ONE THOUSAND ONE HUNDRED AND NINETY-FIRST MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Columbus, Ohio, July 8, 1983

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Friday, July 8, 1983, at The Ohio State University Fawcett Center for Tomorrow, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: John D. Jacob, Chairman, D. James Hilliker, John F. Havens, Daniel M. Galbreath, Edmund C. Redman, Leonard J. Immke, John W. Berry, Shirley D. Bowser, and Hamilton J. Teaford.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

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July 8, 1983 meeting, Board of Trustees

The Chairman, Dr. Jacob, called the meeting of the Board of Trustees to order at 12:00 noon. He requested the Secretary to call the roll. The meeting recessed into Executive Session for the purpose of considering legal issues and personnel-related matters.

Present: John D. Jacob, Chairman, D. James Hilliker, John F. Havens, Daniel M. Galbreath, Edmund C. Redman, Leonard J. Immke, John W. Berry, Shirley D. Bowser, and Hamilton J. Teaford.

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Dr. Jacob reconvened the meeting at 1:30 p.m.

EMPLOYMENT OF ARCHITECT UNIVERSITY VISUAL ARTS CENTER

Resolution No. 84-1

President Jennings called on Vice President Jackson and Dean Andrew J. Broekema to present and ask for approval of a resolution regarding the Visual Arts Center. Mr. Jackson introduced to the Board the following resolution seeking authorization to employ an architectural team to provide the design for the University Visual Arts Center.

Dean Broekema made the following statement:

I would like to express my appreciation to the members of the Board for the time that you gave to us in allowing us to present the design solutions. And I think at this point that in recognizing that we are at the very beginning of the planning process that we feel very confident that the way that the architectural firms have addressed the problem and the program of the building has indeed been an amazing one. But we also recognize that in the course of the planning that will be going on from here on in that there will be changes addressed and we are confident that we will be able to address the concerns that have been already stated, and we also believe that having worked with these--this team thus far, that we have a very good promise for an excellent future in coming up with a building, I think, that is going to be spectacular, and will address a number of the issues that we have already raised. I would like to thank you for your time; I appreciate the opportunity to do some boasting and to share some of our enthusiasm with you. And I thank you very much.

Synopsis: Authorization to employ an architectural firm to provide the design for a University Visual Arts Center is requested.

WHEREAS there is a critical need for a facility to house The Ohio State University's outstanding art collections, to provide workshop and research space for the visual arts, and to serve as a focal point for individual and collective creative expression in all the visual arts; and

EMPLOYMENT OF ARCHITECT UNIVERSITY VISUAL ARTS CENTER (contd)

WHEREAS funds for construction of the Visual Arts Center will be provided from contributions to The Ohio State University Development Fund and the estimated total project cost is \$15 million; and

WHEREAS to ensure the selection of a design for the University Visual Arts Center that will be distinctive, creative, and expressive of the arts, this Board, on November 5, 1982, authorized a design competition whereby architectural firms would be invited to submit competitive designs, to be judged by a select jury appointed by the President; and

WHEREAS the design competition was conducted on May 28-30, 1983, and the select jury unanimously recommended to the President that the design submitted by the architectural team of Trott and Bean, Architects and Eisenman/Robertson, Architects be selected as the design for the Visual Arts Center; and

WHEREAS the President concurs in the jury's selection and recommends that this design be selected for the Visual Arts Center:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the design submitted by the architectural team of Trott and Bean, Architects and Eisenman/Robertson, Architects is hereby selected for the University Visual Arts Center and that the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to employ Trott and Bean, Architects and Eisenman/Robertson, Architects to provide complete architectural design services for this project, based on an estimated total project cost of \$15 million.

Upon motion of Mr. Immke, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous roll call vote.

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AMENDMENT TO RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY Resolution No. 84-2

Synopsis: Amendment to rule 3335-5-57 is being proposed.

WHEREAS the University Senate pursuant to rule 3335-5-57 of the Administrative Code is authorized to recommend through the President to the Board of Trustees the adoption of an amendment to Rules of the University Faculty as approved by the University Senate; and

WHEREAS the amendment to rule 3335-5-57 of Rules of the University Faculty was approved by the University Senate on June 4, 1983, as follows:

AMENDMENT TO RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

AMENDED RULE

3335-5-57 Committee on honorary degrees.

(D) The vice president for academic affairs and provost, or designee, shall serve as liaison between this committee and the president.

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the amendment to the <u>Rules of the University</u> Faculty be adopted as recommended by the University Senate.

Upon motion of Mr. Immke, seconded by Mr. Berry, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous voice vote.

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ESTABLISHMENT OF COLLEGE OF NURSING

Resolution No. 84-3

Synopsis: Recommendation to change School of Nursing to College of Nursing is being proposed.

WHEREAS the Council on Academic Affairs has reviewed and approved a proposal that the School of Nursing be accorded College status; and

WHEREAS the College of Medicine and the Office of the Vice President for Health Services also endorse and support this proposal; and

WHEREAS Nursing as a distinct academic discipline is recognized in the vast majority of U. S. universities in that colleges of nursing have already been established; and

WHEREAS College status would allow Nursing to set its own goals, direction and future; and

WHEREAS the Council on Academic Affairs believes that this proposal will enable Nursing to recruit and retain highly qualified faculty and students; and

WHEREAS with College status the research, teaching and public service mission of the faculty can be significantly enhanced; and

WHEREAS the internal review of the School is near completion and will provide the basis for negotiation of resources:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Trustees approve the action of the University Senate to change the School of Nursing to College of Nursing which was recommended at the June 4, 1983 meeting; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this change will be effective immediately.

Upon motion of Mrs. Bowser, seconded by Mr. Teaford, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous voice vote.

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AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS AND RULES TO INCLUDE NEW COLLEGES Resolution No. 84-4

Synopsis: Amendment of the Bylaws of the Board of Trustees and Rules of the University Faculty is proposed to reflect the establishment of the College of Home Economics and the College of Nursing.

WHEREAS at the June 9, 1983 meeting, this Board approved the change of the School of Home Economics to the College of Home Economics; and

WHEREAS in an action before this Board today, the School of Nursing is being changed to the College of Nursing:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Secretary of the Board of Trustees be authorized and directed to make appropriate revisions in the Bylaws of the Board of Trustees, the Rules of the University Faculty, and any other official University publications and documents to reflect the aforementioned changes in status of these two academic units, and that these revisions be effective immediately.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. Immke, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous voice vote.

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REVISION OF TITLE DESIGNATION FOR STUDENT AFFAIRS ADMINISTRATION

Resolution No. 84-5

Synopsis: Amendment of the Bylaws of the Board of Trustees and Rules of the University Faculty to reflect the title change of the administrative head of the Office of Student Affairs is proposed.

REVISION OF TITLE DESIGNATION FOR STUDENT AFFAIRS ADMINISTRATION (contd)

WHEREAS there is an administrative area within the Office of Academic Affairs and Provost which is responsible for the non-instructional activities and facilities of the students of the University; and

WHEREAS the duties and responsibilities of the administrative head of that area generally shall be the administration of the student services of the University; and

WHEREAS given the realignment of functions and reporting relationships within the Office of Academic Affairs, it has been determined that in order to facilitate these changes the title of Executive Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs (Student Services) should be eliminated, and the title Vice Provost for Student Affairs established:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Secretary of the Board of Trustees be authorized and instructed to effect this title change and other appropriate language revisions throughout the Bylaws of the Board of Trustees and the Rules of the University Faculty as well as any other official University publications and documents in which such change(s) would be appropriate.

Upon motion of Mr. Berry, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous voice vote.

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ELIMINATION OF THE OFFICES OF VICE PRESIDENT FOR REGIONAL CAMPUSES AND VICE PRESIDENT FOR EDUCATIONAL SERVICES

Resolution No. 84-6

Synopsis: Elimination of the Offices of Vice President for Regional Campuses and Vice President for Educational Services is proposed.

WHEREAS in the reorganization of the University administration presented to and approved by this Board in July, 1982, the Offices of Vice President for Regional Campuses and Vice President for Educational Services were proposed to be continued only through June, 1983 and August, 1983 respectively; and

WHEREAS John T. Mount retired from the University and was appointed Vice President and Dean Emeritus effective July 1, 1983; and

WHEREAS Kathryn T. Schoen, in a separate action being presented to this Board today, is being appointed as Acting Dean of the College of Nursing:

NOW THEREFORE

ELIMINATION OF THE OFFICES OF VICE PRESIDENT FOR REGIONAL CAMPUSES AND VICE PRESIDENT FOR EDUCATIONAL SERVICES (contd)

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Offices of Vice President for Regional Campuses and Vice President for Educational Services be abolished effective immediately, and that appropriate deletions and changes in the Bylaws of the Board of Trustees and the Rules of the University Faculty, as well as other University publications and documents, be coordinated by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Mr. Immke, seconded by Mr. Teaford, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous voice vote.

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UPDATING OF BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY PERTAINING TO ADMINISTRATION OF THE GRADUATE SCHOOL

Resolution No. 84-7

Synopsis: Revision of the Bylaws of the Board of Trustees and Rules of the University Faculty pertaining to administration of the Graduate School is proposed to reflect certain current Graduate School responsibilities and/or reporting relationships.

WHEREAS a realignment of the University's administrative organization was approved by this Board last year to be effective in July, 1982; and

WHEREAS part of that reorganization included the creation of the new position of Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies; the reestablishment of the position of Dean of the Graduate School; and the elimination of the title, Vice Provost for Research and Dean of the Graduate School; and

WHEREAS most affected Bylaws of the Board of Trustees and Rules of the University Faculty were updated following the reorganization to reflect the new alignment, but certain responsibilities and/or reporting relationships were not addressed at that time; and

WHEREAS such remaining responsibilities and/or reporting relationships in the <u>Bylaws</u> and <u>Rules</u> have now been defined;

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That in Bylaw 3335-1-05 (G); and in Rules 3335-3-27, 3335-3-31, and 3335-7-05 (H) as well as any other applicable sections of the Administrative Code, the language "Vice Provost for Research and" be deleted, leaving only the title "Dean of the Graduate School," and that these changes shall now reflect the appropriate responsibilities and/or reporting relationships of the positions involved.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. Immke, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous voice vote.

UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS BOARD

Amended Resolution No. 84-8

A resolution was presented to the Board recommending the appointment of a new general public member of the University Hospitals Board. Dr. Jacob asked that the resolution be amended to reflect a request by Mr. Galbreath that he be relieved of service on the University Hospitals Board for 1983-84, and that Mrs. Bowser be appointed to fill that term. The Board voted on the amended resolution as follows:

Synopsis: Confirmation and approval of nominees to the University Hospitals Board is proposed.

WHEREAS the Board of Trustees on November 30, 1979, approved the establishment of a University Hospitals Board; and

WHEREAS the membership of the Board was approved on April 4, 1980 and amended on April 1, 1983; and

WHEREAS it is stipulated that "The Hospitals Board shall be comprised of two members of the University Board of Trustees and twelve other persons, selected from the general public who shall be appointed by the University Board of Trustees in consultation with the President"; and

WHEREAS the terms of four members selected from the general public expired on April 30, 1983, and appointments for only three of those terms have been made to date; and

WHEREAS Daniel M. Galbreath, one of the two Trustees serving on the University Hospitals Board, has asked to be relieved of that appointment:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That Mr. Pete Klisares be approved as a general public member of the University Hospitals Board for a term of three years, effective immediately, replacing Lloyd M. Parks who now resides in Tucson, Arizona; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That Trustee Shirley D. Bowser be appointed effective immediately to fill Mr. Galbreath's term through April 30, 1984.

Upon motion of Mr. Immke, seconded by Mr. Havens, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous voice vate.

Perry R. Ayres, M.D.

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on May 28, 1983 of Perry R. Ayres, M.D., Clinical Professor of Medicine and Preventive Medicine, The Ohio State University College of Medicine.

Born in Columbus, Ohio, on January 19, 1917, Perry Ayres received his B.A. degree from Oberlin College in 1938 and his M.D. from Western Reserve University in 1942. His clinical training in internal medicine at Syracuse, and Cleveland, was interrupted by three years of service as a Battalion Surgeon with the 4th Marine Division from 1943-46. He received the Bronze Star in 1945. Certified by the American Board of Internal Medicine, he entered a busy practice of medicine on State Street in Columbus. He served as a member of the clinical faculty in the Department of Medicine until 1973. From 1959-74 he was Editor of the Ohio State Medical Journal.

At about this time, he underwent the agony of serious medical difficulties and became personally well acquainted with the problems of the impaired physician. His perseverance enabled him to overcome these impairments and 1976 found him on the road back. He resumed his appointment in the Department of Medicine, became a staff internist and consultant on substance abuse at Harding Hospital, Worthington, and became a nationally known figure in the understanding of the physician impaired by psychiatric illness, alcoholism, and drug dependency. He spoke with authority and total conviction, and as a result became a speaker whose schedule took him from New England to California and the United Kingdom. He was named President of the Medical Staff of Harding Hospital, Chairman of the Physician Effectiveness Program for the Ohio State Medical Association and received several other distinguished service and teaching awards.

He is to be remembered as an excellent physician, an effective teacher, but particularly as a person who turned adversity into achievement. Dr. Ayres died suddenly while attending a reunion of his college class in Oberlin on May 28, 1983.

Frank Batley, M.D.

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on May 25, 1983 of Frank Batley, M.D., Professor, Department of Radiology.

Frank Batley was born December 27, 1920, in Oldham in the North of England. He obtained a B.S. degree in Anatomy and Physiology in 1941 and his degree in Medicine from the University of Manchester in 1944.

From 1945 to 1947 he was on active duty in the Royal Air Force and it was during this period that one of his superior officers encouraged him to become a Radiation Therapist. Shortly after his discharge from the armed forces he returned to the Christie Hospital and Holt Radium Institute, Manchester, which was at that time one of the three outstanding cancer institutions in the western hemisphere. In 1950 he was involved in research using radioactive isotopes and in the early 1950's the first external beam cobalt units were used in Canada but there were few radiotherapists in Canada familiar with the use of this isotope. Dr. Batley was invited by the Ontario Cancer Foundation to assist in the use of this apparatus and most probably he delivered the first cobalt 60 treatment in the world to a patient with head and neck cancer in October, 1951 at the Victoria Hospital in London, Ontario. He intended to return to England in 1952; however, he went as Deputy Director to the Ontario Cancer Foundation Branch in Hamilton from 1952 to 1956. He was appointed Chief of Radiotherapy at The Ohio State University in 1957 but due to unforseen Ohio Licensing difficulties he returned to Canada to the Ontario Cancer Foundation at Kingston as Deputy Director from 1957 to 1959. From 1959 to 1967 he was Chief of Radiotherapy at the State University of New York in Syracuse.

In 1967 he was appointed Director of Radiation Oncology at the University Hospitals and as Professor of Radiology in the College of Medicine and served in this capacity until his death. He served on many committees including the Statistical Committee of the National Cancer Institute of Canada from 1954 to 1959 and the Executive and Radiation Therapy Committee of the Southwest Oncology Group. He was a member of the Board of Directors of the Franklin County Unit of the American Cancer Society as well as the Professional Education Committee and Service Committee for this Society.

Dr. Batley was the recipient of the Royal College of Surgeons of England Ninth McClockland Scholar Award and was a Fellow of the American College of Radiology. He was an excellent teacher and was very interested in the education of medical students and resident physicians. In the Columbus community he was highly respected and eagerly sought after as a consultant in radiotherapy. His publications indicated a wide range of interests. His con-

tributions to the field of Radiation Oncology were of significant importance and the field of Radiation Oncology has lost a careful clinical investigator, good physician and widely respected teacher and friend.

Paul D. Morrill

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on June 25, 1983, of Paul D. Morrill, former Assistant University Architect.

Born February 17, 1910 in Springfield, Illinois, Mr. Morrill was graduated from the University of Pennsylvania, School of Fine Arts, Sigma Alpha Epsilon. He was a registered Architect in the State of Ohio and was employed at this University in various positions in the Office of the University Architect. Mr. Morrill began his service with the University in 1934 and was retired in 1967. Among his many job responsibilities was his assignment as Assistant University Architect from 1960 to 1967 and he was considered the Chief Designer of many campus buildings from 1940 to 1967. He was especially involved in the design development of the South and North area Dormitories on the Columbus Campus.

Perhaps of widest public recognition are Paul Morrill's sketches and drawings. He was internationally known for his pencil renderings of Ohio State University landmarks. These renderings have appeared in many publications and have been used extensively by the O.S.U. Development Fund. Many of Mr. Morrill's sketches and watercolors are to be found in private and public collections around the world. He made gifts of his work to the University and presented a permanent collection of his watercolors to the Columbus Cultural Arts Center.

Mr. Morrill was a member of the Clintonville Art Guild, The Ohio State University Faculty Club, and the Columbus Athletic Club.

Carl F. Ruff

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses sorrow upon the death on June 10, 1983 of Carl F. Ruff, Associate Professor and Area Extension Agent, Farm Management.

Mr. Ruff was born April 5, 1930 in Lancaster, Ohio. Graduating from Lancaster High School in 1948, he enrolled at The Ohio State University and received his Bachelor of Science degree in Agricultural Education in 1953. He returned to OSU in 1963 and earned a Master's degree in Agricultural Education.

After serving in the U. S. Army, Mr. Ruff joined the faculty of The Ohio State University as Associate County Extension Agent in Union County on May 16, 1955. He held this position until June 1, 1962 when he became the County Extension Agent, Agriculture in Ottawa County. On April 1, 1980 he became the Area Extension Agent, Farm Management in the Fremont Area and was serving in this position at the time of his death.

Mr. Ruff provided leadership for various Extension activities. He was a highly respected and dedicated agricultural educator for the Extension Service and was well known and respected among his peers in Ohio and throughout the United States as he was a well recognized leader in the National Association of County Agricultural Agents.

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ADMINISTRATIVE REORGANIZATION

President Jennings made the following statement:

Mr. Chairman, with the action of the Board approving Kathryn Schoen's appointment to the College of Nursing and with the elimination of Educational Services (as you know, several of the functions of the Office of Educational Services have been disbursed previously), there remain two offices that are currently located in Educational Services which must be assigned a new reporting relationship. With this in mind, effective immediately we will charge Mr. Dick Jackson to be responsible for the Fawcett Center and we will charge Mr. Larry Thompson to be responsible for WOSU. I think both of these individuals and both of these units are outstanding units today, and because of Kathryn's great work I think the tasks of Dick and Larry will be rather straightforward in this, and I look forward to good things to come.

ADMINISTRATIVE REORGANIZATION (contd)

I'd like to make another comment, too. By and large, with the appointments you've made today, we have completed the reorganization of the central administrative staff. We still, obviously, have the Vice Provost for Student Affairs position to fill. I think it's fair to say that I, the faculty and the entire University community are very pleased with the results of this very lengthy search process. We've put together a central administration team that, working with the deans and faculty, I believe, will move Ohio State University even higher within the ranks of some of the nation's great universities.

I do wish to note that these senior administrative appointments, which have been made over the past several months, might be criticized because they do not include women or minorities. As you know, I have urged the University community to give particular emphasis to the hiring of women and minorities in our recruitment efforts not only at my level, but at all levels throughout the The committees which recommended the senior administrative appointments to me were extremely diligent in seeking such candidates -- it included on the committees themselves. incidentally, significant numbers of women and minorities. Those committees indeed did do nationwide searches on each of the positions. Women and minorities were indeed interviewed, but the committees recommended and I concurred, that the best candidates did not include individuals from these groups. And, we indeed were seeking the best candidates and I believe we have obtained the best candidates. But I would like to take this opportunity to assure you and the entire Ohio State University community that the outcome of our selection process does not signal a loss of commitment to affirmative action objectives. The recruitment of women and minorities onto our staff, to our faculty, to our student body, will continue to be a top priority in this institution and certainly will continue to be in my administration, and I appreciate the Board's support of that position as well.

Mr. Scott added:

I might note, Mr. President, that looking through your agenda today, I think it is a historic first that there are three deans being named--or acting deans--and all three are women.

President Jennings made the following statement:

Mr. Chairman, on that note, it should be noted that our preliminary information indicates that for the year 1982-83, the Research Grants and Contracts total \$84.7 million, which is up from 1981-82 of a total of \$75 million or almost a 13 percent increase. I point that out because that has been accomplished during a period of time when the Federal government awarding on a national basis of research grants and contracts has been going down in this fiscal year and Ohio State has experienced a 13 percent increase. And I think that all of our faculty and the Office of Research and Graduate Studies, OSURF, the entire University community should be very, very proud of that. We have bucked the national trends in a very, very substantial way. One of the great significant accomplishments for Ohio State and I'm very proud of what our people have done.

The Morgan Memorial Scholarship Fund was established September 5, 1980, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University with gifts to The Ohio State University Development Fund from Morgan Lumber Sales Company and other friends in tribute to its founders, Walter E. and Elizabeth S. Morgan.

All gifts are to be invested in the University's Permanent Endowment Fund, under the rules and regulations adopted by the Board of Trustees, with the right to invest and reinvest as occasion dictates.

The annual income shall be added to the principal until the fund reaches \$5,000. At that time, the annual income shall be used to provide scholarship support to a student pursuing a degree in the School of Natural Resources, Division of Forestry. The student must demonstrate high academic achievement as well as financial need. The selection of the student shall be made by the Director of the School of Natural Resources in conjunction with the Director of Student Financial Aids. On an annual basis, the Director of Financial Aids will provide the Morgan Lumber Sales Company with the name of the student who received the award.

Should the need for this fund cease to exist or so diminish as to provide unused income, then the income may be used for any purpose whatsoever as determined by the Board of Trustees, with preference being given to recommendations from the appropriate administrative official of the University, who is then directly responsible for scholarships.

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1983-84 CURRENT FUNDS BUDGET

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Secretary be instructed to incorporate all supporting documents into the minutes of this meeting, including salary rolls with promotions, and fees and charges for the Fiscal Year 1983-84, and to file these materials with the official records of this University.

1983-84 CURRENT FUNDS BUDGET (contd)

Dr. Jacob made the following statement:

Before I take that motion, I would like to read the following statement, and then we will have that motion.

At the June 10, 1982 meeting of the Board it was determined that the time for reviewing the University President's compensation should conform with the timing of the annual review and approval of salary recommendations for the faculty, administrative staff, and Classified Civil Service personnel of the University. In accordance with this mandate, the Personnel Committee of the Board met this noon to review President Jennings' salary as well as his benefits entitlements. In the context of his review we also analyzed and reviewed salary levels of all Big 10 presidents as well as presidents' salaries of other comparable graduate research institutions.

In our deliberations we naturally reflected on the performance of the President during the past year, and it is our committee's consensus judgment that President Jennings has done an unequivocally commendable job in every aspect of his performance. He has provided not only the expected strong leadership in setting the standards of excellence for all of us, but he has also demonstrated a unique competency and sensitivity in addressing the many complex, diverse, and difficult problems which have confronted this University. The Personnel Committee of the Board recognizes that being a public-assisted institution places necessary limits as to what can be done in the area of compensation for staff and faculty, including the President. However, it is the view of this committee that meritorious accomplishments deserve recognition not only in the form of complimentary remarks, but also in the form of monetary adjustments. With this in mind it is the recommendation of the Personnel Committee of the Board of Trustees that President Jennings' salary be adjusted by an increase of 8 percent. This proposed change will ensure that President Jennings is at least comparable in compensation to his peers in the I would like to ask for a motion to approve the President's budget as well as the recommendation of the Personnel Committee as set forth in this report.

1983-84 CURRENT FUNDS BUDGET FOR THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY

I. INTRODUCTION

In June, 1983, this Board approved budget guidelines and a tentative expenditure authorization for the 1983-84 fiscal year. These approvals were in anticipation of the funding authorization from the State of Ohio in the budget bill then under consideration.

The Ohio General Assembly proceeded to pass budget legislation for the 1983-85 Biennium and the Governor has signed this legislation. The level of State funds provided for the 1983-84 fiscal year will enable this University to support the budget guidelines authorized by this Board in June, 1983, including keeping the increases in University fees and charges to an average rate of less than 7 percent.

II. SOURCES OF FUNDS

The sources of current funds in support of the 1983-84 budget total \$712,824,000, as detailed in the schedule of Sources of Income to Support 1983-84 Budget. This amount includes State support totaling \$211,114,993, which remains some \$5,500,000 below the funding level originally appropriated for this past fiscal year prior to the cuts in State funding which occurred in June, 1982, and January, 1983. Of these sources of funds, Columbus Campus general funds represent 42 percent of the total with earnings operations generating 35 percent, restricted grants and contracts 18 percent, and the regional campuses revenues with OARDC totaling 5 percent.

While the guidelines approved in June, 1983, included a 7 percent increase in student fees, the final State budget provided no increase in funding which would enable this University to further reduce the high percentage of student contribution to their costs of higher education. Even more serious is that the level of State support for the instructional subsidies planned for 1984-85 may result in greater deterioration in this percentage. As stated previously, while every effort will be made to improve student accessibility through moderate student tuition, quality education will continue to be the highest priority. Therefore, for 1983-84, the average increase in student fees has been recommended at 7 percent effective Autumn Quarter, 1983.

Every effort has been made to maintain all fees and charges of the University within an overall average of 7 percent, and this result has been achieved with the final average being 6.8 percent. Even more important to achieving the goal of improved accessibility is that the charges to typical students averaged significantly less than 7 percent. The increase in typical student charges ranged from 5.1 to 6.4 percent, as detailed in the supporting budget materials.

It is hoped that the State's estimates of their revenues will not result in further midyear State funding reductions similar to those which have occurred over the past three years. At this time no special contigency reserve fund is being recommended since any unexpected shortfalls in State support during the first year of the 1983-85 biennium can be addressed over the remaining months until June 30, 1985.

1983-84 CURRENT FUNDS BUDGET FOR THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY (contd)

III. USES OF FUNDS

As detailed in the schedule of Budgeted Expenditures for 1983-84 and the supporting documents, this University's current fund expenditures total \$712,518,000, in support of the budget guidelines authorized by this Board at its meeting on June 9, 1983.

Due to the limitations in State funding, this 1983-84 budget includes having the colleges and administrative areas fund from current resources 2 percent of the salary guidelines for faculty and administrative/professional staff on General Fund budgets. This reallocation totaled \$2.0 million, net of a \$500,000 contingency fund used to assist areas for which such a reallocation would have created extraordinary hardships.

It is important that both years of the biennium be considered in our budget planning since State funding has been authorized for the two-year period 1983-85. While preliminary plans were to make further progress in reducing the rate of increase in student fees to below the 7 percent increase for 1983-84, the level of State support being provided will require us to reconsider these plans. The level of State funding for the next fiscal year may require student fee increases above this year's 7 percent and further budget reallocation within all areas of the University. Careful analyses of the possible options will be reviewed over the next several months as we observe the status of the State revenue situation.

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Commencement Speaker

Leo A. Paquette

Today's commencement speaker joined the faculty of The Ohio State University Department of Chemistry in 1963 as assistant professor, and in 1981 he was named the Kimberly Professor of Chemistry. He received his B.S. degree magna cum laude from Holy Cross College in 1956 and was awarded his doctorate in organic chemistry by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1959. He then worked as a research associate with the Upjohn Company for four years before coming to Ohio State.

Dr. Paquette has been a visiting professor at Michigan State University, the University of Iowa, the University of Colorado, the University of California at Santa Barbara, the University of Gröningen, Texas A&M University, and Northwestern University. He has served as an adviser on the Medicinal Chemistry B Study Section of the National Institutes of Health and as a member of the editorial boards of the Journal of Organic Chemistry; Mechanisms of Reactions of Sulfur Compounds; and Chemical Reviews. Currently, he is a member of the editorial boards of Organic Reactions; Synthetic Communications; and Current Abstracts of Chemistry and Index Chemicus. He is also a member of the Chemistry Division Advisory Committee of the National Science Foundation.

in 1965. Professor Paquette was named a Fellow of the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation. On several occasions he has been honored by the American Chemical Society: Morley Medalist of the Cleveland Section in 1971; recipient of the Columbus Section Award in 1979; and designated recipient of the Award for Creative Work in Synthetic Organic Chemistry in 1984. He was a Guggenheim Fellow in the 1976-77 academic year and was elected to the National Academy of Sciences in 1983. In 1980, The Ohio State University honored him with its prestigious Senior Research Award. He is the author of 550 research papers in organic chemistry and has more than 40 patents to his credit.

Recipients of Honors

Herman Chemoff Doctor of Science

Professor of applied mathematics and director of the Statistics Center at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Herman Chernoff has been recognized internationally for his work in mathematics and statistics. The most recent evidence of his international reputation came when more than 25 distinguished statisticians agreed to provide papers on the occasion of his sixtieth birthday, all of which will be published in a Festschrift volume by Academic Press.

During his long academic career, Dr. Chernoff has been a visiting professor at Columbia University, the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences, the London School of Economics, the University of Rome, Hebrew University, and the Institute of Statistical Mathematics in Japan. A productive writer, he has published almost 100 scholarly articles and two books in addition to working as an editor for several of the leading journals in his field. A former president of the Institute of Mathematical Statistics, he is also a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and the National Academy of Sciences.

His work in sequential analysis, pattern recognition, optimal design theory, classification, and optimal control theory has significantly broadened the foundations of modern statistics. A technique he devised, known as "Chernoff faces," has been widely used by communications media to represent data in several dimensions.

The Ohio State University takes great pride in honoring Professor Chernoff for his fundamental and sustained contributions to statistics by awarding him its highest honor, the degree of Doctor of Science, honoris causa.

Raiph Landau

Doctor of Science

As the University continues its efforts to strengthen its ties to business and industry, no one can better illustrate the nature and benefits of such ties than Dr. Ralph Landau. A man of diverse talents, Ralph Landau has a rare combination of business, academic, and engineering acumen. His contributions and leadership in the laboratory led to major breakthroughs that made possible far-reaching innovations in manufacturing processes. A successful entrepreneur, he was then able to help realize the potential market for and applications of his work. Dr. Landau rose quickly through the managerial ranks after participating in the founding of Scientific Design and later Halcon International, Inc., where he has served as president.

Dr. Landau has distinguished himself as a teacher and is an adjunct professor of management, technology, and society at the University of Pennsylvania, where he also serves as a trustee. The author of over 90 publications, he holds 11 U.S. patents and 19 foreign patents. His varied endeavors have earned him numerous awards, including the Petroleum and Petrochemical Division Award of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers, the Chemical Industry Medal and the Petrikin Medal of the American Section of the Society of the Chemical Industry, the Winthrop-Sears Medal of the Chemical Industry Association, and the New Jersey Science/Technology Medal of the New Jersey Research and Development Council.

In awarding Dr. Landau the degree of Doctor of Science, honoris causa, the University seeks to reaffirm its relationship with the world beyond its doors and to publicly thank Dr. Landau for helping to keep them open.

Lloyd M. Parks

Doctor of Science

Ohio State has been fortunate in having many excellent administrators to oversee the operations of its diverse programs and to chart a course to excellence. Lloyd M. Parks, Dean Emeritus of the College of Pharmacy, is a shining example of this tradition. Dean Parks joined the College of Pharmacy in 1956, and for over 20 years he guided that college and helped it achieve the international stature it enjoys today. There are few pharmacists who can boast the string of awards bestowed upon Dean Parks. He began earning accolades for his work in pharmacy early in his career, winning the Ebert Prize of the American Pharmaceutical Association for research in pharmacy in 1952. He later was given the Beal Award of the Ohio State Pharmaceutical Association for his outstanding contributions to the profession of pharmacy Dr. Parks also received what is generally recognized as pharmacy's highest award, the Remington Medal, in 1975, and in 1977 Ohio State's College of Pharmacy building was renamed Lloyd M. Parks Hall in his honor.

Dean Emeritus Parks received a honorary doctorate from Purdue University and from Union College. He also was awarded the University of Wisconsin Citation in 1965. Before coming to Ohio State, he was a member of the faculty of the University of Wisconsin for 18 years, advancing through the ranks from instructor to professor of pharmaceutical chemistry. Dean Parks received his bachelor's and his master's degrees from Purdue University and his doctorate from the University of Wisconsin.

The University community is especially pleased to recognize the achievements and distinguished career of Dean Emeritus Parks by awarding him the degree of Doctor of Science, honoris causa.

Richard D. Altick

Distinguished Service Award

Regents Professor Emeritus Richard D. Altick is the epitome of all that Ohio State aspires to be. His massive accomplishment and international influence as a research scholar have earned for this University a reputation that is second to none. After joining the University in 1945, Professor Altick quickly rose through the ranks, becoming a full professor in just five years and setting the pace for scholarly research in the Department of English for the next 38 years. The author of 15 books, more than 60 scholarly articles, and many reviews-Richard Altick has written for the specialist and nonspecialist alike. A Guggenheim Fellow, a Fellow of the American Council of Learned Societies, a Newberry Library Fellow, Professor Altick has served his profession in every capacity imaginable and in so doing has served The Ohio State University. A university is judged by the quality of its faculty and students, and the stature of a scholar like Richard Altick ensures that The Ohio State University can meet any test and will always be judged as having surpassing standards.

William R. "Ziggy" Coyle Distinguished Service Award

Big Band leader, trumpet player, businessman, and devoted alumnus, William R. "Ziggy" Coyle has been faithfully serving his alma mater and the world of music since the 1940s. An early devotee of the trumpet, he got his nickname from imitating Tommy Dorsey's famous trumpet player, Ziggy Elman. After graduating from Ohio State in 1948, Ziggy Coyle taught instrumental music in Columbus schools until 1952, when he bought the music business that was to become Coyle Music. His business successes led to his being named one of the ten outstanding young men in the music industry in 1967. Ziggy has spearheaded fund raising drives for organizations of which he has been a member. He has served as chairman of the School of Music Association of Alumni and Friends and as chairman of the School of Music Scholarship Fund Drive. He has also served as president of the TBDBITL Alumni Association and for many years has coordinated the Ohio State Franklin County Marching Band concerts, which have raised money for scholarships. He recently has become very active in the Friends of WOSU, and last year he received the Ohio State Alumni Citizenship Award.

M. Merle Harrod

Distinguished Service Award

An Ohio State alumnus, M. Merle Harrod has faithfully served his alma mater since receiving his undergraduate degree more than 50 years ago. A 1928 graduate, he was the president of his senior class and went on to distinguish himself by becoming a charter member of the Presidents Club. He served as vice president of the Alumni Association in 1952 and was a member of the Association's Board of Directors for six years. His most exemplary service, however, came in his years as a member of the University's Board of Trustees. During his nine year term, which began in 1969, the University weathered the storm of student unrest and witnessed a major realignment in its structure and programs. The capital investment in buildings and equipment during those years has never been exceeded in the history of the University. His thoughtful support of Presidents Fawcett and Enarson and his commitment to the University's mission helped ensure that Ohio State would continue a tradition of excellence, a tradition best exemplified by dedicated and loyal alumni like M. Merle Harrod.

Ross Lawler Mooney Distinguished Service Award

Very few professors have made a greater contribution to Ohio State's College of Education than has Professor Emeritus Ross L. Mooney. His illustrious career spans almost two-thirds of the college's history and he has served his college in various ways. After joining the University's Bureau of Educational Research in 1938. he went on to become professor of research and later professor of education, and in 1975 he was appointed Professor Emeritus of Education, His constant efforts to develop organic and integrative methods for teaching and research left him outside the mainstream of his profession for many years. Happily for the University, his colleagues, and his students, he persisted, and since the late 1960s he began to be heard. Professor Mooney's ideas have been realized in many ways, chief among them the Freshman Foundation Program. His perception laboratory and research material are widely used, and his work has profoundly influenced many faculty members, especially those dealing with curriculum, instruction, and development. In 1973 he received the University Distinguished Teaching Award.

William F. Rounds

Distinguished Service Award

They also serve who sit and write. This turn of an old phrase apply describes William F. Rounds, who for over 35 years has covered and reported on the University, its many programs, and its people. After joining the University in 1946, Mr. Rounds served for 12 years as assistant director of the Bureau of Public Relations. From 1958 to 1969, he was an editor with the Office of News and Information Services and became its director in 1969. In 1975 he was appointed coordinator of internal information in the Office of Communications Services, a position he held until his retirement in 1981. Mr. Rounds wrote countless news and feature stories that resulted in favorable publicity about the accomplishments of the University's students, faculty, and staff. He served as a mentor to scores of student assistants who worked for him, many of whom are now putting his knowledge and skill to work at institutions all across the nation. After singing the praise of others for so long, it is fitting that the University now sing his praise by bestowing upon him its Distinguished Service Award.



Dr. Chapman received his D.D.S. degree from The Ohio State University in 1934.

In 1959 Mrs. Mote joined The Ohio State University as an Assistant Instructor in Bacteriology and was promoted to Instructor in 1963 and Assistant Professor in 1970. Throughout her tenure at Ohio State, Mrs. Mote took an active interest in teaching and advising students. She served as Coordinating Advisor for majors in Microbiology, Iiaison for Nursing and Allied Health Programs, advisor for the OSU Optometric Dames Club as well as a member of the Parent Orientation Program, Student Concerns Committee, Arts and Sciences Committee on Counseling and Arts and Sciences Curriculum Committee. She was the first recipient of the Rosalene Sedgwick Faculty Service Award, established to honor faculty who have given outstanding service as a faculty advisor or as a teacher whose work has directly affected the quality of the academic experience of undergraduate students. In both 1970 and 1971 she was named one of the Outstanding Teachers by The Colleges of the Arts and Sciences.

During her tenure at Ohio State, Mrs. Mote co-authored several editions of $\underline{\underline{A}}$ Workbook for General Microbiology, which is still used.

On June 30, 1978, Mrs. Mote retired, yet continued to serve part-time as Instructor of General Microbiology for several years. During the summer of 1979, she taught in the Gifted Children's Program in Fairbanks, Alaska.

She was a member of the American Society for Microbiology, Ohio branch of ASM, Sigma Xi, Sigma Delta Epsilon, Helix, Alpha Epsilon Delta, and Chimes.

Francis P. Robinson

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on August 6, 1983, of Francis P. Robinson, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Psychology.

Francis P. Robinson was born December 21, 1906 in Danville, Indiana. He received a B.A. degree from the University of Oregon in 1929; an M.A. in 1930 and a Ph.D. in 1932 from the State University of Iowa. He directed the Reading Clinic at the State University of Iowa from 1929-33; was assistant professor from 1933-34, professor and head from 1934-37 of the Department

of Psychology and Education at Stout Institute; became an assistant professor in the Department of Psychology, The Ohio State University in 1937, associate professor in 1941, and professor in 1944, serving in that capacity until his retirement in 1971. He established one of the nation's first training programs in counseling psychology at Ohio State, served as its director for more than twenty years, and advised students on nearly 100 M.A. theses and Ph.D. dissertations in this field. He was visiting professor at eight colleges and universities in the U. S. and at universities in Canada, Japan, and the United Kingdom; consultant to the U. S. Office of Education and the Veterans Administration; editorial board member for several journals and editor of the Journal of Counseling Psychology from 1964-69; and author of more than sixty publications and four textbooks, including Psychology and the New Education, co-authored with Sidney L. Pressey and published in five foreign languages. Widely known for his research on reading and effective study, he was the originator of the SQ3R method of studying.

Professor Robinson was a founding member of the Division of Counseling Psychology of the American Psychological Association. He was a fellow of the American Psychological Association (council of representatives 1949-53, 1964-67, council of editors 1967-69); fellow of the Division of Counseling Psychology (executive committee 1951-54, 1956-59, president 1954-55); fellow of the Division of Educational Psychology; member of the Ohio Psychological Association (president 1941); and member of the American Personnel and Guidance Association. Professor Robinson's enthusiasm for world travel and his artistry as a photographer were revealed in his award winning photographic exhibitions and his presentations to friends and members of local and national photographic societies.

Anthony J. Ruppersberg was born on June 30, 1907 in Columbus, Ohio. He received his B.S. degree from Lafayette College in 1929 and his M.D. degree from Jefferson Medical College in 1933. Following internship at the Jefferson Hospital in Philadelphia, Dr. Ruppersberg entered the general practice of medicine for a period of five years, until the beginning of World War II. During this period, Dr. Ruppersberg also served as Health Commissioner for

the City of Bexley. He served 5 1/2 years in the Army during which time he earned the Legion of Merit with the Oak Leaf Cluster. Following discharge as a Colonel, Dr. Ruppersberg continued in the Active Reserves.

Following his military service, Dr. Ruppersberg took residency training in Obstetrics and Gynecology at Jefferson Hospital and the Margaret Hague Maternity Hospital in Pittsburgh. He became a Fellow of the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology in 1952 and a diplomate of the American Board of Obstetrics and Gynecology in 1953. Dr. Ruppersberg practiced until his death and was held in the highest of esteem by his patients. He was a member of the active staff at Grant Hospital during this period.

He was active in public service and was co-founder of the Ohio State Medical Association's Ohio Maternal Mortality Study. In addition, he served as a member of the Ohio State Medical Board for 13 years during which time he was President and, at the time of his death, was Secretary. In his role as a member of the State Medical Board and as President and Secretary, Dr. Ruppersberg served the people of Ohio with great distinction. He was a member of the Academy of Medicine of Columbus and Franklin County, the Ohio State Medical Association and the American Medical Association. His many memberships included those in the Central Association of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, Pan Pacific Surgical Association, International College of Surgeons and the Pan American Medical Association.

