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## Proceedings of the Board of Trustees The Ohio State University

COLUMBUS OHIO, July 18th, 1910, 2 P. M.

The Board of Trustees met pursuant to the call of the Chairman at the University. Present, Walter J. Sears, Vice Chairman, F. E. Pomerene, Julius F. Stone and John T. Mack.

In the absence of the Chairman the Vice Chairman took the chair.

1. Professor Joseph A. Leighton was elected Professor of Philosopuy at a salary of \$2,600, and \$100 was appropriated to meet this recommendation.

2. Mr. C. J. West was elected Assistant Professor of Mathematics at a salary of 1,200, and 1,200 was appropriated to meet this recommendation.

3. Mr. Ray L. Edwards was appointed Fellow in the department of Physics at a salary of 300, as provided in the budget.

4. Mr. G. O. Weimer was appointed Assistant in Physics at a salary of \$750, as provided in the budget.

5. The following re-adjustment in the Summer Civil Engineering Camp salaries was made:

and the balance of the appropriation \$60.00, was cancelled.

6. The title of Mr. H. W. Vaughan was changed to Assistant Professor of Animal Husbandry, and his salary was increased to \$1,500; \$200 being appropriated to meet this increase.

7. The salary of Mr. H. C. Ramsower was increased to \$1,500, and \$100 was appropriated to meet this increase.

8. The salary of Mr. C. C. Huntington was increased 100, and 100 was appropriated to meet this increase.

9. The salary of Mr. Robert Meiklejohn was made \$1,500, and the salary of Mr. Cree Sheets was increased to \$1,100, and \$300 was appropriated to meet said increases.

10. To correct a clerical error in the budget in the department of Physical Education the appointment of Mr. Bauer was made for ten (10) months at a salary of \$800, and \$200 was appropriated to meet this increase.

11. Dr. G. G. Richardson was elected Professor of Veterinary Pathology at a salary of \$2,400 to succeed Dr. J. McI. Phillips, and \$600 was added to the appropriation to meet this appointment.

12. The title of Associate Professor Brumley was changed to Professor of Veterinary Medicine.

13. Dr. R. A. Scothorn was appointed Assistant in Veterinary Medicine at a salary of \$750 as provided in the budget, to succeed Dr. G. M. Potter who declined the appointment.

14. The term of service of Mr. James C. Leist, Janitor, was put on the twelve (12) months basis; said appointment to begin September 1st, 1910.

15. Mr. Alexander Vallance was appointed Assitant Professor of Experimental Engineering at a salary of \$1,000 to succeed Prof. H. N. Packard, resigned.

The \$200 saving in this department was divided between Professors Hitchcock and Judd, giving \$100 to each.

16. Mr. R. B. Stuckey declined appointment in the department of Industrial Arts at \$600 and authority was given the President to employ Mr. R. N. Galloway for the first semester at \$30 per month to be paid from the amount appropriated for Mr. Stuckey.

17. The President reported that Mr. K. B. Ward had declined to accept the appointment in the department of Civil Engineering.

18. \$100 was added to the salary of Prof. J. R. Taylor and \$100 was appropriated to meet this recommendation.

19. \$100 was added to the salary of Prof. G. D. Hubbard, and \$100 was appropriated to meet this recommendation.

20. The salary of Mr. John Chisholm was increased \$5.00 per month, and \$60 was appropriated to meet this increase.

21. Miss Ruth J. Neal was appointed Stenographer for the College of Engineering at a salary of \$50 per month.

22. The following appointments in the department of Agricultural Extension, on a twelve months basis, were made:

Said salaries being provided in the Agricultural Extension Budget.

23. The following rule concerning Agricultural Extension Schools was adopted:

"Satisfactory rooms for instruction and demonstration shall be provided and properly cared for and the expenses for rent, heat, light, janitor service for them, and all other local expenses including the lodging and boarding of all instructors or other persons assisting them shall be borne by the community in which the school is held."

24. The President presented a communication from Professors James E. Boyd and Clyde T. Morris concerning the gift to the University from Mr. J. F. Stone of a photographic micrometer. Whereupon the President was directed to express to Mr. Stone the appreciation of the Trustees for his gift.

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The President presented the following recommendation concerning the Produce Fund of the College of Agriculture, and on motion of Mr. Stone the recommendation was agreed to; the same to become operative at a time convenient to the President and Secretary:

"We recommend that the scheme of organization of the College of Agriculture, and the method of handling the funds, as adopted by the Board of Trustees April 12, 1905, be modified as follows:

I. The heads of the departments of Animal Husbandry, Dairying, Horticulture and Rural Economics shall report to the Dean of the College of Agriculture semi annually (January and July) in advance, a policy for purchases and sales, involving the live stock and commercial productions of their respective departments.

The Dean shall submit said reports with his recommendations to the President of the University.

The President shall transmit the same with his recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees for its consideration and approval.

2. The Department of Animal Husbandry shall have charge of all live stock and stables on the University farm except the following:

The Department of Rural Economics shall have charge of the feeding, care, and use of all work-horses, and of the stables in which they are kept.

The Department of Dairying shall have charge of the milking of the dairy herd, and the department of Animal Husbandry shall arrange for feeding and care of stables to conform to this change. All matters of dispute to be referred to the Dean.

3. The apportionment of the farm lands for the purposes of crop productions, pastures, orchards, gardens, experimental plots, etc., shall be made by the Board of Trustees upon the recommendation of the President.

4. All feed produced on the University farm shall be stored and fed to the University live stock, any surplus remaining, may be sold by the Farm Superintendent upon the recommendation of the Dean of the College of Agriculture.

5. We recommend that the method of handling the produce funds as adopted April 12, 1905, be abolished, and that the following method be established:

All monies received from the sales of live stock, farm, dairy, and garden products, or from any source whatsover, shall be immediately turned over by the department making the sale, to the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, who shall give a proper receipt therefor. The Secretary shall certify said monies into the General Treasury, and shall credit the same to the sales account of the College of Agriculture.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall submit monthly to the Dean of the College of Agriculture, a statement showing in detail all sales made by the departments of said college. 6. All transfer charges and credits between departments of the University, in so far as they relate to feed and the use of live stock, shall be abolished.

7. The heads of departments shall keep a record of the cost of operating their respective departments, upon forms approved by the President, which shall show:

(a) The cost of raising crops and the value of said crops;

(b) The amount of labor used and the amount and value of feed ied to live stock, and the returns from the same;

(c) The cost and value of dairy products handled;

(d) The cost of operating gardens, orchards, and green-houses, and the returns for the same.

A report based upon these records shall be submitted annually by the head of the department to the Dean of the College of Agriculture, for transmission to the President. Said reports to be for the fiscal year ending June 30th.

8. Requests for departmental appropriations, other than those for salaries of instructors, and the current expenses and equipment necessary for instruction, shall be submitted to the Dean of the College of Agriculture, who shall transmit the same to the President with his recommendation thereon.

Said appropriations shall be classified under the following heads:

(I) Labor

(2) Feed

(3) Current Expense

(4) Equipment

(5) Live Stock"

## ADDITIONAL PROPOSITIONS

On the recommendation of the Committee, the bid of F. O. Schoedinger for sheet metal work in the amount of \$299.00 was accepted, and the bid of the Kuhn Artificial Stone Company for the Concrete Work in the amount of \$2,420.20 was accepted. The other bids being above the estimate, the Building Committee was directed to lay the matter before the Auditor of State, and, if possible, secure permission to solicit new bids on the work without advertising, and if such permission was secured then the Building Committee was authorized to make such contracts as in their judgment may seem best for the completion of the work.

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On motion of Mr. Stone the Athletic Board was authorized to erect a grandstand on the west side of the athletic field, and also to remove such trees as may be necessary to make such improvements, it being understood that the Athletic Board shall replace any trees removed upon the advice of Olmsted Brothers.

The Athletic Board was also directed in any future improvements to first present plans and specifications for the same to the Board of Trustees for approval.

## COLUMBUS, OHIO, September 9, 1910.

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The Board of Trustees met at the call of the Chairman, at the University. Present, O. E. Bradfute, Chairman, Guy W. Mallon, Walter J. Sears and Julius F. Stone, \* \* \* \* \* \*

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Mr. J. R. Chamberlin, engineer in charge of the railroad construction, appeared before the Board and presented the final estimate of D. E. Sullivan & Son for the track laying. Mr. Chamberlin stated that a correction should have been made by Mr. Sullivan in the curve and that about ten ties less than the contract called for had been placed in the work. The Engineer stated further that the Contractors, D. E. Sullivan & Son had presented a bill for damages in the amount of \$250 because of the failure of other contractors to complete their work on time.

Mr. Sullivan being present also stated that he would allow a deduction of \$20.00 from his contract price for the correction of the curve and shortage of ties.

On motion of Mr. Mallon it was agreed to deduct from the contract price \$20 for the correction of the curve and shortage of ties, and to allow Mr. Sullivan \$70.00 for damages due to the failure of other contractors; and the Secretary was directed to pay to D. E. Sullivan & Son their final estimate as amended.,

Mr. Chamberlin also presented the final estimate of Wm. H. Luchtenberg & Company for the grading of the railroad, and stated that the Contractors had over-run the time limit of their contract 194 days, and, in his opinion, should be held to the penalty as detailed in the contract.

Messrs. J. M. Butler and J. J. Stoddard, Attorneys for the Contractors, appeared before the Board and asked that the penalty be not enforced.

After listening to their arguments and the statement of the Engineer, the Board decided to waive the penalty on 55 days which the Acme Paying & Construction Company, contractors for the substructure of the bridge, had delayed the grading contractors, and decided further to enforce the penalty on the remaining 139 days at \$15.00 per day; and the Secretary was directed to pay to Wm. H. Luchtenberg & Company their final estimate thus amended.

\* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* President Thompson presented the following minute:

"I report the death of Professor Lewis Addison Rhoades which occurred August 30, 1910. Professor Rhoades was born at Skaneateles, New York, December 19, 1860. He graduated from the University of Michigan in 1884, and in 1886 received his master degree from the same University. He received the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from Goetening in 1892. He served as instructor in the University of Michigan from 1888 to 1890 and after returning from Germany served at Cornell University 1893 to 1896. Later he served at the University of Illinois from 1896 to 1903, since which time he has been head of the department of German at the Ohio State University. It will be recalled that Professor Rhoades through his own personal efforts secured a considerable amount of money and during leave of absence in Germany purchased a very valuable addition to the University Library. He has had continuous academic service since completing his education, and in addition to his class room work was a frequent contributor in matters pertaining to his department. He enjoyed the esteem, affection and regard of his associates.

I further report that in anticipation of a leave of absence for Professor Rhoades a temporary adjustment was made by which certain courses would be withdrawn and the teaching force of the department would carry the remainder. I recommend that this plan be approved until such time as the Board is ready to select a successor to Professor Rhoades."

On motion, the recommendation of the President as to the temporary adjustment in the German Department was agreed to, and the President was directed to express to Mrs. Rhoades the sympathy of the Board of Trustees.

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The following resolution was unanimously adopted.

"Resolved, by the Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University, that in recognition of the generous donation of Mrs. Catherine Tallant of Richmond, Indiana, of an extensive and valuable collection of insects to the Department of Zoology and Entomology, the Board of Trustees desires to place on record its appreciation of the generosity of the gift, and, therefore, it is resolved that we gratefully accept the gift of Mrs. Tallant and assure her that the collection under the designation of the "Tallant Collection" shall be preserved and used in the most permanent and effective manner possible in order that it may be of the greatest possible value to entomological students." \* Ψ \* \* \*

The degree of Bachelor of Science in Domestic Science, as of the class of 1910, was granted to Miss Lilian Makepeace, and the degree of Bachelor of Science in Education, as of the class of 1910, was granted to Miss Ida Gatrel.

"*Resolved*, by the Board of Trustees that they join with the University Faculty and the Chamber of Commerce in a cordial invitation to the American Association for the Advancement of Science to meet in the City of Columbus at the first available date, and further that the Trustees assure the Association that they will heartily co-operate in making suitable provision for its needs."

Mr. Stone presented the following resolution, which was ordered placed in the minutes:

"The Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University place on record their appreciation of the high scholarship and efficiency of Professor Robert White McFarland, LL.D., whose death occurred Sunday, October 23rd, 1910, in the eighty-sixth year of his age. He was born in Champaign County, Ohio, on June 16th, 1825, and graduated from Ohio Wesleyan University in the year 1847.

Professor McFarland was one of the original members of the Faculty having served the Institution as Professor of Mathematics, Astronomy and Civil Engineering from 1873 to 1885. Subsequently he was for three years President of Miami University, when he retired from his professional work. He was elected Emeritus Professor of Civil Eugineering at the Ohio State University in the year 1903.

Professor McFarland was not only a teacher of high order, but a man who showed a large generous public spirit in all his service and endeared himself both to the students, who came under his instruction, and to a wide circle of citizens in his native commonwealth. His services were an important contribution in establishing the high reputation of the Institution throughout the State. In his long and honorable life he exemplified a combination of scholar, teacher, public spirited citizen, friend and cultivated Christian gentleman."

\* \* \* \* \* \* \* \*

Mr. Sears presented the following resolution, which was ordered placed in the minutes:

"Stillman Williams Robinson, Emeritus Professor of Mechanical Engineering, died at his home in Columbus, Monday. October 31st, 1910. He was born near South Reading, Vermont, March 6, 1838. He graduated from the University of Michigan in 1870, and established at the University of Illinois the first department of Mechanical Engineering in a state university in the United States. He served in this Institution from 1870 until 1878, when he was elected Professor of Mechanical Engineering and Physics in the Ohio State University. In 1881 he was relieved from the work in Physics but continued as Professor of Mechanical Engineering until 1895 when he retired from professional duty, and was elected Emeritus Professor in 1899.

Professor Robinson was a man of inventive genius, original power as an investigator and teacher, and recognized by the learned scientific societies throughout the country. In addition to his mechanical inventions he was the author of many important contributions to scientific education and won for himself a national reputation in the field of mechanical engineering. His generous gifts to the University were evidence of his continued interest in and enthusiasm for the cause of education. Most prominent among these was the endownment of the Robinson Fellowship in Engineering. Modest and unpretentious, he endeared himself alike to students and faculty. His scholarship and teaching power rendered him one of the most valuable and distinguished men in the history of the University. The Trustees call attention to his career with appreciation and gratitude."

Mr. W. H. Palmer was appointed assistant in laboratory in Animal Husbandry for the short Winter Course, salary \$300.00, as provided in the budget.

The resignation of Archibald M. Burnham, Assistant Professor of English, effective February 1, 1911, was accepted, and Mr. E. L. Beck, of Westminster College, Pennsylvania, was appointed Assistant Professor of English, vice A. M. Burnham, at \$550.00 for the remainder of the year.

The resignation of Mr. Charles L. Armsby, Instructor in Civil Engineering, effective February 1, 1911, was accepted, and Mr. H. W. Stertzbach was appointed Instructor in Civil Engineering, vice C. L. Armsby, with a salary on the basis of \$1,200.00 a year, services to begin February 1, 1911.

Mr. Clyde R. Miller was appointed student assistant in the department of Geology for the second semester, compensation \$5.00 per week, and \$90.00 was appropriated to the department of Geology to meet this appointment.

Leave of absence for the academic year 1911-1912 was granted to Professor W. R. Lazenby, Professor H. C. Price, Professor C. E. Sherman, and Professor F. P. Graves, with a salary allowance of \$2,000.00.

Leave of absence was granted to Dr. D. S. White for May and June of the current year with full salary.

Leave of absence was granted to Professors M. B. Hammond, E. F. McCampbell and H. W. Kuhn, salary being \$1,800.00, for the academic year 1911-1912.

Leave of absence was granted to Assistant Professor Charles Sheard, Department of Physics, for the year ending June 30, 1912, with a salary allowance of \$1200.00. \$135.00 was appropriated for the Department of Ceramic Engineeing.

\* \* \* \* \* \* \* \*

The President presented the following Constitution for Ohio Union, which was approved:

#### CONSTITUTION OF THE OHIO UNION

#### ART. I-NAME

Sec. 1. The name of this organization shall be the Ohio Union of the Ohio State University.

### ART. II-OBJECT

Sec. 1. Its object shall be to promote good fellowship among the men of the Ohio State University.

### ART. III-MANAGEMENT

Sec. 1. The management of the Ohio Union shall be in the hands of a Board of Overseers, subject to the advice and direction of the Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University.

## ART. IV-BOARD OF OVERSEERS

Sec. I. The Board of Overseers shall be elected annually and shall be constituted as follows: Four representatives elected at large from the student body, one representative chosen by the Faculty, one representative chosen by the Alumni Association at its annual meeting, and one representative chosen by the Board of Trustees of the University. But no student shall be eligible to membership on the Board of Overseers who shall not have been duly registered in the University for at least three semesters.

## ART. V-OFFICERS OF BOARD OF OVERSEERS

Sec. I—The officers of the Board of Overseers shall be President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer. The President and Vice-President shall be chosen from the student representatives on the Board of Overseers. The Board of Trustees of the University shall elect the Treasurer. The House Manager shall be the Secretary.

### ART. VI-DUTIES

Sec. 1. The Board of Overseers shall hold regular meetings at least once a month, and special meetings at the call of the President.

Sec. 2. (a) The Board of Overseers shall, at its first regular meeting of the Fall, elect its officers, with the exception of the Treasurer and Secretary, from the student representatives.

(b) The Board of Overseers shall have power to direct the policy and appropriate the funds of the Union, subject to the regulation of the Board of Trustees of the University.

(c) With the advice and consent of the Board of Trustees of the University, the Board of Overseers shall have power to appoint a House Manager. He shall have such powers and duties as to the general management of the building as the Board of Overseers may provide.

(d) The Board of Overseers shall not lease any portion of the premises without the consent of the Board of Trustees of the University.

(e) The Board of Overseers shall fill any vacancies occurring in the Board until the next annual election.

(f) The Board of Overseers shall make all rules for the use of the building, and shall provide for the general welfare of the Union.

(g) Subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees of the University, the Board of Overseers shall exercise all powers not herein especially assigned.

Sec. 3. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Overseers and perform such other duties as are incumbent upon the office; he shall be ex-officio chairman of all meetings of the Ohio Union.

Sec. 4. The Vice-President shall fulfill all the duties of the President during his absence or disability.

Sec. 5. The Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings, and shall notify candidates of their election to office. He shall also keep the minutes of all the meetings of the Ohio Union.

Sec. 6. The Treasurer shall be the financial officer of the Union, and shall have such powers and duties as the Board of Overseers shall prescribe. Once a year he shall submit to the Board of Overseers a complete financial report, and shall make further reports at the request of the Board of Overseers. He shall give bond in the amount of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) for the faithful performance of his duties; the premiun of said bond to be paid by the Ohio Union.

Sec. 7. The House Manager shall, at the close of each fiscal year, make a complete detailed report showing the operations of the Union, together with a financial statement, and submit the same to the President of the University for transmission to the Board of Trustees. The House Manager shall submit such other reports as may be called for from time to time by the President of the University or the Board of Overseers.

#### ART. VII-MEMBERSHIP

Sec. 1. The membership shall be limited to men. There shall be four classes of members—student, faculty, alumni, and honorary.

Sec. 2. Student members: Any male student who is registered in the University is eligible to membership.

Sec. 3. Faculty members: Any member of the Board of Trustees, teaching staff, or clerical force of the University is eligible to membership.

Sec. 4. Alumni members: Any graduate or ex-student of the University shall be eligible to membership. Alumni members shall be of two classes-resident and non-resident.

Sec. 5. Honorary members: The Board of Overseers shall have power to elect honorary members at its direction.

Sec. 6. Admission to membership shall be as follows: Students shall receive their membership cards upon presentation of their receipted University fee card at the office of the Ohio Union. Faculty, resident and non-resident Alumni shall receive membership cards upon presentation of Treasurer's receipt of dues at the office of the Ohio Union. Honorary members shall have the priviledge of the building upon introduction as such at the office of the Ohio Union.

ART. VIII-NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS OF BOARD OF OVERSEERS

Sec. 1. (a) The annual election of student representatives on the Board of Overseers shall be held on the first Friday in May.

(b) The Faculty representative shall be elected at the Faculty meeting preceding the first Friday in May.

(c) The Alumni representative shall be elected at the annual Alumni meeting during Commencement Week.

(d) The representative of the Board of Trustees shall be elected at the last regular meeting preceding the first Friday in May.

Sec. 2. Nominations for student representatives shall be by petition in writing over signatures of seventy-five undergraduates. Petitions must be filed with the Secretary of the Board of Overseers of the Ohio Union not later than 12 P. M. on the Friday of the week preceding the annual election. The name of every candidate shall be posted on the bulletin of the Ohio Union on Saturday preceding election. The person receiving the greatest number of votes shall be declared elected. In case of a tie for fourth place, another election for that office shall be held within five days. The election shall be by the Australian ballot, the polls being open from 7:30 A. M. to 5:30 P. M. on election day. The Board of Overseers shall have charge of the elections.

Sec. 3. The term of office of student members of the Board of Overseers shall be for one year. The term of office of Faculty, Alumni, and Trustee members of the Board of Overseers shall be for three years, provided that the Faculty member elected in 1911 shall serve one year; that the Alumni member elected in 1911 shall serve two years, and that the Trustee member elected in 1911 shall serve three years. Sec. 4. The first Board of Overseers, to serve until the regularly elected members shall take office, (as provided in Section 1 of this Article) shall be organized not later then January 20, 1911, as follows:

The present Ohio Union Committee shall elect the four student members.

The President of the University shall appoint the Faculty member.

The President of the Alumni Association shall appoint the Alumnus member.

The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall appoint the Trustee member.

Sec. 5. The fiscal year shall end June 30 of each year, and the newly elected representatives shall take their office at the last regular meeting of the Board of Overseers in June, with the exception of the Alumni representative who shall take office at the first regular meeting in the Fall.

## ART. IX-DUES

The annual dues of all members, except honorary members, shall be such as the Board of Trustees of the University may designate, which shall be uniform as to students, faculty members and resident alumni. For students, this amount will be placed on the regular University fee card and paid at the Bursar's office upon registration by all male students, and shall be known as the Ohio Union Fee.

Members of Faculty and resident alumni who desire to become members shall pay dues to the Treasurer of the Union at the Bursar's office.

## ART. X-DISCIPLINE

The Board of Overseers shall have the right to assess fines or deny the privileges of the Union to any member, guest or person violating the House Rules of the Union, but this provision shall not supersede or interfere with the authority of the President of the University in all matters of discipline.

#### ART. XI-AMENDMENTS

Amendments to this constitution may be proposed by the majority of the Board of Overseers or by petition in writing of at least one hundred student members of the Union. In either case the proposed amendment shall be posted at least one week in advance of taking any action. Action shall be taken either at the annual election or at a special meeting of at least two hundred members called by the President. A three-fourths vote of those present shall be required for adoption, provided, however, that the Board of Trustees shall concur in such alteration or amendment.

## ART. XII

This constitution shall go into effect on and after January 20, 1911.

On motion of Mr. Sears, the Ohio Union fee was fixed at two Dollars per year, payable One Dollar each semester. This fee shall be paid by all male students at the same time and in the same manner as other University fees. The first payment shall be made at the semester beginning February 6, 1911.

The President presented the following letter from the Class of 1886, concerning a fund to be known as "The '86 Sword Fund," and also a check for Fifty-two Dollars (\$52.00) to constitute the principal of such fund:

"Columbus, Ohio, December 16, 1910.

## The Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio.

## Gentlemen:

The Class of 1886 desires to place under your control a fund, the income arising from which shall be used in the purchase of To that end I am herewith forwarding to Mr. prize swords. Carl L. Steeb the sum of Fifty-two Dollars to be placed with the income bearing funds of the Ohio State University in the State This sum is to constitute "The '86 Sword Fund," and Treasury. the income arising therefrom is to be allowed to accumulate for periods of twenty years, at the close of which periods all of said accumulated income, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be used for purchasing a sword to be carried by the captain of the best drilled company of the University Regiment as determined at the annual prize drill and subject to the regulations filed with the Military Department of the University May 24, 1910. Should any residue remain after the purchase of said sword it shall be added to the principal.

If for any reason the Prize Drill should be permanently abandoned, the use of said accumulated income at the end of the aforesaid twenty-year periods shall be determined by the persons who at the time may be president of the University, the Dean of the College of Arts, Philosophy and Science, and the Dean of the College of Engineering; unless the said Class of 1886 shall otherwise direct.

On motion of Mr. Mack said fund was accepted, and the President was directed to send to Mr. Edward J. Converse a letter of appreciation of the Board of Trustees.

King, in which he proposed to continue the lease on the land between King Avenue and the University property for a period of four years from November 1, 1910, at an annual rental of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00). Said proposition was accepted and approved.

\* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* On motion, the Secretary was directed to transfer the amount of \$ 30.21 from the Incidental Account to the credit of Oxley Hall, it being the cost of a dinner furnished to members of the Legislature January 25, 1911, and the Secretary was further directed to express to Miss McKinley the gratitude and appreciation of the Board of Trustees for the service she rendered.

\* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* The Chairman selected Mr. Walter J. Sears to represent the Board of Trustees on the first Board of Overseers of the Ohio Union.

\* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* The President announced the appointment of W. W. Boyd as the Faculty member on the first Board of Overseers of the Ohio Union.

Carl E. Steeb was elected Treasurer of Ohio Union, under bond in the amount of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00.) for the faithful performance of duties as said Treasurer, said bond to be filed with the President of the University, and the premium to be paid by the Ohio Union.

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The President presented the following form of a bill for retiring allowances for members of the Faculty of Ohio State Univertity, and on motion of Mr. Stone said form of bill was approved and ordered presented to the State Legislature:

"BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF OHIO:

Sec. 1. That the Trustees of the Ohio State University or their legal successors are hereby authorized to provide retiring allowances for Professors and Instructors in the University upon the terms and conditions as set forth herein.

Sec. 2. Professors or Instructors may be eligible for retiring allowances after thirty years of continuous service of collegiate grade; provided that fifteen years of such service shall have been rendered in the Ohio State University immediately preceding the date of retirement and that such Professor or Instructor shall have reached the age of sixty-five years. In case a Professor or Instructor who is eligible upon the terms and conditions hereinbefore stated does not elect to retire, the Trustees may make such retirement mandatory when the Professor or Instructor shall have reached the age of seventy years.

Sec. 3. The retiring allowance shall be fixed and determined in each case by the Trustees but shall not exceed in any year sixty per cent of the average salary paid for the five years prior to the date of retirement. In case of physical disability, where the terms and conditions as set fourth in this act have not been fully met, the Trustees are hereby given authority to make such retiring allowance within the terms of this act as in their discretion may be equitable.

Sec. 4. In case a Professor or Instructor shall have served twenty-five years, fifteen years of said service having been renderd in the Ohio State University, he may be eligible for retirement upon a service basis; provided, however, that in all such cases the retiring allowance shall in any year not exceed fily per cent of the average salary paid for the five years prior to the date of retirement.

Sec. 5. The Trustees shall in all cases where retiring allowances are granted provide for such limited amount of professional service from the retiring Professor or Instructor as in their judgment the interests of the University require.

Sec. 6. Nothing in this act shall be so construed as to prevent the Trustees from taking such initiative in the removal of a Professor at any time as in their judgment will be for the best interests of the University."

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Mr. Sears presented a resolution concerning the duties of a superintendent of the campus, and upon his request said resolution was laid over until the next meeting.

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The Board of Trustees met persuant to the call of the Chair-Present, O. E. Bradfute, Chairman, John T. Mack, F. E. man. Pomerene, O. T. Corson, Walter J. Sears, Guy W. Mallon, and Iulius F. Stone.

\* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* ж The minutes of the meetings of December 7, 1910 and January 26, 1911 were read and approved.

¥ President Thompson presented the following recommendations which were agreed to:

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The resignation of Miss Julia Titsworth, Assistant Professor of Art, ef. fective June 30, 1911, was accepted.

The resignation of Vittorio Falorsi, Instructor in Romance Languages, effective June 30, 1911, was accepted.

The resignation of M. E. Corotis, Florist, effective February 28, 1911 was accepted, and Mr. Forest B. H. Brown was appointed to succeed Mr Corotis, services beginning March I, 1911, at the same salary, namely \$50 per month.

The resignation of Mr. John Ricketts, campus policeman, effective January 30,1911, was accepted and Mr. William North was appointed campus policeman, services beginning February 10, 1911, at a salary of \$55 per month.

The President reported that John Hendry, groom of the Veterinary Clinic had resigned December 31, 1910, and that Hugh Crooks had been appointed successor, services beginning January 1, 1911, at a salary of \$ 55 per month.

The appointment of Miss Dora Sauer as Assistant in the department of Physical Education for the first semester was continued for the remainder of the year, at the same salary.

Mr. T. L. Wheeler, of Huntington, Indiana, was appointed Agricultural Extension Editor at a salary of \$1800.00 per year, service to begin April 1, 1911.

The appointment of Mr. Harry H. Bumgardner, student assistant in the Department of German, was continued for the second semester, with the amount of work doubled and his remuneration also to be doubled, making it \$50 per month.

Perry Van Ewing was appointed student assistant in laboratory work in the department of Animal Husbandry for four months, beginning February 1, 1911, at \$ 25.00 per month, said salary to be paid from the department current expense fund.

The appointment of R. M. Galloway, student assistant in Industrial Arts for the first semester, was continued for the second semester, at \$ 30.00 per month.

Miss Ruth McManamy was appointed clerk in the department of Animal Husbandry, effective February 1, 1911, salary as provided in the Budget, namely \$50.00 per month.

Upon the recommendation of the University Faculty the degree of Civil Engineer, as of the Class of 1910, was granted to Glenn S. Pierce.

A duplicate diploma was authorized to be issued to Mr. Howard R. Howard, Engineer of Mines, of the Class of 1906, and to Mr. Arthur Howard McCray, Bachelor of Science in Horticulture and Forestry, of the Class of 1909.

A communication from Miss Marie Gugle, President of the Ohio State Alumnae Association of Toledo, concerning the appointment of a dean for women, was referred to the President for consideration at the time of the annual budget.

The \$300,00 which was appropriated in the Budget for a laboratory assistant in Metallurgy and Mineralogy was ordered transferred to the current expense fund of that department, to be used in paying student assistance by the hour.

The communication of May 13, 1908, from the University Faculty concerning a Graduate School was ordered returned to the Faculty, at its request.

A petition for the use of Ohio Field on Thanksgiving Day for a game of football between Carnegie Technical Schools, of Pittsburgh, and Kenyon College was declined.

Mr. Herbert Edwards, Assistant Superintendent of Buildings and Construction, was relieved of further duties in the Chief Engineer's office, his whole time from this date to be devoted to the superintendence of the construction of the new Library Building. It was also ordered that hereafter his headquarters shall be on the Library site.

