MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Columbus, Ohio, April 6-7, 2017

The Board of Trustees met on Thursday, April 6, 2017 and Friday, April 7, 2017 at Longaberger Alumni House in Columbus, Ohio, pursuant to adjournment.

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Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

The chairman, Mr. Shumate, called the meeting of the Board of Trustees to order on Thursday, April 6, 2017, at 2:46 p.m.

Mr. Shumate:

Good afternoon. I would like to convene the meeting of the Board of Trustees and ask the secretary to note the attendance.

Dr. Thompson:

A quorum is present, Mr. Chairman.

Mr. Shumate:

I hereby move that the board recess into executive session to consider business sensitive trade secret matters required to be kept confidential by federal and state statutes, and to discuss personnel matters regarding the appointment, employment and compensation of public officials.

Dr. Thompson:

Motion carries, Mr. Chairman.

The chairman, Mr. Shumate, reconvened the meeting of the Board of Trustees on Friday, April 7, 2017, at 10:03 a.m.

Mr. Shumate:

Good morning, good morning, everyone. It's my pleasure to reconvene the meeting of the Board of Trustees and I'd ask the secretary to note the attendance.

Dr. Thompson:

A quorum is present, Mr. Chairman.

Mr. Shumate:

So that we are able to conduct this meeting in an orderly fashion, I would ask that the ringers on all cell phones and other communication devices be turned off at this time, and I would ask that all members of the audience observe rules of decorum proper to conducting the business at hand. It's good to see everyone this morning. I am very pleased with the turnout and we welcome all of you to our meeting. Before we get to the heart of our agenda, I would like to welcome our newest trustee, Mr. Alan Stockmeister. Alan joins us from Jackson, Ohio. I know, Alan, we have kept you very busy with the onboarding process and, over the last several days, with the medical center board

meeting as well as the various committee meetings. We certainly look forward to partnering with you and working with you as we advance this great institution. Welcome to our board.

Mr. Stockmeister:

Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Mr. Shumate:

I will now call on one of our student trustees, Dr. Lydia Lancaster, to present the Student Recognition Awards.

STUDENT RECOGNITION AWARDS

Dr. Lancaster:

Thank you, Chairman Shumate. I would like to call Alexa Aton and Craig Berning up to the table, please.

I would like to first introduce Alexa. Alexa Aton is a fourth year student in the College of Social Work. In the midst of maintaining an excellent academic record and engaging in community outreach, she's busy winning national championships. That's no joke. She has been a member of The Ohio State University varsity synchronized swimming team the past four years, winning a national championship in 2015 and just recently last month, so let's take a moment to give a round of applause for our excellence in athletics. I believe that is the team's 30th national championship, so that is pretty impressive. In addition to maintaining her academics and athletic excellence, she enjoys participating in organizations around campus including: Athletes in Action, the College of Social Work Student Association, and Honors and Scholars Ambassadors. She is also an undergraduate research assistant for the university's Racial Democracy, Crime & Justice Network.

Alexa has a heart of servant leadership, no doubt. In pursuing the mission of others first, she commits to her team's initiative, Give Back a Day, in which each student-athlete is encouraged to achieve at least 24 hours of community service each year of their undergraduate education. Some of the organizations Alexa has served include the 2nd and 7 Foundation, the Mid-Ohio Foodbank, the American Heart Association, the Stefanie Spielman Foundation, the Red Cross, the Arthritis Foundation, Nationwide Children's Hospital, and many more. Alexa also took part in a 2015 Buck-I-SERV trip where she spent a week investing her time and energy in the city of Chicago.

In addition, Alexa has spent two summers working as an AmeriCorps VISTA summer associate and looks forward to leading a life of service through social work. During her summers of service, Alexa was appointed assistant site director for Serving Our Neighbors (SON) Ministries in Hilliard, Ohio. During this time, she worked with a Christian non-profit utilizing free lunch programs as a way to create an environment that emphasizes human worth, while seeking to diminish the effects of hunger and poverty. She is currently interning at Clintonville-Beechwold Community Resources Center serving as an Ohio Benefit Bank counselor focusing on case management and connecting clients with various community resources.

Upon completing her undergraduate studies, Alexa plans to attend Ohio State's oneyear accelerated Master of Social Work program. She hopes to someday work in reentry, helping to provide resources to ex-offenders and reduce our nation's high rates of recidivism.

Please join me in congratulating Alexa. Alexa, do you have some words to share with us?

Ms. Aton:

I would just like to say thank you so much. This award is truly an honor. Getting to attend The Ohio State University for the past four years has been a dream come true. I would like to thank the College of Social Work and the Board of Trustees for this award and the opportunity to speak here today. The faculty members, Dean Gregoire and everyone at the College of Social Work have gone above and beyond to make sure we as students have an environment that allows us to be supported and challenged to become social workers, and I think that is a really great opportunity. Over the course of my undergraduate career, I have been so blessed with the opportunities that I have had. As mentioned, some of the highlights have been being able to represent the school as an athlete, and a lot of that is a big thank you to Gene Smith and everything that he has given us and provided us with and supported us. Also, just the opportunity I've had to be involved in the community and give back. Lastly, I would like to thank my parents, who are here today, for supporting me and allowing me to achieve my goals and never letting me give up. They have instilled in me a desire to serve others and allowed me a way to live out my faith in a visible way and I am so thankful for that. Next year, I will be attending Ohio State, pursuing my master's degree in social work and I am so excited to continue my education at such a wonderful university, so thank you for your time.

Dr. Lancaster:

Thank you for all you do, it's really exceptional.

Our second student, another exceptional student, is Craig Berning. Craig is a fourth year student in The College of Food, Agricultural and Environmental Sciences (CFAES). Craig is originally from Anna, Ohio, where he was heavily involved with the National FFA (Future Farmers of America) organization. At Ohio State, Craig is majoring in Agribusiness and Applied Economics with a minor in Science and Engineering Public Policy. Craig has been an active member in numerous student organizations while balancing a challenging academic curriculum and completing internships focused in agricultural and food policy.

Craig began his time at Ohio State being involved in Undergraduate Student Government where he served as a senator for the College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences as well as director of the Interns Program—a leadership development program for first year students within USG. He also served as director of solicitations for the Edward S. Beanie Drake Student Leadership Endowment, raising money to provide significant scholarships to younger students seeking to actively engage in the Ohio State community.

In the College of Food, Agricultural and Environmental Sciences, he has served as an ambassador leading prospective student tours and engaging with alumni and donors. He has also served as president of CFAES Student Council, leading 40 student organizations in the planning and execution of college-wide events. In addition, he has been active as a member of FarmHouse Fraternity.

Academically, Craig has been a member of The Ohio State University Honors program, conducting research focused on the assessing legislation passed on the labeling of bioengineered foods. He won first place in the CFAES Research Forum Social Sciences Division and presented at the Denman Undergraduate Research Forum. Additionally, he has contributed to scientific comments to the FDA (Food and Drug Administration) with his academic advisor, Dr. Brian Roe, about how consumers perceive the term healthy.

Much of his research experience stems from his experience in working with agricultural and food policy in Washington D.C. Craig currently serves as an intern for the Ohio Agribusiness Association and Senator Rob Portman. Following graduation next month, Craig plans to move to Washington, D.C., to pursue a career in agricultural and food policy.

Congratulations, Craig. Do you have some words to share as well?

Mr. Berning:

I always tell people that Ohio State has afforded me so many incredible opportunities and a lot of that starts with the work that you as a board do, so thank you for your work and for all of the administration, faculty and staff's work at Ohio State. Because of that work, I have had some incredible opportunities here at Ohio State. I also would like to thank my parents, Doug and Pam Berning, who are back here. I think that I never had to be told about the importance of engaging in your community and giving back. My parents both modeled that behavior for me from a young age and that really helped me when I came to Ohio State to realize that engaging in this community and helping to provide to the Ohio State community is something that I wanted to make sure I did. So through my involvement from the CFAES student council, helping to just create events that bring students together that maybe otherwise wouldn't interact with each other and really create an inclusive community feel was something that was important to me. Serving on the Edward S. Beanie Drake Student Leadership Endowment board, [was] another really neat opportunity for me to see a lot of younger students with great potential and help to provide maybe a kick start to them as they continue on their careers at Ohio State. Just all of those opportunities-I've really felt that I wanted to give back to a community that really poured into me for so many years. I am really excited though to be able to, upon graduation in a few weeks, be moving out to D.C. to work for the National Association of Wheat Growers and to be able to use the skills and experiences that I have had here at Ohio State to help advocate for farmers, which is something that is really important and special to me and my background. I am really excited to just to be able to give back in that way and to use the skills that Ohio State has really provided me with. So, again, thank you to all of you for the work that you do.

Dr. Lancaster:

Thank you very much, Craig. Next we will go ahead and take our photos. Why don't we start with Craig and your family and representatives from your respective colleges, so we will go over there to do that.

Mr. Shumate:

Again, to Alexa and to Craig, we congratulate you and we certainly fully anticipate that both of you will have very full and successful lives and careers because of what you have learned and experienced at Ohio State. Speaking on behalf of the entire board, I wish you great success in your future endeavors. I would now like to call upon our other student trustee, Halie Vilagi, to introduce our next topic, the President's Prize, which is

being award to two of her fellow undergraduate students who are also graduating this spring.

PRESIDENT'S PRIZE AWARD

Ms. Vilagi:

Thank you, Chairman Shumate. It is my pleasure to introduce the inaugural recipients of the President's Prize, the highest recognition Ohio State awards to students committed to social change. Each President's Prize scholar, a graduating senior, will receive a living stipend and startup funding for the first year post-graduation, access to the mentorship of accomplished experts and the opportunity to share their idea with the university's global community of alumni, friends and partners. Margaret Griffin, of Cincinnati, studies in the College of Social Work. KayMesha Knox, a Columbus native, is an English major with an education focus.

I would like to invite them both to the table so that they can share with us about their projects, addressing some of our most important and pressing challenges, aligning with the focus on community engagement and President Drake's 2020 Vision for the university.

Ms. Griffin:

Hi, my name is Maggie Griffin. I am a senior within the College of Social Work and I am grateful and humbled to be a President's Prize recipient. The President's Prize has allowed me to pursue the creation of the Unity Fridge program. This program aims to increase produce accessibility in the local community through strategic outreach and engagement. I knew that I would not be able to solve the issue of food insecurity by myself. This issue is so great that no one person or major could ever hope to solve it by themselves. We have begun the process of creating the garden on Waterman Farm. It will serve five different locations in the Columbus community that are located in food deserts or facing food insecurity. One of the biggest aspects of the program are community nights and that is when we bus all of the participants in the program to Waterman Farm and they actually get to see where their food is being grown, learn about nutritional education, have access to lending libraries that we are going to create, and also can resource share and create a community within the larger Ohio State campus. What I found when beginning this project is that people are willing to give what they have for the greater good. My professor and now project advisor, Michelle Kaiser, has connected me to so many incredible resources within the community, like Ohio State Extension, Waterman Farm and the Master Gardener Program. What I found is that if we work together, we can change the Columbus community and really impact the face of food security. Thank you.

Ms. Knox:

Good morning. I can truly say that it is my privilege, honor and pleasure to be here with you today as I prepare for the next step of my path. My journey at Ohio State has been largely influenced by the support of the Office of Student Life. They helped introduce me to my sorority, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority Incorporated. With that came an amazing set of women who inspire and motivate me to do so much more. Student life has also made the Department of Social Change a reality, which allowed for the manifestation of my passion of helping low income students believe that college is not only possible, but very much attainable. Along with this, [the opportunity] allowed me to know one of the

greatest people I have ever had the pleasure of meeting and being mentored by, Dr. Patricia F. Cunningham. Not only did Dr. Patty help me expand upon my dream, but also introduced me to one of my strongest support systems, a group of black educators who can often times be the light in the tunnel at the end of a tiring day. Most importantly, Ohio State has allowed me the resources to pursue my dreams. As Dr. Frank W. Hale once said, "Commitment without capital is counterfeit." Thank you President Drake, Dr. J, and all of you, for not only believing in my dreams, but also the students at East High School. Through Steps to Success, 50 East High School students will receive a laptop, a small stipend to defray college application fees, ACT preparation, assistance with college application and essays, and mentorship from a recently graduated student or current college student in the Columbus area who will follow them throughout their collegiate career, and nine months of free Wi-Fi in their home. Thank you again for giving the students at East High School access to a collegiate education by providing affordability and encouraging excellence.

Mr. Shumate:

This is really what it's all about—honoring our students. All that we do ultimately is about the quality of the student experience. We've certainly had excellent examples of the types of students that benefit from the total educational experience, both in the classroom and outside the classroom at The Ohio State University. Again, we congratulate all of you. And Mr. President, I would be remiss if I didn't thank you for establishing these awards and for your focus on making sure that we continue to invest in our students, so thank you.

President Drake:

Well, let me say first, thank you, but even more, we didn't know what the students were going to wish to do with this offer for making a difference in some way. We were so impressed first, by the number of students who applied, and then the quality of the proposals and the real difference, as you can see, that they will make on the lives on dozens, and then scores, and then ultimately hundreds of people in our community. So we are really pleased about the impact that they are going to be having, starting in just a few weeks. It is really quite inspiring, so thank you for all you are doing for us and for our broader community. Thank you.

Mr. Shumate:

Now, I would like to turn the microphone back to Dr. Lancaster, who will talk about some of the outreach and engagement efforts that are taking place at the graduate and professional student level in the College of Dentistry. Again, continuing our focus on our students.

COLLEGE OF DENTISTRY PRESENTATION

Dr. Lancaster:

Thank you very much. Yes, like Chairman Shumate said, it is my pleasure this morning to share with you all some of the innovative ways my college, The Ohio State University College of Dentistry, is doing to engage our Ohio communities. I'd like to bring some friends from the college, Dean Patrick Lloyd and Dr. Canise Bean. They will be familiar faces throughout some of the footage of the presentation and are here if you have questions at the end, to help me out on those. Welcome and thank you.

In 2000, the Surgeon General first identified disparities and access to dental care and called it the silent epidemic in the U.S.-a silent epidemic-and indeed that is unfortunately still what it is. In Ohio, 486,000 children are without dental insurance and more than 3.9 million adults have no dental insurance at all, which is almost triple the number of Ohio adults without medical insurance. At the College of Dentistry, addressing access to dental care is at the heart of our mission, both within the curriculum and through volunteerism. The College of Dentistry is the only state-supported dental school in Ohio and, therefore, we take great seriousness in our responsibility to serve as a safety net for those Ohioans struggling to access care. There are many things that are going on at our college but, today I would like to highlight two of our major projects. The first one is the Ohio Project, as you can see on the screen. That is the oral health care initiative outreach program. It is 50 days within the curriculum-required service that our fourth year students participate in across the state at 32 different, as we call them, Ohio Project sites, but they are various public health clinics within our communities of underserved populations. Last year when I was a fourth year dental student and I actually spent my time doing those as well, not only did I work in public clinics in Columbus, urban clinics in Cincinnati, but I had the opportunity to spend three weeks providing dental care to the citizens of Ironton, Ohio, in our Appalachian area. It really had a major impact on my clinical experience at Ohio State. We even have, and you'll get to see, we have a mobile dental unit that goes to many schools and places within the Columbus community providing pediatric care to children, which will also actually be here. After they are done for the morning, you will have a chance to see the mobile unit at the end of the meeting. With the Ohio Project, over 240,000 procedures have been performed since the beginning of the program, and providing millions of dollars' worth of care is what our students are doing. I'd like to bring your attention to the screen. We have a video describing more about this innovative project the College of Dentistry does.

Dr. Lancaster:

As you can see, this is an incredibly innovative project that our college takes on and, for me personally going through it, I think one of the most valuable. Not only are we providing so much care to our Ohio citizens but we are also teaching our students the importance and awareness of this disparity in access to care, and teaching and instilling a call to service. It's also providing even more permanent solutions than just the project itself. Actually two of my classmates, I just found out recently, accepted full time positions at these project sites after they have just finished a residency program. We're taking dentists where they need to go, the areas that need more care. In addition to our curriculum initiatives, we also have many volunteer opportunities. One that we are especially proud of is the Give Kids a Smile event we host twice a year. Give Kids a Smile is actually a national program sponsored by the American Dental Association where dental schools and clinics participate across the country, providing free care to underserved children. It's an incredible way we give back so I also have another new clip. We just had an event in February and I want to show you some of the footage from that day.

(video presentation)

Dr. Lancaster:

As you can see, a lot of good is going on with that project, and I think even now to date we have given actually over \$300,000 of care with this event. I think something that is really unique about this program is that the College of Dentistry is purely the physical site of this event. This event is totally student-led and fundraisers are held to hold this

event each year. It is not only a moment of great community engagement and serving our Ohioans, but it is also a moment of leadership development. It's doing multiple things for our students and our community.

Lastly, I want to point out again how grave the need is. This event naturally, as you expect, the vast majority of our patients that come to this event are from the Columbus or Central Ohio area, but we had one family drive three hours on a Saturday morning because they needed that care for their children that badly. The need is real and, as you can see, it really is the silent epidemic of healthcare right now—our access to dentistry, to adequate dental care—and truly the College of Dentistry prioritizes being a significant part of that solution here in Ohio. I am personally proud that the college takes our land grant university's mission truly to heart, supporting Ohioans and taking care of their dental needs. Whether it is within the curriculum, like the Ohio Project, or through many of our volunteer efforts, like GCAS (Global Center for Advanced Studies), the College of Dentistry is instilling a call to service and community engagement for our future Buckeye dentists. So thank you so much for learning about what is going on in my neck of the woods in the university and to take home, just in case you forgot to brush your teeth this morning, we have some College of Dentistry toothbrushes for you today. Thank you so much. Any questions or comments?

Mr. Shumate:

Are there questions? Dean, would you like to make any comments?

Dean Lloyd:

I just want to tell everyone how proud we are to have a student body that is so actively involved in the whole state, not just Columbus, not just Franklin County. We now have, maybe stronger than ever before, a national reputation for recruiting students and hiring faculty who have similar values and I continue to see that radiate across our college and literally around our campus. I am particularly fortunate to be able to work alongside Canise Bean who got a lot of this going a decade before I arrived here a couple of years ago. I give her great credit for the things that we do, the impact that we have and the generosity that we have been able to receive all throughout our greater community. Please join me in thanking her personally for the great work that she has done in our college.

Dr. Bean:

In the interest of time, there is a lot that I could absolutely say, but I really would like to express my appreciation for allowing Lydia this time to share what we are really committed to doing. We do believe that the people across the state do deserve the access to care that they so well deserve and so desperately need. If we can train our students to understand the need, to really experience the need, then they will certainly address the need. We know that that will perpetuate and leave a legacy here for the College of Dentistry. We are very excited and we thank you for the opportunity and the time.

Ms. Krueger:

A good friend of mine is a dentist and he practices at Stow Mission. Every other Thursday night, we go there and—the tremendous amount of need—there are people lined up out the door trying to get free dental help in underserved neighborhoods and their dental help is simply just extracting teeth. It just breaks my heart because the age is anywhere from six years old to eighty-six years old. You think about a country with the vast

resources that we have, that we have these people with totally rotten teeth and it just was so sad. They are difficult to remove because they just crumble. Not only are the students from Ohio State down there extracting the teeth and learning how to work with these people, but also they are getting great experience. The dentists that are there teaching them and overseeing them and trying to help coach them are graduates of Ohio State as well, and so, that is all volunteer. It's a terrific program and I am just glad that we are a part of it and hope we can figure out how to be more important in that area. Thank you for all that you do.

President Drake:

Let me also echo the thanks and appreciation for the work that the three of you are doing along with your colleagues. Years ago, I had an experience with some colleagues. We had a series of health clinics that we had a week where we had a health day that was statewide and people came in from all across the state. Actually hundreds of thousands of people were seen during this big effort, and the thing that I learned most is that dentistry and optometry were the two things that families in particular wished to have. They needed a pair of glasses to be able to see, but particularly dentistry because they were in pain. Some of the people that came in to see us were farm workers and others who were adults who had never seen a dentist. This was a great thing to address them, and families were particularly interested in pediatric dental care. So in fact, we were induced, of all the medical services that we provide in this entire range, to provide year round services for those particular two disciplines. So the work you are doing, we know, is so important to so many families. Second, at Halloween, we have trick or treat. We added a toothbrush to the treat and it's the most popular treat that we have. In fact, [when] we give toothbrushes to the kids, the parents often take the toothbrushes as well. We are proud to be able to spread the word of The Ohio State University and the great work that you are doing to the community broadly, so thank you for that.

PRESENTATION OF THE JOHN W. NASON AWARD

Mr. Shumate:

Thank you, thank you very much. Let's give them another round of applause. We're very pleased this morning to have Mr. Rick Legon with us. Rick is the president of the Association of Governing Boards and, Rick, we thank you for joining us today and traveling to Columbus. If you could, join us at the table. Let me also invite our former chair, Bob Schottenstein, to join Rick at the table as well. Rick is the president, as I said, of the Association of Governing Boards and that association represents 1,300 colleges, universities and foundation-level boards. Many of our trustees have attended the AGB conferences. Ohio State has been a very active participant and, in fact, a leader with the Association of Governing Boards at the national level. Rick, we thank you for being here and the floor is yours.