Dr. Ruppersberg was appointed to the faculty of The Ohio State University College of Medicine as a Clinical Instructor in 1952 and remained active in the teaching programs of the Department until his retirement in 1977, at which time he was granted a Professor Emeritus title. During his tenure as a faculty member at Ohio State University, Dr. Ruppersberg was the author of many scientific publications and was greatly admired and respected by his students and colleagues.

On behalf of the University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as an expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy.

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ORGANIZATION-ATHLETICS

President Jennings made the following statement:

Mr. Chairman, I have one additional item that I would like simply to bring to your attention. As you know, the Office of the Vice Provost for Student Affairs is currently facing an enormous number of issues. In particular, the areas of registration and admissions are critical to the fulfillment of our academic mission at The Ohio State University. Beginning in the Autumn Quarter of 1984, we will be implementing an admissions program that very clearly articulates the academic skills required for a matriculating student to be successful at Ohio State. We must continue to concentrate our efforts to improve opportunities for any student who wishes to study at this institution, and who has the basic potential for academic success.

I have also placed increased emphasis on the responsibilities of the Office of the Vice Provost for Student Affairs. First, there is an increased focus on improving retention of highly qualified students. Second, there is increased emphasis on enhancing our recruitment, particularly of students with academic promise, both generally and among minority students. And finally, as noted, the implementation of the new admissions program for the Autumn Quarter, 1984, places an enormously increased burden upon the Vice Provost for Student Affairs.

ORGANIZATION-ATHLETICS (contd)

Of course, these major efforts and initiatives are all in addition to the great responsibilities of the traditional student services functions, including residence and dining halls, non-academic student discipline, coordination of student extracurricular activities and all student or student-connected organizations, counseling, student financial aids and scholarships, off-campus student housing, University student union facilities, student health services and University-wide environmental health and safety concerns, and the monitoring of rules governing student conduct, both on and off campus.

The increased time commitment and increased responsibilities that this office must undertake are occurring when we are also in a transition process. We are now attempting to complete a nationwide search to find the best person available to serve as our new Vice Provost for Student Affairs.

All these reasons, in my judgment, necessitate that temporary relief be provided through a change in some of the other areas of responsibilities of that office.

As all of you know, nationally, there has been a significant number of management and academic issues confronting student athletic programs, especially intercollegiate athletics. Stringent academic standards, greater accountability for student athletes, issues involving broadcasting of athletic events, the enhancement of women's athletic programs, all are examples of the major issues being faced in this area. Although The Ohio State University has long been a leader in addressing many of these concerns, the problems are of such complexity that I believe special attention is required today.

For these reasons, and given the increased burden on the Vice Provost for Student Affairs, I am asking Mr. Larry Thompson, Special Assistant to the President, to undertake responsibility on a temporary basis for overseeing the managerial aspects of the student athletic programs. Because I feel it is also essential to retain academics as paramount in the area of athletics, I am also asking Dr. Russell Spillman, Associate Provost for Academic Affairs, to accept responsibility for the academic matters associated with athletics and to insure that these academic matters are properly retained within the Office of the Provost. I am confident that this dual team will be able to work well together and with the University's Athletic Council to give this area the special attention that these major issues require.

Makoto Kawase

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on August 2, 1983, of Makoto Kawase, Professor in the Department of Horticulture.

Makoto Kawase (contd)

Makoto Kawase was born in Japanese controlled Zuizan, Korea in 1926. received a Bachelor of Agriculture degree in 1951 and a Master of Agriculture in 1954, both from the University of Tokyo. He received his M.S. from the University of Minnesota in 1958 and Ph.D. from Cornell University in 1960. He served as assistant professor of horticulture (temp.) at Purdue University 1960-1962, and was a plant physiologist for the Canadian Department of Agriculture at Morden, Manitoba, 1962-1966. He joined The Ohio State University faculty in 1966 as an associate professor at the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center and became professor in 1970. He participated actively in the teaching programs and worked with many graduate students during his 17-year career. His research included ecological differentiation of horticultural crops and basic studies in photoperiodic control of tree growth, plant senescence, rooting physiology, rooting substances, plant growth regulators, and flooding physiology. He held both U.S. and Canadian patents on the "Wooster Tube," a method he invented to containerize fieldgrown trees and shrubs. He twice won the American Society for Horticultural Science Alex Laurie Award (1962 and 1967); received a National Science Foundation Grant in 1970 to participate in the 18th International Horticultural Congress in Tel Aviv, Israel; and was awarded a NATO visiting professorship at Pisa University in Italy in 1974.

Professor Kawase published many scientific articles and held memberships in the American Society for Horticultural Science, American Society for Plant Physiologists, International Plant Propagators' Society, Scandinavian Society for Plant Physiology, Ohio Nurserymen's Association, Botanical Society of America, American Association for the Advancement of Science, Phi Kappa Phi, Alpha Xi, and Sigma Xi. In February 1983, he returned from leading a highly successful plant exploration in northern Japan followed by a visiting professorship at the University of Tokyo. The plant exploration, a fulfillment of a career-long ambition of Dr. Kawase, was supported by the North Central States Ornamental Subcommittee and resulted in collection of more than 800 specimens for identification and possible introduction as woody ornamental plants for the northern U. S.

John W. Price

John W. Price (contd)

Dr. Price was born in 1899 in Plain City, Ohio. He completed his undergraduate degree in Agriculture in 1921 at The Ohio State University, and he continued for his advanced degrees also at The Ohio State University receiving an M.S. in 1923 and a Ph.D. in 1930. He taught as a missionary in Bogota, Columbia, 1923-24. Dr. Price was appointed as an Instructor in 1927, Assistant Professor in 1930, Associate Professor in 1933, and Professor in 1943.

Dr. Price was a dedicated and enthusiastic teacher. He taught general zoology, vertebrate zoology and developed one of the first courses in comparative embryology. Dr. Price often taught field zoology at the Franz Theodore Stone Laboratory on Lake Erie in the summer months. Dr. Price is affectionately remembered as a mentor to many graduate students, he advised many of them for work toward advanced degrees.

Research was an integral part of his academic life, he believed in the value of basic research. Dr. Price published papers and made presentations relating to experimental embryology and fisheries biology. His work "A Study of the Food Habits of Some Lake Erie Fish," published as a Bulletin of the Ohio Biological Survey, is considered a landmark publication. Dr. Price was always curious and asked questions of both students and colleagues. His questions and original ideas often led to research problems investigated by his graduate students. Dr. Price was one of the founders of the Midwest Regional Developmental Biology Conference. He retired from the Department of Zoology in January, 1970.

Harold R. Walley

Born on March 21, 1900 in Reading, Pennsylvania, Professor Walley received his B.A. (1921), M.A. (1922), and Ph.D. (1924) degrees from Princeton University. He joined the Ohio State faculty in 1925 and was appointed Professor Emeritus on his retirement in 1966 after 41 years as the English department's principal scholar and teacher of Shakespeare.

He was the editor of several textbooks on drama, and the author of many research articles on Shakespeare and his contemporaries. Perhaps he was most widely known as a demanding teacher who brought Shakespeare excitingly alive for generations of OSU students; in recognition of this accomplishment he was named "Professor of the Year" by the Arts and Sciences Student Council in 1952.

3335-3-08 Vice president for business and finance.*

- (B) The major area of responsibility and authority of the vice president for business and finance shall be that of the administration of the university operations. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the vice president for business and finance shall, under the direction of the president and with the approval of the board of trustees, be responsible and have the requisite authority for: the conduct and evaluation of all business and administrative activities and procedures, including management improvement programs; internal auditing; contracts administration; business management; business services; the development, allocation, utilization, and maintenance of the physical facilities, university public safety; university systems; the operation of the Fawcett center for tomorrow; and the coordination of all matters administratively assigned to the other vice presidents which relate to the business and administrative areas of the university.
- (C) The principal administrative officials of the office of business and finance shall include the associate vice president, physical facilities; assistant vice president, business and finance; university fiscal officer; assistant vice president, university public safety; assistant vice president, business management; assistant vice president, business services; assistant vice president, university systems; director, contracts administration; director, internal auditing; and such other associates as may be authorized from time to time. The purpose and intent of this Agreement is to create The Ohio State University Pooled Income Fund IV (the Trust), a pooled income fund as defined in Section 642(c)(5) of the Internal Revenue Code and the regulations thereunder, through which donors may make contributions to the University subject

to a retained life income interest. This Agreement and the Trust hereby created shall be construed and administered in a manner which is consistent with said statute and regulations.

- 1. Contributions. The Trust shall accept contributions of property (including money) from donors subject to the following terms and conditions:
- (a) An irrevocable remainder interest in the property shall be contributed to or for the use of the University.
- (b) The donor shall retain for himself and/or create for his spouse (to whom the donor is married at the time of the transfer) and/or other designated beneficiaries who are then alive and are acceptable to the Trustees, a lifetime income interest in the property transferred. If a spouse or other beneficiary is named as a co-beneficiary with the donor, the instrument of transfer shall designate the share of income payable to each and whether such shares are to be enjoyed concurrently and/or consecutively. The donor may retain the power exercisable only by will to revoke or terminate the income interest of his spouse or other designated beneficiary.
- (c) If donors retain for their joint lives an income interest in jointly owned property transferred to the Trust, the instrument of transfer shall designate the share of income payable to each such donor and upon the death of the first to die, the survivor shall receive the entire income interest for the rest of the survivor's life. However, each donor retains the power, exercisable only by will, to revoke or terminate the interest of the survivor created in the deceased donor's interest in the property.
- (d) Each instrument of transfer shall adopt and incorporate by reference all the terms and conditions of this Agreement, and each instrument of transfer shall in turn be adopted or incorporated by reference herein.
 - (e) The donor may not revoke an income interest of the University.

2. Certain Properties Excluded.

- (a) The Trustees shall not accept or hold any property transferred under arrangements other than those specified in this Agreement and Section 642(c)(5) of the Internal Revenue Code.
- (b) The Trustees shall not accept or invest in and the Trust shall not include any securities, the income from which is exempt from federal income tax.
- 3. Commingling of Life Income Properties. The Property transferred to the Trust by each donor shall be commingled with and invested or reinvested with other property transferred to the Trust by other donors satisfying the requirements of paragraph 1 of this Agreement.

4. Fiscal Year - Valuation Dates. The Trust shall operate on a fiscal year ending on June 30. The Trust property shall be valued on the first day of each fiscal year (including a fiscal period of less than 12 months), on the first day of each quarter-annual period, and on each date on which property is transferred to the Trust by a donor.

5. Allocation and Distribution of Income.

- (a) The income share of each beneficiary for each quarter-annual period of the Trust shall be determined by the rate of return earned by the Trust for such period with respect to his income interest (computed on the basis of units of participation). Income distributions shall be paid quarterly not later than 20 days after the end of each quarter. An adjusting payment, if necessary, will be made during the taxable year or within the first sixty-five (65) days following its close to bring the total payments to the actual income to which the beneficiary or beneficiaries are entitled for the year.
- (b) Each income interest retained or created shall be assigned a number of units of participation which number shall be computed by dividing the fair market value of the property transferred by the fair market value of a unit in the Trust immediately before such transfer. The fair market value of a unit in the Trust shall be determined by dividing the fair market value of all property in the Trust at such time by the number of units then in the Trust. Although the value of the units vary from time to time, all units in the Fund shall always have equal value.
- (c) The amount of income allocated to each unit of participation in the Trust shall be determined by dividing the income of the Trust for the taxable year by the outstanding number of units in the Trust at the end of such year; provided, however, that in the allocation of income to units outstanding during only part of a year (or part of a quarter-annual period) the Trustees shall take into consideration the period of time during which such units were outstanding.
- (d) The income interest of a beneficiary shall terminate with the last regular payment made before his death. The Trustees shall not be required to prorate any income payment to the date of the beneficiary's death.

6. Classification of Income.

- (a) For purposes of this Agreement the term income refers to the ordinary income of the Trust after deducting any costs and expenses incurred by the Trust which are properly chargeable to income, determined under the law of Ohio, and such term has the same meaning as it does under Section 643(b) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, or corresponding provisions of any subsequent federal tax law and the regulations thereunder.
- (b) In allocating receipts and disbursements as between principal and income, the Trustees shall be governed by good accounting practices. Specifically (without intending to limit this general rule) all net gains realized

in the sale or other disposition of securities and other investments, capital gains distributions received from investment companies, mutual or common trust funds, liquidating distributions, and all other items not defined as income under Section 643(b) of the Internal Revenue Code, shall be allocated to principal.

Despite any provision of this Trust to the contrary, the Trust shall not accept, hold, or invest or reinvest in, any common trust fund unless it is a common trust fund to which Section 584 of the Internal Revenue Code applies.

7. Distribution of Remainder Interest.

- (a) Upon the termination of an income interest, an amount equal to the value of the remainder interest in the property upon which the income interest was based shall be severed from the Trust and transferred to the University. The value of the remainder interest for such purpose shall be its value as of the date of the last regular payment made before the beneficiary's death.
- (b) The instrument of transfer by the donor may include a statement of his intention or a direction as to the purposes for which the property is to be used by the University. Any such statement or direction shall be reviewed by the Trustees of the Trust and the transfer shall not be accepted unless such purposes are in furtherance of the charitable purposes of the University. If it is not possible for the University to use such property for the specified purpose, then such property shall be used for the general purposes of the University.

8. Maintenance of Trust - Trust eeship.

- (a) The Trust has been created and will always be maintained by the University, and the Trustees shall be subject to the control of the University. The University may remove any one or more of the Trustees at any time without cause, and in case of such removal or other vacancy in the Trusteeship, the University shall designate one or more successor Trustees.
- (b) No donor to the Trust or beneficiary of an income interest in the Trust shall be eligible to serve as Trustee, and no donor or beneficiary shall exercise any responsibilities, directly or indirectly, with respect to the Trust which would ordinarily be exercised by a Trustee.
- (c) All expenses of operating the Trust, including any compensation payable to the Trustees, and all other costs and expenses, will be paid from the Trust.

9. Administrative Powers.

(a) Subject to the provisions of paragraph 10 and the rules and regulations applicable to pooled income funds as defined in Section 642(c)(5) of the Internal Revenue Code, the Trustees shall have full and complete power

and authority to administer the property in the Trust, including the power to retain, sell, assign, transfer, exchange, mortgage, pledge, contract with respect to, and in any manner dispose of any or all of the property; to lease property, including leases for terms extending beyond the period of the Trust; to execute any instruments or writings incidental to the exercise of their powers; to exercise any voting, subscription and other rights and privileges incidental to securities; and to cause securities to be registered in the name of a nominee. The Trustees are given broad discretion in the investment of funds, including the authority to invest in all types of securities - other than tax exempt securities, see paragraph 2(b) - and other classes of property deemed to be in the best interests of the beneficiaries and the University. No person dealing with the Trustees shall be under a duty to see to the application of the proceeds of any transaction, and the execution of any instrument or paper by the Trustees shall be conclusive evidence to those dealing with them of their power so to act.

- (b) The Trustees may consult with the managers and investment advisers holding the general endowment funds of the University, and may make use of University services in connection with purchases and sales of securities and other properties. It is intended, however, that this Trust shall at all times be maintained as a separate investment account operated by the Trustees. Detailed accounting records shall be maintained at all times, specifically identifying the assets included in the Trust and the income earned by such assets.
- 10. Federal Tax Requirements. The following specific prohibitions shall apply to the Trust, as a split-interest trust within the meaning of Section 4947(b) of the Internal Revenue Code:
- (a) The Trustees shall not engage in any act of self-dealing as defined in Section 4941(d) of the Code.
- (b) The Trustees shall not retain any excess business holdings as defined in Section 4943(c) of the Code.
- (c) The Trustees shall not make any investment in such manner as to subject the Trust to tax under Section 4944 of the Code.
- (d) The Trustees shall not make any taxable expenditures as defined in Section 4945(d) of the Code.

11. Duration of Trust - Amendments.

- (a) The Trust shall remain in existence as long as any life income interests are outstanding, and thereafter until all property in the Trust has been transferred to the University.
- (b) This Agreement shall be irrevocable and shall not be subject to amendment except to comply with Section 642(c)(5) of the Internal Revenue Code and the regulations thereunder, or corresponding provisions of any subsequent federal tax law or regulations.

Alfred B. Devereaux

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on September 20, 1983, of Alfred B. Devereaux, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Engineering Graphics.

Alfred B. Devereaux was born February 2, 1903, in Mechanicville, New York. He received the B.S. degree from the United States Military Academy in 1925. He served as an Instructor in various Garrison and Troop Schools in the United States Army. Professor Devereaux served as Assistant Professor of Military Science & Tactics at Cornell University from 1936 to 1940. His World War II duties included service in the European Theater of Operations and a term as Director of Field Artillery Training at Fort Bragg, North Carolina. His decorations included the Bronze Star and the Legion of Merit. From 1951 to 1955 he served as Professor, Military Science and Tactics, at The Ohio State University. He retired from the U. S. In 1958 he was promoted to Assistant Professor and served in that capacity until his retirement from The Ohio State University in 1973.

Professor Devereaux concentrated his efforts on teaching and provided improvements in Engineering Graphics instruction through course development. He had excellent rapport with students and was an effective and conscientious teacher.

Jean R. Geisman was born in Ohio City, Ohio in March 1933. He attended The Ohio State University, receiving the B.S. (1955), M.S. (1956), and Ph.D. (1958) degrees in horticulture, specializing in food technology. He joined the faculty of the Department of Horticulture in 1958 as an assistant professor. He was promoted to associate professor in 1963, professor in 1967, and assistant chairman in 1980. In 1961, he conducted post-doctoral research at the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies. During his 25 years on the horticulture faculty, Dr. Geisman taught many undergraduate and graduate courses in food processing and related areas, served as an advisor for a number of M.S. and Ph.D. graduate candidates, worked with many OSU student organizations and University committees, and achieved wide recognition for his research with vegetables for processing. A committed and popular teacher, he served as advisor for the University Fruit and Vegetable Society, Phi Eta Sigma and Alpha Lambda Delta (freshman honorary societies), and was assistant advisor to the OSU Food Technology Club. He served a number of years as chairman of

the Department of Horticulture Graduate Committee. Professor Geisman conducted research with fermentation of selected vegetable crops. He was widely recognized for his research on waste utilization and disposal of waste from the food processing industry. He developed techniques for reuse of spent brine from the pickling industry and utilization of tomato seed protein.

Dr. Geisman published widely and was a member of many professional organizations. He was a co-founder of the Buckeye Chapter of Phi Tau Sigma. He held memberships in the Institute of Food Technologists, American Society of Horticultural Science, Institute of Sanitation Management, Alpha Zeta, Gamma Sigma Delta, and had served in many offices in the Ohio Valley Institute of Food Technologists. He served on a number of national and regional educational, research, and industry committees during his career. At the time of his death, he was chairman of the OSU Radiation Safety Committee, member of the Graduate Council and its curriculum committee, and on the College of Agriculture Patent Advisory and Faculty Government Committees. He had served in leadership positions on a number of other University and College of Agriculture committees in past years. Among the honors he had received were the Distinguished Service Award from the Ohio Program National Junior Horticulture Association and in 1982, the Distinguished Teaching Award from Gamma Sigma Delta. He was listed in Who's Who in American Men & Women in Science.

Robert M. Zollinger, M.D.

An internationally known surgeon and teacher of surgery, Robert M. Zollinger, M.D., retired in 1974 as professor and chairman of Ohio State's Department of Surgery after 28 years in that position. He also held the title of Regents Professor.

Dr. Zollinger received his bachelor of science degree at Ohio State in 1925 and his M.D. degree in 1927. He spent 14 years on the medical faculty at Harvard University before returning to Ohio State. His military service during World War II included a period as senior consultant on general surgery for the European Theater of Operations.

He is the author or coauthor of more than 330 publications, including the Atlas of Surgical Operations and the Textbook of Surgely. He has served on numerous editorial boards and has been editor of the American Journal of Surgery.

Dr. Zollinger has shared his talents throughout the world, serving as president or chairman of several professional societies and as visiting professor at many medical schools. His many awards and honors include fellowships, honorary degrees, and the establishment of the Robert M. Zollinger Chair of Surgery in Ohio State's College of Medicine. He received the Joseph M. Sullivant Medal, the highest award conferred by Ohio State, in 1965.

Christa Wolf Doctor of Humane Letters

Recognized as the outstanding novelist today in her native East Germany, Christa Wolf has attracted international attention and acclaim to her considerations of feminism, socialism, and humanism. Her writing has achieved such stature that it transcends the limits of cultural policy control prevalent in her homeland.

Her work has explored styles ranging from the traditional to the avant-garde, while consistently displaying a unique combination of outstanding literary talent and a deep philosophical commitment to the present and future cause of humanity. Through extensive lecturing and travels in Europe and, briefly; in the United States, she has provided an example both to writers of her generation as well as to younger writers of German fiction in the East and West.

Christa Wolf's first published work in English, The Quest for Christa T., in 1970, was called "a literary landmark" by the New York Post and "one of the few great novels in the German language since the war" by the London Times. Her works in German are studied extensively at universities throughout the United States.

She has received numerous prizes, including the East German Heinrich Mann Prize in 1963, the National Prize of East Germany's Academy of Arts in 1964, and the Georg Büchner Prize of the West German Academy for Language and Literature in 1990.

She has been writer-in-residence at Oberlin College and, during Spring Quarter 1983, was Distinguished Visiting Professor of German and Women's Studies at Ohio State.

The University is honored to recognize Christa Wolf for her contributions to literature and her commitment to the critical examination of our world.

Walter L. Hartman Distinguished Service Award

During 35 years as assistant director and later director of the Physical Plant Department, Walter L. Hartman made sure that the University's power was generated efficiently and that its facilities kept pace with the newest technological developments.

Hartman joined the staff after returning from military service in World War II and immediately set out to modernize the McCracken Power Plant's electrical systems, which had become outdated during the Depression and the war years. He was instrumental in the purchase and installation of nearly all the major equipment still operating in the power plant.

When the power plant reached its capacity in 1959, he arranged for the University to connect with supplemental outside power sources. When the plant's coal-fired boilers raised environmental concerns in the 1960s, Hartman supervised their conversion to natural gas. He continued an active role in Ohio State's Energy Conservation and Management programs until his retirement in 1981. Until then—and subsequently, as a volunteer—he was instrumental in exploring the feasibility of a return to coal-fired generation of power at Ohio State in a manner that will be environmentally acceptable and economically advantageous.

Hartman holds a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering from Ohio State. He has been active in professional circles and has received the Outstanding Service Award of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers in 1980.

Walter Hartman's service to the University has been vitally important to the campus. Ohio State shows its gratitude today by presenting him with a Distinguished Service Award.

THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE ONE THOUSAND ONE HUNDRED AND NINETY-FIFTH MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Columbus, Ohio, December 8, 1983

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, December 8, 1983, at The Ohio State University Fawcett Center for Tomorrow, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: John D. Jacob, Chairman, D. James Hilliker, Edmund C. Redman, Leonard J. Immke, John W. Berry, Shirley D. Bowser, and Hamilton J. Teaford.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

The Chairman, Dr. Jacob, called the meeting of the Board of Trustees to order at 12:00 noon. He requested the Secretary to call the roll. The meeting recessed into Executive Session for the purpose of considering legal issues and personnel-related matters.

Present: John D. Jacob, Chairman, D. James Hilliker, John F. Havens, Edmund C. Redman, Leonard J. Immke, John W. Berry, Shirley D. Bowser, and Hamilton J. Teaford.

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Dr. Jacob reconvened the meeting at 1:30 p.m.

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ENROLLMENT -- AUTUMN QUARTER, 1983

President Jennings called on Mr. Ihrig to present a report on the Autumn, 1983 enrollment situation.

Mr. Ihrig made the following statement:

Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. Chairman, before you is a brief report that provides the highlights of enrollment by the various categories within the University. I will not take the time to review that in detail, but I'd like to summarize part of the material from that report.

The efforts to reduce the numbers of undergraduate students on the Columbus campus have been successful for 1983. New, first quarter entering freshman were reduced by 270 students from the prior year; we reduced undergraduate transfer admissions and also the number of undergraduate students who had 'stopped out' for a quarter or so and had returned to the University. However, while reducing the numbers of entering students on the campus, two other factors had reversed the impact of these actions. First was that undergraduate retention increased for the continuing undergraduate students, which increased those enrollments 615 over the prior year. Our retention rates of first year/second year students, for example, are now at around 79.23 per cent, and that increase is about 5 per cent over what that retention rate was five years ago. In addition to the retained students--the retention of undergraduate students increasing, the numbers of graduate students reversed a declining trend since 1980, and we had 157 more graduate students this year than the previous year. So the overall result on the Columbus campus was 53,757 students, which is 319 above the previous year, which is about 6/10ths of a per cent increase, which is really steadystate--where we've been over the past five years.

In addition, on the regional campuses—all those campuses showed enrollment increases for the fiscal year—or for the 1983 academic year, and for a total increase on the regional campuses of 261. And our total University enrollment is at 58,359. And again, overall that is about a less than 1 per cent increase.

ENROLLMENT--AUTUMN QUARTER, 1983 (contd)

Based on these data and looking ahead for continuing improvements in the preparation of our undergraduate students, since currently some 25 per cent of our entering freshmen are placing in the top quartile in the ACT test scores and some 45 per cent of our freshmen enrollments are from the top 20 per cent of their high school classes, and with the continued emphasis we are having on improved high school preparation prior to coming to Ohio State, we think that our retention levels will be maintained at these high levels and probably in the future further increase. Based on that fact along with our graduate student enrollments, we've set planning targets for next autumn quarter (in 1984) for the entering freshman class of 6.500, and undergraduate transfers at 2.000. Our planning target for this year was 6,800, and this reduction--let me remind you that is not a part of the decrease of potentially up to 2,000 students that we were talking about if the funding levels from the state had been reduced. This is a part of our normal planning, looking ahead and taking into account our assumptions of maintaining our high retention rates and the number of students that will be here who are already enrolled for next year, and our graduate student enrollments. So our new targets for next year will be 6,500, heading toward an eventual steady-state where these fluctuations we have had over the last few years would be at around 6,600 entering freshmen. So for the next couple of years we are looking at a slight dip in that and then coming in at a steady-state level around 6,600.

We have alerted, through correspondence, the high school counselors throughout the State of Ohio, that there is a strong possibility that in early January we will be closing off admission to Ohio State, even up to two weeks earlier than the action occurred last year. But, the overall good news in all this is that OSU continues to attract the better prepared students at this University. That completes my report. If there are any questions, I will be glad to respond.

President Jennings called on Dr. Tzagournis to introduce the report on the Medical Research and Development Foundation.

Dr. Tzagournis made the following statement:

Mr. President, Drs. Robert Wall and Robert Fass are here; they are officers of the MRDF, and will present the report.

Dr. Wall made the following statement:

Or. Jacob, President Jennings, the MRDF Board has now functioned for about four years plus, and with the passage of time and the fact that there are new members on the Board, I would like to make a few introductory statements.

MRDF stands for the Medical Research and Development Foundation, which was created March 2, 1979. All faculty members of the College of Medicine who are members of the fourteen different clinical departments—that is, departments that are directly involved in patient care—and who are full-time members of the faculty, and who are M.D.'s, are automatically members. Each year these departments, who vary greatly in their mission, responsibilities and functions, have their elected finance committees draw up a plan of enrichment for that year, which, following approval by 75 per cent of their membership, the dean of the College of Medicine and the Practice Plan Committee, becomes binding on all members of that department for that fiscal year.

The function of the Board of Trustees of the MRDF is to serve as an agent to facilitate and monitor the functioning of these approved plans. The Board has four members from the administration appointed by title--the Chairman of this Board, the President of the University, the Chief Fiscal Officer, and the Dean of the College of Medicine-and six elected faculty members. The Board of the MRDF meets periodically, but the day by day work is done by one half-time accountant who is the only employee, and the officers of the Board. There is only one committee--the finance committee, whose members are Weldon Ihriq, Dr. Bob Fass who is Treasurer, Dr. Wooley who is Secretary, and I sit on it ex officio. We have no operating funds so we generate such funds by floating our enrichment funds; this is to pay minimal operating expenses for one employee and for our auditing fees each year, and a few office expenses. These funds have generated additional monies over our expenses which have been contributed equally to our operating fund to pay our expenses, to the Dean of the College of Medicine for whatever his priorities are for its use, and we return a third of it prorated to the departments who left the money to generate interest--otherwise we wouldn't have any money floating.

The functioning of the Board has been, to my perception at least, extremely amicable with a good exchange of ideas and common agreement on all issues at least to date. And with the new sense of stability and growth of our college and firm leadership both at the college and University level, and full cooperation of all the faculty members who are in MRDF, we have had no significant problems at this time that we haven't been able to handle.

There has been a steady growth in enrichment contributions for the programs by the MRDF members. Some departments have limited resources and some of them are more affluent. None have regressed in their programs and the more affluent have steadily increased their contributions which will be outlined by Dr. Fass. These enrichment programs support specific objectives and they are designed by the members of the department who best know what their needs are in that department which cannot readily be met by the restraints of University funding and its priorities. They fund the purchase of equipment: typewriters, computers, medical equipment, etc.;

educational support for undergraduate and post-graduate students in the form of books, travel to medical meetings, start-up funds for student research and equipment; funding and equipment for newly recruited faculty as an important use of it; payment of visiting professors for research and teaching; and in some departments awards which have been given each year for excellence in teaching and research. Careful monitoring is made to assure that none of these monies return to any of the MRDF members which would jeopardize our nonprofit foundation status. We hope you will be pleased, as we are, with the increase of enrichment funds from our first fiscal year of approximately \$1.8 million to the projected 83-84 fiscal year of \$3.9, and an increase this year which will be approximately 33 per cent.

I guess with all that good news you always have some concerns. A major one is the new TEFRA tax law which has considerable impact on the practice of medicine in general, and particularly in teaching institutions such as ours. While the regulations are not entirely clear--as far as I know they might not even be written--they could significantly decrease the income particularly related to outpatient clinical functions. Dean Tzagournis and his staff have been aware of this and have shown a leadership role in trying to solve the problem. Besides the enrichment programs we have outlined, there are expenses to be paid in the outpatient clinic -- these continue to escalate. In one department they have risen from \$79,000 to \$240,000 in only two years. Payment of these expenses comes from the same sources as the enrichment programs, and it is feared that if these expenses are not contained, and with the income decreases that could occur related to the TEFRA laws, it potentially could have an adverse effect on the continued growth of the enrichment programs.

Dr. Fass will report on the specifics of our function and we will try to answer any questions that we can when he is finished. We really appreciate the opportunity to address the Board.

Dr. Robert Fass made the following statement:

I will try and be brief and round most figures off.

Most of our money we keep track of along two lines. One line is the cumulative funds that are available from each of the fourteen departments. In fiscal year 82-83 the total budget for those fourteen departments was just under \$3 million; that amount was deposited and used for the stated purposes, and the cash balance at the beginning and the end of the year was approximately \$550,000. For the first quarter of 83-84 the fund float has been a little bit greater. As Dr. Wall pointed out, the budgets-accumulative budgets for the fourteen departments are just under \$4 million rather than just under \$3 million. And so far within the first quarter, \$1-1/3 million has been deposited. The current balance after the first quarter of the current year is just over \$1 million.

The other sort of fund that we keep track of is the operation account fund which is the money that is generated from the interest from the fourteen departments leaving it there before that money is spent. For fiscal year 82-83, our opening balances and closing balances were \$96,000 and \$92,000 respectively. We generated \$73,000 in income from our investments--at about \$73,000, as Dr. Wall already pointed out, \$30,000 was given to the College of Medicine and \$30,000 was returned to the participating departments. Our actual expenses, our actual true operating expenses are only about \$17,000, and most of that was for our half-time employee. For the first quarter of the current fiscal year, again our opening balance was \$92,000 and to date we have generated almost \$26,000 in interest, leaving a balance as of the end of September of \$114,000. Our board of trustees at its last meeting again voted to give \$30,000 to the college and redistribute \$30,000 of that to the participating departments, leaving the balance within the operational account.

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REPRINTED STATUTES APPLYING TO THE UNIVERSITY, BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, AND RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY

BE IT RESOLVED, That the reprinted text of the Statutes Applying to the University, Bylaws of the Board of Trustees, and Rules of the University Faculty dated September, 1983 be adopted as the official publication of the Board of Trustees.

ART ACQUISITION POLICY

Resolution No. 84-61

Synopsis: Adoption of a policy for the acquisition of objects of fine art is proposed.

WHEREAS the University, over the years, has acquired outstanding collections of fine and decorative art and other objects and has a commitment to expand and enhance these collections to benefit teaching and research in the arts; and

WHEREAS the acquisition of objects of fine and decorative art having unique and individual characteristics and other objects of intrinsic historical or artistic value cannot, by its very nature, be accomplished by soliciting competitive bids:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance, upon the recommendation of the Dean of the College of the Arts, or other designated University official responsible for such collections, be authorized, on a continuing basis, to purchase, without competitive bidding, objects of fine or decorative art or other objects to be collected for and on behalf of the University from funds authorized for such purposes, upon such terms and conditions as are deemed to be in the best interest of the University, but not to exceed \$100,000.00 per art work or collection based on an appraisal (or appraisals) acceptable to the University.

Harold J. Grimm

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on November 10, 1983 of Harold J. Grimm, Professor Emeritus, Department of History, College of Humanities.

Dr. Grimm was born in Saginaw, Michigan in 1901. He took the B.A. degree from Capital University in 1924, and his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from The Ohio State University in 1928 and 1932 respectively. He was appointed as assistant professor in 1937, associate professor in 1942, professor in 1947, and then went as professor and chairman of the Department of History at Indiana University from 1954-1958. Dr. Grimm returned to Ohio State in 1958 and served as Department Chairman from 1958-1967.

Dr. Grimm's speciality was Reformation history and his textbook on the Reformation has been widely used for over two decades. He was truly a distinguished student of Martin Luther and of the social impact of the Reformation throughout Europe. In the course of his career Dr. Grimm served as President of the American Society of Church History, as President of the American Society for Reformation Research, was a charter member of the Foundation for Reformation Research, and was elected a Member of the Royal Historical Society and of the Royal Society of Arts.

Dr. Grimm was known as an inspiring teacher, and one who was thoroughly dedicated to this University and to his adopted state. His talents and interests were recognized when he was named Honored Professor of the Year in Arts and Sciences (1950), and when he received the Alumni Award for Distinguished Teaching in 1963. He also received a Distinguished Service Award from this University and from Capital University as well. Dr. Grimm's devotion to the state is seen in his long service on the Board of Trustees of the Ohio Historical Society, during which he served two years as President (1973-75).

Professor Grimm always believed it his duty to support his local community as well as his University. For seven years (1940-47) he served on the Board of Trustees of the Bexley Public Library, and for six years (1948-54) on the Board of Trustees of the Bexley Public Schools.

Dr. Grimm was named Regents Professor in 1968 and retired in 1972. Five years later, in 1977, he published a widely acclaimed book on Lazarus Spengler, a lay leader of the Reformation. Harold Grimm's life was an example to his many graduate students and to his colleagues as well that scholarship can be a delight throughout a long and useful life. Dr. Grimm died on the day the world was celebrating the 500th birthday of Martin Luther.

Victor W. Hoffman

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on November 10, 1983, of Victor Warren Hoffman, Assistant Professor Emeritus in the Department of Educational Theory and Practice.

Victor Hoffman was born at Greenfield, Ohio, on June 28, 1915. In 1934 he graduated from Chillicothe High School. He received a B.S. in Education in 1942 and a M.A. in Education in 1947, both from The Ohio State University. He was a graduate assistant at The Ohio State University School in 1942-43 and returned to join the faculty as an instructor from 1947 to 1957. The next year he joined the Academic Faculty of Industrial Technology Education as an assistant professor, continuing there until his retirement in June, 1980.

Professor Hoffman was elected to membership in Epsilon Pi Tau, an International honorary fraternity in technology education. In his 33-year career at The Ohio State University, he was a loved and respected teacher and counselor. He taught a National Defense Education Act sponsored institute for advanced study in industrial arts in 1968. He also taught State of Ohio sponsored advanced workshops in driver and safety education in 1969 and 1971.

He served on active duty with the U.S. Army from April 1943 until September 1946, serving as a communications officer. He retired from the U.S. Army Reserves in 1968 with the rank of lieutenant colonel.

Robert E. Mathews

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on November 4, 1983, of Robert Elden Mathews, Professor Emeritus of the College of Law.

Robert Elden Mathews distinguished career covered six decades of professional contributions, including fifty-two years of law teaching. He holds the longest tenure as a member of the faculty of the College of Law, The Ohio State University serving from 1924 to 1964. Upon retirement he was named Professor Emeritus by the Board of Trustees. Professor Mathews was born in 1894. He completed his undergraduate study at Yale University Phi Beta

Kappa and received his Juris Doctor degree from the University of Chicago in 1920. He began his law teaching at the University of Montana and served as a visiting professor at Columbia University, the Indian Institute of New Delhi, Harvard University, and the University of Texas where he taught part-time until his retirement at age 80 in 1974. His fields of teaching and scholarship were agency and partnership law, labor law, and professional responsibility.

Professor Mathews' scholarship contributions were significant. He contributed the section on Partnership for 30 Ohio Jurisprudence and edited the Fifth Edition of Mechem, Cases on the Law of Partnership, (1935). Subsequently, he published his own casebook, Cases and Materials on the Law of Agency and Partnership, Chicago, Callaghan and Company (1940) and (1957). Professor Mathews served many years as chairman of the Labor Law Group Trust, a nonprofit association, and was editor-in-charge of the early volumes of the Trust's publication series, including Labor Relations and the Law (1953), Readings on Labor Law (1955), and The Employment Relation and the Law (1957). He contributed various writings and, as others, he received no compensation. During the 1950's he developed innovative teaching problems for his course in Professional Responsibility. Subsequently, these were published in six revisions as Problems Illustrative of the Responsibilities of Members of the Legal Professional Responsibility and the Law School Foundation at the University of Texas. He directed several significant studies and his last publication appeared in 1972.

Professor Mathews had a consuming devotion to the principles of democracy and individual freedom, as well as public service. He served in Washington, D. C. from 1942-45, first with The Board of Economic Warfare and later as Associate General Counsel with The National War Labor Board. He contributed to many organizations, including the Association of American University Professors, the Association of American Law Schools which he served as national president in 1952, and the National Academy of Arbitrators. He served as chairman of the U. S. International Society of Labor Law, as a member of the U. S. National Commission for UNESCO, and taught at the American Law Institute's "Orientation Program in American Law" held at Princeton for some 140 international lawyers.

Professor Mathews was endowed with an indefatigable zest for life. His friendship and counsel were an inspiration to countless numbers. His long, dedicated and meaningful life is distilled in enduring quality of his work and the traditions of this University.

Wendell D. Postle, D.D.S.

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death on October 28, 1983, of Dr. Wendell D. Postle, Dean Emeritus in the College of Dentistry.

Dr. Postle received his D.D.S. degree from The Ohio State University in 1923. He maintained a successful private dental practice.

Dr. Postle received the Callahan Award of the Ohio Dental Association; the Centennial Award in 1966; the Distinguished Service Award in 1958 from The Ohio State University; the Distinguished Alumni Award from The Ohio State University College of Dentistry in 1981; and the Distinguished Service Award from the Pierre Fauchard Academy. He was a Fellow of the American College of Dentists, Past President American Association of Dental Colleges, and Past President of the Fund for Dental Education of the American Dental Association.

Dr. Postle was Dean of the College of Dentistry from 1938-1964. In 1976 Wendell D. Postle Hall, Dental Building, at The Ohio State University was dedicated in his honor. He was Faculty representative of the Big Ten Western Conference 1947-1960.

Dr. Postle was a member of First Community Church, Omicron Kappa Upsilon, Phi Kappa Psi, Psi Omega Dental Fraternity, Columbus Rotary Club, Presidents Club, Faculty Club, Columbus Club, Scioto Country Club and the Masons Scottish Rite and Aladdin Temple Shrine.

James C. Rubright

On campus, Professor Rubright was particularly active in curricular concerns and in the Honors Program of the Colleges of Arts and Sciences. He served as chairman of the Honors Committee from 1966-1972. He was also a member of the University Senate, and was advisor to the Sigma Epsilon Phi Fraternity and the Hellenic Student Association.

Mr. Tobin made the following statement:

Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Included in the agenda for this month's meeting is a new report on the Development program at The Ohio State University. The report covers the period from July through October in 1982 and 1983. Our purpose is to provide the Board with a more useful view of fund-raising at The Ohio State University. The report shows gifts by source and by type, and compares this year with 1982.

When I assumed my position seven months ago, the President indicated that he expected me to increase the annual level of contributions. If you look at the total gifts for the period through October of this year you will see that it is \$5.8 million, some 20% below the same period in 1982. However, this difference was caused by the Molly Caren gift of \$1.7 million which was received during this same period in 1982.

