Mr. Zeiger:

Our first order of business is the approval of the November Board of Trustees meeting minutes. These have been distributed to all trustees. If there are no additions or corrections, the minutes will stand as approved.

BUCKEYES IN THE SPOTLIGHT

Mr. Zeiger:

It is a true privilege to serve on the Board of Trustees of this institution. We learn so much, and we get to see so much more than the general public gets to see. And there is never a shortage of accomplishments that would be worthy for celebration by this Board. This meeting we've heard about new milestones in clinical care, like the 10-way kidney transplant chain that Dr. John Warner described for us yesterday. Then we hear about breathtaking research. And of course, we hear about the success of our students who make the most of the opportunities that are rather amazing here at Ohio State.

The university's achievement in athletics is also a subject of deep pride for all of us and many others across the state and the country. Recent weeks have given us much to be proud of. The Ohio State football team won the national championship in the first-ever 12-team College Football Playoff, and won it in a spectacular fashion. And just days before, our spirit and dance teams also won national championships. You might say they initiated the path of momentum for the football team to finish in Atlanta.

Equally impressive, and very important, are the success of these students in their respective fields of competition are their academic accomplishments. We learned from Ross Bjork on Monday that, department wide, Ohio State student-athletes achieved a cumulative grade point average of 3.368, reminding us that the student experience is still largely focused on academic learning and accomplishment. And the football team joins their counterparts at Harvard as the only Division I football teams in the country with a perfect academic progress rate as measured by the NCAA. Truly a remarkable accomplishment and one of which all Buckeyes should be very proud.

Given these accomplishments, it is the Board's great pleasure to welcome representatives this morning of our football team, dance and spirit teams to the meeting today, along with members of their coaching staffs. I would like to invite Executive Associate Athletics Director Carey Hoyt to introduce our guests this morning and then spend a few minutes with us and them sharing their experience. Carey?

Ms. Hoyt:

I'm Carey Hoyt. This is my 23rd year here at Ohio State. I have the privilege of serving with our athletic director, Ross Bjork, who unfortunately couldn't be here this morning. I also have oversight of our football program and our spirit program. We had an excellent year, obviously, with teams winning national championships. And for me, it's an honor to get to work with local programs. Obviously, at football, the highest, biggest stage in America, and our spirit squad. Equally as impressive, the sports are completely different. My favorite part of being in administration is getting to work with a variety of athletes and coaches. And I will tell you that is not a coincidence that these two programs are national champions. The coaching staff, the leadership that our coaches provide for our student-athletes is second to none. When you go to a dance practice, when you go to a football practice, they are equally intense — attention to detail, and our leadership of our coaches, the dedication to holding our student athletes accountable is what I can say, unequivocally, has made these two teams national champions.

So, I'll introduce our coaches who are with us today. We have Melissa McGhee, the director of our spirit program. We have Ray Sharp, who's the head coach of our mascot program. With our football program, we have our co-offensive coordinators, Brian

Hartline and Keenan Bailey, Co-defensive Coordinator Tim Walton. Coaches, I'll start with the spirit program, you can introduce student-athletes. Thank you.

Ms. McGhee:

Thanks, Carey. As Carey said, my name is Melissa McGhee, and I've been with the spirit program for 14 years now. Also a graduate of The Ohio State University. So, proud to be back here and proud to introduce a few of our student-athletes who are on our championship teams, as well.

So, we have two representatives from our mascot program and two representatives from our dance team here to introduce to all of you. And I'll ask them to stand if you guys don't mind being recognized right now. Starting with our dance team, we have Ellie Wagner and Diana Natalicchio, who are both of our captains for the season. Ellie is from Minneapolis, Minnesota, studying strategic communications, and Diana is from Woodcliff Lake, New Jersey, studying psychology. On our mascot team, we have Emily Hayward and Jeff Moody. Emily is studying the impressive biomedical engineering, coming from Mars, Pennsylvania. And Jeff, from Fredericktown, studying exercise science.

So, I'm thrilled for these athletes to be in here to receive their recognition. It is our great honor not only to compete in our sport, but also to represent this university. And so thank you, again, for the recognition. We are thrilled to be here.

Mr. Hartline:

Thank you. So, I speak for Coach Day and rest of the coaching staff. We appreciate it. We wouldn't be here without you guys. So, I want to make sure we're clear on that. I want to thank, again, Coach Walton and Coach Bailey. The rest of the coaching staff send their regards.

We just got done with the mat drill. So, these guys are just hustling over here from their workout this morning. Did a good job with that. So, I'll introduce these guys. First: the son of Lorenzo Styles and Laverna. He's from Pickerington, Ohio. So, he's in town, went to Pickerington Central High School. He's a junior. Plays linebacker and studies sports industry. Sonny Styles.

The second gentleman I'd like to introduce is Caleb Downs. To his left. Son of Gary and Tanya Downs. He's from Georgia — Atlanta — went to Mill Creek High School. He's a sophomore, and he plays safety, and he's studying sports industry. Caleb Downs.

Next one is Carson Hinzman. He is from Spring Valley, Wisconsin. Son of John and Tera Hinzman. Went to Saint Croix Central High School. Yeah, there you go. He's the one holding the beautiful trophy as well. He's a junior, he's an offensive lineman, helped us win the national championship playing center this year, and he's also studying sports industry.

The last gentleman: Tegra Tshabola. Parents are Angel and John Tshabola. From West Chester, Ohio, went to Lakota West High School. So, he's a local boy. He is a junior, again, playing offensive line, guard, tackle. Anything we asked Tegra to do, he did, and he is studying communications. Tegra Tshabola.

It goes without saying, to finalize this, I am a Buckeye through and through, and to be here is a true honor. I know a handful of gentlemen, ladies in this room and, honestly, year in and year out you guys' support is unparalleled. We would not be where we are today if it wasn't for you guys. And to continue on this path, we need your support. So, thank you and go Bucks.

Mr. Zeiger:

I don't think any of us can fully appreciate how much hard work it took for both our national championship teams — all three of our national championship teams to accomplish the ultimate goal. That hard work is not seen by everybody every day, but we do understand that it takes a lot to get where you attained. So, thank you for representing this university in a very important and incredible way on the largest stage that we have in this country. So, thank you to each and every one of you and your teammates, and the coaches, for just remarkable accomplishments.

As we prepare to do our responsibilities as trustees, we think a lot about where young people will go and why we are doing this, and it's not lost on us that one of the recent persons associated with our athletic program is now the lieutenant governor of the State of Ohio. So, we will watch with interest, where each of our young athletes go, and the success they have, and know that they'll make important contributions not only in the state of Ohio but across the country. An exciting time for us.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Mr. Zeiger:

The next item on our program this morning is the report from President Carter. Ted, the floor is yours.

Mr. Carter:

Chairman Zeiger, members of the Board: good morning.

I appreciate the opportunity to tell you a little bit about what our teams have been working on since the last time we met. And what a great way to start off the meeting by celebrating our athletes at the national-championship level.

You may remember that we predicted 2025 was going to be a year when The Ohio State University made history. Seven weeks in, we are definitely delivering.

I am so proud of the achievements of our students, faculty and staff so far this year. And we are just getting started.

As you know, Lynda and I recently celebrated our first full year as Buckeyes. We are even more excited about the work and mission of Ohio State today than when we first arrived here in Columbus.

And that's a credit to the leadership of this Board, the tireless commitment of our faculty and staff, the enthusiasm of our students, and the support from our partners. So, just a simple thank you.

Of course, as we just heard from our football players, we kicked off the New Year at the Rose Bowl, part of the greatest run in college football playoff history.

I assume I don't need to recap what took place over that four-week period—though I'm not tired of talking about it still. I'll simply take this opportunity to congratulate, once again, Coach Day, his staff and our student-athletes on bringing home our ninth national title.

I'm so pleased that we have Coach Day as the leader of our program and our young men.

As the chairman mentioned, our success on the field gave us a tremendous platform to talk about our success off the field. We took full advantage of that megaphone.

Our team's perfect academic progress rate — which, by the way, puts us in the exclusive company of Harvard University — earned national media attention. Our website had its highest traffic in over two years.

I know many people associate Ohio State with athletic excellence, and we're very proud of that. But we strive for excellence in all aspects — athletics, student learning, research and patient care.

With the nation's eyes on Ohio State, I'm very pleased that we were able to deliver that message of excellence far and wide.

Speaking of excellence, I want to officially welcome the newest member of our leadership team: Dr. Ravi Bellamkonda, who joined us as executive vice president and provost in January. Ravi — welcome officially.

This was a search we knew we had to get right. And we did.

What stood out to me about Ravi is that he shares our vision for academic excellence as our true North Star. I'm happy to have him and Lalita on board, and I have every confidence that with Ravi and the team we've assembled, Ohio State is going to do big things.

We have already been able to celebrate some of those victories early in the semester.

I'm proud to share with you that we retained over 98% of our new first-year students on the Columbus campus from fall to spring. That's a great proof point when you consider that we had our largest first-year class in history this past year. To me, it says that students and families recognize the quality and value that we provide, and they want to be a part of it.

We've also made exciting announcements when it comes to faculty excellence. A few weeks ago, Professor Adam Leroy from our Department of Astronomy was named the recipient of the 2025 Henry Draper Medal, awarded by the National Academy of Sciences for extraordinary discovery in astronomical physics.

This honor puts Professor Leroy in elite company: Nine previous Draper Medal recipients have gone on to win the Nobel Prize in Physics. We are proud of Professor Leroy and the national acclaim an award like this brings to the world-class faculty of Ohio State.

And, we have announced the new Agostini Prize, named in honor of professor emeritus and Nobel Laureate Pierre Agostini. This award will be our most prestigious honor for

scholarly and artistic achievement and will give us an opportunity to lift up the best of the best work taking place here at Ohio State.

Now, I could talk at length about the successes of our students, faculty and staff.

But I share these highlights because I want us to always remember that the work we do at Ohio State is creating impact each and every day.

There's a lot happening in the world today, and I'll get to that in a moment. What has struck me about this university — and frankly every institution of higher learning I've had the privilege of serving — is that even during times of uncertainty or challenge, the work of higher education never stops.

We still have the unique and sacred privilege of educating the next generation of leaders, of preparing them for success in life and work, of exposing them to new ideas and teaching them not what to think but how to think.

We still have the responsibility of conducting research that grows the economy, discovering new medical treatments that give hope where there was none before, and providing patient care that changes lives.

As public land-grant universities, we still have the noble mission of serving as the primary engines of growth and opportunity for the communities we serve.

We still hold true to our founding values of access and opportunity for all — the values that have made America the envy of the world when it comes to higher learning.

None of that has changed. In fact, I would argue our mission is more important now than ever. And I would further argue that the future of higher education is going to emerge from public land-grant institutions like ours. There is a race for leadership right now in that space. Ohio State can be, and will be, at the forefront.

No doubt, higher education has found itself at the center of many developments at the state and federal levels as of late.

We anticipated that new leadership both locally and nationally would bring new ideas and priorities. Certainly, a number of the policy proposals put forward in recent weeks will impact Ohio State, some significantly so. We are monitoring each new development and communicating with the campus as necessary.

Just last week, we shared with students, faculty and staff that we are continuing our evaluation of diversity, equity and inclusion efforts across campus and have stood up two working groups to review jobs and programming related to DEI.

And as of a few days ago, we along with our colleagues in public education have learned of additional guidance from the Department of Education's Office of Civil Rights regarding DEI. This new guidance will inform and likely accelerate our work.

But as we said at the outset of our review, our goal in being proactive was to be prepared to make changes if necessary. I expect that will be the case. And I have heard and understand the concerns and questions we've received from students, faculty and staff.

I will not pretend to have all the answers here at this very moment. And I will not pretend these conversations are easy or will continue to be easy. My job, as president, is to make sure that first, we follow the law; second, that we take care of our students, faculty and

staff; and third, that we stay true to our values as a land-grant university serving the people of Ohio.

I will always advocate for a competitive, affordable Ohio State that provides life-saving research and patient care, and I take every opportunity to share our story with elected leaders who historically have recognized the tremendous return that their investment in higher education yields.

I recently had an opportunity to meet with both of our new U.S. Senators, Senator Husted and Senator Moreno, in Washington, D.C., and I was pleased with our conversations. Here in Ohio, we appreciate Governor DeWine's budget recommendation that makes important investments in access, research and clinical care, including support for veterinary medicine and behavioral health, both priorities for us.

The message I've shared with our elected officials, and with every Ohioan, is that a strong and competitive Ohio State means a strong and competitive Ohio. This is what higher education does: We create opportunity, we are engines for growth, we change lives. And few do it on the scale of The Ohio State University.

