual Reports

The following University annual reports were distributed to each member of the Board of Trustees, and the Secretary was instructed to file a copy of each report with the official records of the Board of Trustees.

C. Administrative Reports to the Board of Trustees by President Fawcett

1. Highlights of University Activities

President Fawcett reported to the Board of Trustees on some of the significant activities of the University since the last meeting of the Board. Some references included in the report, which is filed with the official records of the Board, were as follows:

C. Administrative Reports to the Board of Trustees by President Fawcett (continued)

1. Highlights of University Activities (continued)

- a. The University will begin its 95th year of instruction September 27, 1967, with an anticipated grand total enrollment of 43,084. This includes estimates of 39,049 at the Columbus campus and 4,035 at branches and off-campus centers. Last autumn the grand total enrollment was 41,207, with 37,486 on the main campus and 3,721 at branches and centers.
- b. Ohio State ranked sixth in the nation in the production of teachers newly certified in 1966, according to the report of the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education. The University produced 1,396 new teachers, to rank behind Indiana, which led with 1,959; Michigan State, Fresno State, Western Michigan, and the University of Puerto Rico.
- c. The University will replace its principal research and instructional computer during the next year. On order is a new and more powerful third-generation system, an IBM 360, to be installed in place of its present IBM 7094. Dr. Roy Reeves, Director of the Computer Center, indicates that the advantages of the new system would include higher-speed computing for long-running problems, use of more modern computer languages, larger storage capacity, and greater accessibility by students and faculty.
- d. The College of Medicine has concluded a contract with the U. S. Public Health Service's National Library of Medicine for initial support of \$50,585.00 for a computer-based medical information retrieval program. According to Dean Richard L. Meiling, the new facility will enable the College to serve as a resource for the State of Ohio for the growing amount of information in the health fields. The present volume of published scientific material creates an urgent need for more efficient retrieval of health information.
- e. Some 1,715 law alumni of the University now have received new juris doctor diplomas in place of the LL. B. degrees previously awarded.
- f. The Department of Aviation is conducting three research studies for the Federal Aviation Agency under contracts totaling over \$75,000.00. Mr. Jack J. Eggspuehler, Chairman of the Department, said the University won the contracts in competition with certified flying schools and other universities throughout the country.
- g. Scientists, engineers, and social scientists from a battery of Midwestern institutions, including Ohio State, have banded together to build a plan for attacking water-resource problems in the Great Lakes area.

 - 1. Highlights of University Activities (continued)
 - h. Frederick G. Kilgour, Associate Librarian for Research and Development at Yale University, has been named Director of the new Ohio College Library Center based at Ohio State. The appointment was announced by A. Blair Knapp, President of Denison University and Chairman of a Committee of the Ohio College Association assigned the job of getting the Center under way.

2. Administrative Report

In a report to the Board, President Fawcett discussed administrative policy matters dealing with the following four principal categories:

- (a) The efficient management of existing resources
- (b) The need to achieve an increase in State appropriations
- (c) An enlarged effort to capture Ohio's share of Federal funds
- (d) The inevitable need for increased private, corporation, and foundation support.

The Secretary was instructed to file a copy of the above statement by the President with the official records of the Board of Trustees.

Thereupon the Board adjourned to meet Wednesday, October 11, 1967, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, at 10:30 a.m.



Schedule of Student Fees, Effective Winter Quarter, 1968




^{*}Pursuant to action of the Board of Trustees on January 14, 1965, third- and fourth year students enrolled in the Doctor of Medicine degree program of the College of Medicine are enrolled in a year-round program of courses and are assessed fees on an annual basis payable in two installments, June 15 and December 15. The annual rate for such resident students for the 1967-68 academic year shall be \$915.00 for resident students and \$1,515.00 for nonresident students.

Part-time students (those enrolled for six or less credit hours or enrolled for one term of a Summer Quarter), shall be assessed one-half of the full fees to the next even dollar amount; i.e., \$83.00 for Ohio residents enrolled in undergraduate college programs and \$183.00 for nonresident students enrolled in undergraduate programs.

All other fees previously approved by the Board of Trustees shall remain unchanged.

Columbus, Ohio, October 11, 1967

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Wednesday, October 11, 1967, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: John W. Bricker, Vice Chairman, Bertram D. Thomas, Frederick E. Jones, Mervin B. France, James W. Shocknessy, Don M. Hilliker, and William C. Safford.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

Mr. John W. Bricker, Vice Chairman of the Board of Trustees, presided in the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Stanley C. Allyn.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATION

A. Academic Reorganization of the University

While the structure of an institution guarantees neither success nor failure, it should facilitate success. With this in mind, the academic structure of the University has been studied with some regularity over the past twenty years. These studies have now resulted in an academic reorganization plan which was approved by the Faculty Council on October 3, 1967, following recommendations submitted to the Council by Vice President Corbally on behalf of the faculty Council on Academic Affairs:

The proposal is designed to meet several objectives:

- the development of college units which can react with some consistency and rapidity to changing academic needs and requirements;
- the grouping of academic departments into college units on the basis of academic relationships;
- the provision of an effective faculty base for the design and implementation of academic programs in the broad arts and sciences area; and
- the development of coordinating mechanisms to assist colleges and departments in the planning and offering of multidisciplinary academic programs.

The major elements of the reorganization plan are:

- the creation of a unit to be known as the Colleges of the Arts and Sciences to include the existing College of Biological Sciences and University College and the following new colleges--the College of the Arts, the College of Humanities, the College of Mathematics and Physical Sciences, and the College of Social and Behavioral Sciences;
- the creation of a College of Administrative Science and a College of Optometry to design and coordinate specialized professional academic programs;

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATION (continued)

A. Academic Reorganization of the University (continued)

- the creation of a Faculty of the Arts and Sciences to have jurisdiction over academic programs leading to the "untagged" baccalaureate degrees and over basic education programs for the Colleges of the Arts and Sciences;
- 4. the creation of a position--Dean for Undergraduate Programs in the Colleges of the Arts and Sciences-to coordinate certain specified activities of the Colleges;
- 5. the redefinition of a School to clarify the distinctions between a School and a Department; and
- the assignment of existing Departments and Schools to Colleges within the new structure.

President Fawcett recommended that this plan of academic reorganization be approved, effective January 1, 1968; and that the Secretary of the Board be directed to correct and reprint the Rules for the University Faculty and the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees to include the specific changes as approved by the Faculty Council, recorded in the document identified as "Changes in Rules for the University Faculty Resulting from Academic Reorganization," and filed with the official records of the University.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

* *

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Office of Business and Finance will proceed to complete those property transactions which would result in acquiring properties in the center section and in the northwest triangle to complete a contiguous land area functionally usable for Transportation Research purposes by the Engineering Experiment Station, within the limits of the \$2,000,000 budget; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Office of Business and Finance will proceed to negotiate, if possible, within the \$2,000,000 budget, two-year options with an additional two-year renewal right on all properties located in the upper northeast corner, east of the line running north to south along the east line of the Barrett, No. 39, Moore, No. 40, Devault, No. 41, Johnston, No. 51, and Comstock, No. 55, properties, plus the remaining properties located in the extreme southeastern portion, all of these being within the area of the Transportation Research Center.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

C. Marion Campus, Easement for Ohio Edison Company

The Ohio Edison Company has requested a pole line easement on State of Ohio lands that have been designated for the use of The Ohio State University Marion Branch. The pole line will provide electricity to the Marion Campus.

President Fawcett recommended that a pole line easement, within the existing 10' easement previously granted to the General Telephone Company, be granted to the Ohio Edison Company. It was further recommended that the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to request the Director of Public Works, pursuant to his statutory duties, to act on behalf of the University in developing the necessary legal instruments to provide electric service to the Marion Campus.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

IX. RESOLUTION IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the death of Charles E. Dryden, Professor in the Department of Chemical Engineering. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, a copy of the following Resolution expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the family of the deceased.

A. Charles E. Dryden

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on September 23, 1967, of Charles E. Dryden, Professor in the Department of Chemical Engineering.

Dr. Dryden was born in Hagerstown, Maryland, on October 15, 1917. He received his B. Ch. E. degree from Drexel Institute of Technology in 1939, his M.Sc. degree from Princeton University in 1942, and his Ph.D. degree from The Ohio State University in 1951. After he received his degree from Princeton, he worked as a chemical engineer at the Silmo Corporation, M. W. Kellogg Co., Nopco Chemical Corporation, General Electric Nuclear Division, E. I. DuPont deNemours, and Battelle Memorial Institute.

Dr. Dryden had a very colorful career as a chemical engineer in industry and as a teacher. He joined the faculty at The Ohio State University in the Department of Chemical Engineering in 1955.

Dr. Dryden was a member of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers, American Society of Engineering Education - Nuclear Division, and American Chemical Society. He served on many important national committees of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers.

The Distinguished Alumni Award was presented to Dr. Dryden by Drexel Institute at their 75th Anniversary. He was elected to all the honorary societies involving chemical engineering and chemistry. He was chosen to give the A. S. Mudlair Lectures at the University of Madras, India. In competition with over 100 engineers from the State of Ohio, he received the highest grade for chemical engineering in the professional engineer's examination in 1950.

Dr. Dryden was chosen to head the chemical engineering department at the Indian Institute of Technology, Kanpur, India. This appointment was in connection with the Kanpur Indo-American program which is a group effort of a consortium of nine universities. The Ohio State University is one of the nine. During his stay in India he authored the book, <u>Outline of Chemical Technology</u>, in 1964. This book was revised and finally published in hard back cover form. The book was adopted by many schools in India and it is now in its second printing. The royalties from this book were donated to the University for undergraduate scholarships and a design award which is awarded to the two best design solutions for students in the fifth year. The award is now known as the "Dr. Dryden Design Award."

IX. RESOLUTION IN MEMORIAM (continued)

A. Charles E. Dryden (continued)

Dr. Dryden was one of the country's outstanding engineers and as a teacher he did a magnanimous job. He enjoyed a close personal relationship with all of his students and left an imprint on all of them. He has over fifty publications including four books. He has been granted four patents.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

A. Report from the President

President Fawcett presented the following statement relating to the labor relations problem with the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, Local 138:

As members of the Board know, The American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, Local 138, struck the University on Thursday morning, October 5, 1967. The strike ended on Monday, October 9, 1967.

Prior to, during and following the strike the University received full and complete support from the Office of the Attorney General, through its Special Legal Counsel, Mr. Huntington Carlile, who sat with representatives of the University and representatives of the Union in a long series of discussions that were designed to avert the kind of disruption the University experienced during the period indicated above.

In a final effort to avert the strike, the University invited the Union on September 28, to discuss further those matters which appeared to be critical in the minds of Union leadership which was representing about 1,600 or 1,700 University employees out of 6,760 classified and equivalent people.

While the Union first declined our invitation, it was agreed later that the two groups would convene on Wednesday, October 4, with the understanding that our representatives would be accompanied by Vice Presidents Corbally and Carson, who would be available to explain in depth University budgeting procedures and such other matters as might lead to resolution of those problems that the Union felt were unresolved. On the morning of October 4, the University representatives proceeded in good faith to explain University budgeting procedures and expressed a willingness to

continue these discussions as long as needed. The meeting recessed until 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, during which period University representatives put together the substance of a proposal that it intended to develop in the interest of all University employees. When the group reconvened in the afternoon. Union representatives indicated that the settlement achieved at Ohio University represented their minimum demands and that these demands were not subject to any further modification. Briefly stated, these demands consisted of a onestep salary increase, effective January 1, 1968, free parking, free meals for food service employees, Blue Cross-Blue Shield benefits effective January 1, 1968, and final and binding arbitration as a part of a grievance procedure. If the University had granted this request, the cost for classified and equivalent employees on the one-step basis would have been approximately \$3.9 million, an amount of money not available within the context of this institution's resources during the 1967-68 fiscal year.

University representatives reported that they had returned to the discussion table with a proposal that was permissible within the limits of the Attorney General's Opinion 67-087 and limited available resources.

Union representatives listened to the University proposal which included group life insurance, accidental death and dismemberment and major medical insurance, a revision in the University's grievance procedures to accommodate some of the requests made by the Union but which were within the context of the meaning of the Attorney General's Opinion and an opportunity to conduct a wage and salary study that could lead to the elimination of certain inequities and that could be funded within the limits of available resources.

The Union representatives refused to discuss our proposal, left the room and announced that the strike would begin at 12:01 A.M. on October 5 as planned.

On the morning of October 5, 1967, the University, upon the advice of legal counsel, proceeded to take such legal steps as necessary and did indeed get a mandatory injunction directing the Union to terminate the strike and ordering the employees to return to work. The Union decided to defy the Court Order and appealed the decision to the Franklin County Court of Appeals whereupon the Attorney General's Office of Ohio secured a Writ of Prohibition on Saturday, October 7, and plans were made to press in the Common Pleas Court contempt charges at 1:30 P. M. on Monday, October 9.

For reasons that are too long to enumerate here, the University decided on Saturday, October 7, to explore the possibilities of having its representatives meet again with the representatives of the Union to examine in greater depth the nature of the proposal that University representatives had hoped could be discussed on Wednesday, October 4, when the Union broke off the discussions. The invitation was accepted and University representatives met again with Union representatives on Sunday evening, October 8, out of which discussions evolved the termination of the strike.

Let me summarize the discussions:

The University will amend the University grievance procedure that applies to all employees so that union employees and all employees can have representation at all levels. Arbitration of an advisory nature is to be a fifth step in the six-step procedure for resolving grievances, but arbitration is not binding nor can a union speak for anyone other than the members of its organization. Additionally, the University will, under reasonable rules and limitations for the number of people and the hours spent, pay for the time spent in processing and handling grievances.

There is to be no change in fees charged for parking, but the University will discuss with the Union and other groups on this campus, as it always does, any proposed increase in parking fees.

In accordance with HB 470 that has been effective since September 15, 1967, the University is pledged to extend its group life insurance, accidental death and dismemberment insurance and major medical insurance to all employees along the same lines as it has provided for its professional staff in the past. This change should be effective at the earliest possible date and will be funded this year through a reduction in University wide equipment allocations.

Since major medical insurance does not always provide adequate protection for employees in the lowest salary and wage classifications, the University will provide Blue Cross and Blue Shield for all employees of the University, including members of the Union, if the rate of pay of the employee is less than \$5,000 per year. This change will be effective July 1, 1968, when resources are available to cover it.

The nominal charge for meals to food service employees who have been getting this concession has been set at 15¢ per meal.

A. Report from the President (continued)

The University, representing all employees, and the Union, representing its members, will conduct scientific internal and external job evaluation wage and salary studies to determine such inequities as may exist for individuals and groups. The University will request the State Compensation Board to approve, effective January 1, 1968, such adjustments as may need to be made and can be made within available University resources and within the confines of Ohio law.

The checkoff of Union dues will continue in accordance with existing procedures.

The above points represented substantially the University's position prior to the strike, and have application to all employees.

I want to commend the students for the calmness they maintained during the course of the strike and for the services they rendered. I want, particularly, to commend all of those employees who loyally stood with the University during this interruption of work and kept this institution in operation in support of the educational programs that we are providing for our students.

Finally, I would commend, particularly, Mr. Robert E. Walsh, Director of Employee Relations, Vice Presidents Corbally and Carson and Mr. Huntington Carlile, who represented the University so effectively in resolving this dispute.

Trustee James W. Shocknessy commented as follows regarding the above report by President Fawcett:

It should be emphasized that this Board which serves as the governing board of this University has not recognized any group as an exclusive bargaining agent for the employees of The Ohio State University. In the President's remarks he spoke of action taken by the University. It should be understood that the President was speaking for himself and other officers of the University and that whatever action those officers have taken was in good faith and has been generally well received. I want it understood that this Board of Trustees has not recognized any exclusive bargaining agency. The law applicable to employment and to organizations of employees has been illuminated by the Attorney General of Ohio in an opinion which the President cited in his statement. This Board does not understand and would not understand that any person employed by the University would be required to belong to any organization.

X. REPORTS (continued)

A. Report from the President (continued)

Further, I want it understood that as a member of this Board I do not construe anything that has taken place to mean that any person or organization speaks for all of the employees of the University. The group referred to in the President's report speaks only for those employees which it actually represents. The University, as the President used the term, has not bargained for the Board of Trustees. This Board was not provided with a copy of the so-called "Joint Statement" that was issued under the name of Ohio State University News and Information Service on October 9, 1967. I would not want our acceptance of the President's report to indicate our approval of the so-called "Joint Statement" which this Board did not see before it was issued.

The first eight Regents' Professors named above are renewals from 1966-67. Pursuant to the above action, The Ohio State University will receive a supplemental appropriation of State funds in the amount of \$250,000.00 to support the above Regents' Professorships.

(2) Approved a special purpose appropriation to The Ohio State University in the amount of \$1,400,000.00 for the fiscal year 1967-68 for research and public service whereby The Ohio State University will support the following activities in the amount indicated and will provide appropriate arrangements for the participation of other state universities in these activities:

C. Highlights of University Activities

Among the highlights of University activities, a copy of which is placed on file with the records of the University, President Fawcett advised the Board of Trustees:

 That as of October 11, 1967, 42,893 students have paid fees for the Autumn Quarter--an increase of 1,686 over the 41,207 final enrollment for the Autumn Quarter, 1966. A breakdown of the total enrollment is as follows:

2. That the University ranked 10th among all of the nation's universities and third among Big Ten institutions in the amount of federal support received during the 1966 fiscal year.

According to a new National Science Foundation report compiled for the Federal Council for Science and Technology's Committee on Academic Science and Engineering, Ohio State received \$39,025,000 from various federal agencies during 1966.

Ohio State moved to the 10th place ranking from a position of 19th nationally which it held in each of the fiscal years, 1963 through 1965.

D. Introduction of the Director of Alumni Affairs

President Fawcett introduced Dr. Richard M. Mall, the newly appointed Director of Alumni Affairs for The Ohio State University Association. Dr. Mall expressed his appreciation for the opportunity to meet the Board of Trustees and to let them know that there is a new regime in the Alumni Association--one that is committed to carrying on programs which are in the best interests of the University. He indicated that the Alumni Association wanted to have a good working relationship--one that is thoroughly integrated with the total effort of the University. He stated further that although the Association is a separate and autonomous group, which autonomy it will preserve, it is our commitment to work as closely as we can with the administration and the Board of Trustees of the University. We of the Alumni Association invite you to ask questions of us directly or through any channels and to give us the opportunity from time to time to ask questions of you.

The Vice Chairman, Mr. Bricker, expressed appreciation to Dr. Mall for his gracious comments and extended to him best wishes on behalf of the Board of Trustees.

E. Reports from the Finance and Investment Committee

1. Insurance Program for Faculty, Staff, and All Regular Employees

Mr. Mervin B. France, Chairman of the Finance and Investment Committee, presented on behalf of the Committee the following resolutions amending the insurance program for the Faculty, Staff, and All Regular Employees of The Ohio State University and moved that they be adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, that the action taken by the Board on September 14, 1967 regarding the insurance program for faculty, staff and all regular employees be amended, effective for all purposes as of November 1, 1967, to include the following changes:

 - Insurance Program for Faculty, Staff, and All Regular Employees (continued)

Classified and Hourly Employees

(a) Group Life Insurance Program - The amounts of life insursurance for active regular classified and hourly employees be increased, provided the employee is on the effective date actively at work, otherwise on the date of his return to active work, to 2-1/2 times regular annual compensation to the nearest dollar, or \$7,500, whichever is greater. The amount of life insurance of an insured active classified or hourly employee who has attained age 55 shall be reduced in accordance with the following formula, except in no event shall the insurance of an insured active person be reduced because of age by an amount greater than \$13,500.

The reduction in the amount of life insurance (to the nearest dollar) equals 3% times the number of September 30ths coincident with or since the active employee's 55th birthday times the amount of insurance which would be effective under the plan without the required reduction. The initial reduction in amount of insurance shall be effective at midnight on the September 30th coincident with or next following the attainment of age 55 and the amount of insurance will be further reduced at midnight on each September 30th thereafter.

"Annual Compensation" shall be determined once each year as of October 1 and shall mean the employee's regular hourly wage rate or salary on such October 1, multiplied by the number of hours worked by the employee during the twelve months preceding such October 1, not in any case to exceed 2080 hours. For employees hired on or after October 1 each year or for employees with less than twelve full months of service as of October 1 of each year, "Annual Compensation" shall be determined by multiplying said employee's average weekly wage during the partial year worked, as determined by the University, times 52 weeks.

(b) Accidental Death and Dismemberment Insurance - The amount of accidental death and dismemberment insurance to be equal to the amount of life insurance by increasing the accidental death and dismemberment schedule for active regular classified and hourly employees to 2-1/2 times annual compensation. The new schedule would be identical to the new life schedule including reductions after age 55.

 - 1. <u>Insurance Program for Faculty, Staff, and All Regular Employees</u> (continued)
 - (c) <u>Contributions</u> The Ohio State University shall provide and pay the full cost of the group life insurance, accidental death and dismemberment insurance and major medical insurance under the University's group insurance program as amended for all active regular classified and hourly employees provided the employee is, on November 1, 1967, actively at work, otherwise on the date of his return to active work.

With respect to the major medical insurance, the University shall pay the cost of such insurance for the active employee and also the cost of said major medical benefits for the eligible dependents of such active employee.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University that the action of the Board on September 14, 1967 regarding the issuance of separate group insurance contracts by the carrier to insure classified and hourly employees and the amending of the in-force group insurance contracts covering various classifications of University employees to exclude classified and hourly employees from coverage thereunder be hereby amended to be effective November 1, 1967.

 $\mbox{Mr.}$ William Safford seconded the motion that the above resolutions be adopted.

Before voting, Mr. Shocknessy stated that "It should be understood that the resolutions which have been recommended by the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees of which I am a member are presented on behalf of this Board pursuant to State law (H. B. 470) which law became effective September 15, 1967, and that the action proposed in the resolutions could not have been taken by this Board at any previous regular meeting and further the adoption of these resolutions is not in any way related to recent events."

Upon a roll call, the above resolutions amending the insurance program for faculty, staff, and all regular employees were adopted by a unanimous affirmative vote.

2. Report on the University's Investment Portfolio

The report on the University's Investment Portfolio dated September 30, 1967, as submitted to the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees, was received and ordered to be filed with the official records of the Board.

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Thereupon the Board adjourned to meet Thursday, November 9, 1967, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, at 10:30 a.m.

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, November 9, 1967, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, and a unanimous vote of the Board of Trustees, Dr. Bertram D. Thomas was designated to serve as Acting Chairman of the Board of Trustees during the disability of the Chairman, Mr. Stanley C. Allyn, and the Vice Chairman, Mr. John W. Bricker; and Dr. Thomas was authorized to take such action as is necessary with respect to the minutes of the last meeting of said Board.

In the interest of clarification and pursuant to the adoption of the resolution by the Board of Trustees that the new academic units--the Colleges of the Arts and Sciences and the College of Administrative Science--be created effective January 1, 1968, the minutes of the October 11, 1967 meeting were corrected to record that the now existing College of Arts and Sciences and the College of Commerce and Administration be dissolved, effective January 1, 1968.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Amendments to Rules for the University Faculty

The Faculty Council on October 3, 1967, upon the recommendation of the Rules Committee of the Council approved certain amendments to the Rules for the University Faculty which would bring said Rules into conformity with previous actions taken by the Faculty Council and the Board of Trustees. The amendments referred to above may be summarized as follows:

- Amendments to Rules pertaining to titles of principal administrators in the Office of Student Relations necessary to accommodate the changes in titles previously approved by the Board of Trustees for those persons appointed to succeed Dean of Men, Mylin H. Ross, and Dean of Women, Christine Y. Conaway. The Rules for the University Faculty affected by these changes are as follows: Rules 11.1106, 29.2709, 41.15, 45.03, 53.0701, and 53.0703. Rules 11.1301 and 11.1303 have been deleted.
- Amendments to various Rules which provide for graduate student representation on certain University councils and committees. The <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u> affected by these changes are as follows: Rules 27.2701, 29.01, 29.2705, 29.2721, 53.0705 (a new rule), and 54.05.
- Amendments to Rules pertaining to the administration of the Mershon Center for Education in National Security necessary to conform with the action of the Board of Trustees creating the position of Provost. The <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u> affected by these changes are as follows: 13.11 and 29.2719.

A. Amendments to Rules for the University Faculty (continued)

- 4. Amendments to Rules pertaining to the organization and membership of the Council on Research. These amendments include the change in name from "Council on Research" to the "Research Council." The Rules for the University Faculty affected by these changes are as follows: 13.09 and 29.2707.
- 5. Amendments to Rules pertaining to the distribution of membership on the Faculty Council which amendments will provide for more equitable apportionment of the academic disciplines and accommodate the academic reorganization of the University as adopted by the Board of Trustees at the meeting on October 11, 1967. The Rules for the University Faculty affected by these changes are as follows: 29.01, 29.03, and 29, 2713. Rules 29, 05 and 29, 07 have been deleted.

President Fawcett recommended that the above-referred-to amendments to the Rules for the University Faculty be adopted by the Board of Trustees, and that the Secretary of the Board be directed to correct and reprint the Rules for the University Faculty incorporating the specific changes as approved by the Faculty Council and included in these minutes as Appendix II, page 337.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous voice vote.

B. Proposal for the Establishment of New Undergraduate and Graduate
Degree Programs in Computer and Information Science Which Lead
to the Degrees-Bachelor of Science in Computer and Information
Science, Master of Science, and Doctor of Philosophy

The Faculty Council on October 10, 1967, upon the recommendation of the Council on Academic Affairs, approved for transmittal to the Board of Trustees and the Board of Regents the recommendation that new programs in the area of computer and information science be authorized as follows:

- Undergraduate program leading to the degree, Bachelor of Science in Computer and Information Science; and
- 2. Graduate programs leading to the degrees, Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy.

The Dean of the College of Engineering, with the concurrence of the Vice President for Academic Affairs and the Council on Academic Affairs, has created an administrative unit designated as the Division of Computer and Information Science within the College of Engineering. This Division has administrative and technical autonomy similar to that of the Departments within the College.

B. Proposal for the Establishment of New Undergraduate and Graduate

Degree Programs in Computer and Information Science Which Lead
to the Degrees--Bachelor of Science in Computer and Information
Science, Master of Science, and Doctor of Philosophy (continued)

Computer and information science deals, on the one hand, with the body of knowledge concerned with the quantitative relationships, concepts, theory, and methods common to the processing and utilization of information in different fields, and on the other hand, with theory and operations of the automatic equipment and systems used to process such information. Common properties of information are induced logically by the study, in part, of specific areas of science and technology which have a concern with the handling of information. Information is defined as data of value in decision making.