To give you a better impression of the progress in fund-raising at Ohio State, let me report some preliminary figures through November of this year. Our gift total from all sources stands at approximately \$9.4 million. This is 15% ahead of a year ago. In addition, I would mention that we are currently 83% ahead in the number of alumni donors. This is attributed to expanded and improved direct mail and phonothon programs introduced this summer. We are 40% ahead in non-alumni donors, which is attributed to the WOSU summer TV solicitation drive. We show a 50% increase in corporate donors because of an expanded corporate matching gift program. We currently are 38% below last year in total alumni dollars but, once again, this can be attributed to the Molly Caren gift. If one were to exclude the Molly Caren gift, we would actually be 5% ahead of a year ago in the alumni gift category. Finally, I would report to you that we are 161% ahead in non-alumni donors this year as compared to last.

If you find this information of value, Mr. Chairman, the Development Fund would be pleased to continue making monthly reports of this character in the future. Thank you.

Present: John D. Jacob, Chairman, D. James Hilliker, John F. Havens, Edmund C. Redman, Leonard J. Immke, John W. Berry, Shirley D. Bowser, and Hamilton J. Teaford.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

The Chairman, Dr. Jacob, called the meeting of the Board of Trustees to order at 11:45 a.m. He requested the Secretary to call the roll. The meeting recessed into Executive Session for the purpose of considering legal issues and personnel-related matters.

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Dr. Jacob reconvened the meeting at 1:30 p.m.

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CAPITAL PLAN

President Jennings called on Mr. Ihrig to review the Capital Plan that will be presented to the General Assembly within a few weeks.

Mr. Ihrig made the following statement:

Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. Chairman, Board Members, two years ago when I came before you to present the Capital Plan for the current biennium, we noted at the beginning that we had a very short time to prepare the plan and submit it. It appears that the same scenario has happened again this biennium, but we had one great advantage through the foresight and the early efforts of David Marsh, who is sitting here by Mr. Nichols, our Assistant Vice President for Campus Planning, who started working this summer with the Deans and Vice Presidents regarding their priorities. We are well prepared to respond to the call for the Capital Plan for the next six years—that is, the next three bienniums—as we work in the Capital Planning process.

That process for the State of Ohio begins with each of the universities and colleges submitting their plans to the Board of Regents for the six years that starts July 1, 1984 and goes through June 30, 1990. The Regents will review and determine—and make their recommendation to the Governor for a Capital Plan for all higher education. The current schedule is for the Regents' recommendation to be finalized by mid-March this year, with the Governor's recommendation being submitted to the General Assembly by the first of April. The General Assembly will then consider capital funding for the first of the three bienniums—for fiscal years 1985 & 1986. The staff members from the Board of Regents, as well as the Office of Budget and Management, have been on all of our campuses to perform site visits and to obtain background information in order to make their recommendations.

The documents submitted in a Capital Plan, in case you are interested in the bulk and size of them, are what I have in my hand-they are this thick. In order to save you from all of this mass of paperwork, we have tried to summarize the material in the

CAPITAL PLAN (contd)

folders that are in front of you. What we have provided in those folders, you will find for each of the three bienniums. If you look on page three for the first biennium of '85-'86, you will find the summary listing of the projects and the dollar amounts in millions of dollars; and starting on the following page, brief descriptions of each of the projects; starting on page four, the equipment, utilities and renovations; and on page five, more of the line-item type projects.

What I'd like to do is review with you the basic philosophies and guidelines that we've used in putting together this plan and the priorities in which it is submitted. The first major item is our instructional equipment at this University, erasing the backlog of needs and bringing it up to state-of-the-art condition. The majority of the equipment we use for instruction is in the age range of fifteen years, because it was provided at the time of the building boom of the 1960's, as part of the basic construction budgets for the capital projects. Requests from the deans have defined a backlog of around \$84 million dollars in equipment replacement needed for our instructional and research activities. We are requesting a \$30 million catch-up in the first biennium; and this includes \$5 million allocated toward expanding our computer networks on campus to make sure that we enhance the computer literacy of our students and our faculty.

In our second priority we are requesting a total of \$28 million, to be used for what we classify as utilities and renovation. This is where we are working to protect the previous investment of the state in the capital facilities at this University, as well as maintain the various infrastructure support programs that keep this campus community, as well as every campus, alive and working well. Seventy-three percent of the six-year request items relate directly to equipment, utilities and renovation, rehabilitation or replacement of old facilities. Over the six years we have fifteen major buildings we are requesting for renovation; the average age of these fifteen buildings is sixty-eight years old.

In addition to the replacement and rehabilitation, we have to recognize that we have changing patterns within enrollments within the institution (even though total enrollments are level), changing patterns in instruction and research activities, and our continued efforts to meet accreditation standards. We must provide facilities that are responsive to these needs. In addition, we have new academic areas that need to be supported, and in addition we have the need to consolidate various academic departments where over the years, as they have grown and evolved, they have had to be housed in several different buildings on campus. Consolidation is a high priority guideline as we rehabilitate facilities in order to provide more efficient use of personnel and facilities.

We are also maintaining the process we started last biennium, and if you note on the listing on page three, that at the far left margin there are five projects with asterisks after them. Those

CAPITAL PLAN (contd)

projects had planning monies provided in the current biennium capital funding; now we are asking for the construction funds for those projects. In each of the bienniums, we have listed major renovation-type projects in which we are asking for the planning money. This is needed so that once we get into the facilities, we have an accurate cost of what it will take to do the renovation work. In addition, it makes better use of the time available and in scheduling new projects. All the monies in this request are in dollars as of January, 1984, so they are consistent; and we have hopes that as the recommendations go forward, those numbers will be enhanced to the appropriate time in which the projects would be bid.

I'd like to note also that in setting these priorities we have attempted to respond to the areas of the greatest need and in the areas of new thrusts that we think are important to the overall mission of this institution. However, we have to take into account that when we are building a new facility, all we need to do is have the vacant land. The problem with renovation and rehabilitation work in existing facilities is there are people and activities going on in those buildings; so that we have to--and this is what Dave Marsh and his staff spend many, many hours on--plan for the relocation of the people to minimize the amount of relocation involved and to move them back into consolidated, improved quality space. This is a significant problem and it does affect the priorities of when certain projects can be implemented.

We think in overall summary that we have a sound plan to maintain and upgrade, where needed, the University's facilities as we prepare to move into the next decade.

I'd be glad to respond at this time to any specific questions that you may have regarding this material.

Mr. Redman:

Mr. Ihrig, does this include the Cancer Hospital or any parts of it other than the radiation?

Mr. Ihrig:

Right. The radiation is a planned component of that because the radiation facilities in the current University Hospital are out of date. And so this does include the radiation relocation into the Cancer Research Center.

Mr. Redman:

But, nothing in this projection includes...

CAPITAL PLAN (contd)

Mr. Ihrig:

No, that is in the current biennium and we expect to have that funded except for a certain amount of the equipment which we cannot acquire until after the center is constructed.

Mr. Redman:

So, that would be in addition to what we have?

Mr. Ihrig:

Yes, sir.

President Jennings:

Well, remember the Cancer Facility is in the Capital Budget for the last biennium, and so that that facility is already authorized by the General Assembly--

Mr. Redman:

But, didn't the Governor put a hold on that --

President Jennings:

No, the Governor has not pulled back on that. He did put a hold on all capital projects during the Issues 2 and 3 discussion, but the Cancer Center is part of the past appropriation. It would only have to go in there for reappropriation insofar as the funds were not encumbered by 30 June, and we expect to have bids let and everything encumbered by 30 June of '84--or virtually everything encumbered.

Mr. Ihrig:

Except for the equipment.

President Jennings:

Yes.

Mr. Jackson:

Mr. President, if things go on normally on the Cancer Research Center, bids should be taken in April.

President Jennings:

Of course they will go on normally, right?

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY

Resolution No. 84-72

Synopsis: Amendments to rules 3335-3-19, 3335-3-20, 3335-5-37, 3335-5-52, 3335-5-60, 3335-7-13, 3335-7-14, 3335-7-15, 3335-7-16, 3335-7-20, 3335-7-21, 3335-7-22, 3335-7-23, 3335-7-32, 3335-7-33, 3335-9-12, 3335-9-14, 3335-9-17, 3335-9-171, 3335-9-18, 3335-9-20, 3335-9-30, 3335-9-321, 3335-11-06, 3335-13-01, and 3335-13-03 are being proposed.

WHEREAS the University Senate pursuant to rule 3335-1-09 of the Administrative Code is authorized to recommend through the President to the Board of Trustees the adoption of amendments to Rules of the University Faculty as approved by the University Senate; and

WHEREAS the proposed changes in the Rules of the University Faculty were approved by the University Senate on December 3, 1983, as follows:

AMENDED RULES

3335-3-19 University registrar.

Subject to the direction of the vice provost for student affairs, the principal duties of the university registrar shall be the supervision of the details of registration, records, and scheduling which shall include: distribution of registration forms; distribution of approved schedules; fee assessments and adjustments; record of fee payments; maintenance of current quarter schedules; maintenance of home or permanent addresses, name and address of person(s) to be notified in case of emergency, local addresses and the respective telephone numbers of all currently enrolled students; the posting of quarters of attendance; the posting of all courses and respective marks; recording of all probations and dismissals; recording of withdrawals; recording of all degrees earned and dates; recording of all past names and other demographic data; the distribution of the official student records to include the proper confidentiality safequards; scheduling of classroom space, classes, and final examinations; offering placement testing, admission testing, test scoring services, a mechanism for student evaluation of teaching, and coordination of the credit by examination programs; other routine duties associated with the registration, records, and scheduling of students; and special projects and duties that may be assigned from time to time by the vice provost for student affairs.

3335-3-20 Director of admissions.

Subject to the direction of the vice provost for student affairs, the principal duties of the director of admissions shall be as follows:

(G) Engage in special projects or duties as may be assigned from time to time by the vice provost for student affairs.

3335-5-37 Membership.

There shall be a university senate, a unicameral body constituted as follows:

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

(A) Voting members: the voting members of the senate (throughout this document the word "senate" shall be taken to mean the university senate) shall consist of

Twenty-four administration members

Sixty-eight faculty members

Forty student members, consisting of twenty-five undergraduate, ten graduate, and five professional student members.

Any change in the number of members representing one of three primary categories shall necessitate an adjustment in the total membership in order to maintain to the nearest percentage the ratio of these numbers.

(B) Non-voting members: senate members not entitled to vote on the floor of the senate, but otherwise to participate in all senate deliberations, shall include the university ombudsman, the director of alumni affairs, the secretary of the university senate, the president of freshman senate, the president of undergraduate student government, the vice president of undergraduate student government, the president of the council of graduate students, and the president of the graduate-professional council.

3335-5-52 Council on admission and registration.

- (A) The council on admission and registration shall consist of nineteen members chosen as follows:
 - (1) Appointed members. Three members of the university faculty shall be appointed by the president for three-year terms. Appointed members shall be eligible for reappointment.
 - (2) Ex officio members. The persons holding the following titles shall be ex officio members: vice president for academic affairs and provost or designee (who shall serve as chairperson of the council); vice provost for student affairs or designee (who shall serve as secretary of the council); vice president for business and finance or designee; university registrar; and the director of admissions.
 - (3) Members elected by the senate: six faculty, at least three of whom shall be senate members; two undergraduate students; two graduate students; and one professional student.

3335-5-60 University calendar committee.

- (A) The university calendar committee shall consist of fourteen members as follows:
 - (1) Six members of the university faculty for terms of three years. A faculty member completing a full term shall be ineligible for reelection for one intervening year;
 - (2) Four students consisting of two undergraduates (including a senate member), one graduate, and one professional student;

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (3) The vice president for academic affairs and provost or designee;
- (4) A representative of the council of deans;
- (5) The university registrar, or designee, ex officio;
- (6) The vice president for personnel services, or designee, ex officio.

3335-7-13 Class rosters.

Instructors shall make their class rosters solely from the rosters issued by the office of the university registrar, except that each department or school is authorized to change the hour assignment of a student for courses offered in more than one section. The department or school shall notify the office of the university registrar of all such changes.

3335-7-14 Approval of student schedules.

The deans or secretaries of the several colleges and schools, or designees, shall approve the schedules of classes of students in their colleges and schools but the assignment to hours and all changes in such assignment shall be made by the office of the university registrar.

3335-7-15 Changes of schedules.

No instructor shall change the hour or place of meeting of any class to which a student has been assigned except with the approval of the office of the university registrar.

3335-7-16 Cancellation of elective courses.

As promptly as possible after the filing of the election cards, the office of the university registrar shall report to the dean of the college or director of the school having charge of the department or program concerned all elementary elective courses (those numbered below 300) in which fewer than twelve students are enrolled and all elective advanced undergraduate courses (those numbered 300 and above) in which fewer than eight students are enrolled. The dean or director shall cancel every such course unless the department or program can show adequate reason why it should be given. When such a course is cancelled, the dean or director shall notify the office of the university registrar, who shall insert in the official bulletin a notice of its cancellation.

3335-7-20 Schedules for final examinations.

(A) Examinations for classes taught on the regional campuses and for classes whose enrollment is exclusively of students registered in the colleges of dentistry, law, medicine, optometry, pharmacy, and veterinary medicine will be scheduled by the offices of the regional campuses and of the colleges respectively. All examination schedules prepared outside the office of the university registrar shall, before publication, be cleared with the office of the university registrar which shall have the power to resolve all conflicts.

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (B) Examinations for graduating students shall be arranged by individual instructors so that final grades for the affected students may be submitted to the office of the university registrar by the deadlines established by that office.
- (C) All other final examinations shall be centrally scheduled by the office of the university registrar. The official examination schedules shall be strictly adhered to by all instructors. Any deviation must first be approved by the appropriate university official (department chairperson, regional campus dean and director, or college dean) in consultation with the office of the university registrar, which shall have the power to resolve all conflicts.
- (D) In performing its scheduling function the office of the university registrar shall limit individual examinations to two-hour duration and the total examination period to no more than five days.

3335-7-21 Marks.

The official marks of the university are as follows: "A," "A-," "B+," "B," "B-," "C+," "C+," "C-," "D+," "D+," "E," "EM," "I," "K," "P," "PA/NP," "R," "S/U," "W." These marks shall have the following meaning:

(A) "A," "A-"

The instructor judged the student to have satisfied the stated objectives of the course in an excellent manner. The student's performance was judged to be in this range of high quality based upon a comparison with other students in the course, and/or with students who have taken the course previously, and/or the instructor's personal expectations relative to the stated objectives of the course, based on the instructor's experience and expertise.

(B) "B+," "B," "B-"

The instructor judged the student to have satisfied the stated objectives of the course in an above-average manner. The student's performance was judged to be in this range of above-average quality based upon a comparison with other students in the course, and/or with students who have taken the course previously, and/or the instructor's personal expectations relative to the stated objectives of the course, based on the instructor's experience and expertise.

(C) "C+," "C," "C-"

The instructor judged the student to have satisfied the stated objectives of the course in an average manner. The student's performance was judged to be in this range of average quality based upon a comparison with other students in the course, and/or students who have taken the course previously, and/or the instructor's personal expectations relative to the stated objectives of the course, based on the instructor's experience and expertise.

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

(D) "D+," "D"

The instructor judged the student to have satisfied the stated objectives of the course in a low but acceptable manner. The student's performance was judged to be in this range of below average but acceptable quality based upon a comparison with other students in the course, and/or with students who have taken the course previously, and/or the instructor's personal expectations relative to the stated objectives of the course, based on the instructor's experience and expertise.

(F) "EM"--examination

- (1) This mark indicates credit given to students registered in the university on the basis of examinations taken prior to or after admission to the university. The level of achievement which must be demonstrated by the student on these examinations in order to receive "EM" credit shall be determined by the department or school in which the course is offered for credit, in accord with the criteria for the award of letter grades. This credit, up to a maximum of forty-five credit hours, shall be assigned only upon the authorization of the chairperson of the department or the director of the school and with the approval of the authorized representative of the dean or director of the student's enrollment unit. Additional examination credit hours may be assigned specific curricular programs with the prior approval of the council on academic affairs.
- (2) Examination credit shall not be given to a student for a course in which the student has received a mark at this university for which the student has transfer credit from some other college or university. Conversely, no course for which "EM" credit has been received can be taken later for a grade or credit. No credit points are allowed for courses in which a mark of "EM" is given.

(G) "I"--incomplete

- (1) An "I" indicates that the student has completed a major portion of the work in the course in a satisfactory manner, but for reasons judged by the instructor to be legitimate, a portion of the course requirements remains to be completed.
- (2) The mark "I" shall be reported to the office of the university registrar together with the mark which the university registrar is authorized to enter on the student's official record unless a different mark is reported to the office of the university registrar in the manner and within the time described below.
- (3) The student must complete the work so that the instructor of the course may report the final mark at the earliest possible time, but not later than noon of the sixth Saturday of the quarter following the quarter in which the "I" was received. For legitimate reason the instructor may establish a deadline for the

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

completion of the work which is within the maximum time permitted. Upon petition of the student within this period, the authorized representative of the dean or director of the enrollment unit in which the student was last enrolled after consultation with the instructor of the course, or, if the instructor is unavailable, the chairperson of the department involved, may for good reason allow a student additional time in which to complete the work. Generally, this shall not be longer than the end of the quarter following the quarter in which the "I" was received. Any decision extending the period shall set forth the time in which the student shall complete the work and a copy of the decision shall be forwarded to the office of the university registrar.

- (4) As soon as the incomplete work has been made up, the instructor, or in the case of the instructor's absence from the university, the department chairperson or the director of the school, shall file the proper mark in the office of the university registrar. Until such time as a final mark is recorded the credit for the mark "I" shall be counted as hours only, and shall not be considered in determining a student's point-hour ratio under rule 3335-7-26 of the Administrative Code.
- (5) In no case shall a student who has received the mark "I" be permitted to repeat the course in which such mark was received until such time as the "I" has been removed and then only in such cases as fall within rule 3335-7-28 of the Administrative Code.

3335-7-22 Report of marks.

Upon completion of the course requirements, marks for every student shall be reported to the office of the university registrar in accord with deadlines listed in the quarterly master schedule of classes.

3335-7-23 Alteration of marks.

- (A) A mark filed in the office of the university registrar is a part of the official records of the university. It is subject to change only when a procedural error has been discovered in evaluation or recording of a grade. Action to change a grade must be initiated before the end of the second succeeding quarter. In no case will a grade be revised in accordance with criteria other than those applied to all students in the class. If the instructor agrees that an error in the mark was made, the mark will be changed upon written authorization of:
 - (1) The instructor of the course,
 - (2) The instructor's department chairperson,
 - (3) The director of the instructor's school, if applicable,
 - (4) The dean of the instructor's college, and

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

(5) The authorized representative of the dean or director of the student's enrollment unit.

If a student believes that a procedural error in grading was made, the student should meet with the instructor. If the instructor does not agree that a procedural error was made, the student may meet with the department chairperson to discuss the grade grievance. The chairperson shall respond to the student no later than thirty days after the student has requested a review by the chairperson. Upon receipt of the chairperson's response, if the issue is not resolved to the satisfaction of the student, the student may within two weeks request in writing by duplicate submission to the dean or director of the instruction unit and the department chairperson the procedures in paragraph (B) of this rule. Unresolved cases of grade grievance due to grading procedures are subject to paragraph (B) of this rule; unresolved cases of grade grievance due to other causes are not subject to paragraph (B) of this rule.

- (B) Unresolved cases of grade grievance due to grading procedures shall be reviewed by a faculty departmental committee appointed by the department chairperson.
 - (1) In cases of instructors still affiliated with the university, the review committee shall consult both the student and the instructor and shall determine the validity of the grade grievance due to grading procedures. The review committee shall make its findings known in writing to both the student and the instructor within thirty days of the student's request to the chairperson.

If the committee finds that a procedural error has occurred and if the instructor declines to accept the findings of the review committee, the committee shall consider the reasons for not authorizing a grade change given by the instructor and may, upon consideration of these reasons, authorize in writing a grade change to be instituted by the department chairperson.

(2) In cases of instructors no longer affiliated with the university, the findings of the committee shall be reported to both the student and the instructor. If the instructor chooses not to respond, the judgment of the committee shall prevail. If the instructor responds and declines to accept the findings of the committee that a procedural error has occurred, the committee shall consider the reasons for not authorizing a change given by the instructor. In either case, the committee may, upon due consideration, authorize in writing a grade change (if such can be determined) to be instituted by the department chairperson.

If a department committee can find no academic basis upon which to recommend an appropriate grade for the course, the student shall be given the option of having the course stricken from the student's record and, if so desired, to retake that course without prejudice or penalty.

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

(C) If charges of grave academic misconduct against an instructor are made and substantiated under rule 3335-5-04 of the Administrative Code, the department chairperson shall be authorized to appoint a department grade grievance committee to consider grading errors that are alleged to be related to the misconduct. The committee shall consider all evidence and present, in writing, a report to the chairperson indicating any recommended grade changes. The department chairperson shall be authorized to institute grade changes in accordance with the recommendations of the committee.

If a department committee can find no academic basis upon which to recommend an appropriate grade for the course, the student shall be given the option of having the course stricken from the student's record and, if so desired, to retake that course without prejudice or penalty.

3335-7-32 Withdrawal from courses or from the university.

- (D) After five p.m. of the third Friday of a quarter and until five p.m. of the seventh Friday of a quarter, if a student withdraws from any or all courses which began in the same quarter, the university registrar is authorized to enter the mark "W" on the student's official permanent record for the courses withdrawn.
- (E) After five p.m. of the seventh Friday of the quarter or the second Friday of a summer term, a student who because of circumstances beyond his/her control finds it necessary to withdraw from any or all courses, must file the appropriate petition with the authorized representative of the dean or director of the enrollment unit. Reasons not acceptable include (but are not limited to) the student's performance in the course(s), lack of preparation for the course(s), or dissatisfaction with the subject matter offered in the course(s). If the petition is approved. a copy will be filed with the university registrar who is then authorized to enter the mark "W" on the student's official permanent record and the instructor(s) of the course(s) will be so notified. If the petition is not approved, the student continues to be enrolled in the course(s) and a final mark must be submitted by the instructor(s). Withdrawal from any and all courses shall not be permitted after the last day of regularly scheduled classes except when the student experiences a genuine emergency after the regularly scheduled classes end and prior to sitting for the final examination in a given course or courses.

3335-7-33 Conditions for disenrollment from a course.

- (A) After consultation with the instructor, the chairperson of the instructor's department (or other appropriate administrative official) may disensell a student from a course if:
 - (1) By the third instructional day of the quarter or the second scheduled class session of the course, whichever occurs later, the student fails to attend the scheduled course without giving prior notification to the instructor. In such cases the chairperson (or other appropriate administrative official) shall notify the student's college office. A change ticket removing the course from the

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

student's schedule shall be prepared and copies forwarded to the student and to the office of the university registrar. The student is not relieved of the responsibility for dropping such course in the customary way.

- (2) The student enrolls to audit a course without the instructor's approval, or fails to meet the prerequisites of the course, or fails to demonstrate adequate preparation as provided in rule 3335-7-30 of the Administrative Code. Disenrollment procedures shall be the same as in paragraph (A) (1) of this rule.
- (B) After consultation with the instructor, students in the course, and the student in question, the chairperson (or other appropriate administrative official) may disenroll a student from a course if the student presents a clear and present threat of bodily harm or injury to the instructor or fellow students, or after warning continues to engage in disruptive conduct, either of which results in impairment of teaching or learning processes.
 - (1) If, after attempting to resolve the difficulty by informal means, the department chairperson (or other appropriate administrative official) deems disenrollment necessary, the affected student shall be notified in writing. The notice shall be delivered by hand or sent through ordinary mail to the student at the last address supplied pursuant to rule 3335-9-09 of the Administrative Code. Copies of the disenrollment action shall be sent to the dean of the instructional college, the dean of the student's college, the office of the university registrar, and the office of student affairs.
- (C) For disenrollment, exclusive of audit, under sections (A) and (B) of this rule, the university registrar shall enter on the student's official permanent record:
- (D) If a student who has enrolled to audit a course fails to complete the requirements for audit specified by the instructor and also fails to withdraw from the course, the instructor shall so inform the office of the university registrar when marks are reported for the quarter. That office will then disenroll the student from the course, removing the course from the student's permanent record, and will notify the student and the student's college of the action taken.
- 3335-9-12 Registration conditional upon payment of fees.
- (A) All quarterly bills, fees, and deposits required from students must be paid at the office of fees and deposits prior to and as a condition of registration for that quarter.
- 3335-9-14 Time of registration and payment of fees; penalties.
- (A) Payment of fees is required of all students each quarter by the close of business on the date established by the vice provost for student affairs in cooperation with the appropriate offices, and published by the office

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

of the university registrar. This fee payment deadline will apply to the postmark date for fees paid by mail and to the date of receipt for fees paid in person. Failure to meet this requirement will result in a penalty assessment, unless excused by the university registrar or designee.

3335-9-17 Filing registration forms.

All students are required to present their registration forms with course requests each quarter at the time and place announced by the office of the university registrar. Failure to comply with this rule will result in a penalty assessment.

3335-9-171 Additions to approved schedules.

- (D) Because of the accelerated nature of summer-term courses, deadlines for adding these courses are as follows: from the first day of classes until the official closing time on the first Friday of each summer term a student may add a course only with the permission of the instructor (or, with the instructor's concurrence, a representative as appointed by the department) and the approval of the student's enrollment unit. After this date a student wishing to add a summer-term course to the approved schedule must have, in addition, the permission of the instructor's department chairperson or the director of the school (or of the designated representative of the chairperson or the director).
- (E) For courses of shorter duration deadlines and approval procedures will be established by the instructional unit in which the course is offered after consultation with the office of the university registrar.

3335-9-18 Return of fees.

- (D) In order to be eligible for the listed refund, the student must present to the office of fees and deposits--within the time listed above--written permission to withdraw, signed by the dean of the student's college, at which time the student's fee card must be surrendered.
- (E) If exceptional conditions prevent the presentation of the authorization to withdraw at the office of fees and deposits at the proper time, and if the student has not been able to attend classes during this time, the case should be referred for decision to the university registrar or designee.

3335-9-20 Improper admission or registration.

Admission or registration may be cancelled by the director of admissions or the university registrar in cases of improper registration or when false or incomplete information is provided on the application for admission, registration forms, or other official documents. No credits earned subsequent to such cancellation and prior to proper admission or registration shall be entered upon the permanent record of the student. Students whose admission or registration is cancelled are not entitled to any refund of fees.

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

3335-9-30 Requirements for an undergraduate baccalaureate degree.

To obtain an undergraduate baccalaureate degree from this university, an undergraduate student must:

(G) Except for paragraph (B) of this rule, waiver of any part of this rule in the case of individual students may be made only by the council on academic affairs following prior approval by the appropriate executive committee. The vice president for academic affairs and provost shall transmit all affirmative actions of the council on academic affairs under this paragraph to the secretary of the student's college and to the university registrar for notation on the student's permanent record.

3335-9-321 Requirements for certificate of study.

A certificate of study may be awarded concurrent with or following the student's receipt of a baccalaureate degree. Award of such certificates shall attest to demonstrated competence in a coherent academic curriculum, program, or area of study.

(B) Waiver of any part of this rule in the case of individual students may be made only by the council on academic affairs upon recommendation of the executive committee of the college, colleges, or school. The vice president for academic affairs and provost shall transmit all affirmative actions of the council under this section to the secretary of the student's enrollment unit and to the university registrar for notation on the student's permanent record.

3335-11-06 Student use of university facilities.

(B) No student, group of students, or registered student organization may announce an activity involving the use of university facilities including outdoor space or may use such facilities for an activity, unless such use has been approved first by the student organizations and activities office and has been scheduled through the office of the university registrar in accordance with rule 3335-13-03 of the Administrative Code.

3335-13-01 Drives and canvassing.

- (A) Canvassing or solicitation for funds, sales, or subscriptions are prohibited on university campuses or in university buildings unless written permission therefor shall first have been granted by the office of the university registrar which may seek recommendation regarding requests for permission from appropriate university offices.
- (B) The sale of merchandise of any kind whatsoever, or publications or services upon university property, other than by the regularly authorized stores, restaurants, departments or divisions of the university, is likewise prohibited except upon written permission of the office of the university registrar which may seek recommendation regarding requests for permission from appropriate university offices. The responsibility and authority of the office of the university registrar under this rule may be delegated by it to a member of the university faculty or staff.

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

3335-13-03 University facilities.

- (B) The office of the university registrar shall be responsible for the scheduling of and shall have the necessary authority to schedule all university facilities. No meeting shall be scheduled in or announced for any university facility unless permission to use the facility has been obtained in advance from the office of the university registrar. All requests for the use of university facilities shall indicate the nature of the proposed meeting. If the proposed meeting is one to which a quest speaker is to be invited, the request for the use of university facilities shall indicate the name of the quest speaker and shall be submitted to the office of the university registrar at least two weeks prior to the date the meeting is to be held, but such two-week period may be waived by the office of the university registrar if the exigencies of the situation so require and the orderly scheduling of university facilities would not be unduly prejudiced (see rule 3335-5-06 of the Administrative Code).
- (D) The responsibility and authority of the office of the university registrar under this rule may be delegated by it to a member of the university faculty or of the staff of this university.

WHEREAS the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University did, on January 9, 1976, amend paragraph (G) of bylaw 3335-1-08 of the Administrative Code to state that "buildings and structures shall not be named for any person who is an officer or employee of the University or the State of Ohio, but may be named for a person who has been retired or has otherwise left such a position for a minimum of three years"; and

WHEREAS the President wishes to recommend that the Technical Education Center on the Mansfield Campus be named to honor Henry R. Fallerius who retired on January 31, 1984 as President of the North Central Technical College:

BE IT RESOLVED, That the applicable requirements of paragraph (G) of bylaw 3335-1-08 of the Administrative Code be waived so that the Technical Education Center on the Mansfield Campus can be named for an officer or employee of the University or the State of Ohio who has not been retired from such position for three years.

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EARLY RETIREMENT INCENTIVE PROGRAM

Resolution No. 84-77

Synopsis: Early Retirement Incentive Program is proposed.

WHEREAS in July 1983, the Ohio General Assembly enacted Amended Substitute House Bill 410 which became effective on October 7, 1983, enabling universities and colleges to establish retirement incentive plans for individuals at their respective institutions who are members of the State Teachers Retirement System (STRS); and

EARLY RETIREMENT INCENTIVE PROGRAM (contd)

WHEREAS The Ohio State University desires to adopt such a retirement incentive plan in order to provide more flexibility in its long term planning for its academic human resource needs:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That effective April 15, 1984, and continuing for one year thereafter, the University will purchase service credit, in one year increments, for eligible STRS members electing to retire under this plan, and further that the amount of service credit purchased shall not exceed the lesser of three years or one-fifth of the individual's total service credited by STRS as of the date the eligible STRS member elects to participate in this plan; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That to be eligible, all members must be members of STRS and must have attained the age of fifty (50) and be currently eligible to retire or eligible to retire after including the years of service credit to be purchased under the plan; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the maximum number of eligible members under this plan will be limited to five percent (5%) of the total number of individuals at the University who are members of STRS as of January 1, 1984, and further that if the total number of persons applying for this program exceeds the five percent (5%) maximum, then approval for participation will be determined in accordance with Section 3307.35; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That those individuals who are eligible and approved for participation in this plan must retire within ninety (90) days of notification that additional service credit has been purchased; and further that those individuals who retire under this plan will not be eligible for participation in any other supplemental or early retirement program previously established by the University; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the President and/or the Vice President for Personnel Services are hereby authorized to notify the State Teachers Retirement System on the official form approved by that agency of The Ohio State University's election to participate in a retirement incentive plan in accordance with Section R.C. 3307.35 and the terms of this resolution.

William M. Drenten

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on January 13, 1984, of William M. Drenten, Assistant Professor in the School of Journalism.

William M. Drenten was born January 7, 1926, in Grand Rapids, Michigan. He received the B.A. degree from Otterbein College in 1951. He began his professional career in news as a reporter and cameraman for WBNS-TV, Columbus, Ohio in 1951, working in that capacity until 1958 at which time he became news director for the television station. During the next two years he worked as a stringer for CBS, NBC and Sportlite, Inc. and during the period 1964 to 1968 he worked as state supervisor of the NBC Ohio Election Unit. In 1959 he joined the faculty of the School of Journalism as an assistant professor of broadcast news and continued in that position until his death. He was a veteran of the U. S. Professor Drenten was active with the Boy Scouts of America and was awarded its highest honor for leadership, the Silver Beaver Award. Norman Levine

Professor Levine was born in Cleveland, Ohio on November 22, 1923, and was educated in the public schools of that city. He served as a Weather Officer in the Army Air Corps during the Second World War. He graduated from Western Reserve University in June 1947 with a B.S. in Mathematics. He received his M.A. degree in August 1948 and his Ph.D. degree in August 1951, both in Mathematics from The Ohio State University. He was a Teaching Assistant here from 1947 through 1949 and an Instructor from 1950 through 1952. Professor Levine then worked as a Mathematician for the Department of Defense until 1953, when he accepted a position as Assistant Professor of Mathematics at the University of Pittsburgh. Professor Levine was a member of the Mathematical Association of America. He was the author of over sixty mathematical research papers, mainly in the field of point set topology. He directed more than twenty Ph.D. dissertations. He prepared meticulously both for his classroom teaching and for his coordination of large enrollment courses. He served on every important departmental committee, displaying sensitivity and flawless judgement.

In 1956, Mr. McDonough joined the faculty of St. Joseph's High School in Cleveland as a teacher and as track coach. During this period he entered graduate school on a part-time basis and completed work for an M.A. degree in Physical Education at Western Reserve University in 1959. In 1963, Mr. McDonough became Athletic Director at St. Joseph's High School and remained in that capacity until 1967, when he went to Kent State University as Assistant Professor in Health and Physical Education, in addition to serving as Assistant Track Coach.

He went to the State University of New York at Buffalo in 1972 as Head Track Coach, where he remained until joining the athletic staff at The Ohio State University, December 1, 1975.

Mr. McDonough served as Assistant Track Coach at Ohio State. He was named Head Coach of Cross Country in 1976. A devoted student of the sport of track and field, he especially enjoyed the challenge of coaching distance runners. He worked with each runner individually, breaking down each event into component distances and then calculating desired times for each segment. He spent countless hours working with runners, encouraging and prodding them to improve their times.

Robert L. Wills was born in Omega, Ohio, on July 3, 1910. He received a B.A. degree from The Ohio State University in 1931 and a J.D. degree in He earned both Phi Beta Kappa and Order of the Coif. associated with the Cleveland, Ohio, firm of Thomson, Hines and Flory between 1934 and 1937 and was engaged in law practice in Chillicothe, Ohio, between 1937 and 1944. During World War II he served on active duty with the United States Naval Reserves. Professor Wills joined The Ohio State University College of Law in 1946 as an Associate Professor, was made a Professor in 1952, and served as Director of the College's Legal Clinic from 1947 to 1955. In 1979, Professor Wills was named the first recipient of the C. William O'Neill Professorship in Law. While at Ohio State, he taught courses in civil procedure, pleading, federal courts, decedents' estates, and jurimetrics. He was also instrumental in designing and implementing the computer-based statistical program governing the admissions and grading policies at the College of Law. Even after his retirement from the law school faculty in 1981, Professor Wills served as a computer consultant to the law school and continued to teach decedents' estates as an Adjunct Professor.

Professor Wills made enormous contributions to the legal profession and law reform. He was a consultant to the Advisory Committee to the Ohio Supreme Court that modernized the Ohio Rules of Civil Procedure, a member of the Probate Reform Committee in Columbus and the Ohio Judicial Council, and he worked actively with the Ohio State Bar Association Committee on Judicial Administration and Law Reform. He also worked actively with several bar associations, including relevant committees of the American Bar Association, the Ohio Bar Association, the Columbus Bar Association, the Association of Trial Lawyers of America, the American Judicature Society, and the Association of American Law Schools. He lectured often to lawyers. Professor Wills also made enormous contributions through his scholarship. He published two books: Materials on Ohio and Federal Pleading (1958), and Materials on the

Administration of Decedents' Estates (1962, and revised periodically). Among his many law journal articles are several significant ones in The Ohio State Law Journal.

On behalf of the University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deepest sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as an expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy.

As a special note, the University and the Board of Trustees express their sorrow on learning of the death on January 27, 1984, of CLARA R. RADER. A graduate with two degrees from The Ohio State University, she was a member of the faculty in physical education from 1919 to 1923. Mrs. Rader was the first woman to receive the University's Distinguished Service Award from the Board of Trustees. The award was granted to Mrs. Rader in 1954, soon after the inception of the Distinguished Service Award program. During her life she was very active in alumni affairs, serving as a member of the Alumni Advisory Board for several years. In 1953 she received the Alumnae Council's Woman of Achievement citation.

REPORT ON INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS

President Jennings made the following statement:

Mr. Chairman, I would like to call on Mr. Thompson for a very brief report on intercollegiate athletics.

Mr. Thompson made the following statement:

Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. Chairman and Members of the Board, we are very pleased to announce today that after an extensive review by the Department of Education - Office of Civil Rights, The Ohio State University has been found to be in full compliance with Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 in the operation of its intercollegiate athletic programs. As you all know, Title IX of the Education Amendments prohibits discrimination against persons because of sex by educational institutions which receive federal financial assistance.

This review started because of a complaint that was filed back in November, 1974 (this is how long this review has been going on!), but it really focused--qot itself focused--in 1983. That is the time when the review team came to campus from the Department of Education, interviewed over a hundred persons, toured the facilities, as well as reviewed and requested various documents and resonnes. After this in-depth review we have now been found to be in full and complete compliance with the letter and the spirit of the law. This finding definitely demonstrates this institution's continuing commitment to the principles of affirmative action and equal opportunity for all individuals regardless of sex, race, religion, age, national origin, disability, or Veteran status. Indeed, our athletic programs, which include over thirty different intercollegiate sports--half of which are open to women--represent one of the most comprehensive programs in the United States. I must say that the tremendous efforts of the Office of Affirmative Action, as well as the Department of Athletics, to ensure this equality of treatment for men and women clearly merits our recognition. We are very proud to present this to you today. Thank you.



THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE ONE THOUSAND ONE HUNDRED AND NINETY-SEVENTH MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Columbus, Ohio, March 2, 1984

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Friday, March 2, 1984, at The Ohio State University Fawcett Center for Tomorrow, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: John D. Jacob, Chairman, D. James Hilliker, Daniel M. Galbreath, Edmund C. Redman, John W. Berry, and Hamilton J. Teaford.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

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The Chairman, Dr. Jacob, called the meeting of the Board of Trustees to order at 11:45 a.m. He requested the Secretary to call the roll. The meeting recessed into Executive Session for the purpose of considering legal issues and personnel-related matters.

Present: John D. Jacob, Chairman, D. James Hilliker, Daniel M. Galbreath, Edmund C. Redman, John W. Berry, and Hamilton J. Teaford.

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Dr. Jacob reconvened the meeting at 1:30 p.m.

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CONDITIONAL/UNCONDITIONAL ADMISSIONS

President Jennings called on Dr. Haenicke to give a report on the progress that has been made on the conditional/unconditional admissions program which goes into effect Autumn Quarter, 1984.

Dr. Haenicke made the following statement:

Mr. President, Mr. Chairman, members of the Board, I am very pleased to submit to you today a report on our preliminary findings regarding the new conditional/unconditional admissions policy which you, as a Board, approved in April of 1982. At that time the University stated that in order to be unconditionally admitted, the student had to complete a college preparatory high school curriculum as defined by the University. You stated at that time that this policy was to take effect in the Autumn Quarter of 1984, which is just before us. Since then many people in the University have been busy preparing the incoming students, the parents, the high school counselors and our OSU faculty for this new policy. The faculty committee here at Ohio State has given enormous time and effort to screen applications, to assess high school curricula, and, in general terms, to ease transition into the new policy.

I would like to mention briefly the members of the committee. They are: Professor Cooper from History, Professor Crosswhite from Education, Professor Garnes from English, Professor Horrocks from the College of Medicine/Physiological Chemistry (who is with us), and Professor Warmbrod from Agriculture. Professor Cardozo-Freeman and Dr. Baumer, in my office, provided leadership and support--Dr. Baumer is in the audience, too, as is our very able Director of Admissions, Dr. Mager, who is in charge of the entire and very complex technical operation.

The results of the efforts that we have made are very encouraging. The Class of 1988, the approximately 6,500 freshmen entering our University this fall, might be the best prepared group of students to enter the University in recent years. We think that the new policy is the reason for this change. Let me briefly explain. At The Ohio State University, a college preparatory high school curriculum is defined as follows: you have to take fifteen units in high school; four of them in English; three in mathematics; two in natural

science; two in social science; two in foreign languages; one in the visual and performing arts; and one additional unit taken from any of the above. Students who have not completed this college preparatory curriculum will be admitted to the University conditionally. Conditionally admitted students must remove what we term the deficiencies within the first 30 credit hours of study. That would be approximately during the first two quarters of their presence at OSU, and these credits would not count toward the completion of the degree requirements in college. In other words, the number of credit hours required for graduation will be increased by the number of hours required to remove a deficiency.

Each student's high school record is assessed at the time application for admission is made. Depending on the student's high school curriculum and the grades received, he or she will receive a personal letter. If students appear highly qualified academically but have what we call deficiencies, we strongly encourage them to come and we offer advice regarding the additional courses that they would have to take. Students who we think have little chance of succeeding at Ohio State, given their high school preparation, are not immediately admitted; instead, we invite them to visit with us so that we can discuss their deficiencies and the likelihood or perhaps the lack of likelihood for their success. If they then still wish to enroll regardless of our reservations and counsel, they may.