That is why our 10-year Education for Citizenship strategic framework is so important for the future of our state. Since we introduced the framework in November, we have been hard at work developing the priorities that will form the final plan.

I have told our teams, this is the time to be bold. We will be making exciting investments in academic excellence that will enhance Ohio State's leadership role in the areas that will grow the future workforce. And we have big ideas around affordability that will help keep an Ohio State education accessible for every student who wants to earn it.

I am excited about the work we've put into this plan so far and look forward to keeping you updated as we get closer to our release date of July 1.

I thank you again for your leadership and support as we prepare for Ohio State's next chapter.

Mr. Chairman, with that, I'll turn it back to you.

Mr. Zeiger:

Thank you, Ted. I want to publicly again acknowledge this Board's strong confidence in President Carter's leadership. And I particularly want to emphasize that he has been open with us about some of the challenges that the university will face in likely near term. I want to be very clear this Board supports President Carter and his team strongly as they navigate the policy changes that are coming from various levels of government. You do have our support, Ted, as you work through these changes.

The close working relationship that President Carter has built with the trustees over the last year has been impressive and invaluable. We look forward to continuing that relationship, Ted, with you to complete not just what we need to do to adapt to the new circumstances, but also to continue to enhance the opportunity for our students over the very long-term.

CONSENT AGENDA

We have now arrived at the consent agenda. Today there are 15 resolutions for the Board's consideration and approval. As members of the public may not know, these

have all been discussed thoroughly in our various committee sessions for the subject area that they are fitting into.

In addition to what has been distributed previously, we have one hand-carry resolution this morning. It ratifies the appointment of Richard Silveria as vice president and CFO of the Wexner Medical Center, extends the contract of Head Football Coach Ryan Day and Senior Vice President for Advancement Mike Eicher, and reappoints Dr. Trevor Brown as dean of the John Glenn College of Public Affairs. Copies of that resolution are available from the Media Relations team.

Also on the consent agenda is a measure approving recipients of the university's Distinguished Service Award. This honor recognizes extraordinary and lasting impact these individuals have made on their association with Ohio State. We congratulate them and thank them and look forward to recognizing them during the upcoming commencement ceremonies.

Lastly, item four on our consent agenda establishes the Salmon P. Chase Center for Civics, Culture, and Society and makes it a tenure initiating unit of this university. It is the view of this Board that the Chase Center will be a strong and unique addition to Ohio State's academic offerings, one that ties directly to our motto of "Education for Citizenship" and our mission of preparing our students to be thoughtful members of our society will be advanced by this program. We have insisted, under Trustee Kaplan's leadership, that this program have a truly national underpinning of excellent quality, and we believe that is occurring. It is well known that the creation of the Chase Center was spurred by legislative action undertaken by the Ohio General Assembly. But given the diligent, collaborative work of Professor Lee Strang, who is the center's first inaugural executive director, his efforts to integrate this center into the academic life of this university have been important and effective, and we want to be clear that this Board is excited to formally recognize the importance and fully support the process and commitment of the Chase Center. We believe the Chase Center can be a model of excellence and an integral part of this university as it fulfills its mission.

RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

Resolution No. 2025-55

MARION L. CREMER

Synopsis: The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sympathy regarding the November 6, 2024, death of Professor Emerita Marion L. Cremer, who specialized in hospitality management in what is today the College of Education and Human Ecology. She was 89.

Cremer was considered a beloved professor who made significant developmental contributions to the college's Hospitality Management program. As was said at her celebration of life service, hospitality and mastery of culinary arts were the center of her life. After earning a 1958 MS in food and nutrition, a program then located in a division within the School of Home Economics, College of Agriculture, she became a registered dietitian and worked for two food companies and two hospitals over a span of seven years.

She returned to Ohio State in 1965 to earn a PhD, which she achieved in 1969. The subject of her dissertation was an analysis of quality factors in frozen meal components. She undertook the study, as stated in her dissertation, because food processing was becoming increasingly important to the service segment of the food industry. The college's late Professor Emerita Rachel Hubbard served on Cremer's committee.

While earning her PhD, Cremer worked half-time as an instructor in the School of Home Economics, and half-time for The Refectory, a cafeteria in Pomerene Hall associated with the home economics program over the years. Upon earning the advanced degree, Cremer became an assistant professor and later advanced to professor with tenure.

Cremer was known for her lectures and for guiding many graduate students toward their degrees in the program that became Hospitality Management in later years. She authored several textbooks that helped advance the field of food technology. One of the most prominent was *Quality Food in Quantity: Management and Science* published by the McCutchan Publishing Company. She also co-authored the book *Purchasing for Food Service Managers* from the same publisher, including updating its fifth edition in 2005.

She published in peer-reviewed journals such as the *Journal of the American Dietetic Association* and wrote research circulars for the university's Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center. She also wrote articles for the center's bimonthly *Ohio Report* magazine. For instance, in the March/April 1983 issue, she described the findings from her research study comparing "Food quality and energy use — microwave vs. convection ovens." Her work was essential during a time when microwave ovens were beginning to become common in the United States market.

For her many contributions, Cremer was recognized with an Ohio State hospitality management lifetime achievement award. She was a 50-plus year member of the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics, a member of the American Home Economics Association and of the Columbus Dietetic Association, among other professional associations. She retired from Ohio State in 1992 and was granted emerita status.

Cremer loved the restaurant business and will surely be missed by restaurant owners and servers in the Columbus area. She also was an avid photographer, producing many stellar photos over the years as a member of the Photo Society of The Ohio State University Retirees Association.

MARK E. HEADINGS

Synopsis: The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its condolences on the death of Mark E. Headings, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Entomology of the College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences, on December 19, 2024. He was 87.

Mark was born on May 2, 1937, in Halsey, Oregon, where his family owned a grass seed farm. He was a graduate of Western Mennonite High School and pursued higher education at Hesston College and Goshen College before earning his MS in 1971 and his PhD in forest entomology in 1975 from Michigan State University.

Dr. Headings dedicated his career to education and research, serving for two years at the University of Guam and for 35 years as professor of entomology at The Ohio State University Agricultural Technical Institute (ATI). At Ohio State ATI, his passion for teaching brought the world of insects to thousands of undergraduate students. He conducted research on various plants and insects during his tenure. Dr. Headings greatly contributed to faculty governance and committee service at Ohio State ATI. He retired in 2013.

In his retirement years, Dr. Headings and his wife, Mary, split their time between Ohio and Arizona. Hiking, collecting insects and watching birds were some of his favorite activities. Mark enjoyed being a hobby farmer, beekeeper and avid traveler, as all of these things reflected his love of creation and curiosity about the world. He was also a man of deep faith as an active member of The Gideons International, Smithville Mennonite Church (Ohio), and Christ Chapel (Arizona). He did two years of alternative service with PAX in Greece and other European countries and served alongside Mary in Haiti for two years with Mennonite Central Committee.

LARRY E. MILLER

Synopsis: The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow regarding the death, on October 5, 2024, of Larry E. Miller, PhD, professor emeritus of agricultural education in the university's College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences. He was 81.

Dr. Miller joined the faculty of Ohio State as a professor in the Department of Agricultural Education in June 1979. In this department, he taught research methods and teacher education courses in agricultural extension and education until he retired in 2010 with the title of faculty emeritus.

Dr. Miller had a long service record associated with vocational/career and technical education, having been involved with various organizations such as the Association for Career and Technical Education, Ohio Association of Career and Technical Educators, National Association of Agricultural Educators, Association for International Agricultural and Extension Education, American Association for Agricultural Education, Association for Career and Technical Education Research, Future Farmers of America, and Omicron Tau Theta, among many others.

Dr. Miller authored and contributed to over 50 scholarly publications and received over 275 invitations to present his papers. Due to his scholarly activity and professional reputation for expertise, he served on many editorial boards, including those for the Journal of Agricultural Education, Journal of Vocational Technical Education and Journal of Vocational Education Research. He is a past editor of the Journal of Agricultural Education and the Agricultural Education Magazine.

Dr. Miller also served as a graduate advisor and committee member for many master's- and doctoral-level students. Dr. Miller was selected as one of eight out of over 3,800 faculty members to be awarded The Ohio State University Alumni Award for Distinguished Teaching in 1986. He has had extensive involvement in international development activities with over 100 consultancies in nearly 20 countries.

Dr. Miller earned a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Missouri – Columbia in agricultural education in 1965 and a Master of Science degree from Northwest Missouri State University, with a major in agricultural education and a minor in animal science, in 1969. He received his Doctor of Philosophy from Purdue University in 1972, with a focus in agricultural education, and minors in counseling and personnel services, and agronomy.

Dr. Miller taught vocational agriculture to students at Carroll County High School in Carrollton, Missouri, and at Nodaway-Holt High School in Graham, Missouri. He also served as a faculty member at Northwest Missouri State University, Purdue University, Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, and the University of Missouri – Columbia.

Miller was admired by his fellow faculty members, students, advisees and the agricultural education profession in Ohio, around the United States of America and throughout the world.

CAROLE ROGEL POIRIER

Synopsis: The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow regarding the death on September 30, 2024, of Carole Rogel Poirier, associate professor emerita in the Department of History in the College of Arts and Sciences. She was 85.

Carole Rogel Poirier was born in Cleveland on January 30, 1939. She graduated from Euclid High School in 1956; received a BA from Flora Stone Mather College (Western Reserve University), Cleveland, in 1960; and from Columbia University in New York three degrees: an MA (1961), a certificate from its Institute on East Central Europe (1962) and a PhD (1966).

Professor Rogel Poirier taught in the Department of History at The Ohio State University from 1964 until her retirement in 1990. From 1988-1990, she was vice chair of the department. She was a longtime member of the American Historical Association; the American Association for the Advancement of Slavic Studies; the Association for Southeast European Studies, of which she was president in 1981; and the American Association of University Professors (Ohio State chapter secretary, 1973-1974). She was also a founding member of the Society for Slovene Studies, of which she was president from 1984-1990 and treasurer from 1998-2012. She also wrote a history of the society.

Throughout her career, Rogel authored numerous books and articles on Slovene and Yugoslav history and lectured extensively on the breakup of former Yugoslavia in the 1990s. Her books include *The Slovenes and Yugoslavia 1890-1914* (1977), *The Breakup of Yugoslavia and the War in Bosnia* (1998), *The Breakup of Yugoslavia and Its Aftermath* (2004), and, with Leopoldina Plut-Pregelj, *The Historical Dictionary of Slovenia* (1997). Additionally, Rogel is remembered for her work in mentoring and promoting many young scholars of Slovene studies. In 2002, the Republic of Slovenia awarded her an Honorary Gold Medal of Freedom for contributions in America to the scholarship and teaching about Slovenes and Slovenia.

She is remembered by her colleagues for her deep knowledge, her kindness and her generosity. Professor Emerita Jane Hathaway remembers Professor Rogel's support and care on behalf of female faculty at the university. Beyond Ohio State, Professor Emerita Tom Priestly recalls collaborating on a special volume of Slavic Studies in 2018 with Professor Rogel, who had encouraged his work for many years at various meetings of the Society for Slovene Studies. Professor Emerita Myroslava Znayenko, who knew Professor Rogel from the time when they were both graduate students, describes her friend as a dedicated scholar and teacher, and as a lovely human being.

STACY WEISLOGEL

Synopsis: The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow regarding the death on November 30, 2024, of Professor Emeritus Stacy Weislogel, from the former Department of Aviation in the College of Engineering. He was 85.

Mention Stacy Weislogel's name in the corridors of The Ohio State University Airport, and you are likely to get a nod of recognition. Many aviation alumni credit the late professor emeritus with contributing to their career success at some of the nation's largest airlines while colleagues smile as they recall his characteristic attention to detail as an administrator. An attorney, engineer and Ohio State aviation pioneer, Weislogel served nearly four decades in the Department of Aviation, airport and College of Engineering.

Weislogel earned his bachelor's degree in engineering in 1962 and returned to his alma mater as an aviation instructor in 1968. He advanced to become a full professor (1979), aviation department chair (1982-90) and airport director (1982-83) before serving as a College of Engineering associate dean (1990-2006) and interim dean (1992). When Weislogel retired in 2006, the Board of Trustees honored him as a professor emeritus. A supporter of multiple aviation organizations, he was particularly devoted to the Ohio State Aviation Alumni Society, which he helped reenergize in 2012.

At the society's reunion in autumn 2023, Weislogel's commitment was recognized when the annual student award was renamed the Stacy Weislogel Award. The honor "established a legacy for which I am most appreciative," Weislogel commented previously. He instituted the award in 2012 to recognize outstanding aviation student leaders.