\$5.56 was appropriated to the department of Electrical Engineering to cover the expense of repairing an instrument, the money having been paid in by students.

The request of Mr. J. Upton Gribben to be commissioned as the architect for the new Horticulture and Forestry Building when provided, was ordered laid on the table until the matter is before the Board for consideration.

\$100.00 was appropriated for the department of Bacteriology for current expenses.

and \$25.00 of the money hitherto appropriated for Hayes Hall out of this fund was cancelled.

The resignation of Mr. C. H. Lucas, first assistant in the Chemical Supply Store, effective February 11, 1911, was accepted, and Mr. Harry Brewer was promoted to the position which Mr. Lucas held, his salary to be \$60.00 per month, effective February 15, 1911.

It was ordered that hereafter teachers, candidates for the master's degree, be required to pay only one year's fee, namely \$20.00, and that when such payment is complete further registration until the degree is received shall be free of charge.

It was also ordered that the total fee for the College of Law be \$180.00 for resident students and \$225.00 for non-resident students. Where students desire to extend the work over a greater time they are to pay the fees in regular order until the full amount has been paid, after which time further registration shall be free of charge.

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The committee consisting of the President and the Deans to which was referred for an opinion a communication from Mr. Ralph Mershon regarding a revision of the plan of organization of the University submitted the following report and recommended its adoption:

"We have had before us a revised plan of organization coming from Mr. Mershon after a personal conference with this committee. This revised plan also shows a graphic map of university organization, of which we desire to express our approval. In view of the communications submitted to us, we desire to make the following recommendation:

"We recommend that the following be added to Rule 41 of the Rules of the Board of Trustees as 41-a: 'A Dean shall at the proper time make up a budget for his college for presentation to the President after the manner hereinafter prescribed under budget. In making up the college budget the Dean shall endeavor to arrive at a budget which shall represent the consensus of opinion of the heads of the various departments and himself.'

"We recommend as a new rule of the Board, to follow the paragraph on Deans, the following: 'The Administrative Council shall be made up of the President of the University and the Deans of the various colleges of the University and of the Graduate School. It shall be advisory to the President, who shall be chairman of the Administrative Council.'

"We recommend as a new rule under the caption "Budget" (to come in at the end of the rule book) the following: 'For purposes of administration, the Administrative Council shall assign each department of the University to some one of the seven colleges.'

"The departments composing a college (in the administrative sense) shall be under the immediate supervision of a dean. All questions of personnel of the teaching force and of appropriations for the equipment and and maintenance of the departments constituting a college shall be submitted by the heads of the departments to the dean of said college, and it shall be the duty of the dean to submit them with his recommendations to the President. It shall be the duty of the deans, each year, at the proper time, to prepare and submit to the President, budgets for their respective colleges, based upon the estimated revenues of their colleges as determined and apportioned to each by the President from the general revenue of the University.

"It shall be the duty of the superintendent of property to prepare and submit to the President annually at the proper time a budget for the maintenance and extension of the physical plant of the University, including the campus, buildings, power house, heating and ventilating systems, water supply, sewage disposal, etc., but not including the farm lands which are under the College of Agriculture, or the equipment of the several departments, or the library. Said budget shall be based upon the sum apportioned to his use by the President.

"It shall be the duty of the President to ascertain the probable revenues of the University, to apportion it among the respective colleges, the executive staff, the physical plant of the University, and all other interests of the University, and to correlate, co-ordinate and adjust the various budgets and to determine finally upon all these matters, subject only to the paramount authority of the Board of Trustees."

"We recommend the amendment of Rule 72 of the Rules of the Board of Trustees, by cutting out all words after the word "assistants"; by substituting the word "standard" instead of the word "minimum", and by prefixing to the rule the following sentence: "The Deans shall do such teaching as the duties of their office shall permit."

"We recommend that the office of Superintendent of Property be created, and that the following rule be adopted: "The Superintendent of Property shall report directly to the President. He shall be responsible for the buildings, the grounds and the power and heating plants."

"In conclusion we desire to say that in our opinion the other points touched upon in the communication submitted to us for consideration, are already adequately covered by existing rules and regulations of the Board of Trustees or of the Faculty."

On motion of Mr. Mack the above report was adopted.

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On motion of Mr. Sears, the Board of Overseers of the Ohio Union was authorized to modify or alter the specifications for the equipment of the building as prepared by Mr. George S. Mills, the architect. The Board of Overseers was also given authority to call for new bids if it so desires.

\* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* On motion it was ordered that the University pay for the bronze tablet to be placed in Orton Hall in memory of Dr. Edward

Orton, with the understanding that the inscription to be placed on the tablet shall first be approved by the President.

\* \* \* \* \* \* \* Mr. Florizel L. Smith, attorney for William H. Luchtenberg & Company, appeared before the Trustees and presented a brief of the argument which he had presented at the meeting of the Board on December 7, 1910, and on motion this entire matter of the Luchtenberg contract was referred to a selected committee, consisting of Messrs. Pomerene, Mallon and Stone, to examine and report its findings back to the Board.

# THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY

COLUMBUS, OHIO, June 12, 1911.

The Board of Trustees met at the University at the call of the Chairman. Present, O. E. Bradfute, Chairman, John T. Mack, F. E. Pomerene, Guy W. Mallon, Walter J. Sears, O. T. Corson, and Julius F. Stone.

\*  $\mathbf{x}$ ≵ × \* \*¥ \* The President announced to the Board the death of Professor Nathaniel Wright Lord which occurred May 23, 1911, whereupon the following minute was adopted, and on motion of Mr. Stone a copy was ordered sent to the family:

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The Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University places on record its high appreciation of the character and professional services of the late Professor Lord in his long career in the University. He graduated at Columbia in 1876 and entered the service of the University in 1878 and served contin-uously until his death. At the time of his death he was Professor of Metallurgy and Mineralogy and Director of the School of Mines. His career was one of increasing usefulness. From time to time he rendered valuable public service in the Geological Survey and in various capacities as an expert chemist and metallurgist.

He was one of the organizers of the School of Mines and for seven years served as Dean of the College of Engineering. It fell to his lot to direct the early organization of the College of Engineering, in which he showed a clear grasp of the educational problems involved.

He was a rare teacher who taught for the love of teaching. This devotion and love for teaching determined his action when repeatedly lucrative commercial opportunities were offered and declined.

He was beloved and esteemed by all his associates, and enthusiastically admired by his students.

His death at the early age of 57 was a great shock to his friends and an irreparable loss to the University.

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The President presented a letter from Captain Converse addressed to the Adjutant General of the United States Army applying for an assistant to be detailed by the Federal Government for service in connection with the Military Department.

The application was approved and the President was authorized to forward the same in the name of the University.

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\* The following resolution was adopted:

"In recognition of the life and service of Stillman Williams Rebinson. as a man, a citizen, an engineer and an educator, and in further recognition of the obligation which the Ohio State University owes to his ability, his professional eminence, his profound loyalty, his long service, his not inconsiderable gifts to its material equipment, and his successful efforts in the stimulation of research in the fields of applied sciences, the Board of Trustees hereby directs that the building used by the departments of mechanical and electrical engineering shall be known as the Robinson Laboratory."

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The President reported that the legislature had passed an act authorizing the erection of a high school building on the University Campus subject to agreement by the Board of Education and the Trustees of the University, and recommended that a committee be appointed to conduct the preliminary negotiations and report back to the Board for approval.

Messrs. Corson, Sears and Stone were appointed such a committee.

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The President presented certain papers and reports concerning Dr. Wingert in the matter of athletics with the recommendation that no action be taken.

\* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* The President presented a report from Dr. David S. White showing the entire herd of cattle belonging to the Ohio State University to be free from tuberculosis. The report was ordered filed.

The President presented the following report concerning the organization of a Graduate School as adopted by the University Faculty March 22, 1911, and upon his recommendation said report was approved and adopted:

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"To the University Faculty:

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The Committee appointed to consider the desirability of the organization of a Graduate School of the University, and to report a plan for such organization, should the Committee favor it, respectfully submits the following report:

The Committee has had before it the original and amended reports of a similar committee of 1908. In view of the adoption of the latter by you on May 13, 1908, it does not seem necessary to re-argue, or to re-present the grounds for the establishment of a Graduate School. Since then the enrolment in graduate courses of instruction has increased more than forty per cent. Four colleges of the University now offer graduate work, and the College of Engineering is taking steps to provide more fully for such work.

Your Committee submits the following recommendations:

1. That there be organized at this University, the Graduate School of the Ohio State University.

2. That all legislation regarding the affairs of the Graduate School be subject to the approval of the University Faculty. This shall not be so interpreted as to prevent direct legislation regarding the Graduate School by the University Faculty.

3. That the administration of the Graduate School be vested in a council, (to be known as the Graduate Council) consisting of a Dean and twelve other members, so selected as to properly represent the various lines of graduate work.

4. That the Dean of the Graduate School shall have all the powers duties and privileges that pertain to the office of Dean in the several colleges."

5. That the Dean be elected by the Board of Trustees upon the recommendation of the President of the University; and that the twelve other members of the Graduate Council be appointed by the President of the University for a term of three years, except that, of the original appointees, four shall be appointed for a term of one year, and four for a term of two years.

6. That the existing regulations concerning graduate work in the several colleges of the University remain in force until such time as changes may be proposed by the Graduate Council, and be approved by the University Faculty. That while the Committee does not regard it as a part of its duty to outline the policy to be pursued by the Graduate Council when formed, it is the opinion of the Committee that all graduate courses offered should be introduced as at present in the Faculty of the appropriate college and, if passed, be referred to the Graduate Council for recommendation to the University Faculty and that all such courses when adopted should be printed as at present in the catalogue of the appropriate college as well as in the bulletin of the Graduate School.

Sears as a member of the Board of Overseers of Ohio Union for a term of three years, beginning July 1, 1911. \* \* ж \* \*

The Library Building Committee reported that Allen & Collens, architects for the Library Building, had recommended an extension of thirty days in time to the contract of D. W. McGrath to complete his contract, and presented the following resolution, which was adopted:

<sup>&</sup>quot;Resolved, that the request of D. W. McGrath, contractor for the con-struction of the Library Building at this University, for an extension of thirty days in time to complete the contract, be granted, provided the approval of

the surety on the bond given by said contractor be given in writing to said extension, and further that all the terms and conditions of said contract apply to said extended term."

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The matter of selecting an architect for the equipment of the new Library Building was referred with power to the Library Committee.

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The Executive Committee was authorized to secure bids and award the contract for the coal supply for the year beginning July 1, 1911.

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Mr. Sears presented the following resolution which was adopted, and the correspondence submitted therewith was ordered filed:

"Resolved, that the Secretary's record of the minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee, held February 10, 1910, be changed to show that the only action taken was the adoption of a motion directing the removal, temporarily, from Orton Hall of the Economic Museum only, all members of said committee being fully agreed that such action and no other was taken; and further that certain letters, setting forth such understanding, be filed as a part of this record."

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Mr. Sears presented the following resolution concerning the Ohio Union fee, which was adopted:

"WHEREAS, this Board by resolution dated the 26th day of January 1911, ordered that each of the male students of this University pay in addition to the fees now in force an additional fee of one dollar (\$1.00) each semester for the uses and purposes of the Ohio Union, and,

WHEREAS, the Board of Overseers of said Ohio Union has declared it to be necessary to borrow money for the furnishing and equipping of said Ohio Union; now, therefore, be it

*Resolved*, That the Bursar of this University be and he is hereby authorized and directed to set aside annually from the additional fee thus collected the amount of two thousand dollars (\$2,000,00) to apply on the principal of any loans made by said Board of Overseers of said Ohio Union, and an additional amount to meet the interest accruing on said loans, and said amounts thus set aside to cover principal and interest shall be paid by the Bursar to the party making said loans, and said amounts thus set aside shall not be used for any other purpose whatsoever."

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The special committee, consisting of Messrs. Mallon, Pomerene and Stone, having had the matter of the Luchtenberg contract under consideration, reported as follows:

# "To the Board of Trustees of Ohio State University:

### Gentlemen:

Your committee selected at the Board meeting March 16, 1911, to examine and report its findings back to the Board, in the matter of the claim of Wm. H. Luchtenberg & Company, submits the following findings of fact and its opinion of the law applicable thereto:

On the 28th day of July, 1909, a contract was entered into between Wm. H. Luchtenberg & Company and the Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University, whereby said Luchtenberg & Company agreed to perform certain work, namely, the grading of a road bed for a railroad siding, such work to be completed by November 25th, 1909. This contract was approved by the Attorney General on July 31, 1909.

The month of August went by without any work being done. The work was started on Monday, September 27th--two months after the signing of the contract, and thus one half and a trifle more of the entire time allotted to the work had been allowed to pass unutilized, although the contractor had been notified by a letter of the Engineer in charge dated September 16th to start forthwith and warned by the same official in writing upon the same day that the work demanded 'that considerable force be put to work at once while the river is low, as the University will take no chance on the work lying all winter.'

The work proceeded slowly with an entirely inadaquate force for one month, and upon October 26th the Engineer in charge called the attention of the contractor to the fact that only 5,000 cubic yards had been excavated and that during the next thirty days four times that amount would have to be removed, and demanded that more men and teams be set to work.

During the next month the contractor proceeded with more diligence but it was manifestly impossible to complete in thirty days what would reasonably require four months.

Because of the delay of two months in commencing the work, and the meagre force of eight teams (average) employed during the next month, at the close of the specified period there was completed but 60% of the work.

Upon November 23rd the contractor made written request to the Board for an extension of thirty days, which matter was taken up at a meeting of the Board held December 28th but no action was taken.

The work proceeded during the months of December, January and February very slowly, largely because of bad working conditions; and during the months of March, April and May but little better progress was made, and the work was finished June 8th, 1910.

The grading was sublet by the contractor without the consent of the Engineer in charge and contrary to the directions contained in his letter to the contractor dated September 16th, 1909.

The sub-contractors were incompetent, inexperienced and without proper equipment.

We find

*First:* That the requirement of the contract that the work should be completed by November 25th was not unreasonable.

*Second:* That a sufficient force properly handled could have completed the work in 120 days.

*Third:* That the weather conditions were favorable during the 120 days specified.

*Fourth:* That the failure to complete 90% of the work within the time specified and the entire work within 55 days thereafter was due to the negligence of the contractor.

The claims made on behalf of the contractor are:

A: That other contractor, to-wit, those erecting the concrete abutments to the bridge impeded their work, and were fifty-five days behind with the masonry contract.

B: That because of this delay due to no fault of the contractor, the work was thrown over into the winter months when the working conditions were exceptionally bad.

 $\ell$ : That no damage resulted as the other portions of the work were defective and had to be remedied, and were not so remedied as to render the track available to the use of the University until after the completion of his work.

We answer to

A: That, whereas the masonry contract was delayed 55 days, the interference was but partial, and that 90% of the work of grading could have been done had it been started in time, and had a sufficient force been employed while the other work was under way, whereas only 60% was completed during the partial occupancy of the site by the masonry contractors; that concrete work was finished on November 24th, 1909, and all material removed within a week, that subsequent to December 1st, 1909, there was no obstruction whatever; that assuming that the contractor in agreeing to perform the work in four months counted upon 120 days of perfect weather, he must have contemplated doing almost 1% a day as he could not have contemplated working upon Sundays; that subsequent to December 1st, 1909 and prior to January 25th, 1910, a period of 55 days, the delay claimed, there were more than 10 good working days. In fact the record shows that during the month of December alone there were 15 days upon which the contractor was working as many teams as he had averaged during the prior months;

B: That, conceding the bad weather of the winter months, and the partial delay caused by others, the fact that there was 40% of the work unfinished on November 25th, 1909, instead of only 10% was due to the negligence of the contractor, and that had reasonable diligence been used thereafter, 10% and even 20% of the work could have been completed within the 55 days subsequent thereto.

*C*: That the defects in the masonry work upon the abutments of the bridge were not the cause of the delay in rendering the track available to the use of the University.

On January 7th, 1910, Prof. J. R. Chamberlin, engineer in charge, and Prof. C. T. Morris, Engineer of Bridge Structure, joined in a letter to the Board, stating that the reason for delay in placing the bridge was that "there stills remains to be excavated immediately under the proposed bridge about 7 ft. for a distance of some 80 ft. and in case of high water this obstruction in the channel might cause the water to rise considerably higher than it otherwise would and thus endanger the bridge, were it in place."

The defects in the abutments were not noticed until March 17th, and during the time from the completion of the track upon the west side about January 1st, until March 17th, the bridge was waiting upon the completion of the grading and upon nothing else.

The masonry defects were found to be mere surface crumbling endangering the safety of the structure in no respect and there never existed any reason for withholding the placing of the bridge, other than the delay of the grading. Had the bridge been in place it would have aided rather than hindered the repairs to the masonry.

Professor Morris states professionally and we entirely agree with him that 'at no time in 1910 did the work on the bridge or abutments interfere with the work of grading and filling.'

Coming now to consider the law, we do not consider it necessary to reply to the arguments of counsel concerning the non-enforcement of stipulated damages of \$15, per day provided for in the contract, for we may accept his contention that the proper measure of damages is just compensation for the injury sustained.

It is true that the records of the proceedings of the Board show the following action September 9, 1910:

"Mr. J. R. Chamberlin, engineer in charge of the railroad construction, appeared before the board and presented the final estimate of D. E. Sullivan & Son for the track laying<sup>\*</sup> \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \*

Mr. Chamberlin also presented the final estimate of Wm. H. Luchtenberg & Company for the grading of the railroad, and stated that the contractors had over-run the time limit of their contract 194 days and in his opinion should be held to the penalty as detailed in the contract.

Messrs. J. M. Butler and J. J. Stoddart, attorneys for the contractors, appeared before the Board and asked that the penalty be not enforced.

After listening to their arguments and the statement of the Engineer, the Board decided to waive the penalty on 55 days which the Acme Paving & Construction Company, contractors for the substructure of the bridge, had delayed the grading contractors, and decided further to enforce the penalty on the remaining 139 days at \$15 per day, and the Secretary was directed to pay to Wm. H. Luchtenberg & Company their final estimate thus amended."

The amount of damages so established was \$2,085.00. If this was an erroneous action, and the case did not justify the enforcement of the clause in the contract providing for stipulated damages, such action can now be rescinded.

If this is done, the entire action of the Board and its findings on that day must be set aside.

The question then arises: what were the actual damages sustained by the University by reason of the breach of contract by Luchtenberg & Company?

The breach of the contract, interpreting its provison as contended for by the contractors' counsel, was the failure to complete the contract not prior to November 25th, 1909, a period of 120 days, but a failure to complete it in a reasonable time after November 25th, as they strongly contend that 120 days from July 25th to November 25th may be far different from the same number of days at another season.

We do not find that the Acme Paving & Construction Company delayed the grading contractors 55 days, but that such Company did delay the contractor to the extent of obstructing him upon a portion of his work amounting to not more than 10% of the entire work—or 12 days—and we further find that the 55 days succeeding November 25th contained the equivalent of 12 full good working days. Hence we arrive by a more exact course of reasoning to the same conclusion arrived at on September 9th, 1910.

Namely, we hold the contractor liable only for damages arising from loss suffered by the University after the expiration of the contract period extended by 55 days.

In estimating those damages we multiplied the number of days from such date to the time of the completion of the work by the stipulated damages per day, i. e. \$15.00, and referred to such amount as a penalty. In this we may have been in error. If so, the real measure of damages would be the actual injury resulting to the University by failure of the contractors to complete the grading, prior to January 25th, 1910.

The actual injury suffered was much more than \$2,085.00. The loss incurred in the hauling of coal alone was in excess of \$15.00 per day, taking no account of the direct damage in being compelled to close the University for some three days by reason of having no fuel, which in pecuniary loss alone was over \$1000 a day.

We therefore recommend the following action:

A reconsideration and a rescinding of the action of the Board of September 9, 1910, and the passing of the following resolution:

WHEREAS, Wm. H. Luchtenberg & Company violated the conditions of the contract entered into July 28th, 1909, by such firm as party of the first part and by the Ohio State University as party of the second part, and whereas by reason of such breach of contract upon the part of the party of the first part, the party of the second part was substantially injured; and whereas a fair and just compensation for such injury is an amount in excess of \$2,085.00, and whereas said party of the first part has been either paid or tendered the full contract price less \$2,085.00 and now makes claim for \$2.085.00: be it

Resolved by the Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University that said claim be rejected.

> (Signed) GUY W. MALLON JULIUS F. STONE"

Said report was ordered received and adopted, and the action of the Board taken at its meeting September 9, 1910, as regards the penalty imposed upon Wm. H. Luchtenberg & Company as set forth in the above report, was rescinded.

On motion of Mr. Stone the resolution of the committee as set forth in the above report was adopted.

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Whereupon the Board adjourned to meet at the University on Tuesday at 1:30 P. M.

June 13, 1911, 1:30 P. M.

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The Board came together with all members present except Mr. Corson. \*





2. Mr. William N. Fenninger was appointed Fellow in Physics at \$300.00 as provided in the budget.

3. Mr. H. C. McCall was appointed Assistant in Civil Engineering at a salary of \$600.00 as provided in the Budget.

4. It was ordered that the diploma fees received during the year be credited to the account of Commencement Expense.

5. It was ordered that when money is returned in payment of loans made under the Smith and Scott Funds, that such monies be added to the principal of the fund from which the loan was originally made.

6. It was ordered that the payment of expenses of delegates from the University to educational conferences shall be limited to those conventions of which the University is a contributing member.

7. It was ordered that 1800 of the balance to the credit of the Publication Board be cancelled.

8. It was also ordered that the balance to the credit of the salaries account be canceled; also Winter Course lecture fund, Summer Session 1910 balance and Virginia Military Lands balance.

10. \$459.50 was appropriated to the Student Building account to meet the payment due George S. Mills as architect.

11. Eugene Ruth was appointed Assistant in Agricultural Chemistry at a salary of \$600.00, and Clara Smith was appointed Fellow in Agricultural Chemistry at a salary of \$300.00, and \$900.00 was appropriated to meet these appointments.

12. \$121.00 was appropriated for the Winter Course lectures in the Dairy School.

13. The request of the Archaeological and Historical Society for the location of the new building on High Street, south of Fifteenth Avenue, was approved, with the understanding that the exact location meet the approval of the supervising architect.

CEDAR POINT, OHIO, August 2, 1911.

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The Board met at the call of the Chairman with the following members present:

O. E. Bradfute, Chairman, Walter J. Sears, Julius F. Stone, F. E. Pomerene and John T. Mack. \*

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\* The Secretary presented his bond in the amount of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.) issued by the United States Fidelity and Guarantee Company, under date of August 1, 1911, and the same was approved and ordered filed with the Treasurer of the University.

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On motion of Mr. Stone the proposition of the Ludowici-Celadon Company of Chicago, to repair the roof of Townshend Hall, was referred to the Building Committee with power to act. \* \* ж \* ж  $\mathbf{x}$ \* On motion of Mr. Sears, Olmsted Brothers were retained

for one year as landscape architects for the University, compensation to be on the same basis as for previous years. \* \* \*  $^{*}$ \* \* \* \*

The President presented preliminary plans for the proposed building to be erected by the Ohio State Archæological and Historical Society, said plans having been prepared by Professor Bradford.

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After careful examination, said preliminary plans were approved and the Secretary was directed to send the same to Mr. Olmsted, the landscape architect, for his approval.

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Captain Cope presented the following applications for deeds, and on motion of Mr. Mack, the Chairman was directed to execute the same:

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The President reported the death of Professor Benjamin Franklin Thomas at Boothbay Harbor, Maine, July 4, 1911, whereupon the Board adopted the following resolution:

Benjamin Franklin Thomas, born at Palmyra, Portage County, Ohio, October 14, 1850, graduated from Ripon College, Ripon, Wisconsin, in 1874, and from Stevens Institute, Hoboken, New Jersey, with the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in 1880, came to the Ohio State University as professor of Physics in 1885, having served five years in the same capacity immediately preceding at the University of Missouri. His death occurred in the Marine Hospital at Boothbay Harbor, Maine, July 4, 1911, from acute Brights Disease, having gone as usual with his family to their summer home at Squirrel Island, Maine.

Professor Thomas during his services at the Universities of Missouri and Ohio was a member of the Board of Examiners at the International Electrical Exhibition in Philadelphia in 1884, a member of the Jury of Awards, Department of Electricity, at the World's Columbian Exposition at Chicago in 1893, and served efficiently as State Sealer of Weights and Measures in Ohio. He was frequently called upon for expert advice by municipalities and as an expert witness in cases involving technical problems in physics and electricity. He was a man of high order of ability, devoted to his work in the University, and an effective member on faculty organization. He served with great efficiency in the organization of athletics as member of the Athletic Board. His untimely death marks another break in the ranks of the men who connect the present with the early history of the University. The Trustees bear testimony to his ability, scholarship and efficiency.

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The following recommendations of the President were agreed to:

1. Paul N. Rice, graduate of Wesleyan University, Connecticut, was appointed Library Assistant at \$65.00 per month, effective September 1. 1911, as provided in the Budget, and the remaining \$100.00 appropriated for this purpose was cancelled and credited to the unappropriated balances.

2. Leslie Merton Parker, Cornell 1911, was appointed Fellow in Geology at \$300.00 for the year 1911-12, as provided in the Budget.

3. Henry B. Froning and Jesse E. Day were appointed Fellows in Chemistry at \$300.00 each, as provided in the Budget.

4. Miss Laura Parsons Thomas was appointed Assistant in Greek and Latin for the year 1911-12 at \$300.00, as provided in the Budget.

5. Henry F. Walradt, Ph. D. Yale, was appointed Substitute Instructor in Economics and Sociology for 1911-12 at \$1200.00, as provided in the Budget.

6. John G. Hopper, University of Pennsylvania 1911, was appointed Assistant in Veterinary Medicine at \$750.00, as provided in the Budget, vice R. A. Scothoru resigned.

7. \$25.00 was appropriated for student assistance in the Department of Chemistry for the Summer Session, said amount to be paid from the appropriation made for lectures by Professor J. Warren Smith.

8. Professor E. E. Somermeier was made acting head of the Department of Metallurgy and Mineralogy for the year 1911-1912.

9. \$1,000,00 was transferred from the appropriation for labor in the Dairy Department to the account of salaries in the Dairy Department, and the name of J. M. Cadwallader was ordered listed as Instructor in Dairying at the salary of \$1,000,00.

10. The salary of R. O. Busey was increased \$200,00 and this amount was appropriated to meet said increase.

11. \$220.00 was appropriated for the two month's service of C. W. Reeder in the Library during the Summer Session.

12. \$35.00 was appropriated for one month's salary in the Summer Session of Cora Elliott as maid.

13. The rules of the Board of Trustees for a system of accounting among student organizations, as adopted May 20, 1909, were amended as follows:

In items 1 and 12 the words "University Editor" were substituted for the words "Purchasing Agent" and in item 13 the words "University Editor" were substituted for the words "Secretary of the Board of Trustees." \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \*

Upon the recommendation of the President provision for a new porch on the south-east side of Oxley Hall was authorized, also a new electric elevator, the money for the same to be provided from the Oxley Hall fund.

(1) The appointment of a permanent University architect, who with the aid of necessary assistants would design and erect all buildings for the University.

(2) The appointment of an architect's advisory board of seven members, composed of the Landscape Architect, the President, the Superintendent of the University Power, Heat and Light Plant, and four members of the Faculty, persumably engineers. This Board will pass upon all plans prepared by the University architect, before they are sent to the Board of Trustees. In conjuction with the University architect, and the landscape architect, if one is employed, it will pass upon all locations of buildings, subject to ratification by the Board of Trustees.

(3) The Board of Trustees will reserve the right as a part of the above plan, to solicit competitive plans for any structure from outside architects, paying the actual cost of each plan submitted, and paying the usual  $2\frac{1}{2}$ % for the winning plans. The University architect, with the advisory board, or the Board of Trustees itself, to be the jury to select the winning plans. After a plan is thus selected it will be turned over to the University architect for execution, he being given the power to make any changes to bring it into harmony with the general plan for the development of the University, such changes, if any, to be subject to ratification by the advisory board and the Board of Trustees.

The object of the provision of Section 3, is to bring in a wider scope of ideas, whenever the Board of Trustees thinks there is too much of the oneman idea in the University's architecture.

(4) The University architect to have under him.

(a) A competent assistant architect of good quality (a man who would cost from\$ 1.800. to \$2400, a year) who would take the ideas of the Universityarchitect, detail them, prepare specifications and estimates, etc.

(b) A competent superintendent of construction whose principal employment would be outside on the works, but who in slack times could be employed at drafting or office work.

(c) A force of draftsmen, tracers, etc. which would fluctuate greatly according to the amount of work in progress.

(5) The University architect will have charge of the alterations, extension and constructive repair of all University buildings (not including all ordinary repairs, which would be in charge of the Maintenance Department).

(6) All buildings built upon the University's land, for other organizations than the University, shall be designed by the University architect, or if designed by outside architects, the plans shall be approved by the University architect and the advisory board, and the Board of Trustees, in order to secure continuity and harmony of design.

The following report of the Sub-Committee on salaries and appointments is recommended for adoption:

The Sub-Committee of the Architectural Advisory Board appointed to consider salaries, appointments and office room, respectfully reports and recommends the following:

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On motion of Mr. Pomerene the position of University Architect was created. The duty of said Architect shall be to prepare the plans and specifications for University work and superintend the construction of all buildings to be erected on the campus by University authorities.

It was also agreed that an Architectural Advisory Board be created, said Board to consist of seven members, as follows:

- President of the University.
- 1st President of the Univ 2nd Landscape architect.

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- Four members of the faculty to be named by the President, sub-3rd ject to the approval of Trustees.
- 4th Chief Engineer.

On motion of Mr. Sears it was ordered that the Architectural Advisory Board be instructed to prepare a comprehensive plan for the future development of the campus and its buildings, said plan to be submitted to Olmsted Brothers for their approval.

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On motion the President was directed to submit to the Board of Trustees at the next meeting for its approval, the names of the University Architect and of the Advisory Board, together with the recommendation for such change in salaries as may be necessary.

That until some definite idea has been obtained as to the total expense involved, but for a period of not to exceed six months, the Association will pay the salaries of those carrying on the work of the offices, and that the University will pay all other expenses whatsoever of the office, except the traveling expenses of the Permanent Secretary in such of the organizations work as may require him to travel.

That at the end of six months period, or as much sooner as appears advisable, some definite basis will be arrived at between the representatives of the University and of the Association, respectively, as to a division of the expense of the office, due regard being given to the desirable activities of the office, their value to the University, and the limitations imposed upon the Association by the amount of its income.

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Ohio State University.