Mr. Legon:

Thank you, Mr. Chairman, and thank you for inviting me to join you and your colleagues. I had a few minutes earlier this morning to speak with many of you who participated in the governance committee meeting to detail the nature of this AGB recognition so I won't go through all of that again, but I can say in front a number of additional people here that I am pleased to have been part of a process that recognizes the leadership of The Ohio State University board, a board that has long been committed to best practice in governance, under your leadership, Mr. Chairman, and some of your predecessors as

chair. Some of you may know, or maybe you weren't in the room to know, that Mr. Shumate was part of a national commission that AGB sponsored a number of years ago to address the challenges and ask the question as to what do we need from higher education governing boards as we move through the 21st century and he and they came up with a concept of what we call "consequential boards." Consistent with that call for boards to understand their broader responsibilities while not intruding on presidential and administrative leadership, we reestablished an award in honor of a wonderful leader, a gentleman by the name of John W. Nason, who was a former college president and a former leader of the foreign policy association. As I said earlier, he was instrumental during World War II in advocating for the release from Japanese internment camps those Japanese college-aged students who had been swept up when we interned Japanese citizens in this country at the outset of the war, and advocated for their release and was able to get some 4,000 or 5,000 of these kids into colleges and universities across the country. I happen to know this gentleman. He is a leader and, as I said earlier, he'd be sitting here right here with me noting that The Ohio State University board merits this selection. The board, as you should know, Mr. Schottenstein, was selected-Ohio State was-from 77 nominated institutions and governing boards by an independent panel that uses as its criteria for selecting recipients of this award boards that meet best practice, but also boards that take risks and demonstrate bold and visionary leadership. In recognizing The Ohio State University's board, it was in recognition of the leadership that you provided with your colleagues in recognizing the fact that this fiduciary body has a level of responsibility for the medical center and the related what was then, I think, a total of five governing bodies that oversaw the complexities of the healthcare system as a part of Ohio State University. You do great work but the efficiency of governance is something that just this gentleman lead with those of you and some of your predecessors, and it is that leadership which takes some courage to do. We see it across the country as being a challenge that our panel was especially mindful in recognizing this board for this honor. I'm pleased to be here and I am very proud to recognize The Ohio State University Board of Trustees with the John W. Nason Award. Thank you.

Mr. Shumate:

Bob, would you have any comments?

Mr. Schottenstein:

Thank you. First of all, being here this morning reminds me of what a great honor it is to be part of the board of this university—listening to the student presentations, just the aura and the importance of what happens here and how serious I think the people in this room take their responsibilities. I think that the only thing I would say is, while I was on the board, it struck me that there was always maybe mystery within the general community about what goes on at the board level. The one thing that there should be no mystery about is how seriously the individuals that are seated at this table take their work, because it matters and it starts with governance and it starts with creating the right not just people in the room, but the architecture of the structure of the board. When I first joined the board, I was unaware of that, but I learned that from my colleagues, many of whom are not in here today. I recall the great leadership of then-chairman Bob Duncan, followed by Gil Cloyd, Les Wexner and now continuing with you, Chairman Shumate, so I think that it's good for Ohio State. We like to win in everything so not just synchronized swimming, but in everything, and it's good to win this award and we appreciate it. I am just very honored to have the opportunity to say something.

Mr. Shumate:

Thank you very much. Thank you, Rick, for joining us and we really appreciate you travelling to Columbus. We look forward to continuing our partnership with the Association of Governing Boards. Would you take a picture?

Mr. Legon:

Your engagement with us means a lot, so we appreciate that.

Mr. Shumate:

Well, thank you. Bob, why don't you accept on behalf of the board and take the photo, Kevin. Thank you.

Well, thank you. The first order of business for our agenda is the minutes of the January meeting of the Board of Trustees, which were distributed to all members of the board. If there are no additions or corrections, the minutes are approved as distributed. Now, Mr. President, we will turn to your report.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President Drake:

Well, thank you very much, Alex, and good morning, everyone. Before and as I begin, we've had a lot to talk about today that I think reflects very nicely the multiple ways that we engage with the community and see the great work that our students and faculty and staff are doing, so [I am] pleased to see that.

I want to echo earlier comments that welcome Mr. Stockmeister to the board. We've had a chance to meet over the years and I've had a chance to come down and visit you, so it's great to have you here with us and look forward to many years of working together.

Also, let me thank Mr. Legon for joining us today. The Nason award sets a standard for our future work. I will mention that I am active, as you know, in a few national organizations of college presidents and chancellors. I remember that a few years ago there was one particular session where people there were talking about their boards. Generally, it was an outdoing each other on how awful the board was to work with truly, how obstructionist and challenging, obscure, et cetera, the boards could be. I would say that coming to this university and working with this board, it has been a board where we have been partners with students and faculty and staff, expanding the roll of students actually in the last couple of years, but people all over the state who care passionately about the state of Ohio and The Ohio State University and help us be the best place that we can be. It really is something that we appreciate. Then to be recognized externally for that really is another validation, so we are pleased and thank you for that.

Our aspiration broadly is to significantly strengthen our position as a national flagship public research university, so this is a great step in enhancement in that. We are continuing to make great progress toward our goal. The university is working on a strategic plan for the future, and the plan will guide and inform everything we do, including Framework 2.0, the vision for our physical campus. This week, we were excited to announce the next step in the framework, and that is five planning studies to comprehensively support research, teaching and engagement. I want to thank our

campus planners and the Master Planning and Facilities Committee, a new committee of the board, for their hard work. The studies address areas across the university from interdisciplinary research and high-quality arts spaces, to health sciences education and best-of-class patient care.

Vital to all that we do in the framework and vital to our mission as a leading academic institution is our work to ensure we are as sustainable as we can possibly be. Last week. the university announced its recommendation for a Comprehensive Energy Management Project. This program is the culmination of two-and-a-half years of discussion with more than 30 groups across the campus, including students, faculty and staff, and holds the potential to make Ohio State an international leader in energy and sustainability. At the same time, we have the opportunity to strengthen our core mission with considerable, really impressive investments in faculty, staff and students. This would be the largest single investment in the academic mission in the history of our university. One particularly exciting area and an important factor in our campus advisory groups unanimously selecting a potential partnership with ENGIE-Axium is that they will invest in a \$50 million center for energy research. The center will create a hub for faculty, staff, students, local entrepreneurs and international experts to focus on smart energy solutions, renewable energy, green mobility systems and solutions, and more. So not only will we improve campus energy efficiency by 25 percent over the next decade reducing our carbon footprint, we also envision Ohio State as a destination for sustainability solutions that will impact communities across the globe.

It was great to hear again from our students earlier, including those who were the inaugural recipients of the President's Prize. This prize was made possible by donors who came forward with funding that allowed us to create an endowment to be able to support students in projects that were going to do something to help change the world and make it a better place. As Halie said, it is the highest recognition Ohio State bestows on exceptional students committed to social change. I want to also acknowledge, just so I have done this, Amy Guttman. Amy is the President of the University of Pennsylvania and Penn started a similar program a few years ago. It was really in discussions with Amy that I thought, "Gosh, we have this pool of money from these donors. Maybe we can focus this on something?" We are very proud and I wanted to make sure that when I see Amy, I will make sure to mention that I want to acknowledge her for that. It is another example, really though, of the special commitment we have to engaging and uplifting our communities.

An additional example of this is BuckeyeThon, the university's largest student-run philanthropy. The group this year raised a record \$1.5 million to support pediatric cancer care, culminating in a 24-hour dance marathon at the Ohio Union. In a great public-private partnership, I was happy to attend with Cardinal Health's George Barrett, AEP's Nick Akins and Shadowbox Live. We were able to play a song at the beginning that was fun. Fun for us, at least. That was good fun.

Our student athletes also continue to shine. We added to our ever-growing list of national championships with the fourth aggregate title for women's pistol and the 30th in program history for our synchronized swimming team. I don't know if any of you have been. I've been to a synchronized swimming meet—you should go to one. Again, 30 years the best program in the history of the country; 30 championships is amazing. The things that they do are not easy. You watch it happen, and you can't imagine how that's done. So they are swimming upside down, they are jumping out of the water without touching the bottom, so it's, like, an amazing thing to do, so really incredible athletes, and as you see, also outstanding students. Also, and maybe a different type of sport, Kyle Snyder earned his second-straight NCAA wrestling championship. As you know, he won a gold medal last summer as well, and Ohio State finished second overall in that championship, so

really pleased to congratulate the wrestling program and Kyle. Kyle is also a world champion, so world and Olympic champion, and a two-time NCAA champion. Like our Presidential Prize recipients, Kyle was introduced to the crowd at The Shoe who gave him a large, 100,000 person ovation for having won his gold medal, but they were also really impressed with his 3.88 GPA, so wonderful young man. We learned yesterday actually that Ohio State rose in the Director's Cup standings to third overall, powered on the strength of our Olympic sports. Great for us. That's great progress, and we look to continuing that momentum through the spring.

Last week, I joined Gene Smith at the Scholar-Athlete Banquet where 626 student athletes were recognized for achieving GPAs of 3.0 or higher, the largest number in our history—a big focus on that. That was a small dinner when it was first held many years ago, and now it takes over the Archie Griffin Ballroom, 626 student athletes with GPAs above 3.0.

Last week, we also recognized, in fact on the same day, recognized a record number of faculty for outstanding contributions to research. This year, faculty received citations of excellence from or were elected to at least 148 national and international learned societies, up 29% from the previous year and 80% from two years ago. We're really being recognized.

Among this year's honorees are newly elected members to the National Academy of Sciences, National Academy of Medicine, a recipient of the Presidential Early Career Award for Scientists and Engineers, Fulbright Scholars, fellows of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and fellows of the National Academy of Inventors. The critical importance of research will be a topic of discussion this month at the Economic Club of Washington, D.C., a couple of weeks from now. I will join colleagues from two private universities for a dialogue on higher education. There are three of us doing this so I will be representing the public universities, and the two private universities are the two that have the highest research profile. The focus on research will continue at the Global Brain Health and Performance Summit presented by our Wexner Medical Center Neurological Institute and the Stanley D. and Joan H. Ross Center for Brain Health and Performance. The summit will welcome inventors, innovators and scientists from around the world to discuss research and development that enhances brain health and human performance.

Our excellence, balanced with our continuing work to increase access and affordability, adds to the value of an Ohio State education. The demand to be a Buckeye has never been greater. We set a record for applications to the Columbus campus with 52,400, a 6% increase over last year's all time record high and up from 29,000 applications in 2011 and 2012, so dramatic increase in that aspect of measuring our perceived value to the broader world.

Last week again, I was pleased to learn or hear first-hand about students and our Buckeye Love program at our Mansfield and Newark campuses—actually Newark last week and Mansfield a little bit before that. They talked about the importance of the campus in their lives and how satisfying their experiences have been. All of our campuses play a vital role in access to a higher education and what makes Ohio State such a special place for so many across our state, nation and around the world.

Next month brings commencement and the end of another remarkable academic year, really, for us. Brenda and I continue to enjoy our time at the university and it's really been great being a part of this community. I want to take a moment to acknowledge her again as a university ambassador and the work all the time. Actually, Dean Lloyd—I don't know if Patrick is still here—I know that she met with you and Dean Gregoire earlier

this week about programs and had a very good time meeting, and that's really wonderful. I will mention proudly that she was in California last week to receive the UC (University of California) Irvine Medal, the highest award that that campus bestows on people who have made a lasting contribution to their community, so I am going to give her a round of applause, if my colleagues will join me. I will say that it was particularly wonderful because women do so much to lead our country, and sometimes a bit out of the limelight, so it was great to see her recognized for that role. It meant a lot to our family and I was pleased to see that happen.

Let me say that it has also been wonderful working with our student leaders in Undergraduate Student Government, the Council of Graduate Students, and our Inter-Professional Council. We thank them for their many contributions this year. Ohio State has great momentum. Everything we do is focused on ensuring our position as one of the world's most important and effective centers of learning, research and engagement. We could not do this without the incredible support of Buckeye Nation and I look forward very much to continuing our work together. I'm going to add one tiny thing. We have things that we are able to do and there are times that we are moved, touched and proud of the things that happen in a memorable way. I would say yesterday we had the honor of being with a few colleagues representing the university at the service at Arlington Cemetery, laying Senator John Glenn to rest. To think of Senator Glenn and the incredible impact that he had on the world, the courage and bravery that he distributed as a young man and then the public service that was really a part of his life, until the very end of his life. To see how he was recognized and revered so much by people around the country. All of the flags in the national capital were at half-mast. The traffic was altered as he was on a procession. It was something that was very touching and his life was very devoted to four areas of service. The first was in the military, where he was a decorated hero as we know. The second was as a test pilot, an astronaut, really famous as we know around the world for showing people what human beings could do. The third was as a U.S. Senator, four consecutive terms, a record for Ohio and great work there. His final chapter was here in starting the program that became the Glenn School and, ultimately, by the wisdom of this board, the Glenn College. I remember, as we sit. John and Annie sitting in those chairs two years ago when we renamed 17th Avenue as John and Annie Glenn Avenue where our offices are located, and how much the university meant to him at the end of his life and what really was the fourth chapter of his service. We couldn't have been prouder. I'll mention also Annie Glenn's great steadfast service and her behavior yesterday was something that I will never forget. That partnership was something that we were so pleased to have been able to bask in the glow of and then to be able to celebrate in our memories. The main speaker was thethis was a military burial of course-and the main speaker was the commandant of the Marine Corps and he mentioned several times in his comments about The Ohio State University and the pride that Senator and Colonel Glenn had in this relationship. So it was a time of great pride and privilege for us, and I just wanted to mention that for a moment to this board. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. That concludes my remarks.

Mr. Shumate:

Thank you, Mr. President.

board... We know that you have met with the administration. Thank you for being here today.

As I said this morning, we have a full array of students and we appreciate all of our students. I'm not sure how many of them were students but, again, if they would like to submit a written statement to the board, we would be happy to respond to that.

We will now move to committee reports, starting with the Wexner Medical Center. Abigail Wexner?

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Mrs. Wexner:

Thank you, Mr. Chairman. The Wexner Medical Center Board met on Wednesday in the new Jameson Crane Sports Medicine Facility. I'd just like to say it was a wonderful idea to have the meeting there, to see this new facility and just all it has to offer, not only to students at Ohio State, but to the community at large. We started our meeting with a presentation by two of our sports medicine physicians, Dr. Borchers and Dr. Flanigan. They talked to us about the manner in which the field of sports medicine continues to grow and further define itself, driven by people staying active throughout their life and discovery in the biomechanical red flags in athletes. Dr. Borchers spent time describing the clinical aspects and specialty programs as well as the partnerships we have with many area high schools, other colleges and universities in the area, and professional arts and sports organizations. Dr. Flanigan then discussed the education and research pieces of the sports medicine enterprise.

Dr. Retchin provided his CEO update in which he shared news and other updates. He then turned it over to David McQuaid who walked the board through the enterprise scorecard. Again, the scorecard is something we pay close attention to and monitor, and things are very much on course.

Mr. Larmore then reviewed the medical center financials, noting a continued growth in days cash on hand.

Dr. McPheron and Dr. Retchin then reviewed the authorization to enter into professional services contracts. The contracts that we reviewed were particular to the medical center enterprise. The Master Planning and Facilities and Finance Committees also reviewed these contracts.

Mr. Kasey presented two sales of real property. Both properties were vacated when physicians and staff moved into the new Upper Arlington Outpatient Care Facility and existing Worthington Family Practice.

These resolutions were passed by the Wexner Medical Center Board and are being recommended to this board for approval.

Finally, Ms. Taylor presented the burn center verification resolution. This resolution was approved by the Wexner Medical Center Board and supports the application for the burn center verification by the American Burn Association and the American College of Surgeons, Committee on Trauma.

We then met in executive session and that concludes my report, Mr. Chairman.

Mr. Shumate:

Thank you, any questions? Mr. Fischer?

Mr. Fischer:

Thank you. The Master Planning and Facilities Committee met yesterday and covered several items.

During the meeting, there were four items presented for discussion.

Mr. Kasey presented the Physical Environment Scorecard and discussed briefly the changes to the metrics. Overall, the scorecard has nine areas coded green with eight coded as yellow. Mr. Kasey also presented a review of our on-campus crime statistics compared to eleven benchmark institutions. These universities were selected for comparison due to the size of the student body and proximity to both urban and medical centers. We asked Mr. Kasey and the team to bring back to the committee recommendations from the best practices of those universities as we strive to do everything that we can to ensure all of our student, faculty and staff live and work in a safe environment.

The Major Project Status Report, which includes construction projects over \$20 million, was presented by Ms. Readey. It was noted that Pomerene and Oxley Halls Renovation is coded yellow for budget, and Cannon Drive is coded yellow for schedule. All other major projects are rated green on the report as on time and on budget to date.

Mr. Myers presented the current design for the Schottenstein Center North Expansion and Concourse Renovation, scheduled to begin in June. He also presented the schematic design for the Schumaker Student Athlete Development Center, which will start this summer to be completed in 2018. The presentation included a review of the overall site plan for this as a part of the athletics district including the extension of Irving Schottenstein Drive from Olentangy River Road to Fred Taylor Drive. All of these projects, I think, the board has had a lot of conversation and discussion and [we] applaud Gene Smith's leadership in each of these projects, putting the student athlete at the forefront of all the design and conceptual activities for these projects. As Dr. Drake discussed in his Presidential Report, Mr. Kasey presented a request for approval to enter into professional services contracts for programming in five areas: the arts district, health sciences campus, interdisciplinary research, ambulatory care, and an inpatient hospital. These five studies advance the work of the Framework 2.0 plan and will explore how our physical environment can best support the academic and research aspirations of our institution. Mr. Myers presented four real estate items for consideration: one acquisition of real property at 1596 Highland Street; two sales of real property, one at 1727 Bethel Road and 1615 Fishinger Road, and one easement at the Lima campus.

All of these resolutions are on our consent agenda and are brought with unanimous recommendation from our committee. That concludes my report.

Mr. Shumate:

Thank you, Mr. Fischer, and thank you for you and your committee's leadership with Framework 2.0. It's a very important part of our strategy going forward. Thank you for your thoughtful approach to each of those projects and the RFQs related to them, so thank you. Mr. Jurgensen, the talent and comp report?

Mr. Jurgensen:

Thank you. The Talent and Compensation Committee met yesterday. We started our meeting with an executive session.

After reconvening in public session, we began with two items for discussion. Ms. Mincey and Mr. Magee gave an update on the centralization of the Family and Medical Leave Administration, referred to as FMLA. This FMLA centralization was successfully operationalized in September of 2016. The integrated approach that we're using better ensures fair and consistent application of policy and practice related to paid and unpaid leave, workplace accommodation under the American's with Disabilities Act, disability separation and reinstatement which [is] governed by state law. Through this centralization effort, they have successfully aligned the people that administer these programs and now have the ability to hone strategy and processes that are consistent and reflective of the university's values, helping people get back to work.

Ms. McGoldrick gave an update on the Fair Labor Standards Act and the university's overtime analysis as we moved staff from exempt to nonexempt status. After careful consideration, the university moved forward with instituting the changes despite the injunction against required implementation of FLSA. On October 30, 2016, 2,032 employees transitioned to overtime eligible status, so it was a big and complicated thing for this university to go through.

The committee then reviewed three items for action.

Ms. McGoldrick reviewed the personnel actions with the committee. These included the appointment of Cathann Kress as vice president of agricultural administration and dean of the College of Food, Agricultural and Environmental Sciences, and the reappointment of Bern Melnyk as vice president for health promotion, chief wellness officer and dean of the College of Nursing.

We also considered one item that was not on the previously distributed agenda. The Talent and Compensation Committee reviewed and is recommending to the board a revised agreement for President Michael Drake. The revisions extend his contract for an additional two years. During the course of the presidential review process in November, it was abundantly clear that we are all extremely happy with President Drake as the leader of the university, and that Michael and Brenda are enjoying their time here and are committed fully to The Ohio State University and the rest of the university community. Under Michael's leadership, the university has made significant progress on our 2020 vision, and is shepherding other significant innovations that will position this university for the challenges that lie ahead. With that in mind, we began conversations with Dr. Drake regarding a contract extension. There is no change to his base salary, beyond the standard annual increase that he and other executives at the university are entitled to. The university will be making some commitments to the president's retirement that will help situate Michael and Brenda for the time when they ultimately decide to retire from Ohio State.

These revisions recognize the continued commitment and leadership Michael brings to the university and the academic medical center. Being the president at The Ohio State University is a 24/7, 365-day job. The letter of offer that we've extended recognizes the demands associated with the position and reflects the board's continued commitment to Michael and Brenda, and appropriately values the leadership, experience and the loyalty they have shown since they arrived on this campus.

The Board of Trustees continues to be impressed with President Drake's drive, his determination, and his commitment to the furtherance of The Ohio State University. We thank Dr. Drake and Brenda for all they have done so far, and we are really excited about what the future holds with Michael at the helm and Brenda by his side.

Mr. Shumate:

Thank you, any questions? Thank you, Jerry.