In addition to mentoring students, Weislogel considered his contributions to the field of aviation to be among his most notable achievements. Courses he developed and taught focused on the national aviation system, flight instruction methodology, airplane performance, flight test engineering and legal aspects of aviation. He conducted research for the Federal Aviation Administration and NASA, the latter resulting in the designation of Ohio State as the U.S. General Aviation Airfoil Design and Analysis Center for two five-year terms.

Throughout his career, Weislogel logged flights in 27 different types of aircraft and served as a flight test pilot for a number of NASA projects. At Ohio State, he piloted flights in the 1970s that provided transportation for faculty, administrators and sports teams and guided students in these trips' "flying classrooms."

Gratified by numerous accolades and professional memberships, a long career and accomplished mentees, Weislogel remained as passionate about aviation as ever until his unexpected passing.

Resolution No. 2025-58

Synopsis: Approval to establish the Salmon P. Chase Center for Civics, Culture, and Society as a tenure-initiating unit.

WHEREAS pursuant to section 3335.39 of the Revised Code, the Ohio General Assembly created the Salmon P. Chase Center for Civics, Culture, and Society (Chase Center) at The Ohio State University; and

WHEREAS the enacting legislation establishes the Chase Center "as an independent academic unit within the Ohio state university ... [that] shall conduct teaching and research in the historical ideas, traditions and texts that have shaped the American constitutional order and society," and further has "the authority to house tenure-track faculty who hold their appointments in the center" and "the authority to offer courses and develop certificate, minor, and major programs as well as graduate programs, and offer degrees"; and

WHEREAS the University Senate's Council on Academic Affairs granted the Chase Center temporary center status in September 2023 to support the center's initial organizational efforts pending the hiring of the Chase Center's inaugural executive director, Lee Strang, in August 2024; and

WHEREAS, since his hire, Professor Strang has worked diligently to develop the Chase Center and position it for future success, including by engaging extensively with faculty, staff, and students across the university and developing external support and partnerships to ensure that the Chase Center meets all applicable requirements for a tenure-initiating unit and has a distinct and sustainable academic focus that advances its statutory mission; and

WHEREAS the Chase Center presented a proposal for tenure-initiating unit status to the Council on Academic Affairs that outlines this work and the efforts to meet the enacting legislation's requirements that the Chase Center house tenure-track faculty, "offer courses and develop certificate, minor, and major programs as well as graduate programs, and offer degrees," and exercise all other authority set forth in that statute; and

WHEREAS the proposal was extensively reviewed by the Council on Academic Affairs and approved at its meeting on December 11, 2024, by a vote of 13-3; and

WHEREAS, while the University Senate has not advanced this proposal to the Board of Trustees for consideration despite the Council's endorsement, section 3335.39 of the Revised Code requires the university to establish the Chase Center in line with the statutory requirements, which the Board both fully supports and has a duty to faithfully implement:

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Trustees hereby establishes the Salmon P. Chase Center for Civics, Culture, and Society as a tenure-initiating unit with the authority to offer courses and develop certificate, minor, and major programs as well as graduate programs, and offer degrees, and to exercise all other authority set forth in section 3335.39 of the Revised Code.

Synopsis: Authorization to establish a new affiliate for a university-owned captive insurance company (hereafter "Great River Insurance, LLC") in the state of Vermont is recommended.

WHEREAS the Board of Trustees adopted the Policy on Affiliated Entities in June 2008 to provide a uniform framework for the establishment and operation of separate entities that are closely affiliated with The Ohio State University (hereinafter "Ohio State" and/or "University"), ensure that such entities serve the best interests of the University, and provide for continuing appropriate oversight by the University and the Board;

WHEREAS the establishment of Great River Insurance, LLC is necessary to manage and mitigate risks, enhance cost-efficiency, and improve the overall control of the insurance program and process for the university.

WHEREAS Great River Insurance, LLC objectives are to: 1) reduce the cost of insurance and create a more tailored risk management strategy; 2) improve cash flow by retaining underwriting profits and investment income within the university; 3) provide custom insurance coverage for risks that are difficult or expensive to insure in the traditional market; 4) stabilize insurance premium pricing over time and reduce reliance on commercial insurers; and 5) gain better control over coverage design, the claims handling process, and loss prevention initiatives.

WHEREAS as Great River Insurance, LLC will require structure and therefore the university will serve as sole owner of the captive and establish governance to include a board of directors with representatives from the university and industry experts. The entity will be a single captive (pure captive) domiciled in Vermont; appropriately capitalized based

on regulatory requirements and anticipated risk exposure; and will adhere to all university regulatory reporting requirements.

WHEREAS Great River Insurance, LLC will comply with all applicable regulations in its chosen domicile including securing the license to operate as an insurer and ensuring that capital and surplus requirements are met to maintain solvency standards; and

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Trustees hereby authorizes the establishment of the affiliated entity, Great River Insurance, LLC, and authorizes and directs the President and/or Senior Vice President for Business and Finance, in consultation with other University officials as appropriate, to perform such actions and execute such documents as may be necessary or desirable to effect the establishment of this entity; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That, in accordance with the Policy on Affiliated Entities, the Senior Vice President for Business and Finance is hereby designated as the senior University official charged with oversight of this entity and that Great River Insurance, LLC shall report periodically to the University and Board of Trustees through the designated senior oversight official; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the relationship between the University and Great River Insurance, LLC shall be memorialized through a memorandum of agreement and that the entity shall operate in accordance with the Policy on Affiliated Entities, its governance documents including its articles of incorporation, operating and code of regulations; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That as appropriate and as directed, Trustees, officers, and employees of The Ohio State University are hereby authorized, designated, and directed to serve as directors, managers, officers, employees, and agents of Great River Insurance, LLC, representing the University in such capacities as part of their official duties and responsibilities to the University and entitling them to any immunity, insurance, indemnity, and representation to which Trustees, officers, and employees of the University now are, or hereafter may become, entitled.

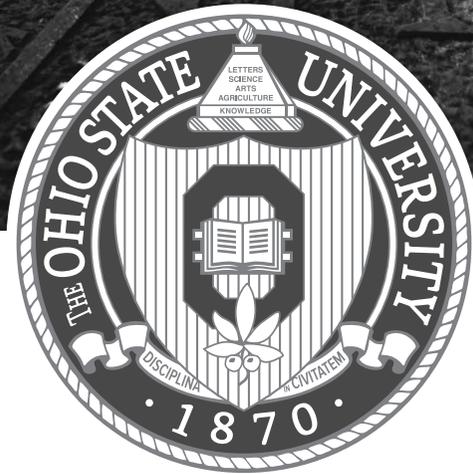

Pomp, circumstance, and other songs of a lifetime

—by Professor David Citino, 1947–2005, Late University Poet Laureate
(Originally presented as the 2000 Winter Commencement address)

If you're like me, you've got a big head,
not to mention a funny robe, full of music—
poems and melodies, the tunes
we move to, shower and shave by,
study, write to. Not just the incidental,

but the momentous music keeping time.
Our histories are measures of song.
Listen to your heart: drums of Africa,
sea-spume of blind, far-sighted Homer,
Sappho's honeyed love lyrics. Often,

music speaks for us, one note saying
a thousand words. Like Rodolpho
in Puccini's *La Boheme*, *Sono un poeta*.
I am a poet. *Che cosa faccio?* What
do I do? *Scrivo*. I write. This ceremony

is loud music—pomp and circumstance
of the life you began freshman year
or that first day of graduate school.
In my head I press Play, and the CD
of *Big Days* kicks on. I leap and linger

over moments too sweet, nearly, for words.
I'll never escape rhymes from the nursery.
Up above the world so high, like a diamond
in the sky. We knew from the start
our universe was aglow with wonder.

Italian, Latin, English songs in nasal accents
of Cleveland. *Gaudeamus igitur*, *Juvenes
dum sumus*. So, let us rejoice, while
we are young. Youth is that gift we can't
comprehend while we're young. This ceremony

means you all are less young than you were.
Don't let the heavy knowledge gained
from your studies deprive you of the gifts
of youth, to be able to rejoice at the drop
of a hat, to care for, be moved by others.

Now I hear golden hits of five decades.
Big Mama Thornton, and that so-called King
(King of what, fried butter sandwiches?)
who stole away her hound dog. You ain't
never killed a rabbit, you ain't no friend

of mine. As with those profs and TAs,
course after course, you had to produce—
kill some rabbits—to earn respect.
And at times OSU may have seemed
like Heartbreak Hotel, down at the end

of Lonely Street, so difficult was it
to do your best. Tennessee Ernie Ford,
"Sixteen Tons": St. Peter don't you
call me 'Cause I can't go. I owe
my soul to the company store.

You have been digging deep in mines
of knowledge. We all owe our souls
to Ohio State, company store of learning,
shared experience—precious ore
we have in common forever.

Now I hear Domenico Modugno's
fervent urging to wish, sing, fly,
Volare, *Wo-oo*. *Cantare*, *Wo-o-o-o-o*.
My grandfather was a peasant farmer,
a *contadino* in Calabria in the toe

of Italy. He knew it's the human lot
to dream of flying. Lucky, lucky,
lucky me, I'm a lucky son-of-a-gun.
I work eight hours, I sleep eight hours,
That leaves eight hours for fun.

Hey! He sailed in steerage across
the Atlantic, came to Cleveland, where
he stayed long enough to work 52 years
for the B&O Railroad, before lying down
to rest in good Ohio soil. So many of us

here today came from elsewhere,
or ancestors did. From Tennessee, Italy,
Africa, Asia, Appalachia—even,
President Kirwan, the wilds of Kentucky
and Maryland. Women and men with backs

supple as birch trunks. The courage
it took to pick up stakes and begin again
in a new world! Think of the work
those older ones did. For you. You all
are facing a change right now.

This sheepskin is your passport.
You're bound for emigration to
the next song of your life. Ohio State
is the ark on which you've been sailing.
You've been the precious cargo.

But, as Noah once said, I can see
clearly now the rain is gone. The ark,
our university, was filled to overflowing
with the diversity of us. Diversity.
Networks and talk shows devalue the word.

Stephanie Hightower

Stephanie Hightower is the 8th President and CEO of the Columbus Urban League. Since starting this role in 2012, she has focused the organization's efforts on closing the wealth gap through workforce development, entrepreneurship and financial empowerment services. Prior to leading the Columbus Urban League, Ms. Hightower served as vice president for institutional advancement for the Columbus College of Art & Design, where she also served as special assistant to the president for external relations. Ms. Hightower was elected to the Columbus Board of Education in 2000 and served as board president from 2001-2005.

As a world-class track and field athlete, Ms. Hightower

earned awards and recognition at the collegiate, national and international levels competing in the 60- and 100-meter hurdles. She has held several American and world records and was a member of the 1980 Olympic Team before retiring in 1988. As a student-athlete at Ohio State, she earned Big Ten Conference, collegiate and national championship titles and a place in The Ohio State University's Athletics Hall of Fame. After graduating from Ohio State, she completed executive leadership training at Harvard University.

Ms. Hightower was named to the Columbus Business First "Power 100" list of Central Ohio's most influential people for three consecutive

years and is a recipient of the 2021 Columbus Chamber of Commerce's Columbus Award, presented for outstanding community leadership. She has served as a board member for the World Athletics Council and as USA Track & Field's (USATF) board chairman and president. Other leadership roles include founder and board chair of Freedom Equity, which provides microloans to minority-owned businesses, chair of the USATF Compensation Committee, founding member of The Women's Fund of Central Ohio, chair of CelebrateOne Columbus, Columbus Museum of Art board member, and Advisory Board member of the African American Leadership Academy.

Recipients of Honors

Natala K. Hart

Distinguished Service Award

Natala K. Hart is a nationally recognized expert and leader in student financial aid who dedicated her professional career to improving access to higher education for first-generation, underrepresented and disadvantaged students and families. In 1989, she co-founded College Goal Sunday, a program to provide families and high school students with support for completing the FAFSA and other college financial aid forms to provide assistance and needed resources to attend college.

Ms. Hart joined Ohio State in 1996, where she directed the Office of Student Financial Aid for ten years before being elevated to a new leadership position as the university's

senior advisor for economic access. In these roles, Ms. Hart utilized her extensive knowledge of financial aid and barriers to higher education to develop programs to ensure economic diversity and access at Ohio State. She was responsible for changing the way student financial aid is distributed, making Ohio State one of the first universities in the nation to switch to direct lending, which dramatically shortened the wait time for students receiving financial aid.

Ms. Hart's impact at Ohio State includes helping to establish the Land Grant Opportunity Scholarship program, which covers the whole cost of attendance for 176 students each year, with an effort to award

two students from each Ohio county, as well as other first-generation student initiatives.