DEAR PRESIDENT THOMPSON:

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In accordance with Rule 53 of the Rules of the Board of Trustees, I am reporting herewith two new rules of a general nature passed by the University Faculty, which should be presented to the Board of Trustees for approval:

127 b. Students who wish to withdraw from the University must make application to the Dean of the appropriate college for permission to withdraw in good standing. In order to retain their right to voluntary return, the reasons given for withdrawal must be satisfactory to the Dean, and must

be so endorsed at the time the application is filed. If the permission to withdraw is withheld, and students absent themselves from the University notwithstanding, they will sacrifice their right to voluntary return, and can only obtain readmission by petition to the Executive Committee of the appropriate college, as in the case of those who have lost their standing by reason of conditions and failures.

Rule 129 was amended to read as follows:

129. No undergraduate will be admitted to candidacy for a degree at any Commencement who has not done the last year of work required for the degree in residence at that college of this University in which the degree is sought, two summer terms being considered the equivalent of one semester, and four summer terms the equivalent of the year, and no student will be registered in such candidacy later than the first day of October.

Two new courses of study have been adopted by the University Faculty which, under Rule 50, should be reported to the Board of Trustees for approval:

1. An Apprentice's Course in Animal Husbandry. This course covers two years of work at the University and two alternating years of professional work on approved stock farms. A certificate is granted upon completion of the course.

2. A Four Year Course in Agricultural Education, leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Education. The purpose of this course is to equip students for the teaching of agriculture in secondary schools.

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\* The President reported a second shipment of mineral specimens from the National Museum at Washington to the department of Metallurgy and Mineralogy, and said gift was accepted and the President was instructed to make suitable acknowledgement on behalf of the University.

\* A scholarship from Cuyahoga County was awarded to Ernest Hoftyzer. \*

The President was authorized to approve bills not to exceed \$150.00 in amount, for certain experiments under Dr. Brumley in the College of Veterinary Medicine, and \$150.00 was appropriated to the department of Veterinary Medicine for this purpose.

\* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* Upon recommendation of the University Faculty, the following degrees were granted:

Don C. Mote, Bachelor of Science in Agriculture; Gertude Koehne Blose, Bachelor of Science in Education; Albert Caine Morrow, Doctor of Veterinary Medicine and Hiram Lyle Tate, Doctor of Veterinary Medicine, as of the Class of 1911.

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The following resolution, approved by the University Faculty on March 8, 1911, was adopted:

"*Resolved.* That the undergraduate degrees in the College of Engineering shall be Bachelor of Architecture; Bachelor of Ceramic Engineering; Bachelor of Chemical Engineering; Bachelor of Civil Engineering; Bachelor of Electrical Engineering; Bachelor of Industrial Arts; Bachelor of Mechanical Engineering and Bachelor of Engineering in Mining. Notice of these changes in degrees shall be published at once and shall take effect in 1915. Students who wish to avail themselves of these degrees earlier may do so upon the approval of the Engineering Faculty."

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Upon the recommendation of the President, it was agreed to take membership in the Association of State Mining Schools, and an expense bill from Professor F. A. Ray, in the amount of \$53.74, incurred while attending a meeting of said Association, was ordered paid.

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On motion of Mr. Pomerene, the Secretary was directed to examine the original records of Blackwood, Green and Company and satisfy himself that said account was correct and to report his findings to the Executive Committee, which Committee was given power to authorize the payment of said account if same was found to be correct.

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The Board came in session with all members present. \*

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\* \* The President presented a communication from the Visitors Committee of the Ohio State University Association concerning the erection of domitories for men upon the University campus. and on motion of Mr. Mack, the President and Mr. Pomerene were appointed a committee to confer with the Visitors Committee concerning plans for a domitory system. \* \* \* \* \* \* \*  $\ast$ \*

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Upon the recommendation of the President, Mr. J. A . Almirall of New York City, was appointed engineer to prepare the plans and specifications for extending the hot water heating system to Orton Hall and the Ohio Union, on the basis of a commission of three per cent of the total cost of the proposed extension, plus actual traveling and hotel expenses for such trips as may be necessary.

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Mr. Mack reported that, acting upon the request of the President, he had examined the Indianola Printing Plant with a view to estimating its value, in case the University should care to purchase it, and on motion, Mr. Mack and Mr. Sears were instructed to further investigate the matter of establishing a printing plant at the University and to report to the Trustees at a subsequent meeting.

John Chisholm, Superintendent of the University Farm, effective March 1, 1912.

Wallace Stengle, Clerk in the Military Department, effective January 30, 1912.

2. Richard Bean, Fellow in English, was relieved of one half of his departmental service for the remainder of the year 1911-1912, and Miss Eya M. Campbell, was appointed Fellow in English, half time, at a salary of \$75.00 effective February 1, 1912, to be paid from the \$150.00 appropriated for the salary of Mr. Bean.

Miss Margaret MacLean was continued as Assistant in Chemistry 3. for the second semester at the same salary as the first semester, the same to be paid from the Emergency Appropriation for temporary assistance in the department of Chemistry.

4. C. E. Findlay was appointed Clerk in the Military deparement, vice Wallace Stengle resigned, effective February 1, 1912, and \$42.50 was appropriated for Mr. Findlay's salary to cover additional length of service.

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5. The title of W. F. Gephart was changed from Assistant Professor to Professor of Economics and Sociology.

6. The President reported that, through a clerical error in making up the Budget, the name of C. S. Lehner, second assistant in the Chemical Supply Store, was omitted. Mr Lehner has been serving since July 1, 1911, at the salary provided in the Budget.

7. Dr. A. M. Jansen was appointed Technician in the department of Bacteriology, half time for five months, beginning February 1, 1912, at a salary of \$200,00, and said amount was appropriated for this purpose.

8. The President presented the following report of the special committee appointed to consider the reorganization of athletics. Said report was approved by the University Faculty February 14, 1912.

(1) The control of intercollegiate athletics shall be vested in an athletic board of control constituted as follows:

The said board shall consist of nine members; five of these shall be members of the University Faculty and shall be appointed by the President, annually. They shall constitute the Faculty Committee on Athletics and Eligibility.

Two members shall be alumni of the University elected or appointedannually by the Alumni Association. Two members shall be student s to be elected annually by the members of the Athletic Association. This board shall appoint the athletic director, engage all coaches and trainers, approveall schedules and expenditures, appoint all student mauagers and other assistants.

(2) The immediate direction of intercollegiate athletics shall be in the hands of a director of atheltics, appointed by and responsible to the board of control. It shall be the duty of such director to arrange the schedules of all intercollegiate and intramural contests subject to the approval of the board. He shall supervise all trips and all arrangements for the carrying on of intercollegiate and intramural contests.

He shall look after the interests of the intercollegiate teams and further he shall endeavor to promote a general participation in outdoor athletics among students of the University. He shall report to the board of control on all matters relating to his department.

(3) It is recommended that as soon as practicable and as far as possible all coaches of teams shall be employed for the regular academic year and when satisfactory, continued in their office from year to year. It is the view of the Committee that it is highly desirable that all coaches should be permanently identified with the life of the University. On motion, said report was agreed to, and all adjustment of rules necessary to conform to the plan was authorized.

The Chairman stated that the motion of Mr. Mallon was before the Board for action, and on roll call the Chairman declared that the motion was unanimously disagreed to.

Ι. The following changes were approved:

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Owing to the illness of Assisistant Professor H. W. Vaughan of the department of Animal Husbandry, W. H. Palmer was appointed to carry some of the work for the remainder of the year, at a salary of \$100.00 permonth, effective February 1, 1912, payable from the appropriation for the salary of Mr. Vaughan.

The resignation of A. E. Hardgrove, Fellow in Chemistry, was accepted, effective April 9, 1912, and the balance remaining in the appropriation for the salary of Mr. Hardgrove was placed to the credit of the fund for student assistance in the above department.

The resignation of Miss Alice A. Thacker, Assistant to the Registrar, was accepted, effective April 1, 1912, and Miss Mabel Boardman was appointed to succeed Miss Thacker, at the same salary, effective April 1, 1912,

The resignation J. G. Wittenmyer, Assistant in the department of Zoölogy and Entomology, was accepted, effective April 1, 1912, and Miss Elizabeth Sweatman and Don C. Mote were appointed student assistants to fill the vacancy for the remainder of the year, the balance remaining of the salary appropriated for Mr, Wittenmyer to be divided equally between them.

The resignation of Miss Alice Wing, cataloguer in the Library, was accepted, effective June 15, 1912.

The resignation of Curry Sesler, second engineer, was accepted effective April 22, 1912; Fred Brewer was advanced from third engineer to the position of second engineer aud W. D. Hicks was appointed third engineer, at a salary of \$70.00 per month until July 1, 1912.

2. President Thompson, Professor G. W. Knight and Professor J. V. Denney were appointed official representatives to attend the celebration of the seventy-fifth anniversary of the founding of the University of Michigan, June 23-27, 1912.

3 Charles Lewis Miner, Bachelor of Science in Agriculture, Class of 1906, was granted a duplicate diploma, the original having been destroyed by fire.

4. In accordance with the recommendation of the University Faculty at a meeting held May 8, 1912, George Doane Freeman was granted the degree of Mechanical Engineer in Electrical Engineering, as of the Class of 1898.

5. President Thompson presented a communication from Associate Professor W. A. Knight, of the department of Industrial Arts, concerning his work, and the same was ordered filed.

6. The President submitted the following report from the Administrative Board of the Summer Session, and the same was approved:

First. That the regular Summer Session of eight weeks be continued.

Second. That the Summer Session be conducted in all respects like the regular sessions of the University.

Third. That the registration fee for the Summer Session be increased from \$6.00 to \$8.00.

Fourth. That graduate work be encouraged.

Fifth. That while no departure be made from the ideals of the Summer Session of the past, yet that the work of the Session be restricted by the elimination of courses which are chiefly of a preparatory character and such other courses as are not necessary to carry out the fundamental purposes of the Session in order that the Session for 1912 may be kept within the limits of the funds available.

7. One hundred dollars (\$100.00) was appropriated to the Current Expense account of the department of Electrical Engineering.

8. The President reported that Professor R. D. Bohannan finds it impossible to accept the leave of absence granted him and desires to express his thanks and appreciation to the Board for this kindness.

9. An appropriation of \$49.65 was made to the department of Mine Engineering, for the payment of the following bills covering expenses incurred on trips with students to Athens, Gloucester and Cambridge, Ohio, during December and January: W. H. Minor, \$9.40; Charles M. Shinn, \$7.80; W. H. Minor, \$7.80; W. H. Minor, \$6.95; I. C. Callender, \$9.20; Charles M. Shinn, \$8.50.

10. The following report of the Graduate Council, covering work done at the Ohio Experiment Station, adopted by the University Faculty April 10, 1912, was approved:

"Inasmuch as the Ohio Experiment Station is equipped for doing a high grade of scientific research work in lines related to Agriculture and has in its employ graduates of this and other institutions of high rank who desire to pursue scientific courses leading to graduate degrees, and since some provision for such connection between the two institutions seems eminently desirable and in agreement with conditions in all othercolleges of Agriculture in the United States, it is recommended that scientific work at the Ohio Experiment Station be recognized on the following terms.

I. That persons engaged in investigation at the Ohio Experiment Station may, if meeting other requirements of preparation, be recognized as meeting the residence requirements of the University, the time required to be determined in each individual case by the Graduate Council. Provided, that in case of a candidate for a Doctorate, at least one-third of the required work to be done in residence at the Ohio State University.

2. That each case, where Experiment Station residence is proposed, shall be considered individually and subject to detailed examination on the part of the Graduate Council.

3. That work done at the Ohio Experiment Station and accepted for credit toward degrees shall be open to supervision on the part of the University by the usual committee provided for graduate courses as well as direct supervision of the proper officer of the Experiment Station, and such periodical reports or conferences may be required as the University department concerned may prescribe.

4. That the candidate for an advanced degree who offers residence and work at the Experiment Station shall take the prescribed oral examinations at the University and when practicable such examinations shall be attended by the members of the Experiment Station staff with whom he has worked as well as by the usual examining committee of the University.

5. That members of the Experiment Station staff may by agreement of the department concerned, and with the approval of proper authorities at the University and the Station be placed upon the Department staff of the appropriate University Department as non-resident members, and in such cases they may be added to the committees in charge of the student courses."

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

"The Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University most heartily approves the plan of co-operative graduate work, as prepared by the Graduate Council, and approved by the University Faculty, and refers the same to the Board of Control of the Ohio Experiment Station for consideration and action." 11. The resignation of Leon P. Shinn, student assistant in the department of Pharmacy, was accepted, effective May 15, 1912, and the balance of the appropriation for his salary was ordered placed to the credit of the department to be used for student assistance.

12. The salary of Professor William McPherson was made \$3,250.00 for the current year, to include services as Dean of the Graduate School, and \$750.00 was appropriated for this purpose. \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \*

The President was directed to secure a report on the organization of "The Lantern" and present the same to the Board at its next meeting.

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The President recommended that the following appropriations be made from the Special State Appropriation of \$5,000.00 for apparatus and equipment, and said recommendation was agreed to:

On motion, the University Architect was directed to prepare preliminary sketches and estimated cost of the proposed Woman's Building, the same to be presented to the President and Board of Trustees for approval.

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The plans and specifications for new steps in front of University Hall, as prepared by the University Architect, at an estimated cost of \$1,900.00 were approved.

The plans and specifications for a new entrance to the front of University Hall, as prepared by the University Architect, at an estimated cost of \$600.00 were approved.

The plans and specifications for plazas to be constructed in front of University Hall, Townshend Hall, Brown Hall, Mines Building, Veterinary Laboratory, Robinson Laboratory, Northeast corner of University Hall, and North-west corner of University Hall, all at an estimated cost of \$1,200.00, were approved.

The plans and specifications for an exit at the north side of the Gymnasium and for iron stairways from the balcony to the main floor, as prepared by the University Architect, at an estimated cost of \$1,300.00, were approved.

The plans and specifications for new gutters for Hayes Hall, as prepared by the University Architect, at an estimated cost of \$800.00 were approved.

The plans and specifications for new gutters for the Biological Building at an estimated cost of \$200.00, were approved.

The Secretary was directed to secure bids on the above plans and specifications and award the contracts to the lowest and best bidders in each instance.

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The President reported that the estimate for the plans for the Biological Building, which were approved at the last meeting of the Board of Trustees, was for \$125,000.00, while the appropriation as made by the legislature was only \$100,000.00. He stated further that an adequate building could not be built with this amount of money, and, on motion, the order to the Secretary to present said plans, specifications and estimate to the State Building Commission was withdrawn, and the President was directed to call the attention of the next legislature to this situation. \* \* \*  $\mathbf{v}$

Mr. Pomerene, of the committee appointed to confer with a committee from the Alumni Association concerning the erection of a dormitory system at the University, reported that at a conference held with the Attorney General this morning, the Attorney General had approved of the general scheme of co-operation of the Trustees of the University with the Ohio State University Association for the building of a dormitory system.

On motion, the committee was continued with the power to prepare proper contracts for such co-operation. \*

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On motion, the Secretary was directed to have the roadway from the Biological Building to University Hall abandoned.

\* \* ж ж \*  $\ast$  $_{\star}$ ж The President presented the following report concerning a biological survey of the State of Ohio, with the recommendation that the plan as outlined be approved, and that the President be authorized to take the necessary steps to put the same into effect, and on motion, the recommendation of the President was agreed to: To The President and Board of Trustees,

Ohio State University,

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Columbus, Ohio.

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At a meeting of the Ohio Academy of Science held in Columbus, November 30 and December 1 and 2, 1911, a committee consisting of L. B. Walton (Chairman) Gambier, Ohio, E. I., Rice of Delaware, and Frank Carney of Granville, was appointed to formulate a plan for a Biological Survey of Ohio in co-operation with the educational institutions of the state and with the assistance of such aid as might be obtained from the state.

The committee submitted a tentative arrangement—a copy of which is enclosed—of such a survey to various institutions. This contemplated the nomination and appointment of a Director, while a Co-operative Board, one member to be from each institution subscribing to the general plan on the basis of \$25, so annually, would act with the Director to arrange a definite working basis for the Survey.

At Kenyon College, the faculty has recommended the plan to the Trustees who will undoubtedly agree to it at the coming meeting. Ohio University has signified the intention of co-operating, as has also Otterbein and Heidelberg, both of which however wish to await the arrival of the new men who will assume charge of the work in Biology the coming year.

It therefore seems probable that at least twelve institutions are ready to unite with the Ohio State University in such a Survey.

The success of a Biological Survey will depend largely upon the assistance which may be obtained directly or indirectly from the State. Surveys of this nature have already been organized in various states with appropriations of from \$1,550.00 to \$10,000.00. (See Conn.Public Document No. 47,p. 21) the latter instance being a Geological Survey. The State of Connecticut which has anextremely efficient Geological and Natural History Survey, uses approximately \$2,000.00 for the Biological Work.

The Committee therefore presents the matter to the Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University, with the request that they render such assistance as may seem most advantageous to the educational interests of the State of Ohio.

# OUTLINE OF A PROPOSED ORGANIZATION FOR SECURING A BIOLOGICAL SURVEY OF OHIO

The members of the Ohio Academy of Science, representing a large number of universities and colleges in the state, have been endeavoring for a number of years to secure legislative support toward a biological survey along the lines adopted by many other states. At the last meeting of the Academy a conference of a large number of the teachers and workers in biology was held and after a careful consideration of the ways and means for mangurating the work with the least possible delay, the accompanying resolutions were adopted and signed, and a committee appointed to perfect such organization.

### RESOLUTIONS

In view of the general desirability, alike from the economic and educational view points, of the establishment of a Biological Survey of the State of Ohio, the undersigned members of the Ohio Academy of Science agree upon the following resolutions:

1. That it is desirable that a Biological Survey be organized in connection with the Ohio State University and in co-operation with other educa tional and scientific institutions of the State.

2. That a committee be appointed to secure an expression of opinion from the colleges of the "Ohio College Association" and from Scientific Workers and Organizations, and to obtain assurance of scientific and financial co-operation on the part of such institutions and individuals.

3. That in case of favorable response, this committee be instructed to present the request of the authorities of the Ohio State University that the University organize such a survey in connection with the general biological work of the University, and to make such provision for maintenance as the Trustees may deem expedient.

A committee was then appointed consisting of Professors Walton of Kenyon, Rice of Wesleyan, and Carney of Denison, to carry out the proposed arrangement and secure responses from other colleges. This committee sub mits herewith a provisional plan of organization and will welcome an early response with any suggestions that may be offered.

### PROVISIONAL OUTLINE

The following preliminary outline for a Biological Survey is based upon suggested co-operation between the various educational and other institutions in the state interested in securing a definite knowledge concerning the fauna and flora of Ohio.

The object of the Survey will be to secure accurate and detailed information as to the occurrence, distribution, and ecology of the animals and plants in Ohio for the benefit of the people in general and particularly for those engaged in school instruction, and to collect, identify and distribute material that may be of service in educational work.

The co-operation proposes either financial or scientific support, or both, from institutions, organizations, or individuals, interested in the purpose of the survey.

The central office and general management will be arranged in connection with the State University and under the official control of its trustees. The co-operative board is planned to consist of a representative from each institution and organization agreeing to the plan of co-operation and contributing a membership fee of \$25.00, such representative to be appointed by the executive officer of the institution or organization. The functions of the co-operative board will be to outline the policy of the Survey, recommend the distribution of the work by localities and among specialists, to nominate the director, and determine on such other recommendations as may seem to them desirable for the success of the Survey.

The Director of the Survey shall be appointed by the board of trustees after nomination by the co-operative board, and his duties shall be to have general executive management of the Survey, the details of co-operation with individuals, the direction of special assistants, and arrangement of papers for the board of publication. He shall also act as Secretary of the co-operative board, and approve all bills paid from the Survey fund.

The publication shall consist of a series of bulletins, each to be issued as promptly as possible after the completion of any piece of work.

A series of memoirs or monographs to include the more extended results of special investigations will be undertaken if the material together with the support necessary for such publication becomes available.

The contributions from the co-operating institutions and from individuals and any specific appropriations from the state shall constitute a fund for biological survey purposes, to be drawn upon by orders of the director.

From duplicate material secured in progress of the work, special collections may be arranged and forwarded to such schools as may wish them under regulations to be determined by the co-operative board. Meetings of the co-operative board shall be on the call of the Director. There shall be at least one meeting each year, ordinarily in connection with the meeting of the Ohio Academy of Science, for the purpose of hearing reports and outlining the work for the ensuing year.

\* \* The President presented the plans and specifications, as prepared by the University Architect, for the construction of a frame

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building to be used for poultry instruction, at an estimated cost of \$2,900.00, said building to be located west of the river near the other poultry buildings.

On motion, said plans and specifications were approved, and the Secretary was directed to secure bids and award the contract. \* \* \* \* ж The President presented sketches for the remodeling of the first floor of Brown Hall, in order to provide an office and fireproof vault for the use of the University Architect, and a fire-proof vault for the use of the University Photographer. Said sketches were approved, the estimate for above work being \$500.00. \* × \* \* ¥ ¥ \* \* \*

The President presented a report from Dr. D. S. White as to the expenditure of the Special State Appropriation of \$5,000.00 for the equipment of the Veterinary Clinic Building. This report was approved, and the Secretary was directed to proceed with the expenditure of the above funds in the usual manner. \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \*

The President presented a communication from W. C. Mc-Cracken, Chief Engineer, under date of April 19, 1912, regarding suggested improvements for the railroad spur, to be paid from the Special State Appropriation of \$5,000.00. The recommendations were agreed to, and the Secretary was directed to award proper contracts for the work.

\*

The President presented a report concerning the new lighting system for the Armory and Gymnasium building, as contained in the report of W. C. McCracken under date of May 3, 1912, at a total estimated cost of \$775.58, to be paid from the Special State Appropriation for Betterment of Buildings. On motion, it was ordered to proceed with this work. \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \*

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The President presented two proposed routes from the railroad spur to the site of the proposed Archæological and Historical Museum building, as laid out by the Hocking Valley Engineer. These routes were not approved. The Executive Committee, however, decided to permit the Dawson Construction Company to use one of two routes, namely, from the railroad spur north of the power house and south of the Robinson Laboratory, thence along the roadway in front of the Mines Building to the intersection of the roadway in front of the Armory and Gymnasium building, thence to enter on the oval and curve to the site of the building. If this route is chosen, it shall be with the understanding that the track must be removed and the campus and roadway placed in as good condition as found before the track was laid, not later than May 1, 1913. The second route to leave the main spur at Neil Avenue and Woodruff Avenue and follow along Woodruff Avenue up to the woods, at which point the Dawson Construction Company can maintain unloading equipment until the building is finally completed. In case the Dawson Construction Company accepts either one of the above routes, the Secretary was directed to prepare a proper contract, with bond guaranteeing that the track, campus and roadway shall be kept in good condition during the use of the spur, and that when said spur is removed the roadway and campus will be carefully repaired.

CEDAR POINT, OHIO, JULY 26, 1912.

The Board of Trustees met at the call of the President at the Hotel Breakers, Cedar Point, Ohio.

Present: Walter J. Sears, Chairman. Julius F. Stone, John T. Mack, O. E. Bradfute and F. E. Pomerene.

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The President presented the following recommendations which were agreed to:

I. Mr. C. R. George, Instructor in the Department of Animal Husbandry, and Mr. Milton C. Warren, Fellow in English, declined appointment for the year 1912-1913.

2. The resignation of Mr. F. B. Hagaman, Instructor in Manual Training for the Summer Session was accepted, effective July 13, 1912, and Mr. S.P. Smith, was appointed to complete the work in the Summer Session, in place of Mr. Hagaman.

3. The name of Professor O. C. Lockhart was substituted for that of Professor W. F. Gephart in the Summer Session Budget, the salary to remain the same.

4. In order to correct the record, the appointment of Mr. W. H. Palmer, Instructor in Animal Husbandry in the Agricultural Extension Department, was made for eleven months, effective August 1, 1912, at a salary of \$125.00 per month.

5. The following appointments were made for positions already provided in the Budget:

Mr.T S. Hewerdine, Assistant Professor of Civil Engineering, at a salary of \$1500.00.

Mr. Wilmer G. Stover, Instructor in Botany, at a salary of \$1400.00.

Mr. Robert B. Stoltz, Instructor in Dairying, salary on the basis of \$1000.00 for twelve months, beginning August 1, 1912.

Mr. Ralph Jeffries, Assistant in Horticulture, at a salary of \$600.00.

Mr. Wesley E. Gatewood, Assistant in Bacteriology, at a salary of \$775.00.

Mr. Charles Ross Schroyer, Fellow in Geology, at a salary of \$300.00.

Mr. Earl Jones and Mr. E. Basil Hawes, Fellows in Agricultural Chemistry, at a salary of \$300.00 each.

Mr. J. M. Rudwin, Fellow in German, at a salary of \$300.00.

Miss Kathryn M. Roeser, B. A., (Marietta College) Fellow in English at a salary of \$300.00., in place of Milton C. Warren.

Miss Adelaide Jenney, B. A., (Oberlin) M. A., (University of Illinois) Fellow in English, at a salary of \$300.00.

Mr. E. P. Bengert, B. A., (Brown University) Fellow in English, at a salary of \$300.00.

Miss Wahnita DeLong, B. A., (Ohio Wesleyan) Fellow in English at a salary of \$300.00.

Miss Emma Rower, B. A., (Ohio State University) Fellow in English at a salary of \$300.00.

Mr. Paul M. Herbert, B. A., (Ohio State University) Fellow in English at a salary of \$300.00.

Miss Genevieve Lawrence, B. A., (Ohio State University) Fellow in English, at a salary of \$300.00.

Professor George Frederick Arps, of the University of Illinois, Professor of Psychology, at a salary of \$2250.00, and \$250.00 was added to the appropriation already made, to cover the above salary.

6. It was ordered that the salary of Professor V. H. Davis, of the Department of Horticulture, be paid as follows: \$1500.00 from the University funds and \$300.00 from the Agricultural Extension funds.

7. It was ordered that where fellowships have been granted to students, the usual rule concerning the payment of fees shall obtain for the Summer Session, with the understanding, however, that this concession shall not in any case exceed four semesters.

8. An appropriation of \$50.00 was made for current expense for the Summer Session, said appropriation to include payment to Miss Grace Fullington for services in the department of Physical Education.

9. An appropriation of \$275.00 was made to cover the salary of \$40.00 per month, not to exceed three months, and expenses, as approved by the President, for the same period, for services rendered by T. G. Watson in the Co-operative Ohio Rural Life Survey.

10. The salary of Miss Emma McKinley, Superintendent of Oxley Hall, was increased to \$125.00 per month, beginning July 1, 1912.

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The President presented sketches of the proposed improvement of the Thomas house, as prepared by the University Architect, and on motion of Mr. Stone, said plans were referred to the President and Secretary with full power, with the understanding that the Athletic Board should make these improvements without assistance from the University.

 new Library Building. After reading said list, the same was referred to the Library Building Committee for examination and report.

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The President presented a communication from the architects of the Library Building, asking for an extension of thirty days on the contract of D. W. McGrath. This matter was also referred to the Library Building Committee for report.

\* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* Electric fixtures were ordered placed in the third floor of the Library Building, the estimated cost being \$250.00.

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\* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* The President was authorized to use the seminar rooms of

the new Library Building for class room purposes.

The Secretary reported that on July 22, 1912, in accordance with the advertisement, bids had been received for the sidewalk on High Street and Eleventh Avenue and for the new Fifteenth Avenue Entrance; that said bids had been opened by Mr. Mc-Cracken, Mr. Royer and the Secretary and found to be as follows:

On motion, the contract for the High Street and Eleventh Avenue sidewalks was awarded to E. A. Patterson at his bid of \$4685 00, said bid being below the estimate of \$4991 87, and on motion, the contract for the Fifteenth Avenue Entrance, including roadway and sidewalk, was awarded to E. A. Patterson at his bid of \$4940 00, said bid being below the estimate of \$5,189.00. The President presented the plan and estimated cost of the proposed extension of the spur track into the Robinson Laboratory, as prepared by the Hocking Valley Railway Company, the cost of said improvement being estimated at \$1650 00.

Upon the recommendation of the President, said extension was authorized and the Secretary was directed to arrange with the Hocking Valley Railway Company to do the work.

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The President presented a report from Mr. McCracken relative to the tests of coals, furnished in accordance with instructions given by the Executive Committee at its meeting held June 20, 1912:

DEAR SIR:

We hand you herewith report of Mr. A. Vallance, Engineer, on the coal tests made by him on July 4th and 5th, 1912, and also test by Professor  $E^{\cdot} A$  Hitchcock on "Black Betsy," West Virginia Splint for comparison. Also the analysis of the Maynard Company's Meigs Co. coal.

The bids of the Lorain Coal & Dock Company and the Central Hocking Coal Company were identical, \$1.25 per ton. The bid of A. Simons & Son on West Virginia Splint was \$1.39 per ton, all delivered at the University.

You will note by the report that the West Virginia Splint coal contains 6.1% more heat units and that it gives better evaporation per pound of actual coal for boiler of 12.5%, or for boiler and economizer 11.3%. As we do not use the economizer, we base our conclusions on the other test of 12.5% difference in evaporation for boiler. It would require approximately 1500 tons of coal less to be handled.

The Maynard Company, whose bid was \$1.29 per ton, offers but little better value than the Central Hocking Coal Company, and for that reason is not considered.

We recommend the proposition for "Black Betsy," West Virginia Splint, as bid upon by A. Simons & Son.

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The President presented a report from Mr. Bradford concerning the condition of the north wing of Hayes Hall, and on motion, an examination of the north wing was ordered and if repairs are necessary, said repairs are hereby authorized to be made promptly.

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The President presented a communication concerning the location and general plan of the proposed Woman's Building and on motion, a committee consisting of President Thompson, Mr. Pomerene and Mr. Stone, was appointed to confer with the Alumnae Committee and the University Architect and to recommend to the Board of Trustees the location and general plan of the proposed building.

Mr Sears. representing the Board of Overseers of Ohio Union, requested permission from the Trustees to remove the partition between the bowling alleys and the dining room and to remove the bowling alleys for the purpose of installing a "self-help" restaurant in the room now used for bowling. Said changes were authorized by the Trustees, with the understanding that the cost of the improvement shall be borne by the Ohio Union.

On May 2, 1879, he bought 1401/2 acres in same lot and executed contract of sale which stipulated that he should pay therefor as follows: \$40. cash, \$20. in one year, \$20. in two years, \$20. in three years, \$20. in four years, \$20. in five years from day of sale, with interest at 6% payable annually. He gave his notes for such deferred payments. The contract stipulated that a deed for the land should be given to him when said notes and the interest thereon were fully paid. On the execution of such contract Mr. Staley entered into possession of the land and has been in

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possssion ever since. Mr. Staley paid the first of the notes when it became due, and the second note Feb. 8, 1882 and the interest due at that time, except the sum of \$3.40, and has paid nothing since. Efforts were made to collect the three remaining notes, but without success, and the Agent of the Board of Trustees in 1885 reported the notes as worthless.