This program is designed to give the student a basic background in mathematics; a practical and theoretical knowledge of computer and information science; and a broad familiarity with a number of different areas which contribute to computer and information science.

Admission to the graduate program includes a Bachelor's Degree in Computer and Information Science or another discipline contributing to this field, a good background in mathematics, and computer programming.

The Master's program includes three options designed to (1) provide a broad foundation for continued graduate work to the Ph.D., (2) provide a sufficient background for a student to enter or continue professional practice in information systems, or (3) provide adequate preparation for students specializing in computer systems.

For entrance into the program leading to the degree, Doctor of Philosophy, a student must hold a Master's Degree in Computer and Information Science or its equivalent, and must have demonstrated outstanding scholastic ability in earlier graduate work. The requirements leading to the degree, Doctor of Philosophy, are flexible and will be tailored to the particular background and interests of the individual student.

President Fawcett recommended that the above proposal to establish new under graduate and graduate programs in computer and information science leading to the degrees--Bachelor of Science in Computer and Information Science, Master of Science, and Doctor of Philosophy be approved by the Board of Trustees, and pursuant to Section 3333.04 of the Revised Code of Ohio, that the proposal for the new programs and degrees be forwarded to the Board of Regents; and further, subject to the approval of the Board of Regents, that this action become effective Winter Quarter, 1968.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendations by unanimous voice vote.

C. Proposal for Revised Curriculum Leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Architecture

The Faculty Council on October 10, 1967, upon the recommendation of the Council on Academic Affairs, approved for transmittal to the Board of Trustees the recommendation that a revised curriculum leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Architecture be adopted, effective Summer Quarter, 1968.

The proposal requested that the present five-year program in the School of Architecture which leads to the degree, Bachelor of Architecture, be replaced with a four-year program leading to the degree, Bachelor of Science in Architecture.

For more than 30 years, the five-year Bachelor of Architecture degree has been the only degree recognized nationally for accreditation and licensure in the field of architecture. However, as a result of intensive study and major changes in the field by professional architectural groups, a revised pattern of emphasis and reorganization of collegiate education in architecture has been recommended. The new pattern calls for the creation of a four-year program leading to the degree, Bachelor of Science in Architecture, followed by a one-year organized internship and a two-year master's program leading to the degree, Master of Architecture. The master's degree will then become the first professional degree recognized for accreditation and licensure by the profession.

The present program and degree will be phased out by the end of 1971-72, and in the interim, qualified students will be given the choice of working for either the Bachelor of Architecture or the Bachelor of Science in Architecture.

President Fawcett recommended that the above proposal for revising the curriculum in the School of Architecture be approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

D. Naming of Buildings

Upon the proposal of Dean Harold A. Bolz, College of Engineering, and with the concurrence of the President's Cabinet, President Fawcett recommended that the building now under construction at 2015 Neil Avenue be officially named "Electronics Laboratory," and that the building now under construction at 1971 Neil Avenue be officially named "Systems Engineering Building."

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

A. Allied Medical Sciences School - Employment of Architects

President Fawcett recommended that the architectural firm of Holroyd and Myers be employed to provide preliminary drawings and such other data as may be required to accompany the University's application for Federal funds. President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of William Eugene Barnhart, Clinical Instructor in the Department of Medicine; Dana Wesley Cox, Clinical Associate Professor in the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology; Huston Fenn Fulton, Associate Professor in the Department of Radiology; Sidney M. Kaplan, Professor in the School of Art; and Clayton Sydney Smith, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Physiological Chemistry. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

A. William Eugene Burkhart

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on July 14, 1967, of William Eugene Burkhart, Clinical Instructor in the Department of Medicine.

William Eugene Burkhart was born in Mechanicsburg, Pennsylvania, on January 21, 1921. He was graduated from Otterbein College in 1943 with a Bachelor of Science degree, and in 1945, he received his Doctor of Medicine degree from The Ohio State University College of Medicine. Following internship at the Cleveland City Hospital, he served two years in the Medical Corps of the U. S. Army and was stationed at Ft. Custis Administration Hospital in Battle Creek, Michigan. He returned to Columbus for two years of residency in internal medicine at The Ohio State University Hospital followed by one year of residency in psychiatry at the New York Hospital and Veterans Administration in New York City. In 1951, he returned to Columbus to enter private practice and joined the faculty of The Ohio State University as a Clinical Instructor in the Department of Medicine.

Dr. Burkhart was Chairman of the Hospital Utilization Committee, a member of the active staff at Mt. Carmel Hospital, and on the courtesy staff of Riverside Methodist Hospital and University Hospital. He was interested in the specialty of gastroenterology as well as psychiatry. He was a member of the Division of Gastroenterology of the Department of Medicine at The Ohio State University. In 1956, he was certified by the American Board of Internal Medicine, and in 1963, he was elected to Fellowship in the American College of Physicians. He was a member of the Columbus, the Ohio, and the American Societies of Internal Medicine; the Columbus Academy of Medicine; the Ohio State Medical Association; and the American Medical Association.

On behalf of the members of the Faculty of the College of Medicine and his colleagues throughout the University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. B. Dana Wesley Cox

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on May 30, 1967, of Dana Wesley Cox, Clinical Associate Professor in the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology.

Dana Wesley Cox was born May 3, 1898. Doctor Cox received his early education in the public schools of Newcastle, Pennsylvania. During World War I, he served as an enlisted man in the United States Army from October until December, 1918, when the Armistice terminated hostilities. The following year, he matriculated at Muskingum College, New Concord, Ohio, where he earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1923, and his Doctor of Medicine degree from Western Reserve University Medical School in 1928.

Doctor Cox served an internship from 1929 to 1930 in Epworth Hospital, South Bend, Indiana. Gradually, he had developed a keen interest in obstetrics, and although he desired to take postgraduate training, Doctor Cox commenced general practice in Poland, Ohio, in 1930. In 1934, he entered the New York Lying-in-Hospital as an intern continuing in obstetrics and gynecology as assistant resident, 1935-1936. His training was extended as he became resident and subsequently chief resident in obstetrics and gynecology in Margaret Hague Maternity Hospital, Jersey City, New Jersey, 1936-1937, under the eminent, late, Doctor Samuel A. Cosgrove. In 1939, the American Board of Obstetrics and Gynecology certified him as a diplomate.

Succeeding Doctor Andrews Rodgers, Doctor Cox served as Acting Chairman, Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology, College of Medicine, The Ohio State University, from 1943 to 1945. Upon the appointment of Doctor Allen Barnes to the Chairmanship, Doctor Cox continued to serve on the faculty as Clinical Associate Professor.

Besides his position on the faculty at The Ohio State University, he was also a member of the active medical staffs of Grant, St. Ann's, and Mt. Carmel Hospitals, where he served faithfully in both a teaching and clinical capacity. Among many facets in his talents for teaching, Doctor Cox was a strong proponent of strict hygiene for every prenatal patient, advocating especially the improvement of prenatal care, to include dental hygiene.

Doctor Cox was dedicated in his services to several professional affiliations. He was a founding member (1944) and past president of the Columbus Obstetric-Gynecologic Society. From time to time, on various committees he served his County Medical Society; he also belonged to the Ohio State Medical Association and the American Medical Association. He was active for many years in The Planned Parenthood Association, The Childhood League, and others.

C. Huston Fenn Fulton

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on May 31, 1967, of Huston Fenn Fulton, Associate Professor in the Department of Radiology.

Huston Fenn Fulton was born November 7, 1899, in Belle Center, Ohio. Dr. Fulton attended Oberlin College and received his A. B. and M. D. degrees from The Ohio State University in 1922 and 1925, respectively.

Following internship, he entered practice in Columbus with Dr. Charles J. Shepard in the specialty of dermatology. Dr. Shepard at that time was also in charge of the Radiology Department of Mt. Carmel Hospital, and it was there that Dr. Fulton found his true interest in the field of medicine. He then became a resident in radiology at Massachusetts General Hospital under Dr. George Holmes. He returned to Columbus to become the radiologist for Mt. Carmel Hospital and was appointed by Dr. Hugh Means as radiologist for St. Francis Hospital, then a teaching facility for The Ohio State University. Dr. Fulton was appointed to the faculty of the College of Medicine in 1927; and during his many teaching years, he was a source of assistance and inspiration to countless medical students and house officers.

As an early diplomate of the American Board of Radiology in Columbus, he represented and participated actively in the transition period of radiology in its present day academic form. Dr. Fulton was the author of several papers in the field of diagnostic radiology. He served as medical advisor (radiology) to the Ohio State Director of Selective Service during World War II and until 1955, continued in that capacity. Fellowship in the American College of Radiology was conferred upon him in 1948.

Dr. Fulton was active in both professional and social organizations. He was a founder and charter member of the Ohio State Radiological Society and past president of the Columbus Club. He was a member of numerous national medical organizations, such as the American Roentgen Ray Society, Radiological Society of North America, and the Inter-American College of Radiology. He was also a member of the Local Medical Forum, Medical Review Club, Rotary Club, and the Masonic Order.

Dr. Fulton was always willing to lend a helping hand to friends and colleagues and was widely known for his consideration for patients and colleagues and for his integrity in his association with hospital administrators and medical-staff members. His many friends feel a deep loss and the specialty of

radiology has lost an inspirational leader. Although golf and gardening were his hobbies, his main non-medical interest was in his family and friends. He will be long remembered for the fine contributions he made to medicine and will be sadiy missed by family and colleagues.

D. Sidney M. Kaplan

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on October 17, 1967, of Sidney M. Kaplan, Professor in the School of Art.

Professor Kaplan was born in New York City, on October 9, 1913. He was graduated with the A.B. degree from Columbia College in 1934, the M.A. degree from Mills College in 1939, and the Ph. D. degree from Harvard University in 1954. Dr. Kaplan was associated with the Fogg Museum's Asiatic Research Bureau between 1947 and 1948. He served as an Instructor in Oriental Art History at the University of Michigan (1948-49) and was an Assistant Professor in Oriental Art History and Director of the Art Gallery at Mills College (1949-51). He joined the faculty of The Ohio State University as a Lecturer in 1954, was made Assistant Professor in 1955, Associate Professor in 1957, and Professor in 1961. Professor Kaplan's professional concerns ranged over a broad field. This is reflected in the variety of courses he taught: the Art of China and Japan, the Art of India, Survey of Far Eastern Art, Primitive and Prehistoric Art, Introduction to Art, Introduction to Research Methods, and Museum Problems and Practice. He served on the committee and faculty of the University's summer programs on the Far East and Africa. In addition, he served as a consultant in the orientation program for the training of Peace Corps volunteers. As a member of the faculty, Professor Kaplan gave of himself freely. He enjoyed his contacts with students at all levels. He had an amazing ability to see the most complicated and sophisticated problems with a great deal of clarity and insight.

Dr. Kaplan was the recipient of numerous honors: the University of California's Chinese Cultural Scholarship in 1945 and a similar scholarship from Harvard University in 1946. Professor Kaplan received a faculty research grant from the University of Michigan in 1947-48 and a Ford Foundation Grant for travel and research in India, Pakistan, and Ceylon in 1956-57.

E. Clayton Sydney Smith

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on July 10, 1967, of Clayton Sydney Smith, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Physiological Chemistry.

Dr. Smith was born April 23, 1887, at Newark, New Jersey. He received his B.Sc. and M.Sc. degrees from Rutgers in 1909 and 1912, respectively. At Rutgers he was awarded the Suydam prize in Natural Science. During his postgraduate study at Columbia, he was elected to membership in Sigma Xi and to Phi Lambda Upsilon (honorary chemical fraternity). He was awarded the Ph.D. degree in biochemistry in 1913.

From 1914-18, Dr. Smith was Associate in Physiological Chemistry in the College of Medicine, University of Illinois, and from 1918-20, Associate in Physiology at Northwestern University where he received his M. D. degree in 1920. He was a member of Nu Sigma Nu (social fraternity) at Northwestern University. He came to Ohio State as Assistant Professor of Physiological Chemistry and Pharmacology in 1920 and was made Professor and Chairman of the Department in 1921. He continued in this position until retirement in 1957 when he was made Professor Emeritus.

Although Dr. Smith had no formal military service, he conducted drug assays and toxicological investigations for the U. S. Army Depot at Chicago during World War I. During this period, he taught clinical chemistry to a group of naval officers from the Great Lakes Training Station. Throughout his career he has been interested in the application of science in the detection of crime and was one of the charter members of the Society for the Scientific Detection of Crime which was founded in Columbus during World War II. He was president of this society in 1944.

During his early years at Ohio State, Dr. Smith practiced medicine part time in Grandview Heights. He was a member of the Board of Health of Grandview from 1932 to 1942, and its president from 1940 to 1942. He was a member of Optimist International, University Lodge and several other Masonic bodies, and the First Congregational Church.

Dr. Smith belonged to several scientific societies including the American Chemical Society, and the Columbus Academy of Medicine. He was a Fellow of the American Institute of Chemists and of the American Academy of Forensic Sciences. He was a member of Alpha Omega Alpha at Ohio State. In 1959, he was given the Award of Merit, the first occasion on which this award was made by the College of Medicine.

Dr. Smith's principal activities during his 37 years of service at Ohio State were teaching courses in Physiological Chemistry and Pharmacology to first and second year medical students, organizing and teaching a course in toxicology, advising M. Sc. and Ph. D. graduate students, and administering the affairs of the Department. He served on numerous college and university committees during his long service under four deans, two acting deans, and four presidents. He was author of some twenty scientific papers on a broad range of subjects. For many years, he conducted a toxicology laboratory in Hamilton Hall in cooperation with the Department of Pathology and the County Coroner.

Dr. Smith is a familiar and fondly remembered personage to many of his colleagues and former students. He has made many contributions to medical education and to his Department in the College of Medicine.

On behalf of the members of the Faculty of the College of Medicine and his colleagues throughout the University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. STATEMENT OF POLICY FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY ENDOWMENT PORTFOLIO

Background Information:

Col. Ralph D. Mershon left \$7,438,142 to the University on September 24, 1953. In his bequest he directed the Trustees as follows:

That the whole of the said property and estate so given, devised and bequeathed to The Ohio State University, with all increases and appreciation in the principal thereof, shall be forever kept intact as a permanent fund under the name of The Ralph D. Mershon Fund, and the income only thereof expended, and that the principal of said fund, together with all increases and appreciation thereof, be kept invested in well selected and well diversified common stocks of going concerns, or their equivalent, and not in preferred stocks or bonds. By the equivalent of common stocks I mean preferred stocks, bonds or other similar securities which have the element of safety supposed to inhere in fixed securities and also shall, through conversion privileges, participation privileges, or other similar devices, enjoy equal rank with the common stock of the enterprise to which they pertain as to appreciation in value of the property of the corporation and in the matter of earnings therefrom and upon the further condition, nevertheless, that not less than onehalf of the income of said fund shall be used in such manner as in the judgment and discretion of said The Ohio State University shall best promote, encourage and carry on civilian military education and training in the United States and its territories.

Mershon Funds must be invested in accord with the above instruction. Other donated funds may be invested in bonds, preferred stocks, or common stocks as may be prudent, at a given time.

Comparative Data:

For the fiscal year ended June 30, 1967, endowment earnings from all sources, including the State Treasurer irreducible debt funds, accounted for 1% of the University's operating budget. This is far too little for a University of The Ohio State University's size and complexity. The endowment funds can be increased by new gifts and appreciation of assets. Also when circumstances permit, reinvestment of earnings will increase the endowment.

Regardless of method, endowment funds must be markedly increased.

It should be noted that the sum of the endowments of the first two far exceeds the sum of the endowments of the other eight.

The endowment funds of The Ohio State University, while largely designated, do include as the largest item the Mershon Fund, half of the earnings of which are for "civilian military training" and half to be used at the discretion of the Board of Trustees.

Purpose:

The purpose of The Ohio State University Endowment Portfolio is to provide funds for those things which cannot be supported by other University resources. The purpose is not to provide income to be expended in lieu of taxes and student fees, but rather an income additional to taxes and student fees in the University's pursuit of excellence.

Policy:

The policy under which The Ohio State University Endowment Funds are to be invested is simply stated:

The fund shall be prudently invested in equities traded on the New York Stock Exchange, or the American Stock Exchange, except for Banks and Insurance Companies, which shall be invested in wherever the equity chosen has reasonable volume of trading and the proposed investment has the unanimous support of the Finance and Investment Committee.

The policy for selecting equities as candidates for investment is to attempt to choose those situations capable of returning reasonable income with fine growth possibilities.

Whenever market conditions make it appear wise to do so, endowment funds may be invested in short-term governments and/or agencies wherein the investment maximizes the interest return.

The fund shall be kept fully invested at all times.

The fund is a long-term investment fund, and not a rapid turnover or trading type of endeavor.

The income from the Mershon bequest shall be held in interest-bearing securities approved by the Board of Trustees' Finance and Investment Committee pending its use for purposes as authorized by the Board of Trustees.

Modus operandi:

Recommendations for trading shall be brought to the attention of the Finance and Investment Committee and such trading shall take place only after a majority vote of said committee approves such action.

Wherever it seems wise to do so between meetings, the Vice President for Business and Finance shall poll the committee by telephone and report the result at the next meeting of the committee for ratification. Trading may proceed on the basis of the telephone vote.

B. Reports from the President

Several items of interest and pleasure were reported to the Board for information and the record. They were as follows:

1. Accreditation of University Hospitals

The Board of Commissioners of the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals in a communication dated October 20, 1967, has advised that The Ohio State University Hospitals are "accredited for a period of three years or until a subsequent survey is conducted." This certificate of accreditation is a result of the evaluation of the hospital survey conducted on September 12, 13, and 14, 1967. It should be noted that the above-referred-to communication included the following statement of commendation:

1. Accreditation of University Hospitals (continued)

The dean and the staff are to be congratulated on their successful integration of all patients into the organized teaching and patient-care program, and on evidences of superb quality control as observed specifically in the clinical laboratories, the pharmacy and central supply.

2. Student Fee Increases Approved by the Ohio Board of Regents

The increases of student fees adopted on September 14, 1967, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University to become effective Winter Quarter, 1968, were approved by the Board of Regents at its regular meeting on October 20, 1967, pursuant to Senate Bill 350.

3. Resolutions from Wright State University

The Board of Trustees of Wright State University at its initial meeting on October 5, 1967, requested that the following resolutions be forwarded to the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University:

Resolution Authorizing Continued Administrative Services

WHEREAS: the Board of Trustees and the Presidents and other officials of The Ohio State University and Miami University have been doing all things necessary to conduct the legal, fiscal, personnel and all other functions of Wright State Campus, and

WHEREAS: the Board of Trustees of Wright State University is now by certification of the Ohio Board of Regents to the Governor, and the filing of such certification by the Governor with the Secretary of State, authorized to exercise its powers, therefore be it

RESOLVED: that the Board of Trustees of Wright State University does hereby authorize the Board of Trustees and the Presidents and other officials of The Ohio State University and Miami University to continue the administrative services necessary to conduct the functions of Wright State University, formerly known as Wright State Campus, until the President or the Business Manager of Wright State University shall notify the Presidents of Ohio State University or Miami University from time to time that each administrative function is properly and legally in operation at Wright State University; furthermore be it

RESOLVED: that all employment contracts and other contracts entered into for the benefit of Wright State Campus by The Ohio State University and Miami University, be and hereby are ratified, confirmed and continued in full force and effect until replaced by contracts legally issued by Wright State University.

3. Resolutions from Wright State University (continued)

Resolution of Gratitude to The Ohio State University

WHEREAS, responsibility for the establishment of Wright State University as a state operated institution of higher education was placed in large measure in the hands of The Ohio State University and Miami University; and

WHEREAS, the establishment of Wright State University is now accomplished; and

WHEREAS, the realization of this goal was diligently and continuously pursued by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, which Board evidenced full cooperation and absolute good faith in the accomplishment of this fact; and

WHEREAS, the supply of expertise, knowledge, and practical experience which the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University made available through its President, staff, and faculty aided immeasurably in the formulation of this newest of State universities, particularly in the areas of the sciences, mathematics, psychology, and engineering; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that an initial act of this Board be to express its sincere gratitude to the Board of Trustees, President, staff, and faculty of The Ohio State University for its participation; and be it further

RESOLVED, that such gratitude is hereby expressed; that a duly authenticated copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University; and that this resolution be spread upon the minutes of this meeting.

4. Highlights of University Activities

President Fawcett reported to the Board on some of the significant activities of the University during recent weeks and activities to take place in the near future. Some references included in the Report, which is filed with the official records of the Secretary, were as follows:

- a. The official Autumn Quarter enrollment report lists a total of 38,834 students on the Columbus campus. Of these 6,271 are in the Graduate School and 3,281 in the professional colleges. Enrollment at the Branch campuses total 3,866 students. Ohio State's grand total enrollment is 42,700, an increase of 1,493, or 3.6 per cent, over last Autumn's figures.
- b. Representatives of The Ohio State University will serve as hosts and participate in the 81st annual convention of the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges to be held in Columbus, November 12-15, 1967.

 - 4. Highlights of University Activities (continued)
 - c. Ohio State's first multi-level, 600-car parking garage was opened on November 8. University officials have set up procedures for using it to ease the crowded parking conditions on the central campus.
 - d. The College of Pharmacy building was officially dedicated on October 17, 1967. The new building of five floors complete with greenhouse, was built at a cost of \$3.4 million and is located in the University's Medical Center.
 - e. The School of Journalism has enrolled the first 10 students in its new international journalism program, designed to train news specialists who can bridge the gap between foreign news developments and the American press. The President introduced Miss Christine Ann Jindra, a third-year student in the School of Journalism, who was present at the meeting to report for The Ohio State Lantern.

Amendments to Certain Rules for the University Faculty

as Approved by the Faculty Council on October 3, 1967

Adopted by Board of Trustees November 9, 1967 (See page 306)



Rules for the University Faculty

On October 3, 1967, the Faculty Council approved the following revision of Rules and changes as underscored in Rules 11.1106, 13.09, 13.11, 27.0701, 29.01, 29.03, 29.2705, 29.2707, 29.2709, 29.2713, 29.2719, 29.2721, 41.15, 45.03, 53.0701, 53.0703, 53.0705 (New), and 54.05. Rules 11.1301, 11.1303, 29.05, and 29.07 were deleted since they are no longer applicable.

11.1106. Executive Dean for Student Relations. *

Section 3. The principal administrative officials of the Office of Student Relations shall be those Associate Deans and Directors who are in charge of Student Housing, Student Organizations and Activities, Student Discipline, Student Health, Student Financial Aids, Athletics, Ohio Union Programs, Counseling, and Orientation and Testing.

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13.09. Research Institutes; Establishment and Administration. *

Research Institutes shall be established or abolished by the Board of Trustees upon recommendation of the <u>Research Council</u> and Faculty Council. Each Research Institute shall be administered by a Board having such membership and authority as determined by the <u>Research Council</u> (see Rule 29. 2707) and approved by the Faculty Council and the Board of Trustees.

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13.11. Director, Mershon Center for Education in National Security.*

Section 1. The Director, Mershon Center for Education in National Security, shall have the responsibility and authority for formulating and administering the program of the Center financed by the civilian-military portion of the Mershon Fund and other funds that are made available. He shall provide active leadership in developing and maintaining a program of education and research in national security which will support and be in harmony with the general educational and research aims of the University. In carrying out these duties, he shall consult with the Mershon Committee on Education in National Security (see Rule 29.2719).

Section 2. The Director, Mershon Center for Education in National Security, shall report to the President through the Vice President for Academic Affairs $\underline{\underline{\text{and}}}$ Provost.

Section 3. The Director shall, following consultation with the Committee, be responsible for recommending through the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost to the President and the Board of Trustees the annual budget for the Center.

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27.0701. Membership.

d. Representative from the Council of Graduate Students. A representative from the Council of Graduate Students shall sit with the Graduate Council as a member but without vote (see Rule 53.0705).

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Rules for the University Faculty (continued)

29.01. Membership.

There shall be a Faculty Council constituted as follows:

- a. Ex Officio Members. There shall be twenty-two ex officio members:
 The President; the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost;
 the Secretary of the University Faculty; the Dean of the Graduate School;
 the Dean for Undergraduate Programs in the Arts and Sciences; the Deans
 of the Colleges; and the Director of Libraries.
- b. Elected Members. The number of elected members shall be three times the number of ex officio members. Accordingly there shall be sixty-six members of the University faculty on Regular contract, distributed among and elected by each college, academic unit not assigned to a college, and branch campus with a resident faculty and its own faculty council. For the purposes of this section there are three academic units not so assigned:

 (1) the library, (2) the Departments of Physical Education, and (3) the Departments of Military, Naval, and Air Science. Each college, each such academic unit, and each such branch campus shall constitute an election district from which shall be elected the number of members as specified for each election by the Committee on Elections for the Faculty Council, and shall elect at least one member. No person is eligible to represent one college, academic unit, or branch campus while serving as representative of another.
- c. Alternate Members. Each member of the Faculty Council is expected to attend its meetings regularly but alternate representatives shall be designated for each election district in order to assure full attendance at meetings when regular representatives are justifiably absent.

When a regular member is off duty or unable to attend a meeting of the Faculty Council, he shall notify the Secretary of the Council in advance of the meeting, giving the name of the alternate who will represent him. The alternate so designated shall then have the general powers and privileges in the Faculty Council of the person whom he represents.

Alternates shall be designated as follows: (a) alternates for ex officio members--each ex officio member shall designate his alternate; (b) alternates for elected members--unsuccessful candidates for election shall constitute a panel of alternates in each election district, in the order of votes which they received in the election.

d. Representative from the Council of Graduate Students. A representative from the Council of Graduate Students shall sit with the Faculty Council as a member but without vote (see Rule 53.0705).

Rules for the University Faculty (continued)

29.03. Elections.

Section 1. Elections to the Faculty Council shall be administered and supervised by a committee of three chosen by the Council from its elected members and known as the Committee on Elections for the Faculty Council. The first terms of membership on this committee shall be one, two, and three years. Thereafter each member's term shall be three years. All decisions of this committee shall be subject to the approval of the Faculty Council.