Mr. Jurgensen:

I have one more. This is one more brief thing, if I could, Mr. Chairman.

The committee also reviewed the Ohio State Faculty & Staff Near East Side Homeownership Incentive Program, to be administered by PACT (Partners Achieving Community Transformation)—the university's non-profit affiliate tasked with the revitalization of the Near East Side neighborhood in partnership with the City of Columbus and Columbus Metropolitan Housing Authority. PACT Board of Directors supports the incentive program, as it aligns to the ideals of the community masterplan for that part of Columbus.

We are going to allocate \$500,000 towards the creation of this incentive program, offering \$8,000 per homebuyer, estimating 12 grants per year to eligible OSU faculty and staff to purchase homes in this area. OSU-HR and Campus Partners have consulted with PACT staff to administer the program identical to the existing OSU Faculty & Staff University District Homeownership Incentive Program that we have, which is principally in Weinland Park. PACT and the university will work to market this program with a target audience of first time homebuyers.

These resolutions, including the extension of our university president's appointment, were approved by the committee and are on the consent agenda today.

Mr. Shumate:

Thank you very much. Erin, the Advancement Committee?

Mrs. Hoeflinger:

Thank you, Mr. Chairman. The Advancement Committee met yesterday and we had many high points to discuss.

We dove into the foundation report and discussed how well fundraising is going. The numbers are up, the scorecard is green, and we have really good momentum. We also discussed the importance of investing in our staff in order to retain talent. If we are to build on our success, we need to have the staffing capacity to continue engaging a high number of donors. Our staff retention is up and we are focused on developing the incredibly capable people we have on our teams.

Our Foundation Board representatives provided a recap of the lifetime directors' event held in Naples last month. It provided an opportunity for President Drake to engage the directors in conversations about the university's initiatives and benefit from their wealth of experience. The Foundation Board will also be reviewing nominations at its meeting on April 21. Their current focus is building the board for the future and developing ways to strengthen their pipeline of leadership volunteers.

The endowments and naming resolutions put before the committee were representative of the meaningful ways our donors are choosing to give back to the university and pay forward to the Buckeye community. Their giving focuses on scholarships, health and wellness research, and causes that are of great personal importance. These endowments and resolutions are the ways our donors are choosing to make a difference at Ohio State.

One notable item from our meeting is that Archie Griffin was nominated to receive a Distinguished Service Award for his incredible leadership at his alma mater. He served for 20 years in our Department of Athletics and later became president and CEO of The Ohio State University Alumni Association. His accomplishments are great and his service to the university is unquestionable.

We recapped the successful *Buckeye Love* campaign, which was designed to provide an opportunity for Buckeyes to show, give and share their love for Ohio State. It engaged every single unit and college in one unifying activity. Participants were encouraged to pay forward on February 14, and it showed that Buckeye spirit has real and tangible ways of presenting itself, not just in campaign dollars, but in how we live our lives. It was even trending on Twitter!

We reviewed the donor experience survey and gained insight into how satisfied our donors are with their relationship with Ohio State. We learned that donors value hearing how their gifts are impacting the lives of students, the success of programs or the progress of the medical research they are funding. While our donors are generally very satisfied with their experiences, we have the opportunity to improve how we engage our donors and communicate the impact they have on Ohio State. The long-term health of our program relies on donor retention, which remains a focal point for us.

The committee then met in executive session and that concludes my report.

Mr. Shumate:

Any questions? Thank you, Erin. Mr. Smucker, the audit and compliance report?

Mr. Smucker:

The Audit and Compliance Committee met yesterday and we had four items for discussion on our agenda.

The first item for discussion was a report on our Fiscal Year 2017 External Audit Plan by Christa Dewire from PwC. There are no major changes to the primary objectives for the audit, scope of services or deliverables compared with last year's audit plan. The only noteworthy changes compared with last year's plan relate to PwC's desire to further align their internal controls recommendations to the university's strategic focus on operations efficiencies, which should be helpful to us.

Then, Kevin Patton reported on the Internal Audit Quality Assurance and Improvement Program. Consistent with industry best practice, Kevin provides this annual report to the audit committee to confirm annually the independence of the Internal Audit Department and their adherence to industry standards, to periodically review and refine their primary monitoring assessments, and to confirm the continued appropriateness of the Internal Audit Charter and the Board Audit Committee guidelines with respect to internal audit functions.

Next, Chris Culley and Gates Garrity-Rokous presented on the Audit and Compliance Committee scorecard. There were three strategic risk areas that were colored yellow, including information security, but overall, there are no major concerns there. We will continue to monitor the university's efforts to mitigate those most significant strategic risks.

Finally, Chris Culley and Gates provided the committee with an update on the university's compliance and integrity program. As you will recall, this board directed that the university establish a central compliance office a few years ago. Gates Garrity-Rokous, who has served as our first chief compliance officer since the office's inception, reported on our continued work on enhancing and refining a robust compliance operation and integrity culture that is best-in-class across higher education. This program is focused on leadership engagement, issue response and reporting, testing and monitoring, risk identification and abatement, and training and communication.

The committee then met in executive session and that concludes my report.

Mr. Shumate:

Thank you, Mr. Smucker. Any questions. The Academic Affairs and Student Life Committee, please?

Mrs. Kass:

Thank you Mr. Chairman. The Academic Affairs and Student Life Committee met yesterday and covered several items.

Provost McPheron began our meeting with a brief video that overviewed Ohio State's local, state, national and international engagement, pointing out what it means to be a Carnegie Foundation Community Engaged University, a designation OSU received in 2015. The video highlighted programs like: Moms2Be, Student Life's Buck-I-SERV, 4-H Extension, and the Young Scholars Program.

Bruce and Dr. J were joined by Stephen Myers, Bill Martin, Nicole Kweik and Ahmed Hosni to explain the breadth of our engagement efforts at Ohio State and they used the opioid crisis in Ohio as a case study for how we use the engagement and outreach strategy to address and solve compelling challenges.

Dr. Martin, who is dean of the College of Public Health, outlined the scope of conversations that we are convening about the opioid crisis, including one that took place yesterday at the statehouse.

Dr. Nicole Kweik then provided an overview of the Generation Rx Program and its impact across the nation. Specifically, Dr. Kweik noted that more than 50,000 faculty and students from some 90 colleges of pharmacy nationwide have worked with Generation Rx to reach 37 million people.

Dr. Adams-Gaston described the general outreach and engagement as it relates to students and invited Program Coordinator Ahmed Hosni to describe the Collegiate Recovery Community Program as a specific example of that engagement.

A rich discussion followed that helped explain the evolution of the opioid crisis in Ohio and across the nation, the role big pharma and the health industry have played, and the proliferation of pill mills that have sustained the crisis.

Provost McPheron reviewed the academic initiatives scorecard and summarized key changes including: an increase in the number of graduate programs in the top 25, an increase in enrollments in online courses, and some of the anomalies that affect rankings from year to year.

Dr. McPheron then reviewed findings of the Ohio Department of Higher Education Report on Low Enrollment and Duplicative Courses. No overlapping programs were found at OSU, and Bruce noted that his office is using the findings to determine if courses meet minimum enrollment requirements.

Provost McPheron next walked the committee through five items for action: amendments to the rules of the university faculty; personnel appointments and reappointments; posthumous degrees for three students; an honorary Doctor of Public Service degree to Mrs. Abigail Wexner; and the establishment of a Master of Contemporary Art and Curatorial Practice degree program. These resolutions were passed by the committee and are on the consent agenda today.

The committee recessed into executive session.

I would also like to note the Academic Affairs and Student Life Committee held a joint meeting with the Finance Committee yesterday to consider the Comprehensive Energy Management Project. We held this joint meeting given the scope of the proposed partnership, which will support an unprecedented program to improve the sustainability of our college campus and will be the largest single investment in the university's academic mission.

Provost Bruce McPheron and CFO Geoff Chatas jointly detailed how this innovative public-private partnership will strengthen our position as a national flagship public university.

The impact of this partnership will be substantial. Through the university's investments of proceeds and direct collaborations with ENGIE-Axium, Ohio State will have opportunities for immediate and significant steps forward in faculty excellence, the quality of our physical space, and as a hub of applied research on energy and sustainability. As Dr. Drake outlined in his remarks, ENGIE-Axium will establish a \$50 million Energy Advancement and Innovation Center, which will be the first of its kind in North America. This center will be a hub where Ohio State students and faculty, ENGIE researchers and industry experts can collaborate on developing solutions for the new generation of smart energy systems, renewable energy and green mobility.

This center represents the strength of the partnership. It's a marriage of the academic and sustainability benefits, with an impact that will be felt both on our campus and far beyond.

This resolution was passed as part of this joint committee meeting and is on the consent agenda today.

And that concludes my report, Mr. Chairman.

Mr. Shumate:

Thank you. Any questions or comments? If not, Mike, the Finance Committee report?

Mr. Gasser:

The Finance Committee, like most of the other committees, met yesterday and there were four items that we talked about.

Ms. Devine presented the consolidated university and medical center financial scorecards through February and the interim financial report through the first seven months of fiscal year 2017. The performance on the consolidated and university scorecards met or exceeded goals. Overall financial performance through February is solid.

The committee also reviewed the two construction projects that were yellow. Chairman Fischer also reported on those in the Master Planning and Facilities Committee report.

The Finance Committee additionally discussed three items for the consent agenda. Two of them Chairman Fischer talked [about]. One was the five projects for professional services. The second was the acquisition of the 0.16 real estate at 1596 Highland Street. The third item that we talked about was the reappointment of Reed Frahley to the self-insurance board. First, the university is seeking approval of professional services contracts for five (5) projects.

All three of these resolutions were passed by the Finance Committee and are included in the consent agenda.

The committee then met in executive session.

Mr. Chairman, if I may, I would also echo Linda's comments regarding our joint committee meeting yesterday to consider the Comprehensive Energy Management Project.

Provost McPheron and CFO Chatas provided an overview of all the important elements of this partnership, including financial details, the key performance indicators that the partners must meet, and details about how the university will focus the benefits of this partnership on access, affordability, excellence and sustainability. The university would receive \$1.165 billion, most of it up front, that will be invested in our endowment to support teaching, learning and research. The project team engaged broadly with faculty experts and other stakeholders on campus throughout this two-and-a-half year evaluation process; although, I think we have been talking about it for four to five years and I think the evaluation was two and a half years, which resulted in a top bid from a team of global leaders in energy and sustainability. Our 485-building campus would be modernized to improve the energy efficiency by 25 percent within 10 years and collaborations between industry experts and our own students, faculty and staff to develop the next generation of research solutions in energy and sustainability. Every evaluation of the final bids recommended the same team - ENGIE North America and Axium Infrastructure, who are creating a new entity called Ohio State Energy Partners to serve our campus. These evaluations included separate reviews of the academic, technical, human resources and financial elements of the ENGIE-Axium proposal.

As Linda mentioned, this resolution was passed as part of this joint committee meeting.

That concludes my report, Mr. Chairman.

Mr. Shumate:

Thank you, any questions or comments?

Mr. Kellogg:

I don't know if there will be opportunities in the future, but this clearly made sense to have a joint committee. I thought it was instructive and very helpful and I would just suggest that we consider other opportunities in the future when it makes sense because it is a great way for us to get together as a board and cross-pollinate the committees.

Mr. Shumate:

That is an excellent comment and, in fact, at our next meeting where our focus will be on strategic planning, which is critical to the university and our mission, we will have a similar joint meeting. Thank you for the comment.

Mr. Jurgensen:

Given the size and the complexity of this transaction and reading the paper this morning, the presentation that the provost and the CFO gave yesterday was really good. I recognize that it is tough to capture that amount of detail and really demonstrate all the due diligence that Mike suggested that has gone into this. I do not have anything specific in mind for strategy, but I would really encourage the university to take a hard look at a public outreach effort in this regard, that explores in a little more detail than the Q and A format in the paper this morning what this is really all about. Because of its size and because it is 50 years, there is a real great opportunity for this to be misunderstood and unappreciated. That would be my thought.

Mr. Shumate:

I would agree with that sentiment and can see the provost and the president nodding their heads. I would also suggest that the deck that was used yesterday for the presentation, which contains significant detailed information and background information. If we could make that more available to the public in general, I think that would be helpful in terms of telling the story about what this really is. Good comments. Any other comments? If not, we will move to our Governance Committee.

Dr. Reid:

The Governance Committee met this morning where we had a few items for discussion and one item for action.

We too welcomed Mr. Alan Stockmeister, so Alan, I hope you feel very welcomed by now.

Mr. Stockmeister:

I sure do.

Dr. Reid:

I also shared information and reminders of our ongoing obligations under the Ohio Ethics Commission, Public Records and Open Meetings laws. As a reminder to all of us, you received an email earlier this week from the board office reminding us of the upcoming May 15 deadline to file our annual Financial Disclosure Statement with the Ohio Ethics Commission. I will also say that when you go online to do so, there are two buttons that are very close to each other. One is print and the other is send. I recommend that you hit print and read it before you hit send.

Also, as all of you know, we are required to take annual ethics training. We are also looking to expand the training and resources available to us as trustees. We now have online training available to us regarding Ohio Public Records law that was put together by our public records office and they have also prepared a brief summary document on the Ohio Open Meetings Act, which governs how we as a board conduct our business at official meetings. I encourage all to look at those as well.

We were also joined by Rick Legon, which again, we really do appreciate your deep dive background into the award that we won. It makes us feel even more honored knowing all of the stipulations behind it. Again, we so appreciate you coming.

Mr. Shumate presented our one item for action, Ratification of Committee Appointments. This appoints Dr. Fujita to the Talent and Compensation Committee.

I would now like to give my formal report on the election of officers and move that we convene a committee of the whole.

Upon the motion of Dr. Reid, seconded by Mr. Kellogg, the Board of Trustees adopted the foregoing motion by unanimous voice vote.

Mr. Shumate:

We are now convened as a committee of the whole. Janet, please proceed.

Thank you, Mr. Chair. I have talked to all trustees as part of our annual review process and am pleased to report to the board strong support for Mr. Shumate's continued service as our chair, but also unanimous support. In finishing his first year as chair, Alex made us even stronger as a board. You have been a tremendous partner to President Drake and the university in its ongoing strategic planning efforts. You continue to be a steady hand through the myriad of challenges any institution of our size faces on a dayto-day basis. I am pleased to recommend to the committee Alex's reappointment to a second term as allowed in our bylaws. As has been the tradition of the board, Alex has asked two of our most senior trustees to serve as his vice chairs - Jerry Jurgensen and myself. Alex, we both have accepted these assignments and, on behalf of Jerry, I will say what an honor it is to serve alongside you. In addition, Alex has indicated his preference that Dr. Thompson continue as our secretary. I would like to ask for a motion of approval for this slate of officers by the board. The formal resolution language is at each of your seats and, Jerry, you and I will have to abstain.

Mr. Shumate:

Any comments or discussion?

THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY FACULTY AND STAFF NEIGHBORHOOD HOMEOWNERSHIP INCENTIVE PROGRAM

Resolution No. 2017-82

Whereas The Ohio State University has engaged in an extensive public planning process with the City of Columbus, CMHA, neighborhood leaders, property owners and other stakeholders to identify programs and projects to improve the quality of life of all those who live and work in the community surrounding University Hospital East; and

Whereas the planning process resulted in a comprehensive planning document, titled "Blueprint for Community Investment," which was delivered to the community in July 2013; and

Whereas this revitalization plan documents the decline in homeownership including housing utilized as rental at approximately 74% and homeownership at 26% emphasizing

the need to raise the level of homeownership as a prerequisite to sustaining long-term improvements in the area; and

Whereas this revitalization plan points to the employer-based homeownership programs around the nation, and locally with Ohio State via Campus Partners, which have proven effective public policy tools to encourage urban neighborhood revitalization, and the plan recommends that the university implement such a program modeled after Campus Partners on the Near East Side; and

Whereas this Board of Trustees in support of this revitalization plan asked that an employer-based homeownership program be developed and brought back to this board for adoption; and

Whereas Partners Achieving Community Transformation (PACT) and Wexner Medical Center have worked with the University Office of Human Resources to replicate an employer-based homeownership program based on the best experiences with the Campus Partners managed program and other such programs around the country and tailored to the specific conditions of the Near East Side community surrounding University Hospital East; and

Whereas the homeownership program targets its funds to the identified neighborhoods within the PACT planning area which are closest to University Hospital East, while also encouraging homeownership throughout the Near East Side; and

Whereas the efforts of the university to develop a homeownership program for its employees are being complemented by the investments of its partners the City of Columbus and Columbus Metropolitan Housing Authority; and

Whereas this expansion of the university's Faculty and Staff Neighborhood Homeownership Incentive Program to the Near East Side community surrounding University Hospital East has been reviewed and recommended by representatives of the PACT Board, Campus Partners staff, neighborhood residents; and the appropriate university offices and committees:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Trustees hereby approves The Ohio State University Faculty and Staff Neighborhood Homeownership Incentive Program to encourage homeownership by faculty and staff in the PACT planning area; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the university administration is hereby authorized to proceed with implementation of the Faculty and Staff Neighborhood Homeownership Incentive Program in furtherance of the PACT partnership to revitalize the Near East Side, including to raise the level of homeownership in the planning area and that this program will be funded with \$500,000 of the Jobs Growth Tax Incentive funds paid by the City of Columbus to The Ohio State University in connection with that certain Jobs Growth Tax Incentive Agreement, entered into on August 24, 2011, as may have been or will be amended; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That PACT will report annually to the Talent and Compensation Committee of this board on the expenditure of these funds, the progress of implementation of the homeownership program, and the benefits achieved.

Anthony F. "Tony" Campagna

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on December 7, 2016, of Anthony F. "Tony" Campagna, Associate Professor Emeritus of Management and Human Resources in the Fisher College of Business.

Professor Campagna first showed an interest in industrial relations and human resources as an undergraduate at the State University of New York at Buffalo, where he was awarded a Bachelor's Degree in business, economics and industrial relations in 1964. After graduating, he immediately went to the University of California, Los Angeles, received a Master of Business Administration in 1966, and then moved into their Ph.D. program. In 1971, he was awarded his doctorate in human resources and industrial relations. He first came to Ohio State in 1970 as an assistant professor in the faculty of management sciences and was promoted to associate professor in 1975. The department merged with the faculty of labor and human resources, becoming the Department of Management and Human Resources (MHR), and Professor Campagna continued his teaching, research, and service in MHR with a joint appointment in the School of Public Administration, until his retirement in 1995.

As a faculty member, Professor Campagna served in a variety of university, college, and department committees, typically utilizing his particular human resource skills. For example, he was chairperson of the ad hoc University Faculty Committee to study collective bargaining for faculty in higher education, a member of the University Fiscal Committee, and a member of the Red Tape Reduction Committee. At the college, he served on the College Personnel Committee on two different occasions, the Labor and Human Resources Graduate Studies Committee, and the College of Business Teaching Committee. From 1983 to 1984 he was Acting Associate Dean for Graduate Programs in Business. Over more than 10 years, the Ohio State Office of Human Resources tapped into his understanding of human resources having him serve as their faculty advisor, working on projects such as the development of a classification and compensation system for administrative and professional employees, serving as co-director of the management development program, and developing a classified civil service employee performance appraisal system.

Professor Campagna's true passion was teaching. He taught a variety of courses at the undergraduate, master, and doctorate levels. He also taught executive courses in the areas of collective bargaining, labor dispute settlements, corporate human resource strategy, training and development, and compensation. Students loved Professor Campagna and his ability to be both intimidating and kind. Professor Campagna challenged his students to see the positive and negative aspects of management rights and union leadership, two cornerstones of effective work in human resources.

On behalf of the university community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Professor Anthony F. "Tony" Campagna its deepest sympathy and sense of understanding of their loss. It is directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to his family as an expression of the board's heartfelt sympathy.

John A. Lott

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on January 9, 2017, of John A. Lott, Professor Emeritus of Pathology in the College of Medicine.

Professor Lott received his Bachelor of Science degree in pharmacy from Rutgers University in 1959 and in 1965 his Doctorate in analytical chemistry. He was a diplomate of the American Board of Clinical Chemisty and member of the American Chemical Society. He arrived at The Ohio State University in 1968 to direct the clinical chemistry laboratory of University Hospitals where he would remain until his retirment 31 years later. His position required not only academic excellence but providing the highest level of patient care and safety to the patients of The Ohio State University Wexner Medical Center.

During his distingusihed career he authored three text books, over 180 publications in the field of enzymology and clinical chemistry, had prominent roles in the American Association for Clinical Chemistry (AACC), served on the editorial board of numerous journals, and served on the Board of Directors for the National Academy of Clinical Biochemistry. He had a long and distinguised teaching career, serving as the advisor for numerous master and doctoral candidates at OSU. He was recognized for his excellence as an educator locally and nationaly through receipt of both the AACC Education Award and the Outstanding Teaching Award from The Ohio State University Alumni Association in 1986. In 1994, he was the recipient of the Miriam Reiner award of the Capital Section of the AACC for outstanding contributions to clinical chemistry.

On behalf of the university community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Professor John A. Lott its deepest sympathy and sense of understanding of their loss. Kathryn T. Schoen

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on February 15, 2017 of Dr. Kathryn T. Schoen, Vice President Emeritus, and the first woman appointed a vice president at the university.