Mr. Staley now proposes to pay said notes and take a deed under said contract. Have calculuated interest on said notes at 6% with annual rests, and find amount due thereon to be \$282.00. I enclose draft for the amount received from Mr. Staley, and proper deed for execution.

In reply to your recent letter we would say that we have carefully figured the cost of the furniture which you ordered August 10, 1912, by written order sigued by Mr. Steeb, and we find the cost to be, exclusive of any overhead expenses, \$1216.00.

We have consulted our lawyer in this matter, and he says there is absolutely no question as to our legal right to collect the entire amount of the bill. We should prefer to have this account settled at our cost price of \$1216.00, rather than go to the expense and annoyance of legal complication, although there is not the slightest doubt in our minds as to what the outcome would be.

If you will send us a check for the above amount, we are willing to take it in full payment and consider the transaction closed.

If you still consider that the prices charged for the furniture are excessive, we should prefer to have the matter settled in court, both for the vindication of ourselves and your architects.

Miss Lola Stout, Maid in the Department of Physical Education, vice Miss Condert, at the same salary, begining April 1, 1913.

W. E. McCoy, Assistant in Agronomy, at a salary of \$100.00 per month, for a period of two months, effective April 1, 1913.

Miss Naomi Haber, Clerk Townshend Hall, vice Miss Elizabeth Fyffe, at the same salary, effective March 1, 1913. for the balance of the year.

Miss Eva L. Long, Stenographer, vice Mrs. Edna Burnham Pratt, at a salary of \$50.00 per month.

Ben Lewis, Janitor, at a salary of 50.00 per month, effective March 1, 1913.

Miss Catherine Creamer was transferred, temporarily, from the Agricultural Extension Department to the Department of Home Economics, at a salary of \$100.00 per month, effective April I, 1913, salary to be paid from the appropriation for the salary of Miss Anna F. Blohm.

Miss Marian Waters, Assistant in the Registrar's office, at a salary of \$50.00 per month, effective March 1, 1913, and \$200.00 was appropriated to meet this salary.

G. W. Dillihunt, Assistant Electrician, at a salary of \$65.00 per month, effective December 13, 1912.

O.E. Kiger and John O'Rourke were appointed Janitors at the Library Building, at a salary of \$50.00 per month each, effective January 14, 1913.

3. The President was authorized to appoint a delegate to attend the Commemoration of the Twenty-fifth Anniversary of the Foundation of the College of Women of Western Reserve University, June 10th and 11th.

4. An appropriation of \$50.00 was made for the services of Robert C. Kaiser for instruction in the Winter Course in Dairying.

5. A request of Mr. Robert Gilchrist, desiring to lease privileges on the University campus for an open air moving picture exhibition during the summer, was declined.

6. The President presented, without recommendation, a resolution passed by the University Faculty concerning the furnishing of the Women's Union in Orton Hall. No action was taken.


7. The following reports from the College of Law concerning the requirements for the degrees of Bachelor of Laws and Juris Doctor, were approved:

"The degree of Bachelor of Laws (LL.B.) will be conferred on all who, being at least twenty-one years of age and having met the requirements necessary for entrance for a degree, pass satisfactorily the examinations at the close of the third year, after having done at least that year's work in the College of Law at the University; or upon all who having the requirements for admission to the course leading to a certificate, have completed the course in law with merit in at least fifty semester hours and have been in attendance at this College of Law during the entire last two years of the course, and have taken at least fifty-six semester hours in such last two years."

"The Degree of Juris Doctor (J. D.) will be conferred on all who, being at least twenty-one years of age and having the degree of Bachelor of Arts or an equivalent degree from an approved college or university, have completed the course in law with merit in at least 42 semester hours, and have been in attendance at this College of Law during the entire last two years of the course, and have taken at least fifty-six semester hours in such last two years."

8. The President reported that, pursuant to authority granted by the Board for a reorganization of the Physical Plant, the following organization was put into effect November 1, 1912, that it has now been tried for a sufficient length of time to warrant its permanent approval, and therefore he recommended its adoption by the Board of Trustees at this time.

On motion, said recommendation was approved, and the following organization was authorized as of November 1, 1912:



A. As Secretary of the Board of Trustees his duties shall be as prescribed in the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Trustees, and in all these matters he shall be responsible to the Board of Trustees.

B. As Secretary of the Physical Plant his duties shall be as prescribed below, and in all these matters he shall be responsible to the President of the University.

The duties of the Secretary, as Secretary of the Physical Plant shall be as follows:

- 1. He shall receive his orders and instructions from the President.
- 2. He shall report on all matters direct to the President.
- 3. In the absence of the President, the responsibility of all matters relating to the Physical plant shall rest with the Secretary.

The Physical Plant shall be understood to cover the following:

- A—The Division of Architecture and Construction and its various subdivisions, as outlined in the rules and regulations prescribed for this division and its subdivisions.
- **B**—The Division of Operation and Maintenance and its various subdivisions, as outlined in the rules and regulations prescribed for this division and subdivisions.
- C-The Subdivision of Stores, as outlined in the rules and regulations prescribed for this subdivision.
- 4. He shall receive all recommendations from Heads of Divisions for appointment or dismissal of employees in their respective divisions, and shall transmit them, with his written approval or disapproval, to the President of the University for his consideration and action.
- 5. He shall receive all reports, of whatever nature, from the Heads of the Divisions, and such reports as should be called to the attention of the President shall be promptly transmitted to the President. All other reports shall be filed in the office of the Secretary.
- 6. He shall submit to the President (on Form 347) a weekly report on the conditions of all jobs and projects which have been ordered through his office, said report to show the date order was placed, date completed, estimated cost of the improvement and its actual cost.
- 7. Heshall keep an accurate and complete cost system of all repairs, alterations and betterments ordered through his office.

SUPERINTENDENT OF BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

In charge of Division of Operation and Maintenance.

- 1. The Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds shall be responsible to the President of the University.
- 2. He shall receive his orders and instructions from the President of the University through the Secretary.
- 3. He shall report on all matters direct to the Secretary.
- 4. In the absence of the President, he shall be responsible to and receive orders from the Secretary.

- 5. He shall have full charge of and be responsible for the Light, Heat and Power Plant.
  - The Light, Heat and Power Plant shall be understood to cover the engine rooms, the boiler rooms, the coal handling plant, (including locomotive crane) the railway spur, the tunnels, all gas mains, all water mains, all sewers, all conduits, all overhead lines, and the distribution of the various services and utilities to the various buildings.
  - The distribution of electric current for lighting covers all wires, conduits and apparatus from the switchboard to and including the terminals in the buildings or on the campus, which terminals are understood to be the bulbs or lamps.
  - The distribution of hot water and steam for heating purposes, covers all main lines from boiler room and engine room to and including the terminals in the various buildings, which terminals are understood to be the radiators or hot blast coils.
  - The distribution of gas for heating purposes, covers all main lines, either in the ground or tunnels, to and including the terminals of whatever kind in the various buildings.
  - The distribution of power covers all mains, conduits and apparatus from the switchboard to and including the various motors wherever located.
  - The distribution of compressed air from the Power House to the various buildings served, covers all piping and apparatus from the compressors in engine room to and including the various terminals.
  - The distribution of water service through the grounds, tunnels and buildings, covers all mains, branches and water piping, and all fixtures of every description attached to the water service lines.
- 6. He shall be responsible for the general condition of all buildings located on the University grounds, or under the control of the Board of Trustees.
  - The general condition of all buildings shall be understood to cover:
    - A—Cleanliness
    - B-Sanitary condition
    - C--Structural condition
    - D-Ventilation and temperature conditions
    - E-Fire protection (to be organized later)
  - The conditions of cleanliness is covered by the duties of the Inspector of Janitors, and of the Janitors, as given in the detailed rules and regulations for those employees.
  - The sanitary condition of the buildings cover all toilet rooms, with their various fixtures, soil, waste and vent pipes and lockers.
  - The structural condition of the buildings refers to the general condition of the buildings as to repairs, inside or outside, and and all requests for repairs of whatever kind shall originate in the office of the *Superintendent of Buildings*, and by him be transmitted to the Secretary.
  - The ventilation and temperature condition of the buildings refers to the enforcement of the rules and regulations as prescribed for the Janitor.

The police and night watch service shall be as detailed in the rules and regulations of those employees.

- 7. He shall have charge of and be responsible for
  - A—The execution of repairs, betterments or alterations to buildings, as have been regularly ordered by the Secretary.
  - B-The construction of all equipment or furniture, as has been regularly ordered by the Secretary.
- 8. He shall have charge of and be responsible for the general condition of the roads and grounds, and the execution of all repairs and improvements regularly ordered by the Secretary.
  - He shall advise with the Professor of Horticulture as to the care and trimming of all the trees and shrubs.
  - The general condition of roads and grounds shall be understood to cover
    - A-Roads and drives
    - B-Pavements and cinders paths
    - C-All planting
    - D-Campus (not including farm lands)
  - The condition of roads and drives covers the repair, upkeep and cleaning of existing roads and drives.
  - The condition of pavements and cinder paths covers the same lines as prescribed for roads and drives.
  - The condition of planting covers the care of all trees shrubs flowers and hedges now on the campus, including the University woods. It also covers all future planting as may be regularly ordered.
  - The condition of the campus covers the general upkeep of the grounds, the mowing of the grass, the cleaning of the Spring and Lake, the removal of all rubbish from the grounds, also the removal of all rubbish and refuse from the buildings.
- 9. He shall be responsible for the police and night watch service.
- 10. He shall be responsible for the fire protection.
- 11. In order to properly enforce the rules and regulations prescribed for the employees in the Division of Operation and Maintenance, the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds shall have power to transfer employees from one building to another, or to a different positiou in his division; he shall also have power to recommend to the Secretary the dismissal of any employee of the division, the said recommendation to be made in writing, giving cause for same.
  - All applications for employment in the Division of Operation and Maintenance shall be filed in the office of the *Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds*, and when a vacancy occurs and a new appointment is necessary, the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds shall submit his recommendation in writing to the Secretary, together with proper credentials of the person recommended.
- 12. The list of employees in the Division of Operation and Maintenance shall be as follows:

ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

- 1. The Assistant Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds shall be responsible to the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 2. He shall receive his orders and instructions from the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 3. He shall report on all matters direct to the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 4. He shall have charge of and be responsible for the service of the following employees: Carpenters, Plumbers, Painters, Tinners, Masons and Foreman of the Campus.
- 5. He shall see that orders issued by the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds are properly distributed and promptly executed.
- 6. He shall keep the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds informed as to the progress of orders.
- He shall perform such other duties as may be assigned from time to time by the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.

- 8. In the absence of the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, he shall receive his orders from and report to the Secretary.
- In the absence of the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, the Inspector of Janitors shall be responsible to and receive orders from the Assistant Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.

UNIVERSITY CARPENTERS, PAINTERS, PLUMBERS AND TINNERS

- 1. University Carpenters, Painters, Plumbers and Tinners shall be responsible to the Assistant Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 2. They shall receive all of their orders for work to be done from the Assistant Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 3. They shall report on all matters direct to the Assistant Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 4. They shall confine their work to orders issued by the Assistant Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.

They shall keep accurate account of all time spent on each job ordered.

- Each employee shall make up his own time check, using a separate check for each job.
- 7. They shall keep an accurate account of all material used on each job.
- 8. Time check shall be left at the close of each day's work with the University Time Keeper.
- 9. Requisitions for supplies needed shall be given to the Assistant Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 10. The University Plumber, in addition to his regular duties, shall inspect all fire equipment, as designated in the regulations for Fire Protection.

## FOREMAN OF CAMPUS

- 1. The Foreman of Campus shall be responsible to the Assistant Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 2. He shall receive his orders and instructions from and report to the Assistant Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 3. He shall have charge of and be responsible for the services of the following employees: campus men, teamsters and laborers.
- 4. He shall see that orders issued by the Assistant Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds are promptly executed.
- 5. In the absence of the Assistant Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds he shall receive his orders from and report to the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 6. He shall also perform any other duties which may be assigned from time to time by the Assistant Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.

# CAMPUS MEN, TEAMSTERS AND LABORERS

1. The Campus men, teamsters and laborers shall be responsible to the Foreman of the Campus.

- 2. They shall receive their orders and instructions from the Foreman of the Campus.
- 3. They shall confine their work to the orders assigned to them by the Foreman of the Campus.
- 4. They shall hand in their time checks each night to the University Time Keeper.
- 5. The teamster shall follow the schedule as prescribed by the Assistant Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds for the daily collection of refuse and rubbish from the buildings and grounds, and shall haul the same to such places as may be designated.

# INSPECTOR OF JANITORS

- 1. The Inspector of Janitors shall be responsible to the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 2. He shall receive his orders and instructions from the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 3. He shall report on all matters direct to the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 4. He shall satisfy himself that all Janitors are on duty each day during the hours to which they have been assigned.
- 5. He shall report at once all repairs needed, to the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 6. He shall thoroughly inspect each building at least twice each week.
- 7. He shall report to the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds at the end of each inspection trip.
  - A-The buildings inspected.
  - B-Their condition as to cleanliness.
  - C-As to the manner in which the several janitors are carrying out their instructions.
- 8. He shall also perform any other duties which may be assigned from time to time by the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 9. In the absence of the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, he shall be responsible to and receive his orders from the Assistant Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.

# JANITORS

- 1. Each janitor shall report for duty at 7 A. M. and remain on duty until 5 P. M., with a reasonable length of time allowed for luncheon, (which will be arranged by the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds). Janitors will not leave their buildings during the day except as it is necessary to do so in the proper discharge of their duties; and shall not leave the grounds without permission of the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 2. Janitors are responsible to the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, and will receive their specific instructions from the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds through the Inspector of Janitors.

- 3. Janitors will be held responsible for keeping their buildings in clean, presentable condition, and for the performance of such duties as are ordinarily assigned to janitors, which duties are more particularly described as follows:
  - A-To see that each room in his building is thoroughly cleaned each day.
  - B-In winter time the janitor shall clean the snow from the steps, porches and immediate approaches to the various entrances of the building.
  - C-At all times of the year he shall see that the steps, porches and immediate approaches to his building are clean.
  - D-The windows in the buildings shall be kept as clean as it is possible to keep them under weather conditions. Special orders will be issued from time to time by the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds covering this matter.
  - E-All halls shall be thoroughly mopped at least once each week, (using a germicidal solution which will be provided) or more often if directed.
  - F-All class room floors shall be thoroughly mopped at least once a month, using germicidal solution.
  - G-All base boards in hall shall be thoroughly washed once a week, and base boards in recitation rooms shall be thoroughly washed once a month, using germicidal solution.
  - H-The walls shall be cleaned down at least once each month in all halls, lecture rooms and laboratories.
  - I-Each blackboard shall be washed once each week with a clean rag and cold water, unless ordered to contrary by notice on the board.
  - J-Each floor shall be swept daily, first having been sprinkled with an approved no-dust preparation which will be provided
  - K—After sweeping, all chairs and furniture in the room shall be carefully dusted with cheese-cloth.
  - L—The tablet arms of class room chairs shall be washed thoroughly four times each year, using germicidal solution in the water.
  - M-All lavatories, water-closets, bowls and urinals shall be thoroughly cleaned each day with a germicidal solution. All water-closet partitions shall be thoroughly cleaned once a week.
  - N—All offices shall be thoroughly cleaned each day, floor mopped weekly, and the windows cleaned as often as is necessary, or the weather will permit.
  - O— the outside temperature will permit, janitors shall, on coming on duty in the morning, open the outside doors and enough windows to cause a circulation of fresh air through the building.
  - P-At least once during the morning, at noon and at 2 p. m., the doors and windows are to be opened as in previous section.

- Q—During the winter season, janitors will be expected to observe the thermometers in the various rooms in the building several times each day and shall keep the temperature at or as near  $70^{\circ}$  as is possible.
- R—Each janitor shall keep the copper sign on the front of his building brightly polished, being careful to keep the cleaning substance from the brick work.
- S-Each janitor shall carefully drain all acids from jars before emptying the contents in the containers provided.
- T-Janitors shall not burn waste paper, boxes or other refuse in or about the building, but shall deposit the same daily in containers provided for that purpose. The refuse will be collected by the wagon each morning.
- U-All janitors shall leave their keys in the key closet, before leaving the building in the evening.
- V-All requests for supplies shall be given to the Inspector when he visits the building.
- W—Janitors shall wear, while on duty, the regulation cap, badge and uniform provided by the University.
- X—Janitors shall also perform any other duties which may be assigned from time to time by the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.

### ELEVATOR MEN

- r. The Elevator Men shall be responsible to the Inspector of Janitors.
- They shall receive their orders and instructions from the Inspector of Janitors, and shall report on all matters direct to the Inspector of Janitors.
- 3. The elevator man shall have charge of the elevator to which he has been assigned.
- 4. He shall keep the elevator machinery and cables thoroughly oiled, the cab clean, and shall advise the Inspector of Janitors of all repairs needed for his elevator.
- 5. He shall handle his elevator carefully, at all times looking to the safety and welfare of his passengers.
- 6. Before leaving at the close of the day's work, he shall see that the main switch to the motor is open and that everything about the elevator is left in a safe condition.

#### DAY POLICEMAN AND NIGHT WATCHMEN

- 1. The Day Policeman and Night Watchmen shall be responsible to the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 2. They shall receive their orders and instructions from the Superintendent of Buildings and grounds.
- 3. They shall report on all matters direct to the Superintendent of Buildings and grounds.
- 4. In cases of emergency, requiring immediate action, they shall report to the quickest available officer of the University.

- 5. They shall patrol the buildings and grounds in accordance with schedule prescribed by the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds. In cases of inability to follow the regular schedule, the cause of such inability shall be reported to the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds at the first opportunity.
- 6. They shall arrest or take into custody any person or persons violating any of the rules of the Board of Trustees, of the City Ordinances, or of the State laws.
- 7. They shall make record of the name and address of each person taken into custody or arrested, the same to be filed, together with a brief of the circumstances relating thereto, with the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 8. They shall perform such other duties as may be assigned from time to time by the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 9. They shall at all times be on the lookout for fire, and when passing through buildings shall be on the lookout for burst water or steam pipes. In case of fire the city alarm shall be promptly turned in, and the officers of the University notified by telephone. In case of burst water pipes during the day, report to the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, and at night to the engineer in charge at the Power House.

# SUBDIVISION FIRE PROTECTION

- 1. The system of Fire Protection at the University shall cover all fire hose, stand pipes, fire extinguishers, fire cisterns and hydrants connected to water mains.
- 2. It shall be the duty of the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds to see that the equipment as listed in Section 1. is at all times in proper working condition. To this end inspection of all such equipment shall be made at stated periods by the University Plumber, acting under the direction of the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 3. All fire hose shall be tested twice each year, in May and November. All stand pipes, valves and hose racks shall be thoroughly inspected at the same time.
- 4. All fire extinguishers not of the Seagrave Model type, shall be fully recharged once each year, in the month of May.
- 5. All Seagrave Models shall have a new soda charge once each year, in the month of May.
- At the time extinguishers are recharged, an examination of the hose, nozzle and case shall also be made.
- 7. An annual inspection of the general condition of fire cisterns shall also be made.

During the winter season, the covers of fire cisterns and covers of valve boxes shall be cleared of snow and properly salted whenever weather conditions demand.

8. Fire hydrants shall be regularly inspected, during the winter season, to observe any leaks, and if water is found, it must be pumped out at once, and if on second inspection, the same quantity of water is found, this fact should be reported promptly to the Water Works Department The large wheeled extinguisher shall always be kept in the place provided for it and shall be readily and easily accessible.

- In making reports on inspections as above ordered, the Plumber shall use Form No. 361, which report shall be filed with the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 11. The Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds shall transmit to the Secretary a summary of the inspection reports as made by the University Plumber, using Form No. 362.
- 12. The Inspector of Janitors, in his bi-weekly inspection of each building, shall satisfy himself that all fire extinguishers are in place and that all fire hose is properly racked or reeled.
  - If any of the equipment is found to be out of place or in need of attention, he shall report the fact at once to the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.

## MASTER MECHANIC

- 1. The Master Mechanic shall be responsible to the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 2. He shall receive his orders and instructions from the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 3. He shall report on all matters direct to the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 4. He shall have charge of and be responsible for the services of the following employees: Electricians, Steam-fitters, Blacksmith, Engineers, Firemen, Craneman, Helpers and Wipers.
- 5. He shall see that orders issued by the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds are properly distributed and promptly executed.
- 6. He shall keep the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds informed as to the progress of orders.
- 7. He shall perform such other duties as may be assigned from time to time by the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 8. In the absence of the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, he shall receive his orders from and report to the Secretary.

ELECTRICIANS, STEAM FITTERS AND BLACKSMITH

- 1. The Electricians, Steam Fitters and Blacksmith shall be responsible to the Master Machanic.
- 2. They shall receive their orders from the Master Mechanic.
- 3. They shall report on all matters direct to the Master Mechanic.
- 4. In the absence of the Master Mechanic, they shall receive their orders from and report to the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 5. They shall confine their work to orders issued by the Master Mechanic.
- 6. They shall keep an accurate account of all time and material used on each job.

- Each employee will make up his own time check, using a separate check for each job.
- 8. Time checks shall be left at the close of each day's work with the University Time Keeper.
- 9. Requisitions for supplies needed shall be given to the Master Mechanic.

#### ENGINEERS

- 1. The Engineers shall be responsible to the Master Mechanic.
- 2. They shall receive their orders and instructions from the Master Mechanic.
- 3. They shall report on all matters to the Master Mechanic.
- 4. They shall confine themselves to the duties assigned to them by the Master Mechanic.
- 5. In the absence of the Master Mechanic, they shall be responsible to and receive their orders from the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 6. The Engineer on watch shall be in charge of and be responsible for all machinery in the engine room and in the pump room, and at night shall have supervision over the fireman and helpers.
- 7. The Engineers shall perform such other duties as may be assigned from time to time by the Master Mechanic.

# FIREMEN

- 1. The Firemen shall be responsible to the Master Mechanic.
- 2. They shall receive orders and instructions from the Master Mechanic.
- 3. They shall report on all matters to the Master Mechanic.
- 4. They shall confine themselves to the duties assigned to them by the Master Mechanic.
- 5. In the absence of the Master Mechanic, they shall be responsible to and receive their orders from the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 6. The Firemen on watch at night shall report to the Engineer on watch and take instructions from him.
- 7. The Firemen shall perform such other duties as may be assigned from time to time by the Master Mechanic.

# HELPERS AND WIPERS

- 1. The Helpers and Wipers shall be responsible to the Master Mechanic.
- 2. They shall receive orders and instructions from the Master Mechanic.
- 3. They shall report on all matters to the Master Mechanic.
- 4. They shall confine themselves to the duties assigned to them by the Master Mechanic.

- 5. In the absence of the Master Mechanic, they shall be responsible to and receive their orders from the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 6. The Helpers and Wipers on duty at night shall report to the Engineer on watch, and take instructions from him.
- 7. They shall perform such other duties as may be assigned from time to time by the Master Mechanic.

## CRANE MAN

- 1. The Crane Man shall be responsible to the Master Mechanic.
- 2. He shall receive his orders and instructions from the Master Mechanic.
- 3. He shall report on all matters to the Master Mechanic.
- 4. He shall confine himself to the duties assigned to him by the Master Mechanic.
- 5. In the absence of the Master Mechanic, he shall be responsible to and receive orders from the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.
- 6. He shall be responsible for the operation and maintenance of the crane and see that all switches, crossings and frogs of the railroad are cleared of ice, snow or dirt.
- 7. The Crane Man shall perform such other duties as may be assigned from time to time by the Master Mechanic.

# THE UNIVERSITY ARCHITECT

In charge of the Division of Architecture and New Construction.

- 1. The University Architect shall be responsible to the President of the University.
- 2. He shall receive his orders and instructions from the President through the Secretary.
- 3. He shall report on all matters direct to the Secretary.
- 4. In the absence of the President, the University Architect shall be responsible to and receive orders from the Secretary.
- 5. The University Architect shall have charge of and be responsible for
  - A—The preparation of plans, specifications and estimates of all new buildings, and the supervision of the construction of the same.
  - B-The preparation of plans, specifications and estimates of all repairs, betterments, or alterations which shall need plans and specifications to intelligently and efficiently carry them out.

He shall have supervision of all work coming under this head which shall have been let by contract.

C-The preparation of plans, specifications and estimates of all furniture and equipment, which the Secretary may order from time to time.

- D-In the preparation of plans and specifications for betterments or alterations of buildings, or for furniture or equipment, as have been regularly ordered by the Secretary, the University Architect shall make detailed drawings covering the work in hand, together with explicit specifications which shall describe the method of carrying on the work and the various materials to be used.
- 6. He shall have the right to inspect the execution of any or all work in process of construction, for which he has prepared the plans and specifications, and which work is being done by the University employees.

If said plans and specifications are not being properly executed, he shall report his findings in writing to the Superintendent of Buildings, sending a copy thereof to the Secretary.

7. When requested, the University Architect will advise with the Superintendent of Buildings as to

1st-The advisability of making any repair or betterment,

2nd—The execution of necessary repairs or betterments about buildings,

3rd-Safety of any building.

- 8. Before the location of any building, tunnel, sewer or conduit is made, the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds shall be advised, in order that he may know in advance what disposition to make of any planting which might be on the site, or lines to be excavated, and what disposition to make of all excess dirt.
- 9. The University Architect, in conjunction with the Professor of Horticulture, shall prepare such planting schemes for the campus as may be regularly ordered.

He shall also prepare plans and specifications for new walks and roads.

- 10. Before preparing any new planting schemes, the University Architect shall consult the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, so as to avoid planting objectionable trees, etc. directly over any service lines, tunnels or sewers.
- II. The University Architect shall make a thorough inspection of each building on the campus once during each fiscal year, and shall submit a written report on his findings to the Secretary; a copy of said report shall at the same time be sent to the Superintendent of Buildings.
- 12. In order to properly enforce the rules and regulations for the employees for the Division of Architecture and New Construction, the University Architect shall have power to transfer employees from one position to another in his Division; he shall also have power to recommend to the Secretary the dismissal of any employee of the division, the said recommendation to be in writting, giving cause for same.
  - All applications for employment in the Division of Architecture and New Construction shall be filed in the office of the University Architect, and when a vacarcy occurs and a new appoint-

ment is necessary, the University Architect shall submit his recommendations to the Secretary, together with proper credentials of the person recommended.

13. The list of employees in the Division of Architecture and New Construction shall be as follows:

A—Chief Draftsman B—Clerk of Works C—Draftsman D—Tracers

E-Stenographer

## RECEIVING DEPARTMENT

- 1. The Receiving Department and Stores will be in charge of the Receiving Clerk.
- 2. The Receiving Clerk shall be responsible to the Secretary.
- 3. He shall receive his orders and instructions from the Secretary, and shall report on all matters direct to the Secretary.
- 4. Two stores shall be maintained: the one at the Chemistry Building, and known as Store No. 1, to handle exclusively laboratory supplies or supplies for educational purposes. All other supplies such as stationery, cleaning supplies, hardware, lumber, pipe fittings, lamps, electrical supplies, etc., shall be kept in Store No. 2.

The amount and kind of stock to be carried on hand shall be determined by the Purchasing Agent and the Receiving Clerk from an examination of the records. Wherever conditions warrant, purchases shall be made in such quantities as to secure best jobbers' prices.

- 5. All articles purchased by the University shall be delivered to the Receiving Department.
- 6. All express and freight shall be delivered to the Receiving Department.
- 7. All packages, (except books for the library) shall be promptly opened by the Receiving Clerk and each item shall be checked as to quantity and quality with the copy of the order received from the Purchasing Department. Before certifying to the receipt of goods as to quality the Receiving Clerk shall satisfy himself that the articles received are as specified on the order, and when necessary, shall consult the party making requisition; or shall submit the articles to tests or analyses.
- 8. In checking goods the special Form No. 355 shall be used, which form as soon as certified to, shall be promptly sent to the Secretary's office.
- 9. After goods have been accepted by the Receiving Clerk, they shall be delivered promptly to the department making requisition; or, if ordered for stores, they shall be placed promptly in their respective locations in stock, and the Store Clerk shall make proper entries on the stock ledger cards—Form No. 356.
- 10. Persons expecting donations to the University from any source, should advise the Receiving Clerk at once, in order that proper delivery of the gift may be made after its receipt by the Receiving Clerk.

- 11. When a consignment of goods is received and cannot be accepted, the Receiving Clerk shall notify the Purchasing Agent at once, using Form No. 360 and giving the reasons therefor.
- 12. All shortages in packages shall be called to the attention of the Purchasing Agent on Form No. 358.
- 13. In case of shortage in number of packages received from the transportation companies, the Receiving Clerk shall so note on the delivery sheet, and he shall follow up the shortage at once by tracer.
- 14. The Receiving Clerk shall be supplied with a copy of each order issued by the Purchasing Agent, on which shall be stated the approximate date of delivery.
- 15. The Receiving Clerk shall note the time of completion of orders and in cases where delivery is not being made as per schedule, he shall advise the Purchasing Agent.
- 16. Goods will be issued from the stores only on properly signed orders—Form No. 359. After the order has been filled, the item shall be properly entered on the stock card.
- 17. Filled order blanks—Form No. 359—shall be sent to the Secretary's office daily.
- 18. The stock cards—Form No. 356—shall be a perpetual inventor y and shall show at all times the amount of stock on hand; the amount sold and to what department or job; the selling price per unit, and the location of the item in the stores.
- 19. All discarded valves, fittings or articles made of copper, brass or lead, shall be turned into the stores for immediate credit as soon as the repair job is completed. All worn or old material, such as hardware, lumber, iron pipe and fittings, doors, casings, etc., as well as old or worn equipment or apparatus, shall be sent to the stores and there listed by the Receiving Clerk. A copy of these lists shall be sent to the heads of departments, in order that all may have an opportunity to have the articles, if needed, transferred to their department for use.
  - If no demand is found for any of the items, then the Receiving Clerk, upon the approval of the Secretary, shall scrap such material or equipment and sell the same, the proceeds to go to the credit of the department from which the item came.
- 20. Excess material purchased from the stores and not needed in the job, or defective material purchased, shall be returned to the stores, and proper credit will be given for such returns.

Credit slips—Form No. 357—must be sent to the Secretary's office daily.

21. The employees of the Receiving Department shall be responsible to the Receiving Clerk.

The employees shall be

A-In Store No. 1:

- 1. Store-keeper
- 2. Assistant Store-keeper
- 3. Book-keeper

B-In Store No. 2:

- 1. Checking Clerk
- 2. Delivery Man
- 3. Store Clerk

A porter to divide his time between both stores.

## REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE DAILY TIME OF EMPLOYEES

- A-The registering time clock located in the office of the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds is to be used by the following employees:
  - 1. Inspector of Janitors
  - 2. Janitors
  - 3. Plumbers
  - 4. Steam Fitters
  - 5. Electricians
  - 6. Carpenters
  - 7. Painters
  - 8. Blacksmiths
  - 9. Tinners
  - 10. Cranemen
  - 11. Wipers and Helpers
  - 12. Ashmen
  - 13. Engineers
  - 14. Firemen
  - 15. Campus men
  - 16. Special Mechanics and Laborers
- B-Each employee shall register in ample time to be at place designated for his day's work at the hour prescribed for each employee, and work shall start promptly at said hour.
- C—Employees will be expected to work full hours and not leave their place of work before the hour of quitting, as stated in the above mentioned regulations.
- D-Employees desiring to be absent any part of the day, shall first secure permission from the head of the division, and shall register accordingly.
- E-Employees will be required to observe exactness in taking the noon hour, the same as in beginning and ending the day's work.
- F-Each employee shall ring in his own time, and no employee will be permitted to ring time of any other employee.

11. \$472.50 in the Library salary fund was canceled and an appropriation of \$460.00 was made for Current Expense for the Library.

12. The President reported a gift from Mr. M. D. Monsarrat of the Sunday Creek Coal Company of two hundred and fifty copies of the Proceedings and Transactions of the American Society of Civil Engineers subsequent to 1895, said gift was accepted and the President was directed to make suitable acknowledgement therefor.

13. The President submitted the following report of the Joint Committee concerning the proposed High School Building on the University campus, with the recommendation that it be taken up for consideration at the convenience of the Board:

#### COLUMBUS, OHIO, December 16, 1912.

To the Trustees Ohio State University, and Board of Education.

GENTLEMEN:

The following report is submitted in accordance with the action of the Joint Committee—the Trustees of the University and the Board of Education, consisting of the following Trustees; Messers. Stone, Corson and Sears, and Messers. Means and Herbst of the Building Committee of the Board of Education. There were also present at the same time, Professor Bradford of the University, King G. Thompson, President of the Board of Education, Superintendent Shawan and Architect Riebel.

It was mutually agreed.

- I—That the Board of Education be permitted to erect a high school building on the University campus, at the corner of High Street and Eleventh Avenue.
- 2-That the exact location of this building with respect to these streets shall be determined by the Architects of the University and the Board of Education.
- 3—That the ground plans of said building shall cover approximately four hundred by two hundred and fifty (400x250) feet, and in the matter of style and materials shall conform to the general scheme of the University campus and architecture, and be in harmony therewith.
- 4—That ample room for a play-ground such as a model school should have, to be determined when the final agreement between the respective Board is drawn.
- 5—That the privileges now granted the College of Education for observation and practice shall be continued, not only in this school, but in other high schools of the city—provided that the regular teacher shall at all times be in charge of the school.
- 6-That opportunity be given the College of Education to do experimental and research work to be approved by the Superintendent of Schools, and without cost to the Board of Education.
- 7—That said High School shall be under the control of the Board of Education as provided by law.

8—That heat for said building shall be furnished from the central plant of the University—the extension from the Union building (the point farthest south from the heating plant) to be paid for by the Board of Education; it is further agreed and understood that the current for lighting and power purposes shall be furnished from the central plant of the University. The cost for both heating and electricity to be fixed by the University Trustees on the basis of cost to the University—depreciation and investment considered.

14. The President submitted the following report from the Joint Committee concerning the question of connecting the Archaeological Building with the University Power Plant, and the same was approved.

COLUMBUS, OHIO, December 18, 1912.

To The Board of Trustees:

In accordance with instructions received from the Trustees September 26, 1911, the following report is respectfully submitted.

On November 12, 1912, E. O. Randall, L. P. Shaus and W. C. Mills, representing the Ohio State Archaeological and Historical Society, met with your committee and considered the question of connecting up the Archaeological Museum Building with the University Power Plant.

The following conclusions were reached:

- 1. It is desirable to secure the heating, lighting and power service from the central plant of the University.
- 2. Connection should be made by tunnel between the new building and the tunnel now passing to Biological Building.
- 3. This tunnel should be built, equipped, and under the control of the University.
- 4. The University should deliver the above service to the inside wall of the building, where proper meters will be placed by the University.
- 5. All service lines and equipments inside of the building, except the meters, shall be furnished by and under the control of the Ohio State Archaeological and Historical Society.
- 6. The Ohio State Archaeological and Historical Society shall pay the University for its light, heat and power service. The rates for such service shall be fixed from time to time by the University and shall be determined upon the cost to the University.

The rates for the present shall be-

For Heating:

- 1. By direct radiation  $25\phi$  per square foot.
- 2. By indirect radiation 35¢ per square foot.
- For Power and Lighting:

Electric current for light and power 3¢ per kilowatt hour.

15. The President reported that the 80th General Assembly at its session recently adjourned, passed the following bills affecting the University, namely:

Senate bill No. 152 by Senator Hudson. A bill to establish an Engineering Experiment Station at the Ohio State University.

Senate Bill No. 191 by Senator Lloyd. A bill authorizing the Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University to establish a University Extension Department.

Senate Bill No. 237 by Senator Mooney. To permit the alumni of the Ohio State University to present to the State a building or buildings to be used as dormitories in connection with said University and to authorize the Trustees of the Ohio State University to enter into contract for such purposes.

Included in the above items is \$139,800.00 which was appropriated in the partial appropriation bill as already shown in the minutes under date of March 5, 1913.

Upon the President's recommendation, it was ordered that in accordance with the Rules of the Board of Trustees the several departments interested be required to present plans for the expenditure of the appropriations for the coming year, and the Secretary was directed to notify the departments of these appropriations and this request.

17. The President reported that he had ordered work begun on the repairs to the railroad on account of damage caused by the flood, and requested authority of the Board to complete the repairs in accordance with plans outlined. Such authority was granted.

18. Upon the recommendation of the President, it was ordered that the Secretary enter into a contract with the City Water Department to construct an 8-inch water main for fire protection, at a cost of \$2,966.00, the same to be paid from the Special State Appropriation for fire protection.

19. The University Architect was directed to prepare, for the approval of the Board., plans and specifications for a new roof on the gymnasium, as provided for by the appropriation of the legislature.

20. The Purchasing Department was directed to submit specifications and prices for a one-ton electric motor truck, to be paid for from the appropriation made by the legislature for that purpose.

21. The President was authorized to proceed with the repairs and remodeling of Orton Hall, in accordance with the appropriation made by the legislature.

22. The University Architect was directed to prepare, for the approval of the Board, a report of what changes, if any, should be made in Page Hall, said changes to be within the appropriation made by the legislature.

23. The, President reported a gift from Professor W. H. Siebert of \$100.00 and \$100.00 from Mr. John Siebert continuing the annual gifts to the Siebert Library of German History. It was ordered that suitable acknowledgment be made of these gifts.

24. The University Architect was directed to submit plans and recommendations for the approval of the Board, covering the improvements of roads and sidewalks on the east side of the campus, including improvements already begun.

25. The President reported the case of a student, Jacob Perla, who came to the University from Brooklyn, N. Y., seemingly under a misapprehension. Mr. Perla presented two checks in payment of his fees, but upon finding that his credits were not what he expected, he left the University and stopped payment on the checks which were protested. The University has been unable to get any response from Mr. Jacob Perla or his father, and on the recommendation of the President, it was ordered that \$26.39 be appropriated to cover charge for fees in this case.

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The Secretary reported that at twelve o'clock noon, in accordance with advertisement, the following bids had been opened, publicly read and referred to the University Architect for examination and report:

The President, Mr. Pomerene and Mr. Sears were appointed on this committee.

芯 ÷ \* ×: \* \* The University Architect presented plans, specifications and estimates for two tunnels, one from the new Library Building to the site of the proposed Horticulture and Forestry Building, at an estimated cost of \$6,092.00; the other from the Power House to connect with the tunnel at the English Building, at an estimated cost of \$3,670.00. After examination, said plans, specifications and estimates were approved, and the Secretary was directed to present the same to the State Building Commission for its approval. and if approved by it, then the Secretary was directed to give notice, as required by law, of the time and place, when and where sealed proposals will be received for furnishing materials and performing the labor necessary for the construction of said tunnels.

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Upon the recommendation of Mr. McCracken, the contract for the two Automatic Underfeed Stokers was awarded to the American Engineering Company, Philadelphia, Pa., at their bid of \$4,385.00, and the Secretary was directed to enter into proper contract therefor.

It was further ordered, upon the recommendation of the University Architect, that the alternate bids offered by The Wm. H. Conklin Company, be accepted namely:

The additions and reductions covered by these alternates, in accordance with the opinion of the University Architect, will add to the efficiency of the heating and ventilating apparatus and add \$265.00 to the heating contract.

The Secretary was directed to enter into contract with The Wm. H. Conklin Company for the above heating, ventilating, plumbing, gas-fitting and sewer, including alternates, for the Botany and Zoology Building, in the amount of \$17,241.00.

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The President presented the following proposal by the Board of Trustees of the Starling-Ohio Medical College, a corporation, to the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, dated January 10, 1913:

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"The Trustees of the Starling-Ohio Medical College, in pursuance of a resolution by them duly adopted, hereby make the following proposal to the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University:

On condition of the passage and the taking effect of an Act of the General Assembly of the State of Ohio authorizing and empowering the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University to create, establish, provide for and maintain in said University a College of Medicine and a College of Dentistry, for the purpose of advancing and promoting the purposes afore-said, the Trustees of the Starling Ohio Medical College will convey and transfer all of its right, title and interest of whatsoever kind, whether legal or equitable, in and to all property, both real aud personal, except cash, held and owned by it, to the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University for the purposes aforesaid.

Said property is described, and the right, title and interest therein of the Starling-Ohio Medical College is shown, by the statement hereto attached, marked Exhibit A, and made a part hereof, the title to be so conveyed and transferred being the same as that now held by the Starling-Ohio Medical College, such conveyance and transfer being subject to the condition that the Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University be duly authorized and empowered as aforesaid, and that said Board shall accept the students now in attendance in its College of Medicine, College of Dentistry and College of Pharmacy with the rank and standing as certified by the proper officers of the Starling-Ohio Medical College, and to take such steps as will be necessary to protect the professional rights of the alumni of said college and their predecessors, and shall receive from the Starling-Ohio Medical College and duly preserve such papers and records as may be necessary for that purpose."

Professor Bradford presented the completed plans, specifications and estimate for the proposed Horticulture and Forestry Building, the estimate being \$135,000.00.

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After examining said plans, specifications and estimate, Mr. Stone offered the following resolution which was adopted:

"Whereas, Prcfessor Joseph N. Bradford, University Architect, has presented final plans, specifications and estimate for the Horticulture and Forestry Building, the amount of said estimate being \$135,000.00, and the same having been carefully examined by the Board, therefore, be it

*Resolved*, That the plans, specifications and estimate for the Horticulture and Forestry Building be, and the same are hereby approved, and that the President and Secretary be directed to present the same to the State Building Commission for its approval, and if approved by it, then the Secretary be directed to give notice, as required by law, of the time and place, when and where sealed proposals will be received for furnishing materials and performing the labor necessary for the erection of said building."

Professor Bradford presented the plans and specifications, as prepared by Lord & Burnham Company, of Chicago, for the greenhouse connected with the Botany and Zoology Building, the estimated cost being \$8,000 oo.

After examining said plans and specifications, Mr. Mack offered the following resolution which was adopted:

"Whereas, Professor Joseph N. Bradford, University Architect, has presented plans and specifications, as prepared by Lord & Burnham Company, for the greenhouse connected with the Botany and Zoology Building, at an estimated cost of \$8,000 oo, and the same having been carefully examined by the Board, therefore, be it

*Resolved*, That the plans, specifications and estimate for the greenhouse, be and the same are hereby approved, and that the President and Secretary be directed to present the same to the State Building Commission for its approval, and if approved by it, then the Secretary be directed to give notice, as required by law, of the time and place, when and where sealed proposals will be received for furnishing materials and performing the labor necessary for the erection of said building."

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Professor Bradford presented the plans and specifications for a new roof on the Gymnasium, and on motion the same were approved and the Secretary was directed to secure bids and award the contract in accordance with said specifications, the estimate of said roof being \$2,000.00.

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Professor Bradford presented the plans and specifications for new roads and walks, from the Fifteenth Avenue entrance along the north side of the oval, connecting with the finished roadway west of Hayes Hall. Said plans and specifications were approved, and the Secretary was directed to enter into contract for said improvements in accordance with the specifications.

On motion of Mr. McCann, the president was directed to execute, on behalf of the University, the bond required by the United States Government for Ordnance and Ordnance Stores, in the amount of \$35,114.00.

Siebert, asking that \$750.00 of the Siebert Fund now in the hands of the University Treasurer, be transferred into the State Treasury, said amount to become a part of the irreducible debt of the State, the interest thereon to be used for the purchase of books on German history, in accordance with the original gifts. This request was granted.

Beginning in the Fleniken Pike at the Northeast corner of a 20 acres tract of land owned by The Livingston Seed Company; thence West 2720 feet; thence North 2059. 51 feet; thence East 863. 24 feet; thence North 94. 03 feet; thence East 1857. 02 feet to the Fleniken Pike; thence South along the Fleniken Pike 2153. 54 feet to the place of beginning, containing 132. 04 acres, more or less.

To Have and to Hold the above described premises with the appurtenances thereunto belonging unto said lessee from the date of the execution of this agreement unto the first day of March, 1914. Lessee shall not have possession of the East part of the North half of said demised premises until after January 1st, 1914. Lessee shall have the use and control of the remainder of said premises from the date hereof unto the end of the term herein provided, to-wit, March 1, 1914, and may use the same and make such repairs to the fences and buildings thereon as it may see fit, except that it shall not plow any of the ground that is now in grass and shall not cut any timber from said premises and shall not pasture any hogs thereon unless the same are ringed. #### STATEMENT

On May 13, 1910, the Board of Trustees met for the purpose of selecting an architect for the proposed new library building. The competitive method was determined on, the details of which are given in the Record of the Proceedings of the Board of Trustees under the above date.

June 16, 1910, preliminary sketches were submitted to the Board of Trustees and referred to a committee for examination and report.

June 30, 1910, Messrs. Allen & Collens, of Boston, Mass., were selected as architects for the new library building, and a committee, known as "The Library Building Committee," was appointed.

Details in connection with the erection, completion and acceptance of the library building, other than those given in the following minutes of the Library Building Committee, may be found in the Record of the Proceedings of the Board of Trustees.

## The Library Building Committee OF The Ohio State University

COLUMBUS, OHIO, July 6, 1910.

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Messrs. Sears, Stone and Mallon constituting a committee to be known as the "Library Building Committee," appointed by the Chairman at the meeting of the Board of Trustees held June 30, 1910, to which committee all matters pertaining to the plans for the new library building shall be referred, met in regular session and selected Guy W. Mallon to act as Chairman.

 $\Psi$ The following motion by Mr. Sears was adopted:

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"The building shall be so designed and constructed as to be complete in itself and not show any disfigurements." \*

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\* On motion of Mr. Stone, and in pursuance to the location decided upon by the Board at its last meeting, the exact location of the building was determined to be as follows:

"The center of the east front of the building to be on the axis of the 15th Avenue entrance, and the east side of the building shall be as far west of the axis of the Main Building and parallel thereto as may be determined by the Architects upon consultation with Olmstead Brothers."

\* \* \* \* \* \* \* On motion it was agreed that the following arrangement be made as a basis for compensation to the Architects, said arrange-

ment to be subject to the approval of the Architects:

"The compensation to be paid to the Architects shall be 5 per cent of the cost of the building out of which an allowance shall be made to meet the salary of the Superintendent and Clerk of the Works, Mr. Edwards, it being understood that Mr. Herbert Edwards shall act as Superintendent for the Architects, in an amount equal to one half of his yearly salary, the total of such allowance in no event to exceed \$1,000, and in addition thereto there shall be allowed to the Architects their necessary travelling expenses connected with the visitations to the work."

The schedule adopted October, 1903 by the American Institute of Architects shall govern in all respects except as above modified.

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The Architects were directed to prepare preliminary plans in

consultation with the Librarian and Library council and to submit such plans to the Library Committee at their earliest convenience.

On motion it was agreed that all instructions and orders to the Architects should pass through the Library Committee.

I am enclosing herewith to you, as chairman of the new Library Building Committee, letters from Messrs. Allen & Collens, the architects, dated February 11, 14 and 18, concerning the inspection of steel work, and the matter of grades and extras connected with the building.

I do not know whether it is necessary to call a special meeting of the Committee to settle these questions, but if so I will be governed by your advice.

Mr. McCracken thinks that the steel should be inspected at the factory, as the firm having the contract for the steel is possibly not quite so well known as some other steel concerns.

In accordance with the above action of the Library Committee, the Secretary instructed the architects to notify Francis J. Peck & Company, of Cleveland, to make the mill and shop inspection of the steel work for the Library Building for the sum of two hundred and sixty dollars (\$260.00), as outlined in the proposition of the said Francis J. Peck & Company to Allen and Collens under date of February 10, 1911.

The Secretary also instructed the architects that the revised grading plans as furnished by Olmstead Brothers had been approved, and the proposition of Mr. D. W. McGrath, the contractor, to furnish the extra courses of Indiana limestone required because of the lowering of the grade, at a cost of four hundred and ninety dollars (\$490.00), was accepted. The proposition to construct the new double door in the basement at the north end of the west elevation, complete for the sum of one hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$175.00) was also accepted, and the Secretary directed the architects to issue the necessary orders to the contractor for the extra work above agreed to.

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Mr. Mallon presented the following letter from the Architects, and after reading the same items 1, 2 and 4 were agreed to: action on item 3 was held in abeyance, as was also action on item 6; item 5 was disagreed to:

BOSTON, May 1, 1911.

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Mr. GUY W. MALLON, Care of Mr. C. E. Steeb, Secy., O. S. U., Columbus, Ohio.

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#### DEAR MR. MALLON:

We undertand that there is to be a meeting of the Library Committee on Wednesday morning at ten o'clock. We wish to bring to your attention certain matters, which Miss Jones has asked for.

The first of these is shown on the sheet of the basement plan. She wishes us to omit the floor underneath the newspaper stack and let this stack run down to the basement. As an offset for the omission of this floor, we can obtain a partition about the basement space plastered on the side toward the stack. We are also omitting the vault originally shown, and using a kalamein iron door, which was formerly specified for the vault, to connect the newspaper stack with the main stack at the basement level. We trust that this arrangement will be satisfactory to your Committee, as it would be done without additional cost.

It has also been suggested that we drop the soil pipe underneath the 2. men's toilet room and place it in a trench, so that if at some future time a toilet room may be required in the basement, it could be added to this soil pipe. We are negotiating now for this change, which we expect can be done without additional cost.

The next change regards the omission of the fireplace in the Stan-3. The next change regards the omission of the fireplace in the Stan-dard Literature Room. We have suggested to Miss Jones that this fireplace remain, as we had always regarded it as an especial feature of that room, which gave it a certain homelike appearance and made it distinctive from the ordinary Reading Room.

Miss Jones further asked that the long window in her room be carried down to the floor level so that she can step out on the balcony. This is shown on sheet 40. We recommend that this be done.

Miss Jones further suggests that a doorway be cut through the 5. front of the Reading Room, so as to make it possible for a person to walk out on the balcony over the front door. This would be desirable for ceremonials and would make it easier for the janitor to get out there than as though he used a ladder. We recommend that this be accepted. As an offset to the above two changes we recommend that the seal on the front and rear cornice be removed and the cornice be carried out in a simple manner corresponding to the original sketch of the building.

6. Miss. Jones further requests that the two windows in her room off the corridor be omitted and the door made solid. This is a matter for your Committee to decide. The leaving out of this glass would probably make it necessary to burn electricity in that corridor. No saving is made by the above change.

We trust that we may hear from you as soon as possible regarding the above matters, as the drawings are progressing rapidly, and we do not want the actual work to get ahead of us in connection with any such alterations, that might meet with your approval.

We trust that hereafter we may be notified in advance of the meetings of the Building Committee, as it would be a very simple matter to make our visits to the work coincide with those meetings.

\* \* \* \* 1. The President reported the gift of the library, consisting of 538 volumes of medical literature, of the late Nathaniel R. Coleman, M. D. through his wife Mrs. Sarah J. Coleman; also that Mrs. Coleman had given \$500.00 for its endowment which gift she hopes to increase later. The President further reported that in addition to the medical library Mrs. Coleman had also given a few rare volumes for the library.

This gift was accepted and the President was directed to make suitable acknowledgement therefor to Mrs. Coleman.

Upon the recommendation of the President it was agreed that the books be placed in the University Library until such time as a medical library will make provision for this collection which shall be known as the Nathaniel R. Coleman Medical Collection.

2. Upon the recommendation of the President, the fees of Miss Isabella Arthur were ordered returned in full, payment to be made to Mr. Milton Snow, as authorized by letter of her sister, Miss Blanche Arthur.

3. Upon the recommendation of the President, the following appointments were made:

Mr. J. Forest Craig was appointed Instructor in English, at a salary of \$1,000.00, effective September 1, 1913, said salary to be paid from the appropriation made by the Emergency Board.

Mr. Gould Leach Harris was appointed Student Assistant in Economics and Sociology, at a salary of \$30.00 per month for eight months, beginning November 1, 1913, said salary to be paid in part from the balance remaining in the appropriation for salaries in above Department, and \$150.00 was appropriated to cover the balance required to meet this salary.

Mr. Otto Francis Wilkinson was appointed Student Assistant in Economics and Sociology at a salary of \$15.00 per month from November 1st until the end of the semester, and \$45.00 was appropriated to meet this salary.

Miss Marie Bowman was appointed Stenographer in the President's office, to succeed Miss Anna Long, resigned, at a salary of \$50.00 per month, effective October 6, 1913.

4. Upon the recommendation of the President and the University Faculty, the degree of Bachelor of Science in Education, as of the Class of 1913, was conferred on Miss Jennie Harmon and Mr. Charles Edward Doust.

5. The President was authorized to approve bills in payment of the services of Miss Anna Null as substitute stenographer in the Chemistry Building during the illness of Miss Cordelia Smith.

6. Upon the recommendation of the President, provision was made for the employment of student assistance by the hour in the Department of Economics and Sociology, monthly bills to be paid, when approved by the President.

7. The President reported that Dr. Horace Brittain, Director of the Ohio School Survey, had requested the Summer Session to give certain courses in rural school administration, the teaching of agriculture and certain courses in agriculture. The Board of Trustees met at the University pursuant to the call of the Chairman.

Present: Walter J. Sears, Chairman, Julius F. Stone, Guy W. Mallon, F. E. Pomerene, O. E. Bradfute and Benj. F. McCann.

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The minutes of previous meetings were read and approved.

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1. The President reported the following resignations, and upon his recommendation the same were accepted:

Dr. J. L. Busby, Assistant in the Department of Anatomy and Physiology, effective November 30, 1913.

Mr. Lloyd Copeland, Fellow in Chemistry, effective October 31, 1913. Mr. R. G. Wolf, Deliveryman, effective November 30, 1913.

2. The President reported as a matter of record, the resignation of Mr. H. S. Warwick, Secretary of the Ohio State University Association, effective December 15, 1913.

3. The President recommended the following appointments which were agreed to:

Mr. Justus Howard Dice was appointed Reference Assistant in the University Library, at a salary of \$500.00 for the remainder of the year beginning January 1, 1914; said salary to be paid from the appropriation for salaries provided in the Budget.

Mr. A. R. Mead was appointed temporary Instructor in the Department of History and Philosophy of Education for two months, at a salary of \$200.00 per month, said salary to be paid from the salary appropriation for the above Department.

Dr. H. E. Boucher was appointed Assistant in the Department of Anatomy and Physiology, vice Dr. Busby, resigned, effective December 1, 1913.

Miss Dora Hepner was appointed Stenographer in the Department of Electrical Engineering, at a salary of \$50.00 per month, beginning November 15, 1913, and \$375.00 was appropriated to meet this salary.

Mr. Raymond R. Hicks was appointed Deliveryman, to succeed Mr. R. G. Wolf, resigned, at a salary of \$55.00 per month, beginning December I, 1913.

4. Upon the recommendation of the President, the title of Miss Clara G. Mark was changed to Instructor in Geology and her salary increased to . \$100.00 per month, beginning December 1, 1913, and an appropriation of \$350.00 was made to meet this increase.

5. The President reported that, owing to a clerical error, the records give the title of Mr. R. H. Neilan as Instructor in Mechanical Engineering instead of Assistant, and upon his recommendation it was ordered that the records be corrected to read Assistant in Mechanical Engineering.

6. Upon the recommendation of the President, the following transfer, appropriations and expenses were authorized:

The balance in the appropriation for the salary of Mr. Lloyd Copeland was transferred to the appropriation for student assistance, it being impossible to fill the fellowship at this period of the year.

An appropriation of \$11.20 was made to the Department of Industrial Arts for student labor in the forging department for the first four weeks of the present semester, and \$125.00 was appropriated to the above department for labor and material for the repair of wood lathes.

The expenses of Mr. W. W. Boyd, Dean of the College of Education, were authorized for a trip to the University of Missouri and the University of Illinois for the purpose of investigating the suitability of certain persons for the professorships of Art and the History and Philosophy of Education.

An appropriation of \$200.00 was made for expenses of the Engineering Lecture Course.

7. The President reported that the Receiving Department was now ready for operation and recommended that an appropriation of \$1,259.67 be made for the purchase of equipment, as follows:

On motion, an appropriation was made of \$1,259.67 to cover the cost of the above equipment, and the installation of a Bell telephone and a Citizens telephone was also authorized for the Receiving Department.

8. The president submitted the following report of the Graduate Council for the distribution of the fund of \$2,500.00 appropriated by the legislature, with the recommendation that the plan of expenditure be approved:

"The Graduate Council recommends that the \$2,500.00 be used in establishing six scholarships at \$250.00 each, and two fellowships at \$500.00 each."

On motion the above recommendation was approved.

9. The President presented a report from the University Architect, stating that Mr. M. P. Streett had completed his contract for the Store Room and Receiving Department Building in accordance with the plans and specifications, and recommended the acceptance of the work and payment of the final estimate without penalty.

On motion the above recommendation was agreed to and the Secretary was authorized to pay the final estimate to Mr. Streett in the amount of \$734.65.

10. Upon the recommendation of the President, the University Architect was authorized to design certain equipment for the Botany and Zoology Building and the Horticulture and Forestry Building.

11. Upon recommendation of the President, the Secretary was directed to pay to Professor Frank P. Graves \$225.00 for services rendered in the Department of History and Philosophy of Education subsequent to his resignation, said amount to be paid from the salary appropriation for the above Department and to cover both services and travelling expenses.

12. The President reported that the Civil Service law will become effective January 1, 1914, and on motion the entire matter of arranging the classification of the employees of the Ohio State University was referred to the President with power.

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On motion of Mr. McCann, the President was appointed to represent the University at the inaugural ceremonies of John Huston Finley as President of the University and Commissioner of Education of the State of New York, at Albany, January 2, 1914.

The President reported that he had received a resolution passed by the Board of Regents of the University of Michigan November 14, 1913, in which said Board of Regents declares that it does not desire to carry on further the matter of bringing the University of Michigan again into the Western Conference. Whereupon the following resolution was presented and adopted:

"The Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University respectfully acknowledges the receipt of a copy of the action taken by the Regents of the University of Michigan May 29, 1913 and of the action taken November 14, 1913. It desires to state that since this University was admitted within the past year to membership in the Western Conference it did not deem it wise to begin action looking to a revision of the rules governing the Conference until experience had demonstrated the necessity of such revision. In accepting membership in the Western Conference, the Ohio State University recognized with sincere regret the necessity of forfeiting athletic relations with the University of Michigan. The return of the University of Michigan to the Conference would be universally approved in the athletic circles of the Ohio State University. The Board expresses its regret that the conditions are such as to render the return of the University to the Western Conference apparently impossible."

Captain Cope called the attention of the Board to the desire of Mr. A. M. Marcy of Mount Sterling, Ohio, to purchase twelve or fifteen acres of land in Madison Township, Fayette County, Ohio, which said Marcy thinks belongs to the University. Captain Cope stated that in order to determine definitely the title to this land, it was necessary that an accurate survey be made, and that Mr. Marcy had agreed to pay the expense of the engineer if, after the survey is made, it is found that the title does not belong to the University, and that if it does belong to the University, then the University should pay the expense of the engineer.

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On motion of Mr. Bradfute, Captain Cope was directed to have the land surveyed under the conditions named above.

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The Board of Trustees of the Starling Ohio Medical College and Dr. Colwell of the American Medical Association appeared before the Board and discussed the proposals made to the Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University by the Board of Trustees of the Starling Ohio Medical College relative to merging Starling Ohio Medical College with the Ohio State University.

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Professor H. C. Price appeared before the Board and made a report as to the proposed new three-year course of twenty weeks as a substitute for the present two year course in agriculture. Formal action on this report was deferred until definite recommendation should be made by the Faculty.

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Captain Cope presented the following application for deeds, and the Chairman of the Board was directed to execute the same:

The Board of Trustees met pursuant to the call of the Chairman, at the Neil House.

Present: Walter J. Sears, Chairman, Julius F. Stone, Guy W. Mallon, O. E. Bradfute and Benj. F. McCann.

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The following resolution presented by Mr. McCann was unanimously adopted:

"Be Il Resolved, That this Board request a conference with the Agricultural Commission on the matter of extension work, in order that duplication may be avoided, and that a committee from this Board be appointed to attend such conference."

The Chairman appointed Mr. McCann and Mr. Bradfute as members of said committee.

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The following resolution presented by Mr. Stone was unanimously adopted:

"That it is the sense of the Board of Trustees that it is highly necessary for the bill providing for a building for the College of Education to be passed."

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The Board now recessed to have a conference with Governor James M. Cox.

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After the conference with Governor Cox the Board resumed its session at the Neil House.

I. Upon the recommendation of the President and the University Faculty, the following persons were granted the degree indicated:

Edward D. Coberly, Bachelor of Science in Horticulture and Forestry, as of the Class of 1905.

Erskine Clark Wright, Bachelor of Science in Agriculture, as of the Class of 1912.

Edwin Barlow Evans, Master of Arts, as of the Class of 1913.

2. The President reported the death of Dr. Andrew Miller Jansen, Instructor in Bacteriology, which occured January 4, 1914, and recommended that, in accordance with the usual custom, two months' salary be paid to his widow, Mrs. Grace Ackland Jansen. Said recommendation was agreed to.