Section 2. Elections shall be held in the Spring Quarter of each year for terms beginning in the following Autumn Quarter. Each member shall be elected for three years and shall for one year immediately thereafter be ineligible for election. Service to complete an unexpired term, and service as an alternate, do not affect eligibility.

Section 3. The Committee on Elections shall determine which election districts are entitled to more representatives than one in accordance with the following formula:

- a. <u>Determine how many University faculty members within the election district</u>
 <u>are on Regular contract and are based at least 75 percent on the Columbus campus;</u>
- b. Apportion the elected membership so that each election district is represented in that proportion which its members as described above bear to the total of such members in the University, but each election district shall have at least one representative.

Section 4. Representatives from branch campuses shall be elected in accordance with whatever procedures are in effect at such campuses. Other members shall be elected from nominees solicited from colleges and other academic units. The Committee on Elections shall make up a ballot consisting of names three times the number to be elected from the college or academic unit. Such names shall not be placed on the ballot until the person named has been given an opportunity to decline nomination, and priority in choice of names shall be accorded to the frequency of their appearance on the returns from solicitation of colleges and other academic units.

The Committee on Elections shall mail the ballots to University faculty members on Regular contract wherever located, and they shall be cast by mail. The Committee shall declare as representatives from the respective colleges or academic areas those persons receiving the largest number of votes.

Section 5. In the event of vacancy during the term of an elected member, the Faculty Council shall elect an interim successor from the same election district to serve until the next general election, when the vacancy shall be filled by election for the unexpired term.

29. 2705. The Library Council.

Section 1. The Library Council shall consist of six teaching members of the University Faculty; the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost; the Vice President for Research; the Dean of the Graduate School; the Director of Libraries; and a representative from the Council of Graduate Students (see Rule 53.0705). The President, on recommendation of the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost shall appoint the six faculty members for four-year terms, one or more to retire each year and to be ineligible for re-appointment during one year thereafter. The Chairman shall be elected from among the teaching faculty members of the Library Council and he shall report to the Faculty Council.

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29, 2707. Research Council.

Section 1. Membership. The Research Council shall consist of <u>eighteen</u> members chosen as follows:

- a. Appointed Members. Sixteen members of the Graduate Faculty, two from each of the eight graduate areas (as defined in Rule 27.0701), but not more than one from any department or school, shall be appointed by the President in consultation with the Vice President for Research and the Dean of the Graduate School. None of the appointees shall be executive officers of any college. Appointees shall have significant research experience, duties, and interests. These members shall be appointed to a three-year term, the appointments to be staggered 6-5-5 cyclically. No appointed member shall be eligible for re-appointment during one year thereafter.
- b. Ex-officio Members. Two ex-officio members, or delegates of their choice, shall serve as voting members: the Vice President for Research, and the Dean of the Graduate School.

Section 2. Associates. Because of their relevant responsibilities and expertise, the following or their delegates are expected to meet frequently with the Research Council:

The Executive Director of The Ohio State University Development Fund;

The Director, Mershon Center for Education in National Security;

The Executive Director of the Research Foundation;

The Director of the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center;

The Director of the Engineering Experiment Station;

The Director of Libraries.

(The list is intended to be suggestive rather than exhaustive.)

29. 2707. Research Council. (continued)

Section 3. Organization:

- a. The Research Council will normally meet once each month during the academic year, and in summer as need may appear. The Steering Committee (Part c) may elect to schedule additional meetings or to cancel a scheduled meeting.
- b. Meetings of the Research Council shall be chaired by the Vice President for Research. The Research Council shall annually elect a Vice Chairman from the appointed membership, to serve for a term of one calendar year, ineligible to succeed himself. The Vice Chairman shall preside at Research Council meetings in the absence of the Vice President for Research, shall chair the Steering Committee, and shall serve as half-time Associate in the Office of Research.
- c. The Research Council shall annually (at the last Spring Quarter meeting) elect three of its appointed members to serve on a Steering Committee; the Vice Chairman of the Research Council shall serve as the fourth member and Chairman. The Steering Committee, in consultation with the Vice President for Research, is charged with preparation of agenda and in general with responsibility for ensuring that the Council's work is effectively carried on. The Steering Committee may from time to time represent the Council at its direction, and subject to its final approval.
- d. Each college shall have a committee, the duties of which shall include responsibility for stimulating scholarly activity and assisting the faculty in obtaining support and facilities necessary for research. The membership, method of appointment, and specific responsibilities of these committees shall be determined by the corresponding college faculties, except that each college committee shall include one member of the Research Council.
- e. The Research Council shall be provided with such secretarial and other staff assistance as may be required for efficient and effective conduct of business.
- f. Membership on the Research Council shall be recognized as direct service to the University; the member's normal departmental duties shall be appropriately reduced, and the department shall be provided with funds with which to replace the services so released.

Section 4. Functions. The Research Council is charged with encouraging and stimulating research and scholarly activity, and assisting in obtaining support. It shall provide a communication channel between faculty and those responsible for obtaining and administering funds. The Research Council shall be consulted on all major research fund allocations, and on all matters of University planning that affect research; in turn it is charged with responsibility for ensuring that the research needs of the University are adequately represented in the formulation of the University's plans, policies, and budgets. The Council is expected to work

29. 2707. Research Council. (continued)

in close consultation with the Vice President for Research. In matters of joint interest, the Research Council is expected to work in cooperation with the Council on Academic Affairs. Specifically, the Council shall have the following duties and responsibilities:

- a. To become familiar with the research activities carried on by the University faculty and staff, and with available and potential sources of research support.
- b. To foster existing research and to stimulate the development of new programs.
- c. To study and where appropriate in consultation with experts or committees having knowledge or responsibilities in specific areas, or with the Graduate Council or the Council on Academic Affairs, recommend to the Faculty Council policies with respect to research activities, facilities, personnel, University organization, and plans for future development.
- d. To provide advice and information concerning research activities and available resources, and to be available to any faculty member or group to assist in planning and obtaining support for research.
- e. Under authority delegated by the Faculty Council, to be responsible for making recommendations concerning the establishment, affiliation, and abolition of research institutes, centers engaged in research activities, and other comparable organizations, and for determining the membership and authorities of their boards or governing bodies (see Rule 13.09).

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29.2709. Council on Student Affairs.

Section 1. The Council on Student Affairs shall consist of 12 members as follows:

- d. The Associate Dean for Student Relations who coordinates all student activities.
- e. The Associate Dean for Student Relations who coordinates student housing.

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29.2713. Faculty Advisory Committee to the President and the Board of Trustees.*

Section 2. At the opening of each Spring Quarter, the <u>Committee on Elections</u> for the <u>Faculty Council</u> shall poll the University Faculty for nominations for membership of the Committee. Each faculty member may nominate one member of the University Faculty for membership on the Committee, regardless of the number of vacancies to be filled. The persons most frequently nominated, in a number twice

the number to be elected, shall constitute the slate of nominees. Upon report of this slate to the <u>Committee on Elections for the Faculty Council</u>, the elected members of the Council annually at its June meeting shall elect by secret ballot from the nominees so presented a sufficient number to fill then occurring vacancies. New Committee members shall serve beginning with the quarter next following their election.

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29. 2719. Mershon Committee on Education in National Security.

Section 1. The Mershon Committee on Education in National Security shall consist of six faculty members appointed by the President for three-year terms. Two members shall be appointed each year. Members shall be eligible for reappointment. The Director, Mershon Center for Education in National Security, shall serve as Chairman of the Committee.

Section 2. The Mershon Committee on Education in National Security shall function principally in an advisory capacity to the Director (see Rule 13.11) with respect to the development of a program of education and research in national security which will support and be in harmony with the general educational and research aims of the University. The Committee shall be charged with the responsibility of insuring that the program makes a significant and continuing contribution to the University-wide program for education and research in national security.

Section 3. This Committee shall be responsible for making recommendations to the <u>President</u> regarding the appointment of the Director, Mershon Center for Education in National Security, <u>as a vacancy arises</u>. <u>Established University procedures for appointing academic personnel shall be followed</u>.

Section 4. Reports by this Committee to the President shall be transmitted by the Director through the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost.

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29, 2721. Committee on Academic Misconduct.

Section 1. The Committee on Academic Misconduct shall consist of three members of the University Faculty, one representative from the Council of Graduate Students (see Rule 53.0705), one undergraduate or professional student, and without vote, the Executive Dean for Student Relations, ex officio. The three members of the University Faculty shall be appointed by the President for a term of three years, the appointments to be made annually so that one member will retire each year. No member of the University Faculty shall serve more than two consecutive terms. The student member shall be appointed by the President for a term of one year. This appointment shall be made from nominations (no less than four in number) of students with at least junior standing, the nominations to be made by the Student Senate in a manner prescribed by the Student Senate.

41.15. Student Addresses.

Upon entering the University, each student shall give in writing his local address and his home address to the Registrar, and shall report promptly all subsequent changes in either address to the Registrar's Office, his College Office, and to the Office of Student Housing as long as he is connected with the University.

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45.03. Group Absences.

Section 2. Group absences which are a necessary part of a class scheduled in the University must be authorized by the Chairman of the Department or Director of the School in which the class is scheduled. Group absences which are a necessary part of a non-class function of the University must be authorized by the Office of the Associate Dean for Student Relations who coordinates all student activities. In the latter instance, the person authorizing the absence shall file in the Office of the Associate Dean for Student Relations, a letter containing (1) a list of names of all of the students involved, (2) the dates and times of the absence, and (3) a complete explanation of the purpose of the absence. The person authorizing the absence shall distribute a copy of this letter to each student involved in the group absence.

The student may then present his copy of the letter to each Instructor of the classes from which the student will be absent. This letter may be the basis of an excuse for an absence from class under the policies provided in Rule 45.01.

Section 3. In all instances of group absences in which women students will be absent from the University before 6:30 a.m. and after 12:00 p.m., the Associate Dean for Student Relations who coordinates student activities should be notified in advance of the names of all women students involved.

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53.0701. Student Senate.

Section 3. The officers of the Student Senate shall include the President, Secretary, and such additional officers as are provided for in the constitution of the Student Senate. The Senate President shall also serve as President of the student body which is represented by the Student Senate. A member of the Student Relations staff shall serve as adviser to the Student Senate.

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53.0703. Women's Self Government Association.

Section 2. The officers of the Women's Self Government Association shall include the President, a Vice President and such additional officers as are provided for in its constitution. A member of the Student Relations staff shall serve as adviser to the Women's Self Government Association.

53.0703. Women's Self Government Association. (continued)

Section 4. The Women's Self Government Association shall be empowered to:

- a. Develop programs which carry out the purposes outlined in Section 3 above
- b. Make recommendations to the Executive Dean for Student Relations regarding rules governing the non-academic student life of women students; and
- c. Adjudicate alleged violations of the rules established by the Executive

 Dean for Student Relations relating to the non-academic life of women
 students to assess disciplinary penalties not exceeding probation to the
 Women's Self Government Association, and to make recommendations
 to the colleges or the Executive Dean for Student Relations regarding
 more serious disciplinary penalties.

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53.0705. Graduate Student Representation on University Committees.

Section 1. Each of the following Committees or Councils shall include in its membership one representative from the Council of Graduate Students: the Faculty Council, the Graduate Council, the Advisory Committee on Cultural Programs, the Committee on Academic Misconduct, the Library Council, the Ohio Union Council, and the University Scholarship and Loan Committee. Membership shall include the right to vote except on the Faculty Council and the Graduate Council.

Section 2. The Council of Graduate Students shall be responsible for selecting two nominees for each position and shall submit their names and vitae to the President who shall appoint one of the nominees for a term of one year.

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54.05. The Ohio Union Council. *

The Ohio Union Council shall consist of eighteen members chosen as follows:

- Nine student members chosen in accordance with rules established by The Ohio Union Council.
- b. One representative from the Council of Graduate Students (see Rule 53.0705).
- c. Seven faculty and staff members chosen as follows: (1) the Vice President for Business and Finance; the Executive Dean for Student Relations, and the Director, Ohio Union, ex officio; (2) the Program Director, Ohio Union, ex officio, but without the right to vote; (3) two members of the University Faculty, and (4) one residence halls staff representative. The faculty and staff members shall be appointed by the President for a term of two years.
- d. One Alumni member designated by The Ohio State University Association for a term of two years under such procedures as the Association shall adopt.

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, December 14, 1967, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Mr. John W. Bricker, Vice Chairman of the Board of Trustees, presided in the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Stanley C. Allyn.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATION

A. <u>Degrees and Certificates Conferred</u> Autumn Quarter Commencement Convocation

President Fawcett recommended that degrees and certificates be conferred at the Autumn Quarter Commencement Convocation on December 15, 1967, to those students who have completed the requirements for their respective degrees and certificates and are recommended by the Faculty Council. The names of those awarded degrees and certificates will be included in the minutes of this meeting. (See Appendix III, page 377.)

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

II. PERSONNEL CHANGES

President Fawcett recommended that all personnel changes since the November 9, 1967 meeting of the Board, as recorded in the official "Salary Roll" of the University, be approved by the Board of Trustees. These changes included the following Changes in Administrative Responsibility, Promotions, Leaves of Absence With Salary, Leaves of Absence Without Salary, and Emeritus Title:

A. Changes in Administrative Responsibility

Paul G. Craig from Professor in and Chairman of the Department of Economics to Dean of the College of Social and Behavioral Sciences, effective January 1, 1968, at a salary of \$27,276.00 per annum. Dr. Craig will continue to hold an appointment as Professor in the Department of Economics at "No Salary."

Frederick W. Hebbard from Professor in and Director of the School of Optometry to Dean of and Professor in the College of Optometry, effective January 1, 1968, at a salary of \$15,768.00 per annum.

James R. McCoy, Dean of the College of Commerce and Administration, to serve as Dean of the renamed College of Administrative Science, effective January 1, 1968.

II. PERSONNEL CHANGES (continued)

B. Promotions

Ronald W. Brady promoted from Director of the Office of Administrative Research and Data Processing in the Office of the Provost of the University to Associate Provost and Director of University Budgets, effective January 1, 1968, at a salary of \$22,668.00 per annum.

Richard A. Griesemer promoted from Professor and Acting Chairman to Professor and Chairman of the Department of Veterinary Pathology, effective December 1, 1967, at a salary of \$24,168.00 per annum.

C. Leaves of Absence With Salary

The principal is to be invested in accordance with rules and regulations therefor adopted by said Board of Trustees, with right to invest and reinvest as occasion dictates.

The income is to be used for the benefit of the College of Law as determined by the Dean of said College.

In the event that the College of Law as it now exists should be altered in any reorganization of University colleges, schools, and departments, the Board of Trustees or successor governing body of the University shall direct use of this income for purposes within the field of law, as recommended by the appropriate administrative official of the University then directly responsible for the legal education at The Ohio State University.

This boiler is being modernized to reduce atmospheric pollution.

Funds for this project will be provided by a transfer of funds from Budget Account 121658 (Contract Repair) to Budget Account 801149 (Construction Account, McCracken Power Plant - Modernization of Boiler #3).

B. University College - Utilities

This project will provide the various utilities required in the area of the new University College and includes water supply, storm and sanitary sewers, gas service and electric service to the outside of the various buildings.

Funds for this project will be provided from Item 235-008 (Ohio Board of Regents, Technical Institutes, Community Colleges, and University Branches) and will be transferred by the Controlling Board to a new account Item 315-057 (University College - Utilities) H. B. 886.

C. Airport Operations Remodeling

This project will allow for the rehabilitation of the existing building with special emphasis on the entrances, lounges, and flight operations area.

Funds for this project will be provided from Budget Account 129060 (Engineering College Improvements Account) and Budget Account 603808 (Flight Training Clinic Account).

D. Center for Tomorrow

This project will provide a building with conference rooms, auditorium, television studios, dining facilities, offices, and dormitory rooms.

Funds for this project will be provided from Budget Account 801035 (Construction Account, Center for Tomorrow).

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. France, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote, and the Secretary was authorized and directed to sign the plans and specifications for the above projects for and on behalf of the Board of Trustees. Sullivan, Jr., be designated as Special Policemen pursuant to the provisions of Section 3345.04 of the Revised Code of Ohio; and that in further compliance with the provisions of said section, the Board of Trustees require Mr. Cottrill and Mr. Sullivan, as well as any other employee of this institution designated as Special Policeman, to take the oath of office and give bond to the State of Ohio in an amount no less than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) prior to assuming the duties of Special Policeman.

Upon motion of Dr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. France, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

Following action upon the above motion, the Board of Trustees agreed unanimously that the responsibility for the designation of an employee of the University as a Special Policeman, pursuant to the provisions of Section 3345.04 of the Ohio Revised Code be delegated to the President and that any employee so designated shall take the oath of office and give bond to the State of Ohio in an amount no less than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) prior to assuming the duties of Special Policeman.

C. ROTC Classroom Building Equipment

Provision for the purchase of movable equipment was not included in the project to renovate the ROTC Classroom Building when it was authorized by the Board of Trustees on June 8, 1967. The estimates of cost for such equipment are now available, and President Fawcett therefore recommended that an amount of \$40,000.00 be appropriated from the investment income on the civilian-military portion of the Mershon Fund and transferred to Budget Account 801127 Military Science Remodeling to provide the necessary funds to complete this renovation project.

IX. RESOLUTION IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the death of Philippe Reed Lawson, Professor in the Department of Psychology. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, a copy of the following Resolution expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the family of the deceased.

A. (Phillippe) Reed Lawson

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on October 31, 1967, of Reed Lawson, Professor in the Department of Psychology.

Dr. Lawson was born August 16, 1929. Despite his young age, he had a brilliant career in psychology.

After receiving his B.S.J. degree at Northwestern University in 1950, he enrolled at the University of Missouri where he earned his M.A. degree in 1952 and his Ph.D. degree in 1955. He remained as Assistant Professor at Missouri for the year 1956-57. He joined the faculty at The Ohio State University in 1957 with the rank of Instructor, was promoted to Assistant Professor in 1958, to Associate Professor in 1961, and to Professor in 1965. He was admitted to the Graduate Faculty in 1960 and chaired eleven Master of Arts and six Doctor of Philosophy graduates.

Dr. Lawson was an excellent teacher. He had broad intellectual interests outside psychology and a deep preoccupation with philosophical problems. His ability to interweave these interests with psychological concepts, lacing all with a sense of humor, made his courses particularly interesting and stimulating. His devotion to and work with the honors program at Ohio State demonstrated his concern with the quality of education as a whole.

IX. RESOLUTION IN MEMORIAM (continued)

A. (Philippe) Reed Lawson (continued)

He was also a dedicated researcher and writer. He pursued exhaustively a line of research which he knew to be important, and he made many very valuable contributions to the periodical literature of his field in a wide variety of professional journals. In addition, he had a breadth of perspective which enabled him to write two books of more than experimental significance--Learning and Behavior and Frustration. He was engaged in writing a third book at the time of his death. Thus he was a scientist of national repute, and his death is a loss to the University.

Dr. Lawson, despite his devotion to teaching and research, was also a person who took his membership in the University community seriously. He was always willing to carry his share of any load. He was a member of and chairman of several important departmental committees and University committees.

On behalf of the University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

On July 13, 1967, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University authorized Novice G. Fawcett, President, or Gordon B. Carson, Vice President for Business and Finance, to do and perform all necessary acts to transfer the property known as Light Station, South Bass Island, from the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, to the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University. The General Services Administration presented an appraisal report from H. Brentwood Biggs, M. A. I., Toledo, Ohio, indicating the fair market value of the property to be \$15,500.00. On October 31, 1967, the property was transferred to the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University.

2. Sale of Property

President Fawcett further reported that in accordance with the recommendation of the Finance and Investment Committee, as approved by the Board of Trustees on December 10, 1964, the sale of the subject property has been consummated and the proceeds were as follows:

The proceeds of the sale have been deposited in the University Endowment Fund to be used for the College of Medicine, with emphasis on, but not restricted to, cancer research, in accordance with the terms of the bequest of Howard B. Monett.

3. Highlights of University Activities

President Fawcett reported to the Board on some of the significant activities of the University during recent weeks and activities to take place in the near future. Some references included in the Report, which is filed with the official records of the Secretary, were as follows:

- a) Mr. Earl F. Morris, Columbus attorney and president of the American Bar Association, will address the graduating class at Autumn Quarter Commencement Friday, December 15, 1967.
- b) Acquisition of The Ohio State University Libraries' two-millionth volume was celebrated November 21, 1967, with a campus program. The libraries, now ranking 16th in size among the nation's university libraries with some 2,030,000 volumes, are expected to reach the three-millionth volume in about seven years at the present rate of growth and to double the holdings by 1982.
- c) A new type of paramedical specialist will be trained in a unique program now being planned by the College of Medicine. The first school for "extracorporeal circulatory systems" specialists is being developed by the College. Its aim is to produce highly qualified persons capable of operating all types of medical electronic instruments and devices located outside the body through which blood is circulated.

3. Highlights of University Activities (continued)

- d) University engineers have been asked by the National Traffic Safety Bureau of the U. S. Department of Transportation to suggest possible improvements in the currently used automobile taillight systems.
- e) Ohio State ranks second in the nation in the number of students studying agriculture, a recent survey shows. Ohio State has an agriculture enrollment this year of 2,155 students, an increase of 100 students over 1966. Iowa State leads in agriculture enrollment with 2,792 students.
- f) Two hundred forty high school seniors were honored by The Ohio State University for their outstanding academic achievement at a reception held at the University on November 29. Thirty-five Columbus and Franklin County high schools were represented.
- g) Centennial objectives for the University's centennial observance were outlined in a progress report by Dr. Alfred B. Garrett, Vice President for Research and Chairman of the Planning Committee. The University's 100th anniversary will be celebrated during 1970. The five objectives are:
 - To bring to the campus, the alumni, the state, the nation, and the world community a deeper understanding of this University and of its important and changing role over the years in exploring and shaping the future.
 - 2) To assess Ohio State's first 100 years, to honor those leaders of the past as men of vision, and to draw upon past gains in initiating a changing vision for the future.
 - To identify those major problems which must be solved during the next century if civilization is to continue.
 - To stimulate the University community to plan positively for the future.
 - 5) To challenge the leaders in the University, the community, the state, and the world to "gear up" to meet the challenges of the next century.



SHERMAN EMERY LEE
DOCTOR OF HUMANE LETTERS

Distinguished scholar, author, museum director, and humanist, whose growing influence in the arts has reached an international dimension.

Under the leadership of Sherman Emery Lee, the Cleveland Museum of Art has become one of the world centers of art appreciation and study. To a great extent, the excellence of the museum's collections reflects the skill, imagination, and scholarly commitments of Dr. Lee, its Director. Today, teachers and scholars from this country and abroad are drawn to the museum by the unusual opportunities it affords for the study of a wide range of art forms.

Dr. Lee possesses that rare blend of qualities which combines broad understanding and insights with specialized training and competencies. His remarkable grasp of Oriental art and culture has earned him a series of significant positions: Curator of Far Eastern Art at the Detroit Institute of Arts, from 1941 to 1947; Associate Director and Curator of Oriental Art at the Seattle Art Museum, from 1948 to 1952; and Curator of Oriental Art at the Cleveland Museum, which he holds in addition to the Directorship, from 1952 to the present. From 1944 to 1946, while in the Armed Forces, he was Advisor on Collections and later Officer in Charge of the Arts and Monuments Division, General Headquarters, Tokyo.

Dr. Lee's demonstrated interests and experiences extend from the "museum world" to that of the university community. He holds the A.B. and M.A. degrees from American University and the Ph.D. from Western Reserve University. From 1948 to 1952, he served as lecturer in the History of Art at the University of Washington. He became professor of art at Western Reserve University in 1962.

He is the author or co-author of numerous books on Oriental art and a leader in the major professional organizations in his fields of interest.

Today, at a high point in his career, Dr. Lee may look back on an impressive list of accomplishments as a scholar, museum director, and teacher. Ahead there is the almost limitless potential of a disciplined and imaginative mind that seeks enriched and enlarged possibilities for the study of art.

ONE THOUSAND AND TWENTY-SEVENTH MEETING

OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Columbus, Ohio, February 8, 1968

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, February 8, 1968, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: John W. Bricker, Vice Chairman, Bertram D. Thomas, John G. Ketterer, Frederick E. Jones, Mervin B. France, James W. Shocknessy, Don M. Hilliker, and William C. Safford.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

*

Mr. John W. Bricker, Vice Chairman of the Board of Trustees, presided in the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Stanley C. Allyn.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Change of the Name of the School of Allied Medical Services to the School of Allied Medical Professions

The Council on Academic Affairs on December 12, 1967, endorsed the proposal of the Faculty of the School of Allied Medical Services that the name of the said School be changed to the School of Allied Medical Professions. The reasons for the proposed change include:

- The United States Congress enacted legislation known as the "Allied Health Professions Personnel Training Act of 1966." It is, therefore, advantageous that the name of the School in the College of Medicine of this University be modified to recognize the nature of the programs presently located therein. The academic programs offered by the said School include: Medical Dietetics, Medical Illustration, Occupational Therapy, Medical Technology, Physical Therapy, Nurse Anesthesiology, and Orthoptic Technology.
- Further, it is believed that the proposed change in name will enhance the School and its activities both on The Ohio State University campus and nationally. The said School is a charter member of the recently established "Association of Allied Health Professions."

President Fawcett recommended therefore that the Board of Trustees approve the change in the name of the School of Allied Medical Services to the School of Allied Medical Professions, effective immediately.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous voice vote.

B. Establishment of the School of Natural Resources

The Faculty Council on December 12, 1967, approved the recommendation from the Council on Academic Affairs that a School of Natural Resources be established in the College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

The conservation of natural resources has emerged in present years as an area of widespread human concern, of academic learning, and of professional employment. As a result, there is a national trend to emphasize natural resources in the mission of colleges and universities. Professional employment in this area in the public sector alone is now over 50,000

persons as contrasted with just a few thousand several decades ago. Demand for professional personnel in all areas of resource management remains strong as a result of new programs developed in response to public demand for better management of air, soil, water, wildlife, and aesthetic resources.

The College of Agriculture and Home Economics sets forth the following assumptions for the formulation of a School of Natural Resources:

- There is an interdisciplinary professional area of natural resources management.
- 2. The University wishes to provide a program in natural resources management which is both operationally viable and professionally visible. This will require phasing out the Natural Resources Institute in favor of a regular academic administrative unit.
- 3. A School of Natural Resources, established to provide a professionally oriented program, would be responsible for coordinating faculty members in various disciplines and from a variety of colleges in the operation of its programs and would initially contain a minimal number of staff members of its own. At the present time, individuals with an interest in this area are found in such disciplines as agronomy, biology, civil engineering, geography, and economics, as well as in such professional areas as education and agriculture.
- 4. A School of Natural Resources would establish an all-University coordinating committee representative of the disciplinary groups interested in natural resources management.
- A logical point to begin programs in natural resources management would appear to be at the master's level in addition to the provision for appropriate undergraduate courses.