Before coming to Ohio State, Ms. Hart served as vice president for student assistance services for the College Board and managed various financial aid operations for Indiana University, Purdue University and the University of California San Diego.

The National Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators (NASFAA) has recognized Ms. Hart three times with major awards: the Purdy Distinguished Service Award (1993); the Meritorious Achievement Award (2010); and their most prestigious recognition, the Lifetime Achievement Award (2012).

Virgil L. Strickler

Distinguished Service Award

Virgil L. Strickler dedicated his life and professional career to the agriculture industry, which was exemplified through his service as the longest-running general manager in the history of the Ohio Expo Center & State Fair prior to his retirement in February 2024.

During his tenure, he was a valued partner to Ohio State and the College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences as he managed the Ohio State Fair and more than 175 events visited by 3.2 million individuals at the Ohio Expo Center each year.

Prior to becoming general manager, Mr. Strickler began working at the Ohio Expo Center as Agriculture Director in 1993, where he was

instrumental in implementing the nationally recognized Youth Reserve Program, which was renamed in his honor as the "Virgil L. Strickler Youth Reserve Program" in 2023. Under his leadership, the program awarded more than \$4.6 million to more than 44,000 youth exhibitors and several endowments since its inception.

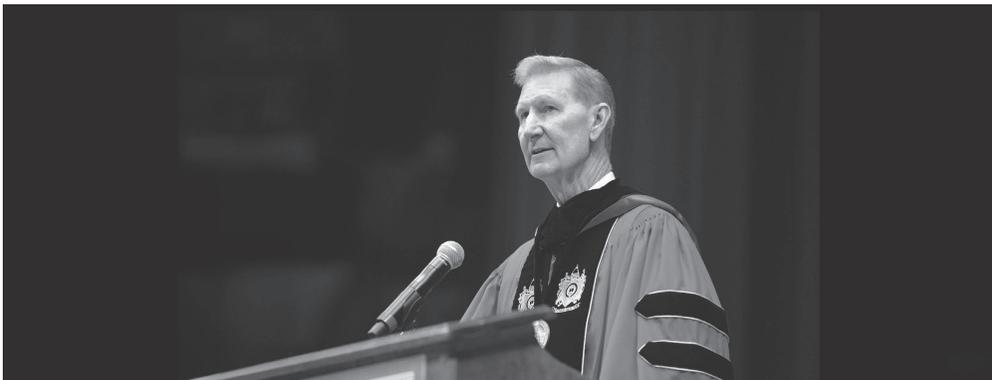
Mr. Strickler has been involved in the International Association of Fairs and Expositions (IAFE), previously serving on the board of directors. He has been recognized with numerous industry awards including the 4-H Fifth 'H' Award for youth development (2000), the Honorary American FFA Degree (2018), the Meritorious Service Award from The Ohio State University (2019), and the Ohio Friend

of 4-H Award (2023). He was also inducted into the Ohio Fair Managers Association Hall of Fame (2014), the Ohio Agricultural Hall of Fame (2017), the IAFE Hall of Fame (2023), and the Ohio State Fair Hall of Fame (2023).

Mr. Strickler served on the Ohio Livestock Care Standards Board and Ohio Amusement Ride Safety Advisory Board and held memberships in numerous agricultural groups including the Ohio Agriculture Council, the Ohio Farm Bureau and the Greater Ohio Showmen's Association.

He is married to his wife Kimberly, and is the proud father of four daughters, and grandfather to eight grandchildren.

The Academic Costume

The colorful ceremonies of The Ohio State University commencements derive from practices originating in the Middle Ages. When European universities were taking form in the 12th and 13th centuries, the scholars were usually clerics, and consequently they adopted costumes similar to those of their monastic orders. Cold halls and drafty buildings called for caps and floor-length capes with attached hoods, and the sobering influence of the church probably resulted in the staid character of the caps and gowns.

As the control of the universities gradually passed from the church,

some aspects of the costumes took on brighter hues. Old prints and engravings, however, reveal a strong similarity between the regalia worn in early universities and that of the present day.

In light of our nation's English heritage, academic costume has been in use in the United States since colonial times. To establish a standard of uniformity in regard to the practice, an intercollegiate commission was formed to prepare a code for caps, gowns and hoods that has since been adopted by all academic institutions.

Originally round, the shape of the cap is now the familiar mortarboard

square — a shape that, according to ballad folklore, resembles a scholar's book. Legend also has it that the privilege of wearing a cap was the initial right of a freed Roman slave; the academic cap, therefore, has become a sign of the freedom of scholarship. The flowing gown has become symbolic of the democracy of scholarship, for it covers any dress that might indicate rank or social status. The hood, reserved at The Ohio State University for those receiving doctoral and master's degrees, not only indicates the type of degree, but also is lined with the official colors of the university.

The Gown

Bachelor: The bachelor gown is black, full-cut with long pointed sleeves.

Master: The master gown is black, long or short sleeves, with an arc-shaped panel extended for each sleeve.

Doctor: The Ohio State University Doctor of Philosophy, Doctor of Education, and Doctor of Nursing Practice gown is scarlet with gray velvet panels on the front and three velvet bars on each sleeve. Other doctor gowns are black with velvet panels and bars, the color of which is distinctive of the field of study.

Honors Emblem

The Ohio State University honors emblem is a scarlet and gray tasseled braid (honor cord) worn over the gown. Students eligible for this curricular honor are those graduating *summa cum laude*, *magna cum laude*, and *cum laude*. At the discretion of their college, students graduating with distinction or with honors may also be eligible.

The Hood

Bachelor: Three feet long with a two-inch-wide velvet edging.*

Master: Three and one-half feet long with a three-inch-wide velvet edging.

Doctor: Four feet in length with a five-inch-wide velvet edging and panel at the sides.

The lining of all hoods, which is folded out, bears the official colors of the institution granting the degree. The color of the velvet indicates the field of study.

* Not usually worn by candidates for a degree.

Cap and Tassel

Candidates for degrees at The Ohio State University wear the black mortarboard with a tassel whose color is distinctive of the degree being received. The tassel colors are as follows:

The Research, Innovation and Strategic Partnerships Committee of The Ohio State University Board of Trustees convened on Tuesday, December 17, 2024, virtually and in person at Longaberger Alumni House on the Columbus campus. Committee Chair Lewis Von Thaeer called the meeting to order at 1:26 p.m.

Items for Discussion:

1. **Quarterly Highlights for Research, Innovation and Knowledge:** Executive vice president for the Enterprise for Research, Innovation and Knowledge Peter Mohler opened the committee meeting by highlighting research and innovation highlights from the last quarter. These included updates on the innovation district, a new partnership with the City of Columbus and Rev1 to further build out space for software innovators, and the National Science Foundation-supported National Extreme Ultrafast Science Facility, or NeXUS, which is a resource for scientists across the United States.

2. **Ohio State Innovation Highlights:** Dr. Mohler then transitioned to presentations from two Ohio State researchers with significant accomplishments in the innovation space.
Dr. Kotaro Nakanishi, professor in the College of Arts and Sciences' Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry, discussed his research in RNAi-based medicine. These groundbreaking treatments are designed to deactivate specific genes associated with diseases, effectively halting the production of harmful proteins. While this technology can be applied to treat a broad set of diseases and conditions, an early focus is Argonaute syndrome. Dr. Nakanishi is also co-founder of the startup City Therapeutics, which launched in October with \$135 million in financing.

Then, Dr. Anil Parwani, chair of the Department of Pathology in the College of Medicine, discussed his transformative research focused on digital pathology for cancer diagnostics. This tool translates tissue samples into digital images that can then be analyzed with the help of machine learning to produce automated diagnoses for patients from across the globe. Ohio State is a national leader in this area.

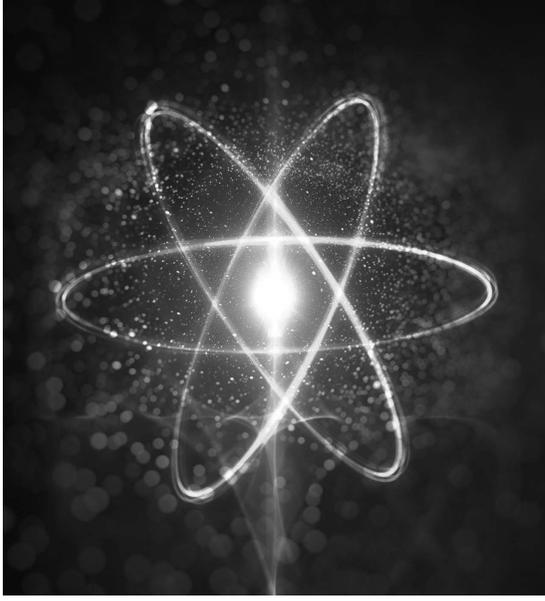

Working with ERIK, Jabez Biosciences, a clinical-stage biopharmaceutical oncology company has licensed the drug and will soon be used for cancer treatment at the patient's bedside as part of an Ohio State-led clinical trial.



Ohio State startup launched with \$135 Million in financing

Licensing technology from the College of Arts and Science's Kotaro Nakanishi, City Therapeutics Inc. is advancing the RNA interference (RNAi) therapeutics pipeline. RNAi therapeutics are designed to deactivate specific genes associated with diseases, effectively halting the production of harmful proteins.

In October, the company announced a \$135 million fundraise, the largest "Series A" raise for an Ohio State startup to date.

The company aims to begin clinical by the end of 2025 and hopes to submit one to two new Investigational New Drug applications (INDs) each year starting in 2026.

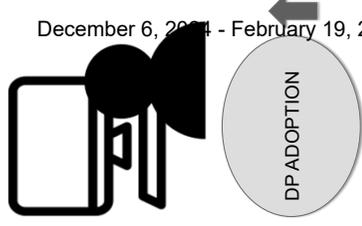
Traditional versus Digital Pathology Workflow



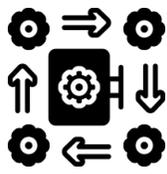

The Academic Affairs and Student Life Committee of The Ohio State University Board of Trustees convened on Wednesday, January 29, 2025, in person at Longaberger Alumni House on the Columbus campus. Committee Chair Reginald Wilkinson called the meeting to order at 1:59 p.m.

To begin the meeting, Chair Wilkinson recognized the recent national championship victory by the Ohio State football team and welcomed Executive Vice President and Provost Ravi Bellamkonda to the university. He closed by expressing his gratitude to be at Ohio State and to Dr. Zadnik for her work prior to his arrival.
2. **Senior Vice President for Student Life's Report: Off-Campus Housing Network:** Senior Vice President for Student Life Melissa Shivers provided an overview of the Off-Campus Housing Network (OCHN), which has been in operation for approximately three years. The initiative seeks to extend the iconic residential experience provided to students in on-campus housing to students living beyond campus borders. Already, 95 property owners, who represent more than 13,000 properties, are part of the network and have agreed to meet certain standards related to health and safety. Third-year undergraduate student Eva Estep then shared her experience working with students and property owners as part of OCHN, which is housed in Off-Campus and Commuter Student Engagement in the Office of Student Life. Dr. Shivers also noted that, through OCHN, the university has built even more productive relationships with City of Columbus Code Enforcement.

WHEREAS the University Senate's Council on Academic Affairs granted the Chase Center temporary center status in September 2023 to support the center's initial organizational efforts pending the hiring of the Chase Center's inaugural executive director, Lee Strang, in August 2024; and

WHEREAS, since his hire, Professor Strang has worked diligently to develop the Chase Center and position it for future success, including by engaging extensively with faculty, staff, and students across the university and developing external support and partnerships to ensure that the Chase Center meets all applicable requirements for a tenure-initiating unit and has a distinct and sustainable academic focus that advances its statutory mission; and

WHEREAS the Chase Center presented a proposal for tenure-initiating unit status to the Council on Academic Affairs that outlines this work and the efforts to meet the enacting legislation's requirements that the Chase Center house tenure-track faculty, "offer courses and develop certificate, minor, and major programs as well as graduate programs, and offer degrees," and exercise all other authority set forth in that statute; and

WHEREAS the proposal was extensively reviewed by the Council on Academic Affairs and approved at its meeting on December 11, 2024, by a vote of 13-3; and

WHEREAS, while the University Senate has not advanced this proposal to the Board of Trustees for consideration despite the Council's endorsement, section 3335.39 of the Revised Code requires the university to establish the Chase Center in line with the statutory requirements, which the Board both fully supports and has a duty to faithfully implement:

EXECUTIVE SESSION

The Master Planning and Facilities Committee of The Ohio State University Board of Trustees convened on Wednesday, February 5, 2025, in person at Longaberger Alumni House on Ohio State's Columbus campus. Committee Chair John Perez called the meeting to order at 1:58 p.m.