The response of the State's high schools to this new admissions policy has been dramatic. Without question, there has been a general upgrading of preparation for all students--male, female, minorities--in the two years since you announced this new approach to admission to the Columbus campus. Many more applicants who will come for the Autumn Quarter of '84 have completed a college preparatory curriculum than did students admitted to the University two years ago. I would like to show you a table which demonstrates this change.

In the first table we have taken a rather large sample of 559 students who applied for admission in the fall of '82. announced the policy in April of '82, so the students who entered in the fall could not get prepared for that new policy. So the first column shows the enrollees for '82. Had we applied our current unconditional admission requirements to that group, 14.6% of them would not have met our requirements in English. Two years later obviously something has happened in the high schools. Only 7.6% are not meeting the requirements. In mathematics the decrease is even greater. Better than 16% at that time would not have met them; now only 7%. In natural sciences, a very dramatic change. In social studies, no change, but it is insignificant. In foreign language, half of them--down from 30% who would not have met the criteria then, down to 14% now; in the visual and performing arts, curiously the figure has stayed the same. At that time we would have had only 33.8% of students who had no deficiencies--now we have 51.6% who have no deficiencies whatsoever. And if you realize that we have an enormously large number of students who have deficiencies only in

this one credit--in the visual and performing arts--we could say that 76% of our students meet the new unconditional admissions requirement with a possible exception of the visual and performing arts. Turned around also for foreign languages, we could say that 86% of all students applying for the fall have met the foreign language requirement.

Obviously the high school administrators, the counselors and the teachers have done an outstanding job in informing the students of our new admissions policy and in helping us to meet these new requirements. Many high school officials have informed me that the new policy has helped to make that job easier. In the past, many students believed that because they intended to apply at OSU, which has a traditional policy of open admissions, they did not have to take college preparatory courses to attend. The situation, we believe, has now changed, and students have begun to recognize that college preparatory work in high school is necessary to attend OSU and to succeed here.

Clearly--and I wish to emphasize this--the unconditional/conditional admissions policy is not meant to end the open admissions policy of the University. Rather, it is intended to assure that more students are prepared in the best possible way for college level work. Students who come to the University with weak preparation have always found it difficult to compete successfully with students who have superior academic preparation. We are now seeking increasingly to help our students by assuring that the largest available number of them come to us with preparation that will make it possible for them to succeed with college level work.

The recent study of students admitted in the Autumn Quarter of '82 confirms the value of college preparatory training. For this purpose I will show you Chart 2 which shows us how the students that we admitted in '82 fared. The first column shows the retention rate. The retention rate is defined as the number of students that are still in college the Autumn Guarter of their sophomore year. Of the ones that came in the autumn, how many of them are still there in the autumn one year later? Overall, we retained 79.2%; of the students who had no deficiencies whatsoever, 81% are still there a year later; but, of the students who had deficiencies in both English and math, there is a significant 10 percent difference—only 71% of them are still there.

If you also look at how they fare in general coursework, you see that the students with no deficiencies whatever, of course, do best in college as a group. Their average, their mean grade point average, is 2.57; the next best group in terms of academic performance are the students who have no deficiencies in English and math. The students with deficiencies in English and math are the poorest performers by this indicator.

These new admissions policies have not kept students from applying at OSU. In fact, this year we received larger numbers of applications than ever before, necessitating the earliest ever cut-off for accepting applications for the Autumn Quarter of 1984. We cut off admissions on January 5, 1984. This is an indication, I think, that students across the state value highly the quality of education at our University. The remedial instruction that we had to provide for many years has been a heavy burden on higher learning in recent times. More than 20% of freshmen entering Ohio State in the Autumn Quarter of '83--last fall--required remedial instruction in mathematics or English and often in both. This figure is now down from previous years, in large part because of the extensive efforts that the University has made to work with high school students and teachers of mathematics and English. The mathematics department at OSU pioneered a program for testing high school juniors in mathematics as a means of preparing them for math requirements at the college level. The success is dramatic--in 1978 for instance, 26% of all freshmen had to take remedial mathematics; in 1980, this figure was down to 25%; in 1981, it was down to 21.7%; and in 1983, last autumn guarter, it was down to 18.9%. Down from 26% just in 1978--1 think that is a dramatic success, particularly if you translate that in real numbers, because we accept some 7,000-8,000 students depending on the year; and if almost 7% or 8% of them do not have to take math, as I said before that is a wonderful success.

More high school students are now taking mathematics and English as seniors, as a means of better preparing themselves for college level work. We anticipate that the need for remedial work at the An understanding of the University will continue to decline. fundamentals of mathematics and English composition, we think, is among the most important requirements for successful University Without these basic skills students are at a serious experience. disadvantage. That is why we place such great emphasis on adequate preparation. We want our students to succeed. We believe that better preparation and our increased articulation to the high schools have had an effect also on our general retention rates. For instance, in 1978, 75.6% of all freshmen survived into the Autumn Quarter of the next year--the sophomore year. In 1980, this figure had increased to 77.9%, to 78.3% in '81, and it stood at 79.2% in 1982. We are of course again very satisfied with this type of progress. We are making every effort to prepare our students for success in college.

Let me briefly point to the last chart that we have, Chart 3. This now shows you the profile of the students that we have processed as applicants. The total applicants that are processed and represented in these charts are better than 11,000 people. Of these we see that 7.6% have not taken four units of English--of the men, 8.3%; the women, 7%; minorities, 10.1%. Better than 51% have no deficiencies whatsoever, as we pointed out. The major problem that we defined at this point is in the area of visual and performing arts, and we are trying to address that in our discussions with high schools and our internal discussions, and in our negotiations internally

CONDITIONAL/UNCONDITIONAL ADMISSIONS (contd)

with the colleges about developing new courses. We were initially quite surprised that the foreign language requirement obviously does not pose the problem that some of us had expected. Seventy-six percent of our students meet it without any problem, and this figure of 14.4% who do not meet the language requirement does not indicate clearly whether it is just one unit by which they are short or two, because two units is what we require.

Again, as I've pointed out before, if we combine these two figures and leave out the visual and performing arts requirement because that is just one credit, we have a figure of better than 76% of our students who meet the requirements, which is a dramatic change over what would have happened, we think, had we not instituted the policy; because the comparative figures that we have from '84 show us that the figure would have been very significantly different. What we are doing is that we are providing appropriate courses for all students who need to remove deficiencies, so that we can lift the conditional status of their admissions. In some cases--foreign languages, for instance--we have new courses, but in the visual and performing arts we are still working on the appropriate remedies. The relatively small number of students requiring remedial work we think will not pose any big problems for the University. Our aim is, of course, to speed the day when none of our students will require remedial work at the university level any longer. This, Mr. President, concludes my report.

President Jennings:

Thank you, Diether. I think we can all be extremely proud of that record throughout the institution—the faculty, Diether's office, Professor Horrocks, Professor Baumer. I think this is a story in which the early success has been much more dramatic than I think any of us would have predicted. I think the most astonishing thing is the characteristics of these figures, where this is really just the first year that we have been working with this activity and yet we have seen such a remarkable turnabout. It is abundantly clear, I think, that not only does remediation go down, but the quality of a student's experience academically will go up considerably by coming to us with this preparation. It is really a program that has worked enormously well and I want to thank Diether's office and the entire staff for the really excellent work associated with this effort.

Mr. Galbreath:

Another thing, too, is that clearly it means that all other colleges and universities dealing with Ohio students are going to benefit from this program, too. And it shows that the kids are bright enough that they get the proper direction.

CONDITIONAL/UNCONDITIONAL ADMISSIONS (contd)

Dr. Jacob:

I think this really has worked out even better than we had a right to hope two or three years ago. The question that I would have, though, is that—it looks as though, if those numbers are reflected, that you will have about 2,000 kids who will show up this fall who are deficient in the visual and performing arts. And if you are going to give them that one course within the first 30 hours, that means you have got about 1,000 a quarter to put through the program.

Dr. Haenicke:

I thought they might enlarge the marching band or come up with some other creative suggestions. More seriously speaking, this is indeed a problem that we are trying to address. What we have in mind is this, where our general rule is that the students have to make up this deficiency in the first two quarters, we might ease that provision and say that they must make up that deficiency in the first year or year and a half or whatever so that we can normally spread it over a longer period--so that we can adjust it without having additional sections and additional staff and personnel to take care of that situation.

President Jennings:

Also, it will be extremely interesting for us to compare these figures that we have today with what that reality is next fall, because all of these youngsters have an opportunity to correct some of these deficiencies this spring semester in high school, during the summer in high school, or by coming to summer school at Ohio State. It will be interesting to see to what extent these numbers go down with the youngsters who actually show up here, because they have clearly gotten the word where they could adjust it in their high school—in their last semester of high school or in summer school. I think that is the next comparison coming—to what extent the kids make that adjustment.

Dr. Jacob:

If that is a significant adjustment, that would lead me to think even more highly of the program, because it influences the students to get this done before they get here. And that is what we have been trying to do all along, is it not?

President Jennings:

I think we have been preaching also that college preparation is really the most-at this stage--significant thing we can do, and I think that is the other thing that is very gratifying about this data. Solid evidence is now confirming the assumption that success in college is largely determined by the preparation one gets in high school. And then I think the final thing is that along that same line, the

evidence certainly suggests that the high school teaching is done very well, when they get the youngsters in the classroom. Part of the weakness of the high school operation has not been the teaching, but simply not getting the youngsters in the classroom. And the high schools, in terms of their quality, are getting beat up a little bit nationally, but I think this clearly indicates that when that high school teacher in general can teach a literature class or a mathematics class, they do a pretty good job. It really is a very nice thing and I think it is more than we could have hoped for.

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DISCONTINUANCE OF BACHELOR OF SCIENCE DEGREE IN LABOR AND HUMAN RESOURCES

Resolution No. 84-84

Synopsis: Discontinuance of the Bachelor of Science Degree in Labor and Human Resources is proposed.

WHEREAS on April 1, 1983, this Board approved the restructuring of the College of Administrative Science, which brought about the merger of the Academic Faculty of Labor and Human Resources and the Academic Faculty of Management Science to form the Academic Faculty of Management and Human Resources; and

WHEREAS the faculty of the College of Administrative Science endorse the discontinuance of the Bachelor of Science in Labor and Human Resources degree; and

WHEREAS the Bachelor of Science in Labor and Human Resources degree peaked at 45 students; and

WHEREAS the current eight students in the Bachelor of Science in Labor and Human Resources degree program will be protected, and may be graduated with said degree; and

WHEREAS the Master and Ph.D. degree programs in Labor and Human Resources will remain in place:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Trustees concurs with the decision of University Senate, on February 18, 1984, to discontinue the Bachelor of Science in Labor and Human Resources degree, and that said action is hereby approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Galbreath, seconded by Mr. Berry, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous voice vote.

TEMPORARY MEASURES FOR PROCESSING ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT CASES

Resolution No. 84-85

Synopsis: Temporary measures are proposed to expedite processing of matters before the Committee on Academic Misconduct while the University Senate deliberates rule amendments intended to alleviate the workload on a long-term basis.

WHEREAS the workload of the Committee on Academic Misconduct, as presently constituted, has increased to the extent that an unacceptably large backlog of cases exists; and

WHEREAS the principles of justice and equity require thoughtful and timely disposition of allegations of academic misconduct; and

WHEREAS appropriate committees of the University Senate are considering what changes in the <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> may be necessary to ensure equitable and prompt processing of cases before the Committee on Academic Misconduct in the long term, and it is anticipated that the review and revision process will take at least several months; and

WHEREAS the University Senate, in order to meet the immediate objective of addressing, as expeditiously as possible, the aforementioned backlog of cases, has proposed that certain provisions of Rule 3335-5-54 be temporarily suspended in accordance with the following:

That (1), the Committee on Academic Misconduct will temporarily be increased in size by the addition of nine faculty members, three graduate student representatives and three undergraduate student representatives;

That (2), the Steering Committee shall propose nine faculty members to serve as temporary members of the Committee on Academic Misconduct subject to approval by the Senate; the President of the Council of Graduate Students, with the approval of the Council of Graduate Students, shall appoint three temporary members of the Committee on Academic Misconduct to represent graduate students; and the President of the Undergraduate Student Government, with the approval of the Undergraduate Student Assembly, shall appoint three temporary members of the Committee on Academic Misconduct to represent undergraduate students. These persons shall serve in addition to the existing, regular members of the Committee on Academic Misconduct. These memberships on the Committee on Academic Misconduct shall cease when the purpose of this provision ceases:

That (3), from the pool of current and temporary members of the Committee on Academic Misconduct, the Committee may establish panels empowered to conduct hearings and make decisions with the same authority as the Committee on Academic Misconduct:

TEMPORARY MEASURES FOR PROCESSING ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT CASES (contd)

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Trustees of the University waives 3335-5-46 (T) (2) in order to implement this temporary change immediately, eliminating the necessity to submit this rule change to the further attention of the Rules Committee and resubmission to the University Senate; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the temporary suspension of Rule 3335-5-54 as proposed above is approved; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this action shall be effective immediately and shall continue in effect until permanent rules adopted by the University Senate increasing the size of the committee are approved by the Board of Trustees and implemented by the regular process for selection of committee members, but no longer than the last day of Fall Quarter, 1984.

Upon motion of Mr. Galbreath, seconded by Mr. Teaford, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous voice vote.

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AMENDMENTS TO RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY Resolution No. 84-86

Synopsis: Change in the use of the term "chairman" to "chairperson" and "chairmen" to "chairpersons" in Rules of the University Faculty is proposed.

WHEREAS on March 12, 1983, the University Senate passed a resolution changing the use of the term "chairman" to "chairperson" in Rule 3335-3-35; and

WHEREAS on April 1, 1983, this Board concurred with the above action of the University Senate by adopting Resolution 83-103; and

WHEREAS on March 12, 1983, the University Senate also asked that <u>all</u> uses of "chairman" and "chairmen" be changed to "chairperson" and "chairpersons", respectively, in the Rules of the University Faculty; and

WHEREAS the chairperson of the Rules Committee of the University Senate has now asked that the latter request be implemented:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Secretary of the Board of Trustees be authorized to change to the terms "chairperson" or "chairpersons" all remaining references to department administrators and committee heads in which the term "chairman" or "chairmen" is used, and that this change shall be reflected in the next published edition of the Rules of the University Faculty.

WHEREAS the chairperson of the Rules Committee of the University Senate has expressed that committee's view that these are editorial changes and not of a substantive nature, and that the committee has requested that the Board of Trustees make these changes in the Rules of the University Faculty without further action by the University Senate:

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Secretary of the Board of Trustees be requested to make the referenced amendments to the Rules of the University Faculty, to be effective immediately and to be reflected in the next published edition of that document.

AMENDMENT OF BYLAW OF UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS BOARD Resolution No. 84-88

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on February 9, 1984, of E. Kenneth Alban, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Horticulture. Professor Alban retired September 30, 1978, following nearly thirty-six years of distinguished service to the University.

Professor Alban received his B.A. degree from Denison University and his M.S. and Ph.D. degrees from The Ohio State University in 1943 and 1945 respectively. He worked with several nurseries in central Ohio following graduation from Denison. He came to Ohio State in 1942 to begin work on Master's and Ph.D. degrees. In 1943 he started working for the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station and teaching courses at the University in the Department of Horticulture. In 1943 he started research on chemical weed control in vegetables. He continued this work until his retirement and was recognized as one of the pioneers in chemical weed control, research, and teaching.

Over the years Professor Alban has taught many different courses in horticulture including introductory vegetable crops, advanced vegetable crops, general horticulture, weed science, greenhouse vegetable crops, vegetable breeding, and postharvest physiology.

Professor Alban was a member of Sigma Xi, American Society for Horticultural Science, Gamma Sigma Delta, Weed Science Society of America of which he was elected a Fellow in 1972, American Society of Plant Physiologists, American Institute of Biological Sciences, American Association for Advancement of Science, and the Ohio Academy of Science where he became a Fellow in 1949. More recently in 1977 he received the H. D. Brown Award from the Ohio Canners and Food Processors Association. He also received, at the Short Course for Potato Growers in 1977, the Golden Potato Award.

Professor Alban was the author of many scientific publications as well as commercial publications for growers.

Through his teaching and concern for people, Professor Alban gained the respect of his students, associates, and commercial producers. Through his guidance and his many contributions to chemical weed control, Dr. Alban's influence will have a lasting impact for generations to come.

Alvia L. Bozeman

Dr. Bozeman received her Bachelor's and Master's degrees from Virginia State University. She completed her doctoral program from The Ohio State University in 1958. For more than thirty-five years, she was a teacher of children, youth, and adults. She joined the faculty at Ohio State as a teacher in the University School. From 1968 to 1983 she was Associate Professor in the areas of elementary and early childhood education.

Dr. Bozeman was committed to the recruitment of minority students and worked very actively in this area. She was recognized for her capability and willingness to work with all students. She has often been described as "one of the finest teachers I have ever known."

He served in the Army Air Force in World War II.

Robert C. Good Doctor of Humane Letters

Robert C. Good, president of Denison University in Granville, has combined an academic career with untiring service to his country. Good will leave the presidency of Denison this spring after seven years in the position. Robert Good was born in 1924 in Mount Vernon, N.Y. He received a bachelor of arts degree from Haverford College, a bachelor of divinity degree from Yale University Divinity School, and a Ph.D. in international relations from Yale. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa. His academic service began in 1953 with teaching duties in international relations at the University of Denver. From 1958 through 1961, he was affiliated with the Washington Center of Foreign Policy Research at Johns Hopkins University and later was director of the Carnegie Endowment Seminar in Diplomacy in Washington, D.C. Dr. Good was director of President-elect Kennedy's Task Force on Africa in 1960, and in 1961 was appointed director of the Office of Research and Analysis for Africa at the Department of State. He received the Department of State's Superior Honor Award in 1964. He served as U.S. Ambassador to Zambia from 1965-1969. In 1970 he returned to the University of Denver to become dean of the Graduate School of International Studies and director of the Social Science Foundation. He assumed the presidency of Denison University on September 1, 1976. Dr. Good's professional service and personal strength have inspired his students, his colleagues, and his nation. The University is honored to recognize his achievements.

Recipients of Honors

Fred Machetanz Doctor of Humane Letters

After Fred Machetanz received his master of fine arts degree from Ohio State in 1935, he was given a sixweek trip to Alaska to visit his uncle's rural trading post. His experiences on that journey inspired his life's work: portrayal of images of Alaskan life and wildlife through paintings, lithographs, illustrations and writings. His work provides an immeasurably valuable historical and artistic record of his adopted state. Machetanz is known as the "dean of Alaskan painters." He was elected to the Alaska Hall of Fame in 1966 and was named "Alaskan of the Year" in 1977. In 1981. American Artist magazine named him "Artist of the Year." He has illustrated a dozen books, several of which he wrote. He has been featured in one-man shows in Alaska, Seattle, St. Louis, and London and his work is included in permanent exhibits in Alaska, Canada, Washington, D.C., and the Explorer's Club of New York. He has completed four film productions and created a series of 50 stone lithographs from 1946 to 1980. Machetanz was born in 1908 in Kenton, Ohio, He earned a bachelor's degree from Ohio State in 1930 and the master of fine arts in 1935. He later studied at the Chicago Art Institute. After working as an illustrator for Charles Scribner's Sons in New York City, he served in World War II as a lieutenant commander of intelligence in the North Pacific Command. The University is proud to acknowledge the contributions this distinguished alumnus has made to the art and culture of a state and a nation.

Each university committee defined in rules 3335-5-47 through 3335-5-62 of the Administrative Code shall report at least annually to the university senate at a time and in a manner specified by the program committee of the senate.

Robert H. Browning

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on February 20, 1984, of Robert H. Browning, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Medicine, Division of Pulmonary Diseases.

Robert Browning was born in Oberlin, Ohio, April 7, 1903. He graduated from Oberlin College in 1923. He received a M.D. degree from Western Reserve University in 1927; served an internship and residency in Internal Medicine at Cleveland City Hospital and a tuberculosis residency at The Trudeau Sanatorium, Saranac Lake, New York. Upon completion of post graduate training Dr. Browning accepted the position of Director of Sunny Acres Hospital, Cleveland, Ohio. His academic appointments include Assistant Professor of Medicine at Western Reserve University from 1931-1948 and Professor of Medicine at The Ohio State University until his retirement in 1973.

Dr. Browning authored and published 38 articles in his career, and also served as a consultant to the U. S. Veterans Administration. Upon his retirement in 1973, Dr. Browning was awarded The Ohio State University Captain's Chair as a token of esteem from the Department of Medicine.

Earle R. Caley

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on February 2, 1984, of Earle Radcliffe Caley, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Chemistry.

Professor Caley, scientist, educator and humanitarian, was born in Cleveland, Ohio. He received his B.Sc. degree from Baldwin-Wallace College in 1923 and his Ph.D. from Ohio State in 1928, under the guidance of the late C. W. Foulk. He married Grace Cochran on Christmas Eve, 1925.

Professor Caley's career as an educator combined studies in analytical chemistry with a deep interest in the classical world. He was an innovator in the application of modern analytical methods to the study of archeological objects of ancient Greece and the Middle East; his efforts in this area were recognized by numerous prizes and awards, including the Dexter prize from the American Chemical Society in 1966. The reader of his first publication could have had prescience of his life's work. It was a translation, with comments, of a Latin text of the Leyden Papyrus, which catalogued chemical formulations used in Alexandria in the Third Century A.D. It was written in 1926 while he was, simultaneously, a student working toward his Ph.D. and a high school principal in Monroeville, Ohio.

After graduation, Dr. Caley established a substantial reputation in Analytical Chemistry as a faculty member at Princeton University, where he remained until 1939. During this time, he spent a year in Athens, Greece, on the staff of the Agora Excavation. His academic career was temporarily interrupted by the Second World War, when he served as chief chemist for Wallace Laboratories in New Jersey.

Following the war in 1946, Dr. Caley returned to his alma mater as Associate Professor and Vice Chairman of the Department of Chemistry. He became a full Professor in 1957 and continued his research and teaching in the Department until his retirement in 1970. He was the author of numerous papers and several books including The Composition of Ancient Greek Bronze Coins (1939), Theophrastus on Stones (1956), Analysis of Ancient Glasses (1962), and Analysis of Ancient Metals (1964). His enthusiasm for his scholarship was especially admired by his colleagues, and his research continued without pause until his untimely death. His most recent paper, entitled: Analyses of Eight Roman Orichalcum Coin Fragments. . .was published in Archeometry in 1983.

Dr. Caley held membership in several organizations, including the ACS, AAAS, Archaeological Institute of America, International Institute for the Conservation of Historic and Artistic Works, Ohio Academy of Science, and Sigma Xi.

We have lost a man who was characterized by one colleague as "a chemist bearing gifts to the Greeks," and by another as making "a significant contribution to an area of knowledge without regard for the more utilitarian justifications of technology." Evelyn P. Gordon

Evelyn P. Gordon, emeritus faculty member of the Medical Dietetics Division, School of Allied Medical Professions, made a significant contribution to The Ohio State University in school lunch programming and dietetic education.

Miss Gordon was a native Ohioan who received her B.S. degree from The Ohio State University in 1932. After twenty years as a high school teacher of Home Economics, she returned to the University and earned her master's degree in the Graduate School in 1952.

In 1952, Miss Gordon began her faculty service to the University in the College of Education as an instructor and the nutritionist in the University School. She held this position until 1968 when she joined the faculty of the School of Allied Medical Professions as an instructor in the Medical Dietetics Division.

During her employment in the College of Education, Miss Gordon was active in both the American School Food Service Association and Ohio School Food Service Association. She was chairman of the Nutrition Committee of ASESA for two years and was responsible for the preparation of Nutrition Education in School Lunch, a brochure published by ASESA and widely used by school lunch personnel throughout the United States. She also served as a nutrition consultant to the Ohio Department of Education School Lunch Program and worked with a number of school lunch programs in Ohio schools.

In the College of Education, Miss Gordon participated in a number of activities and projects. She contributed to the College's publication, How Children Develop, published by The Ohio State University in 1964. She also participated in the Inter-age Grouping Experiment in the University School. The school lunch program at the University School, which she directed, was a model for others on the coordination of the feeding program with the education program.

Miss Gordon authored articles on school lunch and its relation to child development, health and nutrition education.

Dr. Medhurst was born on September 10, 1916 in England and spent his early years there before coming to the United States. He earned a Bachelor of Arts in Sociology in 1940 and later a Master's of Social Work degree at the University of Southern California. He practiced social work at the Santa Barbara County Welfare Department, 1941-1942, before serving as Assistant Field Director and Field Director with the American National Red Cross in Long Beach and Fort MacArthur, California, 1942-1943.

Dr. Medhurst's practice and education were interrupted from 1943 to 1946 when he served as a U. S. Navy Officer. He saw combat aboard ship in the Pacific Theater during World War $\rm II$.

Upon his return stateside, Dr. Medhurst became a social worker, supervisor and then Assistant Chief with the U. S. Veteran's Administration in Los Angeles from 1946 to 1952. During 1952 to 1955, Dr. Medhurst served as an Assistant Professor at the University of Southern California School of Social Work and earned the Doctorate of Social Work at U.S.C. in 1959. He served from 1957 to 1966 as Assistant Professor, Associate Professor and Professor at the University of Toronto School of Social Work. During his final three years at the University of Toronto he was Assistant Director of the School.

Dr. Medhurst was invited to The Ohio State University as Director of the School of Social Work in 1966, and served in this capacity until 1976. Under his administrative leadership a number of new and revitalized programs took shape. While he was Director, the School instituted a New Careers Program, revised each of the degree programs--BSSW, MSW and Ph.D., initiated the Columbus Area International Program, established a cooperative inter-institutional Ph.D. program in social work with the University of Puerto Rico and, in collaboration with other academic units, began The Ohio State University Commission on Interprofessional Education and Practice. Moreover, ethnic minority representation in the School of Social Work multiplied as a result of recruiting efforts during Dr. Medhurst's administration, and many graduates of the School advanced to positions of leadership in social work practice, administration and education in the United States and abroad. In addition, Dr. Medhurst was instrumental in developing the plans that eventuated in change in status of the School of Social Work to that of an independent College.

During his years at Ohio State University, Dr. Medhurst served terms as a member of the Board of Directors of the Council on Social Work Education and co-chairman of several of its Annual Program Meetings, President of the Ohio Welfare Conference and a member of the University Senate and the Graduate Council.

Those who worked closely with Dr. Medhurst respected him for his warmth and kindness, his concern and love for students and people in general, his devotion to social work education, and his wonderful sense of humor.

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BLACK STUDIES COMMUNITY EXTENSION CENTER

Resolution No. 84-116

Synopsist Authority to enter into an agreement with Charles E. Wallace and Company for the purchase of a facility to house the Black Studies Community Extension Center is requested.

WHEREAS since 1972 the University's Department of Black Studies has operated a Community Extension Center within the black community in the City of Columbus, which facility presently is located in leased space at 640 South Ohio Avenue; and

WHEREAS the purpose of the Community Extension Center is to foster greater interaction between the community and the University and to provide educational and research programs and services that enhance academic opportunities for students and that relate to community issues and concerns by offering credit and non-credit courses which promote the educational advancement of community residents, coordinating and developing community participatory research skills, serving as a meeting place for community social and civic groups and promoting interaction with individuals from the University, providing educational and psychological counseling services, establishing a community education information and referral clearinghouse, and developing and fostering community participation in cultural programs; and

BLACK STUDIES COMMUNITY EXTENSION CENTER (contd)

WHEREAS the present leased space is inadequate to meet the basic needs of the Center and to carry out the programs described above and there is a need for a new facility to accommodate current and future program requirements; and

WHEREAS Charles E. Wallace and Company has presented the University with an opportunity to acquire a new facility, containing approximately 6,940 gross square feet, to be constructed at the southeast corner of Monroe Street and Mt. Vernon Avenue, on a tract of land donated to Charles E. Wallace and Company by the City of Columbus for this purpose, at a total cost of less than \$300,000.00, which facility would be constructed in accordance with the program of requirements, plans, and specifications as approved by the University; and

WHEREAS Amended Substitute House Bill 552 adopted by the 114th General Assembly appropriated \$300,000.00 to the University for this purpose; and

WHEREAS the purchase of this facility has been approved and recommended by all appropriate University offices:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance from Charles E. Wallace and Company, upon successful completion of the project, the land and building to be acquired and constructed by Charles E. Wallace and Company, to provide a new facility for the Department of Black Studies Community Extension Center, at a total base cost not to exceed \$300,000.00, plus the cost of any options chosen by the University if funds are available for the purchase of such options, on the condition that Charles E. Wallace and Company obtain clear and marketable fee simple title to the property and that the facility is constructed in accordance with the program of requirements, plans, and specifications as approved by the appropriate University offices.

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CONGRATULATIONS TO PROFESSOR HARVEY FRIEDMAN

Upon motion of Mr. Teaford, seconded by Mr. Galbreath, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous voice vote.

Dr. Jacob called on David W. Kramer, Dean/Director of the Mansfield campus of The Ohio State University, to introduce the presentation by the Mansfield campus representatives.

REPORT - THE PRESIDENT'S AFFIRMATIVE ACTION GRANT AT MANSFIELD

Dr. Kramer noted that OSU-Mansfield is a 600-acre campus which was given to The Ohio State University by the local community. Including the North Central Technical College, which shares the facilities, approximately 3,000 students attend programs on the campus. Dr. Kramer introduced Dr. Byron Keith who was appointed President of North Central Technical College on February 1. Dr. Kramer stated that since a general report on Mansfield and the other regional campuses had been presented to the Board last year, the report at this meeting would focus on the implementation at Mansfield of an affirmative action grant awarded by the President's Office and the Office of Affirmative Action.

Dr. Allan Dittmer, Associate Dean at Mansfield and Associate Professor of Humanities Education, outlined OSU-Mansfield's application for the grant and receipt of the award. He introduced Dr. Robert Kahn, Associate Professor of Political Science, who played a major role in the development of the grant proposal.

Professor Kahn observed that in spite of the fact that OSU-Mansfield is a regional campus located in a small community in an essentially rural area, and that it has historically attracted a disproportionately small number of minority students, it has essentially the same obligation as the main campus to provide affirmative action programs for the minority population within the community it serves. An affirmative action program was developed at Mansfield for the 1983-84 year, and the campus received the referenced grant to support the program. A minority affairs advisory committee provides direction for the efforts, which consist of three components. First, a high school program is aimed at establishing and maintaining communications with and support for black culture clubs in the high schools. Second, a minority scholarship program has been established for Mansfield, to be funded equally from the grant, the campus scholarship fund, and monies to be raised from the community. The third component of the program is a leadership program to enhance identification with and service to the Mansfield community. In this connection, a series of Saturday morning seminars for minority community leaders will be sponsored this spring. A nationally-known speaker, Mary Frances Berry, will address a campus audience on May 24.

Carolyn Payton, a member of the Minority Advisory Committee, addressed the Board from the perspective of the community. Mrs. Payton noted that the receipt of the affirmative action grant and the establishment of the advisory committee have had a wide-ranging effect on campus-community ties, communications and perceptions. The program has resulted in the discovery of many effective ways of enhancing affirmative action and educational awareness and opportunity. Mrs. Payton expressed the view that in the past, little direct contact has existed between the campus and the minority community. The affirmative action program has been a two-way communications process, and the work of the advisory committee has resulted in a heightened awareness of both community needs and campus opportunities. It is the goal of the committee to continue this initial success on a long-range basis.

REPORT - THE PRESIDENT'S AFFIRMATIVE ACTION GRANT AT MANSFIELD (contd)

Marian Russell spoke to the Board about her experiences as a student at the Mansfield campus and a member of the Minority Affairs Advisory Committee. Ms. Russell highlighted the programs and opportunities which were available on the Mansfield campus for interested students. In particular, she stressed that scholarship funds available for OSU students enrolled at Mansfield were of particular significance in enhancing opportunities for students in her situation. Ms. Russell noted that new funds available through the affirmative action grant would further increase enrollment options for minority students.

Lisa Scott, a senior at Mansfield Senior High School and secretary of the Black Culture Club, expressed to the Board her views about the importance to her and other high school students in the Mansfield and surrounding areas of the affirmative action efforts on the Mansfield campus. In her remarks, Ms. Scott described various portions of a field trip to the Ohio State main campus organized through the Black Culture Club earlier in the year under the auspices of the Mansfield campus. She also mentioned several other events which had occurred this year due to campus interest, assistance and encouragement. Ms. Scott summed up by saying that the Mansfield campus involvement has meant that the black culture clubs have been much more able to focus on their intended purpose of enhancing cultural awareness and activity among minority high school students.

President Jennings made the following comment:

Thank you very much, Allan. I have a couple of comments. First of all, Lisa, you have one more job to do as a student as articulate as you clearly are--you must come to Ohio State, whether it is at Mansfield or Columbus; and if you don't, all these faculty members and Dean Kramer are going to be in a whole mess of trouble. We want you here. In all seriousness, this is the type of activity that not only Ohio State, but all public institutions in the State of Ohio need to be committed to. The type of creativity that the faculty and the staff and the advisory committee have exhibited here is exactly the thing we need in these times. We do indeed need new ideas, new involvement; and despite all of the "thank-yous," very little would happen without your demonstrated commitment to doing things well. And we, the institution, thank you for your hard work, for getting a lot of folks together. That is always difficult, but that type of commitment, that type of involvement is greatly appreciated by all. Thank you.

Dean Kramer made the following statement:

Thank you, Ed. I think this is a good point to announce that last week we delivered to the Columbus campus our proposal for next year's Affirmative Action Grant. We are filing a joint proposal with the Marion campus incorporating the best features of both of our programs. I understand, by the way, in talking with Frank Hale yesterday, that there are many more applications this year for these grants than there were last year, and I think that speaks very well for the program.

REPORT - THE PRESIDENT'S AFFIRMATIVE ACTION GRANT AT MANSFIELD (contd)

The affirmative action project is not the only exciting thing that has happened at the campus this year or that will happen yet in the remaining months of the year. On your table there is an announcement of Women's Week. Women's Week was planned almost single-handedly by Dr. Beverly Kahn. It was her husband, Bob, who told you about the affirmative action project. These two programs are tremendously helpful to our campus, but the Kahns--even their contribution goes beyond that. Both of them are tenured associate professors here, and earlier this morning you approved faculty professional leaves for both of them for next year when they will be going to Italy. Beverly has received a prize for study in Italy next year and also has received a Fulbright grant for study there. So Bob and Bev and their two children will be going to Italy next year and we wish them well and we thank you for approving their leaves.

Also on the table in front of you is a white document with a light blue cover; it is a directory of the Citizen's Council members and the Alumni Advisory Board members for the regional campuses, and we invite you to take that with you. We will be making more introductions at noon--many of the Citizen's Council members are with us today and will be joining us for lunch. Again, we thank you very much for being here today. Come back any time, either as the Board of Trustees or as individuals who are dedicated to higher education; we welcome you at any time. Thank you very much for your support.

Dr. Jacob thanked each of the speakers and expressed the Board's pleasure at being on the Mansfield campus and receiving the special report on the affirmative action program.

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

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THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE ONE THOUSAND ONE HUNDRED AND NINETY-NINTH MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Columbus, Ohio, May 4, 1984

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Friday, May 4, 1984, at The Ohio State University Fawcett Center for Tomorrow, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: John D. Jacob, Chairman, D. James Hilliker, John F. Havens, Daniel M. Galbreath, Edmund C. Redman, Leonard J. Immke, Shirley D. Bowser, and Hamilton J. Teaford.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

The Chairman, Dr. Jacob, called the meeting of the Board of Trustees to order at 10:40 a.m. He requested the Secretary to call the roll. The meeting recessed into Executive Session for the purpose of considering legal issues and personnel-related matters.

Present: John D. Jacob, Chairman, D. James Hilliker, John F. Havens, Daniel M. Galbreath, Leonard J. Immke, Shirley D. Bowser, and Hamilton J. Teaford.

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Dr. Jacob reconvened the meeting at 11:50 a.m.

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ELECTION OF OFFICERS BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Resolution No. 84-120

Mr. Immke presented the following slate of officers:

Upon motion of Mrs. Bowser, seconded by Mr. Teaford, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous roll call vote.

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Dr. Jacob called on Wilfred Nazareth, Chairman, Minority Affairs, Local 4501, Communications Workers of America to make a statement to the Board.

Mr. Nazareth made the following statement:

My name is Wilfred Nazareth. I am the Chairman of the Minority Affairs for CWA, Local 4501. I am here to present the plight of minorities. We are in the mid-1980's and discrimination is alive and thriving. Department heads don't seem to care for the goals of Dr. Jennings's affirmative action goals. I have been working on this project for over a year now. I have approached the De-

partment of Affirmative Action, vice presidents and directors, but I have received little or no results from them. So I decided to present the concerns of minorities to the Board and hope to achieve better results.

Let me elaborate on my findings. Don Scott Airport does not hire minorities even for jobs like aircraft attendants, as they feel blacks will hurt their business as it is one of the busiest airports in Ohio. After pointing out the lack of black employees at Don Scott, nothing has been done. The Physical Facilities Lock Shop has had problems in the past and is still continuing to have problems. They are not even going through the formalities of interviewing blacks for job openings. The machine shop supervisor swore that he would never hire a black. After my complaining to the associate from Business and Finance, the supervisor hired one black. The supervisor made a statement that the black was hired to fulfill the requirements. I have heard that the supervisor continues to hire his relatives, the latest on March 11, 1984. This man is so prejudiced that a black employee was refused the use of a microwaye oven to heat his lunch.

In the Mechanical Shop a 17-year veteran black air conditioning/refrigeration technician was by-passed for a supervisory position and a plumber was appointed as superintendent of the air conditioning/refrigeration department. When I questioned the superintendent he said, "A supervisor is not supposed to know the job; all he has to do is give orders." This statement was made at a meeting in the presence of the Director of Personnel, the Director of Physical Facilities, the Administrative Director of Physical Facilities and other employees. The Mechanical Shop is plaqued with racism. The minorities in the shop had to fight for their positions. None of them were awarded their jobs on merit. However, the superintendent did create higher job classifications for them. We have had blacks fired and even suspended while others are not even reprimanded. When blacks are suspended their names and cards were taken off the board, while--when a caucasian was suspended, nothing of that was done. Records of the Mechanical Shop speaks for itself.

Residence and Dining Halls refuse to open up their doors to blacks. There is a vacancy at Buckeye Village--the supervisor's job has been open for over a year now. Qualified minorities applied for the job; they were turned down. An ad was placed in the Sunday's Dispatch for a superintendent for Buckeye Village. The minorities objected and filed grievances. The Director of Personnel heard the grievances, but made no favorable decision regarding the job. Now Mr. Schwartz and Mr. Hall have decided to downgrade the position and that way the minority will have to take a pay cut to work at Buckeye Village. I had questioned Mr. Schwartz, Personnel Director of Residence and Dining Halls, regarding the job. He informed me that they had decided to reorganize. I am all for reorganizing the

Mr. Nazareth (contd)

Residence and Dining Halls. These gentlemen should be asked to put in their resignations as they are not an asset to the University. I must state they are a disgrace to OSU and the community.

In the past I contacted the associate from Business and Finance Department. He suggested that we work together to tackle the minority hiring problem, but he did not get any favorable response from other department heads. I am still willing to work with anyone to solve this problem. All I am asking from you, the Board members, and Dr. Jennings is for your support. I want to see more blacks and other minorities given the opportunity to work for OSU, not as custodians or housekeepers, but in the technical field. There are a lot of qualified minorities who can be an asset to OSU. There are too many opportunities at OSU. It is in the fairness of the process that concerns employees and myself. I feel that the University is a great place to work, but it can be a greater place to work. Not only can OSU be a leader in education and research, but also a leader in eliminating problems of discrimination.

I would now like to thank the Board for giving me this time. The material presented to the Board is just a molecule of happenings at OSU. The reason I decided to come before the Board and Dr. Jennings is because I felt the show of discrimination could be solved in the campus community without having to approach other government bodies, as I feel it is not OSU that is discriminating—it is individuals who are doing the damage. It is not Mr. John Doe or Mr. Jack Doe that will get a bad name, it is Ohio State University, a world renowned public education institution that will get a bad name which I strongly feel is not fair. Dr. Jennings has set the ground rules of Affirmative Action; all we have to do is make these people follow them. If they do not want to set aside their personal prejudices, I suggest they be relieved of their positions.

This morning when the department head found out that I was scheduled to address the Board and the subject that I was going to touch, he tried to intimidate me into not appearing before the Board by stating that I would not be paid for the time spent here. This again is an example of what takes place in instances concerning any individual who will speak out on what is right. So therefore I am asking that Mr. Madison Scott direct the department head, whose name is Mr. Richard Herb, to consider me in pay status for time spent here--unless it is an unwritten rule that a person who speaks to the Board on the subject does not get paid--then I will not expect pay. Thank you.

Thank you, Mr. Nazareth. Any questions, comments?

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AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY AND FACULTY APPOINTMENTS, PROMOTIONS AND TENURE

Resolution No. 84-121

Synopsis: Amendments to the <u>Bylaws of the Board of Trustees</u> (3335-1-04), <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> (3335-5-03, 3335-5-04, 3335-5-19, and 3335-5-4) and <u>Faculty Appointments</u>, <u>Promotions and Tenure</u> (3335-47-11) are proposed.