A School of Natural Resources established within the framework of these assumptions will initially serve as an administrative unit to bring together the various groups interested in the formulation of programs of instruction, research, and extension in natural resources.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

B. Establishment of the School of Natural Resources (continued)

President Fawcett recommended therefore that the proposal of the Faculty Council to establish a School of Natural Resources, effective July 1, 1968, be approved and that the Natural Resources Institute be dissolved subject to the approval of the Faculty Council at its next regular meeting.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous voice vote.

C. Administrative Identification of "School" of Education Be Discontinued

Pursuant to the adoption of the academic reorganization, the School of Music, the School of Art, and the Department of Psychology were transferred from the College of Education, leaving the School of Education as the only administrative unit within the College.

To avoid the continuance of two co-terminus administrative agencies within the College of Education, the Faculty Council on December 12, 1967, approved the proposal from the Council on Academic Affairs that the School of Education as an administrative unit be discontinued.

President Fawcett recommended therefore that the action of the Faculty Council to discontinue the School of Education as a separate administrative unit within the College of Education, effective January 1, 1968, be ratified.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

D. College of Biological Sciences Becomes a Single Academic Unit

The Faculty Council on December 12, 1967, approved the recommendation from the Council on Academic Affairs that, effective January 1, 1968, the College of Biological Sciences be created as a single academic unit. By this action, the separate academic Departments of Biochemistry, Botany, Microbiology, Zoology and Entomology, and the Division of Biophysics were discontinued.

A new plan of organization for the College of Biological Sciences established basic units identified as academic faculties for instruction, research, and extension in the following defined fields of learning: Biochemistry and Molecular Biology, Biophysics, Genetics, Microbial and Cellular Biology, Organismic and Developmental Biology, Population and Environmental Biology, and Entomology.

President Fawcett recommended therefore that the action of the Faculty Council discontinuing the above-named departments and division be ratified.

Upon motion of Dr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous voice vote.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

E. Naming of Building and Streets

President Fawcett recommended that:

The building which houses the Ohio Tuberculosis medical services, 466 West 10th Avenue, be named "William J. Means Hall" in memory of Dr. William J. Means, first Dean of the College of Medicine of The Ohio State University and first Chairman of the Department of Surgery. This proposal was made by Dr. Richard L. Meiling, Dean, College of Medicine, on behalf of the College of Medicine.

The access drive from Mumaugh Road to John E. Galvin Hall on the Lima Branch Campus be officially named "Campus Drive" (its current identification), as proposed by the Advisory Board for the Lima Branch.

The street leading from John E. Galvin Hall to the new Phase II building on the Lima Branch Campus be named "Progress Road." This proposal also was made by the Advisory Board of the Lima Branch.

The access drive leading from Country Club Drive into the Newark Branch Campus be named "University Drive," as proposed by the Advisory Board for the Newark Branch.

The main street on the University College site, which street will connect Kenny Road with Lane Avenue by a circuitous route through the site, be named "Carmack Road" in memory of Associate Professor Paul A. Carmack, Department of Speech, who died December 27, 1963. Professor Carmack, a leader in his field, was among the first faculty members to travel to the University's branch campuses to conduct classes. This proposal was made by Dean Richard H. Zimmerman, University College.

These proposals have the concurrence of the President's Cabinet and are in accordance with the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendations by unanimous voice vote.

F. Insurance Program for Faculty and Staff - Amendment to Contract No. GTC-58175, The Ohio State University Major Medical Contract

President Fawcett recommended that the following resolution be adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University that the following amendment to the University's Group Major Medical Insurance Contract No. GTC-58175 be enacted and made effective, January 1, 1968:

F. Insurance Program for Faculty and Staff - Amendment to Contract
No. GTC-58175, The Ohio State University Major Medical Contract (continued)

Section A(1), Amendment #13, shall be further amended so that the definition of "Medicare" presented therein shall also include the hospital insurance coverage provided under the Public Employees Retirement System and the State Teachers Retirement System for retirants and their eligible spouses, widows, or widowers who have attained the age of 65 years and who are not eligible to receive hospital insurance benefits under the Federal Old Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance Program. All other provisions of Amendment #13, as they provide for the integration of "Medicare" benefits with the major medical insurance coverage under Contract No. GTC-58175, will remain unchanged.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. France, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous voice vote.

G. Establishment of the "Everett D. Reese Chair of Banking and Monetary Economics"

President Fawcett expressed a deep sense of gratitude and delectation in recommending the establishment of the Everett D. Reese Chair of Banking and Monetary Economics. In January, 1965, through the generosity of a gift from Mr. Reese, a Professorship of Banking and Economics was established and has been filled by the distinguished scholar, Dr. Karl Brunner. Mr. Reese has now contributed through the Development Fund the amount of \$240,000.00 and pledged the additional funds to increase the endowment to the level of \$500,000.00 in order that the "Chair of Banking and Monetary Economics" might be activated by January, 1970.

This endowed Chair is established pursuant to the conditions as approved by the Board of Trustees on January 14, 1965. Mr. Reese received The Ohio State University Distinguished Service Award in 1964, and he is an Ohio State graduate and former faculty member. As an illustrious alumnus, he has given unusual and dedicated service to the University in many capacities including the past chairmanship of The Ohio State University Development Fund Board of Directors; and he is the current chairman of the executive committee of the Presidents Club, an honor organization of the Development Fund contributors.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the Board of Trustees by unanimous voice vote approved with gratitude and delight the recommendation to establish the Everett D. Reese Chair of Banking and Monetary Economics.

D. Van de Graaff Laboratory Addition

Funds for this project will be provided from Budget Account 801148 (Construction Account for Van de Graaff Laboratory Addition).

E. Sisson Hall - Remodeling of West Wing

This project provides for complete remodeling of interior space to provide additional staff offices for the Dean of Veterinary Medicine and Administrative offices.

Funds for this project will be provided by a transfer of funds from Budget Account 129110 (College of Veterinary Medicine Improvements Budget) and Budget Account 921400 (Physical Plant Labor and Materials) to Budget Account 801154 (Construction Account, Sisson Hall - Remodeling of West Wing).

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote, and the Secretary was authorized and directed to sign the plans and specifications for the above projects for and on behalf of the Board of Trustees. Vice President Carson was directed to proceed with a request for bids in the normal University manner and if satisfactory bids are received, to proceed with the award of contracts. 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X. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of Anne M. Burns, Instructor in the School of Nursing; Alice R. Robinson, Professor Emeritus in the School of Art; Robert Victor Zumstein, Associate Professor Emeritus in the Department of Physics; and Alma Herbst, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Economics. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

A. Anne M. Burns

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on October 13, 1967, of Anne M. Burns, Instructor in the School of Nursing.

Miss Burns was born in Corning, Ohio, on October 1, 1912. She was graduated from Mt. Carmel Hospital School of Nursing in 1934, received a Bachelor of Science degree in Nursing Education from The Ohio State University in 1937, and did graduate work in the School of Social Administration. She received the Master of Public Health degree from the University of Minnesota in 1948.

Miss Burns began her public-health nursing career at the Columbus Public Health Nursing Service and functioned there from 1936 to 1942. During World War II, from 1942 to 1946, Miss Burns served with the Mayo Clinic Unit of the Army Nurse Corps in the South Pacific Area. After the war, Miss Burns returned to Columbus and was appointed as the interviewing nurse for patient education in the newly established Central Ohio Rapid Treatment and served as field nursing consultant with the Ohio Department of Health. In 1950, Miss Burns was promoted to Assistant Chief in Education of the Division of Nursing of the Ohio Department of Health. In 1955, she became Chief of the Division of Nursing. Since 1952, Miss Burns had been an Instructor in the School of Nursing at The Ohio State University.

During the past twenty years Miss Burns worked earnestly and consistently with the six collegiate schools of nursing in Ohio to help them develop the public health aspects of their curricula. Through her position she helped make the public health agencies throughout the State available for the field experience required of all students in collegiate schools of nursing. She was particularly concerned about developing continuing educational programs for the public health nurses of Ohio. Through her intensive efforts, programs were developed in general public health nursing, rehabilitation nursing, and nursing in the care of patients with acute cardiac conditions.

Miss Burns was active and held office in many local, state, and national professional organizations, such as the American Nurses' Association, the National League for Nursing, and the American Public Health Association. Her advice was sought by the United States Public Health Service on its Advisory Committee for Heart Disease Control and on the National Expert Committee on Title II Traineeships. She was also appointed to the Technical Development Branch of the Governing Council of the American Public Health Association.

A. Anne M. Burns (continued)

Among the many honors and awards which Miss Burns received, one of the most outstanding was conferred upon her by President Eisenhower in 1958. She was appointed to the official United States delegation of the Eleventh World Health Organization Assembly to serve as nurse advisor to the United States delegation. She was one of five nurses from 83 countries selected to attend that meeting.

Miss Burns' sparkling personality, charm, ability, and enthusiasm have influenced countless nurses to engage in the field of public health nursing. She consistently stimulated those so engaged to strive for better education and preparation so that nursing service to patients would be of the highest quality possible.

On behalf of the members of the Faculty of the College of Medicine and her colleagues throughout the University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution, which has been inscribed upon the minutes of the Faculty of the College of Medicine of November 14, 1967, be made a part of the minutes of this meeting; and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

B. Alice R. Robinson

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on December 23, 1967, of Alice R. Robinson, Professor Emeritus in the School of Art.

Alice Rebecca Robinson was born in 1881, in Congruity, Pennyslvania. She received a Bachelor of Literature in 1901 from Oxford College; Bachelor of Pedagogy in 1903 from Miami University; and a Bachelor of Science in 1916 at Teachers College, Columbia University. She studied painting at the Art Academy of Cincinnati in 1902-1903 and at the Art Students League in New York City in 1920. Her teaching experience before coming to The Ohio State University consisted of six years at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio (1904-1911) and one year at Washington State Normal School (1911-1912).

Alice Robinson was among the first of the Fine Arts faculty at The Ohio State University. She joined the faculty of the School of Art as an Instructor in 1912 and progressed through the academic ranks to become Professor in 1935. She was made Professor Emeritus upon retirement in 1947. In this thirty-five years, she was a strong influence in developing and encouraging the University to create a Fine Arts Department in the College of Education and later establishing the Graduate Program in Art Education.

Professor Robinson belonged to Tau Sigma Delta and Delta Phi Delta, Fine Arts Honorary Fraternities; Phi Lambda Theta, Education Honorary Fraternity; Columbus Gallery of Fine Arts; Urban League; League of Columbus Artists; Ohio Water Color Society; National Education Association; Progressive Education Association; Western Arts Association; Ohio Education Association; Art Section of OEA; and National and State Association of Supervisors of Practice Teaching.

B. Alice R. Robinson (continued)

Because of her active and creative mind, Professor Robinson was invited to participate in the Vassar College Experiment for the Geriatrics Institute, Cold Harbor Springs Foundation on the Hudson, New York. After retirement from The Ohio State University, she continued to teach art privately, and she was engaged in writing a history of the Fine Arts Department.

It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

C. Robert Victor Zumstein

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on December 28, 1967, of Robert Victor Zumstein, Associate Professor Emeritus in the Department of Physics.

Professor Zumstein was born in Wellandport, Ontario, Canada, on December 26, 1896. He received his Bachelor's degree in 1917, his Master's degree in 1918 from the University of Toronto, and his Ph. D. from the State University of Iowa in 1924. He was an Instructor at the State University of Iowa from 1920 to 1924, and a Fellow of the National Research Council at the University of Michigan from 1924 to 1926.

In 1927, Dr. Zumstein joined the faculty in the Department of Physics at The Ohio State University as Instructor and was promoted to Assistant Professor in 1932 and Associate Professor in 1942. During this time he carried on an active program in the area of atomic and molecular spectroscopy, particularly in the latter field. He also worked in x-ray spectroscopy. His publications during his tenure at Ohio State included 22 papers and one book.

Dr. Zumstein was interested also in the problems of instruction and his cheerful good nature and cooperative attitude made him well liked by his colleagues. He was a member of Sigma Xi and the American Physical Society.

D. Alma Herbst

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on January 18, 1968, of Alma Herbst, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Economics.

Professor Herbst was born May 27, 1892, in Columbus, Ohio. She received her A. B. degree from The Ohio State University in 1914 and earned the Ph. D. degree in Economics at the University of Chicago in 1930. Her academic career was devoted to The Ohio State University where she progressed through the academic ranks from Instructor to Professor, beginning in 1930. She retired from the University at the end of the academic year 1962-63. Throughout her years of service at the University, her classes were distinguished by a realistic, knowledgeable, and eminently practical exploration of complex facets of labor problems and industrial relations. She attracted and interested many students to her field of specialization at the undergraduate level. Even more clear testimony to Professor Herbst's constructive professionalism was the caliber of graduate students who took graduate degrees under her guidance and embarked on eminent professional careers. A number of the outstanding specialists in labor and industrial relations in the nation today were students of Professor Herbst and profited from her stimulating mind and critical and constructive evaluation of their work.

In addition to her academic work, Dr. Herbst maintained wide contacts in the non-academic world of industrial relations. At various times in her career, she was industrial secretary of the National Board of the YWCA, taught in the Bryn Mawr Summer School for Workers, and served as a public member of the Regional War Labor Board. She was instrumental in developing labor education activities on The Ohio State University campus and retained an interest in this activity throughout her career.

Dr. Herbst was awarded one of the five Distinguished Teaching Awards by The Ohio State University Association in 1962. The recipients of these awards were asked to comment on their most rewarding teaching experiences. A part of her response reveals the depth of her commitment to the teaching profession. She said

My most rewarding teaching experience has been the unique privilege of association and comradeship with students in the quest for truth. . . . The most rewarding teaching experience is never concluded . . . there comes a realization of the sacred worth of personality and the uniqueness of irreplaceable talent. All are fellow members of the human race. As the core of life emerges so also are relationships in the home, on the job, and in the larger community established. To the teacher it is rewarding to recognize the dedication of former students to responsible areas of the government, in international affairs, in academic life, in labor-management relationships, in business, in politics, in the home, and in service activities. The bond of a continuing free way of life is sealed in mutual gratitude and love long after the formal 'Commencement' date.

By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, and Rules for the University Faculty has been reprinted incorporating those amendments adopted by the Board of Trustees through the December 14, 1967 meeting. The statutes of the Ohio Revised Code pertaining to The Ohio State University and printed in the publication have been revised to include those actions adopted by the 107th General Assembly.

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XII. PRESENTATION OF PART 1, VOLUME VIII, UNIVERSITY HISTORY WRITTEN BY PROFESSOR EMERITUS JAMES E. POLLARD

President Fawcett in presenting the new volume of the University history series spoke as follows:

In 1964 Professor Emeritus James E. Pollard, who was at that time serving as University Historian, was assigned the responsibility for completing a history of the University's role in World War II. Professor Pollard has now completed the work, and it has been registered in the Library of Congress. Officially it is Part 1, Volume VIII, in the University's history series and is entitled The University in a World at War, covering the first five years of the administration of former President Howard L. Bevis. Part 2 of Volume VIII is now in preparation and will cover the last eleven years of the Bevis administration.

This volume portrays the campus as it was at the time of Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941, and describes the great acceleration and change that followed in its wake, including the extensive special training programs undertaken by this University for the armed forces. The publication goes into some detail about wartime research on the campus and it touches on the early planning for the postwar years and the efforts made in anticipation of the unprecedented growth in enrollment known as the "veterans' bulge."

In particular, however, the work underscores the contribution made by the estimated 17,000 alumni and former students who took part in World War II, as well as the 350 members of the University faculty and staff who were granted leaves either for active military service or for other war-connected assignments. Special attention is given to the 699 alumni and former students whose lives were sacrificed in the defense of our country, including four at Pearl Harbor. Those honored citizens comprise the University's honor roll, and it is to them that the book is dedicated.

Before presenting the book to each member of the Board of Trustees, President Fawcett introduced the author, Professor Emeritus James E. Pollard, and cited facts from his illustrious career as follows:

Most of you know Jim Pollard for his long and dedicated service to this University and I consider him a very dear personal friend. Jim Pollard, who holds three degrees from The Ohio State University, joined the staff of the University in 1923. He has gained wide recognition for his research and writings, notably in history and newspaper law. He received the title of Professor Emeritus upon his retirement in July, 1965, and was awarded The Ohio State University Distinguished Service Award in August of that year. He is continuing his service to the University as a consultant to Vice President Mount.

XII. PRESENTATION OF PART 1, VOLUME VIII, UNIVERSITY HISTORY WRITTEN BY PROFESSOR EMERITUS JAMES E. POLLARD (continued)

It should be noted that Professor Pollard has served as President of the American Association of Schools and Departments of Journalism and as the national President of Kappa Tau Alpha, the journalism scholarship fraternity. For his book The Presidents and the Press, published in 1947, he received the Distinguished Service Award for Research in Journalism from Sigma Delta Chi, the national professional journalistic fraternity.

The volume I am presenting to you today is the fourth book written about The Ohio State University which has been authored by Professor Pollard, the others being the 75-year history, 1873-1948; a biography of former President William Oxley Thompson; and a history of University athletics from 1879 to 1959.

Mr. Bricker in accepting the book expressed on behalf of the Board of Trustees deep appreciation and high commendation to Professor Pollard for his efforts in authoring the new volume in the University history series.

Columbus, Ohio, March 14, 1968

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, March 14, 1968, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: John W. Bricker, Vice Chairman, Bertram D. Thomas, John G. Ketterer, Mervin B. France, James W. Shocknessy, Don M. Hilliker, and William C. Safford.

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Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

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Mr. John W. Bricker, Vice Chairman of the Board of Trustees, presided in the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Stanley C. Allyn.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Proposal for the Establishment of a New Graduate

Degree Program and a Certificate Program in

Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages

The Faculty Council on February 13, 1968, upon the recommendation of the Council on Academic Affairs, approved for transmittal to the Board of Trustees the recommendation that new programs in the area of teaching English to speakers of other languages be authorized as follows:

- A graduate program leading to the degree, Master of Arts; and
- 2. A graduate certificate program.

Since World War II, the number of international students in the United States has increased tremendously. Universities have had to develop special English programs and also find personnel competent to provide the special kind of English instruction which international students require. To serve their own interests over the years and to facilitate communication within the field, these special teachers of English have created their own professional associations and journals. Recently, interdisciplinary graduate programs to which the fields of English, linguistics, and speech have contributed were developed in several major universities in an attempt to meet the demand for personnel competent to teach English to speakers of other languages (TESOL).

Such a program at The Ohio State University will be open to students who are, or who have been, enrolled in other graduate degree programs in English, linguistics, modern languages, or speech. Students who successfully complete a graduate degree in one of these programs may also receive a Certificate in TESOL upon completion of the additional requirements of the program in TESOL. Students will not be awarded a Certificate in TESOL if they fail to complete the degree for which they have regularly enrolled.

President Fawcett recommended that the above proposal to establish a new graduate degree program leading to the Master of Arts degree and a certificate program leading to a Certificate Program in Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages be approved by the Board of Trustees, and that this action become effective Summer Quarter, 1968.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. France, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

B. Establishment of a Certificate Program for Translators of Russian in the Social Sciences

A program designed to prepare persons to be effective translators of Russian in the Social Sciences has been approved by the appropriate department and college faculties, as well as the Graduate School and the Council on Academic Affairs. Such a program is a part of a larger venture which encompasses both the preparation of translators and the actual translation of significant Russian works in the Social Science fields to be published by The Ohio State University Press as a series over the next few years. There is a significant need for personnel with this preparation in both industry and government. The original source of such translators—native Russians—is no longer open.

Students entering the Certificate Program must register and meet the requirements of the Graduate School. All course work taken will be for graduate credit. Candidates will be exposed to language training, courses in applied linguistics, English composition, and translation techniques. Upon completion of the program, these students will be awarded the certificate by the Graduate School upon the recommendation of the Department of Slavic Languages and Literatures.

President Fawcett recommended that the above proposal be approved by the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

C. Honorary Degrees

The Faculty Council on February 13, 1968, recommended that the honorary degrees, as specified hereafter, be conferred on the following individuals:

Sir Charles Wilson, Principal and Vice Chancellor of University of Glasgow - Doctor of Laws

Henry Chauncey, President of Educational Testing Service - Doctor of Laws

Lyman Sedgwick Ford, Executive Director of United Community Funds and Councils of America - Doctor of Humane Letters

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the awarding of honorary degrees to the above-identified persons.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

D. University College--Designated as Separate Administrative Unit

When the academic reorganization for the University was approved by the Board of Trustees at the October 11, 1967 meeting, the University College was one of the six separate administrative units within the Colleges of the Arts and Sciences. Since the mission of the University College has been determined to be that of serving as a foundation for all of the undergraduate colleges of the University, the Faculty Council on February 13, 1968, endorsed the recommendation of the Council on Academic Affairs that the University College become a separate administrative unit outside the Colleges of the Arts and Sciences, effective immediately.

President Fawcett recommended that the action taken by the Board of Trustees on October 11, 1967 regarding the academic reorganization of the University be amended to delete the University College as one of the administrative units within the Colleges of the Arts and Sciences.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote.

E. Student Services Fee Increase

To meet the increasing costs of student services and to provide for increased professional services in such areas as student health, student financial aids, student orientation and testing, intramural, recreational and cultural programs for students, the Ohio Union, and activities of more than 400 University recognized student organizations, President Fawcett recommended that the Student Services Fee be increased by \$5.00 per quarter, effective Summer Quarter, 1968.

Although student service activities and expenses have increased on a year-to-year basis, there has been no increase in the Student Services Fee for the past eight years. In recent years, these additional costs have been absorbed through a Student Services Fee reserve, which reserve will be encumbered by July 1, 1968. This recommendation was considered when the University comprehensive budget was proposed in June, 1967; however, on the request of the Ohio Board of Regents that any student fee increases to become effective after the fiscal year 1967-68 should be submitted in the spring of 1968, the proposal to increase the Student Services Fee as outlined above was deferred until this time.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

F. Amendments to Constitution of The Ohio State University Development Fund

The Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Development Fund at its regular meeting on Saturday, March 2, 1968, approved the attached resolutions, identified as Appendix IV, page 513, amending the Constitution of The Ohio State University Development Fund to double the size of the Board of Directors from ten to twenty members with five of the additional members to be elected by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Association and five to be appointed by the President of the University.

Pursuant to Article V, Section 1, of the Constitution of The Ohio State University Development Fund, President Fawcett recommended therefore that the above-referred-to amendments to the Constitution of The Ohio State University Development Fund be approved and included with the minutes of this meeting.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote.

G. Degrees and Certificates Conferred -- Winter Quarter Commencement

President Fawcett recommended that degrees and certificates be conferred at the Winter Quarter Commencement Convocation on March 15, 1968, to those students who have completed the requirements for their respective degrees and certificates and are recommended by the Faculty Council. The names of those awarded degrees and certificates will be included in the minutes of this meeting. (See Appendix V, page 517.)

Upon motion of Dr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

H. Schedule for Football, Basketball, and Ice Hockey Ticket Prices Effective 1968-69 Season

The Athletic Council has recommended, and the President's Cabinet has reviewed the recommendation, that the following schedule of football, basketball, and ice hockey ticket prices be approved, effective with the seasons beginning 1968.

The foregoing schedule of football prices represents an increase of \$1,00 per game in box and reserved seats and no increase in bleacher, student, and faculty-staff ticket prices. Students and faculty-staff members who purchase football season admission cards or basketball season tickets will be admitted free to all regularly scheduled intercollegiate athletic contests except football, basketball, and ice hockey.

The football ticket prices for box and reserved seats have not been increased for five years. The above-recommended prices will bring The Ohio State University up to the level charged by seven other Western Conference (Big Ten) universities, and the two remaining Conference universities charge \$5.50 for reserved football seats. Further, the above-recommended schedule of prices is considered necessary to meet the increased costs of operation, to continue the support of all seventeen varsity intercollegiate athletic programs, and to continue the University policy of operating the intercollegiate athletic program without assistance from the State.

President Fawcett recommended, therefore, that the above schedule of ticket prices be approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote.

I. Resolution Supporting Programs Dealing With Socio-Economic Problems

President Fawcett recommended that the following resolution be adopted by the Board of Trustees:

WHEREAS: The Ohio State University has through its administrative officers repeatedly expressed its support of both the legal and moral requirements for non-discrimination because of race, color, and creed in all aspects of University and community life; and

WHEREAS: the University has taken a series of actions to insure that internal employment practices reflect this commitment; and

WHEREAS: the University has initiated action to introduce into its curricula subject matter which will reflect the contributions to American society and the heritage of minority groups; and

WHEREAS: the Student Assembly of The Ohio State University in cooperation with student groups, faculty members, and administrative officers has initiated a program which will attempt to insure that off-campus housing available to University students is available in accordance with Ohio law relating to civil rights and equal opportunity; and

WHEREAS: The Ohio State University has within its faculty and staff knowledgeable scholars with competency to seek solutions to a wide range of socio-economic problems; and

WHEREAS: a university, because of its inherent capability and of its well-defined service mission, should exercise a leadership role in designing and implementing such solutions; and

WHEREAS: University officers have already begun action programs within the University and within the community to deal with various socio-economic problems; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED: That the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University endorses the programs already initiated by the University to deal with such problems, and

That the Board directs the appropriate officials of the University under the direction of the President of the University to take such steps and to initiate such programs as will attempt to insure that University and University-related activities are conducted in conformance with Ohio law relating to civil rights and equal opportunity and as will insure that the University play its proper role in exercising leadership in dealing with important current socio-economic problems.

Dr. Thomas moved and Mr. France seconded the motion that the above resolution be adopted. During the discussion of the above resolution, Mr. Shocknessy stated

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

I. Resolution Supporting Programs Dealing With Socio-Economic Problems (continued)

that he "heartily endorsed the pious expressions, aspirations, and direction set forth in the resolution," and he followed with the question regarding the intent of the manner in which those groups referred to in paragraph 4 of the resolution might effectively insure that off-campus housing available to University students is, in fact, available in accordance with Ohio law.