It was moved by Mr. Perez and seconded by Dr. Wilkinson that the committee recess into executive session to consider business-sensitive trade secrets required to be kept confidential by federal and state statutes and to consult with legal counsel regarding pending or imminent litigation. A roll-call vote was taken, and the committee voted to move into executive session with the following members present and voting: Mr. Perez, Mr. Skestos, Mr. Stockmeister, Dr. Wilkinson, Mr. Bigby, Dr. Buchan and Mr. Schottenstein.

The committee entered executive session at 1:59 p.m. and reconvened in public session at 3:25 p.m.

PUBLIC SESSION

Items for Discussion:

1. **Physical Environment Scorecard**: Chris Kabourek, senior vice president for administration and planning, presented the Physical Environment Scorecard, which tracks metrics related to campus operations and safety. Of note, off-campus crimes are above the year-to-date target. More than half (52%) of the reported incidents are related to Attempted Motor Vehicle Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Theft from Motor Vehicle. The motor vehicle categories include eBicycles and eScooters.

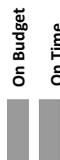

The OSU College of Engineering is planning to construct a Bus Testing Facility for the Center of Automotive Research (CAR). The project will be located at CAR's current facilities at 930 Kinnear Rd. on the university's west campus. The proposed site currently houses CAR's main facility including research laboratories, offices, high bay areas, Ohio State Motorsports / Student Projects Building, and heavy chassis dynamometer space.

This project will support the university's partnership with the Federal Transit Authority (FTA) to support the FTA "Low No Bus Testing Program". The proposed facility is anticipated to be approximately 10,400 SF and will accommodate certified federal testing of busses up to 60 ft long and be flexible to allow for future opportunities for bus technology and design. The facility will require high bay space for bus prep. The facility will also include fuel cell and battery testing spaces, office and conference room space. The proposed building will need to meet the federal certification standards in order to receive federal grant funding.

Strengthen the Identity and Character of the Campus

Being located remotely from the core of campus the project should primarily reflect its use and be a good neighbor to the adjacent properties. Currently the project is envisioned to be a metal panel facility with storefront emphasis that signals entry and highlights its programming where appropriate.

Foster Stewardship of Campus Buildings and Landscapes

Beyond the stand-alone new Bus Testing Facility, the project needs to reinvent site circulation that works internally and also for future expansions and renovations.

Promote the Exchange of Ideas

This building will be an education and research centric building and ultimately has the opportunity to be a recruiting tool for new students as well as a chance to highlight work for current and potential research partners. Even though the building is set back from Kinnear Road and inboard of the site, it still needs to highlight the great work going on. Education and research will be on display through storefront on the exterior. An interior observation room will allow visitors to look into the high bay areas and research labs.

Enhance Environmental Sustainability

The project will meet the Ohio State Greenbuild Policy and expand on it in several areas. Daylighting is critical to working in the high bay areas with skylights and clearstory windows.

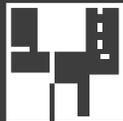
Promote Health and Wellness

Interior daylighting is critical as researchers spend considerable amount of time in the facility doing detailed work. This will be accomplished with clerestory windows as the high bay walls need to be largely windowless. An exterior greenspace and entry court are desired on site to give students and researchers breaks from long working hours and a common place to gather.

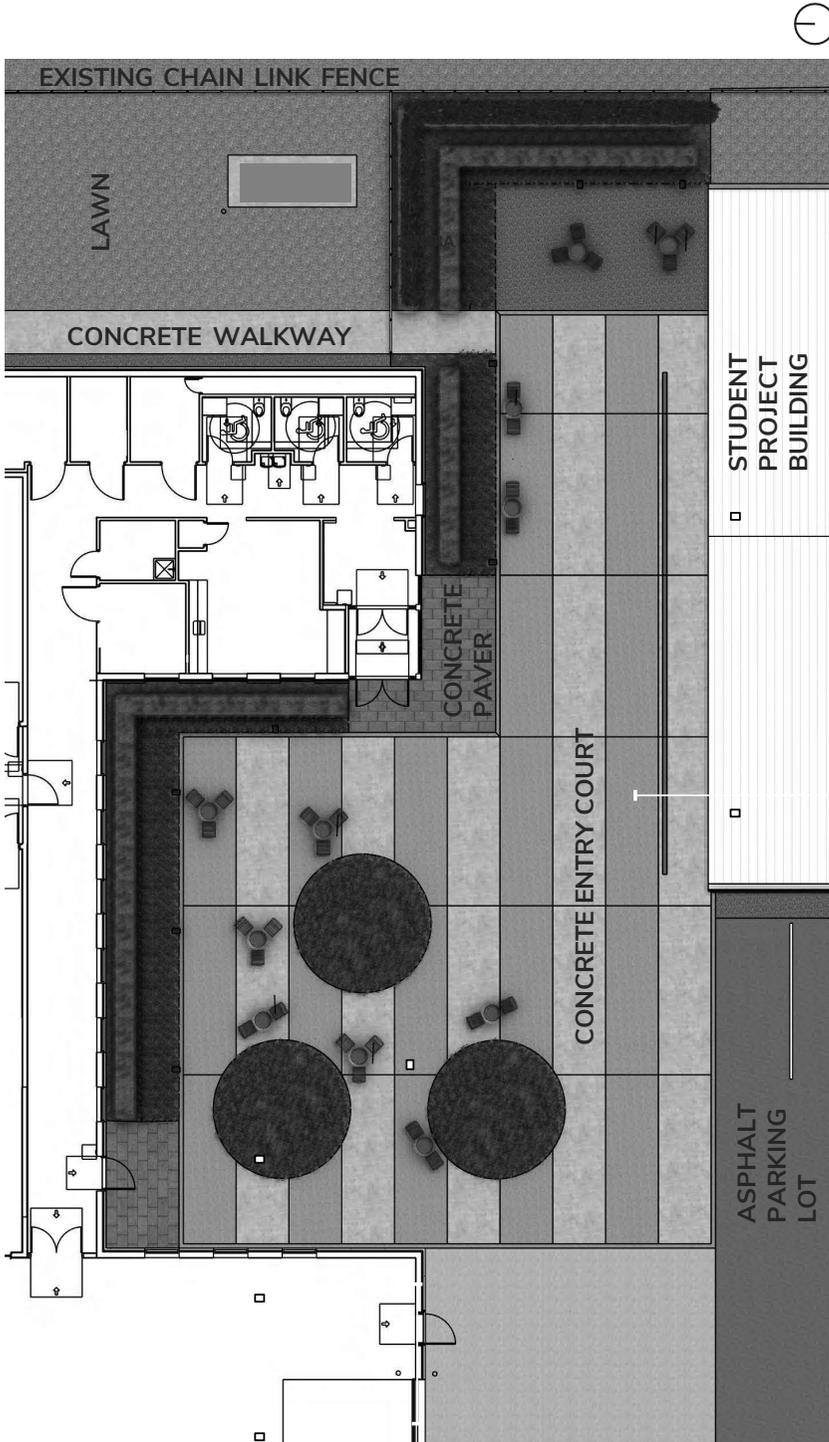
Site Location

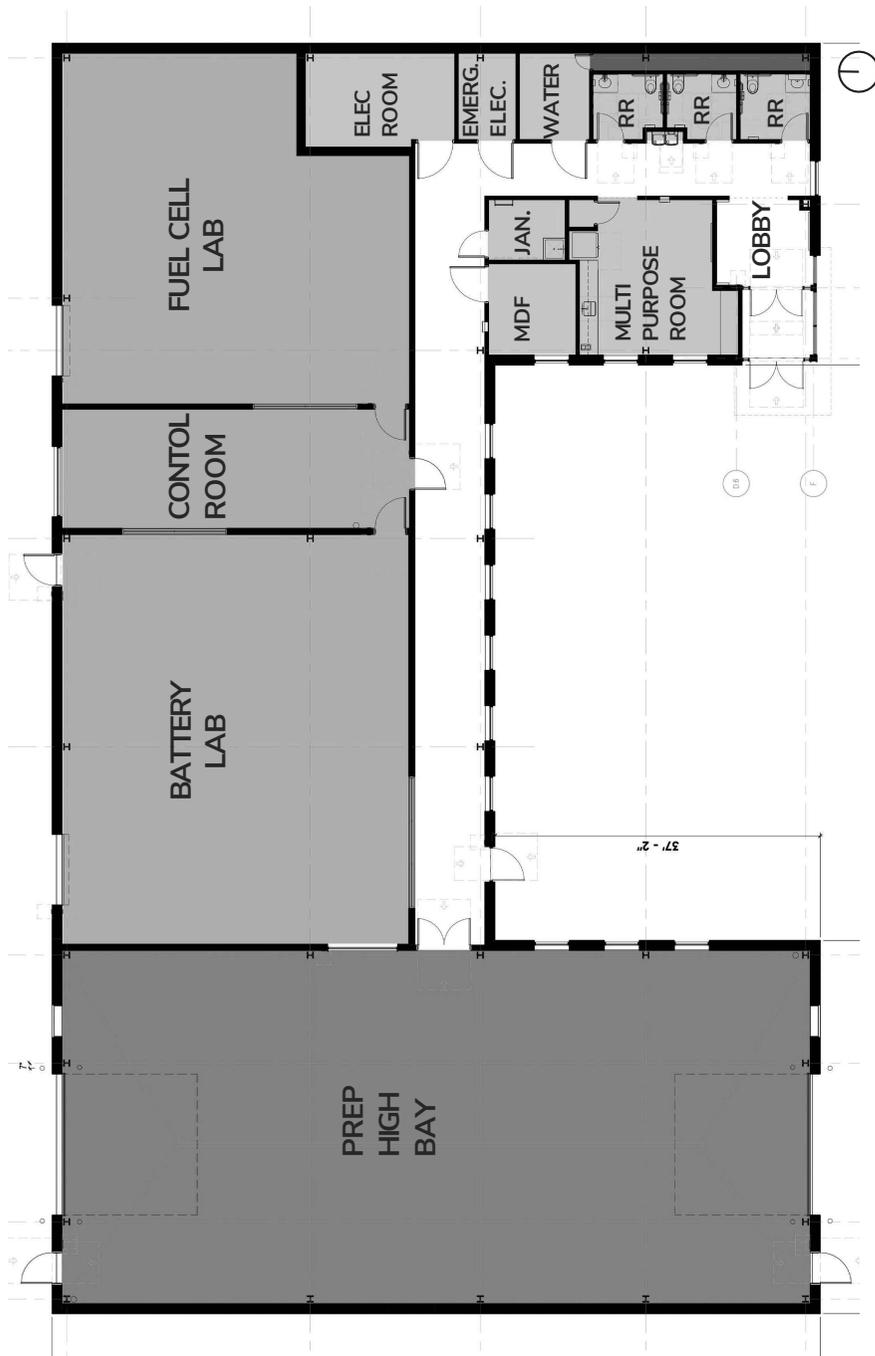


Proposed Plan

EXECUTIVE SESSION

The Finance and Investment Committee of The Ohio State University Board of Trustees convened on Wednesday, February 12, 2025, in person at Longaberger Alumni House on Ohio State's Columbus campus. Committee Chair Tomislav Mitevski called the meeting to order at 1:58 p.m.

It was moved by Mr. Mitevski and seconded by Mr. Bigby that the committee recess into executive session to consider business-sensitive trade secrets required to be kept confidential by federal and state statutes and to consult with legal counsel regarding pending or imminent litigation.

A roll-call vote was taken, and the committee voted to go into executive session with the following members present and voting: Mr. Mitevski, Mr. Bigby, Mr. Kiggin, Mr. Kerner, Mr. Stahl and Mr. Zeiger. Mr. Heminger, Mr. Skestos and Ms. Chronis were not present for this vote.

The committee entered into executive session at 2:00 p.m. and reconvened in public session at 4:06 p.m.

PUBLIC SESSION

Items for Discussion:

1. University Financial Scorecards: Senior Vice President and Chief Financial Officer Michael Papadakis, Vice President of Operations and Deputy Chief Financial Officer Kristine Devine, and Wexner Medical Center Co-Leader of Financial Services Bryan Pyles reviewed financial scorecards for the consolidated enterprise, the university and the Wexner Medical Center for the second quarter of the fiscal year. They highlighted areas for continued monitoring.