3. The President reported the resignation of Mr. Don F. Russell, Assistant in the Department of Anatomy and Physiology, effective December 30, 1913, and upon his recommendation said resignation was accepted.

4. Upon the recommendation of the President, the following appointments were made:

Mr. Henry Bernhardt Froning was appointed Instructor in Bacteriology, to succeed the late Dr. Jansen, at a salary of \$100.00 per month, from February 1 to July 1, 1914, and \$100.00 was appropriated to meet this salary.

Mr. D. D. Shira was appointed Assistant in the Department of Anatomy and Physiology, to succeed Mr. Russell, at the same salary, from January 1 to July 1, 1914.

Mrs. Marian Lucas Garvin was appointed Instructor in Home Economics, for the second semester, at a salary of \$600.00, as provided by the Emergency Board.

5. Upon the recommendation of the President, the title of Mr. C. S. Duncan was changed from Assistant Professor to Professor of English, and his salary increased from \$1,800.00 to \$2,000.00 per year, effective February I, 1914. An appropriation of \$100.00 was made to meet this increase.

6. Upon the recommendation of the President, an arrangement was made whereby Mr. Charles Wells Reeder, Reference Librarian, may give one half his time to the Industrial Commission of Ohio, his salary to be at the rate of \$,800.00 per annum, one half of which is to be paid by the University, said arrangement to become effective February I, 1914.

7. The President presented and recommended for approval a recommendation from the University Faculty, under date of January 23, 1914, providing for an Arts-Agriculture Combination Course, between the University of Akron and The Ohio State University, said course to cover a period of five years, three of which are to be spent at the University of Akron and two at The Ohio State University. At the end of four years the degree of Bachelor of Science will be conferred by the University of Akron, and at the end of five years the degree of Bachelor of Science in Agriculture will be conferred by The Ohio State University.

The President also presented an outline of the proposed course and general requirements for admission.

On motion, the recommendation of the faculty was approved.

8. Upon the recommendation of the President, the following resolution concerning a change in fees was adopted:

(1) That all laboratory fees and the non-resident distinction be abolished. (2) That as a substitute for the present incidental fee of ten dollars and the laboratory fees, one fee of fifteen dollars a semester be charged in all colleges now in operation, except the College of Law, where the present fees be continued.

(3) That locker fees as now charged in the Gymnasium be continued.

(4) That the usual deposit fees as now in force be continued.

(5) That the custom of collecting one dollar per semester for the Ohio Union be continued.

(6) That this order become effective with the beginning of the second semester of the current year.

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The Secretary presented a request from the University Architect for an extra on the Horticulture and Forestry Building for extra excavation and concrete work in the foundation, in favor of Mr. D. W. McGrath, in the amount of \$856.50.

On motion, said extra was approved, and the Secretary was directed to file a certified copy with the Auditor of State.

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The Secretary reported the gift from Mr. George N. Cole, of New York, to the School of Mines Library, of Vols. LXXV and LXXVI of the Transactions of the American Society of Civil Engineers; also the proceedings of the American Society of Civil Engineers for February 1911, October, November and December 1912 and ten volumes for 1913. Whereupon the Secretary was directed to make suitable acknowledgment therefor.

The statement of the President concerning the medical college was now read to the Board of Trustees, and in the conclusion of said statements his recommendations were as follows:

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1. "I recommend that the Trustees accept the proposal made by Starling-Ohio Trustees and proceed with the necessary steps to acquire the property and to succeed to the ownership and management of the Starling-Ohio Medical College.

2. I recommend that the Trustees express their willingness to operate a homeopathic college, or department, but before setting out on this proposal, make furt her investigation as to whether the work should be continued in Cleveland, and whether in either case the indebtedness could be provided for. 3. I recommend that an appropriation of \$25,000.00 be asked from the legislature for medical education, including repairs to property, but that the taking over of the property be not conditioned upon the granting of the appropriation."

The Secretary presented a supplementary proposition from the Trustees of the Starling-Ohio Medical College, dated January 27, 1914, as following:

"To the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University.

### GENTLEMEN:

The Trustees of the Starling-Ohio Medical College have authorized me to make the following supplementary proposition to that of January 10, 1913:

To-wit: They will also turn over cash on hand in addition to the properties, after all debts are paid, which balance will amount approximately from twelve to fifteen thousand dollars.

The only condition attached to this cash donation is that a sufficient amount shall be set aside to make desirable improvements in the college building on Park Street.

Dr. George H. Matson, chairman of the special committee appointed by the Board of Visitors of the Ohio State University Association appeared before the Board and presented the report of his committee on the matter of the advisability of The Ohio State University establishing a college of medicine and the acceptance of the proposition of the Starling-Ohio Medical College.

Dr. Matson's report showed that of the fifteen members of the Board of visitors, replies had been received from fourteen, all of which were favorable to the proposition.

Dr. Matson's report, together with the replies from the individual members of the Board of visitors, were turned over to the University, and the Secretary was directed to file the same.

Mr. Mallon offered the following resolution, which, upon motion of Mr. McCann, was unanimously adopted:

### Be it Resolved by the Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University:

First—That pursuant to an Act of the Legislature of Ohio, passed April 18, 1913, (O. L. 103, P. 344) a college of medicine and a college of dentistry be established at The Ohio State University. Second—That the proposition of the Board of Trustees of the Starling-Ohio Medical College, submitted to the Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University, under date of January 10, 1913, supplemented by the proposition of the Trustees of the said Starling-Ohio Medical College, dated January 27, 1914, be accepted, provided that the title to said property is acceptable to the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, and to this end a committee of three shall be appointed to take steps to execute the required papers and to examine and pass upon the muniments of title necessary to the carrying out of this resolution.

Third—The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University desires to go on record as likewise willing to establish a homeopathic department to said college, provided the property inducements offered by the Homeopathic School of Medicine are satisfactory to this Board, and it is ordered that the investigation as to the property of the Cleveland-Pulte Medical College, of Cleveland, Ohio, be continued.

The Board of Trustees met at the Neil House pursuant to the call of the Chairman.

Present: Walter J. Sears, Chairman, Julius F. Stone, Guy W. Mallon and F. E. Pomerene.

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1. The President called the attention of the Board to the matter of appropriating funds for current expense for the second semester, stating that the general appropriation bill had not been passed by the legislature and therefore no appropriations could be made by the Trustees.

Upon the recommendation of the President, the Purchasing Department was authorized to extend the credit of certain departments in the matter of current expense until the next meeting of the Board of Trustees.

2. Upon the recommendation of the President and the University Faculty, the two-year courses in Agriculture and Horticulture were abolished, and three-year courses in Agriculture and Horticulture were established instead, under the following conditions: First—The three-year courses to begin the Tuesday following the fifteenth of October and end the Friday immediately preceding the fifteenth of March; the year to be divided into two terms, the first ending at the holiday season.

Second—That it be understood, as a matter of record, that no credit will ever be given in the four-year courses for work done in the three-year courses.

The President also submitted the outlines for the two new courses which were duly approved by the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion, the incidental fees for the three-year courses in Agriculture and Horticulture were fixed at \$10.00 per term or \$20.00 per year.

3. Upon the recommendation of the President, free scholarships in the College of Agriculture were abolished, the present scholarships to be continued in force untill they expire in 1915.

4. Upon the recommendation of the President, the following persons were granted leave of absence for the academic year 1914-1915, upon the usual basis, except in the case of Miss Beatrice Sheets who asked for leave without salary:

J. A. Bownocker	Professor of Inorganic Geology and Curator (for one-half year)
A. E. Davies	Professor of Philosophy
O. C. Lockhart	Professor of Economics and Sociology
Miss Sarah Barrows	Assistant Professor of German
Miss Beatrice Sheets	Assistant Professor of Economics and Sociology
W. B. Cockley	Assistant Professor of Law
W. A. Starin	Assistant Professor of Bacteriology

5. Upon the recommendation of the President, Mr. R. R. Robinson, Fellow in the Department of Geology, was granted leave of absence for a short period to do some work for U. S. Geological Survey at Washington, and the employment of Mr. Kenneth Cottingham during Mr. Robinson's absence, at \$30.00 per month, not to exceed three months, was approved, salary to be paid from the appropriation for the salary of Mr. Robinson.

6. Upon the recommendation of the President, Dr. Lewis F. Anderson, now of the University of Illinois, was elected Professor of the History of Education, at a salary of 3,000.00 per year, effective September 1, 1914.

7. Upon the recommendation of the University Faculty and the President, Mr. Clinton Codrus Brown was granted the degree of Mechanical Engineer, as of the Class of 1913.

8. Upon the recommendation of the University Faculty and the President, the requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Laws were amended to read as follows:

"The degree of Bachelor of Laws (LL. B.) will be conferred on all who being at least 21 years of age, and having met the requirements necessary for entrance for a degree, passed satisfactorily the examination at the close of the third year, after having done at least that year's work in the College of Law at the University."

9. The President presented the general statement of the entrance requirements for admission to the University as adopted by the University Faculty January 21, 1914. The statement was approved.

10. The President presented the following report from the Graduate Council, concerning a system of fellowships and scholarships, as approved by the University Faculty, and recommended its approval by the Board of Trustees. On motion said report was approved.

(1) That provision be made for a new system of fellowships and scholarships.

(2) Fellowships shall be open to candidates who have previously pursued graduate work equivalent in amount to that required for a master's degree and of a character to indicate their capability for specialized research, and who are intending to become candidates for a doctor's degree.

(3) Scholarships shall be open to graduates who desire to enter upon specialized graduate studies in candidacy for any of the higher degrees.

(4) Fellowships and scholarships shall be awarded for the period of one year. In return for the compensations granted them, Fellows and Scholars shall carry on such research work as may be assigned them by the instructiors under whom they are working. They shall not be called upon for service to the University as instructors or assistants.

(5) Each fellowship shall be of the annual value of Five hundred dollars and each scholarship of the annual value of Two hundred and fifty dollars with remission of all regular fixed university fees.

(6) The fellowship shall be open in those departments that offer graduate courses and opportunities in character and amount meeting the major requirements for a doctor's degree.

(7) The scholarships shall be open in all departments of the University announcing and conducting graduate work sufficient in amount to satisfy the major requirements for a graduate degree.

(8) We further recommend that the state appropriation of \$2500.00 for the Graduate School for the year 1914 be devoted to the establishment of two (2) fellowships and six (6) scholarships available for the year 1914-1915.

(9) The Committee further recommends, that the title of the existing teaching fellowships be changed to "Graduate Assistantships" the terms of their positions and their relationship to graduate study to remain as hitherto. This change to become effective in 1914-1915.

11. The President reported that the University Faculty had adopted subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees, a four-year course in Manual Training offered in the College Education.

The President presented the outline of the Course and upon his recommendation the same was approved.

12. The President presented and recommended for approval by the Board of Trustees the new course Rural Economics (108)—Rural Community Life,—this course having been approved by the University Faculty February 12, 1914.

On motion, action on this matter was deferred and the recommendation was laid on the table.

13. The President presented the report of the Committee on Instruction, under date of February 11, 1914, concerning electives in the College of Arts, Philosophy and Science, and the resolution of the University Faculty adopted February 12, 1914, with the recommendation that said action be approved.

On motion, action on this recommendation was deferred and the entire matter was laid on the table.

Mr. Mallon announced the death of Professor Josiah Renick

Smith at his home in Columbus, February 15, 1914, and offered the following minute, which was unanimously adopted:

"The Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University being advised of the death of Professor J. R. Smith, places on record its appreciation of his high character, his efficiency as a teacher, his splendid manhood and his loyal service for a generation in behalf of the cause of education. Professor Smith, a graduate of Amherst College in 1871, began teaching in the public schools of Columbus, where he was born October 24, 1851, and after an experience both in the grades and the high school, was invited to the University in 1876 as Assistant Professor of Ancient Languages. In 1881 he resigned for study in Europe where he spent two years at the University of Leipsic. Upon his return he was elected Professor of Greek, a position he occupied continuously until his death which occurred during the thirty-sixth year of his service. He won the universal esteem of his colleagues, of his students and of all who knew him. The University and the State profited greatly by his service and his death closed a career rarely surpassed in academic circles. The Board recognizes the loss to the University and expresses its gratitude for a scholarly service cheerfully rendered by a teacher who was in himself the expression of the highest ideals of culture and citizenship.

"Be it resolved that the Secretary send a copy of this minute to Mrs. Smith with an expression of the profound sympathy of the Trustees in her bereavement."

On motion, the Secretary was directed to present this matter to the Attorney General.

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Upon the recommendation of the President, the Secretary was directed to have plans and specifications prepared (1) for

the new tunnel from the Horticulture and Forestry Building to the Botany and Zoology Building, the cost not to exceed \$14,950.00; (2) for a Freight House and Kiln Room, the cost not to exceed \$12,200.00; (3) specifications for a generating unit for the Power House, the cost not to exceed \$12,000.00 installed.

The Secretary was directed to have the proceedings of the Board of Trustees for the year ended June 30, 1913, printed and bound in the usual manner.

Mr. E. C. Smith was appointed Instructor in Metallurgy for the current semester, (to serve during Mr. Somermeier's absence on sick leave) at a salary of 100.00 per month, as provided in the Budget.

Mr. Emmett S. Porter was appointed Assistant in Agronomy to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Malcom Sewell, resigned, at a salary of \$50.00 per month, effective March I, 1914.

Mr. Otto F. Wilkinson was appointed Student Assistant in the Department of Economics and Sociology for the second semester, at a salary of \$30.00 per month, and \$150.00 was appropriated to meet this salary.

On motion the Secretary was directed to enter said appropriations on the ledger, and said amounts were appropriated for the University for the purposes indicated, to be expended in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Board of Trustees.

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Upon the recommendation of Acting President Adams, the Treasurer of the University was directed to turn over to the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, on the date when Senate Bill No. I (passed January 21, 1914) becomes operative, all monies remaining in his hands as Treasurer of the University, taking proper receipt therefor; and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees is directed to pay forthwith such balances received from the Treasurer of the University into the State Treasury, in the manner indicated in said Senate Bill No. 1.

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The attention of the Board was called to a communication from Mr. John A. Kling, General Manager of the Kelley Island Lime and Transport Company, concerning the rental of the Mollitor property at Marblehead for the use of the Lake Laboratory.

This communication was referred to a special committee, consisting of Mr. Sears, Mr. Stone and the President. \*

The request of the officers of the Lawrence County Agricultural and Horticultural Society to transfer the free scholarship now held by Cecil M. McGown to Isaac P. Lewis was agreed to, it being understood that this scholarship will expire June 30, 1915, in accordance with the resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees at its meeting February 17, 1914.

ж \* \* \* \* ж \* \* \* A petition from students in Forestry regarding the name of the new Horticulture and Forestry Building was read and ordered filed with the President.

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Mr. Mallon presented the following regulations covering the Civil Service at the University, and on motion said regulations were adopted:

In order that the State Civil Service Law may be more effectively complied with, it is hereby ordered that all requests for service of any kind be filed with the President, and after such request has been approved by the President, then the Secretary shall make formal application to the Civil Service Commission for the kind of service requested.

In case of temporary help the same procedure shall be followed.

The salary and wage of each person in the classified service is filed with the Commission. No change in said salary or wage shall be passed by the Secretary until after such change has been approved by the President and filed with the Civil Service Commission, as directed by law.

The Secretary is hereby directed to prepare and keep in his office such records as will protect the University in the operation of the Civil Service Law.

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In order to take care of the increased business in the Secretary's office, resulting from the new budget system, the State depository law and the new methods of disbursing funds ordered by the Auditor of State, the Secretary, upon motion of Mr. Stone, was authorized to employ an accountant, the service to begin as soon as a suitable person can be secured.

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Mr. Sears presented a communication from Mr. N. W. Storer, President of the Ohio State University Association, requesting the Trustees to pay a part of the expense of the publication of "Who's Who," and to make as a part of the graduating expenses of seniors, a charge of Two Dollars, upon payment of which each graduate would become automatically a member of the Ohio State University Association.

The matter of "Who's Who" was referred to the President and Secretary for examination and report, the same to be presented to the Board at its next meeting. The matter of the senior fee was laid over until the next meeting of the Board.

\* \* \* \* \* \* \* \*

Professor Bradford presented the plaus, specifications and estimate for a Freight House and Kiln Room, said estimate being \$12,200.00.

On motion said plans, specifications and estimate were approved, and the Secretary was directed to present the same to the State Building Commission for its approval, and if approved by it, then the Secretary is directed to give notice, as required by law, of the time and place, when and where sealed proposals will be received for furnishing the materials and performing the labor necessary for the erection and completion of said building.

The Secretary reported that in accordance with the action of the Board of Trustees at its meeting held June 27, 1913, the deeds to the Hansberger and Belt lands have been prepared and said deeds together with the abstracts have been presented to the Attorney General and approved by him.

Mr. Stone presented the following motion:

"That the Secretary be directed to complete the purchase of the above lands, paying therefor the option price of \$56,000-000, said payment to be made from the balance of \$10,947.55 remaining in the appropriation for new farm lands and improvements, the appropriation of \$42,000.00 made at the last session of the legislature and \$3,052.45 from the general funds of the University, which amount is hereby appropriated for said purpose."

On this motion the Chairman called for the ayes and nays which resulted as follows:

Whereupon the motion was declared carried.

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The Secretary presented a communication from Louisa Hess Brown requesting the Board of Trustees to continue the lease on the Hess tract for the year ending March 31, 1915, at a rental of \$550.00 for the year.

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This request was referred to the President and Secretary with power to act.

March 17 to 20, 1914.

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Mr. Pomerene presented the following resolution which was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, It is and has been the policy of the University to grant a year's leave of absence to deserving members of the Faculty that they may better prepare themselves for serv-

ice by travel and study at home and abroad; and Dr. William Oxley Thompson has now given the State more than fourteen years of faithful, continuous and valuable service as President of this University, and in the judgment of this Board the time has come when he should be granted a leave of absence.

Be It Resolved, That leave of absence for six months be tendered and granted to President Thompson, in order that he may take a much needed rest, study the educational institutions of this and other countries and bring the results of his investigations to aid in working out the problems at this University.

Resolved Further, That in the event President Thompson accepts this offer and suggestion of the Board, that Dean John J. Adams of the College of Law be requested to serve as Acting President of the University during the absence of President Thompson.

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> Thereupon the Board adjourned to meet at the call of the Chairman.

\* A report from the University Architect stated that it would be impossible to rebuild or repair the burned structure.

The Executive Committee then ordered the University Architect to present the plans and specifications in his possession, for the wings of the Physics Building for examination.

After examination it was agreed that Acting President John J. Adams should present to the Governor of Ohio a statement of the facts in the case and request an appropriation from the Emergency Board to construct one of the wings of the Physics Building, the estimated cost for one wing being \$40,000.00.

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The Secretary was directed to secure bids and award the contract for wrecking the English Building.

# Office of the Board of Trustees The Ohio State University

COLUMBUS, OHIO, March 19, 1914.

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The Board of Trustees met pursuant to the call of the Chairman at the Neil House.

Present: Walter J. Sears, Chairman, Julius F. Stone, F. E. Pomerene, Guy W. Mallon, O. E. Bradfute and Benj. F. McCann.

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The President reported that in accordance with the instructions received from the Executive Committee at its meeting March 9,1914, (called on account of the destruction of the English Building by fire March 8th) request had been made from the State Emergency Board for an allowance of \$40,000.00, for the purpose of constructing a wing to the Physics Building, said wing to be used by the Department of English for class rooms.

On motion of Mr. Pomerene the above action of the Executive Committee was approved by the Board.

The President reported that the following action had been taken by the Emergency Board:

"Resolved, That the Ohio State University be granted \$40,000.00 for emergency to be credited to F-10 in the budget of said institution, and the Auditor of State is hereby authorized to transfer from the funds available for the use of the Emergency Board the above amount." In taking the above action it was agreed between the Emergency Board and the President that, in view of the above allowance, the University would withhold the expenditures on certain items in the Appropriation Bill coming under classification F-10. In support of said agreement the President presented the following letter to the Emergency Board, which letter, on motion of Mr. Bradfute, was approved:

"COLUMBUS, OHIO, March 19, 1914.

The Honorable Emergency Board, Columbus, Ohio.

GENTLEMEN:

Pursuant to the conversation and understanding between the Emer gency Board and The Ohio State University, March 10, 1914, and in view of the appropriation made by the Emergency Board of \$40,000.00, the University makes the following proposition, namely;

That the following appropriations will be withheld until Autumn and the expenditures not made at that time unless by the approval of the Emergency Board the expenditures are authorized:

For Lake Laboratory	\$ 2,500 00
For one unit of the Greenhouses	
For water stalls in Veterinary Laboratory	
For Library stacks	7,400 00
Total	\$15,000 00

The above proposal anticipates that the balance of \$3,200.00 in the appropriation for Library stacks may be used for Library equipment, in the event that the Emergency Board finds next Autumn that it is unwise to authorize the expenditure of \$10,600.00 for the Library stacks, as provided in the Appropriation Bill.

The appropriation for Greenhouses was \$13,000.00. The proposal is to omit one unit at a cost of \$5,000.00, leaving \$8,000.00 for the initial construction of Greenhouses.

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Professor Bradford presented the completed plans, specifications and estimates for the East Wing of the Physics Building.

On motion of Mr. McCann, said plans, specifications and estimates were approved, and the Secretary was directed to present the same to the State Building Commission for its approval, and if approved by it, then the Secretary is directed to give notice, as required by law, of the time and place, when and where sealed proposals will be received for furnishing the materials and performing the labor necessary for the erection and completion of said East Wing of the Physics Building.

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Professor Bradford also presented the completed plans, specifications and estimates for the Tunnel connecting the Horticulture and Forestry Building with the Botany and Zoology Building.

On motion of Mr. Pomerene, said plans, specifications and estimates were approved, and the Secretary was directed to present the same to the State Building Commission for its approval, and if approved by it, then the Secretary is directed to give notice, as required by law, of the time and place, when and where sealed proposals will be received for furnishing the materials and performing the labor necessary for the construction of said Tunnel.

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The Secretary reported that the purchase of the Belt and Hansberger tracts of land had been completed, in accordance with the directions of the Board of Trustees, and that said deeds have been filed, as directed by law, with the Auditor of State.

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I. The President recommended the acceptance of the resignation of Dean W. W. Boyd, Professor of School Administration and Dean of the College of Education, to take effect June 30, 1914.

Whereupon the Board passed the following motion:

"That the resignation be acce pted with regret, and the Board places on record its appreciation of his service rendered for twelve years as High School Visitor, Professor of School Administration and Dean of the College of Education. The Board also extends its most cordial good wishes for his success as President of the Western College for Women at Oxford, Ohio."

2. Upon the recommendation of the President, Mr. George Melville Bolling, Ph. D., was elected Professor of Greek Language and Literature, at a salary of \$3,000.00 per year, effective July 1, 1914.

3. The President reported that owing to the resignation of C. A. Hersom, Dr. Max Wershow had been assigned the duties of Technician in Pathology in addition to his work as Assistant in the Department of Veterinary Medicine, and upon the recommendation of the President he was allowed \$40.00 per month additional for this service.

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4. Upon the recommendation of the President, Dean Denney was appointed to attend the meeting of Deans to be held at the University of Missouri, Columbia, Missouri, in the month of May.

5. Upon the recommendation of the President and the University Faculty the following degrees were granted:

## BACHELOR OF ARTS

Madeline Johnson Baird, as of the Class of 1914. Abe Ploshansky Dunmar, as of the Class of 1914. John George Van Deusen, as of the Class of 1913.

#### BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN DOMESTIC SCIENCE

Grace Graham Walker, as of the Class of 1913.

6. Upon the recommendation of the President, the tuition fee in the College of Medicine and the College of Dentistry was made \$150.00 per year, with an additional annual fee of \$5.00 chargeable to students requiring the use of a high power microscope.

7. The President presented a communication from Dean Price concerning the use of the new farm for the current year, looking toward the subsequent establishment of some experimental work, and upon the recommendation of the President, the following suggestions of Dean Price were adopted:

I. That a lease be made with Mr. Fred Windmiller for one year for the portion of the farm that he has been using for market garden purposes.

2. That the remainder of the farm be used for farming purposes to the best advantage possible.

3. That the Department of Forestry be requested to investigate the wood lot that is new standing on the farm and to make recommendations concerning the use of the same.

4. That the Head of the Department of Horticulture and the Dean of the College of Agriculture be authorized to confer with the Director of the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, looking toward the establishment of experimental work in truck farming and market gardening on the tract of land now occupied by Mr. Windmiller, and if found feasible and desirable to establish such work that a plan for carrying it out be submitted to the Board of Trustees for its approval.

5. That the President of the University and the Dean of the College of Agriculture be authorized to confer with the Director of the Ohio State Agricultural Experiment Station in reference to establishing a branch experiment station upon a portion of the new farm for the experimental work in farm crops and soil fertility. That a preliminary survey of the farm and a report concerning its suitability for this purpose be made, and if found desirable, a plan for carrying it into effect be submitted to the Board of Trustess for its approval.

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The President submitted the following resolution adopted by the Agricultural Commission of Ohio:

*Whereas*. The Agricultural Commission is charged with the supervision and direction of all agricultural extension work supported by the State, and

Whereas, One of the principal reasons for creating the State Agricultural Commission was to unify and correlate the agricultural extension activities of the State, and

Whereas, The State appropriations for agricultural extension are divided between the Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University and the State Agricultural Commission, and the Federal appropriations for agricultural extension will be made to the Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University.

Therefore, be it resolved, That it is the sense of the State Agricultural Commission that a joint board should be constituted of representatives of the Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University and the State Agricultural Commission to work out plans and policies for the expenditures of all funds, either State or National, appropriated for agricultural extension work. That the actions of this joint board shall be subject to the approval of both the Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University and the State Agricultural Commission.

Be it further resolved that a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University, with the request that they receive consideration at the earliest convenience of the Board, and report on the same be made to the Agricultural Commission.

On motion, President Thompson and Judge McCann were designated as the Committee to confer with the Agricultural Commission, as requested in the above resolution.

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The Secretary presented the following contract concerning the transfer of The Starling-Ohio Medical College to The Ohio State University, and on motion of Mr. Stone said contract was ratified and the Chairman and Secretary of the Board of Trustees were directed to sign the same, after the approval of the Attorney General is secured: CONTRACT BETWEEN THE STARLING-OHIO MEDICAL COLLEGE AND THE STATE OF OHIO, MARCH 19, 1914.

This agreement made and concluded at Columbus, Ohio, this 19th day of March, 1914, by and between The Starling-Ohio Medical College, party of the first part, and the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, party of the second part, Witnesseth:

That said party of the first part for good and valuable considerations hereby covenants and agrees to and with said party of the second part, as follows, to-wit:

r. That it hereby sells, remises and releases, and agrees that within thirty days from the date hereof it will convey, to the party of the second part, or to the State of Ohio at its option, by a good and sufficient deed in fee simple, with covenants of general warranty, the following described real estate, situated in the State of Ohio, County of Franklin and City of Columbus, and more particularly described as follows, to-wit:

> Being Lots numbered Fourteen (14) and Fifteen (15) of Lincoln Goodale's Executor's Subdivision of part of Reserve Number Eight (8) of Lincoln Goodale's Addition to the City of Columbus, Ohio, and located on the east side of Park Street in said city.

Subject, however, to a certain lease by said party of the first part to the Protestant Hospital Association, dated the 28th day of June, 1907, which was recorded in the Recorder's Office of Franklin County, Ohio, in Miscellaneous Record, Volume 6, commencing at page 410.

2. That it hereby sells, remises and releases, and agrees that within thirty days from the date hereof it will convey, by quit claim deed, to said party of the second part, or to the State of Ohio at its option, all of the right, title and interest of said party to the first part in and to the following described real estate, situated in the State of Ohio, County of Franklin, and City of Columbus, and more particularly described as follows, to-wit:

> Being Lots Numbered Forty-four (44), Fortyfive (45) and Forty-six (46) in Kelly and Northrup's Addition to said city, and situated on the south side of East State Street in said city.

3. That it hereby sells, remises, releases, grants and assigns to said party of the second part, or to the State of Ohio at its option, all of the chattel property of said party of the first part, and all of its personal property of every kind and character except its cash on hand mentioned and referred to in the eighth (8) paragraph hereof, and that it will within thirty days from the date hereof execute and deliver to said party of second part, or to the State of Ohio at its option, a bill of sale of said personal property.

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4. That prior to the execution and delivery of the conveyances aforesaid, it will pay all lawful assessments for local benefits which are liens upon the aforesaid real estate and every part thereof.

5. That it will duly assign to said party of the second part, or to the State of Ohio at its option, all subsisting fire insurance policies issued to it or held by it on each and all of the buildings situated on the lots aforesaid, and each thereof, and at the time of the delivery of said conveyances will deliver to said party of the second part, or to the State of Ohio at its option, all of said fire insurance policies duly assigned as aforesaid.

6. That said party of the first part will carry on to the close of the present scholastic year the work now and heretofore carried on by said party of the the first part in its college of medicine, its college of pharmacy, and its college of dentistry and will maintain throughout the present scholastic year the present standard of efficiency therein, and hereby reserves the right to use all of the property herein mentioned until the close of its present scholastic year for the purpose aforesaid.

7. That it will, before the close of said scholastic year, collect all bills and accounts receivable due to it so far as practicable.

8. That at the close of said scholastic year, or as soon as thereafter as practicable, it will pay all its liabilities of every kind and character, and will as soon as such liabilities be paid, and not later that the first day of August 1914, pay over to the party of the second part, or to the State of Ohio at its option, the net amount of all its cash on haud after paying its liabilities as aforesaid, and will then assign to said party of the second part, or to the State of Ohio at its option, all of the collectable bills and accounts receivable due to it.

9. That said real estate shall be conveyed to said party of the second part, or to the State of Ohio at its option, and said personal property shall be transferred, assigned and turned over to said party of the second part, or to the State of Ohio at its option, and said net cash on hand shall be paid over to the party of the second part, or to the State of Ohio at its option, for the purpose of advancing and promoting the science and art of medicine and the science and art of dentistry as provided in the act of the General Assembly of the State of Ohio, passed April 18, 1913 (103 Ohio Laws page 344).

For the considerations and purpose aforesaid party of the second part on behalf of the State of Ohio hereby agrees to accept said property and said conveyances, said bill of sale, said cash, said bills and accounts receivable, said fire insurance policies and the transfers and assignments aforesaid, subject to the reservation contained in paragraph six (6) of this agreement, and subject to the further reservation, condition and agreement that the party of the second part shall take said property subject to the obligation on its part to indemnify the party of the first part and its trustees against, and save the party of the first part and its trustees harmless from, all loss for and on account of any and all claims against said party of the first part of which the party of the first part shall not have knowledge at the time said money is to be paid by said party of the first part to said party of the second part as aforesaid.