President Fawcett, Vice President Corbally, and Executive Dean Bonner reviewed the procedures which are now being followed by the University in assisting students individually and collectively in their efforts to secure off-campus housing in residences where the non-discrimination policy is in effect.

It was the consensus that the "administrative officers of the University would use their best efforts in an attempt to insure that the expressions of the resolution were executed," recognizing that since the University does not supervise off-campus housing, it cannot in fact fully insure that the Ohio law will be followed by all owners who rent housing to students. The resolution was revised to include the above consensus with the consent of Dr. Thomas and Mr. France who moved and seconded the motion to adopt the resolution.

Upon a roll call vote, the above resolution as revised was adopted by unanimous vote.

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VIII. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

A. Transportation Research Center - Easement for Power Line Right-of-Way and Right-of-Way Tree Permit

The Dayton Power and Light Company has requested permission to construct a 138 KV transmission line across property comprising the site of the Transportation Research Center west of U. S. Route 33. The Dayton Power and Light Company has obtained easements to construct the transmission line and, at the University's request are willing to change the proposed right-of-way to better conform to the University's proposed facilities.

President Fawcett recommended, therefore, that the granting of a reasonable right-of-way easement and a right-of-way tree permit to the Dayton Power and Light Company be approved. It was further recommended that the President and/or the Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to request the Director of Public Works, pursuant to his statutory duties, to act on behalf of the University in developing the necessary legal instruments to provide for the installation of the transmission line and to develop the necessary legal instruments to cancel the existing easements.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

B. Medical Center - Easement to Provide for Relocation of 30" Sanitary Sewer West of Dodd Hall

Easements for the construction or relocation of existing utility lines will be required for the completion of the Medical Center Complex. President Fawcett recommended that a new easement be granted to the City of Columbus to relocate a 30" sanitary sewer west of Dodd Hall.

It was further recommended that the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to request the Director of Public Works pursuant to his statutory duties to act on behalf of the University in developing the necessary legal documents to provide for this easement and to cancel the existing easement on that portion of the sewer to be abandoned.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

C. <u>Laneview Area - Acquisition of Property for Educational,</u> Research, and Service Facilities

President Fawcett presented the following resolution for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

WHEREAS, The Ohio State University has acquired certain parcels of real property bounded on the east by the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway, on the south by Lane Avenue, on the west by Kenny Road, and on the north by lands titled in the name of the State of Ohio; and

C. Laneview Area - Acquisition of Property for Educational, Research, and Service Facilities (continued)

WHEREAS, the University in planning to meet a portion of the needs of its students and its programs from the standpoint of educational, research, and service facilities, will be required to acquire most, if not all, of the land lying between the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad, Lane Avenue, Kenny Road, and State of Ohio owned lands; and

WHEREAS, the Trustees of The Ohio State University deem that the acquisition of this land is mandatory in meeting the needs of the University and serving the people of the State of Ohio; and therefore find it necessary to proceed with the acquisition of real property therefor;

NOW BE IT RESOLVED, that the Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized and directed to proceed with the purchase of certain residential real estate within the area outlined above with funds not to exceed \$35,000.00 available in the University Treasurer and General Fund and, in the event negotiations to purchase said property at a fair and just compensation should fail, then, pursuant to his statutory authority, the Director of Public Works shall be requested to exercise the right of "eminent domain" and acquire by condemnation for the State of Ohio and said University the following described tract of real estate located in Clinton Township, Franklin County, Ohio:

Being Lots Numbered 19, 21, 22, 31, 40, 70, and 71, inclusive, 2nd Wood-Brown County Addition.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

D. Acquisition of Property, 3253 Granville Road, Worthington, Ohio

Pursuant to action taken by the Board of Trustees on December 10, 1964, relative to the purchase of property in the Don Scott Field area, the following resolution was presented with the recommendation that it be adopted:

WHEREAS, The Ohio State University Board of Trustees authorized on December 10, 1964, the investment in real property in the University Airport area: and

WHEREAS, pursuant to that authority an agreement has been negotiated to purchase 74.070 acres located at 3253 West Granville Road, Worthington, Ohio, from Gail McGurer et al. The property to be acquired and transferred to the University is to be purchased in ten equal installments with the first installment to be paid on the date of closing and the other nine installments to be paid on the same day and month of each year thereafter until fully paid; and

WHEREAS, the total farm surveyed contains 76.063 acres and The Ohio State University is given an option to purchase the remaining 1.993 acres containing the house and all outbuildings for the sum of \$20,000.00 at some future date;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that with the concurrence of the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees, it was now recommended that the agreement to purchase the above-identified property in accordance with the conditions as set forth be approved; furthermore, that the Board of Trustees authorize the President and/or the Vice President for Business and Finance to execute the agreement to purchase and the promissory note setting forth the terms of the installment purchase.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees adopted the above resolution and approved the purchase of the above-identified property by unanimous roll call vote.

E. Acquisition of Property, 1991 Kenny Road

The following resolution, authorizing the purchase of real property for the Investment Portfolio, was presented with the recommendation that it be adopted:

WHEREAS, the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University on December 14, 1967, authorized the Vice President for Business and Finance to negotiate the purchase of 6.33 acres of land and buildings, located on Kenny Road adjacent to the University College area, from the Battelle Memorial Institute from funds available in the Investment Portfolio; and

WHEREAS, said purchase has now been negotiated in accordance with said authorization;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University authorize the President and/or the Vice President for Business and Finance to proceed to execute the necessary documents to complete purchase of the above property as part of the Investment Portfolio.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. France, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote of the six members who voted. Dr. Thomas abstained from voting since the resolution authorized the purchase of property from Battelle Memorial Institute where Dr. Thomas serves as President.

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on February 14, 1968, of Olin Harris Moore, Professor Emeritus of Romance Languages.

Professor Moore was born in Mt. Airy, North Carolina, on January 27, 1885. He received his A.B. degree from the University of Missouri in 1902, his A.M. degree from Harvard in 1904, and his Ph.D. degree in Romance Languages at the same institution in 1913. During World War I, he did hospital service in France in the Hôpital Militaire in the Château de Passy in the summer of 1915. He traveled frequently in Europe and studied in Paris, France; Madrid, Spain; and Florence, Italy. He was widely trained in French, Spanish, and Italian languages and literatures, including both the old and modern periods. He taught in Millsaps College, Jackson, Mississippi; Phillips Academy, Andover, Massachusetts; and the University of Illinois. After one year as Associate Professor at Northwestern University, he came to The Ohio State University in 1920 as Professor of Romance Languages, in which rank he served for thirty-five years with characteristic ability and thoroughness as teacher and scholar until his retirement in 1955.

Professor Moore was elected to Phi Beta Kappa at the University of Missouri in 1902. After several student scholarships, he held the Parker Traveling Fellowship at Harvard in 1910-11. He was an active member of the Modern Language Association of America, often contributing scholarly articles to its Publications, and also to other learned journals. He was a member of the American Association of University Professors and, in 1937, held the national Presidency of the American Association of Teachers of Italian. He was the author of Elements of French, Henry Plantagenet: The Young King, Legend of Romeo and Juliet, an edition of Victor Hugo's play, Ruy Blas, and of an article, "Mark Twain and Don Quixote," which drew wide attention among students of Mark Twain. With departmental colleagues, Robert Fouré, D. P. Rotunda, George R. Havens, and Walter Meiden, he collaborated on several important textbooks in French and Italian.

During World War II, Professor Moore taught a special class in spoken Italian for carefully selected servicemen. He was a thorough and remarkably objective scholar, widely informed about many things far beyond his field of specialization. Professor Moore was an able exponent of chess and his games with opponents at the Faculty Club always drew an interested group of spectators, eager to watch every move in his rapid and sure play.

On behalf of the University at large, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

IX. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM (continued)

B. Alvin E. Coons

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on February 22, 1968, of Alvin E. Coons, Professor in the Department of Economics.

Professor Coons was born February 3, 1908, in Iowa. He pursued undergraduate and graduate work at the State University of Iowa and came to The Ohio State University as an Assistant Professor of Economics in 1946. Before joining the faculty at The Ohio State University, he taught at South Dakota State College and the State University of Iowa. During World War II, Dr. Coons served in the Mediterranean Theatre, including among his missions in the Air Corps, participation in the strategic raids on the Ploiesti oil fields in Roumania. He was honorably discharged at the war's end with the rank of Major.

While most of his time at The Ohio State University was spent in teaching, Dr. Coons served as Assistant to the Director of The Ohio State University Research Foundation from 1952 to 1956. In 1956-1957, he held a Ford Foundation faculty fellowship and carried on research in England and Sweden. He was the author of a number of publications in the field of economics and served as editor of a textbook series in economics. As a teacher, Dr. Coons was very well liked by his students to whom he devoted a great deal of extra time.

During the last six years of his life, Dr. Coons became much concerned about the housing problems and living conditions of low-income families in the "inner city" of Columbus. To understand more fully the problems of these people he moved into their community and with the help of others, including the Federal Government, proceeded to renovate run-down property and rebuild parts of the depressed communities. His work attracted wide recognition in Ohio and elsewhere; and heads of social agencies, civil rights organizations, civic leaders, and others held the "dedicated bachelor" in the highest esteem.

On behalf of the University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

A. Report from the Finance and Investment Committee

 Resolution Approving and Providing for the Execution of a Loan Agreement, and Numbered Contract No. H(402) 3007, by and Between The Ohio State University and the United States of America for Project CH-Ohio-216(D)

Mr. France, Chairman of the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees, presented the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY, that:

SECTION 1. The pending Loan Agreement, Numbered Contract No. H(402) 3007, dated as of January 1, 1968, relating to the construction on the campus of The Ohio State University an educational institution of higher learning located in Columbus, Ohio, of a new 13-story dormitory building to provide housing for approximately 504 graduate students and a Building Supervisor (Project CH-Ohio-216(D)), by and between The Ohio State University and the United States of America, is hereby in all respects approved.

SECTION 2. The President or the Vice President, Business and Finance, of the University is hereby authorized and directed to execute the said Loan Agreement in two counterparts on behalf of The Ohio State University and the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and directed to impress and attest the official seal of The Ohio State University on each such counterpart and to forward two such counterparts to the Department of Housing and Urban Development, together with such other documents relative to the approval and execution of such counterparts and to this Resolution as may be required by the Government.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

B. Report on the University's Investment Portfolio

The report dated March 7, 1968, as submitted to the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees by Vice President Gordon B. Carson pertaining to the University's Investment Portfolio, was received and ordered to be filed with the official records of the Board of Trustees.

XI. DISCUSSION OF COURT CASES PENDING AGAINST STUDENTS AND OTHERS WHO WERE ARRESTED RECENTLY

Mr. Safford stated that while he knew it was not on the agenda for action, it had come to his attention that some consideration is being given to the possible dismissal of the court cases against students and others who were arrested recently on the charge of trespassing, and he requested that the record show that he was personally opposed to a dismissal of the charges against those who were arrested on the above-referred-to charge.



APPENDIX IV

Amendments to Constitution of The Ohio State University Development Fund

as Approved by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Development Fund on March 2, 1968

Adopted by Board of Trustees March 14, 1968 (See page 481)



Amendments to Constitution of The Ohio State University Development Fund

The Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Development Fund at its regular meeting on Saturday, March 2, 1968, pursuant to Article V, Section 1, of the Constitution of The Ohio State University Development Fund, adopted the following resolutions:

BE IT RESOLVED that Section 1 of Article II of said Constitution be amended to read as follows:

Section 1. Number: The Board of Directors shall be twenty (20) in number.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Section 3 of Article II of said Constitution be amended to read as follows:

Section 3. Manner of Selection: Ten (10) of the Directors, at least one (1) of whom shall be a woman, shall be elected by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Association, two (2) shall be elected by the Board of Trustees, one (1) at least of whom shall be a member of the Board of Trustees; five (5) shall be appointed by the President of the University; and three (3) shall represent the University Administration, and these three representatives shall be the President, one of the Vice Presidents to be appointed by the President, and the chief financial officer of the University.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Section 4 of Article II of said Constitution be amended to read as follows:

Section 4. <u>Tenure</u>: Each director elected by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Association shall serve for a period of five (5) years, except that:

- (a) All such directors now in office shall serve until the ends of the terms for which they were elected.
- (b) The five (5) new alumni directors shall serve respectively for terms of one year, two years, three years, four years, and five years.

Trustee directors shall serve for a period of one (1) year each.

The five (5) directors appointed by the President of the University shall serve for a period of five (5) years, except that the first group of such directors shall serve respectively for terms of one year, two years, three years, four years, and five years.

The three (3) directors representing the University Administration shall serve during their terms of office as members of the University Administration.

Amendments to Constitution of The Ohio State University Development Fund (continued)

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Section 8 of Article II of said Constitution be amended to read as follows:

Section 8. Quorum. A quorum shall be twelve (12) members of the Board of Directors. Except as provided in Article V, Section 1, of this Constitution, all actions of the Board of Directors shall be determined by the majority vote of the directors in attendance at a meeting at which a quorum is present.


AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Section 2 of Article III of said Constitution be amended to read as follows:

Section 2. <u>The Chairman</u>. The Chairman shall be elected by the Board of Directors from among the ten (10) directors elected by The Ohio State University Association.

THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE ONE THOUSAND AND TWENTY-NINTH MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Columbus, Ohio, April 11, 1968

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, April 11, 1968, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: John W. Bricker, Vice Chairman, Bertram D. Thomas, John G. Ketterer, James W. Shocknessy, and William C. Safford.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

Mr. John W. Bricker, Vice Chairman of the Board of Trustees, presided in the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Stanley C. Allyn.

The 1967 Annual Report for The Ohio State University Research Foundation was distributed to each member of the Board of Trustees, and the Secretary was instructed to file a copy of the report with the official records of the Board.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Amendments to Rules for the University Faculty (53.0701, 53.0702, 53.0703, 29.2709, and 54.07)

For the past two years, the Constitution of the Undergraduate Student Body has been under study and careful review by the Council on Student Affairs and the Faculty Council. Upon the recommendation of the University Committee on Rules, the Faculty Council at its meeting on March 12, 1968, approved the following amendments to the Rules for the University Faculty to bring them in accord with the newly adopted Constitution of the Undergraduate Student Body.

President Fawcett recommended therefore:

- 1. That the amended Section 53.07 of the <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u> as recorded in Appendix VI, page 587, be adopted.
- 2. That Rule 29. 2709 of the <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u> be amended to substitute "Student Assembly" where "Student Senate" now appears in the Rules and that Section 5 be deleted and Section 6 be renumbered as Section 5.
- 3. That Rule 54.07 be deleted since it is no longer applicable.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote, and the Secretary was instructed to make said revisions in the Rules for the University Faculty.

B. Recommendation for the Benjamin G. Lamme Meritorious Achievement Medal - Clarence Christian Keller

Pursuant to the procedures established by the Board of Trustees on June 28, 1930, the faculty of the College of Engineering has nominated Clarence Christian Keller, President of Holophane Company, Inc., New York City, for the Benjamin G. Lamme Meritorious Achievement Medal to be awarded at a subsequent commencement.

B. Recommendation for the Benjamin G. Lamme Meritorious Achievement Medal - Clarence Christian Keller (continued)

President Fawcett recommended that this nomination be approved by the Board of Trustees.

C. Naming of Street

President Fawcett recommended that the access drive from Route 95 to the parking lot, Marion Branch Campus, be named "University Drive," as proposed by the Advisory Board for the Marion Branch of The Ohio State University. The recommendation has the approval of Dean Richard H. Zimmerman, University College.

This proposal has the concurrence of the President's Cabinet and is in accordance with the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous voice vote.

D. Amendments to Memorandum of Agreement Between The Ohio State University and The Ohio State University Research Foundation

The United States Department of Health, Education, and Welfare has requested that the Memorandum of Agreement between The Ohio State University and The Ohio State University Research Foundation be amended to clarify the legal obligation of the Research Foundation to return to the University all applicable indirect costs recovered from sponsors of research grants and contracts.

President Fawcett recommended therefore, with the concurrence of the Executive Committee of The Ohio State University Research Foundation and the special counsel of the Attorney General of Ohio, that the said Memorandum of Agreement be amended as detailed in Appendix VII, page 591.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote.

E. Report of Auditor of State to The Ohio State University

The Annual Report of the Auditor of State for the fiscal year 1966-67 has been received. The report indicates the books and records of The Ohio State University are in excellent condition and that all accounts are in order.

President Fawcett recommended that the receipt of the Annual Report of the Auditor of State be noted in the minutes of this meeting and that it be filed with the official documents of the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous voice vote.

F. Honorary Degrees - Amendment to Rule 11.05, Responsibility and Authority of the President

Upon the recommendation of the Faculty Advisory Committee to the President and the Board of Trustees, the Faculty Council on March 12, 1968, approved the following amendment to Rule 11.05 of the Rules for the University Faculty:

After consultation with the Faculty Advisory Committee to the President and the Board of Trustees, the President may recommend to the Board of Trustees candidates for honorary degrees. The number of candidates so recommended shall be limited to two per calendar year. This right and its limitation in no way abrogates the power of the Faculty Council to recommend candidates for honorary degrees (Rule 29.15.d).

The above new entry is to be numbered "Section 3" and the section now going by that number is to be designated "Section 4."

The above action of the Faculty Council to amend Rule 11.05 was presented to the Board of Trustees with the recommendation that it be adopted.

Upon motion of Dr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote, and the Secretary was instructed to make said revision in the Rules for the University Faculty.

Funds for this project are provided from Budget Account 801148 (Van de Graaff Laboratory Addition Construction Account).

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the above award of contracts and expenditure of funds were approved and the action of the Vice President for Business and Finance ratified by unanimous roll call vote.

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VII. CONTROLLING BOARD APPROVALS

Each numbered request shown below accomplishes the following purpose:

A. The Ohio Board of Regents

19 Approves the transfer and release of \$883,750.00 from Item 235-008 Technical Institutes, Community Colleges, and University Branches to Item 315-057 University (General) College Utilities, H. B. 886, to provide funds for the project, University (General) College Utilities.

B. The Ohio State University

- 35 Approves the transfer of \$600,000.00 from Item 315-019 Mansfield Branch to Item 315-060 Mansfield Technical Building, H. B. 886, and the release of \$49,000.00 of this account for planning purposes.
- 36 Approves the award of two extra orders for the Medical Science Building, one to the General Contractor in the amount of \$77,100.00 and the second to the Heating, Ventilating Contractor in the amount of \$20,908.26.
- 37 Approves the transfer of \$155,000.00 from Item 315-016 Medical Complex to Item 315-059 Medical Center Library and releases this amount for planning purposes.

VIII. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

A. Roadway Easement, Kenny Road, Franklin County (Board of Trustees Land)

Franklin County, State of Ohio, has requested permission to widen Kenny Road in accordance with University College area, County Engineer's project, Kenny Road - Section "A." This proposed road improvement requires an easement over lands owned by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University. This improvement is designed to improve the traffic flow to and from the University College to be constructed west of Kenny Road.

The total additional acreage to be acquired by Franklin County to effect this widening is 0.627 acres. Franklin County has had the property appraised and based on the appraisals has offered \$19,740.00 as compensation for the lands owned by the Board of Trustees needed for the right-of-way.

President Fawcett recommended that the granting of a highway easement in accordance with the above stated project to Franklin County be approved. It was further recommended that the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to act on behalf of the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University in developing the necessary legal instruments to provide for the improvement to Kenny Road, and to accept the sum of \$19,740.00 as just compensation for the land needed for the right-of-way.

Upon motion of Dr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

B. Roadway Easement, Kenny Road, Franklin County (State of Ohio Lands)

Franklin County, State of Ohio, has requested permission to widen Kenny Road in accordance with University College area County Engineer's project, Kenny Road - Section "A" and construction of a storm sewer to control run off. This proposed road improvement is designed to improve the traffic flow to and from the University College complex to be constructed west of Kenny Road.

President Fawcett recommended that the granting of a highway and storm sewer easement to Franklin County in accordance with the above stated project be approved. It was further recommended that the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to request the Director of Public Works, pursuant to his statutory duties, to act on behalf of the University in developing the necessary legal instruments to provide for the improvement to Kenny Road.

Upon motion of Dr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

VIII. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE (continued)

C. West Campus - Easement, Columbus and Southern Ohio Electric Company

An easement for the construction of a 13,200 volt overhead electrical service has been engineered to provide electrical service for the new Horticulture and Forestry Building. This electrical service will be extended in underground conduits to other buildings in the West Campus area to provide better electrical service for the existing buildings in the West Campus area.

President Fawcett recommended that the granting of an electrical pole easement to the Columbus and Southern Ohio Electric Company be approved. It was further recommended that the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to request the Director of Public Works, pursuant to his statutory duties, to act on behalf of the University in developing the easement to provide for the new and improved electric service.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

D. Medical Center - Easements and Agreement to Provide for Construction of a 20" Water Line

Two easements and an agreement for the construction of a 20" water line will be required for the development and completion of the Medical Center Complex. President Fawcett recommended that easements be negotiated with Battelle Memorial Institute and the City of Columbus, and a consent of leasee to the granting of easements be negotiated with the City of Columbus to the State of Ohio to construct a 20" water line from Fifth Avenue to King Avenue for the benefit of the Medical Center Complex and to reinforce the present campus water distribution system.

It was further recommended that the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to act on behalf of the State of Ohio (The Ohio State University) to develop the necessary legal documents to provide for these agreements.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

IX. REPORTS

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A. Report on the University's Investment Portfolio

The report dated April 10, 1968, as submitted to the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees by Vice President Gordon B. Carson pertaining to the University's Investment Portfolio, was received and ordered to be filed with the official records of the Board of Trustees.

IX. REPORTS (continued)

B. Highlights of University Activities

President Fawcett reported to the Board on some of the significant activities that have taken place in recent weeks and honors that have been received by faculty and staff members of the University. Some references included in the report, which is filed with the official records of the Secretary, were as follows:

- The University is one of six institutions in the nation selected by the National Academy of Engineering to find improved ways of putting modern technology to work in the enhancement of biomedical research and health care. The study will be conducted jointly by the Departments of Electrical Engineering and Medicine in cooperation with Battelle Memorial Institute under a contract from the academy.
- Contract research administered by the Research Foundation totaled \$15,717,594.00 for the 1967 fiscal year. A total of 3,457 persons worked on research projects and 81 of the University's schools, departments, bureaus, and institutes conducted sponsored research.
- 3. The first land-vertebrate fossil found in Antarctica--a 2 1/2-inch piece of jaw bone--may provide a clue to the origin of Southern Hemisphere continents. The bone was discovered last December by a geology team from Ohio State's Institute of Polar Studies under a grant from the National Science Foundation. The fossil bone is from an amphibian that lived about 200 million years ago.
- 4. A national study of the changing role of home economics education-urging a shift from a rural emphasis to one more concerned with urban
 problems--includes recommendations already put into effect at Ohio
 State. The study was commissioned by the Home Economics Division
 of the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges
 and was funded by the Carnegie Corporation.
- 5. A 15-pound sonic riveting machine which does the same work as the traditional, all-at-once, 10-ton blow has been developed by Ohio State welding engineers. The 20-inch-long, 15-horsepower device was developed in Ohio State's Sonic Research Laboratory under the direction of Dr. Robert C. McMaster, Regents' Professor, Departments of Welding Engineering and Electrical Engineering.
- 6. Physicians at 15 community hospitals in Ohio and West Virginia will be able to hold two-way discussions as well as see panelists on television via the Ohio Medical Education Network this month. WOSU-TV, the television outlet at Ohio State, is the key station for the network, originating all programs and providing quality control in engineering and production.
- The Ohio State chapter of Phi Beta Kappa has announced election of 102 new members. For the third consecutive year, the number elected was the largest in the history of Ohio State's chapter of the national scholastic honorary society.

IX. REPORTS (continued)

B. Highlights of University Activities (continued)

- 8. Students of satellite geodesy at Moscow University are using a textbook written by Professor Ivan I. Mueller of Ohio State's Department of Geodetic Science. It was published in the United States in 1964 and the Russian edition was issued last year by the Moscow publishing house, Mir. without permission, according to Dr. Mueller.
- 9. Honors to Faculty and Staff
 - a. Ruth H. Weimer, Associate Dean for Student Relations, will become President in 1969 of the National Association of Women Deans and Counselors.
 - b. Dean Harold A. Bolz of the College of Engineering has received the Citation of the Ohio Society of Professional Engineers, highest award presented by the organization.
 - c. Dr. William M. Boorstein, Assistant Professor of Metallurgical Engineering, and Dr. John B. Neuhardt, Assistant Professor of Industrial Engineering, were among 147 young engineering professors in the nation to receive National Science Foundation Research Initiation Grants. Such grants are awarded annually to encourage research by engineering faculty members who recently have received their doctoral degrees.

* *

President Fawcett noted that a group of students and others assembled on the Oval at noon on Wednesday, April 10, 1968, in what was publicized as a "rally" to press for what the spokesmen described as "student power." The President added that at the conclusion of the "rally" in the late afternoon, he (the President) received in his office three representatives of the group who presented their concerns which are under consideration by the administration of the University.

Thereupon the meeting adjourned and the members of the Board of Trustees and administrative officers of the University moved to the site where the first shovel of earth was turned to mark the beginning for the Humanities Center - Foreign Language Building. as Approved by the Faculty Council on March 12, 1968

Adopted by Board of Trustees April 11, 1968 (See page 562)



Rules for the University Faculty

On March 12, 1968, the Faculty Council approved the following Section 53.07 of the Rules for the University Faculty pertaining to student government as a substitution for Section 53.07 as printed in the January, 1968 edition of Rules for the University Faculty, subject to the adoption by the Board of Trustees. The detailed amendment to Rule 53.0701 is as underscored. Rules 53.0702 and 53.0703 were deleted since they are no longer applicable.

- 53.07. Student Government.
- 53.0701. Faculty Responsibility for Student Government.

Student government is the direct responsibility of the Council on Student Affairs, subject to the approval of the Faculty Council (see Rule 29.27). The Constitution of the Undergraduate Student Body and documents of a similar nature shall be published in the Student Handbook.

53.0705. Graduate Student Representation on University Committees.


Section 1. Each of the following Committees or Councils shall include in its membership one representative from the Council of Graduate Students: the Faculty Council, the Graduate Council, the Advisory Committee on Cultural Programs, the Committee on Academic Misconduct, the Library Council, the Ohio Union Council, and the University Scholarship and Loan Committee. Membership shall include the right to vote except on the Faculty Council and the Graduate Council.