Vice President Schoen received her Bachelor of Arts degree from Capital University in 1957. In 1961 and 1965, she received her Master of Arts in education and a dual Doctorate in speech communication and education from The Ohio State University, respectively. Dr. Schoen began teaching in the Department of Speech at the university in 1965. She took on a dual role teaching communication and education courses. In 1967, she moved into her role as associate director of the School of Allied Medical Professions where, from 1967 to 1972, she assisted in creating the curriculum for a graduate program and obtaining funding and accreditation.

In 1970, Dr. Schoen was asked to chair a committee that would assess the status of all women on campus, including faculty, staff, and students. This committee would eventually evolve to become the Office of Women's Affairs and would assist in the coordination of promoting the efforts and expanding the opportunities for women at the university. In the early 1970s, Provost Albert Kuhn promoted Dr. Schoen to associate provost for faculties, the first woman to be named to that role. During this time, her work focused on the documentation of promotion and tenure processes. Uniform data systems, specific procedures, and guidelines were developed during her occupancy.

In 1978, President Harold Enarson named Dr. Schoen vice president for educational services. After serving in this role for five years, where her responsibilities included

University Libraries, WOSU, Admissions, Continuing Education, ROTC and many other areas, she was preparing to retire. Just before taking leave, she was asked to lead the School of Nursing during the transition to the College of Nursing as its first dean. With President Jennings' support, Dr. Schoen and the School of Nursing faculty received approval from the state nursing board for the transition.

In 1984, Dr. Schoen's friends and colleagues honored her when they recognized her advocacy for women with the Kathryn T. Schoen Endowment Fund. The endowed fund supports opportunities for women to progress in their university administration careers. Dr. Schoen remained an advocate for faculty, staff, and students at the university until her passing.

On behalf of the university community, the Board of Trustees expresses its deepest sympathy to the family of Vice President Kathryn T. Schoen. It is directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be tendered to her family as an expression of the board's heartfelt sympathy.

Philip C. Sorensen

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University expresses its sorrow upon the death on February 12, 2017, of Philip Chaikin Sorensen, Professor Emeritus of Law.

Professor Sorensen received his Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Nebraska and his law degree from the University of Nebraska College of Law in 1959. Prior to his graduation from college and law school, Professor Sorensen served in the United States Coast Guard from 1951-1954. After his graduation from law school, Professor Sorensen served as a law clerk to Federal Judge Robert Van Pelt from 1959-1960 and then practiced law in Lincoln, Nebraska, until 1965. From 1965-1967 he served as Lieutenant Governor of the State of Nebraska, and was Democratic Candidate for Governor in 1966. From 1967 to 1973 he was Executive Director of the Cummins Engine and Irwin-Sweeney-Miller Foundations and Chairman of the Center on Corporate Responsibility. Professor Sorensen joined the faculty of the College of Law at The Ohio State University in 1973 and was a much-admired teacher and scholar in the areas of tax law, business associations, and non-profit corporations. Among other scholarship on a variety of topics, he was the co-author of the treatise Ascending Liability in Religious and Other Nonprofit Organizations (with Edward McGlynn Gaffney, Jr.), (1984). During his tenure at the College of Law, he taught courses on business associations, torts, legislation, and non-profits.

Professor Sorensen was the founding director of the Socio-Legal Center, now known as the Center for Interdisciplinary Law and Policy Studies. Under his leadership the Socio-Legal Center grew quickly, sponsoring special programs, developing joint interdisciplinary research projects, and fostering cooperative relationships with other programs. The center fostered a valuable relationship with a similar center at Oxford University, which led to many productive and mutually enriching exchanges between the two centers. Professor Sorensen also served as the Associate Dean of the College of Law from 1979 to 1983 and remained a strong advocate for interdisciplinary studies throughout his professional life.

Following his retirement from The Ohio State University, Professor Sorensen spent his time in a variety of pursuits. He became an accomplished sculptor, a nationally ranked senior tennis player, and a regular volunteer in the community. He was truly a Renaissance figure, as he enjoyed the theater, opera, music, politics, philosophy, and history, and could speak with authority on any of them. He is remembered by his colleagues as a man from whom many sought wise counsel.

On behalf of the university community, the Board of Trustees expresses to the family of Professor Philip Sorensen its deepest sympathy and sense of understanding of their loss. It is directed that this resolution be inscribed upon the minutes of the Board of Trustees

and that a copy be tendered to his family as an expression of the board's heartfelt sympathy.

through a substantial up-front payment by the Concessionaire (as defined below) and academic collaboration between the Concessionaire and the University; and

WHEREAS (a) a bidding process with respect to the Concession Agreement was established pursuant to a Request for Proposals dated as of February 9, 2017 (as amended and supplemented by the University, the "<u>RFP</u>"), and conducted by the University (such process, the "<u>Bidding Process</u>") and (b) three (3) bids from such Bidding Process were received for consideration; and

WHEREAS Ohio State Energy Partners LLC, a Delaware limited liability company (the "<u>Concessionaire</u>"), which is ultimately owned by ENGIE North America Inc. and Axium Infrastructure US Inc., submitted a bid in response to the RFP with an upfront payment amount of \$1.015 billion on Form B-1 of the RFP in accordance with the terms thereof, in a form satisfactory to the University; and

WHEREAS University Senate voted to support the university recommendation to the Board that Ohio State enter into a partnership with ENGIE-Axium that would advance and enhance the educational mission of the university; and

WHEREAS pursuant to the Bidding Process, the President, provost of the University (the "<u>Provost</u>") and the senior vice president for business and finance and chief financial officer of the University (the "CFO"), with the endorsement of the President's Cabinet, recommend to the Board that the Concessionaire be chosen as the concessionaire under the Concession Agreement; and

WHEREAS it is proposed that the University enter into a Long-Term Lease and Concession Agreement for The Ohio State University Utility System (the "<u>Concession Agreement</u>") with the Concessionaire, on substantially the same terms and conditions described in the summary of the draft Long-Term Lease and Concession Agreement for The Ohio State University Utility System (the "<u>Draft Concession Agreement Summary</u>") attached hereto as <u>Exhibit A</u>; and

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Trustees hereby determined that it is in the best interests of the University to enter into the Concession Agreement with the Concessionaire and the Related Documents (as defined below), to perform the obligations arising under, or in connection with, the Concession Agreement and the Related Documents, including, but not limited to, the University's obligation to make the payment of the utility fee (as defined in the Concession Agreement) on a monthly basis (collectively, the "<u>Transaction Obligations</u>"), and to otherwise consummate the transactions contemplated thereby (the "<u>Transaction</u>"); and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board has reviewed the Bidding Process and accepts the recommendation of the President, Provost, and CFO to select the Concessionaire as the concessionaire under the Concession Agreement; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board hereby authorizes the University (1) to enter into the Concession Agreement with the Concessionaire and into any other documents and agreements that the President and CFO ("<u>Authorized Officers</u>"), or either of them, deems necessary, advisable or appropriate in connection with the Concession Agreement (including, without limitation, the Memorandum of Lease (as defined in the Concession Agreement), the Design-Build Agreement (as defined in the Concession Agreement) and one or more consent agreements and estoppel certificates contemplated by the Concession Agreement for the benefit of the Leasehold Mortgagee (as defined in the Concession Agreement)) (collectively, the "<u>Related Documents</u>"), such Authorized Officer's execution thereof to be conclusive evidence of such approval and determination of the necessity, advisability or appropriateness thereof, and (2) to take such actions as any Authorized Officer deems necessary, advisable or appropriate to perform the

Transaction Obligations and to otherwise consummate the Transaction, such actions not to be materially inconsistent with the terms of the Draft Concession Agreement Summary, such Authorized Officer's taking of such action to be conclusive evidence of such approval and determination of the necessity, advisability or appropriateness thereof; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board hereby authorizes and directs the Authorized Officers, or either of them, upon consultation with the chair of the Finance Committee of the Board, the Senior Vice President for Legal Affairs and General Counsel, any outside counsel or advisors retained for this purpose and such other members of the senior leadership of the University that any Authorized Officer deems necessary, advisable or appropriate, subject to the terms, limitations and conditions prescribed in this resolution. (1) to negotiate, execute, acknowledge and deliver the Concession Agreement and any Related Document on such terms as any Authorized Officer deems necessary, advisable or appropriate, such terms not to be materially inconsistent with the Draft Concession Agreement Summary, with such Authorized Officer's execution thereof to be conclusive evidence of such approval and determination of the necessity, advisability or appropriateness thereof, and (2) to take such actions as any Authorized Officer deems necessary, advisable or appropriate to perform the Transaction Obligations and to otherwise consummate the Transaction, such actions not to be materially inconsistent with the terms of the Draft Concession Agreement Summary, with such Authorized Officer's taking of such action to be conclusive evidence of such approval and determination of the necessity, advisability or appropriateness thereof; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board hereby authorizes the CFO to serve as the Senior Official (as defined in the Concession Agreement); and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That all actions previously taken by any Authorized Officer or employee of the University, by or on behalf of the University in connection with the Transaction (including, without limitation, any such actions related to the RFP, any interest rate management or hedging contract, credit support or enhancement contract), be, and each of the same hereby is, adopted, ratified, confirmed and approved in all respects; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That it is found and determined that all formal actions of this Board concerning and relating to the adoption of this resolution were adopted in an open meeting of this Board, and that all deliberations of this Board and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code; and

Mr. Wexner called the meeting of the Wexner Medical Center Board to order on Wednesday, April 5, 2017, at 1:42pm.

Present: Leslie H. Wexner, Alex Shumate, Janet B. Reid, William G. Jurgensen, Cheryl L. Krueger, Abigail S. Wexner, Corbett A. Price, David B. Fischer, Robert H. Schottenstein, Michael V. Drake, Sheldon M. Retchin, K. Craig Kent, E. Christopher Ellison, David P. McQuaid, Amanda N. Lucas, Elizabeth O. Seely and Marti C. Taylor. Michael A. Caligiuri and Geoffrey S. Chatas were absent. Stephen D. Steinour was late.

Ms. Link:

Good afternoon, everyone. We are going to get started. I would like to convene the meeting of the Wexner Medical Center Board and note that a quorum is present. The minutes of the January meeting were distributed to all members of the board and, if there are no additions or corrections, the minutes are approved as distributed. I would like to now call on Mr. Shumate for some introductory comments.

Mr. Shumate:

Thank you, Madame Secretary.

Good afternoon, everyone. It is great to see everyone and thank you for joining us at our Wexner Medical Center Board meeting. I would like to thank you, Mr. Chairman, and I am pleased to note that I was able to attend the Association of Governing Board's National Conference on Trusteeship this past weekend. Many of you may recognize AGB, as it is called, and some of you have attended their conferences in the past. Ohio State has been a very active participant. In fact, the leader at the national level, with this organization, which represents over 1,300 colleges, universities and foundation boards. You will be proud to know that The Ohio State Board of Trustees was recognized at the most recent meeting with the John W. Nason Award for Board Leadership. That deserves a round of applause. This award recognizes and honors, and I quote, "boards at the pinnacle of excellence, serving at the pinnacle of excellence. These are boards that go beyond and above what boards should do and instead take board driven measures to advance their institutions in ways that truly matter." Importantly, the award notes that it recognizes the entire board for its governance work. This particular award was judged by a distinguished panel led by Governor Phil Bredesen, whom some of you know, the former governor of Tennessee. I raise this today because one of the key drivers of this recognition was the creation and the work of this Wexner Medical Center Board. I must publically recognize Bob Schottenstein, who was chair when that creation took place, and also Les Wexner for your excellent job of chairing the center board. A special thank you to all of you, both of you, and all of my fellow trustee members. Again, thank you so much for your leadership. The President of the Association of Governing Boards, Rick Legon, will be joining our public board meeting later this week for the formal and official presentation of the award. I am pleased to have taken just a moment of time to recognize the outstanding contributions of this board. We thank you and, as you often say, Les, "let's continue to get better." Thank you.

Ms. Link:

Thank you, Mr. Shumate. I would now like to call up Dr. Borchers and Dr. Flanigan to the presenters' table for the sports medicine overview.

Dr. Kent:

I will take the opportunity to introduce our guests. First of all, welcome, everyone, to the Jameson Crane Sports Medicine Institute. As you can see already, this is an extraordinary facility but it is only matched by the extraordinary team of physicians that staff this facility. We are honored today to have two of those individuals to tell us a little bit about the sports medicine program. The first is Dave Flanigan. I will begin by saying

that the sports medicine team is really a combination of surgeons and primary care physicians, and that's really a very unique combination of physicians. The way that they structure their care is that patients with sports injuries are initially evaluated by a primary care physician and then, if they need surgical care, they are referred on to a surgeon. It is really that teamwork that I think is the essence that differentiates our sports medicine program from those around the country. Dave Flanigan is an orthopedic surgeon. He is the director of the OSU cartilage restoration program and also head of resident research for the Department of Orthopedics, and key position for the OSU men's hockey team as well as the volleyball team. Dr. Borchers, is a family medicine physician, the director of the primary care sports training program. Dr. Borchers was recently appointed as head team physician for the entire OSU athletic department and spends a fair amount of time at the football stadium. He called the key play in the Michigan and OSU game, right? I think that is correct. Anyway, a warm welcome to both of our guests.

Dr. Borchers:

Thank you very much, Dr. Kent, and thank you to the Wexner Medical Board for having us today. You are sitting in what we believe to be the largest, most expansive, multidisciplinary sports medicine center in the United States. You are sitting in a biomechanics lab that usually has athletes and other individuals going through this lab to look at their biodynamics and biomechanical motions that pertains to injury and performance. Behind you, you see an area that is one of the most expansive physical therapy areas in this area [the Midwest], which normally would have a number of patients, physical therapists and others working and doing procedures in order to get them back on the field, but obviously with our meeting today, we've helped those patients and those folks from performing here.

We want to spend just a few minutes talking about our sports medicine program and sports medicine mission with you. You can see that our mission here is to improve people's lives by enhancing physical activity across the lifespan. [This is] not just for athletes at Ohio State, but for all of our patients. Whatever the problem, whatever the age, we want to keep folks active and moving. Our goal is to be the top academic sports medicine program in this nation and we believe we are moving in that direction.

As Dr. Kent mentioned, our model is unique in that it is a multidisciplinary model. We are more than just a one-specialty facility. You can see the numbers of specialties and clinicians that we have that work here at OSU sports medicine from different physicians with different backgrounds, to physical therapists, athletic trainers, sports psychologists, exercise scientists, bio mechanists and researchers. It's the combination of this group of people under one roof being able to work together that allows us to make advances in our field. We are grateful for this facility and believe that this is allowing us to provide a unique service, not only to our city here and our region, but throughout the nation.

This facility in and of itself has allowed us to grow. You can see here at the Jameson Crane Sports Medicine Institute we have a number of staff, including 45 physicians or clinical staff, 40 other surgical staff, 5 staff working in our imaging department, 26 clinical physical therapists, 9 full-time research staff and another 26 support staff. This facility has already allowed us to expand and maintain growth here at the Jameson Crane [Institute] and we are looking forward to continued growth in this facility. Our specialty programs are very unique and the things we are able to provide here are unique to sports medicine. You can see some of them here. Many people believe or think about sports medicine, sports psychology, endurance medicine, concussion programs, and programs in orthobiologics, cartilage restoration and other performance programs that are very unique to this facility and unique to our program. Ohio State's sports medicine provides a model for growth. We are sitting in a wonderful facility and certainly this is the hub, but we certainly are supported by our community outreach facilities where our consumers

demand instant access to our services. We provide those here and at numerous other facilities throughout the greater Columbus area and regionally. It allows us to be where our competitors are, to make certain that those folks who need access to us are there and allows us to align with our ambulatory strategic plan to continue our growth out of this campus area.

Many people believe or think about OSU sports medicine, as Dr. Kent mentioned, on football Saturdays, and yes, we are the team physicians for the Buckeyes. But we are also the team physicians for many other organizations and provide service to many other organizations for outreach. You can see here, not only at the high school level and collegiate level, but certainly also at the professional level, and then also other groups here-the School of Music, the Department of Dance, Pelotonia and Special Olympics. Those are just some other athletic groups that need our services. We are continuing to strategically grow with these groups to expand our footprint in sports medicine throughout our region.

Mr. Schottenstein:

I have a question as I look at the high schools - some of the largest high school systems in the region. What do we do from an outreach standpoint? Are we trying to establish additional relationships with suburban school systems and what are we doing when that happens?

Dr. Borchers:

Yes, we are strategic about working with high school systems and we are certainly interested in those relationships. What makes us unique is our multidisciplinary approach. We do not just bring medical services. We bring strength and conditioning services to those high schools and they are very much interested in the other services that we have here. For example, this biomechanics lab that you're sitting in, where athletes can come through and be screened? Our sports psychologists that are available to them and their athletes. It's the multidisciplinary approach we bring that I think interests these high schools most. Our services have differentiated ourselves from other competitors here in town.

Mr. Schottenstein:

Are we happy with the logos on this page?

Dr. Borchers:

We are certainly happy with the logos on this page as of today. I would hope that when you come back here in a year from now, we'd have more logos on this page. We are looking to grow this footprint and strategically to do so with partners that value what we bring to them. Certainly, those are things that we are looking at, especially at the high school level. If they approach us, if they have an interest in what we are doing, we're certainly open to those conversations.

President Drake:

I will make a contrarian [statement], a specific contrarian [statement], about being happy with the logos on this page. When I look at the collegiate ones, I see that we are represented by a multitude of different logos, which is one of the things that drives me bananas. I'd love us to expand to other logos, meaning other organizations. The concept of expanding to move logos in the ways that we differentiate ourselves, so that people do not know who we are, is what drives me crazy. Therefore, that's not you, but I just wanted to make that comment that it drives me crazy, so I hope that we can decide that we are one university and we would like to represent ourselves as one university, my goodness. But otherwise, I agree completely.

Dr. Borchers:

We won't wear any logos on our hats or our shirts but the Block O.

Our Jameson Crane Sports Medicine Institute has already shown us clinical growth. We have seen already, as you can see here, growth in our clinic visits over our previous year and physical therapy visits. Already to date, we've performed over 600 surgeries through our outpatient surgery center here and we've added more than 1,000 patients to the Wexner Medical Center. These are new patients to this Wexner Medical Center through the Jameson Crane Sports Medicine Institute, so those are not new patients just to us here in sports medicine, but new patients to the system. We would certainly expect that to expand and continue to grow as we move forward.

Last, as far as clinical programming goes, our patient satisfaction continues to improve - you can see here - from our surgery center assessment to our sports medicine clinic and physical therapy assessment. We continue to improve our patient satisfaction. These numbers are good, but they are not good enough for us. Until we are at or above that 99th percentile, that is our goal and that is what we are striving for in this facility. We believe we are working in that direction and that is where we are headed.

President Drake:

The shadow number is where we were before?

Dr. Borchers:

No, that is where we would rank nationally. We are in the 99th percentile nationally for surgery center, although they gave us 98.9%. I would now like to turn the presentation over to Dave Flanigan, my colleague from orthopedic surgery for a few slides on research and education.

Dr. Flanigan:

Thank you, Dr. Borchers. Like our other areas of sports medicine, we also, in our educational standpoint, really touch a broad range of different people. We have fellowship programs in orthopedics, primary care sports medicine, and three separate fellowship programs in physical therapy. We have residents who come from multiple different areas of our university who rotate through here. That can be even from our residents in physical therapy, our orthopedic residents, our PM&R (physical medicine and rehabilitation) residents and family practice residents. At any given time, in any given year, we have about 60% of our orthopedic residents who are actually touched by this facility here and being trained by our physicians within this building.

Students from not only the medical school but also undergraduate programs and other allied health professionals are all trained by some of our staff here, as with our physicians. Every year, we host four different symposiums, really as a way to bring an update to very key areas in sports medicine to many different physicians and allied health professionals. These areas are concussions, ACL (anterior cruciate ligament) injury and prevention, endurance medicine and our hip preservation symposium.

Finally, we have a robust community outreach program. These are not only through - as you can see - Dr. Kaeding on this slide, but just even with our coaches, any type of community outreach. We are always trying to get out there, not only for our brand, but just to get them further information. I want to highlight a couple of things about our research as well. At the current time, we have over 11 industry trials sponsored here within the Jameson Crane Sports Medicine Institute that equal about \$2.2 million. Sixteen grants have come in and I have gotten word from one of our PhDs that they have gotten good scores on a new grant that will likely be adding to the center as well. When I started here, we had one industry-sponsored trial. If you look at where we have

grown over the course of 12 years, we really are one of the leaders as far as industry trials and sports medicine, and we continue to grow within our grant money. It is always hard to benchmark this with our competitors because sports medicine is usually housed in different departments and sometimes very hard to carve where this is compared to our competition. We believe this puts us in the top 10% of our peers nationwide.

As you can see, we have multiple research partners. These have actually come through numerous collaborations. These have started through some of these multicenter studies of which OSU has been one of the founding members in leading enrollers. These include the MOON for both knee and shoulder - these are Multicenter Orthopedic Outcomes Networks, looking at ACL injury, rotator cuff injuries, and labrum tears as well within the shoulder. I would also like to highlight some of our military connections, especially the Air Force base at Wright-Patterson. We are doing a lot of collaborative research with our athletic department looking at human performance. Lastly, I have been asked just to show how OSU sports medicine has made both the national and international impact. If you could play the video, please.