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The President presented the following proposition from the Trustees of the Cleveland-Pulte Medical College, and on motion said proposal was referred to Judge McCann for examination and report to the Board at its next meeting:

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## TO DR. W. O. THOMPSON,

President Ohio State University, and Board of Trustees of said University, Columbus, Ohio.

GENTLEMEN:

The Board of Trustees of Cleveland-Pulte Medical College desires to submit to you the following proposition:

The Trustees of the Cleveland-Pulte Medical College of Cleveland, Ohio, hereby tender to the Trustees of the Ohio State University of Columbus, Ohio, the following:

(1) Our student body.

(2) Our laboratory and anatomical equipment, an inventory of which is hereto attached and marked Exhibit "A."

(3) Our library of eighteen hundred volumes.

(4) Our equity in the Huron Road property, Cleveland, Ohio, which we estimate to be worth \$30,000,00. We to sell

the property at the earliest opportunity and turn the proceeds in cash over to said Board of Trustees of Obio State University.

Said property is to be turned over to the said Board of Trustees of Ohio State University on the following conditions:

(I) That it establish and maintain a Homeopathic department in the College of Medicine of the Ohio State University, embracing a Homeopathic Dean and such professorships as the Dean and the President of the University may deem necessary.

(2) That it establish and maintain a Homeopathic Hospital.

(3) That the Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University shall accept the students now in attendance in the Cleveland-Pulte Medical College, with rank and standing as certified by the proper officers of the Cleveland-Pulte Medical College and take such steps as may be necessary to protect the professional rights of the Alumni of said College and their predecessors and shall receive from it and preserve such papers and records as may be necessary for that purpose.

We urge;

(a) That the pre-medical branches be taught by the University as now constituted.

(b) That the College and Hospital be established on the campus of the Ohio State University as soon as possible.

(c) That the Hospital be made a Hospital for the State of Ohio.

Should your Board accept the above proposition, we can guarantee you the undivided support of the Homeopathic profession in Cleveland and in the State of Ohio, and the loyal support of all the living Alumni of this College.

It is understood that the President and Board of Trustees of the University are to have the selection and control of the entire faculty of this department, if established.

> BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF CLEVELAND-PULTE MEDICAL COLLEGE

By C. E. SAWYER R. O. KEISER Special Committee duly authorized herein.

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The President presented the following communication concerning electives in the College of Arts and the College of Education: To the Board of Trustees, Ohio State University.

#### GENTLEMEN:

I submit herewith for your consideration a statement bearing upon a proposed change in the elective privilege of students enrolled in the College of Arts, Philosophy and Science.

This recommendation started in the Faculty of the College of Arts about a year ago, and was subsequently approved by the University Faculty. I withheld my approval at the time for two reasons. First I doubted whether the Faculty realized

the effect of the action, and second, I believed the proposal a considerable departure from existing standards for the A. B. degree. I brought the matter to the attention of the Trustees, and in view of the fact that I regarded a study of the situation as important before further discussion in the Faculty, and in view of the lateness of the season, there seemed no imperative reason why the change should be made at once and the matter was permitted to lie over until the current year.

During the current year, this subject with others was referred to the Committee on Instruction for investigation and report. This Committee gave a hearing—how extensive I do not know—and came in to the University Faculty with a report modifying the recommendation as it came from the Arts Faculty permitting a total of twelve hours instead of twenty hours. After discussion the University Faculty reaffirmed its former position.

I presented the report to the Board of Trustees with a brief statement on the case, and on motion the report was ordered to lie on the table with the understanding that the Trustees would provide a further hearing.

I am again recommending that the report be adopted because the Faculty had twice so recommended. In making this recommendation I desire to call attention to what seems to me the natural consequences of this action and to express the hope that the Trustees or Faculty, or both, make such an adjustment as will give the question a permanent settlement.

> 1. In the first place this action allows 20 hours of elective privilege—5 hours each semester—for the Junior and Senior years in any college of the University—except the College of Law.

This fact makes it possible for any student arranging for such elective privilege to have any 20 hours of work in the five other colleges, counted as a constituent part of the work leading to the A. B. degree. It was stated on the floor of the University Faculty that courses in the College of Engineering were so protected by prerequisite courses that few if any courses in that College would be available for Art students. Nevertheless the action of the University Faculty as a matter of theory admits the courses in all colleges except the College of Law, as proper subjects of study by a candidate for the A. B. degree. This is a wide departure from the older notion that the A. B. degree stood for definitely classical education. I can see no sufficient reason for excepting the College of Law, for it must be agreed that 20 hours of study in that college might be both useful to the student and equally valuable as a discipline. The liberalizing effect of legal study need not be debated.

- 2. The consequence of this action should now be recognized and frankly accepted. The principle is that substantially similar courses should be given the same degree. It is quite possible under this rule for students in the College of Arts and the College of Education to have courses of study quite as similar as the students in the College of Arts. All such should, in my opinion, be given the same degree. On the other hand, there are students in the College of Education taking courses largely technical and scientific for which the science degree is more appropriate. In the future the students in Medicine will be enrolled for two years at least in the College of Arts; some of them for four years. The latter class may well have the A. B. degree; the former class in order to meet the requirements set down by the American Medical Association will be required to put chemistry, physics, histology, bacteriology and perhaps another science into the Freshman and Sophomore years. Upon entering the Medical College their later work will be entirely scientific and professional. The science degree will more appropriately go to all such students, as is now the case in the Rush Medical College, University of Chicago. The College of Arts will therefore be under the necessity of reviving the degree of B. S. Speaking generally there would seem to be no good reason why the science degree should not be revived to cover courses in general science. Modern education at Ohio State has gone too far, in my opinion, in confining the study of students to applied science to the exclusion of more general courses. I know of Alumni of the Ohio State who are especially proud of their B. S. degree although since that time they have proceeded with their education to the doctorate.
- 3. I call attention to the fact that the question of granting degrees is one of university policy and not a college policy. The University grants degrees through the Board of Trustees upon the recommendation of the University Faculty. This

has grown up as a custom, which in my opinion is wise. The Trustees so far as I can learn, have put no limits upon the Faculty. They have rather limited their own action to the recommendation of the Faculty. This too, I regard as wise under all ordinary circumstances. In the case before us I believe that the Trustees and Faculty should fully discuss the situation and reach a conclusion in harmony with the facts.

Writing this at Old Point Comfort with no records before me I speak from memory, and may therefore be in error, but my recollection is that some years ago the University Faculty denied the right of the A. B. degree to the College of Education. I doubt whether it ever had such power, but since there seems no method of appeal from a College Faculty against the action of the University Faculty such a resolution would be practically effective. There must be a last court of appeal, which in the Ohio State University would seem to be the Board of Trustees. It would seem therefore that for exceptional cases where the minority might feel aggrieved, a method of appeal should be provided. I have brought this case before the Board under the rules and have invited a hearing by the Board from Professor Denney and Professor Boyd as representing the colleges most affected.

4. I call attention to the fact that this case unfortunately has appeared to be a controversy between the two colleges. It may be assumed without debate that there is some jealousy between the several colleges on the campus, as there is between the several departments. This condition is pathological rather than educational. It may be ignored for the present. It is not fatal. The real issue, as I see it, is broader than any college question. All of these colleges will be preparing teachers as they have done in the past—else where should we get faculties for our professional schools. Meantime colleges of education the country over will be making an important contribution to the cause of education through their graduates.

The question here is whether for substantially the same courses given in the university the same degree shall be granted, or whether the university policy shall deny to the student a degree that represents the quality and character of his educational training.

I call attention to the fact that we now grant specified degrees, namely: B. S. in Agriculture; B. S. in Horticulture; B. S. in Education and

the College of Engineering, Bachelor of Civil Engineering, Bachelor of Mechanical Engineering, etc. There would be no inconsistency in granting the A. B. degree with similar explanatory phrase as is done at some institutions, for example, B. A. in Classics, B. A. in-,etc., etc. If the rule of the Faculty confining the College of Education to the B.S. degree has been approved by the Board of Trustees, and is now part of an established policy, I suggest that the repeal of this rule, and the consequent change of policy giving to the College the liberty of making its recommendations to the University Faculty upon the merits of the case as determined by the course pursued by the student, would soon end the controversy. If the rule has not been approved by the Trustees and the University Faculty should be unwilling to repeal the rule, then the question is fairly before the Trustees as to the policy that shall be maintained.

The Board of Trustees met, pursuant to call, at the University.

Julius F. Stone, Vice-Chairman, F. E. Pomerene, Present: Guy W. Mallon, O. E. Bradfute and Benj. F. McCann.

In the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Stone, the Vice-Chairman, presided.

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I. Upon the recommendation of the President, the leave of absence granted to Professor F. A. McKenzie, was made to cover the year 1914-1915.

2. Upon the recommendation of the President, a Department of Journalism was created and authority given for the transfer of the necessary courses in Journalism from the Department of English to the Department of Journalism. Mr. Joseph S. Myers was appointed Professor of Journalism, at a salary of \$2,000.00, effective July 1, 1914.

3. Upon the recommendation of the President, the resignation of Albert R. Shadle, Fellow in Zoology and Entomology, was accepted, effective April 1, 1914.

4. Upon the recommendation of the President, W. L. Bauchmiller and Vernon R. Haber were appointed Student Assistants in the Department of Zoology and Entomology, beginning April 1st, at a salary of \$15.00 per month each, said salaries to be paid from the appropriation made for Mr. Shadle.

5. Upon the recommendation of the President, the new course Rural Economics (108)—Rural Community Life, as presented from the College of Agriculture, was approved.

In making the above recommendation, the President made the following statement:

"I desire to emphasize the distinction developed in the discussion between the work appropriately assigned to the Agricultural College and the more fundamental and comprehensive work in the Department of Economics and Sociology. The work in Rural Economics should be based upon the elementary and foundation courses in the Department of Economics and should be restricted to the application of economic and sociological principles to the problem of rural life. From this point of view there need be no serious duplication of work or conflict between the theories upon which the two departments are organized."

6. Upon the recommendation of the President, two types of free scholarships were established in the College of Agriculture, viz:

1. Scholarships good for the Short Courses in Agriculture and Horticulture.

2. Scholarships good for four-year Courses in the College of Agriculture.

# SHORT COURSE SCHOLARSHIPS

1. A scholarship was established good for the three years in the Short Course in Agriculture and Horticulture, one of these scholarships to be assigned to each county in the State this year and one additional scholarship to be assigned to each county next year and the year following, making a total of three scholarships assigned to each county, each scholarship good for three years, one becoming available each year.

2. These scholarships were placed at the disposal of the State Agricultural Commission, to be awarded upon rules and regulations laid down by the Commission, said plans to be approved by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University before becoming effective.

#### FOUR-YEAR COURSE SCHOLARSHIPS

- A free scholarship was established good for four years in any four-year course in the College of Agriculture.
- Five of these scholarships to be assigned to each of the four districts into which the State is divided by the State Superintendent of Education for the purpose of supervising agricultural instruction given in public schools.
- 3. These scholarships shall be awarded according to a plan to be determined upon by the State Superintendent of Education, the State Agricultural Supervisors and the Dean of the College of Agriculture, the plan to be approved by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University before it becomes effective.
- 4. Five additional scholarships to be assigned to each district each year until a total of twenty scholarships is assigned, and thereafter making available five scholarships each year good for four years.

7. The President was authorized to pay to the Debate and Oratory Council, upon the presentation of proper vouchers, the sum of 21.36 being the deficit on the annual debate.

8. Upon the recommendation of the President, Dr. W. J. Means was appointed Dean of the College of Medicine and Dr. H. M. Semans was appointed Dean of the College of Dentistry.

The President was authorized to appoint the Executive Committee for the Colleges of Medicine and of Dentistry for next year.

9. Upon the recommendation of the President, Miss Edna N. White was authorized to visit Columbia University, at the expense of the University, for the purpose of investigating the qualifications of teachers.

10. Upon the recommendation of the President, Professor A. G McCall was authorized to visit, at the expense of the University, the University of Wisconsin and the University of Illinois for some investigations in the organization of the Soils Department and the selection of teachers.

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On motion of Mr. Pomerene, Mr. Stone and Mr. Sears were appointed a committee from the Board of Trustees, to serve with the President in the preparation of the Budget for the coming year.

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Mr. Pomerene presented the resolutions adopted March 28, 1914, at the conference of alumni and ex-students of The Ohio State University, and on motion of Judge McCann, said resolutions were ordered placed in the record.

We, the alumni and ex-students of the Ohio State University, in conference assembled, appreciating to its fullest extent the great and many advantages we have obtained from our work as students of the University, and believing, as we do, that the University will give like aid to thousands of young men and women of the great State of Ohio, who in turn will render the State and the world the more effective service; and,

Whereas, we would help the University, so far as we may, the better to perform its work for the State and its people:

#### Now, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

First—that while the University is far from being equipped and possessed of the necessary buildings and physical needs, it is especially imperative that sufficient income be secured to provide adequate salaries and a sufficient teaching force, otherwise the University will continue to remain a training school for other institutions and our students and especially those in the lower classes will receive inadequate instruction. If a choice must be made between buildings and a proper compensation for the teaching force to maintain a body of high class men, we unqualifiedly choose the latter:

Second—that we believe that the people of the State should be thoroughly informed of what the University is doing, what the probable financial demand will be and what funds it has now available, with a clear-cut statement of what work the University desires to do and what money it will require to do it well. We believe that particular attention should be given to get this information to the ex-students and graduates of this University.

Third—that when the various agricultural enterprises of the State were consolidated under the State Agricultural Commission for purposes of co-ordination, co-operation and the correction of duplication of work, the challenge was made that it was for the purpose of greater efficiency in agricultural interests and greater economy in the expenditure of public funds. To our surprise, the first act under this organization was to divide the appropriations heretofore made for agricultural extension with the result that less than half has been left to the College of Agriculture and the remainder has gone to the Agricultural Commission, thus containing the duplication that the legislation sought to prevent. This may be legal, but is not in accord with the purpose of the act or of Justice to the Agricultural College. We believe that the College of Agriculture should be in charge of all agricultural education in Ohio.

Fourth—that we earnestly recommend the establishment and maintenance of a department of music in the University.

Fifth—that with the amalgamation of Startling-Ohio Medical University with The Ohio State University, the alumni of the former institution, The Startling-Ohio Medical University, become eligible to membership in The Ohio State University Association. Therefore, the Secretary of The Ohio State University Association is instructed to extend an enthusiastic invitation to them to join this Association.

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Sixth—that we believe the various college publications should be so edited as to cover the student activities and student life, leaving the field representing the larger University to be expressed by the Alumui through their monthly publication. We do not advocate a censorship, but do urge an intelligent direction of the several publications so that they may keep well within their respective fields.

Seventh—that we recommend to the President and Trustees that a survey be made of the courses now being given at the University to the end that a betterment of the service may be had and the strengthening of the more essential elements may be obtained.

Eighth—that all the work planned by the conference for Alumni shall be prosecuted under the direction of The Ohio State University Association.

Ninth—that in the evolution of universities out of the land Grant Act of 1862, invariably the policy has been to give the name to the institution as the University of the state in which it is located. In accordance with this universally adopted custom, we sensitively feel that the name of this institution should be changed to "The University of Ohio." For the earnest and unflinching effort of Senator Erastus G. Lloyd to accomplish this change we desire to express the appreciation of this Association. Believing in the justice of this cause we pledge our united support to future efforts to effect this result.

Tenth—that inasmuch as The Ohio State University does not receive proper standing in all educational associations, we recommend that the executive officers of the Association should find out why such recognition is not given and take all proper steps to rectify a condition that savors of injustice.

Eleventh—that as a means of acquainting the public in reference to the needs of the University and its service to the State, a committee be appointed from this Association to cooperate with the organized agencies of publicity.

Twelfth---that we appreciate the kindly sentiments frequently expressed by Governor James M. Cox, concerning the good work of The Ohio State University. We promise him our loyal and earnest support in furthering his efforts to advance the interest and usefulness of this institution.

Thirteenth--that during the fifteen years of President Thompson's administration the University has experienced an unprecedented growth. We believe this is due in large measure to the active and able work of President Thompson. He has carried the University from the campus to all the people of the State. His life has been an inspiration to the thousands of young men and women who have been students of the University, and we congratulate the Association and the University upon the continuance of his labors, and particularly do we congratulate the people of Ohio upon having so conscientious, able and devoted a leader in educational affairs.

We respectfully recommend the adoption of the foregoing resolutions.

2. Upon the recommendation of the President, Mr. Frank C. Howell was appointed Accountant in the Secretary's office, at a salary of \$100.00 per month, effective March 15, 1914.

Pursuant to the recent action of the Board, upon the 3. recommendation of the Graduate Council, the President recommended the following candidates for fellowships at \$500.00 each.

The recommendation was approved and the fellowships granted to the following persons:

Isaac W. Geiger, B. A., Ohio State University 1913; M. A., Ohio State University, 1914. Mr. Geiger is at present a graduate assistant in Chemistry.

4. Upon the recommendation of the University Faculty and the President, the degree of Bachelor of Arts, as of the Class of 1914, was granted to Rajendra Narayan Chowdhury, of Bengal, India.

5. The President was authorized to appoint a representative from the Ohio State University to attend the seventy-fifth Anniversary of the Founding of the University of Missouri, June 3, 1914.

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6. The President presented a communication from Walter L. Tobey, Trustee of Miami University, signed as Chairman of a committee appointed to take up the matter of a conference between Ohio University, Miami University and the Ohio State University, asking that the Board of Trustees of the Ohio State University appoint a committee of five to meet with like committees from Ohio University and Miami University.

On motion of Mr. Pomerene, the Chairman was directed to appoint such a committee.

The Chair appointed the President, Professor Wm. Mc Pherson, Dean of the Graduate School, and Messrs. Pomerene, Mallon and Stone from the Board of Trustees.

7. The requirements for admission to the College of Law, upon the recommendation of the President, were changed to read as follows:

- I Graduates of approved universities or colleges, and students who, in addition to their entrance requirements. have completed a course of study equivalent to that required in the first two years of the course leading to a degree in the College of Arts, Philosophy and Science of the Ohio State University, are admitted to the College of Law as candidates for the degree of LL. B.
- 2 Candidates for a certificate must meet the same requirements as candidates for a degree, except that work equivalent to one instead of two years in the College of Arts, Philosophy and Science is required. No deficiency will be allowed. The above requirements to be effective on and after the opening of the college year in September 1915.

8. The President presented the plans for the awarding of the Free Scholarships established by the Board of Trustees at its meeting of April 3, 1914, and recommended the approval of the same:

On motion of Mr. Mallon said plans were approved.

## FOUR-YEAR COURSE SCHOLARSHIP

- I A uniform competitive examination for these scholarships will be held in each first and second grade high school in the State on the second Friday of April each year.
- 2 These examinations will be conducted under the management of the Supervisor of Agricultural Education in each district.
- 3 The questions for these examinations shall be prepared by the Supervisors of Agricultural Education and approved by the Dean of the College of Agriculture.
- 4 The examinations shall be open to pupils of the senior, or last year classes in the first and second grade high schools.

- 5 The examination shall be conducted in these high schools under the direction of the principal of the high school; the questions shall be upon the subject of high school agriculture; the questions will be sent under seal to the principal of the high school, and shall be opened in the presence of the contestants on the morning of the examination; the manuscripts shall be written under the usual rules for conducting examinations, and under the special rules sent out by the Department of Public Instruction; at the close of the examination the manuscript shall be enclosed, sealed and sent to the Supervisor of Agricultural Education of the district in which the examination is held.
- 6 The manuscripts shall be graded under the immediate direction of the Supervisors of Agricultural Education and the results of this examination shall be sent to the high schools, to the students competing in them, and to the Dean of the College of Agriculture, who will make the awards of the scholarship.

#### SHORT COURSE SCHOLARSHIPS

- 1 The scholarships shall be used as a reward for contestants in the junior contest conducted by the Commission and shall be awarded to the contestants who stand first in each county in the contest in which there are the largest number entered.
- 2 The scholarship shall be awarded to the highest ranking contestant in each county not less than seventeen years of age.
- 3 A scholarship shall be awarded to the successful contestant in each county signed by the President and Secretary of the Agricultural Commission.

9. The President reported the gift of a barometer to the Department of Ceramic Engineering by Mr.W.D. Richardson of Shawnee, Ohio, whereupon the President was directed to make suitable acknowledgment of this gift.

10. Upon the recommendation of the President, the following leaves of absence were granted;

Miss Olive Jones, Librarian, was granted leave of absence on account of ill health, until complete recovery.

Professor A. G. McCall of the Department of Agronomy, was granted leave of absence for the year 1914–1915.

Assistant Professor C. J. West, Department of Mathematics, was granted leave of absence as provided in the Budget, upon the condition that he return to the University for two years of service.

Mr. Ralph B. Wilson, Assistant in the Department of Economics and Sociology, was granted leave of absence for the year 1914–1915, without salary.

11. Upon the recommendation of the President, the following appointments were made, effective July 1, 1914:

Mr. John S. Ankeney of the University of Missouri, was elected Professor of Art, in charge of the Department, at a salary of \$2,750.00.

Mr. Walter C. O'Kane was elected Professor of Zoology and Entomology, at a salary of \$2,500.00, as provided in the Budget.

Mr. Horace B. Drury was elected Instructor in the Department of Economics and Sociology, at a salary of \$1,200.00, as provided in the Budget.

Mr. H. W. Nordmeyer was elected Instructor in the Department of German, at a salary of \$1,000.00, as provided in the Budget.

Mr. J. W. Shipley was elected Assistant Professor of Chemistry, as provided in the Budget.

The Board is pleased to learn that the collection is particularly rich in early American travel during the eighteenth century, in American antiquities and in historical material, and is gratified to know that this unusual collection of books has already brought much favorable comment from those directly interested in history, biography and the drama. "The Board authorizes the use of the Prosper M. Wetmore book plate with the addition of a statement recognising the gift, and directs that the gift be known as the Prosper M. Wetmore Collection."

On motion the above resolution was adopted, and the Secretary was directed to send a copy to the family and to Mr. Albery.

The selection of the hospital Staffs was referred to the President, Mr. Stone and Dean W. J. Means with power to act.

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Mr. Mallon made a preliminary report for the committee on the blanket tax petitions presented by the student body.

In view of the fact that all of the publications of the University are now out, it was agreed to postpone for the present further consideration of the petitions.

On motion of Mr. Mallon, the President was directed to request Dr. Hinsdale of the University of Michigan to assist in the organization of the College of Homeopathic Medicine, in accordance with the resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees at the meeting of May 26, 1914, relative to the organization of a College of Homeopathic Medicine. On this motion Mr. Mallon and Mr. Stone voted in the affirmative and Mr. Pomerene in the negative.

The Chairman declared the motion passed.

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Mr. Mallon presented the following resolution which was adopted:

"Resolved, That the interest on the endowment fund and all other income of the University for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1915, not otherwise appropriated, be and the same are hereby appropriated for its support and maintenance."

The Board of Trustees met at the call of the Chairman at Sandusky to attend the funeral of the Honorable John T. Mack.

Present: Julius F. Stone, Chairman; F. E. Pomerene, O. E. Bradfute and Benj. F. McCann.

Mr. Pomerene offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted:

"RESOLVED, That the Trustees of The Ohio State University being advised of the death of their colleague, the Honorable John T. Mack, and being called to meet in Sandusky in order to attend the funeral services, unite in an expression of profound sympathy with the family and adopt the following minute:

"Mr. Mack came into the service of the University as a Trustee in 1893 as successor to the late Rutherford B. Hayes and served continuously until his death at his home in Sandusky July 8th, 1914. His service was marked by faithful attendance at meetings of the Trustees, fidelity to all the interests of the State and the University, a high conception of his office and its duties, an abiding interest in the students, a clear vision of the place of the University in the educational system of the State and an active co-operation with his colleagues in promoting the progress of the University. His genial companionship, his sincere and genuine friendship, his unflinching integrity, and his high personal character united to make an efficient Trustee and a worthy successor to the distinguished citizen who, like Mr. Mack, gave without stint his time and talent to the service of the University and the State. The sense of loss in his death is accompanied by a grateful appreciation of twenty-one years of service." After the funeral the Board transacted the following urgent business:

Upon the recommendation of the President, the following arrangement for clinical facilities with the Protestant Hospital was agreed to:

For the purpose of increasing the clinical facilities in the Protestant Hospital and to make more definite the teaching service, it is expedient that the College should have under its control all the beds in the wards on the third floor of the hospital and the obstetrical ward on the fourth floor. These wards include the Men's Surgical Ward, 11 beds; Men's Medical Ward, 11 beds; Children's Ward (No. 80). 5 beds; Women's Ward (No. 81), 5 beds; Colored Ward (No. 93), 4 beds; Women's Wards (Nos. 94 and 95). 5 beds each; making a total of 46 beds. The maximum capacity of these wards is about 50 beds. Five patients may be cared for in the Obstetrical Ward on the fourth floor.

It is recommended that in consideration of the full control of the above mentioned wards, the University shall pay the Protestant Hospital Association \$450.00 per month, beginning with September, 1914, and continuing for one year, with the understanding and provision that the Protestant Hospital shall continue the care and maintenance of the patients occupying the beds in these wards and shall give satisfactory service in the clinics held in the clinical amphitheater.

It is also understood that the Protestant Hospital Association shall receive all the money paid by the patients for their service in these wards.

This recommendation carries with it the understanding that in the event the remuneration (\$450.00 per month) is found to be insufficient, a readjustment shall be made and such additional amount shall be given as may be mutually agreed upon.

Upon the recommendation of the President, the following regulation concerning the service on the staffs of Protestant and St. Francis Hospitals was adopted, and the Secretary was directed to send a copy of this regulation to each person on the staff:

It is expressly understood that service on the staffs of the Protestant and St. Francis Hospitals shall be entirely for teaching purposes and that no member of the staffs shall in any way charge or collect a fee from a patient in his service unless such patient is able and does pay the hospital a minimum charge of \$8.00 a week for board and nursing, and, if surgical, \$10.00 for operating expenses. After said charges are paid, the physician or surgeon may ask remuneration for his attention.

It is further understood that a surgeon on the staff may treat and operate patients who are referred to him other than those in his own service who pay the above charges and are used for clinical teaching.

These rules refer to the clinical beds under the control of the college alone and in no way interfere with private patients who are housed in private rooms.

Upon the recommendation of the President, the following readjustment was made in the Department of Physics:

Dr. Edwin W. Martindale was appointed Instructor in Anesthetics and Analgesia in the College of Dentistry, at a salary of \$200.00.

The title of Dr. Hugh J. Means, in the College of Dentistry, was corrected to read Instructor in Roentgenology.

Dr. John B. Alcorn was appointed Instructor in Laryngology at the State Street Dispensary.

The following schedule of prices for X-Ray work was authorized:

That Dr. Bowen at St. Francis Hospital and Dr. Hugh Means at the Protestant Hospital be allowed for X-Ray exposures on patients used for teaching purposes the following rates:

H. Conklin Company, contractors for the Heating, Ventilating, Plumbing and Gas Fitting, in the amount of \$1,475.20.

COLUMBUS, OHIO, OCTOBER 9, 1914.

The Board of Trustees met at the Neil House pursuant to the call of the Chairman.

Present: Julius F. Stone, Chairman; Walter J. Sears, Guy W. Mallon, F. E. Pomerene and O. E. Bradfute.

Professor W. H. Siebert and the University Architect presented to the Board sketches for a memorial gateway to be erected at the Fifteenth Avenue entrance, and requested that the Board approve the plans and grant the alumni permission to erect said gateway.

On motion of Mr. Sears, the sketches as presented were approved, and the alumni were authorized to erect said gateway, with the understanding that the entire cost is to be borne by the alumni.

L. F. Sater, President of the Ohio State University Association, appeared before the Board and presented a request that the alumni committee on budget and University affairs be permitted to meet with the Board of Trustees and the Deans in discussion of the future policies of the University. It was agreed to hold such joint meeting on the campus November 5, 6 and 7, the President of the Association to select such alumni as he may see fit.

Upon the request of Mr. Sater and on motion of Mr. Sears, the Secretary was authorized to pay the railroad expenses of such speakers as may be selected to go out to speak on behalf of the University on Ohio State Day, November 27, 1914.

The President presented a communication from the Secretary of the State Board of Health, calling attention to

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the fact that the City of Columbus was about to build an isolation hospital and suggested that it would be a very valuable asset to the Medical Department of the University to have said isolation hospital erected on the University grounds.

The Trustees did not feel that they had the legal right to enter into such an agreement with the city, and the Secretary was directed to so advise the State Board of Health.

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President Thompson, Dean Price and Dean Orton were directed to represent the University at the annual meeting of the Association of American Agricultural Colleges and Experiment Stations at Washington, D. C. The President was also directed to represent the University at the annual meeting of the National Association of State Universities.

3. 5. Upon the recommendation of the President, Carl R. Mc-Crosky and Charles R. Parkinson, Graduate Assistants in the Department of Chemistry, were promoted to Assistants, at a salary of \$700.00 each, effective for the second semester.

6. Owing to the resignation of F. C. Kaden, the President recommended the following readjustment in the Department of Agronomy, which recommendation was agreed to:

Joseph P. Hershberger to be put on full time for five months, February to June inclusive, at a salary of \$75.00 per month. M. F. Abel to be advanced to a salary of \$70.00 per month for five months, February to June inclusive.

\$100.00 to be assigned for student assistants.

\$250.00 to be set aside for the payment of a field man to begin about March 15, 1915.

7. The President submitted the list of scholarships awarded under the rules for the Three Year Course in Agriculture, and the same were ordered filed.

Upon the recommendation of the President, Miss Mary Utterbach, Dellroy, Carroll County, was given the option of using her scholarship in the Three Year Course in Agriculture or for the two years in the course in Home Economics.

The President referred to a communication from Dean Price, under date of January 19, 1915, regarding a question of ruling; first, whether the scholarships for the Three Year Course might be transferred to the Four Year Courses; second, whether the use of the scholarships might be postponed until the winners had completed their high school courses.

To the first question the President recommended a negative reply, for the reason that the Board offers these scholarships for the purpose of encouraging students in the Three Year Course only. This recommendation was agreed to.

To the second question the President recommended an affirmative reply, which recommendation was agreed to.

8. Upon the recommendation of the President, a renewal of the lease of the William Neil King land, for a period of three years from November 1, 1914, at an annual rental of \$600.00, was authorized.

9. Upon the recommendation of the President, a clerical error in the title of W. H. Palmer was ordered corrected to read Assistant Professor of Animal Husbandry in Agricultural Extension.

10. Upon the recommendation of the President, the following persons were granted the degree of Master of Arts as of the Class of 1914, as recommended by the University Faculty January 6, 1915:

11. The President recommended that, in the case of Mr. Yoshihisa Kawaguchi who desires to take a single course in law, no fee be charged.