Section 2. The Council of Graduate Students shall be responsible for selecting two nominees for each position and shall submit their names and vitae to the President who shall appoint one of the nominees for a term of one year.

53.09. Student Use of University Buildings.

Section 1. University facilities assigned to a student organization shall be used only for the usual activities of such student organization. If a student organization desires to use University facilities, which facilities have been assigned to the organization for purposes other than its usual activities, it shall request permission for such use from the Executive Dean for Admissions and Registrations in accordance with Rule 61.05.

Section 2. No student, group of students, or student organization may announce a meeting involving the use of University facilities or use University facilities for a meeting, unless permission for such use has been obtained from the Executive Dean for Admissions and Registrations in accordance with Rule 61.05.

The Memorandum of Agreement between The Ohio State University and The Ohio State University Research Foundation as amended, upon the recommendation of the U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare with the concurrence of the Office of the Attorney General of Ohio, is as follows: (The detailed amendments to the Memorandum of Agreement are as underscored.)

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University

Dear Sirs:

The Ohio State University Research Foundation has <u>accepted grants</u> and contracts with the sponsors and for the amounts set forth in the list attached hereto, for research to be conducted at the University. The <u>grants</u> and contracts listed will together produce a gross income of \$

In furtherance thereof:

- (1) The scope of each investigation shall be determined by consultation between the President of the University and the Executive Director of the Foundation.
- (2) Members of the faculty, other employees and students of the University and visitors in residence at the University will work upon or participate in a project only with the approval of and on terms satisfactory to the President of the University and the Executive Director of the Foundation.
- (3) The person or persons supervising each project will submit reports as may be required upon the progress of the project through or at the direction of the proper department chairman to the Executive Director of the Foundation.
- (4) The University will cause all discoveries, improvements and inventions resulting from a project to be assigned to the Foundation by the person or persons making such discoveries, improvements or inventions.
- (5) Upon the termination of each project, all notes, records and data resulting from or collected in the course of the project will belong to and be delivered to the Foundation although the University may, if it desires, retain a copy thereof.

The Foundation will:

- (1) Pay monthly to the University an amount equal to the aggregate compensation for work on each project of the members of the faculty and other employees of the University engaged on the project.
- (2) Procure and provide to the University necessary materials, supplies, apparatus and equipment, but the University may, with the specific approval in each instance of the Executive Director of the Foundation, procure them directly, in which event the Foundation will reimburse the University for their cost.


- (3) Arrange for necessary travel and other services for those engaged on a project.
- (4) Return to the University applicable indirect costs recovered from sponsors, less such amounts as are authorized by the University to meet Foundation operating and contingency costs.

The University will incur no other obligations or expense without the written approval of the Executive Director of the Foundation. All apparatus and equipment procured for a project by or at the expense of the Foundation, except that which pursuant to the Foundation's contract with the sponsor is the property of the sponsor, will, at the termination of the project, become the property of the University.

THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE ONE THOUSAND AND THIRTIETH MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Columbus, Ohio, April 30, 1968

Pursuant to Article I, Section 2, of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, the Board met upon the call of the Acting Chairman, John W. Bricker, in a special meeting on Tuesday, April 30, 1968.

Present: John W. Bricker, Acting Chairman, John G. Ketterer, Frederick E. Jones, Mervin B. France, James W. Shocknessy, and Don M. Hilliker.

* * *

The Acting Chairman, Mr. Bricker, opened the meeting with the following statement:

This special meeting was called to consider any action which might be taken in light of the tragic and illegal occupation of this Administration Building on Friday of last week. I wish to emphasize that this is a meeting of the Board of Trustees, it is not a hearing, and it is not subject to testimony or questions on the part of anyone except the members of the Board of Trustees. It is an open meeting complying with the laws of the State of Ohio. We are here for the purpose of considering two matters: (1) What shall be done with regard to those who violated their responsibilities as citizens and illegally trespassed upon this property to the infringement of the rights of others; and (2) to consider suggested rules and regulations to be presented by President Fawcett.

Let it be noted, Mr. Secretary, that a quorum of the Board is present for this meeting.

The Acting Chairman, Mr. Bricker, then called upon President Novice G. Fawcett to report on the events of last week.

President Fawcett responded as follows:

Mr. Chairman, I believe that the information regarding the incidents of last Friday have been well communicated not only in this community but throughout the state and beyond. There was, as you know, a take over of the area in the Office of Vice President Carson by persons who held as hostage three members of our staff for a considerable period of time and later illegally closed the doors of this building. This kind of lawlessness, in my view, cannot be condoned. I have stated many times that the University is now, as it has been in the past, and hopefully will be in the future, better prepared to preserve the orderly operation of the institution and to facilitate the work of all people who are committed to work within the framework of law and order. I have viewed the incidents of last Friday largely in terms of first protecting the lives and safety of people. I also considered the importance of the preservation of the property and the irreplaceable records in the building. These two concerns were successfully accomplished. I then directed my attention to the serious matter of reviewing the rules which govern our performance in such incidents of lawlessness in consultation with my administrative colleagues and faculty. I now come to this Board to seek its consultation in order that we might be certain of the wishes and desires of this Board.

At my direction, a series of rules for the University have been drafted with the hope that they will better facilitate the governing of our operation for the future. These rules are placed before you at this time. If you desire, I will review them in detail or as you have indicated you may refer them to a committee and not wish to take the time to consider them tonight. There are three rules--51.03 Rule on Group Disruption, 51.05 Rule on Individual Disruption, and 29.2725 University Committee on Discipline.

April 30, 1968 special meeting, Board of Trustees

These rules were before the University Faculty Council in a special session this afternoon and were approved unanimously. I have in the process of the preparation of the proposed rules consulted with a number of people and groups on this campus. It has not been possible to have copies of these proposed rules to you before this evening.

Senator Bricker commented as follows:

Mr. President, as I quickly survey these proposed rules I am certain that the University does now have adequate authority to prosecute any cases involving violation of law and the orderly operation of the University as involved in the incidents of last Friday. Further, if we were to act upon these proposed rules this evening, they would not apply to charges brought against persons engaged in the incidents of last Friday. For this reason, I desire to refer the proposed rules to a committee of this Board, if such a procedure meets with the approval of the Board here assembled. Might I ask for a show of hands regarding this question.

The Board by unanimous vote approved the appointment of a committee to review the proposed rules and the Acting Chairman appointed those members of the Board who are attorneys to serve on the committee; specifically, Mr. Ketterer, Mr. Shocknessy, and Mr. Bricker.

Mr. Bricker continued.

Mr. President, I do want to express on behalf of the Board a very keen appreciation for the support of the faculty of these proposed rules which support was unanimously expressed by the Faculty Council this afternoon. I want you to know also that there is an expression of confidence in the administration of this University that it will adequately and properly handle the violations which occurred in this building last Friday. This Board expresses similar appreciation to you personally Mr. President and to the members of the administration and members of the faculty for your proposing procedures that will adequately deal with violations of law and any efforts to interrupt the orderly operation of the University. You have our assurance that the rules which you have recommended will be reviewed promptly by the committee for the earliest possible action.

The Secretary was instructed to file a copy of the above-referred-to proposed rules with the records of the Board of Trustees.

Mr. Bricker continued,

I now place before the Board the question of the procedure in regard to the action which this Board should take in consideration of handling the cases of violation of law and order in this building last Friday. April 30, 1968 special meeting, Board of Trustees

Thereupon Mr. John G. Ketterer presented the following statement and resolution:

Mr. Chairman, I should like to address myself to the first point in the purpose of this meeting. I, therefore, offer the following resolution and move its adoption as further evidence of the support of this Board for the President and the administration of the University in respect to what occurred in this building last Friday. The resolution is as follows:

BE IT RESOLVED that the President and the administration be instructed to immediately make an investigation as to the conduct of all and every person who participated in the events of last Friday with the idea that after the investigation has been completed appropriate action can be taken so that any person involved will have an opportunity for a full and fair hearing and trial.

FURTHER that such action may result in such discipline as appears appropriate under the circumstances after such a hearing.

The motion on the above resolution was duly seconded and unanimously adopted by a roll call vote.

The Acting Chairman, Mr. Bricker, then said:

Mr. President by the adoption of this resolution you have the support of this Board now and in the future. There being no further business on the agenda of this special meeting, I now declare the meeting adjourned.

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, May 9, 1968, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: John W. Bricker, Vice Chairman, Bertram D. Thomas, John G. Ketterer, Frederick E. Jones, Mervin B. France, James W. Shocknessy, Don M. Hilliker, and William C. Safford.

Minutes of the last regular meeting (April 11, 1968) and the special meeting (April 30, 1968) were approved.

Mr. John W. Bricker, Vice Chairman of the Board of Trustees, presided in the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Stanley C. Allyn.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Degrees and Certificates Conferred--Spring Quarter Commencement

President Fawcett recommended that degrees and certificates be conferred at the Spring Quarter Commencement Convocation on June 7, 1968, to those students who have completed the requirements for their respective degrees and certificates and are recommended by the Faculty Council. The names of those awarded degrees and certificates will be included in the minutes of this meeting. (See Appendix VIII, page 635.)

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

B. Honorary Degrees

- Members of this Board have from time to time expressed an interest in conferring an honorary degree upon the Honorable James A. Rhodes, Governor of the State of Ohio. Pursuant to Section 3, Rule 11.05, and after consultation with the Faculty Advisory Committee to the President and the Board of Trustees, President Fawcett recommended that the honorary degree--Doctor of Laws--be conferred upon the Honorable James A. Rhodes at the June 7, 1968 Commencement.
- Pursuant to Rule 29.15 and the action of the Faculty Council on April 9, 1968, President Fawcett recommended that the honorary degrees as specified hereafter be conferred upon the following individuals:
 - Walter Cronkite, nationally recognized News Correspondent and Commentator - Doctor of Humane Letters
 - Weikko Heiskanen, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Geodetic Science - Doctor of Science
 - Lister Hill, United States Senator Doctor of Laws
 - Karl Schwartzwalder, Director of Research with the AC Spark Plug Division of General Motors Corporation - Doctor of Science

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

C. Distinguished Service Awards

Serving as a Committee on Distinguished Service Awards, the President's Cabinet has nominated for consideration by the Board of Trustees the following-named persons to receive the Distinguished Service Award at the August 30, 1968 Commencement. These awards are given in recognition of distinguished service to The Ohio State University and the awards are in accordance with action taken by the Board of Trustees in 1952.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

D. Revision of Rules 29, 15 and 53, 03 of Rules for the University Faculty

The Faculty Council on April 9, 1968 approved the following changes in the Rules for the University Faculty:

President Fawcett recommended that:

 The last sentence of Section 1, of Rule 53.03, be amended to read as follows:

For participation in a major activity (or for candidacy for participation in a major activity) these rules shall include a requirement that students involved not be on disciplinary probation.

(This amendment deletes the phrases "a 2.25 cumulative average" and "academic warning under Rule 47.05.")

2. The last sentence of Item "d" of Rule 29.15 be amended for the purpose of clarity and to avoid a question of possible conflict with the new Section 3 of Rule 11.05 which was approved by the Board of Trustees on April 11, 1968, which amendment shall read as follows:

However, no nominee shall be recommended for an honorary degree by the Faculty Council unless he has received the affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of the voting membership of the Council necessary to constitute a quorum.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote, and the Secretary was instructed to make said revisions in the Rules for the University Faculty.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

E. Naming of Building

Upon the proposal of Dean Harold A. Bolz, College of Engineering, and the chairman and faculty of the Department of Photography, President Fawcett recommended that the facility presently identified as the "Engineering Experiment Station," 156 West 19th Avenue, be renamed "Haskett Hall" in memory of the late Professor Frank Haskett, first professor and first chairman of Photography. The Department of Photography is now housed in this building.

This proposal has the concurrence of the President's Cabinet and is in accordance with the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

E. Change in Name and Description of the Michael Peppe Scholarship Fund

At the request of the principal donors and Michael Peppe, and with the approval of the Development Fund Board of Directors, President Fawcett recommended that the name and description of the Michael Peppe Scholarship Fund be changed to read as follows:

The Michael Peppe - Carl Wirthwein Scholarship Fund was established November 1, 1963, by gifts through the Development Fund in honor of Michael Peppe, Professor Emeritus of Physical Education and Head Swimming Coach from 1930 until his retirement in 1963; and in honor of Carl Wirthwein, who served as Assistant Swimming Coach from 1936 to 1967.

All gifts are to be invested in the University's Investment Portfolio, under the rules and regulations adopted by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, with the right to invest and reinvest as occasion dictates. The income is to be used for scholarships for students who become members of the University swimming or diving teams, upon the recommendations of the head swimming coach.

Should the need for these scholarships cease to exist or so diminish as to provide unused income, or should the swimming or diving teams cease to exist through any reorganization of the University, then the income may be used for any purpose whatsoever as determined by the Board of Trustees, with preference being given to scholarships for needy students.

(The amount deposited in this fund now totals \$12,135.00.)

F. Change in Name of Emil H. Arnold Fund for Optometry

Dr. Emil H. Arnold, for whom an endowment fund in Optometry was named, died on April 7, 1968; and President Fawcett recommended, therefore, that the Emil H. Arnold Fund for Optometry be changed to the Emil H. Arnold Memorial Fund for Optometry.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. France, the acceptance of the foregoing grants, gifts, and royalties, the establishment of the above-named fund, the change in name and description of the above-identified fund, and the change in name for the foregoing specified fund were approved by unanimous voice vote, and the Secretary was instructed to include the report in the minutes of this meeting.

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At the request of the Vice President for Business and Finance, President Fawcett recommended that the plans and specifications, bills of materials, and estimates of cost for the following project be approved by the Board of Trustees:

A. Derby Hall Computer Facility

This project involves complete renovation of existing space immediately west of the present computer room to essentially triple the total computer room floor area.

Funds for this project will be provided by a transfer from Budget Account 189999 (General Reserve) to Budget Account 801158 (Construction Account for Derby Hall Computer Facility).

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Jones, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote, and the Secretary was authorized and directed to sign the plans and specifications for the above projects for and on behalf of the Board of Trustees. Vice President Carson was directed to proceed with a request for bids in the normal University manner and if satisfactory bids are received, to proceed with the award of contracts. All action regarding this matter will be reported to the Board of Trustees at a later meeting.

A. Student Health Facility - Architect's Contract Supplement

The employment of the firm of Freshwater, Harrison and Associates, was approved at the February 10, 1967, meeting of the Board of Trustees, based on the standard fee schedule. The subsequent decision to maintain the Service Road necessitated a complete redesign of the main entrance, including a porch, exterior stairs and ramp. This was work not covered by the original contract.

President Fawcett therefore recommended that the architects be reimbursed for this work at a fee not to exceed \$1,608.31. Funds are available in Budget Account 801066.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

B. Acquisition of Property, Rear of 3505 West Granville Road

Pursuant to action taken by the Board of Trustees on December 10, 1964, relative to the purchase of property in the Don Scott Field area, the following resolution was presented with a recommendation that it be adopted:

WHEREAS, The Ohio State University Board of Trustees authorized on December 10, 1964, the investment in real property in the University Airport area: and

WHEREAS, pursuant to that authority, an agreement has been negotiated to purchase 7.57 \pm acres located at the rear of 3505 West Granville Road, Worthington, Ohio, from Nancy M. (Delewese) Fridd et al; and

WHEREAS, said purchase has now been negotiated in accordance with said authorization;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University authorize the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance to proceed to execute the necessary documents to complete the purchase of the above property as a part of the Investment Portfolio.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above resolution was adopted unanimously by roll call vote.

C. Naval Science - Air Condition Physical Education Building (1940 Addition)

With the concurrence of the President's Cabinet, President Fawcett recommended that the Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to proceed with air conditioning and minor remodeling of the space in the Physical Education Building, 1940 Addition, which space is assigned to the Naval Science Department of instruction.

The cost of the project is not to exceed \$35,000.00 from available funds in the Civilian-Military portion of the Mershon Fund allocated for the 1967-68 budget. Said funds will be transferred to Budget Account 801161 for this project.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

D. Midwestern Volkswagen Hangar at University Airport

With the concurrence of the President's Cabinet, President Fawcett recommended that the Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to proceed with negotiations for the construction of a hangar at University Airport by Midwestern Volkswagen Corporation, which agreement shall protect the interests of the University and provide the University with an enhancement of the program of teaching, research, and service of the Department of Aviation. The proposed facility will revert to the University at the end of a fifteen-year period.

D. Midwestern Volkswagen Hangar at University Airport (continued)

Mr. France moved and Mr. Jones seconded the motion that the Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to proceed with negotiations for an agreement to be signed by the Midwestern Volkswagen Corporation and the University, subject to approval by the Board of Trustees at a future date.

During the ensuing discussion, Mr. Shocknessy indicated that it was his understanding that the proposed facility is to be used by the Midwestern Volkswagen Corporation for 15 years free of rent and that at the end of that period the University will have the enjoyment of the hangar. He further stated that Vice President Carson should make certain that the benefit which the University is to receive at the end of 15 years should be equivalent to the rent that the University would receive for the use of such a facility for that period of time. It must be ascertained also that this contractor (Midwestern Volkswagen Corporation) will not derive unconscionable advantage over others similarly situated.

Upon roll call vote, the above motion was approved unanimously.

E. Dormitory Room and Board Rates

WHEREAS, by Section 8 of the Bond Resolution adopted April 8, 1957, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, the University and its Board of Trustees covenanted to adopt and maintain, so long as any of the bonds authorized by the Bond Resolution were outstanding such parietal rules, and charge and collect such rental rates and charges, from time to time, as may be necessary to assure such occupancy and use of, and receipts from the dormitory facilities as will pay the cost of maintenance and operation and provide for the payment of principal of and interest on the bonds and other payment to special funds required by Section 9 of the Bond Resolution; and

WHEREAS, the rates set forth below are hereby determined to be in compliance with the aforesaid covenants; and

WHEREAS, on June 1, 1967, the minimum wage was increased from \$1.33 to \$1.40 per hour and increased again on July 1, 1967, to \$1.54; and

WHEREAS, House Bill 93 mandated an increase of one step plus an additional 10 per cent for those who were not in old Step 5, and a 10 per cent increase for all others; and

WHEREAS, effective June 3, 1968, certain workers were granted an increase; and

WHEREAS, on July 1, 1968, all workers will receive another increase of approximately 5 per cent; and

WHEREAS, on November 4, 1968, custodial workers will have a wage increase approximating 15 per cent and craftsmen a wage increase approximating 10 per cent;

E. Dormitory Room and Board Rates (continued)

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that dormitory fees beginning Autumn Quarter, 1968, and continuing through the school year 1969, be established at \$969.00 for all students whose continuous residence in University Residence Halls is six quarters or less. Beginning the 7th quarter and continuing through the 9th quarter of continuous residence the rate shall be \$939.00. Beginning with the 10th quarter of continuous residence, the rate shall be \$912.00. All rates thus established here are for the three academic quarters—Autumn, Winter, and Spring. For the purpose of determining continuous occupancy, Summer Quarters are excluded.

Rates stated do not apply to Stadium Scholarship Dormitory, Neil Hall, Jones Graduate Tower, and Married Student Housing.

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Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

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President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of John Clinton Prior, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Civil Engineering; Alpheus Wilson Smith, Dean Emeritus of the Graduate School and Professor Emeritus in the Department of Physics; Inez LeSuer Prudent, Professor in the School of Home Economics; and Howard Landis Bevis, President Emeritus of The Ohio State University. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

A. John Clinton Prior

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on April 2, 1968, of John Clinton Prior, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Civil Engineering.

Professor John Clinton Prior was born in Buckhorn Furnace, Lawrence County, Ohio, on December 23, 1883, the son of a clergyman. He was educated at Doane Academy and Denison University from which he received a bachelor's degree in 1906, having taken all the courses in civil engineering available in the general scientific course. Subsequently, he took advanced courses in engineering at The Ohio State University; and in 1929, he was granted the professional degree of Civil Engineer following waiver of the requirement that a candidate be a graduate of The Ohio State University.

Following graduation from college, Professor Prior held for nine years various positions of increasing responsibility with the Engineering Department of the City of Columbus. His work was devoted chiefly to flood control and to structures for grade separations. This was followed by two years of flood-control work with the Franklin County Conservancy District, after which he was associated with the consulting firm of Braun, Fleming, Knollman & Prior of Columbus. In 1923, he became associated with the Columbus

Department of Water and directed phases of the expansion and extension of its services, continuing in that capacity until 1932.

In 1924, he received a part-time appointment at The Ohio State University as Professor of Municipal Engineering; and in 1926, his title was changed to Professor of Sanitary Engineering. He held this post until his retirement from the University in 1954. Professor Prior engaged in varied consulting work and public service until 1951.

Among his activities were membership on the Columbus Planning Commission (1936-47) and the Board of Inquiry of the Ohio Department of Highways (1937-38). He was held in high regard by all his associates because of his great dignity, equanimity, and objectivity. His teaching was strongly benefited by his wealth of practical experience.

Professor Prior was a member of the American Water Works Association, the American Geophysical Union, the American Society for Engineering Education, and the American Society of Civil Engineers. He served as President of the latter Society's Central Ohio Section in 1936. He was active on several professional committees and wrote a number of technical articles for engineering journals.

Professor Prior continued active in engineering work for a few years after his retirement from The Ohio State University. Even after he became a resident of First Community Village, his energy impelled him to serve as Mayor of that settlement in 1964.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

B. Alpheus Wilson Smith

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on April 18, 1968, of Alpheus W. Smith, Dean Emeritus of the Graduate School and Professor Emeritus in the Department of Physics.

Dr. Smith was born in Phillippi, West Virginia, on January 15, 1876, and received his Bachelor's degree from West Virginia University in 1900 and his Master's and Doctor of Philosophy degrees from Harvard in 1903 and 1906. He served as Instructor of Science and Latin at the West Liberty Normal School in West Virginia in 1900-1901, Instructor of Physics at Bowdoin College in 1906, Haverford College in 1906-1907, and the University of Wisconsin in 1907-1909.

Dr. Smith joined the faculty of The Ohio State University in 1909 as Assistant Professor in the Department of Physics and held this rank until 1917 when he was made a Professor. He held the academic rank of Professor until his retirement in 1946. Dr. Smith served as Chairman of the

Department of Physics and Astronomy from 1926 to 1946 and was, in addition, appointed as Dean of the Graduate School for the period from 1938 to 1946. After his retirement, Dr. Smith served as President of The Ohio State University Research Foundation from 1946 to 1957.

Dr. Smith is generally credited with doing more than any other individual to establish the University as a major research center. A citation he received upon his retirement stated: "Dean Smith's statesmanship has brought the Graduate School to a position of national and international recognition. The radiation laboratory, the cryogenic laboratory, the graduate programs in medicine and surgery, and the integrated cooperation with other schools are but a few examples of his accomplishments."

Dr. Smith was a Fellow of the American Physical Society, the Academy of Optometry, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and the Ohio Academy of Science. He was a member of Sigma Chi, Sigma Xi, and Phi Beta Kappa fraternities. Recognition of his work came to Dr. Smith in the form of honorary degrees from Ohio Wesleyan University, Sc. D. in 1942; The Ohio State University, LL. D. in 1946; and Capital University, Sc. D. in 1949.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

C. Inez LeSuer Prudent

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the untimely death April 12, 1968, of Inez L. Prudent, Professor in the School of Home Economics.

Professor Prudent was born July 30, 1900, in Toledo, Ohio. She attended the public schools of Pana, Illinois, and graduated with honors from the University of Illinois. Her M.S. degree was from the University of Iowa and the Ph.D. degree in food and nutrition was completed at Iowa State University in 1947. Her rich background of professional experience included eight years of teaching science in the public schools of Illinois; serving as therapeutic dietitian in several hospitals; college teaching at Russell Sage College and the University of Illinois; and serving as nutritional specialist at West Virginia State University and Cornell University.

Professor Prudent joined The Ohio State University and the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center faculties in 1947 as Associate Professor and Head of Food and Nutrition in the School of Home Economics. She was promoted to the rank of Professor in 1956.

Professor Prudent was an excellent teacher and a recognized scholar in her field. Her major research interest was in the field of food science. Numerous publications attest to her competence and interest in the application of science in achieving good nutrition for people. She was active in many scientific societies including the American Chemical Society, American Association for the Advancement of Science, Institute of Food Technologists, Ohio Public Health Association, American Home Economics Association, and American Dietetic Association. She held membership in six honor societies including Phi Beta Kappa, Sigma Xi, Sigma Delta Epsilon, and Omicron Nu.

The loss of Professor Prudent will be keenly felt by her community, her professional associates, and especially by those many former students with whom she has kept in touch and who have continued to cherish her professional guidance and deep friendship.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Professor Prudent its deep sympathy. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a sincere expression of the Board's realization of the loss which the family has sustained.

D. Howard Landis Bevis

The Board of Trustees expresses its special sorrow at the death on April 24, 1968, in University Hospital, of Howard Landis Bevis, President of the University from February 1, 1940 to July 31, 1956, and President Emeritus since then.

Dr. Bevis was born November 19, 1885, in the village of Bevis, Hamilton County. His forebears were among the original settlers of that portion of the Northwest Territory. He first attended the Cincinnati Technical School and then the University of Cincinnati where he was awarded the B. A. degree in 1908 and the LL. B. degree in 1910. A decade later he attended the Harvard Law School as a graduate student where he received the degree of S. J. D., Doctor of Juridical Science, in 1920.

Following his admission to the Ohio Bar in 1910, he began the practice of law in the office of Judge Stanley Struble in Cincinnati. The next year he entered into a partnership with Nathan Isaacs which continued until 1912. Dr. Bevis then practiced law alone for six years until he entered the service in World War I. In that conflict, he served in several capacities in 1918-19 with the Ordnance Department and with what was to become the Army Air Service. In the former he codified its voluminous rules and orders that had accumulated during the war. Later he was made head of the legal section of the finance division of the Air Service for war contracts.

In 1921, he was named Professor of Law at the University of Cincinnati. During this period, he became greatly interested in Cincinnati's political problems and served in 1926 as Secretary of the Charter Amendment Committee there.

In 1931, Governor George White named Dr. Bevis State Director of Finance. His immediate but difficult problem was to reduce the general revenue budget for Ohio from \$86,000,000 to \$48,000,000 as "painlessly" as possible. It was during this trying economic period that Dr. Bevis first began to come into close touch with the administrative officers of the University of which in less than a decade, he was to be elected President.