WHEREAS the University Senate pursuant to rule 3335-1-09 of the Administrative Code is authorized to recommend through the President to the Board of Trustees the adoption of amendments to the Bylaws of the Board of Trustees, Rules of the University Faculty and Faculty Appointments, Promotions and Tenure as approved by the University Senate; and

WHEREAS the proposed changes in the Bylaws of the Board of Trustees, Rules of the University Faculty and Faculty Appointments, Promotions and Tenure were approved by the University Senate on April 14, 1984, as follows:

BYLAW

3335-1-04 The faculty and staff.

- (A) University faculty; membership.
 - (1) As used in these bylaws and in the "Rules of the University Faculty," the term "faculty" shall include persons with regular, regular clinical, auxiliary, and emeritus faculty titles on full or part-time appointments with or without salary.

RULES

3335-5-03 Election of faculty and staff; tenure.

The board of trustees shall annually appoint the president and all employees of the university not in the classified civil service, subject to the laws of the state of Ohio, and in the case of regular faculty, to the rights and protection of tenure. Tenure is a commitment by the university and may be earned by all individuals with regular faculty status subject to a probationary period. Regular faculty status is defined in rule 3335-5-19 of the Administrative Code. The protections of tenure and academic freedom extend to all levels of faculty responsibility within the university in accord with rule 3335-5-01 of the Administrative Code and are not restricted to activities identified with specific instructional, research or public service programs. Tenure is lost by formal resignation, by retirement, by transfer to regular clinical faculty status, or may be terminated by reason of proved incompetence or grave misconduct in accordance with rule 3335-5-04 of the Administrative Code, for causes set forth in rule 3335-5-02 of the Administrative Code, or under the conditions of bona fide financial exigency, as specified in rule 3335-5-021 of the Administrative Code.

AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY AND FACULTY APPOINTMENTS, PROMOTIONS AND TENURE (contd)

3335-5-04 Hearing procedures for complaints against regular, regular clinical, and auxiliary faculty members.

(A) Definitions and construction.

(1) This rule shall apply only to complaints against regular, regular clinical, and auxiliary faculty members.

3335-5-19 Faculty.

As used in these rules the term "faculty" shall include persons appointed by the board of trustees with regular, regular clinical, auxiliary, and emeritus faculty titles on full or part-time appointments, with or without salary.

- (A) "Regular faculty": persons with the titles of professor, associate professor, assistant professor, and instructor who serve on appointments totaling fifty per cent or more service to the university.
- (B) "Regular clinical faculty": persons with the titles of professor of clinical (department), associate professor of clinical (department), assistant professor of clinical (department), and instructor of clinical (department), who serve on appointments totaling fifty per cent or more service to the university. Regular clinical faculty appointments are made only in the following departments of the college of medicine: anesthesiology, family medicine, medicine, neurology, obstetrics and gynecology, ophthalmology, otolaryngology, pathology, pediatrics, physical medicine, preventive medicine, psychiatry, radiology, and surgery.

The number of persons holding regular clinical faculty titles in each department cannot be greater than one-third the number of persons holding regular faculty titles in that department. Individuals appointed to the regular clinical faculty are limited to governance participation at the departmental level, but may not participate in promotion and tenure matters of regular faculty.

- (C) "Auxiliary faculty": persons with adjunct titles, clinical titles, visiting titles, lecturers; also professors, associate professors, assistant professors, and instructors who serve on appointments totaling less than fifty per cent service to the university.
- (D) "Emeritus faculty": persons who have served the university continuously as regular or regular clinical faculty for at least ten consecutive years who, upon retirement, were recommended by the chairperson, the dean and the vice president for academic affairs and provost for emeritus status.

3335-5-54 Committee on academic misconduct.

(A) The committee on academic misconduct shall consist of fifteen members of the university faculty, five representatives from the council of graduate students, five undergraduate students, and without vote, the dean

of student life (or designee) ex officio. The committee membership shall also include a coordinator, appointed by the vice president for academic affairs and provost, and charged with assisting the committee in administrative matters. The coordinator shall not participate in the decisions of the committee. The fifteen members of the university faculty shall be elected by the senate at its special meeting in June for a term of three years beginning with the summer quarter, the election to be held annually so that five members will retire each year. No member of the university faculty shall serve more than two consecutive terms.

- (1) The graduate student members shall be appointed in the summer quarter by the president of the council of graduate students, with the approval of the council of graduate students for a term of one year beginning with the autumn quarter. The undergraduate student members shall be appointed in the spring quarter by the president of the undergraduate student government, with the approval of the undergraduate student assembly for a term of one year beginning with the summer quarter.
- (2) When an unexpired term becomes vacant, the vacancy shall be filled in the same manner in which the position was previously filled. A member selected to fill such a vacancy shall serve for the duration of the unexpired term.
- (3) The committee on academic misconduct is authorized to establish panels of persons from the committee on academic misconduct which will conduct hearings and make decisions with the same authority as the committee on academic misconduct.
- (4) The committee on academic misconduct is authorized to establish rules and procedures to conduct hearings, including the definition of a quorum.

FACULTY APPOINTMENTS, PROMOTIONS AND TENURE

3335-47-11 Regular clinical faculty ranks.

The titles of regular clinical faculty are professor of clinical (department), associate professor of clinical (department), assistant professor of clinical (department), and instructor of clinical (department). Individuals in this track may have a full range of responsibilities to appropriate academic units with emphasis on patient care and clinical teaching activities. Clinical activities for faculty members in this category are to be included in approved practice plans.

(A) Appointment criteria

Initial appointments, or transfer, to the regular clinical faculty will be made for individuals with the following experience or credentials:

AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY AND FACULTY APPOINTMENTS, PROMOTIONS AND TENURE (contd)

- (1) They are strict or geographic full-time faculty members in clinical departments in the college of medicine, as defined by the college of medicine.
- (2) They perform duties which consist primarily of patient care or clinical teaching.
- (3) They have the appropriate educational background and credentials to perform the duties outlined in (2).
- (4) They are essential to the continuing mission of the college of medicine as determined by the appropriate clinical department chairperson, dean of the college of medicine, and vice president for academic affairs and provost.

(B) Term of appointment

- (1) In the first term of appointment to the regular clinical faculty, appointees will be reviewed annually. During the fourth year, a formal review will be conducted. The faculty member will be informed if the appointment is to be renewed after the fifth year.
- (2) Subsequent appointments will be for periods of five years in lieu of tenure. A formal review will be conducted in the fourth year and the faculty member will be informed if the appointment is to be renewed after the fifth year for another five year term.
- (3) All appointments will be based upon criteria established by the clinical departments, approved by the dean of the college of medicine, and vice president for academic affairs and provost.
- (4) If the appointment is not renewed, standards of notice must be in accord with rule 3335-47-09 of the Administrative Code.

(C) Transfers

It is generally expected that the needs of the academic unit and the career goals of the prospective faculty member will result in meshing of need, expectation, responsibility, and expertise to allow a long-term appointment to either the regular faculty or regular clinical faculty. Should a transfer be deemed appropriate, the following must be accomplished:

(1) The process of transfer from the regular faculty to the regular clinical faculty or from the regular clinical faculty to the regular faculty is initiated only upon the written request of the faculty member. A recommendation for transfer must indicate clear evidence of a change in the individual's career goals and expectations, duties, and activities.

AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY AND FACULTY APPOINTMENTS, PROMOTIONS AND TENURE (contd)

(2) An individual appointed to a tenure-eligible position as an instructor or assistant professor may transfer to the regular clinical faculty at any time before the fourth year of service, or after tenure has been granted. Transfer of a tenured faculty member to the regular clinical faculty requires resignation of the tenured position.

An individual appointed to a tenure-eligible position as an associate professor, from outside the university, may transfer to the regular clinical faculty before the second year of service, or after tenure has been granted.

- (3) An individual appointed to the regular clinical faculty at the instructor, assistant professor, or associate professor level, upon transfer to a tenure-eligible position, must meet the criteria for the granting of tenure within the established time limits including that time already served in the regular clinical faculty appointment. Transfer at the professor level can be made only with concurrent granting of tenure.
- (4) All transfers must be approved by the department appointments, promotions and tenure committee, the department chairperson, the dean of the college of medicine, and the vice president for academic affairs and provost.
- (5) Only one transfer to or from the regular clinical faculty will be approved during an individual's period of employment at the Ohio state university.

(D) Promotions

Nominations for promotion originate in the department in accordance with criteria and procedures established by departmental faculty.

- (1) A department may recommend the promotion of an assistant professor of clinical (department) to the rank of associate professor of clinical (department) at any time up to the end of the ninth year. An individual who is not promoted by the end of nine years will be reviewed by the chairperson and the appointments, promotions and tenure committee of the department to determine if continued employment is warranted. All recommendations will be reviewed by the appointments, promotions and tenure committee of the department, the college of medicine, and the office of academic affairs.
- (2) A department may recommend the promotion of an associate professor of clinical (department) to professor of clinical (department) in recognition of outstanding accomplishments. Promotion may be recommended no earlier than the third year of service as an associate professor of clinical (department). All recommendations

will be reviewed by the appointments, promotions and tenure committee of the department, the college, and the office of academic affairs.

BE IT RESOLVED, That the foregoing amendments to the <u>Bylaws of the Board of Trustees</u>, <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> and <u>Faculty Appointments</u>, <u>Promotions and Tenure be adopted as recommended by the University Senate.</u>

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DENTAL CARE GROUP INSURANCE PROGRAM

WHEREAS the Board of Trustees on April 1, 1983 designated Ohio Medical Indemnity Mutual Corporation as the provider of the faculty/staff dental insurance program contingent upon resolution of issues relating to the implementation of a dual choice plan; and

WHEREAS the proposed dual-choice plan, upon further review and evaluation, was determined to be inconsistent with the overall best interests of the University; and

WHEREAS a University dental plan committee composed of practitioners and faculty/staff members of the University was appointed to conduct an extensive evaluation and review of the University's dental program needs; and

WHEREAS this committee has completed its study and submitted its findings and conclusions to the University, and on the basis of this report bid specifications were developed for dental coverage as outlined in the committee study; and

WHEREAS quotations were requested from 14 insurance firms and responses were received from 7 providers; and

WHEREAS the appropriate University offices have made a comparative analysis of the program elements, the rate quotations and the provider delivery capabilities, and based on this review a recommendation for the award of contract has been formulated:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That contingent upon the implementation of a Preferred Provider Organization network, Ohio Medical Indemnity Mutual Corporation be designated as the carrier for the group dental insurance program at a monthly premium of \$9.08 per faculty/staff member, or an estimated annual premium of \$1,400,676. Coverage will be available for dependents on an optional basis at a monthly premium of \$9.08 for one dependent and \$21.91 for two or more dependents. Fifty percent of the premium for dependent coverage will be paid by the University (estimated annual cost, \$664,470); the balance will be paid by the participating faculty/staff members via payroll deduction. Total estimated annual cost for the dental program is \$2,729,616; and

DENTAL CARE GROUP INSURANCE PROGRAM (contd)

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the contract for coverage be awarded for a 24 month period effective July 1, 1984 with the understanding that this contract is subject to renegotiation if the issues relating to a Preferred Provider Organization cannot be satisfactorily resolved on or before December 31, 1984. 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PRESIDENT'S REPORT ON BUDGET PLANS AND STRATEGIES FOR 1984-85

During the meeting of the Fiscal Affairs Committee of the Board of Trustees, President Jennings presented the following budget plans and strategies for 1984-85. The President's statement was followed by the questions and comments which are also included below. The guidelines were subsequently approved by vote during the regular meeting of the full Board.

President Jennings:

Mr. Chairman, I am pleased to bring before the Board today, budget guidelines for the 1984-85 fiscal year that represent a return to normalcy within the institution. The State of Ohio has, in the last year, achieved budgetary stability, which has enabled the University to make realistic plans for the future reflecting this stable base of support. As all of you know, even our planning timetable returns to the University's regular cycle with this May recommendation of quidelines.

Our budget remains very tight, however. Fiscal 1984-85 marks the second year of a biennium in which Ohio State is only beginning to recover from the devasting effects of four budget cuts in the preceding three years. Our priorities during that time have been to achieve stability; maintain quality; and even make some progress in that regard; and to guard the vital concept of accessibility by holding down tuition and fee increases for our students.

The manner in which the deans, the faculty, staff, and student body have supported these goals in responding to our budget problems has brought us to the point where I am now able to recommend guidelines that begin to move us forward. For that, I want to express our thanks to all those who have been involved in guiding the University through an extremely difficult period.

Nevertheless, I do want to emphasize that our state appropriation is still \$12 million short, in inflation-adjusted dollars, compared to the state appropriation for 1979-80. We need to remind ourselves that Ohio's new tax base, created in the spring of 1983, replaced only

\$250 million of a \$500 million state budget deficit. With the state funding provided for 1983-84 being at the same level as that appropriated the previous year, prior to the budget cuts, the \$13 million in additional state funds for the next fiscal year represents an effective increase of only 3 percent a year for the entire biennium.

These guidelines for 1984-85 reflect our continued adherence to the five-year compensation plan developed three years ago by the University Senate's Faculty Compensation and Benefits Committee; and to the priority recommendations of the Fiscal Advisory Committee, which emphasized the importance of enhancing academic quality even as we continue to work toward improving accessibility.

Pursuing excellence within the institution means providing special funding for targeted areas; continuing our attention to maintaining competitive salaries; and making progress on the reduction of our enormous equipment and library needs backlog. Comprehensive quality also, of course, requires adequate funding to the operating budgets of individual colleges.

Just as important to our students as the quality found in the University's faculty and academic resources, is the cost of their education. Even under retrenchment, we have been able to hold Ohio State's tuition and fees to levels well below the Board of Regents' statewide quidelines. We remain committed, within available resources, to continue our efforts to make progress in overcoming Ohio State's unfortunate status as one of the highest cost institutions among our sister universities in the Big Ten.

It is in this context that I bring to the Board these budget guidelines for 1984-85. In keeping with a return to normal budget cycles throughout the institution, it is my intention to recommend to this Board at its June 7 meeting the final budget for 1984-85. However, barring very unusual circumstances, the guidelines I am outlining today reflect what those recommendations will be.

Specifically, I am recommending a salary increase of 3 percent for our faculty and staff and providing 4 percent in salary funds for merit increases. Additionally, as in the past, central dollars will be provided for market adjustments and promotions. Our salary budgets also provide for Civil Service employees the average 7 percent pay raise recently mandated by the Ohio General Assembly.

In keeping with the recommendations in the five-year plan of the Faculty Compensation and Benefits Committee of University Senate, Ohio State has been striving to improve its salary ranking relative to the Big Ten. We have succeeded in moving into first and second

place in the different faculty ranks. This year's increase represents not only attention to inflation, but also our commitment to maintaining our rank.

This salary recommendation also is closely in line with the 7.9 percent increase recommended by the members of the University Senate Fiscal Committee. However, I should point out that the Faculty Compensation and Benefits Committee has been involved in a study which suggests that the Big Ten, our traditional benchmark, has been losing ground in its relative salary ranking with all colleges and universities. This committee's higher recommendation of 9.5 percent salary increases reflected a new, nationwide comparative grouping.

While the salary guidelines I am recommending today continue to follow the five-year plan adopted in 1981, I believe the Faculty Compensation and Benefits Committee has raised an important issue that merits our serious attention. We need to ascertain the appropriateness of continuing to use the Big Ten as our only salary comparison group. We do indeed compete in the national arena. Therefore, I have asked the Compensation and Benefits Committee to continue to refine its study, and provide a more detailed report on the possibility of adopting a new comparative base for future years.

Our continued progress on building comprehensive quality demands that our salary levels enable us to retain and attract the very best faculty and staff. Correspondingly, our academic programs and support services must be returned to adequate funding levels. For the colleges' and offices' operating and equipment budgets, I am recommending 6 percent increases for 1984-85. This amount provides new funding rather than limited recovery from earlier budget cuts. That pattern of the past few years is behind us, and our deans will now be able to make decisions from a clearly defined budget base.

As we strive to provide the funding necessary for the multitude of programs which make this a comprehensive University, we also must continue to recognize that resources are indeed limited. We are all faced with the challenge of continually evaluating programs, and searching for more cost-effective methods of performing needed services. While working to enhance our ability to attract external resources, we also must demonstrate as an institution that the most effective use is being made of our existing resources.

To strengthen our continuing efforts in reallocating resources internally to meet changing needs and support demonstrated excellence, I am also asking the deans and vice presidents to implement plans for operating their units at 97 percent of their 1984-85 base budgets by July 1, 1985.

Implementing further efficiencies, improving cost containment and continuing the reductions in programs and services which are no longer needed or central to the University's mission will be the basis for generating this 3 percent reallocation. The funds resulting from these actions will be used to assist in extending our emphasis on academic excellence, as well as supporting new program and service initiatives.

As we discuss new initiatives to build excellence, I want to digress for a moment to a related item. Through the Office of Research and Graduate Studies, the University has this year provided \$1.4 million in seed monies to assist faculty in initiating new research and scholarship efforts; that has been done in almost every college in the institution. Those funds have been awarded to more than 130 faculty members who successfully competed for support. That program will be recommended for continuation in the coming fiscal year.

The final funding item covered in these guidelines also relates to research--that is, funding for equipment and libraries. We have made noticeable strides in the past three years on budgets for maintenance and replacement of out-dated and obsolete equipment. That will continue, with a \$5 million special allocation that I am recommending yet this fiscal year.

Next, we turn to guidelines on University-wide fees. Overall, the average for all fee and rate increases throughout the institution will be held to 6 percent. While this amount is above the current inflation rate of 4 percent, it reflects the fact that this biennium's state appropriations still left us with a total budget that was far too low.

In addition, Ohio State has maintained its tuition charges at levels below those used in the Board of Regents state funding models, by not increasing student fees at the rates suggested during the past years of budget shortfalls. Even with the 1984-85 increase, we will continue to be at tuition levels substantially below those projected by the Regents.

On tuition and fees, I am recommending a 5.5 percent increase at the undergraduate level and a 7.5 percent increase for graduate and professional students. In keeping with the concept that availability of financial aid is just as important to accessibility as tuition rates, I am also recommending a concurrent allocation to the Student Financial Aids budget to cover the full amount of the tuition increase for students currently receiving aid, as well as any newly eliaible students.

This level of increase comes only after thorough consideration of the University Senate Fiscal Committee's recommended increases of 6.5 percent for undergraduates and 8 percent for graduate and professional students. In light of Ohio State's unique role in the state as a land-grant institution, with the historic mission of providing access for all Ohioans, I believe we must continue to strengthen our efforts to reduce the total share of costs paid by students and their parents.

Our budget discussions with the Regents and with the General Assembly also will strongly emphasize the need to reduce students' overall share of the costs of higher education throughout Ohio. Ohio State remains a relatively high cost public institution. This year, we expect our tuition increase to be one of the lowest percentage increases in the Big Ten. But we need to continue to do all we can to further improve our ranking on the relative cost of an Ohio State education.

When we look at the total impact of other charges to the student body, I am pleased to report even lower increase guidelines in other areas of special concern to our students. Residence and dining hall fee guidelines stand at a 3.2 percent consolidated average, which includes the various rates for the many different housing arrangements and meal contracts. I want to take this opportunity to single out the administration and staff of the residence and dining halls for their significant progress in holding costs down. It is through their achievements that this ranks as the lowest of all the major fee increases I will be recommending with the budget in June.

For commuter students and our faculty and staff, parking fee increases also are held relatively low, to a 3.7 percent average. In the University Hospitals, increases will average 6 percent. This also is a very positive reflection on the cost containment measures implemented by the Hospitals staff in recent years.

While this second year of the biennium provides limited resources, its stability provides hope that the new biennium beginning in July, 1985, will provide enhanced support to allow even greater progress. We are committed to continuing our emphasis on excellence and accessibility, while maintaining the comprehensive diversity of this great University.

I would recommend those guidelines for your approval and I will be happy to answer any questions that you might have.

Mr. Galbreath:

I'm not quite sure where we are in this ranking that you talk about. On page 3 you say we are among the highest in costs of our sister universities and then later on I think you are saying that we are one of the lowest. I'm not sure I understand where we are.

President Jennings:

We rank--as you know historically we compare ourselves in the Big 10--we rank third in tuition charges in the Big 10. Michigan and Michigan State are first and second.

Mr. Galbreath:

And higher.

President Jennings:

And higher. And we are about \$300 per year below them. Add up roughly \$1,500 per year--I'm speaking about the undergraduate level now. But, unfortunately the fourth is in the area of \$1,200 lower and it rapidly goes down from there. Not including Northwestern--we can't compare tuition at the private school. The State of Ohio ranks fourth in the nation in tuition charges for all of their public institutions. We have been making some progress by not only having lower rate increases than the Big 10, but lower rate increases than the Board of Regents has recommended in their formula activity. We are on average about 90 percent of what the Board of Regents would recommend for the entire State of Ohio as our tuition. In attempting to hold that down, we are a high cost public institution. The essential reason is that while we rank very high in tuition charges, the State of Ohio ranks on the order of 41st in the nation in public support provided to public institutions. And that 41st ranking in the nation is down from 46th in the nation two years So that our tuition by any standards, any public school standards, is high. Now, by private school standards it is obviously very low, but as a public institution we are high when compared to the Big 10 and we are high when compared to the nation.

Mr. Galbreath:

On page 4 you talk about the faculty ranks--first and second in different faculty ranks. Does that mean that our faculty salaries are high, at the top?

President Jennings:

What has happened is that in the last three years--and the traditional comparison of our faculty salaries--of our market, if you will--has been the salaries in the Big 10. And during this time we have by policy--going through budget cuts--put a very great degree

of emphasis on our salary structure relative to the competition. We have measured the competition historically by salaries in the Big 10 as a collection of the finest quality public institutions truly in the nation. What the Faculty Compensation and Benefits Committee has begun to look at--and I think we need to take a serious look at--is that while we have been making great progress in the Big 10, and again as to our ranking in the Big 10, the preliminary evidence suggests that the Big 10 as a group has been declining relative to the rest of the nation. And while we can begin during the next year to argue as to what group we ought to compare ourselves to. there is some serious evidence that suggests that in modern times we may be comparing ourselves to the wrong group in terms of the outstanding quality institutions of the nation. I am not convinced of that yet, but I think that there is sufficient evidence that we need to take a hard look at that. Anecdotally, the University of Wisconsin and the University of Iowa last year had no salary increases; the University of Michigan and Michigan State were on the order of 2 percent salary increases--those states have been hit very, very hard in this difficult time. No question that we are competing at the national level. Historically we have felt that the Big 10 represents a good sample of the national level. But, I am concerned that perhaps there is sufficient evidence to take a strong look at the possibility of a new comparison group because the Big 10 may be slipping.

Mr. Galbreath:

Thank you.

President Jennings:

I think the other thing is to keep in mind as the higher salary increases, as you noticed through this budget—to accomplish the tasks that we need to accomplish and given that this budget was made in a budget-cutting mode, namely in March and April of 1983, the funds simply would not be available at this stage to make an advance. I am convinced we are not hurting the institution, but there may be some legitimate evidence that we need to look at a broader spectrum of faculty salaries.

Dr. Jacob:

What will the typical per quarter undergraduate pay for 12 hours or more? \$550 per quarter?

Mr. Ihrig:

\$547.

Dr. Jacob:

That will be instructional and--

President Jennings:

Instructional and general.

Mr. Havens:

Are there any further questions? Will this be presented for formal vote at the June meeting?

President Jennings:

Yes. What we will do now--and that is an appropriate question, Jack, because we unfortunately haven't been able to do it this way in the last three years--what we will do now is to send these guidelines to the various administrative units. They will come back in with salary and general expense recommendations as it goes through the institution and we will come back to you with the implementation of that. Our expectation is that salary increases will average 7 percent and tuition and fees will average 6 percent as we suggested; but we need to go through the process and give our people the guidelines; and essentially what we are doing is approving tentatively the guidelines that will establish the budget to be presented in June.

Mrs. Bowser:

I think it is remarkable that the dining facilities and residence halls have been able to keep their costs down--I think that's a remarkable situation.

President Jennings:

They have. As I said I am enormously pleased at what the dormitories and residence halls have been able to do. I look forward to the entire institution next year with this 97 percent base capability. The rest of the institution has now a standard to compare themselves with in residence and dining halls.

Mrs. Bowser:

Have they worked strenuously within their component to keep their costs down? I mean, has that been a real target of theirs?

President Jennings:

This has been a very active working group to monitor and manage those costs. I think it is particularly significant that during these budget times those units have been hit harder than some of the

other units in the institution. They have not only kept their costs down in an absolute sense, but in a relative sense they have done far better than the rest of the institution. I think it is appropriate to single out the University Hospitals people, as well. We are in a period where the typical consumer price index does not apply to hospital costs and for three years now-three years ago the Hospitals had no increase in rates, last year they had a 7 percent increase in rates, this year they are going with a 6 percent increase in rates, and by any standard in Ohio or in the nation that is an outstanding performance when hospital rates on an average are going up yearly 12 and 15 percent, our people are averaging less than 5 percent for a three year period. And while we need some reallocation, I think that is why I can be very confident that we can reduce budget bases in the rest of the institution by 3 percent because those folks can do the same thing. I think it is remarkable what these people have done.

Mr. Havens:

Any further questions on this matter?

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. Immke, the guidelines recommended by the President were approved by unanimous voice vote.

Mr. Hilliker made the following statement:

I would like to say, John, on behalf of the Board, what a pleasure it's been serving with you over the years and don't be a stranger--I know you can't afford to be a stranger because you couldn't give up the income you have taken from us on the golf course. Your efforts have been appreciated. It's been fun.

President Jennings made the following statement:

Or. Jacob, I would like to second that on behalf of The Ohio State University, its administration, its faculty, its students, its staff. Your contributions during these last nine years, and particularly during this last year as chairman, have been substantial and significant; and on behalf of the entire Ohio State community we would like to thank you for your efforts. There have been a lot of issues during these last several years and without your skill and guidance, I'm confident that we would not have been able to do as well as we have. And we'd like to present a small token of our appreciation to you that will help you remember us and keep you coming back.

Dr. Jacob made the following statement:

Thank you very much. I had this four page speech prepared, but I think I had better dispense with that. I certainly have enjoyed serving in this position. I have made public service a very important part of my life for approximately the last 20 years or so, particularly since I graduated from Ohio State. And this is by far the most enjoyable position I have served in and I think certainly by far the most enjoyable group of people that I've served with, not only fellow Trustees, but serving with two presidents and various staff members, and certainly the two secretaries that we've had over these past nine years. This has all made it more enjoyable and more worthwhile and I certainly want to extend my sincere appreciation. Ed, I enjoyed working with you. I think together you and the Board and the various chairmen have accomplished a great many things that will improve the University and make it a better place in the years to come. And certainly, Madison, I want to express to you my appreciation for really a heck of a job well done. And they have to make it, it's not something that they just casually come by, they have to put this on their schedule and they have to make this a priority item. And they do. And I think anytime that you can get a 90 percent level of participation for this type of activity, you really have sincere interest and you are going to be able to provide the leadership and provide improvement to the institution. So, it has made my job more pleasurable and a lot easier to know that these people are going to be here and have input.

It has been a pleasure these years working with all of you and I'm going to miss you, naturally, but I hope to continue my involvement in the University, in some way or another. You will all have some unfinished jobs that you can't get done during the time you are chairman, but it is great to know that the leadership is guaranteed for many years in the future to be good, interested leadership, and solid and sincere, active and intelligent people. Thank you, once again. It's been my pleasure--and I've got, what, ten or eleven more days to serve, and maybe we will get a few more things solved during this time. Thank you, Scottie, thank you all.

John Glenn Doctor of Laws

Native Ohioan John Glenn has achieved an unusually large number of distinctions during his career. After successes in sports and other activities at New Concord High School and Muskingum College, Glenn pursued his childhood interest in flying and earned his private pilot's license before his 20th birthday. He entered the armed forces after the attack on Pearl Harbor, beginning 23 years of military service that were highlighted initially by his combat experience during World War II. Service as a flight instructor was followed by further combat duty during the Korean War. Soon after, Glenn became a test pilot and, in 1957, first attracted national attention for his record-setting supersonic transcontinental flight—three hours and 23 minutes from Los Angeles to New York. That feat led to his selection as one of the first seven American astronauts and his entry into the history books as the first American to orbit the earth. His triumphant return included New York City's largest-ever ticker-tape parade and an address to a joint session of Congress. After further service in the space program and several successful years in private business, Glenn returned to public service with his election to the U.S. Senate in 1974 by a one million vote margin. His re-election bid in 1980 succeeded by the largest margin in Ohio history-1.6 million votes. He serves on the Foreign Relations Committee and the Governmental Affairs Committee and is ranking minority member of the Special Committee on Aging. The University is honored to recognize his achievements and proud to have him address today's graduates.

Recipients of Honors

Harvey Brooks Doctor of Science

The Benjamin Peirce Professor of Technology and Public Policy at Harvard University, Harvey Brooks has done much to shape the academic study of the effects of science and technology on society. With undergraduate training in mathematics and a doctoral degree in physics, early in his career he was involved in nuclear energy research. He made major contributions to nuclear propulsion programs and to nuclear reactor safeguards. After joining the Harvard faculty as Gordon McKay Professor of Applied Physics in 1950, he began to build his international renown through his untiring service to the academic world, government, and the private sector. A sampling of his vast number of professional activities shows that he was co-chairman of the Committee on Nuclear and Alternative Energy Systems for the National Academy of Sciences and founding editor of the International Journal of the Physics and Chemistry of Solids and editorial adviser to half a dozen other publications. He is also a fellow of the American Nuclear Society and the American Physical Society, a member of the National Academy of Sciences and the National Academy of Engineering, and a member of the Board of Trustees of the German Marshall Fund of the United States. Colleagues refer to him as "the preeminent spokesman and dean of science and technology in the United States" and "the most knowledgeable and influential individual in the United States when it comes to issues of science policy and policy for science." Ohio State is proud to recognize him for his inspiration to scholarship on this campus and throughout the world.

Archbishop lakovos Doctor of Humane Letters

This year marks Archbishop lakovos' 25th year as Primate of the Greek Orthodox Church of North and South America, his 30th year as a bishop, and his 50th year as a priest. He is spiritual leader to more than two million Greek Orthodox Christians in more than 550 parishes throughout the Western Hemisphere and has served ably as teacher, administrator, theologian, and statesman. He has been a champion for the unity of all Christians and, in 1959, was the first Greek Orthodox Archbishop in four centuries to meet with a Roman Catholic Pontiff. He also has promoted close working relationships among leaders of all religions, serving as president of the World Council of Churches from 1959-68. He is a member of the honorary board of the Advisory Council on Religious Rights in Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union, affiliated with the U.S. Senate's Committee on Foreign Relations. He has been in the forefront of the civil rights movement and marched with Martin Luther King Jr. More recently, he has spoken out forcefully against the violation of human rights and religious freedom and has protested the actions of oppressive governments throughout the world. The Archbishop is chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Hellenic College and Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology in Massachusetts and president of the Board of Trustees of the Saint Basil Academy of Garrison, N.Y. His numerous recognitions include the Presidential Medal of Freedom, awarded by President Jimmy Carter in 1980. The University is honored to recognize his half century of service to the religious and secular worlds.

Recipients of Honors

Arthur H. Robinson Doctor of Science

The theories and writings of Arthur H. Robinson have led him to be recognized by his peers as the dean of cartography and the founder of the modern discipline of cartography in the United States. Through his textbooks, his leadership in professional organizations, and his work with students during 35 years as a professor at the University of Wisconsin at Madison, he has profoundly influenced the study of cartography and mapping, generally, and the specialized studies of the history of cartography. cartographic design, and physical geography. He holds the Ph.D. from Ohio State. Now professor emeritus, Robinson continues to offer inspiration through service to the American Congress on Surveying and Mapping, the International Cartographic Association, and the Association of American Geographers, among others. He helped found The American Cartographer, the field's leading journal, and was its editor for three years. He received his discipline's highest honor, the International Cartographic Association's Carl Mannerfelt Medal, in 1981. Colleagues around the world hail him as a "complete scholar" whose relationship with his students has always been caring and helpful, yet upholding of the high standards he sets for himself." One professor praised his ability to make readers of his books understand the "how" and "why" of maps, "pointing the way to future research into cartographic communication, a subject of greater than ever importance in the era of computer-assisted mapping." Ohio State is proud to honor this distinguished alumnus.

George D. Snell Doctor of Science

In relative solitude in his Maine laboratory, George Snell conducted work over a 30-year period that has had far-reaching effects in several areas of modern biology and medicine—so much so that he shared the Nobel Prize for Medicine in 1980. By studying the genetic structure of mice, he revealed the genetic factors governing acceptance or rejection of transplanted tissue and developed the concept of histocompatibility antigens, the gene products on cell membranes that determine reactions between body tissues. His work laid the theoretical basis for tissue matching for transplants of kidneys and other organs, led to research advances in cancer immunology, and provided the foundation for understanding the relationship between certain antigens and the susceptibility of humans to particular diseases. While conducting this internationally significant research, Snell continually impressed his colleagues with his constant generosity. Said one, "He serves as a model for the open and enthusiastic sharing of everything he has produced, and ideas and materials given by him have been keys to the development of his field and of many of the younger people in it." In addition to his Nobel recognition, Snell has been elected to the National Academy of Sciences and honored by the National Cancer Institute, the Czechoslovak Academy of Sciences, the British Transplantation Society, the French Academy of Science, and the British Society of Immunology. The University is honored to add its recognition to this impressive list.

Distinguished Service Awards

Morgan L. Allison Distinguished Service Award

A 1944 graduate of Ohio State's College of Dentistry, Morgan L. Allison returned to join its faculty in 1949, beginning what would be a distinguished career. He initiated the first graduate program in oral and maxillofacial surgery at Ohio State in 1953 and promoted the concept of outpatient anesthesia and research in addition to clinical oral surgery. The sophistication of his early research in the area belied the lack of modern techniques and facilities now available. He has been a leader in his profession, developing guidelines for specialty training in oral surgery and guidelines for teaching and comprehensive control of pain and anxiety in dentistry. He was named regents professor by the Ohio Board of Regents in 1966, a position he held until his retirement in 1982. He also was chairperson of the section of oral and maxillofacial surgery and anesthesiology in the College of Dentistry for 15 years; he then served as director of the clinical division of dentistry and chairperson of the section of anesthesiology. He was instrumental in founding the American Dental Society of Anesthesiology, and received that organization's Heidbrink Award for his accomplishments and service. He also has received the Distinguished Alumnus Award of the OSU Dental Alumni Association, the Distinguished Dentist Award of the Ohio Dental Association, and numerous other honors, including election as a founder fellow of the International Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons in London, England. Ohio State is proud to present him with a Distinguished Service Award.

Charles H. Summerson Distinguished Service Award

Although Charles H. Summerson served with distinction for 35 years on the faculty of Ohio State's department of geology and mineralogy, he is being recognized today for an "extracurricular activity" completed while discharging his normal professorial duties. Summerson was his department's representative throughout the six-year process of planning, designing, and carrying out the renovation and restoration of Orton Hall. From 1976 until his retirement in 1982, he demonstrated extraordinary devotion to this project. With his guidance, the paintings hung in the Orton Library were cleaned and restored, original woodwork was restored and preserved, and library service desks were remodeled from plans he developed. The ceramic tile floor in the lobby was replaced with tile donated by an Ohio firm through an arrangement Summerson executed. Window sashes were replaced to match the original. Open stairways and original railings and bannisters were preserved and restored at Summerson's insistence although it was necessary to find a special design solution to satisfy the Ohio Building Code. Old wood display cases for geological artifacts were reconditioned and new cases built from plans Summerson developed, and he personally supervised the completion of the work and the installation of the cases. Orton Hall's importance as a piece of distinctive architecture, noteworthy for its unusual and faithful use of native Ohio stone, has been preserved and enhanced through Summerson's untiring efforts. All who love the building and the University are in his debt.

Distinguished Service Awards

Clara G. Weishaupt Distinguished Service Award

When Clara G. Weishaupt retired in 1968, she barely took time to catch her breath before plunging ahead with the next stage of her work. An associate professor emeritus of botany, she prepared a guide for the identification of grasses by their vegetative characteristics after her retirement, supplementing a widely used guide to the vascular plants of Ohio that she first published in 1960. Through these publications, she helped countless Ohioans learn the plants of their state. An Ohio native, she earned all her academic degrees from Ohio State, beginning with a bachelor of science in home economics in 1924 and followed by the master's and Ph.D. in botany. She spent 22 years on the faculty of the Department of Botany, including service as curator of the department's herbarium from 1949-67. In this role, she performed a vital service in preserving the botanical heritage of Ohio and in helping people identify unknown plants. Honors during her career included membership in Sigma Delta Epsilon, the National Honorary Society for Women in Science, and election as a fellow in the American Association for the Advancement of Science. She has continued to serve the students and faculty of the Department of Botany in informal, but valuable, ways and is remembered by all who have had the opportunity to know her and work with her for her ability to inspire both students and colleagues with a love for her profession. James Hilliker, in a special meeting on Wednesday, May 16, 1984, at 10:00 a.m., The Ohio State University Fawcett Center for Tomorrow, Columbus, Ohio.

May 16, 1984 meeting, Board of Trustees

The Chairman, Mr. Hilliker, called the special meeting of the Board of Trustees to order at 10:00 a.m. He requested the Secretary to call the roll.

INTRODUCTION OF NEW BOARD MEMBER

Mr. Hilliker introduced the new member of the Board of Trustees:

I want to thank the press for coming to my first meeting as Chairman of the Board--I assume that is why you are all here today. Before I turn the meeting over to President Jennings for his agenda, I would like to recognize an old face and a new face to this Board of Trustees. The old face is Dr. John Jacob, immediate past Chairman of this Board. Dr. Jacob has been very instrumental and very helpful in the agenda topic today. John, we welcome you and thank you for your help.

The new face is the newest member of the Board, Mr. John J. Barone of Toledo, Ohio. Mr. Barone's appointment is for a term beginning May 14, 1984 and ending May 13, 1993. He is succeeding Dr. Jacob, whose term has expired.

Mr. Barone attended Canisius College and Miami University of Ohio, and received his Juris Doctorate from The Ohio State University in 1936. He is a partner in the law firm of Barone, Van Horn and Greenberg in Toledo, Ohio, with a specialty in corporate law.

From 1945-64, Mr. Barone was U. S. Commissioner for the Northern District, Western Division. He is a member of the American Bar Association; the Federal Bar; the Toledo Bar; and the Ohio State Bar. He serves on numerous boards of various companies. Mr. Barone has five sons-one of whom is an Ohio State University law graduate. He is a life member of the OSU Alumni Association and a member of the Presidents Club.

Mr. Barone, we welcome you to this Board and look forward to your many contributions during your tenure.

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Mr. Hilliker then called on President Jennings to present his agenda. President Jennings made the following statement:

Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Approximately two months ago we began a search for the new Athletic Director at The Ohio State University. We began a search for an individual who would be committed at the highest levels to the NCAA and the NCAA rules and regulations. We began a search for an individual who would believe in and understand and be committed to students—as students first and athletes second, as an extracurricular activity. We began a search for an individual firmly committed by background and experience to women's intercollegiate athletics. We were looking for an individual who was also committed to competing at the very highest level in intercollegiate athletics—at the national level, and Ohio State deserves nothing less. We began to look for an in-

dividual with a deep appreciation of the financial issues associated with intercollegiate athletics, an understanding of public universities, and with the demonstrated leadership qualities that are so necessary in an athletic director position that is clearly one of the most critical athletic director positions in the country.

A search committee was formed consisting of members of the Athletic Council and four members of my staff. Last Thursday, that committee completed their work and provided me with a list of seven candidates that they would recommend very highly--all of which were superbly qualified. Since that time I have had the opportunity to personally interview all seven, in various cities across the country, for fairly long periods of time. I am convinced that the search committee has truly done a national search, and the list of individuals clearly represents, in my judgment, the best people available in the country in intercollegiate athletics.

After going through that process and a variety of checking among other universities, and after discussing individually with each member of the Board my recommendation, I am prepared to recommend that we appoint today to the Athletic Directorship at The Ohio State University effective on or before July 1, 1984, Mr. Richard M. Bay, who is currently Athletic Director at the University of Oregon. I would make that recommendation for your approval, Mr. Chairman.

(Rick) Bay to the position of Athletic Director of The Ohio State University was presented to the Board of Trustees. In this position, Mr. Bay will serve as the principal administrative official of the Department of Athletics and will have the requisite authority for providing the overall leadership and direction of the University's intercollegiate programs.

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DIVISION NAME CHANGE IN THE COLLEGE OF PHARMACY Resolution No. 84-138

Synopsis: It is proposed that the Division of Administrative and Social Sciences in the College of Pharmacy be renamed the Division of Pharmaceutical Administration.

WHEREAS on March 2, 1973, the Board of Trustees approved the organization of the College of Pharmacy into six Divisions; and

WHEREAS the Executive Committee of the College of Pharmacy has unanimously approved a requested name change of the Division of Administrative and Social Sciences to the Division of Pharmaceutical Administration; and

WHEREAS the University Senate has approved the requested name change and has requested concurrence by the Board of Trustees:

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Division of Administrative and Social Sciences in the College of Pharmacy be renamed the Division of Pharmaceutical Administration effective July 1, 1984.