- Dr. Kent:

Thank you, Jim and Dave. That was fantastic. I want to acknowledge Chris Kaeding, who is in China spreading OSU's word internationally, for his efforts in growing the sports medicine program. That was a wonderful presentation. Do you mind if we ask a few questions?

You said at the beginning that you thought of yourselves as one of the best sports medicine programs in the country, maybe even internationally. I am certain that is true from what we have heard this morning. What is going to make you the best? What is going to differentiate you and put you at the top?

Dr. Flanigan:

I think Dr. Kaeding has given us a great vision and it all comes with teamwork, number one. We really are very keen in recruiting the right people here so we can continue to grow in all these areas, not only with clinical expertise with our patients and with our athletes, but also for our research expansion as well. We look at how we can continue to expand in that area. We have obviously really started with a great base here. We have great strength in industry trials, as with this motion capture lab you can see here, and we want to take it a step further. Some of those further steps are through these collaborations we have within the university as well. Those university collaborations through different departments have started with piloting a lot of different research areas, which I think again will make a huge impact as we start getting some further funding down the road with these collaborations. Finally, it is going to be some of the key things that help us expand into that top place.

Dr. Kent:

Any other questions? Yes.

Ms. Krueger:

Yes, question. Do you have a full time person or people dedicated to going out and reaching out and getting new accounts for high schools or for colleges or for professional teams? How are those teams coming to us? Do we have someone out there full time doing that, or right now is it just more or less they have heard about us and knocking on our door?

Dr. Borchers:

Both. We do have outreach coordinators that work out in the community and reach out to the community to answer their questions. We do have a lot of folks that come to us directly. We do have development folks that are also out there working for sports medicine. We have different arms that are out in the community to help answer those questions. We do not have a full time person that is out there necessarily spreading the word, and I know Dr. Kaeding's vision is to have someone full time that would be potentially out there being able to do those things for OSU sports medicine.

Ms. Krueger:

My second question is, if you are a former athlete of Ohio State, say Beanie Wells or Joey Bosa for example, and they come back here in the summertime if they live here, would they use the facility or would they be able to take advantage of the facility as well?

Dr. Borchers:

That is one of our goals. Obviously, we engage with all of our student athletes when they are here and one of the things that we pride ourselves on is that our student athletes come back here when they are not participating. So we see all of our student athletes when they are back here from their professional ranks or even when they are done with sports. When they have issues, they come back here. That's one of our goals - to serve those student athletes, obviously, when they are finished here.

Ms. Krueger:

Thank you.

Dr. Kent:

Other questions?

Mr. Stockmeister:

Are you staffed on Saturdays? After a Friday night football game, a football player gets hurt. I live in a rural area, our kid gets hurt, puts ice on it, comes into the doctor the next day and there is no physician or there is no imaging. So can we get them referred? So can we go to the rural hospitals and get them to refer here?

Dr. Borchers:

Yes, absolutely. We are available on Saturdays, especially in the fall when it is football and soccer seasons, when we see those highest numbers. But even in the other sports seasons, we're available and have availability.

Dr. Kent:

Jim, Dave - wonderful presentation. Thank you so much.

Dr. Retchin:

I'll start my report. Let me just echo, first, Mr. Shumate's comments about the caliber of the board and development. I hope you will agree that in the last couple of years, this board has really matured, has become engaged and has really challenged our team to up our game as well. These board documents also have matured in terms of organization and discipline. One of the issues in getting board materials aggregated on

time is going to be all the individuals that have to contribute to the board document. That's my purview, and Gail Marsh has helped us out by getting on time. Sometimes we close the books late in the month, but whatever it is we have to go and I always have one fall back. When I go to a member of the team and say, "I have to get materials in. We got to get them in." They say, "Well, I'll get to it." All I have to do is say, "If you don't get it in, I'm going to call Heather Link." There is fear in their eyes and the materials come the next day. I say all of that because we are going to lose Heather. This is her last board meeting. She is moving to be the chief of staff for the president at Kent State, Bev Warren, whom I've known for many years. Heather has done just a terrific job organizing the board through at least my stint here in the last two years, and I want to ask you to give a warm round of applause for Heather. We know you will do well, Heather, and we are just grateful you are not going far.

I have just got a few announcements and we're going to go right to the scorecard. First, I just wanted to announce David McQuaid has been named to the Vizient University Health System Consortium Board of Managers. Vizient is one of the largest professional organizations for academic health centers and the board of managers is made up of 22 executive officers across academic health centers. We are delighted that David has joined that and provided leadership for that organization. A warm round of applause for David, please. Every year, as you know, our medical students match for residencies, and I know that you have probably heard through the grape vine but our match day results were impressive; 163 out of 168 candidates matched on the first round, a rate that is far above the national average. We saw an increase this year in number of students matching to highly competitive programs. A quarter of the class matched to the top 20 programs in the country. That is pretty impressive. Our graduates are heading to 25 different states to complete their residencies - 44% have chosen to stay in Ohio, 37% of our graduating class are going into primary care or primary care specialties. Dean Kent, do you have any remarks on that?

Dr. Kent:

I will just add to that, and I think most everyone in the room knows, that our College of Medicine was ranked 31st in the country out of 146 and that is a two point positive move over the last year. I think it just speaks to the quality of students that are recruited here. They are incredible. I'll just note the statistic that you mentioned, which is that a quarter of our class went to the top 20 institutions in the country. I think that is really incredible and shows very positive direction.

Dr. Retchin:

Thanks. That is terrific. A couple of other announcements. On transplants, we performed a five-way kidney transplant chain on February 14, our second largest donor chain to date. January was record breaking for organ transplants - we did 30% higher than any other month in history. In fact, the transplant program has grown over 27% in the last year alone under Ken Washburn's leadership.

Bill Abraham received the American College of Cardiology's Distinguished Scientists Award at the college's Annual Scientific Session in Washington D.C.

I do not see Mike Caligiuri here; I think he is just wrapping up his inauguration. You may know Mike became president of the American Association of Cancer Research this month. When you see Mike, please congratulate him.

A couple of other noteworthy recognitions, Dr. Susan Koletar in infectious diseases here was named as only one of six central Ohio women to receive the 2017 YWCA Women of Achievement Award. I think that was done today. That is terrific. If you see Susan, please congratulate her.

Our own Gail Marsh was named a 2017 OSU Glass Breaker. Glass Breakers is a prestigious honor that is part of President Drake's 2020 Vision. A warm round of applause for Gail Marsh. With those announcements, I will ask David McQuaid to go over our scorecard. David?

Mr. McQuaid:

Thank you, Sheldon. You have your copy of the scorecard in your book, if you could turn to that page. I just want to start my remarks with fulfilling the requests that the board had regarding putting aspirational targets on the scorecard. If you will look at the extreme right of the scorecard, we have included that for you to take a look. What that is made up of includes a custom compared group of the top 20 academic medical centers in the country. Where data for the top 20 is not available, what we do is we have other third party aggregators, if you will, such as Vizient, formerly the University Health Systems Consortium, or Health Care Advisory Board and the like. These particular aspirational targets will be used in the future to drive the five-year plan. I would tell you, as we hear a little bit more later with regards to strategic planning, the pivot for us next year on the corporate scorecard is to intimately tie the scorecard to the strategic plan, and to really drive those metrics and those tactics that help us to achieve all of the aspirational goals that we have on the card. I wanted to note that.

I will highlight a few areas. Let me start with people and the engagement score area. This week we have a pulse engagement survey going out. Our full survey that includes faculty in the fall will be happening. This past Monday, the pulse survey was sent out and that currently does not include faculty. But those are referred to as the tier three departments and, for this particular survey, were the departments that were most challenged during the last full survey.

I want to give a shout out to Dr. Leon McDougle. Dr. McDougle is doing a great job with diversity and inclusion and really I am grateful to him, that entire group, and their leadership. They are really focusing on three dimensions of diversity. Those being culture, climate and communication. They have four diversity networks that they have put together: African American, LGBTQ, young professional, and Hispanic – American. There are several others being developed, but each week we get a great update from him and his team. I wanted to give him credit for the leadership he is providing in that regard.

Finally, in the people section, I just wanted to make a couple of comments about turnover. Turnover, for year-to-date, quarters one and two, is about 6.7%. That turnover is inclusive of faculty and staff that are leaving the institution. It includes retirement. It does not include any internal movement or temporary appointments. Faculty turnover specifically is at 6.3%. That excludes any trainees, so that would be residents and fellows. It only includes full-time faculty that have 0.75 clinical FTE (full-time equivalent) and above, so that equates to about 118 faculty turnover. On staff, [turnover is] about 6.8%, and then we have broken that down by area and location. The bottom line is that we have really worked hard with HR, Mamoon Syed, his team, Dan Dolan, lots of people, to really try to understand the highest areas of turnover. Some of those would include patient care associates, food service workers, environmental service workers and nursing. We are working hard to come up with strategies but, as you know, the reason we put that on the scorecard is that there is a cost of doing business. Having a great workplace and having tactics and mechanisms to make sure that we are retaining our employees is really important. Quickly, on HCAHPS (Hospital Consumer Assessment of Healthcare Providers and Systems), we continue to do a very good job on patient experience and patient satisfaction, but some challenges continue. We set the bar very high at 94% for the CG CAHPS (Clinician and Group Assessment of Healthcare Providers and Systems) so that's really more of the outpatient experience, but teams are doing a good job there.

The dean mentioned the College of Medicine. To give you a little bit more detail, really what does that include when we move from 33 to 31? It's important to note that the undergraduate GPA moved from 3.77 to 3.8, the acceptance rate has gone from 6.5% to 6.2% so that's a little bit more difficult, and then the faculty to student ratio has moved from 2.5 faculty to 2.6 faculty per student. When we also look into the detail and how we move the needle there and the things that we have to be focused on, we really try to look at the peer assessment scores and MCAT scores. So, the MCAT scores have improved. As far as the peer assessment scores, we dropped a little bit there from 36 to a 34 ranking. Those are sort of the things that make it up. [We] dropped a little bit in NIH (National Institute of Health) funding, so there are a number of attributes that one looks at in those rankings and we continue to make progress.

President Drake:

This may be technical. For the faculty to student ratio, what categories of faculty are included in that? Are there faculty included in that ratio that have no contact, for instance, with medical students, which it sounds like must be the case.

Dr. Kent:

First of all, I will have to admit that I do not know the answer to that question, but I am going to take an estimate. I would think it includes all clinical faculty, but it only includes those clinical faculty that have exposure to medical students.

President Drake:

I think it would be interesting just to see what that is and it is just out of curiosity.

Dr. Kent:

I would like to make an additional comment. A large part of the medical school rankings is reputation and - little doubt - we did have some improvement this part-year in the reputational score. I think before we make significant further advances, we're probably going to have to grow our research profile because it really is a differentiator in terms of reputation of the school, their research strength. Both are important, but I actually think our medical school rankings are actually going to follow our research rankings in terms of the reputational portion.

Mr. McQuaid:

That is a good point. NIH dollars and NIH dollars per faculty member are critically important; in fact, [they] probably make up another 40% of that.

My last comment will be simply around some of the very important patient flow and access issues. Remember we put these things on the scorecard not because they are easy, but because they challenge the organization. These are things that, if we have a growth mentality, we want to bring more volume into the institution. We have to open up access and we had a great presentation the other day at QPAC (Quality and Professional Affairs Committee) by the emergency department. They are doing a good job. They own half of that. The inpatient sides of the facilities own the other half of that in terms of bed availability, which leads us to length of stay. We're doing better but we have some challenges particularly in the last month or so within UH (University Hospitals). We have teams of people that are working very hard and I am confident that with the leadership that's working on this, we are going to be able to get that number to where it is so that we can get more patients in.

Finally, I'll close my comments with conversation around the access to primary care physicians and to specialty physicians. The dean and I have put together a group, along with Dr. Ellison, in a team of folks that are meeting every month now and are working

really hard to understand what we can do across these practices. We just received last night, and I'll send it around to people - a group called Merritt Hawkins just completed their 2017 Survey of Physician Appointment Wait Times, looking at very large metropolitan areas and medium metropolitan areas. I would tell you that we have set a very aggressive target, but I could tell you we're in the hunt. When I look at these numbers particularly for primary care, with the shortage of primary care physicians nationally - we look at some of the specialists numbers; we're challenged - but I believe that we have lots of good work going on there so that would conclude my remarks. I would be happy to answer any questions.

Dr. Retchin:

Any questions for Mr. McQuaid? Seeing none, that completes my report, Mr. Chair.

President Drake:

Let me just make a comment that I was holding in and say that I appreciate the report and the texture and detail that are there, because we can actually see opportunities and progress towards those opportunities and goals. I think it will be very helpful for us as we go through these next several months.

Dr. Retchin:

Mark?

Mr. Larmore:

Good afternoon everyone. You can see on the screen or behind the finance tab in the books are the highlights through February, which is two-thirds of the way through the year. On the first slide, you can see that green is usually a good sign, so from an admissions standpoint, we're running ahead of budget and ahead of prior year. Usually we like to focus more on the prior year, so 3.6% growth in admissions. On the surgical side, you can see 4.7% growth year-over-year. On the 28,000 surgeries, 18,000 of that is on the outpatient side and 10,000 plus on the inpatient side. The outpatient visits are slightly behind budget, but still growing about 2% year-over-year. The subsequent slide, I will go through the breakdown of that 1.1 million visits or procedures that we have. Our worked hours per adjusted admission - again adjusted admissions normalizes our ambulatory activity to the equivalent of an admission - you can actually see that we are positive to budget and slightly below where we were last year.

A little more red on the second slide. I think operating revenue, we have grown 6.1% and are tracking slightly ahead of budget. On the controllable costs side, this leaves out our capital costs. You can see just slightly off budget, but our expenses have grown 9.2% from prior year. If we look at that on a per adjusted admission basis though, our growth is about 2.7%, not the 9.2%. Then, included in that 2.7% - if you look at just the drug costs, drug costs alone are up 9.2%. So that is carrying a chunk of that 2.7% growth. On the excess of revenue over expenses, you will see on the pages we are slightly behind budget about \$2 million and we are about \$15 million behind prior year, I think. I will highlight a couple of things there. We have had a number of prior year adjustments that have come through this year. Remember, our cost reports with the government payers stay open for a number of years, and when they decide that they are going to come around and audit them, they do so, we think. On the James cost report, two things: when we do the process, we actually removed some costs on our costs report that we felt we should adjust, and then they changed the policy on allowing one of the taxes, or franchise fee, that we pay and this allowed that back to fiscal year 2015. So we're seeing the three-year adjustment on that and those adjustments were about \$22 million. Then one of the subsidy pools to the medical center which reimbursed

us for our charity care - they call the UPL program - that came in about \$16 million lower than where we had forecasted. Although we are running slightly behind budget and behind last year, those items that I spoke about are about \$38 million worth of adjustments that two-thirds of those have come through as a negative adjustment there. We are not \$25 million behind because there are some items that we built into the budget that are actually performing better, certainly from a revenue standpoint, than we had forecasted. Our days cash on hand, you can see that we continue to grow. We are at 120 days and we are about \$760 million in cash.

The next slide on page four is the health system P&L and you can see that the bottom line we are at \$108 million and the budget was \$110 million, so \$2 million behind budget. The revenue is about \$11 million positive to budget. Supplies are running \$17.7 million over budget and then our funding needed through the MCI (Medical Center Investments) program is about \$1 million favorable and our earnings on investments are about \$4.5 million favorable.

A comment on the big negative variances on the expense side from a salary and benefits standpoint, we have seen the volume grow a little bit faster than we had expected, and so we will staff for those admissions. In addition, I would say that length of stay is up slightly higher than we wanted. Again, more days left in the system require more staffing. Also, we are bringing on more bed capacity this year than we had anticipated when we built the budget, so as we bring those beds on board, we need to on board the staff. All the nursing staff is going through their normal orientation period where you are basically doubled up during that time period, so some of that is we're consciously spending those through Fridays, we have a number of patients in ED (emergency department) waiting to get up to beds, so we have made the decision to open more beds.

On the supply side, you can see that we are \$10 million over our budget and we can track that back to procedural volume, predominantly on organ transplants. Our transplants are up considerably over prior year and to our budget, and some of our prosthetic devices that we're implanting is where that business is tracking ahead of target. So although it is over budget, we can track it to the cases and revenue that comes in, so we're not concerned about that.

The next slide is some of the stats that I have talked about in admissions in surgery being positive to budget. Outpatient visits [are] slightly behind. Then you can see our length of stay, we are budgeted to be at 6.2 days and we're at 6.28, but given the volume that we had, it adds up to quite a few days where we have to provide care. Our case mix is slightly behind budget and prior year, and I will not read the adjusted admission numbers to you.

On page six is a little bit of an eye chart, but the question usually is how do we do 1.2 million ambulatory visits? So I think in the actual column on the left, you can see that ambulatory surgery about 18,000, 74,000 emergency room visits, and 83,000 procedures done. You can see below that certainly radiology and oncology being a big chunk of that. Clinic visits are 287,000. The big rehab program and the radiology lab are the next large numbers. On the bottom where we have physician visits, these are physician practices that are included within the specialty care network and the primary care network, so family medicine, sports, maternal and fetal medicine, neurosurgery, and a spine program. They are included in the hospital operation nurses and physician practice. That is why you have physician visits included on the health system side.

Slide number seven is the medical center. Again, this is including the College of Medicine and the physician practice. So for results, both of those corporations are doing well, with \$137 million bottom line which is \$29 million positive to what we had budgeted and about \$6 million ahead of last year. So that's good news. You can see our stats on the couple of lines below. The physician encounters - so these are the physician

encounters in the practice plan - are \$1.37 million, so about 14,000 behind budget but when you look on the year-over-year growth, 11% growth year-over-year.

Slide eight splits the three corporations. I already spoke about the health system, so you can see the physician practice in the middle is running \$5.3 million positive to budget and the College of Medicine is actually running \$26 million positive to what we had projected. Again, the first two companies are running on accrual basis, and the college runs more on a cash basis. So where there are funds within the College of Medicine and depending on what the spending plan is during the year, we think of it like a checkbook sometimes, where the balance goes up and down. This is not on that [slide] and so this depends on what programs we're planning and do they actually get implemented at the speed we projected in the budget.

Slide nine is the practice plan. So again, about a \$14 million bottom line budgeted at \$8.6 [million], \$5.3 million positive to budget, and last year we were at [\$7.6 million], so improvement year-over-year. I think you can revenue fairly close to budget. The positive variance on the expense side is salaries and benefits, and we haven't recruited as many physicians as we had planned this year. This is on the physician side and the staffing that comes along with the physician recruits is on the other line. On the purchase services, it is about \$4 million over budget. Some of that is actually hiring some temporary staff to the extent that we have not filled positions. We actually hired a firm that is doing a physician compensation program for us, so [this includes] the consulting cost for that. Chartis is the company that is doing that and is included in the purchase services.

Page 10 is the College of Medicine and, as I said, we had anticipated actually drawing down the cash in the college this year to the tune of \$10 million and it has actually increased the cash in the College of Medicine by \$15 [million]. You can see revenue is about \$20 million positive. Our endowment income was about \$1 million more than we had expected. Our indirect costs tied to grants is about \$2 million positive to what we had expected. The general funds allocation is about \$2 million, so all positive on those categories. Actually, some of the dollars in the practice funds of \$4 million coming over to support the academic mission is about \$4 million over what we targeted.

Mr. Jurgensen:

How many FTEs have we been on? Physician FTEs for business. I assume that we are.

Dr. Kent:

I think that we have open positions now for about 160 positions, somewhere in that range so in some specialty areas we are full up, and in many, we need multiple recruits.

Mr. Jurgensen:

So, involuntary turnover?

Dr. Kent:

Well, I think it is a combination of loss of individuals over the last couple of years. I think that loss rate has been a little higher than we would hope it to be, but we have also been growing. You know, the demand is fairly substantial, and so it is really a culmination of the two.

President Drake:

I noticed that in the encounters category, you said, gosh, that is 11% up but that's 150,000 more encounters than last year. That is a whole other business and that is substantial growth.

Dr. Kent:

In some ways, it's especially upside that it is a good problem to have, but it is a problem. One of the reasons that the length of time to schedule an appointment with one of our physicians is so great is that we are down 160 positions. This is an area that I think all of us are very focused on and trying to find ways to solve.

Mr. Larmore:

On the college, you will see positive variance or shortage on the teaching, research and academic side. On the practice plan you will see the clinical side to that. Last comment on the College of Medicine, which is about \$5 million positive on expenses, and so definitely tracking ahead of what we had targeted which is good news. The last slide is the balance sheet and this is on the combined medical center. The top line is cash. Although it shows a \$41 million decline, we moved \$250 million to the long-term investment pool, which is the fourth line down so you can see that's up \$132 million. So net for the medical center, we're positive about \$90 million dollars this year. I am probably not going to highlight anything else in the balance sheet. Certainly, unrestricted net assets continue to grow as the bottom line has improved.