In 1933, the Governor named Dr. Bevis to a vacancy on the Ohio Supreme Court where he served for eighteen months. He next accepted the Ziegler Professorship of Law and Government at Harvard and was on the faculties of its graduate schools of business and public administration; but at the request of the new Governor, Martin L. Davey, he postponed his departure for Cambridge in order to serve again as Finance Director of Ohio. He then filled the Chair at Harvard until called to The Ohio State University. He held memberships in the American, Ohio, and Cincinnati Bar Associations. He was the author or co-author of four books on law. He was also a contributor to various law and other journals. Among many other organizations, he was a member of Phi Beta Kappa and the Order of the Coif.

Inevitably Dr. Bevis played many other roles during his long public career. In 1932-33, he was on the Ohio Relief Commission. In 1942-45, he was Chairman of the Franklin County War Finance Committee and two years later served as Vice Chairman of the Labor Legislation Commission. For a decade, he was President of the Inter-University Council of Ohio. One of his most important assignments came in 1955 when President Dwight D. Eisenhower appointed him Chairman of the President's Commission on Scientists and Engineers. During his four-year service in this capacity, he traveled 75,000 miles in the interest of increasing the number of U. S. scientists and engineers. He was for years Director of the City National Bank & Trust Co., Columbus, and of the Federal Home Loan Bank, Cincinnati, of which he was Chairman.

Over a period of eighteen years, he was the recipient of thirteen honorary degrees: eleven LL.D.'s, an L.H.D., and a D.Hum. One of the first to honor him was his alma mater, the University of Cincinnati, in 1940, with an LL.D. The Ohio State University on August 31, 1956, conferred upon him an LL.D. degree.

Along the way, Dr. Bevis collected other significant honors. For his address, "Quo Vadis?" delivered at the June, 1950 commencement, he received a Freedoms Foundation Award. In 1954, Temple Israel of Columbus gave him its sixth annual Brotherhood citation for the "example of leadership that he has given the community in general and the campus

community of The Ohio State University in particular, setting a standard of service unlimited by considerations of race or creed." He was also active in Masonry where he was elected to the 33rd degree. He was active in educational circles, especially the Association of Land-Grant Colleges and Universities, the National Association of State Universities, and the Ohio College Association. He played a significant role, as noted, in the development of the Inter-University Council of Ohio, which, for the first time, brought Ohio's six state-supported universities permanently together. He was its second President and served for some years in that capacity.

Dr. Bevis assumed the Presidency of The Ohio State University at a significant and critical time. He was the University's seventh President, and his tenure of exactly sixteen and a half years was the second longest in the University's history. In that time, it went through these major stages: preparation for war, conversion to war with the entire campus on an accelerated basis, and as early as 1942-43 beginning to plan for reconversion to peace in anticipation of unprecedented enrollment with accompanying record demands upon it for curricula and facilities. From the time of Dr. Bevis' arrival on the campus, major changes affecting the University occurred. One was the implementation of the Faculty Council. This updated the internal structure of the University and made it more responsive to the needs of the times. Another was an early staff and line reorganization in which the number of Vice Presidents went from one to three, with other non-teaching functions realigned or spelled out so as to make the administration of the University more effective.

Steps were taken promptly also to "improve the effectiveness of the entire University program"--teaching, research, administration, and public service. The role of the University Research Foundation was expanded greatly. This was of particular importance when the University began to get defense contracts that ran into the millions of dollars. Some of these played a substantial part in the war effort, including aspects of the atomic bomb.

With the attack on Pearl Harbor, the University was more ready than many other universities to shift to a wartime basis. The academic program was accelerated with important defense activities such as the Navy Recognition School, the Army Specialized Training Program, the Specialized Training, Assignment, and Reclassification program, and special Navy programs. The number of men from the Armed Forces sent to the campus ran into the thousands.

Dr. Bevis' reaction to Pearl Harbor was characteristic. He put the University's machinery into wartime gear. He discussed the emergency situation at separate meetings of the students and faculty and used the facilities of WOSU to reach the parents of students. He realized that many students would soon enter active service; but in the meantime, he urged them to stay in school until called on the ground that the better prepared they were the better off they would be.

During the war years, he saw the enrollment shrink from 17,568 in 1940-41 to a low of 6,057 in the Spring Quarter, 1944. It was estimated that up to 18,000 alumni and former students served in the Armed Forces. The University Honor Roll of war dead totaled 699. To the next of kin in each case the University sent a memorial scroll over Dr. Bevis' signature.

With the end of the war, the University entered upon a period of major readjustment and reconversion. Even before this, Dr. Bevis realized that peace would bring new problems of unprecedented dimension. In this conviction, he was quickly borne out by the size of the veterans! "bulge," by major housing problems, by the immediate need for a larger faculty and staff and, above all, for funds to meet the emergency. In some cases, temporary relief was given, but in the main Dr. Bevis strove for longrange solutions to meet the demands of the new day.

Out of this in time grew all sorts of improvements--academic, administrative, and physical. Above all he was insistent upon maintaining and improving the quality of the teaching staff and of tailoring the academic program to the specific needs of the thousands of returning veterans. Within a few years, under his leadership and guidance, came such major improvements as the new multi-million dollar University Hospital, the beginnings of a major dormitory program, many new academic buildings, and ultimately a new Ohio Union, Mershon Auditorium, St. John Arena, and French Field House to meet the almost desperate need for adequate, modern, non-academic facilities.

In time the veterans! "bulge" receded, the enrollment shrank and some felt that the University could get along with less--a smaller staff and smaller appropriations. But Dr. Bevis predicted correctly that the University must work steadily to improve its faculty, to raise the quality of its offerings, to expand its service to the state, to enlarge its research program and, in particular, to enhance its position as a leader in graduate and professional work. Time proved him right in all of these respects, and before he retired from the Presidency, much of what he had striven for had become reality.

Over his years in that office, he frequently expressed his philosophy of higher education and, at the same time, disclosed his personal beliefs. In retrospect, it was remarkable how often he correctly assessed the state of the University at the moment or predicted its course in the near future. At the annual Trustees' meeting in September, 1945, for example, he gave a "Survey of Prospects and Needs" and a year later, similarly, presented detailed "Suggestions for Long Range Plans for Ohio State University." In his annual report covering 1947-48 he called it "A Year of Fruition." At the Autumn Quarter, 1949 faculty meeting, he spoke on "The Mission of the University." At the June, 1951 Board meeting, he reported on "Ohio State in 1951." Again at the 1952 annual meeting of the Trustees, he gave a "State of the University" report and did likewise in December, 1953.

VIII. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM (continued)

D. Howard Landis Bevis (continued)

One of his most notable utterances was in the peroration of his inaugural address in October, 1940. "For us who cherish the civilization wrought by the champions of free spirits and free minds," he declared, "events now making may strike the hour of destiny. In that civilization I was bred, in it I want to live. In my firm belief its perpetuation depends on faith and knowledge, faith to keep us facing to the mark though mists obscure and mountains rise between; knowledge to implement that faith and multiply our powers. To that end I would dedicate myself. To that goal I would point this university."

It was significant that he repeated these exact sentiments in closing his address to the June, 1956 graduating class when he spoke on "Around the Next Corner." He emphasized that people "become a source of strength and power to our nation, only when they are trained, trained to transmute the resources of the land we now possess into more and more and better and better things. In the material sense, this is the mission of the University. Changing the old adage, we can say with almost literal truth: where there are no universities the people perish. Upon its colleges and universities rests the future of America."

Dr. Bevis noted that in his time, between 1940 and 1956, the value of the physical plant grew from \$23.5 million to \$85 million. In two decades, he added, "Our research has multiplied more than fifty times. Our graduate work is taking high rank in the nation. Our distinctive position as a regional center of graduate work, professional work and research is fast becoming a reality." But he intimated that it was still only beginning.

In February, 1950, he and Mrs. Bevis were the guests of honor at a dinner given by the Trustees who presented him with an illuminated scroll. This document summed up the accomplishments of his first decade as President, "Assuming office in a period of national economic distress," it read, "he has guided the University through challenges of the post-war demands upon higher education. He has enhanced its faculty, he has transformed its physical plant, and he has created an atmosphere in which teaching and scholarship have flourished. In a period of international confusion, he has been sure of direction and purpose; in the midst of hostilities he has maintained a humane sympathy and tolerant understanding; in a time of uncertainty and perplexity in the educational world, he has kept his poise in wise leadership."

A Board resolution about him in June, 1956 expressed "sincere appreciation for the invaluable services which have been rendered to The Ohio State University over the period of the last seventeen years. Under his leadership this great institution of learning has grown and prospered. As was said of Christopher Wren, if we seek a lasting monument to his work we have only to look around us. He has served us well in both war and peace. We hereby extend our heartfelt thanks and every good wish in the years that lie ahead."

VIII. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM (continued)

D. Howard Landis Bevis (continued)

Unquestionably Howard Landis Bevis left an enduring mark upon the University. This can, indeed, be seen everywhere, not only in brick and stone but in his impress upon the minds and lives of those who served with him and under him. This makes for a kind of irreducible debt to him.

Dr. Bevis was a modest man, invariably patient, tolerant and understanding. He was also a religious man, a fact borne out by his frequent references to the Scriptures as well as by his life. He was likewise a man who all his days gave of himself unselfishly and unobtrusively for his fellowmen. Nowhere did he practice this more generously or more productively than during his Presidency.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

IX. REPORTS

A. Report on the Physical Condition of University Hall

Vice President Carson upon the request of President Fawcett presented the following report on the physical condition of University Hall:

Dr. Carson stated that on April 19, 1968, a report was received that Room 405C of University Hall had developed a floor bulge. An immediate investigation was made and the engineering firm, Jones-Stuckey Ltd., was employed to make a thorough examination of the structure of the north wing of the building in which the auditorium, classrooms, and offices are located.

A report from Jones-Stuckey Ltd. received on April 29 is summarized as follows: ". . . Failure in these trusses could result in catastrophic collapse of the entire north wing. This condition casts sufficient doubt on the structural integrity of the north wing to consider it unsafe."

Immediate action was taken to abandon all activity in the north wing of the building which includes the auditorium. Vice President Carson concluded with the statement that "Evidence of continuing deterioration in the structural integrity of University Hall presents a serious problem which demands attention."

IX. REPORTS (continued)

A. Report on the Physical Condition of University Hall (continued)

Dr. Bertram D. Thomas then stated, "One thing we should never temporize with is safety." He added that "Since I have been on this Board, the question of what to do with University Hall has been discussed frequently. I recognize that there is much sentiment for the building. However, I understand fully that this Board in its fundamental responsibility for safety cannot afford to continue on the basis of sentimentality."

Dr. Thomas presented the motion instructing the University administrative officials to move toward the abandonment of the entire University Hall facility as soon as such abandonment can be conveniently arranged.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Shocknessy and adopted unanimously by roll call vote.

President Fawcett commented that "University Hall is located in a critical position on the campus since it houses several of the basic education departments of instruction in the areas of the humanities and social sciences. We must restore the academic space in this area at the earliest possible moment because of the need for faculty and students of these departments to have close access to the University library." He added that "The estimated cost to replace the space provided by University Hall is \$5 million."

B. Report from the Office of the Ohio Board of Regents

President Fawcett reported for information and the record that the Office of the Ohio Board of Regents:

- 1. Authorized the allocation of \$165,000.00 to The Ohio State University for the following projects for the summer of 1968:
 - a. Workshop for Master Teachers in Inner-City Schools
 - b. Institute for University Faculty on Education of the Disadvantaged
 - Governor's Invitational Conference on Skilled and Technical Manpower
- 2. At its meeting on April 19, 1968, the request for the increase of the Student Service Fee for The Ohio State University in the amount of \$5.00 per quarter, as approved by the Board of Trustees on March 14, 1968, was tabled for reconsideration at a later time when student enrollments for 1968-69 will be known.

IX. REPORTS (continued)

C. Report on the Status of Dr. David E. Green, Assistant Professor in the Department of History

The President stated,

There has been wide public interest both on and off the campus in the David E. Green case involving the alleged burning of a draft card and other matters related thereto. This matter is under careful investigation by the University. The case has never been closed and some new evidence related to this matter has now come to our attention.

The investigation is being carried forth under the rules and regulations of the University.

I will make a full report on this matter, including a recommendation, at the June meeting of the Board.

D. Report on the Friday, April 26, 1968, "Seizure" of the Administration Building

President Fawcett reported that in regard to the "seizure" of the Administration Building on Friday, April 26, 1968, "We are proceeding in accord with the direction of this Board and with the rules of the University." He stated further that "Steps have been taken to implement procedures for hearing the cases of those persons charged with violations of University rules and for the assessment of discipline of students found guilty. There has been some question regarding these hearings being closed to the general public. They are not open to the general public for reasons of protecting the individual students whose cases are being heard and this policy is one that has been firmly established by this University. I am advised by Executive Dean Bonner that this is the policy of major universities of the country. As soon as the hearings are completed, the public will be informed of any action taken."



The Recipients of Honors

JAMES A. RHODES

DOCTOR OF LAWS

Governor of Ohio, dynamic public administrator, friend of education, whose creative leadership is transforming a plan for progress into a reality of history.

James A. Rhodes, sixty-first Governor of Ohio, has made the strengthening of public higher education one of the paramount missions of his administration. His goal of providing educational opportunities for all Ohio's young people to the extent of their abilities has been in the true spirit of the land-grant ideal upon which The Ohio State University was founded. Under the leadership of Governor Rhodes, the State system of higher education has been extended to the doorstep of virtually every college-age youth in Ohio, and the long-established State universities have received new levels of support to help meet the new levels of service required.

Throughout his public life—as Auditor and Mayor of Columbus, as Auditor of State, and now as Governor—James A. Rhodes has kept in touch with the times and with the people he has served. And the people have responded affirmatively to this hard-working public servant who, with sleeves rolled up, has confronted the challenges of a major industrial state and has maintained, as well, an effective partnership with the grass-roots citizenry of Ohio.

LYMAN S. FORD

DOCTOR OF HUMANE LETTERS

Social welfare administrator, who has given distinguished leadership to the planning and funding of voluntary social services in the United States and Canada

Lyman S. Ford, Executive Director of the United Community Funds and Councils of America, is a leader and researcher in his chosen field of community welfare organization. For 36 years he has devoted his managerial efforts toward the development and improvement of the voluntary health and welfare system. Recently he joined with leaders of the Federal Government, business, and labor on matters of collaboration between government and voluntary agencies in the solution of basic social welfare problems.

Mr. Ford received his A.B. degree from Denison University in 1931. He began his professional education at The Ohio State University in 1931 and completed the degree of M.A. in Social Administration in 1937.

His social work career began as Public Relations Director at the Columbus, Ohio, Community Fund and Council of Social Agencies. He moved quickly to Executive Secretary of the Community Chest of Kansas City, Kansas, and five years later to a similar position at Evanston, Illinois. In 1942, he joined the staff of United Community Funds and Councils of America as Director of Health and Welfare Planning. In 1960, he became its Executive Director.

During his eight years as Director, Mr. Ford has had a prominent role in the transition of the Council movement in America from a service-oriented to a community problem-centered approach; in the development of uniform accounting and service reporting systems for voluntary agencies, Funds, and Councils; in the inauguration of the United Health Foundation and its research and service to local health foundations; and in the preservation and strengthening of the concept of voluntarism.

Mr. Ford has contributed a number of articles to health and welfare publications and to the *Encyclopedia of Social Work*. He has served on the boards of five related national social welfare organizations. He is a member of the Board of Trustees of Denison University, and in 1953, Denison awarded him the Alumni Citation for Distinguished Service.

His imagination and vision have been instrumental in prodding the established voluntary agencies into evaluating their roles in working cooperatively with government agencies at all levels in helping to solve the massive problems of poverty and social change. His leadership is a dynamic force in the major voluntary health and welfare organization in the country.

WALTER CRONKITE

DOCTOR OF HUMANE LETTERS

Outstanding journalist, champion of the public's right to be informed, a man of rare conscience, perception, and courage, whose influence in today's world is beyond measure

The name of Walter Cronkite is so well known throughout this country that any identification is superfluous. As Managing Editor of CBS Evening News as well as reporter and anchor man for special broadcasts on a wide variety of subjects, he has been called "the single most convincing and authoritative figure in TV news." His significant contributions have fostered interest in and understanding of history by the American people through such programs as "Eyewitness to History," "The Twentieth Century," and "The Twenty-first Century."

In addition to the fact that he reaches more people on a regular basis than perhaps any other man in America, Mr. Cronkite also demonstrates a continuing concern for and questioning of the proper role of television in a mass society dominated by mass media. He has been a leader in examining the public responsibility of both commercial and non-commercial public affairs broadcasting and in re-defining the respective responsibilities of print and electronic media.

Mr. Cronkite has also been a leading spokesman for professionalism in American television newscasting. He has advocated special training for television reporters that they might gain a more highly developed news sense, a more disciplined news judgment, and a stronger commitment to responsible and autonomous public affairs broadcasting.

Less well known is Mr. Cronkite's participation in the behind-thescenes struggles in the early days of television journalism to establish and maintain the autonomy and integrity of television newscasting. His efforts then and throughout his career have demonstrated his dedication to the right of the public to know and to be informed.

Today, Walter Cronkite stands at the top among television's news figures. More than a superlative working reporter and journalist, he is a news policy maker of substantial importance who has reached beyond the television industry to the broader arena of mass decision-making and influence.

A man of conscience and rare perception, Walter Cronkite is a symbol of decency and a model of intelligent reporting. His professional ethics and achievements have become a standard of excellence for today's aspiring journalists. He has raised the level of American journalism significantly. The nation is richer for his presence and his influence.

HENRY CHAUNCEY

DOCTOR OF LAWS

Educator and administrator, whose pre-eminent contributions to the field of educational testing have enriched education at all levels, both in this country and abroad

Henry Chauncey, President of Educational Testing Service, is known and respected in educational circles throughout the world as an imaginative and effective leader in the field of educational testing. Mr. Chauncey has guided the development of that organization from its modest beginnings in 1948 to the present. Literally every college and university in this country and many in foreign lands have benefited from the work of ETS. Through the Graduate Record Examinations, through its research in learning theory, through its institutional evaluation service, through its sponsorship of Educational Services, Inc. (now part of the Educational Development Center), and in many other ways, Educational Testing Service has been a strong force for quality and innovation in higher education. To Henry Chauncey, the distinguished President of this remarkable organization, must go a large part of the credit.

A native of Brooklyn, New York, Mr. Chauncey began his lifetime association with higher education as a freshman at The Ohio State University in 1923. He received his A.B. degree from Harvard College in 1928, and did post-baccalaureate work in the Harvard Graduate School of Arts and Sciences in 1929-31.

Prior to becoming the first President of ETS in 1948, Mr. Chauncey served successively as a teacher of history at the William Penn Charter School (1927-29), Assistant Dean and later as Assistant to the Dean of the Faculty and Chairman of the Committee on Scholarships at Harvard College (1929-45), Assistant Director, Army-Navy College Qualifying Tests, College Entrance Examination Board (1943-45), Associate Secretary and Acting Executive Secretary of the College Entrance Examination Board (1945-46), and Director of the College Entrance Examination Board (1946-48).

Mr. Chauncey's intimate knowledge of educational problems and of the educational process has placed him in great demand as a member of numerous policy-making boards and committees. At the national level alone, his contributions have included the following: Member, Advisory Committee on Foreign Service Examinations, U.S. Department of State; member, Special Panel on Scientific Personnel, Scientific Manpower Commission; member, Education Panel, President's Service Advisory Committee; head, team of American educators to visit the Soviet Union, sponsored by the U.S. Office of Education under the Cultural Exchange Act.

In an uncommonly high degree, Henry Chauncey exemplifies the purposes and ideals of the university. The Ohio State University is honored today to honor him.

CLARENCE C. KELLER

BENJAMIN G. LAMME MEDAL

Prominent industrial leader and creative engineer

Clarence C. Keller, President and Chief Executive Officer of the Holophane Company, has made a career of brightening people's lives. He has led his company to the position of acknowledged leader in the manufacture of quality lighting equipment for industrial plants, schools, offices, and for street and other outdoor lighting. In 1929 Mr. Keller received the Bachelor of Electrical Engineering degree from The Ohio State University and the professional degree, Electrical Engineer, in 1936.

Joining the Holophane Company of Newark, Ohio, in 1929 as a test engineer, he was soon promoted to the position of Manager of Application Engineering and moved to New York City. He advanced through many positions in the sales department before being named President of the company in 1961. Under his direction, his firm has grown from one plant to seven and today also includes subsidiary companies in Ohio, Canada, Mexico, and England.

Throughout his professional career Mr. Keller has served in virtually every elective office of the Illuminating Engineering Society. He was chosen President of that society in 1966. He has served similarly in many capacities for the National Electrical Manufacturers Association, including Vice President and member of the Board of Governors.

ONE THOUSAND AND THIRTY-SECOND MEETING

OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Columbus, Ohio, June 13, 1968

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, June 13, 1968, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: John G. Ketterer, Acting Chairman, Frederick E. Jones, Mervin B. France, James W. Shocknessy, William C. Safford, and John H. Dunlap.

* *

The Acting Chairman, Mr. Ketterer, introduced the new member of the Board of Trustees, Mr. John H. Dunlap, Williamsport, Ohio, who was appointed by Governor James A. Rhodes, to succeed Mr. Stanley C. Allyn, for the term beginning May 14, 1968 and expiring May 13, 1977.

* * *

Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

As the senior member of the Board of Trustees present, Mr. John G. Ketterer served as Acting Chairman in the absence of the Chairman, Mr. John W. Bricker, who was not present because of illness, and in the absence of the Vice Chairman, Dr. Bertram D. Thomas, who was unable to attend because of a previous commitment.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Budgets for the 1968-1969 Fiscal Year

President Fawcett presented the following statement pertaining to the recommended budgets for the 1968-1969 fiscal year:

Each year the presentation to the Board of Trustees of the annual operating budget of The Ohio State University provides me with an opportunity to review briefly the past year and to project some new developments for the next. In a complex institution of the magnitude of Ohio State, often the central thrust of its programs is obscured by incidents that are more dramatic. In full perspective, however, the 1967-1968 academic year has been one of marked accomplishment, and the next one is, indeed, filled with promise.

The quality and effectiveness of our research effort continue to grow. The goal to establish chairs and professorships has been enlarged during the past several months with a number of significant gifts. Academic reorganization, one of the most massive efforts of a major university to organize itself better for the attainment of its objectives, has progressed since January 1, 1968, to the point that each of our new colleges has begun to function as a unit.

The budgets for 1968-1969 are in balance. They reflect the new academic reorganization and have been based upon academic plans developed by the new academic units. New programs specifically aimed at improving the quality of undergraduate education have been developed in several colleges--most notably the College of Biological Sciences and the College of Education.

The crucial task of utilizing technology in the instructional process has been approached through two major developments in 1967-1968. A new Office of Learning Resources to coordinate University efforts in this field has been established and the budgets for 1968-1969 reflect new unified plans for the future development of the University Libraries, the Listening Center, Telecommunications, Teaching Aids, Photography, and other related areas.

A second major resource addition is the new "Third Generation" computer to be installed during 1968-1969 in the Systems Engineering Building. Planning for the installation and utilization

of this equipment has been under way for several years, and the arrival of the "hardware" next year will provide the University with significant new capabilities in instruction and research.

The facilities of the University have been keeping pace with the growth in quality of the faculty and student body. The Office of Business and Finance and the Office of Campus Planning have dealt with construction and space problems throughout the year and have done so with significant success. Many units of the College of Engineering and the entire College of Pharmacy have occupied new facilities. While the capital needs of the University continue unabated, progress continues to be made. The budgets for 1968-1969 are designed to continue the academic growth of The Ohio State University in concert with the needs of the times.

With this background of information, President Fawcett presented for consideration by the Board of Trustees a continuation budget proposal involving all of the current budgets for the operation of The Ohio State University for the fiscal year 1968-1969:

The budgets for 1968-1969 for The Ohio State University represent the first complete budget document here based upon the new "program budgeting" technique. The methodology in use at Ohio State has proved highly successful and is being studied by a number of universities and state educational systems for possible adoption. The technique includes a statistical treatment based upon economic and work load factors to produce a "continuation budget" plus a qualitative analysis of proposals from each subdivision of the University to produce budgets for new and improved programs.

The total current funds budget for the University for 1968-1969 envisions expenditures of \$163,112,910.00. The estimated expenditures in 1967-1968 are \$144,849,450.00. The \$144,849,450.00 represents an increase of \$7,931,730.00 over the June 8, 1967 budget estimate of \$136,917,720.00. This increase is all in Restricted Funds and Auxiliary Operations in which expenditures are adjusted to reflect changes in income. Major changes were in the University Hospital (up \$5,205,000.00), Auxiliary Operations (up \$1,307,000.00), Dormitories (up \$1,625,000.00), Athletics (up \$81,000.00), Conferences (up \$25,000.00), Gifts and Grants (down \$520,000.00). The 1968-1969 expenditures include certain changes in accounting practices which now show Student Fee Waivers as an expense of \$3,390,000.00. Also included are new budgeted activities, such as the Development Fund and the Photography Laboratory in the amount of \$394, 300.00, and the total Student Services Budgets which include the amount of \$1,126,000.00 previously identified as Student Facilities account.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

A. Budgets for the 1968-1969 Fiscal Year (continued)

Therefore the estimated net increase in expenditures in 1968-1969 over 1967-1968 is \$13,353,160.00, or about 9.2%. These increases reflect mandated and other salary increases for nonfaculty staff, merit increases for faculty members which will increase average faculty salaries by slightly under six percent, and increased costs of supplies and equipment due to continued inflationary pressures. New and improved programs include new academic units in public administration, natural resources, and plant pathology; greatly expanded instruction and research computer capacity through the acquisition of "third-generation" equipment, and a variety of special programs to deal with educational problems in urban areas.

It is recommended that the following current expenditure budgets for the operation of The Ohio State University for the fiscal year 1968-1969 be approved:

It is recommended further that the supporting statements for the foregoing summary figures which have been previously reviewed by the Board of Trustees be approved, and that the Secretary be instructed to file these detailed budget statements for the fiscal year 1968-1969 with the official records of the University.

Finally, it is recommended that the President be authorized to adjust the expenditure estimates during the fiscal year with fluctuations in income, and report such adjustments to the Board of Trustees as may be required.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Dunlap, the Board of Trustees approved the said budget for the 1968-1969 fiscal year by unanimous roll call vote.