Overall, it was a very strong second quarter of FY25 and a great first six months of the fiscal year. Primary drivers of revenue growth at the university were increases in healthcare revenues, fundraising enrollment and grant funding. Enrollment growth has also increased costs, though the university's net position is ahead of plan. At the medical center and Ohio State University Physicians, sources and net position are ahead of plan despite fewer patient discharges and surgeries than expected.

Synopsis: Authorization to establish a new affiliate for a university-owned captive insurance company (hereafter "Great River Insurance, LLC") in the state of Vermont is recommended.

WHEREAS the Board of Trustees adopted the Policy on Affiliated Entities in June 2008 to provide a uniform framework for the establishment and operation of separate entities that are closely affiliated with The Ohio State University (hereinafter "Ohio State" and/or "University"), ensure that such entities serve the best interests of the University, and provide for continuing appropriate oversight by the University and the Board;

WHEREAS the establishment of Great River Insurance, LLC is necessary to manage and mitigate risks, enhance cost-efficiency, and improve the overall control of the insurance program and process for the university.

WHEREAS Great River Insurance, LLC objectives are to: 1) reduce the cost of insurance and create a more tailored risk management strategy; 2) improve cash flow by retaining underwriting profits and investment income within the university; 3) provide custom insurance coverage for risks that are difficult or expensive to insure in the traditional market; 4) stabilize insurance premium pricing over time and reduce reliance on commercial insurers; and 5) gain better control over coverage design, the claims handling process, and loss prevention initiatives.

WHEREAS as Great River Insurance, LLC will require structure and therefore the university will serve as sole owner of the captive and establish governance to include a board of directors with representatives from the university and industry experts. The entity will be a single captive (pure captive) domiciled in Vermont; appropriately capitalized based on regulatory requirements and anticipated risk exposure; and will adhere to all university regulatory reporting requirements.

WHEREAS Great River Insurance, LLC will comply with all applicable regulations in its chosen domicile including securing the license to operate as an insurer and ensuring that capital and surplus requirements are met to maintain solvency standards; and

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Trustees hereby authorizes the establishment of the affiliated entity, Great River Insurance, LLC, and authorizes and directs the President and/or Senior Vice President for Business and Finance, in consultation with other University officials as appropriate, to perform such actions and execute such documents as may be necessary or desirable to effect the establishment of this entity; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That, in accordance with the Policy on Affiliated Entities, the Senior Vice President for Business and Finance is hereby designated as the senior University official charged with oversight of this entity and that Great River Insurance, LLC shall report periodically to the University and Board of Trustees through the designated senior oversight official; and

TOPIC: Fiscal Year 2025 Interim Financial Report – December 31, 2024

CONTEXT: The purpose of this report is to provide an update of financial results for the six months ending December 31, 2024.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

The university's overall financial position remains strong. Operating revenues increased \$449 million in the first six months of fiscal year 2025 compared to the first six months of fiscal year 2024, driven primarily by strong growth in healthcare revenues. Specific impacts include:

- A \$376 million increase in healthcare revenues, driven primarily by growth in outpatient volumes.
- A \$40 million increase in gift revenues, driven primarily by a \$23 million increase in current-use gifts
- A \$21 million decrease in auxiliary revenues, primarily due to fewer stadium shows for Schottenstein Center in the first six months of fiscal year 2025 compared to the first six months of fiscal year 2024.
- A \$36 million increase in grants and contracts, primarily due to increases in federal grants of \$7 million, private grants of \$16 million and state grants of \$12 million.
- A \$32 million increase in net student tuition, due primarily to increases in enrollment and resident and non-resident rate increases.

The year-to-date increase in net position was \$505 million, an \$87 million increase compared to the prior year. The \$87 million increase relates primarily to a \$57 million reduction in net operating loss and the \$40 million increase in total gift revenues. The reduction in net operating loss primarily reflects increases in healthcare revenues, which outpaced increases in healthcare expenses. Healthcare margins, excluding endowment distributions, depreciation and interest, increased \$55 million over the prior year.

Revenues

Student tuition and fees, net - increased \$32 million or 6%, to \$588 million for the first six months of fiscal year 2025 compared to the first six months of fiscal year 2024, due primarily to an increase in gross tuition and other student fees of \$53 million, offset by an increase in scholarship allowances of \$21 million. The increase in gross tuition revenue is primarily driven by both increases in enrollment and rate increases in instructional and non-resident surcharges. Overall university autumn enrollments increased 2.3%. New freshmen enrollment (all campuses) increased 15%. Instructional and general fees increased 3% for undergraduates in the AU24 Tuition Guarantee Group and 3% for graduate students. Non-resident fees increased 5% for undergraduates and 4% for graduate students.

Grants and contracts – increased \$36 million in the first six months of fiscal year 2025 compared to the first six months of fiscal year 2024 due primarily to increases in federal grants of \$7 million, private grants of \$16 million and state grants of \$12 million. The increases in federal grants and contracts relate primarily to increases from the National Institutes of Health, Department of Transportation and Department of Defense.

Gifts – increased \$40 million over the prior year, reflecting increases in current use gifts (up \$23 million), capital gifts (up \$4 million) and endowment gifts (up \$12 million).

Sales and services of auxiliary enterprises - decreased \$21 million over the prior year due primarily to a \$38 million decrease in Schottenstein Center revenue due to fewer stadium shows in fiscal year 2025. This decrease was partially offset by a \$16 million increase in Athletics revenues, primarily due to eight home football games in FY2025 compared to six home games in FY2024.

Sales and services of the OSU Health System and OSU Physicians, Inc. - increased \$376 million to \$3,239 million. Health System revenues increased \$324 million, driven by growth in outpatient volumes. Total surgical volumes grew over the prior year by 6.1% with outpatient surgeries exceeding budget by 2.7% and the prior year by 10.6%. Additionally, chemotherapy, outpatient infusion, radiology, and procedural volumes contributed to the strong results. OSU Physicians revenues increased \$52 million due to continued investment in primary care and community outreach services, growth of specialty services, expansion in regional outpatient clinics, and increased surgical capacity with the expansion of operating hours and investment in community anesthesia providers.

Expenses

University – expenses increased \$59 million to \$1,942 million in the first six months of fiscal year 2025. Salaries increased \$58 million, or 7%, primarily due to a 3.5% increase in faculty and staff salary guidelines and additional investments in human capital related to strategic investments in academic excellence and research and to address market wage pressures. Benefits increased \$11 million, primarily due to increases in salary guidelines and composite benefit rates. Supplies and services decreased \$7 million, primarily due to decreases in utility expenses. Depreciation increased \$12 million compared to the prior year primarily due to new assets being placed in service and interest expense increased by \$2 million.

OSU Health System and OSU Physicians – expenses, including depreciation and interest expense, increased \$337 million to \$3,129 million in the first six months of fiscal year 2025. The Health System continues to focus on throughput, workforce retention and recruiting. The Health System's expense and labor management was strong and in line with volumes for the first six months of FY2025. OSU Physicians increased \$53 million, primarily due to higher provider expenses associated with investment in patient care services growth and access improvement.

Auxiliary – expenses increased \$3 million to \$261 million in the first six months of fiscal year 2025. The increase primarily reflects increases in Student Life Housing and Dining and Athletics expenses, offset by decreases in Schottenstein Center expenses due to fewer stadium shows.

Cash and Investments

For the six months ending December 31, 2024, total university cash and investments increased \$561 million to \$12,079 million compared to June 30, 2024, primarily due to increases in temporary investments of \$418 million and increases in Long-Term Investment Pool of \$199 million, offset by decreases in unexpended bond proceeds of \$56 million. Additional details for the Long-Term Investment Pool and temporary investments are provided below.

Long-Term Investment Pool and Temporary Investments

For the six months ending December 31, 2024, the fair value of the university's Long-Term Investment Pool increased by \$199 million to \$8,131 million. Changes in total valuation compared to the prior year are summarized below:

Net principal additions include new endowment gifts (\$47.2 million), reinvestment of unused endowment distributions (\$9.5 million), and other net transfers of university monies (-\$0.3 million). Change in fair value includes realized gains (losses) on the sale of investment assets and unrealized gains (losses) associated with assets held in the pool on December 31, 2024. Income earned includes interest and dividends and is used primarily to help fund distributions. Expenses include investment management expenses (\$41.6 million), University Development related expenses (\$29.9 million), and other administrative-related expenses (\$0.3 million).

LTIIP Investment Returns

For the six months ending December 31, 2024, the LTIIP earned a return, net of investment fees, of 4.19%. The comparable six months ending December 31, 2023 saw a net investment return of 4.72%.

Temporary Investments

For the six months ending December 31, 2024, the Tier 1 Investments (0-1 Year maturity) earned a return of 2.67%, outperforming the Bank of America ML 90-day T-Bill (2.53%) by 0.14%. Tier 2 Investments (1-5 Year maturity) earned 3.08%, outperforming the blended benchmark of ICE Bofa US Corp & Govt 1-3 Years, BBG US Govt/Credit 1-5 Years, and ICE Bofa 6m US Treasury Bill (2.71%) by 0.37%.

For the comparable six months ending December 31, 2023, the Tier 1 Investments earned a return of 2.85%. Tier 2 Investments returned 4.03% for the same time period.

Other Assets and Liabilities

Accounts receivable increased \$104 million, primarily due to increases of \$89 million in tuition and student-related fee receivables and \$16 million in housing & dining receivables for spring semester. Prepaid expenses increased \$249 million, primarily due to scholarships and fee authorizations for graduate associates, which are recognized as expenses over the course of the semester. Deposits and advance payments for goods and services were up \$672 million, primarily due to increases of \$615 million for tuition and fees and \$109 million in Student Life Housing and Dining receipts for spring semester. These amounts will be recognized as earned over the course of the semester. These increases were offset by a decrease of \$40 million in advance payments for Athletics and Business Advancement.

Debt

On September 4, 2024, the university issued \$64 million of tax-exempt fixed-rate General Receipts Refunding Bonds, Series 2024A. The Series 2024A Bonds are structured with serial maturities due in 2025 through 2039. The interest rate coupons on the Series 2024A Bonds are 5.00%. The proceeds of the 2024A Bonds were used to refund certain maturities of the outstanding General Receipt Bonds, Series 2014A and to pay the cost of issuance of the 2024A Bonds.

Cash Flows

University cash and cash equivalents decreased \$52 million in the first six months of fiscal year 2025. Net cash provided by operating activities was \$171 million, compared to net cash used by operating activities of \$256 million in the first six months of the prior year. The increase in net operating cash flows relates primarily to increases in receipts from sales and services and tuition, partially offset by payments made to employees and vendors. Net cash provided by noncapital financing activities was \$503 million in the first six months of fiscal year 2025, compared to \$449 million for the prior year. The increase is due primarily to increases in gift receipts and non-exchange grant receipts. Net cash used by capital financing activities was \$542 million in the first six months of fiscal year 2025 due primarily to capital expenditures. Net cash used by investing activities was \$184 million, primarily due to purchases of investments.

Smathers Designated Professor at the Moritz Entrepreneurial Business Law Clinic

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University shall establish the Smathers Designated Professor at the Moritz Entrepreneurial Business Law Clinic effective February 20, 2025, with gifts from Steven Edward Smathers (BS 1972, JD 1976).

This fund supports a professorship position for the Entrepreneurial Business Law Clinic in the Michael E. Moritz College of Law. If full annual funding is not reached or if the position is vacant, the fund may be used to support faculty in the Entrepreneurial Business Law Clinic. This designated professorship shall cease to exist when annual funding ends; however, the position may be renewed for an additional five-year period if an additional commitment at the then current minimum required for a designated professorship is met.

Modifications to endowed funds shall be approved by the University's Board of Trustees, in accordance with the policies of the University.

Dr. William L. MacDonald Scholarship Fund for the Newark Campus

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University shall establish the Dr. William L. MacDonald Scholarship Fund for the Newark Campus effective February 20, 2025, with gifts from friends and colleagues of Dr. William L. MacDonald.

The annual distribution from this fund provides one or more scholarships to students who are attending The Ohio State University at Newark. Scholarship recipients, the number of recipients, and amount of each scholarship shall be determined in accordance with the then current guidelines and procedures for scholarship administration established by Ohio State Newark, in consultation with Student Financial Aid.

The University may modify any criteria used to select scholarship recipients should the criteria be found, in whole or in part, to be contrary to federal or state law or University policy.

The highest ranking official at The Ohio State University at Newark or his/her designee has the discretion to hold all or a portion of the unused distribution in the distribution fund to be used in subsequent years, and/or reinvest all or a portion of the unused distribution in the endowment principal.

The annual distribution from this fund provides one or more scholarships to undergraduate students who demonstrate financial need. First preference shall be given to candidates who volunteered or interned at Columbus Suicide Prevention Services (or successor). Second preference shall be given to candidates who volunteered with any suicide prevention service. If no students meet the above two preferences, additional preference shall be given to any undergraduate students who are enrolled in the College of Social Work.