Dr. Retchin:

Any questions for Mr. Larmore?

Mr. Wexner:

Yes, I was just curious about being down 160 docs, which is how many? I mean, I know it is at 160. What will be the total complement, 1,000 or 1,600?

Dr. Kent:

Our clinical portfolio is about 1,050, so it is fairly significant.

Ms. Vilagi:

Dr. Kent, a quick question on Jerry's point. Given that there is a shortage of primary care physicians, is there anything that we as an institution can do? Other than encouraging students, is there anything structurally that we can do to make it more appealing to enter primary care?

Dr. Kent:

Well, it is interesting. In the College of Medicine, we actually have a program now where, after three years of medical school, you can enter a primary care residency. So sort of a fast track, you know. We only have a small number of slots, but it's an experimental program with the idea of encouraging people to more quickly be able to enter that specialty. I also think that from an economic standpoint, we have tried to create a number of incentives for individuals that might come and join us in primary care, including a bonus for people that would come to OSU and some deference of college debt that they can achieve. We have tried to create a series of financial incentives and I think, David, you'd have to weigh into this, but I think we have had some success in that and we're actually heading in a positive direction.

Mr. McQuaid:

Yes, you will hear a little bit later in the program here about an accountable care organization (ACO), development of clinically integrated network, expansion of our footprint. We have been working very closely with internal medicine and family medicine, and creating exactly the type of incentives that Dr. Kent is referring to. To further the

number of primary care, I think a menu of options is going to have to be available - as we create these mechanisms and delivery systems for an integrated collaborative patient care type of model - to bring in other community physicians and other network facilities and their physicians into these types of models for delivery and care.

Dr. Kent:

I will also make another comment about the deficit of 160. I mean, that is a large number and we are trying to solve that problem. I think that there are a number of different initiatives. One is we're trying to create a culture where people want to come to OSU and people want to be a part of our organization because it is a great place to work and they can achieve their academics. I think we are making progress in that regard and that is going to be very positive. I also think that we need to do a better job of recruiting and working with Mamoon and others. We've created a number of policies around recruiting regarding search committees and recruiting efforts that I think are going to pay off over the long term in terms of identifying a really great candidate. The third area that's really important is, as you well know, is developing a compensation plan that makes people comfortable, that is transparent and fair. I'll chat a little bit more about that later in the day, but I think that we are on the way to accomplishing that. That's going to make it very appealing for people who want to be at Ohio State. The combination of those three things, I think we will have a lot of success over the next year.

Dr. Reid:

I have a question for you as well. We're talking now primarily now about clinicians, you know, so that people can get in, get seen, and get out. I'd like to shift a little bit to talk about researchers, you know, physician researchers. Do we have a way of measuring what our regretted loss rate is for them? You know, really great researchers who we may be losing but we wish we had not. For example, do we keep track of any national academy researchers that we have lost or any others that we have lost? How do we measure that? Then the flip of that is how well we are doing at getting acceptances of those high quality researchers?

Dr. Kent:

Really great question. Unfortunately, or fortunately, you are preempting my College of Medicine report later on, but I will give you some thoughts. We have lost a few all-star researchers over the last year, many of them in the cancer area. Some of those researchers have gone on to positions that are very prestigious positions, and for some of those individuals at least, we're honored by the fact that we have made them successful at OSU and they've had other great opportunities. But we do need to replace those researchers. We have a number of initiatives underway. In fact, to preempt my comments, one of those initiatives - and I know you will be excited about this - is around diabetes. We launched a new initiative about a month ago where we are recruiting five very senior funded diabetes researchers to put together this cluster or team with the goal of being one of the best diabetes research institutes in the country. We have already had a lot of success. We have actually brought two teams through, one from Harvard and one from the Sanford Burnham Institute. Both groups are very interested. We are in the process of negotiating with one of the groups, and we have many more to come through. That is just one example. We have had some loss and that is a cultural thing too. I think it is really important on the research side that we create a culture where people like to collaborate, and that they feel there is a fairness and equity and support for research. That is one of the major initiatives that I've had is to try to create that culture and I think we've had some early success.

Dr. Reid:

I would like, as we continue over the next year, to dig into that just a little bit further. Now is not the time, but sometimes we lose fantastic researchers because they're bought, or

paid more someplace else, or some other kind of circumstances that we really can't control. Sometimes we lose people because we just could have kept them, but they didn't feel that this was the right fit or whatever factors that we can control. Just wanting to dig into what factors can we control such that those that we can keep, we'd be able to.

Dr. Kent:

I would love to have further conversation about this. I think you are right on target. When it comes to retaining and having great faculty, making sure that you're proactive and you retain those people and you create that culture is so important, so we should chat more about it.

President Drake:

Just a word to add to that, so there's short-term and long-term and kind of hard and soft parts of that solution. Tomorrow and on Friday, we will hear about some of the longer term solutions, places for those people to go, or places for them to stay - and we're sitting in actually one of them now, which was a part of the discussion two and a half years ago. It is the kind of place that attracts people to come. I think that is critically important and I think it is implicit, but I want to make sure to say for the board members that we're speaking about physicians and physician shortage and patient wait time, but there are a whole series of other people in the health care delivery team that help. So I don't like the term particularly but, physician extenders more broadly, where we can both create opportunity for patients to be seen, but also to support the physicians that we have in having the kind of impact in their daily lives that work well for them. Those are all parts of the solution.

Dr. Retchin:

Any other questions or comments?

Okay, Chair, should we move on? I will introduce the next section, then turn to my colleague, Dr. McPheron. We are going to discuss projects that are really an outgrowth of the Framework 2.0, which is the long-term guiding vision that imagines transforming research and learning, as well as patient care and capacities over the next decade and beyond. It's a comprehensive plan. You've all been able to absorb some of it over the last couple of months since it was introduced by the president. To advance the Framework 2.0 for the medical center and, indeed, across the campus, you'll hear about four projects that we want to explore, and we want to do that in conjunction with experts. We want to get some of the best in class experts to help us program around these four different projects and conceptually try to make this so that there is some precision in what we do, ensuring that whatever we do, that we can do this judiciously as well as expeditiously. To kick it off on two academic projects, I'll turn to Provost Bruce McPheron.

Dr. McPheron:

Thank you, Sheldon. Let me just start by saying there are actually three academic projects that are coming before the board this week.

One of them is outside of the purview of this board, but the members will certainly hear about it tomorrow in our facilities and master planning. We'll talk about a study on our arts district that will move forward on the west side of 15th and High Street - a really terrific opportunity that has been long in discussion and planning. For today's consideration, there really are two things that align with the academic mission and it's just terrific that this board actually has driven that conversation forward through its

planning exercises through the facilities committee that works with this board and aligning with Framework 2.0. The first I will mention is health sciences education complex. As we have gone through master planning and talked about education of the next generation, it is absolutely clear that best in class programs bring people together from different health sciences disciplines for education. We clearly need to enhance the ability in our College of Medicine for next century educational opportunities, but they need to be educated alongside our nurses, our pharmacists, occasionally even our veterinarians. You think about some of the things that are happening in health sciences today, the chronic diseases - Craig just mentioned diabetes. We think about diabetes, obesity, a lot of the lifestyle-sort of diseases that require a lot of different perspectives. Anti-microbial resistance is something that crosses boundaries, emerging pathogens. even the question of addiction and the opioid consideration. The goal here is to take advantage of the fact that we have this collection of seven health sciences colleges. As we look to modern education and medicine, [we need to] make sure that it's not just our doctors, but it's all of the other professionals that need to be a part of this conversation. It fits in beautifully with the commitment that the university has already made to Postle Hall in dentistry, so this is exactly the time to really be scoping a lot of those conversations.

The second project would be in an interdisciplinary research building. When Craig was interviewing here, we talked first about Fallon, Nevada. We share a little connection there. He grew up there, and my son is stationed there in the Navy. The rest of the conversation, Craig, as I remember it, we never got past interdisciplinary research. We talked and talked about the impact of crossing barriers and boundaries - boundaries that we have artificially set - to do great research. When Framework 2.0 emerged, it contemplated building a research and development corridor that encompasses, for the first time in our thinking as far as I can tell, what we call the midwest campus, that space between the Olentangy River and Route 315. As we think about that, there is a lot of investigation that is required because we have not really explored the infrastructure there. This is the perfect project to really kick that off, and you heard Craig talk about this. If we are going to be world class College of Medicine, if we are going to be world class medical center, if we are going to be world class university, we need to focus on the research enterprise. That is what drives institutions like ours. That is what creates the reputation and all other attributes follow from that. As we think about this particular facility, we have the possibility to work with planning professionals to determine how that might be scaled. Is it something that we would build in a modular sense, to give us a sense of the scope? We developed an initial planning team that is very robust across the disciplines in the university who will come together to really work with those planning professionals to think about how we might be able to take maximum effect of this new facility that we're anticipating. Sheldon?

Dr. Retchin:

Bruce, thanks. I do want to remind the board on two things. One is that these four projects - in addition to the project Bruce named for consideration for the Board of Trustees tomorrow. These four projects around the medical center have been part and parcel of the strategic planning efforts. Second, I believe, Mr. Chair, at the end of this discussion, we will ask for a motion to approve and recommend these projects and the planning of these projects to the Board of Trustees tomorrow and Friday. The third project has to do with our ambulatory footprint. If there is any undeniable movement in the healthcare industry, it is moving more and more services to an outpatient setting. Dr. Drake likes to talk about the days when he was training in ophthalmology and they used to keep cataract patients in the hospitals for months, in the early days. Dr. Drake did train quite a long time ago. The movement on this - it is incredible all the kinds of procedures that we are now sending patients home after a very brief 23 hour stay and we have to address that in terms of technologies and facilities. The third project will be to seek an outside vendor that will give us guidance on optimizing our outpatient ambulatory facilities so that we can, as Dr. Kent and Mr. McQuaid were talking about, meet the demand that is there. If you ask me any issue that we have at the medical

center of paramount importance, it is that it's capacity, not demand. The demand is there. We need to expand capacity and ambulatory, as I said, is a very strong part of our vision for the future. The fourth one is a hospital. We were fortunate to open up the James Hospital now two and a half years ago and it has been a resounding success. I believe it was maybe my third or fourth board meeting when I took the board on a tour of Doan and Rhoades and Dr. Reid made her famous comment, "I couldn't heal in this place." Where we have facilities that are now going on 65 or 70 years old since they were originally commissioned, that would be Doan Hall and part of the University Hospital complex that should be our flagship. We are going to need not only replacement, but we are going to need some calculation of further capacity on inpatient side. Two, if our projections are anywhere near as close at projecting out the growth of the region and central Ohio, we will be looking at programming and inpatient facility as well. Those are the four projects in description. I know we will need a motion to approve the funds for programming. That figure is on the page I believe behind your tab labeled contracts and the estimated project costs. Again, this is for programming purposes over the coming foreseeable months. Jay, do you have any comments on that?

Mr. Kasey:

No, I think there has been a lot of great work done by Mr. Lampert and his team of planners, and it has been discussed with the Facilities Committee by Mr. Schottenstein. I think we are all aligned and in pretty good shape to move this one forward.

Dr. Retchin:

Mr. Chairman, would you like a motion to approve?

Ms. Link:

May I have a motion?

The Bethel Road property is at the corner of Bethel and Reed. The Fishinger property is at the corner of Northwest. Both of these properties supported two or three positions at a time. In today's world of how we treat primary care, that's not sufficient to keep what is now a much more efficient model of primary care of six to seven physicians operating on a site that is busy and supported with the ancillary services that they need to treat their patients. These practices were anticipated and have been successfully consolidated into the new Arlington building, the Kingsdale building. These properties are anticipated to go back on the market. The Fishinger property already has some interests. The appraised value of the Fishinger property is \$505,000 and the appraisal on the Bethel property is \$520,000. I can answer questions about this. This request has been reviewed by the Facilities Committee. Mr. Schottenstein has seen it along and Mr. Lampert has reviewed it, so we bring it to your request for consideration.

BACKGROUND

The Ohio State University (OSU) campus master plan, Framework 2.0, is a long-term guiding vision that imagines transformational research and learning environments over the next decade and beyond. It comprehensively supports our academic and outreach missions - and we are excited to begin exploring possibilities for realizing this grand vision to strengthen Ohio State's position as a national flagship public research university. To advance Framework 2.0, additional study is needed to best understand the scope and priority of projects, which will be guided and informed by the university's strategic plan currently being developed. As responsible stewards of physical and financial resources, individual projects subject to approval by Ohio State's Board of Trustees.

The university is seeking board approval to engage stakeholders in programming studies over the next six to 12 months for four projects impacting the Health Sciences Campus and Wexner Medical Center.

While specific and more detailed deliverables will be established by stakeholders for each project, final documentation will include:

- Written and graphic program of requirements adhering to elements such as university design guidelines and space standards, code compliance issues, environmental issues, circulation, pathways for service traffic, staff amenities and phased implementation options.
- Site plans indicating entry and circulation to the buildings, parking, site, storm water management and utility requirements.
- Conceptual design as appropriate including block diagrams, stacking diagrams, massing, depictions of key spaces and siting.
- Cost estimates including enabling projects.
- Project schedule including "critical path" items and phasing scenarios during project implementation.

HEALTH SCIENCES CAMPUS

Planning for the Health Sciences Campus will include upgraded and shared facilities for all Health Sciences colleges. Functional programmatic requirements, space needs and critical adjacencies will be identified with a focus on leading-edge curricular delivery methods (education spaces including labs), student support spaces, patient experiences, and compliance with university space standards and guidelines. Potential phasing alternatives related to existing buildings and replacement facilities will be explored.

INTERDISCIPLINARY RESEARCH BUILDING

The university seeks a new standard and bold vision for interdisciplinary, collaborative research environments. The proposed programming effort should consider leading-edge research experiences; "best practices" within the "best of class" research buildings; recently constructed research spaces that exhibit cost effective and efficient operations; code compliance; and compliance with university standards and guidelines.

Siting is generally on Ohio State's Mid-Western campus, outlined by Framework 2.0 as a research and learning corridor located south of Woody Hayes Drive. Key neighbors include the College of Veterinary Medicine and the College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences. While siting is influenced by district planning currently underway,

alternatives for spaces and configurations within the site will be explored. A preliminary study estimates that the facility could include vivarium space, lab cores, wet lab facilities, dry research spaces, and building support, depending upon final service arrangement and phasing.

WEXNER MEDICAL CENTER AMBULATORY CENTER

The Wexner Medical Center will provide guidance for medical services to be included in a new Ambulatory Center. The largest single services are the James Cancer Hospital's ambulatory programs and the Wexner Medical Center's ambulatory programs. Siting is influenced by district planning currently underway and is generally on west campus. Alternatives for spaces and configurations within the site and buildings based on functional requirements and space needs will be identified.

Programming recommendations should consider leading-edge patient experiences; "best practices" within the "best of class" ambulatory centers; recently constructed clinical spaces that exhibit cost effective and efficient operations; code compliance; and compliance with university standards and guidelines.

WEXNER MEDICAL CENTER HOSPITAL

Programming services will identify spaces and configurations within a Bed Tower and Clinical Services Podium as a potential major addition to the Wexner Medical Center's main inpatient campus. Functional requirements and space needs as well as siting options for clinical services will be explored. Potential phasing alternatives related to existing buildings and the possibility of the total or partial replacement of Rhodes Hall and Doan Hall will be addressed.

The Wexner Medical Center will provide guidance for medical services to be included in the hospital. The program recommendations should consider leading-edge patient experiences; "best practices" within the "best of class" hospitals; recently constructed clinical spaces that exhibit cost effective and efficient operations; code compliance; and compliance with university standards and guidelines.

APPENDIX XLIII

BACKGROUND

3335-5-48.6 Council on enrollment and student progress.

(A) Membership.

The council on enrollment and student progress shall consist of seventeen eighteen members.

- (1) Nine regular tenure-track faculty.
 - (a) Three regular tenure-track faculty appointed by the president. Appointed members are eligible for reappointment.
 - (a) Six regular tenure-track faculty selected by the faculty council Executive Committee of Faculty Council.
- (2) <u>One non-tenure-track faculty member selected by the Executive</u> <u>Committee of Faculty Council.</u>
- (3) Six students.
 - (a) Two graduate students.
 - (b) Two professional students.
 - (c) Two undergraduate students.
- (34) Two administrators. Non-voting, appointed by the executive vice president and provost, non-votingor designee, to serve as administrative liaison for the council. <u>One administrator shall represent the Office of</u> <u>Academic Affairs and one shall represent Enrollment Services.</u>
- (B)-(C) no changes

3335-5-48.7 Committee on academic misconduct.

(A) Membership.

The committee on academic misconduct shall consist of <u>thirty-four forty-two</u> members.

- Eighteen <u>Twenty-two faculty</u>, at least eighteen tenure-track faculty. Faculty members are eligible for reappointment, but may not serve more than two consecutive terms.
- (2) Fourteen Eighteen students.
 - (a) Seven <u>Nine</u> graduate students.
 - (b) Seven <u>Nine</u> undergraduate students. The term of service shall begin with the summer term.
- (3)-(4) no changes
- (B)-(C) no changes

3335-13-06 Rights to and interests in patentable discoveries and inventions, copyrights, and related materials.

- (A) This rule shall apply to all products of university research (where "university research" is as defined in the current university policy on patents and copyrights), defined to be inventions and other legally protectable material arising out of university research, including any discovery, invention, know-how, design, model, work of authorship, and any strain, variety or culture of an organism, or any portion, modification, translation or extension of these items. Products of research will not include works of artistry, academic instruction, or traditional scholarship insofar as these works were not produced in connection with a sponsored program or as a part of a specific university duty or assignment.
- (B) The board of trustees deems it in the best interest of the university, its faculty, staff, and students, and in the interest of the promotion of research and development to provide for participation by faculty, staff, and students in the proceeds from products of research conceived or developed by them in the absence of any prior agreements relating to sponsored activities and insofar as allowed by any contract or grant agreements in support of the activity leading to the product of research.
- (C) The board of trustees shall establish a policy on patents and copyrights to be administered under the direction of the president of the university through the office of the senior vice president for research. The provisions of the policy shall be subject to review by the faculty committee on patents and copyrights and recommended to the board of trustees by the university senate.
 - (1) The faculty committee on patents and copyrights shall be composed primarily of members of the faculty and shall elect its own chair. Five members shall be elected by the faculty council in a manner to be determined by the council. One graduate student shall be appointed by the council of graduate students in a manner to be determined by that council. Five members shall be appointed by the president in consultation with the senior vice president for research, the executive vice president and provost, and other appropriate officials of the university. Service on the committee shall be for terms not to exceed three years. An individual may become eligible for committee service again after an absence from the committee of at least one year.
 - (2) The specific duties of and the procedures for appeals to the committee shall be as described in the policy on patents and copyrights.
- (D) Subject to the authority of the president of the university, the senior vice president for research is hereby assigned the responsibility for the acquisition, protection and disposition of rights in products of university research in accord with the policy on patents and copyrights.

<u>3335-13-06</u> Rights to and interests in intellectual property, patents, and copyrights.

The university shall have a policy or policies on intellectual property, patents, and copyrights (hereinafter referred to as "the policy").

(A) The intellectual properties, patents and copyrights committee of the university senate shall maintain the policy. Specifically, the committee shall review all proposed changes to the policy, and shall also have the power to initiate its own proposed changes to the policy. The chair of the committee shall also be designated as a member of the policy writing group for any revisions to the policy. Revisions shall be promulgated through the university policy process and then

recommended to faculty council and the university senate. All revisions to the policy must be approved by the faculty council and the university senate, in addition to the other approvals required by the university policy process.

- (1) <u>Membership, duties, and organization of the intellectual property, patents</u> and copyrights committee shall be in accordance with rule 3335-5-48.19 of the Administrative Code.
- (2) The policy on intellectual property, patents, and copyrights shall include specific procedures for appeals to the intellectual property, patents and copyrights committee.
- (B) The board of trustees deems it in the best interest of the university, its faculty, staff, and students, and in the interest of the promotion of research and development to provide for participation by faculty, staff, and students in the proceeds from intellectual property conceived or developed by them as determined by the policy. The term "intellectual property" shall be defined in the policy.
- (C) The university recognizes that copyright protections are fundamental to the academic mission, and that traditional scholarly and artistic intellectual works created by faculty, staff, and students generally belong to those individual creators. There are, however, instances defined in the policy in which specific rights, titles, and/or interests in copyrightable works created by faculty, staff, and students may vest in whole or in part in the university or other entities. As such, the policy shall establish the ownership of all rights, titles, and interests for copyrightable works created by faculty, staff, and students. The technical meaning of "copyrightable works" shall be defined in the policy.
- (D) The policy shall be administered under the direction of the president of the university or his/her designee.

Executive Summary



Partners Achieving Community Transformation ("PACT") is a nonprofit organization founded by The Ohio State University, Columbus Metropolitan Housing Authority, and the City of Columbus to plan and implement transformative change on the Near East Side of Columbus, Ohio. PACT's mission is to permanently disrupt the cycle of generational

poverty and economic instability for residents through the implementation of quality, sustainable and holistic initiatives. PACT serves as the convener of interested and investment partners to realize the goals of its comprehensive plan - the Blueprint for Community Investment ("Blueprint"). PACT will convene partners for the strategic implementation of these physical and programmatic improvements. The organization will also serve as a catalyst for continuing and expanding redevelopment efforts, leveraging investments into this important historic area of the city.