FORMATION OF DEPARTMENTS IN THE COLLEGE OF NURSING Resolution No. 84-139

Synopsis: The formation of two departments within the College of Nursing is proposed.

WHEREAS the School of Nursing was granted college status on July 9, 1983; and

WHEREAS the College of Nursing faculty approved in Autumn Quarter, 1983 the formation of two departments: Life Span Process and Family and Community; and

WHEREAS the Department of Life Span Process will focus on the development and transmission of knowledge needed for the nursing of individuals throughout stages of the life cycle, and will encompass the promotion of health, prevention of disease, restoration of health, terminal illness and death and dying; and

WHEREAS the Department of Family and Community will focus on the development and transmission of knowledge needed for nursing practice with families and communities, and will be directed toward health promotion, disease prevention, restoration and maintenance of health within families and communities; and

WHEREAS both the Department of Life Span Process and the Department of Family and Community will serve as tenure initiating units for their 32, and 29 faculty members, respectively; and

WHEREAS the present structure inhibits interaction among graduate and undergraduate faculty and students, while the proposed departmental structure will more appropriately reflect the mission of the College, and permit more flexibility and better utilization of resources; and

WHEREAS the proposed action was approved by the University Senate on May 5, 1984:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the requested departmental structure for the College of Nursing is approved effective July 1, 1984.

Upon motion of Mrs. Bowser, seconded by Mr. Teaford, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous voice vote.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CODE OF STUDENT CONDUCT

Resolution No. 84-140

Synopsis: Amendments to the <u>Code of Student Conduct</u> (3335-31-02 and 3335-31-03) are being proposed.

WHEREAS the University Senate has approved the following amendments to sections 3335-31-02 and 3335-31-03 of the Code of Student Conduct and has requested concurrence of the Board of Trustees:

3335-31-02 Committee on academic misconduct

- (C) All cases of suspected misconduct shall be reported to the committee. The committee also shall investigate cases of lax or irregular examination methods and report findings to the vice president for academic affairs and provost. Students have the obligation to report suspected misconduct or irregular or lax examination methods. The committee may impose any code sanction. The committee consists of:
 - (1) fifteen faculty members elected by the university senate at its special meeting in June for three-year terms beginning with the summer quarter, the election to be held annually so that five members will retire each year. No member of the university faculty serves more than two consecutive terms;
 - (2) five graduate student members appointed in the summer quarter by the president of the council of graduate students, with the approval of the council of graduate students for a one-year term beginning with the autumn quarter;
 - (3) five undergraduate student members appointed in the spring quarter by the president of the undergraduate student government, with the approval of the undergraduate student assembly for a one-year term beginning with the summer quarter;
 - (4) the dean of student life, or designee, ex-officio and without vote; and
 - (5) a coordinator, appointed by the vice president for academic affairs and provost, ex-officio and without vote and charged with assisting the committee in administrative matters. The coordinator does not participate in the decisions of the committee.
- (D) The committee on academic misconduct establishes panels of persons from the committee on academic misconduct which conduct hearings and make decisions with the same authority as the committee on academic misconduct.
- (E) The committee on academic misconduct establishes rules and procedures to conduct hearings, including the definition of a quorum.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CODE OF STUDENT CONDUCT (contd)

(Details of rule 3335-5-54 of the Administrative Code, which defines the committee on academic misconduct, and committee procedures are available from the office of the vice president for academic affairs and provost.)

3335-31-03 University judicial panel

- (B) three faculty members recommended to the dean by the vice president for academic affairs and provost for three-year terms; annually appointed so that one member retires each year; and
- (D) the coordinator of judicial programs shall serve ex-officio as panel coordinator without vote.
- (E) the dean of student life will appoint a panel composed of six members with expertise to include, but not limited to, sexual harassment cases or those with racial overtones. This panel will serve as a resource for information concerning a variety of cases. One member from this panel of experts may be selected by the coordinator of judicial programs as the case warrants. The expert panel member will participate in the entire case, but will not vote at the conclusion of the deliberations.

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the amendments to sections 3335-31-02 and 3335-31-03 of the Code of Student Conduct be adopted as recommended by the University Senate.

Upon motion of Mr. Immke, seconded by Mr. Galbreath, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous voice vote.

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AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY Resolution No. 84-141

Synopsis: Amendments to rules 3335-5-023, 3335-5-04, 3335-5-05, and 3335-5-581 are being proposed.

WHEREAS the University Senate pursuant to rule 3335-1-09 of the Administrative Code is authorized to recommend through the President to the Board of Trustees the adoption of amendments to Rules of the University Faculty as approved by the University Senate; and

WHEREAS the proposed changes in the Rules of the University Faculty were approved by the University Senate on May 5, 1984, as follows:

AMENDED RULES

3335-5-023 Appeal procedures for tenured faculty because of termination of appointments during financial exigency.

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (B) The faculty hearing committee.
- 3335-5-04 Hearing procedures for complaints against regular, regular clinical, and auxiliary faculty members.
- (E) The faculty hearing committee.
 - (2) The hearing panel may restrict the attendance of persons at the proceedings, provided that neither the respondent nor the prosecutor shall be denied the right to have one observer of their choosing present at all times.
 - (3) Respondents shall have the rights to be represented by legal counsel or any other person of their choice, to examine the witnesses and evidence against them, to present witnesses and evidence on their own behalf, and to refuse to testify or be questioned in the proceedings without prejudice to their cause.
- 3335-5-05 Procedures concerning faculty complaints about promotion, tenure and renewal decisions.
- (A) Definitions and construction.
 - (1) When presenting a complaint to the committee on academic freedom and responsibility, a faculty member (hereinafter "complainant") must first present evidence of having made a reasonable effort to resolve the grievance by informal methods (or formal methods if they exist) in both the department and the college. Complaints concerning promotion, tenure, or renewal decisions may be made by tenured or probationary faculty.
- (B) The committee on academic freedom and responsibility.
 - (1) Complaints alleging improper evaluation shall be presented in writing to the faculty members of the committee on academic freedom and responsibility (hereinafter "committee") and to the vice president for academic affairs and provost within thirty days (whenever practical) after a faculty member has been notified of the decision the faculty member wishes to challenge.
 - (4) If the committee determines that reasonable and adequate grounds may exist for asserting improper evaluation, it shall forward the complaint to the faculty hearing committee, established pursuant to rule 3335-5-581 of the Administrative Code.
- (C) The faculty hearing committee.
 - (2) Actions being challenged under this rule shall be responded to by the vice president for academic affairs and provost or designee.

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

- (3) In matters involving allegations under paragraph (A) (3) (b) of this rule, the hearing panel shall conduct its proceedings in a collegial manner in accordance with the following guidelines:
 - (a) The complaint shall be set forth in writing and a copy furnished to the party or parties that are alleged to have committed the infringement.
 - (b) The hearing panel may restrict the attendance of persons at the proceedings, provided that the complainant shall not be denied the right to have one observer of his or her choosing present at all times.
 - (c) Both complainant and respondent shall have the right to be accompanied and advised by any person of their choice, to present witnesses and evidence on their own behalf, and to examine witnesses and evidence.
 - (d) The hearing panel shall receive such testimony and other evidence as it deems to be material and relevant to the issues before it.
 - (e) An electronic recording shall be kept of all proceedings before a hearing panel.
- (4) (b) The complainant should be given opportunity to address the hearing panel in writing and in person, and offer any evidence substantiating the claim.
 - (c) If the complainant appears before the hearing panel, the complainant may bring an advisor. No formal transcript of the proceedings need be kept.
- (5) (b) When it has found that an improper evaluation has been made, submit its findings to the dean of the college in which the complainant is a member and to the vice president for academic affairs and provost. The vice president for academic affairs and provost, in consultation with the hearing panel and the chairperson of the faculty hearing committee, shall take such steps as may be deemed necessary to assure a new, fair, and impartial evaluation. A copy of the hearing panel's findings shall also be sent to the president.

(D) The president.

(1) Upon receipt of a report under paragraph (C) (6) of this rule, the president shall review the matter and take whatever action the president deems appropriate.

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

3335-5-581 Faculty hearing committee.

- (A) The faculty hearing committee shall consist of nine tenured members of the regular faculty. Three members shall be elected annually from a slate of six candidates. Each elected person shall serve a three-year term as a regular member, followed by a one-year term as an alternate member.
- (E) The proceedings of a hearing panel shall be conducted according to the specifications listed as follows:
 - (1) Hearings conducted on allegations of incompetence or grave misconduct, or on appeals from findings of failure to meet university responsibilities, shall follow procedures according to rule 3335-5-04 (E) of the Administrative Code.
 - (2) Hearings conducted on complaints of alleged improper evaluation based upon reasons or considerations that infringe a constitutional right of the complainant shall follow procedures according to rule 3335-5-05 (C) (3) of the Administrative Code.
 - (3) Hearings conducted on allegations of improper evaluation based upon inadequate consideration of the pertinent facts by the individual(s) making the decision shall follow procedures according to rule 3335-5-05 (C) (4) of the Administrative Code.
 - (4) Hearings conducted on an appeal of a tenured faculty member because of termination of appointment during financial exigency shall follow procedures according to rule 3335-5-023 (B) of the Administrative Code.

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the amendments to rules 3335-5-023, 3335-5-04, 3335-5-05, and 3335-5-581 of the Rules of the University Faculty be adopted as recommended by the University Senate.

Maurice L. Giltz

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on April 30, 1984, of Maurice L. Giltz, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Zoology, College of Biological Sciences.

Dr. Giltz was born September 24, 1910, in Massillon, Ohio. He completed his B.S. in Biology in 1937 at Capital University. Dr. Giltz taught Biology at South Bloomfield High School from 1937-41, and he taught Biology and coached at Massillon High School from 1941-43. He was awarded an M.S. degree in 1942 on completion of his research at the Stone Laboratory of The Ohio State University. Dr. Giltz was a Naval Officer during World War II serving from 1943-46. He studied for his doctorate in Zoology at The Ohio State University working with Dr. David F. Miller, and he received the Ph.D. in 1954. Dr. Giltz was appointed an Instructor in Zoology in 1949, Assistant Professor in 1954, Associate Professor in 1959, and Professor in 1968.

Or. Giltz taught general zoology, anatomy and ornithology. He delighted in field work where students learned the biology of birds. He worked closely with the Columbus Metropolitan Parks and was a loyal member of the Wheaton Club, central Ohio's society of field naturalists. Research concerning birds was an important part of his academic life. Working with others, he was responsible for the live trapping and banding of many thousands of birds in the Columbus area. This work led to publications concerning the migratory patterns of these birds. He cooperated with the Agriculture Research and Development Center at the Maples Marsh in Sandusky researching the depredation of crops brought about by blackbirds. He was a pioneer in management studies of blackbird populations. He retired from the Zoology Department in June, 1981.

William B. Logan

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death of William B. Logan, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Educational Policy and Leadership, Division of Vocational-Technical Education.

A native of North Carolina, Professor Logan joined the faculty in 1948 and was awarded a Ph.D. in Education in 1952. His B.A. was earned at Furman in 1939 and his M.S. at the University of North Carolina in 1944. Professor Logan began his professional career by teaching high school distributive education in Ashville, North Carolina. Later he served in administration in the State Department of Public Instruction and in teacher education at the University of North Carolina.

In addition to his undergraduate and graduate instruction at OSU, Professor Logan engaged in extensive professional service. He was president of the American Vocational Association, served on President Kennedy's Panel of Consultants on Vocational Education, and several Office of Education panels. In addition, he was a visiting professor at numerous institutions and the author of three textbooks.

Upon his retirement from OSU in 1967, Professor Logan assumed the presidency of Webber College in Babson Park, Florida. During his twelve-year tenure as president, the college expanded from a two-year to a four-year institution. In 1973 he was elected president of the Florida Association of Colleges and Universities.

Dr. Logan's contributions were recognized by OSU through the awarding to him of a Centennial Award for his contribution to vocational-technical education.

William J. Miller

Dr. Miller was born December 12, 1908. He received his B.S. from Valparaiso University and his M.D. from Indiana University Medical School. Following this, he completed postdoctoral training at Epworth Hospital in Indiana and at The Ohio State University, followed by training at Washington University and Lempert Institute of Otology.

Dr. Miller was appointed to the faculty in the Department of Otolaryngology as a Clinical Instructor in 1944. He progressed steadily through the several intermediate faculty ranks to become a Clinical Professor in 1970. Upon his retirement from the faculty in 1980, he was granted the title of Professor Emeritus.

Or. Miller's association with the College of Medicine entailed service both at Children's Hospital and University Hospitals. In these situations, he worked closely with resident physicians and medical students and was regarded by all as a bulwark of the department. Dr. Miller was among the earliest to pick up innovative procedures and he was especially well known throughout Central Ohio as a surgeon who pioneered the fenestration procedure for the treatment of otosclerotic deafness. His warm personality and dedication to medical teaching made him a most influential member of the Department of Otolaryngology.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Secretary be instructed to incorporate all supporting documents into the minutes of this meeting, including faculty tenure approvals, salary rolls with promotions, fees and charges for the Fiscal Year 1984-85, and to file these materials with the official records of this University.

1984-85 CURRENT FUNDS BUDGET (contd)

Mr. Hilliker made the following statement:

Before we ask for a motion on that resolution, I would like to read the following report from the Personnel Committee of the Board, which met this morning.

On September 1, 1984, President Jennings will begin his fourth year as President of this University. It hardly seems possible that three years have elapsed since the search and selection process of 1981, and that there has been time for all of the splendid achievements which have been noted during the interim. Although this Board has made an ongoing evaluation of the President's performance, it is our view that from time to time it is necessary and desirable that the results of our evaluations and assessments be publicly recorded.

As everyone would agree, most institutions of higher education are incredibly complex and require unique skills, ability, imagination, insight and leadership vitality at the highest levels. The Ohio State University, being truly the most complex, the most diverse, and certainly one of the most outstanding public institutions in this country, has been most fortunate in having in the chief leadership position, an individual in Dr. Jennings who meets in every respect the ideals of a modern university president. President Jennings, during his short tenure, has not only brought a new vitality and shills in working with the diverse constituencies of the University-leaders of government, both federal and state; members of this Board; alumni of the University; faculty, staff and students.

Through his leadership he has brought about a new awareness and concern for the overriding quest for excellence in education--and, for that matter, in all that we do here at the University. It is a strong testament to his leadership that morale is high, the budget is balanced, and the basic missions and accomplishments of the University are getting more recognition today than at any time in the recent past.

In sum, it is our firm conviction that President Jennings's service to the University over the past three years has been of exceptional merit and has contributed in incalculable ways to the overall esteem, sustained interest and high regard for The Ohio State University.

Given the exceptional and meritorious performance of President Jennings, it is the desire of the University that his service be so recognized. We believe that his value to the University is such that he should be provided some monetary recognition. In accordance with this thinking, we have concluded that President Jennings should be given an increase of \$8,000.00 for the 1984-85 year.

I. INTRODUCTION

The 1984-85 budget being recommended is different from those presented over the past three years since this budget can be presented to this Board without the uncertainties in State funding. While the State support for 1984-85 remains extremely limited, this year of fiscal stability has provided the members of this University community a restored faith that looks forward to a year of progress rather than attempting to rebuild from the disasters of midyear budget cuts.

Even with budget stability, The Ohio State University must continue to operate with an extremely tight budget. This situation is exemplified by the fact that the State support for the current fiscal year, 1983-84, only equaled the original appropriation for the previous fiscal year, 1982-83. Therefore, even with a 6.7 percent increase in State support for 1984-85, this represents an effective increase of only 3 percent per year over the two years of the current biennium.

There are many people who thought that the statewide vote defeating Issue 3 last November would result in immediate additional funding for The Ohio State University. This was an incorrect assumption. What was at stake was continuation of existing state funding and protection against additional midyear reductions. These results have been achieved. Any new funding must await future action by the Ohio General Assembly for the next biennium which begins 1 July, 1985.

The 1984-85 budget being brought for your approval is in accordance with the priorities established and followed during the past three years of budget retrenchments. They include achieving fiscal stability and providing adequate time to plan ways to maintain operations within available funding levels; maintaining and enhancing quality throughout this University; and preserving the land-grant mission of accessibility for our students by keeping tuition and fee increases as low as possible.

After full consultation with the University Senate Fiscal Advisory and Faculty Compensation and Benefits Committees, deans, and vice presidents this 1984-85 budget recommendation continues to emphasize these priorities. While available funding does not enable this University to make the desired amount of progress in further strengthening excellence, funding for such new initiatives as the Ohio Eminent Scholar Program makes a strong and positive statement regarding the

future directions of The Ohio State University. It is our hope that the resources during the next biennium will be sufficient to support significant advancements in excellence.

II. SOURCES OF FUNDS

The Current Fund Budget for 1984-85 includes funding sources which total \$781,120,000, as detailed in the schedule of Sources of Income to Support 1984-85 Budget. This amount includes State support totaling \$229,381,000, which represents a 6.7 percent increase over that received for the current fiscal year. Of these total sources of funds, Columbus Campus general funds represent 42 percent of the total with earnings operations generating 34 percent, restricted grants and contracts 19 percent, and the regional campuses revenues with OARDC totaling 5 percent.

While student access remains a high priority for The Onio State University, the continued limited amounts of State support will require student tuition increases which average 6 percent. Specifically, tuition increases of 5.5 percent for undergraduate instructional and general fees, and 7.5 percent for graduate and professional instructional fees are being recommended effective Autumn Quarter, 1984. Even though these increases exceed current inflation rates, they keep this University's fees below those amounts projected in the subsidy models of the Board of Regents. During the periods of budget cuts and resulting high rates of tuition increases statewide, the moderation used in this University's increases maintains student tuition below the Regents' 1984-85 projections for all fee categories.

Continuing prior years' efforts to manage increases in all fees and charges of the University, the limit on the average increase University-wide will be 6 percent. The continued emphasis on cost containment by our Residence and Dining Halls and by Traffic and Parking has resulted in average rate increases of 3.2 percent and 3.7 percent respectively. The resultant increase in typical student charges range from 4.7 percent to 5.8 percent, as detailed in the supporting budget materials. It should be further noted that University Hospitals have set 6 percent as the average of its rate increases, continuing that unit's leadership efforts in containing health care costs.

The other income components of the 1984-85 Current Funds Budget are in line with expected growth from 1983-84 expected revenues. The projected revenues for 1983-84 show an increase of \$24.1 million in excess of the original budget passed by this Board on 8 July, 1983. The majority of this difference results from the reclassification of \$7.8 million in Federal student aid funds and \$7.2 million in sponsored research revenues, and \$3.9 million in state appropriations due to the classified staff pay bill and actual enrollments. The other revenue adjustments represent normal differences in projected income versus the budget expectations of a year ago.

III. USES OF FUNDS

As detailed in the Schedule of Budgeted Expenditures for Fiscal Year 1984-85 and the supporting documents, this University's current fund expenditures total \$778,560,000. These planned expenditures will support the following budget planning guidelines.

- * Increase faculty and administrative/professional staff salaries by 3 percent and provide 4 percent in salary funds for merit increases.
- * Fund the salary increases for Civil Service staff recently mandated by the Ohio General Assembly, at an average increase of 7 percent.
- * Increase general expense budgets by 6 percent for colleges and offices.
- * Provide funding to maintain the purchasing power of University-funded student financial aid plus \$4.5 million to address special critical needs including providing adequate instructional staffs, support for continued efforts to enhance quality and excellence, and assist in implementing program changes as well as cost containment efforts.
- * Provide resources to meet mandatory General Fund cost increases, such as utilities (\$1.8 million) and employee benefits (\$1.4 million).

While these expenditure plans can be achieved within the available resources, the limited funds available provide no cushion for entering the next biennium. In addition, increased attention needs to again be given to internal reallocations during these years of increased budget stability. Therefore, the 1984-85 budget plan calls for the colleges and administrative areas to begin now to develop plans to operate with a 3 percent reduction in their base budgets effective 30 June, 1985. This provides over 12 months for these units to adjust to lower spending levels and avoids the crisis budgeting experienced over the past three years of budget cuts. These reductions will result from further efficiencies, improving cost containment, and continuing reductions in programs and services which are no longer needed or central to the University's mission. The resources generated will be used for meeting changing needs and supporting demonstrated excellence, as well as new program and service initiatives as we enter the next biennium.

Every effort will be made to again provide one-time funds for equipment maintenance and replacement as well as library acquisitions to continue to improve these necessary support resources. If resources permit, the budget target is to provide \$3 million in one-time equipment and libraries funds for 1984-85.

This expenditure budget is not only within the expected resources for 1984-85, it also provides for internal reallocations to produce critical funding for further efforts to selectively enhance excellence throughout this University. These internal efforts, if coupled with expanded funding assistance for the next biennium, will restore a strong state University and continue to enhance excellence in teaching, research and related service.

Synopsis: Amendments to the <u>Bylaws of the Board of Trustees</u> (3335-1-06) and <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> (3335-3-19, 3335-5-02, 3335-5-07, 3335-5-15, 3335-7-17, 3335-7-18, 3335-7-21, 3335-7-24, 3335-7-26, 3335-7-30, 3335-7-32, 3335-7-33, 3335-7-35, 3335-9-01, 3335-9-02, 3335-9-12, 3335-9-14, 3335-9-17, and 3335-9-18) are proposed.

WHEREAS the University Senate pursuant to rule 3335-1-09 of the Administrative Code is authorized to recommend through the President to the Board of Trustees the adoption of amendments to the Bylaws of the Board of Trustees and Rules of the University Faculty as approved by the University Senate; and

WHEREAS the proposed changes in the <u>Bylaws of the Board of Trustees</u> and <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> were approved by the <u>University Senate on June 2, 1984, as follows:</u>

BYLAW

3335-1-06 Instruction.

(A) The university year. The university year shall be divided into four quarters of approximately twelve weeks each. For any college on a semester basis, the university year shall be divided into a summer session of approximately twelve weeks and two semesters of approximately eighteen weeks each. The summer quarter or session shall begin the university year and may be divided into two terms of approximately six weeks each.

AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

RULES

3335-3-19 University registrar.

Subject to the direction of the vice provost for student affairs, the principal duties of the university registrar shall be the supervision of the details of registration, records, and scheduling which shall include: distribution of registration forms; distribution of approved schedules; fee assessments and adjustments; record of fee payments; maintenance of current quarter or semester schedules; maintenance of home or permanent addresses, name and address of person(s) to be notified in case of emergency, local addresses and the respective telephone numbers of all currently enrolled students; the posting of quarters and semesters of attendance; the posting of all courses and respective marks; recording of all probations and dismissals; recording of withdrawals; recording of all degrees earned and dates; recording of all past names and other demographic data; the distribution of the official student records to include the proper confidentiality safeguards; scheduling of classroom space, classes, and final examinations; offering placement testing, admission testing, test scoring services, a mechanism for student evaluation of teaching, and coordination of the credit by examination programs; other routine duties associated with the registration, records and scheduling of students; and special projects and duties that may be assigned from time to time by the vice provost for student affairs.

3335-5-02 Appointments and continuing employment; conditions upon.

(A) Upon nomination and recommendation by the president of the university, the board of trustees shall make all appointments to all positions within the university and approve the salaries therefor. Such appointments, for a period not to exceed four academic quarters, or a summer session and two semesters if applicable, shall be evidenced by a notice of appointment signed by the secretary of the board and sent to the appointee for acceptance. The notice of appointment form is a budgetary convenience containing some detail relating to the employment relationship during the term of appointment, such as salary, title, and the quarters or semesters during which service is to be rendered. The form is used for appointment to many and varied kinds of service, including appointment to positions which may be tenure accruing and others which are not. Neither the issuance of the notice nor its contents is intended to reflect any commitment by the trustees as to the recipient's tenure or as to renewal of appointment.

3335-5-07 Term of duty.

All members of the teaching staff on duty during a given quarter, or semester if applicable, are expected to report for duty and to be available for consultation and organization at least one day preceding the day designated in the calendar as the day for classes to begin. They are also expected to remain on duty through the convocation and examinations which conclude the work of the quarter or semester.

AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

3335-5-15 Executive committee.

Each college shall have the power to designate an executive committee to which it may delegate authority to transact the business of the college as provided by the rules or by the established precedents of the college. Unless otherwise provided by the college faculty, this committee shall receive and act upon student petitions relative to courses of study and reinstatement; shall certify to the college faculty at the end of each quarter, or semester if applicable, lists of students who have fulfilled the requirements for a degree, or for whom special recommendation is made; and shall bring before the college faculty any matter coming within its knowledge that needs the consideration or action of the college. The dean of the college shall act as chairperson of the committee.

3335-7-17 Regulations for the control of course offerings.

(F) The graduate professional colleges may formulate rules to govern the control of their course offerings, subject to the approval of the council on academic affairs.

3335-7-18 Standards for number of class sections.

(E) The graduate professional colleges may formulate rules to govern the formation of class sections, subject to the approval of the council on academic affairs.

3335-7-21 Marks.

(G) "l"--incomplete

(3) The student must complete the work so that the instructor of the course may report the final mark at the earliest possible time, but not later than noon of the sixth Saturday of the quarter, or semester if applicable, following the quarter or semester in which the "I" was received. For legitimate reason the instructor may establish a deadline for the completion of the work which is within the maximum time permitted. Upon petition of the student within this period, the authorized representative of the dean or director of the enrollment unit in which the student was last enrolled after consultation with the instructor of the course, or, if the instructor is unavailable, the chairperson of the department involved, may for good reason allow a student additional time in which to complete the Generally, this shall not be longer than the end of the quarter, or semester if applicable, following the quarter or semester in which the "I" was received. Any decision extending the period shall set forth the time in which the student shall complete the work and a copy of the decision shall be forwarded to the office of the university registrar.

AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

(I) "P"--progress

(1) This mark is used to indicate that the student has shown satisfactory progress in a series or sequence of courses where the mark is not recorded until the final quarter, or semester if applicable, of the series or sequence is completed. Until such time as a final mark is recorded, the mark of "P" shall be given and the credit shall be counted as hours only, and shall not be considered in determining a student's point-hour ratio under rule 3335-7-26 of the Administrative Code. When a final mark is submitted by the instructor, all previous "P" marks shall assume and be recorded with the value of the final mark.

3335-7-24 Credit hours.

- (8) In determining the hours per week required by the course or work, the council on academic affairs may, in appropriate cases, consider the average weekly hours spent during a quarter or semester on the course or work. It should be remembered that the above are guides only and may be deviated from for good cause.
- (C) When comparing or combining semester credit hours with quarter credit hours, one semester credit hour shall be the equivalent of one and one-half quarter credit hours.

3335-7-26 Point-hour ratio.

- (B) When determining the point-hour ratio of a student:
 - (1) For a quarter, or semester if applicable, the "applicable number of credit hours" shall be the student's scheduled credit hours in that quarter or semester.

3335-7-30 Rescheduled courses.

(B) If, within the first four weeks of a quarter, or semester if applicable, a student's previous preparation is demonstrably inadequate for a course in which he originally enrolled, the department or school concerned is empowered to instruct the college or school in which that student is registered to remove the course from the student's schedule and to replace it with a more suitable one.

3335-7-32 Withdrawal from courses or from the university.

(A) Withdrawal from the university during a quarter, or semester if applicable, constitutes withdrawal from all courses in which a student is enrolled during that quarter or semester. Upon official notification of the student's withdrawal from the university, the university registrar is authorized to enter the dated notation "withdrew" on the student's official permanent record.

AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

3335-7-33 Conditions for disenrollment from a course.

- (A) After consultation with the instructor, the chairperson of the instructor's department (or other appropriate administrative official) may disenroll a student from a course if:
 - (1) By the third instructional day of the quarter, or semester or term if applicable, or the second scheduled class session of the course, whichever occurs later, the student fails to attend the scheduled course without giving prior notification to the instructor. In such cases the chairperson (or other appropriate administrative official) shall notify the student's college office. A change ticket removing the course from the student's schedule shall be prepared and copies forwarded to the student and to the office of the university registrar. The student is not relieved of the responsibility for dropping such course in the customary way.
- (C) For disenrollment, exclusive of audit, under sections (A) and (B) of this rule, the university registrar shall enter on the student's official permanent record:
 - (1) No mark, if the disenrollment occurs before five p.m. of the third Friday of a quarter or semester course, or the second Friday of a summer term course; or
 - (2) The mark "W," if the disenrollment occurs after five p.m. of the third Friday of a quarter or semester course, or the second Friday of a summer term course.

3335-7-35 Quarters, semesters, and terms.

- (A) The university year shall be divided into four quarters of approximately twelve weeks each. For any college on a semester basis, the university year shall be divided into a summer session of approximately twelve weeks and two semesters of approximately eighteen weeks each. The summer quarter or session shall begin the university year and may be divided into two terms of approximately six weeks each.
- (8) The university calendar, including the dates of the beginning and ending of each quarter, semester, and term and of the several vacations and recesses within the year, shall be submitted annually by the university editor to the council of deans (rule 3335-3-22 of the Administrative Code) for adoption and publication in the university bulletins.

3335-9-01 Classification of students for admission.

Students shall be classified as:

(D) Transient students. This shall include regular enrollees of other institutions who with the recommendation of their college authorities enter this university with a brief residence (usually one quarter or semester) without transfer of credits.

AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

3335-9-02 Time of admission.

- (C) Admission as a professional student. Professional students meeting all admission requirements shall be admitted at such time or times as determined by the council on admission and registration with due regard to the curriculum of the professional college involved.
- (D) Admission as a transient student or auditor. Transient students and auditors meeting all admission requirements shall be admitted at such time or times as determined by the council on admission and registration.
- 3335-9-12 Registration conditional upon payment of fees.
- (A) All bills, fees and deposits required from students for a quarter, or semester if applicable, must be paid at the office of fees and deposits prior to and as a condition of registration for that quarter or semester.
- (B) On the first day of class each quarter, or semester if applicable, each student is required to demonstrate the right to enrollment in scheduled classes by presentation of an approved schedule or appropriate change document and paid fee card.

3335-9-14 Time of registration and payment of fees; penalties.

- (A) Payment of fees is required of all students each quarter, or semester if applicable, by the close of business on the date established by the vice provost for student affairs in cooperation with the appropriate offices, and published by the office of the university registrar. This fee payment deadline will apply to the postmark date for fees paid by mail and to the date of receipt for fees paid in person. Failure to meet this requirement will result in a penalty assessment, unless excused by the university registrar or designee.
- (B) All fees, including penalties, must be paid on or before the fourteenth day after classes begin each quarter, or semester if applicable. The university reserves the right to refuse registration if fees are not paid by the date on which they are due. Individual exceptions to this provision may be made only upon the approval of the vice president for business and finance or designee.

3335-9-17 Filing registration forms.

All students are required to present their registration forms with course requests each quarter, or semester if applicable, at the time and place announced by the office of the university registrar. Failure to comply with this rule will result in a penalty assessment.

AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

3335-9-18 Return of fees.

- (A) Fees (except for the application and acceptance fees) are returnable in part if a student withdraws from the university for any cause other than at the request of the university and if such withdrawal is made within the period of time specified in paragraphs (B), (C), and (D) of this rule. The application fee and the acceptance fee are not returnable irrespective of the reason for withdrawal.
- (C) Semester fees will be refunded according to the following schedule:
 - (1) From the date on which fees are paid through the sixth day on which classes are scheduled--full fees less ten dollars.
 - (2) After the sixth day on which classes are scheduled through the eighteenth day on which classes are scheduled--seventy-five per cent of fees paid.
 - (3) After the eighteenth day on which classes are scheduled through the thirty-sixth day on which classes are scheduled--fifty per cent of fees paid.
 - (4) After the thirty-sixth day on which classes are scheduled--no refund of fees paid.

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the foregoing amendments to the <u>Bylaws of the Board of Trustees</u> and <u>Rules of the University Faculty</u> be adopted as recommended by the <u>University Senate</u>.

DEPARTMENTAL REALIGNMENT - HEALTH SCIENCES AV/TV (contd)

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the departmental status of Health Sciences AV/TV be discontinued and that the reporting relationship for this function be aligned as proposed through the School of Allied Medical Professions effective July 1, 1984.

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DEGREES AND CERTIFICATES - SUMMER QUARTER COMMENCEMENT Resolution No. 85-3

G. Harold Chambers

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death on November 25, 1983, of G. Harold Chambers, Instructor Emeritus.

Mr. Chambers was born May 29, 1898 in Hamden, New York. He received his B.S.A. from Syracuse University in 1922. He later took graduate courses at The Ohio State University and Colorado A & M. He taught vocational agriculture from 1922 to 1929 before joining the Cooperative Extension Service as the County Agriculture Agent in Hocking County on January 21, 1930. Mr. Chambers became the County Agriculture Agent in Coshocton County on May 1, 1937 and held this position until his retirement on June 30, 1962.

Oliver D. Diller

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on April 24, 1984, of Oliver D. Diller, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Botany.

Oliver Diller, was born on January 16, 1905 in Putnam County, Ohio He earned his B.A. degree in biology from Bluffton College in 1930, his M.S. in 1932 and Ph.D. in 1934 in botany from The Ohio State University. He specialized in forest ecology and was employed by the U. S. Forest Service for three years. He then joined the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station (now OARDC) as Assistant Professor of forestry, becoming Associate Professor in 1938, and Professor and Chairman of the Department of Forestry in 1951. In 1965, when the Secrest Arboretum became a separate department he was named Curator. He retired and became Professor Emeritus July 1, 1970. He was very active in community and professional organizations where he was well known as "Ollie." He was a trustee of Bluffton College, where he received an honorary doctorate in 1972, as well as being trustee of the Ohio Forestry Association, Ohio Chapter of the Nature Conservancy, the Holly Society of America, and the Dawes Arboretum. He received many awards from forestry and conservation organizations in recognition of his outstanding services, including the Distinguished Achievement Award in Conservation of the State of Ohio in 1970.

Sheila M. Goff

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on June 6, 1984, of Sheila M. Goff, Associate Professor Emeritus in the Department of Communication.

Sheila M. Goff was born on September 18, 1921 in Logan, Ohio. She received a B.S. in Education degree in 1945 and the M.A. degree in 1947 from Ohio University, and the Ph.D. in Speech and Hearing Science from The Ohio State University in 1955. She taught at Ohio University, Athens, Ohio during 1946-47, the University of Florida from 1947-51, the University of Texas in the summer of 1950, and The Ohio State University from 1951-1983.

Professor Goff was a dedicated teacher and clinician. Her efforts embraced the teaching and training of students of speech and language pathology and the habilitation/rehabilitation of both children and adults having disorders of communication. She was also very active in working with many foreign students attempting to become more proficient in the use of English as a second language, and contributed to the early development of Teachers of English as a Second Language (TESOL) and the National Association of Foreign Student Advisors (NAFSA). During her 32 years at The Ohio State University, she served for a period as Director of the Speech and Hearing Clinic and functioned as Administrative Assistant to the Director of the Speech and Hearing Science Section. In conjunction with her work at the University, Professor Goff developed an outreach program in which special clinics were established throughout southern Ohio to serve the needs of children handicapped by speech-language and hearing problems.

Her academic and professional interests transcended the boundaries of the U.S.A., and as a member of the International Association of Logopedic and Phoniatrics and of Quota International she presented scholarly papers on four continents. She also was a co-leader of an international seminar studying aural rehabilitation throughout Europe for one quarter.

Sheila M. Goff was a member of the Speech Communication Association of America and the Ohio Speech and Hearing Association, and a Fellow of the American Speech-Language and Hearing Association. She was an advocate, teacher and practitioner of quality speech. She not only played a significant role in the lives of hundreds of communicatively handicapped individuals, but also through her teaching and training efforts made an outstanding contribution to the educational development and lives of many university students.

It is a difficult job and he and his folks have evidently done a good one. He has signed on next year for an increase of another 20%, and I think we ought to recognize him as having a job well done.

President Jennings: I appreciate that and I know Tom does.

Mr. Tobin: Yes, I do. But the credit should be spread around to quite a few different areas and different people. I certainly appreciate your comments.

Charles L. Babcock Commencement Speaker

Charles L. Babcock is chairperson and professor in the Department of Classics at Ohio State. He came to the University in that position in 1966, served as dean of the College of Humanities from 1968 to 1970, and returned to the position of chairperson in 1980. A specialist in the fields of Latin literature and epigraphy and Roman history, he has been on the faculty at Cornell University and the University of Pennsylvania and was professor-in-charge of the American Academy in Rome in 1966 and of the Intercollegiate Center for Classical Studies in Rome in 1974-75. He received the Alumni Award for Distinguished Teaching at Ohio State in 1982 and, during the same year, was given an award of merit by the Classical Association of the Midwest and South. He has been active in professional associations, including the American Philological Association, the Classical Association of the Midwest and South, the Classical Society of the American Academy of Rome, and the Vergilian Society of America. He recently became a member of the executive committee of the Association of Departments of Foreign Languages. He was coauthor of Aspects of Roman Civilization, published in 1980, and has contributed a number of articles, reviews, and papers. Babcock is a native of Whittier, California, and earned bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees at the University of California at Berkeley.

Distinguished Service Awards

Roy H. Bowen Distinguished Service Award

Roy H. Bowen has played a lead role in central Ohio theatre for nearly 40 years. As both an Ohio State faculty member and an active participant in local community theatre organizations, he has made a remarkable contribution to the health and vitality of theatre in this area by establishing a strong and vital bond of creative support and friendship between the University and numerous theatre groups in the community. His influence has extended beyond central Ohio through his work as a founder of the Ohio Community Theater Association, an organizer of American Playwrights Theater, and quest directing assignments at festivals and universities. A native Ohioan, Bowen received a bachelor's degree from Otterbein College, a master's degree from Northwestern University, and a Ph.D. from Ohio State—one of the first doctoral degrees in theatre awarded by the University. After 10 years as managing director of the Columbus Players Club. Bowen joined the Ohio State faculty full-time in 1958. He retired as professor emeritus in 1977. Bowen has directed more than 140 plays and musicals, including the world premiere of two Lawrence and Lee works, and in the process has developed a legion of admirers. Few faculty members have enjoyed the respect, affection, and admiration of their colleagues and the community that Bowen has. His human understanding, professional expertise, and artistic standards have been a valuable asset to the University, contributing to its national reputation in theatre education. Ohio State is pleased to recognize him for his service.

William J. Holloway Distinguished Service Award

When William J. Holloway brought his educational and administrative expertise to Ohio State in 1970, it was as the University's first vice provost for minority affairs. In his eight years in that post, he built a nationally respected program designed to encourage minority students to further their education at Ohio State. Since the establishment of this program, nearly 6,000 students have benefited. Even after he left the position of vice provost, he continued to serve the University by directing a two-year program to train Nigerian teachers at Ohio State. Before he came to Ohio State, Holloway had worked throughout the nation for the improvement of educational opportunity. In addition to his teaching career, his administrative positions at several universities, and his years in leadership roles with the U.S. Office of Education, he consulted widely and worked with numerous national professional education organizations. He has been recognized for his work by the Hampton Institute; the Southern Regional School Press Institute; the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare; the National Press Institute; the Ohio Legislature; Capital University; and the United Negro College Fund. He has been an active volunteer in each community in which he has lived-Columbus-area beneficiaries of his service have included Buckeye Boys Ranch, the Columbus Branch of the National Urban League, the NAACP, the Worthington Lions Club, and the United Christian Center. Although Holloway retired as professor emeritus of education in 1982, his influence will be long appreciated by this University.

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UNIVERSITY SENATE STEERING COMMITTEE

Resolution No. 85-14

Dr. Jennings called on Dr. Herbert Asher, outgoing Chairman of the University Senate Steering Committee, to present a report on the role and activities of that committee.

Dr. Asher:

Thank you, Mr. Chairman, members of the Board. Before I begin my formal comments I have a confession to make--I own stock in Wendy's and I drink Coors beer. Unfortunately, I don't own enough stock in Wendy's and drink too much Coors beer. I just looked at my enrollments for the upcoming Fall and my classes are much too large so I would welcome a boycott. Being serious, as Chairman of the University Senate Steering Committee for the past two years, I am pleased to have this opportunity to make some brief comments about the Committee and the University Senate.

The Rules of the University Faculty assign a number of responsibilities to the Steering Committee. The Steering Committee is the "committee on committees" for the University Senate and as such has the responsibility for nominating faculty members on University Senate committees. The Rules of the University Faculty also state that the Steering Committee shall meet at least once every year with the chairpersons of all of the other standing committees. And indeed, the Steering Committee has gone beyond this by having its members serve as liaisons to the other committees, thereby promoting better coordination and awareness among the committees. The composition of the Steering Committee as specified in the Rules makes it one of the most representative committees on campus. Membership includes six faculty, the Provost, the University Fiscal Officer, the presidents of the undergraduate, graduate and professional student governments, a dean, and another student. Thus,

the Steering Committee is a good forum for the exchange of sometimes diverse views.

In the past two years the Steering Committee has been guided by two general principles. The first is simply that to the greatest extent possible, the University Senate should be the site of genuine discussion and even decision-making. It is better to err on the side of bringing too much before the Senate, than of bringing too little. One small step the Steering Committee took to enhance the Senate as an arena for real decision-making was to consistently nominate more candidates for committee assignments than positions to be filled, thereby ensuring a genuine election. I might add that up until a few years ago, I think, our elections of the University Senate were very much in the Soviet style--there was one slate of candidates and you got to pick one among one, or whatever.

The second general principle that has guided the Steering Committee is that effective university and faculty governance absolutely requires a strong, well-functioning committee system. Although, in some instances decisions will be made on the floor of the Senate, in most cases the key work and the key decisions will actually be made in the committees. And so to enhance the performance of the committee system, the Steering Committee acted not only as a committee on committees, but also as an executive or literally as a Steering Committee. To that end, we assisted other committees in doing their jobs, usually through the mechanisms of rules changes and sometimes by moral persuasion—or some of the committees might say immoral persuasion. In some cases our assistance was actively sought, in other cases it was not.

The Steering Committee is given additional responsibilities in the Rules of the University Faculty. In the past year the Committee presented President Jennings with a list of candidates for the position of Secretary of the University Senate after conducting a campus-wide search. There are also rules initiated by the Board of Trustees which gives the Steering Committee power to prescribe conditions governing the appearance of guest speakers on campus in potentially turbulent situations. We are delighted that we have never had to get involved in that situation.

Finally, the Rules of the University Faculty state, "the Steering Committee shall serve as a channel of communication between the University Senate and the President and Board of Trustees. Its elected members shall be an advisory group available to both the President and the Board of Trustees for advice and counsel on any matter relating to the operation and development of the University. After consulting with the President, the elected members of the Steering Committee may request and obtain a meeting with the Board of Trustees." On occasion we have met with the President in the past two years, but have not felt it necessary to request a

UNIVERSITY SENATE STEERING COMMITTEE (contd)

meeting with the Board of Trustees simply because things seem to be working fine. The Provost, despite his occasional and justified done a superb job of presenting rules changes to the Board and the Board in its wisdom has concurred in the judgment of the University Senate.

Let me close on a personal note. I have enjoyed being Chairman of the Steering Committee for the past two years. And for one and a half of those years I have also been working in the President's Office as Special Assistant for State Relations. Given that the Chairman of the Steering Committee is by rule to be a faculty member, I was pleased that my faculty colleagues permitted me to remain as Chairman even though I had moved over to the other side on a half-time basis. This willingness of my faculty colleagues to let me stay on as Chairman is less a credit to me and much more a tribute to the administration of this University and to its Board of Trustees. For without faculty confidence in the fairness and responsiveness of the administration and the Board of Trustees, there would have been no way that a member of the President's Staff, albeit still an active faculty member, would have been allowed to serve as Chairman of the Steering Committee. Thus, I thank you for allowing me to have the best of both worlds. I would be happy now to address any questions you might have about the Steering Committee or the University Senate. Thank you.

Mrs. Bowser:

Is your term up?

Dr. Asher:

Yes. I let something fall through the cracks. The new Chairman of the Steering Committee is Professor Richard Lanese in Preventive Medicine and the new head of the Faculty Council is Professor Charles Mand in Education--Physical Education.

President Jennings:

Herb, I thank you for that very succinct but informative report. The Steering Committee is not a usual governance structure in universities, but it allows us to deal with a body of some 140 strong representing literally every constituency group in the institution, and it enables us to work with that body in an efficient manner on governance matters. I have been pleased to work with the Steering Committee these last three years and I appreciate your kind words, Herb; and I also look forward to working with the new officers as we move down the line.

Carlton S. Dargusch

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on August 20, 1984, of Brigadier General Carlton S. Dargusch, former member of the Board of Trustees.

Carlton S. Dargusch was born August 19, 1900, in Batavia, New York. He attended Indiana University from 1921-22 and The Ohio State University from 1922-25.

Carlton S. Dargusch (contd)

General Dargusch began his career as a legislative draftsman for the Ohio General Assembly in 1925, served as an attorney for the Tax Commission of Ohio and then as Tax Commissioner of Ohio from 1933-37. He engaged in the private practice of law, specializing in public finance, taxation, legislative drafting, administrative and corporate law in Columbus, Ohio. He was a managing partner in the law firm of Dargusch, Caren, Greek and King.

He entered active duty as a Lieutenant Colonel in the Judge Advocate Generals Department, U. S. Army in 1940; served as deputy director of the Selective Service System from 1940-47; was promoted to Colonel in 1942 and Brigadier General in 1946. That same year he was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal.

General Dargusch was a member of The Ohio State University Board of Trustees from 1938 until 1959, and from 1963 until 1965; his appointments were made by three different governors. He served as chairman in 1944, 1951 and 1958.

Hamilton Gray

In 1955, Dr. Gray was appointed Professor and Chairman of the Civil Engineering Department at The Ohio State University where he served as Chairman until 1971 at which time he returned full time to teaching and research until his retirement. In addition to administrative duties he performed research in, and also taught basic and graduate courses in, Soil Mechanics, Foundation Analysis and Design, Soil Stabilization, Seepage in Permeable Materials, and Soil-Structure Interaction. He was active in engineering professionalism and

was registered as a Professional Engineer in New York, Maine and Ohio. Throughout his career he served as an engineering consultant on foundation and soil problems in Ohio, New York and Maine.

His professional organizations included: Fellow, American Society of Civil Engineers; Associate, Highway Research Board; Member, American Society for Testing Materials; Member, Sigma Xi; Member, Chi Epsilon; Member, Tau Beta Pi; and Member, Phi Kappa Phi. Dr. Gray retired from the Department of Civil Engineering in June 1976.

WHEREAS The Ohio State University Hospitals wishes to provide increased access and encourage University employees to utilize those facilities and services when medically necessary:

BE IT RESOLVED, That The Ohio State University Board of Trustees concurs with the recommendation of the Hospitals Board Finance Committee that as an employee benefit, private accommodations shall be given to University faculty/staff members when available. Reimbursement to the Hospitals for the differential between the cost of private and semi-private accommodations shall be made by the University for all regular faculty and staff. The effective date of this program shall be October 1, 1984.

POLICY ON PURCHASING

Resolution No. 85-29

Synopsis: Revised policy on competitive bidding and purchasing is proposed.

WHEREAS it is the policy of The Ohio State University to solicit competitive bids in making University purchases in all cases wherein the best interest of the University and the State of Ohio will be served by such competition; and

WHEREAS there is a need to revise the University's current policy on purchasing established by this Board on September 14, 1965, to reflect current economic conditions; and

WHEREAS the President recommended adoption of the following policy on purchasing:

- The Office of the Vice President for Business and Finance shall have the responsibility and requisite authority for the purchase of equipment, materials, supplies, and services for the University.
- Except as provided below, all equipment, materials, supplies, 2. and services shall be purchased through solicitation of competitive bids or proposals except where such equipment, materials, supplies, or services are purchased pursuant to Sections 4115.31 to 4115.35 and 5147.07 of the Revised Code, or where the amount of such purchase of equipment, materials, or supplies is less than five thousand dollars or where the purchase of such services is less than ten thousand dollars. In addition, the purchase of any combination of equipment, materials, supplies, and services of ten thousand dollars or more shall be made through solicitation of competitive bids or proposals. Contracts shall be awarded to the lowest and best bidder on each In accordance with policies and procedures established by the Office of Business and Finance, the University may accept or reject any or all bids or proposals in whole or by item.
- 3. The President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance may grant a waiver from competitive bidding when he or she determines that an emergency or a sufficient economic reason exists, or that the equipment, materials, supplies, or service can be purchased only from a single supplier ("sole source"). A report on waivers granted shall be submitted to the Board of Trustees on a quarterly basis.
- 4. In compliance with Section 125.081 of the Revised Code, the University shall set aside a number of purchases each year for bidding by certified minority businesses only. The

POLICY ON PURCHASING (contd)

bidding procedures for such contracts shall be the same as for all other contracts except that: 1) only minority business enterprises certified by the State of Ohio Equal Employment Opportunity Coordinator shall be qualified to submit bids and 2) the cost of products and services may not exceed the estimated market price by more than approximately 10%. If bids are rejected because of this cost consideration, the purchase shall be offered again for bid by all interested vendors in accordance with standard bidding procedures.

- 5. This policy shall not apply to employment or reemployment of teaching or administrative personnel, nor shall it apply to the acquisition of objects of fine and decorative art, pursuant to the policy adopted by this Board on December 8, 1983.
- This policy applies to all funds administered by The Ohio State University.

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Trustees hereby rescinds the policy on competitive bidding adopted on September 14, 1965, and adopts the foregoing policy on purchasing, effective immediately.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this Board agrees to permit the Ohio Public Facilities Commission to use designated University sites for the purpose of such projects, the boundaries of which will be shown in the plans for such projects, for so long as the respective notes, if any, and bonds issued to finance the projects shall be outstanding; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this Board agrees to undertake performance of the functions and responsibilities of a using governmental agency and of a designated governmental agency to the extent it is such as provided in the regulations of the Ohio Public Facilities Commission and any applicable leases, agreements, or rules of the Commission with respect to such projects.

Upon motion of Mr. Immke, seconded by Mr. Berry, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous roll call vote.

THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE ONE THOUSAND TWO HUNDRED AND FOURTH MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Calumbus, Ohio, October 5, 1984

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Friday, October 5, 1984, at The Ohio State University Fawcett Center for Tomorrow, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

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The Chairman, Mr. Hilliker, called the meeting of the Board of Trustees to order at 12:35 p.m. He requested the Secretary to call the roll. The meeting recessed into Executive Session for the purpose of considering legal issues and personnel-related matters.

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Mr. Hilliker reconvened the meeting at 2:15 p.m.

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WEST CAMPUS CHANGES AND THE RESEARCH PARK CONCEPT

During the meeting of the Educational Affairs Committee of the Board of Trustees, Dr. Francille Firebaugh, Mr. David Marsh and Dr. Jack Hollander presented the following report.

Dr. Firebaugh:

Thank you, President Jennings, and thank you, Provost Haenicke. I will move to a topic that has taken some effort this year, especially on the part of a small committee that Dave and I chaired, to examine West Campus and to make some recommendations regarding it. Composition of the committee included faculty representatives, two architects, an undergraduate student who played an important role in the committee, and the two of us.

The first thing we found was that West Campus had never come into what it had been envisioned to become. In 1967, the plan included thirteen buildings on the West Campus and it was envisioned that there would be 13,000 full-time equivalent students who would be using West Campus. Shortly after the plan was approved and things were under way, a ceiling was placed on the Ohio State enrollment and so it has never happened that we have that many students there and indeed, we have only five buildings on West Campus. Because, I think, the plan was never fully implemented and changes occurred very early, the operation of West Campus for lower-division instruction has been less than satisfactory over the years. Some of the reasons that it has been somewhat unsatisfactory are the number of students we must bus daily. It was envisioned originally that there would be a dominance of commuter students, so they would just drive in and take their classes; indeed, that has not been the case. Some students who are there have a sense of isolation from the Central Campus. We also interviewed some students who sort of liked meeting people on the bus and being over there, so that must tell you that there are two sides. But, the scheduling of classes on West Campus is on the half-hour, so in any three hours a student on

the main campus--on the Central Campus could take three courses, but if you have to lose the half-hour you may only schedule two classes on the West Campus.

Instructional efficiency of departments that teach on the West Campus is somewhat reduced because faculty and graduate associates must be on the West Campus while also serving, in some cases, on the Central Campus. And indeed, we have some office space which somewhat duplicates office space on the Central Campus.

As we worked with the current situation on West Campus we developed, as a committee, a concept of centralizing academic programs on the central core of the campus. I'd like now to take a look at a slide and show you what we conceived in our committee. The main point I want to make here is that in the central part of the campus we would have, surrounding the Oval, the library and so forth, the very heart of the arts and sciences and other areas; then this would move a bit farther out and go into some of the more applied areas and professional areas; pick up the agriculture campus; the medical complex; and here in the central core we would bring the undergraduate instruction. It just so happens that the 1962 Campus Master Plan envisioned just these basic principles. suggested at that time that there should be a concept of a unified academic community with the basic disciplines grouped around the main library, at the heart of the central academic area; applied disciplines surrounding basic disciplines; and then the closely related disciplines, whether basic or applied, in some reasonable proximity. This 1962 plan proposed what we also are very supportive of and that is locating service buildings, varsity athletic fields, Continuing Education, Telecommunications, and non-academic facilities on the periphery of the campus in order to release space for teaching and research within the central academic area. And, finally, there was some concept of encouraging the development of, at appropriate places adjoining the campus, research-oriented industries and other University related agencies.

The specifics now will, I think, be of interest to you, because many of you are quite familiar with the campus--and so Dave Marsh is going to give you some of the specific details. Dave--

Mr. Marsh:

Thank you, Dr. Firebaugh. Let me get you oriented--I won't go into all the details that we are talking about in the plan, but I want to highlight the principal project so that you will get an idea of how we can accomplish this. [Throughout his presentation, Mr. Marsh referred to a map of the campus displayed on a projection screen at

Mr. Marsh: (contd)

the front of the room.] As you know, down through here is High Street, the Oval is around this area--I know you can't see all those details on the map, but at least you can get a sense of where the buildings are. We have St. Rt. 315 down here, and then here is the West Campus area that we are concerned about.

One of the first areas that we looked at is Sullivant Hall, right here at 15th and High. That particular building has a large Biological Sciences collection in the basement in a very prime location. I refer to it jokingly as "dead storage" space, because they do store a lot of animals that are used in research and so on, things such as fish, reptiles, and so on. We would like to move that and another set of collections here in the Biological Sciences building, which would free up some space, to the West Campus area. In addition, Sullivant Hall contains offices for Continuing Education, and some Continuing Education offices are here in the Fawcett Center; we are proposing that they move to the West Campus and be consolidated on the West Campus location. That then would allow us to make the Sullivant Hall building--remodel it for undergraduate library space, which we will need when we move the students to the Central Campus area.

A second major project, located right here, is the Central Services building. This is the area that the University has its stores and supplies, and as you can see it is in the heart of the Central Campus area. It is about 50,000 square feet of space; we are proposing that that move out here along the St. Rt. 315/Kenny Road complex--the service area--and that that space be converted from a stores and receiving function into offices and classroom space.

Another major project is moving University College offices, which are here on the West Campus, to the Student Services building, which is very close to High Street and also very close to the Ohio Union. That building would be remodelled to handle University College and to provide some classroom space.

There are some other projects that are not directly related to the West Campus, at least they're not conceived for the sole purpose of solving the West Campus problem, but they contribute to the solution of the West Campus problem. One of those is in this location—the new Chemistry building that is replacing the old Sawtooth building. When it is completed within a couple of years, that would allow us to move general biology classes from the West Campus to the Central Campus area. A second project, down just across from the Main Library on Neil Avenue, is Lazenby Hall. That particular project is funded in the current Capital Plan through the State for renovation. We will make that renovation for Psychology. There is a companion project—Townshend Hall, also being renovated for Psychology, which will be completed yet this year, and that will assist in moving psychology classes to the Central Campus.

Mr. Marsh: (contd)

There is one other project that is in planning right now and that is a replacement for the Brown Hall annex. The Brown Hall annex, again in the heart of the campus area, was the original power plant. It now serves as temporary instructional space for Architecture, but it really is in need of replacement. So we are proposing that that particular structure be demolished and replaced with a building that would address a severe problem we have in the mathematics and statistics office--housing of their faculty members; also, a consolidation of libraries, and also allow us to move the math instruction from the West Campus to the Central Campus area.

And finally, there are some projects down at the bottom of the screen--in this area--the Biological Sciences building and a connector between Parks and the Biological Sciences building. Parks Hall is the College of Pharmacy and the two--Biological Sciences building and B&Z building provide biological sciences space. Those, like the B&Z building, are in need of renovation. When it is renovated we will make provisions to accommodate lower-division biology located over here in Rightmire Hall. So, that gives you an idea of the kinds of projects that we are looking at here. There are some other smaller-level projects that, of course, will contribute to this move. But it is rather a complex move and will take, we think, around four years to make 90 per cent of the moves we are talking about here.

Now, I think with that, I would like to turn to Dr. Hollander to describe a little bit more about the West Campus and its relationship to the Research Park, because this ties together with the direction we want to move in that particular area. Dr. Hollander--

Mrs. Bowser:

Could I ask a question? What are you planning to do about traffic as you move more people into this center? Because part of the reason for West Campus was traffic control or alleviating some of the traffic congestion. What are your plans, what is your thinking on that?

Mr. Marsh:

What we will do as far as traffic and parking--and they have been looking at this particular problem or potential problem--we are looking at a differential fee for parking to encourage parking on the West Campus parking lots and then set up a bus park-and-ride system. We think that will help tremendously.

Dr. Firebaugh:

And we also have the increase in the parking garages which you previously approved, and those will be under way. Dave, before Vice President Hollander speaks, did you address the "freed-up space?"

Mr. Marsh:

One of the major accomplishments here will be freeing up approximately 100,000 to 125,000 square feet of space on the West Campus area that will be used for research and meeting other high space demands on the campus. So, it gives us the flexibility that we don't have now.

Mr. Galbreath:

One of these projects that you mentioned--about the second one, that you were going to move material purchasing or something like that to Kenny Road. Are you moving it into an existing building?

Mr. Marsh:

No, that would be a new facility.

Mr. Galbreath:

So some of this that you are talking about will require capital expenditures and not just moving from one building to another?

Dr. Firebaugh:

Yes. And it has been included in our capital improvements planning process already.

Mr. Marsh:

That was one of the goals, to maintain and be sure we didn't add anything new.

President Jennings:

Materials/Receiving is in the capital expenditure plan and it is second or third on the priority list for the next capital bill. The key there is that we have tremendous traffic clogging up the campus as these semi-trailers come into the institution to unload right there by the power plant and it is much more convenient for the Business Management operation to get them out of that central area and distribute to campus from a more remote location.

Mr. Galbreath:

Even though it is double-handling?

Mrs. Bowser:

It is anyway, isn't it?

President Jennings:

It is anyway and I think Dick would say that by moving from the power plant location there will be less activity because it will not only ease traffic movement, but in many places the location planned for receiving is closer to the large distribution centers--namely the Hospital, which is very far away from the present location. The material has to be trucked anyway. Do you want to add anything to that, Dick?

Mr. Jackson:

I guess the only additional comment that I would make about it is that at this time the present warehouse facility is a pretty inefficient facility, in that it has multiple floors and the floor heights were not originally designed for warehousing, and the palletizing type of operation that we have now. So that in addition to the points that you have made, we certainly strongly support the reorientation of the warehouse.

Mr. Galbreath:

I guess I am interested in--not in the specifics, because I certainly don't know the operations that well, but philosophically, you're trying to reuse a West Campus facility and you feel, too, that you are going to end up not only by using this more effectively, but by helping the Main Campus, as well?

Dr. Firebaugh:

Yes. We do think that space change will--we do not have great duplication, but we actually have some duplication today and so we would gain 90 per cent in efficiency. I suppose one of the greatest gains, though, would be for students and faculty, because now the students take courses both on the Central and West Campus, and with the changes they would be taking all their courses on the Central Campus.

President Jennings:

Part of the momentum in this project relates to our efforts to address the attrition problem for our freshmen and sophomores. With the conditional/unconditional admissions we have taken one step, but we think that an enormously important second part of our attrition problem results from the fact that our freshmen, a large group of them, tend to land at the West Campus and essentially stay there and do not get integrated into the enormous benefits of the central campus, whether it is the faculty interaction or whether it is at the

President Jennings: (contd)

Ohio Union/Drake Union. These students have a tendency to stay on the West Campus and there is a perception that it is an extension of high school. If we can get them into campus early on, in those first few weeks, we will keep more of them. I don't think there is any question that that is a source of the attrition.

Mr. Galbreath:

Well, it all makes such good sense and I just wanted to understand it a little bit better. The only disappointing thing is that it is going to take four years to make it work.

Dr. Firebaugh:

That's all right, we started out--when the committee first reported to the President's Staff, we had about a ten-year time line, and so we got our marching orders and we think that it is fantastic to have it down to four years.

Mr. Galbreath:

Maybe by the first year we can talk about it in terms of two years.

Mrs. Bowser:

I'm sure I missed this in the conversation, but at what point did we plan the West Campus, anyway? How many years have lapsed since we changed our philosophy?

Dr. Firebaugh:

1967.

President Jennings:

Keep in mind, though, that was a time when higher education was, as we know now, making some very serious errors in enrollment projections all across the country. Freshman enrollment was expected to continue on the trend that was taking place. Our expectation was that West Campus would be a much larger portion of the campus and less of a problem, as we were just talking about, because of its size and activity. A lot of things have happened, but we have been particularly affected by the enrollment ceiling where our freshman class has been getting smaller and smaller; and depending on how successful we are in reducing attrition, will get smaller still.

WEST CAMPUS CHANGES AND THE RESEARCH PARK CONCEPT (contd)

Mr. Galbreath:

How much of it is a result of the limits imposed on us and how much of it is other problems?

President Jennings:

I think, for Ohio State, virtually all of it is the limits imposed. Because while there is a demographic element, we are still, in terms of the size of our freshman class, even today, well below what we could have had had it not been for the limits. We shut off admissions to Ohio State January 5 of last year.

Mr. Galbreath:

That is probably the key to it, I think it is the limit that we didn't know we were going to get.

President Jennings:

But of course that limit today is an enormous advantage not only financially, but an advantage as these demographic trends begin to take hold. If our demand today is artificially low, we are not going to face this up and down cycle of potentially having this University pop up to 75,000-80,000 students and then pop right back down to the current 60,000 or so. Because without that limit--I agree very much with that limit; without it, I'm afraid we would have an up and then down cycle and it would hurt Ohio State very badly. Keep in mind the way that limit operates for stability purposes. If you would have applied after January 5 at Ohio State, you could have gone to a Regional Campus or you could have postponed your matriculation until the Winter Guarter; so that while we will close out people entering the Fall Guarter on the Main Campus, they are not closed out absolutely from entering Ohio State.

Mr. Galbreath:

Why can they get in in the Winter, because of attrition?

President Jennings:

The limit is imposed on the fourteenth day of the Fall Quarter when we take a snapshot of the number of students enrolled on the campus. And that snapshot is our enrollment ceiling. The very next day the number is going to be wrong again, but as long as they come in Winter Quarter that allows us to adjust the next year's freshman class.

WEST CAMPUS CHANGES AND THE RESEARCH PARK CONCEPT (contd)

Mr. Teaford:

But, they will catch up to you the following fourteenth day of the Fall Quarter, anyway, if you admitted too many in that Winter Quarter.

President Jennings:

But, in the meantime we have caught up to that with our freshman class for the following year. And we have pretty good predictive power based on the numbers reported. Where you see us exceeding our enrollment ceiling, though, is that we make those judgments in January when we don't yet know the attrition rate of the previous freshman class; and that attrition has been systematically going downward. Now we are adjusting for those systematic changes, but we are not adjusting completely—I don't think we should—and the Board of Regents is cooperating with us, too, on this. We are suppose to be, I think, 800 over the ceiling for this fall. I think our numbers indicate that we will be very close to that—maybe a little above that 800 number.

Mr. Ihrig:

Yes, just a little bit above it, as far as being closer to the enrollment limit. The other factor, to complicate the question one more time, is the number of courses the students take, because the enrollment limit is not based on headcounts, but full-time equivalents or FTE. So, if the students enroll in more courses per student on the average, our FTE will go higher.

President Jennings:

So, it is just really a snapshot.

Mr. Teaford:

Where will the funds come from on the remodelling of Sullivant Hall and the stores/receiving facility?

President Jennings:

This will be--this whole project, exclusive of the capital activity--we estimate right now that it will be a \$6 million project--the entire project. That will come from the normal utilities and renovation money that is appropriated by the General Assembly in lump sum activities. In addition, there will be some reallocation of funds from the General Fund. But, I think that this is really an exciting project. The four years seems like a long time, but it is not just a building activity that would limit our remodelling; it is also the curriculum adjustment, the scheduling, and so forth that is required here. David is going through a reallocation of classroom space, and while we have a shortage of classroom space that is in use, we do

not have a shortage of classroom space in total. More classroom space will become available in time as the deans work with the Planning Office in sorting out issues of need and availability.

The 100,000 to 125,000 square feet is free space and in time we will develop a plan for that. We are trying to be very clear to the campus, though, that this is not space that will be allocated on an ad hoc basis. As these numbers become completely firm, we will start a process of planning for that. That is enormously important because we have so many needs for temporary as well as permanent research space that is low traffic-space; and this will, in time, solve an awful lot of research space issues that exist on the campus. I say that because, while I don't think we have changed directions, we have put actually some more activity into the research park. That 125,000 square feet for research, I think, fits very well into the research park concept that Jack is now going to talk about. Jack--

Dr. Hollander:

Madam Chairperson and members of the Board, I am very pleased to be with you this morning to talk about the subject of The Ohio State University Research Park. Specifically, we would like to report to you and seek Board approval of a plan to develop the first physical entities of that park. A specific resolution will come later on your agenda today. I would like to speak for a moment of the general philosophy of this plan and then turn the floor back over to David Marsh to explain some of the details of it to you.

You have heard of the word integration mentioned a couple of times already in the discussion of the West Campus, integration in terms of bringing the students who are out there--to integrate them more into the activities of the Central Campus. Well, integration is also a main element of the philosophy of this plan with respect to the Research Park, because it includes the development of the West Campus area, which has been under discussion as a major focus of research at the University, and following that, developing the Research Park as another focus of research in proximity to the West Campus area. We believe that we have selected a logical first site for the Research Park and that it is the Kinnear Road area, near to the West Campus and near to other research related entities such as the University's research center, which houses the Research Foundation, and the Computer Center, newly moved to Kinnear Road, which we have some hope will be the location of a new super computer center should we win that program from the National Science Foundation. (I am sure that you are aware that we just submitted a major proposal to the National Science Foundation for a super computer center which would be located at that same Kinnear Road computer center.)

WEST CAMPUS CHANGES AND THE RESEARCH PARK CONCEPT (contd)

Dr. Hollander: (contd)

The basis of this plan is a visual and an infrastructural integration of the area from Kinnear Road to the West Campus and then all the way through to the Main Campus, which as I said includes the computer center and the research center at that location. We believe that the development of this area as The Ohio State University Research Park and research area will provide increasingly a magnet to attract research oriented companies to our vicinity. It will provide, also, an interface between campus-based research and the advanced or high technology industrial research that we hope to attract to the edges of the campus in the Research Park. This region is also near to leading R & D and information organizations that already exist, such as Battelle and Chemical Abstracts, among others.

The specifics of the initial plan are to acquire and renovate two buildings on Kinnear Road. One of these is planned to provide the home for the two Edison Centers that we recently have been awarded in the State's Thomas Alva Edison Program. They will be essentially across the street from the Computer Center. This location, in addition, will take advantage of the support services that are going to be developed over the coming months and years to support the new research activities that will be housed in the West Campus area, as you just heard described by Francille and David.

The infrastructure in this development will also link the Kinnear Road Research Center, which houses the Research Foundation, to this overall project. This will accomplish another objective and that is to help in strengthening the research development activities of the Research Foundation. You are aware, I am sure, that we engaged a faculty committee during the present calendar year to investigate and report to us on ways that the program and services of the Research Foundation could be strengthened. One of the several recommendations that they made was indeed to beef up and strengthen the development activities of the Research Foundation. Having this location integrated in with--closer to the West Campus and to the first sites of the Research Park, and with the renovation of their facilities which have not been renovated I think since--many years, will go a long way toward accomplishing the recommendations of the report from the committee of Professor Thomas Taylor. The Research Center will then become the home, not only for the Foundation, but also for our new office that we are forming for University/industry relations, the Coordinator of the Research Park, and our new University Patent Administrator's office.

So in short, this plan for this acquisition and development will allow the University to implement the Research Park in a considerably shorter time than would have been otherwise possible if we were talking about starting from the ground up with new construction. We are negotiating with a number of firms and among them are several

who simply could not wait for the time it would take to build new buildings. So, we do feel that these buildings located in the West Campus area are where it makes the most sense to initiate the Research Park activities. This plan will in no way alter the more long-range consideration of the Research Park with the Ackerman Road site and Don Scott field sites which have been under discussion. Those are simply a second, or longer-range phase, of the Research Park activity and this is where we would like to begin.

I think it would probably be appropriate, since I've sketched the overall philosophy, to turn the floor back over to David Marsh, who has a pretty picture up there, and would like to talk about the details of the plan-

Mr. Marsh:

Let me get you oriented again on this particular slide. Here we have Lane Avenue, Kinnear here, Kenny, then North Star is over in this area. The West Campus area that we talked about previously is in this vicinity. Those are the existing West Campus buildings, this is the location of the West Campus parking lot, and then this is the Kinnear Road area. Currently, on Kinnear Road, the Research Center is located in this location near the Food Service Facility and the Computer Center is located here. We have these three buildings making up the National Center for Research in Vocational Education, in this area. The buildings that we are going to introduce a resolution about to the Board later today would be involved here.

The one, A-C (Allis-Chalmers), at 1100 Kinnear Road is about a 46,000 square foot building and associated with that is about 5 1/2 acres of land and it abuts, of course, the University property at this location. The second facility is identified here as FMC at 1224 Kinnear Road; it is about the same size structure--49,000 square feet, about 3 acres associated with that and that will be introduced as a lease of land with an option to purchase later.

Now, some of the site improvements that we were talking about--we would reorient these buildings, especially this FMC building, so that it will face toward the West Campus area to bring it into the campus area itself, the same for the Allis-Chalmers building. By means of landscaping and some exterior work, those can be improved so they will be integrated into the total campus area. We are also talking about major improvements in our access to this site. Right now this particular road exists as a one-lane road exiting from the West Campus parking lot to Kenny Road. It is proposed that that be expanded to at least a two-lane distribution highway along the south edge of the parking lot and then extend that around so we can have access to the Research Center and then eventually it will also intersect Kinnear Road. So that will help us in access to this whole area. In addition, we would plan to extend a roadway through from

the West Campus area to the Kinnear Road area, which would give us good access to the Computer Center right here and also make this particular building--the Allis-Chalmers building--much more readily accessible from the Central Campus area. Most traffic from the Central Campus area would come across Woody Hayes Drive, Carmack Road and then have a straight shot into any of these facilities in this general area.

So, in addition, there are some other site areas available if we want to do any future expansion, here. There are also eight additional building sites up here in the West Campus area that could be used for future expansion, in addition to the Kenny Road, Ackerman Road, and Don Scott areas. Are there any questions?

President Jennings:

Just to point out that in this area is the West Campus we have just been talking about where a lot of--eventually institutional research activity will be going on. Then, up here at the top we have property capable of making--I guess what we envision now as the next major step of the Research Park activity, where potential buildings could be constructed. The third step, then, would be to move to the Kenny/Ackerman Road areas or out to Don Scott Field. You would clearly be getting an area of the campus that would be directly related to research activity--the low traffic research--where there would be laboratories, some student activity, but not much.

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FACULTY APPOINTMENTS, PROMOTIONS AND TENURE

Resolution No. 85-36

Synopsis: Approval, ratification and confirmation of policies relating to faculty appointments, promotion and tenure is proposed, these policies to be known as Faculty Rules 3335-47-1 through 3335-47-11.

WHEREAS since 1941, the University has had as a part of the rules governing the University, various written statements relating to Faculty Appointments, Promotion and Tenure; and

WHEREAS those University rules have been expanded, modified and amended from time to time, notably in 1951, 1962, and 1975 and have come to encompass rules 3335-47-1 through 3335-47-11, rule 3335-47-11 being added in May, 1984; and

WHEREAS it is desirable now to ratify and confirm, with some changes, University rules 3335-47-1 through 3335-47-11, as "Rules of the University Faculty":

FACULTY APPOINTMENTS, PROMOTIONS AND TENURE (contd)

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board does hereby approve, ratify and confirm the adoption of the following as "Rules of the University Faculty":

Chapter 3335-47

ADDITIONAL RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY CONCERNING FACULTY APPOINTMENTS, PROMOTION AND TENURE

3335-47-01 General considerations.

- (A) Nominations for promotion and/or tenure originate in the department or appropriate academic unit in accordance with the procedures established by the unit. The recommendation must provide a comprehensive assessment of the candidate's qualifications, together with detailed evidence to support the nomination. It must also include information about the nature and extent of consultation on the matter within the academic unit and must present any significant evidence and differences of opinion which would support a contrary recommendation. Nominations will subsequently be considered by the college, and if favorable concurrence is obtained, the dean will forward the nomination, along with the dean's assessment and recommendation, to the provost. Recommendations are subject to the approval of the provost, the president, and the board of trustees.
- (B) No teacher attains tenure automatically. It may be acquired either in the original appointment to the regular faculty rank of professor, upon promotion from within the university to the rank of associate professor, or following a probationary period (as specified in rule 3335-47-09 of the Administrative Code). The granting of tenure requires the recommendation of the dean of the college after consultation with the chair-person of the applicable department, with the concurrence of the dean of the graduate school, the provost, the president, and the board of trustees.
- (C) When some of the nominations from a college involve the granting of tenure, the dean should provide a statement showing how the proposed actions will affect the long-range staffing pattern of the department and of the college, taking into consideration expected attrition, budgetary limitations, the need for flexibility, and the effect on that fraction of the faculty already tenured.
- (D) Recommendations for promotion and/or tenure should be based on the merit of the individual, on a consideration of comparable achievement in the faculty member's own field or in closely related fields and on the judicious use of the fiscal resources of the department and college. Whenever possible, consideration should be given to how the nominee stands in relation to other people in the same field outside of the university who might be considered alternative candidates for the position. All available evidence should be considered and it is the responsibility of the academic units to provide complete documentation.

(E) In accordance with a policy of equality of opportunity, decisions concerning appointment, promotion, and tenure are based on the following criteria without discrimination as to race, creed, religion, national origin, age, sex, handicap, or Vietnam-era veteran status.

3335-47-02 Criteria for promotion and tenure.

- (A) Each candidate will be judged with respect to the proposed rank and duties, considering the candidate's record of performance in:
 - (1) Teaching;
 - (2) Research or other creative work; and
 - (3) Service to the instructional unit, the college, and the university and public service related to academic expertise.
- (B) In evaluating the candidate's qualifications within these areas, reasonable flexibility shall be exercised, balancing, where the case requires, heavier commitments and responsibilities in one area against lighter commitments and responsibilities in another. Each candidate is expected to be engaged in a program of work that is both sound and productive. As the university enters new fields of endeavor and places new emphases on its continuing activities, instances will arise in which the proper work of faculty members may depart from established academic patterns. In such cases care must be taken to apply the criteria with sufficient flexibility. In all instances superior intellectual attainment, in accordance with the criteria set forth below, is the crucial qualification for promotion to tenured positions. Clearly, insistence upon this standard for continuing members of the faculty is necessary for maintenance of the quality of the university as an institution dedicated to the discovery and transmission of knowledge.
- (C) The criteria set forth below are intended to serve as a guide in evaluating the candidate:

Teaching. Effective teaching is a criterion essential to advancement or the award of tenure. In evaluating the effectiveness of a candidate's teaching, points such as the following should be considered: the candidate's command of the appropriate subject; the continuous growth in the field; the ability to organize the material and to present it with logic and conviction; the capacity to awaken in students an awareness of the relationship of the subject to other fields of knowledge; objectivity; the creativity, spirit, and enthusiasm which vitalize learning and teaching; the candidate's ability to arouse curiosity in beginning students and to stimulate advanced students to creative work; personal attributes as they affect teaching and students; the extent and skill of participation in the general guidance and advising of students.

FACULTY APPOINTMENTS, PROMOTIONS AND TENURE (contd)

- (D) It is the responsibility of the department chairperson to submit meaningful statements, accompanied by evidence, concerning the candidate's teaching effectiveness at lower-division, upper-division, and graduate levels of instruction commensurate with the candidate's assigned teaching responsibilities.
- (E) No single set of satisfactory measures can be prescribed. However, among significant types of evidence of teaching effectiveness are the following (not rank ordered):
 - (1) Opinions of other members of the candidate's department, particularly if based on class visitations, on attendance at public lectures or lectures before professional societies given by the candidate, or on the results of the candidate's teaching in courses prerequisite to those of other members of the department;
 - Opinions of students, appropriately documented and accompanied by interpretative information;
 - (3) Development by the candidate of new and effective techniques of instruction and instructional materials, particularly when evidenced by acceptance at other universities;
 - (4) Publications by the candidate on the teaching of the appropriate discipline in respected journals devoted to pedagogy; and
 - (5) Recognitions or awards for distinguished teaching.
 - (6) In addition, and of particular significance in appointment or promotion to the rank of professor,
 - (a) Opinions of graduates who have achieved notable professional success since leaving the university; and
 - (b) The number as well as caliber of students quided in research by the candidate and of those attracted to the campus by the candidate's repute as a leader.
 - (7) Research and creative work. Evidence of productivity and creativity should be sought in the candidate's published research or recognized artistic production, architectural, or engineering designs, and the like.
- (F) Publications of research and other creative accomplishment should be evaluated, not merely enumerated. There should be evidence that the candidate is continuously and effectively engaged in creative activity of high quality and significance. Work in progress should be assessed whenever possible. When published work in joint authorship (or other product of joint effort) is presented as evidence, it is the responsibility of the department to establish as clearly as possible the role of the candidate in the joint effort. Account should be taken of the type and

quality of creative activity normally expected in the candidate's field. Appraisals of publication or other works in the scholarly and critical literature provide important testimony. The department chairperson is expected to supplement the opinions of colleagues within the department by critical appraisals from distinguished scholars at other universities.

- (G) Textbooks, reports, circulars, and similar publications normally considered evidence of teaching ability or public service should be considered creative work when they present new ideas or incorporate scholarly research.
- (H) In certain fields such as art, architecture, dance, music, literature, and drama, distinguished achievement may be considered in addition to distinction in scholarly analysis involving the particular branch of creative endeavor. In evaluating artistic creativity, an attempt should be made to define the candidate's merit in the light of such criteria as originality, scope, and depth of creative expression. It should be recognized that in music, drama, and dance, distinguished performance, including conducting and directing, is evidence of a candidate's creativity.
- (I) Service. The faculty plays a vital role in the administration of the university at all levels and in the formulation of its policies. Recognition should therefore be given to scholars who prove themselves to be able administrators and who participate effectively and imaginatively in faculty government and the formulation of departmental, college, and university policies. Service by members of the faculty to the community, state, and nation in their special capacities as scholars should likewise be recognized. Similarly, contributions to student welfare through service on student-faculty committees and as adviser to student organizations should be acknowledged.
- (J) In certain of the colleges, a demonstrated distinction in other service responsibilities characteristic of the area should be recognized as a criterion for promotion and/or tenure. Examples include industrial consulting (engineering) and extension work (agriculture and home economics).
- (K) The candidate's professional activities should be scrutinized for evidence of achievement and leadership in the field and of demonstrated progressiveness in the development or utilization of new approaches and techniques for the solution of professional problems. It is the responsibility of the department chairperson to provide evidence of the quality of the service rendered, including statements from persons served.

3335-47-03 Probationary service, duration of appointments.

(A) Probationary periods are established for regular faculty members with the rank of instructor, assistant professor, and associate professor. In determining the years served in these probationary periods, the following will not be credited toward the attainment of tenure: service on a regular clinical adjunct, clinical, visiting, or lecturer appointment; service (with

any title) on a special appointment, or part-time service at a level of less than fifty per cent of total service (as specified in one or more concurrent notices of appointment) to the university.

- (B) Leaves of absence. The period of a leave of absence may not be credited in the probationary period unless there is a written agreement to so credit it. Such an agreement will require the approval of the dean and of the provost.
- (C) The appointment of a person to a nontenured regular faculty position is probationary in nature. Appointments during the probationary period are for a one-year period and faculty members are normally reviewed annually during this time. It is during this period that persons have an opportunity to prove themselves to their peers; their record of accomplishments forms the basis for decisions concerning renewal of the appointment or the eventual decision to grant tenure or not. The faculty member will be advised of the time at which decisions affecting renewal or tenure will be made and will be afforded the opportunity to submit materials which the faculty member believes will be helpful to an adequate consideration of circumstances affecting status.
- (D) The university does not assume any continuing obligation to renew the appointment of a nontenured faculty member. Nonrenewal may be based upon such factors as changing standards of competence within a discipline, an assessment of inadequate performance or insufficient development, or any one of a number of less fully defined academic, financial, or policy reasons, but must be the result of formal annual review in accord with the review procedures established by the appropriate academic unit of the appointee. The nonrenewal of an appointment in and of itself, however, should not carry with it the implication of either incompetence or misconduct on the part of the faculty member.
- (E) Decisions affecting the nonrenewal of a probationary appointment may not be arbitrary or capricious or carried out in violation of a faculty member's right to academic freedom. Faculty rule 3335-5-05 of the Administrative Code provides a procedural mechanism under which an aggrieved probationary faculty member can challenge a nonrenewal decision believed to have been improper. In that instance, however, the burden of proof is on the probationary faculty member to establish that the nonrenewal decision was improper.

3335-47-04 Extension of the probationary period for part-time faculty.