On motion of Mr. Pomerene, the President was directed to extend the courtesies of the University to Mr. Kawaguchi who has already taken a Master's degree from this University.

12. Upon the recommendation of the President, it was ordered that a refund of fees be made to teachers coming under the rule who had paid the regular incidental fee for the first semester 1914-1915 previous to the action of the Board of Trustees on October 9, 1914, whereby teachers in active service may take one course only upon the payment of a fee of five dollars.

13. Upon the recommendation of the President, Dr. H. M. Semans, Acting Dean of the College of Dentistry, was authorized to attend the meeting of the American Dental Faculties Association to be held in Philadelphia, February 23-24, 1915.

The President reported that under a recent ruling of the Attorney General to the Budget Commissioner the receipts from Oxley Hall are not to be deposited hereafter in the State Treasury but are to be kept by the Trustees and disbursed by the Trustees as a University fund.

Upon motion, the President and Secretary were directed to advise further with the Attorney General as to the income from endowments. The President and Secretary were also directed to interview the State Treasurer on the matter of becoming the Treasurer of the University.

Upon motion of Mr. Pomerene, Mr. Stone was elected Acting Treasurer of the University.

The President reported that the University laundry equipment had been transferred from Oxley Hall to the basement of the new service building, and that Mrs. Myrtle Faught, formerly operator of the laundry at Oxley Hall, had been transferred to the University laundry, at a salary of \$40.00 per month, effective February 1, 1915.

The above transfer was approved and \$20.00 was appropriated for the salary of Mrs. Faught.

The President recommended that in the matter of fees the same rule be adopted in the College of Medicine and College of Dentistry as obtains in the College of Law, namely: that students who desire to extend the work over a greater period than the usual time for the course, shall pay the fees in the regular order until the full amount for the entire course has been paid, after which time further registration shall be free of charge.

On motion, this recommendation was agreed to.

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Upon the recommendation of the President, the University Architect was directed to prepare plans, sketches and estimate for the proposed improvement desired by the Browning Dramatic Society, said plans to be presented to the Board of Trustees for approval, with the understanding that this action does not commit the Trustees to their final adoption.

Upon the recommendation of the President, the Browning Dramatic Society was relieved from the payment of the bill of \$144.49 for services rendered by University workmen in connection with the play given by said Society last Spring.

The President reported that the Budget Commissioner had authorized the transfer of the following amounts from Maintenance, Classification E-8 (Educational and Recreational Equipment) as follows:

The President was directed to take proper steps to provide for the recognition of the alumni of the Colleges of Medicine and Dentistry.

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The President called the attention of the Board of Trustees to the fact that certain persons in the University were about to use influence with the legislature in regard to the needs of their respective departments.

Whereupon Mr. Mallon offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted:

"Resolved, That the Trustees direct the President of the University to advise all interested parties of the policy heretofore adopted, that the presentation of the needs of the University, of all of its departments, shall be made by and through the President alone; and, further, that the Board of Trustees views with distinct displeasure any and all attempts of those connected with the University to advance the interests of their respective departments."

The President presented bills for horses purchased by the Rural Economics Department, which purchases had not been made in accordance with the rule of the Board of Trustees.

After some discussion it was agreed to pay said bills, and on motion of Mr. Pomerene, the Secretary was directed to advise the parties interested that a repeated infraction of the rule will not be countenanced by the Board of Trustees.

The President reported for record and confirmation that the fee in the College of Homeopathic Medicine had been fixed at \$125.00 for the year 1914-1915.

The President presented a request from the University Architect covering extras on the contract for the Plumbing in the Horticulture and Forestry Building, in favor of The Huffman-Conklin Company, in the amount of \$258.30.

On motion, said extras were approved, and the Secretary was directed to file an approved copy with the Auditor of State.

The President presented the report of the University Architect stating that the Huffman-Conklin Company had completed the contract for the Heating, Ventilating, Plumbing, Gas-Fitting and Sewer in accordance with the plans and specifications, and recommended the acceptance of the work and payment of the final estimate in the amount of \$1,462.20.

On motion, the recommendation of the University Architect was agreed to and the Secretary was authorized to pay said final estimate.

The Board of Trustees met at the University pursuant to the call of the Chairman.

Present: Julius F. Stone, Chairman; Benj. F. Mc-Cann, F. E. Pomerene, Guy W. Mallon, O. E. Bradfute, John F. Cunningham and John Kaiser of Marietta, appointed by Governor Willis on February 25, 1915, to be a Trustee of The Ohio State University, for the term ending May 12, 1915, vice William F. Burdell, who declined appointment.

Dr. H. S. Pritchett, President of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, was present by request of President Thompson for a conference with the Board of Trustees concerning the establishment and policies of the Colleges of Medicine.

1. Upon the recommendation of the President, the resignation of Miss Josephine Richardson, Assistant in the Department of Home Economics, was accepted, effective February 4, 1915.

2. Upon the recommendation of the President, the following appointments were made:

Mrs. Marian L. Garvin was appointed Assistant in the Department of Home Economics, vice Miss Richardson, resigned, effective February 9, 1915; salary to be \$75.00 per month for February and March and \$160.00 per month beginning April 1, 1915, for full time service.

Wallace E. Hanger was appointed Assistant Professor of Agronomy in the Agricultural Extension Department, at a salary of \$1,800.00 per year, effective March 1, 1915.

Lloyd E. Thatcher was appointed Assistant in the Department of Agronomy, at a salary of \$80.00 per month, effective March 1, 1915, and \$70.00 was appropriated to meet this salary, in addition to the \$250.00 set aside for a field man in this Department.

In order that the senior students may know what to expect in hospital service for next year, the following internes were appointed at a salary of \$100.00 each:

W. L. Dubois was appointed temporary Instructor in Forestry for January and February, 1915, at a salary of \$50.00 per month.

3. Upon the recommendation of the President, Miss Nellie Eagle Wood was granted the degree of Bachelor of Arts, as of the Class of 1914, as recommended by the University Faculty.

4. Upon the recommendation of the President, leave of absence was granted to Dr. Philip D. Wilson, from March 7th until early in August, in order that he may go with the Harvard Medical Expedition to the American Ambulance Hospital in Paris.

5. Upon the recommendation of the President, Charles F. Kelley was authorized to attend the meeting of the College Art Association in Buffalo, April 2-3, 1915, and to make a trip of investigation at the same time to New York and Boston, expenses to be paid by the University. 6. Upon the recommendation of the President, Captain George L. Converse was authorized to make a trip of inspection in military matters to the Universities of Wisconsin and Illinois, expenses to be paid by the University.

7. In view of the fact that changes in courses have made the fees impracticable, the fee of \$7.50 for students electing limited work and the fee of \$22.50 for students electing more than five hours in the College of Law were abolished, as recommended by the President.

8. Upon the recommendation of the President, the following report, adopted by the Faculty of the College of Agriculture, was approved and adopted:

"That the College of Agriculture establish correspondence courses in agricultural and home economics subjects.

That a lesson consist of approximately 20 standard typewritten pages and each lesson be accompanied by 5, 10 or 20 questions, which can be answered from the text of the lesson.

That the lessons be prepared by such members of the Faculty of the College of Agriculture as may be selected by the Head of the Department concerned and by the Supervisor of Correspondence Courses.

That all routine in connection with the correspondence courses and including the correction of answers to the examination questions be done by the Extension Department.

That the following correspondence courses be prepared by September 1, 1915, or as soon thereafter as possible, and that other courses be added from time to time:

Animal Husbandry Bees Dairy Farming Dairy Accounts Farm Crops Farm Engineering Farm Forestry Home Economics Maintenance of Soil Fertility Orchard Fruits Vegetable Growing"

The following plan of procedure, having been under consideration for some time by the several parties interested, was adopted, the same being submitted with the recommendation of Dean Price and the approval of the President for adoption by the Board of Trustees:

(a) That the Director of Agricultural Extension Service and the State Leader of County Agents be authorized to prepare an available list of persons for the position of County Agent in Ohio.

(b) That when a vacancy or a new appointment is to be made three names shall be taken from the available list and submitted to the Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station and the local authorities in the county in which the position is to be filled.

(c) When agreement has been reached in regard to the person who shall be recommended for the position, the same shall be recommended to the President and appointed in the regular manner by the Board of Trustees of the University.

10. Upon the recommendation of the President, a Committee consisting of the President, the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, the State Leader of County Agents, and the Dean of the College of Agriculture, was appointed to formulate the rules and regulations for the administration of the county agent work.

11. The President reported as a matter for record and approval the bond of Julius F. Stone as Treasurer of The Ohio State University, said bond being furnished by the Bancroft Company, in the amount of \$25,000.00, and recommended the payment of the premium of \$53.13. Said bond was approved and the Secretary was authorized to pay the premium as above.

The Secretary reported that the lease with option of purchase on the Hess land would expire March 31, 1915. Whereupon the Secretary was directed to request an extension of time on said lease with option until such time as the monies appropriated by the legislature would be available.

We are convinced from that report that it is advisable for the University to accept Mr. Hickerson's proposition of \$250.00 for whatever interest the University may have in the property, and we therefore recommend the acceptance of the proposition. We further recommend that upon payment of said sum by Mr. Hickerson, the proper officers of the Board of Trustees of the University be authorized to execute and deliver to Mr. Hickerson a quit claim deed for the premises. We also recommend the allowance and payment of Mr. Van Meter's bill of \$39.00, being his fee (\$30.00) for services and \$9.00 for expenses incurred. Respectfully submitted,

On motion, the recommendation of the committee was agreed to and the Chairman and the Secretary of the Board were directed to execute proper deed to Mr. Hickerson.

The Secretary was also directed to pay to Mr. John I. Van Meter \$39.00 as expenses for investigating the land in question.

President Thompson reported that under the new budget system adopted by the State, it would be necessary for the Trustees to adopt a budget for the four and one-half months from February 16 to June 30, 1915, in accordance with the appropriation bill now pending in the legislature for that period.

The President reported further that the appropriation bill does not carry "receipts and balances;" therefore all balances (unencumbered by outstanding obligations) as of February 15, 1915, must be canceled. Upon the recommendation of the President, all balances on the appropriation ledger at the close of business February 15, 1915, were canceled, and appropriations were made for all overdrafts, as shown on the statement of account for February 15, 1915.

3. The President transmitted the following report for Farmers' Week, February 1-5, 1915:

"Fourteen hundred and forty-five men and women registered. These persons represented eighty-seven of the eighty-eight counties in Ohio and nine other states. The average age was thirty-nine years, and seventy-nine per cent of the men live on farms. This is an increase of 88 per cent over the attendance of last year.

The success of this meeting may be attributed to the effective co-operation of a variety of interests, including railway companies, agricultural and daily papers, bankers, grain dealers, the Faculty of the College of Agriculture, granges and others."

4. Upon the recommendation of the President, the following delegates were appointed:

Professor B. L. Bowen was appointed delegate to represent The Ohio State University at the inauguration of President Frank J. Goodnow of Johns Hopkins University, May 20-21, 1915, his expenses to be paid by the University.

Professor Joseph S. Myers was appointed delegate from The Ohio State University to the International Press Congress to be held at San Francisco, July 5-10, 1915, without expense to the University.

President Thompson was authorized to attend the celebration of the One Hundredth Anniversary of the Founding of Allegheny College, to be held at Meadville, Pennsylvania, June 20-24, 1915, his expenses to be paid by the University.

5. Upon the recommendation of the President, the following rules and regulations concerning the salaries and expenses of County Agents were adopted:

(1) Each County Agent will be required to provide himself with an automobile and to defray all expenses connected with the maintenance of the same.

(2) Thirty dollars (\$30.00) per month will be added to the salary of each Agent to cover depreciation and maintenance of the same.

(3) In order to assist the Agents in purchasing their automobiles, the first year's increase in salary, -\$360.00 – will be paid in a lump sum and the Agent required to sign a contract to repay to the University, in case he leaves the service before the year expires, the amount of salary that has been advanced to him at the date of his resignation.

(4) No expense account for transportation within the county will be allowed.

6. In view of the proposal to remove the fountain erected by the family of the late Dr. Samuel S. Smith, at the south-east corner of Broad and High streets, and in view of the fact that the Trustees of the Starling Medical College have passed a resolution authorizing the erection of this monument at a suitable place in front of the Starling Medical College, therefore,

Be it resolved, By the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University that their consent is hereby given to this proposal, and, second,

Be it resolved, That a copy of this resolution be filed with the City Council and the Trustees of the Starling Medical College."

7. Upon the recommendation of the President, the resignation of Professor Samuel Carson Duncan of the Department of English, was accepted, effective June 30, 1915.

8. The President presented the plans, specifications and estimates for the following improvements, and upon his recommendation the same were approved. Lee M. Roderick, Graduate Assistant in the Department of Bacteriology, effective April 15, 1915.

Miss Alice McMillan, Stenographer in the Department of Agricultural Extension, effective June 1, 1915.

2. Upon the recommendation of the President, the following appointments were made:

Professor Edgar Nelson Transcau, Ph. D. (Michigan) of the Eastern Illinois State Normal School, Charleston, Illinois, was ap-

pointed Professor of Botany, in charge of plant physiology and ecology, at a salary of \$2,500.00 per year, effective July 1, 1915.

Samuel J. Schilling was appointed Student Assistant in the Department of Bacteriology, vice L. M. Roderick, at a salary of \$30.00 per month, effective April 15, 1915.

Miss Hazel Ault was appointed Student Nurse at the Homeopathic Hospital, effective March 26, 1915, compensation on the basis of \$50.00 per year for the first year, payable monthly, and \$13.33 was appropriated to meet this salary.

Miss Katherine Foster was appointed Assistant Cataloguer in University Library, at a salary of \$70.00 per month, effective May 1, 1915, and \$140.00 was appropriated to cover this salary.

3. Upon the recommendation of the President, the time of service of W. L. Dubois, temporary Instructor in Forestry, was extended until June 30, 1915, at a salary of \$50.00 per month, and \$225.00 was appropriated to cover this salary from February 15 to June 30, 1915.

4. Upon the recommendation of the President, Professor Edward Orton, Jr., Dean of the College of Engineering, was given leave of absence, at his own request without salary, for the year 1915-1916, effective July 1, 1915.

5. Upon the recommendation of the President, Professor Edwin F. Coddington was appointed Acting Dean of the College of Engineering for the year 1915-1916, effective July 1, 1915.

On motion, the above course was approved in accordance with the recommendation of the President.

8. Upon the recommendation of the President, it was ordered that \$100.00 be paid to Professor George F. Arps as an honorarium for services rendered during the year at Circleville for courses in psychology.

9. Upon the recommendation of the President, \$50.00 was added to the remuneration of Miss Vera McCoy, Assistant in the Department of Bacteriology, for the current year, and \$50.00 was appropriated to meet this additional salary.

10. Upon the recommendation of the President, the following persons were authorized to accompany the annual inspection trips in the Departments of Mechanical and Electrical Engineering, leaving Columbus April 25th and returning May 1, 1915, their expenses to be paid by the University:

11. Upon the recommendation of the President, the following appropriations were made:

12. The President reported that the Budget Commissioner had authorized the transfer of 500.00 from Maintenance, Classification F-9 (General Plant Service) to Classification F-6 (Transportation), and the same was approved.

13. Upon the recommendation of the President, payment was authorized of the deficit of \$5.16 in connection with the annual Varsity Debate held March 12, 1915.

14. Upon the recommendation of the President, the Board authorized and approved the renting of the house at 1630 Neil Avenue, to be used as a home for nurses at the Homeopathic Hospital, at \$45.00 per month, the University to keep up the inside repairs. The renting of the furniture for the house at \$20.00 per month was authorized.

15. Upon the recommendation of the President, Mrs. Georgia Johnson was appointed cook, at \$10.00 per week, and Grace Patterson was appointed housemaid, at \$20.00 per month, for the nurses' home, effective April 24, 1915.

16. The President recommended that in accordance with State policy, the insurance on the buildings of the College of Medicine be discontinued. This recommendation was approved.

17. In view of the ruling of the Attorney General concerning the payment of County Agents' salaries in advance, the President recommended that the previous action of the Board be rescinded and that an increase of salaries for County Agents be authorized in the amount of \$30.00 per month, and that where agents are required to purchase new automobiles a further increase be authorized to cover the matter of interest.

On motion, said recommendation was agreed to and the increase as above was authorized.

18. In accordance with the recommendation of the President, Professor J. V. Denney, Dean of the College of Arts, Philosophy and Science, was authorized to attend the Conference of Deans of Arts Colleges belonging to state universities, to be held at Bloomington, Indiana, May 6 and 7, 1915, his expenses to be paid by the University.

19. Upon the recommendation of the President, it was ordered that the fees of professional nurses serving the Columbus Association for the Prevention and Cure of Tuberculosis, be remitted, in recognition of a public service rendered and supported by philanthropy.

20. At the request of Professor S. C. Derby, founder of the Derby Scholarship, and upon the recommendation of the President, an amendment was made to the conditions governing said Derby Scholarship by substituting for Section 3 the following:

"With the unanimous consent of said committee, every third incumbent may study at another educational institution which that committee fully approves."

21. Upon the recommendation of the President, the following new rule under Section 41 of the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Trustees was adopted:

"Sec. 41-a — In such of the colleges as the Board of Trustees may specify from time to time, there shall be appointed by the Board, on nomination of the President, an Assistant to the Dean who shall be Secretary of the College and whose duty it shall also be to assist the Dean and to act in his absence."

22. Upon the recommendation of the President, the following amendment was made to Section 67 of the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Trustees:

"Sec. 67-a — The loss, damage or destruction of books, periodicals or other library publications, except from ordinary wear and tear, shall be made good by the person responsible, and the Library Council is hereby authorized to administer and enforce this regulation."

23. Upon the recommendation of the President, Assistant Professor C. C. Morris of the Department of Mathematics was made Assistant to the Dean of the College of Engineering, with the rank of Professor, at a salary of \$2,000.00 per year, effective July 1, 1915.

24. Upon the recommendation of the President, the appointment of a clerk for the Homeopathic Hospital was authorized, at a salary of \$55.00 per month for the remainder of the year, chargeable against money available for salaries.

25. Upon the recommendation of the President, the following expenditures were authorized, payable from the unappropriated balance for Maintenance, and the several amounts were appropriated for the items named:

The President called the attention of the Trustees to the proposed agreement with the Board of Education of the City of Columbus for the erection of a high-school building by the City upon the University campus, and requested that definite action be taken upon this agreement.

On motion of Mr. Mallon, a committee consisting of the Chairman of the Board, the President and the Dean of the College of Education, was appointed to take up with the Board of Education the details of said agreement and report back to the Board at its next meeting.

The President presented a request from certain members of the Faculty, asking permission to erect a Faculty Club House on the campus.

On motion, this request was referred with favorable presumption to a committee, consisting of the President, Mr. Stone and Mr. Mallon, for further consideration and report.

The President was authorized to increase the salary of the shepherd in the Department of Animal Husbandry from \$55.00 to \$60.00 per month, and \$22.83 was appropriated to cover said increase.

The President presented a request from the Board of Overseers of Ohio Union for permission to erect an awning on the north porch of the Ohio Union Building, with the understanding that the University would pay for the per-

manent portion of said improvement and the Board of Overseers to pay for the canvas and its upkeep. Said permission was granted in accordance with the request.

A request to erect a tabernacle on the University campus for temporary use by certain churches on the north side was declined.

The president presented a communication from the Senior Class, requesting the Board of Trustees to remove the fire system in the circle at Fifteenth Avenue, in order that the Class might erect thereon a fountain as a memorial gift. This communication was referred to a special committee, consisting of the Chairman of the Board and the University Architect.

Upon the recommendation of the President, the Departments of Physical Education and of Competitive and Recreative Athletics were combined into one Department to be known as the Department of Physical Education, effective July 1, 1915. Mr. L. W. St. John was appointed Head of said new Department.

The details of the organization of the Department of Physical Education to be presented to the Board of Trustees at its next meeting for approval.

Upon the recommendation of the President, the Secretary and Business Manager was authorized to attend the meeting of the Association of Business Officers of State Universities and Colleges of the Middle West, to be held at Ann Arbor, Michigan, May 14-15, 1915, his expenses to be paid by the University.

President Thompson stated that he had received from the Cleveland-Pulte Medical College a gift of \$30,000.00 to be used for the construction of a hospital building for the College of Homeopathic Medicine.

In order that a suitable unit of the proposed hospital may be built, the interest on the endowment fund for six months ending June 30, 1915, was added to the above gift, making approximately \$50,000.00 for the construction of the proposed unit.

The University Architect presented preliminary plans of a proposed hospital unit which could be built for \$50,000.00.

On motion of Mr. Pomerene, said plans were approved, and the Architect was directed to proceed with the preparation of the final drawings, plans and specifications in accordance with the tentative scheme submitted.

The President reported the gift from T. A. McCann, M. D., Dayton, Ohio, of \$500.00, to be used for research work in the College of Homeopathic Medicine. Said gift was accepted and the President was directed to make suitable acknowledgment therefor.

The sketches prepared by the University Architect for the construction of a sun porch on the south side of the present Homeopathic Hospital, at an estimated cost of \$700.00, were approved, and the Secretary was directed to award the contract for its construction.

Thereupon the Board adjourned to meet at the call of the Chairman.

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The following items were submitted by the President for consideration and action:

1. The President reported that Miss Katherine Foster who was appointed to the position of Assistant Cataloguer in the Library, effective May 1, 1915, had declined the appointment.

2. The following resignations were accepted:

George Livingston, Assistant Professor of Agronomy, effective June 30, 1915.

Lloyd W. Frost, Assistant in the Department of Electrical Engineering, effective May 31, 1915.

3. Upon the recommendation of the President, the following appointments were made:

Professor Paul L. Vogt, Ph. D., of Miami University, was elected Professor of Rural Economics, at a salary of \$2,500.00, effective July 1, 1915.

In making the recommendation for this appointment the President stated that he desired that it be made a matter of record that it does not involve necessarily the permanency of the Department of Rural Economics or the merging of the Department with the present Department of Economics and Sociology, but leaves that issue for the future.

George Wendell Bush was appointed State Leader, Department of Agricultural Extension, at a salary of \$3000.00 for the twelve months, effective July 1, 1915.

Earl Chenault and Frederick H. Herzer were appointed Assistants in Farm Crops, Agricultural Extension Division, at a salary of \$50.00 per month each, effective May 1, 1915.

4. 7. Upon the recommendation of the President, Professor Edgar S. Ingraham of the Department of Romance Languages was granted leave of absence for the year 1915-1916 on the usual salary basis. 8. Upon the recommendation of the President, a Department of Farm Crops was authorized, effective July 1, 1915, the work now provided in the Department of Agronomy to be transferred to the new Department of Farm Crops.

9. Upon the recommendation of the President, authority was given to discontinue the Department of Agronomy, the work in soils to be assigned to the Department of Agricultural Chemistry, which shall be known as the Department of Agricultural Chemistry and Soils, with Professor Alfred Vivian as Head of the Department, effective July 1, 1916.

11. Upon the recommendation of the President, \$1,400.00 was transferred to the Veterinary Clinic for current expense, from the \$2,200.00 appropriated to Veterinary Medicine for current expense.

15. Upon the recommendation of the President, Professor A. H. Tuttle was authorized to attend the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives (Western Conference) to be held at Urbana, Illinois, June 5, 1915, at the expense of the University, and Professor O. V. Brumley was appointed alternate.

16. In accordance with his recommendation, the President was authorized to appoint someone to represent the University at the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the opening of Vassar College and the inauguration of Henry Noble McCracken as President, which will take place October 13, 1915.

17. Upon the recommendation of the President, Professors Alfred Vivian and E. F. # OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY

Columbus, Ohio, June 15, 1915.

The Board of Trustees met at the University pursuant to the call of the Chairman.

Present: Julius F. Stone, Chairman; O. E. Bradfute, F. E. Pomerene, Benj. F. McCann, John F. Cunningham and John Kaiser.

Professor Joseph N. Bradford, University Architect, presented the plans and specifications for three proposed roadways: one from the gymnasium to the southwest corner of the athletic field; one from High Street and 17th Avenue to the southwest corner of the athletic field and one from Lord Hall to the southwest corner of the athletic field.

The plans were approved and the improvement authorized, providing sufficient funds remain in the appropriation for Roads and Grounds.

The University Architect presented the final plans, specifications and estimates for the proposed Homeopathic Hospital Building.

On motion, said plans, specifications and estimates were approved and the Secretary was directed to present the same to the State Building Commission for approval, and if approved by it, then the Secretary was directed to give notice, as required by law, of the time and place, when and where sealed proposals will be received for furnishing the materials and performing the labor necessary for the construction of said building.

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The President was directed to extend an invitation to the American Association of University Professors to hold its second annual meeting at The Ohio State University on December 31, 1915, and January 1, 1916.

The President presented an opinion from the Attorney General on the construction of House Bill No. 413, which bill refers to the New Lyme Institute, in which opinion the Attorney General held that inasmuch as the legislature did not provide the funds for carrying on the work in the above named Institute, the Trustees should decline to accept the property, and, on motion, the President was directed to send a copy of the opinion to the Trustees of the New Lyme Institute, and to advise said Trustees that after considering the opinion of the Attorney General, the Trustees must decline to accept the property of the New Lyme Institute at this time.

Permission was granted to the International Dental Federation to erect a bronze statue of Dr. Willoughby D. Miller on the University campus.

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Upon the recommendation of the University Faculty, it was ordered that the following degrees be conferred by the President of the University on Commencement Day, June 16, 1915:

8. The President reported for approval and acceptance by the Board the gift of a check for \$300.00 from Mr. Ralph D. Mershon, to be used for the establishment of a student assistantship in the Department of Military Science. The gift was accepted and the Secretary was directed to convey to Mr. Mershon the thanks and appreciation of the Board for this gift.

The President presented a communication from Edwards Cole Brown, under date of June 11, 1915, in reference to the purchase of the Hess tract of land, the appropriation for which was vetoed by the Governor. The Secretary was directed to communicate with Mr. Brown and request a new lease with option of purchase to cover a threeyear period.

Upon the recommendation of the President, the group of buildings now called Repair Shops, Freight House and Kiln Room and Stores & Receiving Department, was named "Service Building," and the Secretary was directed to so style the account in the general ledger.

The Secretary reported that the premium on his bond of \$50,000.00 would fall due August 1, 1915, and on motion the Secretary was directed to prepare voucher on the Auditor of State in payment of said premium.

The President, Mr. Stone and the Secretary were appointed a committee to revise the By-Laws, Rules and Regulations of the Board of Trustees, and to report their revision to the Board for action.

Mr. L. F. Sater and Mr. J. H. Galbraith, representing the Ohio State University Association, appeared before the Board and expressed their approval of the construction of the roads now under contract on the south side of the oval.

The committee further discussed with the Board the location of the proposed Medical Group at the head of Eleventh Avenue, west of Neil Avenue, and were advised as to why the Trustees had selected that site for the Medical Group.

Upon the recommendation of the President, the names of Mr. T. S. Lowden and Mr. G. A. Bricker were added to the Budget for the year ending June 30, 1916, with the same salary and rank as for the year just ending, with the definite understanding that the appointments shall terminate June 30, 1916, and reappointment after that date will not be made.

The Secretary presented a communication from the North Side Improvement Association, calling attention to the board fence around the athletic field and requesting that if possible the Trustees replace the fence with a neat iron one.

The Secretary was directed to advise the North Side Improvement Association that its communication would be given due consideration.

The Secretary reported that he had asked the Auditor of State for a ruling as to whether or not the construction of roads, sewers, tunnels and walks was contemplated in Sections 2314-2317 General Code, and stated that said opinion would be received during the coming week.

The following plans, specifications and estimates prepared by the University Architect were approved:

If the Auditor of State holds in his opinion that the above improvements do not come under Sections 2314-2317 General Code, the Secretary was directed to secure competitive bids on the above improvements and award the contracts to the lowest bidders.

If, on the other hand, the Auditor of State holds in his ruling that the above improvements should be regularly advertised, the Secretary was directed to present the plans, specifications and estimates for the above named improvements to the State Building Commission for its approval, and if approved by it, the Secretary was directed to give notice, as required by law, of the time and place, when and where sealed proposals will be received for furnishing the materials and performing the labor necessary for the construction of said tunnel and roads.

The University Architect presented the final plans, specifications and estimates for the Home Economics Building, and the same were approved.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to present the above plans, specifications and estimates to the State Building Commission for its approval, and if approved by it, then the Secretary was directed to give notice, as required by law, of the time and place, when and where sealed proposals will be received for the erection and completion of said Home Economics Building.

On motion, the Home Economics Building was located on Neil Avenue between the Botany and Zoology Building and the Horticulture and Forestry Building, in accordance with site plan presented by the University Architect, the front line of said building to be on a front line with the Botany and Horticulture Buildings, and the east and west axis to be 160 feet south of the Horticulture Building.

The temporary location of the Dr. Willoughby D. Miller memorial, to be erected by the International Dental Federation, was fixed on a site southwest of the Library Building at the intersection of the east and west axis of the Horticulture and Forestry Building and north and south axis of the Library driveway, it being understood that when the Medical Group is completed said memorial will be removed to the Medical Group.

The Secretary reported that the funds available for the year ending June 30, 1915, would not permit of the construction of the roadways authorized by the Board of Trustees at its last meeting; namely, from the gymnasium to the athletic field and from High Street to Lord Hall, and on motion, said roadways were authorized, payable from the appropriation for the year ending June 30, 1916.

The Secretary presented specifications for the installation of an automatic sprinkler system in University Hall, as prepared by Mr. McCracken, the appropriation for which is included in the present Appropriation Bill.

On motion, said specifications were approved.

The Secretary reported that the Attorney General had ruled that such an improvement as an automatic sprinkler system did not fall under Sections 2314-2317 of the General Code and would not require formal advertisement.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to secure competitive bids on above contemplated improvement, in accordance with the specifications prepared by Mr. Mc-Cracken which call for a wet pipe sprinkler system, and also to call for bids on a dry pipe system, said bids to be presented to the Executive Committee of the Board with power to award the contract.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Secretary of the Board of Overseers of Ohio Union, advising the Trustees of the election by the new Board of Overseers of W. J. Davenport as House Manager, whose duties will cover the management of the commons and kitchen, and the election of Edward S. Drake as Secretary of the Board, whose duties will be confined to the management of the building, its finances and social work.

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On motion, said elections were approved.

The Secretary reported that it was found to be impossible to make the contemplated changes in the State Street property for dispensary purposes within the amount set aside by the Board of Trustees for that purpose, and on motion said improvement was ordered deferred until a later date.

The Chairman announced the appointment of the following standing committees for the year 1915-1916:
