The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, July 11, 1968, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. <u>Recommendations on Possession and</u> Consumption of Alcoholic Beverages

President Fawcett presented the following statement and recommendations regarding the possession and consumption of alcoholic beverages:

From time to time during recent years, students on this campus have raised questions about the possession and consumption of 3.2 beer in fraternity houses and residence halls and about the dispensing of 3.2 beer in the Ohio Union. Also members of the Faculty Club have repeatedly expressed a desire to have the privilege of being served alcoholic beverages after 5:00 p.m. on week days in the Faculty Club.

During the 1967-68 academic year, formal proposals to permit such possession and consumption have been submitted through the appropriate channels to my office for review and for possible submission to the Board of Trustees. Copies of these proposals have been transmitted to members of the Board for study as they became available and the last proposal, which was developed by our Campus Residence Hall Associations, reached my office early in June. After all proposals were in my hands, I attempted to analyze them as judiciously as I could with the thought in mind of making what I consider to be an appropriate recommendation to this Board.

Regardless of my personal views on this matter (alcoholic beverages are not and will not be served in the President's House), I have a responsibility to respond as thoughtfully and as appropriately as I can and to do so in accordance with what appears to be the most appropriate direction in which this institution might move at this point in time.

First of all, I want to commend the organized student groups that have considered this matter in substantial depth and have developed thoughtful documents in support of their views. A few observations would appear to me to be in order.

The proposal from the fraternity system was considered by the respective units through a local option vote for which there was not unanimous support.

The proposal from the Campus Residence Hall Associations was voted upon by only 49% of the occupants and with only about two-thirds of those voting favoring the right to possess and consume 3. 2 beer in the dormitories.

I. <u>GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS</u> (continued)

A. <u>Recommendations on Possession and</u> Consumption of Alcoholic Beverages (continued)

Both proposals argue the point strongly that, by giving students a right to make their own decisions on this matter, a significant contribution to effective self government would be made. Both proposals ignore the fact that students are assigned to living quarters which means that the institution would introduce into the atmosphere of a single living unit a problem on which there can be an honest difference of opinion among students and their parents. It is true that most of our students are eighteen years of age or older and, under the laws of the State of Ohio, have a right to consume 3.2 beer if they choose to do so. It is not right, in my view, to force a student to live in a setting where the use of 3.2 beer is permitted and which might be repugnant for a variety of reasons to other occupants who must reside there.

The proposal to permit the serving of 3.2 beer in the Ohio Union was supported unanimously by the voting members of the Ohio Union Council who were present when the matter was considered. The Ohio Union Council is made up of students, faculty, alumni and administrators. The sale and distribution of 3.2 beer in the Ohio Union would be limited to restricted areas. Any student enrolled at The Ohio State University, if he chooses to do so, could go to the Ohio Union, buy and consume 3.2 beer in accordance with the requirements of the proposal or he could stay away from that environment if he chooses to do so. In terms of today's social standards, I am unable to find a valid reason for opposing this proposal.

Concerning the proposal to serve alcoholic beverages in the Faculty Club after 5:00 p.m. on week days, I find that considerably more than half of the membership expressed a view through a preference poll of voting members and that three-fourths of those responding favor the proposal. The atmosphere of the Faculty Club in the evenings is little different from the atmosphere of other fine clubs in this community and in others. Membership is limited to members of the faculty and other adults in the community who have met the qualifications for membership over the years and who have been voted into membership by the club members themselves. The people who frequent the Club do so by choice, and I can find no valid reason for imposing a double standard on members of the faculty during the evening hours simply because the Faculty Club happens to be located on the campus. I have, therefore, decided to support this proposal as I would expect to support a similar proposal for the Center for Tomorrow when it opens.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

- A. <u>Recommendations on Possession and</u> <u>Consumption of Alcoholic Beverages</u> (continued)
 - I, therefore, make the following recommendations:
 - (1) That the proposals from the fraternities and the Campus Residence Hall Associations be denied.
 - (2) That the proposal from the Ohio Union to serve 3. 2 beer in restricted areas on the premises be approved.
 - (3) That the proposal from the Faculty Club to serve alcoholic beverages after 5:00 p.m. on week days be approved.

Upon the suggestion of the Chairman, Mr. Bricker, each of the above recommendations were voted upon individually and the actions taken were as follows:

Upon motion of Mr. Dunlap, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees by unanimous roll call vote approved the President's recommendation that the proposals from the fraternities and the Campus Residence Hall Associations relating to the possession and consumption of 3.2 beer be denied.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees by a vote of five to three, with Messrs. Bricker, Ketterer, France, Shocknessy and Dunlap voting affirmatively and Messrs. Jones, Hilliker and Safford voting negatively, approved the President's recommendation that the proposal from the Ohio Union Council to serve 3.2 beer in restricted areas on the premises of the Ohio Union be approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees by a vote of six to two, with Messrs. Bricker, Ketterer, Jones, France, Shocknessy and Dunlap voting affirmatively and Messrs. Hilliker and Safford voting negatively, approved the President's recommendation that the proposal from the Board of Directors of the Faculty Club to serve alcoholic beverages after 5:00 p.m. on week days be approved.

B. <u>Amendments to Rules for the University Faculty</u> (31.07, 31.0701, 31.0705, 35.07, 37.09, 49.03)

The Faculty Council on June 4, 1968, approved the following changes in the <u>Rules for the University</u> Faculty.

President Fawcett recommended therefore that the following <u>Rules for the</u> <u>University Faculty</u> be amended as recorded in Appendix I, page 43, of the minutes of this meeting:

I. <u>GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS</u> (continued)

- B. <u>Amendments to Rules for the University Faculty</u> (31,07, 31.0701, 31.0705, 35.07, 37.09, 49.03) (continued)
 - Rule 31.0701 in item "a" the words <u>National Defense Studies</u> be added before the alternatives listed to meet that requirement.
 - (2) Rules pertaining to marks given for work completed in University courses be modified to include "PA/NP--Pass/ Non-Pass" in all references to marks in Rules 31.0705, 35.07, 37.09 and 49.03.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote, and the Secretary was instructed to make said revisions in the <u>Rules for the University</u> Faculty.

C. Policy Governing Residency Status of Students Enrolled on Branch Campuses

On June 8, 1967, the Board of Trustees adopted a revised policy governing the residency status of students enrolled at The Ohio State University to comply with the section of the Ohio Board of Regents Rule No. 2, which section defines the residency status of students enrolled on the branch campuses and in academic centers of state-assisted institutions. The Ohio Board of Regents at the June 21, 1968 meeting amended the above-referredto Rule to provide immediate residency status to adult students and to minor students whose parents establish residence and are gainfully employed in the State of Ohio. The Rule as previously stated required the student to reside in the State of Ohio for a minimum of twelve consecutive months preceding date of enrollment in branch campus or academic center programs to be considered an Ohio resident.

Therefore, for the purpose of clarification and consistency, President Fawcett recommended that the policies governing residency status for students enrolled in branch campuses and academic centers of The Ohio State University, as adopted on June 8, 1967, be revised to concur in principle with those adopted by the Ohio Board of Regents.

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote.

D. Degrees and Certificates Conferred--Summer Quarter Commencement

President Fawcett recommended that degrees and certificates be conferred at the Summer Quarter Commencement Convocation on August 30, 1968, to those students who have completed the requirements for their respective degrees and certificates and are recommended by the Faculty Council. The names of those awarded degrees and certificates will be included in the minutes of this meeting. (See Appendix II, page 47.)

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

E. Naming of Physics Building

The Cabinet has proposed, in consultation with the Professor and Chairman of the Department of Physics and the Acting Dean of the College of Mathematics and Physical Sciences, that the Physics Laboratory Building, located at 174 West 18th Avenue, be named the "A. W. Smith Laboratory of Physics," in memory of the late Dean Emeritus Alpheus W. Smith. Dr. Smith served as Chairman of the Department of Physics and Astronomy from 1926 to 1946, in addition to carrying responsibility as Dean of the Graduate School for the period 1938-1946. After his retirement, he served as President of The Ohio State University Research Foundation from 1946 to 1957. Upon his retirement, a citation as recorded in the Board of Trustees' minutes reads as follows: "Dean Smith's statesmanship has brought the Graduate School to a position of national and international recognition."

President Fawcett recommended therefore that in accordance with the <u>Bylaws of the Board of Trustees</u> that the above-referred-to building be officially named the "A. W. Smith Laboratory of Physics."

Upon motion of Mr. France, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

II. PERSONNEL CHANGES

In presenting the recommendations for changes in personnel, President Fawcett addressed himself to the importance of achieving some realignment of personnel within the central administrative structure of the University. He stated that as the University continues to grow, the magnitude of administrative responsibility that must be assumed by the central staff increases. He added that it has been his policy to re-examine the administrative structure from time to time and to recommend such modifications as are required to effect efficiency in the management of the administrative concerns of the officers of the University.

The President then made the following statement:

Because of the rapid growth of The Ohio State University and the changes that are taking place constantly in the field of higher education, I wish to propose that certain changes in the structure of the central administrative staff and certain changes in the assignment of personnel be approved. These changes are designed to enable the University to respond more effectively to the particular demands now being placed upon it and to deploy the personnel in an effort to draw upon the greatest strengths of our people. I, therefore, recommend:

II. <u>PERSONNEL CHANGES</u> (continued)

That there be established the new position of Vice President for University Development, effective September 1, 1968, or as soon thereafter as the position can be filled.

That the title of John T. Mount, Vice President for Educational Services, Secretary of the Board of Control of the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center and Secretary of the Board of Trustees, be changed to Vice President for Student Affairs, effective August 1, 1968, at an annual rate of \$29, 568.00.

That Dr. John T. Bonner, Jr., Executive Dean for Student Relations, be named to the position of Vice President for Educational Services, effective August 1, 1968, at an annual salary rate of \$25,488.00.

Upon motion of Mr. Dunlap, seconded by Mr. Safford, the recommendation to establish the position of Vice President for University Development, the appointment of John T. Mount as Vice President for Student Affairs and the appointment of John T. Bonner, Jr. as Vice President for Educational Services were approved by unanimous roll call vote, and that these redefined administrative functions of the Office of University Development, the Office of Educational Services and the Office of Student Affairs be incorporated in the <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u> and <u>By-Laws of the Board of Trustees</u> and be reflected in the next editorial revision of those documents.

In addition to the foregoing personnel recommendations, President Fawcett recommended that all personnel changes since the June 13, 1968 meeting of the Board, as recorded in the official "Salary Roll" of the University, be approved by the Board. These changes included the following additional faculty Appointments, Promotions, Leaves of Absence Without Salary and Emeritus Title:

Lois Ann Lund, Associate Dean of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics and Professor in and Director of the School of Home Economics, and Professor in the Cooperative Extension Service, effective January 1, 1969, at a salary of \$19,140.00 per annum for 85 per cent of full time. Dr. Lund will hold the academic rank of Professor in the Department of Home Economics at the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center for 15 per cent of full time.

Richard L. Cameron, Assistant Dean of the University College, effective August 5, 1968, at a salary of \$14,208.00 per annum.

Should the need for these awards cease to exist or so diminish as to provide unused income, or should the College of Engineering cease to exist, through any reorganization of the University, then the income may be used for any purpose whatsoever as determined by the Board of Trustees, with preference being given to recommendations from the appropriate administrative official of the University who is then directly responsible for engineering education.

Pampiere Wereld Antiquariaat, Amsterdam, has presented a proposal to the Office of Academic Affairs for the purchase of 10,000 selected volumes of Hebraica and Judaica including approximately 30 items of utmost rarity for the sum of \$290,000.00.

On November 9, 1967, the Board of Trustees approved the employment of Holroyd and Myers to prepare preliminary drawings and data required to accompany the University's application for Federal funds with the understanding that if the project proceeded beyond the preliminary stage, their contract would be extended.

Approval of the Federal grant has been received, and President Fawcett recommended therefore that Holroyd and Myers be employed to provide architectural and engineering services for this project including basic drawings, working drawings, specifications, estimates of cost, necessary bidding documents and complete supervision of construction.

The fee for this service shall be based on the standard fee schedule and will be an estimated \$146,300.00 with funds being provided from Item 315-062, H. B. 886, and a Public Health Service Grant.

IX. RESOLUTION IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the death of Harry Clifford Ramsower, Director Emeritus of the Ohio Cooperative Extension Service. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, a copy of the following Resolution expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the family of the deceased.

A. Harry Clifford Ramsower

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death June 16, 1968, of Harry C. Ramsower, Director Emeritus in the Ohio Cooperative Extension Service.

Dr. Ramsower was born January 6, 1880, near Granville, in Licking County, Ohio. He attended the Granville Public Schools and Doane Academy in Granville. He received his Bachelor of Science degree at The Ohio State University in 1906. He became the first Chairman of the Department of Agricultural Engineering at The Ohio State University in 1908 and served in that capacity until 1920, at which time he became Director of the Ohio Cooperative Extension Service. His Master's and Doctor of Philosophy degrees in education were completed at Harvard University in 1925 and 1930, respectively.

IX. <u>RESOLUTION IN MEMORIAM</u> (continued)

A. Harry Clifford Ramsower (continued)

Dr. Ramsower's association with The Ohio State University spanned nearly sixty years--first as a student, then as the first Chairman of the Department of Agricultural Engineering, and for twenty-nine years as Director of the Cooperative Extension Service in Agriculture and Home Economics. While serving as Department Chairman, he wrote a textbook, <u>Equipment</u> for the Farm and Farmstead, widely used in high schools and colleges throughout the country.

While he was charting the course for the development of Cooperative Extension work in Ohio, Dr. Ramsower was carrying his concept of Extension work to the national scene. He exerted wide influence as a member of several national committees of the American Association of Land-Grant Colleges and State Universities, notably those dealing with Extension Organization and Policy, Youth and Postwar Agricultural Policy. After retirement in 1948, he served as a consultant for the Inter-American Institute of Agricultural Sciences, serving in Uruguay, Paraguay, Brazil, Argentina, Chile and Guatemala. In 1956, he was called to Korea to draft legislation for an Extension program for that country.

Dr. Ramsower was a recipient of an honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters by his Alma Mater at the Winter Quarter Commencement in 1962, the centennial year of the signing of the Land-Grant College Act of 1862. Harry C. Ramsower had a love of the land and of the people who draw from it their livelihood and their way of life. From this love, he has created a living contribution that touched every rural home in Ohio and continues to grow in scope and influence and in depth of its significance.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Director Emeritus Ramsower its deep sympathy. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a sincere expression of the Board's realization of the loss which the family has sustained.

B. <u>Report from President Fawcett Concerning the Case of Assistant</u> <u>Professor David E. Green, Department of History</u>

President Fawcett presented the following statement and recommendation concerning the case of Assistant Professor David E. Green:

Dr. David E. Green is an Assistant Professor of History completing his first year of faculty service at The Ohio State University. Upon advice received from students. University staff members. and others, certain allegations concerning Dr. Green's activities on April 5 and 30, 1968, were outlined by Dean Charles Babcock, College of Humanities, and referred to a special faculty hearing committee pursuant to faculty Rule 21.07 (Tenure; Procedure for Termination). This Committee was chaired by Professor Robert Fisher (Mathematics) and its membership included Professor Albert Kuhn (English) and Professor George St. Pierre (Metallurgical Engineering). The functions of the special committee as outlined in Rule 21.07 include to 'make findings of fact (concerning the allegations) and such recommendations as it may deem appropriate' and to 'submit these to the President' who 'shall have the sole right to make final recommendations to the Board of Trustees. 1

I have now received the report of the special committee including both findings of fact and recommendations, have responded to the report with several questions concerning both interpretations of facts and the recommendations, and have received a reply from the committee to my response. Along with the summary report of the committee, I have received and studied eighteen exhibits related to the committee hearings and the complete, verbatim transcript of the hearings.

X. **REPORTS** (continued)

B. <u>Report from President Fawcett Concerning the Case of Assistant</u> <u>Professor David E. Green, Department of History (continued)</u>

Briefly stated, the allegations against Dr. Green involve the destruction of his selective service draft card in a classroom on April 5, 1968, the encouragement of students to emulate his act, the solicitation of funds on the campus for the purpose of providing arms for Negro citizens, involvement in the violation of the University guest speaker rules and procedures in connection with a campus meeting on April 30, 1968, involvement in events which led to an attack on a news photographer during that campus meeting, and the encouragement of students to violate University rules. The committee, in a letter to me dated July 3, 1968, confirms that there is 'some degree of truth' in each of these allegations except for the final one which was not supported by evidence gathered during the hearings.

The committee finds, specifically, that Dr. Green did burn his draft card in a classroom setting on April 5, 1968; did make statements which could reasonably be understood by students to be encouragement to destroy draft cards or to contribute money to arm Negroes; did engage in activities in connection with the April 30, 1968, meeting which were in technical violation of the University guest speaker rules; and did, at least by omission if not by commission, have a part in the creation of the situation which led to an attack upon a news photographer at the meeting of April 30, 1968.

In analyzing its findings, the special committee concludes that Dr. Green has been guilty of 'serious lack of judgment (April 5, 1968),' and 'poor judgment (April 30, 1968).' Upon the basis of the total hearings, the social context of the specific events, the inexperience of Dr. Green, and testimony relating to Dr. Green's competency as a historian and a teacher, the committee finds that the facts as it reviews them do not support a charge of 'grave misconduct' and recommends that Dr. Green be placed on probation in a disciplinary sense in addition to his regular probationary status as a non-tenured faculty member.

While I am sympathetic to and understand the views of the special faculty committee, I cannot share its judgment that the findings as revealed in the hearing transcript do not support a charge of 'grave misconduct.' Mindful of the intent of Rule 21.07 to provide for a faculty determination of fact in a termination case, but equally mindful of the assignment of responsibility by Rule 21.07, I cannot in good conscience submit to you a recommendation which differs with my judgment concerning the findings. Rule 21.07 appears to me to contain a major internal inconsistency in that it does mandate the division of fact-finding from final recommendation. The rule undoubtedly requires further amendment to clarify the procedures it seeks to outline. But Rule 21.07 as it now exists is the Rule which I must follow.

X. REPORTS (continued)

B. <u>Report from President Fawcett Concerning the Case of Assistant</u> <u>Professor David E. Green, Department of History (continued)</u>

Accordingly, I do find that the facts as gathered by a special faculty committee pursuant to Rule 21.07 and as amplified in correspondence between me and the committee do support the charge that Dr. David E. Green has been guilty of grave misconduct and I do, therefore, recommend that his services at The Ohio State University be terminated effective, as required by Rule 21.07, after one year's notice of this decision except if otherwise ordered by the Board of Trustees. In making this recommendation, I have given due weight to the recommendations of the special faculty committee, but have concentrated my analysis upon the findings of fact presented by the committee rather than upon the committee recommendation. I see no other alternative given the requirements of the Rule under which this case has been pursued.

Mr. Jones responded that he was confident that other members of the Board of Trustees concurred with him in the full disagreement with the recommendations of the Faculty Committee and that they agreed with President Fawcett in his conclusion and recommendation; however, in order to keep faith with the citizens of Ohio he moved that David E. Green be discharged, effective immediately.

Mr. Hilliker in seconding the motion stated that, "I personally see the conduct of David E. Green nothing less than disgraceful. In my judgment, this motion is long past due and I therefore strongly second the motion."

Upon roll call vote, the Board unanimously approved the above motion as presented by Mr. Jones.

C. <u>Report on Fire in Lincoln Tower</u>

President Fawcett made the following report:

I had hoped this morning to be able to present to you the report from the National Fire Protection Association on the fire in Lincoln Tower. Because of the volume of work that has faced the Association in recent weeks, we are advised that the report will not be finished before the end of this week and probably will not be in our hands until sometime next week. In the meantime, it should be noted that in accord with the suggestions of the State Fire Marshal, the University is proceeding to install sprinklers in the living rooms of the separate suites of the Tower. The installation, I am advised, will be completed before the beginning of the Autumn Quarter.

X. <u>REPORTS</u> (continued)

C. <u>Report on Fire in Lincoln Tower</u> (continued)

As an interesting sidelight, I should report to you that about thirteen hundred delegates were here a couple of weeks ago to attend the Annual Meeting of the American Dairy Science Association. Delegates and their families were housed in the Towers and these people, from nearly every state in the Union, were high in their praise of the accommodations. Men, women and children lived in the Towers during the Conference. Our people in Dairy Science and Dairy Technology have advised me that the delegates left the Conference with the feeling that they had occupied the finest housing that has ever been made available to them during their National Conferences.

D. Report on University Hall

President Fawcett presented the following report:

The University Hall has been secured as far as the north wing is concerned with the only use thereof being an access route to the fire escape at the north end of the building. The fire escapes on the building have been stiffened with steel supports.

C. Curtiss Inscho & Associates are now studying the program of requirements for University Hall. While there are no sketches available at the moment, renderings will be ready for the Board of Trustees at the September meeting together with preliminary layouts.

It is expected that Inscho & Associates will examine the possibility of using modified Georgian architecture for this facility.

E. <u>President Fawcett's Report on Disciplinary Action Taken</u> <u>Against Students Who Participated in the April 26, 1968</u> "Lock-in" in the Administration Building

President Fawcett reported that University disciplinary action has been taken against eight Ohio State University students identified as having participated in the April 26 "lock-in" of the Administration Building. Two of the students already had been dismissed for academic failure and two had withdrawn from the University. The records of these four students have been tagged to prevent their readmission to the University without special permission of the chief student personnel officer. The other four students have been dismissed from the University. Two of these remaining four already were on academic probation. Of the remaining twenty-six students alleged to have participated in the "lock-in," ten have been dismissed for academic reasons and five have withdrawn from the University. The records of these students have been tagged. In accordance with long established University policy, names of students involved in disciplinary actions are never released.

President Fawcett then reported that it was his understanding that the special committee (consisting of the attorney members of the Board of Trustees--Messrs. Bricker, Ketterer and Shocknessy), who were appointed at the special meeting of the Board on April 30, 1968, is prepared to report.

Mr. Shocknessy, speaking on behalf of the Committee, stated that the Committee had met and had given careful consideration to those Rules which were submitted by President Fawcett at the time of the special meeting of the Board on April 30, 1968, and had made a few textual changes which are not substantive in nature. Mr. Shocknessy then moved that pursuant to Section 3345.21 of the Revised Code of Ohio, as adopted by the 107th General Assembly, that the following Rules be added to the <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u>. He stated further that it is the Board's understanding that the said Rules as submitted to the Board were discussed at a special meeting of the Faculty Council held on Tuesday, April 30, 1968, at which time they were approved by unanimous vote of the members present.

51.03. Rule on Group Disruption.

Section 1. No student shall, by joining with one or more persons, enter or remain in any building or facility or upon any land of the University where not authorized or where not legally in or upon same or though authorized or legally in or upon same and after being notified to depart therefrom by a University official in charge thereof, faculty member, uniformed police officer or any person delegated such authority by the Board of Trustees or the President of the University.

Section 2. No student shall, by joining with one or more persons, commit or make preparation for or movement toward or continue in the performance of an act which is intended to disrupt any authorized program, operation or function of the University, after having been advised by a University official or faculty member in charge of such program, operation or function, uniformed police officer or any person delegated such authority by the Board of Trustees or the President of the University that such act is in disruption of such authorized program, operation or function.

Section 3. No student shall, by joining with one or more persons, detain, hold, intimidate, injure or threaten to injure or coerce by bodily harm any persons lawfully within any buildings, facilities or upon lands of the University, or any University officer or faculty or staff member in the pursuit of his University duties, or to seize, hold, commandeer, damage or threaten to do damage to such buildings, facilities or lands.

51.03. Rule on Group Disruption. (continued)

Section 4. Any student who violates any section or sections of Rules 51.03 and 51.05 shall, upon being found guilty after hearing by the appropriate committee, be suspended from the University for not less than one academic quarter but such penalty may include expulsion with or without criminal prosecution in municipal, state or federal courts.

Section 5. University police officers are authorized to enforce the By-Laws and Rules of the University as authorized by Section 3345.04 and Section 3345.21 of the Ohio Revised Code and to eject or to arrest, detain, and bring before the appropriate committee, official or tribunal of the University any student upon view or information alleged to be in violation of University Rules.

Nothing in the foregoing shall prohibit police officers or other University personnel from bringing appropriate civil or criminal actions.

51.05. Rule on Individual Disruption.

Any individual student who is found to have been engaged in disruptive acts enumerated in Rule 51.03 by the University Committee on Discipline shall be subject to penalty including expulsion as may be determined by the University authority or authorities who are authorized by the Board of Trustees to impose discipline, with or without prosecution in the civil court.

29.2725. University Committee on Discipline.

Section 1. The standing University Committee on Discipline shall be composed of six members appointed by the President for terms of three years each, two retiring each year, four of whom shall be members of the University faculty, one of whom shall be a University administrator and one of whom shall be a student.

Section 2. Such Committee shall hear on first appeal student discipline cases where an appeal is taken either by the appropriate University official or by any student from any disciplinary action by his College, University Committee or other properly authorized University adjudicatory body, only of those cases where the penalty originally assessed was suspension, dismissal or expulsion; and such Committee shall have original jurisdiction to hear cases of alleged student

violation of the Rules 51.03 and 51.05 brought before it by any University police officer, or University employee or officer or any member of the faculty, and shall determine whether such rules have been violated.

Section 3. The Committee shall have authority to order, upon a temporary hearing, forthwith and immediate suspension of a student pending a full hearing upon the merits under the Rules of 51.03 and 51.05 and shall enact such procedural rules as it deems appropriate, but all such hearings upon the merit shall be conducted pursuant to procedural rules requiring notice to the student of charges against him and affording him opportunity to present witnesses, evidence and testimony and to have representation.

Mr. Ketterer seconded the motion which was approved by unanimous roll call vote of the Board of Trustees.

G. Summer Enrollment Report

President Fawcett reported that the University enrollment for the current Summer Quarter is expected to reach an all-time summer high of 15, 360. The estimate represents an increase of more than 1,000 over last summer's total of 14, 351. According to the report from Vice President John T. Mount, approximately one-third of the enrollment (some 5, 300), will be at the graduate level, an increase of 150 over 1967 figures in this category. The President further reported that according to information from Mr. Mount there will be 24, 927 persons scheduled to come to the campus during the Summer Quarter to participate in workshops, symposia and various other continuing education programs.

H. Report on the University's Investment Portfolio

The report dated July 10, 1968, as submitted to the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees by Vice President Gordon B. Carson pertaining to the University's Investment Portfolio, was received and ordered to be filed with the official records of the Board of Trustees.

APPENDIX I

Amendments to Rules for the University Faculty

as Approved by the Faculty Council on June 4, 1968

Adopted by Board of Trustees July 11, 1968 (See page 4) Page 44 Blank

Rules for the University Faculty

On June 4, 1968, the Faculty Council approved the following changes in the <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u> as a substitution for the text printed in the January, 1968 edition of the <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u>. The changes are as underscored:

31.07. University Required Courses (See Rule 49.03)

31.0701. Men Students.

All undergraduate men students, unless excused under Rule 31.0705, shall be required to schedule and to complete:

- a. <u>National Defense Studies</u>. (1) Two hours of Military or Air Science (or three hours of Naval Science) each quarter until a total of twelve (Naval Science, eighteen) credit hours has been earned; or (2) a grouping of academic courses prescribed by the College in which the student is registered, which courses shall be in addition to all College requirements;
- b. One or more hours of Physical Education per quarter for a total of three quarters; and
- c. During one of his first three quarters at the University and thereafter if necessary, one hour of Health Education until one credit hour has been earned.

31.0705. Marks for and Excuses from University Required Courses.

Section 3. These required courses, for both men and women, may be taken either on a Pass/Non-Pass or on a graded basis.

35.07. Academic Marks.

The official marks of the University are as follows: A, B, C, D, E, H, I, P, R, S, T, X, PA/NP, EM, and K. (A definition of all marks shall remain as printed in the January, 1968 edition with the exception of the addition of PA/NP--Pass/Non-Pass and these marks shall have the following meaning.)

PA/NP--Pass/Non-Pass.

This grading pattern may be chosen for

- (a) any or all of the University required courses (31.0701, 31.0703) of Physical Education, Health Education, and National Defense Studies.
- (b) an additional maximum of 15 hours of work.

The 15 hours noted in "b" above is confined to undergraduate students enrolled in a degree-granting college, who have an accumulated point-hour ratio of 2.0 or higher. In addition, courses required or specified as required electives in the curriculum leading to the degree for which a student is a candidate may not be taken on a Pass/Non-Pass basis.

Rules for the University Faculty (continued)

35.07. Academic Marks. (continued)

Hours graded PA or Pass count towards the degree, and PA/NP or Pass/Non-Pass are not computed in the point-hour average of the student. After an instructor is notified of the Pass/Non-Pass decision he will submit PA or NP to the Registrar, consistent with that decision, in the case of each student making the election. University and College rules for adding and deleting courses apply to courses elected on a Pass/Non-Pass basis. For the purpose only of calculating final standing in a course, the grade Non-Pass is the equivalent of the grade E and the grade Pass of the grades ABCD.

37.09. Repetition of Courses.

Section 1. A student who has received a mark of E or <u>Non-Pass</u> in a required course at this University may repeat the course for credit only as provided in Rule 37.07. A student who has received a mark of E or <u>Non-Pass</u> in any other course at this University may repeat the course for credit at his option.

Section 3. An undergraduate or professional student as defined in Rule 41.03, who has received a mark of A, B, C, <u>or Pass</u> in a course taken at this University or elsewhere may repeat the course only as an auditor, upon receipt of permission by the Chairman of the Department or Director of the School and the Dean of his College. A graduate student, as defined in Rule 41.03, may, after a period of five years, and when approval is given by the Graduate Committee of his Department and the Dean of the School, repeat for credit a course in which he has received a mark of A, B, or C.

49.03. Requirements for an Undergraduate Degree.

d. Have satisfactorily completed the number of credit hours required for the curriculum he is pursuing. The minimum number of credit hours required under Rules 31.0701 and 31.0703; however, excuses granted under Rule 31.0705 shall not reduce the stated minimum number of credit hours required in the curriculum for a degree or a certificate. Credit hours are considered as "satisfactorily completed" only if the student has received, at this University, the mark A, B, C, D, EM, K, S, or PA in those hours (see Rule 35.07).

This quote from an Ohio State Lantern editorial reflects the attitude which guided Christine Y. Conaway in her twenty-three years as Dean of Women. During her tenure, Mrs. Conaway was recognized nationally as a leader in the field of student personnel administration. She served as president of the National Conference on College Fraternities and Sororities, vice president of the National Association of Women Deans and Counselors, and member of the executive committees of the American College Personnel Association and of Alpha Lambda Delta.

Mrs. Conaway received her Bachelor's degree from Ohio State in 1923 and her Master's degree in 1942. She was awarded the honorary degree, Doctor of Humane Letters, from Otterbein College in 1957. As an undergraduate, she was president of the Women's Self Government Association and of her sorority, Pi Beta Phi, and was also a member of Mortar Board.

As Dean of Women, Mrs. Conaway was in daily contact with individual women, responding to their interest and needs in the areas of housing, sororities, honor societies, and organizations. She excelled in the individual and group counseling of women, her primary area of responsibility, and was devoted to the challenge of helping young women develop the capacity for self-government and grow steadily toward mature womanhood.

Indicative of her civic and professional involvement is her favorite quotation by Kahil Gibran, "You give but little when you give of your possessions. It is when you give of yourself that you truly give."

Jacob E. Davis served with great distinction from 1961 to 1967 as a member and chairman of the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University. His impressive qualifications for trustee service included scholarship, as Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Ohio State and law graduate of Harvard; public service, as judge, representative to the Ohio General Assembly and the U. S. Congress, and official of the Navy Department; corporate expertise, as an executive—now president—of the Kroger Company; and civic leadership, as the generating force behind a variety of good works in Cinicnnati, his home community.

Mylin H. Ross, Ohio State's second Dean of Men, served his alma mater for twenty years, fifteen as Dean of Men. A man of sterling character and integrity, Dean Ross exemplified unselfish service and a dedicated concern for the young men who came to this University.

Over the years, students references to Dean Ross were ones of friendship, loyalty, and respect, as well they should have been. He was "in tune" with each student generation, aware of its needs and concerns, and ever willing to work with students in building a stronger, richer campus experience. He reveled in their joys and shared in their troubles. His patience, understanding, and fairness won the admiration of students, faculty, and fellow deans.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Renaming of Buildings

With the concurrence of the President's Cabinet, President Fawcett recommended that the following two buildings be renamed as indicated below:

- The building located at 190 West 19th Avenue now identified as the Industrial Engineering Building be renamed the "Welding Engineering Laboratories." Dean Harold A. Bolz of the College of Engineering reports that the Department of Welding Engineering will occupy 85 percent of the building and that the Department of Welding Engineering is most anxious to have its name identified with this building. The Welding Engineering curriculum has world-wide recognition and is now in the tenth year of full accreditation by the Engineers Council for Professional Development.
- 2. The building located at 174 East 18th Avenue be named the "Alpheus Smith Laboratory of Physics" rather than the "A. W. Smith Laboratory of Physics." The Department of Physics has reported that the use of "A. W. Smith" presents some ambiguity, since there have been two other widely known physicists, contemporaries of Alpheus Smith, to whom this designation might apply: Professor Alva W. Smith of The Ohio State University and Professor Arthur W. Smith of the University of Michigan. Additionally, on this campus Dean Smith for whom the building was named was known as "Alpheus Smith" rather than "A. W. Smith."

This recommendation is in accordance with the <u>By-Laws of the Board of</u> <u>Trustees</u>.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Jones, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

B. <u>Transfer of University Funds Held as "Irreducible Debt of</u> the State of Ohio" to the University Investment Portfolio

On August 29, 1968, the Auditor of State transmitted to the University a check in the amount of \$4,764,460.28, closing out the Irreducible Debt of the State of Ohio, pursuant to constitutional changes voted by the people of Ohio on May 7, 1968, and parallel Federal Legislation (Public Law 90-304) passed by the Congress of the United States on May 13, 1968.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

B. Transfer of University Funds Held as "Irreducible Debt of the State of Ohio" to the University Investment Portfolio (continued)

These funds represented the original Land-Grant Endowment of \$524, 176. 50, the Virginia Military Lands Endowment in the amount of \$228, 329.00 and the Henry Folsom Page bequest in the amount of \$217, 494. 50 for a total of \$970,000.00 of general endowment. Gifts and grants, numbering 251 separate accounts received by the University through the intervening years, made up the balance of funds thus received.

President Fawcett recommended therefore that the monies formerly deposited in the Irreducible Debt of the State of Ohio be added to the University's Investment Portfolio and invested in accordance with the rules and regulations established by the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the recommendation that the monies formerly deposited in the Irreducible Debt of the State of Ohio be added to the University's Investment Portfolio by unanimous roll call vote.

C. Change of Trustee, The Ohio Legal Center

Dean Ivan C. Rutledge and Professors Robert J. Nordstrom and Ervin H. Pollack are currently serving as Trustees of The Ohio Legal Center representing The Ohio State University until such time as "they resign or their successors are designated by this Board." The Code of Corporate Regulations of The Ohio Legal Center stipulates that the Trustees representing The Ohio State University must be the Dean and two members of the faculty of the College of Law.

Since Professor Robert Nordstrom will be on leave during the academic year 1968-69 to teach at Duke University, he will be unable to continue his service as a Trustee.

Therefore, President Fawcett recommended that Professor Leo J. Raskind be designated a Trustee of The Ohio Legal Center to succeed Professor Nordstrom, effective immediately.

Upon motion of Mr. Dunlap, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

Dear Senator Bricker:

This letter is written to confirm my desire to devote my full, professional attention and energy to the significantly increased volume of responsibilities growing out of the demands to effectively execute the position of Vice President for Student Affairs as defined by President Fawcett and approved by the Board of Trustees at its July 11, 1968, meeting. I am confident that the Board of Trustees will agree that it is no small task to achieve the objectives of (1) developing sound and effective policies and programs which reflect the true needs and interests of the more than 44,000 students; (2) achieving rapid and definitive communication with students, faculty, administrators, alumni, and parents in these crucial days of student unrest; and (3) providing for sound and responsible management of the fiscal and human resources of the nine administrative areas reporting through the Office of the Vice President for Student Affairs, including twenty-seven residence halls for more than 12,000 students.

Therefore, in view of the magnitude of the above-described administrative responsibility, I believe it to be in the best interest of the University that I be relieved of the office Secretary of the Board of Trustees, effective whenever the Board of Trustees and the President are agreed upon a successor.

The experience of serving The Ohio State University since May 9, 1958, as the custodian of and responsibility for the official books and records of the University has been a rewarding experience indeed. You will recall that it was in the early days of my tenure as Secretary of the Board of Trustees that the publication which includes the Bylaws of the Board and the Rules for the University Faculty was recodified. This project among many others initiated through the leadership of President Fawcett has drawn nationwide attention to the work of the governing board of Ohio State.

The income is to be used annually to provide one or more scholarships or fellowships to students recommended by the Dean of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics and selected by the University Scholarship and Loan Committee.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

A. Power of Attorney - Customs

President Fawcett recommended that the action taken by the Board of Trustees on November 15, 1963, relative to the Power of Attorney - Customs, be rescinded and the following recommendation for authorization be approved:

That Gordon B. Carson, Vice President for Business and Finance; Ernest W. Leggett, Assistant Vice President; and Joseph F. Medley, Business Manager, The Ohio State University, or any one of them, be and hereby are authorized and empowered to transact any and all business The Ohio State University may have with any Custom House in the United States of America, to make declarations to entries of merchandise imported by said University, to endorse bills of lading and to sign all bonds in the name of said University as required by law or the regulations of the Collector of Customs or Treasury Department; to secure the duties on importations made by said University; and also in the name of said University to execute and deliver any and all bonds of indemnity to the Collector of Customs for the production of endorsed bills of lading, and that a copy of this resolution be sealed with the seal of said University.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Jones, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

B. River Union and Drama Facilities, Employment of Architects

On September 14, 1965, the Board of Trustees approved the employment of Tibbals, Crumley and Musson as architects for the Humanities Center -Little Theater project. Since this project has now been combined with the River Union, their original contract should be cancelled and a new contract given for the project River Union and Drama Facilities.

President Fawcett therefore recommended that the original contract be cancelled and that the architectural firm of Tibbals, Crumley and Musson, Columbus, Ohio, be employed to act as critic in preliminary stage and basic drawing stage; to prepare basic drawings for Mechanical, Plumbing, Electrical and Structural work; to prepare working drawings and specifications for all work, cost estimates, secure approval of documents from all Ohio State University Departments and the State of Ohio, and assist in securing bids and awarding contracts; to provide four (4) inspection trips each of Mechanical and Electrical Engineers during construction; check all shop drawings; assist in selection of materials, colors and other items; and assist in resolving or correcting any construction problems during construction. All work will be done in conjunction with other services provided by the University Architect's Office.

The fee for this work will be based on the standard fee calculation less the amount to be paid to the University Architect or an estimated \$122,147.00. Funds for this project will be provided from Item 315-045 River Union and Drama Facilities, H. B. 886, and from a Federal grant.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

C. Kenny Road Easement, Franklin County

On April 11, 1968, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University authorized the granting of a roadway easement to Franklin County to effect the widening of Kenny Road.

Additional negotiations between Franklin County and The Ohio State University have resulted in a reduction in the amount of land required for the widening of Kenny Road. This permits the University to retain additional space between its buildings and the improved Kenny Road. The original offer was for \$19,740.00 for 0.627 acres. The final plans require 0.455 acres and Franklin County has offered \$14,885.00 as compensation for the lands owned by the Board of Trustees needed for the right-of-way.

President Fawcett recommended that the sum of \$14,885.00 be accepted as just compensation for the land needed for the right-of-way.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

D. Electric Line Easement - Chio Power Company - Newark Campus

The Ohio Power Company has requested an electric line easement on State of Ohio lands that have been designated for the use of The Ohio State University, Newark Campus. The electric line will provide electricity to the Newark Campus.

President Fawcett recommended that an electric line easement be granted to the Ohio Power Company and that the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to request the Director of Public Works, pursuant to his statutory duties, to act on behalf of the University in developing the necessary legal instruments to provide electric service to the Newark Campus.

Upon motion of Mr. Dunlap, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

E. Gas Line Easement - Columbia Gas of Ohio - University College

The Columbia Gas of Ohio has requested a gas line easement on State of Ohio lands that have been designated as a part of the west campus complex. The gas line will provide natural gas to the University College.

President Fawcett recommended that a gas line easement be granted to Columbia Gas of Ohio, Inc. It was further recommended that the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to request the Director of Public Works, pursuant to his statutory duties, to act on behalf of the University in developing the necessary legal instruments to provide gas service to the University College.

Upon motion of Mr. Dunlap, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

F. Lease - Tommy's Pizza, Inc.

Tommy's Pizza, Inc., 1350 West Lane Avenue, Columbus, Ohio, has requested a lease of approximately 0.4 acres for use as a parking lot to the rear of the above address.

The Campus Master Plan has the land assigned as a clear zone to protect the transmission from WOSU-TV. The projected use of this land as a parking lot is compatible with the uses and needs of the University and will not interfere with the programming or transmission from WOSU-TV. The lease rental will be \$100 per month for a ten-year period renewable for a fiveyear period and subject to cancellation by the University after five years.

President Fawcett therefore recommended that a lease be negotiated with Tommy's Pizza, Inc. It was further recommended that the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to request the Director of Public Works pursuant to his statutory duties to act on behalf of the University to develop the necessary legal documents to provide for the lease to Tommy's Pizza, Inc.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

G. Parking Lot Rate Increase - Visitor Lots and Garages

Parking rates for pay parking areas have not been increased since September 1, 1965. To partially offset increased salary and operating expenses and to avoid an increase in faculty, staff and student parking permit cost, a modest increase in rates for pay lots and garages is required.

Additional revenue anticipated from parking meters and increased hospital pay lot patronage will absorb the balance of the additional expense increase.

President Fawcett, therefore, recommended that the following increase in parking rates for visitor lots and garages as approved by the Commission on Traffic and Parking be made effective as of September 16, 1968.

H. Health Laboratory Facility - Land Conveyance

The Ohio State University has been advised that the State of Ohio, through its Department of Public Works, proposes construction of a Health Laboratory Facility to be located within the general campus area of the University.

It has been requested through the Board of Regents and the Department of Finance, that there be perfected in the State of Ohio (as separate from campus land) a fee simple title to the land hereinafter described upon which the facility will be constructed.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees approve the conveyance or other titling of land in the name of the State of Ohio, in accordance with a survey and description in process of preparation describing the land required by the State of Ohio and to be agreed to by the State of Ohio and The Ohio State University.

Location of the State Health Laboratory is shown as Building #106 on the map identified as "Master Plan for the Health Sciences Complex, The Ohio State University," dated April 4, 1968, which is on file with the official records of the Board of Trustees. The building, which covers an area of approximately 140' by 200', is located generally at the northwest corner of West Eighth Avenue and Perry Street.

The supervision and control of such land shall thereafter pass from the Board of Trustees to an appropriate department of State government. The President and Vice President for Business and Finance were further directed to do all things necessary to carry out the purpose expressed in this resolution, including entering into an agreement with an appropriate agency of State government if necessary, embodying matters contained in this resolution together with an appropriate reverter of supervision and control of the land and facility in the event of nonuse by such agency of the State of Ohio and containing other matters mutually agreed upon as well as ingress and egress to the property. This agreement shall also contain the necessary arrangements for utilities, care and custody of lands and buildings and reimbursement to The Ohio State University for services rendered to the State of Ohio, Health Laboratory Facility.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

I. <u>Highway Research Laboratory - Disposition of Building Structures</u>

The Highway Research Laboratory at East Liberty, Ohio, will eventually consist of seventy-seven separate parcels constituting approximately 5,500 acres of land, seventy-five residences, and other outbuildings and structures. A number of the residences, outbuildings, and structures are in excellent condition and located so as to constitute a definite advantage to the Highway Research Laboratory. The remainder of the residences, outbuildings, and structures are either unfit for habitation or use, or are located in areas of future construction. They constitute a serious threat to the community from the standpoint of vandalism, safety, and general appearance, and impair the orderly development of the facility.

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees authorize the College of Engineering, Engineering Experiment Station, to undertake the necessary arrangements for the eventual disposition of undesirable residences, outbuilding, and structures when they become unnecessary for the requirements of the Highway Research Laboratory. Disposition of the above will be accomplished by agreement with the Office of Business and Finance.

X. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of William Robert Jones, Professor of Classics in the Department of Classics; Louis Henry Burgwald, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Dairy Technology; and John A. Ramseyer, Professor of Education in the College of Education. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

A. William Robert Jones

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on August 6, 1968, of William Robert Jones, Professor of Classics.

Professor Jones was born in Lawrenceville, Illinois, July 8, 1917, and was graduated from Lawrenceville Township High School in 1933. His undergraduate work at the University of Illinois was highly distinguished, and he was elected to many honorary societies including Phi Beta Kappa and the all-University honorary, Phi Kappa Phi. He was graduated with high honors in Classics in 1937 and was awarded a University Scholarship for 1938-1939 and a University Fellowship for the two following years. He earned his A. M. in 1938 and his Ph. D. degree in 1940 with a brilliant dissertation on the MSS of Avianus.

In 1940 he came to The Ohio State University as an Instructor in Classics, and was promoted to Assistant Professor in 1945, Associate Professor in 1952, and Professor in 1965. During 1951-52 he received a Faculty Study Fellowship from the American Council of Learned Societies for studies in the field of modern Greek folk music. The year 1957-1958 he spent in Australia on a Fulbright grant as a lecturer at the University of Melbourne.

Professor Jones was recognized as an expert on Avianus and the ancient and medieval fable; he was at work at the time of his death preparing an extensive series of essays entitled <u>Avianus in the Middle Ages</u>. He was highly respected for the breadth of his interests and the precision of his knowledge in almost all the numerous branches of classical studies and

modern literature, particularly, English and German; in drama, both ancient and modern; and in music, in which he was a gifted performer on the piano and organ.

During the critical years of the war he assisted the German Department by teaching a course in German and later supervised students in classical drama with the English Department, acting as consultant to the theater division in the production of ancient dramas. He had a firm command of modern Greek, in which he was the official translater of letters and the official examiner of candidates for Fulbright scholarships.

Professor Jones was extraordinarily active in all phases of work relating to the classics. He was a consultant on etymology for the third edition of <u>Webster's New International Dictionary</u> (published in 1961) for which he revised the etymologies of more than five thousand words of classical origin. It was he who coined the name Xerox in response to a request from Battelle Memorial Institute.

Dr. Jones was active in classical societies--local, state, regional and national. He had made a most noteworthy contribution to the cause of classics by serving, since 1961, as the editor of the <u>Classical Journal</u>, published by the Classical Association of the Midwest and South and described in Professor Katz's selection guide for libraries as: "Outstanding general periodical in the field of the classics." This demanding task he performed so well that he was commended by the Executive Committee of the Association for "Broad and discriminating scholarship . . . Common sense and practical knowledge . . Devoted and untiring labor . . . Congenial relations with departmental editors, contributors and members of our Executive Committee."

Professor Jones' memory will always be cherished by all those who had come to know him for his brilliant mind, his extraordinary range of learning and his unending kindness. His official list of services on University committees, to classical organizations, to the clubs of which he was a member and to his church is a very long one indeed. A superb teacher, he was widely loved. His students knew that they and their interests were first in his thoughts. He was one of the busiest members of the faculty, but he always had time for undergraduate and graduate students, colleagues or friends who needed his assistance or his advice. Not as a part but in addition to his teaching assignments he gave a regular series of readings from classical authors over WOSU.

It was characteristic of Professor Jones' complete selflessness that at the time of his death, although off duty, he helped direct the graduate students, arrange for master's and doctoral examinations and patiently read and corrected theses, dissertations and contributions to the <u>Classical Journal</u>. His department and this University have suffered an irreparable loss by his untimely death.

On behalf of the University at large, the Board of Trustees expresses to his relatives and friends its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in their loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees.

B. Louis Henry Burgwald

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death August 16, 1968, of Louis H. Burgwald, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Dairy Technology.

Professor Burgwald was born February 28, 1892, in Cleveland. He attended the Lakewood High School and entered The Ohio State University in 1910 where he received the Bachelor of Science degree in 1914. He was awarded the Master of Science degree from the University of Wisconsin in 1932.

Following graduation from The Ohio State University, Professor Burgwald spent three years in the industrial field as a chemist and operations supervisor and then served for eleven years as a specialist with the United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. In 1929, he returned to The Ohio State University as a staff member in the Department of Dairy Technology where he performed with distinction for twenty-five years until his retirement in 1954. Thereafter, he joined the Foreign Agricultural Service of the United States Department of Agriculture serving for eight years as a dairy products marketing consultant until mandatory retirement in 1962 relieved him of fulltime responsibilities. During this period, he traveled to thirty-seven countries where he was responsible for planning, formulating and coordinating marketing projects concerned with the effective distribution and utilization of dairy foods. Until 1968, he continued a part-time relationship with the United States Department of Agriculture as a consultant to the Flavor Evaluation Group of the Eastern Utilization Research and Development Division, Washington, D. C.

Professor Burgwald joined the Department of Dairy Technology in its infancy and his consecrated efforts in teaching, research and industry relations were immeasurably responsible for its subsequent development and reputation. In his years of dedicated teaching and warm and personal counseling, he touched the hearts and stimulated the minds of his students by imparting to them the basic principles and philosophies required for excellence in their professional and personal lives. Many distinguished graduates attribute their success directly to Professor Burgwald's influence. The affection and esteem with which he was held by the alumni was expressed eloquently by their gifts and personal testimonials at a special program they arranged in his honor at the time of his retirement from the University.

Professor Burgwald's research brought distinction to himself and to the University. His research contribution resulted in the publication of fortytwo scientific papers. He gained eminence as an authority on dairy microbiology and his technical advice was sought continuously by governmental agencies, consulting organizations and industrial concerns.

B. Louis Henry Burgwald (continued)

Throughout his career, Professor Burgwald was dedicated to the improvement, development, utilization and marketing of dairy products--and gave of his talents and energy unselfishly in furthering the welfare of the dairy industry. Through his efforts as a staff member of the University, he bridged the gap between the academic and industrial communities and created a strong allegiance of leading Ohio dairy executives for the University--an essential relationship which still prevails today. He helped to form the Dairy Technology Societies of Ohio, served as a Director of the Columbus Milk Council and in recent years was Superintendent of the Collegiate Students' International Dairy Products Judging Contest. In 1965, he was awarded the Distinguished Science Award of the American Dairy Science Association for his contributions to the dairy industry.

Throughout his life, Professor Burgwald possessed a loyalty for The Ohio State University exhibited by few persons and had a deep and abiding faith in its destiny. The words of "Carmen Ohio" held a meaningful and personal significance for him.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Professor Emeritus Burgwald its deep sympathy. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a sincere expression of the Board's realization of the loss which the family has sustained.

C. John A. Ramseyer

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death August 20, 1968, of John A. Ramseyer, Professor in the College of Education.

John Ramseyer was born April 13, 1908, in Hudson, Illinois. He received his B.A. degree from Bluffton College in 1929, his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from The Ohio State University in 1934 and 1948 respectively.

Dr. Ramseyer began his teaching in the field of mathematics and science at Sulphur Springs, Genoa and Dover, Ohio, high schools. For a time after completing his degree at Bluffton College, he was an Instructor in Mathematics and Field Secretary there. He joined The Ohio State University staff in 1938 as an Assistant at University School where he later became an Instructor in 1939, Acting Director in 1944 and Director from 1948 until 1951. In 1951, Professor Ramseyer was named as Director of the School-Community Development Study supported through a grant from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation. In 1955, he was instrumental in the development of the University Council for Educational Administration and was appointed to the Board of Trustees of that group. Mr. Ramseyer helped incorporate the Council and establish its offices on The Ohio State University campus.

C. John A. Ramseyer (continued)

From 1951 through 1968, Dr. Ramseyer served as a Professor of Educational Administration in the College of Education. In 1964, he was invited to serve as Chairman of the College of Education Planning Committee for the formation of a new School of Education. On July 1, 1965, he became Director of the School of Education and served in that capacity until January 1, 1968. From 1959 through 1962, he served on the President's University Planning Committee and through the years was active on several significant University-wide committees.

In addition to his teaching at The Ohio State University, he served as Visiting Professor during summer sessions at the University of Virginia, Emery University, University of North Carolina, Washington State University, University of Hawaii and Miami University of Ohio. He worked as a consultant to school districts and professional associations throughout the country. He lectured at many universities in the United States and Canada. He was a speaker at State, Regional and National meetings of the National Educational Association, the National Association of Secondary School Principals, the National Department of Elementary School Principals, the County Superintendent's Association, the American Association of School Administrators, the University Council for Educational Administration Annual Meetings, the National Conference of Professors of Educational Administration and the Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development.

Mr. Ramseyer's leadership was respected within The Ohio State University, the State of Ohio, the nation and the world. He was called on frequently for service to national organizations such as the University Council for Educational Administration. He served as a member of the Committee for the Advancement of Educational Administration of the American Association of School Administrators and was a special consultant to that Committee for a number of months.

During his extraordinarily busy career, Professor Ramseyer produced a large number of journal articles as well as books, monographs, school surveys and other written documents. His books, often co-authored with other leading authorities in the field of school administration, have been widely used in instructional programs for the preparation of educational administrators.

John A. Ramseyer was loved, respected and admired by his students, his colleagues across the land and school personnel everywhere. He was called upon frequently to visit with school board members and local school administrators about their problems. His depth of understanding about schools, communities, teaching and administering was valued by school people and laymen alike. He was able to view complex matters with dispassion and to sort out the salient issues. His convictions about the worth of an individual and the worth of education to the individual were the most prominent values in his scale of things that were important. It was these criteria that became so controlling in his judgment and so respected by those who sought out his judgment.

The reports dated August 20, 1968 and September 11, 1968, as submitted to the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees by Vice President Gordon B. Carson pertaining to the Investment Portfolio, were received and ordered to be filed with the official records of the Board of Trustees.

2. Appropriations for University Administrative Officials

Mr. Jones moved that the amounts to be appropriated from the unrestricted interest on endowment funds in the University Treasury to certain principal administrative officers of the University for the purpose of carrying out their administrative responsibilities during the fiscal year 1968-69 be on the same basis as the appropriations for 1967-68: (1) to the President, \$10,000,00; (2) to each of the persons holding the following titles, \$1,000.00 - Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost of the University, Vice President for Business and Finance; Vice President for Student Affairs; Vice President for Research; Vice President for Development; Vice President for Educational Services; Executive Dean for Student Statistical Services; Executive Director for University Relations; and Executive Assistant to the President; and (3) an additional amount of \$1,000,00 to be allocated at the discretion of the President for such costs as may be incurred by the administrative officers as they, by direction, further the fiscal progress of the University.

The above motion was seconded by Mr. Safford and approved by unanimous roll call vote.

RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees hereby adopts the Series J Bond Resolution as set forth in the Fifth Supplemental Trust Agreement between the University and The Ohio National Bank of Columbus as Trustee, (presented to this meeting and marked Supplement A, page 187).

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees hereby approves the Fifth Supplemental Trust Agreement (as presented to this meeting and marked Supplement A), in all respects and the officers designated in the Series J Bond Resolution are hereby authorized to execute and deliver said Fifth Supplemental Trust Agreement, in substantially the form presented, to The Ohio National Bank of Columbus, as Trustee, at such time as they may deem appropriate.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the certificate of the President and Vice President, Business and Finance of the University, attached hereto and marked respectively Supplement B (page 221) and Supplement C (page 225), Supplement B setting forth the earnings coverage pursuant to Section 6(b) of the Original Bond Resolution, and Supplement C certifying as to there being no default under the Original Trust Agreement and Certain Facts pursuant to Section 2.03 (4) of the Trust Agreement be and the same are hereby approved.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees hereby confirms the applicability of the provisions of the resolutions adopted by the Board on September 1, 1958 and June 11, 1960 relating to the parietal rules governing the use and occupancy of the University dormitory facilities to all Dormitory Facilities.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees hereby confirms the applicability of the provisions of the resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees on June 8, 1967 and May 9, 1968 relating to the rates and charges for the dormitory and dining facilities of the University to all Dormitory Facilities.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees and the University hereby establish such special bank accounts as may be required by the Fifth Supplemental Trust Agreement or the Original Trust Agreement, or by the resolution providing for the issuance and sale of the \$3,000,000 Dormitory Revenue Notes, Series 1968, or the Loan Agreement with the United States of America Contract No. H (402) 3007, dated January 1, 1968 and authorized signatures for withdrawals from such accounts shall be the same as the authorized signatures with respect to bank accounts in which there are deposited pursuant to said Original Trust Agreement and the Executive Officer or Fiscal Officer, or any one of them, are authorized to arrange for such accounts at such banks as the officer acting may determine and the Secretary of this Board is authorized to include in the minutes as hereby adopted any standard form of bank resolution required in connection with effecting the foregoing.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Executive Officer or Fiscal Officer of the University, or any one of them, are authorized and directed to do all things necessary for the sale of the Series J Bonds, subject, however, to all applicable provisions of the Series J Bond Resolution and the Loan Agreement with the United States of America.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that in addition to other terms herein defined, the term "Executive Officer" shall mean the Chairman of the Board of Trustees or the President of the University; and "Fiscal Officer" shall mean the Vice President, Business and Finance, or the Assistant Treasurer of the University; the terms "Original Bond Resolution," "Dormitory Facilities," "Trust Agreement," and "Project" shall have the same meanings as are given to them in the Series J Bond Resolution.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the adoption of the Series J Bond Resolution and approval of the Fifth Supplemental Trust Agreement on July 13, 1967, be and the same are hereby repealed and rescinded, the same having been superseded by the aforesaid adoption of the Series J Bond Resolution and approval of the Fifth Supplemental Trust Agreement by the aforesaid act this day.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

RESOLUTION providing for the issuance of \$3,000,000 Dormitory Revenue Notes, Series 1968, for the purpose of refunding \$3,000,000 Dormitory Revenue Notes of 1967 heretofore issued for the purpose of paying part of the cost of constructing and equipping certain dormitory and related dining facilities known as Drackett, Jones and Taylor Towers, Archer, Houck and Nosker Houses and Raney Commons Dining Facility.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University (herein called the "Board") is vested with the government of The Ohio State University (herein called the "University," or where the context admits collectively with the Board called the "University") and has the general supervision of all land, buildings and other property of the University and control of all expenses therefor pursuant to Chapter 3335 of the Revised Code of Ohio; and

WHEREAS, under Section 3345.07 of said Revised Code, the Board has authority to construct, equip, maintain and operate the Project described below and to issue bonds and notes to pay the costs thereof and pledge to the payment of such bonds and notes the net revenues of dormitory and dining facilities now or hereafter under the control of the Board as the Board may designate, and to issue such bonds and notes to refund bonds and notes previously issued for such purpose; and

WHEREAS, the Board has previously determined, and does hereby confirm, that it is necessary to provide additional dormitory accommodations and dining facilities for students of the University and, therefor to construct and equip on the campus of the University and dormitory and dining facilities known as Drackett, Jones and Taylor Towers, Archer, Houck and Nosker Houses, and Raney Commons Dining Facility, provided, however, that it subsequently determined not to construct and equip Dennis House (said dormitory buildings and dining facility and all things incidental thereto, exclusive of Dennis House, being herein called the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the Board has heretofore duly issued, and there are presently outstanding, notes in the aggregate principal amount of \$3,000,000 Dormitory Revenue Notes, Series 1967, dated as of September 15, 1967, issued for the purpose of refunding in part \$14,000,000 Dormitory Revenue Notes of 1966, dated as of September 15, 1966, and issued for the purpose of paying the costs of the Project, and said 1967 Notes bearing interest

at the rate of 3% per annum, maturing on September 15, 1968 (the said outstanding note issue being herein called the "Outstanding Notes"); and

WHEREAS, the Board does hereby determine and confirm that it is necessary to issue the below authorized dormitory revenue notes in the principal amount of \$3,000,000 to refund the balance of the Outstanding Notes prior to the completion of permanent financing of that part of the Project known as Jones Tower, to be represented by an issue of \$3,000,000 Dormitory Revenue Bonds Series J, pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Ohio Revised Code and pursuant to Resolution of the Board duly adopted this day authorizing said Series J Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the Fiscal Officer of the University has solicited proposals for the purchase of said \$3,000,000 Dormitory Revenue Notes at par and at an interest rate not to exceed 6% per annum and this Board now desires to award the Notes to the Original Purchaser described in Section 4 hereof;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University:

Section 1. It is hereby determined and declared that it is necessary to construct and equip that part of the Project known as Jones Tower and to issue and there shall be issued, pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Notes, Series 1968 (herein called the "1968 Notes"), in the aggregate principal amount of \$3,000,000 for the purpose of refunding the presently outstanding \$3,000,000 principal amount of The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Notes, Series 1967, dated as of September 15, 1967.

Section 2. The principal of and interest on the 1968 Notes shall be payable solely from (a) the revenues of the Dormitory Facilities, as defined in the Trust Agreement between the University and The Ohio National Bank of Columbus, dated as of April 15, 1957, as supplemented pursuant to the terms thereof, after providing only for the reasonable and proper expenses of operation and maintenance thereof and all payments required from time to time to be made into the Special Funds created under such Trust Agreement, as supplemented, and (b) the proceeds of the sale of dormitory revenue bonds or notes of the University to be issued pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, or other authorizing provision of law, to refund the notes authorized hereby; and neither the State of Ohio nor the University or its Board of Trustees shall be obligated to pay the same from any other property of the University or the State of Ohio, and said notes are not general obligations of the State or the University, and

the full faith and credit thereof are not pledged thereto and the noteholders shall have no right to have any taxes levied, collected or applied for or to the payment thereof.

The University and its Board of Trustees covenant and agree that they will do all things necessary to effect the issuance and delivery, prior to the maturity of the 1968 Notes, of dormitory revenue bonds or notes for the refunding of the 1968 Notes pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 3345.07, or other provision of law authorizing such revenue bonds or notes, in such principal amount as shall be necessary to pay the principal of and interest on the 1968 Notes and shall apply the proceeds thereof to such purpose, that they will do all things necessary to sell such bonds or notes at the time provided above and will accept such price and such interest rate as shall be necessary in order to effect such sale; and these obligations are established as duties specifically enjoined upon the University, its Trustees and officers, by law and result from their respective offices, trusts or stations within the meaning of Section 2731.01 of the Revised Code of Ohio.

Section 3. The 1968 Notes shall be dated as of September 15, 1968, shall mature on September 15, 1969, shall be in the denominations, bear interest at the rate with interest payable all as described in Section 4 below, or upon prepayment of the principal thereof as hereinafter provided, shall be designated "The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Notes, Series 1968." The University shall reserve the right to make prepayment of all or a portion of the principal amount of the 1968 Notes at any time or times without premium or penalty, provided that it may not make such payment through application of the proceeds of refunding notes for a period of one year from the date of said 1968 Notes. Said notes shall be payable at the office of the Original Purchaser, or at such other place as he may designate, and shall be signed by the Executive Officer or by the Fiscal Officer, may have the seal of the University impressed thereon, or a facsimile of said seal imprinted thereon. The definitive notes shall be substantially in the form attached hereto as Supplement D (page 229), the terms and covenants of which are incorporated herein, with such changes therein, not substantially adverse to the University, as the officers executing same and the Original Purchaser may agree upon.

For the purposes of this resolution "Executive Officer" shall mean the Chairman of the Board of Trustees or the President of the University; and "Fiscal Officer" shall mean the Vice President, Business and Finance, or the Assistant Treasurer of the University.

Section 4. Said 1968 Notes are hereby awarded to Huntington National Bank, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to its proposal, a true copy of which was submitted to this meeting (filed with the official records of the Board of Trustees), bearing interest at the rate of 3.5%, interest payable on March 15 and September 15, 1969, in the denomination of \$3,000,000, and, in accordance with this Resolution, the Executive Officer and the Fiscal Officer are each hereby authorized and directed to do all things necessary for the delivery of said notes in accordance with this said award, the proposal and this Resolution.

Section 5. The proceeds of said notes shall be applied promptly to the payment and discharge of the Outstanding Notes, and the Fiscal Officer is hereby directed to apply to the payment of interest on said outstanding notes such amount from the construction funds for the Project or from available surplus dormitory revenues as shall be needed therefor.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

B. Highlights of University Activities

President Fawcett reported to the Board on some of the significant activities that have taken place in recent weeks. Some references included in the report, which is filed with the official records of the Secretary, were as follows:

- Despite government cutbacks in certain areas, research contracts and grants received at Ohio State totaled the highest in its history during the last fiscal year. Vice President Alfred B. Garrett said the July 1 financial report of the University's Research Foundation shows a total of sponsored research contracts and grants of \$16, 784, 814 for 1967-68. This compares with a figure of \$15, 717, 593 for the previous year. About \$700,000 in institutional grants from the National Science Foundation and the National Institutes of Health should be added to the total which makes a total of almost \$17.5 million as compared to about \$16.3 million last year.
- 2. Results of the National Medical Board Part III Examinations, taken this past spring by the College of Medicine third-year class, when compared with results of students from other American medical schools, showed that The Ohio State University College of Medicine ranked in the top five of the 40 participating medical schools, according to Dr. Richard L. Meiling, Dean of the College. Dean Meiling said that innovations in the medical curriculum over the past several years (computer-assisted instruction is an example) no doubt contributed to this achievement.

XI. <u>REPORTS</u> (continued)

B. Highlights of University Activities (continued)

The test, administered by the National Board of Medical Examiners, was given to third-year medical students on an experimental basis. It is usually administered to physicians completing their internship programs.

3. A sign for the purpose of identifying slow-moving vehicles on public highways to serve as a warning to motorists which was devised by Mr. Kenneth Harkness of the Department of Agricultural Engineering in 1963 has received national and international acceptance as evidenced by its use on all of the highways in the United States and the Provinces of Canada. This invention was considered an important factor in improving safety on the highways and it was recommended that it be freely available to the public. For this reason The Ohio State University "dedicated it to public use."

FIFTH SUPPLEMENTAL TRUST AGREEMENT

THIS FIFTH SUPPLEMENTAL TRUST AGREEMENT, dated as of the 15th day of April, 1968 (herein called the "Supplement"), by and between The Ohio State University and its Board of Trustees (herein called the "University"), a state university of Ohio, and The Ohio National Bank of Columbus, Columbus, Ohio (herein called the "Trustee"), a corporation duly organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the United States, as Trustee under the Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1967 hereinafter mentioned.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the University, pursuant to the Original Bond Resolution passed April 8, 1957, entered into a Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 with the Trustee and as of April 15, 1958, October 15, 1959, April 15, 1961, April 15, 1963, and August 1, 1967, respectively entered into First, Second, Third and Fourth Supplemental Trust Agreements (which original Trust Agreement, as so supplemented thereby and hereby is herein called the "Trust Agreement") under which \$31,560,000 Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H and I Dormitory Revenue Bonds have been authorized and have been or are to be issued and under which additional bonds (herein called "Additional Bonds") are issuable on a parity with the said Bonds and other Additional Bonds hereafter issued under certain conditions as provided in the Trust Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the University has in all respects complied with the provisions of the Trust Agreement so as to be entitled to execute and to have authenticated and delivered by the Trustee \$3,000,000 Additional Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the University further desires by this Supplement to provide for the issuance under the Trust Agreement of said \$3,000,000 of Additional Bonds (herein called the Series J Bonds); and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the University has duly adopted on September 12, 1968 the Series J Bond Resolution providing for the Series J Bonds and this Supplement, which resolution, collectively with the Original Bond Resolution, the Series C and D Bond Resolutions adopted July 8, 1960, the Series E, F, G and H Bond Resolution adopted June 15, 1962, and the Series I Bond Resolution adopted July 13, 1967 is referred to as the Bond Resolution; and

WHEREAS, the Series J Bond Resolution is as follows:

RESOLUTION

Providing for the issuance of \$3,000,000 The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Bonds, Series J, as Additional Parity Bonds pursuant to Bond Resolution adopted April 8, 1957 and Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957, for the purpose of constructing and equipping Jones Tower.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University (herein called the Board) is vested with the government of The Ohio State University (herein called the University or, when the context admits, collectively with the Board called the University) by Section 3335.03 of said Revised Code, and as such Board, of suing and being sued, contracting and being contracted with, and of making and using a common seal and, under Section 3335.10 of said Revised Code, has general supervision of all land, buildings and other property of the University and control of all expenses therefor; and

WHEREAS, by authority of Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, the Board is authorized to construct, equip, maintain and operate upon sites within, or in close proximity to, the campus of the University, buildings to be used as dormitories and as other suitable living quarters, or as dining halls, for students and members of the faculty and servants and wives and families of married students of said University (including all separate or connected buildings, sites, equipment, structures and utilities to be used in connection with the maintenance or operation of, or in any way supplementing or related to the services or facilities to be provided

by such buildings) and to pay for the same out of funds in its possession derived from operation of any such buildings under its control or out of funds borrowed therefor and to borrow funds for such purpose upon such terms as said Board may deem proper and issue notes or other written instruments evidencing such indebtedness provided that such indebtedness shall not be a claim against or lien upon any property of the State or any property of or under the control of said Board excepting such parts of the receipts of the operation of any such buildings under control of the Board as it may pledge to secure the payment of such indebtedness and by authority of said Section 3345.07 the Board is also authorized to issue such notes or other obligations payable as aforesaid in order to retire or refund outstanding notes or other obligations matured or unmatured, to repay moneys previously borrowed or advanced under said section 3345.07; and

WHEREAS, the University determined by resolution adopted April 8, 1957 (herein called the Original Bond Resolution and collectively with this resolution, the Series C and D Bond Resolution adopted July 8, 1960, the Series E, F, G and H Bond Resolution adopted June 15, 1962 and the Series I Bond Resolution adopted July 13, 1967, called the Bond Resolution) to provide for the issuance of Dormitory Revenue Bonds and pursuant to the Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 with The Ohio National Bank of Columbus (herein, with the First, Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Supplements, called the Trust Agreement), to pledge the net income of all the dormitory facilities, including married student housing and dining halls, now or hereafter under control of the University pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 3345.07, and to provide in said Trust Agreement for the issuance of such Bonds (herein called the Bonds) as from time to time authorized subject to the conditions contained in said Trust Agreement, and by the Original Bond Resolution and the Trust Agreement provided for the sale of an initial issue of \$12,000,000 consisting of

\$6,000,000 Series A Bonds and \$6,000,000 Series B Bonds (herein called the Series A and Series B Bonds) and for the issuance from time to time as authorized by the Board of additional bonds (herein called Additional Bonds) on a parity with said initial issue of which \$2,330,000 Series C Bonds, \$2,030,000 Series D Bonds, \$5,300,000 Series E Bonds, \$1,200,000 Series F Bonds, \$1,350,000 Series G Bonds, \$2,850,000 Series H Bonds and \$10,500,000 Series I Bonds have been authorized and issued and the unmatured portions of such Series A through I Bonds are presently outstanding; and

WHEREAS, the University has not pledged or encumbered the revenues from its dormitory facilities on a basis equal or prior to the pledges under the Trust Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the University has determined to sell an issue of \$3,000,000 Additional Bonds as Series J Bonds (herein called the Series J Bonds) all as provided in the Trust Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Board by the adoption of this resolution has determined and confirmed that it is necessary to provide additional dormitory accommodations and dining facilities located on or in close proximity to the campus of the University and, accordingly, hereby declares and determines that it is immediately necessary to construct and equip additional dormitory facilities to be known as Jones Tower (said dormitory building and all things incidental thereto being herein referred to as the Project); and

WHEREAS, said Project is to be constructed pursuant to plans prepared by the University Architect and approved by the Department of Public Works of Ohio and the Department of Housing and Urban Development of the United States of America (herein called the Government); and

WHEREAS, based upon final construction and other costs, the University has determined the costs of the Project to be \$4,000,000, including capitalized interest, miscellaneous expense and contingencies; and

WHEREAS, the University has heretofore by the Series I Bond Resolution adopted July 13, 1967, allocated \$610,000 of the proceeds of the sale of the Series I Bonds to the Series J Construction Fund hereinafter provided for to be held for paying costs of the Project and the University has \$390,000 of funds otherwise available for such purpose which this Board has heretofore authorized and directed be deposited in said Series J Construction Fund to be held and used for paying costs of the Project; and

WHEREAS, the University has determined to borrow the balance of the funds to pay the foregoing costs, and to advertise for bids, subject to the terms of the loan agreement (numbered Contract No. H (402) 3007) dated as of January 1, 1968 covering Project No. CH-Ohio-216 (D) (herein with any amendments thereto called the Loan Agreement) with the Government under which the Government agrees, subject to the terms of the Loan Agreement, to purchase the \$3,000,000 Dormitory Revenue Bonds, Series J.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University:

Section 1. <u>Purpose of Series J Bonds</u>. It is hereby determined to be necessary to construct the Project and to issue \$3,000,000 of Dormitory Revenue Bonds of the University pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio and the Trust Agreement for the purpose of paying part of the cost of the Project and of all things incidental thereto or incidental to the financing thereof, including repayment of moneys previously borrowed or advanced for the Project or restoring amounts used for the Project from other funds of the University available for such purposes, excepting, however, the sum of \$610,000 allocated from the proceeds of the Series I Bonds and the \$390,000 of other funds otherwise available for such purpose deposited to the Series J Construction Fund under this Resolution.

Section 2. Terms of Series J Bonds. Said \$3,000,000 of Dormitory Revenue Bonds Series J shall be issued under this Resolution, the Original Bond Resolution. and the Trust Agreement, and shall be entitled "The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Bonds." The Series J Bonds shall be initially issued in coupon or fully registered form as may be requested by the Original Purchaser and shall be exchangeable for fully registered or coupon bonds in the manner and on the terms provided by the Trust Agreement. Series J Bonds in coupon form shall be dated as of April 15, 1968, and shall be issued as negotiable coupon bonds, registrable as to principal in the denomination of \$5,000 or as single maturity fully registered bonds without coupons in denominations of \$5,000 or any multiples thereof, as requested by the Original Purchaser or Purchasers of such Bond or Bonds; provided, however, that until such time as the Original Purchaser or Purchasers request(s) the preparation of definitive bonds, a single multiple maturity, fully registered bond or bonds without coupons shall be issued in an amount equal to the bonds contracted for by said Purchaser or Purchasers and thereafter at the request of the holder(s) thereof the University will, at its expense and within ninety days from such request, issue to him in exchange therefor definitive bonds, as aforesaid, in aggregate principal amount equal to the unpaid principal of such single bond. The Series J Bonds shall be numbered J 1 to J 600, inclusive, in order of maturity, and fully registered Bonds without coupons shall be numbered as determined by the Fiscal Officer, shall bear interest from their date or from the last interest payment date preceding the date of issuance, payable semi-annually on April fifteenth and October fifteenth of each year, beginning with October 15, 1968, until the principal sum is paid, at the rate or rates per annum stipulated in the bid or bids of the successful bidders and approved in writing by the President or Fiscal Officer of the University, (or in the case of Bonds purchased by the Government pursuant to the Loan Agreement, at the rate specified in the Loan Agreement) provided that no such rate shall exceed 6% per annum. The Series J Bonds shall mature annually on October fifteenth in the years and amounts per year as follows:

The Series J Bonds maturing on and after October 15, 1979 shall be subject to redemption in whole or in part in inverse order of maturity, prior to the stated maturity thereof at the option of the University on any interest payment date on and after April 15, 1979, at redemption prices equal to the following percentages of the principal amount redeemed, plus accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption, to wit:

3 % if redeemed April 15, 1979 through October 15, 1983, inc.
2-1/2% if redeemed April 15, 1984 through October 15, 1988, inc.
2 % if redeemed April 15, 1989 through October 15, 1993, inc.
1-1/2% if redeemed April 15, 1994 through October 15, 1998, inc.
1 % if redeemed April 15, 1999 through October 15, 2003, inc.
0 % if redeemed April 15, 2004 or thereafter

If some but less than all of one maturity are to be called, the selection of coupon bonds or portions of fully registered bonds of that maturity to be called shall be chosen by lot conducted by the Trustee under the Trust Agreement. If single multiple maturity fully registered bond or bonds is or are issued for the Series J Bonds, the annual principal payments with respect thereto may be prepaid in the above manner, and, if the Government is the holder, the University may, at its option, prepay from funds available therefor, on any interest payment date, the entire unpaid principal amount of the Series J Bonds or from time to time, in the inverse chronological order of the aforesaid installments, a lesser proportion thereof in multiples of \$5,000. Call for redemption shall be made by notice specifying the numbers, and portions of registered bonds, of the Series J Bonds to be called, published by the Trustee on behalf of the University once a week for two consecutive weeks in a financial newspaper of national circulation, published in the English language in New York City and in an English language newspaper

of general circulation in Columbus, Ohio, the first publication to be not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of redemption. Any bonds thus called for redemption and for the retirement of which funds are deposited with said Trustee as provided in the Trust Agreement on or before the redemption date shall cease to bear interest on said redemption date. If the Series J Bonds are all registered, or are issued as a single multiple maturity fully registered bond or bonds, published notice of redemption shall not be required, but notice by registered or certified mail shall be given not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of redemption to the registered owner or owners at the address(es) appearing on the Bond Registry. Except in the case of redemption of Bonds held by the Government from the Construction Fund as provided in Section 4 of this Resolution, or in a corresponding provision of a resolution authorizing Additional Bonds, no Bonds of any series may be called unless the same proportion of the outstanding Bonds of each other series, then callable, are called. A registered bond shall have prepayment provisions consistent with the redemption rights relating to coupon bonds which it replaces.

Subject to the terms of the Loan Agreement, the principal and interest of the Series J Bonds shall be payable in any coin or currency which, on the respective dates of payment, is legal tender for the payment of debts due the United States of America, at the principal office of the Trustee under the Trust Agreement (presently, The Ohio National Bank of Columbus, Columbus, Ohio), or, at the option of the holder, at the principal corporate trust office of the United States Trust Company of New York, in the Borough of Manhattan, City and State of New York except that interest on fully registered bonds is payable by check as provided in the Trust Agreement, and principal on fully Registered Bonds may also be payable at such additional place or places, at the option of the holder as shall be designated by the Fiscal Officer of the University; provided, however, that payment of principal and interest on a single multiple maturity fully registered bond without coupons may at the request of the registered owner be made on each principal and interest payment date by draft or check mailed to such

registered owner, or, if the Government is the registered owner, to the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond, Richmond, Virginia, or to such other place as may be designated by the Government.

The Series J Bonds shall have such other terms and conditions and shall be issued, executed and delivered as provided by the applicable provisions of the Trust Agreement, and of or pursuant to the Loan Agreement.

Section 3. <u>Sale of Series J Bonds</u>. The \$3,000,000 Series J Bonds shall be advertised for sale, awarded and delivered by the President or the Fiscal Officer of the University pursuant to the provisions of the Loan Agreement, and said officers and each of them are authorized to take any and all actions necessary of the Government.

Section 4. <u>Allocation of Proceeds of Series J Bonds</u>. Upon the issuance and delivery of the Series J Bonds, the Fiscal Officer of the University shall forthwith establish a bank account in the name of the University designated "Series J Construction Fund," (hereinafter called the "Construction Fund"). The proceeds from the sale of said Bonds shall be forthwith deposited and applied by the University as follows:

- (1) The portion representing accrued interest to the Debt Service Fund provided for in the Original Trust Agreement to be held by the Trustee, and the portion representing premium above par paid to the University for such Bonds to the Debt Service Reserve Funds.
- (2) To the University, the amounts necessary to reimburse the University for amounts in excess of \$1,000,000 expended by it on costs of construction of the Project prior to issuance of the Series J Bonds. (Said \$1,000,000 consisting of the \$610,000 of the proceeds of the Series I Bonds allocated to the Construction Fund under the Series I Bond Resolution and the \$390,000 of funds otherwise available for such purpose and deposited by the University in the Construction Fund.)
- (3) The balance to the Construction Fund to be held by the Trustee to pay costs of construction of the Project and to pay all incidental expenses of the Project and the financing thereof, including repayment (with interest) of money borrowed by the University for such purposes in accordance with the Loan Agreement.

(4) Any balance remaining in the Construction Fund after payment, or retention of funds sufficient to pay, costs and other amounts provided for in (3) above, shall be promptly applied to the extent possible for the retirement at par plus accrued interest in inverse order of maturity of Series J Bonds, if any, then held by the Government, and any portion not needed for such retirement shall be transferred to the Debt Service Reserve Fund.

No part of the proceeds of Series J Bonds sold to the Government shall be used to pay costs (including cost of movable equipment or fees of a financial advisor) which, under the Loan Agreement or under the rules, regulations or practices of the Department of Housing and Urban Development, may not be paid from proceeds of Bonds purchased by the Government through that agency, and proceeds of Bonds purchased by the Government as aforesaid shall be segregated in the Construction Fund to the extent necessary to effect the foregoing and none of the funds in the Construction Fund shall be applied in any manner contrary to the Loan Agreement.

The Trustee shall apply said Construction Fund to the payment of such items as from time to time are requested in writing by the Fiscal Officer of the University. Such written request shall include a certificate by such official that the amount to be paid from such Construction Fund constitutes authorized payments from said fund under the foregoing provisions of this Section 4. If the payment is to be made with respect to an obligation under a construction contract relating to the Project, such written request shall certify that such payment was certified as due under such contract by a qualified architect or engineer.

To the extent the moneys in the Construction Fund exceed the estimated disbursements needed to pay the costs of the Project for the next ninety (90) days the Construction Fund shall be deposited by the Trustee in banks that are members of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, or invested by the Trustee in such direct obligations of, or obligations the principal of and interest on which are guaranteed by, the United States which shall not mature later than eighteen (18) months after the date of such investment and which shall be subject to redemption at any time, in either

event as shall be directed in writing by the President or the Fiscal Officer of the University, which writing shall designate maturities and amounts which, as nearly as practicable, would, through maturities, provide funds when needed to pay costs for which the respective funds have been established. Such investments and the proceeds of sale thereof shall constitute part of the fund from which the investment was made. Interest on such investments may be paid to the Dormitory Revenue Fund or applied to the purposes of the fund from which the said investments shall be sold, exchanged or collected from time to time as directed in writing by the President or the Fiscal Officer of the University and the Trustee shall be under no liability in connection with such investment, sale, exchange or collection thereof provided the directions of said officers are followed. No direction shall be made to invest the Construction Fund except as permitted by the Loan Agreement.

Section 5. <u>Additional Bonds</u>. (a) The Board shall have the right from time to time to issue Additional Bonds under the Trust Agreement if necessary to pay the costs of completing the Project or completing any projects for which Additional Bonds are issued. The Trustee shall authenticate and deliver such Bonds upon (but only upon) receipt of the documents required by Section 2. 03 of the Trust Agreement. Nothing herein or in the Trust Agreement shall require any earnings coverage, or certificate with respect thereto, in connection with Additional Bonds issued for completion of a project.

(b) The Board shall also have the right from time to time to issue Additional Bonds under the Trust Agreement to provide funds for purposes authorized by Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, including construction and equipment by the University of buildings to be used as dormitories or as other living quarters or the refunding of outstanding bonds or notes issued under said Section 3345.07. The Trustee shall authenticate and deliver under the Trust Agreement Additional Bonds issued under this subdivision (b) if, (but only if), when such Additional Bonds are issued, the University

shall have furnished to the Trustee in addition to the documents required by Section 2.03 of the Trust Agreement, a certificate of the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University, approved by the Board of Trustees. (1) showing that (a) the actual net income from the dormitory facilities of the University (excluding net income from any dormitory facility which is to be abandoned or which is not suitable for continuous use as a dormitory facility for the term of such Additional Bonds) for the preceding fiscal year, as adjusted, if necessary, to reflect the schedule of rates and charges to become effective at the beginning of the next semester, quarter or other school period and to give recognition to any anticipated changes in operating costs; plus (b) the estimated annual net income of the dormitory facilities to be financed through the proceeds of the sale of such Additional Bonds will be equal to or greater than one and three-tenths (1, 3) times the maximum amount to become due in any succeeding fiscal year for the payment of principal and interest charges on the Bonds then outstanding hereunder and on the Bonds then to be authenticated and delivered; (2) showing that, until the dormitory facility being constructed from the proceeds of the Additional Bonds, is ready for occupancy, funds then available from net income, bond proceeds, gifts, legacies, devises or grants or other sources for payment when due of principal and interest on the Bonds will be at least one and three-tenths (1.3) times the principal and interest requirements for that period; (3) showing that there were not included in net income any receipts against which there is any prior claim other than the use thereof for the operating expenses included in computing the net income; (4) furnishing such other information in support of the foregoing as may reasonably be requested by the Trustee; (5) showing that the computations of estimates provided for above are based on an assumed occupancy of not more than 95% of capacity of the dormitory facilities in question.

The first call date on Additional Bonds shall not be earlier than the first call date on any issue of Bonds outstanding at the time of issue of such Additional Bonds.

Section 6. Terms of the Bonds Generally. As used in this Resolution, the term "Bonds" refers to the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I and J Bonds and all Additional Bonds issued on a parity therewith under the Trust Agreement. The Bonds shall be designated The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Bonds, shall be payable in any coin or currency which, on the respective dates of payment, is legal tender for the payment of debts due the United States of America, shall have all the incidents of negotiable instruments under the laws of Ohio, shall express upon their face the purpose for which they are issued, and shall be issued pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio. Unless otherwise provided by the Board, the Bonds shall be signed by the Chairman of the Board or bear his facsimile signature, shall be signed by the President of the University or bear his facsimile signature, shall be attested by the Secretary of the Board or by the Vice President. Business and Finance of the University, and may be sealed with the seal of the University or a facsimile thereof, and interest coupons attached to the Bonds shall bear the facsimile signature of the Secretary of the Board or of the Vice President, Business and Finance of the University. In case any officer whose signature or a facsimile of whose signature shall appear on any Bonds or coupons shall cease to be such officer before the delivery of such Bonds, such signature or such facsimile shall nevertheless be valid and sufficient for all purposes, the same as if he had remained in office until such delivery. Except in the case of redemption of Bonds of a particular series from the surplus proceeds of that issue as provided in Section 5 of the Original Bond Resolution, no Bonds of any series may be called unless the same proportion of the outstanding Bonds of each other series, then callable, are called at the same time. The additional Bonds shall bear such designations as may be necessary to distinguish them from other Bonds having different provisions and shall have maturities, interest rates, interest payment dates, redemption provisions, denominations, registration provisions, and other provisions as provided in the Resolution providing for issuance of the Additional Bonds, provided,

however, that such terms and provisions shall not be inconsistent with this Resolution, the Trust Agreement and in the Bonds, the Bonds shall be equally and ratably payable from and secured by pledge of, the receipts from the operation of all dormitory facilities now or hereafter under control of the Board including the dining facilities constituting a part thereof, after provision for reasonable and proper expenses of operation and maintenance of such facilities; and anything in this Resolution, the Bonds or the Trust Agreement to the contrary notwithstanding, neither this Resolution, the Bonds, nor the Trust Agreement shall be a claim against or a lien upon any property of the State of Ohio or any property of or under the control of the Board except the portion of said receipts pledged as provided herein; provided, however, that nothing herein shall be deemed to prohibit the University, of its own volition, from using, or pledging, to the extent it is lawfully authorized to do so, any of its other resources or revenues for the fulfillment of any of the terms, conditions or obligations of the Trust Agreement, this Resolution, or any of the bonds.

Section 7. <u>Covenants of the University</u>. The University covenants with the holders of the Bonds and with the Trustee under the Trust Agreement that (a) it will adopt and maintain so long as any of the Bonds are outstanding such parietal rules, and charge and collect such rental rates and charges, from time to time, as may be necessary to assure such occupancy and use of, and receipts from, the dormitory facilities as will pay the costs of maintenance and operation and provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds and other payments to Special Funds required by Section 8 of this Resolution; (b) from funds lawfully available, it will cause the Project and any project to be constructed from the proceeds of Additional Bonds to be completed and equipped in an efficient and economical manner with reasonable dispatch and in a manner consistent with the plans and recommendations of responsible architects and all applicable laws, ordinances and regulations; (c) subject to the right of abandonment under conditions provided in the Trust Agreement designed to prevent

adverse effect of such abandonment on the expected earnings coverage of Debt Service, it will, from the dormitory receipts pledged under this resolution and as part of the operating expenses, maintain, preserve and keep the dormitory facilities in good repair, working order and operating condition and continuously operate the same on a revenue producing basis, and will apply the receipts therefrom only as provided in Section 8 of this Resolution and in the Trust Agreement: (d) it will furnish to the Trustee and the Original Purchasers of the Bonds within 120 days after the close of each fiscal year an annual report of the accounts (including each Special Fund provided for in Section 8 of this Resolution) and operations of the dormitory facilities prepared by qualified accountants approved by the Trustee; (c) it will keep proper books of record and accounts separate from all other records and accounts, in which complete and correct entries will be made of all transactions relating to the dormitory facilities and will at all reasonable times permit the Trustee, the Original Purchasers or any holder or holders of 25% of the outstanding Bonds, or their authorized representatives, to inspect the dormitory facilities and any books, documents and vouchers relating thereto; (f) it will furnish heat, light, power, water and other necessary services to the dormitory facilities at not in excess of reasonable cost; (g) it will comply with all the terms and conditions of the respective Loan Agreements with the Department of Housing and Urban Development as long as the United States holds any of the Series B. D. F. G. H and J Bonds; (h) it will insure the dormitory facilities as required by the Trust Agreement and apply the proceeds of such insurance as provided therein; and (i) will observe and perform all its agreements and obligations provided for by the Bonds, the Trust Agreement or the Bond Resolution.

Section 8. <u>Application of Receipts; Special Funds</u>. There was established by the Original Bond Resolution a Special Fund designated "Dormitory Revenue Fund," which fund shall be maintained in a bank account, or invested as herein authorized, in the name of the University separate and distinct from all other funds of the University

and subject to the withdrawals and uses herein authorized, is pledged to and charged with the payment of the principal, interest, and premium, if any, on all the Bonds issued under the Trust Agreement.

Under the Original Bond Resolution there shall be maintained in the Dormitory Revenue Fund, as an Operating Reserve, such amount as is from time to time certified by the Fiscal Officer of the University as adequate and necessary for working capital for operation and maintenance of the dormitory facilities; provided, that such Operating Reserve shall not exceed one-fourth of the operating and maintenance expenses of the dormitory facilities for the preceding 12 months.

All receipts from dormitory facilities now or hereafter under the control of the Board, including the dining halls constituting part thereof, shall be deposited in the Dormitory Revenue Fund.

The Dormitory Revenue Fund, including the Operating Reserve, shall be applied to pay when due all reasonable and proper expenses of operation and maintenance (as defined in Section 10) of the dormitory facilities, excluding extraordinary repair and replacement expenses payable from the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund and expenses of or provision for depreciation or capital replacement.

The remainder of the Dormitory Revenue Fund, after retaining therein the then current Operating Reserve and payment of said operation and maintenance expenses then due, shall be applied as provided in the Original Bond Resolution, namely, as follows and in the following order of priority:

First: Into the Debt Service Fund, to be held by the Trustee as a separate fund and used for the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds, the amounts provided in the Original Bond Resolution and in the Bond Resolutions relating to the Series C, D, E, F, G, H and I Bonds for payment of principal and interest on the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H and I Bonds and, in addition, (1) on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year an amount equal to the interest due and on the next ensuing

interest payment date in that year on the Series J Bonds then outstanding; provided, that, the amount so payable on any such date into the Debt Service Fund shall be reduced by the amount then remaining in said Debt Service Fund from the accrued interest and from the funds deposited therein for capitalized interest pursuant to Section 4 of this Resolution; (2) on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year, the equal semi-annual amounts necessary to provide for payment of any principal maturity in that year on the Series J Bonds; (3) if Additional Bonds shall be issued under the Trust Agreement, such additional amounts and at such times as specified in the resolution authorizing such Additional Bonds, which amounts shall be not less than necessary to provide in the Debt Service Fund amounts, in addition to the amounts hereinbefore provided for the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I and J Bonds, sufficient to pay in full interest and principal on all Additional Bonds then outstanding, as the same shall become due and payable provided that no payments need be made to the Debt Service Fund so long as the amounts in the Debt Service Fund and Debt Service Reserve Fund aggregate at least the total principal and interest payable on all Bonds then outstanding to the dates of their respective maturities.

Second: Into the Debt Service Reserve Fund, to be held by the Trustee as a separate fund for the payment of principal and interest on, and purchase or redemption of, the Bonds as herein provided, on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year and on such other dates as amounts are payable into the Debt Service Fund with respect to Additional Bonds, such amounts as are necessary to create and maintain in said Debt Service Reserve Fund the required reserve, namely, an amount equal to the maximum principal and interest requirements for any consecutive two-year period on all Bonds at the time outstanding;

Third: Into the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund, to be held by the University as a fund separate and distinct from all other funds of the University, semiannually on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year, or as soon thereafter as the

required reserve has been established in the Debt Service Reserve Fund, an amount equal to one-quarter of one percent of the cost of construction on all dormitory facilities then under the control of the Board and 3 percent of the cost of movable equipment for all such dormitory facilities, which fund may be used by the University to the extent necessary for payment of principal and interest on the Bonds or for extraordinary repairs and replacements to the dormitory facilities or for construction or equipping of additional dormitory facilities;

Fourth: On April 1 and October 1 of each year, to the foregoing funds, such amounts as may be necessary to make up previous deficiency in any deposits required by the foregoing paragraphs of this section;

Fifth: So long as there is no deficiency in any of the deposits provided for in Paragraphs First through Fourth above and so long as the amounts in the Debt Service Reserve Fund are at least equal to the then required reserve, any amounts in the Dormitory Revenue Fund, after reserving therein the then current Operating Reserve, may be used for any purpose of the University for which such funds may lawfully be used.

The Debt Service Fund is irrevocably pledged to and shall be used by the Trustee for the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds and, until required for such purposes, shall be invested by the Trustee in such direct obligations of the United States as the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University shall direct in writing addressed to the Trustee, which writing shall determine that the maturity of the respective obligations is not later than the date on which such funds will be required for payment of such principal and interest. The Trustee shall transfer from the Debt Service Fund to the Paying Agents amounts sufficient to enable said Paying Agents to pay when due principal and interest on the Bonds, or the Trustee shall make such credit arrangements with said Paying Agents as to permit such payments.

The Debt Service Reserve Fund is irrevocably pledged to, and shall be used by the Trustee for, the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds if other available funds are insufficient for that purpose, and, to the extent herein provided, for purchase or redemption of Bonds. Until required for such purposes it shall be invested by the Trustee in such direct obligations of the United States as the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University shall direct in writing, which obligations shall, subject to the applicable provisions of the Loan Agreement, mature not more than five years from the date of investment. The Trustee shall transfer from the Debt Service Reserve Fund to the Debt Service Fund such amounts as are necessary in addition to amounts available in the Debt Service Fund, including funds transferred from the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund, to enable said Paying Agents to pay when due the principal and interest on the Bonds.

Any amounts in the Debt Service Reserve Fund in excess of the required reserve provided for in Paragraph Second above shall be used to purchase Bonds for retirement or to redeem Bonds then subject to redemption to the extent and in the manner from time to time requested in writing by the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University. In calculating at any time whether additional amounts are required to be paid into the Debt Service Reserve Fund under Paragraph Second above and in calculating the excess over the required reserve, no value shall be given to any investments of the fund other than direct obligations of the United States maturing within five years from the date of such calculation, but, in all other respects, such investments shall be valued at their face amount or market value, whichever is lower.

The Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund is irrevocably pledged to, and shall be used by the University for, extraordinary repairs and replacements to the dormitory facilities or to construct or equip additional dormitory facilities or for the retirement of all then outstanding Bonds by purchase or redemption or for payment of the principal and interest by transfer to the Debt Service Fund as herein provided.

The University shall transfer from the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund to the Debt Service Fund such amounts as are from time to time necessary, in addition to the other amounts available in the Debt Service Fund and without use of the Debt Service Reserve Fund, to provide for the payment, when due, of the principal and interest on the Bonds and shall not use any of this fund for repairs or replacement or additional facilities if there is any deficiency in any of the deposits required to be made under subparagraphs First or Second of this Section. Until required for such purposes, the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund may be invested by the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University in direct obligations of the United States maturing not more than five years from the date of investment subject, however, to the applicable provisions of the Loan Agreement.

Investments made pursuant to this Section 8 of any amounts in any Special Fund herein created and the interest thereon and the proceeds thereof shall constitute part of that Special Fund and be added to that particular fund. Such investments shall be sold, exchanged or collected from time to time as directed by the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University, and the Trustee shall be under no liability and have no responsibility in connection with such investment, or the sale, exchange or collection thereof, provided the directions of said officers are followed.

Section 9. <u>Trust Agreement</u>. In order to secure the payment of the principal and interest on the Bonds, the President of the University and the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and each of them, are authorized to execute, acknowledge and deliver as may be appropriate the Fifth Supplemental Trust Agreement in substantially the form attached hereto, and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees is authorized to seal and attest the same, with such changes not unfavorable to the University as the Officers acting shall deem advisable and as shall be approved by the Original Purchasers of the Series J Bonds. The terms and provisions of the Trust Agreement are hereby confirmed and adopted and the terms of said Trust Agreement purporting to be applicable

to the Series A and Series B Bonds or to the Project to be constructed from the proceeds of the Series A and Series B Bonds shall be deemed equally applicable to the Series J Bonds and the Project covered by this Resolution to the extent that the same are not inconsistent with the terms or provisions of this Resolution and the context so permits.

Section 10. Definitions. Where the context permits, the following terms as used in this Resolution or in the Trust Agreement shall have the following meanings; (1) "the Fiscal Officer" shall mean the Vice President, Business and Finance, of the University or any official or employee performing the duties of such officer for the time being. The Comptroller, or the Assistant Vice-President - Assistant Treasurer, or any official or employee performing the duties of such officers for the time being, shall also be "a Fiscal Officer" when the context so permits. (2) "Additional Bonds" shall mean Bonds issued pursuant to the Trust Agreement in addition to and on a parity with the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I and J Bonds and "Bonds" shall mean both the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I and J Bonds and Additional Bonds; (3) "Agreement" or "Trust Agreement" shall refer to the Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 as from time to time supplemented pursuant to its terms; (4) "Dormitory Facilities" shall mean buildings, groups of buildings or parts of or additions to buildings, including the sites therefor, now or hereafter constructed, acquired by or under the control of the Board and authorized to be constructed, equipped, maintained and operated by Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, including the dormitories, additions to dormitories, dining facilities, and married student housing facilities or projects and all separate or connected buildings, sites, equipment, structures and utilities to be used in connection with the maintenance or operation of, or in any way supplementing or related to the services or facilities to be provided by such buildings located on or in close proximity to the campus; (5) "Net Income" shall mean all receipts of the operation of dormitory facilities after deducting therefrom the reasonable and proper operating and maintenance expenses thereof;

(6) "Reasonable and Proper Operating and Maintenance Expenses" shall mean ordinary and usual reasonable expenditures necessary to the operation, repair and maintenance of the dormitory facilities including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, taxes, fees and expenses of the Trustee and paying agents and any expenses required to be paid by the Bond Resolution or the Trust Agreement, but excluding provision or expenditure for depreciation or capital replacement or expenditures for administration or regulation of the occupants of the dormitory facilities which expenditures do not constitute costs of the type included as costs of operation of the dormitory facilities under the present accounting practice of the University or expenditures for extraordinary repairs or replacements or payments to the Debt Service Fund, Debt Service Reserve Fund or Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund; (7) "Trustee" refers to the Trustee under the Trust Agreement, presently The Ohio National Bank of Columbus; (8) any reference to an officer of the University or of the Board in this Resolution shall refer to the person holding such office or, in the event of resignation, absence, incapacity or vacancy in such office, then the person performing the duties of such office; any reference to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio shall, where the context permits, mean said section as it now exists and as it is from time to time amended, supplemented or affected by later legislation.

Section 11. <u>General</u>. The appropriate officers of the University and the Board, the architects and engineers employed by the University, and the Trustee designated in the Trust Agreement are authorized and directed to do all things necessary or proper to carry out the terms and provisions of this Resolution, the Trust Agreement and the sale referred to in Section 3 above and to effect the execution, sale and delivery of said Series J Bonds in accordance therewith if approved by the President and Fiscal Officer of the University. It may be required as part of the terms of sale of the Series J Bonds that prior to or at the time of delivery of the Series J Bonds there shall have been executed and delivered contracts for construction of the principal

portions of the Project and provisions shall have been made for obtaining sufficient amounts to pay all costs of the Project as estimated by the Project architect. The obligations imposed upon the University under this Resolution or the Trust Agreement are established as duties specifically enjoined upon the University, the Board and the officials of the University by law and result from their respective offices, trusts or stations within the meaning of Section 2731.01 of the Revised Code of Ohio.

WHEREAS, the text of the Series J Bonds and the coupons, if any, to be attached thereto and the authentication certificate of the Trustee to be endorsed thereon are to be substantially as follows:

This Bond is a Series J Bond and is one of a duly authorized issue of \$3,000,000 Dormitory Revenue Bonds of the University, issued and to be issued from time to time, pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio and the Resolutions of the Board of Trustees of April 8, 1957 and September 12, 1968 (herein collectively called the "Bond Resolution") for the purpose of paying the costs of constructing and equipping certain dormitory facilities and secured by Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 and First, Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Supplemental Trust Agreements between the University and the above-named Trustee (herein collectively called the "Agreement").

The University hereby reserves the right to call and redeem the Bonds of this series prior to maturity as a whole, or in part, in inverse order of maturity, on any interest payment date on or after April 15, 1969, upon terms of par and accrued interest to the redemption date plus redemption premiums as follows: three percent (3%) if redeemed 1979 to 1983, inclusive; two and onehalf percent (2-1/2%) if redeemed 1984 to 1988, inclusive; two percent (2%) if redeemed 1989 to 1993, inclusive; one and one-half percent (1-1/2%) if redeemed 1994 to 1998, inclusive; and one percent (1%) if redeemed 1999 to 2003, inclusive; and zero percent

(0%) if redeemed 2004 and thereafter. If less than all the Bonds (or parts of Registered Bonds) of one maturity and of one series are to be called, the Coupon Bonds or portions of fully Registered Bonds of such series and of that maturity to be called shall be chosen by lot by said Trustee. Except in the case of redemption of a particular series of bonds from surplus proceeds of that issue as provided in the Bond Resolution, no Bonds of any series may be called unless the same proportion of the outstanding Bonds of each other series, then callable, are called at the same time.

NOW, THEREFORE, THIS SUPPLEMENTAL TRUST AGREEMENT, WITNESSETH that in order to secure the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds according to their true intent and meaning, and to secure the performance and observance of all covenants and conditions therein and herein, in the Bond Resolution and in the Trust Agreement contained, and for and in consideration of the premises and of the purchase and acceptance of the Bonds by the holders thereof from time to time, and the acceptance by the Trustee of the further trusts hereby created, and for other good and valuable considerations the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the University has executed and delivered this Fifth Supplemental Agreement.

IN TRUST, NEVERTHELESS, upon the terms and trusts in the Trust Agreement and in this Supplement set forth for the equal and proportionate benefit and security of all present and future holders of the Bonds and appurtenant coupons issued or to be issued under and secured by the said agreements, without preference, priority or distinction, as to lien or otherwise, of any one bond or coupon over any other by reason of priority in the time of the issue or negotiation thereof or otherwise, except as may be otherwise expressly provided in said Trust Agreement.

AND IT IS HEREBY COVENANTED AND DECLARED by the University with the Trustee and its successors in the trust under the Trust Agreement for the benefit of those who shall hold such Bonds and appurtenant coupons at any time issued and outstanding under the Trust Agreement as follows:

Section 1. <u>Incorporation of Bond Resolution</u>. The Series J Bond Resolution is hereby made a part of this Supplement and of the Trust Agreement.

Section 2. Form, Execution and Delivery of Series J Bonds. The Series J Bonds shall be executed, authenticated and delivered as provided herein, and said Series J Bonds, the coupons to be attached thereto, and the certificate of authentication of the Trustee to be endorsed thereon shall be substantially in the form provided in the preambles hereto with any necessary modifications to conform hereto.

Section 3. <u>Proceeds of Sale</u>. The proceeds from the sale of the Series J Bonds shall be applied as provided in the Bond Resolution.

Section 4. <u>Concerning the Trustee</u>. The Trustee hereby accepts the trusts hereby declared and provided and agrees to perform the same upon the terms and conditions in the Trust Agreement and in this or any other Supplement set forth.

The Trustee shall not be responsible in any manner whatsoever for or in respect of the validity or sufficiency of this Supplement or the due execution thereof by the University, nor for or in respect of the recitals herein contained, all of which recitals are made by the University solely. In general, each and every term and condition contained in the Original Trust Agreement shall apply to this Supplement, with such omissions, variations and modifications thereof as may be appropriate to make the same conform to this Supplement.

VIII. REPORTS

A. Report on the National Science Foundation Ceiling

President Fawcett made the following report:

All of us are aware of the fiscal requirements faced by the Federal government as a result of Congressional budgetary action. In anticipation of a reduction in Federal research support, the University has made a major and a successful effort to obtain new grants in the hope that the total receipt of dollars in support of research would remain about the same. We have now been informed by the National Science Foundation of the imposition of an expenditure ceiling on NSF funds--a ceiling based on 1968 expenditures rather than upon 1969 grants and contracts. This method of imposing a ceiling upon expenditures provides more problems for institutions with growing programs than for those in a stable position and appears to us to penalize progress.

While we have made plans to adjust to the loss of almost \$1 million in anticipated receipts from National Science Foundation, we are also preparing a strong request for an adjustment in our ceiling. National Science Foundation has indicated its willingness to receive such requests and the University intends to pursue this matter with vigor. I will keep you informed of the success of our efforts to obtain an adjustment which will reflect in an equitable way the outstanding growth of our research capability.

B. Report on Student Enrollment and Student Housing for Autumn Quarter, 1968

President Fawcett reported on the projected student enrollment as of the fourteenth day after the beginning of classes for the Autumn Quarter, 1968, and the occupancy in student residence halls for the Autumn Quarter, 1968. He noted that

- (1) The first quarter freshmen enrollment has increased by 471 students on the Columbus Campus (7, 500 in 1968 compared to 7, 029 in 1967). This increase is due primarily to the additional number of freshmen honor scholars (almost 100) and the additional number of well-qualified out-of-state students.
- (2) The increase in returning undergraduates on the Columbus Campus is 1,725 (24,700 in 1968 compared to 22,975 in 1967) and is indeed significant. This increase is influenced by the larger freshman class in 1967, a higher retention rate and increased number of transfer students from other colleges and universities.
- (3) The Graduate School enrollment has reached an all-time high of 6,715 on the Columbus Campus, an increase of 444 over 1967. In addition 510 students are enrolled at the Wright-Patterson Graduate Center in Dayton.
- (4) In the Professional Schools, the total enrollment is projected to be 2,491 in 1968 as compared to 2,559 in 1967. The decrease in enrollment is due to a drop in the number enrolled in the College of Law, which decrease is attributed to the effect of the Selective Service Act.
- (5) The enrollment on the regional campuses for 1968 is predicted to be 3,343 as compared to 3,372 for 1967. The President reported that the enrollments on the regional campuses--Lima, Marion and Newark--have increased slightly, while the enrollment on the Mansfield Campus has decreased significantly. The President explained that the loss is due to no increase in the number of high school graduates in the area and a loss in the percentage of graduates attending the Mansfield regional campus due to increased competition from other colleges and the Marion regional campus whose commuting zone overlaps the commuting zone to Mansfield.

In summary, the President reported that the total enrollment of The Ohio State University is expected to reach 45,259, with an increase of 2,559 students over 1967.

B. <u>Report on Student Enrollment and Student Housing for Autumn Quarter, 1968</u> (continued)

Occupancy in Student Residence Halls--President Fawcett reported that as of October 1, 1968, there were 11,716 students housed in University residence halls and that this number is within 10 of the number of spaces planned for housing students (11,726) this Autumn Quarter. He stated further that

Because of the knowledge that the enrollment at the freshmen and sophomore level would not provide enough students to fill all of the residence halls, four floors in Lincoln Tower were not made available to students and Archer House was transferred for use by the Division of Continuing Education. Also, it was planned not to assign 56 spaces in Morrill Tower to provide more adequate space for freshmen honor scholars living on the four floors of Morrill Tower. We have, therefore, more than 650 living spaces in University residence halls not assigned to students in the Autumn Quarter, 1968. For those who question the parietal rule, it should be abundantly clear that the University has not extended itself beyond the planned occupancy of students in the residence halls this year. It would appear also that the parietal rule may need to be continued for next year if we are to fulfill our debt retirement obligation to bondholders.

C. Highlights of University Activities

President Fawcett reported to the Board on some of the significant activities that have taken place in recent weeks. Some references included in the report, which is filed with the official records of the Secretary, were as follows:

- 1. The University welcomed some 500 new faculty and staff members at its annual Newcomers Orientation Program on September 30, 1968, in Mershon Auditorium.
- 2. The President's Annual Report for 1968 to the citizens of Ohio appeared September 29, 1968, as a pictorial supplement in the eight major Sunday newspapers of the state. The press run, 2,145,000 copies, is believed possibly the largest circulation ever given an annual report by an institution of higher education. Titled "The Ohio State University--What's In It for Me?", the publication represented an effort to bring home to the people of Ohio what they are getting for their tax dollars invested in the support of education at Ohio State.
- 3. Don Scott Field is becoming one of Ohio's busiest airports. A total of 124,767 takeoffs and landings for the first eight months of the year for an average of 14,500 operations a month since January 1, 1968, have been reported.

- C. <u>Highlights of University Activities</u> (continued)
 - 4. As a part of an administrative reorganization of the Office of Educational Services, Dr. John T. Bonner, Jr., Vice President for Educational Services, is assuming personal responsibility for the coordination of all learning resources. Learning resources include the University Libraries, the Telecommunications Center, the Listening Center, the Teaching Aids Laboratory and the educational service program of the Department of Photography and Cinema.
 - 5. Under the supervision of the Office of the Dean of Students, extensive instruction in fire survival and control has been included this year in training of residence hall personnel. The State Fire Marshal's Office, Columbus Fire Department and campus fire officials participated in training sessions for about 250 personnel who included residence hall directors, student personnel assistants (graduate students on residence hall staffs) and resident advisers.
 - 6. The University has begun operation of a new, more powerful thirdgeneration computer, an IBM 360, as its main research and instructional computer. The computing machinery occupies the fifth floor of the new Systems Engineering Building and the Computer Center staff has moved its offices from the Research Center to the fourth floor of the new building.
 - 7. A special 24-page homecoming edition of the Ohio State Lantern will be published October 19 by some of the most prominent American journalists on assignments in the United States and abroad. Editors and staff writers for the special edition are former student staff members of the Lantern who are sending dispatches in the form of columns and articles.

D. Report on the University's Investment Portfolio

The report dated October 8, 1968, as submitted to the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees by Vice President Gordon B. Carson pertaining to the University's Investment Portfolio, was received and ordered to be filed with the official records of the Board of Trustees.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

- I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS
 - A. Proposal for Revision of Curricula Leading to Eleven New Baccalaureate Degrees in the College of Engineering and Two New Professional Degrees

The Faculty Council on October 8, 1968, upon the recommendation of the Council on Academic Affairs, approved for transmittal to the Board of Trustees the request for a major revision of the curricula in the College of Engineering. This request included changing (1) to a four-year curriculum, (2) name of the degree to be granted and (3) an advanced professional degree program.

The reorganized programs place greater emphasis on, and offer more opportunity for, post-baccalaureate study for those engineering students preparing for professional practice in engineering. These changes will provide greater flexibility in the years ahead for students who want to strengthen their preparation for careers in the new and more sophisticated areas of professional practice. The new programs in engineering will afford opportunities for students who plan careers in design, development and other areas of engineering practice to obtain advanced professional education comparable to that which has been available traditionally for those students who are oriented more toward research and teaching. They will also give the college basic programs in engineering which are consistent with well-established trends in engineering education and with recommendations of the recently completed GOALS Study of Engineering Education.

The adoption of eleven new baccalaureate degrees to be awarded upon completion of the four-year prescribed programs in the College of Engineering as they are changed will be:

The present five-year degree will be available through June Commencement, 1974, and will be phased out with the introduction of the new four-year degree.

An advanced professional degree program leading either to the degree Electrical Engineer or Mechanical Engineer and administered by the College of Engineering will be inaugurated. These programs will consist of a oneyear sequence of requirements (minimum of 45 hours) beyond the level of achievement represented by The Ohio State University bachelor's program.

The post-baccalaureate study will continue the existing Master of Science program administered through the Graduate School in addition to establishing the new advanced professional program administered through the College of Engineering.

President Fawcett recommended that the above proposal for revising the curricula and the names of the degrees in the College of Engineering and the establishment of two new professional degrees as recommended by the Faculty Council be approved. It was recommended further that the said new programs and degrees become effective immediately.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous voice vote.

B. Administrative Identification of "School" of Art Be Discontinued

The Faculty Council on October 8, 1968, approved the proposal from the Council on Academic Affairs that the School of Art be abolished effective retroactively to July 1, 1968.

Following a reorganization of the College of The Arts in which a Division of Art Education, Division of the History of Art, Division of Design and Division of Art were established within the new college and subsequently approved by the Council on Academic Affairs and the Faculty Council, it was necessary to abolish the currently known School of Art as it has been recognized for several years.

President Fawcett recommended therefore that the action of the Faculty Council be approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous voice vote.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

C. Centennial Celebration for The Ohio State University

Plans have been under way for the last two years for the observance of the University's centennial celebration. A committee was appointed with Vice President Alfred B. Garrett as Chairman, and this committee has been engaged in preliminary planning for this observance to commemorate Ohio State's establishment as the "Ohio Agricultural and Mechanical College" by act of the Ohio General Assembly in 1870. A detailed report concerning the plans developed to date will be presented by Dr. Garrett at the December 12, 1968 meeting of the Board of Trustees.

President Fawcett recommended that the accompanying centennial symbol (page 261) be accepted for use during this celebration.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous voice vote.

D. Naming of Building

Upon the recommendation of a special committee of the Newark Campus of The Ohio State University, and with the concurrence of Dean Richard H. Zimmerman, University College, it is proposed that the first building on the Newark Campus be named "Founders' Hall."

This proposal has the concurrence of the President's Cabinet and is in accordance with the <u>Bylaws of the Board of Trustees</u>. President Fawcett recommended that said proposal be approved.


Upon motion of Dr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

E. Modification of Master Plan

It is proposed that the official comprehensive master plan map adopted by the Board of Trustees on February 16, 1962, and subsequently amended on seven occasions be further modified in the following ways and for the reasons indicated:

- 1. Recent studies by the Division of Campus Planning propose relocation of certain buildings to serve education and the social and behavioral sciences in the northeast sector of the central academic area in keeping with the master plan guidelines to group related disciplines. The master plan map should now be modified to show these changes plus minor relocations of buildings elsewhere on the campus which relate to these changes.
- Planning studies have been completed by the Division of Campus Planning and the Medical Center planning consultant which reflect final design of five buildings (Nursing, Basic Sciences, Biological Sciences, Dodd Hall Addition and Allied Medical Professions), design studies for two others (Mental Retardation and Health Sciences Library) and the location of other proposed Medical Center facilities.





I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

E. Modification of Master Plan (continued)

In addition, these planning studies specify various changes in the location of parking, service and circulation elements in the Medical Center. The Medical Center portion of the master plan map should now be revised to indicate these modifications.

3. The Division of Campus Planning has completed minor planning studies dealing with (a) updating the master plan map in terms of new information about the design or construction of various projects, (b) correcting building or area designations and (c) reflecting development decisions made since the master plan map was last revised. In addition, minor changes are proposed in plan details in order to increase the clarity, the logic and the workability of the master plan map. The master plan map should now be revised to show these corrections and detail improvements.

The changes described above are shown on the accompanying map, dated November 14, 1968, and are consistent with the principles and concepts approved by the Board of Trustees in adopting the master plan in 1962.

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees now approve the master plan changes as depicted on the accompanying map, that all previous actions of the Board of Trustees with respect to the master plan and not contrary to the accompanying map be reaffirmed, and that a copy of said map be filed by the Secretary with the "Campus Master Plan Study--Phase II" report submitted December 12, 1961.

Upon motion of Mr. Dunlap, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous voice vote.

II. PERSONNEL CHANGES

A. Appointment of Vice President for University Development

President Fawcett in presenting the recommendations for changes in personnel indicated that at the July 11, 1968 meeting of the Board he had discussed the need for a realignment of administrative personnel. At that time, the Board took action to establish the position of Vice President for University Development. In accordance with this action of the Board, the following appointment was recommended:

Robert G. Smith be appointed Vice President for University Development, effective February 3, 1969, at a salary of \$27,648.00 per annum.

Upon motion of Dr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the appointment of the new Vice President for University Development was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

B. Amendment to Rules for the University Faculty

Pursuant to the foregoing recommendation for the appointment to the newly created Vice Presidential position, President Fawcett recommended that the following Rule 11.1105 be added to the Rules for the University Faculty:

Rule 11.1105. Vice President for University Development.*

Section 1. The Vice President for University Development shall be the executive head of the Office of University Development.

Section 2. The major area of responsibility and authority of the Vice President for University Development shall be that of general university development. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the Vice President for University Development, shall, under the direction of the President and with the approval of the Board of Trustees, be responsible and have the necessary authority for: the coordination of all aspects of general university development, including the coordination of all university and related offices involved in as well as assisting the President in his responsibility for, resource development, fund raising, financial support, public relations, community relations, alumni affairs, governmental liaison, legislative relations, and internal and external communications.

*Rule initiated by Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees approved the adoption of the above Rule 11.1105 by unanimous voice vote, and the Secretary was authorized to include this Rule in the <u>Rules for the University</u> Faculty.

In addition to the foregoing personnel recommendation, President Fawcett recommended that all personnel changes since the October 9, 1968 meeting of this Board, as recorded in the official "Salary Roll" of the University, be approved by the Board. These changes included the following additional faculty Appointment, Promotion, Leave of Absence With Salary, Leaves of Absence Without Salary and Emeritus Title:

C. Appointment

Gordon E. Gatherum, Professor in the School of Natural Resources, and Professor in the Cooperative Extension Service, effective January 20, 1969, at a salary of \$19,344.00 per annum for 85 per cent of full time. Dr. Gatherum will hold the academic rank of Professor and Chairman in the Department of Forestry at the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center for 15 per cent of full time.

Fred F. Jaeger, Jr., Memorial Insurance Fund

The Fred F. Jaeger, Jr., Memorial Insurance Fund was established November 14, 1968, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University Development Fund from the Estate of the late Fred F. Jaeger, Jr., B.Sc. Bus. Adm. '43, formerly of Columbus, Ohio.

Should the need for the use of the income cease to exist or so diminish as to provide unused income, or should the College of Administrative Science cease to exist through any reorganization of the University, then the income may be used for any purpose whatsoever as determined by the Board of Trustees, with preference being given to recommendations from the appropriate administrative official of the University who is then directly responsible for insurance education.

(The amount deposited in this fund totals \$9,664.30.)

A. Pedestrian Bridge Over Olentangy River and Olentangy River Road

On February 8, 1968, the Board of Trustees approved the employment of Tweed & Eriksson, Engineers, to provide services in connection with this project.

The original project was based on a limited concept of a pedestrian bridge over the river and the Olentangy River Road with temporary stairs at each end. The project has now been expanded to provide for pedestrians and bicycles, with connections to the new River Union terrace on the east and the parking areas on the west.

President Fawcett therefore recommended that a supplemental contract be approved with Tweed & Eriksson to provide for complete engineering services for the new project, including underwater survey, preliminary plans, detailed construction drawings, specifications, contract documents and periodic supervision of construction. B. Lima Campus - Easement, Shell Oil Company

The Shell Oil Company has requested a pipeline easement across State of Ohio lands that have been designated for the use of The Ohio State University, Lima Branch. The pipeline will provide an alternate site to the Shell Oil Company so that the Shell Oil Company can abandon its easement over lands owned by the City of Lima to facilitate the construction of Ferguson Lake water reservoir. The pipeline easement to Shell Oil Company is an additional 20 feet added to a permanent 60-foot Buckeye easement and is not considered excessive or detrimental.

The Ohio State University, by cooperating with the City of Lima to help facilitate the construction of Ferguson Lake water reservoir, will insure its branch campus of an adequate water supply.

A. Donald Frederick Bowers

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on June 10, 1968, of Donald Frederick Bowers, Clinical Assistant Professor, Department of Medicine.

Dr. Bowers was born on January 15, 1901, in East Liverpool, Ohio. He received a Bachelor of Science degree from The Ohio State University in 1924 and a Doctor of Medicine degree from the same university in 1926. He served an internship at Mount Carmel Hospital, Columbus, Ohio, from July 1, 1926 through June 30, 1927. He was appointed as Instructor in Orthopedic Surgery at The Ohio State University, College of Medicine, in 1929. He served in this capacity through 1933. In 1936 he was appointed to the faculty in the Department of Medicine, and he served in this capacity until his death in 1968.

Dr. Bowers was a member of the American Medical Association, the Ohio State Medical Association and the Columbus and Franklin County Academy of Medicine. Dr. Bowers also held membership in the American Heart Association, American Arthritis Association, and Ohio State Heart Association. He served on the Ohio State Medical Board from 1955 to 1965 and was Chairman of the Ohio State Cosmetology Board in 1963.

Dr. Bowers was medical director at Franklin Village, Franklin County Welfare, for many years and this was a job in which he took particular pride and interest. He served in the U. S. Navy for nine months as a Landsman. He was a member of the National Guard from 1927 through 1931.

Dr. Bowers took an active part in the Shriners and was a Potentate of the Aladdin Temple in 1952.

Dr. Dawson was born January 17, 1904. He was a native of Yellow Springs, Ohio, and the son of a former president of Antioch College. He was graduated from Antioch College with an A. B. degree in 1925 where he starred in basketball. He received his M. D. degree from The Ohio State University in 1929.

In 1929 and 1930 Dr. Dawson served an internship in Miami Valley Hospital, Dayton, Ohio, following which he entered general practice in Xenia, Ohio. There he became Assistant Resident in Pediatrics at the Ohio Soldiers and Sailors Home from 1930 to 1934.

In 1934 he was appointed a Resident in General Surgery at the New York Postgraduate School and Hospital in which capacity he served one year. From 1935 to 1937 he served as House Officer in Orthopaedic Surgery at Childrens and Massachusetts General Hospitals in Boston, Massachusetts. He was then appointed Resident in Orthopaedic Surgery and Assistant in the Department of Orthopaedic Surgery at Harvard Medical School and Childrens Hospital in Boston from July, 1937 to September, 1938.

In 1938 Dr. Dawson came to Columbus, Ohio, after being named Consultant to the Industrial Commission of Ohio which post he held until 1941 when he became associated with Dr. Judson D. Wilson in the practice of orthopaedic and traumatic surgery. He joined the faculty of The Ohio State University in 1938 in the Department of Surgery, Orthopaedic Division.

Dr. Dawson was a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons, American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgery and American Medical Association. He was a member of the Clinical Orthopaedic, the Tri State Orthopaedic and the Ohio State Orthopaedic (of which he was a past president) and Columbus Surgical Societies. He was also a member of the Ohio State Medical Association, the Columbus Academy of Medicine, the Northeast State Orthopaedic Club, the Orthopaedic Guild, a regional member of the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons and a diplomat of the American Board of Orthopaedic Surgery. He was a senior attending physician at University, Riverside and Children's Hospitals and the Franklin County T. B. Sanatorium. In addition, Dr. Dawson was on the consulting staffs of numerous other local and area hospitals.

Dr. Dawson was a member of Community Lodge No. 684, F. & A. M., Scottish Rite and Shrine and was active in the Aladdin Shrine Crippled Children's program. He was a member of First Community Church.

Dr. Kinsey was born in East Liverpool, Ohio, on June 19, 1929. He was graduated from The Ohio State University where he received his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1951, Doctor of Medicine degree in 1955 and Master of Medical Science degree in 1961.

Dr. Kinsey served his internship at The Ohio State University Hospital from 1955 to 1956. He served a full general surgical residency and thoracic surgical residency at The Ohio State University Hospital from 1956 to 1962. This was interrupted by two years service given to the National Cancer Institute at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Maryland, from 1957 to 1959, where he was Senior Assistant Surgeon. Following this period of training, he received certification by the American Board of Surgery and the American Board of Thoracic Surgery.

From 1963 to 1964 Dr. Kinsey served as a member of the full-time teaching staff of the Department of Surgery, where he was cancer coordinator. On July 1, 1964, Dr. Kinsey entered private practice of surgery in Columbus, Ohio, serving in his specialties of general and thoracic surgery, while continuing his activities in cancer-oriented programs and cancer research. He provided twenty-four scientific publications that manifested his interest in and ability in teaching and research.

The listing of Dr. Kinsey's educational and professional background gives no clue to his qualities and abilities as a person. Although he was driven by a sense of urgency and a demand for perfection in his professional performance, he carried a warmth and kindness for his patients that provided a rare combination in this day of impersonal scientific production. Doctor Kinsey's unusual personality with happiness, friendliness and wit carried him to deep friendship in many other fields. He carried an unshakable loyalty for his teachers and his University. His integrity inspired not only his students, but his co-workers as well. The loss of this brilliant young man was great, but the inspiration that he has left will keep his memory alive.

During the span of a lifetime, Dr. Kirkendall was the recipient of many honors. He received his medical degree from Starling Medical College in 1905 and his postgraduate studies were completed at Johns Hopkins University and Jefferson Medical College.

Dr. Kirkendall practiced medicine for sixty years, was an Honorary Staff Member at Riverside Methodist Hospital and an Associate Professor Emeritus
in Radiology at The Ohio State University. He was a member of the Academy of Medicine of Columbus and Franklin County, the Ohio State Medical Association, the American Medical Association, the American Radium Society and the American Cancer Society.

Dr. Kirkendall will be remembered by the faculty and former residents in Radiology at The Ohio State University for his contributions and teaching in medicine, especially in the procedural use of radium and its derivatives as therapeutic agents.

E. George Wendell Eckelberry

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on October 31, 1968, of George Wendell Eckelberry, Professor Emeritus of Accounting.

Professor Eckelberry was born at Zaleski, Ohio, on February 1, 1892. He received his B. A. and M. A. degrees from The Ohio State University in 1914 and 1916. During World War I, he served in the Signal Corps and rose through the ranks to Second Lieutenant. He began his career at Ohio State in 1915 and served the University continuously for forty-seven years until his retirement in 1962. His first Ohio State appointment was that of Assistant in the Department of Economics and Sociology. He was made full Professor in 1921, and in 1922 he assumed the Chairmanship of the newly formed Department of Accounting. During these same early years, he passed the Ohio Certified Public Accountant's examination in 1920 and was admitted to the Ohio Bar in 1921.

Professor Eckelberry's exceptional talents were recognized in 1926 when he became Assistant to University President George W. Rightmire, a position he held until 1938. His duties included supervision of the faculty budget, Chairman of the Council on Instruction, member of the Administrative Council and of the University Cabinet. When President Rightmire retired in 1938, Professor Eckelberry returned to teaching in the Department of Accounting. Thereafter, at various times, he was Chairman of the Committee on Student Standing,

member of the Committee on Honorary Degrees and member of the Executive Committee of the Graduate Council. In addition, he served as Director of the University's Summer Quarter program and from 1923 to 1926 he was the first coach of the University's golf team.

In 1927, Professor Eckelberry co-authored a textbook, <u>Outlines of Account-</u> ing, which was used in elementary accounting courses at Ohio State for many years. He published numerous articles on professional topics and became a highly regarded authority in public utility accounting. In 1916, he was one of the founders of the American Association of University Instructors in Accounting, later to become the American Accounting Association, and served as its Secretary-Treasurer from 1924 to 1926. He was also a member of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, the Ohio Society of Certified Public Accountants, Beta Alpha Psi, Beta Gamma Sigma, Alpha Kappa Psi and Delta Tau Delta. In recognition of his notable leadership in accounting education and of his effective service to this University in major administrative assignments, he was granted The Ohio State University Distinguished Service Award in August, 1962.

On behalf of the University at large, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. <u>Amendment Number 38 to John Hancock Mutual Life</u> Insurance Company Contract - Policy No. 1305-G

President Fawcett presented on behalf of the Retirement and Insurance Committee a resolution amending the insurance program for faculty, staff and all regular employees. Amendment Number 38 has been made possible by Revenue Ruling 68-334 - proceeds of group life insurance not included in employee's estate if all rights, including conversion privilege, were irrevocably assigned, and Amended Senate Bill No. 129 amending Section 3917.07 of the Ohio Revised Code. The following resolution was recommended for adoption:

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees, The Ohio State University, that Amendment Number 20, effective July 1, 1960, regarding "Change of Beneficiary," be cancelled and Amendment Number 38 be substituted to be retroactively effective to June 1, 1968.

Amendment Number 38;

It is understood and agreed that effective as of June 1, 1968, said Policy is hereby amended as follows:

- (1) Amendment Number 20 to said Policy is cancelled and annulled and of no further effect.
- (2) The following provision shall supersede and replace all other provisions of said Policy relative to assignments by Unclassified Employees insured under said Policy, of their rights and benefits relating to the Group Life Insurance coverage:

Assignment. No rights or benefits of any such employee relating to his or her Group Life Insurance and Permanent and Total Disability Benefits Insurance, if any, under this Policy shall be assignable except as follows: Such employee may for himself or herself, his or her heirs, executors, administrators and assigns, assign all right, title and interest, and ownership and control and incidents of ownership in this Policy with respect to the Life Insurance on his or her life and his or her Permanent and Total Disability Benefits Insurance, if any, and in any and all such insurance provided now or at any time hereafter under this Policy, together with any additional such insurance which may be provided in the future under this Policy and together with all

benefits, rights and privileges provided now or at any time hereafter under this Policy pertaining to such insurance (including any and all right, title and interest which, except for such assignment, would pass to the estate of the employee) including specifically but not by way of limitation upon the generality of the foregoing, all rights to:

- (i) receive the indemnities and benefits of such insurance,
- (ii) submit the notice of claim, proofs of loss, and proofs of disability required for entitlement to or continuance of such insurance,
- (iii) exercise the conversion privilege,
- (iv) name or change the beneficiary of the employee's insurance under this Policy,
- (v) purchase any such additional insurance for which the employee may become eligible under this Policy,
- (vi) make payment to the Policyholder of any premium payments required to maintain his or her insurance in force under this Policy, and
- (vii) cancel such insurance,

provided such assignment is made in writing by the employee and consented to by the Policyholder and by the Insurance Company in writing. The Policyholder and the Insurance Company reserve the right to decline to consent to any such assignment, and in no event shall the Policyholder or the Insurance Company be responsible for the validity, effect or sufficiency of any such assignment to which it has consented.

(3) The Change of Beneficiary provision under the Group Life Insurance coverage is amended by the addition of the following paragraph:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

A. <u>Amendment Number 38 to John Hancock Mutual Life</u> Insurance Company Contract - Policy No. 1305-G (continued)

Anything in this provision to the contrary notwithstanding, an Unclassified Employee may nominate an irrevocable beneficiary, provided such nomination is made in writing and is consented to by the Insurance Company in writing.

Except as stated in this Amendment, nothing contained herein shall be held to alter or affect any of the provisions of said Policy including any prior Amendments.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the President be authorized to sign on behalf of The Ohio State University, Amendment Number 38 to John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance Company Policy No. 1305-G.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above resolution amending the insurance program for faculty, staff and all regular employees was adopted by unanimous roll call vote, and the President was authorized to sign said Amendment.

VIII. RESOLUTION IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the death of Fordyce Ely, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Dairy Science. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, a copy of the following resolution expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the family of the deceased.

A. Fordyce Ely

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death November 21, 1968, of Fordyce Ely, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Dairy Science.

Dr. Ely was born January 25, 1898, in St. Croix Falls, Wisconsin. He attended Central High School in St. Paul, Minnesota, and entered the University of Minnesota in 1915 where he received the Bachelor of Science degree in 1919. After working on dairy farms and as fieldman for the Twin Cities Milk Producers Association, he enrolled at Iowa State College where he received the Master of Science degree in 1921. From 1921 to 1928, he served on the faculty at Iowa State College where he attained the rank of Associate Professor. In 1928, he became Professor in charge of the Dairy Section at the University of Kentucky. On a leave of absence from the University of Kentucky, Fordyce Ely received the Doctor of Philosophy degree from the University of Minnesota in 1939, specializing in the physiology of milk secretion. He returned to the University of Kentucky and continued teaching and serving as head of the Dairy Section until he joined the faculty at The Ohio State University in 1948. From January 1, 1948 until his retirement in 1963, Dr. Ely served as Professor and Chairman of the Department of Dairy Science where his consecration and enthusiasm were immeasurably responsible for the development and reputation of the Department. He spoke frequently before Ohio dairy farmer audiences and co-authored numerous scientific papers.

Professor Ely was widely known among the purebred dairy cattle breeders throughout the United States for his ability as a dairy cattle judge and a type classification inspector. In his years of dedicated teaching and personal counseling, he touched the hearts of his students and stimulated them to establish goals worthy of their ability. Many distinguished graduates

attribute their success directly to Dr. Ely's influence. In 1966, Dr. Ely organized and conducted a six-week People-to-People tour of Russia and other European countries for a group of 40 Ohio dairy leaders.

Dr. Ely's ability and accomplishments were recognized throughout his career. In 1937, he was an official delegate to the World's Dairy Congress in Berlin; and in 1946, he was elected President of the American Dairy Science Association. The University of Minnesota honored him in 1960 by selecting him as the recipient of the Outstanding Achievement Award. In addition to his membership in the American Dairy Science Association, he was a member of the honor societies: Sigma Xi, Gamma Sigma Delta, Alpha Zeta and Gamma Alpha. He was held in high regard by his fellow faculty members and the leaders of the dairy cattle industry throughout the United States. His contributions to dairying both within Ohio and elsewhere will long be appreciated and remembered.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Dr. Ely its deep sympathy. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a sincere expression of the Board's realization of the loss which the family has sustained.

A. <u>Report on Action Taken by the Ohio Board of</u> <u>Regents at Its Meeting on November 15, 1968</u>

President Fawcett reported for information and the record that the Board of Regents at its meeting on November 15, 1968, approved the increase in the Student Services Fee from \$20 to \$25 per quarter, effective Winter Quarter, 1969.

B. Highlights of University Activities

President Fawcett reported to the Board that the Autumn Quarter Commencement Convocation would be held on Saturday, December 14, 1968, with Dr. John A. Hannah, President of Michigan State University, as the Commencement speaker. He stated further that in a 1968 survey of enrollments at 1,145 U. S. colleges and universities conducted by the University of Cincinnati, Ohio State was reported to rank 10th in full-time enrollment (41, 555) and 13th in grand total enrollment (45, 262).

C. Report on Rose Bowl Ticket Sales

Mr. Mount, Chairman of the Rose Bowl Committee, reported that his committee was working to see that the people who will represent this institution do so in the highest possible manner in accordance with the guidelines set down by the Big Ten Conference in order to bring prestige to the Conference and this University. He reported that to date 4,966 student tickets had been sold and 591 faculty and staff for a total of 5,557 students, faculty and staff. The sponsored tour will accommodate 1,301 students and the wives and parents of the players will bring that total to 1,450 and 1,380 alumni will go on the alumni tour.

D. Progress Report on the Centennial Observance Plans

Dr. Alfred B. Garrett, Vice President for Research, who is serving as Chairman of the University's Centennial Observance Committee, presented a report on the progress in the preparation for this observance. A copy of the complete report is filed with the official records of the Board of Trustees.

E. <u>Report on the University's Investment Portfolio and Accountant's</u> Report on the University Dormitory Revenue Bond Funds

The report on the University's Investment Portfolio dated December 11, 1968, and the Accountant's Report on the University Dormitory Revenue Bond Funds, including the financial statements of June 30, 1968, prepared by Peat, Marwick, Mitchell & Co., as submitted to the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees, were received and ordered to be filed with the official records of the Board.

The Recipients of Honors

WEIKKO A. HEISKANEN

DOCTOR OF SCIENCE

World leader in geodesy, founder of this University's Department of Geodetic Science, genius at stimulating students and colleagues to productive research

Weikko A. Heiskanen is without question the world's most eminent and influential geodesist, and The Ohio State University may well rejoice at the honor of having been the beneficiary for 15 years of his activity on this faculty.

After a long and brilliant career in Finland, Dr. Heiskanen came to the United States in 1950. Under the initial aegis of Ohio State's Department of Geology, he founded on this campus the first department of geodetic science in an American university. Today that department is recognized and respected the world over.

Dr. Heiskanen is the author of some 140 books and articles covering a wide range in geodesy, 82 of which are original contributions to knowledge and all of which have figured in the advancement of his science. His studies of gravity data and their relation to the condition of isostasy in the earth's crust have created an important bridge between geodesy and its sister science of geology, and they will ever stand as classic in their realm. His work in devising the global geodetic system that unifies the work of geodesists all over the world has brought international fame to this University.

While at Ohio State, he organized symposia that brought together several brilliant assemblages of scientists from all parts of the world and, by the cross-fertilization they engendered, advanced the geophysical sciences at large.

Dr. Heiskanen has evinced real genius at stimulating students and colleagues to outstanding accomplishment in a wide variety of geodetic and related fields. His imprint upon these sciences therefore extends far beyond the results of his own individual research.

No less than 30 high honors have come to Dr. Heiskanen, many of international significance. The Ohio State University now takes great pride in adding its accolade to this impressive array, in clear recognition of the great contribution he has made to his field and to the excellence and worldwide reputation of this University.

LISTER HILL

DOCTOR OF LAWS

Dedicated public servant and architect of legislation which has raised to new heights the level of health and education of the American people

Lister Hill, United States Senator from Alabama, has devoted his creative energy and interest to the strengthening of the health and education of this nation.

Son of a dedicated surgeon, bearer of the name of Dr. Joseph Lister distinguished in the medical history of the world as a pioneer in antisepsis, Senator Hill brought to the councils of government a mind hospitable to the great traditions of medicine. During a career of more than four decades in the Congress of the United States, he labored to fashion the tools and to lay the foundations for medical research and education and to provide those facilities that will make possible the "Golden Age of Medicine" which he has foreseen for the world.

Honored throughout the United States as the "Statesman of Health," recipient of the late President Kennedy's accolade as "the outstanding Congressional leader in the field of medical legislation in the nation," Senator Hill was the chief architect of the Hill-Burton Act which has provided hospital facilities throughout the United States, including 20,000 beds in 300 hospitals in the State of Ohio.

The National Institutes of Health are largely the legislative creation of Senator Hill. He has led the legislative fight against mental illness and mental retardation, and he has been the principal initiator of legislation expanding health education and training and strengthening public health programs and aid to the handicapped.

The Ohio State University is among the host of institutions which have been the beneficiaries of Senator Hill's vigorous leadership in the field of education. To cite but two legislative landmarks in his long career, he was co-author of the GI Bill of Rights and author of the National Defense Education Act, and he has been a Congressional leader and national spokesman for virtually all legislation involving organized education at any level.

In recognizing Senator Hill, The Ohio State University pays tribute to a lifetime of public service and to the almost unending array of major accomplishments in the fields of science, health, and education which that lifetime of service has produced.

KARL SCHWARTZWALDER

DOCTOR OF SCIENCE

Creative engineer and scientist, effective administrator, distinguished humanitarian and leader in the education of young people

Throughout his professional career, Karl Schwartzwalder, director of research and development for the AC Spark Plug Division of General Motors Corporation, has demonstrated an insatiable curiosity about materials and their behavior. Today, almost all alumina products manufactured follow closely the results of his pioneering research in alumina ceramics and the disclosures of the more than 50 patents issued to him.

A graduate of The Ohio State University, from which he received the Bachelor of Ceramic Engineering and Master of Science degrees, he has been with the General Motors Corporation his entire professional career except for periods of service as a consultant to government scientific groups and technical and scientific societies.

Mr. Schwartzwalder was a scientific consultant to the Manhattan Project and has served on committees of the National Bureau of Standards, the National Science Foundation, and the Atomic Energy Commission. He is a member of many professional and learned societies, among them the American Ceramic Society which he has served as president and the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

For his ingenuity and creative ability in the engineering and scientific fields, Mr. Schwartzwalder has been honored in many ways. In 1959, he was chosen by this University as a Distinguished Alumnus.

Mr. Schwartzwalder's outstanding professional accomplishments have been closely rivaled by civic contributions, particularly in improving educational opportunities for young people in his community. He is the founder and president of the "Five Talents" educational program to challenge the minds of the brightest youth in the Flint-area parochial high school system. He has given much of his time to stimulating the interest of young people in science and to cultivating in them a strong moral and religious fiber.

Karl Schwartzwalder has demonstrated extraordinary ability as a scientist and engineer in the ceramic and automotive industries and has found time to give liberally of his talent in service to others. In every way, his career has indeed been one of great distinction.

President Fawcett introduced Mr. Robert G. Smith, Vice President for University Development, whose appointment became effective February 1, 1969.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATION

A. Departments of Accounting and Business Organization Be Discontinued

On December 10, 1968, the Faculty Council approved a proposal from the Council on Academic Affairs that the Departments of Accounting and Business Organization be discontinued, effective immediately.

Since the academic reorganization of the University was approved, the faculty of the College of Administrative Science has given careful study to the mission, internal organization and programs of the new College. In order to implement the internal reorganization of the College and to permit establishment of new academic faculties in Accounting, Finance, Management Science and Marketing, it was necessary to dissolve the existing Departments of Accounting and Business Organization.

In developing the proposed College organization, the faculty sought a structure that will facilitate (1) more effective utilization of faculty resources, (2) the development of appropriate academic policies related to each of the disciplines, (3) the interdisciplinary planning and coordination required for the programs and (4) fuller faculty involvement in the formulation of College policies.

President Fawcett recommended that the action of the Faculty Council be approved by the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Dr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote.

VI. PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS

At the request of the Vice President for Business and Finance, President Fawcett recommended that the plans and specifications, bills of materials and estimates of cost for the following projects be approved by the Board of Trustees:

A. McCracken Power Plant - Addition to Primary Distribution System

The electrical load in existing central campus buildings is increasing at such a rate that higher capacity is required. This capacity is being achieved by a transfer of power from the 13 KV system to the 4.16 KV system.

Funds for this project have been provided by a transfer from Budget Account 149996 (Contingency Reserve) to Budget Account 801188 Primary Electrical Distribution System.

B. West Substation Transfer

The feeder system for the West Campus buildings needs revision to provide relief for the increased central campus electrical load. This project permits the West Campus buildings to be served from a 13 KV utility line augmenting the present system.

Funds for this project have been provided by a transfer from Budget Account 149996 (Contingency Reserve) to Budget Account 801188 Primary Electrical Distribution System.

C. Elevator Modernization

This project will replace or repair elevator units as required to eliminate unreliable operations and unsafe conditions that exist on the units in Cockins Hall, Men's Physical Education Building, Oxley Hall and William Oxley Thompson Memorial Library.

Funds for this project will be provided from Budget Account 124358 Contract Repair.

D. Lighting Improvements - 12th and 19th Avenues

This project will replace the existing lighting system with new underground wiring, new aluminum poles and mercury luminaries.

Funds for this project will be provided from Budget Account 124358 Contract Repair.

B. Mansfield Technical Center - Employment of Architects

President Fawcett recommended that the architectural firm of Thomas Gene Zaugg and Associates, Mansfield, Ohio, be employed to provide complete architectural and engineering services for this project including preliminary plans, basic drawings, working drawings, specifications, estimate of cost, necessary bidding documents and supervision of construction.

The fee for this service is estimated to be \$49,000.00 or 7 per cent of the estimated cost of construction. Funds will be provided from Item 315-060 Mansfield Technical Center and an appropriation from the Board of Regents.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Dunlap, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

C. Comparative Medical Teaching and Research Facility -Employment of Architects

On December 10, 1964, the Board of Trustees approved the employment of Benham, Richards and Armstrong for the Veterinary Clinic and Animal Hospital. This project now known as Comparative Medical Teaching and Research Facility has been expanded and qualified for federal assistance. Because of the expansion of the project, President Fawcett recommended that the original contract for architectural services for the Veterinary Clinic and Animal Hospital be terminated and that the Board of Trustees approve the employment of Benham, Richards and Armstrong for the Comparative Medical Teaching and Research Facility.

Their services will include complete architectural and engineering work including preliminary plans, basic drawings, working drawings, specifications, estimate of cost, necessary bidding documents and supervision of construction.

The fee for this service is estimated to be \$418,052.00 and will be calculated on the standard fee schedule for construction cost. Funds for this project will be provided from S. B. 370, H. B. 202, H. B. 886 and a Federal Grant.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

D. Garage and Laundry Building, Alteration of South Portion

President Fawcett recommended that the engineering firm of Ralph and Curl be employed to provide complete professional engineering services for heating, ventilating, air conditioning, plumbing and electrical work for this project including surveys, design, preparation of drawings, specifications and estimate of cost, checking shop drawings and four inspection trips to review the performance of the contractors.

The fee for this service is estimated to be \$5,950.00 or 7 per cent of the construction cost of the plumbing, heating and electrical work. If additional inspection trips are required, they will be charged for at an hourly rate of \$15 for principals, \$11 for engineers and \$8 for draftsmen. Funds have been provided by a transfer from Budget Account 149996 (Contingency Reserve) to Budget Account 801163 (Garage and Laundry Remodeling).

Upon motion of Mr. Dunlap, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

E. University Hospital, Remodel Intensive Care - Recovery Rooms

President Fawcett recommended that the architectural firm of Dan A. Carmichael be employed to provide complete architectural and engineering services for this project including preliminary plans, basic drawings, working drawings, specifications, estimate of cost, necessary bidding documents and supervision of construction.

The fee for this service is estimated to be \$21,500.00 or 10 per cent of the construction cost. Funds for the project will be provided from the Hospital Rotary.

IX. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of Thomas H. Langlois, Research Professor Emeritus in the Academic Faculty of Population and Environmental Biology, College of Biological Sciences; Carl Adolph Norman, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Mechanical Engineering; Perry P. Denune, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Sociology; and James R. Hopkins, Professor Emeritus and Director of the former School of Art. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

A. Thomas H. Langlois

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death on December 5, 1968, of Thomas H. Langlois, Research Professor Emeritus in the Academic Faculty of Population and Environmental Biology, College of Biological Sciences.

Dr. Langlois was born in Detroit, Michigan, on February 19, 1898. After serving in 1918 and 1919 as a member of the Natural Resources Council of the United States Naval Reserve, he completed his Bachelor of Science degree at the University of Michigan in 1924 and his Master of Science degree in 1925.

From 1924 to 1927 he served as the Assistant Fisheries Biologist for the Michigan State Department of Conservation. The following two years he served as State Fish Pathologist and then became Chief of the Fish Section of the Ohio State Division of Conservation and Natural Resources in 1930, a position which he held for sixteen years. In 1935, Dr. Langlois received his Doctor of Philosophy degree from The Ohio State University. The following year he served as an Assistant Professor in the Department of Animal Husbandry at Ohio State. He joined the Department of Zoology as a Professor in 1938 and remained in this position until 1956. From 1956 to 1964, Dr. Langlois served as a Research Professor. He retired in 1964 from The Ohio State University. During the period 1936 to 1956, Dr. Langlois served as Assistant Director and Director of the Franz Theodore Stone Institute of Hydrobiology at Put-in-Bay, Ohio. He also served as a member of the Board of Directors of the Research Foundation of the University.

Dr. Langlois' knowledge and ability in the field of zoology and, more specifically, in the field of fisheries, are made obvious by the responsibilities he held in administrative positions throughout his career. His accomplishments were recognized when he was made an honorary member of the Fisheries Society and later, in 1950, became President of this Society. His publications include research in social zoology, social limnology, oceanography and in ice formation on Lake Erie. As an authority on the ecology and sociology of fish, Dr. Langlois was considered outstanding in his field.

B. Carl Adolph Norman

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death January 1, 1969, of Carl Adolph Norman, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Mechanical Engineering.

Professor Norman was born on January 12, 1879, in Borga, Finland. He attended the Helsingfors High School in Finland, and he earned his engineering degree at the Royal Technological Institute in Stockholm, Sweden. He also pursued graduate studies in Berlin, Munich, the University of Chicago and the University of California. He came to the United States in 1902 to practice in the field of machine design at the Jones and Laughlin Steel Company until 1907. From 1908 to 1910, he was in charge of production at the Nobel Brothers Refinery in Baku, Russia. He returned to the United States in 1912 to serve as a consulting engineer in the gas turbine field at the General Electric Company. In 1917, he joined the faculty at The Ohio State University as Professor of Machine Design in the Department of Mechanical Engineering. He developed this area of engineering education and was actively developing the area of gas turbine design at the time of his retirement in 1949.

Professor Norman was known and respected among the teachers of machine design throughout the United States and in many other countries for his widely used textbooks in this field. His first textbook was <u>Principles of Machine Design</u>, and his second textbook, <u>Fundamentals of Machine Design</u>, was written with Professor E. S. Ault and Professor I. F. Zarobsy as co-authors. In addition to these texts in machine design, he was co-author with Professor Richard H. Zimmerman (now Dean of the University College at The Ohio State University), of one of the early texts in the field of gas turbines and jet propulsion entitled, <u>Introduction to Gas Turbines and Jet Propulsion Design</u>. He was also the author of a number of technical papers dealing with his research in machine elements, such as belts and belt drives and he held patents on belt testing machines. He was one of the world authorities in the field of power transmission by belting.

Professor Norman had a profound interest in human problems which matched his interest in the technical world. This led him to teach, for many years, a course in human engineering which was required of all mechanical engineering undergraduates. In addition, he published a number of papers in this field.

B. Carl Adolph Norman (continued)

Professor Norman was a member of several professional organizations such as the American Society of Mechanical Engineering and the American Society for Engineering Education. He was elected a Fellow of the ASME, and in 1968 was honored with the fifty-year membership award. He was also elected to membership in several honorary societies such as Sigma Xi and Tau Beta Pi.

Professor Norman's time as a consultant was in continual demand by such companies as the General Electric Company, The International Harvester Company, The Dayton Rubber Manufacturing Company, the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company and many others. In addition, because of his great facility with a number of languages, he served as foreign editor of Automotive Abstracts for a number of years.

While Professor Norman had great talents as an engineer, his greatest accomplishment was his ability to inspire his students, not only to have them learn the technical material he was presenting, at which he was a master, but also to inspire them to think about the effects their engineering work would have on the well-being of our society. At any gathering of alumni of the Department of Mechanical Engineering where former students of Professor Norman were present, there were always discussions about the lasting impression made on them by "Pop" Norman, as he was affectionately known.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Professor Norman its deep sympathy. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a sincere expression of the Board's realization of the loss which the family has sustained.

C. Perry Perdue Denune

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death on January 19, 1969, of Perry P. Denune, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Sociology.

Dr. Denune was born April 13, 1891, on a farm in Franklin County where he attended rural schools. He was graduated from North High School in Columbus, and subsequently enrolled at Hiram College from which he received the A. B. degree in 1917. From 1919 to 1921, he was in the grocery business. He served as a minister of the Church of Christ from 1914 to 1919. He received his M. A. and Ph. D. degrees from The Ohio State University in 1922 and 1927, respectively. Dr. Denune started his teaching career at The Ohio State University as an Assistant in 1921, becoming an Instructor in 1922, an Assistant Professor in 1928 and an Associate Professor in 1930. In 1940, he was appointed Professor of Sociology and Chairman of the Department and served in that capacity until 1950. He retired in 1951 and moved to Santa Rosa, California.

C. Perry Perdue Denune (continued)

Dr. Denune was responsible for developing the program and reputation of the Department of Sociology in teaching, research and service during the crucial years of rapid expansion after World War II. His special fields of interest in Sociology were Rural and Urban Sociology, Social Welfare and the Family. Results of research in these areas were published in monographs and numerous articles in professional sociological journals and other publications. Dr. Denune's ability and accomplishments in his chosen field were recognized by his colleagues when they elected him President of the Ohio Sociological Society in 1947-48. He was also Editor of the Ohio Valley Sociologist.

A dedicated teacher in and out of the University, Dr. Denune made numerous public addresses on sociological and social welfare topics in the local community and throughout the state. He contributed expertly and generously to civic affairs serving on numerous local, state and national boards, committees and commissions, such as the Board of Directors of the Columbus Council of Social Agencies, the Children's Code Commission, the State Department of Public Welfare of Ohio and the Committee on Education for Marriage of the National Conference on Family Relations. He was President of the Franklin County Chapter of the American Red Cross in 1935, the Ohio Welfare Conference in 1935 and the Columbus Council of Social Agencies in 1937.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Dr. Denune its deep sympathy. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a sincere expression of the Board's realization of the loss which the family has sustained.

D. James R. Hopkins

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death, January 23, 1969, of James R. Hopkins, Professor Emeritus and Director of the former School of Art.

Professor Hopkins was born May 17, 1877, in Irwin, Ohio. He began his professional training at the Art Academy of Cincinnati. There he worked under Frank Duveneck before going abroad to study. After a year in Paris he travelled around the world studying in particular the art in Italy, Egypt, Ceylon, China and Japan. Returning to Paris in 1904 he remained for ten years, exhibiting frequently at the Salon des Artistes and other important shows. He was a member of the Societe Nationale des Beaux Arts, Paris. He also sent paintings to the United States and South America, winning the Lippincott Prize at the Pennsylvania Academy in 1908 and the Bronze Medal at the Buenos Aires International Exposition of 1910. He returned to the United States in 1914 and became the head and a member of the teaching staff of the Cincinnati Art Academy where he worked with his close friend and former teacher, Frank Duveneck.

D. James R. Hopkins (continued)

In this period following his return from Europe he won the gold medal at the San Francisco Exposition of 1915; the Norman Wait Harris bronze medal at the Art Institute of Chicago, 1916; and the Thomas Clark prize at the National Academy of Design, 1920. He was designated as an Associate member of the National Academy (A. N. A.). He became especially famed for his paintings of Kentucky mountaineers at about the same time that John Fox in his American novels and Cecil Sharp in his English folk dances and music were discovering our "Contemporary Ancestors." The large canvasses "Mountain Courtship" (American Academy Award) and "Circuit Rider" (Ohio State University Collection) have become well known and appreciated for their artistic merits as well as for their intriguing subject content.

In 1923, James Hopkins accepted the position of visiting artist in residence on the Ohio State campus. He was soon appointed Head of the Department of Fine Arts and under his wise administration and executive work the rather small department grew to the status of a school having by 1947 a staff of forty and an enrollment of over seven hundred major students. His sincere interest and warm counseling, inspiring teaching and enthusiasm in art coupled with his diplomacy and executive skills became proverbial on The Ohio State University campus.

In addition to his master class in portrait painting and to his administrative duties for the School of Art, he found time for many other services, being at various times Chairman of the Athletic Board, Chairman of the Rules Committee and Chairman of the Committee on Recognition of University Staff. In addition, he was an active member of the Committee on Memorials and Gifts, the College Executive Committee, the Degree with Distinction Committee, the College Committee on Honorary Degrees and served as an unofficial advisor to the State Department of Education.

Professor Hopkins retired in 1947 and was made Professor Emeritus of Fine Arts. He received the honorary degree, Doctor of Laws, in 1948.

Professor Hopkins is represented by several portraits of University personnel on the University campus as well as many portraits in private collections. He also is represented in the collections of the Cincinnati Museum Association, the Atlanta Art Association and the Art Institute of Chicago.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Professor Hopkins its deep sympathy. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a sincere expression of the Board's realization of the loss which the family has sustained.

A. Report from Mr. Bricker Concerning Property Received by The Ohio State University and Request for Authorization to Sell Said Property

The Chairman, Mr. Bricker, reported that The Ohio State University has received a gift of property from the Estate of Harriet A. Paul which is located in Upper Arlington, Ohio. It was requested that this property be sold and the proceeds be paid to the University in accordance with the provisions of the donor's will.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the authorization for the sale of said property was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

The reports dated January 20, 1969 and February 12, 1969, as submitted to the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees by Vice President Gordon B. Carson pertaining to the Investment Portfolio, were received and ordered to be filed with the official records of the Board of Trustees.

C. Report on Status of the Budget Requests for The Ohio State University for 1969-71

President Fawcett made the following statement:

A succinct report on the status of our budget request for 1969-71 seems to be in order, since so much has been said and written on this subject in the last several weeks and since the requests are in channel but have not yet been resolved.

As I have reported to you previously under the regulations established by the Board of Regents, the University made its budget request to the Board of Regents on August 31, 1968. This was divided into two parts: (1) A continuation budget and (2) A budget for new and improved programs.

A continuation budget by definition incorporates the necessary funds for increased costs due to inflation, 5 percent for faculty salary increases, mandated increases for non-teaching employees, all the costs that are involved in increased enrollments, the costs of operating buildings that have come on line but are not in operation during the present year and such other miscellaneous items that are essential for the operation of this University.

The new and improved programs budget is for the support of programs which have evolved out of departmental six-year studies. These programs have been screened and examined in terms of what society demands most and of what the Institution is best qualified to provide.

> On January 9, 1969, the Board of Regents met and took its official action. I would like to say, first of all, that the total dollars recommended to avoid a drop in quality at our institutions constituted a figure that I felt was acceptable--it provided for a continuation budget as I have defined it and provided support for about 27 percent of the new and improved programs that we had envisioned we could develop. The sources of funds suggested in this document caused a considerable amount of concern. First, for example, there was to have been an increase of 9 percent in this University's budget which when reduced to support on a full-time equivalent basis would have meant a 3.2 percent increase per student and a new two-part fee program. The first part called for an increase in the instructional fee at Ohio State from \$135 to a maximum of \$200 per quarter and an increase in the general fee that could have taken it from \$25 up to \$50 a quarter as a maximum, with the level to be determined, of course, on the basis of the needs of the University. The second part of the proposal involved a grant-in-aid program, for students of low income families, of \$100 or \$50 per quarter for an income of \$5,000 or \$7,500 per year, respectively, and twice this amount for students whose fees were over \$1,000 per year. It happens, that there are no private institutions where fees are under \$1,000 and no public institutions with fees as high as \$1,000. The full implementation of the program, if it had been adopted, could have placed resident fees at \$750 versus \$510 at the present time and non-resident fees at \$1,500 versus the present level of \$1,110. We would still have been roughly 7 million dollars per year under our request of last August for new and improved programs. As I indicated, the State support would have been in the range of 3.2 percent more per student and fees would have been increased in the range of 38 to 47 percent, had we followed this plan.

> Three-fourths of the out-of-state undergraduates were to have been subsidized the first year and one-half the second year.

There would have been five branch districts with detachments of what we call regional campuses from parent campuses and a redistribution of these centers. As an illustration, Lima would have become a part of the northwest section and Lancaster, which is a part of the Ohio University district, would have been placed in the central district and so on.

Much dissatisfaction was expressed on the subject of student fees, out-of-state student support and branch campuses. The plan envisioned some increase in tax resources but failed to point out clearly to the General Assembly what the institutions

believed were minimum needs. The Presidents of the Stateassisted insitutions, without committing their governing boards, opposed the proposed large increase in fees. They opposed the out-of-state student formula. They opposed the branch plan. They opposed the grants-in-aid program unless additional resources were made available. I don't believe, however, that anybody would oppose the grants program if sufficient resources were available.

Now the Governor's State of the State message delivered last week held out new hope for us. I thought his treatment of higher education was for the most part enlightened. He proposed a much larger increase in State subsidy for technical education. He proposed a freeze on instructional fees at \$450 and presumably, although not stated, I believe, a \$150 limitation on general fees, which at Ohio State would mean an increase of \$5 per quarter on instructional fees if we went to this level and a range of increase from \$5 to \$25 on the general fee depending on institutional needs. This is a concept in harmony with a position this Institution has advocated for a long time, and I am very pleased with it. No subsidy, however, was provided for out-of-state undergraduates, but there was indicated full support for students -graduate and professional -- a point I suppose that could be argued, but one of the central missions of this Institution is graduate and professional education. Good graduate programs bring students from everywhere for reasons that are obvious to all of us, a procedure that should continue. There was a proposal for acceleration of branches to fouryear institutions. We have historically taken a position at our branches that we will support the policy guidelines established by the Board of Regents as a service to the people of the State. We have consistently insisted upon high quality in the lower division programs, and we continue to support the Board of Regents' policy providing for independence when their enrollment reaches the level of 5,000 students. If there is to be some change in that standard, we are not opposed to it. We will support the independent status for the branches when their fiscal resources and academic programs are sufficiently sound to guarantee high quality programs. There was a heavy emphasis on technical education at the branches, and we are under way with these programs. While we may differ in our views about procedures, we believe in technical education. This morning we have approved architects for the design of technical buildings at Lima and Mansfield. We have the space in the Newark and Marion buildings, because of lower enrollments, to provide technical education

> now. There is no conflict in one view about the need for technical education, merely the procedure for supplying it, which has to be worked out. We are perfectly willing to work on this problem on any intelligent basis.

There was a capital improvements program proposed. As you know, at this Institution, under the law we are required to file requests for capital improvements every two years. We do this thoroughly, trying to anticipate all conceivable needs. We filed, as you know, a very sizeable document. With the exception of the Journalism Building, which was to be provided under Issue No. 1, our top priority item called for the construction of a new University Hall. While funds for this building were not in the message, we have had some assurance since that time that these funds will be provided. I sincerely hope that we will be able to obtain this building as soon as possible since it will form the center for the liberal education program on this campus. It is the facility that is urgently needed if the College of Humanities is to continue to grow and develop as it should.

The outcome of the proposal in the Governor's message on February 5 would appear to me to provide us a satisfactory continuation budget using the best definition of the term. It would provide us with resources for approximately onefourth of our proposed new and improved programs. It would guarantee no major fee increase which, as I have indicated before, is the position I and many of you have advocated for a long time. The program, of course, is buttressed on a new tax program which would give a good level of operation for at least two more years. In general, I may say that I will support such taxes as the Legislature in its wisdom determines are necessary in order to pay for these programs.

I would add two or three footnotes --

(1) In all honesty I think there is some disagreement on a hasty conversion of branches. I think this is a problem that in due course can be worked out.

(2) There is no way for us at the present time to estimate the number of out-of-state students who would be attending this University as undergraduate students on the basis of newly proposed policy, but we need these students. They help to improve the quality of the University. We will still be trying to have out-of-state students attending. We do not

want our percentage of undergraduate out-of-state students to be under the 9 percent which we have at the present time. This University has never turned away Ohio students in preference to out-of-state students.

Another footnote I might add is my concern that non-teaching personnel employees be provided the mandated increases. We must be competitive with the market in this area, and we need the very best people we can get for these positions.

I want to say finally that the proposed fee freeze is good so long as there is adequate support from the State. I am advised that there will be a substitute bill for the branch programs that will do two or three things. One, it will leave the branches attached to the parent campuses, and two, it will mandate the offering of technical courses. We are not in disagreement with this principle because we are already under way on technical education at our branches, Three, it mandates an associate degree program at the branches. A question that may be argued is whether this is a Legislative or an academic decision. We haven't given the associate degree at The Ohio State University campus for two reasons--first, our mission has been more directed toward upper division and professional education and second. we have not chosen to be in competition with the Columbus Technical Institute, which is also under State support.

So, in general, the outlook for support from proper sources is much brighter than it was a month ago. The ultimate decision, however, is yet to come.

Mr. Bricker commented "There has been so much confusion in the press and otherwise--we certainly appreciate the presentation as it comes now."

Mr. Shocknessy stated "I think we can all feel consoled with our present posture. I think that generally the Governor's State of the State message follows the aims and aspirations of this Board."

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

- I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS
 - A. Revision of Rule 21.07 and Rule 29.2709 of Rules for the University Faculty

The Faculty Council on February 11, 1969, upon the recommendation of the Rules Committee of the Council approved certain amendments to the Rules for the University Faculty.

In addition to correcting and making more explicit some of the wording of the existing Rule 21.07, the revised rule specifically calls for

- 1. Person charged to have the right of appearance at all stages of the hearings;
- 2. A new committee to be known as the Faculty Tenure Hearing Committee to be established;
- 3. The President, after receiving the recommendation of Hearing Committee, shall give written notice to person charged before making formal recommendation to Board of Trustees. If the Board disagrees with recommendation of President, the Board shall request the President, the Hearing Committee and the person charged to respond to issues raised by the Board. After such review, the President shall then make his final recommendation.

Rule 29, 2709 provides for

- 1. Changes in the number of members of the Council on Student Affairs and the manner in which they are chosen;
- 2. Faculty Council Standing Committee on Student Affairs; and
- 3. Changes in titles of principal administrators in the Office of Student Affairs necessary to accommodate the changes in titles previously approved by the Board of Trustees.

President Fawcett recommended that the above-referred-to amendments to the <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u> be adopted by the Board of Trustees, and that the Secretary of the Board be directed to correct and reprint the <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u> incorporating the specific changes as approved by the Faculty Council and included in these minutes as Appendix IV, page 453.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

B. Establishment of a Certificate Program in Latin American Area Studies

The Faculty Council on February 11, 1969, upon the recommendation of the Council on Academic Affairs, approved for transmittal to the Board of Trustees the recommendation that a new program in Latin American Area Studies be established.

The Certificate Program in Latin American Area Studies is designed to supplement work for an advanced degree in any one of the cooperating departments. It consists of courses in the Spanish and Portuguese languages and courses dealing with one or more countries or regions of Latin America in five or more disciplines. The student will also be expected to acquire advanced competence in at least one professional area outside his major field of study. A Master's thesis or essay in a Latin American topic must be completed before the Certificate is obtained.

In order to insure the candidate's thorough competence in his own discipline, a student who enrolls only for the Certificate Program must already have a Master's degree or an advanced professional degree in a suitable discipline or must have passed his General Examinations for the Ph. D.

President Fawcett recommended that the above proposal be approved by the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Dr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

C. Degrees and Certificates Conferred--Winter Quarter Commencement

President Fawcett recommended that degrees and certificates be conferred at the Winter Quarter Commencement Convocation on March 15, 1969, to those students who have completed the requirements for their respective degrees and certificates and are recommended by the Faculty Council. The names of those awarded degrees and certificates will be included in the minutes of this meeting. (See Appendix V, page 459.)

Upon motion of Mr. Dunlap, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

D. A Major Library Acquisition

The University has negotiated a purchase agreement, subject to ratification by this Board, with a major bookstore in this country for the acquisition of an inventory of over 800,000 volumes. This agreement provides for the payment of a total of \$250,000.00 from the annual University Libraries budgets over a period of several years.

With these additional volumes, which will be the largest single acquisition in the history of the University, The Ohio State University Libraries will move from its present position of fourteenth largest to well within the ten largest research libraries in the nation.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote.

VIII. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

A. Laboratory Animal Facility - Easements and Agreements to Provide for Construction of a Water Line

Easements and temporary work agreements for the construction of a water line will be required for the development of the Laboratory Animal Facility located adjacent to Don Scott Field. President Fawcett recommended that the necessary agreements to provide the right-of-way be negotiated with private land owners as determined from engineers' drawings.

It was, therefore, recommended that the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to request the Director of Public Works, pursuant to his statutory duties, to appraise the land owners' rights and to develop the necessary legal documents to provide the University with a right-of-way.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

B. Edith Cockins Hall - Modernization for Faculty Offices

President Fawcett recommended that the engineering firm of Ralph and Curl be employed to provide services including complete preparation of plans and specifications for year-around ventilation and air conditioning for 18 faculty offices for the Department of Mathematics.

The fee for this service is estimated to be \$2,320.00 or 8 per cent of the mechanical contracts cost. Funds for the project have been provided by a transfer from Budget Account 149993 (Plant Funds Reserve) to Budget Account 801181 (Edith Cockins Hall - Modernization).

Upon motion of Dr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

VIII. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE (continued)

C. Systems Engineering - Area 480 Computer Facility

President Fawcett recommended that the architectural firm of Croce and Abbot be employed to provide architectural and engineering services including all architectural, mechanical and electrical design and complete preparation of drawings and specifications for conversion of a portion of the fourth floor of the Systems Engineering Building to an expanded computer facility.

The fee for this service is estimated to be \$11,000.00 computed on an hourly basis, but not to exceed 10 per cent of the cost of construction. Funds have been provided by a transfer from Budget Account 149993 (Plant Funds Reserve) to Budget Account 801172 (Systems Engineering Remodeling).

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Dunlap, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

D. Underground Electric Line Easement to Provide for Additional Electricity to the Main Campus

The Columbus and Southern Ohio Electric Company has been requested to provide additional electrical service to the campus. An easement to provide the right-of-way for this underground line is required. The easement required will commence at a point at King Avenue on the east side of the dike, proceeding northward to the site of the proposed substation, turning eastward approximately 300 feet to the southeast corner of the proposed substation, and then northward approximately 200 feet to tie in with the University distribution equipment.

The right-of-way shall be of sufficient width to provide the necessary future electric service as agreed between the Columbus and Southern Ohio Electric Company and the Office of Business and Finance of The Ohio State University.

President Fawcett recommended that the granting of an underground electrical easement to the Columbus and Southern Ohio Electric Company be approved. It was further recommended that the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to request the Director of Public Works, pursuant to his statutory duties, to act on behalf of the University in developing the easement to provide for the new and improved electric service.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

VIII. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE (continued)

E. Acquisition of Property for Educational Facilities

President Fawcett presented the following resolution for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

WHEREAS, the College of Veterinary Medicine at The Ohio State University in planning to meet the needs of its students and related programs is required to expand its facilities beyond the geographical area now served by its present Veterinary Clinic; the rapid urbanization of Franklin County has reduced the available livestock population below that required for continued large animal clinical instruction; this clinical instruction is an essential element in the four-year veterinary curriculum and requires specialized facilities and the availability of an adequate animal population; the acquisition of a facility in Union County will provide the required access to a more adequate large animal population; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University deems that the acquisition of this facility is required to meet the needs of the College of Veterinary Medicine of the University and to serve the people of the State of Ohio; and, therefore, find it expedient to proceed with the acquisition of the necessary real property;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized and directed to proceed with the purchase of the following described real estate located in Paris Township, Union County, Ohio:

Being 4.988 acres in VMS 3354 and 9.996 acres in VMS 3354 and 4069, Paris Township, Union County, Ohio, located on the Marysville-Milford Center Road (State Routes 4 and 36), and adjacent to the City of Marysville, Ohio, containing a complete and operational facility for a veterinary medicine practice.

Funds are available in Budget Account 801099 (transferred from the Veterinary Clinic Rotary). The owners of record are John E. Andreas and Helen M. Andreas. The purchase price of the property is not to exceed \$135,000.00.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Dr. Thomas, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

IX. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of Carlton F. Christian, Associate Professor Emeritus in the Cooperative Extension Service, and Dieter Cunz, Professor and Chairman of the Department of German. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families and friends of the deceased.

A. Carlton F. Christian

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death January 29, 1969, of Carlton F. Christian, Associate Professor Emeritus in the Cooperative Extension Service.

Mr. Christian, born September 4, 1892, Fulton County, Ohio, was a veteran of World War I. He taught vocational agriculture at Canal Winchester after graduation from The Ohio State University. Later he edited a rural weekly newspaper, <u>The Republican Record</u>, in Geauga County; was farm editor of the <u>Defiance Crescent News</u> in Defiance, Ohio; and served as editor of <u>Farm</u> and Dairy, weekly farm publication in Salem, Ohio.

From January 22, 1934 to June 30, 1935, he was county extension agent in Wyandot County, leaving this position to serve as information specialist with the Agricultural Adjustment Administration in Washington, D. C. In 1936 he returned to Ohio to become secretary and general manager of the newly organized Milk Producers' Federation of Cleveland. He left this post to join the staff of the Cooperative Extension Service at Ohio State, first as an extension dairy marketing specialist and later as agricultural editor.

As agricultural editor from 1953 until his retirement in 1958, Mr. Christian headed the Extension Office of Information and Educational Aids on the University's Columbus campus and the Public Information Office at the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center in Wooster.

Mr. Christian was a skillful writer, editor and teacher, with a compassion for justice, a determination for accuracy and a disdain for verbosity. His loss is keenly felt by his professional associates.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Mr. Christian its deep sympathy. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a sincere expression of the Board's realization of the loss which the family has sustained.

IX. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM (continued)

B. Dieter Cunz

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death on February 17, 1969, of Deiter Cunz, Professor and Chairman of the Department of German.

Dr. Cunz was born August 4, 1910, in Hoechstenbach, Germany. He grew up and attended school in Wiesbaden. He studied at the Universities of Munich, Leipzig, Koenigsberg and Frankfurt. From Frankfurt he received his Ph. D. in 1934 in the fields of German Literature and History.

A dedicated opponent of Hitler and his regime, he left his native country in 1934 and lived in Switzerland as a free-lance writer and contributor to Swiss newspapers. In 1938 he emigrated to the United States. After a year in New York City, he moved to Baltimore, Maryland, where he received a scholarship from the Carl Schurz Memorial Foundation for work in the archives and the library of the Society for the History of the Germans in Maryland. In the same year he started his teaching career at the University of Maryland at College Park, Maryland, where he rose within nine years from the rank of assistant instructor to professor. He taught at this institution until 1957, when he joined the faculty at The Ohio State University as professor and chairman of its Department of German.

Dr. Cunz was a devoted teacher, who enjoyed the respect and love of his students. In 1961 the Arts College Student Council awarded him its Good Teaching Award, and in 1964 he received the Alfred J. Wright Award for "dedicated service to student activities and student organizations."

Dr. Cunz was a specialist in the field of 18th century German literature, but his most important and lasting contribution to scholarship was his work on the history of German immigration to the United States. His book <u>The</u> <u>Maryland Germans, A History</u> (The Princeton Press, 1948) established him as one of the two or three leading scholars in the field of immigration history both here and abroad. With the last of his many books he returned again to the field of German immigration history, a collection of literary portraits of famous German immigrants, <u>They Came from Germany</u> (Dodd, Mead & Co., New York, 1966). He contributed close to a hundred major articles and essays to periodicals and newspapers in this country as well as in Germany, Switzerland and France. He is also the author of <u>German</u> for Beginners, a textbook widely used in American and Canadian colleges and universities.

These scholarly activities earned him the highest recognition both here and abroad. He was on the board of directors of the Carl Schurz Memorial Foundation (1961 to 1965) and an honorary member of the Society for the History of the Germans in Maryland, whose secretary he had been from 1944 to 1956 and whose <u>Reports</u> he had edited for many years. In 1959 the government of the Federal Republic of Germany bestowed upon him the Knight's Cross, First Class "in recognition of his efforts on behalf of the German language instruction in the United States and his scholarly contributions in the field of German-American immigration history." In 1965 the Ohio State chapter of Phi Beta Kappa elected him to honorary membership.

B. Dieter Cunz (continued)

Dr. Cunz was a member of the Modern Language Association of America, the American Association of Teachers of German, the Ohio Historical Society, the American Lessing Society and the Ohio College Association. He often held administrative positions in these organizations.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses its deep sympathy to Dr. Cunz's friends and colleagues. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees as a sincere expression of the Board's realization of the loss which The Ohio State University has sustained.

C. Report on the University's Investment Portfolio

The report dated March 12, 1969, as submitted to the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees by Vice President Gordon B. Carson pertaining to the University's Investment Portfolio, was received and ordered to be filed with the official records of the Board of Trustees.

Revision of Rule 21.07 and Rule 29.2709 of Rules for the University Faculty

as Approved by the Faculty Council February 11, 1969

Rules for the University Faculty

On February 11, 1969, the Faculty Council approved the following changes in the Rules for the University Faculty as a substitution for the text printed in the January, 1968 edition of the Rules for the University Faculty.

21.07. Tenure: Procedure for Termination.

Section 1. Charges of incompetence, grave misconduct, or other cause as set forth under Rule 21.03 shall be made in writing by the dean of a college (or, if the person charged is not assigned to a college, by a similar administrative officer), and transmitted to the President. If the President deems such charges to be of substance, he shall transmit them to the person charged and allow him a reasonable opportunity to reply to them. If, after this preliminary exchange, the President determines that the charges might call for termination of tenure, he shall initiate a hearing before a standing committee of three, to be known as the Faculty Tenure Hearing Committee. This committee shall be selected at the beginning of each academic year by the Faculty Advisory Committee. (See Rule 29.2713, Section 4b.) The Hearing Committee shall determine who may be present at its hearings.

Section 2. The rights of <u>appearance</u>, representation, submission of evidence, and introduction <u>and questioning</u> of witnesses shall be granted to both the administration and the person charged at all stages of the proceedings, and a permanent record of the hearing shall be kept. <u>The Hearing Committee shall submit to the President a complete tran-</u> script of the hearing, and all other documents and exhibits relating to the matter, along with a written report containing findings of fact and recommendations. The person charged shall be given a copy of the report and transcript, and copies of all other documents and exhibits. Should the President disagree with the recommendations of the Hearing Committee, he shall indicate his differences to the Committee and the Committee shall respond to him on the issues he has raised. If the President requests the Hearing Committee to consider information not presented to them previously, they shall reopen the hearing and submit a supplementary report. All the procedures previously stated shall apply to the supplementary hearing and report.

Section 3. All records of the hearings and recommendations shall be held confidential in the office of the President; however, if the person charged is dismissed, the President and the Hearing Committee shall inform the University Faculty of the critical issues in the case. With the permission of the person charged, members of the University Faculty may review all University records of the case.

Section 4. Should the President at any time decide in favor of the person charged, in the absence of a request by the Board of Trustees for a formal recommendation, he shall close the case by writing to the person charged that the proceeding against him has been concluded and that his tenure is continued. In the event a formal recommendation is requested by the Board of Trustees, the President shall give written notice thereof to the person charged. The President, after receiving the recommendations of the Hearing Committee, shall give written notice of his decision to the person charged before making his formal recommendation to the Board of Trustees. The report of the Hearing Committee shall be transmitted to the Board along with his recommendation.

Should the Board of Trustees disagree with the recommendation of the President, the Board shall request the President, the Hearing Committee, and the person charged to respond to issues raised by the Board. After such review, the President shall then make his further recommendation and present it to the Board.

<u>Section 5.</u> Publicity concerning the findings and recommendations of the Hearing Committee and the President shall be withheld until the Board of Trustees has acted upon the President's final recommendation.

Rules for the University Faculty (continued)

21.07. Tenure: Procedure for Termination. (continued)

Section 6. Termination of tenure shall not become effective until one year's notice of the final decision has been given, except when otherwise ordered by the Board of Trustees because it finds the misconduct to be of such extreme gravity as to necessitate immediate severance of all relationship with the University. The President and the Hearing Committee shall include in their recommendations a statement as to whether or not this provision should be waived.

<u>Section 7.</u> The right to <u>terminate tenure</u> for cause <u>shall</u> be lost by failure of the proper administrative officer to inform the individual of the unsatisfactory nature of his services and to follow appropriate procedures within a reasonable time.

29.2709. Council on Student Affairs.

Section 1. The Council on Student Affairs shall consist of 15 members as follows:

- a. Seven students to be selected as follows:
 - (1) The President of the Undergraduate Student Body (see Rule 53.0701).
 - (2) The President of the Women's Self Government Association (see Rule 53.0703).
 - (3) Two students appointed by the President of the <u>Undergraduate Student</u> Body with the advice and consent of the Student Assembly.
 - (4) <u>Two</u> students to be appointed by the President of the <u>Council of</u> Graduate Students with the advice and consent of that <u>Council</u>.
 - (5) One student to be appointed by the <u>Presidents of the Student Councils</u> of the Colleges of Dentistry, Law, Medicine, Optometry, and Veterinary Medicine.

The <u>five</u> students appointed shall <u>serve</u> one-year <u>terms</u> but shall be eligible for reappointment.

- b. Six elected members of the Faculty Council chosen by the Faculty Council for three-year terms, two to be chosen each year.
- c. The Dean of Students.
- d. The Vice President for Student Affairs, who shall vote in case of ties.

Section 2. The Faculty Council members elected to the Council on Student Affairs shall also constitute the Standing Committee on Student Affairs of the Faculty Council.

Section 3. The Vice President for Student Affairs shall be Chairman of the Council. A Vice Chairman shall be designated by the six Faculty Council members of the Council on Student Affairs, and he shall also serve as Chairman of the Faculty Council's Standing Committee on Student Affairs.

Rules for the University Faculty (continued)

29.2709. Council on Student Affairs. (continued)

Reports by the Council on Student Affairs to the President of the University shall be made through the Vice President for Student Affairs. Reports to the Faculty Council shall be made through the Faculty Council's Standing Committee on Student Affairs.

Section 4. This Council shall be the principal liaison council between student government and the faculty and administration. It may recommend to the Faculty Council proposed legislation affecting student life and activities. Its administrative responsibilities shall be expressed through recommendations to the <u>Vice President</u> for Student Affairs.

The Council shall have the authority to <u>make regulations pursuant to Rules</u> for the Faculty, the By-Laws, and the Statutes, insofar as they pertain to students.

Section 5. The Council shall <u>have responsibility for the recognition of, and</u> <u>determination of operating procedures for</u>, the publications of all student organizations, but this responsibility may be delegated by this Council to the Student Publications Board or any College committee recognized by this Council.

Section 6. Any group of students desiring to organize and be recognized as a University organization or as a fraternity or sorority of this University shall obtain permission from the Council (see Rules 53.01 and 53.03), but this responsibility may be delegated by this Council to other councils. The Council shall require a list of officers and an annual report from every student organization on the activities of the organization.

Section 7. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the Council's jurisdiction shall also extend to rights and responsibilities of students. Other specific responsibilities consistent with the concept of the Council as outlined above may be added from time to time by assignment from the Vice President for Student Affairs. Page 458 Blank

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, April 10, 1969, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: John W. Bricker, Chairman, John G. Ketterer, Frederick E. Jones, James W. Shocknessy, Don M. Hilliker and John H. Dunlap.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

Mr. Bricker, Chairman of the Board, expressed regret at President Fawcett's current illness which prevented him from being present at the meeting. He suggested that the Secretary drop the President a note expressing this regret and the hope that he will soon be recovered and able to return to his duties.

In President Fawcett's absence, Vice President Corbally asked Jay Shaffer, student body President, to introduce the newly elected officers of the undergraduate student government. Mr. Shaffer presented Timothy J. Sheeran and W. Bruce Achenbach, President and Vice President, respectively. He also introduced the retiring Vice President, Crofford J. Macklin, Jr.

Vice President Corbally presented the following recommendations to the Board of Trustees:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Naming of Buildings

Upon the recommendation of the President's Cabinet, it was proposed that the three campus buildings listed below be named as follows:

- That the building located at 128 North Oval Drive, known as the Fine Arts Building, be named the <u>James R</u>. Hopkins Fine Arts Center.
- That the Humanities Center Foreign Languages Building, currently under construction at 1841 Service Building Road, be named The Dieter Cunz Hall of Languages.
- 3. That the Student Health Facility, currently under construction at 1875 Service Building Road, be named the John W. Wilce Student Health Center.

These proposals are in accordance with the <u>By-Laws of the Board of</u> <u>Trustees</u>. Vice President Corbally recommended that said proposal be approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. Jones, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

B. Establishment of the Arthur Young Professorship of Accounting

Pursuant to the conditions set forth for the establishment of a "Named Professorship," as approved by the Board of Trustees at its January 14, 1965 meeting, Vice President Corbally recommended that the "Arthur Young Professorship of Accounting" be established at The Ohio State University.

The fifteen partners of Arthur Young & Company, Santa Ana, California, who are alumni of The Ohio State University wish to establish the Arthur Young Professorship of Accounting in recognition of this University's contribution to the profession of accounting through its many graduates who have attained national recognition in public accounting and accounting education. The person selected to serve as the Arthur Young Professor should be nationally known in accounting education.

A sum of \$150,000.00 will be provided to the University endowment trust funds to provide the income of \$7,500.00 annually to support this professorship. If this endowment principal does not provide the necessary \$7,500.00 in annual income, the donors will make such supplemental contributions for a five-year period as are required to bring the annual amount to that level.

A nationwide search is to be initiated immediately so that an outstanding person may be appointed to this professorship. If the position has not been filled, however, by September 30, 1971, the donors reserve the right to withdraw the guarantee of five annual payments of \$7,500.00 each and to stipulate that all income from the endowment will be used for such other purposes as they choose, provided that it is mutually agreed that such use is of benefit to the University.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Jones, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote.

1. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

C. New Section to Rules for the University Faculty-55.00. Open Housing. Rules 55.01, 55.02, 55.03, 55.04, 55.05, 55.06, 55.07 and 55.08

The Faculty Council on March 11, 1969, approved a new section entitled "Open Housing," upon the recommendation of the Committee on Rules to be added to the <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u>. (See Appendix VI, page 531.) These rules (1) establish the policy within the concept of the parietal rule that students shall live only in housing which is available to all students on equal terms without regard to race, religion, color or national origin and (2) provide the necessary bodies, procedures, due process and sanctions for its operation and enforcement.

Vice President Corbally recommended that the said action of the Faculty Council be approved.

Mr. Bricker called for a motion. In the absence of a motion, he expressed appreciation to the student organizations and groups who have devoted a tremendous amount of time in preparing this resolution for their sincerity of purpose. He indicated that the Board had a letter from the Assistant Attorney General as to the legality of this proposal, but that the letter did not discuss the specific items which are presented in the resolution. Since these proposed rules enter a new field which is very complex and complicated and in which enforcement of the proposed rules presents serious problems. the legality and constitutionality should be checked very thoroughly before taking final action. He apologized for not having been able to spend more time reading cases and running down the law on this subject during the past month. He stated "In my judgment we ought to have a definite opinion from the Attorney General. The letter that we have is not such as to the power of this Board to enact a rule effective off the campus such as this will be. regardless of the desirability of it and the desire of members of the Board to vote on it at this time." He pointed out that only six members of the Board were present and that the President was not present. He further stated that "There will be a change next month of three members of the Board and they are the ones that will have to live with these proposed rules and enforce them." He requested the Secretary of the Board to make application to the Attorney General for a formal opinion as to the legality of the proposed rules. He requested and received from the Trustees present general agreement with his position. Mr. Bricker then asked that the President be advised that there was no opposition expressed to the proposal but that the Board simply wanted to take every necessary legal step before a vote is taken.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

C. New Section to Rules for the University Faculty--55.00. Open Housing. Rules 55.01, 55.02, 55.03, 55.04, 55.05, 55.06, 55.07 and 55.08 (continued)

Dr. Corbally stated "It is my understanding that Mr. Mount in an earlier procedure had sought and received an informal opinion from the Office of the Attorney General and that we would now ask for a formal opinion."

Mr. Bricker responded "We had a letter without any details or any discussion of any of the details or the legal questions that are actually involved in those details. I do appreciate the attitude of the Board."

Mr. Jones stated "Mr. Chairman, I suggest that you approve the questions that are presented to the Attorney General before they are sent."

Mr. Bricker said "If they are submitted to me I would be happy to do so, but I would not want this matter delayed very long. I am quite sure we can obtain an opinion within the next month."

D. Extension of Beverage Policy Approved at July 11, 1968 Meeting

In accordance with the recommendation to and the action of the Board of Trustees at its July 11, 1968 meeting concerning establishing a policy for the serving of beverages within its jurisdiction, Vice President Corbally recommended that appropriate extension of this policy be made to the Center for Tomorrow which will contain our continuing education programs and to the golf course facility as it was applied to the Faculty Club and Ohio Union respectively.

Upon motion of Mr. Dunlap, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees by a roll call vote of five to one with Messrs. Bricker, Ketterer, Jones, Shocknessy and Dunlap voting affirmatively and Mr. Hilliker voting negatively, approved the stated extension of the beverage policy.

At the request of the Vice President for Business and Finance, Vice President Corbally recommended that the plans and specifications, bills of materials and estimates of cost for the following projects be approved by the Board of Trustees:

V. PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS (continued)

A. Comparative Medical Teaching and Research Facility

This new building will replace the temporary Veterinary Hospital on Kenny Road and will provide expanded facilities for research and instruction programs in the College of Veterinary Medicine.

Funds for this project have been provided from S. B. 370, H. B. 202, H. B. 886 and Public Health Service Grants.

B. University College - Building No. 3

This building is a Branch Library for University College, providing bookstacks, student study stations, group study and reading rooms, offices and work areas.

Funds for this project have been provided from H. B. 949, an allocation from the Board of Regents and a Title I Federal Grant.

C. Underground Duct System - Twelfth Avenue

This project involves the installation of underground ducts and manholes to extend and connect the campus duct system to the existing system at 12th Avenue to allow for future alterations and expansion of electrical systems.

Expanding telephone service needs require additional cabling to the south campus area. In 1970, the Telephone Company will place into operation a new exchange located on West 8th Avenue.

To support this new exchange and to provide interim service between now and the time it can be implemented, it is necessary for the University to install telephone conduit to receive the Telephone Company's cabling on Neil Avenue extending roughly from 17th Avenue to 12th Avenue, with a branch to the Language Building.

Conditions are such that it is essential for the University to seek permission to advertise for a 10-day period in order to complete the work in time for Autumn Quarter, 1969.

Vice President Corbally recommended, therefore, that the President and/ or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to proceed with

the implementation of this project on a 10-day advertisement basis. Funds have been provided in Budget Account 124358 (Contract Repair).

Rules for the University Faculty

The Faculty Council on March 11, 1969, approved the following proposed new section to the <u>Rules for the University Faculty-55.00</u>. Open Housing, upon the recommendation of the Committee on Rules. These rules will be included in the reprinted copy of the <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u> upon approval by the Board of Trustees.

55,00. Open Housing

55.01. The Open Housing Policy.

It is the policy of The Ohio State University that rental housing be available to all of the University's students on equal terms without regard to race, religion, color, or national origin.

55.02. The Open Housing Rule.

- a. (1) No student shall become a resident of any premises (whether registered or unregistered with the University) which is on the discriminatory housing list, as defined in subsection d. This section shall not apply to students living with their parents.
 - (2) Upon a finding by the appropriate tribunal that a student has violated this subsection, with knowledge that the premises are on the discriminatory housing list, he shall be liable to recorded probation or suspension.
- b. (1) If a student becomes a resident of any premises (whether registered or unregistered with the University) which is on the discriminatory housing list without knowledge of that fact he shall not continue his residence therein for more than thirty days after he received notice to vacate from the Office of the Vice President for Student Affairs unless he is bound by a lease for a longer time, in which case he shall not continue his residence therein beyond the term required by such lease. The prohibition of this subsection does not apply to a student who resides in the premises at the time of the finding of discrimination, and who remains in the same unit.
 - (2) Upon a finding by the appropriate tribunal that a student has violated this subsection, he shall be liable to recorded probation or suspension.
- c. (1) No student shall enter into any arrangement to become a resident of any premises (whether registered or unregistered with the University) which is on the discriminatory housing list.
 - (2) Upon a finding by the appropriate tribunal that a student has violated this subsection, with knowledge that the premises are on the discriminatory housing list, he shall be liable to recorded probation or suspension.

55.02. The Open Housing Rule. (continued)

- d. The discriminatory housing list shall consist of those premises which the Open Housing Panel has ordered to be placed on such list for the periods prescribed pursuant to Rule 55.06.
- e. A student is a person who is registered for course credit toward a University degree or who is seeking housing in preparation for registration and candidacy.
- f. Any charge that a student has violated this rule shall be subject to a hearing, in conformity with due process, by the appropriate tribunal charged with the adjudication of violations of University rules.
- 55.03. The Open Housing Panel.

The Open Housing Panel shall consist of:

Six faculty members selected by vote of the Faculty Council, at least one of whom shall be a member of the Faculty Council;

Three undergraduate student members selected by vote of the Student Assembly;

One graduate student member selected by vote of the Council of Graduate Students;

One professional student member selected by vote of the Professional College Council.

Faculty members of the Open Housing Panel shall be designated for a term of two years. The initial Panel shall decide by lot which three faculty members shall serve for a one-year term so that three positions will become vacant each year. Student members of the Panel shall serve for a term of one year. Faculty and student members may serve successive terms.

Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner that the position which has become vacant was filled; those appointed to fill vacancies shall serve out the term of the member they are replacing.

The Open Housing Panel shall elect its own chairman and such other officers as the members deem appropriate. The Panel shall keep a record of each case consisting of a brief description of the facts, the decision (including any concurring or dissenting opinion), and the vote of each member. These case records shall be filed with the Vice President for Student Affairs, who shall maintain them, and make them available to the Panel, parties, and the public at reasonable times in accordance with a published schedule.

The Open Housing Panel shall adopt its own rules of procedure not inconsistent with these provisions.

55.04. Complaints.

- a. Any student, the Vice President for Student Affairs, or the Director of Housing may lodge a complaint that an owner, landlord or the authorized agent of either has discriminated in the rental of housing to students on the grounds of race, religion, color or national origin with the Office of the Special Assistant for Student Affairs within six months of the alleged act of discrimination.
- b. The complaint shall contain a statement of the acts alleged to constitute the discrimination.
- c. The Special Assistant shall use student investigators for the purpose of determining whether owners, landlords, or their authorized agents discriminate on the grounds of race, religion, color, or national origin in the rental of housing.
- 55.05. The Hearing.
- a. Upon receipt of a complaint, the Special Assistant shall:
 - (1) Request the Open Housing Panel to convene a public hearing to determine whether the named owner, landlord, or an agent of either, discriminated against the University's students in the rental of housing on the basis of race, religion, color, or national origin.
 - (2) Serve by registered mail upon the landlord, owner, or authorized agent in charge of the premises a copy of the complaint and of this rule.
- b. The Special Assistant or the complainant may present evidence material to a determination of the charges and cross-examine witnesses, with or without the aid of counsel, at a hearing convened for the purpose by the Panel.
- c. The Open Housing Panel shall, on the written request of the Special Assistant, conduct a public hearing no earlier than ten days after the making of the complaint and its notice of hearing to the Special Assistant, the complainant, and the party charged with discrimination, who shall be advised of his right to appear, to be represented by counsel, to present witnesses, and to cross-examine witnesses who testify.

55.06. Findings.

After considering only the evidence admitted at the hearing, the Open Housing Panel shall determine whether the owner, landlord, or the authorized agent of either of them has refused to rent on equal terms without regard to race, religion, color, or national origin to all of the University's students. A refusal to rent shall include those situations where the owner, landlord, or authorized agent

55.06. Findings. (continued)

refuses to rent premises to a student who is gathering evidence to determine whether the owner, landlord, or authorized agent discriminates within the meaning of this rule.

If the Open Housing Panel finds by a preponderance of the evidence that there has been such a discriminatory refusal to rent, it shall enter a determination that the premises be placed on the discriminatory housing list.

Any premises placed on the discriminatory housing list shall remain on the list for the period prescribed by the Open Housing Panel, but it shall not be less than one year nor more than three years. However, in extreme circumstances, the Panel may prescribe a period of less than one year provided that its reasons are included in the record provided for in Rule 55.03. No premises shall be removed from the discriminatory housing list until: (a) the period prescribed by the Open Housing Panel has ended, (b) a written pledge of compliance with this rule has been received from the landlord or owner of the premises, and (c) with reference to premises which are rented through an agent, (i) the owner or landlord has given the agent written instructions to comply with this rule, (ii) has submitted a copy of said instructions to the Open Housing Panel, (iii) has received the Open Housing Panel's approval of such instructions, and (iv) has pledged in writing to give such approved written instructions to all future agents.

If the Panel finds that the landlord or owner has breached a pledge previously given under this section the premises shall be placed on the discriminatory housing list for a period of not less than three years.

55.07. The Discriminatory Housing List.

The Vice President for Student Affairs, upon receipt of a decision of discrimination by the Open Housing Panel shall place the premises wherein the discrimination took place on the discriminatory housing list. He shall also notify the owner or landlord of the premises that none of the University's students will be permitted to become residents of or make any arrangement to become a resident of the building for the period of time determined by the Open Housing Panel.

Any owner or landlord, or authorized agent who knowingly rents or enters into any arrangement to rent housing to a student in premises which he has been notified are on the discriminatory housing list shall, after a hearing establishing this fact, have the term of listing extended for three additional years. A complaint of violation of this section shall be processed in accordance with Rules 55.04 and 55.05.

55.08. Notice.

The discriminatory housing list, divided by geographical area, shall be published periodically in the Lantern, and shall be included in the registration materials of every student together with a copy of this rule.

55.08. Notice. (continued)

A copy of this rule shall be conspicuously published in a newspaper of general circulation at least five times during the month preceding the commencement of each quarter. A copy of this rule shall also be sent or delivered to each landlord who is known to the University to have student tenants in Franklin County.

The Lantern shall not accept or print any advertisement for rental of any building on the discriminatory housing list.

Mr. Safford seconded the motion, and the above-named persons were elected to the offices as indicated by unanimous vote of the Board.

President Fawcett expressed satisfaction at having so many visitors present at the meeting. He also took this occasion to thank the members of the staff who had filled in so capably during his absence from April 1 through April 22 due to his eye operation. He commended his colleagues for their dedicated service and for carrying on so ably in the performance of their duties.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

Attorney General's Ruling in Regard to the New Section to the Rules for the University Faculty--55.00. Open Housing. Rules 55.01, 55.02, 55.03, 55.04, 55.05, 55.06, 55.07, 55.08 and 55.09

The President presented the following statement pertaining to the Open Housing Rule and recommended its approval:

The proposed Open Housing Rule, now before the Board has the considered support of the major representative bodies of The Ohio State University. I recommend its adoption based upon our continuing interest in the equal availability of student housing under a policy of nondiscrimination.

We now have an opinion of the Attorney General (see Appendix VII, page 571) which, in essence, states that the Board has the requisite authority to adopt the proposed rule. After careful study, it also appears that the Attorney General has declared no legal prohibitions to the rule. He did, however, add caveats to his opinion, particularly pointing out concerns for a due process which would protect the rights of property owners affected by the rule. I have no doubt that appropriate procedures will be adopted by the panel which will provide a full-faith provision for a uniform due process insuring fair hearings to all parties.

It is my judgment that the advice of the Attorney General can best be accepted with the addition to the rule of an appellate procedure by the following addition:

Attorney General's Ruling in Regard to the New Section to the Rules for the University Faculty--55.00. Open Housing. Rules 55.01, 55.02, 55.03, 55.04, 55.05, 55.06, 55.07, 55.08 and 55.09 (continued)

55.09. Appeals.

Appeals from decisions of the Open Housing Panel shall be taken in writing within ten days to a three-member Housing Appeals Panel hereby created, consisting of one student member, one faculty member and one administrative member, each of whom shall be appointed annually by the President in keeping with the duly constituted authority for student affairs as delegated by the Board to the President.

The Housing Appeals Panel shall elect its own chairman, establish rules of procedure for such appellate hearing and make determination in such appeals.

55.07. The Discriminatory Housing List.

Insert after shall, . . . place (page 4, line two) (after the ten-day period for taking an appeal or after determination upon appeal,)

Experience with the administration of the rule or possible future court rulings may well necessitate further revision. We will, of course, make any subsequent changes required to guarantee rights of all in our efforts to make equal housing available to all our students. Clearly nothing in our rule or procedures precludes the application of appropriate civil procedures, the seeking of individual remedies before the Ohio Civil Rights Commission or of recourse to the courts.

As I have indicated previously, I have not known of a proposal which has received more considered attention by, or represents a greater unanimity of, this academic community. Adoption of this rule will be a major step forward in advancing the interest of the Board and the University in housing facilities and nondiscrimination.

Upon motion of Mr. Gibbs, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees approved the new section of the <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u> (55.00. Open Housing) by a unanimous roll call vote, with Mr. Bricker not voting. The Secretary was authorized to include said section in the Rules for the University Faculty.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Establishment of New Graduate Degree Programs in Public Administration

The Faculty Council on April 8, 1969, upon the recommendation of the Council on Academic Affairs, approved for transmittal to the Board of Trustees and the Board of Regents the recommendation that new programs in the area of public administration be authorized as follows:

- 1. The Master of Public Administration program will provide for leadership careers in government organizations at all levels.
- 2. The Master of Arts program with a field of specialization in public administration will offer greater flexibility for students desiring a specialized course of study.
- 3. The Doctor of Philosophy program will prepare a student for an academic career of teaching and research. It also will provide preparation for top level administrative and research careers in public agencies.

Responsibility for these degrees will be transferred from the Department of Political Science to the Division of Public Administration of the College of Administrative Science. The proposed programs will have three basic aims: (1) to offer an instructional program at the master's and doctoral levels emphasizing the knowledge, skills and attitudes required for leadership in the public sector; (2) to engage in research for new knowledge to solve major public policy and administrative problems; and (3) to serve the community by offering continuing education for public administrators and by assisting in the solution of current problems.

President Fawcett recommended that the above proposal to establish the new graduate degree programs in the Division of Public Administration of the College of Administrative Science be approved by the Board of Trustees, and pursuant to Section 3333.04 of the Revised Code of Ohio, that the proposal be forwarded to the Board of Regents; and further, subject to the approval of the Board of Regents, that this program become effective Autumn Quarter, 1969.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Gibbs, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

B. Authorization to Grant the Degree--Bachelor of Science in Allied Health Professions

The Faculty Council on April 8, 1969, upon the recommendation of the Council on Academic Affairs, approved for transmittal to the Board of Trustees and the Board of Regents the recommendation that a new undergraduate degree, Bachelor of Science in Allied Health Professions, be offered within the School of Allied Medical Professions of the College of Medicine. This new degree will encompass the major areas of study offered by the School; namely, medical communications and circulation technology.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

B. Authorization to Grant the Degree--Bachelor of Science in Allied Health Professions (continued)

President Fawcett recommended that the present degrees offered within the School of Allied Medical Professions of the College of Medicine (Bachelor of Science in Medical Dietetics, Bachelor of Science in Medical Illustration, Bachelor of Science in Occupational Therapy, Bachelor of Science in Medical Technology and Bachelor of Science in Physical Therapy) be withdrawn and that the present areas of concentration represented by these degrees be offered as major areas of study under the proposed Bachelor of Science in Allied Health Professions. Students entering the School prior to Summer Quarter, 1970, would be permitted to elect admission to one of the present degree programs.

It was recommended further that the above proposal to establish the new undergraduate degree program in the School of Allied Medical Professions of the College of Medicine be approved by the Board of Trustees, and pursuant to Section 3333.04 of the Revised Code of Ohio, that the proposal be forwarded to the Board of Regents; and further, subject to the approval of the Board of Regents, that this action become effective Summer Quarter, 1970.

Upon motion of Mr. Dunlap, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendations by unanimous voice vote.

C. Program in School of Allied Medical Professions of the College of Medicine Leading to Master of Science Degree

The Council on Academic Affairs approved the recommendation of the Graduate Council that there be established a degree program leading to the Master of Science degree in the School of Allied Medical Professions of the College of Medicine. This request was subsequently approved by the Faculty Council on April 8, 1969.

Based on the curriculum design of utilizing core courses for improved education in allied medical professions, the proposed graduate program would involve an interdisciplinary core approach. This program would provide various professional areas of strength to contribute to the student's preparation for teaching, understanding basic research methods, administering programs, communicating and strengthening his professional roles in allied health.

It was recommended that this proposal from the Faculty Council be approved by the Board of Trustees and that this program become effective Autumn Quarter, 1969.

Upon motion of Mr. Gibbs, seconded by Mr. Ketterer, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

D. Alternate Set of Requirements for Awarding the Master's Degree

The Faculty Council on April 8, 1969, approved the proposal from the Council on Academic Affairs that a student who has been admitted to candidacy for the doctor of philosophy degree may be recommended for the appropriate master's degree by the departmental graduate committee (or equivalent) without prejudice to his status as a candidate for the doctorate.

This recommendation is intended to provide for students who have only a baccalaureate degree and whose candidacy for the doctor of philosophy degree has been canceled because of the seven-year time limitation. The master's degree would be retroactively awarded to said doctor of philosophy degree candidate who had bypassed the master's degree.

President Fawcett recommended that the said action of the Faculty Council be approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

E. Revision of Rule 63.01 of Rules for the University Faculty

President Fawcett recommended that Rule 63.01 of <u>Rules for the University</u> <u>Faculty</u> pertaining to rights to and interests in patentable discoveries and inventions resulting from research or investigation conducted in any facility of The Ohio State University be revised as follows:

1. In the first paragraph of Section 3, add the phrase as noted in the underscoring:

Section 3. The President of the University is hereby empowered and authorized, after receiving the advice of a committee of University faculty and administrative personnel which he shall appoint, (known as the Patent Advisory Committee), to:

- 2. Delete item (f) in Section 3 and include it as part of the new Section 4.
- 3. Add Section 4 and Section 5 as follows:

Section 4. The President of the University is hereby empowered and authorized, after receiving the recommendation of the Vice President for Business and Finance, to

Sell, assign, convey or grant any such patentable discoveries and inventions or any rights or shares in such discoveries and inventions or the proceeds thereof, on behalf of The Ohio State University, to such persons, firms or governmental agencies for

such consideration or upon such terms and conditions, including dedication to the public, as shall be deemed by him to be proper and in the best interest of the University.

Section 5. The Patent Advisory Committee shall recommend to the Vice President for Business and Finance of the University probable sources for licensing patent use and shall advise that office on reasonable terms of license agreements.

Upon motion of Mr. Ketterer, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote, and the Secretary was authorized to include said revision in the next printing of the <u>Rules for the</u> University Faculty.

F. Degrees and Certificates Conferred--Spring Quarter Commencement

President Fawcett recommended that degrees and certificates be conferred at the Spring Quarter Commencement Convocation on June 7, 1969, to those students who have completed the requirements for their respective degrees and certificates and are recommended by the Faculty Council. The names of those awarded degrees and certificates will be included in the minutes of this meeting. (See Appendix VIII, page 591.)

VIII. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

A. Marion Campus - Unico Heights Land Company Easement

The Unico Heights Land Company has requested an easement for a sanitary sewer line across State of Ohio lands that have been designated for the use of The Ohio State University, Marion Branch. The sanitary sewer will provide sewage facilities for a subdivision to be built adjacent to the Marion Campus.

The Ohio State University, by cooperating with the Unico Heights Land Company, will facilitate the orderly development of a residential community adjacent to the Marion Campus. Further, the developer is planning a connecting street from County Road 169 to State Route 95 (the only entrance to the campus).

B. Ohio Stadium Repairs - Employment of Engineers

President Fawcett recommended that the engineering firm of Korda and Associates, Ltd., be employed to provide engineering services to cover design, writing of specifications and inspection on the following repair work at the Ohio Stadium:

 Remove existing expansion joint material from majority of C Deck and replace with neoprene compression seals. Also replace seals at other specified locations.

President Fawcett reported to the Board the death of Fleetwood Raymond Koutz, Professor of Veterinary Parasitology. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, a copy of the following Resolution expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the family of the deceased.

A. Fleetwood Raymond Koutz

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on April 6, 1969, of Dr. Fleetwood Raymond Koutz, Professor of Veterinary Parasitology.

Dr. Koutz was born in Baltimore, Maryland, on April 3, 1905. He received his B.S. and D.V.M. degrees from the State College of Washington in 1936, graduating with highest honors, and his M.Sc. degree in Veterinary Parasitology at The Ohio State University in 1940. He served for a year as an Assistant Professor at the University of Maryland and was also a member of the University of Maryland's Livestock Sanitary Association during that time. He served with the United States Bureau of Animal Industry and in 1939 became an Assistant Professor at The Ohio State University. During World War II, he was called into active service as a Captain in the United States Army Veterinary Corps on February 13, 1943. As a Major, he served in

the China-Burma Theater as a liaison officer to the Chinese Army. He was discharged in November 1945 and returned to The Ohio State University, where he was Professor in and Chairman of the Department of Veterinary Parasitology with thirty years of service.

Dr. Koutz was a member of Alpha Psi, professional veterinary fraternity; Society of Phi Zeta, national honorary veterinary fraternity; Phi Kappa Phi, honorary scholarship society; Phi Sigma, honorary zoology society; and Sigma Xi, national research honor society. He was a member of the American, the Ohio State, and Fifth District Veterinary Medical Association; the United States Livestock Sanitary Association; the World Association for the Advancement of Veterinary Medicine; and the Conference of Research Workers in Animal Diseases. He was a Past President of the American Association of Veterinary Parasitologists.

Professor Koutz was Scout Master of Troop 252, American Boy Scouts at Trinity Methodist Church; President of the Grandview Heights Board of Health; and an usher at First Community Church. He was a member of the American Legion Post No. 310 at The Ohio State University. He published more than 100 technical articles in scientific journals and prepared, in addition, three laboratory manuals and a booklet on parasitology. His dedication as a teacher was carried over into his contact with, and guidance to youthful members of the Boy Scouts of America, an activity that was extremely important to his interests.

On behalf of the University at large, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

XI. RETIREMENT OF JOHN W. BRICKER

A motion was made by Mr. Jones and seconded by Mr. Shocknessy expressing the gratitude of the Board of Trustees for Mr. Bricker's twenty-one years of distinguished service including this past year as Chairman of the Board.

President Fawcett stated that before a vote was taken on this motion he wished to say something even though he was not a member of the Board. He said,

It happens that thirteen years ago next month I was summoned to sit down with seven men to talk about the presidency of The Ohio State University. These seven men in my view were frightening characters. If I were to reflect over the names you would understand why. There is only one of those people here today--Senator Bricker. I knew Senator Bricker, but I did not know him the way I have gotten to know him in the past thirteen years. Some reflections of mine, while in a state of semidarkness, caused me to recall an experience of a long time ago in 1938. I walked into the office of the Superintendent of Schools where I had just been employed in Defiance. Ohio, and on the counter was a big carton of books -- a whole set of encyclopedias. I made inquiry about where they came from and somebody said 'Well, you know Governor Bricker gave the commencement address and would accept no honorarium but instructed us to take the money we would have used for that to buy books for our library.' While I did not know Senator Bricker at that time other than having read his name in the newspaper many times, I thought there couldn't be anything wrong with a man that would do something like that. These past 13 years have given me an insight into Mr. Bricker as the man, the American, the alumnus and the son of this institution. I must say that even though he may have taken a position on an issue here and there that everybody did not agree with, nobody ever guessed about where Mr. Bricker stood and this is a part of our American system. His dedication to this University has never been questioned. His sincerity in trying to achieve solutions to problems in the best interest of the University has been above reproach. His loyalty to this institution. I think, should well stand as a symbol to others who follow. His unselfish contribution in the line of service even at his own expense as all of you know. I think sets a mark to be followed by those who follow as we approach a new 100 years for this institution. There is never any way for a staff who worked for a governing board to express appropriately its thanks and appreciation for services of this kind, and I suppose there is really never any honest way for the governing board itself to say thank you to a man who has given such service. So without any consultation with anybody, I took it upon myself to have a little citation made and with your permission I am going to have him stand up here if he will and present the following plaque to him. Senator Bricker, it is with great pride and joy that I am able to provide a little recognition to you. I will read the citation that has been prepared:

Gentlemen:

I have before me your request for my opinion, forwarded through Mr. Edward Q. Moulton, Secretary of the Board, regarding the proposed Rules for the University Faculty -- 55.00. Open Housing. You have enclosed with your request a copy of these proposed rules. For reference purposes and since my opinion is requested with respect to such rules, I am attaching a copy of the proposed rules to this Opinion as an Appendix.

Your request for my opinion contains three questions: (1) "whether the Board has the requisite authority to adopt the enclosed rules," (2) "whether said rules are within the legal parameters of existing State and Federal Laws and" (3) "whether the University Board of Trustees has the authority under the Constitution and Laws of the State to supplement the authority given in the Ohio Civil Rights Act."

The Ohio State University, originally named the Ohio Agricultural and Mechanical College, was created by the Legislature through an act passed on March 22, 1870. 67 Ohio Laws, 20. The pertinent provisions of this act relating to the powers of the Board of Trustees are as follows:

"* * * * * * * * * *

"Sec. 2. The government of said college shall be vested in a board of trustees, * * *

"* * * * * * * * * *

"Sec. 5. The board of trustees shall have power to adopt by-laws, rules and regulations for the government of said college;* * *

"* * * * * * * * * * * *

The powers originally granted to the Board of Trustees have remained undiminished since the inception of the University. Sections 3335.02 and 3335.08, Revised Code, provide, respectively, that "[t]he government of the Ohio state university shall be vested in a board of nine trustees, * * *" and that "[t]he board of trustees of the Ohio state university may adopt bylaws, rules, and regulations for the government of the university."

In <u>Pyeatte</u> v. <u>Board of Regents of University of Oklahoma</u>, <u>et al</u>., 102 F. Supp. 407 (1951), affirmed per curiam 342 U.S. 396, in sustaining a resolution of the Board of Regents of the University of Oklahoma requiring that all undergraduate students of that University, with certain exceptions, be required to live in university-

operated housing, the Court had occasion to consider an Oklahoma statute much like Section 3335.08, <u>supra</u>. At 102 F. Supp. 413, the Court stated:

> "* * * The term 'government' is very broad and necessarily includes the power to pass all rules and regulations which the Board of Regents considers to be for the benefit of the health, welfare, morals and education of the students, so long as such rules are not expressly or impliedly prohibited. Rheam v. Board of Regents of University of Oklahoma, 161 Okl. 268, 18 P. 2d 535.

> > "* * * * * * * * * * *

The powers of the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University are no less broad than the powers of the board involved in the <u>Pyeatte</u> case, <u>supra</u>. As the Court stated in that case, at 102 F. Supp. 415:

"The state has a decided interest in the education, wellbeing, morals, health, safety and convenience of its youth."

In another case, which has bearing on the issues considered in this Opinion, it was recognized that the governing body of a state university "can validly impose a wide variety of regulations." <u>Sigma Chi Fraternity</u> v. <u>Regents of the University of</u> <u>Colorado</u>, 258 F. Supp. 515 (1966), at 526. In that case, a social fraternity was placed on probation, with loss of rushing and pledging privileges, because the national fraternity with which it was affiliated had suspended a Chapter on a different campus for

pledging a Negro student. The Court in the <u>Sigma Chi</u> case, <u>supra</u>, upheld the action of the Regents of the University of Colorado in placing the local Chapter of the fraternity on probation.

The Court stressed the point that the interest of the Regents that was being advanced was not invalid and stated, at page 527:

"Indeed, the Supreme Court of the United States has in recent years recognized the importance of elimination of racial discrimination in educational institutions."

Based upon the lines of authority represented by <u>Pyeatte</u>, <u>supra</u>, and <u>Sigma Chi</u>, <u>supra</u>, it seems clear that the governing body of a state university has a valid and continuing interest in the issues of housing facilities for students and non-discrimination with respect to students. It follows that the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, under its specific rule-making authority (Section 3335.08, Revised Code), has the power and authority to adopt and promulgate rules advancing its interest in these issues, with accompanying sanctions to be imposed against students who do not abide by such rules. See also, in this respect only, <u>State, ex rel. Weaver</u> v. <u>Board of Trustees of Ohio</u> <u>State University</u>, 126 Ohio St. 290 (1933).

Having arrived at the conclusion that it is within the authority of the Board to enact rules to advance the Board's substantial interest in housing facilities and non-discrimination and in order to answer your question, i.e., "authority to adopt the <u>enclosed</u>" Rules (See Appendix), it is necessary to determine

the tests to be applied. The <u>Weaver</u> case, <u>supra</u>, referred to rules which are "reasonable" and "not arbitrary." The Court in the <u>Sigma Chi</u> case, <u>supra</u>, refers to action which is not "an excessive use of power." Perhaps the most explicit statement of the test was made by the Court in the <u>Pyeatte</u> case, <u>supra</u>, at page 415:

> "If there is any state of facts which tends to support the regulatory measures and such measures are not clearly unreasonable or arbitrary, then the * * * regulation will be upheld as being constitutional."

The answer to your question, based upon the foregoing, lies in the application of the above tests to the proposed rules. If the Board of Trustees determines that the proposed rules will advance the interests of the Board in housing facilities and non-discrimination with respect to students at the University and, in view of the degree of gravity and extent of the problem based upon their factual knowledge or factual knowledge available to them, determines that the proposed rules are reasonable and not arbitrary in dealing with the problem, then the Board has the requisite authority to adopt the proposed rules (as set out in the Appendix).

Although you have not asked my opinion regarding the application of the proposed rules, I feel compelled to add a <u>caveat</u> in respect to the application at this point. The proposed rules, with respect to its application to students provides only that (See 55.02. f., Appendix):

> "Any charge that a student has violated this rule shall be subject to a hearing, in conformity with due process, by the appropriate tribunal charged with the adjudication of violations of University rules."

The most recent and governing court decisions on the rights of students whose right to remain in school is questioned have recognized the applicability of constitutional due process. The leading case in this area is <u>St. John Dixon, et al</u>. v. <u>Alabama State Board</u> of Education, et al., 294 F. 2d, 150 (1961). Since it is now recognized that students are entitled to the constitutional guarantee of due process, and since the above quoted portion of the proposed rules do not specify the steps necessary to protect that substantial guarantee, the Board of Trustees should consider the procedures to be followed to insure that this fundamental right of students guaranteed by both the United States and Ohio Constitutions is adequately protected.

The rules appear to me to be extremely broad. Certainly the proposed rules are so much broader than the problem they seek to cure that I foresee difficulties in administration. These difficulties may lead to disappointment of the proponents of the rules when they later evaluate its results as opposed to their expectations.

The answer to your second question regarding whether or not the proposed rules are within the parameters of existing State and Federal laws presents a paradox in the present state of the law. Section 55.02 (a)(1) of the proposed rule (see Appendix) reads as follows:

> "No student shall become a resident of any premises (whether registered or unregistered with the University) which is on the discriminatory housing list, as defined in subsection d. This section shall not apply to students living with their parents."

Section 4112.01, Revised Code, which is part of the Ohio Civil Rights Act, provides in pertinent part as follows:

"* * * * * * * * *

"(J) 'Housing accommodations' includes any building of structure or portion thereof which is used or occupied or is intended, arranged, or designed to be used or occupied as the home residence or sleeping place of one or more individuals, groups, or families whether or not living independently of each other; and any vacant land offered for sale or leased for commercial housing.

"(K) 'Commercial housing' means housing accommodations held or offered for sale or rent by a real estate broker, salesman, or agent, or by any other person pursuant to authorization of the owner, by the owner himself, or by legal representatives, but does not include any personal residence offered for sale or rent by the owner or by his broker, salesman, agent, or employee.

"(L) 'Personal residence' means a building or structure containing living quarters occupied or intended to be occupied by no more than two individuals, two groups, or two families living independently of each other and occupied by the owner thereof as a bona fide residence for himself and any members of his family forming his household. If a personal residence is vacated by the owner it shall continue to be considered owner-occupied until occupied by someone other than the owner or until sold by the owner, whichever occurs first.

*** *** ***

Title 42, United States Code, Section 3603, which is part of the Federal Civil Rights Act of 1968, provides in pertinent

part as follows:

"* * * * * * * *

"(b) Nothing in section 3604 of this title (other than subsection (c) shall apply to -

"(1) any single-family house sold or rented by an owner: Provided, That such private individual owner does not own more than three such single-family houses at any one time: Provided further, That in the case of the sale of any such single-family house by a private individual owner not residing in such house at the time of such sale or who was not the most recent resident of such house prior to such sale, the exemption granted by this subsection shall apply only with respect to one such sale within any twenty-four month period: Provided further, That such bona fide private individual owner does not own any interest in, or is there owned or reserved on his behalf, under any express or voluntary agreement, title to or any right to all or a portion of the proceeds from the sale or rental of, more than three such single-family houses at any one time: Provided further, That after December 31, 1969, the sale or rental of any such single-family house shall be excepted from the application of this sub-chapter only if such house is sold or rented (A) without the use in any manner of the sales or rental facilities or the sales or rental services of any real estate broker, agent, or salesman, or of such facilities or services of any person in the business of selling or renting dwellings, or of any employee or agent of any such broker, agent, salesman, or person and (B) without the publication, posting or mailing, after notice, of any advertisement or written notice in violation of section 3604 (c) of this title; but nothing in this proviso shall prohibit the use of attorneys, escrow agents, abstractors, title companies, and other such professional assistance as necessary to perfect or transfer the title, or

"(2) rooms or units in dwellings containing living quarters occupied or intended to be occupied by no more than four families living independently of each other, if the owner actually maintains and occupies one of such living quarters as his residence.

> "(c) For the purposes of subsection (b) of this section, a person shall be deemed to be in the business of selling or renting dwellings if -

"(1) he has, within the preceding twelve months, participated as principal in three or more transactions involving the sale or rental of any dwelling or any interest therein, or

"(2) he has, within the preceding twelve months, participated as agent, other than in the sale of his own personal residence in providing sales or rental facilities or sales or rental services in two or more transactions involving the sale or rental of any dwelling or any interest therein, or

"(3) he is the owner of any dwelling designed or intended for occupancy by, or occupied by, five or more families."

It should be noted that the word "family," as used in the foregoing Federal statute, is defined by Section 3602(c) thereof to include a single individual.

As is evident, both the Federal and State statutes relating to fair housing exempt certain partially owner-occupied premises from their respective operations under stated conditions. The proposed rule, in effect, does not, and in that sense is outside the parameters of the statutes in question.

In 1968, however, the Supreme Court of the United States decided the case of <u>Jones</u> v. <u>Mayer Co</u>., 392 U.S. 409; 20 L. Ed. 2d, 1189. The case arose as a result of the refusal of the <u>Mayer Co</u>. to sell a home to petitioner <u>Jones</u> for the sole reason that petitioner <u>Jones</u> was a Negro. The Court, in deciding in favor of petitioner <u>Jones</u>, grounded its decision on an 1866 statute, 42 U.S.C., Sec. 1982, which reads as follows:

> "All citizens of the United States shall have the same right, in every State and Territory, as is enjoyed by white citizens thereof to inherit, purchase, <u>lease</u>, sell, hold, and convey real and personal property." (Emphasis supplied)

The Court went to great lengths to point out that Section 1982, <u>supra</u>, was <u>not</u> a comprehensive "open housing" law and distinguished its operation from the recently enacted Civil Rights Act of 1968, <u>supra</u>, on the grounds that Section 1982, <u>supra</u>, dealt only with racial discrimination and not with discrimination on the grounds of religion or national origin. In addition, the Court pointed out that it did not deal "specifically" with discrimination in connection with the sale or rental of a dwelling. The Court did hold, however, at 20 L. Ed. 2d, 1192, as follows:

> "We hold that \$1982 bars <u>all</u> racial discrimination, private as well as public, in the sale or rental of property, and that the statute, thus construed, is a valid exercise of the power of Congress to enforce the Thirteenth Amendment." (Emphasis by the Court)

Thus the paradox in answer to your second question. The proposed rule is beyond the parameters of Federal and State laws insofar as it treats discrimination on the basis of religion or national origin regarding certain owner-occupied dwellings, but within the parameters of Federal (and necessarily State) law insofar as it treats discrimination on the basis of race.

In addition to the paradox raised by your second question, I have serious concern over the application of the proposed rule

to homeowners in the University area who are subject to its application. These citizens, like the students, are entitled to the full measure of protection of the constitutional guarantees of due process. The proposed rule contemplates charges brought by University officials or students to be investigated by the Special Assistant for Student Affairs, using student investigators, with charges, if any, being brought before a Panel consisting of six faculty members and five students. (See 55.03. and 55.04. Appendix).

It may be that such a procedure and such a Panel will not result in the protection of the fundamental rights of a homeowner against whom a complaint is lodged. No court has directly ruled on the issue with respect to a rule such as that proposed, however. I am constrained to point out that the State of Ohio, through its legislative branch, has established a Civil Rights Commission (Section 4112.03, Revised Code), with more than ample power and authority to carry out the investigative and hearing functions contemplated by the rule. There is little question as to protection of constitutionally guaranteed rights of individuals in the operation of the Commission. It is objective and not directly related to the University in its operation. The Commission and its operation have already been recognized as constitutional, at least sub silentio, by the courts of this State. See Gegner v. Graham, 1 Ohio App. 2d, 422 (1964). Finally, the orders of the Commission are, by law, subject to judicial review. Section 4112.06, Revised Code.

The lengths to which the State has gone to foster nondiscrimination, while protecting the rights of all citizens, and the machinery established for accomplishing those aims should be considered by the Board before adopting the proposed rules, at least with respect to the methods established by such rules for investigating and hearing complaints. As previously stated, the rights of the individual homeowners subject to the proposed rule are no less important than those of the students at the University.

Your third question refers to the authority of the Board of Trustees to "supplement the authority given in the Ohio Civil Rights Act." The only "authority given" in the Ohio Civil Rights Act (Sections 4112.01 to 4112.99, Revised Code,) is given to the Ohio Civil Rights Commission (Sections 4112.04, <u>et seq.</u>, Revised Code,) with respect to enforcing the Act, and to common pleas courts. (Section 4112.06, Revised Code,) with respect to judicial review of orders of the Commission. Since no authority is given to the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, as such, under the Ohio Civil Rights Act, it follows that the Board has no authority to "supplement the authority given." In addition, any such supplementation would be a matter for the General Assembly, in whom the legislative power of the State of Ohio is vested. Article II, Section 1, Constitution of Ohio.

Accordingly, it is my opinion and you are hereby advised:

1. The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University has the requisite authority to adopt the proposed <u>Rules for the Uni-</u> <u>versity Faculty -- 55.00. Open Housing</u>, a copy of which is attached to this Opinion as an Appendix, upon a determination by the Board that such rules reasonably and not arbitrarily advance the Board's valid interests in housing facilities and non-discrimination with respect to the students at the University.

2. The proposed rules are outside the legal parameters of State and Federal laws with respect to certain owner-occupied dwellings insofar as the proposed rules treat discrimination based on religion or national origin, but within such parameters insofar as they treat discrimination based on race.

3. The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, as such, does not have authority to supplement authority given in the Ohio Civil Rights Act.

APPENDIX

55.00. Open Housing

55.01. The Open Housing Policy.

It is the policy of The Ohio State University that rental housing be available to all of the University's students on equal terms without regard to race, religion, color, or national origin.

55.02. The Open Housing Rule.

- a. (1) No student shall become a resident of any premises (whether registered or unregistered with the University) which is on the discriminatory housing list, as defined in subsection d. This section shall not apply to students living with their parents.
 - (2) Upon a finding by the appropriate tribunal that a student has violated this subsection, with knowledge that the premises are on the discriminatory housing list, he shall be liable to recorded probation or suspension.
- b. (1) If a student becomes a resident of any premises (whether registered or unregistered with the University) which is on the discriminatory housing list without knowledge of that fact he shall not continue his residence therein for more than thirty days after he received notice to vacate from the Office of the Vice President for Student Affairs unless he is bound by a lease for a longer time, in which case he shall not continue his residence therein beyond the term required by such lease. The prohibition of this subsection does not apply to a student who resides in the premises at the time of the finding of discrimination, and who remains in the same unit.
 - (2) Upon a finding by the appropriate tribunal that a student has violated this subsection, he shall be liable to recorded probation or suspension.
- c. (1) No student shall enter into any arrangement to become a resident of any premises (whether registered or unregistered with the University) which is on the discriminatory housing list.
 - (2) Upon a finding by the appropriate tribunal that a student has violated this subsection, with knowledge that the premises are on the discriminatory housing list, he shall be liable to recorded probation or suspension.

55.02. The Open Housing Rule. (continued)

- d. The discriminatory housing list shall consist of those premises which the Open Housing Panel has ordered to be placed on such list for the periods prescribed pursuant to Rule 55.06.
- e. A student is a person who is registered for course credit toward a University degree or who is seeking housing in preparation for registration and candidacy.
- f. Any charge that a student has violated this rule shall be subject to a hearing, in conformity with due process, by the appropriate tribunal charged with the adjudication of violations of University rules.

55.03. The Open Housing Panel.

The Open Housing Panel shall consist of:

Six faculty members selected by vote of the Faculty Council, at least one of whom shall be a member of the Faculty Council;

Three undergraduate student members selected by vote of the Student Assembly;

One graduate student member selected by vote of the Council of Graduate Students;

One professional student member selected by vote of the Professional College Council.

Faculty members of the Open Housing Panel shall be designated for a term of two years. The initial Panel shall decide by lot which three faculty members shall serve for a one-year term so that three positions will become vacant each year. Student members of the Panel shall serve for a term of one year. Faculty and student members may serve successive terms.

Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner that the position which has become vacant was filled; those appointed to fill vacancies shall serve out the term of the member they are replacing.

The Open Housing Panel shall elect its own chairman and such other officers as the members deem appropriate. The Panel shall keep a record of each case consisting of a brief description of the facts, the decision (including any concurring or dissenting opinion), and the vote of each member. These case records shall be filed with the Vice President for Student Affairs, who shall maintain them, and make them available to the Panel, parties, and the public at reasonable times in accordance with a published schedule.

The Open Housing Panel shall adopt its own rules of procedure not inconsistent with these provisions.

55.04. Complaints.

- a. Any student, the Vice President for Student Affairs, or the Director of Housing may lodge a complaint that an owner, landlord or the authorized agent of either has discriminated in the rental of housing to students on the grounds of race, religion, color or national origin with the Office of the Special Assistant for Student Affairs within six months of the alleged act of discrimination.
- b. The complaint shall contain a statement of the acts alleged to constitute the discrimination.
- c. The Special Assistant shall use student investigators for the purpose of determining whether owners, landlords, or their authorized agents discriminate on the grounds of race, religion, color, or national origin in the rental of housing.

55.05. The Hearing.

- a. Upon receipt of a complaint, the Special Assistant shall:
 - (1) Request the Open Housing Panel to convene a public hearing to determine whether the named owner, landlord, or an agent of either, discriminated against the University's students in the rental of housing on the basis of race, religion, color, or national origin.
 - (2) Serve by registered mail upon the landlord, owner, or authorized agent in charge of the premises a copy of the complaint and of this rule.
- b. The Special Assistant or the complainant may present evidence material to a determination of the charges and cross-examine witnesses, with or without the aid of counsel, at a hearing convened for the purpose by the Panel.
- c. The Open Housing Panel shall, on the written request of the Special Assistant, conduct a public hearing no earlier than ten days after the making of the complaint and its notice of hearing to the Special Assistant, the complainant, and the party charged with discrimination, who shall be advised of his right to appear, to be represented by counsel, to present witnesses, and to cross-examine witnesses who testify.

55.06. Findings.

After considering only the evidence admitted at the hearing, the Open Housing Panel shall determine whether the owner, landlord, or the authorized agent of either of them has refused to rent on equal terms without regard to race, religion, color, or national origin to all of the University's students. A refusal to rent shall include those situations where the owner, landlord, or authorized agent

55.06. Findings. (continued)

refuses to rent premises to a student who is gathering evidence to determine whether the owner, landlord, or authorized agent discriminates within the meaning of this rule.

If the Open Housing Panel finds by a preponderance of the evidence that there has been such a discriminatory refusal to rent, it shall enter a determination that the premises be placed on the discriminatory housing list.

Any premises placed on the discriminatory housing list shall remain on the list for the period prescribed by the Open Housing Panel, but it shall not be less than one year nor more than three years. However, in extreme circumstances, the Panel may prescribe a period of less than one year provided that its reasons are included in the record provided for in Rule 55.03. No premises shall be removed from the discriminatory housing list until: (a) the period prescribed by the Open Housing Panel has ended, (b) a written pledge of compliance with this rule has been received from the landlord or owner of the premises, and (c) with reference to premises which are rented through an agent, (i) the owner or landlord has given the agent written instructions to comply with this rule, (ii) has submitted a copy of said instructions to the Open Housing Panel, (iii) has received the Open Housing Panel's approval of such instructions, and (iv) has pledged in writing to give such approved written instructions to all future agents.

If the Panel finds that the landlord or owner has breached a pledge previously given under this section the premises shall be placed on the discriminatory housing list for a period of not less than three years.

55.07. The Discriminatory Housing List.*

The Vice President for Student Affairs, upon receipt of a decision of discrimination by the Open Housing Panel shall, after the ten-day period for taking an appeal or after determination upon appeal, place the premises wherein the discrimination took place on the discriminatory housing list. He shall also notify the owner or landlord of the premises that none of the University's students will be permitted to become residents of or make any arrangement to become a resident of the building for the period of time determined by the Open Housing Panel.

Any owner or landlord, or authorized agent who knowingly rents or enters into any arrangement to rent housing to a student in premises which he has been notified are on the discriminatory housing list shall, after a hearing establishing this fact, have the term of listing extended for three additional years. A complaint of violation of this section shall be processed in accordance with Rules 55.04 and 55.05.

55.08. Notice.

The discriminatory housing list, divided by geographical area, shall be published periodically in the Lantern, and shall be included in the registration materials of every student together with a copy of this rule.

A copy of this rule shall be conspicuously published in a newspaper of general circulation at least five times during the month preceding the commencement of each quarter. A copy of this rule shall also be sent or delivered to each landlord who is known to the University to have student tenants in Franklin County.

The Lantern shall not accept or print any advertisement for rental of any building on the discriminatory housing list.

55.09. Appeals.*

Appeals from decisions of the Open Housing Panel shall be taken in writing within ten days to a three-member Housing Appeals Panel hereby created, consisting of one student member, one faculty member and one administrative member, each of whom shall be appointed annually by the President in keeping with the duly constituted authority for student affairs as delegated by the Board to the President.

The Housing Appeals Panel shall elect its own chairman, establish rules of procedure for such appellate hearing and make determination in such appeals.

SPIRO T. AGNEW

Doctor of Laws

Talented lawyer, enlightened public servant, administrator and statesman to whose high office his efficiency and integrity are of universal importance

The attributes and accomplishments of Spiro T. Agnew, the thirty-ninth Vice President of the United States, combine to make him an eminent symbol of the American saga.

The son of a Greek immigrant father, he was born in Baltimore, Maryland, and is a product of that city's public schools. He attended The Johns Hopkins University and the University of Baltimore, where he received his Bachelor of Laws degree and taught night classes in law for seven years prior to becoming Governor of the State. He holds honorary Doctor of Laws degrees from Morgan State College and the University of Maryland. A World War II Army Company Commander, he served again during the Korean War.

Upon returning to law practice, he became active in civic affairs and, as Chairman of the Baltimore County Board of Appeals and a Director of The National Association of Counties, built an enviable record in reorganizing the Police Bureau, instigating school improvements, and in strengthening the ties between state and local governments. He gained the commendation of both labor and management by his skill in helping to settle or prevent several crippling strikes.

His service as Governor of Maryland was marked by an emphasis on professionalism and the development of new programs to resolve urban and metropolitan problems. His enlightened policies brought about such fiscal reform as a graduated tax rate, and the introduction of tax credits for the elderly, state aid for local law enforcement agencies, kindergartens, and a special grant to inner-city schools.

Governor Agnew's administration was predicated upon thorough study and intelligent analysis aimed at efficiency, economy, and comprehensive concern in State government. New measures in law enforcement and prison reform were developed, the State's first community mental health and child day-care centers were financed, a state-wide highway safety program was instituted, Maryland's public accommodation statutes were extended, and programs were enacted to help control and prevent air and water pollution. Singular accomplishments were the sponsorship of the first state-wide Fair Housing Bill enacted south of the Mason-Dixon Line, and promulgation of a Governor's Code of Fair Employment Practices outlawing discrimination in State service and in any firm doing business with the State.

Wide recognition of his executive ability is, in part, reflected by his top position and expert performance in such groups as the National Governors' Conference, and in his appointment by President Johnson to the Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations.

This University is proud to honor a distinguished American whose exemplary record is testimony of personal commitment to honorable, intelligent, able public service.

BOB HOPE

Doctor of Humane Letters

A distinguished American who has done much to lift the human spirit by his witty illumination of life and his generous involvement with mankind

The philosophy and unselfish direction of Bob Hope's energies and talents make him one of America's most widely influential symbols of humanitarianism. Born Leslie Townes Hope, in Eltham, England, he came to the United States at four years of age and became a citizen of this country by virtue of his father's naturalization. Mr. Hope's long and prominent professional career includes multitudes of stage, movie and television performances, recording successes, and the authorship of articles and books. While notable for range and durability, his achievement is uniquely valuable in making him a one-man bridge between the generations and an expression of perceptive involvement with his fellow me.

He reveals himself to be a contemporary philosopher whose rapier wit strikes telling blows at the entire range of folly which distinguishes our species. He good-humoredly pinpoints stupidity, pomposity, hypocracy, and other widely-assorted ills—regardless of who their perpetrators may be. Personalities and events, great and small, are made subject to incisive, illuminating consideration—designed in humorous format and delivered with grace and style. He saves himself as target for some of the sharpest satire.

Each performance is ruled by a high standard of values, marked by good taste, and reveals profound understanding of and deep sympathy for the human condition. Virtually all are a demanding exercise of critical analysis, expressed by a skilled rhetorician.

Shakespeare's claim that "all the world's a stage" is accepted as dictum by this artist. Currently Mr. Houghton serves as a director of four other corporations and is actively associated with four educational institutions.

He has devoted his entire business career to the operations of the Corning Glass Works, an acknowledged world leader in the development and manufacturing of specialty glass products. Under his leadership, his company's sales increased thirty-two-fold and employment expanded ten times. This outstanding progress was largely due to his progressive and imaginative willingness to underwrite extensive research programs and to support them through the often discouraging and difficult developmental stages.

Mr. Houghton's sensitivity to employee relations is reflected in a strike-free record dating back to the turn of the century. His faith in the fruits of basic research and cooperative approaches has resulted in the formation of such outstanding and jointly controlled subsidiaries as the Pittsburgh Corning Corporation, Owens Corning Fiberglass Corporation, and the Dow Corning Corporation.

Mr. Houghton has also devoted his time and energies successfully to many public and national activities. At the outbreak of World War II he went to Washington as a "dollar-a-year man" to serve as Deputy Chief of the Bureau of Industry of the Office of Production Management, followed by two successive appointments to key positions on the War Production Board. He later served as Deputy Chief of the U.S. Mission for Economic Affairs in London. Later he was recalled to governmental service as United States Ambassador to France.

Mr. Houghton has been active in community affairs and initiated the formation and construction of the Corning Glass Center, a world-wide recognized center for the displays and libraries pertaining to the history, art, and science of glass-making. He has given tangible support to foundations for community programs directed to education, public health and welfare, and to the creation of the Corning Community College as a part of the State University of New York.

President Fawcett stated that he was on the third week following his second eye operation and that he was unable to focus on the printed word even with his good eye. He requested Dr. Corbally to present the recommendations on his behalf. He indicated that he wanted to express publicly his good fortune at having a great many fine colleagues who kept the work of this institution moving forward during this absence as well as his previous absence. He further stated that from everything he had heard while he could not see it, that all the activities associated with Commencement and the Commencement itself were testimony to their effectiveness. President Fawcett expressed the further hope that by the time the Board convenes again that he would be back in full swing.

Before Dr. Corbally proceeded with the recommendations, Mr. Shocknessy made the following motion:

I hope the Chairman will indulge me in offering a motion of commendation for the excellence of the arrangements which were made by President Fawcett; Dr. John E. Corbally, Provost; Dr. Edward Q. Moulton, Executive Assistant to President Fawcett; and Mr. Robert Smith, Vice President for University Development; and to indicate the pride our Board has in the hospitality and the courtesies which were extended to the Vice President of the United States, and for the fact that not a single untoward incident of any consequence occurred during the Commencement proceedings.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Jones and unanimously adopted.

Vice President Corbally presented the following recommendations on behalf of President Fawcett:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Budgets for the 1969-70 Fiscal Year

Vice President Corbally presented President Fawcett's statement pertaining to the recommended budgets for the 1969-70 fiscal year:

Before submitting to you the formal recommendation concerning University budgets for 1969-70, I want to make a brief statement concerning the major features of these budgets. As the resolution will indicate, we are estimating expenditures during 1969-70 in the amount of \$188,063,338. This amount represents an increase of approximately \$15 million over final estimated expenditures for 1968-69. Slightly over \$3 million of this increase occurs in restricted grants and contracts and in auxiliary enterprises leaving about \$12 million in increases in the general unrestricted budgets. We approached the development of this budget with the recognition that continued inflationary pressures would require fairly sizeable increases in operating expenses. We also recognized that faculty and professional salaries in institutions comparable to Ohio State

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

A. Budgets for the 1969-70 Fiscal Year (continued)

have been increasing over the past few years at a rate of about 7% per year. In spite of uncertainties concerning appropriations in support of University programs, we also felt it necessary to attempt to continue the development of a limited number of high priority and essential number of new programs and program improvements. Finally, because of the nature of University requirements for annual budget revision as opposed to a state system of biennial appropriations, it is necessary for us to reserve funds in 1969-70 to support increases in 1970-71. Budget calculations have been based upon an estimated enrollment increase of approximately 4% over 1968-69 enrollments.

As a result of our budget deliberations and in keeping with the factors mentioned above, the \$12 million increase will be used almost in its entirety to sustain the current level of effort of this University. Increases in faculty salaries which average approximately 5% and statutory increases in classified personnel account for \$2.6 million of this total. Slightly over \$3 million is the minimal amount needed for the strengthening and improvement of the existing programs as well as for an extremely limited number of new programs in such critical areas as natural resources, computer science and library circulation. In addition, there are a number of built-in increased costs over which we have little or no control in such areas as utilities, equipment and contract services. At the same time we are bringing a number of new facilities on line during this coming year on the main campus as well as opening the west campus. Meeting the costs of enrollment increases being accommodated with these additional facilities will require about \$1.1 million of additional support in the areas of personnel and operating expenses. Changes in retirement contributions will require slightly over \$700,000, while general price increases in operating expenses within the instructional programs will consume another half million dollars. Our carry forward to 1970-71 adds approximately \$1 million with the remaining increases making up the total of \$12 million.

This budget represents a minimum budget to support the continued operation of existing University programs and a limited effort to maintain the momentum in academic development which the University has experienced over the past few years. We have reduced our earlier program requirements in the amount of \$10 million, and it is my opinion that the budget recommendation which I shall now present does represent the necessary expenditures if The Ohio State University is to continue to serve the people of the State of Ohio as their principal state university.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

A. Budgets for the 1969-70 Fiscal Year (continued)

With this background of information, Vice President Corbally presented for consideration by the Board of Trustees a continuation budget proposal involving all of the current budgets for the operation of The Ohio State University for the fiscal year 1969-70:

While the Ohio General Assembly has not as yet completed action upon either appropriations legislation for education for the 1969-71 biennium or several bills which might affect pay ranges for Civil Service personnel, the requirements related to the continued operation of the University make it necessary to prepare at this time University expenditure budgets for 1969-70. The following proposals require income from State subsidy in the amount of \$58,858,100 or income from a combination of State subsidy and increased student fees in that amount exclusive of the amount necessary to fund any Civil Service salary increases above those now mandated by existing statutes. An analysis of current legislative proposals before the General Assembly indicates that some increases in student fees may be necessary effective with the Autumn Quarter, 1969.

The expenditure budgets for 1969-70 have been prepared for the second time using the new "program budgeting" procedure. This technique is proving highly successful in bringing the judgment and priorities of all elements of the University into focus. The procedure involves calculating a continuation budget based upon enrollment changes and cost of living factors and then examining needs for new or improved programs. The Current Funds Budget for 1968-69 approved by the Board of Trustees on June 13, 1968, contained expenditure estimates of \$163, 112, 910. Due to increases in grants and contracts, student fees and State subsidy, the final estimates for 1968-69 now indicate expenditures of \$172, 630, 225. The budget for 1969-70 as proposed, contains estimated expenditures of \$188, 063, 338, an increase of 8.9 per cent.

It is recommended that these expenditure budgets and the supporting statements for the foregoing summary figures which have been reviewed by the Board of Trustees be approved, and that the Secretary be instructed to file these detailed budget statements for the fiscal year 1969-70 with the official records of the University. It is recommended also that final summary statements be prepared for a subsequent meeting of the Board of Trustees reflecting final action by the Ohio General Assembly concerning appropriations and recommending any necessary action by the Board of Trustees concerning student fee increases, since it is not known at this time what restrictions or review procedures concerning student fees may be contained in potential appropriation legislation. recommended that it be the sense of this motion that the Current Funds Budget of \$188,063,338 must be funded through a combination of income sources including adjustments in student fees and programs as may be required to achieve the intent of this expenditure plan.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Jones, the Board of Trustees approved the said budgets for the 1969-70 fiscal year by unanimous roll call vote.

Budget for The Ohio State University Research Foundation for the 1969-70 Fiscal Year

It is recommended that The Ohio State University Research Foundation annual budget for the fiscal year 1969-70 be approved in an amount not to exceed \$1,184,134. This budget was approved by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Research Foundation at its annual meeting on April 18, 1969.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Safford, The Ohio State University Research Foundation budget for 1969-70 was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

B. Establishment of the Frank E. and Mary W. Pomerene Professorship in the Prevention and Treatment of Infectious Diseases

At the April 10, 1969 meeting of the Board of Trustees the Mary W. and Frank E. Pomerene Memorial Fund was established with a gift to the University through The Ohio State University Development Fund from the Estate of the late Mary W. Pomerene.

The above-specified fund had \$102, 500.00 deposited in the University's Investment Portfolio at the time of its establishment and was to be used in the fields of prevention and treatment of infectious diseases. An additional increment from the estate received by the University on April 22, 1969, brings the total received to date to \$124, 518.70. With this large amount of principal and the accrued interest from such principal, the total will be greater than the \$125,000.00 minimum required for an endowed professorship.

Vice President Corbally recommended therefore that the Mary W. and Frank E. Pomerene Memorial Fund be changed to the "Frank E. and Mary W. Pomerene Professorship." This professorship is to support a professor in the prevention and treatment of infectious diseases within the College of Medicine.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Eckley, the Board of Trustees approved the establishment of the "Frank E. and Mary W. Pomerene Professorship" by unanimous roll call vote.

C. Naming of Street

Upon the recommendation of the President's Cabinet, it was proposed that the existing Service Building Road be renamed "Millikin Road," to recognize and honor Professor Joseph Millikin, first professor of English and modern language and literature at the University.

This proposal is in accordance with the <u>By-Laws of the Board of Trustees</u>. Vice President Corbally recommended that said proposal be approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. Dunlap, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

D. Revision of Rule 29.2705 and Addition of a New Rule 29.2729 to Rules for the University Faculty

- 2. Rule 29.2729 establishes a Committee on Academic Freedom and Responsibility.

Vice President Corbally recommended therefore that this action of the Faculty Council be approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Eckley, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote.

E. Establishment of a New Program Leading to the Master of Arts Degree in the History of Art

The Council on Academic Affairs at a meeting on April 16, 1969, approved for transmittal to the Faculty Council a proposal for the establishment of a new program which would lead to the Master of Arts degree with a field of specialization in the History of Art. This proposal was approved by the Faculty Council at a meeting on May 13, 1969, and is to become effective immediately.

This degree program will prepare the student for teaching on the junior college or college level and for entry into a doctoral program.

Vice President Corbally recommended therefore that this action of the Faculty Council be approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. Jones, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

Vice President Corbally reported to the Board the deaths of Paul Bucher, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Mechanical Engineering; Wendell Allen Butcher, Clinical Assistant Professor in the Department of Psychiatry; Emerson Edward Kimberly, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Electrical Engineering; N. Gilbert Riddle, Associate Professor Emeritus in the College of Administrative Science - Finance; Herschel W. Nisonger, Professor Emeritus in the College of Education; and John Sanford Richardson, Professor in the College of Education. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

A. Paul Bucher

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death May 6, 1969, of Paul Bucher, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Mechanical Engineering.

Professor Bucher was born in East Liverpool, Ohio, on August 30, 1891. He was graduated from East Liverpool High School in 1909 and was an operating engineer for the Railway Traction and Light Company there for five years before entering The Ohio State University. He was graduated from the University in 1918 with the degree, Bachelor of Mechanical Engineering. He also received the Degree of Mechanical Engineer from the University in 1932. He became an instructor in Mechanical Engineering in 1918 and continued his teaching for forty-two years, retiring in 1960 with the rank of Professor which he received in 1934. During this time he also spent most of his summers working in industry to maintain his perspective so that his teaching would be up to date. After retirement he was employed as engineering consultant to the Ohio Board of Building Standards, specializing in boilers, unfired pressure vessels and pressure piping, which

position he held until his death. In the early years of his teaching career he carried out considerable research in flow measurement but in the early 1930's he became interested in the safety of boilers and pressure vessels and spent much time on research on safety valves and other safety devices for industry.

Professor Bucher's work before entering the University created an interest in power generation which continued for the rest of his life. He was a dedicated teacher, willing to spend many hours in explaining the theory and practice of power plant engineering to his students so that many of them report that this interest greatly influenced their careers. He was unsparing of himself if he thought he could help any student and will be remembered by many for his unselfishness. He was responsible for the supervision of the Mechanical Engineering Laboratory at the University for more than twenty years and did much to develop it as one of the outstanding laboratories in the United States at the time of his retirement.

Professor Bucher had spent the early years of his teaching career conducting research on flow measurement, being for a short time a member of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers Research Committee on Fluid Meters. His interest in power plants soon lead to a special study of their safety problems and he worked for many years in the field of safety valve testing and design, becoming the outstanding authority in this field in the United States. He was a member of the ASME Boiler Code Committee on Safety Valves and wrote most of the rules concerning them which are now law in practically all of the United States and Canada. He continued this interest after retirement. His position with the Ohio Board of Building Standards required accepting responsibility for the safety of all pressure vessels and piping in the State. The rules which he wrote and which became a part of State rules will be followed for many years. He became interested in the problems of air pollution when it became apparent that this was a problem of the health of the people and as a member of the City of Columbus Smoke Commission helped write the ordinance for smoke abatement in Columbus and was a member of the appeals board of this commission for almost twenty years.

Professor Bucher was a Fellow of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, an honorary member of the National Association of Power Engineers and a member of the American Society for Engineering Education.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Professor Bucher its deep sympathy. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a sincere expression of the Board's realization of the loss which the family has sustained.

B. Wendell Allen Butcher

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on April 26, 1969, of Wendell Allen Butcher, M.D., Clinical Assistant Professor in the Department of Psychiatry.

Dr. Butcher was born in Murray City, Ohio, graduated from Ohio Wesleyan University and received his Doctor of Medicine degree in 1939 from The Ohio State University. He interned at Grant Hospital in Columbus, Ohio, 1939-1940, and served a residency in psychiatry at the Naval Hospital in Bethesda, Maryland. He was later stationed at the Naval Hospital in Oak Knoll, California, until 1952 when he became Chief of the Psychiatric and Neurologic Unit at the U. S. Marine Corps Depot in Paris Island, South Carolina. He left there to become the Superintendent of the Columbus State School in 1954, serving in that responsible position until 1958. He was an Assistant Commissioner of Mental Hygiene in the State of Ohio from 1958 to 1959. He first began teaching medical students and residents in the Department of Psychiatry at The Ohio State University in 1956. He conducted an active private practice and was active in medical affairs, serving as Chairman of the Committee on Mental Health of the Ohio State Medical Association. He was also a committee member of the American Medical Association Disaster Committee.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the College of Medicine and the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

C. Emerson Edward Kimberly

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on May 6, 1969, of Emerson Edward Kimberly, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Electrical Engineering.

Professor Kimberly was born in Circleville, Ohio, on October 17, 1895. He received his B. E. E. degree in 1921 and his M. Sc. degree in 1929, both from The Ohio State University. After receiving his bachelor's degree he was employed as a designer for one year by the General Electric Company and for two years by the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company as a sales engineer. He then returned to the University as an Instructor and was an active teacher until his retirement in 1960 as a Professor.

During his years on the faculty, he specialized in the teaching of electrical power courses and the electrical engineering courses for students in other engineering departments. For these latter courses, he wrote a textbook published by the International Textbook Company. Just as he was meticulous in his own work, he expected careful work from his students. Many alumni, who as students considered him a harsh taskmaster, have later thanked him for the habits of accuracy he developed in them. For almost thirty years, he was the department representative for engineering employment placement.

C. Emerson Edward Kimberly (continued)

Another aspect of his professional career was his long and successful consulting practice. A few examples will illustrate the breadth of his work. He redesigned the electrical distribution system of the City of Westerville in 1925 and again in 1950. He designed and supervised the installation of the electric distribution system for Don Scott Airport in 1948 and was responsible for the redesign and layout of a pumping station for the City of Columbus, Division of Water, in 1951. He was also a prolific inventor. His contributions include machinery for the manufacture of steel wool products, the electric controls for the first operable pinsetter for bowling alleys, controls for oil well drilling bits and systems for standardizing the density of granular detergents. He also developed a strong interest in engineering aspects of law and participated in many cases as an expert witness.

Following his retirement from teaching, he demonstrated his versatility by working for several years for the Space Technology Laboratories in Los Angeles in development work on the Titan and Minuteman programs. At the same time, he participated in career guidance for high school students in Los Angeles County.

His skills and interests were by no means limited to engineering. He was also a capable writer. In addition to his text, he wrote a novel of life in southern Ohio, served as a technical editor for a company and just before his death completed a history of the Electrical Engineering Department.

Professor Kimberly was a Fellow of the IEEE, a member of the National Society of Professional Engineers, ASEE and Sigma Xi.

On behalf of the University at large, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

D. N. Gilbert Riddle

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on May 8, 1969, of Dr. N. Gilbert Riddle, Associate Professor Em in the College of Administrative Science - Finance.

Dr. Riddle was born in Nottoway County, Virginia, on March 20, 1897. He received his Bachelor's degree from West Virginia University in 1922. He earned his Master's degree from Columbia University in 1926 and his Doctoral degree there in 1934.

Professor Riddle served as Bursar and Assistant Professor of Business at Birmingham Southern College and as Instructor in Economics and Business at West Virginia University. He came to The Ohio State University in 1929 as Instructor in Business Organization, was promoted to the rank of Assistant Professor of Business Organization in 1932 and to Associate Professor of Business Organization in 1947. He retired in 1967 after 38 years with The Ohio State University.

Dr. Riddle held memberships in the American Economics Association, the American Finance Association and the Columbus Society of Financial Analysts; the Faculty Club; Phi Alpha Kappa and Beta Gamma Sigma, honorary fraternities; and Phi Delta Theta, social fraternity. He was an active member of First Community Church. During World War I, Dr. Riddle served two years in the United States Army and during World War II he worked in Washington, D. C. He had been Statistical Assistant to the Federal Reserve Bank of New York; Investment Advisor for the Central Hanover Bank; and Financial Consultant with the United States Government National Economic Committee, Investment Banking Division.

Professor Riddle was an able teacher who enjoyed his students. He was the author of the text, The Investment Policy of Trust Institutions, and collaborated with H. Parker Willis to write The Banking Situation. He was selected for Who's Who in the Midwest and was included in the Directory of American Scholars.

On behalf of the University at large, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

E. Herschel W. Nisonger

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on May 19, 1969, of Herschel W. Nisonger, Professor Emeritus in the College of Education.

Professor Nisonger was born in Ithaca, Ohio, March 18, 1890. He received his B.S. degree from The Ohio State University in 1914 and his M.A. degree from Columbia University in 1926. He served as Principal and Teacher of Science or Vocational Agriculture in several high schools for five years after graduating from this University. In 1919, he returned to The Ohio State University as an Instructor in Agricultural Education and remained on the faculty in administrative and teaching roles until his retirement in 1960. These roles included Professor of Agricultural Education; Junior Dean, College of Agriculture; Assistant Director, Bureau of Educational Research and Service.

E. Herschel W. Nisonger (continued)

It will be observed that Professor Nisonger's interests actually covered three careers: agricultural education; community organization and adult education; and special education. However, after his retirement this vigorous, purposeful and determined man entered upon a fourth and final career extending over a ten-year period. In this he became Director of Special Studies and Technical Planning of the American Association on Mental Deficiency in which capacity he coordinated numerous research projects of a national and international nature. He was actively engaged in this work at the time of his death.

Many honors came to him. Perhaps the most appreciated was the Distinguished Service Award of The Ohio State University presented in 1961 for unusual and distinctive service rendered the University. He served as President of the American Hearing Society for two terms and President of the American Association on Mental Deficiency. Perhaps a statement of tribute as he assumed this office was most fitting: "He is a pioneer; a social innovator; a kindly, wise and patient man; a catalyst."

Other honors indicate the wide range of his leadership functions in Ohio. Some are: Plaque for outstanding leadership from the Ohio Citizens Council for Health and Welfare, 1950; Citation of Recognition from the Ohio Rehabilitation Association; Certificate of Honor from the Ohio Federation of the International Council for Exceptional Children, 1957; Distinguished Service Award from the Ohio Association for Adult Education, 1958; Certificate of Merit to its Honorary Chairman by the Ohio Association for Retarded Children, 1960.

On behalf of the University at large, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

F. John Sanford Richardson

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on May 22, 1969, of John Sanford Richardson, Professor in the College of Education.

John Richardson was born in New Weston, Ohio, on December 14, 1908. He received his B.S. and M.A. degrees from Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, in 1933 and 1936 respectively, and the Ph.D. degree in science education from The Ohio State University in 1942. His public school teaching experience included assignments at the elementary school, junior high school and high school levels. He went to Miami University in 1936 as an Instructor in science and science education. He was promoted to Assistant Professor in 1939 and to Associate Professor in 1942. From 1942 to 1947, he was responsible for various courses in education and also served as the principal of the McGuffey School at Miami University. He joined the faculty

of The Ohio State University in 1948 as an Associate Professor in the College of Education. He was promoted to Professor in 1953. During his tenure at The Ohio State University, he served as Coordinator of the Area of Science Education; Director of several National Science Foundation Academic Year Institutes and Summer Institutes; and Director of the ERIC Information Analysis Center for Science Education from 1965 through 1968.

Professor Richardson was active in many professional associations related to science and science education. He was a member and Past-President and Past-Treasurer of the National Science Teachers Association. He was a member of the National Association for the Advancement of Science, National Education Association, National Association for Research in Science Teaching, National Society for the Study of Education, U. S. National Commission for UNESCO, Phi Beta Kappa and Phi Delta Kappa. He also served as a consultant to many universities, secondary schools and state and national committees.

Professor Richardson was the author of numerous articles, research reports and books related to science and the teaching of science. His books concerning methods for teaching science and materials for teaching science are used on an international basis. Through his teaching and publications, John Richardson established a reputation as a master teacher of science and science education, and a thoughtful scholar. In recognition of his many contributions to the field of science education, he was honored by The National Science Teachers Association in March, 1969, as a Distinguished Science Educator, the highest award the Association can bestow.

On behalf of the University at large, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

The Chairman of the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees, Mr. Frederick Jones, presented the following resolution:

> RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF NOT EXCEEDING \$1,700,000 PARKING SYSTEM REVENUE NOTES, SERIES 1969, FOR THE PURPOSE OF REFUNDING \$1,700,000 PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF PARKING SYSTEM REVENUE NOTES HERETO-FORE ISSUED TO PAY PART OF THE COSTS OF CONSTRUCTING AND EQUIPPING CERTAIN BUILD-INGS, STRUCTURES AND FACILITIES TO BE USED FOR OR IN CONNECTION WITH THE PARKING OF MOTOR VEHICLES AND PROVIDING FOR OTHER MATTERS INCIDENTAL THERETO.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University (herein called the "Board") is vested with the government of The Ohio State University (herein called the "University" and, when the context admits, collectively with the Board called the "University") under and by virtue of Section 3335.02 of the Revised Code of Ohio, with the right, under Section 3335.03 of said Revised Code, and as such Board, of suing and being sued, contracting and being contracted with, and of making and using a common seal and, under Section 3335.10 of said Revised Code, has general supervision of all lands, buildings, and other property of the University and control of all expenses thereof; and by Chapter 3335 of the Revised Code of Ohio; and

WHEREAS, by authority of Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio, the Board is authorized to acquire by purchase, lease, or otherwise, and to construct, equip, maintain, renovate, repair, improve or remodel and operate, and to lease to or from others, buildings, structures, or facilities and sites therefor and related equipment within or in close proximity to the campus of the University to be used for or in connection with athletic purposes, student activity centers, faculty centers, dining halls, bookstores, auditoriums, parking of motor vehicles and contract research facilities; and, for the purpose of paying the costs thereof, or any part thereof, or the repayment of any loans obtained for such purposes, to use any funds in its possession not otherwise obligated, revenues derived from athletic events, and from the operation or leasing of such activity centers, faculty centers, dining halls, bookstores, auditoriums, parking facilities and contract research facilities including but not limited to such portions of student activity fees charged and paid for such purposes, any other revenues or receipts derived or to be derived from the operation or leasing of such structures, buildings, facilities and equipment; and for the purpose of paying all or part of such costs the Board is further authorized thereby to issue and sell bonds, notes

or other written instruments evidencing such indebtedness, provided that such obligations shall not be a claim against or lien upon any property of the State of Ohio or any property of or under the control of said Board excepting such parts of the revenues or receipts derived from the operation or leasing of such structures, buildings, facilities, equipment or sites and any portion of the student fees assessed or to be assessed for the purposes of such acquisition, construction, equipment renovation, repair, improvement or remodeling or for the use of such structures, buildings, facilities, equipment or sites which the Board may pledge to secure the payment of such obligations; and by authority of said Section 3345, 11 the Board is also authorized to issue such bonds, notes or other obligations payable as aforesaid in order to retire or refund outstanding notes or other obligations matured or unmatured, to repay moneys previously borrowed or advanced under said section or to reimburse funds of the University for amounts used under said Section 3345.11; and

WHEREAS, the Board has heretofore and does hereby determine and confirm that it is necessary to provide additional facilities for the parking of motor vehicles and, accordingly, hereby declares and determines that it is immediately necessary to construct and equip certain buildings, structures and facilities to be used for and in connection with the parking of motor vehicles, all within or in close proximity to its campus, including three multi-level parking structures for the parking of approximately 2,250 motor vehicles (being herein called the "Project"), the cost of which is presently estimated to be \$4,500,000; and

WHEREAS, the University has determined to borrow the funds to pay part of the foregoing costs, and to issue its Parking System Revenue Bonds, Series A, in the principal amount of \$4,500,000 pursuant to Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio, and pursuant to resolution of the Board duly adopted September 8, 1966 authorizing said Bonds (which Resolution, as the same may hereafter be amended, supplemented or superseded, is herein called the "Bond Resolution"); and

WHEREAS, the University has heretofore by Resolution adopted June 13, 1968, provided for the issuance of \$1,700,000 Parking System Revenue Notes, Series 1968, of the University, and pursuant to said June 13, 1968 Resolution, there has been issued and delivered \$1,700,000 Parking System Revenue Notes, Series 1968, to refund outstanding interim financing and to provide additional interim construction financing to pay part of the Cost of the Project which is presently under construction, which notes mature on June 27, 1969; and

It is hereby confirmed and declared that it is necessary to construct and equip the Project, and to issue, and that there shall be issued, notes in the aggregate principal sum of \$1,700,000 pursuant to Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio, for the purpose of refunding the interim construction financing evidenced by the \$1,700,000 The Ohio State University Parking System Revenue Notes, Series 1968, dated June 28, 1968, and issued and delivered to pay part of the costs of the Project.

Section 2. The principal of and interest on such notes, and such additional notes as may be issued to pay part of the costs of the Project shall be payable solely from (a) the "Pledged Receipts" after provision for "Operating and Maintenance Expenses," if any, of the "Pledged Facilities," and all payments required to be made, from time to time from said "Pledged Receipts" into the "Special Funds" created under the Bond Resolution subject to the pledge thereof to the bonds authorized by the Bond Resolution upon the issuance of said Bonds; and (b) the proceeds of the sale of revenue bonds or notes of the University issued pursuant to Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio, or other authorizing provisions of law to refund the Notes authorized hereby; provided that neither the State of Ohio nor the University, nor its Board of Trustees shall be obligated to pay the principal of or interest on such notes from any other funds or source, nor shall such notes be a claim upon or lien against any other property of the University or the State of Ohio, and

said notes are not general obligations of the State or University, and the full faith and credit there are not pledged thereto, and the noteholders shall have no right to have any taxes levied, collected or applied for or to the payment thereof.

In consideration of the loan evidenced by the notes authorized hereby, the University and its Board covenant and agree that they will do all things necessary to effect the issuance of and delivery, prior to the maturity of such notes, of revenue bonds or notes for the refunding of the Notes, pursuant to Section 3345. 11 of the Revised Code of Ohio or other authorizing provisions of law, in such principal amount as shall be necessary to pay the principal of and interest on such notes, that they will do all things necessary to sell such bonds or notes at the time provided above and will accept such price and such interest rate as shall be necessary in order to effect such sale, and these obligations are established as duties specifically enjoined by law upon the University and its officers, and result from their respective offices, trusts or stations within the meaning of Section 2731.01 of the Revised Code of Ohio.

Section 3. Said notes shall be designated "Parking System Notes. Series 1969, " shall be dated June 27, 1969, and shall mature June 26, 1970. Said notes shall bear interest at the rate of 5.0%, 5.5% and 5.625% per annum, payable semi-annually, or at maturity as requested by the Original Purchaser. Said notes shall be in denominations of \$5,000 or any multiple thereof. as bearer notes with or without coupons, or may be represented by a single note for the entire issue, as may be requested by the Original Purchaser, and shall be numbered as determined by the Vice President, Business and Finance, or the Assistant Treasurer. Said notes shall be payable at the office of the Original Purchaser, or at such other place as he may designate, and shall be signed by the President or the Vice President, Business and Finance, one of which may be a facsimile, attested by the Secretary of the Board, and the coupons, if any, pertaining thereto shall be signed by or bear the facsimile signature of said Vice President, Business and Finance, or the Assistant Treasurer, and the notes shall bear the seal of the University or facsimile thereof.

If agreeable to the Original Purchaser, prior to delivery of the definitive notes, said notes may be delivered as one or more temporary manuscript notes to be surrendered to the University at the principal office of the paying agent when the University shall notify the holder thereof that the definitive notes are available. The definitive notes shall be substantially in the form attached hereto as Supplement A (page 694), the terms and covenants of which are incorporated herein, with such modifications therein as may be appropriate for issuance of the notes herein or other

unregistered form, with or without coupons or to reflect the terms of the sale thereof consistent with this resolution and with such changes therein, not substantially adverse to the University, as the President or the Vice President, Business and Finance, may approve.

If the owner (in this paragraph called the "owner") of a note issued pursuant to this Resolution claims that such note has been lost. destroyed, or wrongfully taken, the Vice President, Business and Finance, or the Assistant Treasurer of the University are each authorized to cause to be executed and delivered a new note (in this paragraph called the "replacement note") of like tenor and date (specifying on its face, however, that it is issued in place of the original note) in place of the original note, in accordance with and subject to the provisions of Section 1308.35 of the Revised Code of Ohio and of this paragraph. The owner's notification and request pursuant to said Section 1308.35 shall be in writing, addressed to the Vice President, Business and Finance, or Assistant Treasurer of the University, and shall include evidence satisfactory to said Vice President or Assistant Treasurer of such loss, destruction, or wrongful taking and of his ownership. The Vice President, Business and Finance, or in his absence the Assistant Treasurer of the University, is authorized to approve, so long as satisfactory to such officer, the indemnity bond that the owner shall file with the University as a condition to the issuance of a replacement note, and is further authorized to impose other reasonable requirements, including a requirement that the owner pay the reasonable expenses and charges of the University in connection with the issuance, execution and delivery of such replacement note, as conditions to the delivery of a replacement note.

The interest on this note and the principal hereof are payable solely from (a) the "Pledged Receipts" after provision for "Operation and Maintenance Expenses", if any, of the "Pledged Facilities" and all payments required to be made, from time to time, from said "Pledged Receipts" into the "Special Funds" created by the Bond Resolution, identified below, as such terms are defined in the Bond Resolution subject to the pledge thereof to the bonds authorized by said Bond Resolution upon the issuance of said Bonds: and (b) the proceeds of the sale of revenue bonds or notes issued pursuant to Section 3345.11 of the Revised Code of Ohio or other authorizing provisions of law to refund this note; and neither the State of Ohio nor the University or its Board of Trustees is obligated to pay the same from any other funds or source, nor shall this note be a claim upon or lien against any other property of the State or the University, and the full faith and credit thereof are not pledged thereto and the noteholders shall have no right to have any taxes levied, collected or applied for or to the payment hereof. The aforesaid Bond Resolution is the Resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees September 8, 1966, authorizing the issuance of \$4,500,000 principal amount of parking system revenue bonds, as such Resolution may be amended, supplemented or superseded.

Revision of Rule 29.2705 and Addition of a New Rule 29.2729 to Rules for the University Faculty

as Approved by the Faculty Council May 13, 1969

Adopted by Board of Trustees June 12, 1969 (See page 655) Page 698 Blank

Rules for the University Faculty

The Faculty Council on May 13, 1969 approved the revision of Section 1 of Rule 29.2705 of <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u>. The addition to this rule is shown in the underscored section. The Faculty Council also approved a new rule--Rule 29.2729.

29.2705. The Library Council.

The Library Council shall consist of six teaching members of the University Faculty; the Vice President for Educational Services; the Vice President for Research; the Dean of the Graduate School; the Director of Libraries; a representative from the Council of Graduate Students (see Rule 53.0705); and a student appointed by the President of the Undergraduate Student Body with the advice and consent of the student assembly. The President, on recommendation of the Vice President for Educational Services shall appoint the six faculty members for four-year terms, one or more to retire each year and to be ineligible for re-appointment during one year thereafter. The Chairman shall be elected from among the teaching faculty members of the Library Council and he shall report to the Faculty Council.

29.2729. Committee on Academic Freedom and Responsibility.

Section 1. The Committee on Academic Freedom and Responsibility shall consist of five elected members of the Faculty Council. They shall be elected by the Faculty Council for two-year terms.*

Section 2. The Committee shall have the following responsibilities:

- a. To study all conditions which, in the judgment of the Committee, may affect the academic freedom or responsibility of the faculty of the University, and to report at least once a year thereon, with recommendations when appropriate, to the Faculty Council.
- b. To hear and investigate complaints by individual faculty members concerning alleged infringements upon academic freedom or responsibility in the University; to report findings and recommendations to the parties involved with the hope of mediating a dispute; to report to the Faculty Council if further action by the Council is appropriate; and, if necessary, to recommend to the Faculty Council that charges under Rule 21.07 be initiated against the individual alleged to have violated the academic freedom of a member of the faculty or against the individual alleged to have abrogated his responsibilities to the University.

^{*}The Committee recommends that notwithstanding the provision of two-year terms, two members of the first committee, being those receiving the lowest votes, shall serve for only one year.

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, July 31, 1969, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: John G. Ketterer, Chairman, Frederick E. Jones, James W. Shocknessy, Don M. Hilliker, William C. Safford, John H. Dunlap, Jack G. Gibbs, Frederick R. Eckley and John W. Bricker.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Supplemental Action on the Budgets for the 1969-70 Fiscal Year

At the meeting of the Board of Trustees in June, a budget for the fiscal year 1969-70 was approved in the amount of \$188,063,338. To support this level of expenditure, revenues from State subsidies and increases in the present level of student tuition and fees will be required in the amount of \$58,858,100. Since the last Board meeting, the General Assembly through Senate Bill 297 has taken under consideration additional mandatory salary increases for all classified State employees. The increments currently under discussion will require additional revenue during the biennium to support such increases for the employees of this University.

While neither this act nor the appropriations act which will provide the subsidy for this current year have been enacted into law, it is essential that student fee and tuition levels for this current year be established at this time **so** that the registration process may begin without delaying the starting date of Autumn Quarter. Accordingly, contingent upon favorable action by the General Assembly on Amended Substitute House Bill 531 (the Education Appropriation Act) and Senate Bill 297 as presently amended (mandatory pay increase for State classified personnel), President Fawcett recommended that the following student fees and tuition be established for this University effective with the Autumn Quarter, 1969:

- 1. That the Instructional Fee (formerly known as the Instructional and General Fee) for The Ohio State University be increased \$25 per quarter for the main campus and \$5 per quarter for the University branches.
- 2. That the General Fee (formerly known as the Student Services Fee) for The Ohio State University be increased \$5 per quarter for the main campus and remain the same as it is now at the University branches.
- 3. That the Tuition Fee (out-of-state student surcharge) for The Ohio State University be increased \$150 per quarter for both the main campus and the University branches.
- 4. That the part-time students (those enrolled for six or less credit hours or enrolled for one term of a Summer Quarter) be assessed one-half of the full fees for both the main campus and the University branches.*

Upon motion of Mr. Eckley, seconded by Mr. Jones, the Board of Trustees approved the foregoing recommendation by unanimous roll call vote.

**Pursuant to action of the Board of Trustees on January 14, 1965, third- and fourth-year students enrolled in the Doctor of Medicine degree program of the College of Medicine are enrolled in a year-round program of courses and are assessed fees on an annual basis payable in two installments, June 15 and December 15. The annual rate for such resident students for the 1969-70 academic year shall be \$1,020.00 for resident students and \$2,070.00 for nonresident students.

Part-time students (those enrolled for six or less credit hours or enrolled for one term of a Summer Quarter), shall be assessed one-half of the full fees. When fees are not evenly divisible, they shall be assessed to the next even dollar amount.

All other fees previously approved by the Board of Trustees shall remain unchanged.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

B. Residence Hall Room and Board Rates

Pursuant to Section 8 of the Bond Resolution adopted April 8, 1957, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, the University and its Board of Trustees covenanted to adopt and maintain, so long as any of the bonds authorized by the Bond Resolution were outstanding such parietal rules, and charge and collect such rental rates and charges, from time to time, as may be necessary to assure such occupancy and use of, and receipts from the residence hall facilities as will pay the cost of maintenance and operation and provide for the payment of principal and interest on the bonds and other payment to special funds required by Section 9 of the Bond Resolution.

Because of the necessity to maintain salary levels for nonclassified personnel equivalent to salary levels for State employees in the classified service mandated by the 108th General Assembly, and because of the substantial increases in costs of materials, supplies, food and contract services, it is necessary to adjust the residence hall rates.

Accordingly, President Fawcett recommended that contingent upon passage of Senate Bill 297 at the currently proposed increased salary levels, effective Autumn Quarter, 1969, the schedule of rates for all residence halls included in the Bond Resolution referred to above be as follows:

For all students whose continuous residence is six quarters or less	\$335.00 per quarter
Beginning with the seventh quarter and continuing through the ninth quarter of continuous residence	\$325.00 per quarter
Beginning with the tenth quarter of continuous residence	\$316.00 per quarter
For students residing in the Stadium Scholarship Dormitory	\$155.00 per quarter
For students residing in the Jones Gradu- ate Tower	
For single room and meals	\$384.00 per quarter
For single room only	\$195.00 per quarter
For double room and meals	\$354.00 per quarter
For double room only	\$165.00 per quarter

B. Residence Hall Room and Board Rates (continued)

It was recommended further that the University administration be authorized to establish the official rates for those residence halls not included in the Bond Resolution and less than quarterly rates for residence halls in general conformity with the schedule of rates as established in the foregoing.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendations by unanimous roll call vote.

C. Adoption of an Official Shield for The Ohio State University Hospitals

The staff of the University Hospitals has incorporated into the "Constitution, Bylaws, Rules and Regulations of the Medical Staff of The Ohio State University Hospitals" a shield for the University Hospitals. Dr. Meiling advises that all the large teaching hospitals in this country and overseas utilize shields as emblems of tradition, prestige, culture and character of the organization. The shield of the University Hospitals will be used as a shoulder patch on the uniform coats of the staff members other than the physicians. The physicians will have on their coats, as they do now, the shield of the College of Medicine. The shield will be used also on the stationery.

President Fawcett recommended therefore that the Board of Trustees approve the proposed shield as submitted by the Dean of the College of Medicine and further that the original copy of such shield be filed with the official records of the University.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Dunlap, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendations by unanimous voice vote.

D. Distinguished Service Awards

Serving as a Committee on Distinguished Service Awards, the President's Cabinet has nominated for consideration by the Board of Trustees the following-named persons to receive the Distinguished Service Award at the August 29, 1969 Commencement. These awards are given in recognition of distinguished service to The Ohio State University and the awards are in accordance with action taken by the Board of Trustees in 1952.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Gibbs, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

E. Degrees and Certificates Conferred--Summer Quarter Commencement

President Fawcett recommended that degrees and certificates be conferred at the Summer Quarter Commencement Convocation on August 29, 1969, to those students who have completed the requirements for their respective degrees and certificates and are recommended by the Faculty Council. The names of those awarded degrees and certificates will be included in the minutes of this meeting. (See Appendix I, page 105.)

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

F. <u>Proposal for Revised Curriculum Leading to the Degree</u> of Bachelor of Science in Landscape Architecture

The Faculty Council on June 3, 1969, upon the recommendation of the Council on Academic Affairs, approved for transmittal to the Board of Trustees the recommendation that a revised curriculum leading to the degree, Bachelor of Science in Landscape Architecture, be approved, effective Autumn Quarter, 1969.

The proposal requested that the present five-year program in the School of Architecture be replaced with a four-year program leading to the degree, Bachelor of Science in Landscape Architecture.

As a result of intensive studies conducted by the Committee on Education of the American Society of Landscape Architects and by the National Conference on Instruction in Landscape Architecture, dynamic changes in the professional practice of landscape architecture are being reflected in new goals of collegiate education. The recommended pattern involves establishment of the Master of Landscape Architecture as the first professional degree. A two-year program of graduate study, preceded by a four-year program leading to the degree, Bachelor of Science in Landscape Architecture, has approximately the same relation to current professional demands as did the five-year undergraduate program only a few years ago.

President Fawcett recommended that the above proposal for revising the curriculum in the School of Architecture and the degree, Bachelor of Science in Landscape Architecture, be approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Dunlap, seconded by Mr. Bricker, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous voice vote.

G. Master of Science Degree Program in the School of Natural Resources

The Faculty Council on June 3, 1969, upon the recommendation of the Council on Academic Affairs, approved for transmittal to the Board of Trustees the recommendation that a Master of Science program in Natural Resources be offered through the School of Natural Resources, effective Autumn Quarter, 1969.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

G. <u>Master of Science Degree Program in the School of Natural Resources</u> (continued)

The basic objective of the program leading to the Master of Science degree will be to provide in-depth understanding of the relevant natural, social and management sciences in their application to solving real life natural resources problems and to the methods available to achieve optimum resource management in an integrated manner.

The program will be designed primarily for the student who has substantive undergraduate preparation in a natural resources field or in a discipline which underpins specialization in a natural resources field, or who has significant employment experience in a resource management field following undergraduate education.

President Fawcett recommended that the above proposal be approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. Dunlap, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

H. Establishment of the John W. Bricker Professorship in the College of Law

> Pursuant to the conditions set forth for the establishment of a "Named Professorship," as approved by the Board of Trustees at its January 14, 1965 meeting, President Fawcett recommended that the "John W. Bricker Professorship" be established at The Ohio State University.

A group of friends of John W. Bricker on the occasion of Mr. Bricker's 74th birthday, proposed that a "Named Professorship" be established to honor the former United States Senator and former Governor of Ohio. Senator Bricker received his B. A. degree in 1916 and his LL. B. degree in 1920 (changed to J. D. degree by Board action on March 9, 1967) from The Ohio State University. He has been the recipient of 13 honorary degrees including the LL. D. degree from Ohio State in 1939. He has served continuously on the Board of Trustees since 1948. A committee was formed to solicit funds for the endowment account which would provide income to secure the services of an outstanding scholar for a professorship in the College of Law.

To date \$110, 744.10 has been pledged for this professorship and \$82, 492.43 has been received through The Ohio State University Development Fund. As soon as \$125, 000.00 has been received in this endowment account, this professorship will be activated and a search will be inaugurated to secure a nationally known individual to fill this position.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote.

Mr. Bricker stated "I am deeply grateful. I'd rather have my name attached to this than anything I can think of."

II. PERSONNEL CHANGES

President Fawcett recommended that the following Resignations and Promotions and Realignment of Responsibilities be approved:

A. Resignations

President Fawcett said

Dr. John E. Corbally, Jr., Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost, will assume duties as President and Chancellor of Syracuse University on September 1, 1969.

Dr. Corbally has had an exemplary career at Ohio State, coming as an Assistant Professor of Education in 1955 and advancing to full Professor with service as Director of the Personnel Budget, Executive Assistant to the President, Vice President for Administration and Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost. He has served ably and well, and we wish him every success at Syracuse.

Ivan C. Rutledge will resign from the Deanship of the College of Law as soon as a successor is found. Dean Rutledge has asked to be relieved of his duties as Dean so that he can return to full-time teaching. He joined the faculty at Ohio State in 1963 and was appointed Dean in 1965.

B. Promotions and Realignment of Responsibilities

James A. Robinson now Mershon Professor, Department of Political Science, and Director, Mershon Center for Education in National Security, be promoted to Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost, effective September 1, 1969, at a salary of \$33,528.00 per annum. Dr. Robinson will continue as Director, Mershon Center for Education in National Security, at No Salary and will hold a Professorship in the Department of Political Science at No Salary.

The President recommended the following changes in line with an established policy to continually re-evaluate the administrative structure and to make such modifications as are required to effect efficiency in the management of the administrative concerns of the University:

Edward Q. Moulton now Executive Assistant to the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees be promoted to Vice President for Administrative Operations and Secretary of the Board of Trustees, effective September 1, 1969, at a combined salary of \$31,248.00 per annum. Dr. Moulton will continue to hold a Professorship in the Department of Civil Engineering at No Salary.

B. Promotions and Realignment of Responsibilities (continued)

Ronald W. Brady now Associate Provost and Director of University Budgets promoted to Executive Assistant to the President and Director of University Budgets, effective September 1, 1969, at a salary of \$28,488.00 per annum. Dr. Brady will hold a Professorship in the Division of Public Administration at No Salary.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Gibbs, the Board of Trustees by unanimous roll call vote approved the foregoing resignations; the appointment of the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost; the establishment of the position, Vice President for Administrative Operations, and the appointment to fill said position; and the promotion to fill the position of Executive Assistant to the President and Director of University Budgets.

C. Addition of Rules 11.09 and 11.1102 to Rules for the University Faculty

Pursuant to the foregoing recommendations for the realignment of duties of the Executive Assistant to the President and Director of University Budgets and the creation of the position of Vice President for Administrative Operations and Secretary of the Board of Trustees, President Fawcett recommended that the following additions be made to the <u>Rules</u> for the University Faculty:

11.09. Executive Assistant to the President and Director of University Budgets.*

Section 1. The Executive Assistant to the President and Director of University Budgets shall be a staff officer and member of the General Administration Division of the University.

Section 2. The major area of responsibility and authority of the Executive Assistant to the President and Director of University Budgets shall be for University budgets, administrative research, data processing and management and information studies and systems. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the Executive Assistant to the President and Director of University Budgets shall, under the direction of the President, be responsible and have the necessary authority for: preparing for submission to the President the annual and other University budgets to be made in consultation with the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost, the Vice President for Administrative Operations and such other Vice Presidents as appropriate; coordinating all administrative research including the development of official institutional studies and questionnaires; operating the University data processing division, and developing and implementing University management and information studies and systems.

Section 2. The major area of responsibility and authority of the Vice President for Administrative Operations and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall be that of general administration of University operations. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the Vice President for Administrative Operations shall, under the direction of the President and with the approval of the Board of Trustees, be responsible and have the necessary authority for: coordinating the general administration of the University (all nonacademic functions); executing University staff functions; coordinating of and serving as Secretary to the President's Cabinet and the Administrative Council; developing and implementing campus planning, and service as Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Section 3. The Director of Campus Planning shall be an administrative officer within the Office of the Vice President for Administrative Operations and Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

C. <u>Authorization to Execute an Agreement Between The Ohio State University</u> and the <u>Technical Institute District in Ashland-Crawford-Richland Counties</u>

VL PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS

At the request of the Vice President for Business and Finance, President Fawcett recommended that the plans and specifications, bills of materials and estimates of cost for the following projects be approved by the Board of Trustees:

A. Mansfield Technical Building

This building will provide laboratories, storage facilities and offices for the technical education program at Mansfield leading to the Associate Degree.

Funds for this project have been provided from Item 060, H. B. 886; Item 033, H. B. 828; and an allocation from the appropriation to the Ohio Board of Regents in Am. Sub. H. B. 531.

B. Lima Technical Building

This building will be constructed at the Lima Branch Campus and will provide laboratories, storage facilities, and offices for the technical education program leading to the Associate Degree.

Funds for this project have been provided from Item 063, H. B. 886; Item 033, H. B. 828; an allocation from the appropriation to the Ohio Board of Regents in Am. Sub. H. B. 531; and a Federal Grant (Title I).

C. Roof Repairs for 1969

This project provides repairs and maintenance to the roofs of the Laundry (old) and Garage; Lord Hall; Research Center (Boiler House); and Welding Engineering.

Funds for this project have been provided from Budget Account 124358 (Contract Repair).

D. Lighting Improvements - 1969

This project will provide improved lighting for areas on Neil Avenue, the Oval, 18th Avenue and College Road.

Funds for this project have been provided from Budget Account 124358 (Contract Repair).

E. University Hospital - Improvements to 6th Floor and 7 East Nursing Station

This project provides walltex installation, painting, floor repair and minor electrical and mechanical work as required.

Funds for this project have been provided from Budget Account 960200 (University Hospital Rotary).

VI. PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS (continued)

F. Primary Electrical Line Relocation

As a result of the construction of the Olentangy Freeway, it is necessary to relocate electrical connections. This work will be accomplished in three phases: (1) Installation of underground ducts and manholes approximately 1,600 ft. along Cannon Drive from the existing McCracken feeder line south to the proposed sub-station site; (2) Purchase of power cables; and (3) Installation and wiring of the above power cables.

Funds for this project have been provided from Budget Account 124358 (Contract Repair).

G. Systems Engineering - Area 480 Computer Facility

This project provides conversion of the present fourth-floor classroom space to additional computer facilities for installation of IBM 360-50, 1460, and 7094 systems and seven associated offices.

Funds for this project have been provided by a transfer from Budget Account 149993 (Plant Funds Reserve) to Budget Account 801172 (Systems Engineering Remodeling).

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Eckley, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote, and the Secretary was authorized and directed to sign the plans and specifications for the above projects for and on behalf of the Board of Trustees. C. Control of Dogs, Other Domestic Animals, or Fowl

WHEREAS, The Ohio State University has no rules at the present time to prohibit dogs from being permitted to run at large on the University campus;

IT WAS RECOMMENDED THEREFORE that a new section of the University Rules be adopted to read as follows:

No person, being the owner or keeper, or harboring or having charge of any dog, other domestic animal, or fowl, shall permit the same to run at large upon the grounds of The Ohio State University. Any dog, other domestic animal, or fowl, brought onto the grounds of The Ohio State University must, by the owner, keeper, or person having charge of such dog, other domestic animal, or fowl, keep same restrained or confined through the use of a leash at all times while on the said grounds of the University.

Any dog, domestic animal, or fowl, found to be in violation of this rule and regulation may be taken into custody by University authorities and said animal, or fowl, will be held and turned over to the Humane Society for their disposition.

Any suspected rabid animal shall be held in isolation under observation by a person and in a place suitable to University officials for a period of at least ten days in order to determine the definite development of rabid symptoms or for such further period as an examining veterinarian may deem necessary.

X. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of Charles A. Dice, Professor Emeritus in the College of Administrative Science - Finance and Banking, and Melville L. Wolfrom, Regents Professor in the Department of Chemistry. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

A. Charles A. Dice

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on May 27, 1969, of Dr. Charles A. Dice, Professor Emeritus in the College of Administrative Science - Finance and Banking.

Dr. Dice was born in Strasburg, Ohio, on November 5, 1878. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Ohio Northern University in 1905, and his Bachelor of Divinity degree from Drew Theological Seminary in 1908. He earned his Master of Arts degree from Harvard University in 1911, and his Doctor of Philosophy degree from the University of Wisconsin in 1925.

Professor Dice was in charge of a statistical section in the Shipping Board in Washington, D. C., in 1918, and in 1920 he was employed in the Foreign Exchange Department of the Chase National Bank in New York City. He was a Professor at Ohio Northern University from 1911 to 1913, Professor at Rockford College, 1916-1917, and Assistant Professor at Colorado College, 1917-1919. He came to The Ohio State University in 1919 as Assistant Professor of Money and Banking in the former Department of Business Organization and the Department of Economics and was promoted to Professor in 1926. He retired in 1949 after 29 years with The Ohio State University. He was awarded an honorary Doctor of Laws degree by The Ohio State University in 1957.

In 1932 he was appointed to the advisory Board of the Ohio National Bank, Columbus, Ohio, and served on the Board for many years until it was dissolved.

A. Charles A. Dice (continued)

Dr. Dice, in 1952, established the Anna M. Dice Memorial Fellowship for Graduate Students, in honor of his late wife. In 1966 a group of Dr. Dice's former students, associates and friends established the Charles A. Dice Fund, designated for the advancement of knowledge and encouragement of careers in economics, business and banking.

Professor Dice held memberships in the American Economics Association and the Faculty Club; Beta Gamma Sigma and Phi Alpha Kappa, honorary fraternities; Alpha Kappa Psi, professional fraternity; and Tau Kappa Epsilon, social fraternity.

Dr. Dice gained national and international recognition with the publication in 1926 of his book <u>The Stock Market</u>. Dr. Dice was one of the best teachers, and perhaps the best loved professor, in the College of Commerce and Administration (now the College of Administrative Science). He is listed in <u>Who's Who in America</u>.

On behalf of the University at large, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

B. Melville L. Wolfrom

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on June 20, 1969, of Melville Lawrence Wolfrom, Regents Professor in the Department of Chemistry.

Melville Wolfrom was born in Bellevue, Ohio, on April 2, 1900. He received his A.B. degree (cum laude) with a major in chemistry from The Ohio State University in 1924, and the M. Sc. and Ph. D. degrees in organic chemistry from Northwestern University in 1925 and 1927, respectively. He was a National Research Council Fellow in Chemistry from 1927 to 1929 with C. S. Hudson (National Bureau of Standards, Washington, D. C.), P. A. Levene (The Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research, New York, N. Y.) and W. L. Evans (Department of Chemistry, The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio). He was a Fellow of the John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation in 1939 with P. Karrer at the University of Zurich, Switzerland. He joined the faculty of The Ohio State University in 1929 as an Instructor in the Department of Chemistry and became an Assistant Professor in 1930. In 1936 he was promoted to Associate Professor and became Professor in 1940. He served as Head of the Division of Organic Chemistry in the Department of Chemistry from 1948 to 1960 when he was named Research Professor. In 1965 he was made Regents Professor. During his tenure at The Ohio State University Professor Wolfrom taught organic chemistry at all levels and supervised the research of nearly one hundred Ph.D. students, together with numerous postdoctoral associates and M.S. students.

B. Melville L. Wolfrom (continued)

Professor Wolfrom was internationally recognized as an outstanding leader in carbohydrate chemistry. He was active in many professional associations. As a member of the American Chemical Society, he served as Chairman of the Cellulose Division in 1940 and the Sugar Division in 1948. He also served as Chairman of the Columbus Section in 1940. He was a Member (or Fellow) of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, Chemical Society (London), American Society of Biological Chemists, American Academy of Arts and Sciences, Phi Beta Kappa, Sigma Xi, Phi Lambda Upsilon, Pi Mu Epsilon, Alpha Chi Sigma and was listed in Who's Who in America. He was elected to the National Academy of Sciences in 1950.

Professor Wolfrom has authored more than 500 published articles describing research on the organic chemistry of carbohydrates and other natural products. His work on carbohydrates provided a wide range of basic developments in the field, and other aspects of his research are related to problems in medicine, the food industry and the textile industry. He was editor of the annual series of specialist reviews Advances in Carbohydrate Chemistry since its inception in 1944. He was also Section Editor of the Carbohydrate section in Chemical Abstracts. As chairman of the Carbohydrate Nomenclature Committee of the American Chemical Society and member of an international committee on carbohydrate nomenclature, he coordinated the development of the systematic terminology now in use for the carbohydrates. In 1952 he received the Honor Award of the Division of Carbohydrate Chemistry of the American Chemical Society. He was honored by the Austrian Government for work in connection with the 1958 International Congress of Biochemistry held in Vienna. In 1967 he received the Austin Patterson Award for his work in chemical documentation and later that year he received the Kenneth A. Spencer Award for his contributions to agricultural chemistry.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees hereby approves the Fifth Supplemental Trust Agreement (as presented to this meeting and marked Supplement A) in all respects and the officers designated in the Series J Bond Resolution are hereby authorized to execute and deliver said Fifth Supplemental Trust Agreement, in substantially the form presented, to The Ohio National Bank of Columbus, as Trustee, at such time as they may deem appropriate.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the certificates of the President and Vice President, Business and Finance, of the University, attached hereto and marked respectively Supplement B (page 97) and Supplement C (page 101) Supplement B setting forth the earnings coverage pursuant to Section 6(b) of the Original Bond Resolution, and Supplement C certifying as to there being no default under the Original Trust Agreement and Certain Facts pursuant to Section 2.03(4) of the Trust Agreement, be and the same are hereby approved.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees hereby confirms the applicability of the provisions of the resolutions adopted by the Board on September 1, 1958 and June 11, 1960 relating to the parietal rules governing the use and occupancy of the University dormitory facilities to all Dormitory Facilities.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees hereby confirms the applicability of the provisions of the resolution heretofore adopted by the Board of Trustees on July 31, 1969 pertaining to the rates and charges for the dormitory and dining facilities of the University to all Dormitory Facilities.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees and the University hereby establish such special bank accounts as may be required by the Fifth Supplemental Trust Agreement or the Original Trust Agreement, or the Loan Agreement with the United States of America Contract No. H(402)3007, dated January 1, 1968 and authorized signatures for withdrawals from such accounts shall be the same as the authorized signatures with respect to bank accounts in which there are deposited pursuant to said Original Trust Agreement and the Executive Officer or Fiscal

Officer, or any one of them, are authorized to arrange for such accounts at such banks as the officer acting may determine and the Secretary of this Board is authorized to include in the minutes as hereby adopted any standard form of bank resolution required in connection with effecting the foregoing.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Executive Officer or Fiscal Officer of the University, or any one of them, are authorized and directed to do all things necessary for the sale of the Series J Bonds, subject, however, to all applicable provisions of the Series J Bond Resolution and the Loan Agreement with the United States of America.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that in addition to other terms herein defined, the term "Executive Officer" shall mean the Chairman of the Board of Trustees or the President of the University; and "Fiscal Officer" shall mean the Vice President, Business and Finance, or the Assistant Treasurer of the University; the terms "Original Bond Resolution," "Dormitory Facilities," "Trust Agreement," and "Project" shall have the same meanings as are given to them in the Series J Bond Resolution.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the adoption of the Series J Bond Resolution and approval of the Fifth Supplemental Trust Agreement on September 12, 1968, be and the same are hereby repealed and rescinded, the same having been superseded by the aforesaid adoption of the Series J Bond Resolution and approval of the Fifth Supplemental Trust Agreement by the aforesaid act this day.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

FIFTH SUPPLEMENTAL TRUST AGREEMENT

THIS FIFTH SUPPLEMENTAL TRUST AGREEMENT, dated as of the 15th day of April, 1968 (herein called the "Supplement"), by and between The Ohio State University and its Board of Trustees (herein called the "University"), a state university of Ohio, and The Ohio National Bank of Columbus, Columbus, Ohio (herein called the "Trustee"), a corporation duly organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the United States, as Trustee under the Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 hereinafter mentioned.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the University, pursuant to the Original Bond Resolution passed April 8, 1957, entered into a Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 with the Trustee and as of April 15, 1958, October 15, 1959, April 15, 1961, April 15, 1963, and August 1, 1967, respectively entered into First, Second, Third and Fourth Supplemental Trust Agreements (which original Trust Agreement, as so supplemented thereby and hereby is herein called the "Trust Agreement") under which \$31,560,000 Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H and I Dormitory Revenue Bonds have been authorized and have been or are to be issued and under which additional bonds (herein called "Additional Bonds") are issuable on a parity with the said Bonds and other Additional Bonds hereafter issued under certain conditions as provided in the Trust Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the University has in all respects complied with the provisions of the Trust Agreement so as to be entitled to execute and to have authenticated and delivered by the Trustee \$3,000,000 Additional Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the University further desires by this Supplement to provide for the issuance under the Trust Agreement of said \$3,000,000 of Additional Bonds (herein called the Series J Bonds); and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the University has duly adopted on July 31, 1969 the Series J Bond Resolution providing for the Series J Bonds and this Supplement, which resolution collectively with the Original Bond Resolution, the Series C and D Bond Resolutions adopted July 8, 1960, the Series E, F, G, and H Bond Resolution adopted June 15, 1962, and the Series I Bond Resolution adopted July 13, 1967 is referred to as the Bond Resolution; and

WHEREAS, the Series J Bond Resolution is as follows:

RESOLUTION

Providing for the issuance of \$3,000,000 The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Bonds, Series J, as Additional Parity Bonds pursuant to Bond Resolution adopted April 8, 1957 and Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957, for the purpose of constructing and equipping Jones Tower.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University (herein called the Board) is vested with the government of The Ohio State University (herein called the University or, when the context admits, collectively with the Board called the University) by Section 3335.03 of said Revised Code, and as such Board, of suing and being sued, contracting and being contracted with, and of making and using a common seal and, under Section 3335.10 of said Revised Code, has general supervision of all land, buildings and other property of the University and control of all expenses therefor; and

WHEREAS, by authority of Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, the Board is authorized to construct, equip, maintain and operate upon sites within, or in close proximity to, the campus of the University, buildings to be used as dormitories and as other suitable living quarters, or as dining halls, for students and members of the faculty and servants and wives and families of married students

of said University (including all separate or connected buildings, sites, equipment, structures and utilities to be used in connection with the maintenance or operation of, or in any way supplementing or related to the services of facilities to be provided by such buildings) and to pay for the same out of funds in its possession derived from operation of any such buildings under its control or out of funds borrowed therefor and to borrow funds for such purpose upon such terms as said Board may deem proper and issue notes or other written instruments evidencing such indebtedness provided that such indebtedness shall not be a claim against or lien upon any property of the State or any property of or under the control of said Board excepting such parts of the receipts of the operation of any such buildings under control of the Board as it may pledge to secure the payment of such indebtedness and by authority of said Section 3345.07 the Board is also authorized to issue such notes or other obligations payable as aforesaid in order to retire or refund outstanding notes or other obligations matured or unmatured, to repay moneys previously borrowed or advanced under said section or to reimburse funds of the University for amounts used under said Section 3345.07: and

WHEREAS, the University determined by resolution adopted April 8, 1957 (herein called the Original Bond Resolution and collectively with this resolution, the Series C and D Bond Resolution adopted July 8, 1960, the Series E, F, G and H Bond Resolution adopted June 15, 1962 and the Series I Bond Resolution adopted July 13, 1967, called the Bond Resolution) to provide for the issuance of Dormitory Revenue Bonds and pursuant to the Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 with The Ohio National Bank of Columbus (herein, with the First, Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Supplements, called the Trust Agreement), to pledge the net income of all the dormitory facilities, including married student housing and dining halls, now or hereafter under control of the University pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 3345.07, and to provide in said Trust Agreement for the issuance of such Bonds

(herein called the Bonds) as from time to time authorized subject to the conditions contained in said Trust Agreement, and by the Original Bond Resolution and the Trust Agreement provided for the sale of an initial issue of \$12,000,000 consisting of \$6,000,000 Series A Bonds and \$6,000,000 Series B Bonds (herein called the Series A and Series B Bonds) and for the issuance from time to time as authorized by the Board of additional bonds (herein called Additional Bonds) on a parity with said initial issue of which \$2,330,000 Series C Bonds, \$2,030,000 Series D Bonds, \$5,300,000 Series E Bonds, \$1,200,000 Series F Bonds, \$1,350,000 Series G Bonds, \$2,850,000 Series H Bonds and \$10,500,000 Series I Bonds have been authorized and issued and the unmatured portions of such Series A through I Bonds are presently outstanding; and

WHEREAS, the University has not pledged or encumbered the revenues from its dormitory facilities on a basis equal or prior to the pledges under the Trust Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the University has determined to sell an issue of \$3,000,000 Additional Bonds as Series J Bonds (herein called the Series J Bonds) all as provided in the Trust Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Board by the adoption of this resolution has determined and confirmed that it is necessary to provide additional dormitory accommodations and dining facilities located on or in close proximity to the campus of the University and, accordingly, hereby declares and determines that it is immediately necessary to construct and equip additional dormitory facilities to be known as Jones Tower (said dormitory building and all things incidental thereto being herein referred to as the Project); and

WHEREAS, said Project is to be constructed pursuant to plans prepared by the University Architect and approved by the Department of Public Works of Ohio and the Department of Housing and Urban Development of the United States of America (herein called the Government); and

WHEREAS, based upon final construction and other costs, the University has determined the costs of the Project to be \$4,000,000, including capitalized interest, miscellaneous expense and contingencies; and

WHEREAS, the University has heretofore by the Series I Bond Resolution adopted July 13, 1967, allocated \$610,000 of the proceeds of the sale of the Series I Bonds to the Series J Construction Fund hereinafter provided for to be held for paying costs of the Project and the University has \$390,000 of funds otherwise available for such purpose which this Board has heretofore authorized and directed be deposited in said Series J Construction Fund to be held and used for paying costs of the Project; and

WHEREAS, the University has determined to borrow the balance of the funds to pay the foregoing costs, and to advertise for bids, subject to the terms of the loan agreement (numbered Contract No. H (402) 3007) dated as of January 1, 1968 covering Project No. CH-Ohio-216 (D) (herein with any amendments thereto called the Loan Agreement) with the Government under which the Government agrees, subject to the terms of the Loan Agreement, to purchase the \$3,000,000 Dormitory Revenue Bonds, Series J.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University:

Section 1. <u>Purpose of Series J Bonds</u>. It is hereby determined to be necessary to construct the Project and to issue \$3,000,000 of Dormitory Revenue Bonds of the University pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio and the Trust Agreement for the purpose of paying part of the cost of the Project and of all things incidental thereto or incidental to the financing thereof, including repayment of moneys previously borrowed or advanced for the Project or restoring amounts used for the Project from other funds of the University available for such purposes, excepting, however, the sum of \$610,000 allocated from the proceeds of the Series I Bonds and the \$390,000 of other

funds otherwise available for such purpose deposited to the Series J Construction Fund under this Resolution.

Section 2. Terms of Series J Bonds. Said \$3,000,000 of Dormitory Revenue Bonds Series J shall be issued under this Resolution, the Original Bond Resolution, and the Trust Agreement, and shall be entitled "The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Bonds," The Series J Bonds shall be initially issued in coupon or fully registered form as may be requested by the Original Purchaser and shall be exchangeable for fully registered or coupon bonds in the manner and on the terms provided by the Trust Agreement. Series J Bonds in coupon form shall be dated as of April 15, 1968, and shall be issued as negotiable coupon bonds, registrable as to principal in the denomination of \$5,000 or as single maturity fully registered bonds without coupons in denominations of \$5,000 or any multiples thereof, as requested by the Original Purchaser or Purchasers of such Bond or Bonds; provided, however, that until such time as the Original Purchaser or Purchasers request(s) the preparation of definitive bonds, a single multiple maturity, fully registered bond or bonds without coupons shall be issued in an amount equal to the bonds contracted for by said Purchaser or Purchasers and thereafter at the request of the holder(s) thereof the University will, at its expense and within ninety days from such request, issue to him in exchange therefor definitive bonds, as aforesaid, in aggregate principal amount equal to the unpaid principal of such single bond. The Series J Bonds in fully registered form without coupons shall be dated as of the interest payment date on which they are authenticated or the interest payment date next preceding the date of authentication, subject, however, to the terms of the Loan Agreement. The Series J Bonds in coupon form shall be numbered J 1 to J 600, inclusive, in order of maturity, and fully registered Bonds without coupons shall be numbered as determined by the Fiscal Officer, shall bear interest from their date or from the last interest payment date preceding the date of issuance, payable semiannually on April fifteenth and October fifteenth of each year, beginning with October

15, 1968, until the principal sum is paid, at the rate or rates per annum stipulated in the bid or bids of the successful bidders and approved in writing by the President or Fiscal Officer of the University, (or in the case of Bonds purchased by the Government pursuant to the Loan Agreement, at the rate specified in the Loan Agreement) provided that no such rate shall exceed 6% per annum. The Series J Bonds shall mature annually on October fifteenth in the years and amounts per year as follows:

The Series J Bonds maturing on and after October 15, 1979 shall be subject to redemption in whole or in part in inverse order of maturity, prior to the stated maturity thereof at the option of the University on any interest payment date on and after April 15, 1979, at redemption prices equal to the following percentages of the principal amount redeemed, plus accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption, to wit:

% if redeemed April 15, 1979 through October 15, 1983, inc.
2-1/2% if redeemed April 15, 1984 through October 15, 1988, inc.
% if redeemed April 15, 1989 through October 15, 1993, inc.
1-1/2% if redeemed April 15, 1994 through October 15, 1998, inc.
% if redeemed April 15, 1999 through October 15, 2003, inc.
% if redeemed April 15, 2004 or thereafter

If some but less than all of one maturity are to be called, the selection of coupon bonds or portions of fully registered bonds of that maturity to be called shall be chosen by lot conducted by the Trustee under the Trust Agreement. If single multiple maturity fully registered bond or bonds is or are issued for the Series J Bonds, the annual principal payments with respect thereto may be prepaid in the above manner, and, if the Government is the holder, the University may, at its option, prepay from funds available therefor, on any interest payment date, the entire unpaid principal amount of the Series J Bonds or from time to time, in the inverse chronological order of the aforesaid

installments, a lesser proportion thereof in multiples of \$5,000. Call for redemption shall be made by notice specifying the numbers, and portions of registered bonds, of the Series J Bonds to be called, published by the Trustee on behalf of the University once a week for two consecutive weeks in a financial newspaper of national circulation, published in the English language in New York City and in an English language newspaper of general circulation in Columbus, Ohio, the first publication to be not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of redemption. Any bonds thus called for redemption and for the retirement of which funds are deposited with said Trustee as provided in the Trust Agreement on or before the redemption date shall cease to bear interest on said redemption date. If the Series J Bonds are all registered, or are issued as a single multiple maturity fully registered bond or bonds, published notice of redemption shall not be required, but notice by registered or certified mail shall be given not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of redemption to the registered owner or owners at the address(es) appearing on the Bond Registry. Except in the case of redemption of Bonds held by the Government from the Construction Fund as provided in Section 4 of this Resolution, or in a corresponding provision of a resolution authorizing Additional Bonds, no Bonds of any series may be called unless the same proportion of the outstanding Bonds of each other series, then callable, are called. A registered bond shall have prepayment provisions consistent with the redemption rights relating to coupon bonds which it replaces.

Subject to the terms of the Loan Agreement, the principal and interest of the Series J Bonds shall be payable in any coin or currency which, on the respective dates of payment, is legal tender for the payment of debts due the United States of America, at the principal office of the Trustee under the Trust Agreement (presently, The Ohio National Bank of Columbus, Columbus, Ohio), or, at the option of the holder, at the principal corporate trust office of the United States Trust Company of New York, in the Borough of Manhattan, City and State of New York except that interest on fully

registered bonds is payable by check as provided in the Trust Agreement, and principal on fully Registered Bonds may also be payable at such additional place or places, at the option of the holder as shall be designated by the Fiscal Officer of the University; provided, however, that payment of principal and interest on a single multiple maturity fully registered bond without coupons may at the request of the registered owner be made on each principal and interest payment date by draft or check mailed to such registered owner, or, if the Government is the registered owner, to the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond, Richmond, Virginia, or to such other place as may be designated by the Government.

The Series J Bonds shall have such other terms and conditions and shall be issued, executed and delivered as provided by the applicable provisions of the Trust Agreement, and of or pursuant to the Loan Agreement.

Section 3. <u>Sale of Series J Bonds</u>. The \$3,000,000 Series J Bonds shall be advertised for sale, awarded and delivered by the President or the Fiscal Officer of the University pursuant to the provisions of the Loan Agreement, and said officers and each of them are authorized to take any and all actions necessary of the Government.

Section 4. <u>Allocation of Proceeds of Series J Bonds</u>. Upon the issuance and delivery of the Series J Bonds, the proceeds from the sale of said Bonds shall be forthwith deposited and applied by the University as follows:

> (1) The portion representing accrued interest to the Debt Service Fund provided for in the Original Trust Agreement to be held by the Trustee, and the portion representing premium above par paid to the University for such Bonds to the Debt Service Reserve Funds.

(2) To the University, the amounts necessary to reimburse the University for amounts in excess of \$1,000,000 expended by it on costs of construction of the Project prior to issuance of the Series J Bonds. (Said \$1,000,000 consisting of the \$610,000 of the proceeds of the Series I Bonds allocated to the Construction Fund under the Series I Bond Resolution and the \$390,000 of funds otherwise available for such purpose and deposited by the University in the Construction Fund).

(3) The balance to the Series J Construction Fund (hereinbefore and hereinafter called the "Construction Fund") to be held by the Trustee to pay costs of construction of the Project and to pay all incidental expenses of the Project and the financing thereof, including repayment (with interest) of money borrowed by the University for such purposes in accordance with the Loan Agreement.

(4) Any balance remaining in the Construction Fund after payment, or retention of funds sufficient to pay, costs and other amounts provided for in (3) above, shall be promptly applied to the extent possible for the retirement at par plus accrued interest in inverse order of maturity of Series J Bonds, if any, then held by the Government, and any portion not needed for such retirement shall be transferred to the Debt Service Reserve Fund.

No part of the proceeds of Series J Bonds sold to the Government shall be used to pay costs (including cost of movable equipment or fees of a financial advisor) which, under the Loan Agreement or under the rules, regulations or practices of the Department of Housing and Urban Development, may not be paid from proceeds of Bonds purchased by the Government through that agency, and proceeds of Bonds purchased by the Government as aforesaid shall be segregated in the Construction Fund to the extent necessary to effect the foregoing and none of the funds in the Construction Fund shall be applied in any manner contrary to the Loan Agreement.

The Trustee shall apply said Construction Fund to the payment of such items as from time to time are requested in writing by the Fiscal Officer of the University. Such written request shall include a certificate by such official that the amount to be paid from such Construction Fund constitutes authorized payments from said fund under the foregoing provisions of this Section 4. If the payment is to be made with respect to an obligation under a construction contract relating to the Project, such written request shall certify that such payment was certified as due under such contract by a qualified architect or engineer.

To the extent the moneys in the Construction Fund exceed the estimated disbursements needed to pay the costs of the Project for the next ninety (90) days the Construction Fund shall be deposited by the Trustee in banks that are members

of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, or invested by the Trustee in such direct obligations of, or obligations the principal of and interest on which are guaranteed by, the United States which shall not mature later than eighteen (18) months after the date of such investment and which shall be subject to redemption at any time, in either event as shall be directed in writing by the President or the Fiscal Officer of the University, which writing shall designate maturities and amounts which, as nearly as practicable, would, through maturities, provide funds when needed to pay costs for which the fund has been established. Such investments and the proceeds of sale thereof shall constitute part of the fund from which the investment was made. Interest on such investments may be paid to the Dormitory Revenue Fund or applied to the purposes of the fund from which the said investments shall be sold, exchanged or collected from time to time as directed in writing by the President or the Fiscal Officer of the University and the Trustee shall be under no liability in connection with such investment, sale, exchange or collection thereof provided the directions of said officers are followed. No direction shall be made to invest the Construction Fund except as permitted by the Loan Agreement.

Section 5. <u>Additional Bonds</u>. (a) The Board shall have the right from time to time to issue Additional Bonds under the Trust Agreement if necessary to pay the costs of completing the Project or completing any projects for which Additional Bonds are issued. The Trustee shall authenticate and deliver such Bonds upon (but only upon) receipt of the documents required by Section 2.03 of the Trust Agreement. Nothing herein or in the Trust Agreement shall require any earnings coverage, or certificate with respect thereto, in connection with Additional Bonds issued for completion of a project.

(b) The Board shall also have the right from time to time to issue Additional Bonds under the Trust Agreement to provide funds for purposes authorized by Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, including construction and equipment by the

University of buildings to be used as dormitories or as other living quarters or the refunding of outstanding bonds or notes issued under said Section 3345.07. The Trustee shall authenticate and deliver under the Trust Agreement Additional Bonds issued under this subdivision (b) if, (but only if), when such additional Bonds are issued, the University shall have furnished to the Trustee in addition to the documents required by Section 2.03 of the Trust Agreement, a certificate of the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University, approved by the Board of Trustees, (1) showing that (a) the actual net income from the dormitory facilities of the University (excluding net income from any dormitory facility which is to be abandoned or which is not suitable for continuous use as a dormitory facility for the term of such Additional Bonds) for the preceding fiscal year, as adjusted, if necessary, to reflect the schedule of rates and charges to become effective at the beginning of the next semester, quarter or other school period and to give recognition to any anticipated changes in operating costs; plus (b) the estimated annual net income of the dormitory facilities to be financed through the proceeds of the sale of such Additional Bonds will be equal to or greater than one and three-tenths (1, 3) times the maximum amount to become due in any succeeding fiscal year for the payment of principal and interest charges on the Bonds then outstanding hereunder and on the Bonds then to be authenticated and delivered; (2) showing that, until the dormitory facility being constructed from the proceeds of the Additional Bonds, is ready for occupancy, funds then available from net income, bond proceeds, gifts, legacies, devises or grants or other sources for payment when due of principal and interest on the Bonds will be at least one and three-tenths (1,3) times the principal and interest requirements for that period; (3) showing that there were not included in net income any receipts against which there is any prior claim other than the use thereof for the operating expenses included in computing the net income; (4) furnishing such other information in support of the foregoing as may reasonably be requested by the Trustee; (5) showing that the computations of estimates

provided for above are based on an assumed occupancy of not more than 95% of capacity of the dormitory facilities in question.

The first call date on Additional Bonds shall not be earlier than the first call date on any issue of Bonds outstanding at the time of issue of such Additional Bonds.

Section 6. Terms of the Bonds Generally. As used in this Resolution, the term "Bonds" refers to the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I and J Bonds and all Additional Bonds issued on a parity therewith under the Trust Agreement. The Bonds shall be designated The Ohio State University Dormitory Revenue Bonds, shall be payable in any coin or currency which, on the respective dates of payment, is legal tender for the payment of debts due the United States of America, shall have all the incidents of negotiable instruments under the laws of Ohio, shall express upon their face the purpose for which they are issued, and shall be issued pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio. Unless otherwise provided by the Board, the Bonds shall be signed by the Chairman of the Board or bear his facsimile signature, shall be signed by the President of the University or bear his facsimile signature, shall be attested by the Secretary of the Board or by the Vice President, Business and Finance of the University, and may be sealed with the seal of the University or a facsimile thereof, and interest coupons attached to the Bonds shall bear the facsimile signature of the Secretary of the Board or of the Vice President, Business and Finance of the University. In case any officer whose signature or a facsimile of whose signature shall appear on any Bonds or coupons shall cease to be such officer before the delivery of such Bonds, such signature or such facsimile shall nevertheless be valid and sufficient for all purposes, the same as if he had remained in office until such delivery. Except in the case of redemption of Bonds of a particular series from the surplus proceeds of that issue as provided in Section 5 of the Original Bond Resolution, no Bonds, of any series may be called unless the same proportion of the

outstanding Bonds of each other series, then callable, are called at the same time. The additional Bonds shall bear such designations as may be necessary to distinguish them from other Bonds having different provisions and shall have maturities, interest rates, interest payment dates, redemption provisions, denominations, registration provisions, and other provisions as provided in the Resolution providing for issuance of the Additional Bonds, provided, however, that such terms and provisions shall not be inconsistent with this Resolution, the Trust Agreement and in the Bonds, the Bonds shall be equally and ratably payable from and secured by pledge of, the receipts from the operation of all dormitory facilities now or hereafter under control of the Board including the dining facilities constituting a part thereof, after provision for reasonable and proper expenses of operation and maintenance of such facilities; and anything in this Resolution, the Bonds or the Trust Agreement to the contrary notwithstanding, neither this Resolution, the Bonds, nor the Trust Agreement shall be a claim against or a lien upon any property of the State of Ohio or any property of or under the control of the Board except the portion of said receipts pledged as provided herein; provided, however, that nothing herein shall be deemed to prohibit the University, of its own volition, from using, or pledging, to the extent it is lawfully authorized to do so, any of its other resources or revenues for the fulfillment of any of the terms, conditions or obligations of the Trust Agreement, this Resolution, or any of the bonds.

Section 7. <u>Covenants of the University</u>. The University covenants with the holders of the Bonds and with the Trustee under the Trust Agreement that (a) it will adopt and maintain so long as any of the Bonds are outstanding such parietal rules, and charge and collect such rental rates and charges, from time to time, as may be necessary to assure such occupancy and use of, and receipts from, the dormitory facilities as will pay the costs of maintenance and operation and provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds and other payments to Special

Funds required by Section 8 of this Resolution; (b) from funds lawfully available, it will cause the Project and any project to be constructed from the proceeds of Additional Bonds to be completed and equipped in an efficient and economical manner with reasonable dispatch and in a manner consistent with the plans and recommendations of responsible architects and all applicable laws, ordinances and regulations; (c) subject to the right of abandonment under conditions provided in the Trust Agreement designed to prevent adverse effect of such abandonment on the expected earnings coverage of Debt Service, it will, from the dormitory receipts pledged under this resolution and as part of the operating expenses, maintain, preserve and keep the dormitory facilities in good repair, working order and operating condition and continuously operate the same on a revenue producing basis, and will apply the receipts therefrom only as provided in Section 8 of this Resolution and in the Trust Agreement; (d) it will furnish to the Trustee and the Original Purchasers of the Bonds within 120 days after the close of each fiscal year an annual report of the accounts (including each Special Fund provided for in Section 8 of this Resolution) and operations of the dormitory facilities prepared by qualified accountants approved by the Trustee; (c) it will keep proper books of record and accounts separate from all other records and accounts, in which complete and correct entries will be made of all transactions relating to the dormitory facilities and will at all reasonable times permit the Trustee, the Original Purchasers or any holder or holders of 25% of the outstanding Bonds, or their authorized representatives, to inspect the dormitory facilities and any books, documents and vouchers relating thereto; (f) it will furnish heat, light, power, water and other necessary services to the dormitory facilities at not in excess of reasonable cost; (g) it will comply with all the terms and conditions of the respective Loan Agreements with the Department of Housing and Urban Development as long as the United States holds any of the Series B, D, F, G, H and J Bonds; (h) it will insure the dormitory facilities as required by the Trust Agreement and apply the proceeds of

such insurance as provided therein; and (i) will observe and perform all its agreements and obligations provided for by the Bonds, the Trust Agreement or the Bond Resolution.

Section 8. <u>Application of Receipts; Special Funds</u>. There was established by the Original Bond Resolution a Special Fund designated "Dormitory Revenue Fund," which fund shall be maintained in a bank account, or invested as herein authorized, in the name of the University separate and distinct from all other funds of the University and subject to the withdrawals and uses herein authorized, is pledged to and charged with the payment of the principal, interest, and premium, if any, on all the Bonds issued under the Trust Agreement.

Under the Original Bond Resolution there shall be maintained in the Dormitory Revenue Fund, as an Operating Reserve, such amount as is from time to time certified by the Fiscal Officer of the University as adequate and necessary for working capital for operation and maintenance of the dormitory facilities; provided, that such Operating Reserve shall not exceed one-fourth of the operating and maintenance expenses of the dormitory facilities for the preceding 12 months.

All receipts from dormitory facilities now or hereafter under the control of the Board, including the dining halls constituting part thereof, shall be deposited in the Dormitory Revenue Fund.

The Dormitory Revenue Fund, including the Operating Reserve, shall be applied to pay when due all reasonable and proper expenses of operation and maintenance (as defined in Section 10) of the dormitory facilities, excluding extraordinary repair and replacement expenses payable from the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund and expenses of or provision for depreciation or capital replacement.

The remainder of the Dormitory Revenue Fund, after retaining therein the then current Operating Reserve and payment of said operation and maintenance expenses then due, shall be applied as provided in the Original Bond Resolution, namely, as follows and in the following order of priority:

First: Into the Debt Service Fund, to be held by the Trustee as a separate fund and used for the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds, the amounts provided in the Original Bond Resolution and in the Bond Resolutions relating to the Series C, D, E, F, G, H and I Bonds for payment of principal and interest on the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H and I Bonds and, in addition, (1) on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year an amount equal to the interest due and on the next ensuing interest payment date in that year on the Series J Bonds then outstanding; provided, that, the amount so payable on any such date into the Debt Service Fund shall be reduced by the amount then remaining in said Debt Service Fund from the accrued interest and from the funds deposited therein for capitalized interest pursuant to Section 4 of this Resolution; (2) on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year, the equal semi-annual amounts necessary to provide for payment of any principal maturity in that year on the Series J Bonds; (3) if Additional Bonds shall be issued under the Trust Agreement, such additional amounts and at such times as specified in the resolution authorizing such Additional Bonds, which amounts shall be not less than necessary to provide in the Debt Service Fund amounts, in addition to the amounts hereinbefore provided for the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I and J Bonds, sufficient to pay in full interest and principal on all Additional Bonds then outstanding, as the same shall become due and payable provided that no payments need be made to the Debt Service Fund so long as the amounts in the Debt Service Fund and Debt Service Reserve Fund aggregate at least the total principal and interest payable on all Bonds then outstanding to the dates of their respective maturities,

Second: Into the Debt Service Reserve Fund, to be held by the Trustee as a separate fund for the payment of principal and interest on, and purchase or redemption of, the Bonds as herein provided, on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year and on such other dates as amounts are payable into the Debt Service Fund with respect to Additional Bonds, such amounts as are necessary to create and

maintain in said Debt Service Reserve Fund the required reserve, namely, an amount equal to the maximum principal and interest requirements for any consecutive twoyear period on all Bonds at the time outstanding;

Third: Into the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund, to be held by the University as a fund separate and distinct from all other funds of the University, semi-annually on or before April 1 and October 1 of each year, or as soon thereafter as the required reserve has been established in the Debt Service Reserve Fund, an amount equal to one-quarter of one percent of the cost of construction on all dormitory facilities then under the control of the Board and 3 percent of the cost of movable equipment for all such dormitory facilities, which fund may be used by the University to the extent necessary for payment of principal and interest on the Bonds or for extraordinary repairs and replacements to the dormitory facilities or for construction or equipping of additional dormitory facilities;

Fourth: On April 1 and October 1 of each year, to the foregoing funds, such amounts as may be necessary to make up previous deficiency in any deposits required by the foregoing paragraphs of this section;

Fifth: So long as there is no deficiency in any of the deposits provided for in Paragraphs First through Fourth above and so long as the amounts in the Debt Service Reserve Fund are at least equal to the then required reserve, any amounts in the Dormitory Revenue Fund, after reserving therein the then current Operating Reserve, may be used for any purpose of the University for which such funds may lawfully be used.

The Debt Service Fund is irrevocably pledged to and shall be used by the Trustee for the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds and, until required for such purposes, shall be invested by the Trustee in such direct obligations of the United States as the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University shall direct in writing addressed to the Trustee, which writing shall determine that the maturity

of the respective obligations is not later than the date on which such funds will be required for payment of such principal and interest. The Trustee shall transfer from the Debt Service Fund to the Paying Agents amounts sufficient to enable said Paying Agents to pay when due principal and interest on the Bonds, or the Trustee shall make such credit arrangements with said Paying Agents as to permit such payments.

The Debt Service Reserve Fund is irrevocably pledged to, and shall be used by the Trustee for, the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds if other available funds are insufficient for that purpose, and, to the extent herein provided, for purchase or redemption of Bonds. Until required for such purposes it shall be invested by the Trustee in such direct obligations of the United States as the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University shall direct in writing, which obligations shall, subject to the applicable provisions of the Loan Agreement, mature not more than five years from the date of investment. The Trustee shall transfer from the Debt Service Reserve Fund to the Debt Service Fund such amounts as are necessary in addition to amounts available in the Debt Service Fund, including funds transferred from the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund, to enable said Paying Agents to pay when due the principal and interest on the Bonds.

Any amounts in the Debt Service Reserve Fund in excess of the required reserve provided for in Paragraph Second above shall be used to purchase Bonds for retirement or to redeem Bonds then subject to redemption to the extent and in the manner from time to time requested in writing by the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University. In calculating at any time whether additional amounts are required to be paid into the Debt Service Reserve Fund under Paragraph Second above and in calculating the excess over the required reserve, no value shall be given to any investments of the fund other than direct obligations of the United States maturing within five years from the date of such calculation, but, in all other respects, such investments shall be valued at their face amount or market value, whichever is lower.

The Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund is irrevocably pledged to, and shall be used by the University for, extraordinary repairs and replacements to the dormitory facilities or to construct or equip additional dormitory facilities or for the retirement of all then outstanding Bonds by purchase or redemption or for payment of the principal and interest by transfer to the Debt Service Fund as herein provided. The University shall transfer from the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund to the Debt Service Fund such amounts as are from time to time necessary, in addition to the other amounts available in the Debt Service Fund and without use of the Debt Service Reserve Fund, to provide for the payment, when due, of the principal and interest on the Bonds and shall not use any of this fund for repairs or replacement or additional facilities if there is any deficiency in any of the deposits required to be made under subparagraphs First or Second of this Section. Until required for such purposes, the Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund may be invested by the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University in direct obligations of the United States maturing not more than five years from the date of investment subject, however, to the applicable provisions of the Loan Agreement.

Investments made pursuant to this Section 8 of any amounts in any Special Fund herein created and the interest thereon and the proceeds thereof shall constitute part of that Special Fund and be added to that particular fund. Such investments shall be sold, exchanged or collected from time to time as directed by the President and the Fiscal Officer of the University, and the Trustee shall be under no liability and have no responsibility in connection with such investment, or the sale, exchange or collection thereof, provided the directions of said officers are followed.

Section 9. <u>Trust Agreement</u>. In order to secure the payment of the principal and interest on the Bonds, the President of the University and the Chairman

of the Board of Trustees, and each of them, are authorized to execute, acknowledge and deliver as may be appropriate the Fifth Supplemental Trust Agreement in substantially the form attached hereto, and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees is authorized to seal and attest the same, with such changes not unfavorable to the University as the Officers acting shall deem advisable and as shall be approved by the Original Purchasers of the Series J Bonds. The terms and provisions of the Trust Agreement are hereby confirmed and adopted and the terms of said Trust Agreement purporting to be applicable to the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H and I Bonds or to the Projects to be constructed from the proceeds of such Series of Bonds shall be deemed equally applicable to the Series J Bonds and the Project covered by this Resolution to the extent that the same are not inconsistent with the terms or provisions of this Resolution and the context so permits.

Section 10. <u>Definitions</u>. Where the context permits, the following terms as used in this Resolution or in the Trust Agreement shall have the following meanings: (1) "the Fiscal Officer" shall mean the Vice President, Business and Finance, of the University or any official or employee performing the duties of such officer for the time being. The Comptroller, or the Assistant Vice President - Assistant Treasurer, or any official or employee performing the duties of such officers for the time being, shall also be "a Fiscal Officer" when the context so permits. (2) "Additional Bonds" shall mean Bonds issued pursuant to the Trust Agreement in addition to and on a parity with the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I and J Bonds and "Bonds" shall mean both the Series A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I and J Bonds and Additional Bonds; (3) "Agreement" or "Trust Agreement" shall refer to the Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 as from time to time supplemented pursuant to its terms; (4) "Dormitory Facilities" shall mean buildings, groups of buildings or parts of or additions to buildings, including the sites therefor, now or hereafter constructed, acquired by or under the control of the Board and authorized to be constructed,

equipped, maintained and operated by Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio, including the dormitories, additions to dormitories, dining facilities, and married student housing facilities or projects and all separate or connected buildings, sites, equipment, structures and utilities to be used in connection with the maintenance or operation of, or in any way supplementing or related to the services or facilities to be provided by such buildings located on or in close proximity to the campus; (5) "Net Income" shall mean all receipts of the operation of dormitory facilities after deducting therefrom the reasonable and proper operating and maintenance expenses thereof; (6) "Reasonable and Proper Operating and Maintenance Expenses" shall mean ordinary and usual reasonable expenditures necessary to the operation, repair and maintenance of the dormitory facilities including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, taxes, fees and expenses of the Trustee and paying agents and any expenses required to be paid by the Bond Resolution or the Trust Agreement, but excluding provision or expenditure for depreciation or capital replacement or expenditures for administration or regulation of the occupants of the dormitory facilities which expenditures do not constitute costs of the type included as costs of operation of the dormitory facilities under the present accounting practice of the University or expenditures for extraordinary repairs or replacements or payments to the Debt Service Fund, Debt Service Reserve Fund or Contingency Repair and Replacement Fund; (7) "Trustee" refers to the Trustee under the Trust Agreement, presently The Ohio National Bank of Columbus; (8) any reference to an officer of the University or of the Board in this Resolution shall refer to the person holding such office or, in the event of resignation, absence, incapacity or vacancy in such office, then the person performing the duties of such office; any reference to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio shall, where the context permits, mean said section as it now exists and as it is from time to time amended, supplemented or affected by later legislation.

Section 11. General. The appropriate officers of the University and the Board, the architects and engineers employed by the University, and the Trustee designated in the Trust Agreement are authorized and directed to do all things necessary or proper to carry out the terms and provisions of this Resolution, the Trust Agreement and the sale referred to in Section 3 above and the Loan Agreement referred to in said Section, and to effect the execution, sale and delivery of said Series J Bonds in accordance therewith if approved by the President and Fiscal Officer of the University. It may be required as part of the terms of sale of the Series J Bonds that prior to or at the time of delivery of the Series J Bonds there shall have been executed and delivered contracts for construction of the principal portions of the Project and provisions shall have been made for obtaining sufficient amounts to pay all costs of the Project as estimated by the Project architect. The obligations imposed upon the University under this Resolution or the Trust Agreement are established as duties specifically enjoined upon the University, the Board and the officials of the University by law and result from their respective offices, trusts or stations within the meaning of Section 2731.01 of the Revised Code of Ohio.

WHEREAS, the text of the Series J Bonds and the coupons, if any, to be attached thereto and the authentication certificate of the Trustee to be endorsed thereon are to be substantially as follows:

[Form of Coupon Bond]

The form of Coupon Bond shall be identical with the form of Coupon Bond set forth in the Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 except that there shall be substituted in such form in lieu of the corresponding paragraphs and Trustee's Certificate and corresponding coupon form in said Coupon Bond the following paragraphs and coupon form:

This Bond is a Series J Bond and is one of a duly authorized issue of \$3,000,000 Dormitory Revenue Bonds of the University,

issued and to be issued from time to time, pursuant to Section 3345.07 of the Revised Code of Ohio and the Resolutions of the Board of Trustees of April 8, 1957 and July 31, 1969 (herein collectively called the "Bond Resolution") for the purpose of paying the costs of constructing and equipping certain dormitory facilities and secured by Trust Agreement dated as of April 15, 1957 and First, Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Supplemental Trust Agreements between the University and the above-named Trustee (herein collectively called the "Agreement").

JOHN B. FULLEN The Ohio State University Distinguished Service Award

Nationally recognized alumnor; loyal and respected servant of The Ohio State University

For nearly forty years, this dedicated alumnus served his fellow alumni and his university as an able and articulate leader in all aspects involving the Association and the Development Fund. Upon his retirement, he was saluted as one of the most resourceful and astute personalities in this field so meaningful to higher education.

Devoted teacher, humanitarian, perceptive administrator in matters of University policy

Delbert Oberteuffer served with distinction from 1932 to 1966 as a member of the faculty of the Department of Physical Education. For twenty-four years as its chairman, education of the whole man was his theme. His personal drive was the generative force that elevated four education programs to the ranks of the best in the nation. These embraced curricula in freshman physical education and health education, teacher education for professional students in physical and health education, and graduate education in both fields.

As a University professor, he wore the academic robes with dignity and pride, stirred youth, stimulated scholars, prodded council members, encouraged the administration, and held high the central task of the University.

His achievements brought national fame to the University when three national organizations elected him president, four presented him their distinguished service award, and three universities gave him honorary degrees.

Delbert Oberteuffer has been a devoted leader, a respected counselor, a productive participant in University affairs, an author, and an educator who gave unselfishly of himself in order that the University might fulfill its most important mission.

Revered teacher, administrator, nationally known and valued leader in home economics

Dorothy D. Scott served the School of Home Economics at The Ohio State University thirty-one years, the last thirteen as Director of the School and the last ten also as Associate Dean of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics. Under her administration, the School grew and progressed. She inspired colleagues and students by her professional standards of excellence, her spirit of service, and her concern for people.

Dr. Scott received the B.S. and M.S. from Ohio State, and the M.A. and Ed.D. from Columbia. In her early years as a faculty member, she played an important part in developing the student guidance program for the School of Home Economics. She served also as professor and chairman of home economics education and made significant contributions to teacher education and research.

Through her nation-wide leadership in academic circles and professional organizations, Dr. Scott brought honor to herself and to her alma mater. She served the University effectively in many roles, including membership on the Advisory Committee on the Selection of the President, Faculty Advisory Committee to the President and Board of Trustees, and the University Honorary Degrees Committee. In every dimension, the career of Dorothy D. Scott has been one of dedication and distinction.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATION

A. Supplemental Action on the Budgets for the 1969-70 Fiscal Year

President Fawcett made the following statement and recommendation:

On July 31, 1969, this Board, based upon the best information that was available to it at that time, increased the student Instructional Fee by \$25 per guarter to a level of \$170, the General Fee by \$5 per quarter to \$30 and the Tuition Fee (outof-state surcharge) by \$150 per quarter to a level of \$350, all effective with this coming Autumn Quarter. While at that time neither the appropriations bill nor the Civil Service pay raise bill had been enacted by the General Assembly, such action was essential so that the registration process could begin without delaying the starting date of Autumn Quarter, 1969. The establishment of this fee schedule was contingent upon final action by the General Assembly. This fee and tuition schedule was established to support the level of expenditure required by the minimal continuation budget authorized by the Board of Trustees at its June, 1969, meeting. This level of spending had been based on the following information:

- On August 29, 1968, The Ohio State University submitted a detailed biennial budget to the Ohio Board of Regents requesting a level of subsidy support for 1969-70 in the amount of \$69,838,572 which was some \$20,000,000 less than the "asking budgets" of the individual units of the University.
- 2. On January 10, 1969, the Board of Regents recommended a subsidy for The Ohio State University in the amount of \$59, 898, 500. This amount required cutbacks in the University's proposed new and improved programs in the amount of approximately \$10,000,000.
- 3. On February 5, 1969, the Governor's recommendation as released by the Board of Regents called for a subsidy of \$58,050,250.

Had the subsidy as recommended by the Regents or by the Governor been provided, only minimal fee and tuition increases would have been necessary to provide the \$58,858,100 budget approved by the Trustees, plus the additional funds required to meet the Civil Service pay increase bill. Subsequent to the June Board meeting, it became apparent that there would be a substantial reduction in the anticipated subsidy provided by the General Assembly and that additional funds would be required to cover the cost of mandated pay increases for Civil Service employees. The fee and tuition increases acted upon at the July meeting by the Board of Trustees were based upon our best estimates of the situation at that time. Since this meeting,

the Educational Appropriations Act has been passed by the General Assembly providing a subsidy of \$55,046,550 which leaves this University with a total deficit from the minimal continuation budget plus the mandated Civil Service pay increases in the amount of \$4,711,550. At the same time the General Assembly established a limit on the Instructional Fee for undergraduates in the amount of \$160 per quarter.

To provide the funds necessary to support the difference between our minimum continuation budget needs and the subsidy provided by the State and at the same time to bring our Instructional Fee in line with the level established by the General Assembly, I am now requesting that the July action of the Board establishing fee and tuition levels for this coming academic year be amended as follows:

- 1. That the Instructional Fee be decreased by \$10 per quarter for the main campus.
- 2. That the General Fee be increased by \$10 per quarter for the main campus.
- 3. That the other fee actions be sustained as approved on July 31, 1969.

It should be noted that these amendments will not in any way alter the total charges to resident students previously authorized by the Board at the \$200 level per quarter. At the same time it should be noted that the General Fee will still be below the maximum level of \$50 suggested by the General Assembly.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the above recommendations were approved and the Instructional Fee increase of \$15 per quarter on the main campus and the increase of \$5 per quarter at the University branches and the Tuition (out-of-state surcharge) increase of \$150 per quarter be referred to the Ohio Board of Regents for ratification by unanimous roll call vote.

**Pursuant to action of the Board of Trustees on January 14, 1965, third- and fourth-year students enrolled in the Doctor of Medicine degree program of the College of Medicine are enrolled in a year-round program of courses and are assessed fees on an annual basis payable in two installments, June 15 and December 15. The annual rate for such resident students for the 1969-70 academic year shall be \$1,020.00 for resident students and \$2,070.00 for nonresident students.

Part-time students (those enrolled for six or less credit hours or enrolled for one term of a Summer Quarter), shall be assessed one-half of the full fees. When fees are not evenly divisible, they shall be assessed to the next even dollar amount.

A. Insurance Program for Faculty, Staff and All Regular Employees

> President Fawcett presented on behalf of the Retirement and Insurance Committee a resolution amending the insurance program for faculty, staff and all regular employees insured under the John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance Company major medical contract, Policy Nos. 58175-GTC and 58175-GTC-100. The following resolution was recommended for adoption:

Be it resolved by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, that the John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance Company major medical insurance program for faculty, staff and all regular employees be amended, effective for all purposes as of October 1, 1969, to include the following changes:

- (a) Maximum benefit under the major medical plan to be increased from \$15,000 to \$25,000 per person.
- (b) The deductible for insured persons with full Base Plan (Blue Cross-Blue Shield) coverage to be reduced from \$200 to \$100. The deductible for insured persons with partial or no coverage under the Base Plan will remain unchanged at \$500.
- (c) Extended Care Facilities coverage to be added to the major medical plan as follows:

Covered charges (to which the 80% coinsurance provision applies) shall include the reasonable and customary charges for services and supplies (as defined) of a "qualified" Extended Care Facility, provided that confinement in an Extended Care Facility resulted by means of direct transfer from a hospital in which the patient was confined for a minimum of three consecutive days, and further provided that such confinement is for continued care of the same condition or conditions which resulted in hospital confinement. > coverage in an Extended Care Facility is up to 60 days per period of disability. The maximum covered expenses for daily room and board charges in the Extended Care Facility is 50% of the semiprivate room charge of the hospital in which the prior confinement took place.

Other covered charges to be included under the Extended Care Facility coverage while room and board benefits are payable include: routine nursing care, physical, occupational or speech therapy, medical social services, biologicals, supplies and appliances, diagnostic and therapeutic services and ambulance services.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the Board of Trustees adopted the above resolution by unanimous voice vote.

IX. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of Walter N. Brown, Professor in the Department of Horticulture; Everett L. Dakan, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Poultry Science; and R. Bruce Tom, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

IX. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

A. Walter N. Brown

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on July 24, 1969, of Walter N. Brown, Professor in the Department of Horticulture and Forestry.

Professor Brown was born in Christian County near Taylorville, Illinois, July 2, 1913. In 1933 he received the County Agricultural Scholarship tuition award to the University of Illinois for four years. He received his Bachelor of Science degree in Floriculture in June 1937 and was appointed first Assistant in Horticulture at the University of Illinois assigned to the Cook County Experiment Station, Des Plaines, Illinois, with duties in vegetable crop research and extension. In September of 1937 he was appointed Associate in Horticulture and Superintendent of the Cook County Experiment Station. In September of 1938 he entered the University of Illinois Graduate School on a part-time basis.

In June 1941 he received a leave of absence for active duty as a Lieutenant in the U. S. Army. He served in the Southwest Pacific Area and received the Bronze Star for meritorious service. In 1945 he was honorably discharged with the rank of Major.

Professor Brown returned to the staff of the University of Illinois on January 1, 1946, as a Research Associate in Horticulture and reentered the graduate school. He received his M.Sc. degree in June 1948 with his thesis entitled, "Germination of Sweet Corn and Relation to the Amount of Seed Injury Sustained During Harvesting and Processing." His doctorate degree was taken at the University of Illinois in the field of plant breeding with a minor in plant physiology. The Ph.D. degree was awarded in 1952 with his dissertation entitled, "Developmental Morphology of Pericarp Blistering in Sweet Corn." From June 1950 to June 1952 he was an Assistant Professor with responsibility in teaching and research.

On June 1, 1952, he was appointed Professor and Head of the Vegetable Crops Division, Department of Horticulture, The Ohio State University and the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station. He has been responsible for teaching three courses in the Department concerned with general plant breeding, commercial vegetable crop production and advanced plant breeding. He has served as project leader for eight research projects and a co-leader or member of four other projects at the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center. He has served as adviser to several graduate students, a counselor to many undergraduate students, chairman of several department committees and an active member of different College and Center committees.

One of his major responsibilities has been in the area of vegetable crop breeding, particularly tomato breeding. He has developed several new lines presently in use by the vegetable industry. He recently developed two important tomato cultivars for widespread use by the greenhouse industry. As a result of his extensive variety trials at the OARDC Branch at Willard, growers in that area credit much of their success to his introduction of various vegetable cultivars there.

A. Walter N. Brown (continued)

Dr. Brown was author or co-author of over 120 publications in the area of vegetable crop production, breeding, quality evaluation and new varieties of vegetables and potatoes.

Dr. Brown was a member of the American Society for Horticultural Science, American Institute of Biological Science, Sigma Xi, Gamma Sigma Delta, Pi Alpha Xi and the Tomato Breeders Cooperative.

Professor Brown was held in high esteem by his fellow faculty members, undergraduate and graduate students, professional vegetable growers in Ohio and horticultural leaders in the United States. His contributions to the Ohio Tomato Greenhouse Industry, to the Ohio Vegetable and Potato Industry, to the Ohio Canning Industry and to the tomato growers for processing will long be remembered. These contributions are greatly appreciated and will be of lasting value.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

B. Everett L. Dakan

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on August 10, 1969, of Everett L. Dakan, Professor Emeritus in the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, Department of Poultry Science.

Professor Dakan was born on a farm in Andrew County, Missouri, on June 29, 1889, and received the Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Missouri in 1918. His additional education included graduate work in biological science at The Ohio State University (1929-30), in endocrinology at the University of Wisconsin in 1931 and in ornithology at the University of Michigan in 1932.

During his last year at the University of Missouri he was an Instructor in poultry husbandry. After his graduation, he held a teaching position at South Dakota State College for a year prior to his Ohio State appointment in 1919. He served until 1923 as Poultry Extension Specialist at Ohio State, then was appointed Chairman of the newly organized Poultry Department. Professor Dakan held the Department Chairmanship until his resignation in 1955 to devote full time to teaching. He was made a Professor Emeritus upon his retirement in 1957.

From 1947-55, he was Chairman in charge of research at the Poultry Science Department of the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station.

From 1955-57, he was a member of a team from Ohio State which helped develop a land-grant-type agriculture college and experiment station in the State of Punjab, India.

B. Everett L. Dakan (continued)

Professor Dakan was a leader in the movement to bring the World's Poultry Congress to the United States and Ohio in 1939. He led the movement which resulted in the establishment of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Regional Poultry Disease Laboratory, at East Lansing, Michigan, and in the establishment of the cooperative egg marketing systems in Ohio. He also led in the establishment of the Ohio Poultry Improvement Association.

Professor Dakan has been a member of the Poultry Science Association, the American Association of University Professors, the Columbus Audubon Society, the Wheaton Club, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, the American Civil Liberties Union and Gamma Sigma Delta, national agriculture honorary.

Professor Dakan was the author of "Ohio and the Poultry Industry." He also wrote extension poultry publications and poultry articles for the press. He served as Poultry Editor of <u>The Ohio Farmer</u> for many years until he went to India.

On behalf of the University at large, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

C. R. Bruce Tom

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on August 4, 1969, of R. Bruce Tom, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology in the College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

Professor Tom was born in New Concord, Ohio, on December 28, 1890. He was graduated from Rich Hill Township High School in Muskingum County in 1909. His college education was received at Muskingum College, Ohio University, The Ohio State University and Cornell University.

Mr. Tom began his career as a country school teacher in Muskingum County, Ohio. In that county he also served as deputy master of the Muskingum County Granges and for a two-year period was president of the Muskingum County Farm Bureau. In 1920, he was appointed 4-H Club Leader in Summit County, Ohio, and in 1924, he became an Assistant Ohio State 4-H Club Leader. In 1925, he was appointed Extension Specialist in Rural Sociology, a position he held at the University until his retirement in 1952. During the course of his career at Ohio State, he taught short courses at a number of universities including Cornell, Purdue and Michigan State.

Professor Tom was a specialist in the areas of community organizations and recreation. He was associated closely with the Farmers' Institute Program in Ohio for many years and worked closely with rural church and other community organizations. He organized and conducted the first county-wide 4-H camp in Ohio in 1920. He also planned and conducted the first annual grange

Iecturers short course on The Ohio State University campus in 1928. Throughout his career, he worked closely with the Town-Country Committee of the Ohio Council of Churches.

Mr. Tom was the author of many articles and bulletins concerned with 4-H Club activities, rural church programs, programs for older rural youth and juvenile grange programs.

Mr. Tom was a member of Gamma Sigma Delta, Ohio State Grange and National Grange. He was also a member of the Senior Fellowship Club and the First Congregational United Church of Christ in Sandusky, Ohio.

B. Proclamation Honoring John W. Bricker -Trustee Emeritus of The Ohio State University

Official notice is hereby taken of the Governor's proclamation honoring The Honorable John W. Bricker by his appointment as Trustee Emeritus of The Ohio State University. We welcome Mr. Bricker in this new role and are pleased that his wise counsel and guidance will still be available to this Board and the University. The proclamation reads:

JOHN W. BRICKER

TRUSTEE EMERITUS - THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY August 15, 1969

The Honorable John W. Bricker has rendered distinguished public service to the State of Ohio and to the United States in offices ranging from the local level to the highest office in the gift of the people of Ohio.

A native of Madison County, he attended the county schools, Mt. Sterling High School and was graduated from The Ohio State University in 1916 and from its law department in 1920.

During World War I he served as a 1st Lieutenant; solicitor for Grandview Heights, Ohio, 1920-1928; Assistant Attorney General of Ohio, 1923-1927; a member of the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio, 1929, by appointment of Governor Myers Y. Cooper.

Then followed a brilliant public career that reads like a chapter from Horatio Alger's classics of the last quarter of the 19th century.

Elected Attorney General of Ohio 1932 and reelected in 1934; elected Governor of Ohio 1938 and reelected in 1940 and 1942; Republican candidate for Vice President in 1944; first appointment as Trustee of The Ohio State University by Governor Thomas J. Herbert in 1948; elected to the United States Senate in 1946 and reelected in 1952 - for a total tenure of twelve years - January 3, 1947-January 3, 1959.

John Bricker graced all these offices - from the least to the highest - with a penetrating mind and an unswerving faith in representative government under a written constitution.

His imposing presence, his profound knowledge of law and government and his gift as one of the ablest orators of the Nation placed him in the front rank of his contemporaries.

Now, therefore, I, James A. Rhodes, Governor of the State of Ohio, deem it a welldeserved recognition of John Bricker's distinguished achievements to proclaim him a

and I invite the citizens of Ohio to join me in the hope that the University, the State and the Nation may long continue to have the benefits of his experience, his judgment and the inspiration of his leadership.

D. Highlights of University Activities

President Fawcett reported to the Board on some of the significant activities that have taken place in recent weeks. Some references included in the report, which is filed with the official records of the Secretary, were as follows:

- 1. The Center for Vocational and Technical Education dedicated its new enlarged facilities at the corner of Kenny and Kinnear Roads in ceremonies on September 4, 1969. This national center is an independent unit on the Ohio State campus dedicated to research, development, state leadership training and dissemination of information in vocational and technical education.
- 2. The Ohio State University Development Fund set a new, all-time high for the first half of 1969. Gifts to the University for the first six months of the year were a record 49 percent ahead of the comparable period for 1968. The total amount in dollars contributed in the first half of 1969 was \$2,184,100, an increase of \$719,405 over the first half of 1968.
- 3. Some 60 astronomers are at Ohio State this week for the first international colloquium on stellar rotation--a topic of growing scientific interest in recent years.
- 4. Seventy-eight business executives are attending the 15th annual Executive Development Program presently being held on the campus. The intensive program of study and discussion is sponsored by the College of Administrative Science in cooperation with the Ohio Manufacturers' Association.
- 5. A unique program leading to a master's degree in hospital administration will enroll its first students this fall with the assistance of the W. K. Kellogg Foundation of Battle Creek, Michigan. The Kellogg Foundation has provided a three-year grant totaling \$121,650 to support graduate faculty involved in developing curriculum in the area of health care financing and health economics.

- The Ford Foundation has approved a \$38, 500 planning grant to Ohio State for the College of Education to develop a program for preparing educational leaders for urban neighborhoods.
- E. Report on the University's Investment Portfolio

The report dated September 10, 1969, as submitted to the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees by Vice President Gordon B. Carson pertaining to the University's Investment Portfolio, was received and ordered to be filed with the official records of the Board of Trustees.

C. Agreement Between The Ohio State University and the Council on Public Higher Education, Commonwealth of Kentucky

President Fawcett recommended that an Agreement between The Ohio State University and the Council on Public Higher Education, Commonwealth of Kentucky, pertaining to the admission of a limited number of students to the College of Veterinary Medicine be approved. The Council on Public Higher Education for the Commonwealth of Kentucky agrees to pay the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$1,800.00) for each Kentucky student who accepts an appointment for admission; and further agrees to pay One Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$1,800.00) per year for each student for subsequent school years, not to exceed four years for any one student.
- 2. Each Kentucky student enrolled under this Agreement will be charged only such tuition and fees as are charged to students who are residents of Ohio.
- 3. Each party reserves the right to terminate this Agreement at the last of June in any year by giving the other party at least one year's notice of the desire to terminate the Agreement.

A. Evans Laboratory Addition - Improvements to the Heating and Air Conditioning System: Employment of Engineers

President Fawcett recommended that the engineering firm of H. A. Williams and Associates, Inc., be employed to provide complete preparation of plans and specifications for this project.

WHEREAS, the University, in planning to meet a portion of the needs of its students and its programs from the standpoint of educational, research and service facilities, deems it necessary to acquire additional property contiguous to Don Scott Field between Case Road and Route 161, Sawmill Road and Godown Road; and

WHEREAS, the Trustees of The Ohio State University have approved a master plan for the area; and

WHEREAS, the acquisition of this property is mandatory in meeting the needs of the University and serving the people of the State of Ohio; and the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University finds it necessary to complete the acquisition of said real property;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized and directed to proceed with the purchase of said contiguous lands, using funds appropriated in Amended Substitute House Bill 531 for that purpose, and, in the event that negotiations to purchase said property at a fair and just compensation should fail, then, pursuant to his statutory authority, the Director of Public Works, for and on behalf of said Board of Trustees, shall be requested to exercise the right of eminent domain and acquire by condemnation for the State of Ohio and said University the above described property.

VIII. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of Charles D. Cooper, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Engineering Graphics; Osee Hughes Dewey, Associate Professor Emeritus in the School of Home Economics; Harry H. Weiser, Professor Emeritus of the Academic Faculty of Microbial and Cellular Biology, College of Biological Sciences; and Carl J. Wirthwein, Associate Professor Emeritus in the School of Physical Education. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

A. Charles D. Cooper

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on August 26, 1969, of Charles D. Cooper, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Engineering Graphics.

Professor Cooper was born in Cambridge, Ohio, on May 2, 1899, and graduated from The Ohio State University with the degree of Bachelor of Mechanical Engineering in 1923.

Professor Cooper joined the staff of the Department of Engineering Drawing in the Autumn Quarter of 1923. He was promoted to Assistant Professor in 1929, advanced to Associate Professor in 1940 and acquired the rank of Professor in 1944. He retired July 1, 1966, with the title of Professor Emeritus after 43 years of continuous teaching service.

Professor Cooper assisted in revisions of Engineering Drawing, Thomas E. French, from the 4th edition through the 6th edition. He was a contributing author to the 7th and 8th editions. He was one of the technical advisors for seven sound motion pictures and six coordinated film strips to accompany the 7th and 8th editions of French's Engineering Drawing. He was also co-author with the late Professor Paul E. Machovina of Series I and II, Engineering Drawing Problems, to accompany the 7th and 8th editions of Engineering Drawing. He likewise co-authored several editions of Engineering Graphics Problems with Professor Machovina from 1959 through 1963.

Professor Cooper's teaching was in diversified courses for several years. He assumed the chairmanship of the Committee on Instruction for the beginning courses in Engineering Drawing for freshman engineers in 1942 and supervised this work until his retirement in 1966. He was exceptionally resourceful, unusually productive, faithful and devoted to his teaching assignments.

While at the University he was a member of Acacia Fraternity, University Lodge #631 F. & A. M. and the Faculty Club.

In campus and community life he was an active and helpful associate and neighbor. As a member of Crestview Presbyterian Church he had served as a deacon and elder for many years.

Professor Cooper was a member of the American Society for Engineering Education and the American Society of Mechanical Engineers. He was an active participant in the Engineering Drawing Division of ASEE and the Ohio Section of this society. He was a registered Professional Engineer in the State of Ohio.

Woodworking, gardening, photography and fishing were his avocations. He had built a small cottage on Webb Lake in Wisconsin where he enjoyed the summers with his family, particularly the years since his retirement.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

B. Osee Hughes Dewey

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on September 3, 1969, of Mrs. Osee Hughes Dewey, Associate Professor Emeritus in the School of Home Economics.

Osee Hughes Dewey was born March 8, 1887. She received her Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Kansas in 1918 and her Master of Science degree from the University of Chicago in 1930. She was a member of Phi Beta Kappa and Omicron Nu honoraries.

Food conservation work with Agricultural Extension Service in Detroit occupied Mrs. Dewey during the war year, 1918-19. In the fall of 1919, she was appointed Assistant Professor of Home Economics at Michigan State University. She was promoted to Associate Professor in 1923 and remained at Michigan State through 1929, serving also as Assistant Dean of Home Economics.

Mrs. Dewey joined the faculty at Ohio State in October 1930, as Instructor in Home Economics, became Assistant Professor in 1936 and Associate Professor in July 1945. She resigned in the summer of 1947 to be married to Mr. Ernest Dewey and went to live in Schenectady, New York, later moving to Morristown, New Jersey.

Osee Hughes Dewey was the author of the college textbook, <u>Introductory</u> <u>Foods</u>, published by the MacMillan Company in 1940. She wrote a number of bulletins published by the Agricultural Extension Service at Ohio State and several articles which appeared in <u>Cereal Chemistry and the Journal</u> <u>of the American Dietetic Association</u>. Research on the chemistry of starch cookery was carried on concurrently with teaching.

Mrs. Dewey was a talented, well-liked teacher, with exceptional ability to transmit her wealth of knowledge in the field of food and nutrition.

It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as an expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

C. Harry H. Weiser

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death on August 24, 1969, of Harry H. Weiser, Professor Emeritus of the Academic Faculty of Microbial and Cellular Biology, College of Biological Sciences.

Dr. Weiser was born January 26, 1898, in Delaware, Ohio. He was graduated from Delaware High School in 1917, served in the U. S. Army, 1917-1919, and obtained his Bachelor of Science in Agriculture degree from The Ohio State University in 1923. During four years of high school science teaching, the last two in association with the Teacher Training Department of Ohio Wesleyan University, he obtained his Master of Science degree at Ohio State (1926). In 1928 he returned to Ohio State as an Instructor in Bacteriology, working through the ranks until his retirement as Professor Emeritus in 1968, meanwhile obtaining his Doctor of Philosophy degree at Iowa State College (1936). He was a member of two honorary societies: Sigma Xi and Gamma Sigma Delta, and several scientific societies including the Society of American Microbiologists, the American Dairy Association, the American Public Health Association and the American Water Works Association. These wide interests and activities are reflected in the more than 160 publications of Dr. Weiser, including a book: Practical Food Microbiology (1962).

Dr. Weiser played a prominent role in the development of microbiology at Ohio State both through contributions to his own department and through his extensive cooperation with the food technology, dairy technology, sanitary and nutrition groups on the campus. He not only found time to do extensive teaching on the undergraduate level, but advised many graduate students and carried out both varied and extensive research programs in the areas of food, dairy and water microbiology. Few individuals have contributed as much over such a long period to Ohio State as has Dr. Weiser. Dr. Weiser has written, "During the past 40 years I have treasured my teaching experience involving 11, 650 students." This experience has been reciprocally treasured. His colleagues both off and on the campus similarly treasure their experiences, personally and professionally.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Dr. Weiser its deep sympathy. It was directed that this Resolution be inscribed in the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a sincere expression of the Board's realization of the loss which the family has sustained.

D. Carl J. Wirthwein

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on September 2, 1969, of Carl J. Wirthwein, Associate Professor Emeritus in the School of Physical Education.

Although a much-traveled man in the states and frequent visitor in Europe, Professor Wirthwein was a native Ohioan and a resident of Columbus for 72 years. After graduating with a B. A. degree from The Ohio State University in 1922, he served with distinction in the Columbus Public Schools until 1935 as a teacher at the Eleventh Avenue School and McKinley Junior High School. Following the receipt of his M. A. degree from Columbia University, he served 31 years as a member of the faculty of the Physical Education Department for Men, at The Ohio State University.

"Educating young people to live most and serve best" was his theme and it served as the generative force that enabled him to make his most important contributions. These embraced the teaching of physical education and health education to young people, assistant coach of tennis and swimming, meet manager of the Ohio State High School Tennis and Swimming Championships and official timer for intercollegiate basketball and football games.

His notable achievements in the sport world were signaled by the Gold Tuxis Medallion from Culver Military Academy, Central Ohio singles tennis champion, and teamed with his brother Herman, doubles champion and then captain of The Ohio State University tennis team in 1922. His activities outside the University touched such athletic, benevolent and civic organizations as the National College Swimming Coaches Association, the Ace of Clubs, the Columbus Board of Education and the Humbolt Lodge, Scottish Rite and Shrine. The first three honored him by electing him their president.

It was said by Thomas Jefferson that, "Man is the substance of the things he loves." During his colorful career Professor Wirthwein was a talented teacher, a capable coach, a wise counselor, a productive participant in civic affairs, a member of that noble band who gave unselfishly of himself in order that "young people might live most and serve best." This was his concern, his contribution and his legacy.

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, November 13, 1969, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

Present: John G. Ketterer, Chairman, Frederick E. Jones, James W. Shocknessy, Don M. Hilliker, William C. Safford, Jack G. Gibbs, Frederick R. Eckley and M. Merle Harrod.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. <u>Revisions of Rule 35.07 of Rules</u> for the University Faculty

The Faculty Council on October 14, 1969, approved the following revisions in Rule 35.07 of <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u> (See Appendix II, page 261), effective Winter Quarter, 1970.

- 1. That the Progress grade (P) be modified to include the specification that when the final mark is recorded all previous "Progress" hours shall assume the value of the final mark.
- That the Satisfactory grade (S) be used for passing work in individual studies courses rather than A, B, C, D, and that the Unsatisfactory grade (U) be used for unsatisfactory work in those same courses in place of E.

President Fawcett recommended that this action of the Faculty Council be approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Harrod, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote, and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees was further instructed and given authority to make the foregoing changes in Rule 35.07 in the next printing of the <u>Rules for the</u> University Faculty.

B. Programs Leading to the Degrees Civil Engineer and Industrial Engineer

The Board of Trustees approved a revision of the curricula in the College of Engineering on November 14, 1968. This new program included advanced professional degree programs leading to the degrees of Electrical Engineer and Mechanical Engineer.

These new programs have now been expanded to include the advanced professional degree programs leading to the degrees of Civil Engineer and Industrial Engineer. The Faculty Council on October 14, 1969, approved the proposal from the Council on Academic Affairs that these programs be included in the framework of the College of Engineering in the revised curricula programs.

President Fawcett recommended that the above proposal for the establishment of the two new professional degrees be approved, effective immediately.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

C. Naming of Buildings

Upon the recommendation of the students on the Mansfield Campus and the Advisory Committee to OSU/Mansfield, and with the concurrence of Dean Richard Zimmerman, it was proposed that the Phase I Building on the Mansfield Campus be named "Ovalwood Hall" and that the Phase II structure be named "Dwight D. Eisenhower Memorial Center."

Dean Richard Zimmerman of the University College has proposed that the three buildings presently under construction on the West Campus be named as follows:

Building I, located at 1080 Carmack Road, be named "Bevis Hall" to honor the late President Howard L. Bevis.

Building II, located at 1060 Carmack Road, be named "Rightmire Hall" to honor the late President George W. Rightmire.

Building III, located at 1070 Carmack Road, be named "Learning Resources Center."

These proposals have the concurrence of the President's Cabinet and are in accordance with the <u>Bylaws of the Board of Trustees</u>. President Fawcett recommended that the said proposals be approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. Eckley, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

D. Naming of Streets

Upon the recommendation of the students on the Mansfield Campus and the Advisory Committee to OSU/Mansfield, and with the concurrence of Dean Richard Zimmerman, it was proposed that the main entrance road from State Route 39 on the Mansfield Campus be named "University Drive." It was proposed further that a loop road which runs west from the University Drive through the existing parking lot to the Mansfield Technical Building be named "Kenwood Circle."

These proposals have the concurrence of the President's Cabinet, and President Fawcett recommended that the said proposals be approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Harrod, seconded by Mr. Jones, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

E. Establishment of the Battelle Professorship in Theoretical Chemistry

Pursuant to the conditions set forth for the establishment of a "Named Professorship," adopted by the Board of Trustees, President Fawcett recommended that the "Battelle Professorship in Theoretical Chemistry" be established at The Ohio State University, effective October 1, 1970.

The Battelle Professorship is to be established in the specific area designated by the title; namely, Theoretical Chemistry. The budgeting of the salary is to be shared between Battelle Memorial Institute and the University with Battelle providing \$12,000.00 per annum on a continuing basis.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Eckley, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

F. Honorary Degree

The Faculty Council on October 14, 1969, recommended that the honorary degree, Doctor of Science, be conferred on the following individual:

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the awarding of the honorary degree to the above-identified person.

II. PERSONNEL CHANGES

A. Change in Responsibility

President Fawcett made the following statement concerning the Change in Responsibility for Dr. Alfred B. Garrett:

Dr. Alfred B. Garrett, who for seven years has been Vice President for Research, has asked to return to the Department of Chemistry on January 1. During Dr. Garrett's tenure in the Office of Research, The Ohio State University has significantly increased the extent of its research and has dramatically enlarged the volume of annual contracts for faculty research. His service as Vice President for Research is simply one of many contributions Alfred B. Garrett has made to this University since he first came here 40 years ago as a graduate student.

II. PERSONNEL CHANGES (continued)

A. Change in Responsibility (continued)

Professor Garrett's desire to teach again after many years in research and administration signifies the ideal relation of classroom instruction to faculty research. Both teaching and research are important at Ohio State, as Dr. Garrett's career indicates.

In addition to his work in the Chemistry Department, Dr. Garrett will continue in his role as Chairman of the Centennial Committee.

Effective January 1, 1970, the Office of Research will be merged with the Office of Academic Affairs. Vice President and Provost Robinson will add to his role the responsibilities that Dr. Garrett has carried in the President's Cabinet, the Council on Research and The Ohio State University Research Foundation.

By combining research and instruction in the Office of Academic Affairs, we hope to reinforce the policy that teaching and research are integral parts of the academic mission of this University. Research programs bear importantly on teaching activities, and policies about instruction vitally affect research. By coordinating leadership of both these missions in the same office, we expect to strengthen the one without weakening the other.

During the next several months, Dr. Robinson who has wide experience in research and in the administration of research, will study in detail the University's organizational structure as it relates to research. He wishes to consult with the Council of Deans, the Council on Academic Affairs, the Council on Research, the Graduate Council and the Board of the Research Foundation before making any further changes. At a later date, he will submit recommendations for changes in organization.

B. Resignation

President Fawcett announced that Paul G. Craig will resign from the Deanship of the College of Social and Behavioral Sciences to assume the position of Vice President for Academic Affairs at Florida State University, effective at the end of Winter Quarter.

The College of Law, Class of 1966 Fund was established November 13, 1969, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University with gifts to The Ohio State University Development Fund from members of the College of Law Class of 1966.

All gifts are to be invested in the University's Investment Portfolio, under the rules and regulations adopted by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, with the right to invest and reinvest as occasion dictates.

Seventy-five per cent of all monies paid into the Fund in any year will be made available to the College of Law to be used for scholarships, student loans and other financial aids to Law students, and twenty-five per cent of all monies paid into said Fund each year shall be retained therein to eventually provide a named law professorship in the name of the Class of 1966.

Hebbard Optometry Scholarship Fund

The Hebbard Optometry Scholarship Fund was established November 13, 1969, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University with a gift to The Ohio State University Development Fund from Dr. Frederick Hebbard, Dean, College of Optometry.

All gifts are to be invested in the University's Investment Portfolio, under the rules and regulations adopted by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, with the right to invest and reinvest as occasion dictates.

The annual income is to be used to provide one or more scholarships for students enrolled in the College of Optometry whose grades in preoptometry averaged B or higher, with priority given to those with grades above 3.3, or whose work in the College of Optometry averaged B or higher and did not fall below B during the previous academic year, with priority given to those with cumulative averages above 3.3. The maximum award of such scholarship per student each year shall be \$600, adjusted for inflation which may occur after the 1970 base period. Consideration should be given to need and to scholarly attainment in making awards. As a recipient of scholarships from his alma mater and as one who contributed to his alma mater an amount equal to the scholarship help when he was able, the donor requests that all students who are helped through the Hebbard Optometry Scholarship Fund be encouraged to make gifts to this fund (after they have graduated and when they have the opportunity) at least equal to the help that they received so that the principal of the fund may in time grow large enough to help more good students to obtain education in optometry.

Should the income from this fund be large enough to provide scholarships for all students in the College of Optometry with grades high enough to meet the requirements, the balance of the income may be used for purposes to advance optometric education or research, as may be recommended by the dean, with consideration being given to an annual monetary award to the College of Optometry faculty member selected as the outstanding teacher for that year.

Should the need for these scholarships cease to exist or so diminish as to provide unused income, or should the College of Optometry cease to exist through any reorganization of the University, then the income may be used for any purpose whatsoever as determined by the Board of Trustees, with preference being given to recommendations from the appropriate administrative official of the University who is then directly responsible for education in optometry.

A. <u>University Hospital - Renovation of 2nd Floor Radiology</u>, Rooms 229-265 Inclusive

This project provides remodeling of the filing, recording and interpretation areas of the Second Floor Radiology Department to bring these areas up to today's hospital standards.

Funds for this project have been provided from Budget Account 960200 (Hospital Rotary).

B. University Hospital - Electrical Distribution System in Patient Area

This project provides for the installation of a 1500 KVA transformer substation in the Hospital roof area with necessary primary and secondary switchgear for extended electrical power for patient floors 5 through 11.

Funds for this project have been provided by a transfer from Budget Account 809998 (Hospital Capital Reserve) to Budget Account 801216 (Hospital Air Conditioning).

C. University Affiliated Facility for the Mentally Retarded

This project provides facilities for a University-wide interdisciplinary program for training, service and research in the area of Mental Retardation.

Funds for this project have been provided by State appropriations in H. B. 202, H. B. 886 and H. B. 828 and from a Federal Grant.

VIII. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

A. University Hospital - Mechanical and Electrical Projects, Employment of Engineers

President Fawcett recommended that the engineering firm of W. E. Monks be employed to provide for the complete design and supervision of mechanical and electrical projects in University Hospital.

These projects include providing electrical power and distribution systems of sufficient capacity for serving new heating and ventilating systems through the original Hospital building.

The fee for this service will be based on 8 per cent of the contract cost for these projects. Funds have been provided by a transfer from Budget Account 960200 (Hospital Rotary) to Budget Account 801216 (Hospital Air Conditioning).

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

B. Ambulatory Patient Teaching Facility - Employment of Architects

President Fawcett recommended that the architectural firm of Dan A. Carmichael be employed to provide complete architectural and engineering services for this project including preliminary plans, basic drawings, working drawings, specifications, estimate of cost, necessary bidding documents and complete supervision of construction.

The fee for this service will be based on about 5.7% of the construction cost less fees paid for schematics and funds have been appropriated in H. B. 531 for this service.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Eckley, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

C. Dentistry Addition - Employment of Mechanical Engineers

President Fawcett recommended that the engineering firm of H. A. Williams and Associates, Inc., be employed to provide for the complete professional engineering services for heating, ventilating and air conditioning, plumbing and electrical work for this project including design and preparation of basic stage documents. Upon completion of funding, this contract will be extended for the preparation of all remaining bidding documents (including final stage drawings, specifications and estimate of cost) and complete field supervision of construction.

The fee for the first phase of the contract will be based on 3/10 of 6 per cent of the construction cost and for the second phase, 7/10 of 6 per cent of the construction cost. Funds for this service have been provided by a transfer from Item 235-010 Architectural Planning (Ohio Board of Regents) to Item 315-072 Dental Building, Phase II, H. B. 531.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

D. Dentistry Addition - Employment of Structural Engineers

President Fawcett recommended that the engineering firm of Fling and Eeman, Inc., be employed to provide professional services for the structural system of this project, including design calculations, drawings, specifications, estimate of cost and checking of shop drawings. Upon completion of funding, the contract will be extended to include periodic supervision.

The fee for the first phase of the contract will be based on 0.75% of the General Contract cost and the second phase on 0.35% of the General Contract cost. Funds for this service have been provided by a transfer from Item 235-010 Architectural Planning (Ohio Board of Regents) to Item 315-072 Dental Building, Phase II, H. B. 531.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

E. Laneview Area - Acquisition of Property for Educational, Research and Service Facilities

WHEREAS, The Ohio State University has acquired certain parcels of real property bounded on the east by the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway, on the south by Lane Avenue, on the west by Kenny Road and on the north by lands titled in the name of the State of Ohio; and

WHEREAS, the University in planning to meet a portion of the needs of its students and its programs from the standpoint of educational, research and service facilities, will be required to acquire most, if not all, of the land lying between the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad, Lane Avenue, Kenny Road and State of Ohio owned lands; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized and directed to proceed with the purchase of certain real estate within the area outlined above with funds designated by the Board of Trustees at the meeting of March 14, 1968 and, in the event negotiations to purchase said property at a fair and just compensation should fail, then, pursuant to his statutory authority, the Director of Public Works shall be requested to exercise the right of "eminent domain" and acquire by condemnation for the State of Ohio and said University the following described tract of real estate located in Clinton Township, Franklin County, Ohio:

IX. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of Thomas D. Jenkins, Associate Professor, Cooperative Extension Service, College of Agriculture and Home Economics, and Charles A. Dambach, Professor in and Director of the School of Natural Resources, College of Agriculture and Home Economics. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

A. Thomas D. Jenkins

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on September 14, 1969, of Thomas D. Jenkins, Associate Professor, Cooperative Extension Service, College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

Professor Jenkins was born April 10, 1922, on his father's farm near Oak Hill, Ohio. He received his Bachelor of Science in Agriculture degree from The Ohio State University in December, 1948, and his Master of Science degree in Agricultural Education in December, 1960.

A. Thomas D. Jenkins (continued)

Professor Jenkins joined the United States Marine Corps in 1942 and was discharged as Technical Sergeant in 1945. He was appointed to the County Staff of the Ohio Cooperative Extension Service, College of Agriculture and Home Economics, as Instructor and Associate County Extension Agent in Clinton County in January, 1949, transferring to Union County in 1951 as County Agricultural Agent. He joined the State Staff of the Cooperative Extension Service as Leader of Special Projects in 1956, becoming Acting District Supervisor in 1957 and District Supervisor in 1958. He achieved the rank of Assistant Professor on July 1, 1967, and on July 1, 1969, became Associate Professor and Area Supervisor, Washington C. H. Area Center. In his capacity as Area Supervisor, Professor Jenkins was responsible for administrative and program matters affecting five Area Agents in the Washington C. H. Area Center and twenty-eight County Extension Agents in ten counties.

Professor Jenkins was a member of Epsilon Sigma Phi, Alpha Eta Chapter, the Ohio Adult Education Association, the Ohio Extension Professors Association and Gamma Sigma Delta - Agricultural Honorary. In 1966, he received the Farm Foundation Scholarship to the Extension Supervisor Program Development Workshop at Colorado State University. He was a participant in North-Central States Supervisory Workshops held at the University of Wisconsin in 1961, 1964 and 1968. In addition, he participated in three to four In-Service Training Conferences held annually.

Professor Jenkins served as ex-officio committee member on six Area Extension Industry Commodity Committees that are concerned with program development needs and problem identification (1966-69). He represented College and Extension as a member of the Southwest Ohio Water Advisory Council (1968-69).

On behalf of the University at large, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

B. Charles A. Dambach

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death on October 30, 1969, of Charles A. Dambach, Professor in and Director of the School of Natural Resources, College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

Dr. Dambach was born December 31, 1911, in Cleveland, Ohio. He was graduated from Burton High School in 1932. He attended The Ohio State University receiving the Bachelor of Science degree in 1937, Master of Science degree in 1941 and Ph.D. degree in 1945. His career in natural resource conservation began before he received his baccalaureate degree and spanned more than 35 years. He was employed by the United States

B. Charles A. Dambach (continued)

Department of Agriculture in 1934 and became Associate Regional Biologist before resigning to join the faculty of The Ohio State University in 1942. He developed and taught courses in conservation and in wildlife management and, for a time, served as Acting Director of the Ohio Cooperative Wildlife Research Unit. He also served as Director of the Ohio Conservation Laboratory. In 1950 he took a leave of absence from the University to become Chief of the Division of Wildlife of the Ohio Department of Natural Resources. In 1955 he returned to the University and became Director of the newly created Natural Resources Institute. For more than a decade the Institute functioned to stimulate and coordinate conservation activities throughout the University and in the State. In the general reorganization of the University a School of Natural Resources was organized under the leadership of Dr. Dambach and the functions of the Institute passed to the School. A program of instruction, extension and research was developed and implemented in the Autumn of 1969. In the opinion of many, including Dr. Dambach, the establishment of the School was one of the most significant events in the history of conservation in Ohio.

During his busy career he found time to serve on numerous advisory committees for governmental agencies and private foundations and to hold important offices in a number of state and national conservation organizations.

Those who knew Dr. Dambach well admired and were inspired by his indomitable spirit, his profound dedication to his work and the integrity and breadth of understanding which he exhibited. These personal qualities and the articulate manner in which he voiced his views and concerns brought substantial support for work in natural resources conservation to The Ohio State University. He engendered a loyalty in colleagues and students which was durable and effective in fostering the causes which he championed and will make his influence felt for many years. He was so engrossed in the tasks which he had set for himself that, even when he knew how little time was left, he gave of it unstintingly and without concern for his own comfort or well-being. His impressive accomplishments will challenge the best efforts of those who carry on his work and should be a source of immense inspiration and satisfaction to his family and friends.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Dr. Dambach its deep sympathy. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed in the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a sincere expression of the Board's realization of the loss which the family and the University has sustained.

The report on the University's Investment Portfolio dated November 12, 1969, and the Accountant's Report on the University Dormitory Revenue Bond Funds, including the financial statements of June 30, 1969, prepared by Peat, Marwick, Mitchell & Co., as submitted to the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees, were received and ordered to be filed with the official records of the Board.

B. Report on Student Work Projects

Mr. Frederick Jones indicated that he would like to report the following incident that he thought was quite a contrast to the Press coverage usually conveyed concerning student activities at this University. He suggested it might be refreshing for the Press to carry something favorable to our student body. The reported incident referred to was that recently a group of men students from Steeb Hall went to Mr. Dean Ramsey and volunteered to clean up Mirror Lake. Mr. Ramsey told them to go right ahead and that he would provide the necessary equipment and tools. The work was completed and the men did a tremendous job. When the job was finished, the men noted that the trucks were dirty so they were cleaned, too.

When word of this cleanup reached a group of fraternity men, they thought they had been deprived of a project and asked what they could do. They were told that there was a great deal of sodding work to be done by the new pedestrian walk across the Olentangy River. For three days these men worked on this project. They indicated that next spring they would like the responsibility of cleaning Mirror Lake.

Mr. Jones recommended that the Board of Trustees should offer these men a vote of commendation and express appreciation to them for portraying the "real image" of this University.

Upon motion of Mr. Harrod, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above recommendation was approved for inclusion in the minutes of the Board of Trustees.

Thereupon the Board adjourned to meet Thursday, December 11, 1969, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, at 10:30 a.m.

Revisions of Rule 35.07 of Rules for the University Faculty

as Approved by the Faculty Council October 14, 1969

Revisions of Rule 35.07 of Rules for the University Faculty

The Faculty Council on October 14, 1969, approved the following revisions in Rule 35.07 of <u>Rules for the University</u> Faculty, effective Winter Quarter 1970:

(1) That the first sentence of Rule 35.07 be amended so as to replace the mark \underline{S} with the mark $\underline{S/U}$, so that it reads:

The official marks of the University are as follows: A, B, C, D, E, H, I, P, R, S/U, T, X, PA/NP, EM, and K.

(2) That the phrases and sentence as underscored below be added to the material under the mark <u>P--Progress</u>.

<u>P--Progress</u>. This mark <u>may be used</u> to indicate that the student has shown satisfactory progress in courses other than <u>individual-studies</u> <u>courses</u> that extend over more than one quarter. Until such time as a final mark is recorded, the credit hours in a <u>P</u> course shall not be counted for any purpose. <u>When a final mark is recorded</u>, all previous <u>P</u> hours shall assume the value of the final mark.

(3) That the following paragraph be substituted for S--Satisfactory in the present version of Rule 35.07.

S/U--Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory

Section 1. The mark \underline{S} may be used to record either satisfactory progress in or completion of work, provided that the course has been approved for this mark by the Dean of the College offering the course, and in the case of courses carrying graduate credit, by the Graduate Council. It shall be used as an alternative to \underline{U} or \underline{I} in individual-studies courses numbered 593, 693, 793, 993, 998, and 999, and on satisfactory completion by a graduate student of a literature review course or seminar designated by the Dean of the Graduate School as qualifying for the mark of \underline{S} . \underline{S} credit shall be counted as hours only and shall not be considered in determining a student's point-hour ratio under Rule 37.05.

Section 2. The mark \underline{U} shall be used for unsatisfactory work in courses in which a student would be entitled to the mark of \underline{S} if his work had been satisfactory. No credit shall be given for work marked \underline{U} . This grade shall not be considered in determining a student's point-hour ratio under Rule 37.05.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Change the Name of the Department of Veterinary Parasitology to Department of Veterinary Microbiology and Parasitology

The Faculty Council on November 11, 1969, approved for transmittal to the Board of Trustees the proposal from the Council on Academic Affairs that the name of the Department of Veterinary Parasitology be changed to the Department of Veterinary Microbiology and Parasitology,

Dean Clarence Cole of the College of Veterinary Medicine reports that the new name would satisfy accrediting agencies, unite two fields of instruction and research that have common interests and expedite curricula revisions now under way in the College of Veterinary Medicine. Certain courses in Veterinary Microbiology have recently been transferred from the College of Biological Sciences and this change in title will more accurately signify the jurisdiction of the Department.

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the proposed change in name of the Department of Veterinary Parasitology to the Department of Veterinary Microbiology and Parasitology, effective with the 1970-1971 academic year.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

B. <u>Change the Name of the School of Physical Education to</u> School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation

On November 11, 1969, the Faculty Council, with the endorsement of the Council on Academic Affairs, approved the request from the College of Education that the name of the School of Physical Education be changed to the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

The present designation does not reflect the full scope of the existing instructional, research and professional programs carried on in the School. It becomes essential to use each separate title in the total name in order to give visibility to the various areas of responsibility. For purposes of curriculum development, recruitment of students and staff and visibility locally, statewide and national, the name of the School should be encompassing and descriptive. Colleges, schools and departments in institutions of higher education throughout the United States with similar programs and responsibilities have names involving the three major phases of their programs-health education, physical education and recreation.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

B. Change the Name of the School of Physical Education to School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation (continued)

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the proposed change in name of the School of Physical Education to School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation, effective with the 1970-1971 academic year.

Upon motion of Mr. Harrod, seconded by Mr. Gibbs, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

C. Naming of Building

Upon the recommendation of the College of Education, and with the concurrence of the President's Cabinet, President Fawcett recommended that the building located at 29 West Woodruff Avenue presently identified as University School be renamed "Ramseyer Hall" to honor the late John A. Ramseyer. Professor Ramseyer's professional career included distinguished service as a member of the faculty of University School which began in 1938 and as Director of the University School from 1948 until 1951. He subsequently achieved a distinguished career as Professor of Educational Administration and as Director of the School of Education from 1965 to 1968.

This recommendation is in accordance with the $\underline{By-Laws}$ of the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Mr. Gibbs, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the foregoing recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

D. Degrees and Certificates Conferred -- Autumn Quarter Commencement

President Fawcett recommended that degrees and certificates be conferred at the Autumn Quarter Commencement Convocation on December 19, 1969, to those students who have completed the requirements for their respective degrees and certificates and are recommended by the Faculty Council. VI. PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS

A. University Hospital - Ventilation System Improvements to 2nd Floor and 3rd Floor East

This project will provide individually controlled "through the wall" air conditioning-ventilating units at windows where feasible for the project area.

Funds for this project have been provided by a transfer from Hospital Rotary to Budget Account 801216 Hospital Air Conditioning.

B. Parking Ramp - Medical Area

This project will be located in the Medical Center area and will have five complete parking floors accommodating 1,021 cars plus a helicopter landing deck.

Funds for the portion of the project which is for parking have been provided in Budget Account 801031 (Parking Ramp - Medical Area) and for that portion of the project which is the helicopter landing deck from the University Hospital Rotary.

This project provides University-owned underground telephone ducts and manholes to connect the present campus telephone system to the new Ohio Bell Telephone Company Exchange. This will save operating funds on a continuing basis because of lower phone rates which will prevail. Additionally, the University gains the space in the new Service Building currently occupied by the present Telephone Exchange.

Funds for this project have been transferred from Item 235-015 (Board of Regents - Utilities and Renovations) to Item 315-074 Utilities and Renovations, H. B. 531.

D. Sisson Hall - Air Conditioning of Animal Holding Area

This project will provide ventilation, humidification and temperature control to Rooms 333, 335, 231, 233 and 233B the animal holding areas of Sisson Hall.

Funds for this project have been provided from Budget Account 129290 Veterinary Medicine Improvements.

E. University Hospital - Installation of Chilled Water System for Nurse Stations and Food Service Areas, 6th Through 11th Floors

This project will provide individually controlled fan coil units for air conditioning (and heating where rooms have outside walls) in nursing stations and food service areas.

Funds for this project have been provided by a transfer from Hospital Rotary to Budget Account 801216 (Hospital Air Conditioning).

A. Journalism Building Expansion - Employment of Architects (continued)

The fee is to be negotiated based upon the Architects Society of Ohio of the American Institute of Architects recommended minimum cost of service as modified by the Department of Public Works. Funds have been provided from Item 315-064 (Journalism Building Replacement), H. B. 531, and Item 235-010 (Board of Regents - Architectural Planning), H. B. 531.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

B. Campus Loop Road - Employment of Engineers

A section of the Campus Loop Road extending to Stadium Drive on the north and to the vicinity of Coffey Road on the south parallels the new alignment of the Olentangy River Expressway. Because it is contiguous to and part of the general engineering of the Expressway, it was generally agreed by the Department of Highways and The Ohio State University that the engineers for the Expressway, E. S. Preston and Associates, Ltd., be appointed as the engineers for the Campus Loop Road, the intersections pertaining thereto and the attendant changes required in the alignment of Stadium Drive between Fyffe Road and Kenny Road including such structures as are required under the railroad.

President Fawcett recommended therefore that E. S. Preston and Associates, Ltd., be appointed for this work on a cost plus fixed fee basis with the total charge not to exceed \$60,000.00. Funds have been provided in Budget Account 801219. This account will be provided by the State of Ohio from compensation for properties taken for the new Olentangy River Expressway right-of-way.

A. Carl R. Blue

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on November 5, 1969, of Carl R. Blue, Instructor, Cooperative Extension Service, College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

Mr. Blue was born December 29, 1933, on his father's farm near Mt. Vernon, Ohio. He received his Bachelor of Science degree in Agriculture from The Ohio State University in 1955 and his Master of Science degree in Agricultural Economics in 1964.

Mr. Blue served in the United States Army from 1955 to 1957. He was appointed to the County Staff of the Ohio Cooperative Extension Service, College of Agriculture and Home Economics, as Instructor and Associate County Extension Agent in Trumbull County in November 1957. He transferred to Portage County in 1963 as County Agricultural Agent. He joined the Area Extension Staff of the Cooperative Extension Service as an Area Extension Agent, Farm Management, in January 1965. In his capacity as Area Agent in Farm Management, Mr. Blue was responsible for the farm management program in ten counties served by the Washington Court House Center.

Mr. Blue was a member of the Epsilon Sigma Phi - Alpha Eta Chapter, and participated in many In-Service Training Conferences. In Washington Court House he was President of the Union P. T. O., President of the Kiwanis Club, member of the Church Board of Grace Methodist Church and Sunday School teacher for an adult class.

B. Cecil Ernest Boord

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on November 3, 1969, of Cecil Ernest Boord, Professor Emeritus of Chemistry.

Professor Boord was born in Veedersburg, Indiana, on June 29, 1884. He obtained his undergraduate education at Wabash College in Indiana, graduating with an A. B. degree in 1907. He entered graduate school on a Fellowship at The Ohio State University in 1907. Here he studied chemistry with the late Professor William McPherson and earned the A. M. degree in 1909 and the Ph. D. degree in 1912. He remained at Ohio State as an Instructor, was advanced to the rank of Assistant Professor in 1914 and Professor in 1924. In 1951 he was promoted to the highest faculty rank at that time, namely Research Professor. He held this position until his retirement as Professor Emeritus in 1954.

During his career at Ohio State, Professor Boord became known internationally for his research in hydrocarbon chemistry. This work started during World War I when the need for higher quality motor fuels for automotive and aviation vehicles became critical. Professor Boord and his students began study of methods of synthesis of pure hydrocarbons, particularly of olefins, then relatively inaccessible and poorly known. Much of his work--the basis for numerous masters' theses and doctoral dissertations--dealt with the development of the bromo-ether synthesis, perhaps best known of Professor Boord's discoveries.

By 1938, Professor Boord had organized and become director of the now famous hydrocarbon research project on the campus, under the auspices of the American Petroleum Institute. His scientific contributions through this project included methods of synthesis and analysis of the hydrocarbons which make up petroleum and petroleum products. Through the synthesis of practical amounts of many pure compounds, he also opened up avenues of research for other chemists in related fields.

In scientific and industrial circles, Professor Boord earned the titles of "dean of hydrocarbon chemistry" and "designer and builder of gasolines" through his long years of pioneering research in the synthesis and testing of the hydrocarbon components of gasoline. Both designations emphasize the fundamental as well as the practical significance of his contributions. The work of Boord and his students was quickly recognized by the petroleum industry and speeded the development of processes for production of aviation gasoline, the "high octane" which gave allied fliers a winning edge in the battles of North Africa and of Britain in World War II. In 1951 the leaders of the petroleum industry invited Professor Boord to present the results of his hydrocarbon research at the 3rd World Petroleum Congress held at The Hague, Netherlands.

In 1955 the University presented to Professor Emeritus Boord the Joseph Sullivant Medal, one of the highest honors the University can bestow, in recognition of "notable achievement" in the arts and sciences by an alumnus or a faculty member.

A distinguished teacher as well as a research scientist, Dr. Boord gave counsel and direction to 81 candidates for the doctoral degree and 104 for the master's degree during his years on campus. Thousands of other former students remember him as a lucid lecturer, a deep thinker, a patient and understanding counselor.

During his lifetime he wrote numerous scientific papers for publication in journals, magazines and collective volumes. He co-authored a laboratory manual in organic chemistry that achieved wide use. He helped invent and develop the teaching aid known as "Molecular Models," the first and still the best known of its kind.

He was a member of Sigma Xi, Phi Beta Kappa, Phi Lambda Upsilon, American Association for the Advancement of Science, American Chemical Society, American Petroleum Institute, The Ohio Academy of Science, The New York Academy of Science (Fellow), The O.S.U. Faculty Club, Torch Club and Indianola Presbyterian Church.

C. Ray A. Linville

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death on November 13, 1969, of Ray A. Linville, Associate Professor (Extension Agronomist), Cooperative Extension Service, College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

Mr. Linville was born June 16, 1921, in Urbana, Ohio. He was graduated from Salem High School in 1939. He attended The Ohio State University receiving the Bachelor of Science degree in 1949 and the Master of Science degree in 1950. He served as Laboratory Assistant in the Chemistry Department as an undergraduate, and as Assistant Agronomist (Soil Testing) after receiving his bachelor's degree. Mr. Linville was author of several publications on soil testing, soil and plant analysis and helped design and implement the first complete digital readout system in a soil testing laboratory. He served on the faculty since 1951 in the agronomy extension service.

During his busy career in soil testing and analysis, he found time to serve on numerous committees in the American Society of Agronomy, Soil Science Society of America and the Aircraft Owners and Pilot Association. He was a member of Epsilon Sigma Phi, Sigma Xi and Gamma Sigma Delta.

Those who knew Mr. Linville admired his dedication to his work and his integrity and the articulate manner in which he supervised the rapidly expanding soil testing program.

D. William H. Palmer

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death on November 15, 1969, of William H. Palmer, Professor Emeritus, Cooperative Extension Service, College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

Mr. Palmer was born in Fairfield County on July 9, 1882. He received his Bachelor of Science degree from The Ohio State University in 1905 and his Master's degree in animal husbandry in 1907. After operating his home farm, he returned to Ohio State as an animal husbandry specialist in 1912. He became the first State 4-H Leader in 1916 and served in that capacity until his retirement from the Cooperative Extension Service in 1952.

During his thirty-five years as State 4-H Leader the boys and girls club program developed into an active 4-H program in each of Ohio's eightyeight counties. The Ohio 4-H Club Congress, Ohio 4-H Foundation and the State 4-H Advisory Committee all were developed during his active years of service. Camp Palmer, 4-H camp in Fulton County, was named in his honor in 1948. He received national recognition for his achievements through the National 4-H Center. The Ohio Room in the National 4-H Center was dedicated in his honor, with his portrait prominently displayed at this National 4-H Center.

Mr. Palmer had a strong belief in the use of voluntary 4-H advisors. He thoroughly believed that active, voluntary 4-H advisors, trained by the Extension Service staff, would make a strong youth program in Ohio, and time has proved him right.

It was directed that this resolution be inscribed in the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a sincere expression of the Board's realization of the loss which the family and the University have sustained.

E. Johannes Friedrich Schwar

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on November 9, 1969, of Johannes Friedrich Schwar, Professor of Civil Engineering and Director of the Transportation Research Center.

Dr. Johannes Schwar was born in Dorfilm in the province of Thuringia, Germany, on April 14, 1925. His family moved to South Africa in 1928 and it was there that he received his early education, culminating in a bachelor's degree in engineering from the University of Stellenbosch in 1949.

Subsequently, employed by the South African Department of Transport as a road engineer, he attended Yale University under an International Road Federation Fellowship in 1952-53, receiving an award as the outstanding IRF Scholar of that year. Upon his return to South Africa he served with the Department of Transport as a traffic engineer until 1958 when he came

again to the United States as a graduate student at Northwestern University. From that school he received a master's degree in 1959 and a doctorate in 1961.

Dr. Schwar was appointed Assistant Professor of Civil Engineering at The Ohio State University, September, 1961, promoted to Associate Professor in 1964 and to full Professor in 1966. In 1962 he became Director of the Transportation Research Center and shortly thereafter became actively engaged in promoting the creation of a very large transportation research center which would permit extensive full scale testing of both transportation hardware and of novel ideas in the field of transportation. His enthusiasm for this development was infectious and eventually the concept received the support of highway administration officials in Ohio and the Governor of Ohio. With the appropriation of state funds, acquisition of a large tract of land has been accomplished and planning of the facility is being carried out actively. Fate was indeed unkind to have denied him the ultimate satisfaction of seeing his dream translated into tangible test facilities of a scope unequaled elsewhere in the world.

Johannes Schwar contributed extensively to the research and educational literature in the field of transportation and traffic and was held in high esteem by the many graduate students whom he advised. However, it was his engaging personality and genial nature that endeared him to his many friends and also enabled him to distinguish himself in diplomatic liaison between the University research personnel and various sponsors of research efforts. To this task he brought an unusual combination of technical competence, good judgment, equanimity and tact.

Dr. Schwar was a member of several professional societies, including the American Society of Civil Engineers, American Road Builders Association, Institute of Traffic Engineers and served on national and state technical committees dealing with traffic and traffic safety. He had served as Chairman of Committee TO-7 "Quality of Traffic Service" of the Highway Research Board since 1967. Yet his greatest satisfactions seemed to come from teaching and he often observed that teaching was what he most wished to do. The University has lost an energetic, progressive scholar; society an aware and concerned citizen; and his profession a competent and creative practitioner.

In 1950 he received his Bachelor of Science degree from Arizona State University. He came to Ohio as a Research Fellow in 1951 to continue graduate work in agronomy, receiving his Master of Science degree in 1952 and his Ph.D. degree in 1959. Prior to his employment as Extension Agronomist in 1953 he was with the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center at Wooster. He assumed leadership in the soil fertility and lime aspects of the total Extension Agronomy program in Ohio. In addition, he taught a soil management course in the Department of Agronomy. He was author of several soil fertility bulletins and articles in scientific journals, trade journals and popular publications.

During his busy career in soil fertility education, he found time to develop effective visual aids to carry out programs in all areas of the state. He served on numerous committees in the American Society of Agronomy, the Soil Science Society of America, the International Society of Soil Science and was Secretary of the Ohio Soil Fertility Education Society. Dr. Shoemaker was a member of Epsilon Sigma Phi, Gamma Sigma Delta and the Ohio Extension Professors Association.

Those who knew Dr. Shoemaker admired him for his dedication to his work, his enthusiasm in teaching and for the sincere efforts exhibited to make his teaching more effective. He was an active and loyal team member in every group in which he participated.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Dr. Shoemaker its deep sympathy. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed in the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a sincere expression of the Board's realization of the loss which the family and the University have sustained.

G. J. Robert Tompkin

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on November 19, 1969, of J. Robert Tompkin, Professor of Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology.

Professor Tompkin was born in Fargo, North Dakota, August 5, 1916. He received his Bachelor of Science degree in Agricultural Economics from Iowa State University in March 1943. Following graduation he spent one year as a supervising statistician for the United States Department of Agriculture, Agricultural Marketing Service, in Des Moines, Iowa, and two years as chief statistician for Lapant-Choate Manufacturing Company of Cedar Rapids, Iowa. He served as a Lieutenant (j.g.) for the U. S. Navy in the Pacific Theatre from 1944 to 1946. Upon his return, he entered the graduate school at the University of Illinois and received his Master of Science degree in 1947. His doctorate degree was earned at Iowa State University in the field of Agricultural Economics and was completed in 1950.

In September 1950 he was appointed Assistant Professor of Agricultural Economics at the University of Wyoming. He accepted the responsibility of directing the department's graduate program and introduced several new graduate courses during the five years he spent at Laramie. He carried on important research activities throughout the state and counted most of the large ranchers as close friends. He accepted an appointment with the Economic Research Service of the United States Department of Agriculture and was assigned to work in cooperation with The Ohio State University in January 1956. He soon was asked to teach graduate courses, chair important committees and counsel graduate students. He became a very active participant in research projects of the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center and The Ohio State University Research Foundation. He spent two years in Brazil where he served as a special consultant to the Secretary of Agriculture of the State of Sao Paulo. He also taught courses and conducted seminars in their native language, Portuguese.

Dr. Tompkin always maintained a vital interest in research methodology. He constantly challenged the graduate students that he advised to use the best and seek out new techniques of carrying out research. He helped develop new applications of linear programming to farm management decision making. He was intensely interested in helping farmers caught in the cost-price squeeze make sound adjustments in their farming plans.

Professor Tompkin was author or co-author of over 100 publications in the field of farm management, taxation, appraisal, policy, tenure, farm organization, farm adjustment, farm income, statistics and credit. He was a member of the American Agricultural Economics Association, the Ohio Society of Farm Managers and Rural Appraisers, Gamma Sigma Delta and Phi Kappa Phi.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. EDWARD A. HOBART

Doctor of Science

Engineer of unusual capabilities, scientist, inventor, industrial organizer, civic leader, and one of the great pioncers of the welding industry

Edward A. Hobart, President and Chairman of the Board of the Hobart Brothers Company of Troy, Ohio, has made the Hobart name synonymous with industrial progress. The pioneering work he did as a young man resulted in 34 significant patents and formed a basis for products and product development for the new company which he founded with his brother.

In World War II, he served his country in the development of portable welding equipment, power units for anti-aircraft gun implacements, radar power units as well as power units for the Early Warning Radar line. As the aviation industry grew, mobile ground power equipment was needed, first for internal engines and then for jet engines. Mr. Hobart's leadership and his work insured that such equipment was developed.

The welding field captured Mr. Hobart's principle interest, and with his associates, he devoted his attention to the task of advancing this new field. Soon he realized that if the industry were to grow it would require not only equipment to obtain the welding arc but also new kinds of electrodes. The Korean War, however, caused a shortage of rutile, a basic component of electrode manufacturing. Mr. Hobart's response was to develop a process for the separation of rutile from Florida sands, work for which he was awarded three patents and from which evolved a new mining venture which he helped to organize. Today, because of his efforts, the United States is independent of overseas sources of rutile, a material useful in many industries.

A shortage of welding operators prompted him to begin a trade school which later grew into a modern technical institute. As the Hobart organization expanded, he designed and constructed its facilities. The influx of many new people to local industry created a shortage of suitable housing and recreational facilities in the small town of Troy. Mr. Hobart personally developed several subdivisions which provided more than one thousand homes in pleasant surroundings and assisted in the development of public parks, a stadium, and other recreational facilities valued at more than one million dollars.

Edward A. Hobart has been quick to identify the challenges facing our country and has responded creatively to meet the problems of change with effective solutions. The Ohio State University is privileged to honor this distinguished alumnus for his many contributions to his fellow man. Page 302 Blank

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Naming of Buildings

Upon the recommendation of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, and with the concurrence of the President's Cabinet, President Fawcett recommended that the building located at 1827 Neil Avenue presently identified as the Horticulture and Forestry Building be renamed "Lazenby Hall," to honor the memory of Professor William Rane Lazenby, the first Chairman of Horticulture at The Ohio State University and the first Director of the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station (now the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center).

Also upon the recommendation of the Department of Chemistry, and with the concurrence of the President's Cabinet, President Fawcett recommended that the building located at 176 West 19th Avenue now known as the Research Laboratory be renamed "Herrick L. Johnston Laboratory." The late Professor Johnston was a member of the Chemistry Department from 1929 to 1954 and was one of the persons primarily responsible for the construction of the building and the establishment of the cryogenic laboratory which was housed in this building.

These recommendations are in accordance with the <u>Bylaws of the Board of</u> Trustees.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Harrod, the Board of Trustees approved the foregoing recommendations by unanimous voice vote.

B. Establishment of Programs Leading to Certificate of Medical Illustration and Certificate of Circulation Technology

The Faculty Council on December 9, 1969, with the endorsement of the Council on Academic Affairs, approved the request from the School of Allied Medical Professions that the certificate programs currently offered be expanded to include a Certificate of Medical Illustration and Certificate of Circulation Technology.

There is precedent for such certificate programs in the School of Allied Medical Professions since the Physical Therapy Division gives postbaccalaureate certificates in a program approved by the Faculty Council and Board of Trustees.

The certificates in Medical Illustration and Circulation Technology are requested for students who hold baccalaureate degrees from this or other institutions of higher learning. The curricular program will provide professional preparation for those who wish to become medical illustrators or circulation technologists who have taken their baccalaureate work in another field. These certificates will require one year of studies of a professional nature. The certificate will provide the student with valid evidence of this professional training beyond the baccalaureate degree and will enable him to practice his profession.

 - B. <u>Establishment of Programs Leading to Certificate of Medical</u> <u>Illustration and Certificate of Circulation Technology</u> (continued)

President Fawcett recommended that the foregoing certificate programs be approved by the Board of Trustees, effective with Summer Quarter, 1970.

Upon motion of Mr. Eckley, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the Board of Trustees approved the foregoing recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

C. <u>Revisions of Rules 35.07, 37.15 and 47.01</u> of <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u>

On December 9, 1969, the Faculty Council approved revisions in the <u>Rules</u> for the <u>University Faculty</u> which relate to changes necessary for the marks on student records when students withdraw from courses or from the University.

- That the marks WP and WF Withdrawal be added to Rule 35.07 as two of the approved marks of the University. (See complete text of changes in Appendix IV, page 381.)
- 2. That the present Rule 37.15 be deleted and that the new Rule 37.15 be substituted for the old rule. This rule provides for the mark WP for passing work or WF for failing work at the time a student withdraws from University courses between the sixth and eighth weeks of the quarter. After the eighth week, the student receives WP or E as his mark in any courses from which he withdraws.
- 3. That the present Rule 47.01 on Withdrawal from the University be modified to make it possible for a student to withdraw of his own volition during the first eight weeks of the quarter. The student's record will be marked in accordance with Rule 37.15 on withdrawal from courses.

President Fawcett recommended that the foregoing changes in <u>Rules for the</u> <u>University Faculty</u> be approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Dunlap, the Board of Trustees approved the foregoing recommendation by unanimous voice vote, and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees was further instructed and given authority to make the foregoing changes in the next printing of the <u>Rules for the University</u> Faculty.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

D. Reprinted Publication Entitled--<u>Statutes Applying to the University</u>, Bylaws of the Board of Trustees and Rules for the University Faculty

The publication entitled, <u>Statutes Applying to the University</u>, <u>Bylaws of the</u> <u>Board of Trustees and Rules for the University Faculty</u>, has been reprinted to conform to the changes which have been approved by the Board of Trustees since the last publication in January, 1968. The statutes of the Ohio Revised Code pertaining to The Ohio State University and printed in this publication have been revised to include those actions adopted by the 108th General Assembly.

President Fawcett recommended that this publication be accepted in its reprinted form as the official publication of the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Mr. Harrod, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

E. Elimination of Office of Research and Incorporation of Duties in the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost

President Fawcett recommended that proposed changes in the <u>Bylaws of the</u> <u>Board of Trustees and Rules for the University Faculty</u> to accommodate the elimination of the Vice President for Research as a separate office and entity and incorporation of the authority and duties relative to research and sponsored programs within the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost be approved. It was recommended further that the Secretary be authorized to make the appropriate substantive and editorial changes to accommodate this reorganization in the next printing of the Bylaws of the Board of Trustees and Rules for the University Faculty.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the foregoing recommendations by unanimous voice vote.

F. Honorary Degrees

The Faculty Council on January 13, 1970, recommended twenty-three recipients for honorary degrees to be conferred during the Centennial Year. President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the Faculty Council recommendation. The names of the recipients will be announced at appropriate times during the Centennial Year.

Upon motion of Mr. Dunlap, seconded by Mr. Harrod, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

G. Adoption of an Official Seal for the College of Dentistry

The faculty of the College of Dentistry has proposed that a seal be adopted for use by the College. This seal, symbolic of the relationship of the profession of Dentistry to education at The Ohio State University, is described as follows:

The "O" with the open book and buckeye leaf are part of the University seal and signify learning. The "O" also represents the Greek letter <u>Omicron</u> which is the first letter of the Greek word Odont meaning tooth.

The triangle represents the Greek letter <u>Delta</u> which together with the cautery and the branches with leaves and berries are symbolic of the profession of Dentistry. The leaves represent the thirty-two teeth in the permanent dentition, the berries the twenty teeth in the deciduous dentition.

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the proposed seal as submitted by the Dean of the College of Dentistry and described above, and further, that the original copy of the seal be filed with the official records of the University.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. Eckley, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendations by unanimous voice vote.

H. Authorization for the Filing of Application for Grant Funds Under Title VII of the Public Health Service Act, as Amended

In making an application for grant funds for expansion of the University's medical facilities under Title VII of the Public Health Service Act, as amended, this Board is required to approve the following resolution:

This Board authorizes and directs that an application be filed with the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare under Title VII of the Public Health Service Act, as amended, for a grant to support the development of a Clinical Medical Sciences Education Facility (Inpatient Teaching Facility).

The Board designates Novice G. Fawcett, President of The Ohio State University, as the person authorized to file this application and act as the representative of the University in all matters relating to this application and Gordon B. Carson, Vice President for Business and Finance, as the alternate.

And finally, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University is cognizant of the conditions under which such grant funds are made available and approved for payment to an applicant.

C. Agreement Between The Ohio State University and Ashland College

VII. PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS

At the request of the Vice President for Business and Finance, President Fawcett recommended that the plans and specifications, bills of materials and estimates of cost for the following projects be approved by the Board of Trustees:

A. Olentangy River - Channel Improvements

The Olentangy River Freeway relocation is taking approximately 20 to 25 feet off the west bank of the river. In order to keep the river channel open, it is necessary to widen the east bank of the river. This project will include widening with complete landscaping.

Funds for this project will be provided by the State of Ohio from compensation for properties taken for the new Olentangy River Expressway right-ofway and be made available in Budget Account 801219.

B. Street and Curb Repairs - 1969-70

This project will repair street base and provide resurfacing of streets with asphaltic concrete; repair and/or replace existing deteriorating or destroyed curbing; and adjust all manholes, valve boxes and storm inlets to the new grade for several Campus streets.

Funds for this project have been provided in Budget Account 124358 (Contract Repair).

X. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

A. <u>Olentangy River - Channel Improvements</u>, Employment of Engineers

President Fawcett recommended that the firm of Hockaden-Lipes-Rousculp, Inc., be employed to provide plans and specifications for this project including the dredging, seeding and mulching of the east bank of the Olentangy River in connection with the Ohio Highway Department relocation of the Olentangy River Freeway.

XI. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of John Bernis Brown, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Physiological Chemistry, and Jay Nagle Edmondson, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Industrial Engineering. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

A. John Bernis Brown

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on November 21, 1969, of John Bernis Brown, Professor Emeritus and former Chairman of the Department of Physiological Chemistry.

XI. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM (continued)

A. John Bernis Brown (continued)

Doctor Brown was born December 25, 1893, on a farm near Rock Falls, Illinois. He was graduated from the University of Illinois where he earned three degrees--the B.S. degree in 1915, the M.S. degree in 1917 and the Ph.D. degree in 1921. His studies were interrupted by the first World War when he served as a Lieutenant in the U.S. Army.

From 1915 to 1921, Dr. Brown served as a Teaching Assistant at the University of Illinois and from 1921 to 1923, he served as Teaching Associate at the University of Pennsylvania. He came to Ohio State in 1924 as an Assistant Professor, was promoted in 1930 to Associate Professor and in 1941 was made Professor. In 1950, he was named Director of the Institute of Nutrition and Food Technology and in 1957 he was named Chairman of the Department of Physiological Chemistry. He was named Professor Emeritus in 1966.

For 25 years Dr. Brown gave all the lectures in a two-quarter course in medical biochemistry, a one-quarter course in dental biochemistry and a one-quarter course in dental nutrition. He was elected by the University faculty to many of its major councils and served by appointment on innumerable college and University committees. He received an Award of Merit from the Alumni Association of the College of Medicine and the University presented him with a Distinguished Service Award in 1964.

Dr. Brown authored more than 125 scientific papers and achieved an international reputation as one of the nation's foremost authorities on chemistry of fats, oils and fatty acids. In addition to serving on many government committees, Dr. Brown was the Chairman of the Division of Biological Chemistry of the American Chemical Society and the Treasurer of the American Institute of Nutrition; he was later elected a Fellow of that Institute. He served on committees of the National Research Council and was at various times a member of editorial boards of several scientific journals.

For 17 years, Dr. Brown was the Choir Director of Trinity Methodist Church and served several times as President of the Board of Trustees for that church. He was a past President of the Faculty Club and the Mercator Club and an officer in several Masonic bodies.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the College of Medicine and the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

B. Jay Nagle Edmondson

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on December 31, 1969, of Jay Nagle Edmondson, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Industrial Engineering.

Professor Edmondson was born in Milton, Iowa, on November 30, 1905. He received his high school diploma from Milton High School in 1922 and was awarded a two-year scholarship for any Iowa college of his choice. After completing the pre-engineering program at Parsons College in 1924, he transferred to the University of Iowa where he earned the degree Bachelor of Science in General Engineering in February, 1927. The University of Iowa awarded him the professional degree Mechanical Engineer in 1947.

Professor Edmondson had a distinguished career as an engineering educator, starting at the University of Iowa in 1927 as Instructor in Surveying and Engineering Drawing. He came to The Ohio State University in 1928 as Instructor in Engineering Drawing and served in the Department of Engineering Drawing through 1945. He was appointed Professor of Industrial Engineering in 1946 and served in that capacity until his retirement in 1963. His primary fields of interest were Production Engineering and Tool Engineering. His major contributions to the educational program were in these fields in which he developed the program of course work to such a level of excellence that it received national recognition. He was responsible for the acquisition on campus of a metrology laboratory known as a U. S. Navy Gage Laboratory making The Ohio State University one of six universities in the United States so equipped and recognized.

Professor Edmondson was highly regarded as an engineer and he had an extensive summer and part-time consulting practice providing experience which he used effectively to enhance the development of his production engineering course for the benefit of his students. He was an active member of the American Society of Tool Engineers serving on seven local chapter and national organization offices and committees. He was particularly active in those areas of concern to students, such as committees on education, scholarships, research funds and professional engineering. Many students benefited from his efforts on their behalf through his professional work and service with the American Society of Tool Engineers. His students characterized him as an engineer's engineer, and indeed he was, successfully accomplishing the sometimes difficult task of being both an engineering educator and a practicing engineer.

Beginning in his youth he was a radio operator and member of the Radio Relay League. He served as a shipboard radioman on Great Lakes and Atlantic Ocean ships as part-time and summer operator developing a lifelong hobby and interest in the field, extending to a professional interest in radio and electronic product design and production engineering. He had many friends and acquaintances throughout the world who communicated with him and knew him through W8SL, the code call for his radio station.

B. Jay Nagle Edmondson (continued)

Professor Edmondson worked for several summers at the National Bureau of Standards in Colorado prior to his retirement from The Ohio State University. His love for the mountains and for trout fishing in the mountain streams was well known to his friends and colleagues. They were not surprised to learn that following retirement he was employed as a Technical Consultant to the Executive Director of the Boulder Laboratory where he continued his energetic pursuit of his professional career in the beloved setting of the Colorado Rockies.

His dedicated service to his students and to his profession is appreciatively recognized by his students and his colleagues alike.

On behalf of the University at large, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

A. <u>Change of Date for the Filing of Application for Admission</u> to the University and Possible Fee Increases

President Fawcett made the following statement relative to the change in date for the filing of application for admission to the University and possible fee increases:

All of us need to recognize as I reported to you last October, that the University faces some new kinds of problems, particularly in the field of total enrollments and admissions. Included in House Bill 531 of the last General Assembly, was an enrollment ceiling of 40,000 students on what is referred to as the "central campus" of this University effective Autumn Quarter of 1971. Our recollection of the dialogue that preceded the enactment of that Bill was that the limitation was exclusive of the enrollments within our University College. We have recently been informed that this is also the interpretation of the Office of the Board of Regents, but with the additional qualification that only those students taught in the University College's West Campus facilities be exempted for the 40,000 student limitation.

Starting with the Autumn Quarter of 1970, the final day for filing applications for admission to this University is being advanced from August 1 to May 1. There are several reasons for the establishment of an earlier application date. First, it is necessary to enable us to adjust our enrollments to conform with the law. There is no point in being anything

but candid about it, by following this procedure we will of necessity be refusing admission to a substantial number of students. This will also mean that we will have very few more people on this campus next year than we have had this present year. This earlier date will also give the departments and faculty the benefit for more adequate planning to accommodate the enrollments. I am reporting this action to you this morning so that you will fully understand its implications.

The second matter which I wish to comment on briefly pertains to a possible fee increase for the coming academic year. There are apparently a number of rumors making the rounds on this subject, so I believe a brief comment from me would appear to be warranted. I have seen in the papers and heard from other sources that I was going to recommend some action on fees this morning--I haven't, I'm not and I don't intend to at least for two or three months if I do at all. We are presently in the process of studying the financial requirements of this University for the second year of the biennium. Since all other sources of revenue are fixed for the biennium, the only margin of flexibility that is available to make up any deficit in our financial needs is through a student fee increase. I have consistently opposed such increases but I have often lost the argument when the point is reached where all other resources are exhausted and a choice must be made between sustaining the quality of our educational programs or increasing fees. During the next two or three months I am going to review every conceivable way of carrying this University forward without a fee increase. And if I do have to recommend a fee increase, I can tell you now that it will be a modest one.

B. <u>Highlights of University Activities</u>

President Fawcett reported to the Board on some of the significant activities that have taken place in recent weeks. Some references included in the report, which is filed with the official records of the Secretary, were as follows:

- B. Highlights of University Activities (continued)
 - The National Institutes of Health have granted some \$13.3 million to the University for construction projects in the Colleges of Medicine and Dentistry. The amount of \$8.5 million will help finance a five-story ambulatory patient teaching facility and nearly \$1.5 million will aid in construction of the new Health Sciences Library. A \$3.4 million grant will support financing of an addition to the Dentistry Building. Both Medicine and Dentistry will be increasing their enrollments significantly as these expanded facilities become available. Dean Richard L. Meiling of the College of Medicine has announced plans to substitute a three-year curriculum for the present four years of study.
 - 2. The cover study for the February 7 issue of the <u>Saturday Review</u> featured the role of a scientific team from Ohio <u>State's Institute</u> of Polar Studies in a dramatic fossil find in Antarctica.
 - 3. Secretary of Agriculture Clifford W. Hardin and Secretary of the Interior Walter J. Hickel, two members of President Nixon's Cabinet, are speaking today in Mershon Auditorium at a special Centennial Symposium on "Life and Living: 1980-2000." The two-day symposium is sponsored by the College of Agriculture and Home Economics as one of the major events of the University's Centennial Year.
 - 4. The first official program in observance of Ohio State's 100th anniversary was a "Centennibration" sponsored by students on January 10, 1970, in the Ohio Union.
 - 5. Ohio State is one of three newcomers on the list of the 15 institutions which received the largest Institutional Grants for Science from the National Science Foundation during 1969.
 - 6. Members of the 1969 graduating class have made the largest senior class gift in the history of the University. The Development Fund announced that the class has pledged \$25,054 to be used as a loan fund for future students.
 - A report of the National Academy of Sciences shows that Ohio State ranks fifth among the state universities in the Big Ten in the number of postdoctoral students. Ohio State has 109 postdoctorals--74 U.S. citizens and 35 hold foreign citizenship.
- C. Report on the University's Investment Portfolio

The report dated February 11, 1970, as submitted to the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees by Vice President Gordon B. Carson pertaining to the University's Investment Portfolio, was received and ordered to be filed with the official records of the Board of Trustees.

Revisions of Rules 35.07, 37.15 and 47.01 of Rules for the University Faculty

Revisions of Rules 35.07, 37.15 and 47.01 of Rules for the University Faculty

The Faculty Council on December 9, 1969, approved the following revisions in Rules 35.07, 37.15 and 47.01 of Rules for the University Faculty:

35.07. Marks.

 That the first sentence of Rule 35.07 be amended to include WP/WF in the list of official marks of the University.

The official marks of the University are as follows: A, B, C, D, E, H, I, P, R, S/U, T, X, WP/WF, PA/NP, EM and K.

- (2) That the WP/WF Withdrawal be added to the list of marks.
 - WP/WF Withdrawal. After a student may no longer withdraw from a course without a mark on his official permanent record, WP shows withdrawal while passing and WF withdrawal while failing.

37.15. Withdrawal from Courses.

Section 1. An undergraduate student who desires to withdraw from all his courses, i.e., from the University, or from one or more of his courses, must first apply to the Dean of his College or to the Dean's authorized representative. For compulsory course withdrawal, see Rule 41.07.

Section 2. Before noon of the sixth Saturday of a quarter, an undergraduate student may withdraw from all courses, or from one or more courses beginning in the same quarter, and no mark will be entered on his official permanent record. For return of fees, see Rule 43.09.

Section 3. Between noon of the sixth Saturday and noon of the eighth Saturday of a quarter, an undergraduate student may withdraw from all courses, or from one or more courses beginning in the same quarter, and his official permanent record shall bear the notation WP if he withdrew passing or WF if he withdrew failing.

Section 4. After noon of the eighth Saturday of a quarter, an undergraduate student may withdraw from one or more courses, or all courses, and his official permanent record shall bear the notation WP if he withdrew passing or the grade E if he withdrew failing.

Section 5. If an undergraduate student withdraws at any time during the quarter from a course continued from a preceding quarter, his official permanent record in that course shall bear the notation WP if he withdrew passing or the grade E if he withdrew failing.

37.15. Withdrawal from Courses. (continued)

Section 6. In the foregoing, courses extending throughout the quarter are presumed. For courses offered on a five-week term basis, wherever the expression "sixth Saturday" occurs, substitute "third Saturday," and wherever the expression "eighth Saturday" occurs, substitute "fourth Saturday."

Section 7. The Graduate School and graduate professional colleges shall formulate appropriate rules to govern withdrawal from courses in their respective curricula, subject to the approval of the Council on Academic Affairs, and publish these rules in their respective catalogs.

47.01. Withdrawal from the University.

A student who desires to withdraw from the University must apply for permission to the Dean of his College or to the Dean's authorized representative, in accordance with Rule 37.15. If the student severs his connections with the University at any time during a quarter without communicating with the Dean of his College, he shall be marked as having failed in all his courses for the quarter.

When a student withdraws from the University during a quarter, his parent or guardian shall be notified of the fact by the Secretary of his College. For return of fees, see Rule 43.09. For withdrawal from a course, see Rule 37.15.

- 1. \$2,500,000 for three endowed chairs and eight named professorships.
- 2. \$2,250,000 for fellowships, scholarships and loans for deserving students.
- 3. \$2,000,000 for support of a center for the study of contemporary problems to be established in 1970.
- 4. \$1,750,000 for strengthening programs in environmental quality; completing the Center for Tomorrow; planning a center for the performing arts; and supporting selected academic and research programs.
- \$1,500,000 to meet some of the needs and assist in planning future programs in the area of recreation, intramural activities and athletics.

VI. PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS

At the request of the Vice President for Business and Finance, President Fawcett recommended that the plans and specifications, bills of materials and estimates of cost for the following projects be approved by the Board of Trustees:

This project will include the conversion of the west basement area to a Library for Biochemistry, Biophysics and Microbiology; the remodeling of three second floor rooms to provide Faculty Research Laboratories for the Zoology Department; and the upgrading of rest room facilities.

Funds for this project have been provided by a transfer from Budget Account 149997 (New Programs Reserve) to Budget Account 801207 (Lazenby Hall Remodeling).

C. Railroad Siding Removal and Site Restoration

This project will include the removal of all railroad tracks from the east Limited Access line, Highway 315, to The Ohio State University Power Plant; the delivery of all usable standard rails and devices to storage; and the repair and restoration of the site, including blacktop, seeding and sodding, etc., as necessary.

Funds for this project will be provided by the State of Ohio from compensation for properties taken for the new Olentangy River Expressway right-of-way and made available in Budget Account 801211.

D. McCracken Power Plant - Fuel Oil Storage Addition

This project will increase the capacity of the "Fuel Oil Storage System" from 160,000 gallons to 360,000 gallons thus increasing the time the University can operate during gas supply outages.

Funds for this project have been provided from Item 315-074, H. B. 531 (Utilities and Renovation).

VI. PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS (continued)

E. <u>Buckeye Village - Modernization of Electrical</u> Systems in Phase I Buildings

This project provides for upgrading of the electrical distribution systems in 15 of the married student housing apartment buildings consisting of 200 individual apartments.

Funds for this project have been provided in Budget Account 998295 (Dormitory Contingency Fund).

F. Hughes Hall - Electrical Distribution

This project will provide new power transformers, main electric switchboard and distribution wiring to new panelboards to accommodate the increase of lighting levels, air conditioning and other power loads.

Funds for this project have been provided from Budget Account 124358 (Contract Repair).

G. Hamilton Hall - Replacement of Two Elevators

This project consists of removing the existing elevator equipment and the installation of two new units having increased speed, automatic controls, reliable safety devices and operating devices in compliance with present day code requirements.

Funds for this project have been provided from Budget Account 124358 (Contract Repair).

H. Lighting in Mirror Lake Area

This project will provide additional lighting to improve pedestrian safety.

Funds for this project have been provided from Budget Account 124358 (Contract Repair).

I. McPherson Chemical Laboratory - Corridor Renovation

This project will provide complete restoration of the first and second floor corridors, including replacement of plaster walls, patching plaster walls, ceramic tile wainscoating, vinyl wall coverings, acoustical ceilings and relocation and installation of flourescent fixtures.

Funds for this project have been provided from Budget Account 124358 (Contract Repair).

J. Means Hall - Ventilation System Improvements - Phase I

This project will provide individually controlled through-the-wall air conditioning units in rooms having outside walls.

J. Means Hall - Ventilation Systems Improvements - Phase I (continued)

Funds for this project have been provided by a transfer from Budget Account 809998 (Hospital Capital Reserve) to Budget Account 801224 (Air Conditioning Means Hall).

Upon motion of Mr. Dunlap, seconded by Mr. Hilliker, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous roll call vote, and the Secretary was authorized and directed to sign the plans and specifications for the above projects for and on behalf of the Board of Trustees. Vice President Carson was directed to proceed with a request for bids in the normal University manner and if satisfactory bids are received, to proceed with the award of contracts. All action regarding this matter will be reported to the Board of Trustees at a later meeting.

VII. REPORT OF AWARD OF CONTRACTS

A. University Hospital - Improvements to Ventilation System of 6th Floor and 8 East Nursing Stations (Extension of Project)

On February 12, 1970, the Board of Trustees approved the award of contracts for the project named above. The bids on this project, however, were taken with many alternates in an effort to provide the Hospital with prices on doing the work on a schedule provided by the Hospital, such as working second shifts, and additionally in doing work in several other patient care sections of the Hospital. The purpose of this form of bid was to get prices which would provide the Hospital management with the opportunity to choose as much area as possible for the air conditioning project, limited only to the amount of funds currently available.

The Hospital administration is now able to allocate additional funds to provide for the air conditioning of the following areas: 5th Floor East, 5th Floor Center, 7th Floor West, 7th Floor Center, the entire 8th Floor, the entire 10th Floor and 11th Floor Center. When these areas have been air conditioned, all patient areas except an isolation section on 11th Floor West will have been completed.

Therefore the Board of Trustees was requested to approve the expansion of the project from a total of \$133, 900 to \$377, 692 together with the acceptance of the duly received and recorded bids thereon.

Funds for this project have been provided by a transfer from University Hospital Rotary to Budget Account 801213 (Hospital Air Conditioning -6th and 8th Floors).

Upon motion of Mr. Eckley, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the above recommendation was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

The fee for this service is 8 percent of the cost of the contracts and is estimated to be \$5, 384.00. Funds for this project will be provided by the State of Ohio from compensation for properties taken for the new Olentangy River Expressway right-of-way and made available in Budget Account 801211.

D. Ohio Union - Revision of Dishwashing System

President Fawcett recommended that the firm of W. E. Monks, Columbus, Ohio, be employed to provide complete professional engineering services for the mechanical work for this project, including design, preparation of drawings, specifications, estimate of cost and supervision of work as required.

The fee for this service will be calculated on the basis of direct payroll cost times a multiple of two with the total not to exceed 7 percent of the value of applicable contracts and is estimated to be \$2, 415.00. Funds for this project are available in Budget Account 921100 (Ohio Union Auxiliary Enterprise Account).

E. Ohio Stadium - Phase V

President Fawcett recommended that the firm of Tully, Hobbs & Partners, Columbus, Ohio, be employed to provide complete architectural engineering services for this project including preliminary plans, basic drawings, working drawings, specifications, estimate of cost, necessary bidding documents and supervision of construction as required.

E. Ohio Stadium - Phase V (continued)

The fee for this service will be calculated on the basis of the Architect's Society of Ohio standard fee of 8.5 percent of the estimated construction cost, less the State Architect's fee and the work previously done by the University Architect and is estimated to be \$62,548.00. Funds for this project have been provided through gifts from friends of the University and deposited in Budget Account 801125 (Ohio Stadium, Phase V).

F. Agricultural Technical Institute, Wooster -Employment of Architects

President Fawcett recommended that the firm of Tuchman-Canute, Architects, Akron, Ohio, be employed to provide complete architectural and engineering services for this project, including preliminary plans, basic drawings, working drawings, specifications, estimate of cost, necessary bidding documents and supervision of construction.

The fee for this service will be calculated on the basis of the fee schedules of the Architect's Society of Ohio of the AIA. Funds for this project have been provided from Item 235-010 Ohio Board of Regents Architectural Planning, H. B. 531, and Item 366-001 Agricultural Technical Institute, The Ohio State University, Wooster, H. B. 531.

G. Ohio Stadium - Artificial Turf

*

The Athletic Department through action taken by the Athletic Council has determined the desirability of replacing the natural turf with artificial turf in the Ohio Stadium and on one practice field.

President Fawcett recommended therefore that the President and/or the Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to develop specifications and invite bids from the leading manufacturers of artificial turf, and further that the project be expedited in the normal University manner through the Department of Public Works. Since timely installation in keeping with manufacturer's recommendations is a mandatory part of this action, it was requested that an emergency be declared and authorization be given to advertise for a ten-day period.

Funds will be available in Budget Account 801226 in which gifts for this purpose will be deposited.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. Jones, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

X. SALARY INCREASE FOR THE PRESIDENT

Mr. Ketterer made the following statement--

Members of the Board for some time have been considering the status of our President's salary. He came to the University in 1956-57 and has had two salary increases since that time--the last in 1964 which brought his salary to \$40,000. Anybody who has had the opportunity to observe at close range the energy that Novice Fawcett has displayed in directing the affairs of this University--which have not become any simpler as time has gone on--must look with a great deal of admiration on the unflagging energy he has displayed and the almost 24-hour-per-day service he has rendered to this University during the years he has served this University. Under these circumstances we must give serious consideration to the question of whether or not he is not at this time entitled to a salary adjustment in recognition of these tremendous efforts. I am safe in saying that no President of this University has done the Herculean work that Dr. Fawcett has in support of this University. This is our Centennial Year, and I think we would be decidedly remiss in our responsibility as Trustees if we did not raise Dr. Fawcett's salary.

Mr. Jones moved that President Fawcett's salary be increased to \$50,000 per year, effective April 1, 1970. Mr. Eckley seconded the motion which was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

President Fawcett responded by saying that he was deeply grateful to the Board for this action and that he appreciated the fact that the Board had recognized his efforts in behalf of the University.

President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of Katherine Porter Allen, Assistant Dean and Secretary of the College of Administrative Science; David Floyd Baker, Professor and Chairman of the Department of Industrial Engineering; Philip J. Reel, Clinical Professor Emeritus in the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology; and August Mahr, Professor Emeritus in the Department of German. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

A. Katherine Porter Allen

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death on February 8, 1970, of Katherine Porter Allen, Assistant Dean and Secretary, College of Administrative Science.

A. Katherine Porter Allen (continued)

Mrs. Allen was a native of Streator, Illinois. She received her Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration from The Ohio State University in 1927. During her school years she was elected to Mortar Board, national senior women's honorary, and to Beta Gamma Sigma, national business honorary. She was a member of Alpha Xi Delta Sorority. Later she became a respected and honored member of Altrusa International. After her graduation from college, Mrs. Allen accepted a position as assistant to the general merchandise manager of the Rike Kumler Company in Dayton, Ohio. She remained with that company for fifteen years until World War II, when she volunteered for service in the Women's Auxiliary of the United States Navy (WAVES), She became officer-in-charge of some 4,000 women in the nation's largest WAVE barrack in Washington, D. C. She had attained the rank of Lieutenant Commander prior to her leaving the service in 1945, when she returned to The Ohio State University to complete work toward a Master's Degree in Psychology. A month after her graduation in 1946, she was named assistant to the Junior Dean of the former College of Commerce and Administration. She was appointed an assistant professor of business organization in 1947, assistant junior dean in 1949, promoted to associate professor of business organization and appointed secretary of the college in 1955, and was named an assistant dean and secretary in 1966.

Mrs. Allen throughout all her 24 years of service acted as a counselor for students. She held the post of secretary and later advisor for the Beta of Ohio Chapter of Beta Gamma Sigma. She was active in Junior Administrative Council at The Ohio State University, working toward the solution of student administrative and relations problems.

Those who knew her knew that her world of work and her life were inseparable. Her name illuminated by her 24 years of dedicated service has become synonymous with professional education for business and the seeking and achieving of the highest standards of excellence. Mrs. Allen's concern for others in the context of the high standards she held for her college and herself identified her as a warm and sensitive person and gained for her the respect and loyalty of a great circle of friends among faculty, staff and students in the University.

The significant loss brought about by her untimely death will challenge the best from those remaining to carry on her work. Yet her memory leaves only inspiration with which the tasks can be undertaken.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Dean Allen its deep sympathy. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed in the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a sincere expression of the Board's realization of the loss which the family and the University have sustained.

B. David Floyd Baker

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on February 10, 1970, of David Floyd Baker, Professor and Chairman of the Department of Industrial Engineering.

Dr. Baker was born in Blue Springs, Missouri, on September 19, 1919. He received his high school diploma from Saltcreek High School (Ohio) in 1937. He served in the U. S. Navy from 1940 to 1947 where he achieved the rank of Warrant Officer and won a Bronze Star and a Gold Star in lieu of a second Bronze Star. After receiving an honorable discharge from the Navy he enrolled in engineering at The Ohio State University. He earned the Bachelor of Industrial Engineering and Master of Science degrees in 1952 and the Ph. D. degree in 1957.

David Baker had a distinguished career as an engineering educator. He became an Instructor in the Department of Industrial Engineering at The Ohio State University in 1953, advancing to Assistant Professor in 1957, Associate Professor in 1958 and Professor in 1961. He was appointed Chairman of the Department of Industrial Engineering in 1964. His primary fields of interest were personnel and engineering administration. He was instrumental in designing the new physical facilities which now house the Industrial Engineering Department as well as being the chief architect of the new four-year undergraduate program in Industrial Engineering. He provided the leadership necessary to qualify the Department of Industrial Engineering at The Ohio State University to be placed among the outstanding departments in the nation offering such a program. Recognition of his outstanding work in Industrial Engineering is evidenced by his chairmanship of Region I of the Engineering Education and Accreditation Committee of Engineer's Council for Professional Development.

Dr. Baker was highly regarded as an administrator and engineer. He had an extensive history of summer and part-time consulting practice providing experience which he used effectively for the benefit of students. He was particularly active in labor arbitration work where his keen observations and understanding of human behavior gained for him wide recognition as a strong and honest man. These same characteristics led both faculty and students to seek his counsel on many diverse questions. He was very much interested in people and they responded favorably to that interest.

David F. Baker was active in a large number of professional and honorary societies. He held many offices at both the local and national level, including that of National President of Alpha Pi Mu, the industrial engineering honorary society.

In addition to his many professional activities, Dave Baker was known to friends as an avid bird watcher, handball player and pilot. He was past president of the Brooks Bird Club and the Columbus Audubon Society. The same enthusiasm which characterized his professional work made all who shared his avocations better persons for having known him. He had a lust for life which could be matched by very few people.

On behalf of the University at large, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

C. Philip J. Reel

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on January 25, 1970, of Philip J. Reel, M. D., Clinical Professor Emeritus in the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology of The Ohio State University.

Dr. Reel was born in Union County, Ohio, on September 29, 1890. In 1911, he received, as his premedical training, the degree of Doctor of Veterinary Medicine. He felt, as was typical of his individualism, that this would be the best foundation for the study of Medicine. He received his Doctor of Medicine degree from The Ohio State University in 1915 and continued his training under the tutelage of the best surgeons of his time. This included a year in the gynecologic clinics of the University of Vienna in Austria.

Philip J. Reel and a handful of his colleagues were the very foundation of the faculty of our College of Medicine who, during many difficult years, weathered the storm of near collapse. He was a stern disciplinarian of the "old school" whose two chief objectives were that the student shall learn and the sick patient shall recover. His gruffness as a teacher was outshone only by his kindness to the patients and to the student, especially if he was sure the student was not aware of it at the moment.

Through his continuous efforts toward better teaching, as Chief of the Division of Gynecology of the Department of Surgery, he obtained approval of the residency training program in that specialty in 1935. Under his guidance and encouragement the Gynecologic Cancer Clinic was established in 1943 and was the first such clinic in the College of Medicine approved for the diagnosis and treatment of cancer by the American College of Surgeons. In 1945 he was singularly instrumental in securing faculty and University approval for the establishment and organization of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology. He served as the first chairman of the Department for several years.

Dr. Reel's contributions to the medical literature were many and included a textbook of gynecologic nursing. He was a member of Alpha Omega Alpha, Sigma Xi, a diplomate of the American Board of Obstetrics and Gynecology and a member of many other medical and surgical societies. In 1955, he served as President of The Ohio State University Medical Alumni Association. In 1957, he received the Alumni Achievement Award from the College of Medicine and in 1965, he was presented with the Honored Alumnus Certificate for fifty years of practice.

D. August Mahr

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death on January 21, 1970, of Dr. August Mahr, Professor Emeritus in the Department of German.

Dr. August Mahr was born July 15, 1886, in Frankfurt am Main. Between 1905 and 1911 he attended the Universities of Heidelberg, London, Caen, Frankfurt and Freiburg, receiving the Ph. D. degree from the University of Heidelberg in 1911. From 1912 to 1914 he was Visiting Instructor of German at Yale. After serving in the German armed forces in the First World War, he held administrative and teaching positions in Germany. In 1924 he immigrated to the United States and taught at Stanford University from 1924 to 1930, in which year he came to The Ohio State University as Professor of German. This position he held until his retirement in 1956.

Dr. Mahr's claim to distinction is a scholarly career of great merit and wide scope. He published several books in the field of Greek and Byzantine drama and numerous articles and essays dealing with German literature. After 1947 his work was chiefly devoted to the Moravian mission work among the Indians of Ohio, and this represents a most significant contribution to the early history of Ohio. Through his endeavors a very considerable number of early Moravian documents, written in German, have been made accessible to the historian and scholar. This work, sponsored by The Ohio State Archaeological and Historical Society, has proven to be an abundant source of information on all phases of pioneer life. Out of it grew a number of significant articles, ranging in subject matter from folklore, religious life and missionary activities in 18th century Ohio, to natural history, medicine and the linguistic analysis of Delaware and Algonquin Indian place names and designations of the flora and fauna of their land.

During his busy career he found time to hold important offices in a number of historical and scientific associations and organizations. In 1945 he served as Research Analyst with the U. S. Strategic Bombing Survey of Europe.

A. Highlights of University Activities

President Fawcett reported to the Board on some of the significant activities that have taken place or will take place in the near future. Some references included in this report, which is filed with the official records of the Secretary, were as follows:

- 1. Mr. James Reston, Vice President of <u>The New York Times</u>, will speak at the University Charter Day Convocation to be held Sunday, March 22, as a major event of the Centennial Year observance. Charter Day will mark the 100th anniversary of the signing in 1870 of legislation which established the University.
- Ohio State will confer degrees on some 1,234 seniors and graduate students at Winter Commencement ceremonies on Thursday, March 19, in St. John Arena. Mr. John Ciardi, poetry editor of the <u>Saturday</u> Review, will deliver the Commencement Address.
- 3. The University over the past decade was the nation's eighth-largest producer of doctoral degrees, according to a report of the U. S. Office of Education. During the 10 academic years ending with 1967-68, Ohio State had a total of 3, 348 doctoral graduates.
- 4. The College of Dentistry will lead the nation's 52 dental colleges in enrollment when a \$6.5 million expansion program is completed. The expansion will allow the College to increase the size of its freshman class to 200 from the present 155.

The Recipients of the Honorary Degrees

HENDRIK W. BODE

Doctor of Science

Internationally recognized scientist, administrator, and author, whose pioneering contributions to engineering are used worldwide

So extensive are the accomplishments of Hendrik W. Bode that no student in any part of the world can obtain an electrical engineering education without studying the classical techniques which bear his name. His writings have gained world recognition. Even today nearly all classical control systems texts devote large sections specifically to his work. In addition, the vast majority of classical system and network design is still performed using his techniques.

A graduate of The Ohio State University, he joined the Bell Telephone Laboratories in 1926 where he specialized in mathematical methods for electrical network analysis and the application of this analysis to long-distance communication. The next decade saw revolutionary technological developments in this area brought about principally by Dr. Bode and his colleagues at Bell Labs. During this period he earned a Ph.D. degree from Columbia University.

In 1939 Dr. Bode completed a text which presented, for the first time, thoroughly scientific methods for the analysis and synthesis of control systems. This information was disseminated throughout the scientific community during World War II and provided the foundation for truly innovative system developments during that period. For his personal contributions to the defense effort, Dr. Bode was awarded the Presidential Certificate of Merit in 1948.

Following this era of outstanding personal accomplishments, Dr. Bode entered the second phase of his illustrious career, that of engineering management, and advanced rapidly through a series of supervisory positions to Vice President of the Bell Telephone Laboratories. His administrative leadership was instrumental in helping the Bell system achieve a position of world prominence in communication technology. Upon his retirement from Bell in 1967, Dr. Bode became the Gordon McKay Professor of Systems Engineering at Harvard University.

The Ohio State University is proud to honor a man whose extraordinary achievements have exerted a profound influence upon thousands of students and, indeed, upon communications systems for the entire world.

WILLIAM W. COOPER Doctor of Science

Creative research scholar and teacher of the quantitative and behavioral disciplines, architect of innovative structures for administrative science

The career of William W. Cooper, Dean of the new School of Urban and Public Affairs, Carnegie-Mellon University, exemplifies the genius of American scholars and universities for developing new academic approaches to solve old problems.

Educated at the University of Chicago and Columbia University, he is the distinguished student of a distinguished professor of accounting, Eric Kohler, at one time a faculty member at The Ohio State University. In turn, Dean Cooper has been the inspiration for a group of talented students whose unique investigations have created new accounting and management measures.

A pioneering scholar, he has published more than one hundred articles, as well as several books, which have had a major impact, not only on accounting, but on a wide range of other disciplines, including economics, operations research, statistics, and management science. Despite the administrative demands of his present post, he continues to produce research which is always thoroughly integrated with the actual world.

Dean Cooper has been a moving force in the development and implementation of at least three major structures which seek to contribute an additional dimension to our society through research in the quantitative and behavioral sciences. First, for more than two decades he was a key figure in the development of the Carnegie-Mellon Graduate School of Industrial Management, now the primary model for schools for business and government throughout the world. Second, he was the founder and first president of The Institute of Management Science, now the organizational focal point for a whole new breed of international scholars. Finally, in recent years, much of his discerning but zestful intellect has been devoted to the development of another new school of administrative science, this one concerned with the fundamental quality of our daily life.

The Ohio State University is proud to recognize this remarkable American and creative catalyst who is so effective in getting experience out of his ideas.

HENRY B. HASS

Doctor of Science

Eminent scientist, recognized nationally for his extraordinary achievements in the fields of chemistry, engineering, and education

The contributions of Henry B. Hass extend far beyond the chemistry laboratory. His life and habits, his very personality reveal a profound understanding of the human condition and have set a contagious example for his students and colleagues.

Dr. Hass received his Ph.D. degree from The Ohio State University in 1925. After three years of industrial research, he joined the faculty of Purdue University where he served for twenty-one years, more than half that period as Chairman of the Department of Chemistry.

While at Purdue Dr. Hass was involved with the creation of the Purdue Research Foundation and was in charge of the foundation's first project which resulted in rules for predicting the products of the chlorination of hydrocarbons. The fundamental work of Dr. Hass and his students on this project led directly to important commercial chemicals as well as to a new line of resins for plastics. Next came the discovery by Dr. Hass and his students that paraffin hydrocarbons could be nitrated in a vapor process to produce high yields of products that soon found applications in industry.

In the early 1940's Dr. Hass became associated with the Manhattan Project where he developed methods for producing essential fluorocarbons needed for gaseous diffusion operations installed at Oak Ridge National Laboratory. He left Purdue in 1949 to become Manager of Research and Development for General Aniline and Film Corporation. From 1952 to 1961 he served as Director of the Sugar Research Foundation, then joined the M. W. Kellogg Company as Manager of Chemical Research and Development and now serves that firm as a full-time consultant.

In 1968 the American Chemical Society honored Dr. Hass by awarding him the prized Perkin Medal. In 1969 his achievements were also recognized when he received the Gold Medal of the American Institute of Chemists.

The Ohio State University is proud to honor a distinguished alumnus for his outstanding contributions to science and his fellow man.

MAYNARD K. HINE Doctor of Science

Able and respected academic administrator, productive author and scholar, dedicated leader in the field of dentistry

In the current period of history, when university administrators are often neither liked nor respected by some in the academic community, Maynard K. Hine stands out as a scholar, teacher, and administrator who retains the respect and affection of his colleagues and students.

As Chancellor of the new Indiana University—Purdue University at Indianapolis, he has undertaken the challenging assignment of forging an alliance between the urban campuses of two major universities. The task required an academic statesman, a man of vision and personal distinction as scholar and teacher. All of these qualifications Chancellor Hine had amply demonstrated throughout a distinguished career as one of the nation's leading educators in the field of dentistry.

Dr. Hine received his dental education at the University of Illinois where he taught for a decade before joining the School of Dentistry at Indiana University in 1944. The next year he was named Dean, a position he held until 1969 when he became Chancellor. During his years as Dean, his extraordinary leadership abilities and his scholarly productivity carried him to a position of eminence in his field, as evidenced by his services as president of many professional organizations, including the American Dental Association, the American Association of Dental Research.

Co-author of five books, contributor of numerous articles to scientific journals, Dr. Hine also serves as editor of the American Journal of Periodontology, a position he has held since 1950. He has served as Chairman of the Council on Dental Research of the American Dental Association, member of the Board of Regents of the National Library of Medicine, and member of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, to note but a few of many positions of professional service which he has filled.

For his extensive contributions to the dental profession, Dr. Hine has been widely recognized and honored. The Ohio State University adds with pride a new accolade in recognition of scholarly attainments of the highest order.

ALVAH PETERSON

Doctor of Science

Gifted teacher and research entomologist, whose contributions to science and to man span more than half a century

Alvah Peterson has had a significant and lasting influence of major proportions in the fields of entomology and environmental quality. His contributions include studies of the structure of the order of thrips, macrophotography of insect eggs, and techniques for the study of insects in the field and laboratory. He produced the classic work of an identification system for immature insects and pioneered the development of biological control.

Dr. Peterson saw the importance and possibilities of using parasitic and predacious insects to assist in the control of damaging insect pests long before the concept of biological control was generally appreciated in the United States. His investigations were conducted before the significance of ecological balance, or the dangers of persistent insecticides in the environment were recognized by the public, or by most entomologists. Modern procedures for reducing hazardous pesticides in our environment can, in part, be traced to the pioneering efforts of Alvah Peterson.

Alvah Peterson's two-volume work, Larvae of Insects, is a classical contribution to systematics. Until the publication of Dr. Peterson's system of identification based upon insect larvae, there was no satisfactory procedure for obtaining accurate identification of immature insects. These books have guided researchers and insect control specialists around the world and are the basis for courses in insect study at many universities.

Dr. Peterson is a graduate of Knox College and the University of Illinois. He taught at Rutgers University and later was appointed senior entomologist for the U.S.D.A. Bureau of Entomology. In 1928, Dr. Peterson joined the faculty of The Ohio State University and served with distinction until his retirement as Professor Emeritus in 1958.

Possessor of a rare combination of kindness, compassion, vision, and high scholarly ability, Alvah Peterson inspired in students and colleagues at Ohio State a confidence and trust rarely found in men. The Ohio State University is proud to honor a renowned scholar and an outstanding teacher.

The Board of Trustees met at its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, April 9, 1970, at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Deletion of Rule 41.01 (Application for Admission; Dates) and Revisions of Rules 47.03, 47.05, 47.07, 47.09, 47.11 and 47.15 and the Deletion of Rule 47.13 of Rules for the University Faculty

On March 10, 1970, the Faculty Council approved revisions in the <u>Rules for</u> the <u>University Faculty</u>, including the deletion of Rule 41.01 pertaining to application for admission; dates and the revision of rules relating to warning and dismissal (see complete text of changes in Appendix VI, page 473).

The proposed changes in the existing <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u> as published in November, 1969, are as follows:

- Rule 47.03 states that Colleges are responsible for academic standards, the establishment of appropriate policies for transfer and professional students and the definition of deficiency points.
- (2) Rule 47.05 defines the special warning system to be employed when a student's previous academic credentials indicate the probability of low achievement or if he falls below a "C" average (2.0) at this University.
- (3) Rule 47.07 defines the grade level below which a student shall be placed on academic probation.
- (4) Rule 47.09 authorizes a College or School to dismiss a student who does not meet the conditions of his probation.
- (5) Rule 47.11 states that a parent or guardian need not be notified of a student's academic status if the student is over 21 years of age or married.
- (6) Rule 47.13 renumbers the existing Rule 47.15 to maintain continuity.

President Fawcett recommended that the foregoing changes in the <u>Rules</u> for the University Faculty be approved by the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Dunlap, the Board of Trustees by unanimous voice vote approved the adoption of the foregoing rule changes with the deletion of Rule 47.11 which was referred back to the Faculty Council for reconsideration. The Secretary of the Board was further instructed and given authority to make the foregoing changes in the next printing of the <u>Rules</u> for the University Faculty.

1. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

B. Establishment of a New Program Leading to the Degree, Bachelor of Science in Industrial Design

Upon the recommendation of the Council on Academic Affairs, the Faculty Council on March 10, 1970, approved the establishment of a new program leading to the Bachelor of Science in Industrial Design degree, effective July 1, 1970.

The Division of Design of the College of The Arts has proposed this degree program which is to be compatible with the usage of the professional organization, Industrial Designers Society of America. Students in this program will be required to take courses in chemistry, physics, industrial engineering, engineering graphics as well as the basic educational requirements in the social sciences.

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the above recommendation from the Faculty Council.

Upon motion of Mr. Harrod, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

C. Merger of the Departments of Veterinary Medicine, Veterinary Surgery and Radiology and Veterinary Clinics Into a New Department--Department of Veterinary Clinical Services

Upon the recommendation of the Council on Academic Affairs, the Faculty Council on March 10, 1970, approved a merger of three existing departments in the College of Veterinary Medicine--Departments of Veterinary Medicine, Veterinary Surgery and Radiology and Veterinary Clinics--into one new department to be called Department of Veterinary Clinical Sciences, effective July 1, 1970.

This action was based upon a seven-month study conducted by the faculty of the College of Veterinary Medicine of its clinical sciences activities, including teaching, research and service programs and available resources. As a part of this study, organizational practices in other colleges of veterinary medicine were reviewed. In veterinary practice these specialties have a great deal in common and the continuing advances in the clinical sciences are bringing them even closer together. The merger will improve the use of faculty time and college resources in ways not previously possible. An additional reason for merger is that the majority of the present faculty of these three departments are responsible to more than one department chairman.

These studies indicated that the new organizational arrangement being proposed should result in a general strengthening of the research, graduate and postgraduate specialty programs, as well as making them more attractive to prospective scholars and faculty because of the better balance achieved between investigative work and clinical service made possible by this reorganization.

C. <u>Merger of the Departments of Veterinary Medicine, Veterinary</u> <u>Surgery and Radiology and Veterinary Clinics Into a New</u> Department--Department of Veterinary Clinical Services (continued)

President Fawcett recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the above recommendation from the Faculty Council.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Dunlap, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

V. PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS

IX. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of Mervin B. France, former member of the Board of Trustees, and Samuel A. Marable, Professor, Department of Surgery. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

A. Mervin B. France

The Board of Trustees expresses particular sorrow at the death on February 16, 1970, of its former colleague, Mervin B. France, of Cleveland, Ohio. Mr. France was a Trustee from September 16, 1964, until his resignation April 4, 1969.

From the records it would appear that Mr. France was the twenty-third alumnus or former student of the University to serve it as a Trustee. He entered the University in the fall of 1920, but his education was interrupted. He was originally in the College of Engineering but transferred later to the then College of Commerce and Journalism. He withdrew from the University at the end of the second semester of 1923-24. He entered the business world and soon began to make rapid advancement.

As a Trustee, he was singularly faithful to his trust. He attended his first meeting October 9, 1964, a month after his appointment by Governor James A. Rhodes. By coincidence he attended his last such meeting exactly four years later on October 9, 1968. Of the forty-three Board meetings held during that time, he was present at thirty-eight. Because of illness he attended no further meetings and his resignation followed in the spring of 1969.

His was a typical American success story. He was two years old when his father died and his mother took him and a brother to live with relatives in rural eastern Ohio. As a boy, he attended a red brick country school and helped with farm chores. In time his mother moved to Alliance, Ohio, where she was matron of the girls' dormitory at Mt. Union College and the son helped by cutting lawns, firing furnaces and with part-time jobs at the college.

In January, 1925 he went into the bond business in Canton. In 1927 he became Ohio representative, in Cleveland, of the Union Trust Company, of Pittsburgh. It was here he attracted the attention of the officers of the Society for Savings. In 1934 he became head of its investment and collateral loan department as assistant vice president and assistant secretary. He soon made his mark for in November, 1941 he became first vice president and in January, 1947 was elected president. The Society was then 98 years old and, at 45, he was recognized as one of the youngest top bank executives in America.

A. Mervin B. France (continued)

Under earlier Ohio laws the operations of mutual savings banks were restricted. But these were amended in 1955 and this permitted the organization of the Society National Bank which with the Society for Savings operated under the same roof. With court approval the two institutions were merged. Under Mr. France's leadership the Society National Bank was recognized as one of the most progressive banks in the United States. It was one of the first to introduce "electronic banking" to its customers. As of the end of 1969, it was the 71st largest of some 13,000 U. S. commercial banks and had total resources of five-sixths of a billion dollars.

Inevitably a man of the stature and versatility of Mr. France was drawn into wide participation in other business and civic affairs. This is attested to by the long list of trusteeships and directorships he held in other areas. His active life since leaving the University well bears out its motto, "Disciplina in Civitatem."

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as an expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

B. Samuel A. Marable

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death on February 21, 1970, of Samuel A. Marable, M.D., Professor in the Department of Surgery.

Dr. Marable was born in Clarksville, Tennessee, on February 10, 1928. He graduated from Vanderbilt University where he earned two degrees-the B.A. degree cum laude in 1949, and the M. D. degree in 1952 during which time he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa and Alpha Omega Alpha in addition to being awarded the Founders Medal--the highest scholastic award at Vanderbilt.

In 1953 Dr. Marable completed a straight surgical internship at The Johns Hopkins Hospital. From 1953 to 1955 he served as a medical officer in the U. S. Navy. After completion of active duty he entered a five-year residency in general and thoracic surgery at the University of California Medical Center, Los Angeles. Upon completion of his residency training in 1960, he remained on the UCLA faculty for one year as an Instructor in Surgery. In 1961 he was certified by the American Board of Surgery and the Board of Thoracic Surgery.

On July 1, 1961 he joined the faculty of The Ohio State University as an Assistant Professor of Surgery with joint appointments in the Divisions of General Surgery and Thoracic Surgery. With his broad background of training, experience and his technical skill, he was soon recognized as a master surgeon, particularly in the peripheral vascular field. In the Department of Surgery he had numerous administrative assignments including the graduate

training program, sophomore surgical lecture course and resident rotations. His contributions to the medical literature were numerous, including the elucidation of the celiac compression syndrome.

Dr. Marable's excellence as a teacher was recognized by the medical students who selected him the 1964 Faculty Man of the Year. The students made special note that he was "a true gentleman in his teacher-student relationships." Also in 1964 the Columbus Junior Chamber of Commerce honored Dr. Marable as one of the ten "Outstanding Young Men of Central Ohio."

In addition to his serving as Secretary-Treasurer of Alpha Omega Alpha, Dr. Marable was a member of numerous surgical and medical associations. He had just been installed as President of the Academy of Medicine of Columbus and Franklin County.

On behalf of the entire University, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family its deep sympathy and sense of understanding in its loss. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the College of Medicine and the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

X. REPORTS

A. Highlights of University Activities

President Fawcett reported to the Board on some of the significant happenings that have taken place at the University. Some references included in this report, which is filed with the official records of the Secretary, were as follows:

- 1. The University will introduce an upper-division program in elementary education next autumn at its four regional campuses. The level of enrollments will determine when each campus will be able to offer the complete four-year program.
- 2. Ohio State awarded 68 per cent of the Ph. D. degrees granted by eight state-assisted universities in Ohio during 1968-69, according to Ohio Board of Regents figures. During that period 757 doctorates were granted by the universities, with Ohio State accounting for 518. Closest in number of doctorates awarded was the University of Cincinnati with 89. Ohio State's area of heaviest concentration in Ph. D. 's was education with 96, or 66 per cent of the 145 degrees awarded in education by the state-assisted universities.
- 3. The fully automatic car under development at Ohio State recently was steered automatically along a section of new but unopened interstate highway at 100 m.p.h. Previously such steering tests were limited to a maximum of 70 m.p.h.

 - 4. The President expressed his great pleasure with the events of the Centennial Weekend. He also indicated that the response has been highly favorable.

Deletion of Rule 41.01 (Application for Admission; Dates) and Revisions of Rules 47.03, 47.05, 47.07, 47.09, 47.11 and 47.15 and the Deletion of Rule 47.13 of Rules for the University Faculty

Deletion of Rule 41.01 (Application for Admission; Dates) and Revisions of Rules 47.03, 47.05, 47.07, 47.09, 47.11 and 47.15 and the Deletion of Rule 47.13 of Rules for the University Faculty

The Faculty Council on March 10, 1970, approved certain changes in <u>Rules for the</u> University Faculty as enumerated below:

- (1) Deletion of Rule 41.01 (Application for Admission; Dates)
- (2) Revisions in Rules 47.03, 47.05, 47.07, 47.09, 47.11 and 47.15
- (3) Deletion of Rule 47.13 and
- (4) Renumbering of Rule 47, 15 to Rule 47, 13 to maintain continuity

47.03. Minimum Scholastic Requirements.

Section 1. Rules 47.03, 47.05, 47.07, 47.09, 47.11, and 47.13 shall apply only to undergraduate students (as defined in Rule 41.03). The academic standards controlling warning, probation, and dismissal of professional and graduate students shall be established by rule by the faculties of the College in which the professional student is registered, or of the Graduate School if the student is a graduate student; provided, however, that an undergraduate professional student shall not be dismissed from the University unless he has 15 or more deficiency points as defined in Section 3 hereof and computed on the basis of his entire undergraduate program.

Section 2. Application of Rule to Transfer Students. For the purpose of this rule the deficiency points of a transfer student from another university, who is admitted to advanced standing in this University, shall be computed only upon work done at this University.

Section 3. Requirements and Definition. In order to remain in good standing in the University a student must maintain a point-hour ratio (see Rule 37.05) of at least 2.00. Deficiency points are applied only to the records of students whose point-hour ratio is below 2.00 and are defined as the number of credit points a student would have to earn to bring his point-hour ratio up to that level. Deficiency points may be calculated by subtracting the total number of credit points earned from twice the total number of credit hours attempted for which calculable grades (A, B, C, D, or E) were given.

47.05. Academic Warning,

Section 1. Any student who has never attended another college or university and who seeks to enroll as a new freshman in this University shall be placed on special warning when his application for admission is received and processed if his academic credentials indicate the probability of low achievement. He and his parents or guardian shall be so informed before final registration and the payment of fees are completed, except as provided in Rule 47.11. The fact that special warning has been given shall be made known to the office of the College or School to which he seeks admission.

Section 2. If, at the end of any quarter, a student subject to the provisions of Rule 47.03 has accumulated deficiency points in the range from one through fourteen, he shall be warned and his parents or guardian shall be notified by the Dean of his College or Director of his School, except as provided in Rule 47.11.

47.07. Academic Probation.

Section 1. Any student who has accumulated fifteen or more deficiency points shall be placed on probation. The probation shall continue provided the student's college considers his progress to be satisfactory and shall be removed when he has reduced his deficiency points to fourteen or fewer. The student and his parents or guardian shall be notified of probationary status by the Dean of the College or the Director of the School in which he is registered, except as provided in Rule 47.11. Such notification shall include a clear statement of what shall be considered to be satisfactory progress.

Section 2. Probation by special action. If at any time the preparation, progress, or success of a student in his academic program is determined to be unsatisfactory, the College or School in which the student is registered shall be empowered to place him on academic probation.

47.09. Academic Dismissal.

Section 1. If the student's College or School considers a student's progress as unsatisfactory in meeting the conditions placed on his probation the College or School shall be empowered to dismiss him from the University. An exception to this authority for undergraduate professional students shall be in accordance with Rule 47.03, Section 1. Notice of the dismissal shall be sent to the student and the student's parents or guardian by the Dean of the College or the Director of the School in which the student was registered for the quarter, except as provided in Rule 47.11. No student shall be subject to academic dismissal unless he is currently on probation.

47.11. Exception to Notice of Probation and Dismissal.

The notice of action to parents or guardians provided for in Rules 47.05 (Sections 1 and 2), 47.07 (Section 1) and 47.09 (Section 1) will not be sent for a married student or a student who is 21 years of age or older, if the student has requested the Registrar not to send his grade reports to his parent or guardian.

47.13. Reinstatement after Academic Dismissal.

Section 1. Any student who may be reinstated by a College or School following academic dismissal shall be subject to such special requirements as may be determined appropriate by the Dean of the College or Director of the School. If the performance record of any reinstated student does not meet the conditions of probation specified at the time of reinstatement, then the College or School in which he is registered shall determine whether the student is to be dismissed or continued on probation.

Mr. Safford seconded the motion, and the above-named persons were elected to the offices as indicated by unanimous vote of the Board - Mr. Ketterer abstaining.

STATEMENT OF CONDITIONS RELATED TO THE REOPENING OF THE UNIVERSITY

President Fawcett presented the following statement of conditions related to the reopening of the University.

I need not remind this governing board that the conditions leading up to the official closing of this campus constitute a catastrophe of incalculable dimensions. Just the problem of logistics in shutting down and securing this place required two days of intensive work on the part of authorized personnel who could accomplish that task. The process of reopening requires the cooperation of literally thousands of people and the development of a set of conditions that hopefully will assure continuing operation once we are under way again. One concept has been very clear to me even before the instant of closing. This University has been in operation for a hundred years; ways must be found to reopen it and to keep it functioning in service to the people for whom it was founded. Ever since it was closed and secured, we have been examining the input from faculty, students, staff, alumni, trustees and the general public, including many thousands of letters and petitions, most of which have pleaded for a reopening in time to permit students to finish the work of the quarter and to permit others to graduate in order to take advantage of job opportunities in a market where often the supply of trained manpower presently exceeds the demand.

As a result of all kinds of consultation, I would now like to outline the procedures we believe to be essential if we are to reactivate the educational processes that over the years have gained great vigor here and that have lifted this institution to a position of national and international eminence. I will, therefore, review a plan under five headings:

> Campus Security, Faculty Role, Students' Role, Administration Role, and Communications.

Following this presentation, I will request from the Board, action designed to enable us to get under way. If that action is approved, I will then submit a time schedule for your consideration and, hopefully, for your approval.

Campus Security

It is clear to me that the reopening of this campus must be accomplished without the use of outside security forces and must continue to operate on this basis as faculty, students and administration join together to achieve the educational objectives of the Spring Quarter and to engage in such discussions as may be necessary as a means of resolving any legitimate issues that may prevail. I have a commitment from the enforcement agencies of the State that they will return to assist in case of emergency, but those agencies

President Fawcett's Statement (continued)

have no more interest than we have in being on this campus to preserve order. It is our earnest hope that we can regulate the operation of the University without resorting to the use of large security forces in the future.

Access to this campus must continue to be controlled, which means that admission to it must be accomplished through an identification system. Our plan is to provide free pedestrian traffic for students, faculty and others who are authorized to be here, but other pedestrians will be required to produce identification or leave immediately before legal action for trespassing is taken.

We already have instituted a mandatory identification system for faculty, students, staff and visitors. All but about ten thousand of our students have such identification on a voluntary basis. In order to attend classes and participate in University functions all those who do not - whatever their approved category - will be required to obtain ID cards on a schedule that will be announced.

It is essential to begin a system of building security. The Office of Academic Affairs has arranged to have at every building, an Administrator-in-Charge, who will have access to the Office of the Vice President for Business and Finance, under whom our security people function. Additionally, we are in the process of working out a system of watchmen in buildings - an action we believe necessary, because of the high incidences of fire, here and on other campuses in recent days and weeks.

Another action that is necessary but cannot be accomplished immediately is an upgrading of the University security force, both in quality and quantity. This procedure has funding implications and probably will result in a reordering of our priorities for the 1970-71 academic year. It is very clear to me that some substantial changes in the whole system of University security must be achieved in the very near future.

At least during the first several days after we reopen, it may be necessary to establish a curfew extending from 12:00 midnight until 6:00 a.m. so that security can be maintained within the capability of manpower available. I am also asking for authority to limit to a specified area or areas, all people who wish to engage in peaceful dissent and demonstrations - those who are within their constitutional rights and will assure us of so remaining.

Faculty Role

On Tuesday of this week, I met for five hours with the Faculty Council to seek consultation, advice and cooperation. This body can and, I believe, will serve as a task force to persuade and influence all members of the faculty to cooperate with essential security measures. The Council took action requesting me to recommend to this Board the reopening of the University, which was a prerequisite to readmitting faculty to the campus beginning yesterday morning - in preparation for reopening.

President Fawcett's Statement (continued)

In terms of their time commitments, the faculty has been requested to place top priority on assisting students and completing this quarter's work. Teachers have been asked to conduct extra class meetings, when appropriate.

As time is available tutoring for those who need it can be provided. All members of the faculty have been requested to provide extended office hours in order to help students catch up on their schedules. Additionally, every effort will be made to facilitate graduate theses, particularly for those people planning to graduate in June and who have job commitments immediately thereafter.

All faculty travel will be deferred during the remainder of the Spring Quarter, unless it is absolutely necessary for someone to travel in support of the central mission of this institution and in support of its instructional program. Routine types of travel for participation in professional and scholarly conferences will be deferred until after the end of the Spring Quarter. Any emergency travel required will be cleared through the Department Chairman, the Dean of the College and the Vice President for Academic Affairs.

All faculty research during the remainder of the Spring Quarter will be set aside, except where the research is essential to the completion of contractual obligations or that which contributes to the work of a graduate student whose career aspirations would be limited otherwise. Free and independent research during this restricted period will be set aside in an effort to have all faculty assist students in the completion of their academic work. We are assured of outstanding cooperation in this respect, and I have every reason to believe that the faculty will keep its commitment.

College and departmental committees and agencies will be used to work with students in reexamining such issues as may appear to be dividing this campus. Additionally, the faculty has addressed itself vigorously to helping resolve these matters by creating a mechanism that will be in operation concurrently with the opening of the University, if not before. The Faculty Advisory Committee to the President and Board of Trustees will coordinate this effort by providing an opportunity for representative students, faculty and administration to come together for the purpose of reviewing actions that have been taken, and for refining and making recommendations on such legitimate issues as may yet need resolution. An earnest effort will be made to analyze these issues in depth and to take such steps as may be in the best long range interest of this University.

The Faculty Council has been requested to begin at once to reexamine the possible further decentralization of academic organization as a means of relating more effectively to undergraduate instruction. It is our view that we need a higher degree of capability for each college to interface with its students. The student needs to feel that he belongs to a college, that he has an identity in it, and that he has people to talk to about his problems.

Students' Role

We are requesting that all non-essential extracurricular activities be canceled so that the students may give full time to their academic work. This is not to say that no student organization can meet, but such meetings as are

President Fawcett's Statement (continued)

essential should be determined by the college or the structure in which the organization operates, and all of these that can be eliminated will be eliminated during the remainder of the quarter. Every effort will be made to persuade each individual enrolled as a student at this University that concentration on the completion of his course work must come first.

Administration Role

Central administration will take a very hard look at its structure and organization and will, among other changes, try to select a student advisory mechanism for every cabinet officer. We will reassess our counseling and advising system to determine how much of this work should be done centrally as versus how much should be done at the college level. Such changes as need to be made will be contingent upon such academic reorganization as is appropriate, based upon in-depth studies of the manner in which the student can relate to his own college objectives. I am, personally going to examine the feasibility of having some type of student advisory committee that will meet with me on a regular basis, just as the Faculty Advisory Committee does at the present time.

If all of these procedures work, we will try to arrange an appropriate commencement.

Communication

There will be a number of techniques used to try to develop an internal communications system that will work whether or not we are in a crisis situation. When peaceful demonstrations are infiltrated with people who are committed to disruption and violence, we simply have not had a communication system that would function effectively. We are addressing ourselves to this problem at the present time. Also, we will be developing some kind of house organ so that faculty, students and administration can be as fully informed on University action as possible.

We intend to institutionalize our information center, which came into being during the crisis and which has been very effective and helpful in getting information to so many thousands of people who have been trying to understand what was going on here and what would be the conditions for returning.

Some of the above plans have been implemented fully; others will be completed by the time the University might reopen, and the remainder will be pursued as rapidly and as vigorously as possible. Based upon this plan of action, I wish to present the following resolution and to recommend its approval.

Mr. Ketterer noted as a point of personal privilege his deep appreciation of the honor as well as the sense of deep responsibility which he felt by being reelected as Chairman of the Board for another year. He pledged the assistance of the Board and urged the cooperative effort of the entire academic community toward reinstituting and maintaining the educational process at The Ohio State University.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. SPECIAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. <u>Ratification of the President's Action</u> <u>Closing the University</u>

WHEREAS, the recent events which occurred at the University have resulted in high emotion, disruption, damage and danger; and

WHEREAS, the Governor recommended that universities experiencing disruption should close; and

WHEREUPON, President Fawcett closed the University, Columbus Campus, at 6 p.m., May 6, 1970, until further notice;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the President's action closing the University is hereby ratified.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Safford, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

B. Authorization of the Reopening of the University and Special Interim Authorization to the President

WHEREAS, an emergency situation exists on the campus with attendant problems in assuring security for persons and property; and

WHEREAS, new policies, rules, methods and procedures for campus governance are to be formulated;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the President be authorized to reopen the University in accordance with the attached schedule. Be it further resolved that the President be authorized to establish such interim policies, rules, methods and procedures as are, in his judgment, required to open the campus and to preserve the general safety and welfare;

AND, FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED, that such authority shall enable the President to do the following, but to not be limited thereto:

- 1. The establishment of a mandatory system of identification for all University-related personnel and for all other persons having official business on campus.
- 2. The establishment of interim rules of time, place and manner for all campus activities.
- The restriction from University property of any person not properly identified or without official authorization, and the determination as to whether such person is a trespasser.

 - B. Authorization of the Reopening of the University and Special Interim Authorization to the President (continued)
 - 4. The establishment of other such emergency security procedures as judged necessary to preserve the safety and welfare of individuals and property within the jurisdiction of this University.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Harrod and Mr. Shocknessy, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

II. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. <u>Revisions of Rules 25.07, 35.03, 27.0701, 53.0705 and 49.03 and the Deletion of Rule 49.09 of Rules for the University Faculty</u>

On April 14, 1970, the Faculty Council approved revisions in the <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u>, including the deletion of Rule 49.09 (see complete text of changes in Appendix VII, page 511).

The proposed changes in the existing <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u> as published in November, 1969, are as follows:

- Rule 25.07 repeals the requirement that a University Faculty meeting must be held each quarter during the academic year.
- (2) Rule 35.03 permits final examinations for graduating seniors to be given during the regular examination period.
- (3) Rule 27.0701 and Rule 53.0705 provides for full voting membership to the Graduate Student Representative on the Graduate Council.
- (4) Rule 49.03 deletes the requirement that a student be in residence at the Columbus campus for three full time quarters as one of the requisites for the receipt of a degree from this University.
- (5) Rule 49.09 deletes Rule 49.09 so as to make attendance at Commencement Exercises for graduating students optional.

President Fawcett recommended that the foregoing changes in the <u>Rules</u> for the <u>University Faculty</u> be approved by the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Mr. Harrod, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the foregoing recommendation by unanimous voice vote, and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees was further instructed and given authority to make the foregoing changes in the next printing of the <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u>.

B. Facilities to be Financed by the Ohio Public Facilities Commission

President Fawcett recommended that the following resolution be adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY, as follows:

Section 1. The President and/or the Vice President for Business and Finance of The Ohio State University are hereby authorized to complete and sign, on behalf of the University, Ohio Public Facilities Commission Forms Nos. 101 and 101A for any or all of the projects for the University provided for by or pursuant to the appropriations made under Section 4 of Amended Substitute House Bill No. 531 enacted by the 108th General Assembly.

II. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

B. Facilities to be Financed by the Ohio Public Facilities Commission (continued)

Section 2. This Board of Trustees agrees to permit the Ohio Public Facilities Commission to use the sites for the purpose of said projects, the boundaries of which are shown in the plans for such projects, for so long as the bonds issued to finance such projects shall be outstanding.

Section 3. The Ohio State University, and this Board of Trustees in its behalf, agrees to undertake performance of the functions and responsibilities for a using governmental agency, and of a designated governmental agency to the extent it is such, as provided in the Regulations of the Ohio Public Facilities Commission and any applicable leases, agreements or rules of the Commission, with respect to the aforesaid projects.

Upon motion of Mr. Eckley, seconded by Mr. Dunlap, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing resolution by unanimous voice vote.

VI. PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS

At the request of the Vice President for Business and Finance, President Fawcett recommended that the plans and specifications, bills of materials and estimates of cost for the following project be approved by the Board of Trustees:

A. University Hospital - Replacement of Main House Pump System

This project provides a new system with closely regulated hot and cold water pressure throughout the Hospital and will eliminate the present requirement for booster pumps to maintain adequate pressures for critical equipment on the upper floors.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

A. <u>University School, Renovation and Air Conditioning - Employment</u> of Engineers

President Fawcett recommended that the firm of Philip E. Absi & Associates, Columbus, Ohio, be employed to provide complete professional engineering services for heating, ventilating and air conditioning, plumbing, and electrical work for the above project, including design, preparation of drawings, specifications, estimate of cost, and field supervision of construction, as required.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE (continued)

A. <u>University School, Renovation and Air Conditioning - Employment</u> of Engineers (continued)

The fee for this service is 6 per cent of the cost of the mechanical and electrical work and is estimated to be \$15,000.00. Funds for this project have been provided by a transfer from Budget Account 149997 (New Programs Reserve), Budget Account 179999 (University Treasurer General Fund), and Item 315-074 (Utilities and Renovation), H. B. 531, to Budget Account 801140 (University School Remodeling).

B. University Hall Replacement - Employment of Architects

President Fawcett recommended that the firm of C. Curtiss Inscho and Associates, Columbus, Ohio, be employed to provide complete architectural and engineering services for this project, including preliminary plans, basic drawings, working drawings, specifications, estimate of cost, necessary bidding documents, and supervision of construction.

The fee for this service will be calculated on the basis of the schedules of the Architect's Society of Ohio of the AIA. Funds for this project have been provided from Items 315-073 (University Hall) and 235-010 (Board of Regents - Architectural Planning), H.B. 531.

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Dunlap, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

C. Marion Campus - State Route 95

WHEREAS, the Ohio Department of Highways has requested permission to widen and improve State Route 95 on lands fronting on the Marion Campus of The Ohio State University; and

WHEREAS, this additional land will permit the Ohio Department of Highways to widen State Route 95 to four continuous lanes, provide for a deceleration lane making a continuous right turn into the campus, and will provide for an improved entry way to the campus:

IT WAS RECOMMENDED that for the sum of \$5,375.00, the lands necessary for the above improvements be conveyed to the State of Ohio (The Department of Highways); and

D. Lima Campus Easement - Ohio Fuel Gas Company

The Ohio Fuel Gas Company has requested a gas line easement on State of Ohio lands that have been designated for the use of The Ohio State University, Lima Campus. The easement will provide for gas service to industry in the Lima, Ohio, area.

The standard easement charge as calculated by the Ohio Department of Public Works is \$1,080.00. The damages as calculated are \$1,365.00. The Ohio Fuel Gas Company agrees to pay to The Ohio State University, Lima Campus, \$2,445.00 for this easement.

It was recommended that the President and/or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to request that the Director of Public Works, pursuant to his statutory duties, act on behalf of the University in developing the necessary legal instruments to provide for the gas line easement.

E. Lima Campus - Shell Oil Company Easement

On November 14, 1968, the Board of Trustees granted an easement to the Shell Oil Company across lands of The Ohio State University, Lima Campus, for the installation of a pipe line. The Department of Public Works of the State of Ohio advised that the Shell Oil Company does not wish to conclude said easement and respectfully requests that the Board of Trustees' action of November 14, 1968, be rescinded.

President Fawcett recommended that the Board rescind the action of November 14, 1968, pertaining to the granting of an easement to the Shell Oil Company on lands of The Ohio State University, Lima Campus.

It was further recommended that the President or Vice President for Business and Finance be authorized to notify the Director of Public Works, that the above mentioned Board action has hereby been rescinded.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Harrod, the above recommendations were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

F. Student Health Insurance

In accordance with the Board action taken involving student health insurance in September, 1957; April, 1958; February, 1966; and June, 1969, student health insurance has been revised. To meet the rapid inflation which is occurring in hospital and medical costs, and to continue to provide students a modern but controllable health insurance program to sufficiently meet these increased costs, important benefit improvements have been included within the Student Health Insurance Program for the 1970-71 policy year, as described in Exhibit A, on file with the records of the Board of Trustees. As a result of favorable claim experience under the Student Health Insurance Program during the current 1969-70 policy year, the benefit improvements are being made without any change in the current premium rates which will continue as follows:

The fee for this service will be negotiated, based on the schedules of the Architect's Society of Ohio of the AIA. Revisions of Rules 25.07, 35.03, 27.0701, 53.0705 and the Deletion of Rule 49.09 of <u>Rules for the</u> <u>University Faculty</u>

The Faculty Council on April 14, 1970, approved certain changes in <u>Rules for the</u> University Faculty as enumerated below:

- (1) Revisions of Rules 25.07, 35.03, 27.0701, 53.0705, 49.03 and
- (2) Deletion of Rule 49.09.

25.07. Meetings.

Meetings of the University Faculty shall be held as needed during the school year. These meetings shall be held on call of the President, either on his own motion or on request (a) of the Faculty Council or (b) of the University Faculty. The request of the Faculty Council shall be by action taken at any meeting of the Faculty Council. The request of the University Faculty shall be by petition signed by members of the University Faculty (see Rule 25.01) in a number equal at least to ten per cent of the total membership of the University Faculty. The President shall have a reasonable time to call the meeting after receiving the request.

For the purpose of Rules 25.07 and 25.09, this total membership of the University Faculty shall be determined as of the October 1 preceding the date on which the petition is filed.

35.03. Examination Schedules.

Section 1. Scheduling of examinations in classes, the enrollment in which consists exclusively of students registered in the Colleges of Dentistry, Law, Medicine, Optometry, Pharmacy, or Veterinary Medicine shall be done by the administrative offices of these Colleges. All other examinations shall be centrally scheduled by the Office of the Registrar. Examination schedules prepared outside the Office of the Registrar shall, before publication, be cleared for time and room conflicts with the University Registrar who shall have power to resolve all such conflicts.

In performing its scheduling function the Office of the Registrar shall limit individual examinations to two-hour duration and the total examination period to five days; provided, however, that examinations in Deans' or Directors' survey courses shall be held during the last scheduled class hour, that examinations for the Summer Quarter shall be given during the final two scheduled class hours of each course, and that graduating seniors be examined in the regular examination period or at the time and in the mode fixed by their instructors.

d. Representative from the Council of Graduate Students. A representative from the Council of Graduate Students shall sit with the Graduate Council as a member (see Rule 53.0705).

53.0705. Graduate Student Representation on University Committees.

Section 1. Each of the following Committees or Councils shall include in its membership one representative from the Council of Graduate Students: the Faculty Council, the Graduate Council, the Advisory Committee on Cultural Programs, the Committee on Academic Misconduct, the Library Council, the Ohio Union Council, and the University Scholarship and Loan Committee. Membership shall include the right to vote except on the Faculty Council.

49.03. Requirements for an Undergraduate Degree.

To obtain an undergraduate degree from this University an undergraduate student must:

- a. Have been enrolled in the College, the Colleges of the Arts and Sciences, or the School recommending that degree during the last two quarters of work necessary to complete the degree requirements. The Executive Committee of the College, the Colleges of the Arts and Sciences, or the School recommending the degree may waive this requirement to the extent of not more than one quarter's enrollment if the student has six quarters in full-time residence (to be in full-time residence in any quarter a student must be enrolled in courses carrying twelve or more quarter hours credit) at this University, including a minimum of forty-five quarter credit hours earned through regular course enrollment at this University during the junior and senior years.
- b. Have earned through regular course enrollment a minimum of forty-five quarter hours credit from this University.
- c. Have satisfactorily completed the number of credit hours required for the curriculum he is pursuing. The minimum number of credit hours required in each curriculum shall include the credit hours required under Rules 31.0701 and 31.0703; however, excuses granted under Rule 31.0705 shall not reduce the stated minimum number of credit hours required in the curriculum for a degree or a certificate. Credit hours are considered as "satisfactorily completed" only if the student has received, at this University, the mark A, B, C, D, EM, K, S, or PA in those hours (see Rule 35.07).
- d. Have earned credit points (see Rule 37.03) totaling at least twice the number of credit hours attempted at this University for which calculable grades (A, B, C, D, or E) were given.
- e. Have satisfactorily met all additional college and curricular requirements for the degree involved.
- f. Have filed an application for the degree in accordance with rules prescribed by the College or School.

Pursuant to Article I, Section 2, of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, the Board met upon the call of the Chairman, John G. Ketterer, in a special meeting on Monday, May 25, 1970, at 9:30 a.m.

Present: John G. Ketterer, Chairman, Frederick E. Jones, James W. Shocknessy, Don M. Hilliker, William C. Safford, John H. Dunlap, Frederick R. Eckley, Jack G. Gibbs and M. Merle Harrod.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. <u>Temporary Revisions of Rules 35.03 and 35.07 of</u> Rules for the University Faculty

On May 20, 1970, the Faculty Council approved temporary revisions in the <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u> to apply for the Spring Quarter, 1970, only. (See complete text below.)

These temporary revisions in the existing <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u> as published in November, 1969, are as follows:

- (1) Rule 35.03 addition to the rule to extend classes through final examination week.
- (2) Rule 35.07 addition to the rule to provide students with the option of using a pass-fail grading system.

President Fawcett recommended that the foregoing changes in the <u>Rules for</u> the University Faculty be approved by the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion of Mr. Hilliker, seconded by Mr. Harrod, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote.

35.03. Examination Schedules.

Section 3. In order to provide a maximum educational experience during the Spring Quarter, 1970, regular classes shall be held during final examination week. Final examinations shall be limited to one hour and given during regularly scheduled class periods. The professional colleges are exempted from this action.

35.07. Marks.

Normal evaluation procedures are modified for the Spring Quarter, 1970. The undergraduate students, and graduate professional students in the Colleges of Law and Dentistry, shall have the option of receiving letter grades (A, B, C, etc.), or Pass/Non-Pass (PA/NP) grades for any or all courses.

Graduate students shall have the option of receiving letter grades (A, B, C, etc.), or Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory (S/U) grades for any or all courses.

Therefore, all restrictions concerning the student's selection and use of the Pass/Non-Pass and Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory Options in Rule 35.07 are waived for the Spring Quarter, 1970, only. Courses taken in this quarter

under the Pass/Non-Pass Option shall not be included in the total hours permitted under this rule. The responsibility for implementing this alteration shall rest with the Deans of the Colleges.

Graduate professional students in the Colleges of Medicine, Optometry, and Veterinary Medicine are exempted from these changes.

Mr. Gibbs expressed the necessity for more direct Board involvement in campus issues, the need for a representative advisory body to the Board and also recommended, because of campus tension, that students with approval of the Faculty Council be given the option of taking a cumulative grade for the work presently completed and be allowed to leave and be granted full credit for the quarter.

PROMULGATION

May 21, 1970, 9:00 a.m.

Pursuant to the authority conferred upon me as President by the Board of Trustees on May 14, 1970, and the authority on discipline under Rule 51.01, I hereby declare that:

- 1. Procedures of the University Committee on Discipline are suspended.
- 2. Resignations of members of the University Committee on Discipline are accepted as of May 20, 1970.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

- B. Establishment of Interim Disciplinary Policy (continued)
 - 3. An office of University Hearing Officer is established to stand in the place and stead of such University Committee on Discipline as it appears in the rules.
 - 4. Appointments to the office of University Hearing Officer will be made by me, and such office is empowered to adopt rules of procedure for disciplinary cases brought before it.
 - 5. The function of the office shall be to hear evidence, report findings, and make recommendations to the Vice President for Student Affairs (11, 1104) for final action.

Preceding the vote, Mr. Harrod received the assurance of President Fawcett that the University had neither capitulated nor granted amnesty to those involved in the recent disruption.

Upon motion of Mr. Safford, seconded by Mr. Dunlap, the above resolution was adopted by eight affirmative votes and one negative vote cast by Mr. Gibbs.

C. Establishment of the Office for the Coordination of Minority Affairs

WHEREAS, this University continues to recognize its responsibility to provide educational opportunities for minority groups; and

WHEREAS, this University is determined to continue to develop positive programs to carry out this responsibility;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that there is hereby created the Office for the Coordination of Minority Affairs under the Office of Academic Affairs and Provost without approval of any representation heretofore made; and

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED, that through procedures already established and approved by this Board, there is hereby authorized the appointing of a Vice Provost for the Coordination of Minority Affairs and such programs and staff as appropriate only on the expressed approval of this Board, and that the Secretary be delegated to make the appropriate change in Rule 11.1101.

Upon motion of Mr. Harrod, seconded by Mr. Gibbs, the above resolution was adopted by unanimous roll call vote.

President Fawcett presented the following recommendations:

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Degrees and Certificates Conferred--Spring Quarter Commencement

President Fawcett recommended that degrees and certificates be conferred at the Spring Quarter Commencement Convocation on June 12, 1970, to those students who have completed the requirements for their respective degrees and certificates and are recommended by the Faculty Council. The names of those awarded degrees and certificates will be included in the minutes of this meeting. (See Appendix VIII, page 571.)

Upon motion of Mr. Shocknessy, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous voice vote.

B. Honorary Degrees

The Board of Trustees on February 12, 1970, approved twenty-three recipients for honorary degrees to be awarded during the Centennial Year.

C. Residence Halls Room and Board Rates

The subsequent recommendations reference the action taken by this Board on July 31, 1969. The University desires to provide the advantages of an educational and living experience through the operation of residence halls and the payment of the costs thereof in conformity with the Bond Resolution adopted by this Board on April 8, 1957.

The cost of operating residence halls continues to rise. Senate Bill 297 passed by the 108th General Assembly mandates wage and salary increases for staff members in classified jobs within the residence halls and the food service. Because of the increased cost of personnel and increases in the cost of food, materials, supplies, utilities and contract services, it is necessary to adjust the residence halls rates. Also, in the interest of improved living conditions, it is anticipated that the occupancy of certain residence halls will be reduced.

Accordingly, on the basis of studies made by Vice Presidents Carson and Mount, President Fawcett recommended that the schedule of rates for all residence halls included in the Bond Resolution referred to above and including such Housing Commission facilities as are used for residence halls, be made effective Autumn Quarter, 1970. The schedule of rates is as follows:

It was recommended further that the University administration be authorized to establish the official rates for such residences as Lane Manor and Neilwood Gables and less than quarterly rates for residences in general conformity with the schedule of rates as established in the foregoing.

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendations by unanimous roll call vote.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

D. Increase in the Instructional Fee

At the beginning of this present biennium a budget was developed for this University which could be accommodated within the funds appropriated by the 108th General Assembly and the student fee adjustments which this Board approved at their July 31, 1969 meeting.

Since this time, however, inflationary pressures as well as mandated civil service increases, increased fringe benefits to our employees at the lower income levels, unanticipated security costs and damage repair, and several high pr ority new programs have necessitated a reassessment of the available resources and projected allocations. In the process of this review every effort was made to eliminate all but the essential commitments in an effort to live within our present resources level. While a number of substantial cutbacks were effected, it was still not possible to sustain our commitments without additional resources. To put the proposed 1970-71 budget of the University into balance, the President therefore recommended:

That the Instructional Fee for The Ohio State University be increased \$10 per quarter for the Main Campus and the Branches effective Autumn Quarter 1970. (See Schedule of Student Fees, page 529.)

Upon motion of Mr. Harrod, seconded by Mr. Safford, the Board of Trustees approved the above recommendation by unanimous roll call vote.

President Fawcett made the following comments pertaining to the recommended current funds budget for the 1970-71 fiscal year:

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Board:

The current funds budget for the second year of the biennium, 1970-71, has been reviewed in considerable detail with you and is presented this morning for your official consideration. The budget totals \$228 million and represents an increase from estimated expenditure levels of \$217 million for 1969-70. The difference is \$11 million - or an increase of 5 percent. It is presented at a time when we estimate that nearly 46,000 students will be enrolled on the Main Campus at the beginning of the Autumn Quarter of 1970. This figure represents a drop in freshman enrollment as we begin to bring our registrations within the limits set in Amended Substitute House Bill No. 531 passed by the 108th General Assembly of Ohio. Despite its size this budget is an austere one. Inflation has been markedly higher than we estimated more than two years ago during budget forecasting for 1969-71. Also costs of new programs in response to new problems and of damages resulting from disruptions have had to be absorbed. This budget does anticipate a \$10/quarter fee increase in the Instructional Fee. This increase works no

Schedule of Student Fees, Effective Autumn Quarter, 1970

*Pursuant to action of the Board of Trustees on January 14, 1965, third- and fourthyear students enrolled in the Doctor of Medicine degree program of the College of Medicine are enrolled in a year-round program of courses and are assessed fees on an annual basis payable in two installments, June 15 and December 15. The annual rate for such resident students for the 1970-71 academic year shall be \$1,050.00 for resident students and \$2,100.00 for non-resident students.

Part-time students (those enrolled for six or less credit hours or enrolled for one term of a Summer Quarter), shall be assessed one-half of the full fees. When fees are not evenly divisible, they shall be assessed to the next even dollar amount.

hardship on the economically underprivileged because of the educational grants program. The recommendation does not contain any increase in the General Fee. This increase will probably be less than and in a few cases only equal to the general trend across the country for fee increases.

As a part of the total current funds budget, the instructional and general budgets will increase \$5.7 million or about 5 percent. The major components are:

E. Budgets for the 1970-71 Fiscal Year

The expenditure budgets being proposed for the fiscal year 1970-71 represent an increase of 5 percent over the level of expenditures of the current year. While this current level is substantially above the original estimate for 1969-70 it should be recalled that at the time that budget was approved by this Board, the General Assembly had not passed an appropriation act nor had the fee level been established. Because of the uncertainties of these support levels a conservative level of expenditure was projected. As additional resources became available during the year, it was possible to fund planned priority needs of this University.

The estimates of available resources and expenditure budgets for the second year of the biennium have traditionally been closer to the actual expenditure levels than the first year because of fewer uncertainties inherently present at this period in a biennium. However, it should be understood that in spite of our best efforts, including the use for the third consecutive year of the advanced techniques of programmed budgeting in developing these budgets, that month-to-month adjustments will be necessary during this coming year; and accordingly the usual authority will be requested for making such adjustments as necessary and desirable.

And finally, as was mentioned in the previous recommendation pertaining to fees, several extraordinary circumstances have placed a considerable strain upon the budgets for this coming year. However, with the modest Instructional Fee increase and with the reordering of priorities, the following budgets should be adequate to the task:

President Fawcett recommended that the expenditure budgets above and the supporting statements for the foregoing summary figures as reviewed by the Board of Trustees be approved subject to increases or decreases in expenditure levels commensurate with income, and that the Secretary be instructed to file detailed budget statements for the fiscal year 1970-71 with the official records of the University.

Upon motion of Mr. Dunlap, seconded by Mr. Harrod, the Board of Trustees approved the said budgets for the 1970-71 fiscal year by unanimous roll call vote.

President Fawcett made the following statement regarding the new rules with respect to campus disruption:

At a meeting of the Faculty Council on June 9, 1970, action was taken to propose replacement of Rules 29.2725, 51.03 and 51.05 with new Rules 29.2725 and 51.03.

Copies of these actions were forwarded to members of the Board of Trustees last week with the agenda for the meeting today.

The Committee on Rules of the Faculty Council reported out Rules 29.2725 and 51.03, June 9, 1970, after having made only very slight changes in the proposals that were forwarded to you. Faculty Council approved the new rules as set forth on page 535, requested

President Fawcett's Statement (continued)

that I transmit them to the Board of Trustees for consideration today and took a subsequent action to permit students who are alleged to have violated University Rules on disruption, during recent weeks, the option of having hearings under the old or the new rules.

On May 20, 1970, the Faculty Council took an action to set aside the procedures under the existing rules and instructed the Council on Student Affairs to bring forth new rules on this subject by June 2, 1970. Following that action the University Discipline Committee resigned. The next day, under authority vested in me by the Board, I promulgated new procedures based upon the old rules which involved the establishment of a Hearing Office and the appointment of a Hearing Officer.

While the new rules may have much of merit in them, it is my personal view that students who are alleged to have engaged in disruption and/or violence on this campus since early March should be heard under the old rules by a Hearing Officer appointed by me and that these cases should be disposed of as rapidly as charges can be developed or as cases are heard in the courts.

Amended House Bill 1219 has now passed the General Assembly and will become law within 90 days after it is signed by the Governor. To avoid further confusion and to handle interim cases as rapidly as possible, I wish to make the following recommendation:

F. Disruption Rules

Upon the recommendation of Faculty Council, the proposed revised Disruption Rules 29.2725 and 51.03, see page 535, which would replace the present Rules 29.2725, 51.03 and 51.05, are being presented to this Board for appropriate action.

Since any action involving changes in these Rules must take into consideration pending legislative action as well as the necessity for the University to proceed promptly with all accumulated cases, President Fawcett recommended that:

- 1. A Hearing Officer be appointed and that hearings for students identified as having engaged in disruption proceed as rapidly as possible under the existing Rules.
- 2. The revised Disruption Rules 29.2725 and 51.03 recommended by Faculty Council by action of June 9, 1970, be recommitted to Faculty Council for such redrafting as may be appropriate in light of the proposed State legislation on disruption.

I. GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS (continued)

F. Disruption Rules (continued)

Mr. Harrod suggested that it is time to consider some basic facts concerning the disruption rules. He referred to the Amended Substitute Senate Bill 468 which was passed and signed by the Governor in 1968 and quoted two paragraphs from Section 3345.21 of the Revised Code of Ohio. Pursuant to this act, The Ohio State University established rules with respect to disruption. Mr. Harrod indicated that he favored no change in these regulations.

Upon motion of Mr. Harrod, seconded by Mr. Jones, the Board of Trustees approved the foregoing recommendation by unanimous roll call vote.

Mr. Dunlap moved and Mr. Shocknessy seconded the motion that this recommendation be approved. Messrs. Shocknessy, Dunlap and Ketterer cast affirmative votes and Messrs. Jones, Safford and Harrod cast negative votes. Mr. Ketterer declared the motion lost.

B. Leave of Absence Without Salary

Ann Helburn, Instructor, University Library, effective June 1, 1970 through June 30, 1970, to travel.

C. Emeritus Titles

Upon motion of Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Harrod, the Leave of Absence Without Salary, Emeritus Titles, Promotions in Rank for 1970-71 and personnel budget actions as recorded in the official "Salary Roll" of the University were approved by unanimous roll call vote, and the Secretary was instructed to file these changes in the "Salary Roll," an official document of the University.

Disruption Rules

At its meeting on June 9, 1970, Faculty Council passed the following Rule changes and requested that they be forwarded to the Board of Trustees for consideration at its June meeting.

These proposed changes in the <u>Rules for the University Faculty</u> as published in November, 1969, replace <u>Rules</u> 29.2725, 51.03 and 51.05.

- (1) Rule 29.2725 provides for the establishment of Hearing Officers and panels to implement Rule 51.03.
- (2) Rule 51.03 defines the jurisdiction of the University regarding student disruption, the sanctions to be applied, and the provision for hearings on individual cases.

The proposed rules are as follows:

29.2725. Hearing Officers and Panels.

Section 1. The Council on Student Affairs shall establish and maintain a list of attorneys, unaffiliated with the University, who shall be authorized to act as Hearing Officers to preside over disciplinary proceedings under Rule 51.03. One such attorney shall be designated by the Council on Student Affairs as Chief Hearing Officer, whose duties shall include:

- (a) assisting the Council on Student Affairs in preparing and enacting procedural rules to guarantee due process, including, but not limited to, the procedural recommendations contained in the Report and Recommendations of the University Committee on Rights and Responsibilities (The Ohio State University, September 15, 1968).
- (b) selecting Hearing Officers as needed from the Council on Student Affairs' approved list;
- (c) reviewing every case in which sanctions have been recommended to determine whether such sanctions should be imposed or reduced, or whether the case should be dismissed or remanded for further hearing;
- (d) forwarding completed cases to the Vice President for Student Affairs for administrative implementation in accordance with their final determination by the Chief Hearing Officer;
- (e) hearing on appeal student disciplinary cases, not including University actions relating to academic failure or violations of a code of professional ethics or of an honor code of those colleges or academic units having such codes, where an appeal is taken by any student from any such action by his College, University Committee, or other properly authorized University adjudicatory body, only in those cases where the penalty assessed was suspension, dismissal, or expulsion.

Disruption Rules (continued)

29.2725. Hearing Officers and Panels. (continued)

Section 2. The Council on Student Affairs shall appoint an array of Hearing Panelists consisting of:

- (a) faculty members, on the advice and consent of the Faculty Council;
- (b) undergraduate students, on the advice and consent of the Undergraduate Student Assembly;
- (c) graduate students, on the advice and consent of the Council of Graduate Students;
- (d) professional students, on the advice and consent of the Professional College Council.

The Chief Hearing Officer shall randomly select from the array Hearing Panels, each composed of three faculty members, two undergraduate students, and one graduate or professional student. The Hearing Panels shall have original jurisdiction to hear cases of alleged student violation of Rule 51.03 brought before it by authorized University officials, make findings of fact, determine a verdict, and, in the event of a guilty verdict, to recommend sanctions.

51.03. Student Disruption.

Section 1. Students, as members of the University community, are expected to observe all valid and applicable city ordinances and state and federal statutes. The University distinguishes its responsibilities for student conduct from the control functions of the wider community. Except in those extraordinary cases under section five, infra, the University shall not initiate or exercise jurisdiction or disciplinary sanctions when public prosecution is anticipated or under way.

Section 2. The University may apply sanctions or take appropriate action for the breach of a valid city ordinance, or state or federal statute, only when the student's conduct, individually or by joining with others, directly and significantly interferes with the University's:

- (a) primary educational responsibility of ensuring the opportunity of all members of the University community to attain their educational objectives, or
- (b) subsidiary responsibilities of protecting the health and safety of persons in the University community, maintaining and protecting property, keeping records, providing living accommodations and other services, and sponsoring nonclassroom activities such as lectures, concerts, athletic events, and social functions.

Disruption Rules (continued)

51.03. Student Disruption, (continued)

Section 3. Sanctions which may be imposed for conduct subject to University action under section two shall include one or more of the following:

- (a) disciplinary dismissal;
- (b) disciplinary suspension;
- (c) University disciplinary probation;
- (d) probation to the Dean of Students;
- (e) restriction on the use of designated University facilities or participation in specific University activities;
- (f) admonition and warning.

Section 4. A finding, after hearing, that the terms of disciplinary sanctions have been violated may be grounds for further disciplinary action by the University.

Section 5. In extraordinary cases where (a) there is substantial likelihood that a student may be found to have violated Rule 51.03, section 2, and (b) there is a clear and present danger of repeated or continued violation, and (c) the remedies available in pending or anticipated civil proceedings are inadequate protection, the University may, following a temporary hearing at which such facts are proved, order temporary suspension or probation:

- (a) pending final adjudication of civil proceedings; or
- (b) at the option of the student, pending a prompt and full hearing on the merits prior to the completion of civil proceedings; or
- (c) until such time that the clear and present danger of repeated or continued violation no longer exists.

VIII. MISCELLANEOUS FROM OFFICE OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

A. Treasurer's Bond - Required by Section 3335.05 Ohio Revised Code

Section 3335.05 of the Ohio Revised Code requires that the Treasurer of The Ohio State University give bond to the State of Ohio in such sum as the Board of Trustees determines.

President Fawcett recommended that the bond of Gordon B. Carson, Treasurer of The Ohio State University, as required by Section 3335.05 of the Ohio Revised Code, be set at \$500,000.00.

B. <u>Marion Campus, Storm Sewer Easement</u> -<u>Unico Heights Land Company, Inc.</u>

IX. RESOLUTIONS IN MEMORIAM

President Fawcett reported to the Board the deaths of Linden Forest Edwards, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Anatomy, and Russel Garrett Means, Sr., Professor Emeritus in the Department of Otolaryngology. In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees, copies of the following resolutions expressing on behalf of the University the sorrow and sympathy of the Board will be furnished the families of the deceased.

A. Linden Forest Edwards

The Board of Trustees expresses its sorrow at the death on April 8, 1970, of Linden Forest Edwards, Ph. D., Professor Emeritus in the Department of Anatomy.

Professor Edwards was born in Lewisville, Ohio, on November 25, 1899. He received his secondary school education in the public schools of Lewisville and Reynoldsburg, Ohio. He earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in Zoology from The Ohio State University in 1922 and pursued graduate work while serving as a Graduate Assistant in the Department of Zoology and Entomology. Here he received a Master of Science degree in 1923. Upon completion of his degree he served for three years as an Instructor in the Department of Zoology. In the summers of 1922, 1923 and 1927 he attended the Franz Theodore Stone Laboratory at Put-in-Bay, Ohio, where he continued graduate study and research. From 1925 to 1929 Professor Edwards served as an Instructor of Human Anatomy in the Department of Zoology at the University of Illinois during which time he continued work leading to the Doctor of Philosophy degree. He received his Ph. D. degree from The Ohio State University in 1928. In 1929 Dr. Edwards accepted the position of Assistant Professor in the Department of Anatomy at The Ohio State University College of Medicine. Here he remained to become Associate Professor in 1934 and Professor in 1940. He was Departmental Chairman from 1956 to 1961.

During his career he served on The Ohio State University Faculty Council, Graduate Council and Committee on Honorary degrees. He has been a member of the College of Medicine's Library Committee, Curriculum Committee and Committee on Appointments and Promotions. He also served on the Graduate Committee of the College of Dentistry. He was Chairman of the Committee of Medical History and Archives of The Ohio State Historical Society, President of the Ohio Academy of Medical History, Vice President of the Medical Section of the Ohio Academy of Sciences. He was a member of the American Association of Anatomists, the International Committee for Dental Research, Sigma Xi, the American Association for the History of Medicine and the Columbus Dental Society.

Professor Edwards' research interests were in comparative anatomy, human anatomy and medical history. He contributed many original papers to all these fields, served as an Editor of the Journal of the College of Medicine, Editorial Advisor in Anatomy for <u>The Journal of Prosthetic Dentistry</u> and contributed chapters to several textbooks.

A. Linden Forest Edwards (continued)

Dr. Edwards loved to teach and had an innate ability to present general principles as well as stuffy details of anatomy in a manner which allowed students to grasp and clearly understand most any difficult region of anatomy. His presentations were dynamic, meaningful and interesting. In 1964 he received the University's Distinguished Teaching Award.

In 1965 after 38 years in the Department of Anatomy, Professor Edwards retired. His major effort following retirement was the third edition of his text <u>Concise Anatomy</u>.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Dr. Edwards its deep sympathy. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed in the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a humble expression of the Board's heartfelt sympathy in its bereavement.

B. Russel Garrett Means, Sr.

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow at the death on April 25, 1970, of Russel G. Means, Sr., M.D., Professor Emeritus in the Department of Otolaryngology.

Dr. Means was born in Columbus, Ohio, on May 21, 1895. He was graduated from The Ohio State University where he earned two degrees - the Bachelor of Science degree in 1917 and the Doctor of Medicine degree in 1919. From 1918 to 1919 he served as an intern at Mount Carmel Hospital in Columbus. In 1919 he began residency in otolaryngology at the Metropolitan Hospital in New York City. From 1921 to 1922 he was a resident at the Manhattan Eye and Ear Hospital in New York City. He was certified by the American Board of Otolaryngology in 1923. In 1936 he did postgraduate study in otolaryngology in Vienna.

Dr. Means began his practice in otolaryngology in Columbus in 1922. He was on the staffs of Starling Loving (now University Hospital), White Cross, Children's and Mount Carmel Hospitals. In 1940 he served as president of the Columbus Academy of Medicine. He was a co-founder and first president of the Metropolitan Health Council. Dr. Means served as alumni secretary for the Medical College for more than fifteen years and was chairman of the Annual Post Collegiate Medical Assemblies. He served for fifteen years as otologist for the Ohio State School for the Deaf and was director for the Columbus Hearing Society. He served two terms on the Ohio Department of Health Council.

Dr. Means joined the faculty of The Ohio State University College of Medicine as a teaching assistant in otolaryngology in 1922 and served in that capacity until 1927 when he became an instructor in otolaryngology at The Ohio State University. He was acting chairman of the Department of Otolaryngology from 1953 to 1954.

B. Russel Garrett Means, Sr. (continued)

In 1956 he received The Ohio State University Distinguished Service Award for "having sparked the original drive for The Ohio State University Health Center." In 1948 he was honored with the College of Medicine Alumni Achievement Award. In addition, in 1962 he received another citation from the College of Medicine ". . . because he was a teacher, physician, civic leader and honored citizen. " A bronze plaque engraved to that effect now hangs in Hamilton Hall. In this Centennial Year, Dr. Means was a recipient of a Centennial Award for Distinguished Alumni.

His interest in community activities was equally ambitious. He was a past director of the Columbus Area Chamber of Commerce and the Community Chest. He was a member of the First Community Church, Masonic Bodies, Grange, Sons of the American Revolution and a charter member and third president of the University Club.

On behalf of the University community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Russel Garrett Means, Sr., its deep sympathy. It was directed that this resolution be inscribed in the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to the family as a sincere expression of the Board's realization of the loss which the family and the University have sustained.

1. Resolution Providing for the Issuance of Not Exceeding \$4,500,000 Parking System Revenue Notes, Series 1970

The Chairman of the Finance and Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees, Mr. Frederick Jones, made the following statement:

On September 8, 1966, the Board of Trustees passed a Bond Resolution initiating action on Parking System Revenue Bonds in the amount of \$4, 500, 000.

The first borrowing on this resolution consisted of one-year Parking System Revenue Notes in the amount of \$700,000 and was approved by the Board of Trustees on June 8, 1967.

The second borrowing occurred on June 13, 1968, at which time the borrowing amounted to \$1,700,000 including the refinancing of the previous \$700,000.

The third borrowing occurred on June 12, 1969, at which time the \$1,700,000 previously financed was refinanced for a period of one year.

With the added construction of the parking ramp to serve the Medical Center, it is necessary to borrow the full amount authorized under the Bond Resolution, \$4,500,000, and I, therefore, move the resolution providing for the issuance of \$3,200,000 Parking Revenue System Notes, Series 1970.

RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE AND AWARD OF NOT EXCEEDING \$4,500,000 PARKING SYSTEM REVENUE NOTES, SERIES 1970, FOR THE PURPOSE OF REFUNDING CERTAIN REVENUE NOTES HERETOFORE ISSUED TO PAY PART OF THE COSTS OF CONSTRUCTING AND EQUIPPING MOTOR VEHICLE PARKING FACILITIES AND TO PAY THE COSTS OF ADDITIONAL MOTOR VEHICLE PARKING FACILITIES AND PROVIDING FOR OTHER MATTERS INCIDENTAL THERETO.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University (herein called the "Board") is vested with the government of The Ohio State University (herein called the "University" and, when the context admits, collectively with the Board called the "University") under and by virtue of Section 3335.02 of the Revised Code of Ohio, with the right, under Section 3335.03 of said Revised Code, and as such Board, of suing and being sued, contracting and being contracted with, and of making and using a common seal and, under Section 3335.10 of said Revised Code, has general supervision of all lands, buildings, and other property of the University and control of all expenses thereof; and by Chapter 3335 of the Revised Code of Ohio; and

1. <u>Resolution Providing for the Issuance of Not Exceeding</u> \$4,500,000 Parking System Revenue Notes, Series 1970 (continued)

WHEREAS, by authority of Sections 3345.11 and 3345.12 of the Revised Code of Ohio, the Board is authorized to, among other things to construct and equip motor vehicle parking facilities; and for the purpose of paying all or part of the costs thereof the Board is further authorized to issue and sell obligations in the manner provided by and subject to the applicable provisions of Section 3345.12, Ohio Revised Code;

WHEREAS, the Board has previously determined, and does hereby confirm that it is necessary to provide additional motor vehicle parking facilities and, accordingly, that it is necessary to construct and equip additional motor vehicle parking facilities within or in close proximity to its campus, including three multi-level parking structures, for the parking of approximately 2,250 motor vehicles (being herein called the "Project"), the cost of which is presently estimated to be \$4,500,000; and

WHEREAS, the University proposes to borrow funds to pay the costs of constructing and equipping the Project, and for such purpose, to issue its Parking System Revenue Bonds (hereinafter called the "Project Bonds"), Series A, in the principal amount of \$4,500,000, pursuant to the laws of the State of Ohio and resolutions, including Resolution adopted by the Board on September 8, 1966, authorizing said Project Bond (which resolution is, as the same may be amended, supplemented or superseded, hereinafter called the "Bond Resolution"); and

WHEREAS, to provide for the refunding of prior notes issued for, and the proceeds of which were applied to, the interim construction financing for part of the costs of the Project prior to the issuance and delivery of the Project Bonds, the University has issued and there is outstanding its Parking System Revenue Note, Series 1969 in the amount of \$1,700,000 (hereinafter called the "Outstanding Note"); and

WHEREAS, the University hereby determines to borrow \$2,800,000 of Funds to pay part of the costs of additional motor vehicle parking facilities; and

WHEREAS, there has been submitted the following proposals for the purchase of said notes at 100% of par and at the designated interest rate:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University:

Section 1. It is hereby confirmed and declared that it is necessary to construct and equip the Project, and to issue, and that there shall be issued, notes in the aggregate principal sum of \$4,500,000 pursuant to Sections 3345.11 and 3345.12 of the Revised Code of Ohio, for the purpose of refunding the Outstanding Note issued and delivered to pay part of the costs of the Project and to provide additional interim construction financing to pay the balance of the costs of the Project.

Section 2. The principal of and interest on such notes, and such additional notes as may be issued to pay part of the costs of the Project shall be payable solely from (a) the "Pledged Receipts" after provision for "Operating and Maintenance Expenses," if any, of the "Pledged Facilities, " and all payments required to be made, from time to time from said "Pledged Receipts" into the "Special Funds" created under the Bond Resolution subject to the pledge thereof to the bonds authorized by the Bond Resolution upon the issuance of said Bonds; and (b) the proceeds of the sale of revenue bonds or notes of the University issued pursuant to Sections 3345.11 and 3345.12 of the Revised Code of Ohio, or other authorizing provisions of law, to refund the Notes authorized hereby; provided that neither the State of Ohio nor the University, nor its Board of Trustees shall be obligated to pay the principal of or interest on such notes from any other funds or source, nor shall such notes be a claim upon or lien against any other property of the University or the State of Ohio, and said notes are not general obligations of the State or University, and the full faith and credit there are not pledged thereto, and the noteholders shall have no right to have any taxes levied, collected or applied for or to the payment thereof.

In consideration of the loan evidenced by the notes authorized hereby, the University and its Board covenant and agree that they will do all things necessary to effect the issuance of and delivery, prior to the maturity of such notes, of revenue bonds or notes for the refunding of the Notes, pursuant to Sections 3345.11 and 3345.12 of the Revised Code of Ohio or other authorizing provisions of law, in such principal amount as shall be necessary to pay the principal of and interest on such notes, that they will do all things necessary to sell such bonds or notes at the time provided above and will accept such price and such interest rate as shall be necessary in order to effect such sale, and these obligations are established as duties specifically enjoined by law upon the University and its officers, and result from their respective offices, trusts or stations within the meaning of Section 2731.01 of the Revised Code of Ohio. The University covenants that proceeds of said Notes shall not be invested or used in such manner that any of said Notes would be "arbitrage bonds" for purposes of Section 103 (d)(1) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954.

Section 3. Said notes shall be designated "Parking System Notes, Series 1970," shall be dated June 26, 1970, and shall mature June 25, 1971. Said notes shall bear interest at the rates specified in Section 4 hereof, payable semi-annually, or at maturity as requested by the Original Purchaser. Said notes shall be in denominations of \$5,000 or any multiple thereof, as bearer notes with or without coupons, or may be represented by a single note for the entire issue, as may be requested by the Original Purchaser, and shall be numbered as determined by the Vice President, Business and Finance or the Assistant Treasurer. Said notes shall be payable at the office of the Original Purchaser, or at such other place as he may designate, and shall be signed by the President or the Vice President, Business and Finance, one of which may be a facsimile, attested by the Secretary of the Board, and the coupons, if any, pertaining thereto shall be signed by or bear the facsimile signature of said Vice President, Business and Finance or the Assistant Treasurer, and the notes shall bear the seal of the University or facsimile thereof.

If agreeable to the Original Purchaser, prior to delivery of the definitive notes, said notes may be delivered as one or more temporary manuscript notes to be surrendered to the University at the principal office of the paying agent when the University shall notify the holder thereof that the definitive notes are available. The definitive notes shall be substantially in the form attached hereto as Exhibit A, page 566, the terms and covenants of which are incorporated herein, with such modifications therein as may be appropriate for issuance of the notes herein or other unregistered form, with or without coupons or to reflect the terms of the sale thereof consistent with this resolution and with such changes therein, not substantially adverse to the University, as the President or the Vice President, Business and Finance, may approve.

If the owner (in this paragraph called the "owner") of a note issued pursuant to this Resolution claims that such note has been lost, destroyed, or wrongfully taken, the Vice President, Business and Finance, or the Assistant Treasurer of the University are each authorized to cause to be executed and delivered a new note (in this paragraph called the "replacement note") of like tenor and date (specifying on its face, however, that it is issued in place of the original note) in place of the original note, in accordance with and subject to the provisions of Section 1308, 35 of the Revised Code of Ohio and of this paragraph. The owner's notification and request pursuant to said Section 1308.35 shall be in writing, addressed to the Vice President, Business and Finance, or Assistant Treasurer of the University, and shall include evidence satisfactory to said Vice President or Assistant Treasurer of such loss, destruction, or wrongful taking and of his ownership. The Vice President, Business and Finance, or in his absence the Assistant Treasurer of the University, is authorized to approve, so long as satisfactory to such officer, the indemnity bond that the owner shall file with the University as a condition to the issuance of a replacement note, and

The principal sum and interest thereon are payable in lawful money of the United States at the principal office of ______ of

without deduction for its services as the University's paying agent, upon presentation and surrender of this note. The interest on this note and the principal hereof are payable solely from (a) the "Pledged Receipts" after provision for "Operating and Maintenance Expenses," if any, of the "Pledged Facilities" and all payments required to be made, from time to time, from said "Pledged Receipts" into the "Special Funds" created by the Bond Resolution, identified below, as such terms are defined in the Bond Resolution subject to the pledge thereof to the bonds authorized by said Bond Resolution upon the issuance of said Bonds; and (b) the proceeds of the sale of revenue bonds or notes issued pursuant to Sections 3345.11 and 3345.12 of the Revised Code of Ohio or other authorizing provisions of law to refund this note; and neither the State of Ohio nor the University or its Board of Trustees is obligated to pay the same from any other funds or source, nor shall this note be a claim upon or lien against any other property of the State or the University, and the full faith and credit thereof are not pledged thereto and the noteholders shall have no right to have any taxes levied, collected or applied for or to the payment hereof. The aforesaid Bond Resolution is the Resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees September 8, 1966, authorizing the issuance of \$4, 500,000 principal amount of parking system revenue bonds, as such Resolution may be amended, supplemented or superseded.

This note is one of a duly authorized series of notes of like tenor and effect, except as to , issued for the purpose of refunding \$1,700,000 principal amount of The Ohio State University Parking System Revenue Notes, Series 1969, dated June 27, 1969, issued and delivered to pay part of the cost of constructing and equipping certain motor vehicle parking facilities within or in close proximity to its campus, including three multi-level parking structures for the parking of approximately 2,250 motor vehicles and to provide moneys to pay the balance of such costs, under authority of, pursuant to and in full compliance with the general laws of the State of Ohio, particularly Sections 3345.11 and 3345.12 of the Revised Code, and pursuant to a Resolution of the Board of Trustees of said University duly adopted on the 11th day of June, 1969.

In consideration of the loan evidenced by this note, the University and its Board of Trustees covenant and agree that they will do all things necessary to effect the issuance of and delivery, prior to the maturity of this note, of revenue bonds or notes for the refunding of this note, pursuant to Sections 3345. 11 and 3345. 12 of the Revised Code of Ohio, or other authorizing provision of law, in such principal amount as shall be necessary to pay the principal of and interest on this note, that they will do all things necessary to sell such bonds or notes at the time provided above and will accept such price and such interest rate as shall be necessary in order to effect such sale, and these obligations are established as duties specifically enjoined by law upon the University, its trustees and officers, and result from their respective offices, trusts or stations within the meaning of Section 2731. 01 of the Revised Code of Ohio.

This note is executed on behalf of said Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University solely in their capacity as such Trustees and shall not constitute their personal obligation, either jointly or severally, in their individual capacities.

AND IT IS HEREBY CERTIFIED AND RECITED, that all acts, conditions and things necessary to be done precedent to and in the issuance of this note, in order to make it a legal, valid and binding obligation of said University and its Board of Trustees, have happened, been done and performed in regular and due form as required by law.

The Recipients of Honors

RICHARD BRADFIELD

Doctor of Science

Distinguished international soil scientist and imaginative leader in research, whose achievements have brought him world-wide recognition

The leadership of Richard Bradfield in applying the basic principles of chemistry and physics to the science of soils makes him a symbol of America's contribution to the global search for freedom from hunger. His unusual ability to apply the scientific method to agricultural problems earned him the respect of soil scientists and physical and colloidal chemists, while his achievements in the colloidal chemistry of soils were rewarded with a Gugenheim Fellowship for study at the Kaiser Wilhelm Institute in Berlin.

Reared on a farm in Madison County, Ohio, he majored in chemistry for the A.B. degree at Otterbein College and received the first Ph.D. awarded by The Ohio State University in the field of soils.

As a teacher he inspired students to greater heights of creativity and productivity, and they have achieved major national and world positions of leadership in agriculture. Dr. Bradfield has served with distinction as Professor of Soils at the University of Missouri, Professor of Agronomy at The Ohio State University, and Head of the Department of Agronomy at Cornell University, where the new agronomy building has been dedicated Bradfield Hall in his honor.

Dr. Bradfield served as a member of the board of trustees of the Rockefeller Foundation, and was one of three stellar scientists who laid the groundwork for the agricultural revolution in Mexico. The principles inaugurated in Mexico and described by Dr. Bradfield and his colleagues in their book, *Campaigns Against Hunger*, have become the basis of the green revolution in India, Pakistan, and the Philippines. Dr. Bradfield's procedures for rice production in the Philippines promise revolutionary changes in the culture of Southeast Asia's major food crop.

His professional colleagues have recognized his leadership by electing him president of the Soil Science Society of America, the American Society of Agronomy, and the International Society of Soil Science. Otterbein College conferred upon him the honorary degree, Doctor of Science.

The Ohio State University is proud to honor this distinguished alumnus and former faculty member who exemplifies the ultimate in professional excellence.

HENRY STEELE COMMAGER Doctor of Letters

Eminent historian, interpreter of the American heritage, and exponent of freedom, equality, loyalty, and dissent

Henry Steele Commager, a distinguished and productive scholar, has written and edited works on American intellectual, political, and constitutional history, biographies, anthologies, and essays on contemporary problems. His writings, esteemed by fellow historians, have won wide popular audiences in this country and abroad. He has attempted to put present issues in historical perspective and has not hesitated to speak vigorously and cogently in support or condemnation of public policies in domestic and foreign affairs.

Henry Commager's ancestors were among the pioneer settlers of Ohio. Born in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, in 1902, he spent part of his youth in Toledo. He took bachelor's, master's, and Ph.D. degrees at the University of Chicago, receiving the doctorate in 1928. In a professorial career spanning more than four decades, Dr. Commager has taught at New York University, Columbia University, and Amherst College and has held appointments at major universities in Europe and the Americas. Devoted students in all parts of the country testify to his dedication to and effectiveness in the art of teaching.

The Growth of the American Republic, which Professor Commager wrote in collaboration with Samuel Eliot Morison, has elevated standards of college instruction in American history. Commager's Documents of American History makes fundamental sources available to teachers and students at every academic level. His provocative study, The American Mind, has influenced teaching and stimulated research in American intellectual history.

As one of the general editors of the New American Nation series, he is responsible for one of the most ambitious undertakings in contemporary historical scholarship.

Henry Steele Commager has sought to discover and reveal the characteristics and meaning of American civilization. In a troubled, uncertain era he has been an eloquent spokesman of democratic and humane values and a courageous defender of freedom of inquiry.

The Ohio State University takes pride in recognizing Dr. Commager's services to his profession and to his country.

PAUL J. FLORY

Doctor of Science

Pioneering and continuously productive student of the macromolecular realm, whose service to science is of rare distinction

The great importance of his scientific specialty, the study of polymeric and macromolecular substances, and his massive contribution to it, have combined to make Paul J. Flory an internationally renowned and honored scholar.

Dr. Flory received the B.S. degree from Manchester College and the M.S. and Ph.D. degrees from The Ohio State University. From 1934 to 1948 he was successively a research chemist at E. I. du Pont de Nemours, a research chemist with Standard Oii of New Jersey, and a section head in the laboratories of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company. In 1948 he left industry to become, in turn, Professor of Chemistry at Cornell, Executive Director of Research at the Mellon Institute, and Professor of Chemistry at Stanford where, in 1965, he was named the first Jackson-Wood Professor of Chemistry.

Dr. Flory has pioneered in research on the constitution and properties of macromolecules, including their formation via polymerization and their physical and thermodynamic properties. His investigations have included theoretical and experimental studies and have employed the methods of statistical mechanics in developing generic characterizations of the physical chemistry of macromolecules.

His reserch has been reported in more than two hundred scientific papers and two books which he has written or for which he has served as co-author. Dr. Flory's Principles of Polymer Chemistry has been referred to as "the fundamental polymer textbook for industry," and his Configuration of Chain Molecules has contributed significantly to the understanding of molecular structure Formal recognition of his stature has come many times in the honors bestowed upon him by his fellow chemists and scientific colleagues, both in this country and abroad. A member of the National Academy of Sciences, Dr. Flory has received the Colwyn Medal of the Institution of the Rubber Industry, the International Award in Plastics and Science Engineering of the Society of Plastics Engineers, and the High Polymer Physics Prize of the American Physical Society. In 1945, Dr. Flory was the recipient of the Joseph Sullivant Medal of The Ohio State University for outstanding contributions to his profession and his alma mater.

This University takes pride in recognizing the pre-eminent contributions of Paul J. Flory by conferring upon him the honorary degree, Doctor of Science.

THOMAS CARLYLE JONES

Doctor of Science

Veterinary scientist who has contributed immeasurably to the health of animals and man through innovative educational methods

Scholarly productivity and administrative ability give Dr. Thomas Carlyle Jones a pre-eminent position in veterinary medicine today. His achievements in pathology were recognized internationally in March, 1970, when he was installed as president of the International Academy of Pathology.

He received his undergraduate and professional education at Washington State University and was graduated with highest honors. One of his early major accomplishments was the establishment of veterinary pathology as a modern functional discipline through his studies and discoveries on a wide variety of animal disease problems.

While at the Walter Reed Army Medical Center, Dr. Jones started the Section of Veterinary Pathology as part of the Armed Forces Institute of Pathology and developed an advanced training program which continues today as the model of professional educational methods. He conceived and organized the first specialty board in the veterinary medical profession, the American College of Veterinary Pathologists. Serving for ten years as executive secretary and later as president of that organization, Dr. Jones was instrumental in establishing standards and organizational structure which have served as the basis for the development of all veterinary medical specialties.

Through his service as chairman of the Advisory Board on Veterinary Medical Specialties of the American Veterinary Medical Association, Dr. Jones has guided the formation of all veterinary medical specialty organizations. The culmination of his efforts to develop veterinary pathology was his publication of a textbook on veterinary pathology which has been acclaimed as the classic in its field.

Dr. Jones' career also has produced important contributions to comparative pathology. In 1957, he was appointed Director of Pathology at Angell Memorial Animal Hospital, associate clinical professor of pathology at Harvard Medical School, and associate director of the New England Regional Primate Center where he has had wide influence in stimulating comparative studies on animal models of human diseases.

The Ohio State University is proud to honor a man whose leadership has greatly enhanced veterinary medicine as a modern medical science and furthered the advancement of the health of animals and man.

J. WALTER SEVERINGHAUS

Doctor of Humane Letters

Noted architect and designer of leading contemporary buildings, whose professional excellence enhances man's constructed environment

A constant consideration for man in a man-planned environment characterizes the innovation in humanistic architecture of J. Walter Severinghaus and has earned international respect and admiration for his work.

Mr. Severinghaus was graduated Phi Beta Kappa from Ohio Wesleyan University and with highest honors in architecture from The Ohio State University. In 1937 he joined the firm of Skidmore, Owings and Merrill in New York, where he advanced rapidly to become a senior partner in 1949.

In 1960 he was elected a Fellow of the American Institute of Architects, in recognition of excellence in architectural design—an honor accorded less than one per cent of all architects in the United States. In 1963 he was honored as a Distinguished Alumnus of The Ohio State University's College of Engineering.

His architectural firm has achieved a world-wide reputation for excellence. Assignment of high priority to human values characterizes every SOM project, regardless of its scope or complexity. Prompted originally by declining resources of skilled labor in many areas of the construction industry, this firm has utilized the capabilities of modern American technology in mass production, on-site assembly, and in adaptation to the skills available. The senior partners and project architects have been identified prominently in a long series of citations awarded to their firm by representatives of the public at large, the clients, and the profession of architecture.

Among the many outstanding structures designed by Mr. Severinghaus are the facilities for United States airfields in Morocco, buildings for the Ford Motor Company in Dearborn, the International Arrivals Building and the United Airlines Terminal in New York, the First City National Bank in Houston, and the Chase Manhattan Bank in New York. His latest project is the New York Stock Exchange, now in the final design stage.

At a time when man's total surroundings are subjected to ever closer scrutiny and evaluation, this University is proud to honor a distinguished architect whose completed buildings add beauty, utility, and order to America's constructed environment.

JAMES A. SHANNON

Doctor of Science

Distinguished physician, under whose leadership the National Institutes of Health became a major national resource for the support of medical education and research

The "Shannon Era" has already become legendary in the history of biomedical research in the United States. By application of his many abilities in the practical political world, James A. Shannon was able to guide the development of the National Institutes of Health into the remarkable program to which our Nation owes so much.

A graduate of the College of the Holy Cross, he received his M.D. and Ph.D. from New York University. Dr. Shannon has contributed substantially, as physiologist and later as a clinician, to our knowledge about the kidney, and during World War II, to our knowledge of malaria, a major health hazard to our armed forces.

He went to Washington, D.C., in the early days of the National Institutes of Health, first as Associate Director of the National Heart Institute in charge of research. Later he became Associate Director of the National Institutes of Health, and from 1955 until 1968, he served as Director.

Under his direction, the program expanded massively through grants to universities, through fellowships, and through a variety of collaborative efforts. Scientific developments, such as drug therapy for high blood pressure, vaccination for poliomyelitis, modern cardiovascular surgery, and a whole new era of clinical medicine occurred. With the support of NIH programs, the medical schools of this country became the modern medical enters of today.

Under Dr. Shannon's direction, the National Institutes of Health maintained a steady course of progress and developed a long-term program which brought medicine, dentistry, nursing, veterinary medicine, pharmacy, and other biological and scientific fields into a coalition for health. The impact of this program has been felt directly by every academic medical center, medical student, and physician in the United States. The rapid development of bio-engineering on the Ohio State campus is a case in point.

Through Dr. Shannon's medical and administrative ability, combined with creative and resourceful planning, a great contribution of major proportions was made toward the broad goal of truly scientific medicine and better health care for the citizens of the United States. The Ohio State University is proud to honor Dr. James A. Shannon for his unique contributions to medical education and research.

S. FRED SINGER

Doctor of Science

Eminent scientist, educator, author, and public servant, whose fundamental contributions to the physical sciences have won international acclaim

Starting as an experimentalist and gradually shifting into theoretical areas, S. Fred Singer has fashioned a career highlighted by innovations in pioneering endeavors. He has followed his scientific interests into many different areas of geophysics, and his contributions to each have been substantial, often generating further research.

Born in Vienna, Austria, in 1924, he received the Bachelor of Electrical Engineering degree from The Ohio State University in 1943, the A.M. from Princeton in 1944, and the Ph.D. in physics in 1948 from Princeton. Since 1946, Dr. Singer's positions have covered a wide spectrum of academic endeavors and public service.

From 1946 to 1950 he was a physicist at the Applied Physics Laboratory of Johns Hopkins University where he engaged in high altitude research using baloons and high altitude research rockets. Under his direction, physical phenomena which had been previously inaccessible were first brought within the scope of measurement. Later, holding high-level government and academic positions, he made numerous fundamental contributions in such diverse areas as relativity theory, the origin and age of meteorites, properties of interplanetary dust, moon surface composition, primary cosmic rays, ionospheric currents, magnetic storms and aurorae, and radiation-belt theory.

While serving as first director of the National Weather Satellite Center, Dr. Singer was instrumental in the development of the TIROS meteorological satellite. He has served as Professor and Dean of the School of Environmental and Planetary Sciences at the University of Miami and is presently the U.S. Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Interior for Scientific Programs. Dr. Singer has received numerous honors for his pioneering research, including a Special Commendation from President Eisenhower for outstanding achievement in the development of satellites for scientific purposes and the first Astronautics Medal of the British Interplanetary Society.

The University is proud to honor a distinguished scientist whose brilliant insight has shed light upon many areas of man's knowledge of the universe.

Columbus, Ohio, June 19, 1970

Pursuant to Article I, Section 2, of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, the Board met upon the call of the Chairman, John G. Ketterer, in a special meeting on Friday, June 19, 1970, at 10:00 a.m.

Present: John G. Ketterer, Chairman, James W. Shocknessy, John H. Dunlap, Jack G. Gibbs and Frederick R. Eckley.

Mr. Ketterer made the following statement:

At the regular meeting of the Board last week there was an issue presented to the Board that involved the employment of Charles Ross as the Director of the Black Studies Program, a Program which I might add has been in the making for some time and had been authorized by the Board of Trustees several months ago. With only six members of the Board present at that meeting, the vote in respect to the employment of Mr. Ross was three members in favor to three members against, resulting in a defeat of this recommendation. The afternoon following the meeting, the Faculty Advisory Committee asked to meet with a representative of the Board, and since I happened to be on Campus, staying over to attend graduation on Friday, I agreed to honor the Committee's request. At that time the point was made that on a matter of such importance the academic community. the students of the University, the faculty and the interested people in this State had a right to know how all of the members of the Board stood on this matter. After some reflection, I decided that a special meeting should be called. Members of the Board were polled in an effort to select a date which would have as many members available as possible. And so this meeting was called, notices were sent out, and we are assembled today to deal with this one issue and that is the issue of the employment of Mr. Ross as Director of the Black Studies Program.

I. PERSONNEL CHANGE

President Fawcett recommended that the following Appointment be approved:

A. Appointment

Charles O. Ross, Chairman, Black Studies division, effective July 1, 1970, at a salary of \$24,528.00 for twelve months. He will also hold the title Associate Professor in the School of Social Work at No Salary.

Upon motion of Mr. Dunlap, seconded by Mr. Shocknessy, the foregoing Appointment was approved by unanimous roll call vote.

Mr. Shocknessy made the following statement after the approval of the appointment of Mr. Ross:

Mr. Chairman, I would like to make a statement. By the vote here this morning, eight of the nine members of our Board have given public expression concerning the employment of Mr. Ross. The three members who voted against this employment last week are not here today. I do not know why they are not here; accordingly, I cannot pass judgment on their absence. But two of the members who were not here last week are here today. And this vote today by five members of this Board is not merely a vote of a majority of a quorum, but the five members who have just voted constitute a majority of the Board. Only one member of our

Board has not publicly passed judgment on this employment and publicly been counted, that's Mr. Hilliker. Every other Board member, either last week or today, has publicly expressed his judgment and has publicly been counted. Thus, I believe that what we are doing is precisely what the Chairman envisioned, we are bringing to the attention of the whole Board a problem of the whole Board. I conclude merely by saying that I want the record of this meeting to emphasize that eight members of our Board, either at the meeting last week or today, have indicated their judgment; and five of the members of our Board, constituting a majority of the membership of the Board, have voted for the employment of Mr. Ross.