The foundation of the Blueprint is community-driven principles for a healthy community and areas for critical community improvements. The ongoing input of stakeholders has shaped the creation of the Blueprint and will continue to guide the focus of investments within the 800 acre-community. Through a holistic approach outlined in the Blueprint, PACT will leverage partnerships to target areas of impact including initiatives related to access to personalized healthcare, quality education and safe, affordable housing. - PACT forwards the application to Human Resources to verify applicant's eligibility for the incentive. Human Resources provides documentation of eligibility to PACT.
- 5. PACT send the applicant the promissory note to sign and be returned.
- 6. PACT will initiate an eRequest to issue the check, via Wexner Medical Center.
- 7. Wexner Medical Center will create a payment voucher and submit to Accounts Payable to issue the check. Taxes required to be paid on the benefit will be taken from the total.
- 8. PACT will provide the check to the title company in time for the applicant's closing date.
- 9. Restrictive covenant is filed with Franklin County on the property by the title company at closing.

The OSU Faculty & Staff University District Home Ownership Incentive Program is a down payment assistance program that consists of a zero interest forgivable loan to be applied towards the down payment, closing costs and/or reduction in principal amount on a home purchased within either of the two incentive areas.

Employees must reside at the residence and remain employed with Ohio State during the five-year repayment period. The down payment assistance is considered income to the employee and therefore the recipient is responsible for any related income tax liability.

In any given year that the endowment distribution is not fully used for its intended purpose, the unused portion should be held in the distribution account to be used in subsequent years and only for the purposes of the endowment, or reinvested in the endowment principal at the discretion of the director of the Division of Endocrinology, Diabetes & Metabolism and the chairperson of the Department of Internal Medicine or their designee.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of Trustees. As authorized by the Board of Trustees, a fee may be assessed against the endowment portfolio for the University's costs of development and fund management.

It is the desire of the donor that the endowment established herein should benefit the University in perpetuity. The University reserves the right to modify the purposes of this fund, however, (1) in consultation with the donor named above, or (2) if such purposes become unlawful, impracticable, impossible to achieve, or wasteful, provided that such fund shall only be used for the University's charitable purposes. In any given year that the endowment distribution is not fully used for its intended purpose, the unused portion should be held in the distribution account to be used in subsequent years and only for the purposes of the endowment, or reinvested in the endowment principal at the discretion of the dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine or his/her designee.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of Trustees. As authorized by the Board of Trustees, a fee may be assessed against the endowment portfolio for the University's costs of development and fund management.

It is the desire of the donors that the endowment established herein should benefit the University in perpetuity. The University reserves the right to modify the purposes of this fund, however, (1) in consultation with the donors named above, or (2) if such purposes become unlawful, impracticable, impossible to achieve, or wasteful, provided that such fund shall only be used for the University's charitable purposes. In seeking such modification, the University shall consult the dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine or his/her designee. Modifications to endowed funds shall be approved by the University's Board of Trustees, in accordance with the policies of the University.

Pathology Growth and Excellence Endowment Fund

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University shall establish the Pathology Growth and Excellence Endowment Fund effective April 7, 2017, with revenue support from OSU Pathology Services, LLC.

The annual distribution from this fund shall be used to support strategic initiatives; faculty and staff development; curriculum and training enhancements; medical research including seed funding; and other opportunities or programs to advance innovation, growth and excellence in the Department of Pathology in the College of Medicine. Expenditures shall be approved by the chairperson of the department, in consultation with the dean of the college.

In any given year that the endowment distribution is not fully used for its intended purpose, the unused portion should be held in the distribution account to be used in subsequent years and only for the purposes of the endowment, or reinvested in the endowment principal at the discretion of the chairperson of the Department of Pathology and the dean of the College of Medicine.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of Trustees. As authorized by the Board of Trustees, a fee may be assessed against the endowment portfolio for the University's costs of development and fund management.

It is the desire of OSU Pathology Services, LLC that the endowment established herein should benefit the University in perpetuity. The University reserves the right to modify the purposes of this fund, however, (1) in consultation with OSU Pathology Services, LLC, or (2) if such purposes become unlawful, impracticable, impossible to achieve, or wasteful, provided that such fund shall only be used for the University's charitable purposes. In seeking such modification, the University shall consult the chairperson of the Department of Pathology and the dean of the College of Medicine. Modifications to endowed funds shall be approved by the University's Board of Trustees, in accordance with the policies of the University.

Douglas M. Post PhD Endowed Memorial Fund in Family Medicine

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, in accordance with the guideline approved by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Foundation, shall establish the Douglas M. Post PhD Endowed Memorial Fund in Family Medicine effective April 7, 2017, with revenue support from Family Medicine Foundation, LLC to honor the career of Dr. Douglas M. Post (BA 1974, MA 1979, MSW 1989, PhD 1992) and to facilitate gifts to Family Medicine from family, friends and colleagues.

Dr. Post was a professor in the Department of Family Medicine, serving as a psychologist. He joined the department as clinical instructor in 1989; became assistant professor in 1995, associate professor in 2000 and professor in 2009. He was also an assistant dean for Practice-Based Learning in the College of Medicine (2011-2015) and received the college's Distinguished Educator Award. His career encompassed expertise in medical education, including participation on the implementation team of the new Lead/Serve/Inspire curriculum that began in the 2012-13 academic year; and in using technology to enhance the health care delivery system.

The annual distribution from this fund shall be used to support educational and training activities in the College of Medicine, Department of Family Medicine for residents, fellows and medical students with focus on opportunities to present research findings (covering costs of travel, lodging, per diem and presentation expenses). Expenditures shall be allocated by the chairperson of the department and approved by the dean of the college.

In any given year that the endowment distribution is not fully used for its intended purpose, the unused portion should be held in the distribution account to be used in subsequent years and only for the purposes of the endowment, or reinvested in the endowment principal at the discretion of the dean of the College of Medicine or his/her designee.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of

Trustees. As authorized by the Board of Trustees, a fee may be assessed against the endowment portfolio for the University's costs of development and fund management.

It is the desire of Family Medicine Foundation, LLC that the endowment established herein should benefit the University in perpetuity. The University reserves the right to modify the purposes of this fund, however, (1) in consultation with Family Medicine Foundation, LLC, or (2) if such purposes become unlawful, impracticable, impossible to achieve, or wasteful, provided that such fund shall only be used for the University's charitable purposes. In seeking such modification, the University shall consult the dean of the College of Medicine or his/her designee. Modifications to endowed funds shall be approved by the University's Board of Trustees, in accordance with the policies of the University.

Pfeifer Family K-L Row "i Dot" Endowed Scholarship Fund

The James E. Pfeifer II K-L Row I-Dot Scholarship Fund was established May 2, 1997, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University with a gift from James E. (BS in Business Administration 1961) and Nancy G. (BS in Physical Therapy 1960) Pfeifer in celebration of the participation of their son, James E. Pfeifer II, in The Ohio State University Marching Band (1987-1991). The name was changed to the James E. Pfeifer II K-L Row i-Dot Scholarship Fund on June 6, 1997. The name was revised again on September 5, 2003. Effective April 7, 2017, the fund name and description shall be revised.

All gifts are to be invested in the University's Permanent Endowment Fund, under the rules and regulations adopted by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, with the right to invest and reinvest as occasion dictates.

The annual distribution shall provide annual scholarships for every member of The Ohio State University Marching Band selected to "dot the i" in Script Ohio during regular season Ohio State football games. Scholarships will be awarded above and beyond any other Marching Band scholarship the recipients would have received otherwise. Recipients will be selected by the director of the School of Music, in consultation with the director of the marching band and Student Financial Aid. Scholarships are not renewable and are not restricted to music majors.

In any given year that the endowment distribution is not fully used for its intended purpose, the unused distribution from this endowed fund shall be reinvested in the endowment principal.

It is the desire of the donors that the endowment established herein should benefit the University in perpetuity. The University reserves the right to modify the purposes of this fund, however, (1) in consultation with the donors named above, or (2) if such purposes become unlawful, impracticable, impossible to achieve, or wasteful, provided that such fund shall only be used for the University's charitable purposes. In seeking such modification, the University shall consult the director of the School of Music and the director of The Ohio State University Marching Band or their designees. Modifications to endowed funds shall be approved by the University's Board of Trustees, in accordance with the policies of the University.

The Grayce M. Sills Endowed Professorship in Psychiatric-Mental Health Nursing

The Grayce M. Sills Professorship Fund was established September 1, 1993, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University with gifts from alumni, friends, and faculty of the College of Nursing. The description was revised August 29, 2001. The funding level was reached and the professorship was established December 2, 2005. Effective April 7, 2017, the fund name shall be revised.

The annual distribution from this fund shall be used to provide a professorship in behavioral health nursing or to support a visiting professor in behavioral health nursing in the College

of Nursing. Appointment to The Grayce M. Sills Professorship will be recommended by the dean of the College of Nursing to the provost and approved by the Board of Trustees.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of Trustees. As authorized by the Board of Trustees, a fee may be assessed against the endowment portfolio for the University's costs of development and fund management.

It is the desire of the donors that this fund should benefit the University in perpetuity. If, in the future, the need for this fund should cease to exist or so diminish as to provide unused distributions, then another use shall be designated by the Board of Trustees as recommended by the dean of the College of Nursing. Any such alternate distributions shall be made in a manner as nearly aligned with the original intent of the donors as good conscience and need dictate.

Neil A. Armstrong Chair in Aerospace Policy

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University shall establish the Neil A. Armstrong Chair in Aerospace Policy effective January 27, 2017, with funds transferred by the College of Engineering and the John Glenn College of Public Affairs. Effective April 7, 2017, the fund description shall be revised.

The intent of this fund is to recognize Neil A. Armstrong as the first human being to set foot on the moon and commemorate a technological achievement that has inspired those pursuing careers in science, engineering, and public policy particularly as related to aerospace.

The annual distribution shall be used to provide support for the work of a distinguished teacher, scientist, engineer, industrialist or policymaker as a faculty member jointly appointed in the College of Engineering and the John Glenn College of Public Affairs to advance aerospace policy and/or aerospace engineering in national and international domains.

The appointee is to be recommended by the dean of the College of Engineering and the dean of the John Glenn College of Public Affairs to the Provost and approved by the University's Board of Trustees. Basis for selection of the chair holder includes a record of significant achievement in aerospace policy, aerospace research or the aerospace industry; demonstrated ability to work effectively with representatives from industry and public agencies; and demonstrated personal qualities that enable the individual to inspire, instruct and influence in matters related to aerospace policy and aerospace engineering.

The Neil A. Armstrong Chair will have a term of four years, but be eligible for renewed appointment at the joint recommendation of the deans of the College of Engineering and the John Glenn College of Public Affairs.

In any given year that the endowment distribution is not fully used for its intended purpose, the unused portion should be held in the distribution account to be used in subsequent years and only for the purposes of the endowment, or reinvested in the endowment principal at the discretion of the dean of the College of Engineering and dean of the John Glenn College of Public Affairs, or their designee.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of Trustees. As authorized by the Board of Trustees, a fee may be assessed against the endowment portfolio for the University's costs of development and fund management.

It is the desire of the colleges that the endowment established herein should benefit the University in perpetuity. The University reserves the right to modify the purposes of this fund, however, (1) in consultation with the colleges named above, or (2) if such purposes

become unlawful, impracticable, impossible to achieve, or wasteful, provided that such fund shall only be used for the University's charitable purposes. In seeking such modification, the University shall consult the deans of the College of Engineering and the John Glenn College of Public Affairs. Modifications to endowed funds shall be approved by the University's Board of Trustees, in accordance with the policies of the University.

The Maria A. Melnyk Franks Memorial Scholarship Fund

The Maria A. Melnyk Franks Memorial Scholarship Fund was established August 30, 1995, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University with gifts from Richard L. Franks (BA 1977) and friends in memory of Maria A. Melnyk Franks. The description was revised August 30, 2000, May 14, 2010, and February 1, 2013. Effective April 7, 2017, the fund description shall be revised.

Twenty percent (20%) of the annual distribution shall be reinvested in the endowment principal. Eighty percent (80%) of the annual distribution shall provide three scholarships for students actively involved in music and music study: one for an outstanding undergraduate or graduate piano major; one for an outstanding undergraduate or graduate piano major; one for an outstanding undergraduate or graduate music major who is an active member of The Ohio State University Men's Glee Club; and one for an outstanding undergraduate or graduate or graduate student who is an active member of The Ohio State University Marching Band from any school or department. If there are no candidates majoring in piano, it is the desire of the donor that the award is given to a student majoring in French horn. Scholarship recipients must maintain a minimum grade point average as stipulated by School of Music and University policies; scholarships may be renewed up to four years as long as the recipients maintain eligibility. Scholarship recipients shall be selected by the director of the School of Music with recommendations from the directors of The Ohio State University Marching Band and The Ohio State University Men's Glee Club and in consultation with Student Financial Aid.

The University may modify any selection criteria should the criteria be found, in whole or in part, to be contrary to federal or state law or University policy.

In any given year that the endowment distribution is not fully used for its intended purpose, the unused portion shall be reinvested in the endowment principal.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of Trustees. As authorized by the Board of Trustees, a fee may be assessed against the endowment portfolio for the University's costs of development and fund management.

It is the desire of the donors that the endowment established herein should benefit the University in perpetuity. Should unforeseen circumstances arise in the future so that the need for this endowment ceases to exist, then another use as nearly aligned with the original intent of the contribution as good conscience and need dictate shall be designated by the University's Board of Trustees. In making this alternate designation, the Board shall seek advice from members of the Franks family (Richard L. Franks, Charles R. Franks, Charles A. Franks, and Stacey R. Franks or their heirs) and the director of the School of Music with recommendations from the directors of The Ohio State University Marching Band and The Ohio State University Men's Glee Club.

Bob and Corrine Frick Chair in Heart Failure

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, in accordance with the guidelines approved by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Foundation, shall establish the Bob and Corrine Frick Chair in Heart Failure effective April 7, 2017, with gifts from Bob and Corrine Frick of Westerville, Ohio.

The annual distribution from this fund shall be used to support a chair position for a nationally or internationally recognized physician faculty member in the specialty of heart

failure in the Division of Cardiovascular Medicine, including the OSU Heart and Vascular Center and the Richard M. Ross Heart Hospital. The annual distribution may support the salary and benefits of the chair holder and/or programs related to the clinical and research efforts of the chair holder that foster diagnostic and treatment innovations, excellence in medical research and a team approach on heart failure.

Should progress be made in the treatment for heart disease that diminishes the need for a heart failure chair position, the annual distribution may support a chair position in Cardiovascular Medicine. Should medical discoveries lead to the prevention and cure of heart disease, the chair position may be directed towards other diseases. Should the University and Foundation find it necessary to make this revision or otherwise modify the fund's purpose, the donors shall be consulted, if possible, prior to the proposed modifications. If not possible, instead the College of Medicine and Division of Cardiovascular Medicine may discuss appropriate alternative uses with donors' family.

The appointment to the position shall be made by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, as approved by the dean of the College of Medicine upon recommendation of the directors of the Division of Cardiovascular Medicine and the OSU Heart and Vascular Center, in consultation with the chair of the Department of Internal Medicine. The activities of the holder shall be reviewed no less than every four years by the dean of the college to determine compliance with the intent of the donors as well as the academic and research standards of the University.

In any given year that the endowment distribution is not fully used for its intended purpose, the unused portion should be held in the distribution account to be used in subsequent years and only for the purposes of the endowment, or reinvested in the endowment principal at the discretion of the director of the Division of Cardiovascular Medicine, in consultation with the director of the OSU Heart and Vascular Center and the chair of the Department of Internal Medicine.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of Trustees. As authorized by the Board of Trustees, a fee may be assessed against the endowment portfolio for the University's costs of development and fund management.

It is the desire of the donors that the endowment established herein should benefit the University in perpetuity. The University and the Foundation reserve the right to modify the purposes of this fund, however, (1) in consultation with the donors named above, or (2) if such purposes become unlawful, impracticable, impossible to achieve, or wasteful, provided that such fund shall only be used for the University's charitable purposes. In seeking such modification, the University and the Foundation shall consult the directors of the Division of Cardiovascular Medicine and the OSU Heart and Vascular Center, chair of the Department of Internal Medicine and dean of the College of Medicine. Modifications to endowed funds shall be approved by the University's Board of Trustees and the Foundation's Board of Directors, in accordance with the policies of the University and Foundation.

Carter V. Findley Professorship in Ottoman and Turkish History

The Professorship Fund in Ottoman and Turkish History was established April 3, 2009, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University in accordance with the guidelines approved by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Foundation, with gifts from an anonymous donor. The description was revised September 18, 2009. The required funding level for a professorship has been reached. Effective April 7, 2017, the fund name and description shall be revised and the position shall be established.

The purpose of this endowment is to support in perpetuity the study of Ottoman and modern Turkish history, a field taught and studied at The Ohio State University since the 1930s,

and to enhance the national and international competitiveness and distinction of the University in this field.

The donor intends more specifically to establish an endowment of \$1,000,000, in keeping with the currently established 2006 endowment levels, to create the named professorship in Ottoman and modern Turkish history. The donor reserves the right to rename and/or revise the fund during his lifetime or by his will.

The annual distribution shall be used to support a named professorship position in Ottoman and Turkish History. Appointees to this position shall be distinguished scholar-teachers known for their positive interest in Turkish history and culture, their high standing in the international community of scholars in the field, their expertise in the history of the Turkish republic as well as of the Ottoman Empire, their broad linguistic command of the Ottoman and modern Turkish language of different periods, and the originality and impact of their historical scholarship. Holders of the professorship shall be appointed after a rigorous international search and on the recommendation of the chairperson of the Department of History.

In keeping with the stated purpose of this endowed fund, if the fund grows or if the principal can be increased sufficiently over time, the form in which the fund supports the field may be revised, up to and including the creation of an endowed chair at the 2006 endowment funding levels, and during the donor's lifetime any such change shall be made at his initiative or with his consent.

If in any year the income of the fund is not fully used to support the stated purpose of the endowment, any such unused income will be reinvested to principal.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of Trustees. As authorized by the Board of Trustees, a fee may be assessed against the endowment portfolio for the University's costs of development and fund management.

It is the desire of the donor that this fund should benefit the University in perpetuity.

The need for the fund shall not be deemed to have ceased to exist until it becomes impossible to use the distribution of the fund to support Ottoman and Turkish studies in any way whatsoever at this University.

If in the future the income of the fund so diminishes that it is impossible to use the income from the fund to support Ottoman and Turkish studies at this University in any way whatsoever, then another use shall be designated by the Board of Trustees and Foundation Board as recommended by the executive dean of the College of Arts and Sciences or his/her designee, in consultation with the chairperson of the Department of History. Any such alternate distributions shall be made in a manner as nearly aligned with the original intent of the donor as possible.

The David and Isabel Perry Endowment Fund for Research in Veterinary Medicine

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, in accordance with the guidelines approved by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Foundation, shall establish The David and Isabel Perry Endowment Fund for Research in Veterinary Medicine effective April 7, 2017, with gifts from the estate of Isabel H. Perry (BS 1943) of Sylvania, Ohio in memory of her husband, David V. Perry (BSBA 1942).

The annual distribution from this fund shall be used to support the advancement of veterinary research, including both basic and clinical research, towards finding causes, innovative treatments, and cures for diseases afflicting animals. Expenditures shall be determined annually by the associate dean for research and dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine. Uses may include, but are not limited to, scientific supplies,

equipment, salaries for research personnel and activities required for quality veterinary medicine research.

In any given year that the endowment distribution is not fully used for its intended purpose, the unused portion should be held in the distribution account to be used in subsequent years and only for the purposes of the endowment, or reinvested in the endowment principal at the discretion of the dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine or his/her designee.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of Trustees. As authorized by the Board of Trustees, a fee may be assessed against the endowment portfolio for the University's costs of development and fund management.

It is the desire of the donor that the endowment established herein should benefit the University in perpetuity. The University and the Foundation reserve the right to modify the purposes of this fund, however, if such purposes become unlawful, impracticable, impossible to achieve, or wasteful, provided that such fund shall only be used for the University's charitable purposes. In seeking such modification, the University and the Foundation shall consult the dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine. Modifications to endowed funds shall be approved by the University's Board of Trustees and the Foundation's Board of Directors, in accordance with the policies of the University and Foundation.

The Larry L. Hench Scholarship Fund

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, in accordance with the guidelines approved by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Foundation, shall establish The Larry L. Hench Scholarship Fund effective April 7, 2017, with an estate gift from Larry L. Hench.

The annual distribution from this fund shall be used to support an award(s) for undergraduate and graduate students enrolled in the College of Engineering, Department of Materials Science and Engineering.

Scholarship recipients shall be selected by the college's scholarship committee, in consultation with the chairperson of the Department of Materials Science and Engineering and Student Financial Aid, and approved by the college's dean or his/her designee.