Budget for The Ohio State University Research Foundation for the 1968-1969 Fiscal Year

It is recommended that The Ohio State University Research Foundation annual budget for the fiscal year 1968-1969 be approved in an amount not to exceed \$1,050,104.00. This budget was approved by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Research Foundation at its annual meeting on April 26, 1968.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. France, The Ohio State University Research Foundation budget for 1968-1969 was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

B. Establishment of a School of Physical Education in the College of Education to Replace the Department of Physical Education

As a result of a comprehensive study conducted by a Faculty Advisory Committee on the Academic Organization and Relocation of the Department of Physical Education, it was recommended that a School of Physical Education be established in the College of Education, effective July 1, 1968, to replace the current Department of Physical Education. This recommendation was endorsed by the faculty of the College of Education on April 23, 1968, the Council on Academic Affairs on May 6, 1968, and the University Faculty Council on May 14, 1968.

The essential nature of the recommendation is that the Department of Physical Education be reorganized and established as a School with appropriate academic sub-units with provisions for the development of a single coordinated faculty which shall be responsible for teaching, research, and service in physical education, health education, and recreation. Although the Department of Physical Education has not been a direct administrative unit of the College of Education, there has been a close and long-term relationship with the College of Education through which all of the Department's curricula and course materials have been approved.

This recommendation is submitted to the Board of Trustees for approval in the belief that such a coordinated academic unit is essential for the longterm development of a viable physical education program within the University.

Upon motion of Mr. Dunlap, seconded by Mr. France, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

C. Change the Name of the Department of Air Science to the Department of Air Force Aerospace Studies

The Council on Academic Affairs approved a proposal and forwarded it to the Faculty Council for action on May 14, 1968, requesting that the name of the Department of Air Science be changed to the Department of Air Force Aerospace Studies, effective July 1, 1968. This request has been appropriately coordinated with the Department of Aeronautical and Astronautical Engineering of the College of Engineering.

It was recommended that the above action of the Faculty Council be approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. France, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by voice vote with five members voting affirmatively and one member voting negatively.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

D. Establishment of the "Earl M. Tilton Professorship in Mechanical Metallurgy"

President Fawcett indicated his great pleasure in recommending the establishment of the "Earl M. Tilton Professorship in Mechanical Metallurgy," in the Department of Metallurgical Engineering, effective for the 1968-1969 academic year. A gift in the amount of \$100,000.00, payable at the rate of \$10,000.00 each year for a period of ten years, has been committed by the Forging Industry Educational and Research Foundation of Cleveland, Ohio, in cooperation with Mr. David E. Tilton, Treasurer and General Manager, Columbus Forge and Iron Co., to establish this "Named Professorship" with the understanding that \$5,000.00 per year is designated for the salary of the "Tilton Professor" and an additional \$5,000.00 per year for support of his activities in mechanical metallurgy.

This "Named Professorship" is to honor Earl M. Tilton, President and Chairman of the Board of Columbus Forge and Iron Co., Columbus, Ohio, and is in accordance with the policy adopted by the Board of Trustees on January 14, 1965.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. France, the Board of Trustees by unanimous roll call vote approved the establishment of the "Earl M. Tilton Professorship in Mechanical Metallurgy."

E. Establishment of a Department of Anesthesiology

On June 4, 1968, the Faculty Council with the endorsement of the Council on Academic Affairs approved the proposal of the faculty of the College of Medicine that a Department of Anesthesiology be established, effective October 1, 1968.

As a result of the relationship of anesthesiology to the several academic departments within the College of Medicine, the establishment of this new department will provide a much greater degree of flexibility in relating the anesthesiology program across the entire structure of the College. The general objectives of the department include broadening the educational opportunities for all students in the health professions, developing broader research efforts, and maintaining the excellent patient care now provided in the present program.

It was recommended therefore that the Board of Trustees approve the proposal to establish a Department of Anesthesiology.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

F. Establishment of a Department of Computer and Information Science

At the request of the faculty in the area of Computer and Information Science and with the support of the faculty of the College of Engineering, the Council on Academic Affairs at its meeting on May 22, 1968, approved a proposal to establish the Department of Computer and Information Science in the College of Engineering, effective October 1, 1968. This proposal was subsequently approved by the Faculty Council on June 4, 1968.

This proposed new academic department will offer a broad spectrum of courses at the undergraduate and graduate degree levels in a well-defined academic endeavor which has become recognized internationally as an appropriate scientific discipline. The department will be staffed with full-time faculty holding regular appointments and will have the necessary qualifications to provide excellent instructional, research, and educational service programs in this rapidly developing discipline.

It was recommended therefore that the Board of Trustees approve the proposal of the Faculty Council to establish a Department of Computer and Information Science.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Jones, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

G. Change in Name of the Department of Photography to the Department of Photography and Cinema

On June 4, 1968, the Faculty Council, with the endorsement of the Council on Academic Affairs, approved the request from the College of Engineering that the Department of Photography be changed to the Department of Photography and Cinema.

The present designation does not reflect the full scope of the existing instructional, research, and professional programs. At the present time there are seventeen members of the faculty engaged in the area of motion picture (cinema) work and fourteen with still photography. These faculty members in presenting the six-year program goals for the department documented the need for including both photography and cinema in the department name if the department is to achieve academic and professional distinction at a national and international level.

It was recommended therefore that the Board of Trustees approve the proposed change in name of the Department of Photography to the Department of Photography and Cinema, effective July 1, 1968.

Upon motion of Mr. Dunlap, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

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II. PERSONNEL CHANGES

President Fawcett recommended that all personnel changes since the May 9, 1968 meeting of the Board, as recorded in the official "1967-68 Salary Roll" of the University and the personnel changes including promotions in rank as shown in the official "1968-69 Salary Roll" of the University, be approved by the Board. 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V. PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS

At the request of the Vice President for Business and Finance, President Fawcett recommended that the plans and specifications, bills of materials, and estimates of cost for the following projects be approved by the Board of Trustees.

A. Horticulture and Forestry Building, Partial Remodeling

This project will provide the remodeling of six classrooms in the old Horticulture and Forestry Building to accommodate teaching laboratories for anatomy and physiology programs of the College of Biological Sciences.

Funds for this project will be provided by a transfer from Budget Account 189999 (General Reserve) to Budget Account 801162 (Construction Account for Horticulture and Forestry Building, Partial Remodeling).

B. Street Repairs for 1968

This project will provide patching of several street areas, paving Neil Avenue from 17th Avenue to West Woodruff Avenue, and replacing the existing stone and concrete curbs with concrete curbing on the east side of Neil Avenue from a short distance south of 19th Avenue to West Woodruff Avenue.

Funds for this project will be provided from the 1968-1969 allocation to Budget Account 121658 (Contract Repair).

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote, and the Secretary was authorized and directed to sign the plans and specifications for the above projects for and on behalf of the Board of Trustees. Vice President Carson was directed to proceed with a request for bids in the normal University manner and if satisfactory bids are received, to proceed with the award of contracts. All action regarding this matter will be reported to the Board of Trustees at a later meeting.

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VII. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

A. Easement for Power Line and Telephone Line, Lane Avenue

The Columbus and Southern Ohio Electric Company and the Ohio Bell Telephone Company have requested an easement for their pole line across University lands. The pole line originally was in the right-of-way of Lane Avenue. In 1957 when Lane Avenue was realigned, the County vacated the old right-of-way to the University. The rights of the utilities located in the old right-of-way were omitted when the land was conveyed to the State of Ohio. These utility lines currently provide telephone and electric service to the west campus area and WOSU-TV.

President Fawcett recommended that the granting of a right-of-way easement to the Columbus and Southern Ohio Electric Company and the Ohio Bell Telephone Company be approved. It was further recommended that the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to request the Director of Public Works pursuant to his statutory duties to act on behalf of the University in developing the necessary legal instruments to provide for the easement.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. France, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

B. Means Hall Remodeling - Extension of Architects Contract

President Fawcett recommended that the McGee and Alberts contract for preliminary drawings and specifications for this project, approved by the Board of Trustees on December 14, 1967, be extended to provide basic drawings, working drawings, specifications, estimate of cost, and necessary bidding documents.

VII. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE (continued)

B. Means Hall Remodeling - Extension of Architects Contract (continued)

The award of contracts and complete supervision of construction are not included at this time, but it is understood that these additional services may be added in accordance with the fee established for this project, at the option of the University.

The fee for this service has been calculated at 9 per cent of the estimated construction cost less the fee for preliminary work or an estimated \$13,982.90 with funds to be provided from Budget Account 801139 (Means Hall Remodeling Construction Account).

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

C. <u>Health Sciences Information Center (Medical Center Library)</u> - Extension of Architects Contract

President Fawcett recommended that the C. Curtiss Inscho & Associates contract for the preparation of schematic studies and drawings for this project, approved by the Board of Trustees on July 13, 1967, be extended to provide architectural and engineering services including basic drawings, working drawings, specifications, estimate of cost and necessary bidding documents.

The award of contracts and complete supervision of construction are not included at this time, but it is understood that these additional services may be added in accordance with the standard fee schedule, at the option of the University.

The fee for this service will be calculated on the basis of 6 per cent of the first \$1,000,000, 5 1/2 per cent of the second \$1,000,000 and 5 per cent of \$1,540,000 of the estimated construction cost less the fee for preliminary work, or an estimated \$88,800.00. Funds will be provided from Item 059, H. B. 886, and an anticipated federal grant from the Public Health Service.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Jones, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

D. Laneview Area, Demolition of Buildings

Pursuant to the action of the Board of Trustees on March 14, 1968, the University is currently acquiring land east of Kenny Road, north of Lane Avenue, west of the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad and south of State of Ohio owned lands. This land is to be cleared for future University utilization in accordance with the master plan. It is proposed that the buildings on these properties be demolished as acquired.

VII. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE (continued)

D. Laneview Area, Demolition of Buildings (continued)

President Fawcett recommended therefore that authority be granted to demolish any and all structures on lots in this area as they are acquired. The demolition in each case shall be scheduled at the discretion of the Vice President for Business and Finance subject to Cabinet approval.

All demolitions of these buildings will be accomplished in the usual manner.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. France, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

E. 2637 Olentangy River Road (Hess Property), Demolition of Buildings

The State of Ohio (The Ohio State University) acquired the above property on August 1, 1932. The buildings have been reviewed by appropriate University officials and have been found to be of no value to the University. The land is to be cleared for future University utilization in accordance with a master plan. It is proposed that the buildings on this site be demolished.

President Fawcett recommended therefore that authority be granted to demolish all structures at 2637 Olentangy River Road.

All demolitions of these buildings will be accomplished in the usual manner.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. France, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

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VIII. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

A. Report on Fires in Lincoln and Morrill Towers and Resolutions in Memoriam for Students Whose Lives Were Lost

President Fawcett, with obvious sadness and deep concern, reported on the tragic fire which occurred in Lincoln Tower on May 22 which caused the death of two students from smoke inhalation. The President also reported on the fire in Morrill Tower on May 10. He reviewed in detail the investigative process which has been instituted under the direction of the Ohio State Fire Marshal with various other agencies cooperating. The President reported further that the investigation has culminated in the arrest of the suspected arsonist. He indicated that agencies involved in the investigation are in the process of drafting a full report of the findings which report will be presented to the Board of Trustees and released for public information. A copy of the President's statement is filed with the official records of the Board of Trustees.

VIII. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM (continued)

A. Report on Fires in Lincoln and Morrill Towers and Resolutions in Memoriam for Students Whose Lives Were Lost

Following the report on the fires, President Fawcett presented the following Resolutions in Memoriam for the two students whose lives were lost, and in accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be sent to the families of the deceased.

1. Retta Diane Foster

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on May 29, 1968, of Retta Diane Foster, a sophomore student in the Colleges of Arts and Sciences. Miss Foster lost her life as a result of the tragic fire in Lincoln Tower on May 22.

Retta Diane Foster was born in Halifax, England, on July 7, 1945. She was graduated from Cheyenne Mountain High School, Colorado Springs, Colorado, in 1963, attended Colorado Women's College, studied six months in Europe and attended Kent State University before entering The Ohio State University Autumn Quarter, 1967. In her three quarters Miss Foster performed well academically achieving a 3.0 cumulative point-hour ratio. She was a cooperative and loyal resident of Lincoln Tower and a member of Kappa Alpha Theta sorority.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

2. Pamela Sue Patterson

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on May 22, 1968, of Pamela Sue Patterson, a freshman student in the Colleges of Arts and Sciences. Miss Patterson was the victim of the tragic fire in Lincoln Tower on May 22, 1968.

Pamela Sue Patterson was born in Dayton, Ohio, on July 16, 1949, and was graduated from Milton Union High School in 1967. Miss Patterson entered The Ohio State University as a freshman Autumn Quarter, 1967, and was enrolled until the time of her death.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

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IX. REPORTS

A. Report on Action Taken by the Ohio Board of Regents at Its Meeting on May 17, 1968

President Fawcett reported for information and the record that the Ohio Board of Regents at its meeting on May 17, 1968:

The first ten Regents' Professors named above are renewals from 1967-68. Pursuant to the above action, The Ohio State University will receive a supplemental appropriation of State funds in the amount of \$120,000.00 to support the above Regents' Professorships.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the above report was accepted by unanimous voice vote.

B. Report on the Status of Dr. David E. Green, Assistant Professor in the Department of History

The President stated,

As a result of certain alleged actions on the part of Dr. David E. Green, Assistant Professor of History, on April 5, 1968 and April 30, 1968, Dr. Charles L. Babcock, Dean of the College of Humanities, provided under University Rules a clear statement of allegations of misconduct on the part of Dr. Green and I, acting under Rule 21.07, requested the Faculty Advisory Committee to activate hearing procedures and report to me in accordance with Section 2 of Rule 21.07.

The Hearing Committee proceeded in accordance with my request and has just completed a long series of hearings designed to enable the Committee to develop findings of fact and to make appropriate recommendations.

IX. REPORTS (continued)

B. Report on the Status of Dr. David E. Green, Assistant Professor in the Department of History (continued)

I am advised by the Hearing Committee that because of the extra load of work at the end of the Quarter, it has not been possible to take all of the steps that are required under our Rules in time to make its report to me for such action as is required prior to this meeting. It is expected that the Committee report will be in my hands within the next two weeks and I will, therefore, have a specific recommendation at the July meeting. In the meantime, Professor Green's contract for 1968-69 has not been included in the list of those contracts covered in the 1968-69 budget presentation. Action on his contract will be postponed until the Committee report has been received and until there can be time to analyze the report and make an appropriate recommendation to the Board, which will come on July 11, 1968.

C. Progress Report on University Hall

President Fawcett presented the following report:

Following Vice President Carson's report to this Board on May 9, 1968, on the need to abandon the North Wing of the Building in which the auditorium, classrooms and offices are located, and in accordance with the action taken by this Board at the same meeting which instructed the University administrative officials to move toward the abandonment of the facility as soon as such abandonment could be conveniently arranged, the following steps have been taken:

- On May 17, 1968, an application in the amount of \$3,000,000 was filed with the Emergency Board and the Controlling Board of the State of Ohio. The application is for a structure containing 78,000 square feet to replace the North Wing of the Building. To date no action has been taken by the Controlling Board and the Emergency Board on this application, but we hope to have a response to it in a relatively short period of time.
- The South Section or the original portion of the Building, while in need of extensive repair, can be continued in service for a very short period of time but will need to be either reconstructed in accordance with the recommendation of the University Hall Committee or replaced as a part of a totally new structure.

IX. REPORTS (continued)

C. Progress Report on University Hall (continued)

- 3. I have approached the Development Fund Board with the idea in mind of suggesting a capital funds campaign of sufficient magnitude to do whatever is required to replace the building. This Board is awaiting a reading from The Ohio State University Association Board since a half of its membership comes from The Ohio State University Association. This meeting took place on May 10, 1968.
- 4. I next met with the Alumni Advisory Board on the morning of May 25, 1968, to discuss the matter further. Dr. Richard Mall, Director of Alumni Affairs, reports to me that The Ohio State University Association Board discussed this problem generally, but has not yet reached a position of making a firm recommendation to its representatives on the Development Fund Board.

I will continue to go through all of the appropriate channels in an effort to develop funding for this structure which is so critically needed to house the basic education departments in the areas of humanities and the social sciences.

Mr. Shocknessy expressed his apprehension regarding the deteriorating condition of University Hall and voiced the opinion that the building is "disaster prone." He then moved the adoption of the following resolution:

WHEREAS, continuing studies by professionally qualified persons reveal serious doubt regarding the structural safety of the entire University Hall building.

BE IT RESOLVED that action be taken by University administrative officials to

- implement at the earliest possible date the abandonment of University Hall as authorized by this Board of Trustees in action taken on May 9, 1968;
- (2) execute the demolition of the building following its evacuation; and
- (3) proceed with the development of plans and specifications for funding and constructing a building which will replace the critically needed

academic space for the several basic education departments now housed in University Hall at the earliest possible moment.

Mr. Jones seconded the motion, and the Board of Trustees adopted the above resolution by unanimous roll call vote.

D. Report on Admission of Freshman Honor Scholars for 1968-1969

President Fawcett stated that he had received from the Vice President for Educational Services a report that "353 high school graduates who have been designated Ohio State Freshman Honor Scholars have indicated their intention of enrolling in the University in either the Summer or Autumn Quarter."

He further reported that this is an increase of approximately one-third over the number of honor scholars who had indicated their intention to enroll in the University at this time a year ago. The designation of Freshman Honor Scholar is earned by a high school senior who ranks in the upper 3 per cent of his high school graduating class and who scores in the upper 5 per cent of college-bound seniors nationally on the American College Test.

Of the 353 students, 106 ranked first in their respective graduating classes at the time of admission, while 105 ranked either second or third. The 329 who came from Ohio represent 73 of the state's 88 counties. Another 24 will come from 15 states, with Pennsylvania sending four and West Virginia three.

The Chairman of the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees, Mr. Mervin France, presented the following resolution:

RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF NOT EXCEEDING \$1,700,000 PARKING SYSTEM REVENUE NOTES, SERIES 1968, FOR THE PURPOSE OF REFUNDING \$700,000 PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF PARKING SYSTEM REVENUE NOTES HERETOFORE ISSUED TO PAY PART OF THE COSTS OF CONSTRUCTING AND EQUIPPING CERTAIN BUILDINGS, STRUCTURES AND FACILITIES TO BE USED FOR OR IN CONNECTION WITH THE PARKING OF MOTOR VEHICLES AND \$1,000,000, PRINCIPAL AMOUNT, FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING AN ADDITIONAL PART OF SUCH COSTS

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University (herein called the "Board") is vested with the government of The Ohio State University (herein called the "University" and, when the context admits, collectively with the Board called the "University") under and by virtue of Section 3335.02 of the Revised Code of Ohio, with the right, under Section 3335.03 of said Revised Code, and as such Board, of suing and being sued, contracting and being contracted with, and of making and using a common seal and, under Section 3335.10 of said Revised Code, has general supervision of all lands, buildings, and other property of the University and control of all expenses thereof; and by Chapter 3335 of the Revised Code of Ohio; and

WHEREAS, by authority of Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio, the Board is authorized to acquire by purchase, lease, or otherwise, and to construct, equip, maintain, renovate, repair, improve or remodel and operate, and to lease to or from others, buildings, structures, or facilities and sites therefor and related equipment within or in close proximity to the campus of the University to be used for or in connection with athletic purposes, student activity centers, faculty centers, dining halls, bookstores, auditoriums, parking of motor vehicles and contract research facilities; and, for the purpose of paying the costs thereof, or any part thereof, or the repayment of any loans obtained for such purposes, to use any funds in its possession not otherwise obligated, revenues derived from athletic events, and from the operation or leasing of such activity centers, faculty centers, dining halls, bookstores, auditoriums, parking facilities and contract research facilities including but not limited to such portions of student activity fees charged and paid for such purposes, any other revenues or receipts derived or to be derived from the operation or leasing of such structures, buildings, facilities and equipment; and for the purpose of paying all or part of such costs the Board is further authorized thereby to issue and sell bonds, notes or other written instruments evidencing such indebtedness, provided that such obligations shall not be a claim against or lien upon any property of the State of Ohio or any property of or under the control of said Board excepting such parts of the revenues or receipts derived from the operation or leasing of such structures, buildings, facilities, equipment or sites and any portion of the student fees assessed or to be assessed for the purposes of such acquisition, construction, equipment renovation, repair, improvement or remodeling or for the use of such structures, buildings, facilities, equipment or sites which the Board may pledge to secure the payment of such obligations; and by authority of said Section 3345.11 the Board is also authorized to issue such bonds, notes or other obligations payable as aforesaid in order to retire or refund outstanding notes or other obligations matured or unmatured, to repay

moneys previously borrowed or advanced under said section or to reimburse funds of the University for amounts used under said Section 3345.11; and

WHEREAS, the Board has heretofore and does hereby determine and confirm that it is necessary to provide additional facilities for the parking of motor vehicles and, accordingly, hereby declares and determines that it is immediately necessary to construct and equip certain buildings, structures and facilities to be used for and in connection with the parking of motor vehicles, all within or in close proximity to its campus, including three multi-level parking structures for the parking of approximately 2,250 motor vehicles (being herein called the "Project"), the cost of which is presently estimated to be \$4,500,000; and

WHEREAS, the University has determined to borrow the funds to pay part of the foregoing costs, and to issue its Parking System Revenue Bonds, Series A, in the principal amount of \$4,500,000 pursuant to Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio, and pursuant to resolution of the Board duly adopted September 8, 1966 authorizing said Bonds (which Resolution, as the same may hereafter be amended, supplemented or superseded, is herein called the "Bond Resolution"); and

WHEREAS, the University has heretofore by Resolution adopted June 8, 1967, provided for the issuance of \$700,000 Parking System Revenue Notes of the University, and pursuant to said June 8, 1967 Resolution, there has been issued and delivered \$700,000 Parking System Revenue Notes to provide interim construction financing to pay part of the cost of the Project which is presently under construction, which notes mature on June 29, 1968; and

WHEREAS, the University has and does hereby determine and confirm that it is necessary to issue notes to borrow funds for the repayment of the interim construction financing evidenced by said \$700,000 Parking System Revenue Notes dated June 29, 1967, as authorized by said June 8, 1967 Resolution and that it is further necessary to issue notes to pay additional interim construction costs in the principal amount of \$1,000,000, prior to the issuance and delivery of said Series A Bonds; and

WHEREAS, there has been submitted the following proposals for the purchase of said notes at 100% of par and at the designated interest rate:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University:

Section 1. It is hereby declared necessary to construct and equip the Project, and to issue and that there shall be issued, notes in the aggregate principal sum of \$1,700,000 pursuant to Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio for the purpose of refunding the interim construction financing evidenced by the \$700,000 The Ohio State University Parking System Revenue Notes dated June 29, 1967 and issued and delivered to pay part of the costs of the Project and for the purpose of paying an additional part of the costs of the Project.

Section 2. The principal of and interest on such notes, and such additional notes as may be issued to pay part of the costs of the Project shall be payable solely from (a) the "Pledged Receipts" after provision for "Operating and Maintenance Expenses," if any, of the "Pledged Facilities" and all payments required to be made, from time to time from said "Pledged Receipts" into the "Special Funds" created under the Bond Resolution; and (b) the proceeds of the sale of parking system revenue bonds or notes of the University to be issued pursuant to Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio, or other authorizing provisions of law; provided that neither the State of Ohio nor the University, nor its Board of Trustees shall be obligated to pay the principal of or interest on such notes from any other funds or source, nor shall such notes be a claim upon or lien against any other property of the University or the State of Ohio, and said notes are not general obligations of the State or University, and the full faith and credit there are not pledged thereto, and the noteholders shall have no right to have any taxes levied, collected or applied for or to the payment thereof.

Section 3. Said notes shall be designated "Parking System Notes, Series 1968," shall be dated June 28, 1968, and shall mature June 27, 1969. Said notes shall bear interest at the rates indicated in Section 4 of this resolution, payable semi-annually, or at maturity as requested by the Original Purchaser. Said notes shall be in denominations of \$5,000 or any multiple thereof, as bearer notes with or without coupons, or may be represented by a single note for the entire issue, as may be requested by the Original Purchaser, and shall be numbered as determined by the Vice President, Business and Finance or the Assistant Treasurer. Said notes shall be payable at the office of the Original Purchaser, or at such other place as he may designate, and shall be signed by the President or the Vice President, Business and Finance, one of which may be a facsimile, attested by the Secretary of the Board, and the coupons, if any, pertaining thereto shall be signed by or bear the facsimile signature of

said Vice President, Business and Finance or the Assistant Treasurer, and the notes shall bear the seal of the University or facsimile thereof.

If agreeable to the Original Purchaser, prior to delivery of the definitive notes, said notes may be delivered as one or more temporary manuscript notes to be surrendered to the University at the principal office of the paying agent when the University shall notify the holder thereof that the definitive notes are available. The definitive notes shall be substantially in the form attached hereto as Appendix IX, page 795, the terms and covenants of which are incorporated herein, with such modifications therein as may be appropriate for issuance of the notes in coupon form or to reflect the terms of the sale thereof consistent with this resolution and with such changes therein, not substantially adverse to the University, as the President or the Vice President, Business and Finance, may approve.

Section 4. Said notes are hereby awarded as follows in accordance with their aforesaid proposal and this resolution:

The President, the Vice President, Business and Finance, and the Assistant Treasurer are each hereby authorized and directed to do all things necessary for the delivery of said notes in accordance with said award and this resolution.

Section 5. The Vice President, Business and Finance, or the Assistant Treasurer of the University is hereby authorized and directed to apply part of the proceeds of the 1968 Notes promptly to the payment and discharge of the outstanding note dated June 29, 1967 and to apply to the payment of interest on said outstanding note such amount from the Construction Fund for the Project or from other funds available therefor and as to the balance, he is authorized to deposit the balance of the proceeds of the notes in the Construction Fund established under the provisions of the Bond Resolution and to apply and invest the moneys therein as provided in the Bond Resolution.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.





This note is executed on behalf of said Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University solely in their capacity as such Trustees and shall not constitute their personal obligation, either jointly or severally, in their individual capacities.

AND IT IS HEREBY CERTIFIED AND RECITED, that all acts, conditions and things necessary to be done precedent to and in the issuance of this note, in order to make it a legal, valid and binding obligation of said University and its Board of Trustees, have happened, been done and performed in regular and due form as required by law.