Preferences shall not be considered restrictions and shall not prohibit the University from awarding this scholarship in years where no students meeting the preference criteria stated above can be identified.

- Graduated from a high school in the state of West Virginia
- Graduated from a high school in Seneca County, Ohio
- Graduated from a high school in the state of Ohio

If no students meet the selection criteria, the scholarship(s) will be open to all DVM students who demonstrate an interest in large or mixed animal practice. Scholarships may be renewable as long as recipients remain in good academic standing. Scholarship recipients, the number of recipients, and amount of each scholarship shall be determined in accordance with the then current guidelines and procedures for scholarship administration established by the college, in consultation with Student Financial Aid.

The University may modify any criteria used to select scholarship recipients should the criteria be found, in whole or in part, to be contrary to federal or state law or University policy.

The highest ranking official in the College of Veterinary Medicine or his/her designee has the discretion to hold all or a portion of the unused distribution in the distribution fund to be used in subsequent years, and/or reinvest all or a portion of the unused distribution in the endowment principal.

The Thomas H. and Elizabeth B. Timmer Distinguished Visitor will be invited to interact with the Food Industries Center Board of Directors or subsequent group that involves this board.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of Trustees. As authorized by the Board of Trustees, a fee may be assessed against the endowment portfolio for the University's costs of development and fund management.

Scholarship recipients shall be selected by the dean of the Moritz College of Law, in consultation with the Moritz College's Office of Student Financial Aid.

The T. R. Lakshmanan and Lata R. Chatterjee Graduate Scholar in Geography Endowment Fund

His expertise has been widely sought around the world, and in the academic and policy communities concerned with urban and regional development, transportation, and energy/environmental issues. Lata Chatterjee (Ph.D. 1973 - Johns Hopkins) is internationally known for her work on housing analysis and policy, urban and regional development, economic analysis of vulnerability and poverty issues in the developing world including environmental issues, gender, and local governance. The T. R. Lakshmanan and Lata R. Chatterjee Graduate Scholar in Geography Endowment Fund is an ongoing recognition of their life's work in regional development, bettering the lives of many, and addressing issues of the Global South; in honor of all they have given and accomplished and an opportunity to amplify it through others.

The annual distribution from this fund shall be used to recognize a distinguished PhD student in the Department of Geography who is carrying out research on the Global South focused on issues of benefit to humanity; and demonstrating professional promise. Chatterjee Graduate Scholar will make a significant difference in the professional development of the student and in the visibility of the Department of Geography.

Martin served as the College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences' associate dean for academic programs from 2007-2017 and provided leadership for various programs throughout the college. She had a passion for making a difference in the lives of students and embraced the longstanding commitment of the college to put "students first." During her time as associate dean, Dr. Martin recognized the contribution of the college's Ambassador Team to the success of the college and remained dedicated to their personal, professional and academic growth. This endowment is meant to foster the personal growth, academic enrichment and professional success of the ambassadors who represent their respective academic departments, the college, and the university throughout the State of Ohio and across the country. Additionally, in 2010 Dr. Martin was appointed as the Sanford G Price & Isabelle P. Barbee Endowed Chair for Teaching, Advising & Learning and in 2014, she was appointed the director of the University's Second-year Transformational Experience Program (STEP) for the Office of Academic Affairs, where she focused on both student engagement and development to enhance second-year success.

The annual distribution from this fund shall be used to support the personal, professional, and academic growth of the College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences' Ambassador Team and/or provide recognition for contributions of individual Ambassadors to the success of the college. Proceeds should be used to advance the efforts of the college's Ambassador Program and should not be distributed as individual scholarships. Expenditures shall be approved by the associate dean for academic programs of the college or his/her designee. If the college's Ambassador Program ceases to exist, the proceeds will support a similar purpose at the discretion of the associate dean for academic programs of the college or his/her designee.

In any given year that the endowment distribution is not fully used for its intended purpose, the unused portion will be reinvested in the endowment principal.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of Trustees. As authorized by the Board of Trustees, a fee may be assessed against the endowment portfolio for the University's costs of development and fund management.

It is the desire of the donor that the endowment established herein should benefit the University in perpetuity. The Honorable William M. McCulloch Diversity Scholarship

The Honorable William M. McCulloch Diversity Scholarship was established January 29, 2016, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, in accordance with the guidelines approved by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Foundation, with a gift from an anonymous donor. Effective February 20, 2025, the fund description shall be revised.

The annual distribution from this fund shall be used to provide scholarships. First-time recipients shall be outstanding students enrolled in the Michael E. Moritz College of Law. It is the desire of the donor that the scholarships be awarded to students with a demonstrated commitment to fostering greater access to justice in society, particularly for populations underserved by the legal profession or otherwise marginalized who demonstrate financial need. Scholarship recipients shall be selected by the college's scholarship committee, in consultation with Student Financial Aid.

Scholarships are portable if the recipients change campuses, transferable if they change major, and renewable for up to eight semesters, even if the semesters are non-consecutive, as long as the student remains in good standing with the University. This fund is included in the Ohio Scholarship Challenge. The University will match annual distribution payouts in perpetuity. The transfer of matching funds will occur once annually, usually in July. Under the Challenge, unused annual distribution cannot be reinvested in the fund's principal.

The University may modify any criteria used to select scholarship recipients should the criteria be found, in whole or in part, to be contrary to federal or state law or University policy.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of Trustees. As authorized by the Board of Trustees, a fee may be assessed against the endowment portfolio for the University's costs of development and fund management.

It is the desire of the donor that the endowment established herein should benefit the University in perpetuity. The University and the Foundation reserve the right to modify the purposes of this fund, however, (1) in consultation with the donor named above, or (2) if such purposes become unlawful, impracticable, impossible to achieve, or wasteful, provided that such fund shall only be used for the University's charitable purposes. In seeking such modification, the University and the Foundation shall consult the dean of the Michael E. Moritz College of Law or his/her designee. Modifications to endowed funds shall be approved by the University's Board of Trustees and the Foundation's Board of Directors, in accordance with the policies of the University and Foundation.

The Rosemary McCullough and Barbara Rich Endowed Scholarship Fund

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, in accordance with the guidelines approved by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Foundation, established The Rosemary McCullough and Barbara Rich Endowed Scholarship Fund effective August 30, 2019, with gifts from John M. Jackson (JD 1993). Effective February 20, 2025, the fund description shall be revised.

The annual distribution from this fund provides one or more scholarships to students who are enrolled in the Michael E. Moritz College of Law. It is the donor's desire that the scholarships be awarded to students who attended Miami University for their undergraduate degree consistent with the college's commitment to increasing the access to legal education for students from all backgrounds. Students that were Pell eligible during their undergraduate education, are United States citizens or an eligible non-citizen, and demonstrate financial need as determined by FAFSA are eligible to be considered for an Access Scholarship. Factors may also include status as a first-generation college student, parental income at high school graduation, or extraordinary financial hardship. If no candidates are identified, it is the donor's desire for the scholarships to be awarded to students graduating from the Columbus City School system in Columbus, Ohio. Recipients will be selected by the dean of the college or his/her designee, in consultation with Student Financial Aid.

The University may modify any criteria used to select scholarship recipients should the criteria be found, in whole or in part, to be contrary to federal or state law or University policy.

The highest ranking official in the Michael E. Moritz College of Law or his/her designee has the discretion to hold all or a portion of the unused distribution in the distribution fund to be used in subsequent years, and/or reinvest all or a portion of the unused distribution in the endowment principal.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of Trustees. As authorized by the Board of Trustees, a fee may be assessed against the endowment portfolio for the University's costs of development and fund management.

Scholarship recipients, the number of recipients, and amount of each scholarship shall be determined in accordance with the then current guidelines and procedures for scholarship administration established by the College of Medicine, in consultation with Student Financial Aid.

In any given year that the endowment distribution is not fully used for its intended purpose, the unused portion should be reinvested in the endowment principal.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of Trustees. As authorized by the Board of Trustees, a fee may be assessed against the endowment portfolio for the University's costs of development and fund management.

It is the desire of the donor that the endowment established herein should benefit the University in perpetuity. Dr. Lisa Palermo Edwards & Dr. James Palermo Memorial Fund for Periodontology

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, in accordance with the guidelines approved by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Foundation, established the Dr. Lisa Palermo Edwards Memorial Fund & Dr. James Palermo Honorary Fund for Periodontology effective May 18, 2023, with gifts from Patricia A. Palermo (BS 1963) and family and friends. Effective February 20, 2025, the fund name was revised to reflect the passing of Dr. James Palermo.

The annual distribution from this fund supports residents in the periodontology program. Expenditures shall be approved in accordance with the then current guidelines and procedures established by the College of Dentistry. The highest ranking official in the college or his/her designee has the discretion to hold all or a portion of the unused distribution in the distribution fund to be used in subsequent years, and/or reinvest all or a portion of the unused distribution in the endowment principal.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of Trustees. Scholarship recipients, the number of recipients, and amount of each scholarship shall be determined in accordance with the then current guidelines and procedures for scholarship administration established by Student Financial Aid.

The University may modify any criteria used to select scholarship recipients should the criteria be found, in whole or in part, to be contrary to federal or state law or University policy.

The highest ranking official in Student Financial Aid or his/her designee has the discretion to hold all or a portion of the unused distribution in the distribution fund to be used in subsequent years, and/or reinvest all or a portion of the unused distribution in the endowment principal.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of Trustees. As authorized by the Board of Trustees, a fee may be assessed against the endowment portfolio for the University's costs of development and fund management.

Scholarship recipients, the number of recipients, and amount of each scholarship shall be determined in accordance with the then current guidelines and procedures for scholarship administration established by the college, in consultation with Student Financial Aid.

The University may modify any criteria used to select scholarship recipients should the criteria be found, in whole or in part, to be contrary to federal or state law or University policy.

The highest ranking official in the Michael E. Moritz College of Law or his/her designee has the discretion to hold all or a portion of the unused distribution in the distribution fund to be used in subsequent years, and/or reinvest all or a portion of the unused distribution in the endowment principal.

PUBLIC SESSION

The Athletics Committee of The Ohio State University Board of Trustees convened on Monday, February 17, 2025, in person at Longaberger Alumni House on Ohio State's Columbus campus. Committee Chair Gary Heminger called the meeting to order at 2:29 p.m.

Mr. Heminger started the meeting by congratulating Mr. Ross Bjork, Mr. Ryan Day and the Ohio State football team on its recent national championship victory. Mr. Bjork and Mr. Day thanked the Board for its support over the past season and particularly during this period of massive change in college football. Mr. Day also noted the team's significant academic success, including a perfect Academic Progress Rate score, which is tied for best in the country.

Item for Discussion:

1. Athletics Director's Report: Mr. Bjork noted that the Ohio State Department of Athletics currently has 24 sports in season. He also detailed preparations in Ohio Stadium for the upcoming National Hockey League "Stadium Series" game on March 1 between the Columbus Blue Jackets and the Detroit Red Wings.

Mr. Bjork reinforced Mr. Day's comments on academic success, noting that the cumulative and collective grade-point average of Ohio State student-athletes is 3.368, one of the highest on record. He then outlined areas of focus for the department, including implementation of the *House* settlement, governance work across the NCAA and the need for federal legislation to create uniform rules nationwide. He closed his report by noting the value of the Buckeyes' College Football Playoff appearances. The department estimates that the playoff generated approximately \$17 million in media exposure, social media engagement and brand awareness.

Item for Action:

2. Approval of Minutes: No changes were requested to the November 18, 2024, meeting minutes; therefore, a formal vote was not required, and the minutes were considered approved.

PUBLIC SESSION

The Wexner Medical Center Board convened for its 53rd meeting on Tuesday, February 18, 2025, in person at Longaberger Alumni House on Ohio State's Columbus campus. Board Secretary Jessica A. Eveland called the meeting to order at 2:08 p.m.

At the beginning of the meeting, Mr. Robert Schottenstein welcomed Executive Vice President and Provost Ravi Bellamkonda to the university and Wexner Medical Center Board, noting how excited he and other Board members are to work with him.

Item for Action:

1. **Approval of Minutes:** No changes were requested to the November 19, 2024, meeting minutes; therefore, a formal vote was not required, and the minutes were considered approved.