The Ohio State University's mission and admissions policy supports educational diversity. The University may modify any criteria used to select scholarship recipients should the criteria be found, in whole or in part, to be contrary to federal or state law or University policy.

In any given year that the endowment distribution is not fully used for its intended purpose, the unused portion should be held in the distribution account to be used in subsequent years and only for the purposes of the endowment, or reinvested in the endowment principal at the discretion of the dean of the College of Engineering or his/her designee.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, in accordance with the guidelines approved by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Foundation, shall establish The Marian Chase Scholarship Fund effective April 7, 2017, with an estate gift from Marian F. Chase (BS 1952, MS 1961) of Columbus, Ohio.

The annual distribution from this fund shall be used to provide scholarships to undergraduate, graduate, or professional students through the Critical Difference for Women program at The Women's Place. Recipients must demonstrate financial need to re-enter the educational process due to interrupting their education to meet other responsibilities. It is the donor's desire that the scholarships be awarded with particular attention to, but not limited to, female students. Recipients will be selected by the director of The Women's Place or his/her designee, in consultation with Student Financial Aid.

If the Critical Difference for Women program ceases to exist, the annual distribution shall be used to provide scholarships to student-athletes. It is the donor's desire that the scholarships be awarded with particular attention to, but not limited to, female students. Recipients will be selected by the director of the Department of Athletics or his/her designee, in consultation with Student Financial Aid.

The Ohio State University's mission and admissions policy supports educational diversity. The University may modify any criteria used to select scholarship recipients should the criteria be found, in whole or in part, to be contrary to federal or state law or University policy.

In any given year that the endowment distribution is not fully used for its intended purpose, the unused portion should be held in the distribution account to be used in subsequent years and only for the purposes of the endowment, or reinvested in the endowment principal at the discretion of the director of The Women's Place or his/her designee.

The Robert A. and Sheila B. Ranallo Scholarship Fund

The Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, in accordance with the guidelines approved by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Foundation, shall establish The Robert A. and Sheila B. Ranallo Scholarship Fund effective April 7, 2017, with gifts from Robert A. Ranallo (JD 1980) and Sheila B. Ranallo.

The annual distribution from this fund shall be used to provide scholarships to students enrolled in the Michael E. Moritz College of Law who demonstrate a clear need for financial aid to be able to attend law school. To qualify candidates must demonstrate academic achievement as an undergraduate by either having a cumulative grade point average of 3.5+ through graduation or graduate with a distinction of Magna Cum Laude or higher as established by the candidate's undergraduate institution. Additionally, candidates must satisfy at least one of the following selection criteria:

- Earned an undergraduate degree from any of the following undergraduate institutions:
 - University of Notre Dame
 - The Ohio State University
 - Any Jesuit undergraduate institution; or
- Earned an undergraduate degree with a major in accounting or finance; or
- Be a permanent resident of Lake County or Geauga County, Ohio; or
- Be a first-generation college graduate from the candidate's family.

Recipients will be selected by the college's scholarship committee, in consultation with Student Financial Aid. The donor reserved the right to rename the fellowship. The donor exercised that right in February 2017. Those who held the fellowship as the "Adivar Fellowship" shall have discretion to refer to it as the "Carter V. Findley Fellowship" in referring to their tenure of the fellowship.

All gifts are to be invested by the Foundation, under the rules and regulations adopted by the Foundation's Board of Directors, with the right to invest and reinvest as occasion dictates.

The purpose of this endowment is to strengthen and perpetuate the study of the history of the Ottoman Empire and Turkish Republic, a field taught and studied at this University since the 1930s, and to enhance the national and international competitiveness and distinction of the University in this field. The donor intends more specifically to endow a graduate fellowship in Ottoman and Turkish history as just defined. The annual income shall be used either to provide a fellowship to recruit or retain a graduate student in Ottoman and Turkish history or to fund overseas dissertation research for a student excluded from, or disadvantaged in, competition for non-departmental research fellowships by reason of nationality or other factor extraneous to the student's merit and that of his or her dissertation research. The fellowship will be awarded strictly on the basis of merit. Applicants for dissertation research must also demonstrate need and what if any funding they have obtained from other sources. Graduate students of any nationality are eligible to receive this fellowship. The awarding of this fellowship will be determined by the chair of the Department of History, in consultation with the department's senior faculty in Ottoman and Turkish History and Student Financial Aid.

This fellowship will be awarded for one year at a time to a graduate student who has been accepted into the graduate program of the Department of History and approved for funding (stipend and fee authorization) in that program. The fellowship will provide the recipients'

stipend during the year or years of their tenure of the fellowship, enabling them to devote full time to their studies.

The purpose of this endowment being to provide support in perpetuity for the study of the history of the Ottoman Empire and Turkish Republic, the donor intends to continue adding to the principal of the fund in the future.

If in any year there is no qualified candidate for the fellowship or if the income is not fully used for any reason, any such unused income will be reinvested to the principal.

If the fund declines to the point that it cannot support a full graduate fellowship, it is the intention of the donor that the income from the fund should be used to provide research support funding for graduate students in this field or to purchase books in the field for the library, and that the need for the fund shall not be deemed to have ceased to exist until it becomes impossible to use the income of the fund for any of these purposes.

It is the desire of the donor that this fund should benefit the University in perpetuity. If the need for this fund should cease to exist or so diminish as to provide unused income, then another use shall be designated by the Foundation Board as recommended by the executive dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, in consultation with the divisional dean of Arts and Humanities in order to carry out the desire of the donor.

Dr. Mabel G. Freeman Student Support Fund

The Dr. Mabel G. Freeman Student Support Fund was established January 31, 2014, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University, in accordance with the guidelines approved by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Foundation, with gifts from supporters of and the committee for the Freeman Challenge, friends and family of Dr. Freeman, and the founding donor, Dr. Mabel G. Freeman (BS 1966, MS 1975, PhD 1988). Effective April 7, 2017, the fund description shall be revised.

During the founding donor's lifetime, this fund shall be administered in accordance with the guidelines for donor-advised funds approved by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Foundation.

After the death of the founding donor, the annual distribution from this fund shall be used to provide scholarships for students transferring to the Ohio State Columbus campus from a community college, with particular attention to, but not limited to, students transferring from Columbus State Community College. Recipients must demonstrate a high level of financial need and must already possess an associate's degree upon transferring. The number and value of scholarships offered annually will be determined by Student Financial Aid with a focus on making the greatest amount of impact on recipients' ability to access, afford and complete a bachelor's program. Recipients will be selected by Student Financial Aid. Scholarships are renewable for a total of 4 semesters of study. Should a time come when the community college sector is altered or no longer exists within the higher education framework, the scholarships shall be awarded to any students demonstrating high levels of financial need.

In any given year that the endowment distribution is not fully used for its intended purpose, the unused portion should be reinvested in the endowment principal.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of Trustees. As authorized by the Board of Trustees, a fee may be assessed against the endowment portfolio for the University's costs of development and fund management.

It is the desire of the donor that the endowment established herein should benefit the University in perpetuity. The University and the Foundation reserve the right to modify the purposes of this fund, however, (1) in consultation with the donor named above, or (2) if

such purposes become unlawful, impracticable, impossible to achieve, or wasteful, provided that such fund shall only be used for the University's charitable purposes. In seeking such modification, the University and the Foundation shall consult the director of Student Financial Aid. Modifications to endowed funds shall be approved by the University's Board of Trustees and the Foundation's Board of Directors, in accordance with the policies of the University and Foundation.

Richard L. and Hazel M. Spetka Memorial Scholarship Fund

The Richard L. and Hazel M. Spetka Memorial Scholarship Fund was established April 5, 2013, by the Board of Trustees of The Ohio State University in accordance with the guidelines approved by the Board of Directors of The Ohio State University Foundation, with gifts from Dr. Lawrence and Mrs. Christine Spetka of Ottowa Hills, Ohio. Effective April 7, 2017, the fund description shall be revised.

The annual distribution from this fund shall support the University's most urgent scholarship needs as determined by Student Financial Aid. The scholarship(s) is available to Ohio State student(s) from Lucas or Knox County. Scholarship recipients shall be selected by the director of Student Financial Aid.

The scholarships are portable if the recipients change campuses; transferable if they change major; and renewable for up to eight semesters, even if the semesters are non-consecutive, as long as the student remains in good standing with the University.

This fund is included in the Ohio Scholarship Challenge. The University will match annual distribution payouts in perpetuity. The transfer of matching funds will occur once annually, usually in July. Under the Challenge, unused annual distribution cannot be reinvested in the fund's principal.

The Ohio State University's mission and admissions policy supports educational diversity. The University may modify any criteria used to select scholarship recipients should the criteria be found, in whole or in part, to be contrary to federal or state law or University policy.

The investment and management of and expenditures from all endowment funds shall be in accordance with University policies and procedures, as approved by the Board of Trustees. As authorized by the Board of Trustees, a fee may be assessed against the endowment portfolio for the University's costs of development and fund management.

It is the desire of the donors that the endowment established herein should benefit the University in perpetuity. The University and the Foundation reserve the right to modify the purposes of this fund, however, (1) in consultation with the donors named above, or (2) if such purposes become unlawful, impracticable, impossible to achieve, or wasteful, provided that such fund shall only be used for the University's charitable purposes. In seeking such modification, the University and the Foundation shall consult the executive director of Student Financial Aid or his/her designee. Modifications to endowed funds shall be approved by the University's Board of Trustees and the Foundation's Board of Directors, in accordance with the policies of the University and Foundation.
APPENDIX XLVIII

BACKGROUND

The Ohio State University (OSU) campus master plan, Framework 2.0, is a long-term guiding vision that imagines transformational research and learning environments over the next decade and beyond. It comprehensively supports our academic and outreach missions - and we are excited to begin exploring possibilities for realizing this grand vision to strengthen Ohio State's position as a national flagship public research university. To advance Framework 2.0, additional study is needed to best understand the scope and priority of projects, which will be guided and informed by the university's strategic plan currently being developed. As responsible stewards of physical and financial resources, individual projects subject to approval by Ohio State's Board of Trustees.

The university is seeking board approval to engage stakeholders in programming studies over the next six to 12 months for five projects.

While specific and more detailed deliverables will be established by stakeholders for each project, final documentation will include:

- Written and graphic program of requirements adhering to elements such as university design guidelines and space standards, code compliance issues, environmental issues, circulation, pathways for service traffic, staff amenities and phased implementation options.
- Site plans indicating entry and circulation to the buildings, parking, site, storm water management and utility requirements.
- Conceptual design as appropriate including block diagrams, stacking diagrams, massing, depictions of key spaces and siting.
- Cost estimates including enabling projects.
- Project schedule including "critical path" items and phasing scenarios during project implementation.

ARTS DISTRICT

The university is committed to exploring high-quality, modern learning environments for interaction across arts disciplines, including theatre and music performance spaces. These developments advance a comprehensive vision for an Arts District at 15th Avenue and High Street that would also open the university's front door and create a vibrant connection to the heart of the University District. A previous planning study, the Arts District Master Plan, was approved in April 2016. The proposed programming effort will further explore the opportunities for physical and programmatic adjacencies with a focus on state-of-the-art spaces for the Department of Theatre, School of Music and Wexner Center for the Arts. The final program should consider how planned facilities will elevate existing programs locally, regionally and nationally. Phasing considerations, including enabling projects and the associated impact on instruction and research, will be detailed.

HEALTH SCIENCES CAMPUS

Planning for the Health Sciences Campus will include upgraded and shared facilities for all Health Sciences colleges. Functional programmatic requirements, space needs and critical adjacencies will be identified with a focus on leading-edge curricular delivery methods (education spaces including labs), student support spaces, patient experiences, and compliance with university space standards and guidelines. Potential phasing alternatives related to existing buildings and replacement facilities will be explored.

INTERDISCIPLINARY RESEARCH BUILDING

The university seeks a new standard and bold vision for interdisciplinary, collaborative research environments. The proposed programming effort should consider leading-edge research experiences; "best practices" within the "best of class" research buildings; recently constructed research spaces that exhibit cost effective and efficient operations; code compliance; and compliance with university standards and guidelines.

Siting is generally on Ohio State's Mid-Western campus, outlined by Framework 2.0 as a research and learning corridor located south of Woody Hayes Drive. Key neighbors include the College of Veterinary Medicine and the College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences. While siting is influenced by district planning currently underway, alternatives for spaces and configurations within the site will be explored. A preliminary study estimates that the facility could include vivarium space, lab cores, wet lab facilities, dry research spaces, and building support, depending upon final service arrangement and phasing.

WEXNER MEDICAL CENTER AMBULATORY CENTER

The Wexner Medical Center will provide guidance for medical services to be included in a new Ambulatory Center. The largest single services are the James Cancer Hospital's ambulatory programs and the Wexner Medical Center's ambulatory programs. Siting is influenced by district planning currently underway and is generally on west campus. Alternatives for spaces and configurations within the site and buildings based on functional requirements and space needs will be identified.

Programming recommendations should consider leading-edge patient experiences; "best practices" within the "best of class" ambulatory centers; recently constructed clinical spaces that exhibit cost effective and efficient operations; code compliance; and compliance with university standards and guidelines.

WEXNER MEDICAL CENTER HOSPITAL

Programming services will identify spaces and configurations within a Bed Tower and Clinical Services Podium as a potential major addition to the Wexner Medical Center's main inpatient campus. Functional requirements and space needs as well as siting options for clinical services will be explored. Potential phasing alternatives related to existing buildings and the possibility of the total or partial replacement of Rhodes Hall and Doan Hall will be addressed.

The Wexner Medical Center will provide guidance for medical services to be included in the hospital. The program recommendations should consider leading-edge patient experiences; "best practices" within the "best of class" hospitals; recently constructed clinical spaces that exhibit cost effective and efficient operations; code compliance; and compliance with university standards and guidelines.

APPENDIX XLIX

BACKGROUND

Background

The Ohio State University seeks to acquire from Joanne 1596, LLC, approximately 0.16 acres of improved real property to support the future development of the Innovation District contemplated in Framework Plan 2.0. The improvements include a three-story multi-family apartment building comprised of approximately 6,480 square feet (collectively, the "Property"), and is one of two parcels needed to assemble an entire block in the acquisition zone.

Location and Description

The Property is located at the northeast corner of Highland St and 10th Ave. The apartment building is comprised of six units, all occupied by residential tenants. The site is zoned as an AR-4 residential district.

Property History

The property is titled to Joanne 1596, LLC and will be acquired in the name of the State of Ohio for the use and benefit of The Ohio State University. Acquisition will require approval of the State Controlling Board.

Acquisition of Property

Planning and Real Estate (PARE) recommends that the 0.16 acres of improved real property be acquired for a purchase price of \$975,000.00 and under other terms and conditions to be negotiated in the best interest of the university. The source of funding for the acquisition is the land purchase reserve fund. The Office of Planning and Real Estate will operate the property with the goal of replenishing the land purchase reserve prior to redevelopment.

The second recommended the inclusion of a mental health statement on course syllabi. In light of these accomplishments, he was nominated for the National Campus Leadership Council's Student Body President of the Year Award.

Beyond USG, Mr. Basalla has been involved with event

planning for the Ohio Union Activities Board and served as the public relations chair for the Delta Tau Delta fraternity. He also served on the University Senate, participating in the Steering Committee and Council on Student Affairs. In the summer of 2016, he interned for Ohio Senator Rob Portman in his Washington, D.C., office, working alongside staff members who were responsible for the senator's legislative and administrative operations.

Born in Parma, Ohio, Mr. Basalla will remain in the Buckeye state after graduation with plans to become the special assistant to the president and CEO of the Columbus Partnership, a nonprofit group of chief executives from leading businesses and institutions in Columbus who are committed to improving the economic vitality of the region.

RECIPIENTS OF HONORS

Charles F. Bolden Jr. DOCTOR OF PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION

Nominated by President Barack Obama, Major General Charles F. Bolden Jr., USMC (Ret.), served for nearly eight years as the 12th administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration until his retirement in January 2017. As administrator of NASA, Major General Bolden - the first African American to hold the office - led a nationwide team to advance the missions and goals of the U.S. space program, shepherding a new era of space exploration focused on aeronautics technology development and increased utilization of the International Space Station.

Born in Columbia, South Carolina, Major General Bolden received an appointment to the U.S. Naval Academy, where he completed his undergraduate studies in electrical science in 1968. He went on to serve in the Marine Corps as an aviator, flying more than 100 combat missions in Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia in the early 1970s.

In 1977, Major General Bolden earned a graduate degree in systems management from the University of Southern California, and was selected as an astronaut candidate in 1980.

He traveled into orbit four times as a member of NASA's Astronaut Corps, commanding two missions and piloting both the *Columbia* and *Discovery* shuttles. His missions included the deployment of the Hubble Space Telescope and the first American-Russian joint international space mission. He was inducted into the U.S. Astronaut Hall of Fame in 2006.

During his tenure as NASA administrator, Major General Bolden led the agency in developing innovative technology crucial to the advancement of space travel, such as the Space Launch System rocket and Orion spacecraft that will carry astronauts to deep space destinations.

Under his leadership, the agency's support of commercial space transportation systems for reaching low-Earth orbit has enabled successful commercial cargo resupply of the International Space Station. He also oversaw a variety of dynamic science activities at NASA, including the unprecedented landing of the Curiosity rover on Mars, the launch of a spacecraft to Jupiter and continued progress toward the 2018 launch of the James Webb Space Telescope - the successor to the Hubble Space Telescope.

Lucy Shelton Caswell DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

Countless scholars at Ohio State and beyond owe a debt of gratitude to Lucy Shelton Caswell, a celebrated authority on cartoon art and the visionary behind the creation of the Billy Ireland Cartoon Library & Museum - the foremost collection of cartoon and comics materials in the world. Thanks to her efforts. Ohio State is home to one of the first academic libraries to recognize the importance of collecting and cataloging cartoon art for preservation and research

Professor Emerita Caswell earned her undergraduate degree in history and German language and literature at Austin College before attending the University of Michigan, where she completed her graduate studies in library science. In 1970, she began her 40-year career at Ohio State as an instructor and head of the Journalism Library. Four years later, Ohio State alumnus Milton Caniff, creator of the beloved "Terry and the Pirates" and "Steve Canyon" adventure comic series, donated an extensive trove of memorabilia and manuscripts to the university.

As curator of the Milton Caniff Collection, Professor Emerita Caswell embarked on a considerable journey, which began in 1977, to survey, archive and preserve the prolific collection - the seed from which the Billy Ireland Cartoon Library & Museum would grow. A champion of cartoon art as a serious academic pursuit. Professor Emerita Caswell leveraged the university's newfound asset to cultivate relationships with artists and organizations across the nation and encourage them to contribute artwork and papers to the archive

In 1997, Professor Emerita Caswell negotiated the transfer of 75 tons of comic strip clippings from the San Francisco Academy of Comic Art, rescued from the bound newspaper volumes that libraries across the country had discarded in favor of microfilm.

Under her leadership, donations increased and the collection outgrew multiple storage facilities. In 2013, after eight years of fundraising and construction, the new, state-ofthe-art Billy Ireland Cartoon Museum & Library opened in Sullivant Hall. Fulfilling Professor Emerita Caswell's vision, the library has become an internationally renowned center for research and exhibitions, and hundreds of donors have contributed to the collection. which includes more than 300.000 cartoons and 2.5 million comic strip clippings and newspaper pages.

RECIPIENTS OF HONORS

Richard S. (Dick) Stoddard DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

After earning his undergraduate degree from Ohio State in 1966, and dedicating nearly four decades of loyal service to his alma mater, Dick Stoddard has become the epitome of a Buckeye for life. His collaborative spirit and selfless commitment to Ohio State extended well beyond his formal responsibilities at the university as he united with higher education leaders and elected officials to advance the goals of Buckeyes near and far.

An ROTC graduate, Mr. Stoddard was commissioned to the U.S. Army as a second lieutenant. After fulfiling his military duties, he returned to Ohio State to pursue graduate studies in the Department of Political Science. It was there that he took on professional roles at the university, first as a graduate administrative associate and then, in 1978, as director of undergraduate studies and department administrator. Four years later, he was recruited as special assistant to the vice president of the newly created Office of Research. He is credited with helping grow that office during its formative years. He became an expert in regulatory issues and federal funding for research, which led to another promotion in 1995, this time to special assistant to the president and director of federal relations.

Mr. Stoddard became a strong advocate for Ohio State's legislative priorities. He represented the university as a member of prominent national higher education organizations, such as the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities and the Association of American Universities. Throughout multiple administrations, Mr. Stoddard remained a constant and reliable presence - the face of Ohio State in Washington.

To better address the needs of Ohio's congressional delegation, he assisted in opening a satellite office in the nation's capital, which has been hailed as "one of the best damn lobbying operations in the land." He also established the Big Ten Federal Relations Council, further encouraging members of the Big Ten to stand together on academic issues.

Mr. Stoddard most recently served as vice president of government affairs and special assistant to the president before his retirement from Ohio State in the fall of 2015. A highly respected voice in national academic circles, Mr. Stoddard currently volunteers as chair of the Big Ten Federal Relations Council and as the university's delegate on the board of directors of the Midwestern Universities Consortium for International Activities.