Where a member of the regular faculty has served for a period of less than full-time service but at a level of fifty per cent or more of total service, the probationary period may be extended. Such extension must be requested at least one year in advance of the expiration of the usual probationary period and must have the approval of the dean and the provost. In such cases, the extension shall be for an integral number of years, based on the principle that the usual probationary period should represent full-time service. (For example, either two years at a fifty per cent level or four years at a seventy-five per

cent level would permit a one-year extension.) The maximum permissible extension of a probationary period will be three years in the case of a probationary instructor or assistant professor, and one year in the case of a probationary associate professor.

3335-47-05 Prior service.

When a faculty member has rendered prior service at or above the level of instructor at this or another university, such prior service may be included as part of the probationary period. This credit will be agreed to prior to the initial appointment and only upon the written recommendation of the chair-person of the department and the dean of the college with the concurrence of the provost.

3335-47-06 Multiple appointments.

- (A) For persons with multiple appointments, whether members of the regular faculty or the auxiliary faculty, it is important that there be a single department (or academic faculty, division, school) which will be responsible for assisting in the professional development of the faculty member and the evaluation of the faculty member; for maintaining complete records, and for initiating promotion recommendations. While tenure is a shared responsibility involving the university, the college, and the department, it is essential that a single department (or academic faculty, division, school) be responsible for the appointment of a member of the regular faculty and be responsible for initiating tenure or nonrenewal recommendations and for any eventual tenure commitment.
- (8) Multiple appointments totaling fifty per cent or more of service to the university shall be considered to be the same as a single appointment of fifty per cent or more for the purpose of determining eligibility for tenure or tenure candidacy if at least one of the appointments is an appointment to a regular faculty position.

3335-47-07 Campus assignment.

The Ohio state university provides instructional programs at several locations including the central campus in Columbus, regional campuses in Lima, Mansfield, Marion, and Newark, and the agricultural technical institute (Wooster). Members of the regular faculty who receive tenure while rendering primary service on a particular campus hold tenure only at that campus.

It is the policy of the university to achieve and maintain high quality programs on each of the several campuses. Decisions regarding the selection, salary, assessment, promotion, assignment, and responsibilities of a regional campus faculty member should reflect full cooperation between the Columbus academic unit, which is responsible for instruction, and the regional campus administration. All formal recommendations (e.g., appointments, nominations for promotions or tenure, etc.) must bear the signature of the chairperson of the Columbus campus academic unit, the dean of the college of instruction, the dean of the regional campus, and the associate vice president for academic affairs (regional campuses).

FACULTY APPOINTMENTS, PROMOTIONS AND TENURE (contd)

3335-47-08 Change of tenure status.

- (A) When a faculty member moves from one department (or academic faculty, division, school) to another, responsibility for tenure consideration or tenure moves to the new instructional unit. Also, a faculty member may be considered for service on a campus other than the one at which regular faculty service was initially rendered or tenure was earned. In the case of such reassignment, which must have the prior approval of the dean and of the provost, responsibility for tenure will move to the new location.
- (8) A tenured member of the regular faculty who voluntarily agrees to reduction of appointment below fifty per cent of service to the university (as specified in the notice(s) of appointment) loses tenure except in the case of an approved leave of absence. Similarly, a tenured member of the regular faculty who changes to a regular clinical or an auxiliary faculty position loses tenure.

3335-47-09 Standards of notice.

- (A) In cases of nonrenewal of an appointment to a regular faculty rank, the university will, insofar as possible, observe the following standards of notice:
 - (1) Not later than March first of the first academic year of probationary service, if the appointment expires at the end of that year; or if a one-year appointment expires during an academic year, at least three months in advance of its expiration;
 - (2) Not later than December fifteenth of the second academic year of probationary service, if the appointment expires at the end of that year; or if an appointment expires during the second academic year, at least six months in advance of its expiration; and
 - (3) At least twelve months before the expiration of an appointment after two or more years in the institution.
- (B) These standards of notice need not apply in cases of termination for cause.
- (C) In event of a decision resulting in nonrenewal, the faculty member shall be notified in writing of that decision. Upon written request by the faculty member, reasons for the nonrenewal shall be supplied in writing.
- (D) Decisions regarding renewal of members of the auxiliary faculty (adjunct, clinical, visiting titles, or lecturers) are made annually in accordance with criteria and procedures of the appointing instructional unit and in accordance with university policies relative to auxiliary faculty positions.
- 3335-47-10 Regular faculty ranks (requisites, capacities, and tenure accrual).
- (A) Instructor.

FACULTY APPOINTMENTS, PROMOTIONS AND TENURE (contd)

- (1) Recommendations for appointment as an instructor are subject to the following conditions:
 - (a) Formal requisite: baccalaureate degree and master's degree, or its equivalent, and at least three years of graduate study or relevant professional experience.
 - (b) Capacities: satisfactory evidence that the person being appointed possesses the capacity to develop and meet substantially the criteria described in criteria for promotion and tenure, rule 3335-47-02 of the Administrative Code.
 - (c) Tenure: before an instructor will be granted tenure at that rank, a seven-year probationary period must be completed.
- Initial appointments as an instructor are on a probationary basis. (2)Performance is ordinarily reviewed annually during the probationary period to determine whether or not the appointment will be renewed, subject to the standards of notice set forth in rule 3335-47-09 of the Administrative Code. If the appointment is renewed for a fourth year, the university will inform the instructor during the fourth year as to whether or not the individual is a candidate for tenure. If the instructor is not considered a candidate for tenure, the appointment will not be renewed after the end of the fifth year. If the appointment is renewed for a sixth year, the person involved will be informed by the chairperson or dean, during the sixth year of service, if tenure is to be granted beginning with the eighth year of service. If tenure is not granted, the instructor's appointment will not be renewed after the end of the seventh year.

(B) Assistant professor.

- (1) Recommendations for appointment as an assistant professor are subject to the following conditions:
 - (a) Formal requisite: Ph.D. degree or equivalent qualification.
 - (b) Capacities: demonstrated evidence that the person being appointed possesses the capacity to meet substantially the criteria described in rule 3335-47-02 of the Administrative Code.
 - (c) Tenure: before an assistant professor will be granted tenure at that rank, a seven-year probationary period must be completed. Service to the university as an instructor (without interruption) will be counted in meeting this probationary requirement. Tenure may be granted at an earlier time upon promotion to associate professor.

FACULTY APPOINTMENTS, PROMOTIONS AND TENURE (contd)

(2) Initial appointments as an assistant professor are on a probationary basis. Performance is ordinarily reviewed annually during the probationary period to determine whether or not the appointment will be renewed, subject to the standards of notice. If the appointment is renewed for a fourth year, the university will inform the assistant professor involved during the fourth year as to whether candidacy for tenure is to be considered. If the assistant professor is not considered a candidate for tenure, the appointment will not be renewed after the end of the fifth year. If the appointment is renewed for the sixth year, the person involved will be informed by the chairperson or dean during the sixth year of service, if tenure is to be granted beginning with the eighth year of service. If tenure is not granted, the appointment will not be renewed after the end of the seventh year.

(C) Associate professor.

- (1) Recommendations for appointment as an associate professor are subject to the following conditions:
 - (a) Formal requisite: Ph.D. degree or equivalent qualification.
 - (b) Capacities: demonstrated evidence that the person appointed meets substantially the criteria described in criteria for promotion and tenure, rule 3335-47-02 of the Administrative Code, and that professional development will continue.
 - (c) Tenure: a person promoted to associate professor from a lower rank at this university will acquire tenure upon the effective date of promotion.
- (2) A person appointed from outside of this university to associate professor will serve a three-year probationary period. During the second year, the person involved will be informed by the chairperson or dean if tenure is to be granted beginning with the fourth year of service. If tenure is not granted, the appointment will not be renewed after then end of the third year.
- (D) Professor. Recommendations for appointment as professor are subject to the following conditions:
 - (1) Formal requisite: Ph.D. degree or equivalent qualification.
 - (2) Capacities: demonstrated evidence that the person being appointed has met the criteria described in criteria for promotion and tenure in rule 3335-47-02 of the Administrative Code with distinction and that these outstanding contributions will continue.
 - (3) Tenure: tenure is automatic upon promotion or appointment to this regular faculty rank.

FACULTY APPOINTMENTS, PROMOTIONS AND TENURE (contd)

3335-47-11 Regular clinical faculty ranks.

The titles of regular clinical faculty are professor of clinical (department), associate professor of clinical (department), assistant professor of clinical (department), and instructor of clinical (department). Individuals in this track may have a full range of responsibilities to appropriate academic units with emphasis on patient care and clinical teaching activities. Clinical activities for faculty members in this category are to be included in approved practice plans.

(A) Appointment criteria

Initial appointments, or transfer, to the regular clinical faculty will be made for individuals with the following experience or credentials:

- (1) They are strict or geographic full-time faculty members in clinical departments in the college of medicine, as defined by the college of medicine.
- (2) They perform duties which consist primarily of patient care or clinical teaching.
- (3) They have the appropriate educational background and credentials to perform the duties outlined in (2).
- (4) They are essential to the continuing mission of the college of medicine as determined by the appropriate clinical department chairperson, dean of the college of medicine, and vice president for academic affairs and provost.

(B) Term of appointment

- (1) In the first term of appointment to the regular clinical faculty, appointees will be reviewed annually. During the fourth year, a formal review will be conducted. The faculty member will be informed if the appointment is to be renewed after the fifth year.
- (2) Subsequent appointments will be for periods of five years in lieu of tenure. A formal review will be conducted in the fourth year and the faculty member will be informed if the appointment is to be renewed after the fifth year for another five year term.
- (3) All appointments will be based upon criteria established by the clinical departments, approved by the dean of the college of medicine, and vice president for academic affairs and provost.
- (4) If the appointment is not renewed, standards of notice must be in accord with rule 3335-47-09 of the Administrative Code.

(C) Transfers

It is generally expected that the needs of the academic unit and the career goals of the prospective faculty member will result in meshing of need, expectation, responsibility, and expertise to allow a long-term appointment to either the regular faculty or regular clinical faculty. Should a transfer be deemed appropriate, the following must be accomplished:

- (1) The process of transfer from the regular faculty to the regular clinical faculty or from the regular clinical faculty to the regular faculty is initiated only upon the written request of the faculty member. A recommendation for transfer must indicate clear evidence of a change in the individual's career goals and expectations, duties, and activities.
- (2) An individual appointed to a tenure-eligible position as an instructor or assistant professor may transfer to the regular clinical faculty at any time before the fourth year of service, or after tenure has been granted. Transfer of a tenured faculty member to the regular clinical faculty requires resignation of the tenured position.

An individual appointed to a tenure-eligible position as an associate professor, from outside the university, may transfer to the regular clinical faculty before the second year of service, or after tenure has been granted.

- (3) An individual appointed to the regular clinical faculty at the instructor, assistant professor, or associate professor level, upon transfer to a tenure-eligible position, must meet the criteria for the granting of tenure within the established time limits including that time already served in the regular clinical faculty appointment. Transfer at the professor level can be made only with concurrent granting of tenure.
- (4) All transfers must be approved by the department appointments, promotions and tenure committee, the department chairperson, the dean of the college of medicine, and the vice president for academic affairs and provost.
- (5) Only one transfer to or from the regular clinical faculty will be approved during an individual's period of employment at the Ohio state university.

(D) Promotions

Nominations for promotion originate in the department in accordance with criteria and procedures established by departmental faculty.

(1) A department may recommend the promotion of an assistant professor of clinical (department) to the rank of associate professor of clinical (department) at any time up to the end of the ninth year. An individual who is not promoted by the end of nine years will be

reviewed by the chairperson and the appointments, promotions and tenure committee of the department to determine if continued employment is warranted. All recommendations will be reviewed by the appointments, promotions and tenure committee of the department, the college of medicine, and the office of academic affairs.

(2) A department may recommend the promotion of an associate professor of clinical (department) to professor of clinical (department) in recognition of outstanding accomplishments. Promotion may be recommended no earlier than the third year of service as an associate professor of clinical (department). All recommendations will be reviewed by the appointments, promotions and tenure committee of the department, the college, and the office of academic affairs.

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RULE 3335-5-02 - APPOINTMENTS AND CONTINUING EMPLOYMENT; CONDITIONS UPON

Dwight M. DeLong

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on August 23, 1984, of Dwight M. DeLong, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Entomology.

Dr. DeLong was born in Corning, Ohio, on April 6, 1892, the son of a public school superintendent. He received his B.S. degree at Ohio Wesleyan in 1914. This institution later granted him the honorary D.Sc. degree in 1941. He came to Ohio State as a graduate assistant in 1914, where he received his M.S. degree in 1916. After serving in the U.S. Army in World War I, he returned to Ohio State and in 1922 received the Ph.D. degree. He served on the faculty for 45 years and since 1962 was a very active Emeritus Professor. He contributed distinguished service to this University for 70 years.

Professor DeLong was an excellent teacher of entomology. Many of our successful alumni give him credit for stimulating their interest in the field. Under Dr. DeLong's direction 98 M.S. degrees and 49 Ph.D. degrees in Entomology were earned at The Ohio State University. He was co-author of the most widely used textbook in entomology, "An Introduction to the Study of Insects."

Professor DeLong had also distinguished himself as an international authority on an important group of insects known as leafhoppers (Homoptera). This group of insects is of great economic importance because of the direct damage done to crops and because they carry important plant diseases. He published over 400 papers and monographs on the taxonomy of leafhoppers and the control of economic insects in North America.

Professor DeLong was active in various professional societies and received many awards and honors. He served as President of the Ohio Academy of Sciences in 1959 and was an Honorary Life Member of the Academy. He served as Associate and Acting Director of the Ohio Biological Survey from 1943-1958. From 1929-1936, he served as Associate Editor of the Journal of Economic Entomology and was a member of the Editorial Board. In 1964, he received the Founders Memorial Award of the Entomological Society of America. He was awarded an Honorary Life Membership by this Society in 1966. Dr. DeLong was a member of the Presidents Club at Ohio State University, and in 1962 received the Distinguished Teaching Award. He received an Honorary Doctor of Science degree from Ohio State University in 1977.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deepest sympathy. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed in the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a sincere expression of the Board's realization of the loss which the family and The Ohio State University has sustained.

Ruth Streitz

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on August 11, 1984, of Ruth Streitz, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Educational Theory and Practice.

Dr. Streitz was born September 19, 1892 in North Platte, Nebraska. At the age of 22, she enrolled in the Pestalozzi-Froebel Teachers College in Chicago, Illinois. Following that year of study, she taught kindergarten for one year and in a junior high school for two years in Lincoln, Nebraska. From 1919-1921 she was Director of Child Welfare, Madison, Wisconsin. She was awarded a Ph.B. in 1921 and an M.A. in 1922 from the University of Chicago. Dr. Streitz was an Associate in the Bureau of Educational Research and an Instructor in the College of Education at the University of Illinois, 1922-1924. She completed work for her doctorate at Teachers College, Columbia University and was awarded the Ph.D. in 1926. She taught at the University of Cincinnati before coming to The Ohio State University in 1938.

Her field of endeavor, elementary education, led her into a very wholesome and devoted interest in young children and early childhood education. She felt privileged to have studied under John Dewey. Her writing included contributions to the Progressive Education Journal, the John Dewey Society Yearbook, and the American Elementary School. She served as Director and Chairman of

the Teacher Education Committee of the American Progressive Education Association. She devoted her professional life to teaching. Dr. Streitz retired from the College of Education in 1963.

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MODERNIZATION OF THE ADMISSIONS AND REGISTRATION PROCESS

President Jennings called on Dr. Russell Spillman, Vice Provost for Student Affairs, to present a report on the modernization of the admissions and registration process.

Dr. Spillman:

Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Board. I have with me, Mr. Gene Schuster, the University Registrar, who is going to discuss some of the very exciting things beginning to happen in the Admissions and Registration Office. Unfortunately, Mr. Mager, our Director of Admissions, was to be with us, but he took ill this morning, so Gene will fill in for him.

At the beginning of this year, with the more stable budget, we were able to fund some things in the Admissions Office and the Registrar's Office that we think will make life much more bearable and happy for our students, faculty and staff. And with that, I would like to turn to Gene and ask him to tell you about some of our major projects.

Mr. Schuster:

Thank you. In the Admissions Office itself, we have a situation where about three years ago we were able to complete a major development effort towards personalizing the admissions system. As a result, there are several enhancements that we think will greatly improve the process.

MODERNIZATION OF THE ADMISSIONS AND REGISTRATION PROCESS (contd)

Mr. Schuster: (contd)

At the time, three years ago, when the admissions system was installed, the system dealt only with applicants to the University. Since then we have noticed a great need to watch the people who are simply interested in Ohio State University and to do a better job of keeping track of those people who may turn into applicants. As a result, prospective students and the area of prospective students becomes very important to the University, particularly during times of declining enrollments within the State of Ohio and declining traditional type students. Also our interest in improving the quality of the student body makes this group very important to the University.

Two separate efforts are undertaken in this area: one is to personalize the communication with these people; the other is to install a prospective student data system which will allow all the departments, staff, and alumni who have contact with people who may be prospective students to "log the contacts." Then, when others have the opportunity to talk with that student we know what information they have been given, what advice they may have received, who else they have talked to, and so on.

In the area of undergraduate transfer applicants, we have a development under way that would try to use the modern technology available to enhance articulation of those students from other universities to Ohio State. By developing a system which would allow us to know the equivalent courses at other institutions, and enable us to use that for advising and counseling those prospective applicants, we would later be able to ease the processing burden that we have in awarding credit to those applicants.

In the area of graduate and professional applicants, again utilizing modern technology, we hope to establish a referral network for the individual departments and colleges. We want to be able to receive information without having to use campus mail, so we can be much more speedy in our response. Again, in that area, personalization of the correspondence is a high priority, as well as personalization of the contact.

In the area of the Registrar's responsibilities, the need to modernize our information management practices is terribly important to us. For example, in the area of room scheduling we need to develop some software to help us schedule rooms for two basic reasons: to improve the use of the capital facility that the University has allocated for common use (the classroom pool); and also to try to create a more efficient environment so a faculty member from the south side of the Oval doesn't go to the north side of the Oval to teach a class, when another faculty member is going to his side. So, we plan to do some work there. We will also be working in that

Mr. Schuster: (contd)

area because of the move of West Campus instruction to the Central Campus area and some efficiencies that we need to gain in the short-run to accomplish that goal.

In the area of registration our move is to decrease the amount of run-around on campus. Currently, all students who do not participate in advance registration have to walk to Lincoln Tower in order to be able to accomplish their registration and to have their fees assessed. So, our main goal is to try to use the modern technology that is available (i.e., touch-tone type input, voice responser-similar to what many of the banks have done) to allow registration to be accomplished at the point that the last decision is made about what the student wants to take. Whether it is at the student's home, that would be a possibility, or at the adviser's office, that would be a possibility. We want to try to keep students from having to move to two or three other areas on campus to complete their registration.

In the area of student records, we currently are keeping paper records in a variety of locations on campus--the college office, our office, sometimes departmental offices, sometimes in the adviser's desk drawer. We will move our dependence to a mechanical or computer record and generate complete accurate records each quarter, and not have to shuffle paper and spend the time in three or four different areas with records maintenance.

The area we are most excited about, however, is the area of improving advising support. This fall we are going around to the colleges and departmental offices with an on-line system that will help them better manage adviser assignments. This will enable the colleges and departments to keep track of how many students are assigned to one particular adviser, to spread the load more evenly, and to move students easily between advisers. As I mentioned, we will begin distributing complete records instead of sticky labels that go in file folders, in order to make it much easier for people to have the information they need for advising and to make sure that that information is accurate.

Then, the most exciting development is what we are calling "degree-auditing." Basically, it is a system whereby we use the computer to keep a list of degree requirements and to match those against the courses students have taken to complete their degree program. Then we will respond with a report for the student or adviser which will graphically lay out exactly what the student needs to do to finish his or her degree. That will be helpful for students and it will be helpful for advisers. Faculty members will be able to concern themselves with and spend time discussing with the student how to enhance the academic program, instead of simply how to complete the academic program.

MODERNIZATION OF THE ADMISSIONS AND REGISTRATION PROCESS (contd)

Dr. Spillman:

We would be happy to entertain any questions.

President Jennings:

Well, thank you very much. That is very exciting when we stop and think that three times a year we register and process almost 60,000 students and untold numbers of applicants--15,000-16,000 a year at Ohio State. We currently do a fine job, but I think this will lead to considerable improvement in the matriculation experience of our student body. And there again, I hope we will leap-frog much of higher education in our modernization of the admissions and registration process. We thank you for all of the efforts you are expending on this important project. Thank you.

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Friday, November 2, 1984, at The Ohio State University Fawcett Center for Tomorrow, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

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The Chairman, Mr. Hilliker, called the meeting of the Board of Trustees to order at 11:40 a.m. He requested the Secretary to call the roll. The meeting recessed into Executive Session for the purpose of considering legal issues and personnel-related matters.

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ENROLLMENT -- AUTUMN QUARTER, 1984

President Jennings called on Mr. Ihrig to present a report on the Autumn, 1984 enrollment situation.

Mr. Ihriq:

Thank you, Mr. President. Included in the agenda materials you each have copies of the detailed enrollment data for Autumn Quarter, 1984, which summarizes, by campus and by college of enrollment, how the 56,756 students break out throughout the University. Rather than review these data with you, I would like to concentrate this report on the results we achieved this year on our planned enrollments, and compare them with the assumptions and plans we had going into the year.

First of all, the question that normally comes up is, "Where are we with regard to our 40,000 FTE ceiling?" If you recall, last year we projected being around 800 above that ceiling in our planned reduction in the Columbus Campus enrollment. We actually turned out to be 1,367 above last year. We revised our plans based on what we saw of the data at that time and expected to be around 700 above the ceiling this year. The results show that we came out at 528 FTE above the ceiling this year, which was the original target we set a year ago, and it has actually occurred this year. So all this shows is how much we understand about what we are doing with regard to our planning for bringing the Columbus Campus closer to the enrollment ceiling.

The majority of the reduction of 1,600 students enrolled at Ohio State was the result of planned activity. We are carefully studying, at this time, where we are today with regard to each of the assumptions; let me go through them briefly. We had assumed this

year that the retention rates would equal 1983's retention rates, and that is essentially what has happened. The retention rates have stabilized, after one year of enrollment for entering freshmen, at around 79 per cent; and at 67 per cent after two years. Those rates have held steady for the last two years after increasing regularly over the previous five years. So we may be at a plateau on retention rates. But remember, this Autumn Quarter is the first quarter that we are having the conditional/unconditional admissions with students who have been alerted to that and planned their high school preparation. So our planning for the next two years, as we set up a year ago, was to look at a slight increase in those retention rates over the next two years. And we will be reevaluating that position this year as we analyze the data more closely.

We also assumed that the credit hours taken by the students would be stable this year and for the next several years; and again, that assumption has held up. There was stability in the credit hour loads taken by the students this year in the undergraduate level and the professional student level—a very slight (1 per cent) increase in the graduate credit hour load. That stability comes after a period of several years of growth in the number of credit hours.

We also assumed that there would be a slight increase in the number of graduate students this year compared to last year and that increase would continue another year. That is one assumption that did not occur. There was a leveling off of our graduate student enrollments and that is a very significant feature that we are going to try and understand better as we look at our enrollment planning for the next fiscal year.

The best way to summarize where we are is by pointing out that in the grand totals we are where we want to be according to our plans; however, the mix leaves a little to be desired. We would like to have slightly fewer lower-division students and more upper-division and graduate students in our enrollment mix. On the issue of retention, Provost Haenicke authorized a study where we actually made telephone contact with around 1,500 students who had left the University between Spring 1983 and Winter 1984. We noted two primary causes in talking with those students as to the reason they had left the University without graduating. Forty-two per cent indicated poor academic performance as a significant factor, but 35 per cent indicated that they could not afford college costs. a significant concern to us as we look at the participation rates, with this state being 46th in the nation and Ohio's fee rates being near the highest in the country--about third nationally. This concerns us greatly and that is why we think the efforts to bring those fees down in the future, as part of a total cost of education, are very significant.

Mr. Ihrig: (contd)

Moving on from the Columbus Campus--our Regional Campus enrollments were generally down, in the 3 to 4 per cent range, with two exceptions: 1) Newark, which was up one per cent; and 2) ATI, which is down around 20 per cent. We are working with those campuses because we think those are early indications of the impact of changing demographics of the high school classes, and we need to work with those campuses very closely in planning for their future enrollments.

Of interest, the state-assisted universities in Ohio had generally a 2.6 per cent decline in total enrollments—that is about 6,600 students. Bowling Green and Ohio State led the way and both universities are trying to bring enrollment down to the ceiling. Looking at the Big 10, there was about 7/10 of a per cent decline in the total enrollments within the Big Ten and that was led again by Ohio State, but also Minnesota had about an 1,800 student enrollment reduction.

As we are looking toward our planning for next year, we are running a great number of analyses on what's happened within student classes, so we can try and understand what is going on in our enrollments and our mix. We will be looking at the impact of the changing demographics in high school enrollments; also, at how to judge the impact of a recovering economy on the college participation rates. We think that will have a significant impact on what is going on with students entering higher education and on retaining those already enrolled. We are also interested in the continuing impact on retention of having better prepared students entering this university, and also, where graduate enrollments are going. That completes my report and I would be glad to respond to any questions about the enrollment data that you might have.

President Jennings:

Well, thank you. I think it is very important to emphasize that these enrollment results are in the context of planning. And I think it is appropriate to note that in that planning we are talking about a total enrollment of 57,000. Where the numbers were off 200 or 300, I think Weldon's people and the admissions people should be complimented on coming so close.

We will, in the next several weeks, be going over the data for next year. As you know, in the last several years we have had to close down admissions—last year for example we had to close down admissions on January 5. We will be making those decisions probably in November as to when we will close down admissions for the freshman class for fall, 1985. But the difficulty with that is, of course, the uncertainties in the rate of conditional/unconditional

admissions and those generated by the economic recovery. Weldon emphasized the economic recovery because our industry is very much a counter-cyclical industry in the sense that nationwide, during recession periods, more youngsters go on to college. The percentage participation rates are higher than in better economic times.

Mr. Galbreath:

Doesn't that refute one of the reasons they said they didn't come back to school--that they couldn't afford it?

President Jennings:

It does refute--although we are talking generality versus a specific set, and a 35 per cent set. I would also say that any youngster that has a financial problem at Ohio State, I am completely confident that that youngster can receive financial aid so that they can stay in. But the typical national response is that the college-going rates go down in prosperous economic times and go up during poorer ones--because remember the largest cost of going to college is the "opportunity cost" -- namely, the income forgone while you are in That is the largest cost. The second largest cost, of course, the general living expenses -- the room and board associated with that. Tuition and books are the third largest cost associated with that. In that context, of course, when times are good the job opportunity cost begins to go up and those at the margin will go up. And then overarching all of this is the demographics that we talked about--where beginning in '79, with the end of the baby boom, the number of high school graduates began to decline at a rate that will amount to 30 per cent by 1992.

One of the interesting things in Ohio, where our college-going rates are so low relative to the nation--we are at 43 per cent relative to 53 per cent--it does give us an opportunity--when I say us, I mean higher education in Ohio--to avoid those demographics if we can get the college-going rate up. And there is some indication that we will be able to get the college-going rate up, because the opportunity costs, particularly in the heavy industries, are not as large as they were all during the 50's, 60's and early 70's. I think this is up and down--but, the point I really do want to leave you with is that I don't think we have any worry about major enrollment declines at Ohio State in the foreseeable future.

Mr. Ihrig:

Just to add on to that, Mr. Galbreath, when the economic times are depressed there are more students who are interested in attending higher education and will initiate attending higher education. But,

the problem is how long would they have the resources to continue their education, and when the good times are back, there will be more opportunities for students.

President Jennings:

That is, incidentally, the only variable across the nation that higher education has ever been able to find that has any predictive power at all in terms of the number of students going on to higher education. The demographics, income, all of that—higher education as an industry has been singularly ineffective in predicting enrollments. We had a report last month on West Campus. It was originally designed to have thirteen buildings and house an institution with 80,000 students.

Mr. Ihrig:

The demographic studies are very interesting, because we had a downturn in the number of high school students in the early to mid-70's. But higher education in general, especially in this state, did not experience that downturn. What happened then, was the increased number of women that enrolled in higher education who had not been participating previously, and that leveled off that downturn. And, at this time, the only variable is the participation rate and that hits the states in this region very hard. With the new emphasis on training individuals to handle greater changes in society and the economy, we think that there is a great opportunity here in this state to increase the participation rate and to go counter-cyclical to the rest of the nation during the next five or ten years.

President Jennings:

Terrel H. Bell, Secretary of Education, put out a report that made a variety of suggestions. I was very pleased to see that report, because all of those suggestions were suggestions that Ohio State and the State of Ohio had started two, three, or four years ago. Thank you, Weldon.

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY (contd)

WHEREAS the University Senate pursuant to rule 3335-1-09 of the Administrative Code is authorized to recommend through the President to the Board of Trustees the adoption of amendments to the Rules of the University Faculty as approved by the University Senate; and

WHEREAS the proposed changes in the Rules of the University Faculty were approved by the University Senate on September 29, 1984, as follows:

AMENDED RULES

3335-5-59 Faculty compensation and benefits committee.

(A) Membership:

The committee shall consist of:

- (1) Twelve elected faculty members, at least two of whom also shall be members of the senate, to serve a three-year term with four to be elected each year;
- (2) The vice president for academic affairs and provost, or designee, ex officiot
- (3) The vice president for personnel services, or designee, ex officio;
- (4) A non-voting emeritus faculty member appointed annually by the president in consultation with the Ohio state university retirees association; and
- (5) Additional ex officio, non-voting members and consultants from the university, at the discretion of the committee.

3335-5-60 University calendar committee.

(C) The university calendar committee shall report to the university senate at least once a year. Reports, including results of studies conducted by the university calendar committee, shall be forwarded to the council on academic affairs and the university senate for consideration and appropriate action.

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the foregoing amendments to the Rules of the University Faculty be adopted as recommended by the University Senate.

Eugene H. Roseboom

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on September 19, 1984 of Eugene H. Roseboom, Professor Emeritus in the Department of History.

Dr. Roseboom was born in 1892 in Frankfurt, Ohio. He took his B.A. from The Ohio State University in 1914, where he graduated Phi Beta Kappa. Continuing on at The Ohio State University, he took his M.A. and then went to Harvard University where he took his Ph.D. in 1932.

Dr. Roseboom joined the faculty at Ohio State as an Assistant Professor in 1929. From 1929 until he retired in 1963, Dr. Roseboom taught American political history and the history of Ohio.

Dr. Roseboom, together with Mr. Frances Weisenburger, published a <u>History of Ohio</u> in 1934, a book that quickly became the standard text for over thirty years and is a book still widely consulted. He then published an authoritative history of Ohio in the Civil War era in 1944. Dr. Roseboom's definitive study, <u>A History of Presidential Elections</u>, was published in 1957. This book won wide scholarly acclaim and was praised by former President Harry Truman as one

every high school senior and college student should be required to read. As Mr. Truman observed in a letter to Dr. Roseboom, "Our youngsters would then find out just exactly what makes the Government tick." This book won the Ohio Academy of History Award in 1958. Up until his death Dr. Roseboom was consulted by scholars, journalists, and television commentators for his views of current presidential elections.

Dr. Roseboom served a term on the Board of Editors of the most prestigious journal in his field, The Mississippi Valley Historical Review. His eminence was also recognized when he was elected President of The Ohio Academy of History in 1956.

Professor Roseboom was truly an outstanding scholar who brought great distinction to The Ohio State University. His special role was in encouraging younger scholars to become the very best teachers and scholars they could. He gave this University forty years of effective and devoted service.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Dr. Roseboom its deepest sympathy. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed in the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as sincere appreciation of the Board's realization of the loss that the family, the University and his many friends and associates have sustained.

Grace Murray Hopper Commencement Speaker

Grace Murray Hopper is one of the pioneers of the computer industry. After earning a bachelor's degree from Vassar and master's and Ph.D. degrees from Yale University, Hopper taught mathematics for several years at Vassar. In 1943, she entered the United States Naval Reserve and attended midshipman's school. After graduation, she was commissioned lieutenant (JG) and ordered to the Bureau of Ordnance Computation Project at Harvard. She learned to program the first large-scale digital computer, Mark I, at Harvard. She went to work on successors to that computer for the Navy, then transferred her efforts to the UNIVAC project for what would become the Sperry Rand Corporation. Hopper retired in 1971.

She has published more than 50 papers and articles on software and programming languages. She has been a visiting faculty member in engineering at the University of Pennsylvania and a professional lecturer in management science at George Washington University. Hopper is a fellow of the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and the Association of Computer Programmers and Analysts. She is a recipient of numerous awards, honorary degrees, and other recognitions including, most recently, the Living Legacy Award from the Women's International Center, San Diego, and the Woman of the Year Award from the YWCA of the National Capital Area. She remains on active duty with the U.S. Naval Reserve and was promoted to the rank of commodore in 1983.

Joseph McVicker Hunt is a scientist and scholar who has made an enormous contribution to the fields of psychology and education during the past several decades. His research on the effects of environment on the development and education of young children has had a strong influence on educational research and social policy. His 1941 work, Personality and Behavior Disorders, has been a standard reference for students of clinical psychology for many years. His book, Intelligence and Experience, published in 1961, inspired Project Head Start, one of the most successful and farreaching social programs of this century. In 1966, he chaired the White House Task Force on Early Childhood Education.

A graduate of the University of Nebraska where he received his B.A. and M.A., and Comell University where he obtained his Ph.D., Hunt spent most of his professional career on the faculties of Brown University and the University of Illinois. He retired from the University of Illinois as professor emeritus of psychology in 1974. He is a past president of the American Psychological Association and the American Psychological Foundation; a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the American Academy of Psychotherapists; and the recipient of major awards from the American Psychological Association, the National Institute of Mental Health, the American Psychological Foundation, and the Society for the Psychological Study of Social issues. In pursuit of his work on behalf of the human race, he has challenged students, colleagues, and professional peers throughout the world. Ohio State is proud to award him this honorary degree.

Abba G. Lichtenstein Doctor of Engineering

After earning a bachelor of civil engineering degree from Ohio State in 1948, Abba G. Lichtenstein went on to achieve international recognition for his work on the design and historic preservation of bridges. As principal or partner in several engineering firms in New Jersey and New York, Lichtenstein developed methods that have gained widespread use in evaluating and rehabilitating historic bridges for continued productive use. His work included an evaluation of the oldest suspension bridge in the United States at the request of the National Park Service. He also was involved in developing national standards for bridge inspection, investigated several notable bridge collapses, and served as an expert witness in resulting legal proceedings.

Lichtenstein is a fellow of the American Society of Civil Engineers and a member of the National Society of Professional Engineers, the International Association for Bridge and Structural Engineering, and a number of other professional organizations. He has presented more than 50 short courses and seminars as a visiting professor and has given more than 30 papers and lectures on bridge renovation and preservation. He has received numerous recognitions for his work, including the Distinguished Alumnus Award from Ohio State's College of Engineering, Lichtenstein is commended by colleagues in academia and his profession for his engineering skills, imagination, and dedication to the protection of this nation's engineering heritage. The University is proud to honor this distinguished alumnus.

Distinguished Service Awards

W. Arthur Cullman Distinguished Service Award

During his 35 years as a faculty member in the College of Administrative Science at Ohio State, W. Arthur Cullman gained an international reputation as a specialist in strategy, policy, and advertising. He began his career with a bachelor's degree from Yale University and an M.B.A. from Harvard Business School. Cullman worked in various sales capacities for Philip Morris and was executive vice president of Benson and Hedges before joining the marketing faculty at Ohio State in 1947. He earned his Ph.D. here in 1951. At Ohio State, Cullman served as director of graduate programs in business and as chairperson of the marketing faculty. In 1953 he was named professor of the year by the students in the college, and in 1955 he received the Alfred J. Wright Award for service to Ohio State students

Cullman has been an active business consultant and has served on the faculties of workshops and institutes, including the Graduate School of Credit and Financial Management at Dartmouth College and the Graduate School of Sales Management and Marketing at Rutgers and Syracuse Universities. He taught at a management development institute in Lausanne, Switzerland, in 1969-70 and has lectured around the world. Cullman retired in 1982 as professor emeritus of marketing. He has been president of the American Marketing Association and is active on the boards of several corporations and cultural and service organizations. Cullman was honored with the creation of two University endowed funds in his name when he retired. Ohio State is pleased to recognize him for his achievements and service to this University.

Stanley Earl Harrison Distinguished Service Award

A native of Gallipolis, Ohio, and an honors graduate of Ohio State with a degree in electrical engineering, Stanley Earl Harrison provides a stellar example of cooperation between industry and academia in the pursuit of excellence. Professionally, he has conducted highly regarded work in engineering and technological development with Battelle Columbus Laboratories, Sandia Laboratories, Martin-Marietta Corporation, and BDM Corporation. Harrison is now president and chief operating officer of BDM Corporation as well as executive vice president and a director of BDM International, Inc. He is active in numerous professional societies and national committees. He received the Benjamin G. Lamme Meritorious Achievement Medal, the highest honor granted by Ohio State's College of Engineering, in 1980.

Harrison was the first chairperson of the Committee for Tomorrow, directing efforts of distinguished business leaders in supporting the College of Engineering. He was the primary driving force in developing and implementing the goals and objectives of the Alliance with Industry Program and helped to develop advisory committees for each department in the college. Harrison devoted boundless energy to the completion of a \$15-million campaign to provide the College of Engineering with endowed chairs, equipment, program support, and scholarships. He is a member of The Presidents Club and personally supports an annual faculty award for excellence in engineering education. The University deeply appreciates his dedication.

Distinguished Service Awards

L. Neal Smith Distinguished Service Award

L. Neal Smith retired in 1982 after 21 years on the staff of the Center for Textual Studies in Ohio State's Department of English. He was overall supervisor of the work at the center and chief textual researcher involved in producing the center's monumental edition, The Centenary Edition of the Works of Nathaniel Hawthome. The Hawthorne project is an immense scholarly achievement that has brought the University immeasurable praise during the past two decades. One of a series of similar projects begun at major universities in 1960, the Hawthorne project set textual standards and defined editorial practices that became the norm for all later projects.

While many other individuals were involved in the project and, on occasion, received greater public credit, Smith was the researcher who ferreted out the elusive facts about stop-press corrections, hidden impressions, surreptitious foreign printings, and other little known details involved in the textual criticism of so prolific and popular an author as Hawthorne. Smith is a nationally recognized and frequently consulted expert on the deciphering of Hawthorne's difficult handwriting, and he probably knows more about this author's work habits and his dealings with publishers than any other scholar in the world. After more than 20 years devoted to bringing this important work to a conclusion, Smith retired with the basic textual work completed on all of Hawthorne's writings. The University is proud to recognize his tireless efforts with this award.

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AMENDMENT TO THE RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY Resolution No. 85-58

Synopsis: Amendment to rule 3335-3-21 is being proposed.

WHEREAS the University Senate pursuant to rule 3335-1-09 of the Administrative Code is authorized to recommend through the President to the Board of Trustees the adoption of an amendment to the Rules of the University Faculty as approved by the University Senate; and

WHEREAS the proposed change in the Rules of the University Faculty was approved by the University Senate on October 27, 1984, as follows:

AMENDED RULE

3335-3-21 Director of athletics.

- (A) The director of athletics shall be a member of the faculty. The director of athletics shall be responsible to the vice provost for student affairs and shall be appointed under the procedures outlined in rule 3335-3-35 of the Administrative Code. The athletic council (see rule 3335-5-51 of the Administrative Code) shall also be consulted.
- (8) Under policies established by the athletic council, the director of athletics shall administer the programs of intramural and intercollegiate athletics.
- (C) The director shall have the duties of the chairperson of a department as prescribed in rule 3335-3-35 of the Administrative Code.
- (D) The athletic physical plant shall be under the concurrent jurisdiction of the department of intercollegiate athletics and the office of physical facilities. Athletic physical plant employees shall be under the

jurisdiction of the department of intercollegiate athletics, which in consultation with the office of physical facilities shall be responsible for all normal maintenance and repairs. Major remodeling, renovation, construction, and other capital improvements shall be undertaken only with the prior approval of, and under the direction of, the office of physical facilities.

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the foregoing amendment to the Rules of the University Faculty be adopted as recommended by the University Senate.

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EXCEPTION TO RULE 3335-47-11

BE IT RESOLVED, That the exception to rule 3335-47-11 of the Rules of the University Faculty be approved as recommended by the University Senate. This opportunity applies only to Regular Faculty who were between their fourth-year and sixth-year reviews when the Regular Clinical Faculty category was approved by the Board of Trustees.

- (d) To conduct or support programs or projects acceptable to the University which augment the facilities of or otherwise assist the University in the advancement of education, research and service;

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That pursuant to the general authority vested in the Board of Trustees by law, The Ohio State University hereby approves the establishment of The Ohio State University Foundation under the laws of Ohio and approves such a relationship between the University and The Ohio State University Foundation which can qualify such Foundation under Section 509 (a) (3) of the United States Internal Revenue Code by reason of the University being a benefited organization; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That The Ohio State University gives its consent to The Ohio State University Foundation to use the name, The Ohio State University Foundation; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the President of the University is authorized to execute such documents that are necessary to carry out the establishment of The Ohio State University Foundation and to provide such procedures, rules and agreements for the University's representatives serving in any capacity to assist the Foundation as he deems necessary or desirable to carry out effectively the responsibilities and purposes of the University.