Items for Discussion:

2. **Chief Executive Officer's Report:** Dr. John Warner, chief executive officer, Wexner Medical Center, first reflected on the great work being done by the heart and vascular team at the medical center. November marked the 20th anniversary of the Richard M. Ross Heart Hospital which, when it opened, was the first academic hospital in the nation dedicated to comprehensive cardiovascular care. Over the past year, the hospital hosted nearly 25,000 new outpatient visits and almost 7,000 new inpatient visits — both figures representing strong increases over the prior year. The past year has also seen new partnerships and services.

Dr. Warner then shared an update on the Wexner Medical Center's partnership with Helix to help accelerate the integration of genomic data into research and decision-making. In collaboration with other academic institutions, the initiative will provide no-cost genetic screenings to 100,000 individuals to identify risk factors and inform preventative measures for certain conditions. It will eventually make it easier to develop personalized health plans for patients. He illustrated the value of these efforts with the story of the Smith family, who is affected by a rare aortic dissection condition.



THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY

Dr. Warner updated the Board on progress within the SOAR study, noting that Ohio State has exceeded its target number of completed wellness surveys from across the state and is well over halfway to meeting its goal of enrolling brain-health phenotyping participants. He also discussed the early work of a new mobile MRI unit and its contributions to the SOAR study.

Finally, Dr. Warner recognized Dr. Sylvester Black and Dr. Kymberly Gowdy, both recipients of the Presidential Early Career Award for Scientists and Engineers, and highlighted the 20-person living kidney transplant chain completed at Ohio State in December.

- 3. James Cancer Hospital Report: Dr. David Cohn, interim chief executive officer and chief medical officer, James Cancer Hospital and Solove Research Institute shared an update on the institution's work to renew its designation by the National Cancer Institute as a Comprehensive Cancer Center. He also briefed the Board on The James' new outpatient bone marrow transplant program. This is one example of a broader effort to expand access to, and the reach of, Ohio State's exceptional cancer care — from more robust pre-diagnosis options and outpatient treatments to new partnerships and expanded in-patient capacity in the new hospital tower currently under construction. He closed by noting that registration for Pelotonia 2025 begins in March.

Background

In February 2024, The Ohio State University (OSU) received Board approval to enter into a contract to dispose of approximately 23.50 acres of land (Resolution #2024-88). All parcels are situated along and near West Dublin Granville Road and located north of the Don Scott Airport.

In May 2024, the university entered into a sale contract with NRP Properties LLC (Buyer) for disposition of the above noted acreage located at 3455 West Dublin Granville Road. The property described in the original sale contract is shown in Exhibit A. Expected income from the sale was estimated at \$7,285,000 (\$310,000 per acre less project expenses).

As a result of the Buyer's due diligence process, wetlands were discovered on the portion of the for-sale parcels that is heavily wooded (parcels 010-159028 and 010-128886), which represent approximately 9.5 acres of the current for sale premises. The Buyer determined the extent of the wetlands present in the wooded area were of such significance that it would be prohibitively expensive to develop.

To achieve highest and best use of the assets, the university seeks Board approval to reconfigure the previously approved site and enter into a contract for the sale of acres of land of equivalent size (approximately 23.50) as shown in Exhibit B. All parcels are situated along and near West Dublin Granville Road and located north of the Don Scott Airport. Expected income from the sale is estimated to remain at \$7,285,000 (\$310,000 per acre less project expenses). Disposition of the property aligns with the university's land asset management goals of strategic divestment and investment of properties to optimize real estate holdings in support of current and future needs.

Location and Description

The subject property consists of approximately 23.50 acres of vacant ground situated along and near West Dublin Granville Road, Columbus, Ohio north of the Don Scott Airport. The property will include all of parcels 010-158972 and 010-228184 and portions of parcels 010-158960 and 010-158961.

Property History

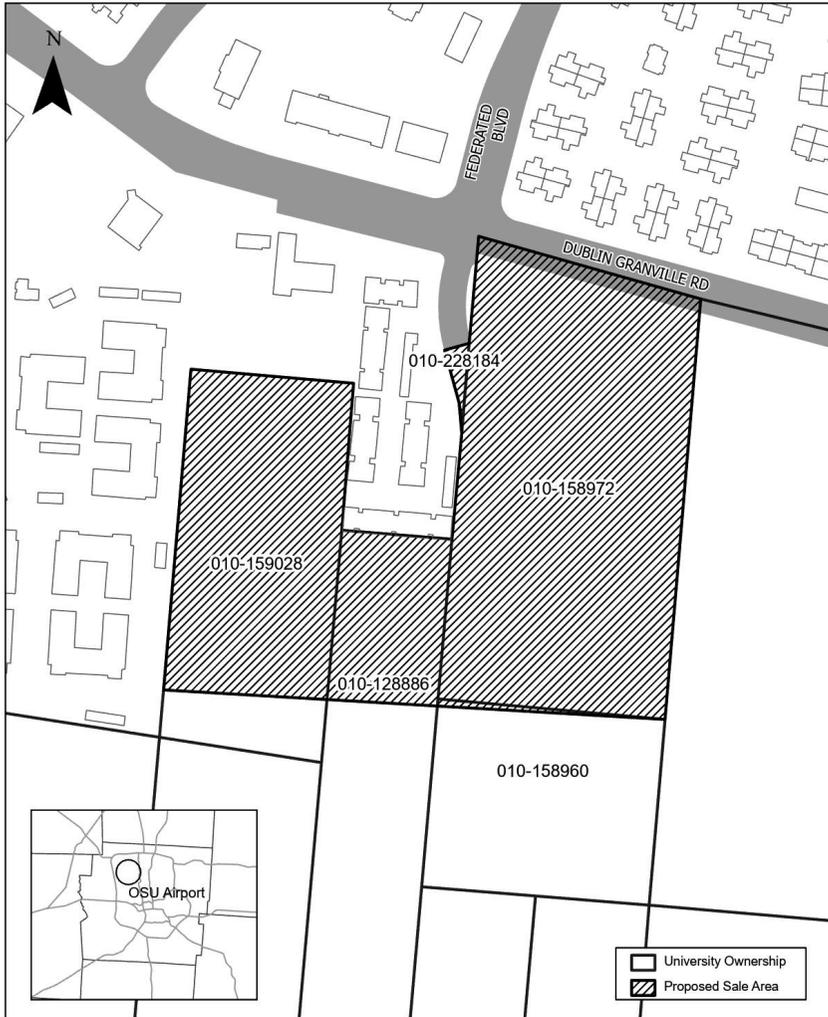
The university acquired the subject property from various owners between 1965 to 1994. All parcels are titled to The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University. The land has historically been farmed by the university.

The properties have been broadly marketed through an independent broker and vetted to ensure a fair and equitable process. Having received a number of competitive proposals favorably aligned with appraised values, the university seeks authorization to finalize a sale contract with a purchaser selected from among the bidders.

Sale of Property

Planning, Architecture and Real Estate recommends that the above referenced property be sold under terms and conditions that are deemed to be in the best interest of the university and at a sale price at or above the appraised value.

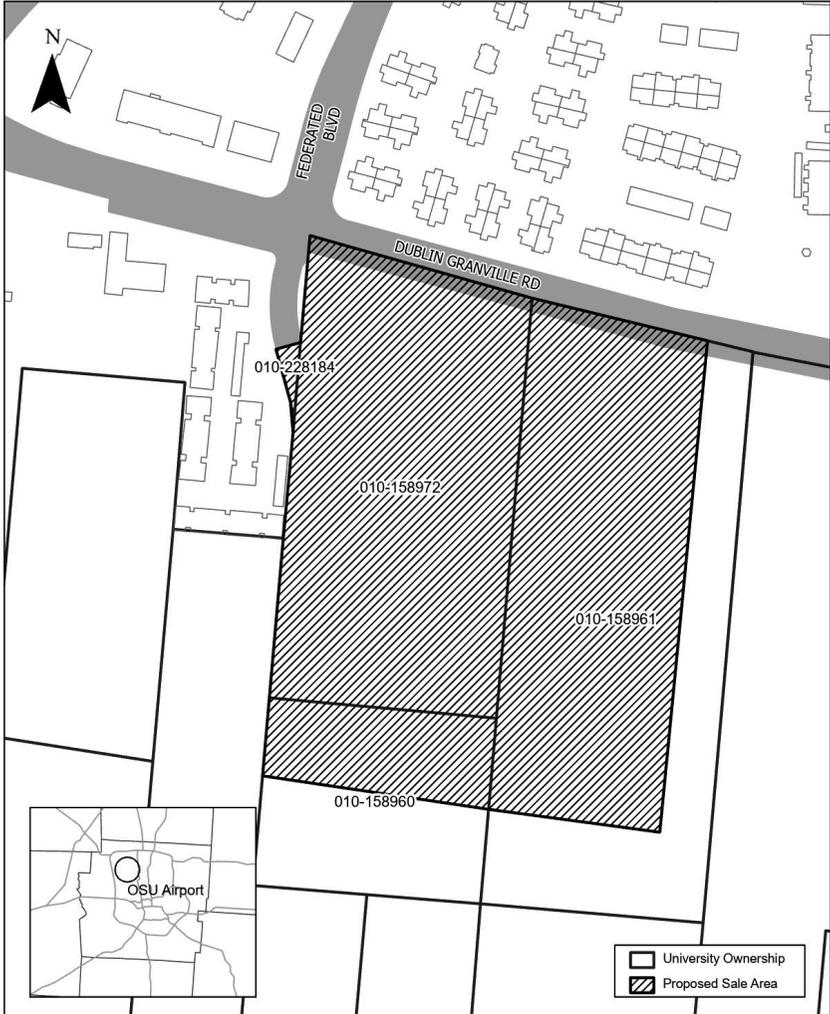

BACKGROUND

TOPIC: AUTHORIZATION FOR ESTABLISHMENT OF A NEW UNIVERSITY AFFILIATE GREAT RIVER INSURANCE, LLC

CONTEXT: The captive insurance market has seen continuous growth, particularly due to increasing commercial insurance premiums, reduction in coverage and capacity, regulatory improvements, and the rising demand for better risk management. Captives are utilized across numerous industries, including higher education, healthcare, construction, manufacturing, retail, and financial services. The establishment of a captive insurance company is necessary to manage and mitigate risks, enhance cost-efficiency, and improve the overall control of the insurance program and process for the university. The captive will insure the risks of the university, subsidiaries, or affiliated entities.

Objectives

The primary objectives of the captive insurance company are:

- **Risk Management:** To reduce the cost of insurance and create a more tailored risk management strategy.
- **Cost Efficiency:** To improve cash flow by retaining underwriting profits and investment income within the organization.
- **Custom Coverage:** To provide custom insurance coverage for risks that are difficult or expensive to insure in the traditional market.
- **Stabilized Pricing:** To stabilize insurance premium pricing over time and reduce reliance on commercial insurers.
- **Increased Control:** To gain better control over coverage design, the claims handling process, and loss prevention initiatives.

Structure

The proposed structure of the captive insurance company includes the following elements:

- **Parent Company:** The university will be the sole owner of the captive.
- **Type of Captive:** The entity will be a single-parent captive (pure captive).
- **Domicile:** The captive will be domiciled in Vermont, which offers favorable regulatory, tax, and capital requirements.
- **Initial Capitalization:** The captive will be appropriately capitalized based on regulatory requirements and anticipated risk exposure.

Legal and Regulatory Framework

The captive will comply with all applicable regulations in its chosen domicile. Key considerations include:

- **Licensing:** Securing a license to operate as an insurer in the selected jurisdiction.
- **Solvency Requirements:** Ensuring that capital and surplus requirements are met to maintain solvency standards.
- **Governance:** Establishing a board of directors that includes representatives from the university and industry experts.

- **Reporting and Compliance:** Adhering to university and regulatory reporting standards, including annual audits, actuarial reports, and financial statements.

Risk Management Strategy

The captive will employ a comprehensive risk management strategy that focuses on:

- **Underwriting:** The captive will assume risks that the parent company and affiliated entities currently retain or insure through commercial carriers. Initially, it will cover standard risks such as general liability, automobile liability, professional liability, educators' legal liability, incidental medical malpractice liability, and student practicum liability.
- **Loss Control:** Continual implementation of robust loss control and prevention programs across the insured entities to minimize claims.
- **Reinsurance:** The captive will initially transfer all risk through reinsurance agreements to protect against catastrophic losses. This will help in maintaining solvency and preserving the capital base.

Risk Assessment and Mitigation

Key risks associated with forming a captive include insufficient capital to cover claims, regulatory issues, and improper risk management. Mitigation strategies include:

- Conducting thorough actuarial analysis before underwriting risks.
- Purchasing adequate reinsurance.
- Maintaining reserves and surplus in accordance with regulatory standards.
- Continual evolution and improvement of claims handling and loss control initiatives.

Financial Structure

Revenue Model:
